## 14 DRURY STREET OR 4 LOWER ROW

## NB: There is no 13 Drury Street; instead 14 and 14A Drury Street

This house is one of the original "two roomed kit houses worth £50 each" that were shipped down on board the Victory which arrived in Stanley 13 October 1849. Twelve cottages were built on Drury Street (or Lower Row as it was originally called) for the military pensioners who also arrived on the same ship. This house was originally 4 Lower Row and was allotted to Robert GILLESPIE, a private and military pensioner from Ireland, who had arrived with his family 13 October 1849 on board the Victory.

On 19 June 1856 Crown Grant 70 was issued to **Robert GILLESPIE** for services performed, being Pensioners Cottage Allotments 4 containing 24 poles and measuring 60 links x 250 links. [CG 70]

Robert and his family departed on the *Ealing Grove* 12 February 1858 and the cottage was allocated to a member of the newly arrived detachment on the *Ealing Grove*. [B10].

Crown Grant 70 was cancelled and on 8 September 1879 Crown Grant 244 was issued to **James HOCKING** for £66, being Pensioners Cottage Allotments 4 containing 24 poles and measuring 60 links x 250 links. [CG 244]

In 1891, for tax purposes, 14 Lower Pensioners Allotment was valued at £15. [FI Gazette]

**James Henry HOCKING**, a naval pensioner, died 23 November 1892 and left his entire estate to his wife, Ann.

**Ann Elizabeth HOCKING** died 10 May 1896. In her will dated 6 December 1892 she left Pensioners Cottage Allotment No 4 to her granddaughter **Alice Mary COULSON**. [BUG-REG-5; 169]

On 22 April 1899 **Alice Mary COULSON** granted to **Franz BUSE** Pensioners Cottage Allotments No 4 containing 24 poles and *"including house & buildings"* for £108. [BUG-REG-5; 266]

On 21 February 1922 **Franz BUSE**, through his attorney Gregor Brechin, granted to **Helen GRIERSON** of Stanley, Pensioners Cottage Allotments No 4 containing 24 poles and bounded "On the North by Drury Street, on the South Pioneer Row, on the West by Lot 5 and on the East by Lot 3 together with all erections thereon" for £400. [BUG-REG-9; 23]

On 3 September 1924 **Helen GRIERSON** granted to her eldest daughter, **Mrs E J (Margaret) SMITH** née **HUNTER**, Lot 4 Section B bounded "On the North by Drury Street; On the South by Pioneer Row; On the East by Lot 3; On the West by Lot 5 together with all erections thereon" for £500. [BUG-REG-9; 211]

On 21 August 1928 **Margaret SMITH** of Stanley granted to her mother, **Helen GRIERSON** of Stanley, Lot 4 Section B bounded "On the North by Drury Street; On the South by Pioneer Row; On the East by Lot 3; On the West by Lot 5 together with all erections thereon" for one shilling. [BUG-REG-9; 381]

**Helen GRIERSON** died 7 December 1931 and on 5 September 1933 her youngest daughter, **Helen ETHERIDGE** of Stanley, and her eldest daughter, **Margaret SMITH** of Stanley granted to **Ernest Lewis LYSE** of Stanley, Lot 4 Section B together with all erections thereon bounded "On the South by Pioneer Row, on the east by Lot 3, on the North by Drury Street, on the West by Lot 5" for £350. [BUG-REG-10; 296]
