# Falkland Islands and South Georgia, Wheling Industry.

Dear Sir.

During recent researches carried on in Scotland, at the request of the Colonial Office, with regard to the unsatisfactory health of the sheep stocks in the Falkland Islands, analyses of the pasture grasses there show them to be highly deficient in certain minerals.

We reported accordingly to your office, and suggested that certain experiments might be made in feeding minerals to the sheep stocks direct. The most suitable of these mineral mixtures in all probability is bone meal. I understand that the whaling industry in the Anterctic Seas has recently undergone considerable development, and that one of the stations is in South Georgia, and that a Committee under the Colonial Office is carrying out certain investigations on this subject. The skeletons of these whales would provide a source for a considerable amount of bone meal at a relatively short distance from the Falkland Islands, and I suggest that letters should be sent both to the Flakland Islands and to South Georgia to enquire whether:-

- (1) There is any large supply of bone meal to be obtained from the source.
- (2) What its price would be.

(3) Whether the Falkland Islands would consider utilising this, for at any rate a certain amount of experiment.

"Tonsberg Whaling Co., has 181 tons of "bonemeal awailable for immediate delivery "at £7.15.6 per ton c.i.f. Stanley.

The above quotation was issued by the Company in December last year but is the latest the local manager has to hand.

According to the correspondence received from the various whaling Companies there was approximately 1,654 tons of bonemeal manufactured in South Georgia last season, but after perusal of the material extracts of correspondence attached hereto, it will be observed that last season cannot be accepted as a fair criterion of the standard production as developments are fast taking place.

EXTRACTS FROM CORRESPONDENCE ON BONEMEAL RECEIVED FROM THE WHALING COMPANIES, AS UNDER: -

#### Compania Argentina de Pesca.

We do not produce benemeal for export on our Station except the quantity necessary to mix the meatmeal in order to get the right proportion bone and meatmeal in the guano we export viz:-1/3 part benemeal and about 2/3 part meatmeal. Last year we exported 75,477 lbs benemeal, but this quantity was the balance we get after having used what we needed for the guano.

Production last season: -

1/3 part bonemeal......1,880,578 Lbs. 2/3 .. meatmeal..... 75,477 ...

Production of Meatmeal...1,956,055 .

The above quantity should be more or less the total quantity of bonemeal we are able to manufacture per season.

#### Tonsberg Whaling Co.,

From fresh whales are especially manufactured cattlefood and under these conditions the production of bonemeal will increase comparitively. From burnt whales are nearly only made some small portion of bonemeal so you will understand it is rather difficult to fix a certain quantity. As the catch turned out last season there was manufactured of bonemeal about 215 tons.

### Southern Whaling & Sealing Co.,

We have just recently got our bone drier into working condition and have to date produced 700 bags and all bone residues are going to be used for the purpose of bonemeal.

#### South Georgia Co.,

During last season we did not manufacture any bonemeal at all. This season we have manufactured about 1,500 bags to date but will be able in the new factory being built to work up 8/900 bags by day.

#### Vestfold Whaling Co.,

(Telegram) Production of bonemeal during sesson 1924/25 was 5,750 bags of 100 kilos (appx 566 tons),1925-26 1,400 bags, (137 tons 15 Cwt. appx)
