Gir, Enclosing Duplicates of our two last Despatches on the 10th and 14th ult. and letter of 19th ult. F. 'Dus' we acknowledge your letter of 11th Nov^t which arrived 21st ult. and contained the Bill Receivable £ 52. 2. 9 reported as not in N^o 491, the matters in this letter have been attended to. Your Despatch N^o 492 of 4th ult. arrived on the 15th instant.

2. N^o 491, 8. We received the Chart with Fences on Lagonia through your Brother but unfortunately nothing will ever be able to replace the one taken or destroyed in this Office.

3. Par 10. In order to have a proper opinion upon the legal point whether the expenses of a Master of a wrecked vessel could be demanded of the Owners we wrote Mess^m Waltons Johnson & Bubb, Solicitors, 101 Leadenhall St^r, on 8th instant with Copy of this Paragraph and received their letter of 11th inst. replying that they "do not think that Owners of a wrecked vessel are under any legal obligation to pay the costs of the Masters passage home" or other expenses, as this Firm stands high in legal Shipping business you will have to exercise judgment in advising Captains under such circumstances, copies of the letters are sent herewith.

4. Par 12. We sent on 11 May 89, 11,184 yds Wool Bagging and on 9 Nov 89, 3,905 yards making 15,089 yards according to Indent 89 ordering 15,000 yards, and next month or March we mean to order 20,000 yards for the 10th May steamer, perhaps in the meantime you may have stated whether any of the cheaper at 4th sent 11 May 89 is to be supplied.

5. Par 16. It is very unfortunate that the Newspapers are again missing, the Post Office cannot discover the reason so we shall register each package in future and so get a receipt for it.

6. Par 18. The two cases Private Effects of 'Pentaur'

14 Sep 89 are N. £8,100 for Packes man Fleuret from Mr. Ploger and N. £8,202 for Dr. Dale from his Brother, both senders had orders to put the consignee's name on the case.

7. Par 19. Mr. Dean sent us your letter of 18 Oct 89 to Mr. C. M. Dean stating that the balance in favor of Capt. Hanson after realization of his Produce was to be paid to him, an account was therefore made out, copy herewith, and £322.2.4 was paid to Mr. Dean on the 14th instant.

8. Par 24. I believe your suggestion about Telegrams not being needed for small repairs of vessels well owned ought to be carried out so that this expense may be saved.

9. N. 492, 3, 6. On 18th ult. at 9.32 am we received Telegram Home N. 83 "Federal Adolph Harboe Harboe Skjeldekor schooner returns decimal" meaning we are to arrange credit with Owners and reply 21st December, & immediately wrote Messrs. G & R. Harboe with details & stating that we must wire on 21st Dec^r, as they did not telegraph or write we sent Telegram Out N. 54 on 21 Dec 89 at 12.35 pm "Harboe Festival" for you to take Bottomry Bond - we wrote again on 6th & received reply on 10th that they would accept Captain's Draft if he had not made other dispositions in Stanley and the Commission was not more than 7½ %, Mr. Dean now suggests that we might instruct Vorwerk at Valparaiso, to whom you will doubtless ^{send} the Bottomry Bond, to make a reduction, this must be decided soon to write by an early Mail.

10. We are exceedingly glad to hear that the Lambing has been so good and that you have visited all our Stations with Mr. Williamson who of course could explain about Cooper's Sheep Dip: your Cousin told me he had received a long letter from you proposing that there should be a Camp Manager independent of the Business Manager at Stanley which he will lay before the Board on the 20th - we lately received a Telegram from Mr. Nichol at Fremantle notifying his return to England towards end of next month.

11. H. E. Gov^r. Herr returns by this Steamer, he called here on 16th to sympathize with my sad loss so would not enter into any business or allow me to send for a Director to see him, but feeling the necessity of financial arrangements I told him of the £ 361 Stanley Treasury Bill now enclosed and he said he had arranged

with the Crown Agents to report by the 'Osiris' to Sandy Point what instructions could be given for the purchase of further Bills here on account of the Savings Bank funds. Most unfortunately the 'Dux' has had to put back for repairs after collision and sails again this day, this delay is unfortunate for our £2,000 onboard which you want, but know it is coming, and for the Cathedral goods as the building will be interrupted. Our Finances here require management I am happy to report that Mr. Staudt writes that the 'Memphis' Mail Sv. of 15th instant was to take 600 bales Wool and the 'Heben' would call middle of next month for another large quantity, so you are fulfilling our instructions at end of Telegram Out N° 53 to expedite the Wool. The expenses on the £2,000 per 'Dux' freight 7.10. - insurance 12.15. - must be considered with reference to the cost of obtaining Specie from the River Plate Bank at Montevideo, though I suppose you could use Silver from there which would be much cheaper than Gold.

12. Mr. T. Robson is receiving small advances against his Wool, he is going to return soon to live in the Colony. Mr. Peckham has paid in £500 for Weddell Island account at 5% upon the current account. Messrs. Wright & M^c Jerrow, Solicitors, Lockerbie, inform us that Mr. Thomas Paterson at Walker is a beneficiary under a Will and they require his signature to be attested by a Public Official, we have told them that you would assist and if necessary allow him to come into Stanley so they write him by this Mail, please render him the needed assistance. Mr. Paget asks us to forward a Bill for £73.12. - upon Mr. James Turner please get it accepted and return by first opportunity.

13. Mssrs. L. A. Baillon and E. F. Baillon signed on the 9th inst. a Bond for Fidelity for £500 (Five Hundred Pounds) each for their Brother Mr. Andrew E. Baillon our Clerk at Stanley. I deem it proper to state that we pay £4 quarterly for Capt. Winkler and paid his Insurance £6.13.4 on the 16th inst. - the only other payment for the 'Orissa' is £1 a month for Gladen the Mate. Through the illness of Mr. Clements several returns and accounts cannot be sent nor the Ledger and Journal entries but send an account of Creditors and Debtors at Stanley on a single sheet as it is essential you should know these receipts and payments. The Wool Press from Denison & C° £120 has been shipped for Mr. Austin, we wait instructions about the large quantity of Stores ordered in N° 487.

14. For some time past there has been an idea that we

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would excessively have to put up Refrigerating Machinery for utilizing our Sheep instead of boiling down but the expense has been objected to and the difficulty of getting Steamers to call for the Mutton. Mess^r Spearin & Waldron having now fitted out the 'Hongkist' to sail on 20th for refrigerating Mutton at Weddell Mr. Howard asked me to inspect her which has been done and I send a sheet of notes upon this business, for it might answer our purpose to avail of this vessel as they do not wish to enter into opposition with us in any way & they have already engaged for Steamers to call to bring the cattle ^{to London} so that if their ideas could be carried out we should save considerable expense and risk, the matter is therefore brought to you for consideration.

15. There is a difficulty about the 3 Guanaco Skins said to be part of the cargo of the D. Brundrib 22 July 89 as they cannot be found so I have written Capt^r. Thomas about them, I mentioned this in N^o. 729, 9 but as you report they belong to Rev^r. Bridges we are answerable for them which I have reported to the Brokers who have searched into the matter but cannot discover that they were landed. Only this morning have we received Landing etc. of the 143 Sheepskin bales ex. 'Hornate' 6 Jan 90 as follows £ 109 bales - HGC 20 bales - WEC 16 bales - £ 58 bales - F 2 bales - F 5 bales - No Marte bales.

Capt^r. Jones of the 'Glencoyn' states that 4 bags flour 4.16c in account 24 Oct 89 were not put on board & sends Certificate to prove this, if you cannot prove the delivery we shall have to repay this to Mess^r Sherwin & Son, Liverpool. Mess^r. Burney's Chilean Steamers from France will coal at Sandy Point though paying over $\frac{1}{2}$ of a ton.

We send Circulars of Mess^r. David Powell & C^o; Iron Wire Fencing of which they say a quantity has been used on the West giving great satisfaction, they will allow 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent Discount to buyers and a special 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ % Commission for all orders received through us.

Mess^r. Thomas Bland & Sons, Gun Makers, 130 West Grand, have also offered an Agency as they have supplied many people at the F. D. as per copy of their letter 16th inst. enclosed.
The rate for Wool by the Gulf Line Steamers is 7% not 8% as reported
The 'Birgitte' sailed on the 10th inst. & do not think she is to call at Stanley.
Miss Barriet Coish goes out by this Steamer to marry James Steel.

Sir,

We enclose Duplicate of N^o. 733 dated 18th ult. and acknowledge your Despatch N^o. 493 of the 12th Dec^r received on the 27th ult., and on same morning at 9.25 am Telegram Home N^o. 84 arrived "Slush stidonata man pesada" meaning, I have shipped 930 bales Wool P. G.W. Memphis, which is most satisfactory and we were further gratified by learning from Mr. Staudes letter of 28th ult. that Mr. Schlottfelds had reported that 700 bales would be ready for the extra boat 'Trever' calling at Stanley 14th February, so that these two large lots of Wool can be sold early in the Second Series of Wool Sales and place us in funds, after our very heavy expenses and the Interim Dividend last month.

2. N^o. 493, 3. We are obliged for the calculations about Refrigerating Melton but as this business is at present so uncertain the Board has determined not to erect buildings, par 14 of our last Despatch sent particulars of the 'Fengist' fitted up for refrigerating by Spearing & Waldron and we might be able to get rid of a few old Sheep through them though our chief endeavor ought to be to increase our Wool producing stocks, still we shall be glad of your examination & remarks on the 'Fengist'.

3. Par 6. With respect to the Church we have left the whole matter entirely to your judgment, of course we could hardly refuse building materials for it to fill up the 'D. Brundell' and they were entitled to charter the 'Dux' to send out the balance some trust matters will proceed favorably - you have quite understood our Telegram Out N^o. 53, unfortunately the 'Dux' was not able to sail until the 29th ultimo.

4. Par 14. I explained to Capt. Thomas that we had contracted to ship most of our Wool by steam but as he said he should like to return with whatever he could get instead of going seeking, I thought it had better be mentioned to you as

he would doubtless take a very low rate of freight so I trust my remarks may not cause you trouble with him.

5. Par 18. The Board decided yesterday that you might try some Wool next season by tying the fleeces with string, picking out one flock tying up half with wool as now done sending the numbers of the bales of each tying up to enable us to compare the prices realized at sale, and we shall obtain if possible a report from the buyer of the string tied Wool, the String or Twine ordered in Indent 91 will be shipped next month.

6. Par 20. Mr. W^m. F. Stark returned by the 'Cruba' bringing the Despatch, the 'Theben' landed them at Sandy Pt on the 16th Dec^r having met early that morning the 'Crotava', two hours outside Sandy Point, which would not stop when hailed by the 'Theben' to take her Mails, ^{passengers} and we have complained to the Pacific C° on this point - as he was delayed he has asked for expenses, which is declined as he must have known from the Mail Service table that there would be some delay and he has been handsomely treated by the C°; for Mr. Dean states there was no agreement for bringing home his wife, however the matter is now settled so there is no need of further remarks.

7. Par 12. We now keep the payments for 'Orifa' separate until her return, the first payment on behalf of John Sladen, the Slave £1 on 4th Dec^r was debited to Debtors at Stanley but this now passed to Orifa Voy. Acc^t by Journal entry.

8. Par 23. It is unfortunate the bales of Sheepskins ex Denderah 16 Sep 89 were not measured but when we advised you, 26 Nov 89 Remarks on Accounts in N^o 730, of only charging 66/- per ton weight we were under impression you would charge our Clients with an additional freight for labor, schooner work &c. Will you be good enough to inform us this year the exact freight we are to charge ourselves and Clients by each vessel the Produce is shipped, as there were so many different freights last year.

9. We have not written M^r F. Vorwerk & C° at Valparaiso to make any reduction upon the Adolph Harboe's Bottomry Bond should Mr. Harboe consider himself too heavily charged we might make some reduction here on learning your opinion on the matter. I made a mistake in N^o 733, 11 in stating the freight on £2000 Specie per 'Duc' was 7.10.- it should have been £15.15.- which we have

paid : Messrs. F. Langridge &c. have asked us to advance to Capt. Tergesen of the 'Dux' or pay his accounts to the amount of £200 (Two Hundred Pounds) and they will meet his Draft on them at Three days sight. We are much surprised and annoyed to find that Messrs. Bafts &c. did not ship 12 Kils Ale by the 'Dux', they will now go by the next Steamer together with the Stores ordered in Indents 95 and 96, though there may be difficulty with the Bulwark Iron as we have asked for prices at Hamburg and a reduced rate from the Kosmos E. - the name of St. for 15th pros. is not yet given - there will also be some goods left at Hamburg by the 'Osiris' also Antwerp, there was great trouble & confusion about this vessel Browne &c. have not yet cleared it up, they think several packages struck out of the Bill of Lading are on board. You will have to charge Austin on his Wool Preys & Wool packs, Bertrand on his Stores &c. 'Osiris' Frt, Insurance, Dock Charges, Commission 2½% as per account of Client's Store Shipments P. 'Orifsa' and D. Brundrit' herewith, as before stated the Commission and Dock Charges do not pay us for the trouble and expense incurred. We have begun N.S. again for packages by the 'Osiris' - With reference to 731, 15 about delaying a Steamer to recount the bales Wool if there is a dispute about the number received, Mr. Gauder asserts we should have to pay for the delay if the number stated by them for the Bill of Lading proves to be correct.

10. We have now claimed 116. 13. 4 from the River Plate Meat E. here for the 14,000 Sheep Bags sent P. Menes' 10 Oct 88 to Montevideo for their works at Buenos Ayres and they have written to enquire if they were received. Capt. Packe called yesterday to pay £300 for his Nephew Mr. Vere Packe, I have since thought we could not pay over so much Cash so have this day written him to this effect stating it can be placed to their Store &c. and shall receive his decision to send by the Supplementary Mail on 8th inst.

Sir, Enclosing Duplicate of our last on 4th ult. and my letter of 8th ult. we acknowledge your Despatches N^o. 494 and 495 dated 8th and 16th January received on 27th ult. and N^o. 496 dated 6th ultimo which arrived on the 11th inst., all Enclosures being in order.

Your letter of 18th January by the S. Memphis' to Monte Video arrived 21st ult. so that Mr. Humphreys sent it on by an earlier Steamer than the Post Office did.

2. N^o. 494, 3. We did not receive full particulars of the number of Hides for each Client per 'Dennis Brundrit' 22 July 89, only the "Knots" quantity recd stated therefore the wharf sorted them from the list handed to them - There is certainly a great difference compared with your list now so hand but as our Books are now closed corrected Account Sales cannot be sent, please therefore make necessary alterations on your side. It would save mistakes in future if separate Bills of Lading were made out for Produce not consigned to the Company for sale.

3. Par 6. Account Sales shall in future be made out as you suggest and the Broker's copies sent to you - and freight upon Sheepskins must be charged by measurement as you suggest in Pars 7 and 8.

4. ^{Par 11} We have always considered that the extensive Skirting practised by some Farmers makes their few bales of extra Wool sell at a higher price than ours, though when the average is taken we are still rather above them so we had better continue in the same way.

5. Par 18. We regret to say the Orissa's homeward freight

resulted in a loss of £130. 16. 2, the outward in a profit of £284. 7. 1 as per particulars sent on 8th ult. - details of the £165 on Co^{rs} cargo out by her are sent herewith. Freight on Mr. Dean's extra cargo must be charged by you as not being on 18th ult we were quite at a loss to know what had been shipped, the freight on stoves £1. was paid here. Mr. Dean bought himself for Port Stephens £1. Therefore we have no invoices only charging freight which Mr. Dean paid here. We were forced to fill up with Patterson's beer strongly recommended by Mr. Dean as Read Bros. had none ready. Part 19 Morton's invoice for Sheben 9 Nov 89 was not ready so it was sent the next Mail on 10 Dec 89.

6. N^o. 495, 2104 - The Board are well satisfied that you have carried out such a thorough inspection of our Sheep Farms and found everything in such good order, you have certainly managed remarkably well to have so much Wool ready so early and we trust prices will be good at the Sales next month as both the "Memphis" and the "Shebenis" will be here in time - I fear the freight will be heavier as the bales are not so heavily packed but this shall be thoroughly examined.

7. Par 5. We must attend to your wish not to ship goods for residents at Stanley as they may be sold in opposition to our Stores but I was told the cartridges for Rowell were a small quantity for his own use.

8. Par 8. We shall charge Freight in future according to your List dated 15 Jan 90.

9. Par 11. The Directors have decided not to continue the Co^{rs} payment of Cash, use of House &c to a Successor of the Rev^o W. G. Philips through the Free Church of Scotland and have asked us to do so, the house will be required for the Camp Manager, you had better therefore arrange with the Rev^o L. C. Brandon, the Rev^o G. H. Harris and the Catholic Priest for visitations & inspections in the best manner possible.

10. Par 14. The bottled Irish Whiskey is ordered from Day - the Brandy Cocks were ordered for Tanks so it was considered best to order them from Burney who supplies the Tanks.

11. Par 23. We have the pleasure of reporting that the Crown Agents wrote us on the 4th inst. that they could sell us drafts on the Stanley Treasury for £400 per month during the current year, this we immediately accepted for the present Mail, draft enclosed, and the Mails of 1st April, 10th and 29th May to be continued on the 19th July & subsequent Mails on receiving your reply so this notifying that these remittances will be required. When Cash is paid in here for Island Accounts and payments at Stanley a charge for freight and insurance ought to be entered in your books, our £2000 ft. Due cost £1.8.6 per cent and should we ever be forced to send Specie by the Cosmos C° the expenses would be £1.15.7 per cent.

12. Par 25. I wrote Edward and Captⁿ. Packe as you wished, both express their satisfaction with our mode of conducting business, the former is selling his share 4/11ths in Packe Bro^s Farm on West Falkland, Fox Bay, to Mr. John G. Goodhart who has been working with them there for 4 years for £5,000, Captⁿ. Packe holds 6/11 and Mr. Buckworth 1/11, Mr. Goodhart has been here several times and goes out by this opportunity if the legal documents for the purchase are completed, he has kindly undertaken to take charge of Jesse Phillips' watch, if not it will be sent in the Despatch per G.W. as being safer than parcel post.

13. Par 26. The Board has decided to appoint a Camp Manager to be under your instruction four to six months, they have seen Mr. Nichol and there are a great number of applications through advertising, it will be difficult to arrange properly at first, the house ought to be plainly furnished by the C° as we cannot expect a young man to provide this himself, if no suitable Furniture obtainable in the Colony some must go out in the 'Brissa'; then again if not married there ought to be a man and his wife for cooking and household duties, this would cost £7 a month according to the expenses incurred by the West Falklanders; several of the Directors consider he ought certainly to have experience of Colonial Sheep Farms, others that a clever Scotchman from the North would be better, one even proposed that he

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should go out on trial so if after three months you did not find him the right man he could be sent back - the Salary proposed is £250 to 300 rising annually or a commission upon dividend, engagement for 3 or 5 years, security for £1000 or more as the Cash for Darwin Store will pass through his hands; we hope your Despatch due 9th prox: will give us some hints & even full details upon this appointment, as it will doubtless give your opinion as to Baillon's capabilities for undertaking the Mercantile Management at Stanley.

14. Par 33. We find that the 1 keg O Tallow in the Neko 4 Nov 89 is leakage from the ~~WP~~ 21 casks carefully saved & put into a keg by the Officers of the Neko.

15. Par 35. We regret the Post Office is still dishonest & careless about the Newspapers but as we now register each package to ensure delivery we have not ordered Kirkland & Cope &c. to send the Times on your own account, should even registration not cause proper delivery we can then carry out your wish.

16. N^o 496, 1. The Memphis' 930 bales Wool and 3 casks Sealskins arrived on 10th inst. though as yet the returns are not here. We are glad you are prepared for the earlier arrival of "Theben" - on the 13th ult. Telegram Home N^o. 85 arrived "Theben sprovedute" to tell us she had received 670 bales Wool.

17. Par 2. It is satisfactory that you received Despatch Out N^o. 732 though delayed by the Stanley Postmaster as we complained to the Post Office about the nondelivery - Par 4. When this Mail is gone I must enquire at the River Plate Bank if they ever get any English Silver Coin and the price to us.

18. Par 8, 9. The West Falkland goods p. D. Brundrit were insured to Stanley only, in future they shall be done so destination. We always insure all Wool consigned to us, Dean & Capt. Packe insure their own, the former insures for Anson, I must ask about the premium for all risks & Dean about the damage at Charters River and send note later on.

19. Par 12. The "Wasp's" Boiler Tubes were ordered from Rownson for the 'D. Brundrit' but could not be ready so were shipped by the 'Dux' 19 Dec 89. The remainder of Fencing p. Pentaur 14 Sep was sent p. D Brundrit 5 Nov 89.

19. Par 13. Enclosed is Memo

Spearing and Waldron's further arrangements in the Refrigerating business as they are going to erect killing Sheds upon Land sold them by Mr. Cameron close to his Wool Sheds at San Carlos where they will kill 8,000 Sheep provided by Cameron & others for the 'Hengist', as they are willing to work amicably with us I do not see why you should not sell them some Sheep if we can spare them and they will send the 'Hengist' round to Goose Green, of course they must pay cash for them or give approved Bills but it would be experience for us and would certainly pay better than melting them for Tallow, I am sure the Directors would approve of your using your best judgment in the matter and commence such a business with your usual care.

20. On the 11th ult^r. Mess^r. Cooper Nephews sent through our Indicator a Telegram for their Agent Mr. Williamson "Williamson remain dipping" which we hope was understood. On the 14th ult^r. Lloyds sent copy of your Telegram of arrival of 'Maravilla' and 'Mattice' for water, which is dated the 6th ult^r. being the first Telegram Home giving the Stanley date: on the 1st inst^r. we received Telegram Home N^o. 86 "Federal Antares Penney Brighton" we immediately ^{wired} wrote Mr. Penney if he would accept his Captain's drafts for expenses of the 'Antares' to which he consented and we therefore sent Telegram Out N^o. 55 "Fictionist Antares" on the 3rd instant and hope it arrived with the Mail of 4th ult^r. as it was rather late as Mr. Penney did not answer our Telegram.

21. There has been considerable trouble about the Stores pt. S. V. 'Osiris' 18 Jan 90 many packages were struck out of the Bill of Lading but not being found at Hamburg they must be on-board, some left out are now sent and we execute Indent 96 of 14 Jan and Indent 97 of 15 Jan both received 29th ult^r. and we trust nothing will be left out this time though a quantity has gone over to Antwerp. The Brother of Capt^r. Hamilton of the 'Arendsburg' who died at Stanley has sent a Gravestone, as per enclosed letter from him to you, which he wishes you to put in the Cemetery

at his expense which he will pay here on receiving account. Indent 98 of 6 Feb received 11th inst. will be executed on 10th May, the 2,0000 yards Wool Bagging entered in it were ordered on the 19th ult. from Hindley and we trust this time the entire order will be ready in time. To be on the safe side we ordered the Ship repairing Iron from Mr. Rump recommended by Mr. Stande and trust all is on board, the 24 bars Bulk Iron we had to ship from Newcastle, the Cosmos C° have considerably reduced the freight on this rough iron to 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ /c per ton. We send copy of Specification of Boiler for Blacksmith's Shop from Rowson Drew &c° dated 21 Sep 89 which was shipped in D. Brundrit's 5 Nov 89. Messrs. Gilber & Fleming send Illustrated Catalogue, their terms are 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ % discount monthly, with an extra 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ % within 7 days. We have taken from Potter at a reduced rate one dozen more old Charts of the Falklands which can be mounted and folded in any way desirable.

22. On the 20th ult. we paid the National Bank of Scotland £54. 6. 9 for Mr. Bridges' Produce ex 'Neko' 4 Nov 89 reported to Stanley 4th ult. by entry in A. 734. The extra cost of Insurance upon Wool at all risks is 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ % per cent, so Hewitt's Clerk told us here but note just arrived says average risk can be included on our homeward cover for 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ %, I thought 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ for against all risks was very low but must enquire the meaning of average risk.

23. The Board has devoted great attention to the proposal made many years ago for purchasing some Government Land at Darwin Harbour Farm and as you understand the Land question better than any one else and stand well with the Governor the Directors have concluded it will be proper to have this carried out before you leave our service at the Colony. Two statements were prepared for their consideration, as per copies enclosed, showing that the ^{long} Sections you recommended for purchase N° 24, 25, 32, 34, 27, 31, 30, 26, 22 and 18 amounted to 70,460 acres, which at 4/- an acre would cost £14,092 to be paid in yearly instalments of £1,000 with a charge of 3% interest on the balance, though we sincerely trust you will be able to obtain a considerable allowance upon the acreage, and the Board decided on 3rd instant - That Mr. F. Cobb be authorized

to treat for the purchase of our Leaseholds on East Falkland on the basis of the Government price of 4/- per acre in accordance with Gov^r. Kerr's letter of 15 Jan 84 with such allowances as he may be obtain and taking due notice of the fact that the Leases are actually running at £164.9.2 per annum and we have the option of renewal at double Rent & that before actually closing he, if possible, should submit the firm offer home for telegraphic reply.

In case you consider it necessary to wire any arrangement the word "Bugbear" would mean - Cannot arrange anything different to the two statements sent out 15 Mch 90, if the Board agrees wire "buggy". The word "Buglehorn" would mean - Government will accept £ (number as at page 446 A. B. C. Code) payable £2000 a year with 3% interest on balance, if I am to agree wire "bugler". The word "Building" would mean - Arranged certain matters which can be completed after my return to England.

Should we deem it necessary to wire our agreement to the above Telegrams we should use the same word with "agreed" after it. If the matter can be delayed for full report by Despatch Home which may require our telegraphic reply you must send code words for such reply. Should you receive the word "Bulbous" in a telegram to catch this Steamer at M. Video you need not wire the decision with the Governor about the Land Purchase as the Board may decide at next Meeting to let you carry out the whole business as you best can.

Further Code words -

Bulged - Can purchase on terms of Gov^r. Kerr's letter 15 Jan 84 but with no deductions upon acreage.

Bulky - Can purchase on those terms with deductions on acreage. In view of Baillou's statement the word "Bulkiness" would mean - can purchase at three shillings an acre.

Sir, Our last was dated 15th ult. Duplicate being now enclosed, on the 29th ultimo we received your Despatches N^o. 497 and 498 of 15th and 20th February with Enclosures in order, and yesterday your Despatch N^o. 499 of 21st Febst arrived the Duplicates therein mentioned by Mr. M. G. 'Flamingo' having been received on the 29th ultimo.

2. N^o. 497, 2. We are glad to hear the first year's working of Messrs. Dean's purchased business has proved so favorable and the Directors are satisfied with your good management and approve of the arrangements detailed at Par^s 4, 5, 6 as the extra accounts must have certainly given much more work to yourself and clerk.

3. N^o. 498, 5. We trust you will be able, after Mr. Williamson's superintendence of the dipping with Cooper's Dip, to decide whether that or Little's is the best because we believe it will be safer to only use one kind of dip over all our farms and recommend other Sheep Farmers to do the same.

4. Par 6. Through the late arrangement with the Crown Agents for a £400 Stanley Treasury Bill by every Mail, the present one now enclosed dated 29th ult., we are more independent about Finance though I shall adopt your suggestion and endeavour to obtain a lower rate of freight for Specie by the Frosmos Steamers in case of need. We have enquired of the River Plate Bank about English Silver Coin and learn they never have any.

5. Par 7. We advised Mr. Paget of James Turner's delay in paying him and learn that he has since received a letter stating Turner will remit in June and December.

6. Par 8. We now keep all payments for 'Crisa' as against her Voyage Account to be settled here on her return to London and we trust you will give us early intimation when you arrange this - as there are no instructions for Harper's Bridge for next Steamer would it not be well to send it in her.

7. Par 10, 24. Our last left the Refrigerating business at your command so that should Spearing & Waldron approach the C. you can make your own terms, they will doubtless carry out the first voyage of the 'Fengist' and we trust your fears about their getting some of the West Falkland Wool may not be realized, still there is the chance and we may as you observe not be able to retain the present low rate of Wool freight with the Flomas C., still experience must be gained so that if possible better value may be obtained for our surplus Sheep than the present boiling down, as it was noticed at the Board yesterday that 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ ^{rs} was the lowest average value per sheep since 1875, though some one remarked the average weight 18 $\frac{3}{4}$ lbs. shows them to have been a very poor lot all round - we send copy of the line for Return of our large Statement for last year, though the Stores return has not yet been able to be made up.

8. Par 14. This most annoying that Mr. Blake is angry with us because Mr. Ellis did not get his Tallow Machinery ready for the Orkney on 4 Oct 89, the orders came to him direct from Mr. Blake and I did my utmost, knowing Ellis to be very dilatory, to get him to prepare as much as possible, I believe he had the opportunity of shipping by the 'Dox' and now learn that he has three Tanks in sections, Donkey Engine & Cooler, 6 to 7 tons d.w. but have not heard if Mr. Blake will pay steamer freight, though I now see you write Ellis ought to pay the difference; Ellis was to have sent here full particulars I hope he explains matters this Mail to Mr. Blake, we have always found him a most troublesome man to deal with and I was surprised that Mr. Blake should have left so many arrangements to him, I shall go & see him tomorrow & urge him to carry out his duties directly.

9. Par 16. Respecting Dr. Dale's application for increase of Salary yesterday's Board decided as you report favorably of his attentions to our people to grant him Twentyfive Pounds (£25) for the present year and £25 for next year, my Diary has a note on 22 Feb^o. that on that date he may give six months notice to leave, we presume this has not been done though it could not have arrived in Stanley at the date of the last Despatch.

10. Par 14. Kelly took back & allowed for last year's Directory when the present year's was delivered we will however endeavour to procure the book and send with the next Stores.

11. Par 18a. The insurances mentioned have been done Mr. Dean undertaking Weddell, we have commenced Policies for

all risks from the Wool Shed to Warehouse here at 2.6 percent extra, you are aware that our charge to Clients has been 23% per cent so with all risks it will be 25.6 and all Wool consigned to us will now be insured on these terms, unless you direct to the contrary - Captⁿ. Packe has decided not to incur the extra expense 2% for all risks as his Wool always comes by Steamer.

12. Par 19. We are obliged for your reminder that the Land Deeds for M^{rs} Dean & Sons purchase ought to be registered at Stanley they will be sent out next Mail in charge of Mr. Nichol as we must not run the risk of Book Post for such valuables by this Mail - I presume these Deeds will be returned here after registration and I must now ask you to let us have List and full details of all Land Deeds which require to be kept at Stanley before you leave - also the Leases of the Government Lands.

13. Par 24. We shall now pay M^{rs} W. Sherwin & Son £4.16. - for the 4 bags Flour not delivered to their 'Glencoyne' when receiving provisions at Stanley last October.

14. Par 26. Yesterday's Board saw some applicants for the Office of Camp Manager and decided upon Mr. Robert Nichol who has agreed to accept it at a Salary of £300 a year with House, Furniture, Butcher's Meat and Peat Fuel provided for a term of five years with liberty for either party to give six months notice to leave in case of being unsuitable at the end of the first year or at any period afterwards - the Directors consider he ought to go out by the Mail of 10th prox: to have as much instruction from you as possible and we trust this will be carried out.

15. Par 28. The Directors accept the resignation of the management for the C: which you have carried out so well with regret, feeling sure you will make every preparation for leaving all business in first rate order & presume you will quit the Colony in May or June of next year, in the mean time they wish to receive your specific and detailed opinion upon the matter mentioned in my letter to you by the present Mail.

16. Rump's Invoice 4481 £ for Ship Repairing Iron by

Totmes 15th ult^r. only arrived 17th ult^r. & is now sent on, we wrote him 14th ult^r. about same as there appeared some of the order omitted and learn only this morning that is was not delivered so have had to send Copy and will report further when his reply arrives.

The German Consul has paid us 201.4.9 on your account and we have received from the Falkland Islands Meat C° a first and final Dividend of 15. 3 1/2 in the £ upon your claim for services, Mr. J. J. Fellowes Bills and Messrs. Sharp Smith's Bill for supplies and Mr. Humphreys for services as per special letters to each of them I now enclose for the C° Mr. Baker the Liquidator's Report & Cash Accts' dated 21st ult^r. - Mr. Robson accompanied me & received his Dividends £ 68. 1. ~ himself.

17. The Rev. Mackintosh writing from Edinburgh for the Free Church about the Presbyterian Minister stated he had heard the Church & House belonged to the Shepherds, this we totally denied & said if minister appointed that they would have to obtain our permission to use the Church and that they would have to build a House upon our land which we could allow for it. I took your glasses to Mr. Callaghan who finding them rather rubbed advised a new pair for the gold setting and the steel to be repaired for a stand by, this has been carried out & they are now enclosed. We have written J. Bowdidge for the debt 13.14.7 to the address he gave, the letter has been returned, can you learn from any friend in the Colony where he can be found.

18. We are to be allowed £5 at the next purchase of Proprietary Rams for the useless one ft. & Brundrib 5 Nov 89 and the Superintendent must learn whether the defective one gets stock as the Breeder reports this constantly occurs here - as Mr. M. Call so highly approves of these Rams ought we not to send ten out by the Kosmos Pr. of next Sept^r. as the 'Orissa' is too small for such valuable stock, I shall try for a lower freight. Hibbert asserts their bottled Ale was of the best sort if now deteriorated you must get rid of it through Valparaiso or Montevideo.

19. The Kosmos C° refuse to return us any freight on Dean's and Packe's Wool & Sheepskins per Theben 27 Ult^r go as per copy of Browne Vb^r letter 31st ult^r. now enclosed, you will observe they do not recognise the continuation of the 9 Nov 88 Contract only on Produce consigned to the B/L made out to this C°, you must therefore arrange something in our favor as we are losing money. The Theben's cargo arrived 27 ult^r. we believe as ft. B/L but the Dock C° has not sent any return. We trust the 'Getos' will deliver end of this month 700 to 1,000 bales Wool.

Sir, Enclosing Duplicate of our last Despatch on 1st ult. and copies of my letters on 1st and 3rd ult. we have to acknowledge your Despatch N^o. 500 dated 14th March which arrived on 14th ult. with Enclosures in order, also your letter of 15th March arrived the same day.

2. N^o. 500, 2. We are much obliged for the Photo of the laying the Foundation Stone of Christ Church on 6th Mch by the Bishop but unfortunately we do not see your worthy self in it, if another was taken in which yourself and family appear please send a copy.

3. Part 4. We learn from further enquiries at the Brokers that it would be wrong to tie up our Wool with string as it deteriorates the value so the Board considers this must not be done.

4. Part 6. It is very unfortunate you are so troubled about Finance but we have done the best we could in shipping £2,000 by the Dux and must not be blamed for her delay - as the Government have again commenced Stanley Treasury Bills at £400 per month we trust this will keep you clear, if not we must ship Specie by the Rosmos Steamers who have reduced the freight to 25% per cent, or send some by 'Orissa' on learning the amount required: the Rosmos C^o have waived the freight upon the £10 Copper and £5 Threepenny pieces by this Steamer, but they cannot reduce the freight upon Rams because the Fodder takes up so much space and the large quantity of water used has to be bought again or condensed at considerable expense.

5. Part 10. We will do our best to give the information asked for about goods sent for Colonists though at times it is very difficult through the carelessness and rush of the present time, should this not arrive with the packages you must estimate the charge and 1/- upon small cases 2/- upon large ought to be put down for dock expenses: we are quite willing to take any trouble to keep the expenses.

Par 21. Mr. Blake's Fencing Wire goes by this steamer, Ellis
cannot ship his machinery until next Rail 19 July, I have
written for List if it arrives will send it on.

10. Par 23. The South American Missionary Wool is in
future to be consigned to us for sale with our Wool.

11. Par 24. We now learn that the Refrigerating vessel
'Bengist' is taken over by Messrs? Tyser &c who manage the
Union Colonial and the New Zealand Shipping Companies
whose steamers are to call for the Mutton after the 'Bengist'
has returned to the Falklands, this will give time to make
any arrangement you deem advisable, but I must report
that the Hosmos C° are proposing to insulate some of their
Steamers when we can provide Mutton and call for it, this
however looks in the distance as the Board is averse to
a large outlay at Goose Green for refrigerating works, as it
would also require a long Jetty for Steamers to lie alongside
to save their time in loading and as the water is shallow a
refrigerating Hulk may after all prove the best plan as she
could be sent out properly fitted for Steamers to load alongside.

12. Par 25. Your division of our Clients is good & shows

that we must take them as they are and make what profit we can out of them, though we certainly agree with you that they ought to pay 1% for cash accommodation unless they give us their Wool and even with that the supply of Cash might even cost us more.

13. Par 26. Enclosed is copy of M^rs Edenborough's report upon bales 914 to 946 N^A ex 'Petos' 20th Ap^{go} which you wanted specially examined - The 'Theben's' cargo delivered on 24th Mch^{go} was 639 bales Wool and 32 bales Sheepskins, Reports are enclosed, the Wool sold very well on 14th ult^v. accounts enclosed; the D^H had 1 pound more tare than the others through extra broad iron bands, I do not think we ever sent this out as the thinner narrower mooring is sufficient. The 'Petos' delivered in Tilbury Docks on 20th ult^v. 744 bales Wool, 243 bales from Weddell Island and 60 bales for Capt^r Packe which were sold on 5th instant at rather reduced prices unfortunately, Reports are enclosed. The 'Osis' will be ^{the} intermediate Steamer with Wool having left Stanley 29th ult^v. and must have delivered at M. Vido on 5th inst^v. Telegram Home N^o: 88: she is due at Hamburg 8 or 9 prox^v.

14. Letter 15 Mch^{go}. The Steam Hammer Machinery for Blacksmith's Shop must be shipped 19th July - we did not have anything to do with Packe Bro^s cargo per Dux as Edw^r Packe arranged himself with the Brokers. I wrote Mr^r Williams about the £ 933. 9.5 balance due in your books though £ 500 was paid in here 20th Dec^r last and Mr^r Peckham wrote that he would ^{do} on 2nd but did not do so, I have written him and will send any reply. Enclosed is Letter, Plan and Circular to enable you to correct the working of the Telephone from the Consolidated Telephone Construction C^o: should any alteration be needed please return these papers as we have no copy - we learn since the C^o have copies so you may keep these.

15. On the 30th ult^v we received Telegram Home N^o: 87 "Fostered Astoria Fredale Liverpool" M^rs P. Fredale & C^o will accept the Captain's Draft for her expenses and send letter for you: Lloyd's sent us copy of their Telegram on the 29th one day earlier and as both must have arrived by the Pacific S^r 'Oruba' at the same time we have complained to M^r Humphreys about the delay of ours: as your 18th April Mail caught the 'Oruba' at Sandy Point we shall get

it on the 21st a fortnight earlier than our printed Mail Table though I had entered it as likely to occur in my private Table. On the 6th inst. Telegram Home N^o. 88 arrived "Insectile Harboe subscapolo fothed Seatoller Gamble's Harrington elucidate Manager affection" from New York, which we translate "Ensure £2,550 on Bottomry Bond for Adolph Gharboe, Seatoller here damaged arrange credit with Owner Gamble's of Harrington^{reply unnecessary}, do not engage Manager pending advice from me" and on the same day Lloyd's sent copy of their Telegram about 'Seatoller', 'Janet Cowan' and 'Cambrian Duchess'. Mr. Gamble's agrees to accept the Captain's draft at 30^{ds} for the expenses of the 'Seatoller'.

16. We are much concerned that you should have telegraphed "do not engage Manager pending advice from me" as we have just appointed Mr. Robert E. Nichol as Camp Manager to go out by this Mail as reported to you in last Despatch N^o. 736, 14 on 1st ult. and my letter of 3rd ultimo. Your Telegram reached us on the 6th inst. and as you do not say Camp Manager the Directors are left in doubt whether your telegram referred to your own successor because in your Despatch 495, 26 of 16th Jan^o last you advise the appointment of a Camp Manager to which we agreed in Despatch 735, 13 of 15th March mentioning Mr. Nichol and the terms &c. Then again your Despatch 498, 20 of 20th Feb^o last also uses the expression Camp Manager which we answered on 1st ult. by N^o. 736, 14 as above mentioned, which would arrive soon after this Telegram left Stanley on 29th ult. - also we do not suppose that you would leave out the single word Camp for economy, so at a special Board held on the 7th inst. it was decided that Mr. Nichol should go by this Steamer as all preparations had been made, though he considerably offered to remain until the next Mail of 19th July. We trust therefore his arrival before we get your advice now coming will not interfere with your arrangements and that the said advice does not refer to him. He has had considerable experience in all branches and we fully believe he is the right sort of man for the position: he has taken great interest in all that has been explained to him having made a copy

him having made a copy of the Sections, Fences, Rivers, Lakes &c as entered on the Chart sent home by your Brother received 30 May 89, I have also shown him the papers on the proposed Land purchase at Darwin section, the Refrigerating proposals, Fencing requirements, Sturgeon's Merinos, Wolseley's and Burdon & Ball's Sheep Shearing Machines &c &c He kindly takes charge of Benson's Watch on Indent 99 - Capt. Hansen's Revolver from Shoolbred, Dr. Goings' Vaccination Lymph, the £15 Specie (£10 copper pennies £5 silver threepenny pieces) and the Despatch - I have asked M^r. Humphrey to show him if possible some Negretti Merinos as he rather thinks they would be suitable to cross with our Sheep. We send Copy of Agreements dated 7th inst. showing that his Salary of £300 (Three Hundred Pounds) a year commences on arrival at Stanley and that at end of one year either party may give six months notice to terminate it. Mr. Rawlings his Uncle has become Security for £5000 for him.

17. We have received from Mr. Dean Capt. Hansen's Dividend 118.11.7 from the Falkland Islands Meat Co. and have paid M^r. Bompas Bischoff £6.15.8.10 Law Charges upon the question of his killing Seals upon the Jasons and other Islands rented by him from Government: the Brokers advise that his Fur Seal skins ex Memphis 10 Mch 90 had better be sold next month when there will be more demand for them. Enclosed is the usual remittance of £400 on Stanley Treasury. We send List and 16 Deeds of Land at Stanley purchased from M^r. Dean & Sons for registration at the Government Office. We learn from the Crown Agents that Mr. F. S. Ganguinetti goes out by this Mail as Acting Colonial Secretary at Stanley.

18. In case the Presbyterian Church decide upon sending a Minister to Darwin we should like you to arrange before leaving the piece of land we could allow them for building a House for his residence & all particulars you deem necessary. There was

some Cooper's Sheep Dip sent out on consignment, we do not find it entered amongst the Stock Accounts so bring the matter to your attention. The present coils of Feltens Fencing Wire are quarter of a mile long each. The Auditors were asking the other day whether the proposed Audit at Stanley by Mr. C. M. Dean had been carried out or would be commenced soon, please inform the Board upon this point.

The 'Adolph Harboe's' Bottomry Bond £2,550 has been insured as per copy of covering note now enclosed.

We have had a visit from Mr. Dale who would like to commence the business of making Violin Strings and Sausage Covers from the entrails of Sheep at Goose Green, but fears there is not a continuous killing to keep his men fully employed, I advised him to go out this Mail prospect but do not know if he has so decided.

Mr. Stauder has just informed me that the 'Blarnak' for 15 May Mail will not take Wool as the 'Pentaur' is to call about 22 May for it and deliver here in time for 3rd series of Wool Sales.

We forward Duplicate of our last on 10th inst. and acknowledge your Despatch N^o. 501 of 16th April received on 22nd instant, with Enclosures in order, and your letter of 29th April received on 28th inst. with Bill of Lading for 915 bales Wool P. St. 'Isis' due in Tilbury Docks 2nd or 3rd prox^r.

2. N^o. 501, 2. It is satisfactory to learn that you are increasing the quantity of Wool through reserving the old Sheep by means of fencing in preference to boiling them down as Tallow yields so very little profit and we trust this plan will be continued; we cannot however agree to the next paragraph that the Rams lately sent out are rubbish, Mr. M^r. Call certainly praised the Dryfsholm rams as well as the Shropshire though it is unfortunate one of these was imperfect, still if you can buy Hill Cove Rams at a moderate price suitable for crossing with our Sheep this had better be done as it will be cheaper than sending Rams by the Cosmos Steamers - we regret to learn by Par 10 that Scab has broken out in the North Camp & trust the utmost vigilance will be exercised to prevent Bonner's sheep inoculating ours as was formerly the case, and we hope it will soon be decided which is the best Dip, Little's or Cooper's, so that Scab may really be stamped out all over the Colony.

3. Par 11. We wrote Messrs. Bagg &c to inform us the exact contents of their hogsheads of Ale as you pay duty on 54 gallons though considering it might be somewhat less, enclosed is their reply of 29th inst. stating that all their casks are made to hold 56 gallons and every one is filled to the Bung previous to leaving their Stores.

4. Par 14. We have insured Anson's Wool from Charters River against all risks and on receiving account of value and expenses on the salvaged proper claim shall be made on the Underwriters.

5. Par 17. The order for the Jetty tramway Rails has been handed to Rounson &c who will supply as near as possible

like those sent 12 years since: I have not been able to search for the papers about the proposed new Jetty through being so much engaged with the Accounts of last year, the Call just made and preparing for the General Meeting.

6. Par 22. You are quite right about the 'Gipsy's' Freight which is not so profitable as expected through the crew's wages not being charged, still we shall have to work her as reasonably as possible to keep the business of our Clients in the Co.'s hands.

7. Par 23. The last Mail conveyed Edenborough's calculations upon the extra cost of the lighter pressed bales of Wool costing more money this year for freight, it was not more approved nor did it sell higher for not being so heavily pressed and as the Brokers and other judges do not consider it improves the Wool it need not be continued, unless you find something in favor of the plan such as less time being required for pressing or anything else in its favor of which you are the only person capable of judging.

8. Par 24. I am happy to say the Crown Agents have agreed to sell us a £400 Bill for every Mail out this year but regret that you have been put to such straits for Cash through the long voyage of the 'Duc' with our £2000 Gold Specie on board, Lloyd's sent us on 29th copy of your Telegram of 22nd inst. announcing her arrival on 6th inst. so for the present you are safe, the next Board may decide to send Specie by the Kosmos S.V. of 19 July as the freight is reduced to 25/- & the insurance is 5/-.

9. Par 25. We are glad to hear that you consider Colonial experience is necessary for our Camp Manager as this relieves us of the fears expressed at Par 16 of our last Despatch upon your Telegram Home N° 88 for we are sure Mr. Nichol will justify our choice, though your letter of 29th April implies that you think of making proposals to Mr. Alex. M. Call our Superintendent at North Arm to undertake this office, we trust this has not been carried out as within about a fortnight of above date you would receive our Despatch 736, 14 announcing Mr. Nichol's appointment, and further though Mr. M. Call performs his duties so well in his present office the whole body of Shepherds would hardly obey one risen from themselves.

10. Par 12. We send the Telephone estimates, drawings &c as per list herewith and will endeavour to obtain revised list of prices if time thusly permit to forward by extra Mail on 10th prox: which I believe will catch this at Sandy Point.

11. Par 33. We have already reported that the Frosmos Co. declined to charge the reduced rate of 30/- per ton meas. upon Wool not consigned to us though shipped by us with our own Wool, and as they still continued this we wrote them strongly on the 19th inst. that we were entitled to the difference charged to others to repay our expenses in collecting this extra Wool for their Steamers, to which they replied on 21st that they were entitled to it as the consignment had not been carried out, but a letter received yesterday shows they are softening for it asks if the extra charge may eventually be returned to the respective Shippers, meaning of course the owners of the Wool, this we have declined and now send you copies of the correspondence, the whole matter will be submitted to the Board on 2nd proximo.

12. Mr. Dale mentioned in last paragraph of last Despatch about Sheep entrails business should be Mr. John Ball. Quibell have enquired if their sample of Sheep Dip Powder has been tried, please let us know. Findley's Wool Bagging is expensive through heavy charge of freight from Dundee to Hamburg but they have allowed half this to be deducted. Wolseley's Sheep Shearing C° will supply two Machines for trial free of expense and only to be purchased if suitable and found to answer, it is proposed to send them by the 'Orissa', tell this to Mr. Nichol as he went to their office with me - we have not heard anything from Burdon & Ball whose machine he and I saw in action, shearing Sheep very well.

13. On the 29th inst. 9.25 am we received Telegram Home N° 89 - "Bromine paulastato annealing Knutsford paragon" which we translate "I can buy at subject to approval of Lord Knutsford have sent full particulars" we cannot find the word "paulastato" the Telegraph C° nor Lloyd's cannot help, the nearest "paulastos" means 25/-, now as the Secretary of State for the Colonies is mentioned the purchase must mean Land and 25/- is quite inexplicable we must therefore wait your Despatch.

14. Mr. S. Lipscomb Seckham who manages Mr. Williams' business called here on 29th, paid £ 433.9.5 the balance of last year's Weddell Island Account and paid £ 1000 on behalf of this year's supplies, you will have to charge interest on last year's balance but I told him we could not allow interest on the £ 1000 from the time of payment here and only from the period it could

be used in Stanley, he expressed himself quite satisfied with our management, was very friendly saying he should stick to us probably pay off Dean soon and appoint us his Agents for the whole business of Weddell Island, he said Birch worked well for the farm but implied he was not entirely satisfied through the seduction of his position.

15. Enclosed is correspondence with Harper's Bridge Co: which unfortunately shows that it cannot be sent by the next Mail of 19th July as intended so must wait for 13th Sept N.Y. Mail. A Frosnos letter this morning informs that Mr. Pentawi left Montevideo with 1,200 bales Wool on 28th inst. & would probably discharge in the Tilbury Docks. We find Lloyd's Agents List justified. The Wool ex Santos 20 Ap 90 not sold on 5th inst. is going off at rather increased prices than were bid at the Auction.

Sir, Believing that this Steamer will arrive at Sandy Point in time for the 'Cosmos' Steamer which has to convey the last Despatch by the 'Sr. Magellan', we acknowledge your Despatch N^o. 502 of 25th April which arrived on 6th inst. with Enclosures in order.

2. N^o. 502, 2. You have entered most fully into the matter of the Camp Manager and though your reasons are strong about A. M^c Call being suitable for the office the Directors believe a gentleman is the correct thing, and having full confidence in Mr. Nichol they consider his appointment will be very beneficial to the Comp^y, and they trust that Mr. M^c Call and the other Superintendents will work smoothly with him as we feel sure he will show every desire to gain by their experience and work in harmony with them and all our Shepherds.

3. Par 3. We have already remarked upon your Telegram Home N^o. 88. With regard to the Furniture we meant that a single man would not possess any, not that we should send out a very young man - the cost named for a female servant to attend to the house in which he lived was reported to us by a West Falklander, your proposal for the Housekeeper to ^{be} the wife of a workman at Darwin is good and cheap and ought to be carried out.

4. Par 5. The Bills for the expenses of Captains Roberts and Livingston have been accepted. Par 6. We have heard that the 'Adolf Harboe' had safely arrived at Valparaiso and must now wait for advices from M^{rs}. Vorwerk &c.

5. The last Board decided to send at least £1,000 Gold Specie by the 'Osiris' of 19th prox^o: and even more if your next Despatch states that Cash is required.

6. During the negotiations with the Kosmos C° for the return of the extra freight on the Wool they have collected they have expressly enquired whether the Agreement will be continued next year and have been informed that you have not yet mentioned this, but that we consider the continuation would be beneficial for both parties, please therefore let us have your views as soon as possible.

7. Enclosed is our new Mail Table dated yesterday and Proof of the General Post Office Mail Table received yesterday. The 'Dennis Brundrit' arrived yesterday in the West India Docks. The G.W. 'Isis' arrived in Tilbury Docks on 3rd instant and has delivered 916 bales of Wool, two bales of Fells being shipped as one fastened together.

9. Referring to Telegram Home N° 89 mentioned in Par 13 of last Despatch we find the uncertain word ought to have been "panlavato" which means "three" therefore the Land can be purchased at three shillings an acre.

Enclosing Duplicates of our last Despatches No. 738 and 739 dated 24th May and 10th June we acknowledge your Despatch No. 503 of 14th May and your private Letter of 22nd May which arrived on the 23rd ult., the 'St. Pentaur' arrived in Tilbury Docks on 26th ult. with her Passengers all in order and delivered the following bales of Wool 2230 - HB 100 - TB 38 - DB 8 - \$3580 - also 160 for Capt. Packe and 616 for Mr. Dean.

2. No. 503, 4. Capt. Packe has written about the Freight for Stores which they paid to the 'Dux' not sending them to Fox Bay and has been informed just what you observe, that though his Brother Edward called here and received a through freight rate he did not avail of it but shipped through the Brokers of the 'Dux' Messrs. Langridge &c.

3. Par 5. We believe you do quite right to undertake to convey Cameron's Wool left behind by the 'Birgitte' at the reduced rate charged to our Clients and presume we shall receive it per 'Denderah' end of next month.

4. Par 8. We ship by this vessel some Lubricating Oil for Machinery, as you request, for trial since we learn that the claps of machinery and the climate have to be considered, 1,10 gal drum Engelbert, 1,10 gal drum Bremner, and samples from Wells and Schibajeff, with descriptive papers about each, and shall probably send a drum of the latter by 'Orissa'.

5. Par 9. The Directors are glad to learn you can make favorable terms with the Governor for the purchase of the 10 sections of Land at Darwin Harbour though we must also take Sections 75 and 44: as you complained that Sections 38 and 35 being too far from Darwin were not worth purchasing I wrote Capt. Packe that as they divided his two portions of Leased Land they might be handed over

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to him if we could arrange for their acreage to be purchased
and taken out of Sections 16 and 2, thus making our Land
square south of N. 18 and making his Farm in a ring
fence, but he would not hear of it as per reply of 9th instant

give them up when the Leases expire in 96 and 98 - however
the last Board decided to leave you a free hand to make the
best bargain, though your Cousin thought we ought not to
pay any of the purchase money before the Leases expire.
But now comes a curious feature in the business as the Colo-
nial Office have not received any Despatch from the
Governor about our purchase of Land as I wrote enquiring
Lord Knutsford's decision for this Mail, but as my anticipa-
tion of your 13th June Mail being delivered here on 16th inst.
are likely to be realized, for Mr. Holmested wired on 13th from
Lisbon to his friends, I have notified this to Mr. Wingfield
in hopes this Mail may have the Governor's Despatch to which
Lord Knutsford could give a reply on 19th so we must hope
for the best, this is written on the 15th as there will be so much
business to carry out at end of this week, enclosed are copies
of the correspondence & memo upon this business.

6. Par 10. We have sent the £800 for M^r. Bertrand
to M^r. Nye his Solicitor at Brighton who has taken up
the Mortgage upon his House and holds the Deeds as he has
a Power of Attorney from M^r. Bertrand, we now send his
Duplicate Receipt & shall write fully to M^r. Bertrand.

7. Par 12. We have heard of two good Coopers but
cannot engage any one as M^r. Humphreys has not written
about their obtaining a man at Montevideo.

8. Par 13. Your wish to have M^r. Frazer's Bill
for £683. 9. 2 kept out of the Co^o. accounts shall be attended
to by its being paid through my Bank Account, the Crown
having agreed to give a Stanley Treasury Bill for this amount.

9. Par 14. We forward £2000 Gold Specie by this
Steamer and have paid £500 to the London & River Plate
Bank to open an account at Montevideo for you to draw

upon, which can be continued when necessary by your Draft for £3 or 400 to them upon us, I showed Mr. Temple, Manager here, copy of this paragraph and he will instruct the Montevidean Manager to send you Cheque Book & full particulars. We also forward Stanley Treasury Bill for £400.

10. Par 22. We are preparing matters for the 'Orissa' and hope your next will enable us to decide when she ought to be here, also whether the Captain is to be changed - I regret to state that Harper's Bridge cannot be shipped until the Flambyses on 13th Sept^r.

11. Par 33. The Kosmos C° have now returned to us the extra freight they collected upon Wool not consigned to us so that this disputed matter is now settled in our favor: they have kindly reduced at my request the freight to $\frac{1}{4}$ of nett upon Mr. Blakesborough iron & Machinery by this Steamer, they will also bring the Rev^r Philip's Baggage left behind for 'Pentaur' 23 May 90 free of freight by their next Steamer.

12. Par 34. We shall be prepared to send a Coal vessel from the Tyne on receiving fuller particulars, you say Timber is to go with it but N° 472, 4 forbids this as the Wood ft. 'Taikun' was so damaged by moisture & steam from the Coals, we must therefore exercise our judgment as to a second vessel for a great quantity of Timber is on order which could go with Lime, Cement and a few Bricks from a Northern Port, though we now incline to London for this vessel.

13. Par 35. Mr. E. Nilsson's claim upon the Falkland Islands Meat C° has been received by Mr. Dean and transmitted by him to Mr. Nilsson.

14. We consider the stock of Stores at Stanley very heavy and should like to see them reduced - there has not been any account sent to obtain reduction of premium on Stores £3,000 in Dean's buildings as the Royal offered this if we made out a case: it was considered at the last General Meeting that £18,800 the Insurance on Stores was not sufficient, so I was instructed to open a provisional Policy for £5,000 which the Royal have accepted on the under-
17th ult: 3

standing that if you do not consider it necessary it is to be cancelled. The Shareholders at the Annual General Meeting on 16th ult. passed a vote of thanks to the Officers and all Employees at the Falklands for their careful attentions to the Co.^{'s} business, which we request you will make known to all concerned.

Dr. Dale lately asked me in one of his letters if I knew a philanthropist who would send out a Magic Lantern for him to take round and exhibit at our Stations for the gratification of our Shepherds and their children, I brought the proposal to the notice of the Directors who kindly agreed to send one out at the Co.^{'s} expense so I have obtained a good Magic Lantern with 5 doz Slides £. which goes out in one of Cook's cases addressed to Dr. Dale, please send the two small parcels on at once, I have written the Dr. about it telling him after it has been round Lafonia it must be exhibited at Stanley - we trust this will prove a source of great amusement and improvement to our people.

15. We have received the full amount £ 2550. 18..8 of the 'Adolf Harboe's' Bottomry Bond and have returned to the Owner Mr. Harboe £ 283. 8..9 being 15 per cent of the Maritime Premium charged on the Bond, we retaining 20% against which there were some expenses for telegraphing to Flanburg Valparaiso £.; also the Insurance of this Bond £ 42. 6..7. We have sent Chart & Mail Table to Capt^r: Lewis E. Wintz appointed to H.M.S. 'Basilisk' going to the South East America Station, also to Capt^r: A. Parr of the 'Melpomene' for the Pacific Station. We send Lloyd's Registry of Shipping 1890, just published and List of Agents revised to last May. Lloyd's have had some correspondence with the Board of Trade about Pilotage at the Falklands and Telegraph to the Lighthouse but nothing is decided at present. Mess^r: Jones Ingram &c: of Cardiff have enquired about a Steamer coaling at Stanley we offered Coals at 5/- a ton.

16. The South American Missionary Society are not satisfied with the sale of their Wool 44 bales ex Dennis Brunskill 9 June 90, Account Sales enclosed £ 451. 6..7, so I have written them they had

Bridges' application for the C° to sell him 1,000 young Ewes for his Farm at Town East, Tierra del Fuego, and it was decided that we were to do this at a fair price to be fixed by you and paid for in Cash (some of it if possible) and consignment of his Wool to us and his supplying butter or any other produce saleable in Stanley, Mr. Bridges to fetch the Sheep from any farm on Lafonia you may fix at his own expense and risk, it appears he needs Sheep to breed up for exhibiting 3,000 head to the Argentine Govt. to obtain the Freehold Grant of his Land, we write him a letter now enclosed for you to forward but have sent copy to Sandy Point so that he may lose no time in making preparations to carry out this business.

18. My anticipations are realized your Despatch Nº 504 of 10th ult. arrived on 17th inst., your letter of 12th June by post this morning (the 18th) and Mr. Holme-sied has just brought your Despatch 505 of 12th June.

W^r Wingfield has been so attentive as to write on the 14th by desire of Lord Flintford that there was no Despatch from the Governor about the proposed purchase of Land in the Mail delivered to the Colonial Office on the 17th instant.

19. Nº 504, Par 3. I make no doubt the Board will order £2,000 Silver Specie to be sent by the Mail of 13th Sept^r.

20. Par 158. It is satisfactory that the 'Gipsa' has done so well and that you can continue this good service, as you do not advise a change of Captain we shall continue Winter & attend to his proposals for alterations & repairs, I wish you had told us when she would sail to enable us to arrange for her cargo return & anticipating that she would leave about 20th June, ought to

arrive here end of next month in which case we must try to get her away about 25th Sept. so that she may return to Stanley the first week of December: no mention is made about Anson's large order and we consider she cannot take much more than half the Timber ordered so that it will be necessary to charter here for all the rough stuff ordered by Indent 102 so that she may sail shortly after the 'Orissa'. The Brokers have just called about the Norwegian Brigantine 'Orion' to carry about 600 tons Coals @ 24/- delivered to leave Newcastle end of August, they state small vessels are difficult to obtain, so that if we send 250 tons WallSEND, 75 tons Brancapelle & 25 tons Salt we should be free for the later vessel here & another Indent should arrive 27 Aug. Mail.

21. Par 5. We have not been able to send the Sketch of Bridge and the details given in this paragraph to Garpers Bridge C° but by the late Scotch post we have just received two drawings of Elevation, Plan, Sections & details of the Bridge preparing for 13 Sep Steamer, with Instructions for Erection with List of Timber required and forward same to enable preparations to be made, I am instructed to write them that the Flooring should be four feet above the level of high water, & see their distance is ^{ft ins} 3.6 but this is at the top of the arch only.

22. Par 16. We have this morning received from the Prosmos C° 72.11.6 return of extra Freight collected by them p. Osio 3 June 90 upon Wool from Pebble, Baillou & Stickney as per copy of Account enclosed and must search into last year's accounts as soon as possible.

23. Par 19. This very unfortunate there has been so much trouble with the 'Dux' and her cargo, we shall complain to Mfrs Langridge &c: and claim any expenses from them.

24. Par 20. We regret exceedingly there has been a mistake about the Ledgers from Brown &c: the larger one N° 124,107 has the ruling you do not approve of through your having ordered it to be ruled like our Ledger here, the other N° 129,695 is not paged as you wish but the right hand page number could have been entered for the reference - we now send a small Ledger from Graker purchased yesterday being the largest ready made obtainable with Folio paging and trust you can turn it to account should Brown, Graker or any other Stationer not be able to make one for next Steamer; the further remarks in N° 505, 2 will be attended to.

25. N° 505, 3. Our former Despatches instructed that

too much Credit was not to be given to the Church Building Account, so that they do not appear to have been paying up properly if they owe £500, the C° is willing to grant Credit provided Security is given that all shall be paid within a year.

25. Par 6. Enquiries shall be made about Electric Lamps for the Blacksmith's & Carpenter's Shops and the Stores and Office and full particulars sent you. We enquired of Messrs Rowson Drew & C° about the Jetty you state it is necessary to build or alter and we enclose their "Memorandum of Particulars required" dated this day, and trust you can send full details to enable them to draw up Plans & Estimate for same.

26. Par 7. Mr. Windsor did not give us Cott's letter and Plan for refrigerating our buildings at Goose Green so this letter of 26 Jan 89 will be useful and we must get the Plan from Cott.

27. Messrs Balf & Co.'s letter of 11 June 90 is sent so that you may inform us what we ought to ask them to reimburse us for the empty Cask of Ale ex 'Totnes' 15 March 90. The 'Birgitte' arrived on 16th inst. but has nothing for us. Bertrand's order for 80 cases Cooper's Sheep Dip must be executed from that sent on consignment to Stanley by them. We send a sample of Cannon's Sheep Dip with circulars and may send some for trial at 'Orissa' at their cost and charges. W^r Botwood with two children returns by this Steamer she applied to us for money which was declined, afterwards she received Ten Pounds from W^r Williams, we have paid Browne £3.10.- for her 1½ Second Clas Ticket, this must be charged to her Husband. We have paid Robson 65. 7. 1 for 6 bales Wool TRS ex 'Sis' 3 June 90, the 904. 4. 9 for his 111 bales Wool by same ship remains here at 2 ½ per cent interest. Capt^r Packe has paid 36g. 17. 7 for his Stanley Acc^r to 30th April last. The 'Pentaur's' Wool sold on 14th inst. at very good prices. We send a parcel of Paper for Rev^r Brandon from his Wife, freight £. to be charged.

28. The Directors have decided to appoint Mr. Baillon to succeed you and now send him the enclosed letter with terms which after perusal please hand to him. They will decide upon a Clerk ^{on 2nd} to take Mr. Baillon's place and send him out by the 'Hermes' & 'Zambysses' on 13th Sept^r. with his family.

Sir, We forward Duplicate of our last Despatch No. 740 on the 19th ult. with the Enclosures and copy of my letter of same date, and have not received any communication from you since that date.

2. The Board have decided that they cannot make any further supplies of Cash or Stores to Christ Church upon Credit, Mr. Robinson has asked us to take 50 barrels Cement by the 'Gipsa' or 'D. Brundit', being 9 tons it may prove serviceable for the former's deadweight, and most probably Bertrand's 30 tons Coals will go by her if they can be shipped quite dry.

3. Mr. D. F. C. Waller of Hamburg has written us about purchasing Tallow at Stanley for Valparaiso which for the present is declined, still the correspondence is sent for your information as they state they are the largest buyers & manufacturers of Tallow at Valparaiso.

4. We shall send £2,000 Silver Specie by the next Thosmos Steamer on 13th prox: and with respect to the £500 account opened at the River Plate Bank at M. Video the Manager there is R. A. Thurburn Esq.

5. The pillars for Harper's Bridge going by next Mail are to be sunk into the ground and founded on concrete as per sketch ex 504, 5 - it is now 120 feet long, the roadway can be kept up to any height by making the pillars longer. The Chains in Pudent go not sent off. To me 12 May last as intended are now ordered for 13th prox: we must only send Hoop Iron punched as ordered until this is tried. We send 4, 5 gal drums Cannon's Sheep Dip on account of the Manufacturers being strongly recommended for trial

We made on 24th ult^o a good charter with the Dennis Brundrit for £960 full cargo out and the family of Mr. John Kirwan the Stanley Clerk who goes out by Mail on 13th prox^o, being his Wife and six children for whose provisions Capt^r. Thomas has contracted for the moderate amount of £35 - he wished to sail 1st Oct^r but we made it the 10th in case the 'Orford' should be delayed beyond the 25th prox^o, as by that time we could fill her up though if possible we shall start her before. Charterparty is enclosed - also one signed this day for the Barquentine 'Speedwell' 230 tons Reg^r to convey 300 tons Flouse Coals, 75 tons Blacksmith's Coals at 26/- a ton from Newcastle, to sail during this month.

Sir, Enclosing Duplicate of our Despatch by the 'Orissa' we report that she sailed from Deal on 24th inst. having a full cargo for the West and some for Stanley with two children for Dr. Dale, Alice & William Martin, for whom the Directors have considerably not charged passage money only £7 for their provisions at 4/- each per day for 70 days - there were unfortunately Bonner's Provisions and others shut out which are now on board the 'D. Brundrit' and as the Timber ordered by the various Indents proves to be more than she can carry we have to charter a vessel of 250 to 300 tons and must send by her the Stores intended for the 8 Nov^r Steamer to save the extra expense, but as we shall use our best endeavours to get her off soon these goods will arrive only a fortnight after the Steamer - the Gr^r 'Gerapis' was unfortunately delayed at Dartmouth until 20th inst. - we hope to start the 'D. "Federal Brucklay Castle Brown Glasgow, Helenslea Stephens Dundee, Singapore Gildermeister Bremen" fortunately we were able to report proper arrangements for these three vessels by the 'Gerapis' as per copies of letters enclosed - Lloyd's sent copies of their Telegram about these vessels & the "Annie" and "St Mary". Telegram Home N^o. 91 was received on 22nd inst. 9.30 am "Gleevelds sanicato caligabon" meaning, ship by sailing vessel one hundred casks Portland cement, presuming this is for the Church there being already 50 barrels for ourselves on board it was shipped at once in the 'D. Brundrit' thus taking up the scanty space left.

3. We ought to have reported in N^o. 743 that there has been a short correspondence with Messrs. F&G.

Entrails - we immediately applied to Messrs. Tyser &c, who
have taken over the Colonial Union Co., for Mr. Bertrand's
2,444 Carcasses Mutton and 478 dog Fidries, unfortunately
he had not endorsed the Bill of Lading to us but I gave
them our Guarantee for this and handed same to Messrs.
Nelson Bro. Lim^o. to sell for us, Tyser declined to hand
goods to them and referred to me Spearing & Waldron who
state that the agreement with Bertrand expressly states
that they are to sell the Mutton &c: I could not therefore
do anything more - the other Bill of Lading for 34 casks
Tallow they accepted in favor of Arning & Cobb who will
dispose of same to best advantage - all this is reported to
Bertrand by letter enclosed left open for you to read (also
all the other letters) - Nelson Bro^o. have purchased the whole
cargo at three pence (3^c) a pound said to be a good price.
The 'Hengist' is enlarged to take 14,000 Carcasses leaves
in a fortnight with Coals & Timber, when I told Spearing
we might supply some Sheep as you proposed we should
try something next time he said all her cargo was engaged
and that New Zealand Steamers would call for it - They have
bought the "Ruth Popping" 330 tons Reg^t: - Messrs. Townsend Bro^o.
have bought the "Sir George F. Seymour" 268 tons reported to
be going to the Baltic for timber for the Falklands.

5. The 'Hosmos' Co^o strongly object to our offer of £8¹⁰s⁰
for Wool home next season and some of the Directors are also
of opinion that we can hardly expect them to reduce the 3⁰/₄
Contract, this is to be decided at the next Board on 6th prox^o when
we hope Mr. Staude will be able to attend, as you ought to know
at once that the contract at whatever price is continued we
shall wire on 10th Oct^r "Hosmos Wool Cordwainer", the last word
meaning Contract accepted, to enable you to arrange with Mr.
Schottfeldt for Steamers from Valparaiso for the first clip
of Wool. Enclosed is their Outward & Homeward Time Table.

from the present month and the Post Office Outward Mails dated 23rd inst., I have written the Pacific Co. for their table so as to make ours out if possible to next May.

W^r Mac Dougall the Secretary of the Greenock Steamship Co. called here on 26th inst. to state that their Steamers could take out Stores and bring home Produce if we would enter into arrangements with them, I told him it depended on their making out a regular Table of Departures here and for the Colony, he then wrote a number of sailings from Liverpool and London for this year & beginning of next and promised a Table for Stanley, exact copy is now sent, you will see he has put down Wool home 2⁵/₁₂ to 3⁰/-, Stores out about 4⁷/₁₂ ^{there} for the world come to London, we may eventually be able to do something with them as he is going to write the Colonial Office about the Mails.

6. On the 25th inst. Humphreys' letter of 30th ult. arrived announcing that a Cooper had not been engaged by them at Montevideo, having already spoken to Mr^r Harper about a man we immediately wrote them & one came but his wife would not accompany him so have applied for another man and must endeavour to send him by the vessel we are about to charter. As the casks which brought home the Bone Ash in the 'Orissa' were so broken causing loss of Ash we are advised to use Sacks as is done from other Colonies, we therefore send 100 for trial, the plan is to put the Bone Ash into sacks and just before shipment to put it into a second sack.

Mrs^r Cooper Nephews called about their Dip and we allowed them to copy Par 10 of your Despatch 507 so that they might see it did not kill ticks, they have sent a long reply now enclosed with two printed circulars. We send the usual £4 00 Bill on Stanley Treasury and one for 683.9.2 for Mr^r Frazer, with letter to him, as you did not wish this to pass through the Co^r's accounts I have done it through my own Banking Account.

8. The Wool ex 'Orissa' and 'Denderah' was sold on 30th ult^r. at very good prices, three Catalogues are sent - Mess^r. Goore &c^r have a sale this day of Falkland Wool - the Sheepskins ex Orissa were sold yesterday at good prices, also Bertrand's Tallow ex 'Bengal'. The Journal and Ledger Entries were omitted in the List of Enclosures on 30th ult^r.

9. We regret to state that the 'Dennis Brandit' cannot take all the cargo ordered for her as the Timber amounts to so much more tonnage than expected, it is therefore necessary to charter a small vessel and we are in treaty for the 'Victoria' 211 tons Register at £500 or a little less if possible and trust to get her away by 15th instant, the 'D. Brandit' leaves Docks on 8th inst^r: for ballast we shall ship as few Bricks as possible and as this freight will make the timber dear we must reduce it by sending Indent 103 intended for G.W. Hambyes of 8 prox^r but as the 'Victoria' is a smart vessel they will arrive only a few days later. Unfortunately the accounts for the 'Orissa' have not yet been made out.

Thomas declined to receive the two logs Greenheart on deck being 52 and 51 feet long and said to be as heavy as sojons but has kindly consented at the last moment. N^o. 634 is a small case of Books for Mr. Buckworth from Mr. Goodhart, free to Stanley. N^o. 38 marked Dale P. 'Orissa' is a present of some Gunpowder from the Directors to be delivered free. Hendrick who has supplied Bedsteads before recommended Chorlton's special iron Mattresses so a specimen is forwarded. Enclosed is letter from Mr. Dean to Mr. George Dean to say that you will hand her the Bill of Lading for his shipment please do so.

2. The Board decided on the 6th to continue the Contract with the Thosmos C° for Wool home at 30/- and instructed me to add the word "same" to the proposed Telegram on 10th inst. to show that the price was the same as last year - They have reduced the freight from Valparaiso to Stanley upon Stores &c. for us to 30/- (thirty shillings) per ton meat.

3. Enclosed is copy of 'Victoria's' Charterparty

Sir, We enclose Duplicate of Despatch N^o 446 sent
P. Dennis Brundrit on 8th ult. and my letter of 27th ultimo
P. 'Victoria' and acknowledge your Despatches N^o 508 of
20th August, received on 9th ult., and N^o 509 of 13th Sept^r,
received on 18th ult., with all Enclosures in order.

2. N^o 508, 5. We asked Mr. Leckham for some
Cash on behalf of Weddell Island Account, he replied the
management was handed over to Mr. Williams to whom
we then applied, Mr. Louis Baillon called to state that it
is not usual to pay so much in advance as Farmers Accts
are paid on sale of their Wool, we must consequently recoup
ourselves by charging full interest upon all advances.

3. Par 8. The Board has given instructions for
Clients' Produce Account Sales to be made out as soon as
possible after receipt from Brokers and consider the credit
to them should be from prompt date, this is rather against
the C. as we cannot get 5% interest upon Cash in hand
though it is allowed to our Clients.

4. Par 9, 10. This now decided that some one from
this Office is to inspect the measurement of Wool bales at the
Docks, enclosed is a memo I made on the 4th inst. about
the bales ex 'Theben' 29 Oct 90. Neither the Dock Officials nor
the Brokers observed any direction upon the small bale
of A. E. Felton's Wool ex 'Denderah' 1 Sep 90 so it was
sold with the others and account goes out by this Mail.

5. Par 11. We wrote Dennis & C: about the extra cost
in freight of the large empty coils of Wire and in future two Coils
are to be packed together one inside the other, this costs 5/- per ton
extra but will save considerably in freight - at the close of a late
Board it was determined to send out more Fencing Wire and
Standards and there not being time for English Merchants

to supply it we ordered 17 miles from Feltton through Dennis as they could ship at Antwerp for present Steamer, they also prepared some standards at short notice so we must put up with what they could supply: Mr. Nichol is to be told to put up the Fence recommended by him on 17th Aug^t subject to your sanction, and to be asked to give his deliberate opinion as to the best sort of Fencing, ^{we} inclining to solid wire, of course he can inspect the various fences on the East but have you seen those erected on West from Rowell's manufacture, if not I should think we ought to go over and inspect all the fences there, for as we are now going in for fencing more than ever it is of the utmost importance to decide upon the right kind and use no other.

6. Par 12. Through the kindness of Mr. Wingfield at

the Colonial Office we obtained from their Library a Copy of New Zealand Fencing Act N^o. 28 of 23 Sep 81, I then wrote the New Zealand Government Office for a Copy which they have sent (for a Duplicate next Mail) and Copies of two more Acts 1882 N^o. 64 and 1888 N^o. 27, these three are now enclosed: the Colonial Office Library also gave us a Victoria Law N^o. 479 dated 25 Nov 73, I wrote the Victorian Gov^r Office here for a Copy which unfortunately they cannot supply but send a Bill to amend this Law relating to Fencing, which the Secretary believes is now passed, these two are now sent and we hope they will answer your purpose and be the means of Fencing Laws being established at the Falkland Islands.

7. Par 15. As Mr. Anson's Order did not arrive in time for our vessels we have been obliged to ship it by this Steamer as well as the large order we sent direct to John Barker & C^o of Kensington - the present price of good Household Coal here is 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ / per ton - Messrs^r Cooper have agreed to let Blake's order for their Sheep Dipp, 100 cases, be issued from their consignment P. G. M^r. Meres' 20 July 89 at sailing freights but future orders from this lot at full freight, I believe that this number is the whole shipment so that future orders must be executed from the 200 cases consigned P. D. Brundrit 5 Nov 89 - whilst on this subject I must express our regrets that Bonner's Cooper's Dipp P. r was not ordered in full only 3 casks being sent so we trust you can supply 880 gallons for him.

8. Par 14. You are quite right to object to the present

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mode of business with Messrs. Waldron at Port Howard, Mr. Walter N.B. Waldron attended the Board and it was arranged that your proposal of 22nd July last should be carried out for 7½% being charged as Interest upon advances with 1% for Commission, one month's notice from you to his Agent Mr. C. J. Mathews to put an end to this arrangement if you so decide, this was written him and he now wants to be able also to give a month's notice but I have told him this was not agreed and that they can always terminate the arrangement by not issuing Cheques or drawing upon us. Five per cent to be charged on all advances up to receipt of your letter of 22nd July last.

9. Par 16. On examining your complaint that Goods for Clients P. Osiris 18 Jan 90 and Abydos 10 May 90 were not charged we find that they were included in the General Invoice so we trust you will be able to debit them - with respect to the Freight P. Osiris we have the greatest difficulty in getting dimensions so we must continue the new plan of one B/L being sent you by vessel with dimensions from Hnöhr and from Bulcke so that you may charge this expense: the freight from London to Hamburg or Antwerp is Ten shillings per cubic meter.

10. Par 19, 20. The numerous Vessels calling for repairs must have occasioned great calls on your resources but add to our profit and the Bills from them have been very acceptable, pray bear in mind that the £3000 credit at the Deutsche Bank for the 'Singapore' terminates at the end of next month: we trust the salvage for the 'St. Mary' will prove favorable; as you mention the United States Consul we must report that Mr. Henry S. Lazar's Bill \$532.56 received 5 Sep last ex Despatch 507, Statement on Accounts N. 293, was not paid by the Washington Government in consequence of some irregularity in his accounts as per correspondence with Brown Shipley &c: who had purchased it for collection at 48 ¾ f. dollar, so we had to return this amount 108.3.4 with 1.4.3 expenses as paid to Debtors at Stanley, the Bill remains at Washington for Lazar's explanations. - You state in letter of 22 Aug to me

that we might allow Mssrs. Predale & Porter some of the Commission charged on their vessels Embleton & Astoria but do not mention any amount of which you are the only judge what it ought to be, so when they asked for a return without naming an amount I wrote them that we had already allowed 43.13.8 upon the Astoria's account and asked for particulars of the Bill 138.1.3 we accepted for return upon Astoria's account, they declined to do this in a very offhand way and are informed that we write you to name an amount so please do so.

11. Par 29. I regret you consider the £500 placed to our Credit ^{at} River Plate Bank is useless, we understood from you it would be serviceable & assist your Finance if you cannot draw it for use at Stanley we must withdraw it from this side. Since shipping the £2,000 Silver Specie in Crowns & Double Florins ft. Perapis' 13 Sep 90 we have considered that the highest legal tender of Silver here is Two Pounds but trust the necessities of the Colony will prevent this law being adhered to so strictly at the Falklands, please report on this.

12. Par 30. We were surprised you had agreed with the Thosmos Agent for Wool home at old prices as we were in treaty for a little reduction, we did not therefore send the proposed Telegram that we had done so, the Agreement dated 6th ult. is now enclosed and we trust it will be carried out favorably.

13. Par 41. We have done what we could for Blake's Machinery from Ellis the whole business is very annoying it was only on 29 ult. I discovered that Duplicate of Ellis' Account 231.14.2 dated 7 July 90 only received here 30 July was not enclosed in my letter to him on 5 Aug 90 and we now learn from Ellis that he has not sent the Scrap Bills which was ready some time since by this Steamer because we have not paid the balance of above Invoice as I arranged we was to have £150 only until Blake approved the Goods and decided the extra freight he had to pay per Steamer because Ellis had neglected to get them ready for vessel, I write Blake as fully as my time permits, also Mr. Holmested who has seen Ellis.

14. Par 42. I regret exceedingly that you have not received the Co^o. Report of 5 June last nor the Resolutions passed at the Annual General Meeting held on 16 June issued on 20 June and now send Copies for

15. N^o. 509, 2. We always endeavour to send the Account Sales of Produce for our Clients as soon as possible but at times there is more business than we can get through for a Mail - your proposal to have the Wool Reports & Valuation separate for each mark is good & the Brokers have been instructed to do this so that you may send one to each shipper.

16. Par 3. It is unfortunate that C. Benders MV 15 bales Wool ex D. Brundrit 9 June 90 were wrongly measured and charged as 582 ft 6 in by Mfrs^{rs} Langridge & C^o; as when we complained to the Brokers the London Dock E^c sent dimensions & cubic measurement showing ~~that~~ the total amount 484.8.11 or an average 32 ft 4 in per bale, we then claimed return of extra charge from Langridge out of the 22.18.9 at 3/- and 5/- but they having closed accounts with Capt^r. Thomas cannot refund, but write this Mail to Capt^r. Thomas that you will claim the difference from him.

17. Par 6. There was no claim made for the damaged Wool ex Peis' 3 June 90 the amount not being much, and we do not insure our own Wool against all risks but only the Clients coming from the dangerous Ports on the West - the Board is now considering this insurance and are to give instructions for a plan for next year.

18. Par 9. We believe the Stores you mention as not being shipped have gone, though later than you expected, time & pressure of three vessels out has not permitted us to examine all the Invoices, you would be surprised to see the trouble we have in comparison to former times with Merchants, there is so much delay & disobedience to our rules & orders, therefore you must not blame this Office, we shall examine the matter fully after the Mail Report next time, ^{same} about next Paragraph 10 upon Flomsos Freight - also Par 11. Since above was written I find the following explanation - the Flomsos C^o charge us 6²/₃ per ton weight on Sheepskins, we charge 85/- to our Clients, crediting the Island Account with 25/- per ton as you state: Sheepskin bales are not measured on arrival here and we have only weight to go by - the remedy is to instruct

The Dock C°. to measure as well as weigh all Produce ex
vessels from the Falklands and this shall be done so as to
be able to carry out your ideas.

19. Par 20. We are glad to learn that you have made
a definite proposal to the Government to purchase Darwin
Harbour Farms at a cost of £14,569.4. for 97,128 acres at $\frac{3}{4}$ /
by paying £2,569.4. on 1 Jan 94 and £1,000 every succeeding
1st January with Interest upon the whole cost and then upon
the balances, the cost of the Land being three shillings an acre -
on the 5th we received a letter from the Colonial Office stating
that the Governor had sent your above proposal but considered
that we ought to pay £4,569.4. at once and £1,000 in
annual instalments, this will be submitted to a Board on 10th
and decision sent to Colonial Office directly as we have asked
W^r Wingfield to get Lord Thynne's consent and report
same by this Steamer next week, for the 'Denderah' Engine
having broken down soon after starting from Hamburg
she is delayed and she may not leave Dartmouth until
13th or 14th instant. We can now reply to your 508,28 about
Capt^r Packe, by late correspondence now enclosed you will see
he is inclined to purchase our Leases of Nos 35 and 38 if a
moderate value could be named for the Houses, Cattle &c upon
them, but would it be wise to part with them as they form
the approach to our future Freehold and in case of Capt^r
Packe's death we might be able to buy that part of his Land
near ours when these two Lections though poor land would
become valuable - under all circumstances we trust you
will certainly complete the purchase of the Government Land
before leaving the Colony.

20. Par 21. On examining the Neko 19 July 90 Cargo
Book we find the number you mention 1432 to be a roll of
Leather not a casting weighing 20 cwt, the only casting N. 1404
was from Dean and weighs one ton the weight you give the
freight on this has to be charged at Stanley : we cannot make
out Manifests of the Cargoes on the German Steamers which is
done at Hamburg & ~~Stanley~~, Antwerp, our full list is always
on the B/L, Mr Schlottfeldt ought to send the Manifests to you.
I regret to learn that Ellis' Invoice dated 7 July 90 received 30 July

L231.17.2 p. 'Neko' 19 July 90 was not enclosed in my letter to Mr. Blake on 5 Aug 90, it was only on 29 Oct I discovered the Acct. in his bundle and shall now send it to him - Mr. Holmested is attending to this business now having seen Ellis who has not shipped the Scrap Prefs he had ready six weeks ago because we have not paid him the full amount of above account only £150 but he did not give me notice of this intention or I should have compromised matters by paying him something more.

21. Par 23. We have obtained Passage Ticket for Mrs. Gumble @ £45, I wanted a little reduction for the fourth child 2 years of age but Mr. Staudé could not grant this having given her a larger Cabin to herself, £5 is sent her with full instructions & I shall look after her carefully.

22. Par 25. The Board has decided it will be necessary to erect as much Fencing as possible without delay and have instructed Mr. Nichol to commence at once upon the outside Camp boundary recommended in his Report of 17 Aug last, and have sent fencing standards from Fellen in Germany as they could be shipped at Antwerp without delay so we trust this fence can be commenced with the stock already on hand: for future arrangements it will be necessary to decide the best fence and having sent out several kinds we have asked Mr. Nichol for his deliberate opinion which kind is best as we incline to sold wire, I have recommended he should visit the West to inspect their fences especially Rowell's at Fox Bay of which we have heard an excellent report and I do not think this manufacture has been erected on the East - excuse this reiteration the matter being already mentioned at Par 5.

23. Par 24. The Sheben's cargo landed here 29th ult. was 19 bales Wool, 9 bales Sheepskins, 5 caskets 14 drums Tallow and 2 caskets Sealskins, the JHD 4 bales entered on B/L as Wool proved to be Sheepskins, we have not yet heard how many bales Wool from Port Howard, no remark has been made about short shipment. On the 6th inst. Mfs^r. Spearing & Waldron paid in £844. 12. 3 to credit of Bertrand & Fellon for Refrigerated Mutton and Kidneys shipped by them per "Fengist", the 37 caskets Tallow are sold and Account Sales goes out this Mail. Capt^r. Hansen's Seal Skins ex Memphis 10 Mch 90 were sold 25th ult. at uncommon good prices through the short catch at Alaska, so that he has

benefitted much by the delay. On the 18th ult. Mess^r. Hoare & Co paid £1900 for Baillon & Stickney against 1922.3.4 due 1 Jan^t. last and 314.13.6 for Bernhard Stickney - we have advanced Mr. E. F. Baillon £75 as loan at 5% this will not be reported for Island Accounts - on 23rd ult. Capt^r. Packe paid 1218.11.7 for his own and Packe Bros. Accounts to 30 June last, but the two accounts make up 1241.1.6 can you explain the difference.

24. Par 9. The Board agrees that you are entitled to your Commission upon the £3000 written off for Purchase of Goodwill of Mess^r. Dean & Son's business.

25. Par 28. We have only been able to obtain from Mess^r. Baafs & C^o £4.4.10 for one hhd empty out of the shipment of 'Tomes' 15 Mch go and it is doubtful if we shall get much allowance from them for the Ale ex Orissa Nov 84 taken over from Mess^r. Dean, as the complaint is made so late and Certificates from Publicans are not received by them for claims.

26. Mr. Strickland the Man^r. Dir^r. of the New Zealand Shipping C^o: called here lately about the chance of their Steamers calling at Stanley for Coals if prevented getting full supplies at New Zealand through the strikes there, these being now settled will prevent such a good opportunity of getting rid of our large stock of Steam Coals, but his visit drew attention to the fact that you do not now give the tonnage of Coals in stock in the Despatches as was formerly done, please revive this good system. The 'Englist' has taken 900 to 1000 tons Brown Patent Fuel for refrigerating Machinery and a quantity of Buildings & Shedding for Cameron's Farm at San Carlos, Mr. Ingwersen goes out by this Steamer to look after the Sheep. The Furniture P.D. Brundrit^r marked Nichol is for the house at Darwin - her Despatch did not have a Charter so one is now sent - Dale & Robson's letters were left open for you to read also all in this Despatch. Mr. Townend told me that the 'Sir G. F. Seymour' had gone to the Baltic for Timber for Sandy Point but may call at Falklands. The Victoria sailed from Gravesend on 1st inst., further progress not known, ^{as} took all the Whiskey, Gin & Brandy ordered from Wild we send a small quantity of each order by this Steamer to keep up the supply - you must add to the Manifest the

Reynolds of Chesham as per their Circular of 22nd ult. enclosed, & presume the latter will call soon to explain matters, prices, terms &c. when if proper details ^{are} given we must give them a trial.

2nd. Enclosed is our reply to Mr. Baillon's letter of 22nd August last accepting our offer to appoint him your successor, Lloyds have already applied about your recommendation for him to undertake their Agency, let us know when you write the Governments about the Consulships that we may support the applications. We send some Copies of our Mail Table dated yesterday, the Pacific Co. have not yet printed their Tables so the latter dates may perhaps have to be altered a little. Mr. Raynbird of Basingstoke would feel much obliged by some Tussac Seed being sent for him I hope you can do this. With respect to Baillon above does your Power of Attorney from us contain a clause empowering you to continue it with somebody if the Board of Directors give their consent by a formal document. I regret to state that we cannot engage a Cooper on the terms of our late hand, Harper could not find a man so we advertised had many applications, sent terms & particulars to eight suitable men but not one has replied, they make such good wages now we must increase our offer though I do not like doing this as it may make our other employés in Stanley dissatisfied.

Our last was dated 8th ult. with my letter of 11th ult. P. St. 'Denderah' and we now acknowledge your Despatch of 15th October N^o. 510, which arrived on 24th ult. with Enclosures in order.

2. N^o. 510, 3. You have done quite right to bring to the notice of the Governor the necessity for a stringent Sheep Ordinance and we trust this will not be delayed too long so that it may be settled or in a fair way of completion before you leave - of course there must be a rigid quarantine against our neighbours who do not keep their Sheep clean and you may depend upon our not making any arrangements about Goose Green without due notice and your sanction to any proposed business there, would it be possible to allow anyone to commence the business of tinning meat there as Refrigerating appears likely to be delayed for a long time.

3. Par 4. The Board decided that if you deem it necessary for the Company's Title Deeds for Land &c. to remain at Stanley this must be done, but if not you are to bring them to London yourself, Mr. Dean states that he always kept his Deeds here - the List is admirably drawn up and will doubtless prove most useful here.

4. Par 5. We are making a claim on the £3000 Wool Policy with the Ocean C. for Anson's loss and hope to carry it through though they state that there ought to have been a Certificate from Lloyd's Agent to the statement made by Capt. Winkler about the loss dated 1 Apr 90.

5. Par 6. With respect to the little quantity of timber in Indent 105 we have lately shipped so much that there must be a large stock on hand - unfortunately the 'Victoria' had such heavy weather in the Channel that she had to put into Fowey on 18th ult. for more Ballast and repairs to spars & only sailed on 28th ult., as she will be late we have ordered for the St. Pentaur

'Denderah' should the next Indent have a large order we may reduce it though such Stores are always needed and improve by keeping: half the quantity of Ale in Indent 105 will be shipped by 'Pentaur' and Bals have booked the balance for Steamer of 14th March: with respect to your proposal to send vessels with rough cargo only in Dec^r or Jan^r. it depends entirely upon the orders for such Stores sent here and if now carried out such goods must be delayed until this time next year, and as I was thinking about Rams going by such a vessel it will be two years from our last shipment of Rams so please decide whether any should be sent by Steamer.

6. Par 7. The Directors are willing to purchase the Billiard Table and Furniture you wish to leave at £150.13. according to the List dated 14 Oct 90, so that Mr. Baillon will be able to do the right thing in entertaining Naval Officers and others visiting Stanley.

7. Par 3, 14. We will do our best about sending our dimensions if not our Clients ought to be satisfied with a full estimate made by yourself for the trouble & care we devote to them. We could not send Potatoes & Maize from Hamburg until the last S.W. 'Denderah' which took a large supply selected with care by Mr. Staudt who kindly reduced the freight so we shall be glad to hear that they arrived in good order & gave satisfaction, if so be continued we ought to have early notice.

8. Par 15. I have the satisfaction of reporting that Mr. Fleming of Dundee is about to engage a married Cooper without family for the S.W. 'Pentaur' on myth prox^c: he has excellent Testimonials for Apprenticeship &c: and is an Abstainer, & fancy we may have to allow a little for his wife's passage.

9. Par 18. M^r. Cameron's 153 bales Wool ex 'Denderah' 1 Sept 90 were transferred to Messrs. Hoare &c: and sold by them.

We send Stanley Treasury N^o. 307 for £400 this being the last monthly remittance and as your last Despatch did not propose a continuance we wrote the Crown Agents on 2nd inst^r asking whether they would grant these Bills for another six months but they have not yet replied, we must therefore wait for the Mail due 14th inst^r which may give further instructions.

16. Enclosed is letter for Mr Baillon informing him that his Security for £4000 as your Successor has been provided by his two Brothers Louis and Edward, and that he is appointed Lloyd's Agent on your leaving the Colony.

17. As Mr Holmested told us that the black Fencing Wire withstands Salt Water better than the Galvanized Wire we send out I wrote Mess^s Dennis about it, they have replied with Pamphlets from Felten & Guillaume now enclosed & were to have sent further reports with sample of Wire prepared to stand the sea so as to be used at end of a fence where it is carried along the shore to prevent the animals getting round it perhaps ~~and~~ it is not of so much consequence to us - writing about fencing I must remark that if we are to send a large quantity out it should be shipped by vessel but if our next cargo vessel is to go about this time next what a terrible delay there will be, and arriving in your autumn the erection would have to be delayed for the Spring and Summer. Mr Robertson of Oban has just called about his Sheep Dip & States that Spearing & Waldron have sent out a quantity for Cameron by the 'Edith Waldron' 346 tons (late James A. Clark) to Port Howard, she sailed end of last month so as this will now be used at San Carlos you will be able to report upon it. Spearing & Waldron have also sent middle of Nov^r the 'Ruth Waldron' (late Ruth Topping) 319 tons for Straits of Magellan & perhaps Falklands. 'Endent N^o. 105 will be sent by S^r 'Pentaur' of 14th prox^r.

18. We have now made an excellent arrangement for Insurance of our Wool from the Sheep's back to warehouse in London against Fire and Sea risks at 30/- (Thirty shillings) per cent, £10,000 with Universal £10,000 with Ocean as per Copy of Policy herewith, and Mess^s Bewitt have agreed to insure at Lloyd's £10,000 upon same terms for our Clients from West Falkland, all Policies to be continued for same amounts, this will effect a great saving of expense to us and our Clients who will we trust appreciate our care of their interests.

19. We have received M^r Gildemeister & Co's thanks for our Telegram Out N^o. 56 about their vessel 'Lingapoore', the Eastern Telegraph C^o informs us that if telegrams are sent to Montevideo and cannot be sent on notice is forwarded to their office of this fact and as this has not occurred we conclude their Telegram from Bremen reached you, we write Mr. Humphreys today making enquiries on this matter.

20. When Mr. Gates of Thurlers Gates & C^o called here lately about their present order I asked him if any of his American friends engaged in preserving Meat would commence this business at the Falklands, for as the Refrigerating business cannot be carried out for so long we ought to make use of the sheds &c erected by the late F. J. Meat C^o, Mr. Gates has a friend engaged in the canning business as he calls it and he will be in London early next month and is to call here, I shall advise some one going out to prospect on 14th prox^o as he could return by the direct Mail of 15 March thus returning in a little over three months, the difficulty will be labour & machinery and that the Sheep are only ready during two months of the year still it will probably be possible when the business is established to drive up Sheep during the Autumn & Spring months to keep the works going, please let us have your ideas and instructions upon this business, of course we must put the cost of our Sheep as low as possible.

21. The Crown Agents have agreed by letter of 11th instant, Copy enclosed, to continue the monthly £400 drafts on the Stanley Treasury for another six months subject to this arrangement being sanctioned by H. C. the Governor, we shall therefore expect a decision on the continuation of these remittances.

22. In addition to Part 8 about Wool & Produce Insurance we report that Fire Insurance is not opened upon our Wool in the Sheds or elsewhere, that the low rate upon Clients Wool is only upon that consigned to the C^o, no fire insurance being necessary: we have instructed the Universal to insure £2,000 upon Goods or Merchandise f.o.b. - at a rate to be arranged when shipment is declared, this will cover Adventures or any

thing else you may ship, probably there may be some Salvage ex 'St Mary'. Mr. Dean insures his Wool & Produce himself upon the same terms as ours, with the Ocean I believe.

23. On the 10th we paid into the Rev. Bridges' Account at the National Bank of Scotland £51. 11. 3 for Wool & Sheepskins ex 'Sheben' 29 Oct 90. Mf'srs Hoare & C° sold on 10th inst. Waldron's Wool from Port Howard also ex 'Sheben' at very good prices as well as a quantity of Wool from Delgada Point & Punta Arenas.

Sir, Enclosing Duplicates of our last Despatch and Letter of 9th and 13th ult. we acknowledge your Despatches N^os 511 and 512 of 10th and 14th Nov. last which arrived on the 18th ult. with Enclosures in order.

2. N^o. 511, 3. We have attended to this matter and Miss A. E. Wood goes out by this Steamer, also Miss R. Webb to join her Sister Dr. Goings' Wife on West Falkland.

3. Par 4, 5, 6. The order for old Bessemer Steel was issued as received and we regret to find you consider it so dear, on complaining to Messrs. Rowson &c. they reply that at the price paid we have a bargain: Messrs. Crose & Blackwell returned us £1.2.3 on 8th inst. for the useless case of Fruits. When ordering flexible Steel Wire Rope in future estimates shall be obtained from Bullivant & Fenton and the cheapest sent.

4. Par 7. I have seen Ellis several times about Mr. Blake's Machinery and three packages, ^{Emd. 36.9.7} are shipped by this Steamer, as before explained we had nothing to do with this order but knowing Ellis' unbusinesslike ways have done our best, Mr. Holmested has also called upon him and has sanctioned our paying him £50 upon the account £31.15.2, though Mr. Blake has not yet informed us the extra Steamer freight which he considers Ellis ought to pay.

5. Par 9. It is very sad to hear such illness has afflicted the Colony, Dr. Dale writes that he has had very many ill in Lafonia, pray express our sincere regrets to Mr. Anson for his sad loss and we trust the usual good health of the Colony will soon be reinstated.

6. Par 10. As you consider Frazer the Storekeeper at Darwin is such a good servant the Directors are willing to agree to your proposal to grant him a free passage home at expiry of five years service from Nov. 1888.

7. Par 12. We have had great trouble with the two Bills £2356.3.1 and £75.6.3 for the 'Brucklay Castle' and may suffer loss as Messrs J. G. Brown &c. have refused to accept them and they are noted and protested, the matter is in the hands of Mr. Francis Pnce, a clever Naval Lawyer of the Firm Ingledew Pnce Holt, who advises us to sue & arrest Capt. David Charles at Panama if the law there will allow this, otherwise he must have notice of the dishonor of his drafts which ought to be insured until the vessel returns here or the Continent when the Captain could be arrested and then might bring an Action against the vessel, even then she may prove of little value and is already mortgaged, Mr. Bone trading under the name of J. G. Brown &c. bears a bad character, he has asked us to wait until the Insurance is collected and may be persuaded to do something when the Bills are presented on the due date 20th prox^o. In order to prevent trouble & loss in future the Board has decided that Bottomry Bond must be taken for all vessels whose Owners are not known to us and that a Bill for the expenses is to be drawn as usual as Security for the Bottomry Bond which being met the Bond would not be put in force - by Law a Bill can be taken as Security for a Bottomry Bond, but a Bottomry Bond cannot be taken as Security for a Bill. In future the Register must be examined for Mortgages and Copies of Protest and Surveys are to be sent. As the 'Pentaur' is delayed we shall report further on what has been done. The Credit for the 'Singapore' £3000 is continued at the Deutsche Bank till end of March.

8. Par 14. We have ^{written} the Ambassadors here supporting your recommendation for M^r. Baillon to be appointed to the Consulships, the Pacific C^o. have appointed him their Agent and we believe the Royal Insurance C^o. will do so.

9. Par 15. We quite concur to your proposal that the C^o. ought to employ a good staff of men for your explanations are to the point, so we trust you will arrange with Mr. Baillon how this can be arranged for the future. We have engaged M^r.

John King a Scotchman from Aberdeen as Cooper and he goes with his wife by this Steamer, five years service, wages begin at £96 and rise £5 yearly, character and recommendations excellent, he pays the passages £30 himself this being advanced against his wages, also £8 for outfit, Mr. Fleming here the other day strongly recommended him so we shall pay his railway to Dartmouth and expenses there: he is an Abstainer, this is greatly in his favor.

10. Par 16. With respect to a Telegraph from Stanley to Darwin the Directors are of opinion that this had better be deferred until you return here to decide upon the wire posts &c, of course you will instruct Mr. Baillon & Mr. Nichol upon all the details they would have to carry out whenever it is decided to ship the materials.

11. Par 19. We are sorry to hear that the Church Account has run up so high we wrote strongly to Mr. Robinson who says that he has no funds in hand but that he will write the Rev. N. Brandon to pay up as he has cash in hand - no further credit must be given.

12. N. 512, 2. We send our usual remittance £400 by Stanley Treasury Bill having written the Crown Agents if it could be increased, they reply that the Colonial Govt. have not requested this to be done.

On 1st inst. we paid the first Instalment £2284 " 12 " for the purchase of 12 Sections of Land at Darwin Harbour, thought it well to ask whether the present Governor who arranged the Sale could not give us the Grant for this Land so that the matter could be settled before you leave, but the Colonial Secretary states that this must be deferred until the whole money is paid, enclosed is a Statement I have drawn up as to these annual payments which end on the 1st January 1902.

13. Par 3. We have not heard from Mf's. Vorwerk &c about shipping Tallow to Valparaiso and Mf's. Vorwerk Bro. of Hamburg have not answered

our letter upon this business.

14. Parb, 9, 10. The £150 has been paid as requested.

M^r. Call's Watch is repaired will go in heavy Despatch with Watch and Chain from Benson - also a Book "The Little Colonists or King Penguin Land" being a description of our Colony - The Wallpaper is shipped, tho' there is a doubt if the Steamer will catch the 'Pentaur' for there has been great trouble and delay about the ice as she cannot go up the Scheldt to Antwerp, so that Hansen's Iron House could not be sent from Liverpool, some Guns and Ammunition are sent to Dartmouth to be safe for him and go as Miss Webb's Baggage, also Wratten's D. G. Plates you asked me to get by note of 14th Nov^r. - The Mails will probably not leave Dartmouth until 26th inst. and there is no opportunity of telegraphing, still the 'Pentaur' being a fast Steamer we trust there will not be much delay and it is fortunate the reply Mail to this has to wait at Sandy Point until the 25th Feb^r.

15. Par 1. This most unfortunate a little carelessness has prevented the arrival of the 'Times' from 8 to 23 Aug^r were posted by Wilson & C^o during my holiday, 25 Aug to 12 Sep were enclosed in Despatch P. Serapis 13 Sep 90, also the 'Graphic' 9 Aug to 13 Sep - I have now determined to look after these small details myself.

16. You have not answered 740, 14 about the reduction of Insurance upon Dean's Buildings nor the extra amount upon Stores for which we paid the Royal £20 subject to your decision if the extra value was necessary, they have now asked for another £20 which is paid to continue this Insurance to end of next June so prompt reply is necessary.

17. Lloyd's state that the Board of Trade report that the Telephone from Cape Pembroke Lighthouse to Stanley would cost £260 but they have no funds to devote to it, we have told them we cannot undertake this outlay for the benefit of the Colony but as the Govt. Funds must be in a good state could you prevail on the Govt. to improve the Shipping interest by carrying it out.

Our remarks in N^o. 743, 14, about a Signal Station have not been answered and Lloyd's have written about it again.

18. As the Proceeds of Capt^r. Hansen's 40 bales Wool ex 'Letos' 20 Ap^r 90, Acc^t. Sales 510.2.2 sent 19 July 90 really belonged to Mr. Dean the Board of 5th inst. ordered a Cheque £500 to be handed to him, and the next day we received Telegram Home N^o. 92 at 10.10 am "Pastime Dean portaferos acodalar Hansen nubarren legataire reguline" meaning "Please pay Dean £500 on account of Hansen, 8th Nov^r. Mail arrived and no letter from you the letter should be registered" - we much regret that Despatch N^o. 747 was not delivered by the S^r. Denderah though properly posted as usual, we complained that day to the Post Office, the Inspector called 15th inst. to report nothing had been discovered so that time - the arrival of this Telegram shows that your Mail of 12th ult. will be here in due time.

I have the pleasure of reporting that Hansen's 2 cks Fur Sealskins ex 'Thebes' 29 Oct 90 and 2 cks Fur Sealskins ex 'Pentaur' 2 Jan 91 were sold yesterday at excellent prices, the Account Sales will go in this Despatch as it is delayed: Capt^r. Hansen wrote me for two Air Guns & a Rifle, silent if possible, have sent them, strongly recommended by Blanch who kindly has written full instructions, in case to Dartmouth (also some ammunition) to go as Miss Webb's Baggage to be on the safe side, his Galv^r Iron House from Liverpool is again delayed as Steamers could not go up to Antwerp: he writes me that a most curious creature was thrown upon one of his Islands, 26 feet long not seen before & the skeleton is saved for me, I sent the descriptive letter to Prof^r. Flower who cannot understand it, is most anxious to receive the skeleton & any skin &c, will pay any moderate expense so please use your best endeavours to have it sent as soon as possible, I write Hansen about it. Only this

morning have we received your Memo of 14th Nov: last with Bill of Lading for 2 bds Fur Sealskins p. G.W. Pentaur' so have written to you why it has been delayed so long.

19. Mr. Gates' friend has considered the proposal for a Canning business at Goose Green but declines as the number of Sheep to be provided appears too small, he may find some one else who may be contented with a smaller business. We enclose Mr. Weddel Hoo's Review of the Frozen Meat Trade dated 27th ult: with Tabulated Statement of Fluctuations in Value which shows the large increase in this business & management of same, which will be useful when we are able to commence refrigerating.

20. Messrs. Carter &c: Seedsmen of Holborn have asked us to get them some Tuf-sack Seed and even ^{better} some Roots if possible, we should like to oblige them and have requested Mr. Nichol to assist in this matter, they will meet any moderate expense.

21. We send ten Scab Acts as per List enclosed, copy gone to Nichol, three New South Wales from Gordley, Secretary to Govt. Agency, from the Colonial Office Library, two South Australia, two Western Australia, two Cape of Good Hope, one Natal and trust that when you submit them to the Governor and Legislative Council a suitable Scab Act will be passed for the Colony as this would much assist Sheep Farming.

22. We write Mr. Baillon that he has been appointed Agent for the Pacific Co., we hope you will be able to have him named as your Successor on the Legislative Council.

23. We have not been able to do anything further with the 'Bruckley Castle' as the Law in Colombia does not allow us to sue and arrest the Captain, we have sent notice to Capt. Charles at Glasgow and Panama of the dishonourment of his Bills and have requested Messrs. Piza, Piza &c. Lloyd's Agent to send us all particulars of her as we may have to insure the Bills in case of her loss: we now learn that Mortgages are not entered on the Register carried by the Ships: Mr. Dean says that he always had four Bottomry Bonds drawn up: if vessel is a Limited Liability Co: Bottomry Bond must be taken for even small accounts: the last Board raised the question whether Owners would not give Banker's Guarantee for

Vessels under heavy repairs but the difficulty would be in arranging this by Telegram as we can only wire once a month, could it be arranged that if you have to send a schooner to Montevideo for supplies and Telegram for London the word "Varanes" denotes that she remains there for our telegraphic reply: it was proposed to have Code words for this business and as your Code is at Page 472 of the A.T.B.C. Telegraphic Code (as per N° 674, 4) "Vardaei" with Vessel's name after it means "Bottomry Bond taken" - "Variabro" "Bill taken as Security for Bottomry Bond" Our Code commences at Page 474 "Veragri" before Vessel's name means "Owner given Banker's Guarantee for expenses". I fear this will prove but poor assistance though I cannot suggest further so we shall be glad of your advice.

24. Mr. John King has had another One Pound advanced to him at Dartmouth.

Sir, On the 31st ult^r we received your Despatch N.
513 dated 12th Dec^r last, Private Despatch of 15th Dec^r.
and Letter of 16th Dec^r with Enclosures in order - we
now send Duplicates of our last on 17th and 24th ultimo
by the S.W. 'Pentaur' from Dartmouth on 27th ult^r at 6 pm.

2. N^o. 513, 2. We have already written about

shearing the Sheep by the new Machines and have
been expecting a Statement from Burges & Ball of their
Machines and Machinery required for working same
which they promised to be sent for your consideration,
the difficulty will be the Steam Engine and fuel supply
also the danger of the machines getting out of order as we
have no workmen suitable for repairing, and though you
state there will be a great gain in the extra Wool clipped off
it would only be a small quantity the first year as we
should not be able to shave so closely in our climate, then
also the Falklands Magazine states at North Arm a bale
of Wool can be shorn and baled in twenty minutes, how
therefore could we do better with Machinery at a great cost
when we have not the funds to afford it, Mr. Holmested
says that many of their Shepherds can shear 60 to 70
Sheep a day and machines cannot do more than this -
we hope to be able to send Burges's Statements soon.

3. Par 3. It is unfortunate that so many Lambs
perished from the cold weather, though there seems to be
the usual small increase every one here considers that
our flocks do not have the yearly increase there ought to be.

4. Par 6, 8. Capt. Hansen's 2 cables Fur Sealskins
ex S.W. 'Pentaur' 2 Gangs were charged freight 75% you now

state, we have explained to Captⁿ. Hansen the reason of
the delay of sale of his first Fur Sealskins and that through
the good advice of our Brokers he has obtained 30 to 50 percent
better prices as he will find by the two Account Sales which
were sent out last Mail.

5. Par 7. The Board of yesterday carefully considered
Mr. Nichol's proposal for a great length of Fencing to be
erected but however good it might prove we cannot afford
it at present, you speak of raising money by Debentures
we already have issued the full amount allowed by our
Charter and Deed of Settlement for Mess^r. Dean's Purchase and
now we have the difficulty of finding Cash for the Land pur-
chase, Mr. Nichol will be told that he must be content for the
present with the Fencing on hand as we can hardly send more
until by the next vessel - though Par 16 states that ~~the kind~~
sent now is ^{not} correct I was not aware of it and have written
several times asking which Fencing materials are to be
sent as a fixed thing for all future orders, the matter must now
be decided on your return as we shall then have to arrange
for a vessel out with rough Stores.

6. Par 9. We are glad to hear you have made a
satisfactory trip to West Falkland I however anticipated
you would have visited more Stations here, it is well that
Waldron's Farm is much better managed now and that
Holmested & Blake have so much fencing, this is a necessity
for the Farmers here to divide their runs from others but with
ours being in a ring fence not so absolutely necessary, though
the late purchased Land at Darwin ought to be fenced off as
soon as we can afford it. The new Bridge at Darwin must be
a great improvement and it is very satisfactory that it has
been so carefully erected.

7. Par 13. We endeavoured to make a claim for Insu-
rance upon the few bales damaged by seawater and one by tallow
in the Orissa 24 Aug 90 but could not succeed as the policies
were not "against all risks", this was reported to Mr. Holmested
who did not state he expected the C° to allow his Firm anything.

8. Par 14. We regret exceedingly as mentioned in our last Despatch that Despatch No. 747 dated 8 Nov 90 was not delivered by the S.W. Denderah on the 1st Dec 90 - it is however satisfactory to learn that you have received by 23rd ult. as reported by Telegram Home N° 93 received 30th ult. 9.50 am "Hambyses stelladia leather nubaron" meaning Hambyses has taken 870 bales Wool, have received Despatch reported missing by Telegram Home N° 92. The same day Lloyd's sent copy of their Telegram - "Charles Dickens' Pisagua for Hamburg put in with lots of main topmast" as she belongs to that large Firm Messrs R.M. Gloman & C° of Hamburg we shall not have any trouble about her expenses. When Humphreys reported Telegram Home N° 92 they stated they had also wired "Mill Garmouth Nothing" and "Pallas Bremen Fardrum Harmfully" this latter relates to the 'Singapore', would it not be well to report in future the Telegrams you send out. We shall adopt your suggestion to post the Despatch with particular Enclosures separate, registered, and the Invoices, Accounts &c by book post as 'commercial papers' also registered.

9. Par 15. It never struck us about the late payments for Rent of Leased Land Sections now purchased but must now endeavour to get an allowance from the Coll. Office.

10. Par 17, 19a. Pray do not imagine that we ever thought you received Commissions really due to the C°, the Directors wish this to be especially mentioned, but we had to arrange about Mr. Baillou's Salary and therefore specially left out certain Commission - the Board still consider that a portion of his Salary should be a separate amount for entertaining and attending to the customers of the C°.

11. Par 21. Mr. Anson's order arrived too late for vessel therefore was shipped by S.W. Denderah 8 Nov 90, especially as Barker of Kensington wrote they were ordered to ship by S.W.

12. John King Cooper per Pentaur 17 Jan 91 has had £11 (Eleven Pounds) advanced in small amounts against his Wages, we have had to pay £28 the difference between Third and second class Passage money as he wrote from

Dartmouth that the third accommodation was not suitable, he agreed when first engaged to pay his passages out so if he cannot give good reasons for the change this must also be charged to him, should it prove that the 'Pentaur' was damaged by the ice an allowance must be made though being a new Steamer the third berths were reported to be better than usual.

Messrs. Brown Bro. & C^o of New York have returned Lasare's draft £ 532.56 reported in N^o 747, 10 as being declined payment by the Washington Treasury and they now state this amount is disallowed. Since our last List of goods detained in the Elbe by ice we learn that Morton's 50 barrels Sugar were not shipped at Hamburg through rail traffic being delayed by bad weather - we ought to have reported that Bindley could not make the Sheep Nets until next Steamer. Mr. Sedgwick the father of a young man in the Hornet wishes to have letter from him, please see that this is done.

13. Private Despatch. The Directors are exceedingly obliged for your suggestions about Mr. Ballou continuing your duties, they trust the same instructions will answer as you gave Mr. Langdon during your leave of absence, with any modifications you may think essential and they will await your return to England for further details to be given and any useful orders can then be sent out.

14. Sir Roger T. Goldsworthy has called to say he is appointed Governor and may be able to leave by 1st March Mail. Though it is doubtful, this has delayed this Despatch so the Chairman has just examined end of Par 12 and will call next Friday to read any continuation I may write, as Nichols' letter is closed hurriedly & that must be extended, and we have to post earlier for registering.

15. Referring to Par^y I am to add that we shall however make up an account of the damage to Holmested & Blake's Wool ex 'Orissa' 24 Aug 90 and endeavour to make some allowance.

16. Sir Roger Tuckfield Goldsworthy's appointment as Governor is made known in the 'Times' of 4th inst., the report that Gov^r Kerr was coming home in the 'Rambysses' is contradicted by Mr. Staude who reports that he will have to wait the arrival of his successor, perhaps under these circumstances Sir Roger may endeavor to leave by next Mail I shall call upon him in a few days and offer our indicator for telegraphing on 1st proximo: he told me that he should not undertake Magisterial duties so probably the Colonial Office mean to send out a Barrister for this office, so much the better for the Colony. In the 'Times' report of Lord Salisbury's Speech at Cambridge on the 21st ult. it is stated that he said that the Falkland Islands "are scarcely habitable", I have written to the Marquis requesting him to contradict this false statement but he has not yet replied.

17. We send the usual Stanley Treasury Bill for £600. yesterday we paid Messrs. Holmested & Blake another £5000 divided as on 24th ult., this demand was quite unexpected. Goods N^o. 107 just received will be shipped on 1st proximo.

Sir, We enclose Duplicate of our last on 3rd ultimo and acknowledge your Despatch N^o. 514 dated 15th and 22nd Jan^t. which arrived on 28th ult^v. with Enclosures in order. The Sir 'Hambyes' Bill of Lading for 81^{1/2} bales Wool in separate envelope arrived on 23rd ult^v. - your second letter of 23rd Jan^t. arrived from Montevideo on 26th Feb^t. The first of 23rd Jan^t. was in the Despatch.

2. N^o. 514, 2. It is most unfortunate the Punching and Shearing Machine has broken, we have appealed to the Manufacturers Messrs. Butterfield & C^o: but they state that from the position of the breakage there must have been foul treatment & they cannot allow any compensation and can only let us have the double ended Machine you ask for at the same price as their List of 1888 though prices have gone up very much since that date, so we have ordered it and it will be shipped by the next Steamer of 23rd May.

3. Par 3. Separate Account Sales of ~~DR~~ 8 bales Wool ex 'Pentaur' 26 June 90 is now sent though you have had these particulars in the Journal Entry.

4. Par 5. We endeavour to keep running numbers for all our Stores but some Merchants are careless and do not use those issued to them, also when there are a great number of small articles from one Firm we allow them to number from one upwards.

5. Par 6. We are obliged for the full details of the Fencing to be supplied in future and shall now send only that which you describe - any further supply must wait your return as it may then be necessary to charter a vessel: Messrs. Dennis & C^o: the Agents for Feltex & Guillaume state their goods are well made and cannot be allowed for

6. Par 7. Messrs. Tyler & C° will make a set of taps and dies for their Machinery to be sent by next Steamer.

7. Par 8. We send £2,000 Silver Specie all five shillings pieces, this time from the Mint ^{in five boxes} as the Bank of England could not supply such a quantity, this is better as they will be entirely new and less expenses as we had to get an order from the Crown Agents: they have agreed to increase the monthly Stanley Treasury Bills to £600 to the end of June next so one for £600 is now sent.

8. Par 19. Rowson's Straining Brackets 1,000 cannot be ready for this Mail they will be sent by 23rd May steamer the 15,000 Split Pins are shipped by present Steamer.

9. Par 23. The Board has ordered that Messrs. Holmested & Blake be paid for the Bale Wool damaged by Tallow ex 'Orissa' last August, the Account £1. 11. 6d is now enclosed.

10. Par 34. We could not make any terms with Balf & C° about Dean's Ale going bad, as more are unfortunately going sour you must send particulars of the shipment, amount of claim with certificates from Publicans or others in authority as soon as possible after discovery of damage.

11. Upon your suggestion about the Rents paid in advance upon the Land of Darwin Sections recently purchased we made a claim upon the Colonial Office for £101. 19. 7 as by our letter of 17th ult., and they replied on 25th ult. that the matter had been referred to the Governor and if found correct this claim would be paid at Stanley: copy of correspondence enclosed.

12. We received £50 on 24th ult. for the Rev. T. Bridges from Miss E. J. Brown at Clifton, a letter is enclosed for him and I have reported to Down East through Sandy Point Agent. Messrs. Webberham & C°. You are to tell Mr. Charles Ellis that he is to write to his Mother at once. We send for your Office & many settlers of our Clients copies of the Govt. Blue Book for 1889. Mr. W. A. Harding of the Colonial Office goes out to give Mr. Jameson a year's furlough, he leaves by 31st March Mail.

13. Letters 23 Jan 91. The 817 bales Wool & 'Hambyses',
the 'Denderah' with 1,250 bales is ordered to the Tilbury Docks due
about 20th inst. so both will be in time for the next Wool Sales
commencing 2 April. Your family shall be informed the
name of your Steamer at Montevideo.

14. We have the pleasure of reporting that Sir Roger
and Lady Goldsworthy go out by this Steamer accompanied
by Miss Jones and Mr. Spearman his Private Secretary, we have
paid every attention to them both and should Govt. Herr not
have left with his family the Directors wish you, or Mr.
Baillon if you have left, to receive them in the Company's
House and make them as comfortable as possible, they both
take great interest in the Colony, everything has been explained to
Sir Roger by the Directors at two interviews and we anticipate
good results from his genial, kind manners and great experience.
Mr. W. A. Harding of the Colonial Office is going out to give
Mr. Jameson a year's furlough, he will probably leave by
the Pacific Mail of 31st instant.

We have the further pleasure of reporting that the
Colony is to be made a Naval Station with an Admiral
to take on the Montevidean Station and the Southern portion
of the Pacific this will add materially to the importance of
business of Stanley and the whole Colony. You have not
yet sent the Machinery particulars for the Admiralty to
be printed in their book of instructions, please do not delay
this any longer.

15. We send Mr. Nichol some Seed of a new Fodder
Plant the *Lathyrus Silvestris* very highly praised as it not
only produces good pasture for Sheep but also improves the
Land and we trust he will carefully plant it and hope it
can be successfully raised for the benefit of our Sheep & Wool:
a couple of the Circulars might be sent to the West. We send
Harper's Magazine for Febrd containing an excellent description
of the voyage of the Kosmos S.V. 'Asiris' from Callao to Montevideo
in April last year.

16. Late yesterday we received two Copies of the Kosmos
F. & G. Mail Service Time Table but it comes up to November next,
one Copy is enclosed and one Copy given to Sir R. Goldsworthy -
we learn a Barrister is to be appointed for Chief Magistrate.

We are glad the Stanley Accounts for last year are coming in this Despatch, as the Men of War will clear out the Steam Coals we must arrange on your return for a further shipment. Should you send telegram by 'Herodot' to Sandy Point about any business, add the word 'Parquetry' Passengers all well, as Sir Roger Goldsworthy might ask us to inform his friends of their safe arrival. 3. Par 7. The Apple Rings for Mr Williams could not be obtained for the 'Prissa' and were shipped by the St Herodot 14 Inch qrs & the charge £15.18. is now sent with Freight, Insurance, Charges and Commission.

4 Par 9. You do right not to deviate from the rules laid down with respect to the "Sisies" service for the Mail Steamers. Mr Staude has heard from his Agent but having seen Mr Cobb on the subject we do not think the Kosmos Co. will send out a Steam Launch.

5 Par 10, 11. The Mutton ex St Bayley sold at 2/1 to 2/4 per stone of 8 lbs. Anson's wethers & rams were very large up to 120 lbs each, Cameron's 70 to 80 lbs. The St Star of Victoria arrived 20th ult^o with 2,110 carcasses Mutton for spearing & Waldron which have sold at 1/10 per stone - they cashed an order for £3 in favor of Francis McInnes signed by C. 8. Par 14. The Directors are pleased and congratulate you on being appointed to a seat on the Legislative Council, as they consider you will be of service there.

9. Par 15. The Commission of Sheep Farmers & others to arrange about Acts for Scab, Fencing &c is certainly the right thing & we believe Mr. Nichol being appointed a Member will take care of our interests & lead to the improvement of the chif interest of the colony.

10. Par 16. I am glad to hear that Capt Hansen has sent some of the large Skeleton he described to me and trust the whole will come by the 'Orissa' as I have written Professor Flower about it.

11. Par 18. We have claimed our Insurance £4,300 less the two above so trust to come out without loss though there will be several expenses attending the disaster. Mr. F. Hardy was the only Passenger, he goes out by this Steamer and has taken charge of a case containing duplicate Books, Newspapers &c as per list enclosed, also Charts for Mr. Nichol and Fishing Tackle for Dr. Dale. We took the precaution to send Telegram our N^o. 59 on 24th ult. at 12.25 pm in hopes of a Man of War or some vessel going thus this may prove to be the case - "Neko woolstack storksbill silently" meaning Neko is a total wreck stores will be forwarded by first Steamer on 26th day of September." As Hardy lost everything we have advanced him Twenty Pounds (£20). Duplicate Copies of Bonner's Will & Power of Attorney for Nichol are sent. We are endeavouring to send 10,000 yards Wool Bagging by a Kosmos Steamer to Sandy Point to be on safe side for our next clip believing it could be easily transhipped there.

Our last went on 1st instant by the extra Steamer 'Theben' the Duplicate being now enclosed.

2. We have to report that Mr. Hallett has purchased the Schw. 'Done' 71 to 76 tons Register a Yacht built very many years ago which he is fitting out for Island service and we believe she will sail between now and the middle of the month.

3. N^o. 522, 4. In reply about Tallow damaged Wool we send copy of our Broker's letter to Edenborough &c: letter of this date, if the 'Orissa' brings any Wool we trust the greatest care will be taken to stow it separate from the Tallow.

4. As the Steamer of 26th prox: will convey two lots of Wool Bagging, 10,000 yards shipped at Neko 18th ult. and 10,000 yards ordered for her, we are considering whether it would not be advisable to send another 10,000 yards in case of accident to the Sep. V. Steamer by a West Coast Steamer from Antwerp on 10th Oct. due at Sandy Point 10th Nov. to be transhipped to the Falkland Steamer leaving there 13th November, the difficulty will be the storing of it there in case the Steamer is delayed through the Chilean disturbances, as the Flosmos &c: state that their Agent owns neither lighters nor warehouse for such purposes so that the transit charges would be heavy and the risk of damage great; when in communication with Mr. Stubenrauch you ought to enquire about this for future emergencies.

5. We are thinking it will be proper to ship £2,000 Silver Specie, as before on 14th March last, by the 26th Sept. Steamer to make up for the stoppage of the Crown Agents drafts on the Stanley Treasury unless advices are received from the Governor that these remittances are to be resumed by the Mail due 14th instant.

6. Your letter of 10th June together with Mr. Nickols letters of 19th and 24th June were carefully considered by the Board this afternoon, who consider that nothing need be done by you as the whole matter must be brought before the authorities here and Mr. F. Sir,

The Board have read and attentively considered your remarks and Mr. Nichols' letters on the subject of the agitation about land, and have instructed me to reply thereto.

They quite agree with the arguments advanced in opposition to the suggested survey, and while they believe that the recent purchase of the Company's leaseholds cannot be overthrown, and that their interests consequently are not seriously jeopardized, they desire that you will take no part, directly or indirectly, in applying for a survey, an act which can only be a sign of extreme simplicity on the part of any landholders who may adopt the Governor's suggestion. Your attitude on this question to put it shortly, should be one of "masterly inactivity"; and should not extend, except in a case to be alluded to later, beyond a temperate statement of your objections to the measure, should it be seriously proposed. The main objections are well set out in Mr. Nichols' correspondence, and there is little to add to them, beyond the undoubted fact that the land question which had been a vexed one for years, was acknowledged by the Government to have been definitely settled in 1882, at the time when the Ordinance doubling the rents was passed, when a specific promise was made to the lessees of Crown lands that their tenure should be undisturbed, at least until the expiration of the

renewed leases granted under the Ordinance alluded to. Under that promise large sums have been laid out in fencing and other improvements, to say nothing of advances made by way of mortgage, and any attempt to disturb that settlement must necessarily be an act of bad faith, if not worse, on the part of the Colonial Government.

It is not considered that such a small colony, as that of the Falkland Islands is likely, within a measurable distance of time, if ever, to be anything but a Crown colony, and, if that view is correct, the probable action of the democracy in the matter of land taxation does not come within the sphere of practical politics. There is no reason for supposing that a qualified Land Surveyor, as Mr Bailey was, although laying out blocks on a nautical chart, would work them in anything but square or land measure, and the Governor's discovery is probably a mare's nest. In any case it is most improbable that any excess over the stated acreage can be greater than the area of rock, bog, and useless water that falls to the lot of all the lessees. Still the Directors could not raise any objection to a survey being held, if the Governor insisted upon it, although they would probably regard it as an absurd waste of public money, and expect that the Unofficial members of Council would object to it on that ground; but they are distinctly averse to proposing any bargain with the Government in the sense you appear to suggest, as regards preemptive or other rights, as they consider that such a proceeding would be, in more senses than one, both useless and ill-advised.

Should any united action on the part of the present landholders be proposed, you could not very well avoid joining in it, - and whether

52

whether that action takes the form of an address to the Governor or a Memorial to the Secretary of State, provided it is expressed in well-considered and respectful terms, it is right that you should sign it on behalf of the Company. You will of course remember that if the Governor has made up his mind to a certain course, the Colonists are powerless, at the time, to divert him from his purpose; it always has been, and always will be so. The Colonial Office, however, have of late years listened favorably to protests sent from the Colony, especially when backed up here, and it is in Downing Street that the fight will ultimately take place. To wage that fight we here are not lacking either in knowledge or resources, and there appears to be no reasonable doubt that when the time comes, we shall be able to carry it to a successful issue.

6. N^o. 525, 3. Gwen Morrison delivered on 8th inst. the bottle of Gold Dust from the Rev^r. T. Bridges which broke on the 15th inst. after reading this Despatch so a Smelters recommended by the Bank of England and received £ 65. v. 6 on 16th inst., which was paid the next day to Mess^r. 9. Par 11. We trust a proper Scab Act will be passed without too much delay for it is certainly needed in the Colony; with respect to the Truck Act we do not see how this can be carried out for it would be exceedingly dangerous to have to keep a quantity of Cash at outlying Stations and we have always understood that our Shepherds were satisfied with the price charged for Stores to them, we presume therefore the demand for such a Law has arisen through the malpractices of a West Falkland Sheep Farmer.

10. Par 18. We regret that there has been trouble about the Fosnos Steamers not taking so much Wool as anticipated, Mr. Staude writes that you do not agree with Mr. Schlottfeldt and endeavour with the Governor to have their Steamers unnecessarily delayed and that the 'Flamnak' could have taken more Wool had you not insisted upon shipping 160 packages to Montevideo, as to which you have sent no report, also that as the Postal subsidy is so small the utmost speed should be used in discharging and loading their Steamers, we trust therefore you will now work in harmony with Mr. Schlottfeldt for he appears to have his own & our Co^o. interests at heart - we hope the 'Tomes' with Septth. 1. Sir. The last despatch, which should have been numbered 762, went per Concord on the 8th ult., and I have to acknowledge receipt of yours no. 526 via Lisbon on the 10th id., no 527 per Divesa 13th ult., and 528 per Orenoco on the 19th ult.

2. 526 - 2. I will endeavor to find out the value of penguin oil.

3. Part. Accounts of freight shall, in future, be forwarded regularly.

4. Part. A new set of seals for the Castalia goes this mail, made as requested by Capt. Rowlands. I have selected an excellent pair of light glass, which go out in charge of Mr. H. H. Cobb. If any repairing canvas for these seals should be wanted, you must let me know in time.

5. Part. of 150. Payments have been made to Messrs. Williams & Mortons, but their request should have appeared in your statement, not the despatch.

6. Part. II. The wreck of the Concordia, unless the proceeds of your account to be set aside, should have been in

your hands an opinion. Present and Lloyd's Agent. You will find a useful paragraph in the Board of Trade instructions on wrecks relating to Local Agents, &c., upon which ~~I~~ you to act, submitting to the benevolent approval of the Receiver of Wrecks, but declining his active assistance. See the case of the Steamer S. Perchance, and many others. Your best line in such cases is to hold the Receiver personally responsible for any mistakes and losses occasioned thereby, if he persists in interfering.

7. Par. 15. Your telegram relating to Colon Agents' bills has been anticipated, as we have arranged to send £400 monthly, and your request for £2000 remains in the same case. I see no necessity for forwarding your gold, unless you can make a profit on it; for many years I never saw a sovereign in the island, and it has only been within the last few years that gold has been much circulated. To send gold is like trying to hold water in a sieve; whereas the silver, ~~which~~ remains in the Colony, we pay no freight on getting it out, and you can probably get as much as you want at all times in exchange for your drafts on London.

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8. Pa. 17. I have been in communication with Mr. G. Williams & Co., and will arrange to send their tobacco by next outward steamer.

9. Pa. 19. Mr. Williams has delivered the leaves.

10. Pa. 21 and 528-3. The Board has discussed the question of the costs served upon you for the value of land, and I am to point out that the statement of Claim is incorrect: it is just true that 100 acres were allotted to Smith and the women, on the contrary the Company paid cash into the Bank of England for every land order they received. Seeing that Smith paid no deposit, and got a free passage, he has just a shadow claim. In consideration of the Company taking the trouble and risk of getting these people out, the Crown Agent, for the Government, paid them a sum per passage money which partly reimbursed them for their outlay, and no doubt if Mr. Moore paid £20 for his passage we made a profit out of her. Sir, however, having seemed a husband by the transaction, has probably been the greatest gainer of the two, and it can hardly be shown that she was entitled, in addition, to profit by the Company's arrangement with the Crown Agent. The legal expenses

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of the Board say that, under ordinary circumstances, it is not quite the thing to plead the Statute of Limitation, but the case comes within it, and having been raised neutrally after an interval of nearly a quarter of a century, solely for the purpose of gaining South autonomy, and causing you annoyance, you are at liberty, if necessary, to avail yourself of it. At the same time you should let the fact of this case be known.

11. Par. 22. A copy of Chapman's letter is enclosed. I cannot understand why the broken machinery was not returned by Sir Orissa. I thought you understood that it was to be shipped in support of your claim.

12. 528 - 2. Copy of a letter to the Colonial Office is enclosed, to which no reply has yet been sent. The last paragraph of Mr. Wingfield's letter of 29th Sept. is ambiguous; most people understand that the lands will not be meddled with, but that the holders will have to pay for their title a reeve. I hear that there is now a hitch about the survey on the ground of expense.

13. Par. 5. He could not buy the Sabine here, and so could give

You no news about her. Although ship
and cargo have cost more than we hoped,
you were quite right to follow your instruc-
tions. We have seen Mr. Slade on the
subject, and after some demur he has
agreed to take a portion at 35%, a few
conditions proposed in the enclosed copy of
letter. After the delay experienced over
the Great Britain it is hopeless to expect any
time to take coal in bulk, and therefore it
was necessary to contract to bag them
into lighters. In the usual season no
doubt there will be some difficulty, but
I send from Antwerp 3000 bags, and
you will use the three lighters when not
required for other cargo, probably also
making use of the Fair Rosamond. You
can get soon ready at home, as some of the
homeward bound steamers will coal shortly.
Mr. Anchell is a man of resources, and
if he carries this out properly he will not
be forgotten. Of course this arrangement
should be kept private, and does not affect
prices to this ship, though, unless you
think it desirable to lighter the hucks at
once, upon night work off the Sabine's
coal by reducing them to 60% or even 55%.

to expense for telegram, more especially
on the latter. (Baronie rosamond
trilino) was received for some reason
of unexplained, on the 27th Inst., eight
days after we had received your report
by mail of the completion of the bargain.
You speak of appointing a master to the
schooner, but you must remember that
she is only bought as a stand-by, a pro-
cess in case of absence of work, and that
any addition to the fleet that has tickets
brought in all the produce, must not
be thought of until that produce has
increased so much as to be proportionable.

17. Par. 13. The cost of the Sabine
must be transferred to London at the
end of December, and you must open
a Sabine's cargo account, which will
be similar to the Great Britain's cost
etc. The account will be debited with
expenses, and credited with sales, the
balance at the end of the year being
carried to Profit & Loss, after carrying
forward the value of cargo remaining.

18. Your telegram "Send
Treasury bill Hansen carcass denominated
"federal Saint Maloed rankin live-
post Knight commander babadoz"
was received a day ago yesterday. The

Board very much regret to hear of
Mr. Hansen's death, which has been

22. Referring to correspondence enclosed, you should advise T. Harvey to make a statutory declaration with reference to his lost effects and their values, then if he will authorize me to act for him I will attend to the matter of his claim.

23. I have the pleasure to report that M.W.G. Robinson has paid £209 on account of the Church, extinguishing our above account.

24. We have effected an arrangement with the Mortgagors of the Bunkley Castle, under which we have accepted £1500 less legal expenses, in settlement of our claim. This is much better than a prolonged lawsuit; this

amount of the dishonored bills is now transferred to your debit, and you are credited with the full sum received, so you will re-open the Bankhead Castle account, and transfer the balance to Profit & Loss. I have given an undertaking to hand over the thirds of the bills, which please return at once; the seconds have already been given up.

25. Although the same was taken in April, no information on the subject has reached us yet. You had better suggest to the Editor of the Official Gazette that the return would be more interesting than much of the information that we get from that valuable publication.

26. Owing to Mr. Colman's absence the dividends for Simpson and Morrison cannot be drawn; it will be desirable to send a new power to me to attend to these matters.

27. The Drissi arrived on the 12th inst. with damage to bulwarks and stanchions; she will undergo repairs, and then be loaded out.

28. I have the pleasure to convey to Mrs. Currie through you short upon hearing of the accident

displayed by her, and of the interest she takes in her work at the Missionary Stores, the Board has unanimously voted her a Christmas box of £10, with thanks for her exertions.

29. The charter of the Concord has to be undertaken in consequence of the Orissa's delay, and I hope she will get round safely. You will observe that all cargo is to be loaded in Stanley except that for the six specified ports, and Dean & Son's costs are to be charged at the same price as Burrows', but to go from your stock. Of course the Orissa will take out the Charles' goods later on. Some must go on first, if still in the employ, you will see that we have to provide ours. The boat Linguis, you can sell at Tor Bay, otherwise the Castalia must bring it in.

30. The Director has had an interview with Mr. Stands, and have promised him their best support; this is reported for open printed information, in order that you may carry out strictly the policy they have chosen to adopt. We are of opinion that taking them all round the Kosma C perform the service and suit the circumstances of the Colony better than any line that is in the least

likely to take it up; they have carried our goods onwards and homewards in a very satisfactory way for more than seven years, and although the main five years have been provokingly irregular, he was in Chile and when Company should be blamed, and we believe that greater regularity will be maintained in future.

It will therefore be your duty to encourage in every way to go for them the good will of shippers, and we trust that through your influence the quantity of wool coming forward by their steamers will be increased rather than lessened.

31. In consequence of our friend Mr. Colman has retired from the post he has held so long, and, as the enclosed circular will show you, I have been placed on the Board with the position of Managing Director. You will, therefore, in future, address your despatches to me in that capacity.

1. My last despatch went for Abyssinia on the 21st ult., and I received on the 4th inst. for Britain your despatches 529 of 1st Oct. and 530 of 27th October, with enclosure in order 2. 529-1. The despatch of the Madrasal to Sandy Point was an utter failure, as any one might have predicted, and it is to be hoped that the Governor will give warning him.

3. Par. 2. The delay of the telegraph in San Rosamond is now understood.

4. Par. 3 and 530-11. The misfortunes of the Knight Commander are much to be regretted; Messrs W. Lowder & Co. have accepted the draft for £1840.14.11, and will meet the supplementary one. Par. 4. G. Smith & Sons have also accepted the draft on account of the City of Buenos.

5. Par. 6. The Claro's station has been sold, and a sale will follow next mail.

6. Par. 7. I have communicated with the Crown Agent on the subject of Mr. Belmont's purchase, and trust to advise A. B. Fallon Esq.
Manager.

7. Govt. I will give you the date
of payment of the draft for the Government,
but have to remark that it is an unusual
practice; a transaction of this sort is in-
variably a matter of exchange, and we
have never in my time sold bills to a

monthly drafts.

8. On 11. and 530-3. We
can do nothing towards improving

10. Par. 9. I speak £2000 in silver as well as the sum sent before have gone, as they naturally have, where are they? The like gold, they cannot have left the colony, and I can hardly imagine that you will have much difficulty in getting both enough to keep you going. On this subject you must keep me well posted. Surely the Government will want to remit Savings bank funds for investment.

11. Par. 11. The Dennis Bunderit will be chartered to carry out those coal and some rough cargo.

12. Par. 16. The insurance premium are asked, and you will remember that ours are sheep back policies, covering risk of fire.

13. Par. 17. We shall do all we can to assist Mr. Hansen, to whom I enclose a letter. Captain Hansen's cheques will be paid, if forthcoming.

14. Par. 18. It is satisfactory to learn that Smith's contemptible action has failed.

I suppose that he has not the impudence to ask you for work now.

15. Par. 19. On the land question I have nothing to communicate but a copy of a portion of Mr. Finchford's despatch, which I believe you have seen, and the significant fact that the surveyor, Mr. Gordon Allen, who was almost engaged, has been told that the survey is indefinitely postponed. This I see is his own writing. The Secretary of State has not answered any of the late letters addressed to him by others as well as myself, and it is presumed to be cogitating how to get out of the mess Sir Roger has got him into. I am going to write to him again soon; meanwhile, your policy is to remain "markedly inactive," and your advice workers should be to resist any aggression, but otherwise remain quiet. Should, however, any action be taken with regard to any of the Company's lands, the Board have decided that you are promptly to give notice of an appeal to the Privy Council, and hold the Government responsible in damages for any injury that may be sustained through their action. There can be no harm in your adding, in an

17. In continuation of para. 15, it is hardly necessary to caution you to keep my remarks strictly to the office, and not let the foreman know what our intentions are.

18. The bale of so-called wool from Fitzroy turns out to be skins. This is the bale from Captain Pack to which you called attention.

19. The hide ex-Dress have not sold well, and something must be done to prevent the multiplication of these lots, which Messrs. Amis & Co. inform us make their catalogue the largest stock of the sale room. Buyers

as a rule, will not look at bales
lowered in twos and threes, con-
sequently they sell below their
value, and you had better, on the
basis of the prices lately realized, try
to buy all lots under 20, and ship
them without mark. The marking
with knots is also condemned as
laborious to distinguish, and some
better plan will have to be devised.

20. The wool at Santos
sold at fair prices, and I forward
herewith catalogue.

21. I have just seen Mr.
W. Stickney, who expresses dissatisfaction
at the way his agents have
conducted his business, and especially
at the delay of his wool, which is
always ready early. As there is
sometimes a difficulty in finding
early pressed wool, his firm would
be useful clients, and they seem
likely to apply to you before long.

4th instant. Your despatch no 531 for
Shekou arrived by the French mail on
the 21st ultimo, your letter of 21st Dec.

patch no. 532 of same date not until
the 5th instant, and telegram "Gannets
"mangusta Epinday" on the 4th.

2. You will observe from these
dates the necessity of posting up a
duplicate despatch for posting in
Montevideo, as used to be done formerly.

3. 531 - 3. With regard to the
land question, you will find enclosed
a copy of a letter from Mr. Winsfield, and
of three others with which I have found
it necessary to trouble him. In his letter
you will note an absence of the confidence
shown in the earlier stages of this controversy,
and I hear from Mr. Lafone, M.D., who
lately had a long interview with Mr.
Winsfield on our behalf, that the question
is now to be referred to the law officers

It will not do, however, to be too confident as yet, or to show the Government that we think we are winning; and your best policy with him will be to maintain an attitude of sorrowful resignation.

4. Part 4. I expect that owing to a break in the cable I was unable to wire to catch Mr. Abdy dor, reporting that Mr. Louder 16th will accept Capt. Murdoch's draft for the Knight Commander's further expenses.

5. Par. 5. I am already making inquiries about a pair of engines for the Sissis.

6. Par. 6. I believe that the monthly Journal has been forwarded by each mail without fail for 2½ years, and it is not satisfactory to learn that it was not ready 17 days after the end of October.

7. 532 - 3. I do not gather that we are to move in the matter of Mr. Alzina's legacy?

8. Part 8. I am informed that the other private papers were

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received, but that they were not ready
for the Herodot.

9. Jan. 5. Mr. Ken's box did not
arrive at Dartmouth until after the
Herodot had left.

10. Jan. 6. I am satisfied that
you will never have peace in Mr. Black-
smith's shop as long as Chaplin is there,
and there can hardly be a question that
it will be better quietly to let him go when
his five year agreement expires in October
next. You need not break this to him
yet; but if you agree with this, say so,
and we can arrange to have a new man
to take his place. It will then be a
favourable time to engage permanent
strikers, if you can make any proposal
as regards housing them; perhaps some
of the local men would take a perman-
ent place if they knew they could. To
send out a new staff pictures to be
contaminated by Chaplin would be a
mistake, I think. Ogilvie, if fit, would
succeed Chaplin as foreman.

11. Messrs. Spearing & McDonald
have paid us £43. 14. 2 on account
of Messrs. Burrows & Telfer.

12. There was a cask of bones
supposed to be on board the Orissa,
the remains of highly interesting marine
monsters; can you find out whether it was
left behind or not?

13. Bills should be made payable to the company, but when by mistake drawn in favour of the Manager, as in the case of the May pic. you should endorse them.

14. More care must be taken over the freight stated in the Bills of Lading. The Orissa brought cotton from Madras Islands at 35/- and there have been other mistakes of the same kind.

15. The Board have decided that Mr. Kiwan is to be allowed a salary of £300 a year, to date from the commencement of his second year. I have explained that it is not possible for him to live on his salary as stated in his agreement, and a rise has accordingly been agreed to. The Board, however, wish Mr. Kiwan to understand distinctly that it is granted on the supposition that he sacrifices money every way, whether as to the time or manner in which he does his work, and they hope that his activity and diligence are now actual facts, instead of partaking of the nature of promises only. You will please communicate this to Mr. Kiwan.

16. Forward some correspond. on the subject of the Captain's suit, about which Lethbridge & Lapthorne & Stacey have made a mistake.

There has been a difficulty over the Edict & Baldon's account, and I regret to say that we were in the wrong owing to you exceeding the instructions sent you, in consequence of which we have had to compromise the matter at the cost of nearly all our commission. The Under-writer has agreed to spend a maximum sum of £500 to get the ship away, in fact the telegram explicitly said, "Expenses must not exceed £500, including divers." They consequently repudiated all charges for Brigg's traps, survey and all, as well as commission, and the additional £76 you paid on the contract, but after some delay agreed to meet us by halving the excess, the amount we have to refund being £93. 5. 6. On our promise to pay this Spearing and Baldon have accepted Capt Hunt's draft, and the affair is closed. You must be careful, however, on another occasion just to exceed your instructions to the smallest extent, your proper course would have been to report the Under-writer, and await further orders. The ship was abandoned to the Under-writer, and Capt Hunt had nothing to do with the repairs; he was no longer the owners' servant, and really ought not to have signed the bill.

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18. As I have several inquiries
for postage stamps, please send three
complete sets. I am also asked for
4 grey brown, watermark Crown & C.A.
postally, 1884, and 8 black, Crown &
C.A. sideways 1886. If the half penny
stamps with P marked may be still
unused, please get some marked and
post on despatcher. I am told they are

if you get in too much wool at once

may, however, find the F. R. useful
in doing a portion of the Orissa's work,
and no doubt she partially replaces the
Fastralia while the latter was away in
Moulmein, but these are both stand-by
occasions. The despatch of your boat

9. Jan. 9. Mr Sanguineti having
left, I do not expect to hear more about

mention that the bill fell due on 18th.

Ref. I do not in the least follow the
reasoning on this subject, for the Govern-
ment, although paying interest to the
depositors, cannot print money in
the colony, and it is useless to do so until
we provide the means of remitting it.

10. Jan. 12. The Board have
very fully considered the question of
Hansen's estate, and I have to convey
to you instructions which are short, but
definite. The remarks in 767-5 are
confirmed, with a warning in addition

from Mr Blakie's letter and your own
remarks, to make no advances on this
account, that are not secured to you
by produce. We are willing to assist
Mr Hansen as much as we can, and
Mr Dean will not press her; but as

The Governor himself says that he
can see nothing ahead except
smash you all down to protect
ourselves. He is entirely with
the Governor, whom you know better
than we do. If at any time you
find him in a soft and sentimental
mood, you should point out that
taking away the Lasons means
ruin to his widow and family, and
that he alone can avert it.

I keep Mr. Hansen busy sending
a rifle and cartridges for the sealing
season by skin steamer, and though
an appeal 'as misericordia' has
got the freight on the latter reduced
one half. If there is money in
hand you should make a remittance
to Mr. Dean; but you were quite
right not to pay the cheque for £300
unless you were fully secured. Should
the Lasons be released, there is no
reason why we should not make
modest advances, so that you see
Mr. Hansen's fate actually rests in
the Governor's hands.

14. Jan. 15th. Sanitary marks
on hides with blue or yellow paint
has been recommended.

12. Par. 16. You have done yourself an injustice in not correcting your statement that Mr. Herodot was taking all the wool you had for until some one incidentally mentioned that you had over 1000 bales ready, we thought that your total collection up to the 16th January was 816 bales. This satisfies us that you were able to entertain the Governor at the races, but it is hoped that you were able to do so without stopping or impeding the wool collection, for you must remember that in the season every day is of importance, and that we could not afford to detain our vessels for royalty itself.

13. Par. 18. The reason why none of the land seekers are applying for the Passage Islands must be this, that there are no buildings or plant occupied by the former lessees to be got at a cheap valuation; these people don't mind paying the part of such fees, but are averse to building their own nests. The Governor should make this.

14. Par. 19. I regret that you should have found it necessary to complain in such sweeping terms of the work in this office. There has been, however, more than sufficient reason for your remarks, and I can only say that the delays you speak of have already had my serious attention, and that I believe they will be cured in future.

The Board desire that you will not fail on a future occasion to call attention to any omission or irregularities that may have escaped notice on their side.

15. Jan. 20. I am writing to the Colonial Office on the subject of the Customs regulations.

16. I enclose a copy of Mr. Standish's letter on the subject of fit. fringe. The only thing to do is to impress upon Mr. Lancster the necessity of refusing packages apparently damaged, whatever the ship's officer may say, unless you can arrange with Mr. Schlossfeldt to have such packages marked on board, and opened afterwards in his presence and compared with the invoice. Mr. Lancster must never give a clean receipt for packages that appear to have been tampered with.

17. At the request of Messrs. Addison & C^o I have given a letter of introduction to you in favour of Captain Robertson of the steam whaler Active.

18. Are you likely to be able to induce the ~~and~~ Camp government,

after the land question is settled, to take over the Harper Bridge for the Arroyo Mato? It would be of great advantage to all of them.

19. The Colonial Office has asked us to do something for the Chicago Exhibition, and you must get Mr. Welch to prepare anything you like, such as wool samples. The Government will give you any information you may require about this.

20. In the Times of 19th Feb. you will see an answer to a question put by Mrs. Hill's, of which I enclose a copy.

21. In the case remittances on account of my butchers own people you must charge the sender the Post Office fee from London, when a £.00. and not a cheque is the form remittance. I send you the Postal guide in which you will find the fees both for inland and foreign orders. We lately paid 1/6^d on an order sent to Germany from the West Falklands, and Mrs. Biemann's monthly costs in with postage £1. per annum. These sums are small, but aggregate a considerable sum in the year.

22. By your estimate of his Oursa's earnings you make 343 bahts.

measures 50ft long & nearly 59 ft. each, - a slight miscalculation.

23. In your last despatch the Stone cart voucher (East) was entered among the enclosures, but was not found.

25. As soon as an Ordinance is printed let us have a copy, and we want all sent since the last batch was forwarded a year or two ago. If you have given any information about the Boston Ordinance at the time I would have endeavored to get the obnoxious clauses disallowed, which may now be a matter of some difficulty; but you allowed three months to pass without mentioning it. As all matters affecting the company you must keep ^{us} up to date.

26. In order to decide about engines for the Sisic it is necessary for you to provide an exact plan of the boat with dimensions of every-

thing, and a surface condensing engine are recommended instead. I may also let show where the condenser can be placed. To this purpose you must of course consult Hobbs.

27. In my despatch 763-25

I asked you for information about the Cunam, but you have ignored the question. Surely the information must have been obtainable months ago. In 1861 it was printed and circulated.

28. Mr. Coleman has at last been able to draw the new dividends, and they are remitted with this.

29. When you ship wool always write the quantity, instead part 1 of Quantities, page 1157. At Code, not part 3. The number must relate to the bales to our consignment, and be the nearest to the actual quantity, thus the Herodot's cable should have been "Herodot Staffell" not "Tuncetto". The Thomas C. informed of a large shipment for Kannak, but your message only relates to the very minuscule payment on account of the Governor.

30. Your correspondence enclosed you will see that Lord Ruthford recognizes our hand as a block, and admits our

boundaries to be correct according to
the leases, although he declines at
present to confirm them. Practically,
however, he has conceded enough to
bring us under par. 5 of his despatch,
which is all we want. I am hoping,
however, to induce him still further.

My last despatch was dated the 12th instant, and up to the time of writing I have only received press copies of your No. 635 of the 13th ult. with enclosures, which came via Sandy Point. As however bills and cheques are being presented, it is clear that other people have received their letters, a state of things against which you must take every precaution in future, as this must annoy. Why, if the Klarkak and Teko were in together you did not take the ordinary precaution of sending original by one and duplicates by the other requires explanation. Your telegram "Federal Ironsides Stevens Swanses Camuto Cambali pannetas marquette Grindlay" arrived on the 20th March £100 sent to Messrs Grindlay at once, and inquiries are on foot as to Mr. Stevens' financial position, the result of which will govern next week's cable.

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I have also received your letter of
20th ult. for Karnak, which with the
packet of duplicates arrived on the
26th instant for Britannia.

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2. Desp. 535. The accounts
have not been before the Board yet,
but I may say, in anticipation, that
they will be considered satisfactory.
The profit on Farm is, as expected,
very good; had you been at all
finished you might have taken
credit for the produce omitted, at
a moderate estimate, say £ 2500.
but it is just as well that you do
not, as the proceeds give us a nest
egg to start the year with.

3. I have been closely
watching the Store sales, and the
reduction of profit is no surprise.
This depends so much on ships that
an occasional drop cannot be avoided.
I cannot see what your total sales
for the year were, as the press copy
of the Journal entry is illegible.
Return it herewith as a specimen
of work that is not creditable to
M. Kirwan. No press copy that

cannot be read should ever be sent out. I should have said that I cannot check your figures, as I see that you have stated the decrease of sales at £243*st*.

4. Notwithstanding the decrease of debt owing to Store I observe that the Sunday Debtors have increased about £4000, and now stand at more than £27,000. To doubt these are mainly secured by produce, and in some cases cash received here towards the end of the year has not been credited. The following require some notice. Baillons & Stickney's balance, £311*4s*. is a large sum to be totally unsecured, and I shall represent to Mr. & J. Baillon that under present circumstances I think we ought to have the consignment of their firm's produce. Penny with £267*8s* must be careful with his expenditure, and if not so must be checked. The reduction of Petalug's balance to £125*s* from what it stood some years ago is hopeful. Although H. Waller's balance is much reduced, you must not forget

that there is a mortgage on his place, which renders caution necessary. The Sabine's cargo account might have been taken out of the Sunday Dr. and placed among the property on hand. Mr. Hansen's balance appears to show that we can make a payment to Mr. Dean, as there is a good sum to go to his credit. Mr. C. Williams appears to have started private accounts, to which there can be no objection providing they keep credit balances; but to make advances of this kind as well as on the station account is objectionable. Perhaps now that W. S. Williams has returned he will rectify this by sending you cheques to place these on the right side.

The cooper's account, £ 136. 7*l*. is monstrous, and you must take active and energetic means to get it regularly reduced.

5. The stock officing on hand requires explanation; if it represents, as it should, materials issued for use but not erected,

The amount seems excessive. Deposit account should represent the actual total of deposits, and the overdraft by Drs (which should be cleared off) should have been transferred to a separate account.

6. The falling off in the month's profit may be due to your having sent her on too long voyage. She carries little, and you may take it as an axiom that the established rates of freight will not pay her if she has to go farther than a port in Falklands Sound. You also know that her captain, though safe, wants wakings up pretty constantly. The rest of the accounts do not at present call for any special remark. I may however, say that their completion and transmission by this mail reflect credit on the activity and diligence of all concerned.

7. I cannot answer your remarks about Frager as they refer to despatch not to hand. I may say, however, that I think it exceedingly unlikely that the Board will assent to a proposal that would tend to create an undesirable precedent.

8. Writing to you for the
Secretary on the 4th August last,
despatch no. 709. I concluded by
saying. "... it is in Downing St.
that the fight will ultimately take
place. To wage that fight we here
are not lacking either in knowledge
or resources, and there appears to be
no reasonable doubt that, when the
time comes, we shall be able to carry
it to a successful issue." This was
about the land question, and I quote
these words with much pleasure, as
they have come true to the letter.
Enclosed you will find a final letter
from the Colonial Office dated the
14th inst. about which I will say
no more than that Lord Lansdowne
has made an absolute and uncon-
ditional surrender to us on every
point we have been fighting for,
both for our clients and ourselves. We
do not wish to be more than modestly
proud of this victory, and have
therefore sending a circular to the
various reporters the decision in
Mr. Winsfield's own words, without

any comment whatever. At the same time there can be little doubt that it will tend to increase the esteem in which we are held by the landholders generally, as it must disabuse the minds of the most prejudiced party idea that we have been playing our own hand only in this business.

9. Lord Stamford will refer my protest about the Custom to the Governor, and probably on this comparatively small matter red tape will prevail. I will, however, forward you by return an exact copy of the Concord's Customs entries for dutiable goods, on the local form, and I will make the best fight I can.

10. The Kamah will land her very fine shipment at Tilbury Docks about Wednesday. Unless you have more sheepskins in view it was a little rash parting with your stock, as you may now short for the Orissa, and you must avoid shipping wool by her. Account sales and measurements of the Herodotus' wool go with this; it realized fair prices considering the market.

11. In buying hides you
must be careful not to give much
as they are very low. The account
sales lately sent will be a guide
for you.

3. Part 4. We must leave it to you to decide ^{to} the Blacksmiths; but must insist upon their account being regularly reduced - If they will not do this voluntarily, you must use strong measures. They cannot spend their earnings, and must have a board somewhere. They are, in fact, what is called "getting into their employer's ribs" with a view to the future.

4. Part 12. Insurance on wool are noted.

5. Part 13. The question of Lively Islands must await the decision of the Board.

6. Part 14. The arrangement with Frazer was that in consideration of his being provided with a passage out for himself and family he was to serve

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us for five years certain, and this you will find confirmed in Mr. Colman's despatch No. 712 - 10 of 10th November, 1888. On arrival we talked over the agreement, and decided that there should be an honourable understanding between us on the above lines, as he had no idea of leaving the place and could trust the company as to his wages. I am disappointed and surprised to see the step he is now taking, and may say at once, that far from paying his expenses to Sandy Point, the Company have, morally, a claim on him for his portion of the passage out which he & will not have earned if he only remains in the service $3\frac{1}{3}$ years. We shall not insist upon his completing his term of service, but shall expect him to remain until we can send out his successor by the 1st of next.

7. Jan. 15. You have not clearly explained why you were obliged to draw so heavily. If you mean that, as the Government declined to draw on the Crown Agents, you stepped in and gave the bill yourself, it was very kind of you; but the pain-

cipt of helping a lame dog over the stile
may be carried too far. Of course if you
wanted the money, it was a different
thing, or if you secured a corresponding
undertaking on the part of the Government
to find you cash whenever you want it, it
would ^{have} been worth while being civil; but on
these points you do not inform us. In
any case when you give draft to oblige
people they should not be at less than
30 days.

8. Jan. 16. Scammon says what
view the Board will take of the purchase
of Cressard's house ~~are~~ ground, but I
should have done the same myself had
I been in Stanley, as it squares upon
block. You will of course cease paying
that exorbitant rent for T. Hardy, and put
him there. Who takes Chaplin's old house?

9. Jan. 17. It is satisfactory
to find the coach moving off; you must
keep us advised as to sales or amount
of insurance.

10. Jan. 22. If a Banker, on whom
a customer draws a cheque, is aware before
paying it, of the death of the customer,
I am informed that he cannot legally
pay it, what is your position as regards
Hansen's cheque

11. Mr. Bonner has consulted us about a press, and wants to know the condition of the one at San Carlos. I took up and examined it, and you authorize his report according to the enclosed code. If pumps are required I think we have some spare ones which you might sell at cost price.

12. I am going back to Mr. Kunkiford to put Bertrand & Teller's purchase on a level with our own, and if I call "Trijamans" it will mean "Bertrand free from liability for increased payment whatever result of survey." But if you do not receive it there will be no cause for alarm, as they are very dilatory at the Colonial Office.

By all means employ her whenever you would otherwise have to charter an outsider; you have an absolute discretion as to this.

4. Par. 5. As Mr. Clark is now with Messrs. Oxbay & Donisthorpe, probably Mr. H. Waller will wish them to sell his wool in future.

5. Par. 7. We may have occasions to charter a sailing ship before long, but with the quantity of coal put ~~in~~ ^{on} board you cannot be hard up for some time. We could not, of course, have known by intuition that you were out of salt.

6. Par. 8. You must be careful about increasing the amount

2. Part 3. I have written to the Colonial Office about the Governor's refusal to renew leases. Part 4. His satisfactory telegrams show the lessers greatly appreciate the Company's assistance in this matter.

3. Part 6. The Old Kensington is owned by Mr. Smith late of Smith Elder & Co. and Mr. Bilbrough; they do not appear to be any reason to doubt their means, but we are taking the precaution of getting the draft on A. Bilbrough & Co. which you will take from the Captain at 60^{gs}. guaranteed by their Bankers. Mr. Bilbrough is sending out sail and A. Harton, Esq.
Managing Stanley.

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Sunday year, which we hope will reduce the amount below £6000.
~~the sum~~ guaranteed. Make
the charges as moderate as you
can consistently with showing
a good profit. If you could get a
few of these large jobs done
expeditiously and moderately
it would act as an advertisement,
and do us and the place far
more good than a few hundred
extra profit obtained by excessive
charges.

4. Day 9. It is not desir-
able to have more fencings lying
on the beach, thus there is a reason-
able probability of getting crushed
onto the ground within the next
couple of months, and it does not
look well to have over £1000's worth
issued but not used at the end
of the year.

5. Day 9. I will ask the
question about Mr. H. W. Waldron's
insurance, but I may point out
that if he issues his goods out

for an amount to cover freight he will save further trouble, and as to freight homeward it is just due until delivery, and therefore it is unnecessary business. You may, however, as I well dissuade Mr. Maldon if you can from asking us to do this, unless we have the consignment of his Delgado produced, for his account is one that must be looked upon as a little shaky.

6. Part 10. Mr. Maldon's coal should be sent as before.

7. Part 16. The draft on the Rosemark Co. to which you refer was not found enclosed.

8. Part 19. I have always thought it absurd to attempt to bolster up the seal fishing, and the sooner the last seal is killed the better it will be for the place.

9. Part 23. If the Poncenis here in time I shall recommend her being chartered again, unless we find a vessel for ourselves in the meantime. As to the Prissa, I shall advocate her immediate sale, and as she can't carry enough either out

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or hours, and the work she did
on the coast was trifling, we
shall be well rid of her, and it
will be no inconvenience to you
if you leave it to Mr. Lai Rosamond
to pick up the few books that she
would have brought in. When
you find a vessel that it will
suit us to buy we shall do so.

10. ^{Jan. 24} It is just a question
whether there was contributory
negligence in Bell's case, but
whether the accident was or was
not caused by any default on
the part of our foremen, or defect
in our machinery. If not, there
was no claim; if there was,
then contributory negligence
might be brought in as a fact.

his leg, your action could lie against
you because the temperature was

I want to know if you have received credit from us for all the return freight charges for 1891. Our accounts here are rather in a mess, and I cannot trace all returns. The Driss's balance you will transfer to Head Office.

15. You should use paper fasteners ~~or~~ staples for all papers that are ~~intended~~ not intended to be permanently fastened together. I shall have some difficulty in getting the Mississ. Bills of Lading apart.

16. Mr. Standish can advise you to remind you about his private account which you promised to send after him.

2. The Driss arrived on the 14th inst. and delivered her cargo in good order, except the bone ash which completely destroys the bags. It must be shipped in casks and barrels in future. Your letter of 19th July reached us by French mail on the 22nd inst., despatched no 543 post until the 25th, having been brought on by the steamer. The duplicate fortunately came in time for the Board meeting on the former day. It might have occurred to you that the second copy of the bill was of sufficient importance to be enclosed with the statement.

3. Part 2. At the present season it is hardly a good time to push the question of the Governor's action on the Customs question, but we shall probably be able to attack him later.

with Steinknepf is satisfactory, and
we cannot claim the consignment of

5. Same par. You must be
sure to give full vouchers for expenses

shortage of Sirgill, and the small
sums we got for it, you would do
right to hand over the shippers of
wool who are put our client to the
Schlossfeld, and charge 5% adl. a ton
for storage, unless our success in
fighting the farmers' case induces
them to come over to us in future.

6. Par. 5. Please supply us
with an exact account of sales in
Skins, and report the quantity on
hand each month.

7. Part. Messrs. Belbrough
called on the 5th without warning,
and we could not have aforesaid any
decision by the Idors. The con-

mission and interest on the Old Kensington account, in consideration of the guarantee, is to be one half the usual charge, i.e. 3 $\frac{1}{4}$ %.

8. Part. The last letter from the Colonial Office in which Lord Ripon confirms his predecessor's instructions means the final and conclusive defeat of the Governor.

9. Part 15. The circumstances are satisfactory. I do not know how the question of Tadarsah's manumission affects us. But Weller is on the same footing as Rowland and Amrichson.

10. The Bills of Exchange sent by mail after Drissi's departure were unsigned copies. Had we been hard up and wanting advanced payment know that these were not negotiable instruments. If you have ever had occasion to negotiate a Bill of Exchange, you are doubtless aware of the value of signatures. Such a slip as this should not have occurred.

11. Bromins family return with a third class passage.

12. Cabled you as to the Capt's deck load, which, with the exception of pieces can not fit long and stowed without a hazard. If damaged you must send the necessary certificate.

13. Capt. Pack would like to have a duplicate file to stay account with him in future.

14. Lloyd asks us to caution you about telegraphing at too great length, and I was looking into your enormous message to us when their letter arrived. Send it to me as it should have been despatched, and you will see what you could have reduced it by 15 words, and saved over £5. We do not want the owners' names when the captains don't draw upon them.

If it could keep him quiet it would not matter; of course you have reserved the right of resuming possession when required.

18. Please inform Mr. Spedd that the reply to his last letter must be deferred until next mail.

Since writing to you for Aranbol I have received your despatches 5444 for Karnak on the 16th Sept., and 5455 for Loko on the 3rd inst. as well as your letter of 11th August by the first named steamer. Your telegram "Saumur Marquette Grindlays" arrived on the 22nd ult., and has been attended to.

2. 544-2. It would have been better if you had sent a list of the Dennis Brundrett cargo. Enclose a list of produce for which we have claims on the Underwriters, and shall be glad to know if it is correct. Nissen's 16 casks of Tallow had been covered before your despatch arrived at £6 a cask, which is very full value, and cannot now be altered. A. W. Leeson's wool the account is so confusing that we can make nothing of it. 320 were ordered to be measured, but 30 bales

were lost or damaged, which would leave 290 to be shipped. The Bill of Lading however gives 285, and agrees with the survey, but of these 42 are stated to be sound, which would leave 243. But the draft for £741 means 247 at £3 per bale, and, again, the list of cargo mentions 32 numbers missing.

One more. The tender is invited for £ 244 bales. What on earth can be made of all this? In such a case the utmost precision is necessary, as you must know, and this carelessness is unexcusable. You have only sent one copy of the Bill of Lading which has gone to the Underwriters, and we should have another copy to keep in the office. The extraordinary trouble must be cleared up at once, or we may have a difficulty in settling the claim.

3. Par. 3. Enclose a copy for further letter back Colonial Office about the bulkhead and what need from our position.

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that we purchased the right to them
in 1883. If the owner or manager
interferes with them you must
politely inform him that you hold him
responsible for any infringement of our
rights, and in the event of his becoming
aggressive you must meet him with
passive resistance.

4. Part. As already advised
we have credit now for all three U.S.
ships, but it was too late to advise by
wire.

5. Par. 7 and 545-2. The
reports on the Knight Commander
were sent to the owner, but I have
not heard from them. With regard to
the restoration practised by Mr. Schomfelde
in which I expect to see that Johnson
takes part, you must explain to both
of them that while we have no objection
to their receiving survey fees when they
get them out of other people's hands we cannot
stand paying £4.4/- ourselves for the
few lines given in confirmation of the
upholstery which they have already been
paid. In Johnson's case you must
point out that we beat him very well

in allowing him to take all the fees,
although he surveys or performs
no service; it is usual with many
people to retain half the fees earned
by their people, and I have a suffi-
ciently good opinion of Johnson's sense
of honour to feel sure that he will
return the money. I am not so
sure with regard to Mr. Schlotfeldt
as his greed for cash would probably
outweigh everything else; but you
can restrain effectively by exclud-
ing him from surveying on ships
which are not in port or insured
in Germany, whenever you can find
two shipmasters in the place, and,
if other means fail, a threat of
this will probably be more effica-
cious than an appeal to his finer
feelings, if he has any.

6. Part 3. Mr. Cameron's
wool has been received as desired.

7. Part 1. It is most
satisfactory to hear of the better
relation existing between the

11. Part 12. The sales lately
held by our Brokers were decidedly
encouraging, and very fair prices
were obtained. Catalogues are sent
herewith. The remaining
information in your despatch not
specially remarked upon has been
duly noted.

12. I should like to know
how the hoop iron sent for the rods
from Blakemore's turns out, as it
was much cheaper than what
Brownson offers. Do not fail
to send remarks upon goods from
all new suppliers. Messrs Brown
Whitell & Co. have asked specially
about their tea, which they say was
remarkably good value.

13. You had better inform
L. Williams that his signature alone
Williams for Charles Williams is not
a valid endorsement, and payment
of bills so endorsed was lately refused
by our Bankers until I specially in-
structed them. You can show him how
to sign for procreation.

14. Enclose copy of a letter from
the Crown Agents about silver, and you must
try to get the Governor to give a general
order to supply us. Point out to him
that as we always give bills at par to
people wishing to remit it makes no
difference in the Colony, say that for
20 years I tried to keep a gold currency
going, but that it was like pouring
water through a sieve. You had better
also intimate that we shall not try it
again, but that if we are put to expense
over silver, remittance to Hindley and
others will probably be subject to a com-
mission of 2% to cover our outlay.

15. Bullock's wine is being
shipped as requested, but Hindley and
another firm say they can supply
much cheaper, and you might let me

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know if there would be any use
in sending sample coils of any
special size. I prefer you to an-
exert from a letter from Lieutenant
or take use of the one Bessemer
in the specification of flexible rods.

16. In closing Mr. Sakino's
coal account for the year you will
of course carry forward the coals on
hand to September at cost price, the
balance being profit. Do not over-
estimate the stock on hand.

17. We note with great sur-
prise that on the 30th June ult.
Kiriwai's account, after giving him
credit for half a year's salary, shows
a balance against him of £181. 18. 1.,
while on the 31st Oct. last he only owed
£131. 5. 10. This means that not-
withstanding his rise of salary he
has increased his indebtedness at the
rate of £100 a year. This should not
have been allowed, and must be
promptly taken in hand. It appears
that Mr. Kiriwai thinks it right to
borrow money for the purpose of giving
an expensive picnic, as we learn from

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the Magazine, and you had better let him know that we are not prepared to advance funds for this kind of generosity, and that it meets with our complete disapproval. In order to place himself in a more satisfactory position Mr. Kincaid will have to pinch himself for some time, and you are not, until a substantial reduction has been made in the account, to sanction any payment being made in England on his account, or to allow him to draw cash in Stanley without your express permission. In connection with this I may remark that the Board object to seeing any of their officers' accounts standing on the wrong side; salaries are not paid here in advance, and there is no reason why they should be on your side.

and send them home. I am convinced
that you will find them issued
in our name. As regards the
amount of commission, you will
I think see that an egregious
blunder has been committed by

third of it. This brings the net

and as the Board wish to deal

better give him £185. The pecuniary part of this question is of no moment to us, and the reason why we must take notice of it is that it would be unfair to the other Storekeepers greatly to increase King's perquisites. In any case see that the latter is not a loser.

6. Jan. 20. Messrs. Wakeham promptly sent a cheque to correct the error in the Bankfile's account. You must have these accounts better checked in future.

7. Jan. 23. We shall have no difficulty with the wool, tallow, &c. Dennis Kunderit, but in the case of the so-called spermaceti wax, which turns out to be solid paraffin, you ought to have informed us that Sevells Brothers were the original consignees, and taken a bond for the salvage, they claimed it open, and having no legal title we had to give it up. When an advance is made on wrecked goods or salvage, if not paid previous to shipment, you should not fail to ship it under a bond, a precedent for which you will find among the papers of the Liverpool S. wrecked in 1885. Without this bond we should have lost our salvage.

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8. You are in future to look
upon the despatcher from this office
as private communications intended
for you alone and not for the informa-
tion of your office, and you are
recommended to keep in your own
charge all correspondence, but it is
unnecessary to make public.

9. I have lost the Stanley
balance sheet and profit-and-loss
statement for the year 1891. Please
have copies made and sent at once.

10. We learn with regret that
the Sophista has put into Monkseaton,
but hope she will not be long in
getting down.

11. The Concord sailed on the
14th inst. from Gravesend in command
of Captain Olsen. Invoices and
freight account enclosed, which
please forward. There is a boat
according to Harbor party for use
in discharging, and it is to be given
up on return to Stanley. Send a
trustworthy pilot with her, not
Samphire of course. It was quite
impossible to send Mr. Richardson's

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coals, but you can supply him out of the Dogfesta at the same rate as charged for forward, and I hope it will not seriously inconvenience him. The explosives for Government have caused trouble and expense, and they should know that we get nothing out of them, but on the contrary shall be at a slight loss.

12. The question of warehouse charges on sheepskins has been discussed, and it is arranged that there is to be a very considerable reduction in future. We learn further that if the skins are carefully sorted on your side it will be a still greater saving to sell them in the bals.

13. The Board has discussed again the pension and insurance scheme, and have accepted the principle of both; but at present the only point definitely decided upon is that a servant of up to 30 years' service may retire on a pension of half his average pay, and that men of shorter service incapacitated through illness will also be pensioned.

As the School will have to find out most of the information wanted on these subjects I refer you to my letter to him.

14. The Committee's ports are
Nielson, St. Croix, Rummor Head,
Bedell Island, Beacon Island, Port
Stephen, Fort Bay.

15. Mr. Blake goes out in charge

October arrived on 28th ult., both
original and duplicate; it is not
necessary to send the latter, via Stanley
Point, as you cannot depend upon
its being forwarded earlier. Your
telegrams from Montevideo of 22nd
ult. and 6th inst. after enclosed copies
arrived on those dates. The words
relating to the Adassah "receive
(sic) marquette", which are supposed
to read "might be made serviceable
for £100" do not at present convey
any meaning to us, but it is to be
hoped that you have not lost her,
as she would be a valuable toy.

2. The despatch of 31st ult.
should have been numbered 775.

3. 547-3. Mr. Farmer has
as yet said nothing about his next
year's wool.

4. Part. I have told Mr. Slanide that we will hold at his disposal 700 tons of coal, and hope that he will make arrangements to clear it. You have the large stock of our own coal to fall back upon for general supplies, and if you see a chance, by reducing the Sabine's load every 5f. or so, of getting off an extra quantity you may use your discretion. Send you report every sale abord.

5. Part. 5. You have gone a little too far in your correspondence about Messrs. Dean's land, principally in your letter of ^{and that of the 30th} 28th September, on which, I have to bring three points to your notice. The term, generally, is too promptory, seeing that it is addressed to the person who it must not be forgotten, is the representative of the Queen; you should just have quoted the telegram officially which was sent to relieve the state

of suspense the lessers were placed
in, but could not possibly be acted
upon by the Governor; and you were
quite out of order in announcing the
course that the London office would
take in this matter; for as it happens
we leave this particular question entirely
alone, and we can give no case approval
of having our hands forced. I may
add that the Board fully appreciate
the zeal displayed by you, but suggest
that it should be tempered with discretion.

6. Par. 9. I think that you
are mistaken about Lloyd's telegrams,
and that you will notice if you
look back that the Captain's names
were seldom or never given. Instructions,
however, are given with Lloyd's code.

7. Jan 11. Your asking in
August 1891 for such "as soon as pos-
sible" which in October 1892 were
"still unpacked and safely housed
in the Erysia" requires some explana-
tion. If not wanted above they
should have been housed in a dry
place, or, better still, unpacked and
hung up in a loft. The question as to
the number of jobs could have been decided

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without looking at them.

8. Jan. 2. Old contracts
with some from the old hands
are to send them to England, and
on occasions they have been
shamed as far as allowing a
passage to Sandy Point instead;
but you have certainly gone too
far in granting £100 on the basis
of the cost of Kosmos fares to Eng-
land, and it must just be regarded
as a precedent. Such a proceeding
would almost encourage some of
our old hands, who have settled
in the Colony out of your service, to
ask you for a cash compensation
for not taking a passage.

9. Jan. 3. The American
bill will both be honored.

10. Jan. 14. You have to
ask the Governor to instruct his
Agent to comply with any
request you may make for orders
on the Mint; it is a pure formal-
ity, and we do not expect the
Governor will have the discretion to
refuse it, seeing that we

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oblige him and the public generally
in the matter of remittances.

11. Jan 15. We hear by cable
that the Dogista has touched at
Montevideo, but has proceeded after
restoring her cargo.

12. Jan 18. The commission
to be on a ship's account, and his
gratuity to the Captain have nothing
to do with one another. The latter is -
present we make ourselves, the amount
of which you in no case to exceed 5% on
the purchases he makes, and is subject
to a considerable extent regulated by
the latter, though the Board think
that in the absence of competition it
might be much reduced, if not altogether
abolished. In any case you will
remember that it is a free gift, and a
lump sum. You must use your
own judgment about the Blacksmith's
charge, no doubt you would do right
to take something off.

13. Jan 19. Capt. Thomas has
received the balance of his account.

14. Jan. 20. Would you be surprised to learn that the three "Linenyon" chains you enquire about were shipped by the Aerodot last March, and included in Howson's invoice of 17th February?

15. Jan. 21. You are correct as to the Dusseldorf amount earned by her should not be sent out to Stanley. Regarding the three items you ask for, particulars of the debt will be sent to Hamburg your supplies you by the previous mail. Replies are sent herewith to enquires as to missing values, in one case at least we could make no return owing to the fact of traders having been carelessly made out at the exact freight paid to the steamer.

16. Jan. 22. Mr. Spokes has addressed to the question of fumigating.

17. Jan. 23. It is altogether to be regretted that the Society of Friends is displaying unwonted activity for soon as ^a tale he will make a mess of some sort, and

be less inclined afterwards to meddle with what he probably does not understand. Read the Terms of Trade instructions on wrecks, and take just what should be done when the master, Consul, or authorized agent on his esp^t. thinks you will see that the Receiver's action should be confined to a benevolent tender of the services if required, and that he suitable way to advise it is to thank him affusively and decline it.

18. Your letter of 15th Oct. was duly received, and we await further information about the Busha.

19. We have been asked to procure a 2 ton sample lot of paraffin oil for which £16. 10s. 0d. is offered; you had better see if Nelson is disposed to make it. Enclosed is letter on this subject.

20. In your private information a copy is enclosed of our new arrangement as to freight with the Kosmopolitan, as embodied in correspondence; at present you had better look after it. You must do all you can to work the wool shipping smoothly.

21. We have arranged with Messrs. W. Hawfors to take Captain Scott's drafts on them at sixty days sight.

22. You are advised this time with a small sum, being 50% on proceeds of the paraffin which you, was; we are satisfied in favour of this, as the paper sent constituted no legal claim. Even the salvage agreement being an uncertified copy. The rest of the claim will be adjusted now very shortly.

23. I have to call your attention to the neglect shown in the matter preparing our goods. notwithstanding instruction. Whenever we go to new suppliers we want a report as soon as possible. The following firms' goods we want to hear about; some are recent, but many could have been reported a long time ago. Devos a/c blanket; Rowes, Tea, paper. Thistle Son, Linen, Middlemore, Lambeth & Butler. Macdonochie, Metropolitan light, Leslie, Edinburgh Ropes a/c wire rope and some are kindly acknowledged. Lam, Sir.
