some weeks past, during which time they  
have been raced too and fro by motor cars

and cycles and, at times they have been as far down as the Battle Memorial. I am of opinion that sheep grazing on this section which has no fence and is therefore open to the town, should not be permitted, the animals are a danger to the public, a worry to the Police through straying into the town, and it is cruelty to the sheep to have them racing to & fro. I suggest that the few shillings that the land may be leased for, will, in no way compensate the Government for the risk and trouble caused.

As you are already aware, when the town plots were put up by auction for grazing, I secured Lot 4, west of Battle Memorial for the sum of 37/-.

I have been using it only for the past month for grazing two horses, but for a week now it has been over-run night and morning, and badly cropped down by sheep that appear to be running loose and not herded, with the result that owing to contamination of the ground I must give up my pleasure of riding and put my animals on the common, having no other place to hold them.

The conditions of the sale distinctly stated that "all animals must be tethered", and I think it hardly equitable that a large number of sheep should have free range to be a pest and nuisance to those who have paid for and keep plots in respectable condition.

If it should not be possible to have this rectified, I would be glad to learn if I may be permitted to relinquish the right I have to Lot 4, until the 31st March 1936, and receive a refund on the amount I paid for it.



I submit report on the complaint of Mr. W. J. Lellman regarding sheep straying on the North Camp Rd. At different times the Police and myself have informed Mr. McTigue as to his sheep straying, and he has immediately gone to see to same. These sheep seem to stray down towards the Memorial site every day and no doubt are becoming a nuisance to the public. Mr. Lellman paid £1-17-0 for the grazing rights on one plot of land west of Memorial Site to main outfall near Sullivan House, from October 1<sup>st</sup> 1935 until March 31<sup>st</sup> 1936, thereby having had nearly four (4) months grazing on same. I do not agree with Mr. Lellman's version (re) contamination of the ground by the sheep grazing there, as I have seen horses grazing on the same land as sheep have been grazing on. I do not see any way to remedy the complaint only by the withdrawal of the permission to graze the said sheep.


