Sir,

With reference to your letter of the of the 31st ulto, we beg to inform you that we ordered 600 bales of Alfalfa from Messrs Gibbs and Company of Valparaiso to be shipped down to Punta Arenas whence it would be brought over by the "Falkland". We have, however received a cable from this firm to-day stating that they cannot ship our order owing to their not being able to give the necessary guarantees.

2. I may add that we shall order a shipment from Bahia Blanca if we can induce the Pacific Company to reduce the rate of freight which they at present quote at \$4 per ton - this is, of course, quite prohibitive and out of all proportion to our freight from home. Should there be a cargo vessel calling at Bahia Blanca, and the freight on this fodder be reduced, we will apply at a later date for His Excellency's permission to import.
