Hon. Col. Seely. On Tuesday the 21st October I rode with
Mr. Langdon through the boggy camp at Fitzroy.

I found that the percentage showing
symptoms of lice was very small, and did not
warrant immediate dipping of the whole flock.

Mr. Langdon will dip this flock off the
shears within the next month.

On Sunday the 20th October I examined the
flock at Finslay Harbour, and was unable to
find any infection. Indeed it was difficult to find
a suspicious animal for examination. Besides
examination of live sheep, several carcasses a few
days old were examined with negative results.

Mr. Elliot informed me that he examined this
flock at an earlier date and was unable to
find any infected sheep. He assured me that
he was satisfied that there were lice on the
skin which was brought in by the shepherd
who herds the Finslay Harbour flock.

This flock will be dipped off the shears.

Dear Sir,

I herewith beg to notify you that a sheep infected with lice was discovered and killed in the camp called Findlay Harbour Rincon of North Arm Section, on 3rd September, 1932.

On 4th and 5th September, the stock, (hoggetts) in this camp were gathered up and inspected by Mr. Elliott the manager of North Arm, and though all suspicious animals were caught and thoroughly examined, no further trace of lice could be found. The two adjoining camps were also similarly inspected but proved to be absolutely clean.

Unless instructions to the contrary are received from you, I propose to have the flock kept strictly isolated, and shorn at an early date when of course they will be dipped off the shears and again in 14 days.

For your information I would respectfully point out that to dip these sheep immediately would entail a 6 to 7 hour drive through clean flocks which would thereby be possibly subject to infection, also as you are no doubt aware it is impossible to get full benefit from any dip when sheep are in /



2. At Port Louis Section there were seen about seven sheep infected among the Gimmers and one bad case was killed.

3. At Fitzroy a few cases were found in the Hoggett grounds of which one was killed.

W. There can be no doubt from Red (10) of Mt. 535/22 that Ordinance, No. 5 of 1922 was expressly introduced for the purpose of dealing with sheep infected with lice.

The Hon. G. J. Felton in 1930 (Red 26 of Mt. 115/27) raised the question of quarantining for lice and a reply was addressed to him as in Red (24) of the same Mt.
