  - the fence to run from the corner of Brownings fence near the South East corner of Sappers Hill in a southerly direction to Stanley Harbour
  - All dry cows and young stock to be kept west of this fence the common west of this fence to be kept for the grazing of horses and milking cows.
  - I do not think that 5 bulls are needed for the number of stock on the commons there are only four feeding grounds at present and if the fence is erected there will then be only three, I consider that three bulls are sufficient.
  - The estimated number of animals on the common is only approximate and cannot be proved without a surprise gathering of the common.

The Government ordered 7' posts but 6'6" posts have been supplied, fortunately a large number are well over 6'6" and sufficient long posts about can be selected for the two fences/to be erected.

2. With regard to the cost the rate is higher considerably than that of the last consignment, obtained from Messrs Menendez Behety & Co. Prior to this round posts were obtained from Messrs Townsend & Co. which can be sold at 2/- each ex store; the post in question being 7' long and the rate of exchange being \$ 38 to £. The 6'6" posts now obtained from Mr Hobbs will have to be sold at 3/7 each; the rate of exchange being \$37 to £. : making a difference of 1/7 per post.

3. I have enquired from the F.I.Co. and find that the selling price of "Sandy Point" round fencing posts and "Cypress" ditto is the same.

## From Governor to Colonial Secretary.

Q. Mr. Ratnapura are not willing to take over control of pastures on common (423/12) it remains in hands of Govt. Without expert advice it is difficult to make practical suggestion for better utilization of area available.

2. As will be seen from chart there is a large area lying between a line drawn from the summit of Sappus Hill to Stanley Harbor & the boundary of the number of animals which graze here is enormous Moody Valley farm. Part of this area has recently been greatly improved by drainage. On 9th February there were over a dozen cattle and a few hens grazing near Toller stream; there were no animals at all on large area <sup>towards</sup> towards Moody Valley farm ~~borders~~.
3. There are four troops of cattle on the common. They generally graze between fairly well defined limits of their own making.
  - (1) Roxbury Stream
  - (2) Hare River
  - (3) Gove Green
  - (4) Toller's stream.



## AGREEMENT FOR THE ERECTION OF A SIX-WIRE FENCE.

I, VICTOR J. IELLMAN, (Contractor) agree with the Colonial Engineer to erect a six-wire fence to extend from the north-east corner of the boundary fence of the land occupied by Mr Browning to the Common Fence at the gateway immediately to the south of Government House, as marked out and explained by the Colonial Engineer, for the sum of Twenty-five pounds (£25.).

GENERAL CONDITIONS.

All material will be carted by the Government and placed at convenient intervals along line of fence.

Two gates (supplied by the Government) to be hung.

Average distance between posts to be 16 yards.

Average distance between battens to be 2 yards.

Fence to be anchored where required.

Posts to be barned and feet given one coat of Solignum or tar.

In places where it is not possible to fix a post owing to solid rock or reef a crate is to be erected.

Length of posts is on no condition to be reduced unless instructed by the Colonial Engineer to do so. Attention is to be drawn to posts which, owing to the nature of the ground, could not be put down more than 2' 3".

The depth in ground of 6' 6" posts is to be at least 2' 6" and of 7' posts 3'. Longest posts are to be put in softest ground.

All main straining posts are to be strutted and stone wedged.

Straining posts are to be about 250 yards apart.

Separate hanging posts are to be provided for gates, each post is to be at least 3' away from the straining post and battens are to be placed between straining post and gate post.

All surplus material is to be collected in one place, not farther from the Township than the south-west corner of Mr Bonner's South Paddock, whence it will be removed by the Government.

Battens are to be attached to wires with staples, the staples being staggered.

The Government will supply all material and tools required for the erection of fence.

Work should commence as soon as possible and the contractor should not engage on other work until the completion of this contract without permission from the Colonial Engineer.

The contractor will be required to carry out the work in a thoroughly sound and workmanlike manner to the satisfaction of the Colonial Engineer notwithstanding anything which may have been omitted either from the notice dated 10th. September or from this agreement.
