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War historian: 'I've been full and fair'

THE author of the newly-released *Official History of the Falklands Campaign* has assured Islanders, "I have made every effort to tell the story fully and fairly."

Sir Lawrence Freedman's book, which was released on Tuesday, is the first comprehensive history of the 1982 war and has created a stir in the British and Argentine press.

The two volumes reveal that some of the British task force ships carried nuclear weapons during the war, confirms the valuable help given to Britain by the United States and Chile, examines controversial military actions such as the sinking of the Argentine cruiser *Belgrano* and *HMS Sheffield*, discusses the tensions over media reporting, and exposes the British Government's secret talks with Argentina over the transfer of titular sovereignty in return for a long lease-back period of continuing British rule.

Professor Freedman this week told *Penguin News* he knew there would be a lot of press interest in the book, "...and that some of the stories - nuclear weapons, *Belgrano*, Chile - were likely to make headlines."

However, he was annoyed that the first story, in the *Mail on Sunday*, was so wrong, "...for example, on what I say about sovereignty or that this book was in some ways tied to Tony Blair -

I was originally approached to write the book under John Major."

To Professor Freedman 'Official History' is an awkward title, "...because people assume that this must mean you are speaking for the government, although it only means that I was commissioned by the government and had complete access to archives.

"Because there was a strict embargo on interviews I was unable to counter the inaccurate early stories. I hope that now people are able to read the book they can judge for themselves its quality and conclusions."

He said from early on he believed that, in writing the official history, the best way to deal with the most controversial questions, "...was to stay close to the evidence and avoid too much speculation or editorialising."

Professor Freedman disagreed that there seemed to be a contradiction in his apparent conclusion that the British government had no prior knowledge of the planned invasion, yet the RAF appeared to be saying the previous year that they could not defend the Falkland Islands against Argentine aggression.

He argued, "There is no contradiction. The military believed that the Falklands were essentially indefensible. When the

question was put this is how they replied." The question however, Professor Freedman said, was hypothetical. "My book confirms that the government only really understood what was underway on March 31, 1982, although there was a growing recognition that they could face a serious problem some time in 1982."

The historian said the secret talks held by then Foreign Office (FCO) minister Nicholas Ridley, while seeming to confirm suspicions Islanders had of 'double dealing' by the FCO, in fact showed the British resolve that Islanders' wishes were paramount.

He said, "It is true that the FCO felt that any attempt to work out a deal with the Argentines had to be covert, because otherwise this would be denounced as a betrayal. But Ridley always made clear to the Argentines that he had to get Islander approval."

"The government view was that the Islanders must not be coerced into an agreement. They had to come to accept a deal themselves, without prompting. However they never were going to do so."

"Whether they would have taken a different view if the government had been more explicit about its interests and concerns I do not know, but my impression is that Islanders would at least have preferred a more honest approach." *Continued on page 3*

Mail investigation

APPARENT "violation" of mail en route to the Falklands and elsewhere via Mill Hill in the United Kingdom is being investigated by police.

The Royal Falkland Islands Police have been asked to assist Ministry of Defence police in a widespread investigation into thefts of mail from within the system at the United Kingdom end.

According to a statement released by police this week, a person has been arrested on suspicion of theft of mail and, "...the investigation is progressing well," however, "it would not be appropriate to comment any further at this stage due to the ongoing investigation. Detectives from both forces are in constant contact."

Postmaster Moira Eccles confirmed that any apparent mail irregularities discovered by postal staff in Stanley are reported back to Royal Mail for clarification and possible investigation. "Royal Mail confirms that any security issues are treated seriously and investigated fully by their security team."

Mrs Eccles said customers who suspect that they may have mail missing are advised to contact the sender, "...especially if it involves credit cards or correspondence from their overseas bank accounts as the sender is the person who has the facts about when and where an item entered the mail system."

When questioned by *Penguin News* yesterday afternoon, a spokesperson for the Ministry of Defence's UK press office said she was unaware of the investigation and therefore felt unable to comment, however she hoped to be able to do so in the very near future.

LATE last week, a caller to the office, although phoning for the nice reason of commending Rob Burnett's editorial, provoked a debate with me by imploring, "Penguin News must always act as opposition to government."

I could see his point, after all this column has often carried my (and my predecessor's) complaints about the existence of GPC and the way it creates the perception that councillors are, irritatingly, always in agreement.

As their decisions and debates take place behind closed doors, it's easy to believe they all feel the same on every issue, something I know for a fact is not true.

But it's nigh on impossible to know individual councillors' stances on issues and this creates a feeling of unaccountability. Therefore the media must try its damndest to challenge and question the decisions taken - and the reasoning behind decisions.

However that doesn't mean we should always act as the opposition for opposition's sake.

The remit of *Penguin News* is to report with accuracy and without bias. I know we sometimes fall down on both counts, but this is what we strive to achieve.

Press in the UK (and of course, in most of the world) have the advantage of being able to take a political stance in favour or against the government.

Penguin News is not so fortunate: being the only newspaper in the Falklands, were we to attack the government on every issue, we would lose credibility and then cease to be an essential tool for the community.

The Falklands is too small a place for the kind of continuous confrontational journalism my caller last week was demanding. Yes, there are times for confrontation (July 99 springs to mind) but balanced reporting is essential. We must be free to give praise when due but equally to attack when due.

I do believe our readers (and those on the receiving end) would soon grow tired were we to attack the government on everything for the very sake of it.

It's vital we are not seen as a government mouthpiece, but at the same time it is not our sole purpose to act as political opposition to FIG.

Our aim must be to strike a balance without compromising integrity.

Book-keeping course for absolute beginners

Lord Triesman's sovereignty assurance

TWO councillors have returned from engagements overseas which included a meeting with the new Falklands minister, Lord Triesman.

Mike Summers travelled to the UK and Channel Islands in June while John Birmingham headed to the UK, US and Canada.

Both men, along with councillor Stephen Luxton and the Falklands representative to the UK, Sukey Cameron, met the new Foreign Office Minister with responsibility for the Falklands, Lord Triesman. Councillor Summers said the meeting was "cordial" and largely a "getting to know you" session.

He said they talked extensively about Argentine issues. "...briefing the Minister on the current position and possible developments." He said Lord Triesman assured that "...under his management there would be no change to the content or the tone of messages to Argentina on sovereignty. It is not for discussion."

Councillor Birmingham said Lord Triesman is keen to visit the Falklands and his office is looking to organise a date in the future. He described the minister as "very supportive" and "well aware of the issues and difficulties we face."

Also discussed during the meeting were economic development, developments in the fishing industry, oil exploration, and the upcoming Official History of the Falklands War.

Councillors Birmingham and Luxton then headed to New York for the meeting of the Committee on Decolonisation - as reported in *Penguin News* in recent weeks - and to Washington for a meeting at the State Department which followed on from previous briefings.

The representatives of the State Department, Councillor Birmingham said, "...listened with interest but made no comments about the Falklands and the events of the last year."

Meanwhile, Councillor Summers attended the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association British and Mediterranean Islands Regional Conference which he said was "well attended and well organised by the Jersey Branch."

The Conference opened on Monday, June 13, with welcoming speeches by Sir Philip Bailhache, the Bailiff of Jersey, and Lieutenant Governor, Air Chief

Marshal John Cheshire of the RAF, who has been to the Falklands a few times since 1982.

Councillor Summers was asked to respond to the welcoming speeches on behalf of the guests and he chaired a session that afternoon entitled "Facing up to the problems caused by an ageing society".

During the Regional AGM on the Tuesday afternoon, Councillor Summers briefed the meeting on current developments in the Falklands, including the relationship with Argentina, and he, "...asked for support on the issue of self determination."

He asked participants at the meeting to reiterate their commitment to the defence of the "...inalienable right to self-determination of all non-independent territories, including the people of the Falkland Islands and Gibraltar..."

Councillor Summers said there was "wholehearted support" for the Falklands from all countries and the Region is to write to Foreign Minister Jack Straw on the matter.

After his visit to the US, Councillor Birmingham headed to Ottawa, Canada where he had meetings with the provincial tourism section of the government and individuals involved at a national level.

When asked what relevance this meeting had, he said, "There are similarities in that they have a large farming community which is finding it difficult to maintain its income level. Their priority is to push for more tourists to go to outlying areas; farming holidays is a growing sector of the market."

Councillor Birmingham also met with the Canadian Minister for Fisheries and other fishing officials with whom he discussed illegal fishing on the high seas.

The main purpose of his visit to Canada, he said, was to "maintain links" established during a visit by Canadian parliamentarians earlier this year: "It's very important to keep our finger-hold in this very large country, if not on an official level, certainly amongst fellow parliamentarians."

His visit to Canada culminated in a small dinner hosted by the MPs who visited earlier in the year, along with some other parliamentarians. "...who were interested in listening to the issues and difficulties the Falklands face at the moment."

Argentine landing rumour 'nonsense'

A RUMOUR that an unauthorised landing had been made on the Falklands by a group of Argentines has been rubbished by the Governor.

Penguin News learned of the rumour when a member of the public telephoned to say he believed an illegal landing had been made on the Islands by a group of "Argen-

tine surveyors" who were then removed by British special forces.

Penguin News contacted His Excellency the Governor, Mr Howard Pearce, who said the rumour was "news to me!"

He commented, "I have no idea what may have given rise to this particular rumour, but it's nonsense."

He continued, "During Ridley's visit in 1980 nobody knew whether they were discussing vague ideas of a real prospect. The Islanders should take comfort from the fact that while many were unhappy with the impact of the Falklands on broader relations with Latin America, the position that the Islanders' wishes were paramount was never challenged."

Professor Freedman visited the Falklands approximately five years ago. He said that during that visit he was "struck forcefully" that "the big difference between now and then is that the Falklands are viable and have a long-term future."

"That was hardly the case in 1982 with a weak economy and a declining population. Of course the events of 1982 changed British attitudes towards the Falklands. If it hadn't been possible to organise the task force to expel the Argentines, Ridley might have considered himself vindicated."

Professor Freedman is sure Islanders, like many other readers, "will have quibbles, believe I've got things wrong or wish I'd stated things differently," and added, "Even with such a long book I am aware of how much I had to leave out."

Tarmac surface still an option for MPA road?

ROADS Engineer Bob Hancox hosted a trip for the public to view the MPA road last Thursday after its current state had attracted criticism and concern at the recent public meeting.

Members of the public met Bob in Stanley although many decided not to proceed as he said, "the road was still partially frozen and they felt that we would not get a realistic view."

Bob said the initial discussion was related to the nature of the capping material being used, but talks quickly turned to, "...what the majority were really concerned about, which was the sealing of the road."

"Various options were put forward from spray and chip through asphalt to concrete with the merits and costs of each being considered."

Gold for Biggs as Bisley competition continues

THE Falkland Islands Defence Force (FIDF) team is shooting well at the Bisley competitions, according to their Commanding Officer, Major Peter Biggs.

In the International Gun Match, Private Daniel Biggs achieved a gold medal while Corporal Ian Betis achieved bronze.

Major Biggs said the newest team members, Dustin Gilson-Clarke and Geoff Loftus, are, "shooting very well, considering it is their first time."

The team spent four days this

week shooting in the Army Rifle Association competition and will move on to the Territorial Army competition today.

Major Biggs said this year's competition seems to have attracted more entries than previous years and therefore the standard of shooting has been raised.

Of the FIDF's performance he commented, "Overall it's going well; the guys are shooting well."

I'm very pleased with the way they're going, we just need a bit of good luck to win more medals."

However he said he hopes Islanders appreciate, "...that I have made every effort to tell the story fully and fairly."

He added, "In the end the history of the Falkland Islands and the events of 1982 makes for a quite extraordinary story and it was a privilege to be given the chance to write it."

Meanwhile the Argentine government is considering taking legal action over Professor Freedman's book which it says is, "based exclusively on British sources."

Following the launching of the book, the Argentine Foreign Ministry released a statement complaining that it is, "conceived from the British perspective."

The statement goes on to say that the Argentine government has begun an "in depth" study of the book and that they will, "...analyse the events described and adopt the legal and diplomatic measures which are pertinent so as to preserve the Republic of Argentina's position regarding the question of the Islas Malvinas."

The statement ends with the ministry reaffirming what it calls its, "legitimate sovereignty rights" over the Falklands, South Georgia, the South Sandwich Islands and surrounding waters. *P/N/MP*

John Allan, who went on the trip said, "Bob answered all our questions very well" and that much of the discussion was about the viability of laying a tarmac surface. He said, "The consensus of opinion is that it's got to be tarmaced."

He went on to say Mr Hancox confirmed that, contrary to popular belief, tarmac can be laid on the current road surface and, "we have the plant and equipment and the manpower to do it."

Councillor Roger Edwards was also present and promised to put the subject on the agenda for the next PWD committee meeting and to raise the matter with the Director of Public Works.

However, according to Bob, Councillor Edwards did, "note his concern over the cost to FIG which would be very high for any of the options."

Remembering Jim Stevens 1930 - 2005

IT IS with sadness that we report the death of former *Penguin News* Editor James 'Jim' Stevens on June 18.

Jim was born in Ipswich on July 22, 1930 and moved to Surrey at some stage where he later remembered being bombed during the war. An incendiary bomb actually landed by the family air-raid shelter in their back yard. Later in the war he remembered sitting reading, when a doodle bug flew over and its engine stopped. It landed close enough for the explosion to bring masonry down in the house.

After school Jim decided on a profession in journalism and started his career by joining the *East Anglian Daily Times* in Ipswich. It was during this period that he met Kate, after being involved in a motorbike accident and being treated in the hospital where she worked. Jim's career took him from the provincial newspapers to Fleet Street which, using a football analogy, would be like from the Vauxhall Conference to the Premiership. Once Jim started work in London the family moved to a small village in Kent and he commuted to London daily. It was a great environment to live in, deep in the Kentish countryside surrounded by cherry and apple orchards, copses, woodland and fields of cows, sheep and corn.

It was probably from their father that his eldest daughter and son got their wanderlust which has led to the former settling in Crete and the latter doing the same in the Falklands. Jim was a very proud Brit and was determined the family would enjoy the sights and sounds of their native land. As many families went to the nearest sea side for their holiday, Jim would have planned a three week study of some part of the British Isles. As a family, over five years, we must have studied every muddy, wind swept field from Lands End to the Isle of Sky.

Jim eventually realised that although the British Isles were beautiful the weather wasn't. The next phase of his holiday master plan was to camp throughout most of Europe. He would load up the car and go for it, reaching places like Yugoslavia, Morocco, Portugal, Bulgaria and Corsica.

Today with all the motorways it's a doddle but in the sixties you didn't see that many other cars from the



UK once you left the beaten track.

As retirement age approached Jim and Kate decided to move to Essex closer to their only child who had remained in UK. Although life continued much as before, the mechanics of commuting to London from their new home was hard work with Kate having to drive to London after midnight to collect Jim because there were no trains home at that time of night.

It must have been at this point that Jim thought perhaps editing the *Penguin News*, where you could walk to work in five minutes, would be appealing even though the financial rewards weren't that great. This of course started a four year association where anyone looking back can see the difference that Jim's knowledge brought to this publication.

Jim and Kate took to Falkland life and often made the trip out to see their son and family at Port Sussex Farm, before the roads came to that area. They also visited many places Island-wide.

Like many before them, Kate and Jim got bitten by the Falkland bug and would often reminisce about the people they had met and the things that they had done. Of course working in the Islands opens the door to South America and Jim was able to feed his travelling hunger by visiting Chile and Peru although I'm sure Kate was glad that by this time Jim was content to sleep in a comfortable hotel bed and eat hotel food (we think).

Jim was a hard worker and a good provider. Someone who would take a risk and do something out of the ordinary. He will be sorely missed by all his family and friends.

FOGL granted licence extension

FALKLAND Oil and Gas Limited (FOGL) has been granted a two year extension to its exploration licences held jointly with Hardman Resources, subject to them fulfilling certain requirements.

The licence, which is split into two phases, will now run to 2010 and requires FOGL to collect 2D and 3D seismic data in the first phase, and then commits them to the drilling of two wells in the second.

FOGL has already begun collecting the 4000 kilometers of 2D seismic data and they expect to begin the 3D survey later this year.

A spokesperson for the joint venture said that the aim of the work

is to "define and prioritise 20 prospects for drilling across all of FOGL's licence areas and to develop a multi-well drilling programme, targeted to begin in 2007."

John Armstrong, Executive Chairman of FOGL said, "We would like to thank the Falkland Islands Government for this extension. We believe negotiations were helped by the fact that we have consistently exceeded the requirements of our licences to date.

"The additional flexibility afforded by the extensions will help us to introduce new parties to the project and maximise shareholder value."

Q WOULD the Attorney General please advise what legislation governs the standard and quality of motor and domestic fuels imported and sold in the Falkland Islands, and if so, is that standard and quality independently monitored. Who is this independent body?

Stanley Services Ltd have been awarded a monopoly on the import and sale of certain petroleum products in the Falkland Islands, including Motor and Domestic fuels, does this allow it to introduce into those products any additives? Should this be the case are Stanley Services Ltd obliged to advise the public that it is carrying out such a process?

A Attorney General David Lang provided the following response

The Sale of Goods Act 1979 of the United Kingdom applies in the Falkland Islands under the Law of Contract Ordinance. Under the 1979 Act, on the sale of goods (and "goods" includes fuel) there are a number of implied terms (which cannot usually be excluded in a sale to a retail consumer).

One of these implied terms is a condition that goods supplied in the course of business will be of satisfactory quality. To be of satisfactory quality, goods must meet the standard that a reasonable person would regard as satisfactory taking into account any description under which they were sold and all relevant circumstances.

In my view "relevant circumstances" might include the time of year at which the fuel was sold, or at which it is reasonable to expect it might be used. "Satisfactory quality" includes fitness for all the purposes for which goods of the kind

in question (in this case fuel) are commonly supplied.

There is nothing preventing Stanley Services adding additives to fuel it imports before selling it to consumers, nor is it required to inform consumers it has done so. Stanley Services will of course be liable under the implied condition of satisfactory quality if any additive contained in the fuel does damage to the customers' property (including cars, boilers etc) whether or not Stanley Services Limited themselves put in the additive. (Some additives may have been added by the overseas fuel company at the time of refining. An obvious example is lead compounds or substitutes for them).

It is possible that Stanley Services Limited could be liable in some circumstances if it failed to add a substance to fuel it imports which it reasonably ought to have done.


The current rates for advertising on FIBS are as follows:

Online solution for public debate?

I WAS simultaneously both cheered and saddened by last week's excellent editorial: cheered. I suppose, to find a personal view shared by someone else and saddened to discover that as far as public meetings go, nothing very much seems to have changed since I last attended one some years ago.

I gave up going to public meetings because it seemed to me that while they pretend to show a healthy democratic process in action, in fact their structure makes them at worst something of a sham and at best very one-sided affairs, geared for confrontation and concealment rather than for real communication. The poor public attendance at these meetings seems to suggest that others share similar views.

There is, unfortunately, a general public perception that the more we hear about the need for "open government", the harder it is to discover where, when and by whom our government's decisions are actually made. The opening up of committee meetings, with the attendant banning of speech by the public and the disappearance of all the really interesting debate - "the juicy bits" - into the private parts of the agenda, has only served to increase this frustration.

The suggestions for the improvement of public meetings made in your editorial are good ones and would make some difference, but probably not enough either to convince the missing participants that they should return or attract a wider audience to public meetings. If public debate is to be put truly at the centre of our democratic process and to involve more people than the hardy perennials who currently appear each month in the town hall refreshment room, more radical solutions may be needed. To fail to search for a mechanism for an on-going and meaningful dialogue between government and governed is to run the risk that the former will become increasingly isolated and the latter permanently and disastrously affected.

With the help of the available technology this need not be too difficult to achieve. We have a small and identifiable population with a very high degree of access to computers and some kind of electronic forum, hosted perhaps on the FIG website, would seem easy enough to set up. Access could be limited by password to whatever groups of participants might seem desirable: let's say FI residents or persons on the electoral roll.

With such a system, voters in Camp and Stanley could make their views known to councillors on an equal basis and at any convenient time, without the constraints and fears of public speaking. Councillors too, besides having the advantage of access to the feelings and thoughts of a much wider cross-section of the electorate, would receive some degree of extra protection from unwelcome out-of-hours telephone calls or ambushes in the West Store. Such behaviour might still be tolerated from the small percentage of the population not yet "on line" but any other offenders could simply be told to "post it on the web site".

With very little editorial management of the site by anybody, government could use it to introduce specific themes for discussion, or to give any relevant information. Frequently recurring topics could be properly debated at length, fresh topics introduced or straw polls taken on specific issues, without anyone having to call time, go out in the rain or miss their favourite TV programme.

Our councillors seem recently to have given the thumbs down to the idea of a constitutionally established parliamentary opposition in the Falklands in favour of what is termed "a consensual approach" to government. I'm not sure I agree with this view, but I would be much happier about it if I knew precisely where, when and by what process eight rather different individuals cast aside those differences to achieve consensus so frequently. I have asked people to explain how this works, but they all seem to feel equally in the dark... like mushrooms, some might say.

At the moment it seems we simply have to hope and assume that the process involves careful research followed by an airing of possibly differing views, including those of the majority of the electorate and the ultimate triumph of good sense and reason. On the other hand, it might all be done by smoke and mirrors or the flip of a coin.

Clearly it would be confidence-building and much more truly democratic, if the Falkland Islands electorate not only knew what the process was by which their government shaped its policy, but had some means of contributing equally and directly to it. Public meetings in their present form just don't come near to providing this.

Since July 2004, thanks to a very positive response from the private sector, two new apprentice carpenters, one apprentice plumber and one apprentice electrician have joined the Apprenticeship Scheme and it is hoped to fill some vacancies within Government in the near future as four school leavers have expressed an interest in apprenticeships.

One young Falkland Islander is also currently studying for an Apprenticeship as an Electrician at Chichester College and is shortly to undertake a short work placement with a private sector company before returning to college and another, an Apprentice Aircraft Engineer, is undertaking a degree at the City of Bristol College.

In addition, one individual has recently successfully completed his apprenticeship as an electrician and has taken up employment in the private sector, another is about to be signed off as a qualified Painter/Decorator, and two Apprentice Carpenters and one Electrician/Refrigeration Engineer are due to complete their apprenticeships shortly.

public relations work has been conducted at the Community School and in the community in general by the Apprentice Scheme Co-ordinator, Marcus Morrison, in an attempt to attract more people into apprenticeships and moves are afoot to expand apprenticeships into new areas.

All new apprentices are taking International Vocational Qualifications (IVQs) locally and several mature people who are experienced in the trades but are not formally qualified will be offered the opportunity to take formal qualifications locally later this year.

A number of courses for Handymen will also be run over the next few months. Whilst this will not turn them into tradesmen, it will help them to develop their skills in a number of areas such as carpentry and benchwork, basic plumbing, mechanics, bricklaying, concreting, fencing and welding.

One of the problems facing the Training Unit is the shortage of qualified assessors to assess apprentices and others wishing to undertake IVQs. We are hoping to run more assessor training over the next few months but as assessing is very time-consuming, not everyone who is in full time employment has the time to assess.

Unlike the United Kingdom, we do not have the luxury of employing full time assessors. This combined with budget cuts and staff shortages has made it somewhat of an uphill struggle.

ROCKHOPPER Exploration Limited, the UK based company founded in early 2004 with the aim of exploring for oil and gas in the Falklands, has announced a raft of new board appointments before its flotation on the AIM (Alternative Investment Market) next month the *Financial Times* reported on Monday.

Former finance director of EasyJet, Chris Walton, joins as a non-executive director with chairmanship of the audit committee.

Also joining the board are co-founder Sam Moody who becomes managing director; Keith Williams, exploration director; Peter Dixon-Clarke, finance director; Dave Bodecott, consultant to the board; and John Cowle who becomes non-executive director and chair of the

remuneration committee.

Executive chairman Pierre Jungels said, "We want to show the market that Rockhopper is a serious company with a serious board with very strong corporate governance standards."

The company are planning exploration and the flotation is designed to bring in funds to help with this. They have also recently been awarded two more licences in the North Falklands Basin which were previously held by Shell, bringing the company's total licences in the area up to four.

Mr Jungels added, "It's a hugely prospective area. It has all the aspects of the North Sea in 1965."

Rockhopper believe they will find reservoirs below the area previously explored by Shell.

News from Executive Council's June 23 meeting

Land disposal criteria decided Measures recommended for biosecurity

THE policy for the disposal of government land in Stanley has been decided upon.

It was agreed by Executive Council that, without prejudice to cases involving special circumstances, the following policies should be adopted:

- Tenders will ordinarily be sought for the purchase of FIG land, but negotiations may be entered into where there is likely to be only one interested purchaser of commercial or residential land.

- Disposal of land for commercial development will be by lease for a maximum period of 99 years. This will enable FIG to exercise effective control over the use of the land.

- Disposal of land for commercial development must be linked to a specific development

proposal. A price of £40,000, subject to annual increase in line with the retail price index per acre, will be charged. Building licences will be required and will impose strict conditions:

- Disposals will not be made if their effect is merely to add to the land bank of the purchaser.
- Rents payable under leases will be subject to review in line with the retail price index.

- Incidental open space alongside residential property will only be sold to the neighbouring owner where the land has no amenity value and represents an unacceptable maintenance burden for FIG

Where such land creates an infill plot for development, the sale price will be £25,000 per acre subject to annual increase in line with the retail price index.

No-interest Kids Zone loan agreed

EXECUTIVE Councillors have granted an interest-free loan to Stanley Kids Zone (SKZ), to fund initial start-up costs of the new childcare facility.

SKZ presented a business plan to Executive Council, along with the associated operational arrangements, together with a request for a grant or interest free loan to assist with start-up costs.

His Excellency the Governor, Mr Howard Pearce, reported, "Members of Executive Council were impressed by the quality and comprehensiveness of the business plan, and agreed that an interest-free loan of £5,710, repayable by August 31, 2006, should be offered to SKZ to fund initial start-up costs."

Law examined after SSL fuel problems

THE difficulties with fuel supplied by Stanley Services in recent weeks is to be taken up with the company.

His Excellency the Governor reported, "Members expressed serious concern at the problems which had been encountered. While recognising that under current legislation FIG's legal powers were very limited, Executive Council instructed that the matter should be taken up urgently with

Stanley Services." ExCo also instructed that a paper should be submitted without delay to a future meeting of Executive Council recommending legislation which would provide additional legal powers to the government in such circumstances.

"Meanwhile, members of the public will be aware from the media of action which Stanley Services are now taking to address the problem."

Frying Pan quarry continues for another year

PERMISSION to work the quarry at the Frying Pan, near Mount Pleasant has been granted for another year to Gordon Forbes Construction (Falklands) Ltd.

Executive Council agreed the year's permission, upon the recommendation of the Planning and Building Committee.

Executive Council also agreed

that an additional condition should be added to the planning consent given for three housing units to the back of 17 Ross Road West.

This additional condition, His Excellency the Governor explained, "...requires the removal of the existing Portakabin on the property before any of the new houses are occupied."

A WORKING group set up to action recommendations made by biosecurity experts earlier this year has presented a report to Executive Council.

The Biosecurity Working Group made seven recommendations to Members asking for approval to implement them. "...when resources are available."

The group met on May 6 to discuss ways to improve biosecurity matters within the Falklands.

In their report, they recommended that importation of meat and meat products should be permitted from any EU approved abattoir. "All such consignments of meat/meat products would have to be accompanied by appropriate certification from the official body within the country of export stating that the product meets the animal and public health requirements for export to the EU.

Also recommended is that importation of dairy and dairy products should be permitted from any EU approved processing plant. However many Chilean plants that supply the Falklands with UHT milk and other dairy products are not EU approved.

In this case, the Working Group suggests, the Senior Veterinary Officer should make up an "approved" list of dairy and dairy product suppliers in Chile from which importers in the Falklands can import these products without the need for an import permit.

For products, such as proc-

essed meat products, made in countries such as Chile but not in EU-approved establishments, the group recommended that some of these products be allowed into the Falklands provided they come from an "approved" source. The approved list of manufacturers would be drawn up by the Senior Veterinary Officer and updated as and when necessary.

Low risk fruit and vegetables, the Working Group recommended, should be allowed into the Falklands without the need for the importer to apply for an import permit for each consignment. The importer could apply for an annual import permit for such products.

With regard to ballast water, identified by biosecurity consultants as a possible source of risk, the group suggests that customs - and possibly fishery - officers, begin to record ballast water exchange records for ships visiting Falklands waters.

The highlighting of biosecurity issues in the annual Ports and Harbours information pack is also recommended. These packs are distributed to all vessels entering Falkland Islands waters.

Finally the group recommended that all second-hand (used) vehicles and farm and other equipment should be, "...thoroughly cleaned and disinfected prior to being exported. All such vehicles and equipment should be accompanied by an official certificate saying that the cleaning has been properly carried out."

Revised laws to be published electronically

PROPOSALS for the future publication of the Revised Edition of the Laws of the Falkland Islands have been considered by Executive Councillors.

"This is an important project," His Excellency the Governor said, "the purpose of which is to ensure that an up-to-date statement of the laws of the Falkland Islands is available to members of the public, legal practitioners and public servants."

A formal proposal had been received from Blackhall Publishing to publish the revised laws in elec-

tronic format with effect from July 1, 2005. Executive Council was satisfied with Blackhall Publishing's proposal, and agreed that it should be accepted.

Councillors also agreed that with effect from July 1, 2005 the Attorney General should be appointed as Law Revision Commissioner.

Mr Pearce explained, "The function of the Commissioner will be to oversee the preparation and publication of the Revised Edition of Laws and to ensure that it is kept up to date."

Talisman production licence assigned to Desire

APPROVAL has been given to the assignment of offshore production licence PL005 from Talisman Energy AB to Desire Petroleum plc.

The licence covers Tranche F, comprising some 1599 sq km to the north of the Falkland Islands. The assignment will take effect from 25 November this year.

Also decided by Executive

Council this month was that environmental impact assessments and environmental impact statements prepared in connection with the drilling of exploration wells should in future be published in the Gazette, in order to give an opportunity for public comment before consideration by Executive Council.

Breathtaking beauty captured on film for Tourist Board's photographic contest

A STUNNING image of kelp gulls in flight over Carcass Island has secured the top prize in an international photographic competition organised by the Tourist Board.

The shot, captured by Ciaccio Andrea, has won the Italian photographer a return flight to the Falklands from London, a prize donated by Morrison Construction (Falklands) Ltd.

Over three hundred entries were received from around the world, a response a spokesperson the Tourist Board described as "fantastic". Many of the short-listed entries were from local photographers.

The spokesperson said the Tourist Board office thoroughly enjoyed being involved with the competition from start to finish. "Entries flooded in during the last few weeks leading up to the closing date for this year's competition, with packages originating from all corners of the globe, making the daily task of opening the mail a really interesting one. The mail box in the Post Office was very often too small to hold all the packages in from the last flight!"

The concept for the Tourist Board to host an international photographic competition came about for several reasons, the spokesperson said. The spokesperson said the judges were extremely impressed with the number of entries received and wanted special mention to be made regarding the entries in the Under 16's category. "Some imaginative photographs were submitted and the judges particularly enjoyed viewing the images of the young photographers."

"The largest and most popular category for entries was, naturally the wildlife category, and as you would expect, there were numerous photographs of penguins, but also, some less common species featured in the entries, and some delightful images ensued."

The first task for the judges was to narrow down the short-list, then to decide upon the winner and the runner up for each category. After this, a decision had to be made for the overall winner of the competition, an honour which eventually went to Ciaccio Andrea of Italy.

Commenting on the photographic contest, Editor of *Practical Photography*, Andrew James, said, "Judging competitions is always a tough but enjoyable undertaking and this was no exception."

"As I expected, the diverse images that people entered were an interesting reflection of the life and landscape of the Falklands Islands. I saw everything from leaping lambs to sleeping penguins and enjoyed looking at each and every one."

He added, "Of course, photography (like any form of art) is an intensely personal thing which makes ranking individual pictures almost impossible. To the winners, congratulations, you clearly caught the judges' eyes. To those who entered but didn't win a prize, please continue to use your camera to record the world around you."

"It's not really about what we think of your pictures... it's more important what you think."





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CSE stars entertain in Iraq

Enter the Commonwealth Vision Awards

THE prestigious Commonwealth Vision Awards entered its fifth year in June, with the launch of the 2005 competition on the theme: "Health and Vitality - the Commonwealth Challenge".

The theme highlights the relevance of health, as illustrated in the United Nations Millennium Development Goals (MDGs), adopted in 2000 and endorsed by 191 countries, which set out the goals to be achieved by 2015.

The eight MDGs set out a commitment to reduce poverty and tackle ill-health, lack of education, gender inequality, lack of access to clean water and environmental degradation. Three of the eight, namely reducing child mortality, improving maternal health and combating HIV/AIDs, malaria and other diseases relate directly to health. This is of particular relevance to the Commonwealth, as two thirds of the 40 million people living with HIV/AIDs are Commonwealth citizens and nine of the most heavily infected countries are in the Commonwealth. In addition, seven Commonwealth countries are among the 20 countries with the highest maternal mortality rate and 60 per cent of maternal deaths are in Commonwealth countries.

The theme's reference to vitality also captures the spirit of the XVIII Commonwealth Games, due to be held in Melbourne, Australia from 15-26 March 2006. This is the Commonwealth's most high-profile and spectacular event, in which it is anticipated that some 4500 elite athletes from 71 countries and territories will participate.

The Commonwealth Vision Awards, jointly organised by the Royal Commonwealth Society and the Commonwealth Broadcasting Association, recognise excellence in the making of a short film on a Commonwealth theme. Broadcasters and independent filmmakers across the five regions of the Commonwealth are invited to submit initial entries by providing a written scenario based on the chosen theme for 2005.

Thereafter, up to fifteen applicants will be short-listed by an independent selection panel and awarded £1,000 each to assist in the production of the finished film, which is to be between 30-90 seconds in length.

Judging of the short-listed films will take place in October and the awards announced and presented at a Gala Awards Ceremony. The winner will receive £2,500 and a trophy, and other awards will be made.

The initiative is supported by the Commonwealth Secretariat, the Commonwealth Foundation, the British Council, the UK Foreign and Commonwealth Office and the BBC World Service. Blood transfusion: 'the long rocky road'

MOST of us are aware that in some instances we may need to have a blood transfusion.

This is particularly true if we have suffered severe blood loss or if we have a disease that affects our bone marrow, blood cells or clotting capabilities.

Transfusions in the clinical world are commonplace today but this has not always been the case. In fact it has been a very long rocky road on which we are still travelling.

Until the discovery of blood circulation in 1616 by William Harvey, the concept of using blood in a therapeutic way was unheard of. In fact the ancient Greeks thought that arteries were filled with air.

After Harvey's discovery there was a frenzy of experiments involving the infusion of various substances into the circulation.

The first successful animal transfusion took place in 1665 when blood from the carotid artery of one dog was transferred to another dog. In 1667 Mr Richard Lower transfused "a mildly melancholy insane man" with lambs blood and he was described as being much better afterwards.

Lower later performed similar experiments until he was charged with murder after his fourth failed attempt.

In the 1700's Nuck and Cantwell stated that transfusion would be invaluable in severe blood loss and in the 1800's Blundell noted that blood does not lose vital properties when it is passed through transfusion equipment.

Blundell later used the concepts to try and save women who had suffered severe blood loss after giving birth. He had a 50% success rate which even by today's standards is quite good.

However, because blood physiology was poorly understood at this time, fatalities as a result of the transfusion were beginning to increase. It became known as a haz-



ardous disreputable procedure only to be used in desperation.

Before it could be used as a therapeutic measure there were certain problems that had to be resolved.

In 1901, when Mr Karl Landsteiner discovered the presence of specific agglutinogens on the surface of red cells the problem of incompatible blood transfusions could be avoided. These agglutinogens later were renamed A, B, AB and O.

Later in 1940 Mr Landsteiner and Mr Weiner confirmed the presence of the Rhesus (Rh) blood group, which also plays an important part in blood transfusion reactions and in still born babies.

There were a great many advances during the first and second World Wars because the demand for blood transfusions increased. During this time storage procedures were perfected.

By chance it was discovered that by placing the donated blood in the fridge it lasted longer. In addition to this it was realised that

sodium citrate added to the donated blood could prevent clots formation in the recipient.

Of course we are all aware of the risk of infection that surrounds blood transfusions made very public in the 1980's with the discovery of Gay-related immunodeficiency disease (GRID), later renamed as AIDS (Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome).

It became a worry when Haemophiliacs that were given Factor VIII (a major protein required for the clotting process) in order to prevent a bleeding crisis, started to show signs of AIDS. As a result, in 1986, HIV testing became compulsory.

It has always been known that transfusions carry a risk of infection but unless the donor was physically and obviously ill there was no way of telling who was carrying infectious pathogens.

Generally the problems surrounding transfusions have been resolved although the infectious risk is still a big problem today.

All blood donors who donate blood are now screened for a variety of pathogens in order to minimise risk to the recipient. These include Hepatitis B and C, HIV, Cytomegalovirus, Human parvovirus, Treponema (syphilis), Malaria, and Chagas disease. Scientists are still working on tests for other diseases like Creutzfeldt Jakob Disease.

Transfusions are an essential part of medical therapy thus scientists will continue to try and decrease the related risks.

In the UK, the National Blood Services requires around 10,000 units of blood per day in order to fulfil the demand of the hospitals. However, only 5% of the British population are registered blood donors and current stock levels are now said to be critical.

Until we are able to manufacture blood there is no other way of replacing these levels unless people step forward and "do something amazing".



Wool report - week ending June 24

WOOL prices for fleece wool lots increased in value at sales in Australia last week for all micron categories except 28 micron.

Price rises continued to build on increases observed over the last month or so and leave some micron categories up almost 10% in value over the same period.

Price increases, as shown in the attached micron price guide, have accumulated largely in response to currency relationships between the £UK and the Australian \$ Un fortunately, as also shown below, prices generally remain at levels considerably below those achieved 12 months ago for many micron categories.

In New Zealand the market tone was described as "weaker", however, once again, currency rates would work to hold-up wool prices when expressed in terms of p/kg clean.

Ten buyers purchased 62% of the Australian offering with a broad spread of demand exhibited.

In Australia 88.4% of the 27.791 bale offering was sold. Included in the offering were 2,815 bales of crossbred wool of which 87.7% was sold.

Auctions continue next week in Australia where approximately 50,000 bales of wool will be offered

for sale. Other countries are already in mid-year selling recess.





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Falklands' support for bombed London

FLAGS are flying at half-mast in the Falklands Islands after a series of bomb attacks yesterday rocked central London.

Four blasts tore through trains and a bus during London's busy rush hour, killing as many as forty people and injuring hundreds.

Prime Minister Tony Blair branded the attacks, which police suspect to be the work of terrorists, "barbaric".

Falklands Governor, Howard Pearce, sent a message of support to the Foreign and Commonwealth Office with a request that it be conveyed to Her Majesty The Queen.

In it Mr Pearce expressed the deep shock and outrage felt by Islanders at the attacks on London.

He said, "On behalf of all Falkland Islanders I convey our sympathy to those who have suffered injury or trauma as a result of these events and our deepest condolences to the families of those who have lost their lives.

"While we may be many thousands of miles away in distance, we feel very close to all

Londoners in spirit, and we know that they will respond with courage and fortitude."

After learning of the attacks, *Penguin News* contacted the Falkland Islands Government Office in London. FIG representative, Sukey Cameron, said three of her staff had managed to get to the office while one had been forced to return home after the transport system shut down.

Ms Cameron said she only learned of the attacks when she arrived at work: "I knew something was wrong as it took me two hours to do a half hour journey, but we were told that was just because the Northern Line was down.

"First rumours were that the tube had suffered a 'power surge' which had caused an explosion at Kings Cross, we then heard about the bus being blown up in Russell Square and then the other explosions, fatalities and injuries."

She said none of her staff had left Falkland House but through the morning, "...we could hear the constant sound of sirens and

helicopters around us but now there is just an eerie silence as there is no traffic moving at all"

Ms Cameron and her team were unsure if they would be able to get home last night due to the closure of the public transport system. However, she added, "...we are in a much better position than most as we do, of course, have the flat (above the office) that we can use if needs be."

Ms Cameron said she and her team were grateful for, "...all the kind messages we have been getting from our friends and colleagues in the Islands - it's nice to know that people are thinking of us."

Legislative Councillor Jan Cheek was at a private business meeting in the Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) when news of the attacks broke.

She said security in the building was immediately tightened: "we were asked not to use mobile phones and had to be escorted if we wanted to visit the lavatory - that sort of thing."

She described the city as she left the FCO: "Armed police and

police vehicles were swarming around Whitehall and the surrounding area.

"All the buses are gone - I guess they have been recalled to their depots to be checked - and all the underground stations are closed."

When *Penguin News* contacted Mrs Cheek, she had just arrived at her hotel, having walked the seven-mile distance from the Falkland Islands Government Office near St James' Park. She said there were many people on the streets: "Most seemed pretty determined not to be scared of being out on the streets and lots were trying to figure out how to get home."

It was announced yesterday that a joint churches service of prayer will take place in Christ Church Cathedral tonight at 5.15pm.

His Excellency the Governor will attend this service, described by the Reverend Paul Sweeting as, "... a simple service to pray for all those affected."

He added, "Everyone is welcome, from any church or none."

Boys run, row and cycle for veterans' charity

FOUR boys who spent hours on exercise machines in an effort to raise money for the Falklands branch of the South Atlantic Medal Association (SAMA82) have handed over a cheque to the charity's Chairman.

The boys from the Falkland Islands Community School decided to fundraise for the charity by recreating the epic yomp British Forces endured in 1982, through running, rowing and biking the equivalent distance as that from Port San Carlos to Stanley in the gym at Stanley Leisure Centre.

Lucas Berntsen, Keiran Morrison, Tristan Giudicelli-Smith and Aaron Clarke collected £228.01 through sponsorship from their families and friends. They handed over a cheque to the Chairman of SAMA82's Falklands branch, Mr Gary Clement, on Wednesday.

Mr Clement praised the boy's efforts saying, "For youngsters to pick SAMA82 as their chosen charity is really nice as, obviously, they didn't live through the conflict."

A number of people have embarked on fundraising efforts

for SAMA82 in recent weeks, possibly motivated by the proposed pilgrimage of veterans planned for 2007, the 25th anniversary of the Falklands War.

Mr Clement said he was grateful to all who have donated

money to the charity.

From collections taken on Liberation Day, Christ Church Cathedral donated £280.18 and the Globe Tavern donated £310; the Victory Bar donated £145 raised through a pool competition.

THE world's media has had no shortage of material for headlines this week with the G8 summit and its accompanying protests/concerts/arrests, the award of the 2012 Olympics to London and the commemorations marking the 60th anniversary of the end of World War Two. Then, yesterday morning, we awoke to reports of the shocking attacks on London.

As I write this column only minutes after learning of the bombings, I feel ill-equipped to comment - particularly as we are not yet sure of the levels of deaths and casualties. Our thoughts are unquestionably with the people of London, who mere hours before the attacks were celebrating their successful Olympic bid.

And so to the other stories of this week. Whether or not Live8 and its aim of Making Poverty History will deliver remains to be seen - the cynic in me can't help believing a few concerts and placards can't touch ingrained corruption - but it has certainly been a history-making seven days.

It has also been a week for marking history, namely the Second World War. Our day of remembrance, along with the UK, is on Sunday and it presents an ideal opportunity to take stock: I can't help feeling we need to.

Over the past few days I've read a number of accounts from the war - not only of servicemen but of nurses, teachers and children of Britain in 1945. Their sense of joy at being alive is striking, with an awareness of just how lucky they are to have survived six years of war and, incredibly, a lack of bitterness about how ghastly those years had been.

To my mind, this contrasts sharply with the outlook on life the children of the 60s, 70s, 80s and 90s now seem to hold.

Now, while I would never wish the terror of war upon anyone, that gratitude to be alive so evident in the 40s and 50s has faded in later generations. The goals of today are no longer about living a fulfilling life, but about gaining more - whether it be money, celebrity or any other trapping of modern life.

At the risk of sounding middle-aged and sensible, this 'me me me' outlook seems to stem from a general lack of discipline and care for others in today's western world. The awareness of others which war and its associated hardships brings seems to have been eroded more and more with every subsequent generation.

This isn't something to which the Falklands are immune, as Frances Douse's letter this week sadly testifies. In the past young Islanders have been renowned for their mature and respectful attitude to their schooling and to life in general. However, the level of pride in themselves and respect for others seems to have dropped to an all time low.

So how, short of bringing back conscription, can this discipline and self-respect be recovered?

Perhaps the answer lies in next week's news story - sport.

It's heartening to see how many Falklands men, women and children are heading to Shetland ready for the Island Games. Admittedly, most are not expected to get past the first round of competition but the self-discipline their training has demanded of them is bound to have an effect.

We should build on this. Instead of taking their troubles out on teachers, parents, or any other unsuspecting person, sport provides the perfect way for youngsters to get rid of teenage angst.

So with London set to host the Olympics surely it's the perfect time to kick off (if you'll pardon the rather poor pun) a movement to encourage our youngsters to take up sport. What better goal than representing the Falklands in 2012?

Briley: 'heroes unrecognised by History'

THE author of the new official history of the Falklands War says he feels "genuinely uncomfortable" that many incidents of heroism displayed by Islanders and others during the campaign are barely discussed in his book.

Professor Lawrence Freedman was responding to an article written by *Mercopress* correspondent Harold Briley which accused the war author of doing Islanders a disservice, "by his paucity of recognition in what is billed as an 'Official History'."

Mr Briley this week wrote, "It is puzzling why, in a two-volume, 1,100-page history, after seven years of research, such an experienced military historian and analyst as Professor Freedman appears to give such little weight to the impressive contribution of the Islanders, several of whom braved death or injury in action and possibly harsh treatment as spies."

"For example, he omits to mention that two men who carried and used arms in the ferocious close-combat battle for Mount Longdon - former Police Chief Terry Peck and air service engineer Vernon Steen - were awarded medals for bravery or that Mrs Trudi Morrison (now Trudi McPhee) won a military commendation from the Task Force Commander in Chief. All three get only summary mention, unworthy of their courageous actions."

Mr Briley said he suspected many Falkland Islanders will be disappointed, "...with an Official History which is so lacking in acknowledgement of their trauma, their defiance and their very real opposition to the Argentine invaders and their invaluable help to the Task Force."

On Wednesday Professor Freedman told *Penguin News* he was "somewhat surprised" by the tone of Mr Briley's remarks because, "...elsewhere he has written enthusiastically about the book."

However, he added, "...he has a point and it is one that concerns me, but the concern goes beyond the Islanders."

He explained, "If you read the many accounts of the campaign and the many battles fought you become aware of numerous incidents of heroism, many of them gaining medal citations, and hardly any of them are discussed in detail in my book."

"There are numerous people who in this sense would have good reason to feel slighted. I genuinely feel uncomfortable about this and have done so throughout the project."

In the book, Professor Freedman said, he does, "...mention the relevant incidents and people, try to put them in context, and I hope take nothing away from the experiences of the Islanders (particularly those stuck at Goose Green)." He added that many of the comments on the role of the Argentines as occupiers came from his interviews with Islanders.

Professor Freedman said the problem stemmed from the fact the book was "top down history."

He explained, "My task, as I explain in the introduction, was to describe the policy-making processes and the command decisions. I had neither the space nor the remit to provide a decent description of all events on the ground. The book was twice the size the publishers were expecting as it was."

"It is always striking after a book is published that people are full of ideas about what should have been put in but have fewer about what could have been left out."

He said he hoped Falkland Islanders "understand the limits of what I set out to do and could do," and added, "I would also hope that they find the book interesting for what it tells them about how their predicament was viewed in London, not only in 1982 but over the whole of the period covered."

Director of Health gets to know the Falklands

THE new Director of Health has taken up her post at the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital.

Originally from Stirling in Scotland, Nikki Osborne (right) has recently been living in Shropshire and is accompanied in the Islands by her husband Simon Jackson and their two year old son, James.

Ms Osborne said she applied for her job for a number of reasons. Firstly, the sense of "adventure" in coming to the Falklands appealed to her. She was also keen to live and work in the same area which, she said, "...is becoming increasingly difficult in the UK."

The post also appealed to her, "...from a management point of view," Ms Osborne said, as it deals with all health services offered in the Islands, from dentistry and accident and emergency to social welfare.

Asked whether she had any plans or ideas she wished to implement within the Health Service, Ms Osborne said she wanted to spend some time "...getting to know the place first."

She added, "I think it would be wrong to make any assumptions yet,



but I'm sure there will be opportunities to develop."

Ms Osborne was also impressed by the wide variety of services available here in the Falklands saying, "I've heard lots and lots of positive things about the standard and breadth of services offered."

She is currently part way through a ten day programme to enable her to meet all staff in both internal and external departments of the Health Service and said, "I'm really looking forward to working with everybody."

FOR the seventh year, the Falkland Islands have been represented at the premier agricultural show in the UK, the Royal Agricultural Show at Stoneleigh in Warwickshire.

The stand profiled some of the Islands' rural diversification initia-



tives and business opportunities, and provided general information about the Falklands.

Farmers week programme of events

FARMERS will be heading in to Stanley next week for a full programme of events laid on for Farmers Week.

The Rural Business Association (RBA) Annual General Meeting starts the proceedings on Monday afternoon followed by an Environmental Planning meeting about disposal of rubbish, and a meeting about wool warehouse operation for the coming season with ByronMcKay Port Services.

The Falkland Islands Government Taxation Department begin the day on Tuesday with a short presentation and a question and answer session, followed by a talk on Camp road expansion and maintenance by Bob Hancox.

The morning concludes with meetings with councillors and the Governor.

In the afternoon, the Falkland Islands Meat Company (FIMCo) will hold a review of last season and provide information for next season before the Falkland Islands Development Corporation (FIDC) concludes the day's events with a look at the schemes on offer at the moment.

Wednesday and Thursday will both be hosted by the Department of Agriculture (DoA) and include a wide variety of presentations and meetings with lunch provided on

Wednesday by the DoA and on Thursday by FIMCo.

Friday morning will begin with a short meeting with Karin Vogel, a representative for the Chilean agricultural supplies company Covepa. The Falkland Islands Tourist Board will also host a meeting on Friday outlining tourism opportunities for Camp residents, followed by meetings with Island Shipping and Civil Aviation.

The morning concludes with an 'End of week round up' meeting before a lunch at the KEMH with a chance to meet Nikki Osborne, the new Director of Health Services. Lastly, there will be fire training at Stanley Airport on Friday afternoon which brings the week to a close.

The social programme for the week begins with the RBA Farmers Week Party in the Narrows Bar. There will be a buffet and drinks at Hillside Camp on Tuesday and a reception at Government House on Wednesday with both events being by invitation only.

An exhibition of Sven Gillsater's photographs will open at the Jetty Visitor's Centre on Friday and the week will finish with the Camp Education fundraising dance in the FIDF Hall on Friday night.

FIDF 'put up a good show' at Bisley

NATURAL shot, Private Daniel Biggs of the Falkland Islands Defence Force (FIDF) has outshone his team mates at this year's Bisley Skill at Arms competitions.

Over the past week the FIDF team has competed in the Territorial Army Rifle Association and the National Rifle Association competitions.

Officer Commanding FIDF, Major Peter Biggs, said the competition standard was higher this year than previous years.

Seven hundred and forty-six people qualified for the Queen's Medal Territorial Army 50. Private Biggs qualified for the final and gained 34th position in a field of around 230 competitors. He earned a medal for his efforts and can wear the TA 50 badge on his uniform.

He also achieved second place in the Wise pistol competition, a class for soldiers with less than five years service.

These achievements are extraordinary, especially considering Private Biggs has been unable to do any training for the event while he has been attending university in Australia.

The next set of competitions were part of the National Rifle Association combat championships. FIDF achieved a number of bronze bars in an assortment of events

with Major Biggs, Captain Derek Clarke, Captain Andy Brownlee, Corporal Ian Betts, Privates Dustin Clarke and Daniel Biggs all collecting prizes.

The team also entered the Metheun Cup, an interservice competition with international team categories. Major Biggs said he was unsure of the FIDF's final placing as the team had to leave Bisley before the results were collated, however he said the team had "put up a good show and we improved on our score from last year."

Overall, he said the FIDF contingent performed "extremely well."

He said this year's competitions were tough, "...as we only had one day's practice before they started, with people having various commitments and coming from far and wide."

However he was "really quite pleased" with how they had done.

Assault case adjourned

GARY MCGILL appeared in court on Wednesday, charged with common assault.

He entered no plea to the charge and the case was adjourned for two weeks.

He is alleged to have assaulted his former partner.

Mr McGill was granted conditional bail.

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Seabird progress 'very good news'

THE Fisheries Committee meeting held last Friday morning began with the annual review of the Falkland Islands National Plan of Action for Seabirds (FI-NPOA-S).

Oliver Yates, Project Leader for the Agreement on the Conservation of Albatross and Petrels (ACAP) and Fisheries Scientist Paul Brickley gave the presentation which outlined the aims of the programme, problems faced, progress achieved and plans for the future.

The aim of the plan is to reduce the number of sea bird fatalities caused by the fishery operating in the Falkland Islands Conservation Zone.

"Very good news," was how Paul Brickley described the progress made so far with the scheme. The longliner bird fatality rate from the season 2002/2003 of 0.011 per 1000 hooks set or 80 estimated killed was nearly halved with the rate for 2003/2004 only 0.005 with only 45 estimated deaths.

The results for the trawler survey were even more impressive with estimated fatalities plummeting from 1,529 over 2003/2004 to only 128 in 2004/2005.

These impressive trawler results were mainly due to the introduction of stream lines, indeed 70% of the kills still occurring in 2003/2004 were recorded before the lines were put out.

Despite these encouraging results, the team were keen to stress that there were still shortfalls in the plan that needed addressing.

Firstly, the fatality numbers were only an estimate based on birds actually seen killed and do not include those that simply die out of sight of the observers who struggle to achieve 100% observation on longliners. There is no estimate at all for the loligo fishery.

Secondly, it is vital that the stream lines are used correctly for the system to work, and thirdly, there had been a delay on the publication of the offal management report which is key in reducing bird deaths.

As for the future direction of the plan, the NPOA team were keen to get the input of Fisheries Department observers to aid data collection. A leaflet for ship's captains detailing the plan and its practical implications was discussed and is now ready for distribution.

The reduction of the discard of offal is also one of the long term aims of the plan, as is the discussion of the scheme with other fishing nations. Oliver Yates of ACAP, said that although the Falklands are world leaders in this field, "It negates everything we do if it's ignored in the rest of the world."

However, Director of Fisheries John Barton said the issue of sea bird deaths, "...isn't something which is greatly in discussion (with Argentine fishing authorities)."

Also discussed at the meeting was the Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Bill 2005.

The Bill is now on its seventh draft after various minor details were questioned by the Foreign and Commonwealth Office and required amendments. The Bill will now be considered at a special meeting of Executive Council sometime in early August.

Lastly, the Marine Farming Bill 2005 was also discussed. It was decided by the committee that it was not in a position to be put before Executive Council until certain issues relating to the Bill were resolved.

The next meeting of the Fisheries Committee scheduled for Tuesday, July 26.

Criteria for the prosecution of 'runaways'

FOLLOWING a recent high profile incident in which an unattended vehicle ended up in Stanley harbour, *Penguin News* contacted the Royal Falkland Island Police to establish what legislation existed regarding such incidents.

Inspector Len McGill said, "Our records show that no person has been prosecuted in the last twenty years, for failing to quit a vehicle, that is switch off the engine and set the handbrake. There have however been a few incidents where vehicles have run away when the handbrake has not been set."

"On May 29, 2003 the Attorney General issued a Prosecuting Policy in Road Traffic cases. This was as a result of a view, fairly widely held among councillors

that some incidents have been prosecuted which ought not to have been.

"They were referring to what might be considered trivial motoring offences. In such incidents no prosecution will be undertaken unless there are additional offences disclosed such as excess alcohol, excess speed or recklessness, invalid or no insurance, drivers licence, vehicle license etc, major vehicle defects, damage to other property or injury to persons."

Inspector McGill said every incident is considered on an individual basis and that since May 2003 this policy has been adhered to. He added, "The incident that you refer to did not reach the criteria for prosecution under the above policy."

Louise McLeod has achieved her Post Graduate Certificate of Education after training in Carlisle.

Louise went to university in Twickenham before embarking on her post graduate teaching degree.

She has worked in the Falklands at the Community School as part of her training.

Louise begins work at a school in Carlisle in September and plans to gain experience in the UK before eventually returning to the Falklands when a job opportunity arises.

Business as usual for Standard Wool

STANDARD WOOL from Punta Arenas is looking ahead to a full year's work in spite of the blaze which razed its wool deposits and equipment in February 2004.

Carlos Calisto, Standard Wool General Manager told the Punta Arenas press that the company is involved in the final stages of discussions with the insurance company and should be collecting the policy cheque in the coming weeks.

"We're currently in the demolition process of the area destroyed by the fire and in two to three weeks we expect to begin working in the new plant with a team of specialists we are in the process of selecting." Building the new plant and deposits is scheduled for the end of next September.

Mr Calisto also revealed that the idea of moving the company to Argentine Patagonia has been abandoned. "...it's definite we're staying and rebuilding in Punta Arenas."

"The new plant, with basically the same industrial processing equipment, should be running by April/May 2006," said Mr Calisto.

Standard Wool has continued in the business by shipping local wool to Montevideo, Uruguay, where it is processed and eventually exported.

"Our volume of operation hasn't suffered that much and in Montevideo we have access to virtually the same productive capacity we had in our plant in Punta Arenas," said Mr Calisto. /MP



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'Good progress' for Pasture Improvement

THE Agricultural Advisory Committee met this week to discuss issues as varied as cattle, rock phosphate and the Pasture Improvement Programme.

The meeting heard that Lafonia has been declared free of tuberculosis which, Director of Minerals and Agriculture, Phyl Rendell, said was, "...a credit to the work of vet Sue Harvey."

Senior Veterinary Officer Steve Pointing said that although some farms had been tested for the disease many times, others had not been tested at all.

Worries about tuberculosis and other diseases lead the committee to decide a programme of testing or culling should be developed by next February. This is crucial if the Islands are to attain disease free status.

The issue of some farms stockpiling rock phosphate was also discussed.

Phyl Rendell said that under the rules of the Pasture Improvement Programme, the accumulation of materials is not allowed and that farms which had stocks of rock phosphate would have to use their existing supply before being allowed any more. If any farm did not comply with this by June of next year, it would no longer be allowed to participate in the programme.

Jimmy Forster told the meeting that there have been stockpiles of the material on some farms for a number of years and that some of it is now unrecoverable.

Senior Agricultural Advisor Neil Judd said that although there is a good demand for rock phosphate, "...there are still a number of farmers who don't recognise its value." Mr Judd felt that although it is not a massive issue, it is something that needs "tidying up".

Reviewing the Pasture Improvement Programme itself, Mrs Rendell said it had, "...made good progress despite a late start."

BAS close to choosing winning station design

A COMPETITION to design an Antarctic research station, intended to be built on a 150 metre thick floating ice shelf and capable of being moved, is now in the final stages.

British Antarctic Survey (BAS) launched the competition with the Royal Institute of British Architects (RIBA) in June 2004 in order to find a design for the new BAS research station at Halley.

When first launched, over 80 designers expressed an interest in the project. From those, six were chosen to submit concept ideas and then three were commissioned by BAS to develop their concepts.

A spokesperson for BAS said, "The Jury Panel and technical advisory team have a difficult choice to select just one from three stunning solutions."

The most important considera-

The programme did not begin until September as some issues had to be revisited and new parameters set. There were also difficulties with the weather with a dry spell before Christmas and excessive rain afterwards which damaged fodder crops.

Despite these setbacks, Mrs Rendell described it as, "...a useful season during which farmers learned a lot."

Mrs Rendell says farmers are now, "very much in the driving seat" with an emphasis now more on managed grazing and moving away from high-risk fodder crops.

The number of farms to apply to take part in the programme has now risen to 56 and Mrs Rendell said that the inclusion of improving sheep genetics in the scheme has attracted more interest. She added that more farms have also been applying for help with labour costs which she says is "healthy" and, "...will add growth to the amount of work available in the camp." £165,000 for pasture improvement was rolled over to this year's budget.

A problem relating to the costs of testing wool samples was also addressed during the meeting.

The committee agreed that batching wool samples into lots of 650 test should provide labour use efficiency for the department. Because of this, the committee decided that farmers who are prepared to take part in a batching method should be offered wool testing services at £2 per sample tested for micron, and at £3 per sample when tested for both yield and micron.

They further agreed that farmers who are unwilling to use the batching of wool samples method should continue being charged the current outlined rates detailed in the Department of Agriculture's Farm Management Handbook.

Up to four thousand tests of this nature are undertaken by the department each year. (FIBS)

tion with any of the designs will be its ability to, "...withstand Antarctica's extreme environment.

"Each scheme is elevated above the ice to avoid burial by snow; and is capable of being relocated inland periodically as the ice shelf flows towards the sea."

The winner of the competition will be announced at the Royal Institute of British Architects in London on Tuesday July 19.

The spokesperson added, "In addition to the huge engineering and technical challenges posed by building on a floating ice shelf, each team has demonstrated their creative and aesthetic expertise to design a stimulating living and working environment that is safe, comfortable and sensitive to BAS requirements for energy efficiency and protection of Antarctica's pristine environment."



Memories of World War II

WORLD War II was one of the most terrible events in human history.

It began with an attempt by German forces to bomb the people into submission. Night after night the enemy rockets, referred to as 'doodle-bugs', were launched at Britain, and enemy planes attempted to eliminate the British air force.

I was seventeen years old, living in New York City, and I well remember how we admired the courage of the British people, standing firm in the face of those terrible attacks.

They failed, of course, and gradually increasing numbers of allies worldwide were able to foil the enemy forces and then launch their own attacks.

Since that time there have been wars, but not a major world war. Some of the countries that fought against one another are now firm friends. For example, Germany, Italy and Japan now have cordial relations with the western powers.

War is a terrible thing. People are injured or killed; their property is destroyed. Yet, as we have just noted, some countries have already shown that it can be eliminated.

Maybe if we help one another to focus on peace, we can go the rest of the way and remove it altogether. Why not!

An average month of weather

JUNE'S mean temperatures were just above average for the month, with the rainfall being the lowest recorded since records began at MPA.

Sunshine was well above average while the mean wind speed was exactly average.

The mean maximum temperature for the month was 4.4C against the average of 4.2C. The highest recorded maximum temperature was 9.6C on the 5th. The lowest maximum -1.9C was recorded on the 19th.

The mean minimum temperature was 0.3C against the average of 0.4C. The lowest minimum temperature was -6.1C recorded on the 14th. There were 11 nights with air frost and 20 nights with a ground frost.

Rainfall was well below average with 23.1mm against the average of 58.1 mm, making June 2005 the driest on record at MPA. The highest daily total of 4.4 mm

fell on the 9th. There were 14 days with 0.1 mm or more and 9 days with 1.0 mm or more. There were five instances of fog during the month.

Snow or sleet fell on 15 days during the month while there were only three instances of hail during the month.

Total sunshine for the month was 81.4 hours, well above the long term average of 61.1 hours. The sunniest day was the 13th with 7.4 hours. Which was the sunniest for a single day in June since records began at MPA.

The mean wind speed for the month was 13.4 knots, equalling the average of 13.4 knots for June. There were three days with gales (34 knots or more over a ten minute mean) during the month.

The highest gust recorded was 49 knots on the 12th. Gusts exceeding 33 knots occurred on 13 days.

The trust aims to advance the education of children and young people of school age resident in the Falkland Islands by the provision of annual prizes to reward endeavour in the fields of art, craft, home economics and domestic science in the Infant/Junior, Community and Camp schools.

The first exhibition was held in 1984; each year an overall winner is selected from senior pupils to hold the Spinning Wheel Trophy for the year.

'I was lucky, I never saw an angry German'

 COMMEMORATIONS will take place this Sunday, July 10 in the Falkland Islands - and around the world - to mark the 60th anniversary of the end of the Second World War.

The aim of the occasion, which falls between the anniversaries of Victory in Europe (VE) Day on May 8 and Victory in Japan (VJ) Day on August 15, is to remember all theatres of war in the 1939-45 conflict and everyone who took part.

A veteran of that terrible war, Jim Lewis (84) has lived in the Falklands with his Islander wife Jean, since his retirement in 1986.

When war broke out in 1939, Jim was already a seaman, working in the Hull fishing fleet on a trawler, having first gone to sea at the tender age of fifteen.

After his ship was commandeered by the Admiralty, Jim signed on to the Royal Navy and was sent to join *HMS Baltavia*, a merchant refrigeration ship.

After getting the vessel rigged out with the necessary weaponry orders arrived for the ship to head to the Falklands.

It was Boxing Day 1939 when Jim first arrived in the Islands, a week later than planned, after the *Baltavia* had to be diverted. At the time, the crew were unaware of the reason but upon reaching Stanley Harbour, were informed by Commander Martin, the Naval Commander in the Islands, that their diversion was, "on account of the Battle of the River Plate."

Jim was told that as a supply ship, the *Baltavia* would have been at risk of being captured by the German fleet keen to get at the stores such ships were carrying. Ships sailing to the Falklands were at risk, Jim says as, unlike in the North Atlantic, "you couldn't

come in convoy because there weren't enough ships coming at the one time."

For two years Jim was stationed in the Falklands. During this time he was coxswain of the ship's launch: "I used to run people ashore and run between some of the other ships, as well as collecting mail."

The *Baltavia's* job was to supply the ships in the area with food. In the course of these duties, Jim had two or three trips to the River Plate where he called in to Montevideo and Buenos Aires. The ship also travelled to South Africa to restock which meant making room for the fresh stores on the way, or as Jim says, "we dumped all our meat in the sea for the sharks because it was getting old."

It was while in the Islands that Jim met and married his wife Jean Grant, an Islander. Unfortunately, the couple did not have long for a honeymoon as Jim was posted back to the UK just four days after their wedding in October 1941. In 1943, Jim finally got to see his wife again when she arrived in the UK as a volunteer war worker in a factory.

In between time, Jim was posted to HMS Mersey barracks in Liverpool before briefly being aboard *HMS Devon City*, another merchant ship. Only three weeks later, he was seconded into the Merchant Navy as so many men had been lost in the service.

One of the ships Jim served on also carried a plane which was launched from the vessel by a catapult to engage the German planes if their convoy was attacked. The problem with the system however, was retrieving the RAF pilot and his plane once he had flown from the ship. Jim says, "If they went up and then

ditched, there was no way we could pick them up, as in convoy you weren't allowed to stop."

Although Jim says that many of these pilots were inevitably lost, it seems his particular ship was lucky as years later, in 1970, while Jim was working in Surrey, "I met a chap and we got chatting. I found out that he was a pilot and found out that he was a pilot on this ship I was on!"

One of Jim's most abiding memories of the war is that of the fleet's departure for the D-Day invasion of mainland France in 1944.

He was aboard the merchant ship *Temple Yard* and was anchored off Southend: "With all the ships and small boats going across, it was a battle royal and quite a lot of people were lost going over before they even touched France."

After the initial invasion, Jim's ship, "followed up and replenished supplies and ammunition."

He sadly recalls, "When we got there to start discharging, it wasn't a very nice sight because you saw bodies floating by now and again as they had no time to pick them up."

Although Jim was known as something of a lucky charm for ships, having never been sunk, his father did not share his son's fortitude. While working on fishing trawlers in the Second World War, he was sunk three times, and in the First World War he was even sunk twice in one night. (After his ship had been torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine, the crew were transferred to another ship which was then sunk by the same submarine. Not wishing to push their luck any further, both crews managed to get aboard another ship which then quickly headed for shore.)

Jim served in the Merchant

Navy for the remainder of the war; when it ended, he rejoined the Hull fishing fleet and, with Jean, lived in Hull, Peterborough and Surrey before coming back to live in the Falklands on his retirement in 1986.

Jean says, "We came for six months holiday and we're still here!"


Fiercely patriotic and still a seaman at heart (Jim's Ensign could be seen flying last week to mark the Battle of Trafalgar celebrations taking place in the UK) Jim was always happiest at sea. He says, "I didn't like being ashore, not when the planes were going over and they were bombing the cities. I was always glad to get back out to sea!"

Jim thinks it is vital that people continue to commemorate and remember those that took part in the Second World War, whatever their role in the campaign was.

Jean shares her husband's feelings on the subject and says, "The *Baltavia* played an important part down here feeding the Navy. Feeding the troops is a very important job, they wouldn't get far without food."

There were also social benefits: as well as their normal duties, many of the ships stationed in the Falklands raised money for the Red Cross and the crew on the *Baltavia* used to run dances and boxing tournaments. As Jim says, "...there were quite a few handy lads in the Falklands!"

Despite sailing with the Royal and Merchant Navy throughout the war, being involved in the D-Day invasion, and seeing many dog fights between British and German fighter planes over his convoy, Jim regards himself as very fortunate. "I was lucky," he says. "I never saw an angry German."

This will be followed by a public reception hosted by The Governor at the FIDF Hall from 11am to 12.30pm, to which all members of the Falkland Islands community are invited. The Governor will then host a lunch for veterans at Government House, at which attendance will be by invitation only. It will be appropriate for medals and decorations to be worn to these events.

Recipes for the Falkland Islands

Lamb and Winter Vegetable Stew

Ingredients

- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 1 pound lamb stew meat, cubed
- 2 cups beef stock
- 1 cup red wine
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh thyme
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 1 bay leaf
- 2 cups pumpkin - peeled, seeded and sliced
- 1 cup peeled, sliced parsnips
- 1 cup peeled, chopped potatoes

- 1 cup sliced celery
- 1 medium onion, thinly sliced
- 1/2 cup sour cream
- 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour

Directions

Heat the oil in a large saucepan, and brown the lamb meat on all sides. Drain fat, and stir in the beef broth and wine. Season with garlic, thyme, salt, pepper, and bay leaf.

Bring the mixture to a boil. Reduce heat, cover, and simmer 20 minutes.

Mix in the squash, parsnips, sweet potatoes, celery, and onion.

Bring to a boil, then reduce heat and simmer 30 minutes, or until the vegetables are tender.

In a small bowl, blend the sour cream and flour. Gradually stir in 1/2 cup of the hot stew mixture.

Stir the sour cream mixture into the saucepan.

Remove the bay leaf, and continue to cook and stir until thickened.

Serves 6.

Wool report - week ending July 1

by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

WOOL prices for fleece wool lots between 18 and 30 micron were firm in value (up 1 to 5 p/kg clean) at sales in Australia last week. As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide". Prices now represent significant premiums over those being achieved several months ago, but generally remain below levels of 12 months ago for most fleece wool categories.

In New Zealand crossbred wool in the 32 to 36 micron range gained 2%.

Ten buyers purchased almost 60% of the Australian offering. In a positive sign for Falkland Islands farmers, buyers/ wool processors of potential importance to Islands farmers remained very active in the markets. For example, Modiano, Chargeurs and Dewavrin purchased almost 6,600 bales between them last week. For the complete selling season in Australia, Chargeurs purchased 126,856 bales, Modiano 112,956 bales and Dewavrin 101,474 bales of wool. They were among the top seven wool buyers by volume in Australia last year.

In Australia 88.7% of the 46,016 bale offering was sold. Included in the offering were 4,945 bales of crossbred wool of which 91.1% was sold.

Auctions continue next week in Australia (first sale of the new

season) where approximately 65,000 bales of wool will be offered for sale.

MERCOPRESS**United Kingdom lifts ban on sale of spares to Argentine Navy**

THE United Kingdom has lifted the ban on the sale of Rolls Royce spares to the Argentine Navy vessels, according to reports in the Buenos Aires newspaper, *Ambito Financiero*.

The decision was communicated by Rolls Royce representatives to Argentine Admiral Jorge Godoy during his recent visit to Britain for the 200 anniversary commemoration of Admiral Nelson's victory in Trafalgar.

The ban on spares has been effective since the 1982 South Atlantic conflict.

Ambito recalls that Britain has been a historical supplier of the Argentine Navy including two cruisers currently on service, *Hercules* and

Santisima Trinidad, plus attack and anti submarine helicopters.

The Buenos Aires daily also points out that according to Sir Lawrence Freedman's book, "The Official History of the Falklands' Campaign," prior to the conflict in 1981, Britain offered Argentina the sale of an aircraft carrier (*HMS Hermes*) to replace the aging *25 de Mayo* and VTOL aircraft.

Buenos Aires British Embassy Naval attaché Captain Julian James Mitchell and his Argentine counterpart in London, Rear Admiral Walter Allara went on a tour of British naval bases. The purpose of the invitation was to convince the Argentines of the purchase but allegedly R/A Allara, who also hap-

pened to belong to Naval Intelligence, gathered as much information as possible about the Royal Navy's capability and readiness.

R/A Allara was later named commander of the Argentine Surface Fleet and was responsible for sea actions during the 1982 conflict.

Argentina is not known to have purchased major naval equipment since 1982. On the contrary during the ten years of President Carlos Menem the military budget was drastically and consistently reduced.

However with the coming of President Kirchner and the economy relatively stabilized, his Defence minister Jose Pampuro has promised to increase the defence budget.

Last February Mr Pampuro visited the Spanish IZAR shipyards in El Ferrol where he stated Argentina's interest in purchasing five patrol corvettes which were to be jointly built with the Argentine naval industry. IZAR yards have built frigates for the Spanish, Norwegian and United States navies.

President Kirchner at the time also reopened the Manuel Domecq Garcia yard which at one time was capable of building and repairing conventional submarines.

France has tempted the Argentine Navy with landing craft vessels which are currently being decommissioned by their Navy.

Tropical storm Cindy causes crude oil to reach 61 US dollars a barrel

CRUDE oil prices rose, close to \$61 a barrel in New York, as Tropical Storm Cindy in the Gulf of Mexico disrupted the arrival of shipments to the United States.

Bloomberg reports that the Louisiana Offshore Oil Port, the biggest US oil import terminal, stopped unloading cargoes from tankers yesterday because of the approach of the storm.

The storm was forecast to make landfall on Wednesday night or early Thursday, the National Hurricane

Center said. Prices rose to a record last week following concern that surging fuel demand may outpace supply this year.

"Any storm in the Gulf of Mexico, especially this early in the season, makes us nervous," said Michael Fitzpatrick, vice president of risk management with Fimat USA in New York. "Memories are still fresh. It was storms last year that helped get us in the current situation."

Crude oil for August delivery

rose \$1, or 1.7 percent, to \$59.75 a barrel at 12.44 pm on the New York Mercantile Exchange yesterday. Futures touched \$60.95 a barrel on June 27, the highest since trading began in 1983. Prices are up 51 percent from a year ago.

Hurricane Ivan in September damaged production platforms and pipelines in the Gulf. Ivan cut a total of 43.8 million barrels of oil production and 172.3 billion cubic feet of natural gas output, according to

the Minerals Management Service in June. States along the Gulf receive more than half of US oil imports and are home to 50 percent of the nation's refining capacity.

The Atlantic Ocean hurricane season was forecast to be more active than normal this year, with as many as five major hurricanes, officials at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration said last month. The season lasts from June through November.

Highs and lows in Shetland Games

THE Falkland Islands team achieved what has been described as "the biggest shock in Island Games football history" with its 2-1 victory over Saaremaa on Tuesday.

This victory, the highlight so far of the Falklands' efforts in the Island Games in Shetland, reflected a strict fitness regime embarked on by the team over the past seven months.

The win came only two days after they lost their first match 4-0 to the host island. Before the Games, the Falklands were considered the poorest team in the ten-island football competition and they were expected to lose to the team from Saaremaa, an Estonian island in the Baltic Sea, which boasts a population of around 40,000 people.


However, their ranking improved on Tuesday, thanks to the goals scored by Martyn Clarke and Wayne Clement and some magnificent saves from goalie Chris Gilbert.

Team manager Chris Clarke chose to play some of his second string players in the next match, against the gold-medal favourites Isle of Man. This left the team with a somewhat shaky defence and resulted in a loss of 9-0.

Thursday's fixture, however, was much more even. Sadly, luck was not on the Falklands team's side and they lost to Aland 2-1. This morning they play-off for 9th and 10th place against Orkney.

The swimming team - Donna Triggs, Thomas Burston, Hannah Arthur-Almond and Edward Freer - has performed well with all four swimmers achieving personal bests in the pool.

Hannah and Edward both won heats; Edward also broke Ben Pointing's 2001 record in the 100m breast-stroke while Donna knocked a mas-



sive 22 seconds off the previous Falklands 200m freestyle record.

Swimming team manager, Pam Freer, said she was "highly delighted" by the times, which were a result of the "dedication and training put in by all four swimmers prior to leaving the Falklands."

Chairman of the Falkland Islands Overseas Games Association (FIOGA), Patrick Watts commented, "...the Falklands are slowly closing the gap on the faster swimmers in the Island Games."

Shooting is traditionally the Falklands' strongest sport, particularly pistol and full-bore rifle events. However, owing to the stringent UK gun laws, Shetland was unable to host these two events, leaving only clay pigeon shooting open to the Falklands competitors.

In the team event, Graham Didlick, Saul Pitaluga and Steve Dent finished ninth of fifteen islands and Saul missed a medal shoot-off by just two clays in the Individual ABT shoot, held over two days. His final score of 90 from a possible of 125 saw him finish in eighth place.

Patrick commented, "Once again, Saul has proved to be up there with the best in the clay pigeon events."

Falklands golfers had a torrid time on the Whalsey and Dale golf courses, although their second round scores showed considerable improvement over the first day's returns.

At Dale, Kevin Clapp, who has played in six Island Games competitions, produced a credible 85, having parred the last three holes. Rod Tuckwood recovered from his treble figure score the previous day with a 91, having birdied the 16th. Peter Bagley, with the best of the first day's scores,

returned to the club house with 93, but, according to Patrick, Steve Vincent had a day he will wish to forget. A run of 13 - 8 - 14 over three holes added up to a final score of 119.

Only the best three scores of the day count towards the team medals. Going into the third round, the Falklands were off the bottom rung, with St Helena holding that position.

In table tennis, teenager Lucas Biggs nervously took to the table on Tuesday in his first-ever international event. Patrick reported, "His nervousness was apparent in his first game as he went down 4-11, 3-11, 2-11 to Bengt Klindqvist of Aland. In his next pool game, Lucas picked up his game and began playing to the best of his ability before losing 5-11, 8-11, 7-11 to Roger Hookey of the Isle of Wight." In his final group game Lucas was edged out in three sets by Dylan De Silva of Orkney 6-11, 3-11, 7-11.

Having just seriously taken up the sport six months ago, Patrick said, "Lucas can feel proud of his performance, and is now looking ahead to the Island Games of 2007 in Rhodes."

Ben Watson surprised even his closest friends by winning six points in the first round of badminton singles. He went down 15-2, 15-4 to a player from the Faroe Islands.

Patrick reported, "Ben, who only entered the tournament for a bit of fun, was so taken by the atmosphere and support, that he now plans to train seriously for the 2007 Games."

Silence for London

FALKLAND ISLANDERS observed two minutes' silence yesterday, a week to the day after the attacks on Londoners by suicide bombers.

The guns on Victory Green were fired by members of the Falkland Islands Defence Force to mark the beginning and end of the silence.

Millions of people across Europe and the rest of the world joined Britons in the silence.

Reuters reported that thousands of workers in London left their offices to stand in the street. Taxis and buses pulled off the road and financial markets paused to remember the dead. The staff of the Falkland Islands Government's London Office took part in the silence, joining hundreds of people who gathered outside New Scotland Yard and the London Underground Headquarters for the silence.

A book of condolence has been opened in the Falkland Islands for the people of London. Anyone wishing to sign the book can do so in the lobby of the Government House offices between 8am and 12.15pm and 1.30pm and 4.30pm.

Alvarez for Foreign Ministry?

CARLOS ALVAREZ, former Argentine vice-president of the ousted De la Rúa administration has been hinted as the candidate to replace Rafael Bielsa in Foreign Affairs if he manages to be elected Deputy for Buenos Aires.

Joaquin Morales Solá, one of Argentina's most prestigious political analysts put forward Mr. Alvarez's name in his weekly *La Nacion* column, although President Kirchner's cabinet chief Alberto Fernández said "ministerial changes" would not be taking place until the results of the coming October mid-term elections were clear.

Mr Morales Solá wrote that Mr Alvarez has received no formal offering but has been invited to prepare for the Foreign Affairs job.

Foreign Minister Rafael Bielsa said yesterday he would be happy to be succeeded by former vice-president Alvarez, even though he has no confirmation that this might happen. Alvarez, Mr Bielsa said, "is a great guy, with a very interesting way of thinking." MP

FARMER'S week is upon us once again, however Stanley's landlords, shopkeepers and restaurateurs are not rubbing their hands with glee at the thought of the 'good eggs from the Camp' flocking to their establishment keen to spend their savings as in the good old days. Indeed, if it wasn't for the line up of clay covered vehicles parked outside the Chamber of Commerce announcing that some of the East Falkland farmers had slithered their way into town, I doubt if many would be aware that the annual discussions are taking place.

Gone are the days of the Town Hall refreshment room being packed with fresh faced young farmers and their spouses oozing energy and enthusiasm for the challenges and hard work ahead that would bring just financial reward. A steady wool price meant that many of the wives could well afford to drift off into their own world of planning outfits for the Government House drinks party in the morning session of meetings and slip off to buy them in the afternoon.

In the good old days when wool prices were at a peak the week was a social whirl where the farmers were wine and dined by businesses keen to make a good impression and ensure that they were remembered when proceeds from wool sales were going into machinery and materials for development. (There was of course a reverse situation when wool prices dropped, and subsidies were introduced. Farmers didn't tend to socialise too much during this period for fear of being accused of "p****ng up the tax-payers money.")

This year there are some of the same faces attending the meetings. Twenty years on I hope they will forgive me for saying they are not quite so fresh faced and maybe not exactly bouncing about with enthusiasm (although that could be because a night in the Narrows Bar takes its toll more than it used to!). In its place there is a dogged determination that the fall in wool prices, resulting in a 40% drop in income for many over the last two years, and the seemingly endless list of logistical problems can be overcome so they can stay in farming and maintain a way of life that many hold dear.

The week didn't get off to a particularly auspicious start with the Rural Business Association (RBA) Annual General Meeting being rescheduled because there were not enough people to form a quorum and two other scheduled meetings for the afternoon being cancelled.

Day two held some interesting discussions about taxation, camp roads and there was a full line up of councillors to answer questions. Transport and in particular wool movements were high on the list of topics discussed as was the recent fuel waxing problems experienced by farmers. Its not a lot of fun being miles from anywhere without an operational generator or vehicle.

However, you wouldn't still be in farming if you didn't have the resilience to get through the lumpy bits - or the sense of humour to have a bit of a chuckle when, just hours after being firmly reassured that the fuel situation was well in hand and bang in the middle of FIMCo's very polished presentation, there was a power cut - the cause? Fuel waxing.

HAPPY holidays....It's the little things that are so enjoyable at first when you leave the Falklands for a while.

You can do your hair and it stays nice all day; drive for hours and hours without having to get out and scrape clay off the vehicle to see out; shop all day and still not see every item available to you; sit in the sun and read a newspaper or bask on a beach with a long glass of Bacardi and diet coke and watch people with bigger bums than yours pass by....yes, well there seems to be a lot less of them since this last burst of over-indulgence.

This type of easy-to-please euphoria lasts about three weeks maximum for me and then I start to see things from a slightly different angle. I get fed up doing my hair everyday, at least when it blows a howling gale straight off the sea I can pretend I've done my hair and the wind just wrecked it. The lovely Tarmac surfaces are great but why does everyone else on the road have a burning desire to be at their destination yesterday? Shopping is fun but they never seem to have my size in the really nice things plus there is a limit to how many times you step aside and apologise for being in the way of a) giggling girls who are dropping clothing all over the floor and not picking it up and b) the dreaded buggy brigade who seem to only travel as the crow flies and do not alter their course one iota for man nor beast. News from Farmer's Week

Camp roads and maintenance

CULVERTS which were expected to have a 25 year life expectancy are in a poor state after only 12 years and urgently need replacing. Roads Engineer Bob Hancox told farmers at a meeting to discuss camp roads and maintenance.

Mr Hancox said that some new plastic pipes are to be trialed this year and that creek crossings would be upgraded in their entirety as culverts were changed. He said this would inevitably cause some disruption to road users but every effort would be made to keep it to a minimum.

There is a total of 700 km of unsurfaced road now in use on East and West Falkland.

On the subject of the MPA road surface, Mr Hancox said there was no-one more aware of the condition than himself. "We look at it incessantly to determine when we should roll grade etc." The inevitable question of sealing the surface was raised, with Mr Hancox agreeing that it was cost effective in the long term and much safer for users, however he described the capital cost as "enormous."

One farmer suggested that a hose pipe and broom at the Sapper Hill turn off would be advantageous so

that drivers could clear windows before entering the town. He said that although most people paid a visit to the jet wash on arrival there was still a short journey through town when visibility was diminished.

Myles Lee from Port Howard on West Falkland asked if people living on the West who can operate the machinery necessary for road maintenance could undertake the work. Mr Lee said just the flights and accommodation fees paid for operators from Stanley to do the work would cover the wages of those living on the West who are able to do the work.

Councillor Norma Edwards said that with a fitter and foreman now on the West to oversee plant it should now be easier to subcontract to West Falkland people. Mr Hancox and Mr Lee agreed to meet at a later date to discuss the possibilities.

Concern was expressed over the current state of Hell's Kitchen in the San Carlos area. Mr Hancox said he would continue to talk to those directly involved, adding that it was on a list of urgent jobs to be carried out as soon as there is a dry spell.

Praise and criticism for the Tax Office

THE break down of specific columns in farm accounts requested by the Tax Office are costing farmers in accountant fees, representatives from the department heard on Tuesday.

Farmers said letters which "demand" a breakdown of a column can involve a lot of work by their accountant incurring ill afforded additional costs when often an enquiry about a single item would be sufficient.

Senior Taxation Officer Tanya Lee explained that enquiries about single items have often resulted in a string of lengthy correspondence which could be overcome with an immediate, complete column breakdown.

Ms Lee added that letters asking for further information are not

intended to sound threatening or to "put the frighteners" on anyone.

East Falkland farmer Nick Pitaluga paid tribute to the Tax Department saying they displayed "far greater efficiencies" than many other departments but added, "the public face needs a bit of work on it."

Couples who are both working on the farm can split the profits as a partnership whether the business is owned by one or both people the group heard, however, an indication of the percentage split must be made before the end of the financial year.

Taxation Officer Ken Eccles said that this was an area that farmers did not tend to take advantage of and could be of possible benefit to them.

Improved transportation for beef animals?

THE subject of an improved transportation service for beef from West Falkland was discussed.

The present situation is that only a few animals can be shipped in horse boxes at a time on *MV Tamar* unless there are more than 20 that require shifting.

It was felt that the ideal situation would involve holding and handling areas on both East and West Falklands. Councillor Roger Edwards said that it should not be a problem on the West as Fox Bay East already has holding paddocks and "hugely expensive" cattle yards established.

Other farmers said that on the

East a jetty at New Haven would be needed to make a drop of point and considered the possibility of the Brenton Loch cattle yards being utilised.

Chairman of the Rural Business Association (RBA) Paul Robertson said that the transportation of cattle was an issue that beef producers need to address.

Also discussed was the possibility of *MV Tamar* operating solely in Falkland Sound with the building in the Gimmer Ground at Brenton Loch being used as a warehouse on the East. Fox Bay already has a large warehouse.

Farmers seek licence to kill

THE shooting of Turkey Vultures and Striated Caracara (Johnny Rook) as pest control was discussed at length at the Environmental Committee meeting on Wednesday.

Applications for licences to shoot the birds have been submitted by various farmers who felt they were acting as pests by attacking sheep and penguin rookeries.

Environmental Planning Officer Dominique Giudicelli told the committee that the body was only empowered to grant licences for the killing of Johnny Rooks and not Turkey Vultures which, under current legislation, are protected birds. Any licence to shoot Turkey Vultures would therefore have to be put before Executive Council (ExCo).

Concern was expressed by members of the committee at the numbers of birds some farmers were requesting licence to kill. Director of Falklands Conservation, Grant Munro, was especially worried by one request for a licence to kill between 200 and 300 Turkey Vultures. He felt that rather than being a sensible number with the aim of controlling the birds, this number represented an attempt to circumnavigate the law and effectively allow the farmer to shoot birds as he saw fit.

The committee felt strongly that when ExCo considered the matter they should give full consideration to the rights of farmers as well as protection of the birds.

Quantity will drive things forward

A HEARTENING message delivered to farmers by Falkland Islands Meat Company General Manager John Ferguson is that the quality of sheep being supplied to the abattoir is improving.

During a presentation at the Rural Business Association Farmer's Week meetings on Tuesday, Mr Ferguson said the amount of sheep rejected as not suitable for slaughter in the last export season was only half that of the previous season. There had also been a 35% increase in animals supplied by privately owned farms.

Mr Ferguson said the company now has customers in five countries, with seven new customers being sourced in the last year. In the first two years exports were only made to Britain.

"Quantity is what will drive things forward," stressed Mr Ferguson. "There is no sales power in 3,000 lambs," (a similar amount to what a large butchers shop in UK would sell); he added that 14,000

Mr Munro said, "Without agreement of people in camp, the legislation won't function."

The issue of the Murrell road was also discussed. Environmental Planning Officer, Dominique Giudicelli said there had been "some movement" on the matter. A draft management plan for the area affected by the road will be undertaken shortly and put before the September meeting of ExCo with construction work scheduled to begin in November. The management plan will focus on the impact the expected rise in visitor numbers will have on the area, especially fish numbers.

Concern about large markings on elephant seals as part of a research project was also raised at the meeting.

A number of tourists who had visited Sea Lion Island had complained that the animals had been marked with dye which allows identification of individual Elephant Seals. Mr Munro told the meeting that the current markings used are in fact, "the least obtrusive method from the animal's perspective."

Julian Morris, General Manager of the Falkland Islands Development Corporation (FIDC) stressed that the future lies in cooperation between the tourism operator on the Island and the research team with the aim of "informing and educating" the tourists who visited this "key Falklands asset."

more lambs at least, were needed to make any impact on the market.

The issue of boils (Caseous Lymphadenitis) in the meat was addressed. Ten percent of the 23,362 animals slaughtered had boils. Mr Ferguson said this restricts the cuts available from the meat company for fear of sending a bone-in cut that may have a boil. A £1 penalty to the farmer is to be introduced for the 2006 season.

Management Team member Julian Morris described the meat industry as a "zero tolerance" business where customers could submit a claim if there was a variance in quality. He added, "All problems have to be eradicated."

The local market is "emotive" but has to be based on quality which is variable at the moment, Mr Ferguson told the gathering. He said 49 beef and veal, 240 mutton, 52 lambs and 14 pigs have been processed through the abattoir for the local market since June 1.

Business links 'hampered' by road

THE cost of sealing the Mount Pleasant Road would be between "ten and sixteen million pounds," Director of Public Works (PWD), Manfred Keenleyside told a meeting of the Public Works Committee on Wednesday.

These figures are based on an estimate made by Morrison (Falklands) Ltd in 2001 which assumed use of PWD plant with a small amount of new machinery. Mr Hancox said although the estimate was undertaken four years ago, the costs would be very similar today, adding, a, "Huge amount of work has been done on various options of costing."

Jimmy Moffatt, speaking on behalf of the Chamber of Commerce said, "I really think the only option is to look for a permanent option rather than temporary - we're talking about the major spine road of the Falklands." Mr Moffatt went on to say that business links between Stanley and MPA were starting to flourish but were being constantly hampered by the state of the road.

Councillor Mike Summers said, "There isn't anyone who wouldn't like it done, the issue is, how is going to be funded? Unless you increase the capital spend of £5 million per year, it isn't possible to do it."

Mr Summers added that something would have to be taken out of the capital plan before the MPA road could be added. The other option Mr Summers raised was whether the money should be taken from the consolidated fund.

Mr Moffatt said, "We've got a road that doesn't work in winter." Mr Hancox rejected this by saying, "It is still operational - if you slow down."

The Committee Chairman, Councillor Roger Edwards, said whatever the current state of the road, "obviously a lot of people are concerned" and it was important to get all the various options and costings "down on paper" so the implications can be examined.

Also at the meeting there was a general progress report of works being undertaken by the Public Works Department. The Town Hall works are very nearly finished with, "just some minor works to complete," according to Mr

Keenleyside, who added that the project, "will come in under budget."

Mr Hancox confirmed the appointment of Mr Chris Davies to the post of Technician Engineer within the department. Mr Hancox said Mr Davies is, "fitting nicely into the section and is rapidly learning the systems and procedures."

Mr Hancox outlined major operations planned for the forthcoming year which include a replacement bridge at Little Chartres, similar to Boxer Bridge (which divides Stanley Harbour at the Canache) but on a smaller scale. Although PWD have never undertaken such a task in the Islands before, Mr Hancox was confident that the expertise was available within the department and that the bridge was, "designed to be built in the middle of nowhere by people without specific skills."

The Sapper Hill road will also be rebuilt and surfaced and urgent repair work will be carried out at Stanley Airport.

With such a full programme of work this year, Mr Hancox said he estimated the level of staff within the department would have to be increased from the current 24 to 42 for the summer. Mr Hancox added however, "I have concerns as to whether we can find this number of skilled people." He said that PWD cannot compete with some other employers, most notably the Mount Pleasant based contractors and other private sector employers.

There was concern expressed among committee members that PWD employees were being headhunted, particularly by contractors based at Mount Pleasant.

Further legislation to protect customers?

A DIRECTOR of Stanley Services Ltd (SSL), Councillor Mike Summers, has advised farmers to take a sample of fuel and send it for testing if in any doubt as to the quality of the product.

Otherwise, he said, complaints become merely a "whinge."

One East Falkland farmer said it was the fact that diesel had been sold as "winterised" that was particularly annoying. He said although fuel waxing has occurred in the past this was the first time to his knowledge that health and safety had been jeopardised with ambulances stopping and damage to property. He added "it was poor planning in advance."

Councillor Jan Cheek said Ex-

ecutive Council had taken the subject on board last month and the Attorney General had been tasked to see if further legislation was needed to protect the customer. She added that, at the time, "Stanley Services did appear to be in denial."

Petrol is not going to get any cheaper, said Councillor Summers in reply to a question referring to "unrealistic petrol prices." He explained that SSL cannot acquire petrol in bulk, that it is shipped in ISO containers which are expensive and there are a lot of health and safety issues involved.

He added that the company would be willing to deregulate petrol if anyone thinks they can get it cheaper.

Veterans gather to mark 60 years since the end WWII

THE sixtieth anniversary of the end of World War Two has been marked by Falkland Islanders.

While in the UK a series of events took place to mark the occasion, on Sunday veterans of the war living in the Falklands were joined by residents and military representatives at Stanley's Christ Church Cathedral for a service of commemoration then later at the Falkland Islands Defence Force Hall for a civic reception.

During the reception, a Power Point presentation, organised by Mr Michael Stevens, Chairman of the Royal British Legion, played a number of images of Islanders during the war, to the accompaniment of distinctive music from the era.

The veterans were later hosted by His Excellency the Governor and his wife for lunch at Government House.

During the cathedral service, the Reverend Paul Sweeting read 'A Veteran's Tale', the story of one man's war.

Aidan Toase served with the Royal Marines in the Second World War and his story took listeners into one of its most famous battles, the Battle of the River Plate. He married an Islander and lived for many years in the Falklands. Aidan was aboard *HMS Exeter* in December 1939, and below, with his kind permission, is his account which was read during the service.

"On the morning of December 13, 1939 I was keeping the morning watch, my particular job was to keep the lookouts awake and doing their job. I was a junior lieutenant in the Royal Marines and was second in command of the Royal Marine Detachment. Humphrey Woods was the Captain of Marines and at action stations he was in charge of B turret, manned by the Royal Marines.

"I had tried to get charge of the turret myself a few weeks earlier, but Captain Woods was not having any and I had to remain with my lookouts.

"At about 0600 the *Graf Spee* was sighted well down on the horizon and the bugler sounded 'Action Stations' over the tannoy. I remember my heart went well down into my boots as everyone was hurrying to his position.

"Very soon two great clouds of fire and smoke burst from the enemy as he fired his first broadside and about a minute later a line of shells landed in the sea about 300 yards short. The next enemy broadside was correct for range but fell about 300 yards astern. Thereafter we were receiving our punishment but managed to get within gun range of the *Graf Spee* and scored several hits.

"B turret was hit by an 11 inch shell and everyone in front of the breeches were killed including Captain Woods. Splinters from this shell cut all communications so the ship's captain, Captain Bell, came aft to fight the ship from the after control position.

"Very soon both A and Y turrets were put out of action because their electrical supplies were cut off, so Captain Bell said within my hearing, 'I'm going to ram the...' Captain Bell went on to say, 'It will be the end of us but it will sink him too.' So off we set.

"Fortunately the electricians managed to get Y turret working again so we turned away and carried on firing with Y turret.

"Lookouts were no longer required so I went to look at B turret. There was some burning debris on top of one gun loading tray and immediately under it a naked charge ready for loading into the gun. It looked a nasty situation so I removed the charge by chucking it overboard and put out the fire.

"Marine Russel was badly injured but was rallying some leaderless crew and putting them to work. When we got back to Stanley Marine Russel was taken into the hospital and appeared to be making a good recovery. However, he needed a minor operation, and died under the anaesthetic. He was buried with full military honours in Stanley.

"During the battle, people just



worked under their leaders and got on with the job: no panic. Panic is liable to start if men are left leaderless by the leaders being killed or wounded.

"While we were taking our punishment, Commodore Harwood in the *Ajax* and the *Achilles* were scoring hits on the *Graf Spee* from the disengaged side.

"It was clear that the *Graf Spee* was trying to get into Montevideo so Commodore Harwood signalled us to report the state of the ship and then ordered us to go back to Stanley. *Ajax* and *Achilles* followed the *Graf Spee* until she was interned in Montevideo and waited outside for reinforcements in case she tried to get away.

"That evening we buried about 50 of the ships company at sea.

"I well remember our reception in Stanley. Nothing was too much for people to do for us. Many were taken into peoples' homes. In the Falkland Islands, the removal of a threat of a raid by the German pocket battleships was a great relief.

"It took about six weeks to get the ship seaworthy. We had a lot of steel plating sent up from the whaling station in South Georgia. I had a very happy time in Stanley as I made the acquaintance of a young lady called Cora Newing. Whenever I could get ashore I would seek her out and she would provide a horse and we would go out to the lighthouse or some other beauty spot."

In the piece read out in the Cathedral service, Aidan then told of his postings away to the Mediterranean, and his involvement with Malta and the invasions of Sicily and Italy. Meanwhile Cora had travelled to the UK to be part of the Mares, the Royal Marines branch of the Wrens.

Aidan was sent home in time for Christmas 1944, so met Cora for the first time after a five year break. The couple were married by Aidan's father, who was a priest, one week after he got home.

Aidan and Cora celebrated their diamond wedding on 30 December, 2004.

Falklands at Calgary oil conference



INTEREST in the Falklands at the biggest worldwide oil exploration conference was down this year, however this has been attributed to increased use of the Mineral Resources Department's website.

The American Association of Petroleum Geologists (AAPG) Conference is an annual event held in North America. This year's event took place in Calgary, Canada last month and the Falklands were represented by Councillor Stephen Luxton, Director of Minerals and Agriculture Phyl Rendell, Oil Statistics Manager Alex Blake and Phil Richards and Bob Gatliff from British Geological Survey.

Councillor Luxton said the event was well attended with over 7000 delegates though there seemed to be less interest in the Falklands stand than in some previous years. "As always though, it was a handful of very good contacts that made the event worth attending, rather than the total number of people visiting the stand, as the majority of visitors only have a casual interest in the Falklands."

He said the emphasis on the Falkland Islands Government's activity at the conference has changed, "...from marketing to potential new license holders over the last few years, to now mainly providing information on the farm-in opportunities available with existing license-holders who are well advanced in their seismic exploration programmes."

He added that the "excellent and comprehensive" Mineral Resources website www.falklands-oil.com has also reduced the number of personal enquiries, "...as many interested companies can now access much of the information they require on-line."

The North American AAPG is believed to be the biggest worldwide oil exploration conference and attracts delegates from virtually every sector of onshore and offshore minerals worldwide.

Councillor Luxton said many companies have very large and elaborate stands there promoting their products, "but for us the main interest is in making contacts with 'new venture' exploration managers of oil and gas companies, and providing them with information which they may then pursue to either a license application or a farm-in with an existing license holder."

He said a number of "useful contacts" were made during the conference.

In Sung 66: owners and captain fined for illegal fishing

THE owners and captain of a Korean fishing vessel have been fined for illegal fishing in Falklands waters.

On Friday, July 8, guilty pleas were received from the Insung Corporation, as the owner of the *In Sung 66*, and ship's master, Yo Yong Sop (39), to charges of using a fishing boat between June 23 and 25 in contravention of the Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Ordinance 1986.

Principal Crown Counsel, Melanie Chilton, told the court a report was received by the Fishery Patrol Vessel *Sigma* on June 25 from *CFL Gambler* that it had found fishing gear on the boundary of the Falklands zone to the southeast of the Islands.

A second set of gear was found approximately one mile inside the zone. The *In Sung 66* was approximately one and half miles outside of the zone at the time.

The vessel was requested to sail to Stanley for an investigation into its fishing activity and the captain fully complied.

The In Sung Corporation provided Vessel Monitoring System (VMS) records which showed that

on June 23 the *In Sung 66* was in the Falkland Islands zone. Ms Chilton said the ship's log book was at "significant variance" for this date.

Lawyer Kevin Kilmartin represented the *In Sung 66*'s owners and captain in court. He said the captain had only taken command of the ship on June 9 and had headed to the Scotia Ridge region (outside the zone) to fish. He said several fishing lines were shot in the area on June 25 and when he shot 'line number 15' he believed it was outside the zone, on the edge.

Mr Kilmartin said the captain would not have set a line inside the zone for a number of reasons:

- He was not permitted to do so by the In Sung Corporation - "they have a strict policy of not violating other countries zones...and enforce this with a strict penalty."
- A licenced vessel, the *CFL Gambler*, was in the vicinity and as such, to protect licenced catch, "...would have reported any perceived infringement of the zone."
- The *In Sung 66* is fitted with VMS.

Mr Kilmartin reminded the Magistrate the captain of the *In*

Sung 66 had fully complied with the investigation into illegal fishing and the vessel owners had provided VMS data which showed the ship was in the zone on June 23. Guilty pleas were entered as soon as possible to the offences.

He described the In Sung Corporation as a "reputable company" which is involved in a number of different fisheries in the Falkland Islands and South Georgia and has long standing business relationships with Falkland Islands companies.

He said the captain was very sorry for the offence and "anxious as to what this may do to his future career."

In issuing fines to the two parties, the Senior Magistrate, Mrs Clare Faulds, said she had taken into account the guilty pleas and cooperation from the company and master.

She said that while the offence seemed to fall into a category of "lesser cases", the captain had however decided to take the risk of fishing so close to the boundary.

She fined the In Sung Corporation £7,500 and the master £500.

The fishing gear retrieved from the area was forfeited.

'Lip service' to anti-bullying

IT WAS with sadness but no great surprise that I read Frances Douse's account of her experience at the FICS.

The verbal and physical abuse she describes falls clearly into the category of bullying. Sadly, many children and young adults who become bullies during their school days go on to repeat this despicable pattern of behaviour on the work place.

Bullying can take many forms, ranging from the overt confrontational approach encountered by Frances to more subtle, insidious and indirect methods of victimisation.

Bullies feel empowered by their actions which frequently evoke profound and long lasting effects on their targets. Those who have been bullied may find themselves suffering from mental and physical health problems, from lack of self esteem and self confidence and from an overriding feeling of despair.

Earlier this year following an internal FIG investigation, the (then) Director of Health and Social Services was found guilty of three counts of bullying KEMH's Senior Dental Officer.

The results of the enquiry were

only made known to the parties involved on the day the Director left the Islands, despite the complaint being lodged with the Department of Human Resources some four months previously.

The lack of expediency in dealing with the serious issue and the fact that no action was taken whilst the perpetrator was still in post suggests that FIG merely pays lip service to its anti-bullying policy. In so doing it gives credence to a culture of bullying which is clearly as prevalent at Senior Management level as it is amongst school children. This is truly shameful.

It takes immense courage to stand up to a bully and to seek redress through the appropriate channels. Frances obviously felt unable to confront the issue whilst still at school, hence her retrospective letter to *Penguin News*.

FIG's failure to deal effectively and timeously with a proven case of bullying will hardly encourage other victims to step forward. Frances' plea for 'something to be done about it' has already fallen on deaf ears.

Allegations 'fully and properly investigated'

The following letter is in response to *Mrs Johnston's letter (above)*. MR FYFE alleged a course of bullying over a period of over three years which, if substantiated, would have constituted gross misconduct on the part of the former Director of Health.

Mrs Faulds (Senior Magistrate) was appointed on December 1 last by the Chief Executive to investigate Mr Fyfe's complaint and started work immediately.

Mr Fyfe was asked by Mrs Faulds to provide information as to his allegations and in mid-January sent Mrs Faulds forty pages of details and identified ten witnesses.

The former Director of Health responded to this document by the end of January, substantially denying Mr Fyfe's allegations.

Mrs Faulds, therefore, had to interview the witnesses and reach her own conclusions in relation to the allegations.

The investigation had, of course, to be fitted in with her duties as Senior Magistrate and the availability of the witnesses. She was not able to deliver her report until May 11.

This was, I believe, received by the Chief Executive on May 12, a Thursday. The former Director of Health left the Islands on the following Tuesday.

While Mrs Faulds found three of Mr Fyfe's allegations of bullying proved, she said in her report that those instances were fairly mild. There was, therefore, no question of gross misconduct on the former Director of Health's part.

In that situation, FIG's written policy is to promote a reconciliation between the parties to the complaint. In view of the former Director's imminent departure FIG could not do this. All it could do was to send the parties a copy of Mrs Faulds' report. That was done.

FIG certainly does not pay lip service to its anti-bullying policy. Serious allegations have to be and are fully and properly investigated.

FIG accepts that this should be done as quickly as it can be, but haste must yield to fairness and thoroughness.

Richard Cockwell's comment (June 24, 2005 edition) that not every youngster is cut out to be an academic is nothing new. Cast your minds back to when you were of school age; a typical classroom was (and still is) a mixture of abilities and skills. Some kids are destined for great things and a sparkly glittering career, other kids are not so inclined and will take pot luck in wherever they find themselves working.

The chances for adults to be able to train is very important: I always hated the 'fact' that a person had to be of school leaving age to gain an apprenticeship, only to squander the whole thing, ie: getting bored and leaving to do something else OR completing their time and going off to do something different. To be an adult, it seemed impossible to get training in any trade.

I was lucky to get an apprenticeship as a plumber: I was 23 years old at the time and accepted the wage terms without question. I had actually put in for four different trades in the hope of getting one - either that or carry on in my old job and get nowhere fast.

So, make sure adults can get a fair chance at training, and even do

Parents, take responsibility for your children

I FIND it a little shameful that a fifteen-year-old has to send a wake-up call to the Falklands about our youths, and to air our dirty linen in public.

I would like to add to Frances' letter with an announcement: 'Welcome to the year 2005.'

This community is no longer the cosy society of yesteryear. Many things have changed: we have television, the internet for good and bad, working mothers, and a different set of demographics which will be clear to anyone who reads the next set of census statistics.

The major problem is that the 'old' community, and that includes councillors, are either unaware of these changes, or have chosen to ignore them, and sweep under the carpet what is directly under their noses. As everyone knows by experience, ignoring problems does not make them go away.

One would have to deaf, dumb and blind, or never have been on the streets of Stanley on a weekend around 11/12 pm, not to have seen what is happening in this community.

Children as young as nine years old are on the streets of Stanley at this time, many of them drinking, some drunk and many smoking. Weekend 'binge-drinking' is the norm for these children and, in my

opinion, we have a potentially volatile situation on our hands. Any number, up to a group from thirty to eighty children can be gathered about the John Street/Philomel junction at these times. Even in England, that would be called a 'mob'.

Underage sex amongst peers happens, as does underage sex with 'adults', probably alcohol related. I, as a teacher, am aware of this, as must be the police and the hospital.

The police have to 'mop up' the streets, and teachers have to cope with hung-over, tired pupils - not a lot of learning takes place under these conditions. The police and teachers have to deal with the consequences of this behaviour but we are the second line troops.

The primary carers - the legal, primary carers are the parents. Where are the parents of a nine year old when their child is on the streets late at night? Where do the parents imagine that child is or wonder what he is doing? Do they think their children are playing tidywinks?

If parents do not know where or care where their nine, ten or eleven year old child is at 11.30pm at night then they are not fit parents and need classes in parenting.

It has always been the youth of the nation that has had to cope regardless of the time in history and we only have to look back to 1982 when a bunch of bullies, whatever the translation meant then or now, were stopped by the youth of that decade and if or when history were to repeat itself they would be more than capable of doing so again.

I'm proud to be the offspring of Londoners. One of my great grandfathers first came to the Falklands as a paying immigrant in 1842. My Grandfather Allan arrived here from London in 1877. I grew up on tales of life in London.

When I first visited that city in 1952 all five family addresses that I visited in the east end had been razed to the ground by the Luftwaffe Blitz. I just sat and cried. His advice was that time is a good healer, it had helped him and he thought that I would find the same. How right he was. The wounds do heal in time but you never forget, and until the bunch of bullies that orchestrate these atrocities are brought to justice we as individuals and as a nation have got to be vigilant at all times.

Karen Lee of the Falklands Wool Centre said that the idea of this first workshop was to show how it could be done at home without any specialist equipment: "There are many different ways to make felt but in this class we were doing felt in a bowl, so that it only used things you had in the kitchen."

Karen said that the Wool Centre hopes to hold further workshops in the future so this first workshop concentrated on the basics. "It was definitely a beginners class but there were some amazing results," she said.

Fiona Didlick was also present and held a demonstration on how to laminate felt to other materials.

Linda McRae and Ruth Taylor from the Guiding Association also helped out as according to Karen, "they are accomplished felters and



so were of great assistance to all."

At the end of the workshop nearly 30 people had got to grips with the process which Karen describes as a "huge achievement."

Not everything ran smoothly though as amidst the excitement of the felting, the group were oblivious to the hot water urn (crucial to the felting process) producing sufficient amounts of steam to set the smoke alarms off in the Hall.

The group were soon joined by the Fire and Rescue Department and Church Warden Keith Biles who were placated with tea and cake.

The felters would like to thank them for turning out so rapidly and apologise for the false alarm which Karen described as, "all very embarrassing!"

Artist John wins Spinning Wheel Trophy at Sue Whitley exhibition

THE standard of the work in this year's Susan Whitley Memorial Art and Craft Exhibition has been roundly praised by the Headteachers of the Infant and Junior School and Community School (FICS) and by the Camp Education Supervisor.

Alan Purvis, Headteacher of FICS was also impressed with the quality of work and said, "The standard, as usual, was very high and we are grateful to the judges for all their hard work."

Mr Purvis echoed Mr Farrow's

words about the feedback from the public saying, "There was an excellent turnout of visitors on both Saturday and Sunday."

"All three departments had very interesting displays and it was good to see a wide variety of cooking and textiles on show this year."

Camp Education Supervisor Richard Fogerty was keen to stress the amount of work the students put in to the work they display, and the part played by teachers and parents.

He said, "None of this would be possible without the hard work of staff and parents who encourage the students and then find themselves with the task of getting the exhibits to Stanley, undamaged."

tape so that a model, or something equally exotic, can be completed for exhibition."




Introduction to Safeguarding Children – course feedback

AN INTRODUCTION to Safeguarding Children course was held on June 29 at the Chamber of Commerce.

Social Work staff presented the course and the attendees came from a range of disciplines across government as well as members of the community. The day consisted of individual and group exercises and discussion.

The aim of the day was to get people to think about the issues involved in this area, build up their child protection knowledge and personal skills to work with children and young people and recognise when a child / young person or family requires additional support.

The day started with the group defining what is abuse and what is not. They then had some discussion around different scenarios, the aim of which was to get people thinking about when is an incident inappropriate.

Issues relating to age, stage of development and temperament of the child, context of the event, time period and severity of the

event and background issues all affect how an incident is seen: reinforcing the fact that each incident is seen in context and part of a much larger picture.

The day then focused on when a situation needs to be referred on to the social work department and what 'blocks' can prevent people passing on information.

It is likely that there is a possible reluctance to involve a social worker and how some see this as interfering. People were reassured that when someone is referred to the department an assessment is carried out with an aim to support a family rather than splitting them up.

In response to a question of who has responsibility to safeguard children and young people it was made clear that members of the community and government staff were responsible for highlighting areas of concern, knowing when to pass things on and how to promote children's welfare within their service.

However, it is not their responsibility to make a judgement on whether or not a situation is abu-

sive. This is the responsibility of the social services.

Some of the feedback comments made by the attendees included:

- The day had "really opened my eyes"
- The course "acted as a refresher and reiterates the need to not jump to conclusions with out the true facts."
- How it is important to "take a step back, not prejudice and be aware of your own assumptions."
- Gained a "new knowledge of the impact of abuse on children and how this effects them as adults."
- "Gained an awareness of the difference between the public perception of social services involvement and what they actually do".

There will be another opportunity to attend an Introduction to Safeguarding Children course towards the end of the year. In the mean time if anyone is concerned about the welfare of a child then please contact social services on 27296.

Penguins subject of box office hit documentary

ANTARCTIC Emperor penguins have become this year's unlikely Hollywood superstars as the documentary 'March of the Penguins' takes cinemas by storm.

The film, directed by French filmmaker Luc Jacquet, cost a mere £4.5 million to make and is currently outperforming Steven Spielberg's latest £100 million offering 'War of the Worlds' at the box office.

According to the *Mail on Sunday*, the film about the life of the penguins in the harsh Antarctic environment is expected to become the most successful independent film of all time, beating current number one, *Crouching Tiger, Hidden Dragon* which grossed £100 million worldwide.

With the poster tag line, "In the harshest place on Earth, love finds a way," the film follows an Emperor colony for a year, charting their quest to mate and how

they live once this has been accomplished.

Director Luc Jacquet lived with the colony with two other cameramen for 13 months collecting footage at the French Antarctic research station in Adelle.

Jacquet told the *Mail*: "It got to the point where, when it was minus four degrees, it felt like a sunny day. It took me a year to reacclimatise. We all got burned and we all got frostbite. We lived with the penguins and learned to love them. Because there has been a research station in Antarctica for 50 years, the penguins were used to seeing men in orange jump suits.

"The penguins spend so much energy merely staying alive in this place at the edge of existence that they didn't waste any energy on us. A female checked us out during mating season but when she realised we weren't penguins, she headed back off across the ice."

The film's success has been attributed to the emotional attachment the viewer inevitably forms with the birds, coupled with its wide appeal.

One cinema manager in Los Angeles said, "This film is cutting across all demographics: it's a date movie, a young person's movie, an over 45s movie.

"There is one scene where a mother bird begins to wail after discovering her chick is dead. People just sob their hearts out. It is impossible not to put human emotions on to these animals. It is heart-breaking, funny, poignant and a wonderful love story; the sort of movie you just don't see any more."

Time Magazine said, "There is more drama and heartache in 'March of the Penguins' than in most movies that are actually scripted to tug at our feelings."

Soaring oil prices may top US\$61 a barrel

CRUDE oil futures shot up nearly US\$2 to almost US\$61 a barrel on Tuesday, as another storm inflamed fears of more supply snags in the Gulf of Mexico and a major oil company reported damage to a platform in the region.

Traders came to work yesterday to find Tropical Depression 5 had strengthened to become Tropical Storm Emily, churning east of the Windward Islands in the Lesser Antilles. The storm could head toward the Gulf coast, home to a large concentration of US refining and production facilities, by late this week, forecasters said.

Also, an oil and natural gas platform operated by BP PLC in the Gulf was found to have sustained

serious damage that could cut into the company's production for years to come, brokers said yesterday. The platform was set to begin producing in the fourth quarter.

BP confirmed the Thunder Horse deepwater platform, located 240 kilometres southeast of New Orleans, was listing by as much as 30 degrees Monday, but said the cause of the problem was unknown.

Traders said the news alarmed a market already keyed up about supply disruptions in the wake of last weekend's Hurricane Dennis.

Benchmark light, sweet crude futures for August rose as much as US\$1.93 to US\$60.85 a barrel shortly after trading began on the New York Mercantile Exchange.

The contract ended overnight trading at US\$59.76 a barrel.

In London, Brent blend crude futures for August rose as much as US\$1.76 to US\$59.20 a barrel on the International Petroleum Exchange. The rally, which rode hefty gains in gasoline and heating oil futures, brought an end to three consecutive days of losses on the energy complex.

"I think the selling has been aberrational in the last few days," said Scott Meyers, senior trading analyst for New York brokerage Pioneer Futures Inc. "Any pullback is going to be a buying opportunity."

By Saturday, forecasters expect Tropical Storm Emily to reach hurricane force, passing north of Cuba.

Q GIVEN the number of children (ie persons under the age of 18) who are present in town at night, particularly during weekends, firstly, do the police monitor numbers, their age and behaviour (ie smoking and drinking alcohol) and if so, what is this? If any are caught drinking or smoking the relevant action is taken, there are several cases underway at this time. The Attorney General cannot identify a law which would enable parents to be given a criminal caution in these circumstances. The Government is aware of the issues and is exploring what action should be taken."

Q IS IT true that government's Highways Department have on order, mile markers to be used on our track system? If this is true, who authorised this purchase and how much did it cost?

A Roads Engineer Bob Hancox said. "This is not true, no mile markers are on order."

Dissident Cubans remember tugboat tragedy

A GROUP of Cuban dissidents congregated on Havana's seaside boulevard Wednesday to mark the 1994 sinking of a tugboat in Havana Harbour when 37 people were killed as they tried to flee the island.

The demonstration drew immediate reaction from an angry pro-Castro gang whose members insulted and shoved some of the dissidents. Several of the anti-government demonstrators were bundled into an unmarked van and driven off.

Some 30 members of the out-


lawed Republican Popular Party, some wearing black T-shirts, congregated at a spot on the Malecon and prayed before throwing flowers into the sea and shouting, "Freedom for political prisoners."

The sinking of the tugboat *March 13* took place on July 13, 1994, when a group of 68 Cubans captured a state-owned tugboat in an attempt to leave the island and head to the United States. But four larger Dutch built tugboats known as "polargos" trained high-pressure fire hoses on the fleeing vessel and

rammed it repeatedly until it sank into Havana Bay, according to survivors. The Cuban government says the sinking was accidental, while dissidents insist it was deliberate. Of the 68 people who had tried to flee on the tugboat, 37 drowned, including many children.

As the dissidents were preparing to leave a large group from the Union of Communist Youth members moved in and surrounded them, chanting pro-government slogans and waving Cuban flags as foreign journalists watched.

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

'Trail of destruction': man arrested

A MAN was arrested and later released on bail after a "trail of destruction" was created in Stanley this week.

The damage - which is likely to total over £10,000 - is believed by police to be linked to the theft of a vehicle in the early hours of Tuesday morning.


Police discovered the Land Rover abandoned in a ditch to the east of Stanley after it was taken from its owner's home on Callaghan Road.

Later that morning reports were received of damage to several vehicles and of others which had been entered.

Police set up an incident team and several officers were called in from rest periods to provide extra help. A public appeal for assistance generated a considerable response and provided valuable information.

Police say the "trail of destruction" which led into Stanley, was soon identified.

Three vehicles and one building in the Falkland Fresh compound had windows smashed, thirteen vehicles in the vicinity of the FIPASS port had windows and windscreens smashed. Several vehicles in the East Stanley housing development were entered and articles removed, stolen and/or transferred from one vehicle to another. Another car on Callaghan Road, close to where the Land Rover was stolen, was also found with its windows smashed.

Chief Police Officer, Superintendent Dave Morris says the cost of the damage is in excess of £10,000.

At 5.20pm on Tuesday, a man was arrested by police and detained overnight while enquiries continued. He was released on police bail following interview on Wednesday.

Superintendent Morris said, "Items seized from this person, along with footprint casts and glass control samples, were prepared for forensic examination in the United

Kingdom and are being hand carried to the UK by a returning military police officer."

Superintendent Morris said he was grateful to members of the general public who provided information, and urged anyone who may have further information to come forward.

Argentine complaint at London meeting

AN ARGENTINE delegation has objected to the Falkland Islands' proposed new fishery policy which is to be put to Legislative Council next month.

The objection was lodged at a meeting of the South Atlantic Fisheries Council in London, attended by the Falklands Director of Fisheries, Mr John Barton, on July 15.

Mr Barton said this year's meeting was shorter than usual, "as there were no scientific meetings." Despite this, he said, discussions were held on the background and issues surrounding the poor 2005 illex squid season. A commitment to further research on illex and southern blue whiting was agreed.

He said the discussion of fishery policy initiatives was a "significant component" of the meeting but gave no further detail.

However an informed source told *Penguin News* Argentina objects to the concept of property rights - lasting for some 25 years - contained in the policy: "the Argentine government takes the view that as the Falklands belongs to Argentina, the Falkland Islands Government cannot give away rights which they do not possess."

Councillor Richard Cockwell, who holds the fisheries portfolio, said he believed it was "not an easy meeting." He was pleased issues of "common interest" had been addressed, "...although we have yet to see the outcomes from these discussions."

Councillor Cockwell said the Argentine objection to the fishery policy was "not unexpected" and added, "we have to maintain our right to put management or conservation measures in place which are to the benefit of the industry and the Falkland Islands in general."

Councillor Roger Edwards described the protest as, "...just a continuation of the Argentine Government's objection to us actually having the right to fish here. It's a continuation of their claim on the Islands."

Of the proposed new fishery policy, he said he felt some modifications need to be made to the Bill before it is passed: "With a few minor amendments it could be very good for the industry."

Guilty verdicts in longline fishing cases

THE owners of two longline fishing vessels have been found guilty of breaching the conditions of their licences to catch valuable Patagonian toothfish in South Georgia waters.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds delivered the verdicts in the cases against Quark Fishing Ltd and Freiremar AS on Tuesday afternoon; she then adjourned proceedings without issuing penalties.

The verdicts followed a three day trial in late April which was adjourned to allow for legal submissions to be made.

The cases against Quark Fishing Ltd, of which Falklands councillor Mike Summers is Managing Director, and Spanish company Freiremar AS, centred around the activities of two longline fishing vessels, Falklands-flagged *Jacqueline* and Spanish-flagged *Ibsa Quinto*.

Quark Fishing Ltd, as charterer of *Ibsa Quinto*, and Freiremar AS, as owner of the vessel, were charged

with breaching a licence condition granted by the South Georgia Government for last year's toothfish season which limited the vessel's total allowable catch to 300 tonnes.

A further charge was made against Quark that, as owner of *Jacqueline*, they failed to comply with a licence condition relating to the minimisation of incidental seabird mortality in the course of longline fishing.

On July 6, 2004 *Ibsa Quinto* arrived in Stanley for her catch to be weighed, a new licence condition introduced by the Government of South Georgia for the 2004 season. The catch was unloaded and weighed on a pallet weighing system. The total of Patagonian toothfish was calculated to be in excess of 300 tonnes, with the extent of the excess being in dispute between the prosecution and defence.

Giving her judgement in court on Tuesday, Senior Magistrate Clare

Faulds said she found as a fact that the total allowable catch on *Ibsa Quinto*, "...exceeded 315 tonnes and was therefore in excess of both the 300 tonnes permitted under the condition of the fishing licence and the amount that would have been allowed after the application of a 5% margin of tolerance."

She said it was not necessary for the prosecution to prove the exact amount of fish caught in excess of the quota: "If the Crown can bring evidence sufficient to satisfy the Court beyond all reasonable doubt that the permitted quota has been exceeded it is enough. In this instance the Crown has done so."

Jacqueline was boarded and inspected in South Georgia waters on June 6, 2004 by fishery officer Steven Waugh who reported several breaches of conservation measures required to be met by the vessel's toothfish licence.

THE condition of the MPA road, one of the Falklands' longest running sagas and second only to Argentina in raising tempers, is once again topic of the month.

Most would agree the road is of a third-world standard and something really needs to be done about it. But the cost of sealing the surface is staggering. A conservative estimate is around the £15 million mark, not money we can just pluck out of the air, so some sort of financial sacrifice would have to be made.

What would you be willing to see lost? Should we end the holiday credits scheme? Should we start paying for prescriptions and stop sending students to college and university? Should we pay higher taxes? Or should we tap into the Consolidated Fund which, after all, currently stands at around £80 million?

At first this latter option might seem the best.

Then again, we would have to accept that our nest egg, which it is comforting to know is there to prop us up in hard times, would be substantially reduced. If we suffered a worse economic downturn than we have already, we could be in trouble.

I don't pretend to have the answer. I would dearly love to see the MPA road sealed with Tarmac but I honestly can't see how it's possible to afford without substantial financial impact on Falkland Islanders.

Meanwhile, the cynic in me can't help but notice the way the road - which granted, is in a pretty horrific state at the moment - has once again become a hot topic as an election looms only a matter of months away.

I sincerely hope the heightened interest in its state has come about from a genuine concern for public safety, but wonder to what extent the issue may be being used as an electioneering tool.

WHILE conveniently on the subject of elections, I would once again encourage those who are thinking of standing to tell *PN* about it: we in turn can let the electorate know and you can then hear from your voters about the issues that really matter to them.

It would be interesting to know how many more people would consider standing if the position was salaried. I feel it is a great shame that the option of having full-time councillors has been discarded as this undoubtedly reduces the pool of potential candidates.

I believe a large proportion of those who would be prepared to stand (and who would probably make damn good councillors) are prevented from doing so as they would have to give up the security of a full-time job.

The wage would need to be attractive and in these days of strict budgeting, perhaps the public would reject the notion of well paid (and I'm thinking in the region of £40-£45K per annum) councillors.

But the current system only encourages the self-employed or those with very understanding and patient employers to put themselves forward for election, thus limiting the electorate's options.

Coroner: millionaire's Antarctic crevasse death was 'accidental'

A VERDICT of "accidental death" has been recorded at the inquest into the death of a British multimillionaire in Antarctica.

Businessman Stephen Glyn Thomas died on January 13 after he fell into a crevasse while walking with crew from his yacht *Magic Dragon*.

An inquest into his death was opened on January 21 and, after formal identification of his body had been given, the Coroner for the British Antarctic Territory, Clare Faulds, adjourned for further inquiries. The inquest resumed in Stanley on Friday, July 15.

Mr Thomas had travelled to Antarctica on *Magic Dragon* as part of a journey from one end of the world to the other and arrived at Port Lockery on January 12.

He and the four other crew of *Magic Dragon* - Robert Bradfield, Melanie and Chris Smith and Frode Knutsen - visited the British Antarctic Survey (BAS) base at Port Lockery where they took advice about a route for a walk.

They were recommended a route taken the previous day by another group, from the yacht *Tara*; the BAS team leader told Mr Thomas and Mr Bradfield the group should be roped together for the walk as there were "holes out there".

In his statements to the Coroner, Mr Bradfield said he and Mr Thomas looked upon the BAS advice to rope together as given out of caution and treated it lightly; they did not pass it on to the other members of the party. Mr Thomas, as the expedition leader, took the decision for his party not to rope together, apparently considering it unnecessary.

Mrs Faulds commented, "It seems to me that Mr Thomas's decision for his walking party not to be roped together was understandable," given that he had had previous experience of glacier walking and the advice from BAS was not given emphatically. In addition he and Mr Bradfield believed it to be no more than a standard safety warning and Mr Thomas and his companions were to walk the same route as that taken by other apparently unroped walkers, without adverse incident, the previous day.

She continued, "Sadly, on the walk on January 13 the ropes were not put to use as a result of what I believe to have been an innocent error of judgement on Mr Thomas's part made out of a false, as it turned out, sense of security. In the circumstances I make no criticism of BAS or of Mr Thomas."

The crew from *Magic Dragon* set out on their walk at around 3.50pm, carrying some basic safety equipment, including a rope, but they were not roped together.

At about 4.40pm, Mr and Mrs Smith turned back to return to *Magic Dragon*. The others carried on walking, following exactly the same route as that taken by the party of walkers the previous day, for about 40 minutes before turning back.

As they returned Mr Knutsen was leading, Mr Bradfield was in the middle and Mr Thomas at the rear. After some minutes walking Mr Bradfield heard a faint cry and turned to see Mr Thomas up to his armpits in snow.

Mr Bradfield and Mr Knutsen ran

to Mr Thomas and tried to get a rope to him. As they were doing so Mr Thomas disappeared from view, having fallen into a deep crevasse.

Mr Bradfield threw a line, anchored by Mr Knutsen, into the crevasse and felt Mr Thomas tug it and heard him shout for them to pull. After that they heard nothing more from Mr Thomas. They were unable to pull him over the lip of the crevasse and summoned help, by radio, from Mr and Mrs Smith who were by this time back on *Magic Dragon*. They also radioed for help from the BAS base and a shore party from the *MI Orion*.

Mr and Mrs Smith took ropes and other equipment from *Magic Dragon* and went back to Mr Bradfield and Mr Knutsen. Mrs Smith slid on her stomach to the edge of the crevasse from where she could see Mr Thomas about a metre below the surface, suspended on the rope and with his face and body hard up against the ice face which was stained with blood. He did not respond to her calling.

Mr Smith managed to get another two ropes round Mr Thomas but they were still unable to get him out of the crevasse. Mr Smith climbed into the crevasse and, by lifting Mr Thomas at the same time as the others heaved on the ropes, he and the others were able to bring Mr Thomas out of the crevasse. By then it was about 7.30pm.

Mr Thomas was not breathing and no pulse could be found. The party commenced CPR and took advice from the doctor on the *MI Orion* over the radio. They continued CPR as they took Mr Thomas, strapped on a spine board, down to a waiting Zodiac (boat) and transferred him to the infirmary on the *MI Orion*. Dr Zapol carried out an assessment and continued resuscitation attempts. These were unsuccessful and at 9.57pm Mr Thomas was pronounced dead.

During last week's inquest, the Coroner said she was satisfied that Mr Bradfield and Mr Knutsen could have done no more than they did in their attempts to rescue Mr Thomas from the crevasse. "In (pathologist) Dr Hunt's report he states his opinion that the injuries that Mr Thomas sustained were entirely consistent with a fall of about 10 metres onto ice and there was nothing to suggest that he had been the victim of a sustained violent assault."

"Dr Hunt also said that the injuries were so serious that, even assuming normal medical care as available in the UK, Mr Thomas would have been unlikely to survive."

"In other words, despite the efforts made by Mr Bradfield, Mr Knutsen, Mr and Mrs Smith, Dr Zapol and the several others who gave help, his life could not be saved."

After returning her verdict of accidental death/misadventure, Mrs Faulds offered her condolences to Mr Thomas's widow and teenage son, "...and to their wider family and friends."

She added her thanks to the people who had assisted with her inquiry, "...particularly Mr Bradfield and the crew from the *Magic Dragon*, Dr Hunt and DC Jon Butler."

Guilty plea to assault charge

A STANLEY man has had his case adjourned after he pleaded guilty to a charge of assault by beating.

Gary McGill was alleged to have punched his former partner, Cara McGill on June 19.

Mr McGill had been looking after the couple's son while Ms McGill had been out. When she returned home, Mr McGill became agitated and, according to Principal Crown Counsel Melanie Chilton, "punched her in the stomach with a clenched fist."

Ian Warburton defending said that although Mr McGill had consumed up to fifteen bottles of beer that evening, "he didn't feel particularly drunk." He did concede however that, "alcohol was a factor that night."

The defendant also claimed he

Suspended sentence for banned driver

JUST two months after losing his licence, Fijian soldier, Apsalome Nawaqabuli of 460 Port Troop at Mare Harbour pleaded guilty this week to four driving offences of driving while disqualified, driving without insurance, speeding and driving without due care and attention.

Mr Nawaqabuli lost his licence in May for driving under the influence of alcohol.

The court heard that on June 24 he took a vehicle assigned to his unit and went to get something to eat. He was then seen speeding by military police who followed him.

Ian Warburton defending said his client, "...saw the police and simply

was provoked although Mr Warburton admitted, "provocation is not an excuse."

Mrs Faulds adjourned the case to allow a pre-sentence report to be prepared as she said, "We need to look at what we can do to make this separated family work without ending up in fisticuffs."

Sentencing will take place on September 7.

Also in court on Wednesday, Mr Brian Williams of Stanley pleaded not guilty to three sexual offence charges.

Because of the nature of the case, Principal Crown Counsel Melanie Chilton requested evidence be given by 'live link'.

Senior Magistrate Mrs Claire Faulds agreed and set Mr Williams' trial date for September 26.

Mr Warburton informed the court that it was the intention of his client's employers to send him back to the UK as soon as possible and that it was, "fair to say" his military career could be at an end.

For the charge of driving while disqualified, Senior Magistrate Claire Faulds sentenced Mr Nawaqabuli to two months imprisonment, suspended for two years. He was fined £350 for each charge of driving without insurance and driving without due care and attention, £100 for speeding and ordered to pay £100 court costs.

Falklands Fresh: mussels are off the menu

FALKLANDS oysters and mussels are off the menu, after routine shellfish testing showed positive results for Paralytic Shellfish Poisoning (PSP).

Mussels and oysters were immediately taken off sale in Stanley and an announcement was put over the radio to inform the general public not to eat the products.

This quick decision was made possible by the testing programme sea food processor Falklands Fresh has in place. As well as a shellfish testing programme that complies with EU specifications for the areas where oysters and mussels are currently farmed at Darwin and Goose Green, constant testing is also carried out at the Fisheries Department and can take as little as half an hour to get results. "Therefore if a 'positive' test is found, the produce can be withdrawn from sale extremely quickly.

Simon Hardcastle of Falklands Fresh said, "Shellfish poisoning can occur in bivalves when the concentration of a toxic algae species exceeds certain levels.

"Algae can multiply very quickly and therefore to keep a monitor on these levels many tests are performed to make sure that the product put one sale is safe to eat."

Falklands Fresh are currently waiting for the results from a mandatory EU test from Santiago for PSP and need two clear negative results before the oysters and mussels can go back on sale.

Mr Hardcastle says although toxic algae blooms are rare, "...Falklands Fresh are taking no risks and will wait for the official results before shellfish are put back on sale. It is currently advised that no fresh shellfish should be taken to eat from the Darwin and Goose Green areas until further notice."

Guilty verdicts in longline fishing cases

Mrs Faulds said she was satisfied "beyond any reasonable doubt" that several of the streamers on the *Jacqueline's* bird scaring line - used to reduce seabird mortality - did not comply with the terms of the Conservation Measure and, therefore, breached a licence condition.

She was not satisfied, however, that the vessel had failed to comply with a measure regarding the discharge of offal and said, "I do not find any breach of the terms governing the discharge of offal to have been proved."

During the April trial, defence counsel Fergus Randolph referred to evidence given by Mr Waugh that vessels other than *Jacqueline* had been in breach in 2004 but had not been prosecuted. He argued that for the Court to allow the Crown to succeed in a prosecution would, in the circumstances be unfair and the defendants should, therefore, be acquitted of all charges.

The Senior Magistrate said, having decided that breaches of the licence condition had been proved in respect of the bird scaring streamers, but not in respect of the discharge of offal, she then considered whether the streamers breaches were sufficient to justify prosecution.

She explained, "...section 5 of the Fisheries Ordinance creates strict liability offences and offers

no statutory defences. I look then at the nature of the mischief at which the provisions of the Ordinance are aimed and whether the imposition of strict liability will tend to suppress that mischief.

"The Ordinance is aimed at marine conservation and the conditions attached to the licence issued under it by the Director of Fisheries for the Government of South Georgia specifically import the terms of Conservation Measure 25-02 (2003) whose full title includes the words 'Minimisation of incidental mortality of seabirds in the course of longline fishing or longline fishing research in the Conservation Area'. Any but the most minor breach of the terms of the Conservation Measure would inhibit or frustrate the aims. Strict liability for an offence under the Ordinance is, therefore, appropriate."

Mrs Faulds said she took the view that if the Government of South Georgia were obliged, "for fairness and natural justice" to use discretion and apply a margin of tolerance before any prosecution for a breach of licence, "...the margin had, in effect, been used up by *Jacqueline* by the time of Mr Waugh's inspection on June 6, 2004."

Therefore she said, she did not accept the defence's submission that it was appropriate to acquit: "I find the charge proved."

Ward improvements ahead of schedule

WORK on a new ward and improvements to the existing wards at the hospital may finish a few weeks ahead of schedule.

The new elderly care unit has been completed and now, hospital administrator Candy Blackley said, contractors are "working on tidying the rest of the ward up."

Councillor Jan Cheek said she had spoken to some of the elderly hospital residents and they seemed "very comfortable" in their new unit.

The Health Services Committee also heard there has been a significant improvement in the supply of drugs at the hospital.

The new Director of Health, Nikki Osborne, said while some problems - which mean a small number

of patients were running low of medication - remain, the situation has "significantly improved" in recent weeks. She added that the hospital is continuing to work at making further improvements, solving all problems with drug shortages.

At Tuesday's meeting, Ms Osborne also said the number of available GP and dental appointments has grown. She said there are "plenty" of GP appointments available while the dental staff is progressing well through its backlog of appointments. Councillor Cheek confirmed that she had received pleasing calls from people who had been happy to get appointments and had had "good service".

Promotional carrier bag 'needs further discussion'

A PROMOTIONAL carrier bag intended to double up as a mobile advert for Falkland Islands wool met with mixed reactions from the board of the Falkland Islands Development Corporation (FIDC).

Following the Craft Producers Scheme initiated by FIDC which assists producers with the cost of upgrading their packaging and labelling, producers felt that a good quality, eye catching carrier bag was needed. The idea was developed into a model and the finished product is planned to be made of high quality gloss laminated paper with a polyester silk rope handle.

A report put before the board said that initially it was planned that the bags should be printed by FIDC and supplied free of charge to retailers

as part of the campaign to promote Falkland Islands wool produce. Due to costs being higher than anticipated it was thought a charge to offset the £13,000 for 5,000 large bags (£1.70 each) and 2,500 medium bags (£1.55 each) should be made.

Councillor Cockwell said he was keen on the concept but not on the design, "too glossy, too High Street" and, "...doesn't suggest clean and green," were his comments.

Keith Biles thought it was a very expensive give-away while Connie Stevens said the highest cost she had ever encountered for a similar order was £3,000.

The board agreed that the design should go back to the producers for further discussion.



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Your questions answered

Q HOW much money has been spent on resurfacing the MPA road with materials from the Port Harriet area in the last financial year and how much have councillors allocated for the same project in this financial year?

Secondly, when is it expected to finish the seemingly long forgotten East Falkland roads by replacing the remaining gates with cattle grids?

A Roads Engineer Bob Hancox provided the following response. Last financial year we spent £131,780 on capping the MPA road with Port Harriet material. This year's allocation for capping is £100,000.

There is an ongoing requirement for cattle grids which has not been forgotten, either East or West. Discussion is ongoing with some farmers investigating the possibility of putting up some additional fencing instead of installing cattle grids. There are quite a number of grids outstanding at present which at the current rate of installation will take around five years to complete. Notable areas on East Falkland with gates on roads at present are as follows: Goose Green bypass, Newhaven, Rincon Grande, Johnsons Harbour, Wreck Point and the Murrell.

Q What is the annual wage bill of the MPA road gang and what is the cost of machinery maintenance for the same gang for the year?

Mussel farming development will continue

BLOCK budget approval was sought in seven areas, totalling £493,000 at the Falkland Islands Development Board Meeting on Tuesday. Approval was granted for all but one project.

The sum of £418,500 was approved for administration central costs; £15,000 for FalklandIslands.com; £23,000 for the maintenance of commercial assets; £3,000 for the maintenance of rural assets; £10,000 for the dairy and £10,000 for Small Business Development.

The sum of £14,000 for local craft development was deferred as a block sum but small sums can be used for individual initiatives in this area.

Approval of £25,000 for FIMCo to use for the development of the local meat market was deferred to go before the Standing Finance Committee. The funds were sought for a refrigerated delivery truck, multideck refrigeration space, labelling, equipment for the automation of mince and sausage production and promotions.

The board also heard during General Manager Julian Morris' report that mussel farming development will continue, led by those who find the returns, "sufficiently

A Mr Hancox replied: This is not the easiest of queries to answer as there is not a dedicated gang that works on the MPA road. The maintenance of this road comes together with that of all other unsurfaced roads, both East and West, staff are directed to whichever area requires treatment on a priority basis.

It is a similar answer for the machinery maintenance. The cost of running each item of plant is recorded by the Plant and Vehicle workshop but the individual hours on any particular section of road by any particular item is not.

Q At a time when the MPA Road is not at its best and with the aim of road safety, will FIG consider placing a standpipe and hose somewhere on the water main near the Sapper Hill Tanks access road to enable motorists to wash off windows and mirrors prior to driving in to Stanley? Or maybe provide free use of the commercial car wash facility?

A Director of Public Works, Manfred Keenleyside said; "Having given this some thought, and discussed with others, the answer is no.

The need or desire to clean vehicles after journeys made both on and off public highways is not new and has previously been addressed by individuals and the private sector and it is not considered that this should change.


attractive, the risks acceptable and have the financial resources to invest."

Mr Morris said it was established at the last meeting of the development group that there was a small group interested in investing now and scaling up existing operations and a larger group who wanted further work undertaken i.e. a business plan and a red tide study. He said that while FIDC were happy to jointly finance a business plan there was not sufficient financial commitment from that group.

The incremental approach adopted utilising existing expertise and processing facilities has many advantages, said Mr Morris, particularly in reducing the scale of initial investment and risk. Other members of the seafood sector may invest as the prospects of mussels become more definite.

Following a decision by Executive Council not to employ a Port Development Officer but to utilise local companies with an interest, port operations are to be developed with Byron McKay. Chairman of the board Councillor Mike Summers said they would expect to hear from Julian Morris or the Chief Executive where this strategy is heading by the next board meeting.

Shipping users less than happy



A COASTAL Shipping Users group is to be established to smooth out what were referred to as "the general grouses" that occur. Wool collection is high on the list of issues to be addressed.

Newly elected Chairman of the Rural Business Association, (RBA) Riki Evans, is to take the lead and put a group together as soon as possible, with the aim to meeting within the next couple of weeks with management and crew from Island Shipping who supply a coastal shipping service.

West Falkland farmer Myles Lee is less than happy with the service he is receiving at present, saying that it was stressed last year that communication between the company and users was the problem. He said it is "now worse" with "no progress having been made at all."

Problems experienced by farmers include not knowing when *Tamar F1* will arrive at their port, particularly when large numbers of sheep are being shipped: the ship not being aware of how many bales of wool are

being shipped and slippage in voyages.

One farmer said she had decided to disregard any information received, "unless it came from the skipper." A further concern was the "uncertainty of the ship's next visit," with regard to quantities of fuel and supplies to order.

Former RBA Chairman Paul Robertson said that following a survey conducted last year there was a clear message sent back to Island Shipping that users were, "happy with the crew" however 80% felt the administration was a "shambles." He added, "every voyage is a bit of a drama."

Manager of Island Shipping Ltd. Captain Ian Wilkinson said that he had received few complaints and that he would need to know specifics to follow things up and find out if the ship is "covering up."

Suggestions to improve the service included a more effective use of e-mail to the ship and the drawing up of a customer charter.

Islands attractive as wilderness destination

ONLY slightly more than half of the bed spaces available to tourists in the Falklands are of a standard suitable for international visitors, Director of Tourism, Connie Stevens revealed during a discussion with farmers last week.

Mrs Stevens said of the 407 bed spaces in the Islands only 240 are of an internationally acceptable standard that tour operators would be happy to put international visitors in to.

Farmers heard however that there are many ways to become involved in tourism apart from providing international standard accommodation. Mrs Stevens said that

there is the possibility of farm holidays, where people would want to see the everyday workings of a farm and in some cases help out, as well as the attraction of the Falklands as a 'wilderness destination' which is extremely attractive to painters, photographers, birders and walkers.

In an effort to determine the annual income from tourism in the Falklands Mrs Stevens said that a confidential questionnaire would be sent to everyone involved in the industry. At present there are no figures available and only a 'crude guess' would estimate the total income as £2.8 million.

Falklands shooters are on target at Bisley

THE full bore rifle shooting competitions are now in progress at the Bisley Ranges in Surrey.

Representing the Islands are Ken Aldridge, Gareth Goodwin, Chris McCallum, Ron Betts, Christian Bernsen and Derek Goodwin.

Rifle Club Sweepstake Secretary, Gerlad Cheek said such a large team attending Bisley was made possible by the, "extreme generosity of FIC Ltd who provided return passage funds for the five shooters, not forgetting the continued support from

all the punters in our sweepstake."

Shooting conditions are reported to be tricky especially at the longer ranges where eight minute wind changes have been noted with temperatures in the mid thirties.

In the first of the team events shot over 900 and 1000 yards, the team of Ken, Gareth, Ron and Chris came out third out of seven teams who took part. A full report will be published in next week's *Penguin News*.

Onus on airstrip safety regardless of budget cuts

AIRSTRIP licensees and users are being asked to become more pro-active with airstrip maintenance following recent cuts in the budget.

Director of Civil Aviation, Andrew Newman, explained that cuts in the airstrip maintenance

budget from £20,000 to £7,000 this year with a further reduction to £5,000 next year has prompted his request. He said the onus is on airstrips being safe regardless of whether the licensee or the main user undertakes the maintenance.

Teachers support 'bullied' pupils

ALL Education Department staff are concerned about inferences being made regarding "bullying".

The Community School has recently been inspected and a report published. As well as the quality of teaching and learning, the effectiveness of policies and procedures are also scrutinised. If "bullying" has been an issue at the Community School or our procedures for dealing with incidents between students, (which are inevitable), were not satisfactory it would have been highlighted in the report.

In a small community with one secondary school it is almost certain that the students who exhibited the appalling behaviour towards Frances Douse are members of the Community School and should be thoroughly ashamed of themselves. The inference that this behaviour was carried out at school shows how little thought has been given to the general behaviour/attitude of school age children in and around Stanley or the support that Frances may have received from staff.

For the record as soon as we were made aware of what was happening to Frances in the community we acted quickly in order to try and ensure that the same behaviour was not being repeated inside school. Mrs Adams-Leach also provided Frances with significant support during this time and we also had helpful discussions with Sgt Roberts about this and other concerns about student behaviour outside school.

I have been teaching here since 1987. Stanley has changed and the attitudes of some students and some

parents have changed. Education is no longer seen as important by a significant minority of students and this is reflected in their attitude to learning and behaviour towards each other. The apparent freedom to do as they please outside school means that students resent the boundaries that we expect to be observed. Are the values we promote at school at odds with the values of a sizeable proportion of the community?

We have a lot of good students as well as supportive parents and school managers. We do our best to promote high expectations of both achievement and behaviour including respect towards others. However, attitudes brought into school reflect what is happening out of school. There are issues that need to be identified and addressed by this community. Putting sticking plasters over the symptoms or pointing the finger at the education system will not solve anything.

Campaign for sealing of 'dangerous and disgraceful' road

DANGEROUS, disgraceful and disgusting are some of the adjectives used to describe the current state of the 40 kilometre unsurfaced stretches of the infamous Stanley to MPA road.

A description I heartily endorse, so - as the people who should be listening, noting and doing something about this sorry state of affairs have somehow neglected to do so in the past and in all probability will continue to not address the issue in the future, I have taken it upon myself to kick start a public campaign to have the entire unsurfaced areas black-topped or concreted.

First, let us reflect on the history of the road. It was constructed in conjunction with the MPA complex almost twenty years ago at the expense of the United Kingdom Government. Designed by John Laing Construction Ltd design and development centre, to parameters set by the Public Service Agency, the all-weather road covered 30 km of green field construction from the MPA site, followed by 20 km upgrading the existing PWD road into Stanley.

The design was based on 500,000 cumulative number of standard axles with a design speed of 60 km/h with a maximum gradient of 7%. The design made maximum use of local materials and is economical in both horizontal and vertical alignments. All peat and unsuitable material was excavated from the base of the entire 50 km road and back-filled with rock followed by a 300 mm rock capping layer.

The 40 km of unsealed surface had a further (minimum) 120 mm of quartzite crusher run (40 mm down) and a final running surface 8.52 metres wide of 50 mm tillite crusher run (40 mm down).

The 10 km sealed surface on steep grades only had the same base and 300 mm rock capping layer but followed by 8 metre wide 150 mm wet-mix macadam (40 mm down) with two coats of surface dressing (10 mm and 14 mm).

When the road was constructed I was a United Kingdom tax payer working in England for the construction industry and, thinking that the MoD had been skimping on the budget, made representation in London asking why the entire 50 km was not being sealed. To my amazement I was told that that had been

the plan but Governor Hunt and Falkland councillors had decided that it was not necessary. I found it difficult to believe that the MoD would allow interference on any of their projects but if that was the truth the reasoning could be found by researching the Legislative and Executive Council minutes of that time. The total cost to construct the road was, I believe, 12 million pounds.

At the end of the construction period, the road was handed over to the Falkland Islands Government and since that time it has been graded, rolled and repaired continuously by the Public Works Department with ever increasing amounts of crushed quartzite being spread on to the surface as the years went by which has increased the general width of the road significantly.

Also as the years passed, so did the size and number of the dreaded potholes. This year has seen a change of tactic in the form of a much softer stone being dug out of burro pits, crushed and applied to the road surface. Unfortunately this form of capping turns into clay slurry when wet which makes driving extremely hazardous; when dry it is smoother but potholes appear at a much faster rate resembling a moon-escape within a month.

Approximately eight years ago the original black topped area was re-laid (overlaid) and is still in relatively good condition today. At the same time, several kilometres of the unsurfaced road was black-topped but after a couple of years it began to deteriorate so much that a concerned PWD management ordered the entire surface to be taken off and dumped.

The general public has expressed concern over the state of the road surface for many years. They are now beginning to get angry and in particular suggesting the councillors are not listening; a view I do not necessarily subscribe to, but by way of my campaign I hope to be able to convey the feelings of the public to both present and prospective future councillors.

It is so easy to point the finger of blame at councillors but we have a civil service that are paid to administer our country's needs and assets. That road is a major asset. If it has been neglected the blame should be placed with the Director of Public Works who in turn is directly re-

sponsible to the Chief Executive. If, on the other hand, councillors have been made aware then obviously the ball is in their court.

It was because of questions asked at a public meeting in June expressing concerns about the road that PWD Roads Engineer Bob Hancox made a radio announcement on the morning on Thursday June 23 inviting any member of the public concerned or interested in the present state of the road to meet with him at Bonner's Car Wash at 2pm that same afternoon. He would accompany them along the road to view and discuss the issue.

Due to the short notice, and possibly the atrocious weather conditions, only four individuals took up his offer - Councillor Roger Edwards, Paul Bonner, Andrew Alazia and myself.

One of the prospective candidates for the next general election, Dr Andrea Clausen, and a number of other interested road users did not make the visit due to the late notice of the start time. They did however, express their strong feelings about the matter and said that the time was long overdue for the entire road surface to be sealed.

Bob drove the four of us out along the mainly frozen road where we observed the numerous potholes in the sections only graded and rolled a few months previously, and the frozen tram rail shapes of frozen clay with some thawed out areas of pure slurry. Driving down the black-topped section as far as Van Tan, we stopped and examined the chip and spray of the original black-top and the overlaid portion. Bob was asked many questions which he answered frankly and unreservedly, some of which I shall relate but we all agreed that the only solution was to have the entire surface sealed.

To give Councillor Edwards credit, although he expressed concern over where the funding would come from, he promised that he would bring the subject up at the next PWD Committee meeting. He would ask for an estimate based on the information given by Bob that PWD already have all the basic plant and equipment to carry out the black-topping in house; and that he as the Roads Engineer would take the responsibility himself thus alleviating the necessity to employ outside contractors and consultants.

Bob's only prerequisite was a replacement of thermal backs for the Tarmac vehicles and possibly a replacement Blaw Knox or similar black-top paver.

When asked where he considered the best location for the Tarmac spot-mix machine, he had no hesitation in saying at the quarry site - but he did have reservations as to whether the present machine would withstand being re-sited.

When asked why the Tarmac laid in recent years had deteriorated so quickly resulting in it all having been taken up and disposed of, he responded by saying that the road surface had not been prepared adequately and that the tar was applied too thinly. This was substantiated by Andrew, who, as one of the black-top gang that had laid it, said they had been instructed by the Deputy Director of PWD to lay it on thin to make it go further!

Bob also suggested that he would be prepared to be sent to Chile together with his foreman to have first hand instruction on black-top capping as practised in our part of the world.

Another surprise for me was that all of the tar imports have to be placed through Stanley Services as it constitutes a petroleum product! The mind boggles.

I have heard individuals talking about the very high costs to surface this road of 12 to 19 million pounds but I would suggest that this is a load of rubbish. We are only talking about topping and it's not exactly rocket science to carry that out but whatever the cost we should allow our councillors to take it from our reserves which will be more than repaid with offsetting the recurrent annual cost maintenance costs. We owe it to our military garrison, the tourist industry, bus, coach and taxi services as well as haulage contractors and the public in general to have a safe and sound road to service the gateway to our nation.

What I would suggest now is that every person who believes that the road needs to be black-topped or concreted as a matter of urgency, contact me, giving your name and address either by writing to me or fax or email, and I shall make sure that your wishes are relayed to councillors.

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'Best we can do' says Roads Engineer of MPA road

IT HAS recently been described as 'disgraceful' and likened to a 'war zone' but what does the man with responsibility for the Mount Pleasant Road have to say in response to the criticisms levelled at him and his department?

Penguin News took a trip on the road with Roads Engineer Bob Hancox to find out.

The main aspect of the road that has recently attracted criticism is the laying of the brown tillite material on the surface as opposed to the grey quartzite material previously used and which still remains on some sections.

It is this tillite material which becomes slushy and causes vehicles to become covered in mud. Mr Hancox however, believes that rather than performing worse, the tillite material is the more favourable option and that "it is not all failing and turning to slush and, in fact, the very worst areas of the MPA road are areas that are made out of the quartzite rock."

Sapper Hill is the first part of the road where the tillite material is used which Mr Hancox said, "behaved very well last winter but this winter is not performing quite as well as we had hoped." Although he admitted it was "rutting in places", he maintains that it is, "still not too bad to drive on at the moment."

When asked why there is a difference in performance between this year and last, Mr Hancox believes that after a prolonged period of ground freezing, once thawed the surface had no opportunity to dry

out, "so it has remained saturated." Mr Hancox said that quartzite could be added to the tillite to help it drain but that it would need, "an enormous quantity of it," so, "we've ruled that out apart from areas where we have particularly significant problems."

To illustrate the difference in performance between tillite and quartzite, we were taken to two sections that had been capped with the quartzite material: the Pony's Pass bypass which is badly potholed and the area just past Fitzroy Ridge which Mr Hancox described as having, "rapid formation of pot holes and significant rutting in the road" which was causing "the vehicle to be dragged around a little bit." Mr Hancox also said the quartzite material doesn't perform particularly well in the summer either, "because it produces marbles."

Mr Hancox believes that all year round, "the tillite will actually outperform the quartzite as well as being at a lesser cost."

The difference in cost is significant as according to Mr Hancox, "...the tillite material is approximately one third of the cost of the quartzite to produce, which will be a major saving in maintaining the road long-term if we don't seal it."

The idea of sealing the road is of course an option that most, if not all road users, would like to see happen. As Mr Hancox said, "Unfortunately there isn't really any ideal solution for any section of the road apart from sealing it in its entirety."

When asked if it was in fact possible to seal the road with a Tarmac

surface, Mr Hancox replied, "Technically it's perfectly feasible. The big question is, whether we can actually afford to fund such an operation." He said it would cost a "phenomenal amount of money."

When pressed about the cost of sealing the road, Mr Hancox said that he was, at the behest of the Public Works Committee, currently producing an up to date quote for this. However, he did say, "Just as an indication, to resurface the section of Sapper Hill road from the Power Station to the triangle (where the road joins the MPA road) and part of the Airport Road from the FIPASS junction to Eliza Cove Road, just those two small sections alone of resurfacing are going to cost at least three quarters of a million pounds."

"So if you try to pro rata that on to 36 kilometres of (currently unsealed) MPA road you're looking at an awful lot of money."

The most recent estimate, produced by Morrisons (Falklands) Ltd in 2001, puts the cost at somewhere between, "ten and sixteen million pounds" according to the Director of Public Works, Manfred Keenleyside.

Mr Hancox said the single most expensive element of any surfacing operation would be the sub-base that would be laid under the final seal, and a lot of work and materials would be required to get the road back into a suitable condition for it to be sealed.

Without the road being sealed, many people are concerned conditions on it will get progressively worse with every winter. Mr Hancox

however claims, "It will not get worse and worse but will stay at its current level which isn't particularly pleasant to drive on."

"We'll never stop the road becoming muddy, slushy and dirty in the wet, it's just not possible with an unsealed road with the materials that we have to hand."

It has been suggested that the road could be surfaced over a longer period of time by doing a certain amount each year. Mr Hancox says this would be "possible" but is a matter for Legislative Council to decide upon. He also points out that 36 kilometres of the 50 are still unsealed and that surfacing at a rate of two kilometres per year, it would take 18 years to complete.

Given that expense is the only restriction in surfacing the road, Mr Hancox was asked what the current cost is of simply maintaining the road in its present form and whether that will grow as time goes on.

"Once it's been re-gravelled, the cost of maintaining it should stay at a fairly stable rate which we have calculated to be around £180,000 to £190,000 a year."

Finally, Mr Hancox was asked whether his ideal solution would be to cap the entire road in the tillite material.

"It's not my ideal," he said, "but it's the best I feel we can do at the moment given the current budgetary constraints."

The ideal would be to seal the whole road, preferably with Tarmac but if we can't afford to do that, then I firmly believe the next best option is to cap the road with the tillite material."

News from the Planning and Building Committee meeting

A NUMBER of planning applications were considered last Thursday at the Planning and Building Committee meeting, and several other outstanding issues resolved.

The Environmental Planning Officer (EPO), Dominique Giudicelli, reported that the ditches at Stanley Racecourse were now filled in and there had been no more complaints of flooding on Jeremy Moore Avenue. She concluded that the matter had now been dealt with satisfactorily.

There being no applications for planning permission deferred at previous meetings of the Committee, members moved on to consider the first of fourteen new submissions seeking such consent. This was for a dwelling on land at the rear of 15 Brandon Road for Gail and Richard Rodgers where outline planning permission had previously been granted. Detailed plans were now before the Committee and it was agreed to grant conditional planning permission.

Such permission was also granted for the following developments: a dwelling for Nevin Middleton at 14 Hansen Hill; another at 10 Hansen Hill for Caroline Cotter; an extension to their mini-mart (K2) at Plots 5 and 6 on Lookout Industrial Estate for Kelper Stores Limited; a garage for Keith and Avril Bonner

at their house at 4 Felton Court; the temporary siting of a bus used as tea-rooms at Gypsy Cove Car Park for Paz Blyth; the omission of an approved link between houses to form separate dwellings at 2 Allardyce Street for Gerald Dixon; and the creation of a timber-framed enclosure to house a fish tank for CFL Fortuna Fish Farming Limited to be located on the south-east barge of FIPASS.

Bruce Miller submitted plans for major works involving an extension and alterations to the building previously known as Dolphin's Guest House at 46 John Street. This had been discussed at an earlier meeting of the Historic Buildings Committee and it was agreed that conditional planning permission should be granted.

Outline planning permission was granted to The Gift Shop Limited for works at 34 and 36 Ross Road involving the demolition of out-buildings and extension to the shop and flat, also the creation of twelve off-street parking spaces. Such permission in principle was also granted to Mike Rendell who applied to extend the existing dwelling at 5 Moody Street and to erect a new dwelling to the north of that property with the provision of driveways to both.

Although an objection had been received from a member of the public, it was resolved to grant condi-

tional planning permission to Alex Jaffray to extend his dog kennels located on Murray Heights. However, this decision is to be re-examined in the light of further information received and will be considered at the meeting to be held on September 3.

Just one submission for planning permission was deferred at the meeting. Mrs Dianne Turner had sought outline planning permission to erect a dwelling on land south of the Murray Heights Mobile Home Park. Members felt there was the need to clarify what was proposed for the whole of the site, which currently has a large number of derelict buildings and vehicles stored there, and the EPO was asked to discuss this with the applicant and report back to the next meeting.

The last application to be considered, which was for planning permission to erect a shed for storage at the Stanley Arms on John Biscoe Road for Kelper Stores Limited, was withdrawn prior to the meeting.

Next on the agenda were nine applications for a building permit, all of which were related to those submissions which had earlier received detailed planning permission. These were, however, to be deferred pending the arrival of the new Building Adviser, Alan Dawson, who is due to arrive in the Islands on July 20.

There was one application for

an off-street parking grant, but here it seemed that funds still available were reserved for agreed schemes and members decided that checks would be made by the Chair before considering this further.

Committee member Mike McLeod wrote to the Secretary, Fiona Wallace, with the next item in which he referred to a number of MoD abandoned installations and asked that the issue be raised at the meeting. He said that the MoD had built a number of communication sites on the Islands which they no longer required and had left them, he felt, in an unsatisfactory state with masts, containers and oil-spills. It was agreed to bring this matter to the attention of the Chief Executive on his return, but in the meantime efforts would be made to identify the sites being referred to.

The EPO then reported on her discussions with Roger Spink of the Falkland Islands Company Limited and the builder, Buster Summers, over a reserved matter relating to landscaping with car parking at the flats being built for that company on Hebe Street. A satisfactory conclusion had been achieved and members agreed to accept her findings.

The date of the next meeting was then discussed and, as mentioned above, it was agreed it would be held on September 8, to commence at 9am in the Liberation Room of The Secretariat.

'Cool Kelper' claims the Governor's Cup

Nostalgic exhibition marks 10 years of Shackleton Fund

AN EXHIBITION of images which capture the Falklands of the 1960s has opened in Stanley.

In the summer of 1968-69, Swedish photographer Sven Gillsäter, accompanied by his wife Harriet and their two year old son Björn, spent six months capturing every day life in the Islands.

Sven began his career as a sports photographer for a leading Swedish newspaper, and soon developed an interest in nature photography and indigenous peoples. He travelled the world as a freelance photographer taking the pictures that brought his wide acclaim.

In the summer of 1968/69 he was on an assignment by Swedish Television and his Falklands stay resulted in several television documentaries, a book - *Pingviner i vind* (Penguins in the wind) - and a rich collection of slides, a selection of which are now on display in the Jetty Visitor Centre.

Welcoming guests to a reception to mark the opening of the exhibition on Thursday, July 14, His Excellency the Governor, Mr Howard Pearce, said once the exhibition closes the images will be do-

ated to the Falkland Islands Archives and later displayed in the museum.

He said the exhibition was also a commemoration of the 10th anniversary of the Shackleton Scholarship Fund. Since its conception, the Fund has raised more than £400,000 and awarded from its income some 50 scholarships, with grants totalling about £20,000 each year.

Mr Pearce explained there are two types of scholarships awarded by the fund: academic and 'quality of life'.

The academic scholarships have included work in a range of fields, "from stone runs to spiders, pilot whales and volcanic ash," while the 'quality of life scholarships' have "embraced everything from hand-bells to horse whisperers and Hank Wangford and the Lost Cowboys."

He thanked the current and past committee members of the fund, both in London and in the Falklands who he said, "...work very hard" and the scholars who, "over the years have put in the effort, imagination and hard work into producing a valuable range of projects."

Get your preschoolers in the kitchen

SOME parents are reluctant to let their young children loose in the kitchen fearing that the only result will be a huge mess.

However cooking is a highly educational activity and helps children develop important language and cognitive, social, emotional and sensory motor as well as practical skills.

Children as young as two can begin to work with you in the kitchen. They may not be able to do everything themselves at that age but it is easy to find little jobs for them. If you let them help, you will be surprised at how quickly they learn new skills.

Cooking with mum or dad helps children develop social - emotional skills. They learn about taking turns and sharing and the rewards of trying new experiences. They learn how to do more for themselves and to become increasingly independent, to start an activity and carry it through till there is a finished product. Young children love producing a useful result and the feeling of competence and mastery of 'grownup' activity.

By its very nature, cooking involves sensory stimulation and helps to develop children's fine motor skills. Children learn about texture and the different feel of different ingredients i.e. flour and salt. As they experience different tastes and textures it is natural to talk about them so your child learns new descriptive words: wet, dry, smooth, lumpy, thick, thin, slippery, greasy.

They also practice and perfect the fine motor coordination to perform the physical actions of cooking - pouring, stirring, cutting, spreading and using implements such

as knives and spoons. With a little exposure and practice you will be surprised at how skilled young hands can be at cracking eggs without getting shells in the bowl.

Of course for young children and the young at heart - spoons and fingers find their way to mouths so children learn about different types of taste - sweet, salty, spicy as well as temperature, hot and cold.

Cooking is one of the most versatile activities to teach language and mathematical, scientific concepts that I can think of. Even for very young children, emphasise the names of everything and the words for the actions you perform.

Talk about sequence, first, then, next, before, after, at the end. Talk about number and quantity, one two three, a little, more, lots, too much, not enough, half, full, empty, all gone, some, one more, no more. Describe - dry, wet, fluffy, sticky, stringy.

Children learn by doing and cooking is a wonderful way for children to develop spatial, comparative and quantitative concepts. How big? How many? How much? How hot? How long?

Cooking activities help children learn to follow directions and even if they can't read yet - they see you reading the instructions and internalise that reading is a useful skill.

How can you make cooking with your child fun, safe and educational?

Set up a working space for your child - you might need a sturdy stool for him to reach the counter - arrange your kitchen so that the tools and ingredients you need are close at hand. If possible store them in places that your child can get to so

he can get them out and put them away by himself.

Involve your child in all aspects of the process of cooking from the choosing of the recipe, shopping, and in the setting up of the ingredients and utensils, the making and cleaning up and the eating or playing.

Start with simple recipes and work alongside your child, letting them do whatever they are capable of and showing them the next step.

Supervise closely any work that involves knives or hotplates.

Practice the skills they need like pouring and cutting at other times as well, for instance in the bath or with playdough.

Relax and reassure yourself that a little mess now will yield huge future dividends. You and your child will have a wonderful time together and think of all those breakfasts in bed and kids who can prepare the evening meal later on.

Check out the library for cookbooks to start your collection of suitable recipes for children. Biscuits are a favourite but there are lots of healthy alternatives and the product doesn't always need to be edible. Here are two recipes I cook with toddlers just for fun with the bonus that you get to play with it afterwards.

This will be the last contribution from me, as I will be leaving the Islands shortly and heading back to sunny Brisbane. I've had a fantastic experience this year. Thank you and I wish you all the best.

Dough for modelling and making long-lasting decorations.

(You bake this dough after you model and then it can be painted -

stored in dry conditions the cooked decorations will last for years)

1 cup of flour

½ cup of salt

½ cup of water

bowl, measuring cups

rolling pin, cookie cutters

straw, baking sheet, tinfoil

Mix together flour, salt and water in a bowl. Divide in half and cover half with plastic wrap and set aside.

Put flour on the surface and knead dough, work it with your hands until it is smooth. This takes 8 to 10 minutes.

You can roll dough out and cut shapes with cookie cutters or mould with your hands. Put shapes on foil lined baking sheet. If you want to hang them up you can poke a hole at the top with a straw.

Bake in 120 C oven for 4 to 5 hours until thoroughly dry.

Take them out and let them cool.

Now you are ready to paint or varnish your creations.

Playdough Recipe

(This is a soft playdough that will stay fresh and pliable for a long time if kept in an airtight container when not in use - the recipe can easily be doubled)

1 cup of flour

1 cup of water

½ cup of salt

1 tablespoon of cooking oil

2 teaspoon of cream of tartar

Put all ingredients in a pot and cook until dough leaves the side of the pot and forms a ball in the middle. Do not boil. Take out and knead until cool. I add food colouring during the kneading process. Recipe can be doubled. Store in an airtight container HAVE FUN!

Wool report - week ending July 15

by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

WOOL prices for fleece wool lots between 20 and 24 micron fell by between 3 and 6 p/kg clean at last week's sale in Melbourne Australia. Prices were up a few p/kg clean for lots between 25 and 26 micron, but were "softer" again above 27 micron. As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide".

Fleece wool lots of good length and style were least affected by price falls.

Prices for "skirtings" and oddments remained quite stable with some oddments actually increasing in price during the week.

In Australia 89% of the 21,000 bale offering was sold. Included in the offering were 2,181 bales of crossbred wool of which 91% was sold. In New Zealand 85% of the 15,518 bales presented at auction, changed hands.

Auctions continue next week in New Zealand. Australian markets will be in recess for two weeks.

No medals, but praise for Falklands competitors

THE Falklands team at the 11th NatWest Island Games, staged on the Shetland Islands, produced a string of positive results which fully justified sending a squad of 31 competitors.

The football team pulled off one of the major shocks in Islands Games history by defeating the larger and more experienced team from Saaremaa 2-1, and did not deserve to go down 2-1 to Aland. The young swimming team of Donna Triggs, Hannah Arthur-Almond, Thomas Burston and Edward Freer produced a string of personal bests (p.b.), while 14 year old Lucas Biggs took 7 and 8 points off top rated players in the table tennis singles competition. In clay pigeon shooting Saul Pitaluga was just two clays away from a final six shoot-off position in the ABT Individual event.

With UK gun laws prohibiting pistol shooting in the Games and no full-bore range on Shetland, the Falklands chances of winning medals this time were limited. Thankfully both Rhodes in 2007 and Aland in 2009, hosts for the next two Games, will not be subjected to such stringent rulings.

With hotels and guest houses on the Shetlands limited, cruise vessels were brought in to meet the accommodation needs. The Falklands were based on the *Van Gogh* which was berthed alongside Lerwick pier, and hosted 750 competitors. Another ship the *Antenna* accommodated a further 500. The remaining sportsmen and women stayed on-shore in Community Halls and schools.

Most of the Falklands team sailed from Tilbury, joining the ship in the wake of the London bombings. A downpour resulted in the Opening Ceremony on July 9 being curtailed by nearly two hours. Golfer Kevin Clapp representing the Falklands for the 6th time at the Games was given the honour of carrying the flag. Swimmer Thomas Burston, the youngest member of the team, was appointed 'water-carrier' for the traditional mixing of island's waters.

Blue skies and a sunny afternoon on the following day brought an estimated 3000 spectators to Gilbertson Park for the Shetlands v Falklands soccer game, which the home team won 4-0.

A rest day allowed the Falklands team time to recover and a journey to the village of Strom on the following day, brought a magnificent victory over the Estonian island of Saaremaa, which is situated in the Baltic sea. The Estonians unwisely rested a few of their best players believing that victory over the Falklands was assured, having already taken four points from their first two games. A 2nd minute penalty by Martyn Clarke put the Falklands ahead, but within a minute of the kick-off in the 2nd half, Saaremaa equalised.

As the tension mounted and with time running out substitute Wayne Clement ran onto a header from "Spurs" Henry and left two defenders for dead. His accurate low shot slid past the bemused Saaremaa goal-

keeper and into the net. It was unfortunate for the fans back home that a power-cut prevented the few final minutes of live commentary and a description of the victory celebrations, being heard. The Saaremaa players were extremely upset by their loss, which shattered any chances they had of winning a medal, and their anger was taken out on the dressing room doors and walls!

The following day, having decided previously that chances of victory over the powerful Isle of Man team was almost an impossibility, Team Manager Chris Clarke rested some of his 1st teamers and gave the reserves an opportunity to play. The final score of 9-0 for the Isle of Man just about reflected the balance of play. It would have been quite disappointing for some squad members had they not been given an opportunity to play, considering the extensive training programme in Stanley which they had undertaken during the previous seven months, and Chris Clarke's decision to stick to his plan has to be respected.

The game against Aland, another Baltic sea island, belonging to Finland, but where the population of 45,000 speak Swedish, brought despair and frustration with Aland winning the game 2-1. A game against the Orkney islands, 5th placed team in Group Two would now decide 9/10th places.

It would be difficult to write anything in favour of the Scottish referee who took charge of the game against Orkney on the small field at Sandwick and it was the Orkneys who ran out 2-0 winners, snatching ninth place in the competition.

All who saw the Falklands team play in Shetland praised their fitness, endeavour and team-work. In particular the pairing of Douglas Clarke and Bill Chater was described by some experts as, 'the best defensive duo on the parks'. The team members themselves picked out Adam Glanville as their top man, given his ability to get down the wings and run non-stop for 90 minutes.

The Football Club under Chair-

man Chris Clarke proudly raised more than £30,000 pounds from various fund-raising activities and the local pools in their build-up to the Shetland games. It may take another four years and the 2009 Games in Aland before a similar effort can be expected.

The swimming team, under the guidance of Pam Freer, performed above expectations in the pool, and all achieved personal bests in a variety of events over the four days of competition.

Edward Freer started the ball rolling in the 100m breaststroke finishing 18th in a time of 1' 24.38. Donna Triggs knocked 5 seconds off her p.b. in the 200m freestyle, breaking the Falklands record by 32 seconds.

With a more relaxed atmosphere prevailing than at the Commonwealth Youth Games in Australia some eight months previously, the Falklands swimmers enjoyed the friendly and supportive approach of the other teams. Hannah Arthur-Almond took seconds of her p.b. in the 50m butterfly, while Thomas Burston cut back his p.b. in the

200m freestyle. Edward Freer improved his 50m breaststroke time to 38.69 while Donna Triggs bettered her Isle of Man games time by 2 seconds in the 100m backstroke. The following day Donna got ever closer to Claire Kilmartin's Falklands best of 31.58 in the 50m freestyle when she recorded a time of 33.75, but Hannah Arthur-Almond's time of 32.54 is now less than 1 second off the Falklands record in this event.

Both Edward and Thomas recorded impressive times in the 100m freestyle taking three seconds off their p.b. while Edward cut his 50m freestyle time by a second to 30.13.

In the 50m backstroke Donna went under 40 seconds for the first time with 39.82 while Hannah's 40.22 bettered her p.b. by a massive three seconds.

The friendly spirit of the Island Games was never more apparent than on the final day when the Jersey coach assisted the Falklands swimmers, and offered some helpful coaching hints which were gratefully accepted by Pam Freer and the team. *Continued on page 16*

The golf team found the courses at Dale and on the island of Whalsey tougher than anticipated and Glenn Ross's four-round Falklands record score of 322, achieved in Guernsey two years ago, was never in danger of being broken.


The overall team score of 1118 saw the Falklands finish in 13th and last place, some 48 points behind St Helena.

Individually Kevin Clapp produced the best score with 361 and 47th place from a field of 53. Whalsey proved his undoing with scores of 101 and 95. Kevin's best golf came at Dale where he recorded 85, paring the last three holes, and an excellent 80, spoiling what could have been a better return with seven on the final hole. He began the final round with an impressive par, birdie, par on the first three holes.

Peter Bagley was the only Falklands player to keep a three figure individual round score off his card, with rounds of 95, 93, 94, 90. Peter birdied the first hole on his Island Games debut.

Rod Tuckwood's final aggregate was 399, with a best round of 91 when he birdied the 16th, while Steve Vincent was philosophically celebrating his best round of 99 at Dale, which saw him end on 427.

For the first time the Falklands had a competitor in the table tennis tournament. Young Lucas Biggs overcame a nervy start in the singles and pushed several of his opponents, scoring seven and eight points in games where the first player to eleven won the set. Having now experienced the Interna-

tional stage Lucas will be better prepared in two years time when the 2007 games are held in Rhodes (Greece).

The Badminton Club was unable to send a team, but Ben Watson who went along to support the Falklands and Anna Luxton the team physiotherapist, teamed up in the mixed doubles in order to savour the competitive atmosphere. They went down 3-15, 1-15 to a pair from the Isle of Man. Ben managed two and four points in each set against the highly rated Bjartur Lamhaug of the Faroe Islands in the mens singles.

Clay Pigeon shooting conditions at Blackgaet were the most difficult ever experienced at an Island Games, with swirling mist and fog greeting the shooters on most days.

Most scores were five to six less than would normally have been expected.

Saul Pitaluga's score of 126 in the ABT individual, recorded in the Isle of Man in 2001, would have been good enough to win the gold medal in Shetland, where Peter Kelly took the top prize with 125. Saul's score this time in Shetland was just two clays short of a top six shoot-off for the gold, silver and bronze. Graham Didlick, who has won an incredible 11 medals in pistol events in previous Games, was considerably further back on 59 and 19th place.

Steve Dent, representing the Falklands for the first time, returned a credible 73 in the Individual Olympic Trench, with scores of 11, 15, 18, 13, 16 and 19th position.

Graham Didlick finished in 22nd position with 60.

The Falklands trio ended up in 9th place in the English Sporting Men's team event with a score of 121, while in the Individual event Steve Dent hit 43 for a finishing position of 21st, ahead of shooters from Gibraltar, Faroes and Western Isles.

The 2005 NatWest Island Games once again provided a welcome public relations opportunity for the Falklands. BBC 2 TV are screening highlights of the Games this weekend, while I was interviewed, along with Managers from St Helena and Bermuda on BBC Radio Scotland on the opening day.

Two young swimmers Hannah Arthur-Almond and Edward Freer appeared on the same radio station later in the week. I was also interviewed for BBC TV Scotland, Radio 5 live, and Jersey Radio. The widely read *Glasgow Herald* newspaper, despite having the attraction of the Open golf championships at St Andrews, surprisingly devoted its back page to the Island Games and the Falklands in particular.

The Falklands teams were encouraged by many supporters, some of whom travelled all the way from the Falklands and others who reside in the UK.

All who went to Shetland expressed their gratitude to the people of the Falklands for their support in raising money over the past two years and to elected Councillors for their continued financial backing and to those individuals and companies who sponsored team track suits and strips.

Currently the Governor of Anguilla in the eastern Caribbean, Mr Huckle will arrive in the Falklands in the autumn of 2006.

Married to Helen, Mr Huckle (57) and his wife have two children, both in their twenties.


Mr Huckle will have some idea of what to expect when he arrives in the Falklands, having visited four years ago. Before his current posting in Anguilla, he was head of the Overseas Territories Department for three years and it was during that time that he visited the Islands in June 2001.

Councillor John Birmingham, who met Mr Huckle during his Falklands visit, was pleased with the appointment and said, "He's a very experienced diplomat with long established links with the Overseas Territories.

"I think he's a good friend and supporter of the Falklands cause."

New York, Vienna and Manila are some of his former postings, and he has also worked in the East African Department of the Foreign and Commonwealth Office, and spent time on loan to the Northern Ireland Office.

Although somewhat different

in climate, Mr Huckle's current posting in Anguilla, shares similar economic interests with the Falklands as fishing and tourism are the main industries.

Mr Huckle will replace the current Governor, Mr Howard Pearce CVO who will be transferred to another Diplomatic Service appointment.


Falklands War computer game launched

A COMPUTER GAME about the Falklands Conflict of 1982 has been released in the United States this week.

Entitled 'The Falklands War 1982' the game had caused concern amongst veterans of the campaign and others that it is disrespectful and may contain graphic images of war which could cause distress.

Martin Reed, Chairman of the South Atlantic Medal Association wrote to *Penguin News* and several UK newspapers in April expressing his strong disapproval of the game. He said he and many other veterans were, "...appalled at the bad taste involved in making a profit out of their suffering and having the sacrifice of so many lives trivialised in this way when the pain and agony, physical and mental, is still so fresh."

Penguin News has seen a 'demo' of the game which appears to be a military strategy game in which real

and imaginary battles are played out. Rather than containing graphic images of soldiers or battles, the game screen consists of a map of the battle area with forces represented by icons.

The famous Pebble Island raid is one of the featured scenarios in the game. Councillor Roger Edwards who was involved with the Pebble raid in 1982 said he thought all computer war games were "sad", especially "...when based on a real war."

Veteran of the conflict Gary Clement said he wanted to "reserve judgement" until he had seen the game which he intends to purchase in America next month.

Launched by American company Shrapnel Games and developed by ProSIM the game explores eight of the most important battles during the conflict as well as ten hypothetical situations.

News in brief

Second Loligo season better than last year's

THERE has been a reasonable start to the second Loligo season, although catches are not as consistently high as they were in the first season.

Director of Fisheries, John Barton explained that this is only the second year where the second season has commenced on July 15. He said catches to date are 7365 tonnes, whereas for the same period last year they were 4434 tonnes.

Mr Barton said the fleet is moving around to maintain catch rates, with vessels fishing in the Beauchene Island area and up by Stanley.

During the first season the fleet fished in the Beauchene Island area throughout the season.

Investigation continues

FOLLOWING an incident last week that Police described as a "trail of destruction" a Police spokesperson said the investigation into vehicle damage is still active and forensic results from the materials submitted is awaited.

A male person, arrested in relation to the incident, remains on police bail.

READERS of my last editorial of June 24 (v17 No 9) will remember I was less than complimentary about the Public Meeting I had attended that week. This week I attended another and there was something different this time around that caught the attention of all present. No, not the fact that Councillor Birmingham was wearing a tie, but a change in format.

As we entered the room, we were greeted by an overhead projector screen in the middle of the room. After my school room analogy of some weeks ago, I thought at first they must have been unable to get hold of a blackboard and gone for the next best thing. This was not the case as Councillor Luxton informed us that he and his colleagues would be giving short presentations on the purpose of their recent overseas visits. This they duly did and some questions were prompted by their reports. We were told where they had been, what meetings they had attended and what the benefits there were to the Falklands in attending them.

No doubt the subject of overseas trips was motivated by the perception of some folk that councillors are constantly indulging in 'free holidays at the tax payers expense', but we were promised other topics would be covered in subsequent meetings.

So, they have made their point. They do listen to us (sometimes). It is a start, but only a start. Whilst the gesture of change is welcomed, we must by no means sit back and think all is now well. It is probably too early to judge after one meeting how successful the new format is, but it must not be allowed to fall by the wayside, and other avenues of possible improvement should be explored. As with improvement in all other areas of government, it should be a continual process.

Councillor Luxton also informed the meeting that in the run up to the election, he would be holding some form of session to discuss with interested parties what being a councillor actually involved in terms of day to day work, something that *PN* will be covering with interest as perhaps more people would consider standing for council if they knew what it entailed. Anything that widens the pool of prospective election candidates can only be welcomed.

Perhaps this new found spirit of openness is all in preparation for our next Governor. Mr Alan Huckle, who's watch words are, according to a newspaper in his current posting of Anguilla, 'transparency and consultation'. Fine sentiments which he will hopefully bring with him when he arrives next year.

Former councillor takes exception to Governor's powers in Fishery Bill

THE power of the Governor as outlined in the Fisheries (Conservation and Management) Bill 2005 was a concern discussed at the Fisheries Committee meeting on Tuesday.

Mr Lewis Clifton, a former councillor had written a letter taking exception to the phrase, "the Governor acting in his own discretion," which is used several times in the Bill.

Mr Clifton writes, "The Governor should be advised by Executive Council, but never should the Governor be enabled to act at or in his own discretion."

Mr Clifton suggests that the use of the phrase infers that the Falkland Islands are, "incapable of managing, conserving and developing its fisheries." He says this is "simply not true" and could give Argentina unnecessary political ammunition. "... by implying that we are not capable of managing in a sustainable way, our resources without Her

Majesty's Governments direct control and or influence."

In responding to the letter, the Attorney General David Lang told the meeting that the Bill had not originally been drafted that way but was a compromise reached with the Foreign and Commonwealth Office.

Drew Irvine pointed out that the Bill in fact gives no more power to the office of Governor than it currently has, as he can overturn Executive Council decisions at the moment. Mr Irvine said, "This is a constitutional issue."

Director of Fisheries, Mr John Barton agreed saying that it was a, "political decision."

Chairing the meeting, Councillor Richard Cockwell said it was his personal feeling that, "this is too important a Bill to hold up over this issue."

Councillor Cockwell said the issue would be discussed by councillors.

Policy issued for access to Mount Pleasant

FOLLOWING a number of recent incidents where Chilean nationals were apparently refused entry to Mount Pleasant as reported in *Penguin News* of June 24, the British Forces at the base have issued a statement outlining their policy on access to the base for all civilians in the Islands.

Firstly, civilian visitors have been restricted in where specifically on the base they can visit. Accessible areas include the bowling alley, cinema, NAAFI shops, Gull and Penguin Bar, Dolphin Club, Ronoke's restaurant, the FIC complex, the Oasis Coffee Shop and of course the air terminal.

The statement goes on to say that passes are now required to access the base, either an annual pass, obtainable with sponsorship from a senior officer, or a day pass, avail-

able at the Police Station on production of photo identification.

Those able to obtain such a pass include, "Falkland Island passport holders, Foreign and Commonwealth Office or Falkland Island Government officials, and individuals holding similar positions of office." Such individuals would have, "unescorted access to the areas listed above" when in possession of a pass.

Other Falkland Islands residents can still enter the base by obtaining a day pass providing they book in at the Police Station, and show photo identification. They are also required to be met at the Police Station by their host who must escort them throughout their visit. They must also book out when leaving the base.

Morrison to build new Halley BAS Base

Following the recent announcement that the British Antarctic Survey (BAS) have chosen the winning design for their new research station at Halley, Morrison Ltd have been named as the company selected to build the structure.

The company, which has been working with BAS since 1999, was also involved in selecting the winning design for the new base.

Regional Manager of Morrison (Falklands) Chris Luker explained, "In February 2005, following a competitive assessment, Morrison were appointed as Project Advisors to assist the British Antarctic Survey in assessing

the buildability and cost of the three short listed Halley designs.

"The project will be managed by the Morrison (Falklands) Ltd team from their offices in Stanley, Falkland Islands and Matlock, UK. Morrison are very proud to be working with the British Antarctic Survey on this innovative and prestigious project."

Mr Luker said, "The initial concept is that on site construction is to begin in the Austral summer 2006/7 and continue during the following season."

The design team for the new base consisted of Faber Maunsell as Consulting Engineers and Hugh Broughton as Architects.

The game is currently on sale for US\$44.95.

Airport construction pioneer dies

IT IS with regret that we report the death of Mr Reg Blanchard in England.

Reg was Plant Manager for Johnston Construction Ltd during the building of Stanley Airport 30 years ago.

He was a respected and popular man during his years spent in the Falkland Islands and gave many young islanders at that time otherwise unknown work opportunities. Michael and Neil McKay, Timmy McCallum, Ian McPhee,

Terence Philips, Mike Pole Evans, Raymond Poole and Robert Rowlands were some of those given the chance to learn the operation and repair of heavy earthmoving plant that had never been seen in the Islands before and earn good wages compared with what was available elsewhere in the Islands at that time.

His funeral was held in Boston, Lincolnshire on 21st July. He is survived by his wife Jean.

Steps taken to prevent further power cuts

THE power failure earlier this month was caused by a form of fuel waxing not necessarily due to the temperature on the day it occurred.

Power Station Manager Glenn Ross confirmed that the incident was due to fuel wax, "...albeit different to before."

Mr Ross said the fuel came through in the form of a sludge and refused to recombine, even at 22 degrees celsius, for two weeks.

This sample is from the lower portion of the fuel and does not truly represent the fuel delivered in that waxing and settling and then drawing off has taken place.

He explained that the pre-heater installed in one of the daily fuel tanks to combat fuel waxing is set at 12 degrees and the tank is topped up every few hours. He added, "We are looking at purifying the fuel post delivery and pre-heating one of our main fuel tanks."

Section of Ross Road to be completed in October

FEARS voiced that the section of road which has undergone extensive repair work on Ross Road over the last few weeks is now completed can be dispelled.

Public Works Roads Engineer Bob Hancox said that the section of road near the Jetty Centre is currently temporarily surfaced and is scheduled to be properly surfaced

with asphalt at the start of the season in October.

Mr Hancox said the new sewer and reinstatement works will not suffer in the interim. He added, "the programme was organised like this so that all the works could be completed through a busy area outside of the tourist season."

Communications consultant returns to the Islands

DR CHRIS Doyle will be in the Falklands from July 30 to August 6.

A Communications Consultant, Dr Doyle visited the Islands in September last year and produced a report on the telecommunication

system in the Islands which was made available to the public.

Cable and Wirelss and the Falkland Islands Government will be having meetings with Dr Doyle during his week long visit.

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Your questions answered

Q After the fire at the hospital in the early 1980s it was decided not to house the laboratory inside the hospital in future. Why then has the laboratory now been moved back inside the hospital and how much thought has been given to safety regarding the fire risk? Is this re-siting long term and can you explain where exactly the laboratory is now situated, i.e. what facilities are directly adjacent to it?"

A *Director of Health and Social Services, Nikki Osborne provided the following answer*

Thank you for your enquiry about this matter. Both the Director and Engineering Manager of the hospital who were involved in the laboratory move have since left. Therefore the following comments are derived from the minutes of meetings and correspondence at the time, and from information that other members of FIG and the hospital have been able to provide.

The decision to re-house the laboratory was taken in the middle of 2002. Since the lab was built in 1987, the range, number and complexity of tests carried out had increased considerably. The laboratory became very cramped and the electrical supply was insufficient to enable the staff to run all equipment. Things came to a head when it was decided to extend the laboratory's public health role which meant a further increase in staffing, space and equipment.

There were two options: to build a new laboratory at great expense or to reorganise internally and move the laboratory to its current location on the first floor of the hospital. It was decided that the relocation was the best course to follow. I can find no record of a decision taken in the early 80s not to house the laboratory in the hospital and no evidence that anyone involved in the relocation knew of such a decision. Certainly, there is no mention of the laboratory in the report of the inquiry into the hospital fire.

The laboratory has occupied one side of the first floor since early 2003. A fire door and the stairwell separate it from the only other department in that area which is the podiatry and physiotherapy department. There are rarely more than 2 patients and 4 staff members in the whole of the first floor at any one time. There is an auto-fire detection system.

The Planning, Health and Medical Services, Standing Finance Committees and Executive Council were all involved in the decision-making process. The Chief Fire Officer and Building Control Officer both advised on the project and the laboratory was constructed and equipped to current UK and EU standards, in-

cluding fitting of fire doors, fire detection system and fire extinguishers. As an additional precaution, flammable liquids are stored in a secure store room at a distance from the laboratory and any patient areas. It should be pointed out that most hospitals in the UK have their laboratories in the main building and a laboratory should not present any significant additional hazard in the event of a fire. The Chief Fire Officer confirms this.

The hospital is regularly involved in visits by Fire Department Staff to ensure that it complies with fire safety regulations. Hospital staff undergo regular fire training and practice fire evacuations at approved intervals so that they are prepared for a real emergency.

Q How does one obtain permission to fence and use a piece of Stanley Common and what is the cost for the land?

A *The Attorney General, David Lang replied.*

It has not been the policy in recent years to give anybody exclusive occupation of any part of Stanley Common.

The Stanley Common Ordinance reflects the policy that the Common is dedicated in perpetuity for public use. Permission has been granted, for example, to persons wanting to use land on the Common for grazing, but always on the basis that although the land in question must be fenced, it must still be available for the public to walk upon.

Permission has similarly been granted to the Stanley Model Flying Association to fence off an area to use for flying model aircraft. During times the land is not in use for that purpose, the public are free to walk upon it.

If the questioner wishes to fence off part of the Common for some purpose, he should apply to the Stanley Lands Committee. The payment for use of the land, if the application is granted, will depend on the purpose but will take into account that exclusive use has not been granted to the applicant.

Q Since the completion of the MPA Road, how much has it cost in materials, machinery and labour?

A *Public Works Department Roads Engineer, Bob Hancox supplied the following response.*

We have undertaken further research on maintenance costs for the MPA road and have concluded that since 1987 we have actually spent £2,006,287 of which £249,669 was spent on winter maintenance (salting costs). These figures exclude any Capital expenditure such as asphaltting or major regraveling.

Temporary hatchery at FIPASS

The first stage of a project which will aid the study of one of the fishing industries most valuable species was put in place this week.

Tuesday morning saw the lifting into place on FIPASS of a temporary fish hatchery facility for CFL Fortuna Fish Farming. Constructed by Buster Summers inside the FIPASS barge, the building was fork lifted out and effortlessly craned into place by Neil McKay. According to Hamish

Wylie, Chairman of the company, the facility has been constructed to enable the company to take advantage of the current toothfish spawning season.

"Whilst nowhere near ideal" said Hamish, "it will enable us to gain a lot of knowledge about these fish a year earlier than we could otherwise have done."

The company hopes to have a permanent facility in place for next season.

Executive/Judicial distinction blurred?

THE investigation into the complaints of bullying by the former Director of Health raises another issue of concern.

The Senior Magistrate is the only resident member of the judiciary in the Islands. As such, she has a clear (and sometimes onerous) responsibility to maintain her independence from FIG.

The complaint against the Director of Health was an internal matter for the Government to resolve. The investigation and resolution of that complaint was the responsibility of the Executive,

and the Executive alone. It is essential in our small community that there is a clear demarcation between the Judiciary and the Executive.

On occasions in the past we have seen attempts to erode this by the Executive: by participating in an internal investigation, the Senior Magistrate has now blurred that distinction further.

This now brings into question whether she can fulfil her constitutional role of being an independent tribunal.

Teachers do talk to pupils

I DO not intend to further debate in *Penguin News* the issues I raised in my letter of 15th July but I would like to dispel some areas of misconception evident in Ann Gray's letter. ('Angry')PN July 22, and refute the inference that we do not talk to each other.

1) I would have thought 'Angry' would be aware of the *Teenage Forum* which was held fortnightly in the hospital last year, over a period of several months, with a member from Social Services serving on that forum as secretary. I was also a member of the forum with pupils from Year 9, 10 and 11 at FICS, as was Sarah Clement who was a driving force behind the forum. We were allowed to invite relevant professionals and anyone else we considered had a part to play in teenage life in this community, to those meetings, and we did. Unfortunately, our concerns were not taken forward at that time, and, as far as I am aware, the promised report, from the then Manager of the hospital, never materialised.

2) Frances Douse was one person - there was no *they*, as 'Angry' stated in her letter, and Frances wrote her letter at a time when her unpleasant experience had recently begun and was still on-going. The fact that she was on the point of departure is irrelevant. As Alan Purvis said in his letter on bullying, (PN 22nd July), Frances was given a good deal of staff support in school and those who were giving her a hard time were spoken to in no uncertain

terms - by myself, amongst others.

3) No one is blaming all parents - only those who have little idea where their children are or what they are doing.

4) Any pupil who passes through my classroom will confirm that his/her eyes glaze over when yet again I try to highlight the hazards, present and future, associated with early drinking, smoking and sex. Cynicism aside, pupils I teach will also confirm that lively debates on these issues take place from time to time. So, strangely enough, we do talk to, and with our young people. Parents are also asked to come and discuss the problems their child may be experiencing, as they would in any other school.

5) Yes, the police are active in their consultations with young people and, to my knowledge, at least three young boys, and their parents, have, in recent weeks, been spoken to about underage drinking. We also have good liaison with the police vis-à-vis a variety of issues concerning young people.

6) I cannot comment on hospital consultations with young people or their parents for obvious reasons. Doctors are bound by the Hippocratic Oath which prevents a breach of patient/doctor confidentiality.

7) Finally, I fail to understand which part of the phrase 'classes in parenting' 'Angry' did not understand.

FIDC unwise investment?

WHILST reading last week's Penguin News (22.07.05), I came across a little gem hidden under the title 'Mussel farming development will continue'. For those who may have missed it, I will repeat the beginning:

"Block budget approval was sought in seven areas, totalling £493,000 at the Falkland Islands Development Board meeting on Tuesday. Approval was granted for all but one project.

The sum of £418,500 was approved for administration central costs; £15,000 for FalklandIslands.com; £23,000 for the maintenance of commercial assets; £3,000 for the maintenance of rural assets; £10,000 for the dairy and £10,000 for Small Business Development etc."

A further sum of £14,000 was mentioned as having been deferred, thereby giving the full amount of very nearly half a million.

I take this to mean that for approximately £80,000 spent on development, it takes £420,000 to administer. The mind boggles!

I am sure there are various local entrepreneurs developing their businesses to this extent, without the need for excessive overheads. One person should be able to administer £100,000 worth of development money without too much

trouble.

I do not believe that Government should be held responsible for every want within the community but I do believe they are responsible for spending tax payers money wisely. I do not believe that granting FIDC half a million to spend most of it on administration costs is wise.

Maybe we could move development back to one office in Government and free up a building, along with at least £300,000! The Secretariat could then move into the FIDC building and we gain a large central building for development.

A community centre perhaps? Our youth would then have the opportunity of getting themselves off the street and out of the public eye.

Should renovation prove expensive, perhaps alcohol could be taxed to the same level as cigarettes to pay for it. This would then send a message to the whole community that a drinking culture is not desirable and give them an alternative as well.

Should that scenario not meet with approval, the MPA road could soak up £300,000 a year as easily as FIDC and maybe we would not be covered in mud each time it rains.

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Falkland Islands Rifle Association: Bisley 2005

THE shooters representing the Falkland Islands at Bisley have once again given a good account of themselves at the annual competition in Surrey.

Each year the Bisley ranges near Guildford in Surrey are the venue for the Imperial Meetings. Whenever possible the Falkland Islands Rifle Association send competitors to the UK to take part in both the individual and team shoots.

This year six competitors attended. Ken Aldridge, Gareth Goodwin, Chris McCallum, Derek Goodwin, Christian Berntsen and Ron Betts. Ron resides in Australia now but having been born in the Falklands he qualifies to shoot for the Islands.

In the Junior Mackinnon team event the Falklands came third from a total of seven teams competing. Highveld were first with 359.16v. Trinidad and Tobago were second with 347.25v. The Falkland Islands were third with 339.18v (see table below for individual scores).

The Junior Kolapore which is shot over 300, 500 and 600 yards was also competed for with seven teams. Malaysia took first place with 590.83v the Highveld Provinces were second with 585.7v. West Indies third with 571.51v and the Falkland Islands fourth with 568.42v. Isle of Man, Normandy and Cape of Good Hope followed.

Junior Overseas was also shot over 300, 500 and 600 yards but with seven scoring shots on each range that is a possible score per competitor of 105. Highveld Provinces took first place with 411.51v. Malaysia were second with 409.42v and the Falklands were third with 389.30v. (See below for individual scores). The next best teams were West Indies, Isle of Man, Normandy and Holland.

A new team shoot was introduced this year called the Parting Shoot. Ten teams took part with the Falklands again picking fourth place.

Out of the individual events at Bisley the Falklands shooters took part in 12 with varying success.

No less than 1,018 shooters took part in the grand aggregate. In the final placings Ron Betts came 179th, Ken Aldridge was 192nd, Gareth Goodwin was 678th, Chris McCallum was 691st, Derek Goodwin 737th and Christian Berntsen was 756th.

Without doubt the greatest achievement was that of Ron Betts who qualified for the final stage of the Queens Prize, this is the dream of every marksman who attends Bisley.

In the final Ron scored a credible 145 which added to his Second Stage score placing him 55th with a final score of 293. The winner of the competition scored the highest possible score of 300. It is worth noting that this is the sixth time a competitor from the Falklands has qualified for the Bisley Final. Former qualifiers are E McAtasney in 1934, R Henricksen in 1978 and 1980 and Ron previously in 1989 and 1995.

Ken, Chris and Gareth were also achieving good scores. Ken and Gareth put in 73.8v and 74.9v respectively which qualified them for the second stage of the St Georges competition. Ken also qualified for the second stage of the Queens Prize.

Although it was Christian and Derek's first time at Bisley they also showed good form. In the Prince of Wales shoot Christian put in a very credible 72.13v which earned him a tankard and in the Kolapore shoot his score was 143 out of a 150 possible. Derek also shot a 72 in the Parting Shot team and in the Queen's Consolation he again scored 72 which put him in 12th position from 150 competitors.

All in all a successful Bisley meeting where again our Falkland Islands shooters gave a good account of themselves in some extremely trying conditions, especially given the high temperatures most days. Many thanks again to the Falkland Islands Company Ltd who sponsored the team's flights and to our faithful sweepstake supporters.

A TYPICAL Fighting Pig start to a gig is a humorous safety brief, completely off the cuff and accompanied by a steady beat from the band. Regular Trough goers treat it almost as a warm up before a work out. They lazily stretch a few muscles and sway to the music in readiness for the wall of sound that is about to assault their senses and keep them dancing for the next two hours.

The four man band are an unlikely bunch with varied backgrounds who all play a serious role within the community. Lead guitarist Gerard Robson is Senior Flight Information Officer with the Falkland Islands Civil Aviation Department, a former councillor and school teacher. Drummer Pete King is Government Secretary, lead singer Len McGill is Police Inspector McGill by day while bass guitarist, ex Navy man and physics teacher, Tim Cotter is involved in Infrastructure Development with the Falkland Islands Development Corporation (FIDC).

The Fighting Pigs known affectionately as The Pigs are older than their Trough. The actual formation date is uncertain, but members believe that the Fighting Pig Band was formed around 1981 by Pete King, Manfred Keenleyside, Gerard Robson, and Simon Goss, who had all played together previously in different bands such as Dhome, Junkroc and the Che Coat Band. Len McGill joined up in 1983 moving from the hard rock band known as Candlepower.

The Trough originated from an eight unit Portakabin complex used by the RAF as a sergeants mess post 1982. A bargain for £50 in the early 1990's, the band have since spent more than £50,000 converting it to a music club. (No wonder they get a bit 'pigged off' about cigarettes and gum in the carpets). A recent extension to the building has added a separate function room - as yet unfurnished - the Pigs plan to create a comfortable area for those who are not into two hours of frenzied dancing.

Len confessed to being almost press

ganged into singing for the band. His days in the Cathedral choir had ensured he could hit the right notes and some gentle persuasion from the band resulted in him hanging up his bass guitar and taking his place at the front of the Fighting Pigs. He is still some what modest about his talent and is often heard to open a gig with the comment, "... unfortunately the singer couldn't make it tonight so I'm here in his place."

Len's most treasured memory with the band are the final moments of the South West Atlantic Millennium party held on the football pitch. Singing Brown Eyed Girl for the third time by special request he was barely able to finish the song for the lump in his throat and the sheer emotion he experienced as he watched the first sunrise of the millennium spread light on one of the biggest parties ever to be held in the Falklands.

The band's desire to have their own venue was born from a dislike of shifting unwieldy equipment in and out of the Town Hall and seeing other people making money from their music. Six beers between them was not considered to be a great return for a night of live music.

The first gig to take place in the Trough was on May 6, 1994 and celebrated a certain ladies fortieth birthday. The format was slightly different with a licensed bar and the Pigs playing to an audience of around 60. However having to shut at 1am wore a bit thin with Pigs who like to stay up late and make a lot of noise. Drummer Pete King stumbled on the solution during his travels one winter. Establishments in Australia were using the bring your own refreshment format. The Fighting Pigs took the idea on board, did away with the pay bar and Saturday nights rolled on into Sunday mornings on a regular basis.

Gerard, instantly recognisable by his trademark faded denim jacket, is an accomplished guitarist, vocalist and songwriter who can belt out a note perfect Dire Straits' Sultan of Swing one minute and ease the soothing notes of

Layla from an acoustic guitar the next. Described as shy and retiring by some and a 'miserable git' by fellow band members once he has his guitar plugged into an amp he is a force to be reckoned with. Some of his songs can be heard on the popular Fag Ash Blondes CD, a project he and Ray worked on with help from their friends. (I have heard that there will be more from Gerard and the possibility of a Pigs recording too)

Pete has been playing drums since he was a mere lad and has helped other budding drummers in the Islands with their music. His love of music and enjoyment from playing keeps him practising everyday. He has a varied taste in music from jazz to rock and is unique in so much as he is the only member of the band who admits to being partial to a bit of country music or 'Piggin Country' as they refer to their particular brand of country rock. No-one is sure who pens the *Pig Line*, a humorous reflection on events past and present (but it seems to reflect Pete's quirky sense of humour) - an infrequent publication to be found on the web site www.fightingpigband.com. Those who hold special occasion private functions are often presented with a personalised *Pig Line* as a memento of the event.

Tim Cotter has been playing bass guitar with the band for two years, filling the gap when former bass guitarist Ray Robson suffered an accident to his finger which has since prevented him from playing with the Pigs. Tim hails from Plymouth and has worked extensively with bands around the UK. At one point in his varied music background he was getting a lot of work because members of other bands were residing at her Majesty's pleasure.

The Fighting Pigs have hosted several famous musicians in the Islands only late night club including Jeff Rich of Status Quo and Hank Wangford a consultant gynaecologist/author by day and country singer songwriter by night. Jeff was sponsored by the Shackleton fund and Hank jointly by FIDC, Tourism and the Shackleton Fund. Don

Powell the drummer with Slade has graced the Trough with his presence. Bob Pearce, a Southampton based blues guitarist has visited the Falklands four times sponsored by the Pigs with help from the Shackleton Fund and discounted accommodation from Mike Rendell the former owner of the Malvina Hotel. Bob's backing band Blues etc also visited in 2003. More recently Scottish singer/songwriter Andi Neate bought her own brand of entertainment to the Trough. Unfortunately, due to the small community these are not profit making ventures and the band are usually left with a fairly large tab to pick up at the end of the visit.

The band have treated Chile to some of their music with a tour of Santiago in 1996. In the UK they have played several venues in Swindon when in 1997 they took part in the Task Force Reunion in Gosport. The Supremes and Three Degrees were among bands who performed at the same function.

Needless to say while these guys are leading rock star lifestyles the wives are left with the less than glamorous tasks - namely entrance control. Rosie King and Phyl Robson are the ladies you are most likely to meet on the door at the Trough. The job's a tough one but fair and firm is the order of the day as they collect the £4 entrance fee.

Naturally the band have seen some amusing sights from their vantage point on the stage but the night they discovered the building was fitted with an automatic brawler ejection unit is a favourite. Two guys started a scuffle near the fire exit and fell against the door which promptly came open ejecting them into the night air. A bystander promptly shut the door behind them and the band didn't miss a beat...but then, do they ever?

Recognising and coping with depression

DEPRESSION is a common mental health problem that will affect approximately half of all women and a quarter of all men at some point in their lives.

Depression is characterised by low mood, sleep disturbance, changes in appetite, loss of energy, loss of motivation, strong negative emotions like anxiety or guilt, negative thoughts, poor concentration, social withdrawal

Life events and the amount of stress we have to deal with contribute to depression. Prolonged exposure to stress can affect the chemicals that affect our mood. These changes in mood chemicals have been identified as a major factor in the development of depressive illness. Even happy life events such as having a baby may lead to depression, e.g. 80% of new mothers will experience the 'blues', while 10-15% may develop Post-Natal Depression. Depression can affect both young and old alike and it does not discriminate. People of any social, educational or economic background may experience depression.

The first line treatment for depression is antidepressant medication. When prescribing antidepressants several factors are considered by your GP, these include: history of previous treatment, previous response to treatment and other medical factors. The most commonly prescribed antidepressants are Selective Serotonin

Reuptake Inhibitors (SSRIs), namely Fluoxetine, Setraline and Paroxetine. These antidepressants are non addictive and fast acting. You should notice the benefits of taking SSRIs within a few weeks. Most noticeable is improvements in your sleep pattern and appetite. Your mood may lift or you may feel less anxious.

An important point when you start a new antidepressant is to take note of any side effects and report them back to your doctor. Some side effects will pass quickly. If side effects feel unbearable you may feel like stopping the medication. Don't give up though. Tell your doctor. Similar to other types of medication, several different types of antidepressants may be tried before a suitable type can be found. You may have to take an antidepressant for up to one year or more, so it is important to find an antidepressant that is right for you. Please keep in contact with your doctor and don't assume the tablets will not work for you. Even in Camp, medication can be monitored over the telephone.

Another effective treatment for depression is Cognitive Behaviour Therapy (CBT). CBT has been recognised as an effective treatment for depression. CBT teaches you how to recognise your depressive symptoms, negative thought patterns and changes in your behaviour. CBT helps you to learn

new skills in how to tackle depression. The length of treatment will vary between six to 20 sessions.

Unfortunately one episode of depression may lead to another. This is called relapse.

To help prevent relapse you may be asked to take medication for a long time, up to five years or more. Your Doctor may also suggest that you try a combined treatment of antidepressant medication and psychological therapy.

Self - Help Checklist

Maximize sunlight - when you get the opportunity to see the sun get outdoors or let the daylight in.

Socialise - make the effort to get out and meet people. Many activities are arranged during the winter months from darts, quizzes to dances. Try some of them, and delay your judgment until afterwards to decide whether you have enjoyed it.

Exercise - increase your endorphins, the natural stress and depression buster. Try something aerobic which will increase your heart rate like brisk walking or dancing. Or you could try swimming or cycling at the Leisure Centre.

Seek Advice - If you have noticed a change in your mood talk to your GP about it. Sometimes medication can help. If you are already taking medication for depression, consider carefully before making any alterations to the dose. Consider, does your mood normally dip in the winter period? If so talk to your GP and seek advice about the dose of medication you are taking.

Recipes for the Falkland Islands

Marinated lamb and vegetable skewers

For the marinade

- 2 tablespoons natural yoghurt
- 1 tablespoon rapeseed oil
- 3 cloves garlic, crushed
- 2 teaspoons honey
- 1 tablespoon cider vinegar

- 12 ozs lamb cut into cubes
- 8 cherry tomatoes
- 8 shallots, peeled
- 1 green pepper deseeded and cut into squares

- Several bay leaves, fresh if possible
- 12 medium mushrooms
- 4 rashers streaky bacon, halved and rolled

Leave the cubed meat to marinate for at least three hours.

Remove meat from marinade and thread all the ingredients on to long skewers.

Brush with marinade.

Grill turning frequently for 5 - 10 minutes.

Serve with potato salad, or a selection of steamed vegetables.

These skewers cook equally well under the grill or on a barbecue. The marinade imparts a lovely flavour to the meat and helps to keep it moist during cooking

EU Tax legislation divides Gibraltar and Channel islands

ISLE of Man has threatened to suspend retention tax or exchange of information on United Kingdom residents' accounts held in the jurisdiction unless Gibraltar is brought within the ambit of the European Savings Directive, according to UK press reports.

It emerged earlier this month that the Directive, does not currently apply between Gibraltar and UK as they are not separate member states of the EU, a revelation which reportedly "caused outrage" in the offshore centres of Jersey and Guernsey as well as the Isle of Man.

"Gibraltar has the capacity to completely derail the savings directive," Isle of Man's tax assess-

sor Malcolm Crouch remarked, according to the Isle of Man Online.

"If the UK doesn't do something about Gibraltar, they will quite openly be creating a tax haven within the EU, which is against everything the directive stands for," he added.

Mr Crouch suggested that the authorities in Gibraltar are actively using the situation to attract new funds, commenting that, "They are playing a long game - not being particularly helpful to the UK in closing the gap."

"If the UK government can't sort this and we can't get satisfaction, we will suspend the UK financial agreement," Mr Crouch warned.

At a meeting of the Crown dependencies next week, the Guernsey government intends to call on the UK to force Gibraltar into compliance with the Directive as soon as possible.

"That is the date when the directive could live or die," said Mr Crouch.

Meanwhile Guernsey could this week also suspend the tax agreement with UK that has been in force only a month according to a report published in *The Guernsey Press and Star*.

Jersey has already said that if the problem is not fixed by the end of the month, then it will suspend the agreement.

Pisco is Peruvian

PERUVIANS celebrated on Wednesday with a 2,000 litres binge at the World's Trade Organization Intellectual Property decision stating that pisco is a Peruvian drink.

The fountain in Lima's main square just across from the Government Palace and the several centuries old Cathedral was ordered filled with "pisco" by the city's government to commemorate and share the favourable ruling in the long standing controversy with neighbouring Chile.

"This is a victory for all Peruvians," said Lima's Deputy Mayor Marco Parra.

The Intellectual Property Office from the WTO in the framework of the Lisbon Treaty ruled in favour of Peru and a sixty days period is running for appeals.

However the problem is that Chile is not a signatory of the Lisbon agreement.

Santiago Roca, president of Peru's Competition and Intellectual Property Defence Office anticipated that Chile will most probably follow other actions in its own ambition of having pisco declared as a Chilean drink.

Pilot strike grounds Aerolineas Argentinas flights

A STRIKE launched on Tuesday by Aerolineas Argentinas pilots, technicians and machinists has paralysed all of the carrier's operations.

Passengers, many of them foreign tourists, lodged angry complaints at airports across Argentina on arriving and learning that flights they were expecting to board had been cancelled or rescheduled.

Airline Pilots Association spokesman Daniel Viro said the union, "decided to resume strong measures" that had been suspended on July 9, when the Labour Ministry started the mediation process.

"The strike, initially, will be for 12 hours" Mr Viro said. The work stoppage targets both domestic and international flights.

Pilots, who staged a two-day strike earlier this month that stranded thousands of vacation travellers, are demanding a 40% pay increase.

Mr Viro warned that if no agreement is reached, pilots could declare an indefinite stoppage, however he trusted talks will resume with Labour Ministry mediation.

New lease of life for historic building

AFTER narrowly escaping demolition, one of the oldest stone buildings in Stanley has undergone a life-saving transformation.

Millers (formerly Dolphin Guest House) now offers a homely bar, restaurant and tearooms and is the only completely nonsmoking establishment in Stanley.

The property at 46 John Street was built around 1864 by Thomas Jarvis. A tailor by trade, he also ran a pub in Stanley called the 'Persevering Hotel'. Government Archivist Jane Cameron, said it is thought that he intended to run the property at 46 John Street as a hotel as it is, "unusually large for a private house of that time."


In 1865 he sold it to the Deans, one of the most prominent families in the Islands. They paid £645 for the building.

Ms Cameron said there is little known of the building's use from then until in the later years of the nineteenth century when it became famous as 'Hardy's Bakery.' In 1922 the Hardy family bought it from the Deans - some of the older people in Stanley still remember Hardy's bread being delivered by horse and cart.

Mrs Mary Hills purchased the property in 1958 and ran it as a cafe for some time. Many will remember her famous toasted sandwiches usually consumed after the film show at the Parish Hall.

More recent owners have been the Goodwins and a Moffatt and Hawksworth partnership who named it Warrah Guest House. Bruce and Jeanette Miller purchased the property from Gordon Forbes.

There was a fear that the property was to be purchased with a plan to demolish the building, how-

ever a petition gained so many signatures that the application was withdrawn. Ms Cameron described it as a building that is held in "great affection by many people."

Jeanette Miller said that phase one of the renovation has involved the rooms being "gutted out" with new floors laid and extensive decoration throughout. Phase two will include a hotel reception and office to the east of the main building with a public bar above. She said the renovations have been a "major task" with very long hours put in by her husband Bruce - who has worked through the night on occasion - and his team of Bobby Crowie, Len McGill, Gerard Jallray and Carlin and Sarah Yon, who have all put in long hours.



Millers is a family run business, welcomes children and has a baby changing area. Jeanette said the no smoking policy came about because she doesn't like being in a smokey environment herself and also because it is better for families with children. The new bar planned in phase two will however have a smoking area, but also large extractors to prevent any trace of cigarette smoke permeating the rest of the premises.

Business has been "steady" in the first week of being open, says Jeanette, while feedback from customers is that the food is of "good quality" and "reasonably priced."

78 Squadron rescue injured seaman from *Kalatzri*

A Search and Rescue helicopter was called into operation on Tuesday to go to the aid of a crewmember of a fishing vessel.

Flight Lieutenant Adam Shipley of 78 Squadron said his crew received the initial call at about 8.30am as they were on the way to work. The brief was to rescue a 30 year old male crewman aboard the Spanish fishing vessel *Kalatzri*. Flt Lt Shipley said the man had suffered a "broken ankle and amputated four of his fingers."

The initial position put the vessel about 50 nautical miles to

the north of Stanley in a sea state five. There was a 400ft cloud base with about 2km visibility and wind from 050 degrees at 35 knots.

Flt Lt Shipley, Co-Pilot Flt Lt Mark Randall, Radio Operator Sgt Andy Catterall and Winchman Andy Rowlands arrived at the vessel at 10am.

The Winchman was lowered down to the bow of the vessel. Flt Lt Shipley said, "Unfortunately the casualty had been put right down in the lowest part of the ship so the winch man required a

stretcher to carry the rather large man up to the top deck for recovery. Once that had taken place the stretcher was recovered and then the casualty and winch man at the same time."

Winchman Andy Rowlands splinted the casualty's ankle, dressed his hand and, said Flt Lt Shipley, "put his missing fingers in ice."

The casualty was safely in the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital in Stanley shortly after 11am.

News in brief

FCO visitors

TWO representatives from the Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) have visited the Falklands this week to learn about the Islands first hand.

Sam Lones is the Assistant Desk Officer for the Falkland Islands in the Overseas Territories Department of the FCO and Ian Duddy is the Second Secretary in the British Embassy in Buenos Aires.

They visited San Carlos and Darwin on Sunday, spent Monday morning at Mount Pleasant and the afternoon and Tuesday in Stanley. They travelled to West Falkland on Wednesday.

Mr Lones left on Thursday and Mr Duddy leaves on the weekend.

Speaking to the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Station, Governor Howard Pearce said it has always been his policy to encourage colleagues from London and Buenos Aires to visit the Islands so they can, "understand our situation and people's views first hand," adding, "I very much welcome this visit."

Elqui under survey

A SURVEY is currently being conducted on the condition of the *Elqui*.

The longliner has been berthed at FIPASS since her arrest in the South Georgia zone on March 2, 2005. A trial in April found the owners of the ship guilty and fined them for illegally fishing for Patagonian Toothfish. The *Elqui* was consequently forfeited because the fines were not paid in the allocated seven days.

First Secretary Harriet Hall said that Lyle Craigie Halkett is currently conducting a survey to ascertain whether the vessel is suitable to be scrapped or cleaned and dumped.

The harbour dues for the *Elqui* were deferred at Friday's Standing Finance Committee for a revised paper to be put before the next meeting of Executive Council.

News from the July Executive Council meeting

New legislation proposals categorised

EXECUTIVE Council (ExCo) considered a paper from the Attorney General setting out proposals for new legislation and prioritising those proposals into three categories: essential/urgent, highly desirable, and desirable.

His Excellency the Governor, Howard Pearce said the purpose of this is to, "help the Attorney General to prioritise his work over the next few months."

ExCo agreed at the beginning of this year that legislative priorities should be reviewed at six-monthly intervals, and the issue will appear

on the ExCo agenda again in January 2006. Mr Pearce said that for those who would like more detail, the paper is being published.

"A specific area where legislation needs to be updated is that of workmen's compensation," said Mr Pearce.

ExCo agreed that a working party comprised of representatives of the private sector and Government should be established, to examine the compensation provisions of the Workmen's Compensation Ordinance and report back with recommendations.

Anti doping in sport convention to apply

A NEW international convention has recently been agreed (UNESCO International Convention Against Doping in Sport) with the object of eradicating the use of drugs at international sporting events.

The UK Government has invited the Falkland Islands Government to consider whether it wishes the Convention to be applied to the Falkland Islands. Mr Pearce said that it

seems likely that adherence to the Convention will in future be a necessary condition for participation in major international sporting events, for example the Commonwealth Games.

Executive Council decided that the UK Government should be told that it wishes the Convention to be applied to the Falkland Islands.

Planning and Building Committee vacancy filled

A vacancy had occurred in one of the five lay member slots on the Planning and Building Committee. Executive Council accepted the Committee's recommendation that

the vacancy should be filled by Mr Mike Rendell.

Court News

Man fined for resisting arrest

STANLEY man Campbell Kirkham pleaded guilty on Wednesday to charges of resisting arrest and of causing a breach of the peace. A third charge of criminal damage was dropped after Mr Kirkham offered to pay for the damage he had caused.

The court heard that Mr Kirkham had been drinking on the night of Saturday July 23, before ending up in the Globe Tavern. A Police officer on foot approached the Globe after hearing what he described as a "noisy incident."

The officer then observed Mr Kirkham walking away from the Globe towards a man in an aggressive manner at which point the Officer decided to intervene. Mr Kirkham physically pushed the officer who made the decision to arrest him. Mr Kirkham then pushed the officer against a nearby wall before a second officer arrived. After a struggle, Mr Kirkham was restrained with handcuffs and arrested.

Mr Kirkham continued to be violent and repeatedly kicked the police vehicle as the officers placed him inside. Once inside the vehicle, he managed to free his right arm from the handcuffs and began kicking the officers.

On reaching the Police Station and exiting the vehicle, one of the

officers tripped Mr Kirkham to try and get him under control, believing that he would fall on to grass. Instead Mr Kirkham landed on a path and sustained an injury to his face. When finally restrained, he was placed in a cell where he continued to shout and kick the door.

When interviewed the next morning, Mr Kirkham was completely cooperative and had no recollection of the events of the previous evening and could not even remember leaving the Globe.

Upon being told of his actions, Mr Kirkham immediately apologised to the police officers involved.

In mitigation, Mr Ian Warburton said his client was, "not a criminal" and that the incident was completely "out of character."

Mr Warburton said his client had not been out drinking in Stanley for around seven months but on this day he had been drinking heavily which was obviously a "significant factor."

Senior Magistrate Mrs Claire Faulds gave Mr Kirkham credit for apologising to all concerned and for his previous good character. For resisting arrest, she fined him £50 and for the breach of the peace, he was bound over for six months. He was also ordered to pay £70 court costs.

Speeding driver given £400 fine

MR Darryl Mark Yon pleaded guilty to two charges of driving without due care and attention and speeding.

Prosecuting, Crown Counsel (A), Alison Inglis told the court that on Friday June 10, Mr Yon had driven up Philomel Street and overtaken a Fiat Panda car near Philomel Place. Another car then appeared coming down the hill. Rather than drop back behind the Fiat, Mr Yon increased his speed and pulled in sharply in front of the Fiat, missing it by "only two metres" according to its driver. This caused the driver of the Fiat to stop his car to avoid hitting Mr Yon's vehicle. The driver of the oncoming vehicle said he would have hit Mr Yon had he not been travelling slowly.

Mr Yon said he had to continue the overtaking manoeuvre to avoid stalling his vehicle.

The following day, Mr Yon was recorded by a police speed check travelling at 52 miles per hour on the Stanley to Darwin road. He told police at the time, "I thought I was only doing 45."

For the charge of speeding, Mr Yon was fined £150. For the charge of driving without due care and attention, Senior Magistrate Claire Faulds fined him £250. He was ordered to pay £70 prosecution costs and his licence was endorsed.

Also in court on Wednesday, Mrs Faulds also set the date of September 14 for the trial of Cherilyn Julie King who has pleaded not guilty to assault occasioning actual bodily harm and common assault.

An Acting Senior Magistrate has now been sworn in and will arrive in early September to hear the case.

Infant and Junior School Head retires

AFTER 39 years in teaching and two stints in the Falklands, headteacher of the Infant and Junior School John Farrow is retiring today.

Mr Farrow and his wife are returning to the UK on Saturday where they will be living in Lincolnshire after five and a half years here in the Islands.

Mr Farrow also worked in the Falklands for three years between 1973 and 1976 and says he is glad he returned. "They always say you should never go back but that's not true. I have no regrets at all about coming back."

Director of Education Mrs Sylvia Cole wished Mr and Mrs Farrow the best for the future adding, "He'll be



greatly missed by parents and children who have got very high respect for him."

Bicycles safely parked after long walk

FIVE boys from the Falkland Islands Community School (FICS) achieved their aim this week when two new bicycle racks were delivered to the school.

Mare Courtney, Shane Mitchell, Robbie George, David Phillips and Tom Elsby decided to raise the money for the new bike racks by walking and cycling to Mount Pleasant. Despite collecting £1211.25 in sponsorship money, they were still some way short of the amount needed to have the racks sent out from the UK.

At this point, the General Engineering Flight (GEF) Workshop at MPA stepped in and offered to build the racks in return for the money being donated to charity.

Painted a smart blue, the racks were delivered to the school on Wednesday.

The boys have donated £1000 to the Phillip Green Trust of White Lodge School for handicapped children in the UK. The remaining £211.25 was donated to the South Atlantic Medal Association. Chairman of the Falklands branch Gary Clement thanked the boys saying, "that money is a quarter of a bum on a seat for a veteran to fly to the Islands."

Director of Education Sylvia Cole thanked the men from the GEF Workshop and said the new racks would, "make a big difference to what the school looks like."

Brize Norton closure means early check in



PASSENGERS travelling on the Air Atlanta airbridge to and from the Falklands will soon have to allow for extra time when arriving and departing Brize Norton.

The runway at the airbase is soon to be resurfaced meaning all flights normally operating out of Brize Norton will be relocated to nearby RAF Fairford, ten miles west of Brize Norton.

However, as RAF Fairford is predominantly a bomber base, it has no passenger facilities. Therefore, the passenger facilities at Brize Norton will continue to be used with passengers being carried

by coach to and from Fairford. A military spokesperson said, "More time will be spent in a coach and hopefully less time in the final departure lounge."

The resurfacing work, which will take place from September 16 through to January, will mean that all passengers must report to Brize Norton for check in at least four hours before departure.

The spokesperson said, "Hopefully this will only affect the majority of passengers once or twice at most; we would therefore urge all passengers to report on or before time and please be patient!"

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Your questions answered

Q Could you explain what the situation is with regard to payments of Family Allowance when a partner or member of the household is receiving tax exempt earnings and what, if any, changes have been made to legislation?

A Postmaster Moira Eccles provided the following response

The most recent amendment to legislation in this regard was contained in the Finance Ordinance 2000 and reads as follows:

"Notwithstanding any foregoing provision of this section, no allowance shall be payable under this section in respect of any child living as part of a household in respect of which any income of any member of that household is, by reason of - (a) a provision of any law of the Falkland Islands (other than in relation to the amount), or (b) any extra statutory concession granted by the Commissioner of Taxation, exempted from liability to pay Falkland Islands income tax."

This provision effectively means that family allowance is not payable in respect of children living in a household where any person receives tax exempt earnings.

Any person in receipt of family allowance who thinks they may be affected by this provision should contact the Post Office as soon as possible.

Q If a former FIG employee has been found guilty of bullying in a work place, would this find be included in a reference and if not, why not?

A Human Resources provided the following answer

All requests for references are provided with an honest and accurate response.

Q I'd be interested to know why the Falkland Islands Government had to lower the flags to half mast for the death of King Fahd?

A First Secretary, Harriet Hall replied.

Her Majesty the Queen instructed that the Union flag should be flown at half-mast on 1 August on Government Buildings in the UK and overseas. Government House and the Falkland Islands Government acted in accordance with these instructions.

Sunshine and rainfall below average in July

JULY'S mean temperatures were slightly above average for the month. With the rainfall being the fourth lowest recorded since records began at Mount Pleasant.

Sunshine and the mean wind speed were both below average.

The mean maximum temperature for the month was 5.1C against the average of 4.5C. The highest recorded maximum temperature was 12.4C on the 22nd. The lowest maximum -1.0C was recorded on the 3rd. The mean minimum temperature was 0.5C against the average of 0.1C. The lowest minimum temperature was -5.0C recorded on the 1st. There were 13 nights with air frost and 21 nights with a ground frost.

Rainfall was well below average with 23.1mm against the average of 58.1 mm. Making July 2005, the fourth driest on record at Mount

Pleasant. The highest daily total of 5.2 mm fell on the 28th. There were 21 days with 0.1 mm or more and 8 days with 1.0 mm or more. There were 3 instances of fog during the month.

Snow or sleet fell on 18 days during the month. With snow lying on 12 days. There were 3 instances of hail during the month.

Total sunshine for the month was 57.8 hours slightly below the long term average of 65.9 hours. The sunniest day was the 21st with 5.2 hours.

The mean speed for the month was 13.1 knots, slightly under the average of 13.4 knots for July. There was only 1 day with gales (34kts or more over a ten minute mean) during the month. The highest gust recorded was 50 knots on the 8th. Gusts exceeding 33 knots occurred on 8 days.

HMS Fearless outline their role in 1982

THE JOURNEY, a DVD/CD box set compiled by crew members of HMS Fearless in 1982 and outlining the part played by the ship during the war is now available at the Museum.

Albatross and Petrel programme pushes ahead

THE start of the Falklands Conservation Albatross and Petrel Programme (funded by the Overseas Territories Environment Programme and FIG) in March 2004 followed on from the highly successful Seabirds At Sea Team investigating the conservation of seabirds in the Falkland Islands. The Albatross team members have changed after a re-shuffle of staff in March 2005 but the aims have remained the same.

The programme is divided into several key elements. There is the ongoing seabird monitoring at sea, which involves observations of interactions between fishing trawlers and seabirds after the implementation of mitigation measures. This provides a means of estimating the mortality associated with the fishing industry and helps identify the best way to minimise the loss of protected birds. Project Leader Oli Yates said: "Our work here is advanced as mitigation devices that really work have been adopted and reductions in mortality appear to be excellent. The Falklands are ahead of targets and leaders in world seabird mitigation use. The effort needed now is to investigate the vessels with no mitigation or where little knowledge exists about seabird interactions, basically lolligo trawlers, jiggers and surimi vessels."

A second part is land-based conservation including the highly important five year counts of the breeding populations. Mr Yates said that without these estimates of numbers present throughout the Islands it would be impossible to determine if seabird populations are increasing, decreasing or remaining the same. "We are currently busy preparing for the summer season when the next round of counts will take place. Letters have been sent to landowners with colonies and many have already been returned with excellent descriptions of colony sites and details. I would like to thank everybody for replying and generously giving access permission to their

land. The surveys would be impossible without your support. If the remaining few folk who haven't replied could spare a few minutes to send in their maps we would be most grateful."

Education is an important part of any conservation project and this one is certainly no exception. Staff at Falklands Conservation have produced a colourful and informative leaflet (in Spanish) to be distributed to the fishing trawlers to help all the crew appreciate the reasons why they are now required to use bird-scaring devices whilst fishing. Mr Yates stresses that this is important as all crewmembers "have to do a little extra to make this successful, and with long workdays anyway this is a lot to ask." Education works both ways onshore, and through talks with landowners. FC have been able to better appreciate the management of Falkland Island seabird colonies particularly minimising impact from human disturbance, especially during sensitive egg and young chick periods. Mr Yates said these details will help to write recommended guidelines for seabird colonies. He added: "Thank you to all those who have helped develop best management issues.

"A further aspect, and one we are extremely excited about is an up and coming international workshop to be held in Stanley. A group of experts, including those involved with seabird conservation on other UK Overseas Territories, will be visiting the Falklands in March 2006 to discuss progressing implementation of the international Agreement for the Conservation of Albatross and Petrels. Delegates will help define the roles of each Territory, identify gaps in our knowledge and make recommendations on the future direction of seabird work. It will be a great opportunity to showcase the seabird conservation work in the Falklands, where many of the key people are right here with the birds, where it matters."

Officials 'far from professional'

IN THE nine years I have lived and worked in the Falklands this is the first time I can honestly say I have witnessed for myself blatant disrespect for peoples' privacy and rights.

I respect the job they do at Customs but what I saw on the July 23 incoming flight from Chile was far from professional: more farcical. My daughter was the first to be detained - in my eyes, not in the right manner. As she stepped from the plane she was made to wait at the bottom of the steps until her partner caught up with her. They then had to wait until their colleague (who was almost the last person leaving the plane) caught up with them and then all three of them were led away in full view of the public. Could they not have waited until they were in the terminal?

I moved to the arrivals' gate to wait for my family to clear customs. To add insult to injury my stepson and his colleague who were also passengers arriving on this flight were being searched, both of whom had gone to the Shetland Island Games (at extreme cost to themselves) to represent the Falklands. In all, the only people I saw being searched that day were four Saint Helenian males and a Scottish lass - the partner of one of those saints... coincidence? I think not.

My stepson and his colleague

were soon allowed to leave the terminal. I waited while my daughter and her partner's personal belongings were meticulously searched by the scanner and hoards of customs and security personnel. I witnessed a civilian - not a member of security, nor a member of customs - being invited into the search area by one of the officials, as the official said it would be warmer inside for him.

It was not long before some of the officials found another way of keeping themselves warm. To my disbelief, and in my presence these officials started playing around with a football they had found in the nearby hangar, while my daughter and her partner were still being searched by their colleagues.

No redress was given by customs for publicly embarrassing the group or for the inconvenience of the whole episode. The only courtesy, professionalism and respect displayed was that of the military personnel on duty at the terminal. They kindly offered me a hot beverage and the warmth of their office which I declined as I wanted to witness what the customs personnel were capable of doing next.

Eventually after four long hours, my daughter, her partner and their colleague were at last allowed to leave the terminal.

Obituary - Emily Flora Surrey 1906 - 2005

IT IS with regret that the family of the late Emily Flora Surrey report her death after a short illness in Guildford, Surrey on June 22 2005, her 99th birthday.

Emily, born in Stanley, was the eldest of three daughters of Thomas (Hookey) and May Walker (nee Allan).

As a young woman she went to work for the Blake family in Santa Cruz, Argentina

When in London on holiday with them she met her future husband, Stanley Surrey. It was love at first sight and when she returned to Argentina with the Blakes via the Falklands, Stan promised he would wait for her. He had a long wait, it took her four and a half years to save enough for her fare back to London where they were married on July 31, 1937.

Emily worked with the London ambulance service during World War II and had some hairy moments, especially at the height of the blitz.

They eventually moved from Wandsworth Common to Shalford near Guildford where they lived out their retirement.

They were a popular couple who enjoyed having family and friends to visit and you could always be sure of a warm welcome, homemade cakes and preserves and a tour of their lovely garden.

Sadly, Stan passed away in February 2001 but Emily continued to live alone until she was admitted to hospital in late May 2005.

She is survived by a son, John, daughter, Joyce, five grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

She was a great correspondent and kept in regular contact with Shirley and Heather in New Zealand, Joan in London and myself where she maintained a keen interest in the Falklands to the end.

She was a lovely lady who had enjoyed a long and happy life and she will be sadly missed by all who knew her.

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'Shock and sadness' at bullying

I READ with shock and sadness the letters about bullying within the school and government (FIG), in the last two editions of *Penguin News*.

It is so good to see that so many members of the public share the feeling of revulsion at these acts.

Bullying is an insidious crime which can take many forms. It can manifest itself in a physical form but it is always first and foremost a crime against the mind. For the Attorney General to state that the three cases of bullying that Norman McGregor Edwards was found guilty of were mild, is to overlook the fact that he was found guilty of these offences in the first place and to trivialise what happened.

In each case it is the level at which the bullying affects the victim that counts and to say it is mild and therefore does not warrant any form of disciplinary action, is to belittle the victim and elevate the perpetrator.

Over one year ago an investigation was carried out at the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital into the alleged misuse of drugs. The internal investigation found that no drugs were missing. Later a second professional investigation was carried out by the Royal Falkland Islands Police and a nurse was convicted. Before the case went to court the then innocent nurse had her passport removed to prevent her leaving the Islands. Yet Norman McGregor Edwards was found guilty of not one, not two, but three counts of bullying, five days before he was due to leave but was allowed to go without any action being taken whatsoever.

The Attorney General says that FIG certainly does not pay lip serv-

Complaints will always be treated seriously

I HAVE read the recent exchanges regarding complaints against the former Director of Health and have nothing material to add to the comments made by the Attorney General in his letter published on 15 July.

Internal disciplinary actions are usually very personal matters and the details must normally be regarded as confidential. However, I am able to confirm that I came to a decision on the findings of the investigation of the complaints of bullying within two working days of receipt of the report from the Senior Magistrate who I had commissioned to conduct an investigation. I have conveyed my decision to the complainant and the former Director of Health.

Managers are entitled, and indeed have a duty, to manage but are expected to behave reasonably at all times. Robust styles of management are not to be confused with bullying. Bullying in any form in the workplace, or for that matter anywhere else, is simply not acceptable and any complaints will always be treated seriously. In the particular case in question, the specific circumstances of each complaint that was upheld (some were not) were viewed as 'fairly minor' in nature by the Senior Magistrate - a conclusion with which, after careful thought, I agreed.

I do not accept that all instances of bullying must be given equal

ice to anti-bullying. I would suggest that (lack of) action speaks louder than words. Having been found guilty of three counts of bullying I wouldn't be surprised if victims were to pursue matters further. Yet unlike the then innocent nurse he was allowed to walk away.

By using the Senior Magistrate to investigate rather than professional investigators such as the Royal Falkland Islands Police, FIG have effectively stopped any criminal or civil cases going to court in the Islands, as there is nobody impartial left to try it.

Also, if *PN* had not published the case, the public would not have known the sort of person formerly employed in their name to run their Health Service.

The Attorney General mentions in his letter that FIG policy is one of reconciliation between the parties. I would suggest that this is fine when both parties are of equal status and the reconciliation can be supervised, such as two pupils in the same class at school. A teacher or the Headteacher can supervise. But when the bullying is by a very senior manager to a junior, who will supervise this? Norman McGregor Edwards was answerable to the Chief Executive; would he supervise the reconciliation? When the bully is the boss, the FIG policy appears to fail.

Bullying is rarely done in isolation. Have other cases of alleged bullying by Norman McGregor Edwards been reported in his time in the Islands and if so were they properly investigated and what action was taken with them?

weight - there are most certainly degrees of severity. The Management Code anticipates such situations and, were it not for the fact that the former Director's employment terminated less than three working days after I had received the investigation report, I would personally have been facilitating a meeting between the complainant and the Director to secure a resolution by way of what I might describe as conciliation. My objective would have been to promote an open and constructive dialogue between the parties and acceptance of an action plan to ensure that there was no repeat of inappropriate conduct and to obtain a commitment to that effect. Implementation of the action plan would have been carefully monitored.

Finally, I am personally satisfied with the process used to investigate this particular complaint and of the ability of the Senior Magistrate to conduct such an investigation. I have no reason to believe that there are any grounds whatsoever for criminal proceedings and, if civil proceedings are instituted in the Courts, the case would be heard by an independent examiner.

I advised the complainant, who has since left the Islands, of my findings by letter of 16 May since when I have received no further communication from him.

FIDC budget - 'the full picture'

READING Nancy Poole's letter. I can fully see why this would cause concern. The initial small *Penguin News* extract was not able to show the full picture regarding the Falkland Islands Development Corporation's (FIDC) budget.

It related to the first FIDC board meeting of the 2005/06 financial year, where the year's central costs were approved, and approvals given for some minor projects. These do not represent the organisation's total budget, nor reflect its overall income and expenditure.

Recent significant reductions in administration staffing mean FIDC's central costs of £418,000 (of which less than £100,000 is spent on admin) are more than covered by the £481,000 income that FIDC generates from its own activities.

This financial year, FIDC will receive £469,000 of direct support from FIG, but more than this amount (£531,500) will be paid out directly to support local businesses.

Without passing on any admin charges to FIG, FIDC also manages a further £370,000 of Government spending relating to the Falkland Islands Meat Company (FIMCo), energy projects, and coastal shipping. FIDC also manages a diverse portfolio of assets with a balance sheet value of over £8m.

FIDC's activities are very diverse and include those which are customer specific, such as finance

and loans, property services, energy, and grant support (e.g. for shellfish testing). The organisation carries out project-based work, including FIMCo and aquaculture development, and also strategic work with an Islands-wide benefit: developing air access and international shipping links; ownership of the Tamar; assistance with the continued operation of Stanley Dairy; energy infrastructure development; promotional marks such as the wool mark and mark of origin; and the operation of both the internet portal www.falklandislands.com, and the '.fk' domain.

I would like to reassure you that FIDC has a vigorous approach to increasing value from its investments and is robustly scrutinised not only by FIG and Councillors, but also by the independent members of the private sector who represent the Rural Business Association (RBA), the Vessel Owner's Association (VoA), Falkland Islands Tourist Board (FITB) and the Chamber of Commerce and who make up half of FITB - as two articles in the original *PN* demonstrated. Members of the public are welcome to attend Falkland Islands Development Board (FIDB) meetings to observe proceedings, and if anyone at any time would like more information, please contact any member of the team at FIDC.


We only went from the play park on St Mary's Walk to the Bread Shop and back.





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News from Executive Council's July 28 meeting

Range of decisions follow DFF audit

HIS Excellency the Governor Mr Pearce said that "a range of decisions" arose out of an audit of the so-called, Domestic Fuel Formula (DFF), which is used to calculate the price of fuel in the Islands.

Mr Pearce said most people will be aware that Stanley Services Ltd holds a monopoly licence for the supply of fuel products. "In return, Stanley Services Ltd is obliged to maintain fuel stocks at or above agreed levels and to set fuel prices in accordance with the Domestic Fuel Formula.

"Following an audit by FIG's Internal Auditor of the Domestic Fuel Formula and discussion in Executive Council (ExCo) last year, a series of recommendations were considered by ExCo last week." Mr Pearce described the issues involved as "complex and technical." He added, "because of the public interest in this issue I have set out the decisions taken by Executive Council in detail."

1. SSL should be asked formally to agree side notes to the Fuel Supply Agreement to provide for:

- simplification of the pricing formula and

- application of interest to the DFF provision, including a penalty rate for excessive balances owed to the customer.

2. SSL should be invited to discuss a fundamental review of the pricing formula, with the objective of removing perverse incentives from that formula.

3. SSL should be required to compensate the customer for the profit that it has erroneously drawn on transport costs throughout the life of the Fuel Supply Agreements.

4. SSL should be required to obtain itemised invoices for future supplies of diesel and kerosene. Alternatively, the company should agree a transport percentage of prime costs that will be excluded from the 2.5% return calculation for the purposes of the pricing formula.

5. SSL should be required to reduce the DFF operating cost apportionments to a level that better reflects the proportion of turnover from fuel activities, except for those items where the

company can provide firm activity data to demonstrate that a different percentage is appropriate.

6. Apportioned costs for marketing and entertainment should be removed from the DFF calculation.

7. SSL should be asked formally to agree a side-note to the Fuel Supply Agreement to clarify that, for the purposes of the pricing formula, depreciation is always to be based on the initial historic cost of fixed assets.

8. SSL should account for shared use assets in a manner that clearly demonstrates that only the fair proportion of the costs is borne by the DFF. In the meantime, notional rents should be increased, where necessary, to provide for full recovery of the non-fuel element by the DFF.

9. In the event that SSL resists implementing all or some of the recommendations in this report, FIG should solicit the company's agreement for the Principal Auditor to be asked to review those findings when he next visits the Falkland Islands. This would provide a cost effective alternative to invoking the potentially expensive option of employing a firm of accountants to act as expert and make binding recommendations.

Following its discussion in June of the problems arising from the quality of fuel recently supplied by Stanley Services Ltd, Executive Council considered possible amendments to the Petroleum Products Ordinance in order to provide added protection to consumers. Mr Pearce said that after some discussion, Executive Council agreed that the Petroleum Products Ordinance be amended so as to:

- (a) provide for complaints relating to the supply of fuel by any licensee under the Ordinance to be made to a Fuel Commissioner and for the powers of the Commissioner;

- (b) provide for the fuel price formula agreed between FIG and SSL to have statutory force;

- (c) provide for the results of any audit of the application of the fuel price formula to be published.

Mr Pearce said that the responsibilities of Fuel Commissioner will be carried out by an existing official, the identity of who is yet to be decided, and will therefore not involve the establishment of an additional post or any further expenditure.

Wrecks and hulks restoration funds carried over

The Falkland Islands Government agreed last year to make available some £25,000 to the Museum and National Trust to support work on wrecks and hulks in Stanley.

These funds were offered on a matching basis - FIG would contribute £1 for every £1 raised for this purpose by the Museum. At its meeting last week ExCo agreed that, since none of this money was spent in the previous financial year, the £25,000 in matching funds could be carried over from the last

to the current (2005/06) financial year; that £2,840 of this money should now be released to the Museum to match funds which had been raised; and that the unspent balance remaining at the end of the current financial year should be carried over to 2006/07.

ExCo also agreed that Mr Vernon Steen and Mrs Alison Barton should be reappointed for a period of three years as Trustees of the Falkland Islands Museum and National Trust.

No licence to kill protected birds

NO further licences for the killing of Turkey Vultures or other protected birds will be issued.

Farmers have applied for licences to control turkey vultures because of the damage they cause to sheep.

Mr Pearce said ExCo held a full discussion of these applications and reached the following conclusions: "The current arrangement, under which the Governor's powers in the Conservation of Wildlife and Nature Ordinance 1999 to issue licences to kill protected birds have been

delegated to a government official, should be revoked; that a paper should be prepared by the Department of Agriculture, following consultation with all interested parties (including the Rural Business Association, Falklands Conservation, Falklands Tourism and the Environmental Planning Officer), setting out the issues and making recommendations for future policy; and that meanwhile, no licences for the killing of turkey vultures or other protected birds should be issued."

Renewal of seismic exploration licence

THE renewal was agreed for a further year from 20 December 2005 of the exploration licence held by Geophysical Service Incorporated, under which they are entitled to acquire offshore seismic data under contract for production licence holders Falkland Oil and Gas Ltd and Borders and Southern Petroleum.

Mr Pearce said it is expected that this work will continue to be carried out by their vessel *GSI Admiral*.

Lease on 'The Place' continued for one year

THE lease to the premises known as The Place is to continue with a further review to take place in July 2006.

In October last year ExCo agreed to rent the old Telephone Exchange on Ross Road to the Trustees of The Place as a meeting place for the young people of Stanley. This decision was subject to review in the middle of this year.

Mr Pearce said members of ExCo noted that usage of The Place had dropped off significantly in recent months, and hoped that this vote of confidence would revive interest on the part of young people in using the building. He said the importance of young people having a place of their own in which they could meet is recognised, and encouraged them to make "full use of this facility."

KTV to repair radio mast on Sappers Hill

THE TELEVISION and radio mast on Sappers Hill is nearing the end of its useful life.

The mast has suffered recent damage and is in need of repair and maintenance in order to enable it to operate for another one to two years until it is replaced.

Mr Pearce said ExCo had

agreed that an offer by Mr Mario Zuvic of KTV Ltd to employ Chilean engineers to carry out this work should be accepted.

ExCo also had a preliminary discussion of options for the long-term replacement of the mast, decision on this aspect will be taken at a future meeting of ExCo.

Dog kennel extension to be reconsidered

EXCO agreed that Planning permission for the extension of a dog kennel at Murray Heights should be revoked and reconsidered at the next meeting of the Planning and Building Committee on September 8.

At its meeting in the middle of last month, the Planning and

Wool report - week ending July 22

by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

NEW ZEALAND wool markets were "softer" last week after the enthusiasm of the previous week. Most micron categories were down by 1 to 2% for fleeces wool. Some oddments however were up to 1% dearer.

Reduced buying interest from China and the mid-year selling recess in Australia were put forward as reasons for the weeks price falls.

Considerable interest will focus on Australian markets as they open next week after their three-week "holiday". It is suggested that currency movements over the last few weeks should make Australian greasy wool cheaper for Chinese processors (a good point to assist in increasing demand) however the impact on potential export sales of Chinese finished products is still being debated.

An estimated 45,000 bales are expected at next week's sales in Australia and almost 27,000 bales in New Zealand.

Exchange rates used to convert wool prices into pence per kg clean basis. Australian \$2.30 per 1£ sterling compared to \$2.29 per 1£ sterling previous week.





Twelve years to recover Torres del Paine

ATWELVE year program for the restoration of Chile's most renowned national park, Torres del Paine which suffered a devastating blaze that destroyed several thousands hectares of pristine wildlife was approved this week in Punta Arenas.

Magallanes Region Environmental Office approved the program involving approximately 7.5 million US dollars presented by the National Forestry Corporation.

The funds will be provided by

Chile's Ministry of Agriculture, regional government of Magallanes, the Czech government and a German forest promotion agency, according to Maria Luisa Ojeda CEO from the Magallanes Environmental Office.

"The project is programmed in four stages which we hope will return the Park, in twelve years time, to conditions before last summer's blaze," said Ms Ojeda.

The first goal is to restore surface vegetation in the open areas

and the different tree species damaged by the fire which took a whole month to stamp out.

Another top priority is mounting a forest fire prevention system so there's no repeat of the last season, and no further surprises inside the most forested areas of the park, which went unscathed during the February blaze.

The fire was concentrated to less than 5% of Torres del Paine's park area and was started by a young Czech camper.

Gibraltar Governor candidate for top intelligence post

GIBRALTAR Governor Sir Francis Richards is the front runner for a top intelligence post that will play a key role in the prevention of more suicide bombings in Britain, according to an article in The Times newspaper.

Sir Francis a former head of GCHQ the government signals intelligence centre, is being linked to the post of chairman of the Cabinet Office Joint Intelligence Committee, which, says the newspaper, "provides Tony Blair and his most senior Cabinet colleagues with a 'red book' of intelligence each week."

Its role is to assess and give early warning of developments likely to affect Britain's interests.

The JIC also advises on priorities for intelligence gathering to counter the threat of international terrorism.

Other front-runners for the job include Sir Peter Torry and Sir Nigel Sheinwald.

However a spokesperson for Sir Francis declined to confirm or deny the story, limiting himself to saying that this was the first that the Governor had heard of this.

Blair and Lula talks about London killing

BRITISH Prime Minister Tony Blair telephoned Brazilian President Luis Inacio Lula da Silva Tuesday to apologize once more for the death of Jean Charles de Menezes, whom London police shot dead after mistaking him for a terrorist.

Official Brazilian sources said Blair explained to President Lula that London "is going through a very difficult time" because of recent terrorist attacks, adding that he had appointed a special commission to investigate De Menezes' slaying.

According to the Brazilian president's office, Lula told Blair he understands Britain's problems, deeply regretted what happened and underscored that steps should be taken to prevent the death of innocent people.

During the ten minutes conversation President Lula told Mr. Blair of the sadness he felt when he spoke with De Menezes' parents about their son, who was shot eight times, seven in the head, as he lay on the floor of a London subway car.

The electrician was buried this week in Gonzaga, his home town in Minas Gerais among great local grief and support for the family. The Menezes also met with officials from the British government and Metropolitan Police who visited them to express their regrets over the loss of 27 year old Menezes.

The Menezes' family has demanded compensation from the British government that, according to the London press, could total as much as \$1 million.

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End of an era for Falklands protector

ONE of the Royal Navy vessels used in the Falklands Conflict Task Force was decommissioned this week.

HMS Leeds Castle sailed into Portsmouth Harbour for the last time on Monday as her 24 year navy career came to an end.

A familiar sight in the Falklands, the *Leeds Castle* has, along with her sister ship *Dumbarton Castle*, provided the resident naval patrol for the Islands for over ten years.

Commanding Officer of the ship, Lieutenant Commander Chris Goodsell said, "It has been an honour and a privilege to serve as the last Commanding Officer of *HMS Leeds Castle* through the final few months of her long and distinguished history.

"She has served the Royal Navy with distinction and now heads towards a well-deserved retirement."

His Excellency the Governor, Mr Howard Pearce has paid tribute to the ship after her long association with the Islands. In a letter sent to Lt Cdr Goodsell, Mr Pearce said, "Falkland Islanders are deeply grateful for the key role which the

vessel has played in protecting the Falkland Islands and in maintaining UK sovereignty in the South Atlantic. He added, "They also value greatly the personal friendships which have been made over the years with the officers and crew."

Mr Pearce describes the sight of the *Leeds Castle* steaming into harbour as, "... a great source of comfort and reassurance."

Leeds Castle left the Islands for the last time in November and has been busy with various tasks in places such as Lithuania, Norway and Newcastle.

Leeds Castle and *Dumbarton Castle* are being replaced in their Falkland Island patrol duties by brand new ship *HMS Clyde*. The *Clyde* is currently being built in Portsmouth and is expected to enter service in 2007.

The Falklands Regime: Bingham book hits the shelves

ENVIRONMENTALIST and former Falklands Conservation (FC) Officer, Mike Bingham has written a book about his experiences in the Falklands.

Entitled 'The Falklands Regime' The Book Store review describes the book as a "true story" which tells how, "twenty years after British troops died for democracy in the Falklands War, a British citizen would be forced to flee the Falklands to escape political corruption and death threats, to seek democracy and freedom of speech in Argentina."

Mr Bingham hit the headlines in 2003 when he challenged Executive Council's decision to refuse his application for Falkland Island Status in the Supreme Court. Executive Councilors had recommended to the Governor that the application be refused on the grounds that Mr Bingham had misrepresented his qualifications on appointment to Falklands Conservation, held out that he had a Doctorate from a university in Ireland which was "bogus", did not have "...skills, abilities and qualifications" of which the

Islands were in need and listed three other grounds relating to Mr Bingham's outspoken views on conservation which criticised the Government.

On October 27, 2003, Chief Justice Wood ruled that Executive Council's decision to refuse Mr Bingham's application for Falkland Islands Status was, "...morally and constitutionally indefensible," and that it, "breached Mr Bingham's freedom of speech guaranteed by section 10 of the Constitution."

Executive Councilors responded to the ruling saying, "...This does not mean that he (Justice Wood) has granted the application which will have to be reconsidered by the Executive Council."

It is not public information whether Mr Bingham has ever re-applied for Falkland Island Status.

Excerpts from the Free Preview of the book to be found on www.authorhouse.com, read: "The people exposed for corruption wanted revenge, and since the Supreme Court ruling had not stopped them, it was hard to imagine what would. Sooner or later my

luck was bound to run out, and they would succeed in framing me for something serious in such a way that I would not be able to prove my innocence... By now I was weary of looking over my shoulder, of continually checking my house in search of false evidence that the Falklands police might have planted, of being unable to start a family for fear of the harassment they would suffer for my beliefs."

Chief Police Officer, Dave Morris said that the allegations Mike Bingham makes regarding the Royal Falkland Islands Police are "totally untrue."

The preview of the book claims that when Mr Bingham, "dared to connect the starvation of five million penguins to commercial fishing that was making the Falklands elite rich, a deadly game of cat and mouse was unleashed," and "...when oil exploration began in the Falklands, Mike Bingham led a protest against the hundreds of penguins that were dying from oil pollution."

News in brief

Marine life study

THE Hobart-based Australian Antarctic Division is to coordinate the biggest marine life survey of its kind in Antarctica.

It will involve up to 30 countries, with 15 research ships and about 200 scientists over the summer of 2007-2008. Antarctic Division chief scientist Professor Michael Stoddart says the census is part of a bigger 10-year study of the world's marine life.

"Never before has there been a survey where everyone has worked in the same way, using exactly the same sampling devices and gear, so that you can get an overall snapshot." He said the overall snapshot will be a benchmark, "against which we can look at the effects of future climate change and so forth."

Professor Stoddart added that the international census could reveal new species.

VC10 damaged

MILITARY officials are investigating the cause of an incident on Wednesday afternoon when a VC 10 aircraft was damaged upon landing.

Four port side tyres burst when the VC10 touched down at Mount Pleasant Airfield. The aircraft had been out on a routine flight.

Officials from the base confirmed that the aircraft will not be flying again until they have finished looking into the matter, but say that it is a pretty quick process. The aircraft is reported to have made a safe touchdown while reports that there was damage to the runway have been denied. *FIBS*

Elqui to be scuttled

Operations Manager for the Government of South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands, Gordon Liddle, has confirmed that the *Elqui* is to be scuttled.

The survey on the longliner has been completed and the decision has been made to scuttle her because the scrap value is minimal.

Mr Liddle said that a date and place for the disposal of the *Elqui* has yet to be decided.

Penguin News

If *Penguin News* were a sailing ship and news was the source of power, it would be no exaggeration to say that we have been floundering in the doldrums this week.

I can recall many an occasion when we have struggled to fit the news items accumulated throughout the week on the final pages and even had to choose between front page stories. But, as in every walk of life there are times of feast and times of famine.

Having said that, after watching *Geldof in Africa* on Tuesday night's BFBS television I feel more than a little guilty about comparing anything we in the Falklands might experience to famine - or come to that complain about anything at all.

To see a programme which was explicit in it's portrayal of children who are terrorised on a daily basis and spend their nights seeking safety from marauding psychopaths who would bear them away to a life of slavery and depravity, is almost more than any normal human being can comprehend. One is left in awe of those children who manage to survive such ordeals physically and mentally and on occasion, against all odds, have gone on to do great things with their lives. Even given some of the horror stories related in this programme, I can't help but hope that some of the older children in the Falklands were watching and gave some thought to how fortunate they are in their privileged lifestyles in one of the safest places on earth to live.

On the subject of *our* young people, they have contributed greatly to the community over the last few weeks. I found the recent fund-raiser in the Globe Tavern an enjoyable eye opener for one who has a bit of a morbid fear of large groups of children. (I was once sent to pick up my two nieces from school and it took all my will power not to leg it when the school doors burst open and what, to me, resembled a riotous lamb break headed in my direction).

The school prize giving ceremonies demonstrated not only academic abilities but also a willingness to contribute to society in one form or another.

So while on occasion our youngsters of today take a knock for always either, "being on the Play Station" or "out on the streets" instead of taking up a part time job or running errands for the elderly, it is a sign of prosperity that their parents can indulge them.

Less than 25 years ago 15 year olds were expected to be independent, work alongside adults, make a living, contribute to the families well being and more often than not move away from home to achieve this.

It's a reflection of an evolving society that teenagers mature at an earlier age, yet are treated as children for longer because they have to remain dependant in order to obtain the education we expect of them and they know they have to achieve, to compete in a highly competitive business world.

So youngsters, enjoy life, stay within the law and always be considerate of those around you. Your childhood and your future are two of the most valuable assets you will ever own.

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Shock at Robin Cook's death

AFTER his tragic death last weekend, Falkland Islands councillors have paid tribute to Labour politician Robin Cook and are said to be "shocked and saddened" at the news.


In a statement from Gilbert House, Legislative Council said the former Foreign Secretary will be remembered in the Islands for his close association with the 1999 White Paper, "Partnership for Progress and Prosperity" which is the basis for the Overseas Territories' relationship with the UK. The document upholds the right to self-determination and encourages the development of democratic government in each territory. The change from Dependent Territories to Overseas Territories was also formalised in this document.

Councillors have described Mr Cook as, "an honest politician, and a man of great conscience and integrity".

Mr Cook, who passed away in Scotland last Saturday, will be especially remembered in the Falklands for his work during the negotiations which led to the British-Argentine Joint Statement of July 1999.

Councillor Jan Check said Mr Cook's death had come as a great shock and that "he still had a lot to offer".

Having met him in 1999 Mrs Check said "I found him to be entirely different to how British newspapers portrayed him." She



added that she found Mr Cook "clever and charming."

Describing Mr Cook as "a very good friend to the Falkland Islands," Councillor Richard Cockwell said he was "very sad" to hear of his death.

Mr Cockwell added that he found Mr Cook was always ready to listen. "He actually thought about what you said and gave you an honest reply which was very encouraging."

Councillor Cockwell also made reference to Mr Cook's treatment by the British media saying, "He wasn't well served by the press but he certainly served the Falkland Islands well."

A letter of condolence has been sent to Mr Cook's widow from councillors.

Seminar in BA discusses the Falklands

A TWO day conference on the Falkland Islands conflict and sovereignty dispute to be opened and closed by Foreign Affairs Minister Rafael Bielsa will be held this week in Buenos Aires, sponsored by, among others, the Malvinas Families committee.

Two other ministers besides Mr Bielsa, Defence Secretary Jose Pampuro and Education Secretary Daniel Filmus will be participating in the seminar "Malvinas in the South American Union: a strategic view" which began on Thursday and is also sponsored by the Argentine Foreign Affairs ministry, National University of Lanus and the Malvinas Institute.

"The armed conflict, current tensions and threats in the South Atlantic" was the first module on the agenda for Thursday which was to be attended by Minister Pampuro and General Roberto Bendini, Army Chief of Staff.

In the afternoon academics and legal experts were to address the sinking of the General Belgrano cruiser. "War crime or military action?"

This morning (Friday) the diplomatic side of the conflict since 1989 is to be addressed by officials from the Argentine Foreign Affairs ministry. In the afternoon

Minister Filmus will lecture on "The Malvinas issue and the education system" together with the Dean from Lanus University, Ana Jaramillo, followed by the Argentine film "Crazy for the flag", a co-production from the Argentine Film Institute and the Malvinas Families Commission.

Minister Bielsa will sum up the event in the closing ceremony to which the ambassadors from Peru, Brazil and Venezuela have been specially invited.

Reporting from Buenos Aires, Peter Pepper said The film "Illuminados por el Fuego" (Illuminated by the Gunfire") is to have a special viewing in Buenos Aires cinemas today (Friday).

Mr Pepper added, "Interestingly, Daniel Barenboim and his mixed (Peace) orchestra of Palestinians and Israelis is playing here in Buenos Aires at the moment. However I have seen no suggestion of him or others trying to form a Falklands, British, Argentine orchestra to promote a settlement of the Falklands dispute."

"The Argentine Government had tried to get Barenboim to set such an orchestra up in the past, but he was apparently unwilling to do so."

Councillor Stephen Luxton said that while he hasn't seen the whole book it would seem from the preview that the book is largely a repetition of his previous work, and as such, "rests on a foundation of inaccuracies such as: the fact that the penguin deaths were later found to be due to red tide, not over-fishing as claimed by Mr Bingham; the fact that the 'oil pollution' referred to was tested and proven to have been heavy crude oil of non Falklands composition, probably from a passing tanker and certainly nothing to do with the oil exploration taking place in the Falklands at that time, and the fact that the Supreme Court case was actually to do with Mr Bingham's status application, and nothing whatsoever to do with the alleged and fictitious "bungled attempts to deport, imprison and kill [Bingham]."

Councillor Luxton said it would also be interesting to see if the book notes that the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) who were allegedly "out to get him" employed Mr Bingham for a number of years, and that the same FIG "made an exception in order to provide him with a subsidised housing plot in spite of the fact that he was technically not eligible for one. I imagine it does not, nor do I expect the book to contain detailed background to Mr Bingham's 'degree' from Shelbourne University."

When asked if Councillors are likely to seek legal representation over the claims made in the book, Mr Luxton said, "I think that anybody who knows the real situation has heard most of this before, and is highly unlikely to take any of the claims seriously. We are therefore not considering legal action at the present time."

Governor goes Top Gun in F3 Tornado jet

GOVERNOR Howard Pearce went "top gun" last month when he was given a flight in an RAF F3 Tornado fighter jet by 1435 Squadron at Mount Pleasant.

Squadron Leader Hoskison first briefed Mr Pearce on all aspects of the aircraft before taking him on an hour long tour of the Islands.

As well as passing by Government house, the Governor was subjected to aerobatics, supersonic speeds and huge 'G' force.

Sqd Ldr Hoskison said, "It was a great privilege to fly the Governor and I believe that he thoroughly enjoyed his flight."

"He was an excellent passenger who was able to stay in good humour throughout this testing flight."



Court News

Third offence in two weeks for Yon

IN court on Wednesday was Stanley man Daryl Yon who pleaded guilty to a charge of driving without due care and attention.

Ros Cheek prosecuting told the court that on July 27 Mr Yon was parked near his boss's house on Fieldhouse Close. She said he was parked on the left hand side of the road facing north and was in the vehicle with the engine running.

A van drove up behind Mr Yon who was blocking the entrance. The driver of the van waited for him to move his vehicle. Instead, he reversed back at speed, subsequently hitting the front end of the van. The driver of the van said he didn't think Mr Yon had looked before moving.

Mr Yon said in interview that he had looked in his side mirror but

not his rear view. It was noted that he was not wearing his glasses at the time, which he requires for driving, because they had been broken the previous day. The police took an eyesight test which Mr Yon failed.

Minor damage was caused to his vehicle but extensive damage was caused to the van.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds reminded the defendant that he had only been in court last week for similar offences with penalties to pay for those charges, adding that he "must be more careful in future."

Mrs Faulds fined Mr Yon £200 plus £70 prosecution costs. She also decided that this fine was to be paid in conjunction with the others and all fines should be cleared by the end of October. *FIBS*

'Unfortunate error' for JCB driver

ALSO in court this week was Stanley man John Gall Sutherland who pleaded guilty to a charge of driving without due care and attention.

The prosecution told the court how, on July 12, a Mitsubishi Pajero was travelling east down the Stanley Bypass when the driver noticed a JCB stationary at the Eliza Cove junction. On passing the junction, the driver felt the rear end of his vehicle fly out and he lost control. The vehicle flipped on to the driver's side and skidded approximately 100 metres. The driver suffered shock and minor injuries.

During interview, Mr Sutherland, who was driving the JCB, said he had looked both ways after stop-

ping at the junction and saw "....nothing out of the ordinary."

He said that he had heard a loud bang and realised what had happened so stopped the JCB immediately. Mr Sutherland apologised to the court for the accident, adding that he "wished it had never happened."

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds noted the defendant's previous clean record and said she accepted that the incident was "an unfortunate error."

She fined the defendant £250 to be paid in seven days, endorsed his licence and ordered him to pay £70 prosecution costs.

Neither of the cases in court had legal representation. *FIBS*

Situated in the former Freshco shop next to Beauchene, the delicatessen is owned and run by Beauchene Trading Co Ltd.

Willows wanted for trials

MANY people in the Falkland Islands are interested in tree planting whether it be for shelter, products from trees or simply to improve the appearance of their property.

Since the late 1980s the UK Falkland Islands Trust has been encouraging tree planting through publications and trials at Fitzroy, East Stanley and Keppel Island among others. The Department of Agriculture followed up with a substantial series of shelterbelt trials in the 1990s underpinned by excellent advice from Alan Low ex Forestry Commission. Trials mainly using lodgepole pine, were established at Estancia, Shallow Harbour, Saladero, Port Howard and Bold Cove and if you have not seen any of these you soon will as the trees are growing really well!

One type of tree which already grows quite well in parts of the islands and more use could be made of are willows. There are many types of willows and they have great genetic diversity which we could make more use of... they are easily planted from cuttings, grow fast, are hardy, can tolerate a wide range of soils and be coppiced or cut down to re sprout with many stems. Some willows have been introduced in recent years – some of you benefited from the expert advice, which Malcolm Dawson from the Department of Agriculture and Rural Development in Northern Ireland (who came down under the Shackleton Scholarship Fund) gave and a Chilean Student (at Queens University Belfast) Rodrigo Olave (supported by UKFIT and DoA) investigated the best way to establish willows from cuttings.

Rather than introduce more trees- which can have problems- we think it would be a good idea to try and find out what willows are actually growing in the islands and which offer the most potential for the type of use outlined above. The best way to do this would be to collect cuttings of willow (new trees grow easily from short lengths of stem) from

across the islands and grow them together under similar conditions where they can be fairly compared. We would then be the able to select which willow type would be best for local use.

The UK Falkland Islands Trust has a small piece of land at Port Howard – the Alexandra wood (named after our patron, Princess Alexandra) where we have been experimenting with different types of trees, method of ground preparation and suitability of tree species to soil type.

If you have a willow hedge or tree in your garden or on your farm, the Trust would like you to send a bundle (about 80) of willow cuttings to Ron Reeves at Port Howard. The cuttings should be about 30cm (1 foot) long and about as thick as your thumb. If you have different types, take a bundle from each and label them with your name, where they came from and anything else you know about your sample. If you have a length of willow hedge, one bundle from along the length of the whole hedge will do fine. Take your cuttings over the next few weeks, i.e. before they start to sprout and send them to Ron. Don't worry, taking the cuttings won't harm your bushes- in fact cutting them back will do them good!

These will then be planted in thoroughly prepared ground, grown and assessed under proper comparative conditions. After two to three years we will know which types have performed best and will be able to take cuttings from them. Cuttings will then be re-distributed freely (and in subsequent years) to all those who have sent willows to participate in the trial.

Road campaign continues

THE response to my campaign to have the Stanley to MPA road blacktopped has been overwhelming.

In order to give the campaign greater authenticity, I now intend to canvass all members of the public, who are subject to Falkland Islands tax, for signatures to a petition which will be presented to all present members of Legislative Council in September and to the newly elected members in November.

Since we have no political party structure our councillors are all elected as independents and in order to give them support I sincerely believe that it is up to us, the general public, as the ultimate policy makers to give them authority to carry out our wishes.

Because my hearing is impaired I am not able to attend or join in debates at public meetings so it was for this reason that I have turned to *Penguin News* to give my support through this medium.

I also believe that we have been subjected to every crank, whim and regulation dreamed up from around the globe and if we are ever going to survive as a nation we have just got to end this madness and believe in ourselves.

As regards the MPA road, we have the machinery and the resources to carry out the work. Our roads engineer is willing to take on the project and the responsibility. This is the same man who has supervised the construction of 700 kilometres of road nationwide. Let's give him and his team the credit and respect they deserve and let them get on with the job.

I have researched all Legislative Council minutes since the road was

originally constructed and during the whole of that period councillors have been concerned about the maintenance costs, but somehow have never been able or willing to bite the bullet.

Councillors were debating speed restrictions; white lines at the side of the road; vehicle weight restrictions of eight tonne and even suggesting a road tax for military vehicles.

The recurrent cost of maintenance in 1987 was thought to be between £50,000 and £350,000 annually and the reason why it had not been totally blacktopped, to quote the Chief Executive at the time was, "The Falkland Islands Government thought that it would encourage high speed and the formation of ice!" I believe that we have paid dearly for that decision.

To give readers some idea of the usage and loads that the road carries today, the following are some of the figures that I have managed to compile.

307 vehicles use the road daily which equates to over a hundred thousand vehicles per annum. 1,600 tonnes of kerosene is transported from East Cove to Stanley per annum. The road also carries 1,110 tonne of East Falkland wool clip per annum, 40,000 live sheep and 247 live cattle to the abattoir from East Falkland, and 12,000 tonne of aggregate from the quarry to Mount Pleasant.

55,000 tonne of aggregate has been used as capping on the road this year. Public Works Department haulage vehicles have a loaded weight of approximately 32 tonne and the fuel bowser 22 tonne.

Food additive responsible for illness?

COULD you be suffering from aspartame poisoning?

A little over a week ago, I received an article in an email from a close friend, the wife of a former Army Air Corp helicopter pilot who served here during the 1982 conflict.

The report was about the use of sweeteners that are found in many food and drink products. Because of my ongoing search for answers as to why my wife Mandy developed a life threatening brain tumour which required urgent surgery to remove it in late 2002 and why our daughter Rachel has suffered from epilepsy since she was just three days old and has suffered for over 18 years. I decided to check out the information given to me.

I was horrified at what I discovered.

I have since become a member of "Mission Possible International" and will begin to inform my fellow country people of the serious potential risks associated with aspartame poisoning.

Now, I do not wish to bore you all, but the following might surprise you.

Since learning about aspartame and its deadly toxins, we did a search of items in our home and were amazed at just how many products contained aspartame. We decided to stop using any products immediately - that was a little over a week ago and the results have been quite striking.

Rachel, as mentioned, has regular night time seizures and until seven days ago I personally do not remember a single night in the past 18 years that I have not had to attend to her, usually several times in a single night.

Since we removed the aspartame products, especially the instant chocolate and diet mineral water, Rachel has not had a single attack for the past seven consecutive nights. This is truly nothing short of a miracle.

I learned that aspartame can seriously affect the ability of regular

prescribed drugs and think it is highly probable that Rachel's medication was being affected. It also makes me wonder if Mandy's tumour was in fact directly linked to aspartame, it is certainly something we have to consider. It just might also be poisoning all of you who consume it.

I sent an email to Dr Roger Diggle at the KEMH on the 30th July passing on this information. (a copy of this letter is available on request) His reply was as follows.

"Many thanks for your letter. I can appreciate your concerns. I do not dismiss the history given by people allegedly suffering from aspartame poisoning. It is possible. However, the internet is a dangerous tool potentially as people can write anything they want and it may not be scientifically correct even though they personally believe it to be true. So, we have to rely upon authoritative research by reputable organisations. I have copied the UK Food Standards Agency current information on aspartame. Their website is www.food.gov.uk. Aspartame, as you will see, has been carefully investigated on several occasions but in the light of the latest research is going to be reviewed again.

"Whether aspartame has anything to do with Mandy or Rachel's illnesses is difficult to say but it will do no harm to try them on an aspartame free diet and see if it makes any difference. Aspartame is a naturally occurring amino acid that happens to be very sweet. It came into use in the 1970's when saccharin was found to be potentially harmful. Like all things, moderation is probably the answer - i.e. if one doesn't eat too much of it one is fine but if one overindulges it can be harmful. I hope this helps to answer your queries."

Well, I do have the supporting evidence of Rachel and her epileptic free nights since the withdrawal of aspartame products.

All diet products are likely to contain high levels of aspartame

and in particular diet coke and pepsi cola are among the most harmful and which our children in the Falklands consume very large quantities.

Aspartame is potentially the culprit for at least 92 recorded illnesses and some serious studies prior to its release in 1981, showed that tests in rats and monkeys indeed showed alarming rates of cancer and brain tumour growth, yet it was still allowed to get on the market.

Customer awareness is critical if we want to be sure that people know what they are consuming. The WNHQ (World National Health Organisation) recommended that all products containing aspartame and phenylalanine (50% of aspartame) should be clearly labelled. They do label, but the writing is so small I doubt that even the sharpest eyes could easily find it on the label. Also, although products may be labelled as containing aspartame, very few people will know what it actually is. As far as we were aware it was another standard ingredient and there is certainly no warning on these products that aspartame is dangerous for your health.

In light of this I am going to take this matter up with our councillors to recommend that all importers of products containing aspartame should be stopped or at the very least retailers should display large warning signs in their shops so that people are aware and can then make their own informed choice to purchase or not.

If you feel that having now read the above you would like to find out more, the following information and web sites are highly recommended.

Senior Magistrate should be judicially independent

I WAS perturbed to read the Chief Executive's letter (*Penguin News*, August 5) concerning the investigations into the former Director of Health.

In it he states that, "if civil proceedings are instituted in the Courts, the case would be heard by an independent examiner." It is not clear with what authority Mr Simpkins makes that statement. The listing of cases - criminal or civil - is not, and never should be, a matter for the Chief Executive, nor the Attorney General nor, with respect, His Excellency the Governor.

The listing of cases and who

hears them in the Islands should be a matter for the Judiciary (that is to say the Chief Justice or the Senior Magistrate) and the Judiciary alone.

The key issue here is that the Senior Magistrate, by virtue of the Constitution, is meant to be judicially independent of Government in all aspects of her work at all times, and that the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) should make every effort to preserve, foster and encourage that independence. Certainly in the past there were several occasions when, however inadvertently, that independence was tested by FIG.

By writing as he does, the 'man in the street' could reasonably assume that the Chief Executive or FIG has a role in deciding who hears cases in the Islands.

It is to be hoped that the Chief Executive will reflect upon his words: at the very least, he should publicly reaffirm FIG's commitment to maintaining the independence of the Judiciary in the Islands from interference, be it actual or perceived, by the Government which he leads.







Detecting and treating head lice and nits

HEAD lice are common. They can usually be cleared easily by treatment.

Head lice are tiny grey/brown insects. They are about the size of a sesame seed (the seeds on burger buns). Head lice cling to hairs, but stay close to the scalp which they feed off. They lay eggs which hatch after 7-10 days. It takes about 10 days for a newly hatched louse to grow to an adult and start laying eggs.

Nits are the white empty egg shells which are left when the lice hatch. Nits can look like dandruff, but stick strongly to hair. Unlike dandruff, nits cannot be brushed out easily.

Head lice are common in children but can affect anyone at any age. They are not a sign of dirty hair or poor hygiene. Close 'hair to hair' contact is usually needed to pass lice on. Head lice cannot jump or fly, but walk from one head to another. They soon die when away from hair, and do not live in clothes, bedding, etc. Most head lice infections are caught from family or close friends who are not aware that they have head lice.

Most people with head lice do not have any symptoms. An itchy scalp occurs in about 1 in 3 cases. This is due to an allergy to the lice, not due to them biting. It often takes about three months for an itch to develop after you are infected. So, you may not notice that you have head lice for a while, and you may pass them on to others for some time. Head lice and nits do not wash off with normal shampoo. Head lice do not cause any other medical problems. In most cases the head is not 'crawling with lice'. Commonly, there are less than 12 lice present.

How to tell if you have head lice

Head lice are difficult to find just by looking in the hair. If you suspect head lice, it is best to do 'detection combing' (described below). Some people advise that you do this to children's hair regularly, about once a week.

Wash the hair in the normal way with ordinary shampoo. Rinse out the shampoo and put on lots of ordinary conditioner. Comb the hair with a normal comb to get rid of tangles.

When the hair is untangled switch to a detection comb. This is a special fine toothed comb that you can buy at pharmacies. (The teeth of normal combs are too far apart.)

Slot the teeth of the detection

comb into the hair at the roots so it is touching the scalp gently.

Draw the detection comb through to the tips of the hair. Repeat this in all directions until you have combed all the hair. Check the comb for lice after each stroke. A magnifying glass may help. If you see any lice, clean the comb by wiping it on a tissue or rinse it before the next stroke.

Comb over a white surface such as white paper. This is so that any head lice that are flicked out by the comb are easy to see.

After the whole head has been combed, rinse out the conditioner. While the hair is still wet, use an ordinary comb to get rid of tangles. Repeat the detection combing in the rinsed hair to check for any lice that you might have missed the first time.

It takes about 10-15 minutes to do detection combing properly, depending on how thick the hair is.

Treatment options for head lice

Treatment is only needed if you see one or more live moving lice. Nits (empty eggshells) do not always mean infection. Nits stick to hair even when lice are gone (after treatment).

Treatment with lotions or cream rinse

You can buy lotions or a cream rinse which kills lice from pharmacies. You can also get them on prescription. Head lice shampoo is not very effective and is not advised. Lotions come in water or alcohol bases. Alcohol based lotions work slightly better than water based lotions. However, do not use alcohol based lotions if you have asthma, eczema, or broken skin.

Alcohol based lotions are flammable so do not use near naked lights, cigarettes, fires, or flames. Be careful with children near fires who have alcohol lotion in their hair.

Tips for use of treatments

Follow the instructions on the packet carefully. This may include the following.

Lotions: Apply to dry hair. Part the hair near the top and pour a few drops onto the scalp. Rub well into the hair. Part the hair again a little further down and repeat. Repeat this until the scalp and roots of the hair are saturated. Apply down to where a pony tail band would be. Leave on for 12 hours (overnight) and then wash off. About 50ml of lotion is needed per person. Up to 150ml is needed for thick hair.

Cream rinse: Apply to damp hair so that the scalp and roots of the hair are saturated. One tube is usually enough. Leave on for 10 minutes and then rinse off.

Do not go swimming before applying a lotion. The chlorine from the swimming pool may stop it working.

Do not use a hairdryer to dry hair after applying treatment.

Re-apply the same treatment after 7 days. (Although lice are usually killed by one application, not all eggs may be. The second application makes sure that any lice that hatch from eggs that survived will be killed before they are old enough to lay further eggs.)

Inspect the hair by detection combing 2-3 days after the second application. If you find any live moving head lice, despite treatment, then see a doctor or nurse for advice.

Wet combing treatment using the Bug Busting method

'Bug busting' is a way of removing head lice without having to use a lotion or cream rinse to kill them. Use the Bug Busting method as described in the section, 'How can you tell if you have head lice'. Do this on every member of the household that has been found to have head lice. (The detector comb removes the lice which cannot grip hair that is slippery with conditioner). You need to do the wet combing routine every four days for at least four sessions (two weeks).

The first combing session should remove all hatched head lice, but does not remove eggs.

Any young lice that hatch from eggs after the first session are removed at the second, third and fourth sessions. This is why it is important to do the full four sessions.

If you see full-grown lice at the second, third, or fourth session, this means that some have been missed on the first session, or re-infection from someone else has occurred. If this occurs, you should increase the number of sessions. In effect, following any session where you find adult head lice, you should do three further sessions at four day intervals where you do not see adult lice.

Do family and friends need treatment?

All people in the same home, and other close 'head to head' contacts of the previous 4-6 weeks should be contacted. Tell them to look for lice. Only people with head lice should be treated. (It used to be advised to treat all close contacts even if

they had no symptoms. This has changed to just treating people with definite head lice infection.) All people with head lice in the same home should be treated at the same time. This stops lice being passed around again.

What about school?

Children with head lice should carry on going to school. Contrary to popular belief, head lice do not spread quickly through schools. Alarming 'head lice letters' from schools are unhelpful. Close head-to-head contact is needed to pass lice on to others. Young children who are 'best friends' and play closely together may pass lice on. A common sense approach is to tell the parents of the close friends of an affected child to look out for lice in their children.

Head lice prevention

There is no good way of preventing head lice. Lice repellent sprays are not very effective. Regular detection combing of children's hair will detect lice infection early. This means treatment can be started early, which means less chance of passing them on to others.

Other useful points about head lice

Use an anti-lice lotion or cream rinse only when you are sure that you or your child have head lice. Do not use them to prevent head lice, or 'just in case'. Frequent use may cause a build up of small amounts of the active medication in the body. The risk of harm from this is very small, but it is best to use these treatments only when infected.

A common reason for head lice to recur in one person is because close contacts (family and close friends) are not checked and treated if they also have head lice. The treated person is then likely to get head lice back again from untreated family or friends.

After treatment and the lice have gone, it may take 2-3 weeks for the itch to go fully.

Nits may remain after lice have gone. They are empty egg shells and stick strongly to hair. They will eventually fall out. A fine toothed 'nit comb' can remove them if you prefer.

A final reminder - alcohol based lotions are flammable. Some children have been badly burnt as their hair caught fire whilst being treated. Keep children away from fires, cigarettes, flames, etc, whilst lotion is in their hair.

Wool report - week ending August 5

SALES resumed in Sydney, Australia after a three-week recess.

Greasy wool prices were markedly higher at the very fine end of the fibre diameter spectrum (18 and 19 micron), but quite erratic for fleece wool lots above 21 micron. As shown in the below "Micron Price Guide".

Significant currency changes over the "recess" period acted to hold-up wool prices when expressed in terms of pence/kg clean.

Fleece wool lots of good length, staple strength and style were least affected by price falls. In addition, according to AWEX reports, some improvement in prices was recorded towards the close of the sale.

In Australia 81% of the 48,700 bale offering was sold. Included in the offering were 2,652 bales of crossbred wool of which 81% was sold.

Auctions continue next week in New Zealand and Australia where over 80,000 will be on offer.



Chavez extends his influence to Mercosur

VENEZUELAN president Hugo Chavez arrived late on Tuesday night in Montevideo as part of a brief visit to the "Southern axis" which includes Uruguay, Argentina and Brazil where he is scheduled to sign several bilateral trade and integration agreements.

In Montevideo President Chavez will follow on the Uruguay-Venezuela trade round which began two weeks ago in Caracas when deals involving almost 130 million US dollars were considered.

Uruguayan authorities are also expecting a strong influx of Venezuelan funds for the local government owned oil and refining company, ANCAP, and airline Pluna, which have begun negotiating association agreements with their Venezuelan counterparts, the all powerful Petroleos de Venezuela, PDVSA, and the airline Conviasa.

Venezuela is interested in investing heavily in Uruguay's only refinery, (several hundred million US dollars) as part of the oil rich country's market diversification policy which includes selling fuel and refined products to energy

short Mercosur members.

Mr Chavez and his Uruguayan counterpart Tabare Vazquez are scheduled to sign the agreement by which Venezuela will supply 43,600 barrels per day of crude on special terms, 75% to be paid in three months time, either cash or in exchange for Uruguayan goods and/or services, and the rest in 25 years with an annual accumulated 2% interest.

The Venezuelan president is also expected to push ahead with several of his pet regional projects such as the creation of a South Bank funded with Mercosur members international reserves deposited in northern hemisphere banks, and a Southern University to promote Latinamerican culture, Venezuela together with Cuba, Argentina and Uruguay recently launched Telesur, a multi national 24 hours television station to compete with the "invading" United States channels.

Another project of Mr Chavez is the creation of Petroamerica, a giant South American oil giant that would incorporate PDVSA, Petrobras from Brazil and other government managed oil corpora-

tions in the region.

Mr Chavez will be making these proposals in representation of the Community of Andean Nations, CAN, since his country currently holds the six months rotating chair.

CAN, made up of Bolivia, Peru, Colombia, Ecuador and Venezuela is currently holding talks for an integration with Mercosur which includes full members Argentina, Brazil, Uruguay and Paraguay, and associate members Chile, Bolivia, Peru and Venezuela.

The two regional blocks are intent in the creation of the South American Community of Nations encompassing the entire continent.

"We're interested in investing in Uruguay, Argentina, Paraguay and Brazil," said President Chavez before leaving Caracas. He added that if Mercosur and CAN can't sidestep "competitive commercial integration," political integration will be unattainable because, "we must emphasize on common social issues before trade."

Mr Chavez arrives in what he considers "friendly territory," countries with which he feels a

"programmatically affinity," with a fat cheque book, following a recent controversial Venezuelan Central Bank reform which made available six of the 30 billion international reserves for "development investment."

The Venezuelan president arrived in Buenos Aires on Wednesday night for a full Thursday of agreements signing with President Nestor Kirchner.

Among them renewal of the heavy oil for food accord; refurbishing of dam turbines in Venezuela by Argentine companies and the building of several vessels for oil and derivatives transport for PDVSA in Argentine shipyards.


A visit which will undoubtedly be closely monitored by United States who have openly accused Mr Chavez of being a "destabilizing factor" in the region, loathes his closeness with Cuban president Fidel Castro and suspects Venezuela's "oil boom dollars" are actually spent in buying political influence for the former paratrooper Colonel and his socialist path to regional development.

Environmental impact of fuel leak 'minimal' say Conservation

FOLLOWING a fuel leak at Mare Harbour on the weekend, Director of Falklands Conservation, Grant Munro has said he is satisfied with the efforts of the military to contain the leak and that, "the effects have been contained to a limited area."

According to a military spokesperson, the leak was discovered during a routine inspection last Saturday morning.

An interceptor, which is a device for capturing fuel tank leaks, had also overflowed.

Once the leak had been detected, the spokesperson said, "Action was quickly put in hand to pump the fuel out of the interceptor tank and also to establish dams, fuel spill booms and absorbent kits around the incident. An additional boom has been placed in the sea at the mouth of the inlet to contain any seepage into the

sea."

A ditch was also dug around the area and the remaining contents of the leaking tank were transferred into spare tanks.

Penguin News has been unable to determine the exact amount of fuel lost, but a military statement said it was, "...believed to be only a small fraction of the contents of the tank."

Grant Munro and Jon Clark of the Fisheries Department who is responsible for the National Oil Spill Contingency Plan both visited the site on Monday to assess the impact of the leak.

Mr Munro said after visiting the affected area, "Whilst the spillage of any fuel is unfortunate and will have some level of impact on the environment, I am happy that on this occasion the effects have been contained to a limited area and

should be relatively transient."

The fuel leaked was aviation fuel which, according to the military statement is "unlike crude oil, as it is a light liquid that dissipates and evaporates more readily and does not produce the same clean up problems."

Speaking on Thursday, Captain Jim Phillipson from Media Operations at Mount Pleasant told *Penguin News* that the bad weather this week has actually helped the clean up operation as the rain will flush the fuel out and the wind will help it dissipate.

A independant consultant representing Defence Estates which has responsibility for all MoD properties arrived in the Islands on Wednesday to, "Assess that everything that can be done, is being done," said Capt Phillipson.

News in brief

Listeria in milk supply

CHIEF Medical Officer Roger Diggle has confirmed that the latest sample of milk from Beckside Dairy has grown *Listeria* in it.

He said a similar problem occurred last year with one isolated positive test and that all subsequent tests until this week have been negative.

The dairy and Falkland Landholdings are cooperating with the hospital's public health laboratory to try and identify the cause.

Dr Diggle says that in the meantime the public are advised that pregnant women, children under the age of five, the elderly and anyone with reduced immunity should either boil the milk for at least three minutes or drink UHT milk. He will advise when these restrictions can be lifted.

Swimming pool closed

DUE to a procedure to correct a minor chemical imbalance, the swimming pool at Stanley Leisure Centre will be closed until the water temperature reaches an acceptable level.

Recreation Manager Steve Dent said the current pool temperature is 11.5C. 28C is the optimum temperature but Mr Dent said he will open the pool when it reaches 25C.

The pool is expected to re-open next week but in the meantime, Steve wished to extend, "his sincerest apologies to any customers who are inconvenienced by this closure."

Charter boat heads south

DARWIN Shipping have advised that the charter boat *Marianne Danica* departed Shoreham in the UK on Saturday.

The vessel is expected to arrive in Stanley late on September 6 or early the following day. She will discharge cargo in Stanley before delivering materials to Fox bay on West Falkland.

SIR Alec Issigonis, designer of the iconic Mini Car, once said, "A camel is a horse designed by a committee." Now although he was postulating on his dislike for working in teams, it struck a chord with me about the Falklands.

We seem to have a penchant here for committees and working groups on every conceivable subject. I am not saying this is necessarily a bad thing, I'd rather an open committee were making the important decisions about our community than a civil servant left to his own devices. However, from time to time I think we may have gone too far or 'over-committed'.

At *Penguin News*, as a matter of course, we are sent the agendas for all upcoming government committees and working groups. When the agenda for the 'Government Vehicles Working Group' arrived in my inbox one morning, I thought this a prime example of our seeming need to run every decision past a committee of some sort. How wrong I was. Did you know for instance, that FIG currently owns approximately 150 vehicles? Did you also know that the Select Committee has agreed £100,000 for the purchase of six new vehicles this year. I have no doubt that the majority of the vehicles are essential for the working of FIG however, item seven in the minutes for this meeting states that there are currently 11 vehicles in the vehicle pool. The Plant and Vehicle Manager suggested that the ideal number of pool vehicles is four, meaning FIG currently have seven vehicles completely surplus to requirements. All are perfectly serviceable and will shortly be sold by tender.

As the vehicles have not yet been sold, we can only speculate as to their sell on value or their initial cost but it will no doubt be a considerable sum.

I bring this up because in a conversation I had this week, somebody asked whether anybody in the Falklands has already been seriously or at least measurably affected by the reduction in fishing income. Apart from the halving of the holiday allowance, we were hard pushed to think whether anyone's standard of living had really suffered. It occurred to me that there is a group of people for whom day to day living has become more of a struggle: students.

While I am not knocking the overall level of funding FIG provides for higher education (of which I myself was a beneficiary), I do not think it is necessarily being used in the most effective way. The £1000 a year reduction in living grants has a big impact on an already tight living budget. I personally was unaffected by the change as I had already completed my education before the reduction came in to force, but I know what it was like to live on the grant before it was reduced. Many students (including myself) take on part time jobs to supplement their income. Falkland Island students are not rich. I am not being ungrateful, I am just stating a fact.

I do not dispute the fact that savings must be made throughout government but I think we have missed a trick that could save the Education Department thousands each year, without affecting the living standards of students overseas. When Falkland Island students attend university, they are required to pay their tuition fees in full - that is, 'overseas' fees. Fees per year are typically between £8,000 to £10,000 for many courses and FIG bears this cost. Students from the UK and even the European Union however, are only subject to 'home' fees of just over £1000. This means that despite being British citizens, our students (and therefore FIG) are currently being charged significantly more for their university education than students from say, France or even Estonia.

One Falkland Island student told me that one university she considered attending told her they would only charge her 'home' fees, so there is clearly some confusion. Surely government should be pursuing this more aggressively: Securing 'home' fees for all Falkland Island students would more than halve the higher education budget at a stroke, and would make the £1000 cut in the grant seem petty.

In the coming academic year there will be 18 students in higher education. This means FIG have saved £18,000 by cutting the grant compared to a conservative estimate of over £100,000 that could be saved in fees. It doesn't take a committee to see that this one is a no-brainer.

Let SeAled PR take the strain

PARTICIPANTS in the Stanley Kids Zone quiz night a few weeks ago will already be familiar with one of Stanley's newest enterprises, as the event was organised by SeAled PR, a marketing and public relations company which also provides events management services.

Started by Sarah Clement and Amanda Morris, (hence SeAled PR - capital S and A in deference to their initials), the new company was partly the result of a strong friendship built up when the pair were both working at Falklands Conservation, but also (like all great inventions) borne out of necessity. Amanda explains that people were impressed with work the pair had done for Conservation and were keen to use their services. "We were constantly being approached, so we thought obviously there's a gap in the market, so why don't we plug that gap?"

According to Sarah, both wanted to start their own business and thought, "with the support from each other, it seemed like the perfect opportunity."

With some help from FIDC and in particular Charlene Rowland who Sarah says has been, "fantastic setting us up," the fledgling company is already busy with several projects. Perhaps unusually for a PR firm, they have been too busy to advertise themselves. Amanda said, "We had great plans for a big marketing strategy to launch ourselves in the Falklands market but work has come in and prevented that."

The oldest form of marketing, word of mouth, has already seen to it that SeAled PR have enough work to keep them busy at the moment.

So what services will the new company be offering? Amanda explained that there will be, roughly speaking, two arms to the business, private and corporate sector work.

The private sector services SeAled PR will be offering are fairly diverse but include parties and events of all kinds including birthday parties, christenings, anniversaries, stag and hen nights, and weddings.

Having got married here herself, Sarah believes that weddings here can often take a similar course, but it need not be that way. "We really strongly believe that there's no reason for people not to have a unique wedding, and everything, or anything is possible."

They are keen to stress that their role in the organisation of a wedding or any event would be entirely up to the customer, "although we have lots of ideas for people and enthusiasm to put behind it, we're not going to dictate to people," Amanda said. "What we want to do is really take away the stress and act as facilitators," she continued, "but also add an element of design and creativity."

Although they think it somewhat "cheesy", Amanda says their aim is to, "enable someone to actually feel like a guest at their own party."

The other element to the company is the corporate sector. They believe that there is a need for local companies to promote and market themselves. Amanda said, "Even though you may have a monopoly or the market lead, you still need to

understand your customer, and what it is they require from you." Although they think some organisations in the Islands do this very well, they do believe that it is an area that could be improved upon while stressing, "We're not here to tell people how to do it, we're here to help people."

As well as public relations, SeAled will also provide corporate hospitality such as receptions, events and entertaining. Whether it be taking visiting overseas clients out to supper or even out on camp trips. "From meet and greet, right down to minute taking and producing a schedule for the visit - whatever the customer requires," Sarah explained.

From the sounds of it, flexibility could be the 'buzzword' at SeAled, as Amanda says, "With events and public relations, the scope is huge, but we want a quality element attached to it, we're not going to spread ourselves too thinly."

"We're very conscious of that," added Sarah, "people who use us will get 110% of our time."

As a taster to the services SeAled can provide, they are currently organising several Christmas parties with a difference. Having experienced difficulty organising work Christmas events in the past themselves, Sarah and Amanda aim to take the hassle out of your hands. They are holding a party each Friday in December with food (in association with the Falklands Brasserie), music and entertainment. Open to around 80 people, the idea is you and your colleagues simply purchase a ticket and then turn up where you will have the chance to mix with others also celebrating.

The company are also hoping to hold the Falkland Islands Expo in January. Essentially a trade show, the event will allow companies in the Islands to show off their wares to the general public and the international trade press. Amanda believes the show will be, "...a really good opportunity for people who want to launch a new product or want to have the opportunity to talk to their customers."

As well as offering an extremely wide range of services, Amanda and Sarah are also keen to be available to all. Amanda says using their company would not, "cost an absolute fortune, there's something to suit everybody's budget."

Sarah said, "People can come in and have a chat with us and that is completely free. If they like what they hear, we can negotiate what suits them and us."

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Court News

Man convicted of harassment

IN the Magistrates Court on Wednesday, Stanley man Kenneth Barry Stewart pleaded guilty to three charges relating to two separate incidents.

The court heard how a charge of harassment had been made following the break down of Mr Stewart's relationship with Brenda Cairns-Wicks.

Crown Counsel Ros Cheek said that on June 8, after the couple had rowed, Mr Stewart had telephoned the police and asked that Ms Cairns-Wicks be removed from his home. She found temporary accommodation with Terence Clifton and attempted an unsatisfactory reconciliation with Mr Stewart after he asked her to go back.

Mr Stewart was admitted to hospital on June 23 and Ms Cairns-Wicks visited wishing to stay friends. Ms Cheek said that Mr Stewart's behaviour had "become erratic" and he had requested that Ms Cairns-Wicks did not visit.

On June 27 Ms Cairns-Wicks and Mr Clifton reported to the Police that they had suffered harassments at work and at home in the form of visits, letters and phone calls. Mr Clifton had reported the phone calls as either silent or threatening.

On July 6, Mr Stewart told Ms Cairns-Wicks that he would "hurt someone close to her," and made threatening gestures to Mr Clifton as they passed on Davis Street. The Police visited Mr Stewart and warned him his behaviour may be constituted as harassment.

On July 10 Mr Stewart contacted the Police saying that he would like to harm Mr Clifton. The Police took Mr Stewart to hospital however the following day they received a call informing them that he had left the hospital and was threatening to hurt Mr Clifton. Mr Stewart was intercepted at Mr Clifton's home and returned to hospital.

Mr Stewart continued to write letters, make calls and visit Ms Cairns-Wicks at work and on July 14 a third party reported to the Police that Mr Clifton was receiving threats. While the Police were at Mr Clifton's home he received a phone call from Mr Stewart telling him his "days were numbered."

Ms Cheek told the court that Ms Cairns-Wicks had become frightened and that the situation was affecting her eight year old daughter.

Mr Stewart accepted in his interview that he had sent letters and made calls, but denied they were threatening. He said he may have told Ms Cairns-Wicks that he would deal with Mr Clifton in "his own way."

Ms Cheek said that phone records from Mr Stewart's work place showed nine calls in a 20 minute period to Ms Cairns-Wicks work place. Her employers had become concerned and transferred her to another area.

Ms Cheek said that Mr Stewart had made a "blatant and obvious" breach of his bail condition of August 10, by approaching Ms Cairns-Wicks in her work place the follow-

ing day.

Not having legal representation Mr Stewart told the court that he was concerned about the "slight on his character and reputation," when Ms Cairns-Wicks had told people that she was leaving for the security of her daughter. Mr Stewart said he had received considerable harassment himself and had complained to the police on two separate occasions.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds sitting with assessors Tim Blake and Judy Summers said that a criminal conviction had been recorded but deferred sentencing until the next charges were heard as there may be a need for a pre-sentence report to be prepared.

Mr Stewart then entered pleas of guilty to charges of impaired driving and reckless driving on the Stanley to Darwin Road on August 14.

The court heard how a member of the public had called the Police by two metre radio after he had become concerned about Mr Stewart's erratic driving as he overtook vehicles on a gravel section of the road. The member of the public said Mr Stewart was swerving all over the road and clearly causing a danger to other road users. He had put his hazard lights on and followed Mr Stewart along the Sappers Hill section of road. As Mr Stewart neared the triangle at the junction of Reservoir Road and Stanley Bypass he swerved left, over corrected and left again going off the road and hitting the embankment on the opposite side of the ditch. Ms Cheek said he continued along the embankment at an approximate speed of 20 - 25 mph for some 3-400 metres. The Police then arrived at the scene and arrested Mr Stewart. A road side breath test gave a reading of 105mg of breath per 100 millilitres of breath (the legal limit is 35mg).

When interviewed by police Mr Stewart admitted to having 7 - 8 beers on his day out which had taken him to North Arm and back with passenger Roy McKay. He said he had black spots in his memory after Sappers Hill but that he could not have been doing more than 55mph as that was as fast as the vehicle would go.

Mr Stewart told the court that he accepted there was no justifiable reason for drink driving. He said he had been depressed and had coped through excessive drinking. He apologised to those he had overtaken on the road and had as a consequence felt intimidated, and to the court for his actions.

Mrs Faulds adjourned the case for a pre-sentence report to be prepared with Mr Stewart to return to court on October 5. Mr Stewart was released under bail conditions which include not driving and not to communicate in any way that might be construed as harassing or threatening to Ms Cairns-Wicks, her daughter or Mr Clifton. Mrs Faulds told Mr Stewart that if he acted in any way threatening he would be arrested again, adding, "there is no room for manoeuvre."

THE Queen's Baton which symbolises the unity and shared ideals of the Commonwealth of Nations will arrive in the Falklands on Wednesday, August 31.

The Falkland Islands Overseas Games Association (FIOGA) have been working in conjunction with the Melbourne Commonwealth Games 2006 and now have a schedule in place.

The first Queen's Baton was created for a relay to celebrate the Cardiff 1958 Commonwealth Games in Wales. Since then the Queen's Baton Relay has become a much loved Games tradition.

The Baton's journey enables communities beyond the host city to share the Games celebrations. It also serves a functional purpose in carrying Her Majesty's message to the athletes from Buckingham Palace in London to the opening ceremony.

The Melbourne 2006 Queen's Baton Relay is the longest, most inclusive relay - travelling to all 71 nations of the Commonwealth in a year and a day. The design and the technological features of the baton that will travel the epic journey reflect the relay's efforts to showcase the diversity of the Commonwealth and unite its communities in celebration of the Melbourne 2006 Commonwealth Games.

On Thursday, September 1 the Baton Team will make their way to Port Howard on West Falkland. From there the baton will travel to Fox Bay by a variety of methods. Commander British Forces South Atlantic Islands (CBFSAI), Ian Monereife has made a helicopter available to lift the team off the ship and transfer them to Darwin with the possibility of a stop on Mt Osborne on the way.

There will be a short reception at the Goose Green Social Club at 6pm where all are invited to have a look at the Queen's Baton.

Friday is the Baton Relay day. More than 100 Falkland Islands residents and UK military personnel have expressed a wish to assist in moving the Baton from Mount Pleasant to Stanley. The Chief of Staff, Group Captain Gordon Moulds MBE will start the relay from HQBFSAI and hand over to children from the Goose Green school, Sea Cadets, Guides, Brownies, Cubs, sporting clubs, school children and former Commonwealth Games athletes will all participate in the run with Tony Petterson and Gerald Check, the first ever Falklands Commonwealth games competitors in 1982, finishing the relay and handing the Baton over to His Excellency the Governor, Mr Howard Pearce.

Mr Dent said FIOGA are "very excited" about this project and hope that as many Falkland Islands residents as possible take the opportunity to come along and see the Baton at its many various locations.

Rockhopper admitted to trading on AIM

ROCKHOPPER Exploration plc (Rockhopper), the oil and gas exploration company with a number of licences in the North Falkland Basin, announced on Monday, that following the successful placing of 35,714,285 shares at 42p to raise £15 million (before expenses), its shares have been admitted to trading on AIM (Alternative Investment Market) and dealings commenced at 8am under the symbol, RKH.

The Rockhopper Group is currently the largest licence holder in the North Falkland Basin and owns a 100% interest in four offshore production licences. An extensive 2D (640sq km) and 3D (685sq km) seismic programme is planned.

In addition, the group has signed a farm-in agreement with Desire Petroleum plc whereby Rockhopper will earn up to a 15% working interest in two further licences covering approximately 1,300 sq km by funding up to 30% of the costs of a three well drilling programme to be carried out during 2006 subject to a suitable drilling rig being available.

The North Falkland Basin has previously been subject to exploratory drilling, with six wells being drilled in 1998. These wells proved the existence of a world class source rock, with the British

Geological Survey estimating that it may be the second richest source rock in the world. One well flowed live oil to the surface, and another flowed gas to the surface.

Rockhopper has a highly experienced board, led by Dr Pierre Jungels, who was the CEO of Enterprise Oil plc from 1996 to 2001. Mr Jungels, Executive Chairman of Rockhopper, said, "I am delighted with the support we have had from institutions and new shareholders. The proceeds of the placing will allow us to carry out our seismic and drilling programmes, in what is a hugely prospective area."

In total, the Board and its Consultant, the Falklands expert, David Bodecott, have over 120 years experience in the oil industry, with specific expertise in the field of exploration and in the region itself.

The Rockhopper Group started trading in February 2004 to invest in and carry out an offshore oil exploration programme to the north of the Falkland Islands. The group is currently the largest licence holder in the North Falkland Basin and owns a 100% interest in four offshore production licences which cover approximately 5,800 square kilometres. These licences have been granted by the Falkland Islands govern-

ment.


Rockhopper has been awarded four production licences situated in the North Falkland Basin. The four licences are situated in two groups, licences PL023 and PL024 (awarded in November 2004) and PL032 and PL033 (awarded in June 2005). All four licences have been awarded under the Open Door Production Licence legislation.

The Rockhopper Group has a 100% working interest and is the operator of these four licences.

The fiscal regime in the Falkland Islands is attractive to oil exploration companies, especially when compared to other areas of the world. The current legislation is based largely on the UK North Sea oil industry and once production commences, provides for royalty payments of 9% and corporation tax of 25%, meaning that corporation tax payable by Rockhopper should be no more than standard UK rates.

The benign fiscal regime means that the minimum economic threshold at which oil or gas can be produced is relatively low.

The Falkland Islands is a remote location in terms of the world's established hydrocarbon infrastructure. Consequently, within the economic analysis of the prospects, whilst the costs

associated with the technical demands of any development project are expected to be in line with international comparisons, the remoteness of the location is expected to lead to higher transportation costs of both delivering the oil to the market and providing the necessary equipment and manpower.

Therefore the directors believe that both the capital and operating costs will be generally above those encountered in other hydrocarbon producing and frontier regions.

Pool chemicals causing skin problems?

ALMOST two years ago the Leisure Centre switched suppliers for chlorine and other swimming pool chemicals.

Over the last year an increasing number of residents – both young and old – have experienced itching, rashes and blisters after swimming. Many of these people have never suffered any other skin complaints.

The Falkland Islands Government (FIG) has admitted that the new chemicals are causing an allergic reaction in some people, but maintain that it is only a "small group" who are affected.

From anecdotal evidence we believe that the numbers of people affected are far higher, and that because the first people to suffer an allergic reaction were those who would normally be in the pool several times a week, over time more and more people will be affected. So far FIG have taken no remedial

action, because the scale of the problem has not been officially recognised.

If you (or your children) have suffered an allergic reaction after using the pool at any time during the past two years, please would you contact us. We would like to find out exactly how many people are affected, how badly, and in particular discover how many swimmers and aquaerobic participants have had to reduce the time they spend in the pool, or even stop using the pool altogether.

If twenty people or more contact us, we will pass on to FIG the numbers involved – and the severity of the problems experienced – in the hope that Councillors and officers will take this information into account when deciding what to do next.

Doug's close shave

NOT content with playing a starring role in the heart of defence for the Falklands football team at the Island Games in Shetland, Doug Clarke headed for Thailand after the games for a white water rafting expedition in the Phang Na province.

Only seconds after this photograph was taken the raft approached the most dangerous stretch of the river, designated a "5" in white water degree of difficulty.

Doug was thrown from the raft and was in danger of being seriously injured or even killed in the stream, but for the actions of a mystery welshman known only as Brian seen sitting opposite Mr Clark in the raft.

The man risked his own life in order to grab Doug and pull him bodily back into the safety of the raft.

Doug, although badly shaken by his ordeal, was able to fully recover back at base camp. The mystery welshman has yet to be contacted, but Mr Clark praised his actions. "If it were not for the agility and bravery of the welsh guy I would not be here now!"

Expedition leader Cpl Simon Angel RE, also praised the amazing actions of the welshman, pointing out that Doug owed him his life.

Doug has now returned to the Falkland Islands and is understood to be none the worse for his ordeal.

Cetacean Watch searches for 'hot spots'


FALKLANDS Conservation (FC) are trying to gain an idea of the distribution of dolphins and whales around the islands.

Oli Yates of Falklands Conservation said. "The cetacean watch is a great way of getting a first picture of where these animals are found. There are obviously some 'hot spots', such as Port Howard where considerable numbers of dolphins are regularly seen, but before we think about further work, we need a wider coverage of where the animals are regularly sighted."

As a solution to this FC propose a different slant to the watch. So far the only forms that have been used are the A4 sized sheets that simply account for one sighting. The length of these forms may discourage people who are busy enough already from taking part. A new idea, specifically for people in camp is that Conservation supply an A3 sized wall chart with slots for individual days. If, for each day of the month a mark could be noted for the number of individuals and species, the information could be collected after several months and a much better picture would be obtained, with much less effort.

All that would be required is that when people see cetaceans; they mark on the chart a letter for the species and a number for the size of the group, with a note of the nearest land feature. Oli explains. "Therefore a day when three Commerson's are seen, a simple 'C3, Tea Point' could be written in the appropriate box for that day, five Peale's would be 'P5, Driftwood point' etc." It is hoped this would provide a really simple and non-time-consuming way of gathering the dolphin data from all around the islands.

This initial work would give FC a wealth of information about what species are seen, where and when. From this they should be able to gain an idea of where to focus some further effort. That effort would be based around actual surveys of the coastal waters around the islands with possibly smaller survey areas more heavily looked at. These smaller, more intense surveys would be in the places with high concentrations of



individuals previously identified through the cetacean watch. Oli said. "Obviously it is very early to be thinking about any form of further work. The first step is to get an idea of the knowledge already held in the islands and the information that is easy to collect. "The more people watching the waves the more data we can collect and therefore the clearer the cetacean picture becomes. At the moment the picture is very muddy at best!"

He said the importance of this project is to overcome the quantitative lack of knowledge of whales and dolphins around the islands. Whilst there doesn't appear to be an immediate risk to these animals, the lack of knowledge of the populations is a risk in itself. "No trends in numbers can be identified until the first effort is made," he said.

There are some interesting figures related to whales and dolphins. In New Zealand 425,000 people go whale watching each year with 2004 bringing almost £37 million to the local economy. In the Orkney Islands 121,125 tourists took whale-watching tours in one year and of all the visitors 44% went with whale watching as their main aim. This saw over £1.4 million in direct profit for those involved. There are plenty more examples including nearby Peninsula Valdez in Argentina where thousands of people flock each year hoping to catch a glimpse of the killer whales. Oli says. "Improved knowledge of cetaceans in the Falkland Islands could highlight an important economic resource."

Falklands war film in Spanish film festival

THE Argentine film *Iluminados por el Fuego* (Illuminated by Fire) will be competing in the San Sebastian film festival in September.

According to Mercopress the film is based on the personal experience of journalist Edgardo Esteban who was an 18 year old conscript sent to fight in the Falklands in 1982.

The film begins with Edgardo hearing of a veteran of the campaign who has committed suicide. This triggers Edgardo's own memories of the conflict and particularly focuses on the mistreatment the Argentine soldiers were subjected to by their own officers.

Directed by Tristan Bauer, the

film examines the role of the Argentine military high command and their treatment of the conscripted soldiers.

Mercopress also point out that in the 23 years since the war, "more Argentine veterans have committed suicide than the number which actually died fighting (over 700)."

The film was produced by the University of San Martin, together with the Argentine Cinema and Visual Arts Institute and the Spanish Channel Plus, and with collaboration from the provincial governments of San Luis and Santa Cruz.

After an advance showing last week, the film will be widely available in Argentine cinemas from September 8. *PN/MP*

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


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


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Hairy moments for fundraising dart players



New group created to tackle youth concerns

THERE has been a lot of concern in the press and the community as a whole in recent weeks about the numbers of young people congregating in the centre of Stanley on weekend evenings.

As many will be aware, the Governor shares this concern and has asked a group of people to look into the situation and to make recommendations to government about it. The group consists of councillors, government officers from social services, education, the attorney general's office, the police, and parents

The fact of young people gathering on the streets is not new in Stanley: a report in the local newspaper in the early 1900's expressed the same concerns that are being expressed today. However, it seems that the number of young people coming together has in-

creased over the last 18 months or so and that attitudes and behaviour have changed. The group's first job is to figure out what 'the problem' is, looking at it from all perspectives: young people, adults, parents, the business community, visitors and the general public.

What about young people themselves. Do they think there is anything wrong with 'hanging out' in town on a Saturday night? Young people the world over get together on street corners. Are you there because you want to be, or because you have nowhere else to go or nothing to do? Of course there are places to go, but maybe they are not to your liking. Why not?

What about parents? Do you think there are adequate facilities for young people? Are there particular groups that are not well served? Where can your children go safely

to learn independence from their parents? Do you need help controlling your kids or protecting them from peer pressure?

What are the concerns of the business community, particularly pubs and restaurants, about young people congregating outside their premises? And how do those adults who want to go out for a drink or meal in the evening feel about making their way through groups of youngsters to do so? What is the impact on local householders?

What are the risks to young people out in this area at night? Is it OK for children to be out at night without adult supervision?

Is this a symptom of a deeper disease in society and, if so, how do we tackle it in practical terms? Is it a coincidence that there is

also concern being expressed, particularly in the schools, about attitude problems, lack of respect for self and others and bullying?

It is not for me, as a newcomer, to make these judgements. My job is to help the group work out what is really going on by seeking the views of children, parents and the wider public. We have designed a questionnaire aimed at young people to get their views and we are planning face to face discussions with groups of young people in a variety of settings, including the school. We will take a similar approach with parents.

The purpose of this article is to inform the public about what we are doing and to get your views. If you have any useful suggestions, or would like to assist in any way, please write to me at the hospital.

Recipes for the Falkland Islands

Warming cheese and potato pie

THIS versatile pie is suitable for packed lunches or an informal supper at home, or even a picnic - when the weather improves.

The herbs in the pastry add a speckled look and extra flavour

It is best served with a salad.

Ingredients

- 12 oz plain flour
- 6 oz butter
- 2 teaspoons finely chopped thyme (or 1 teaspoon dried thyme)
- 4 tablespoons cold water
- 1 oz butter
- 1 large onion peeled and chopped
- 1 medium potato, peeled and cubed
- 10 oz cheddar cheese, grated

- 2 large eggs
- 4 tablespoons single cream
- 2 tablespoons chopped parsley or chives
- Black pepper

Method

Make the pastry with the first four ingredients. A little more water may be needed. Wrap in cling film and refrigerate for 30 minutes.

Heat the butter in a pan and add the onion and potato. Cook slowly with the lid on for 5-10 minutes until cooked but not browned. Remove from heat and cool.

Stir in the cheese. Beat the eggs, cream and parsley together. Add these to the pan.

Heat the oven to 200 C / gas mark 6.

Cut the pastry in two pieces, one slightly larger than the other. Roll out the larger piece to a circle big enough to line a 9 inch (23cm) flan tin. Trim the edges. Pour in the cheese filling and spread evenly.

Roll out the smaller piece to a circle for the top. Wet the edges of the bottom piece and carefully put the lid on top. Seal the edges together and trim.

Use the trimmings to make decorations for the top. (Although not necessary the top can be glazed with beaten egg)

Bake for 40 minutes until golden brown. Can be eaten hot, warm or cold.

GREASY wool prices slipped almost "across the board" at sales in Australia. The only exceptions were 25 micron fleece wool lots, which remained steady. As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide". Prices also struggled in New Zealand.

Adverse currency rate movements that occurred during the week and also a lack of buyer demand affected greasy wool prices.

Difficulties with European/Chinese textile trade arrangements, Australian debate over industry marketing and the PETA campaign (People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals, against mulesing of sheep, livesheep exports etc) have combined to create a "dark cloud" over the wool industry in the minds of some Australian wool traders and their clients.

In Australia 84.7% of the 66,481 bale offering was sold. Included in the offering were 5,479 bales of crossbred wool of which 90.3% was sold. In New Zealand, almost 30% of the 12,000 bale offering was passed in.

Auctions continue next week in New Zealand and Australia where almost 70,000 bales will be on offer. Sales resume in South Africa the following week.

Plane crash in Venezuela kills 160

A COLOMBIAN charter jet carrying tourists from Panama to Martinique crashed in Venezuela on Monday after its engines failed, killing all 160 aboard in one of the country's worst air disasters.

The West Caribbean airways MD-82 aircraft was en route to the French Caribbean island when it reported engine trouble and diverted to an airport in Venezuela. It crashed at a cattle farm near Venezuela's border with Colombia. "Unfortunately, there were no survivors from this accident," Colonel Francisco Paz, head of Venezuela's National Civil Aviation Institute, told local television.

Most of the passengers were local government officials in Martinique who had been on holiday with their families, an official at the Fort-de-France airport in Martinique said.

French television broadcast images of victims' relatives crying and shouting as an official read out the names of the plane's passengers at the airport in Martinique. "There are children who have lost both their mother and their father," said Andre Charpentier, the mayor of Basse-Pointe, a small community of 4,000 inhabitants in the north of Martinique.

The Fort-de-France airport official said the plane had been chartered by the Globe Trotters travel agency in Martinique.

In Seattle, Boeing spokesman Jim Proulx said the company was dispatching a team of air safety investigators to help search for the cause of the crash.

Boeing took over McDonnell Douglas, maker of the MD-82, in 1997.

Venezuelan Interior Minister Jesse Chacón said the aircraft had changed its route to try to land in the western Venezuelan city of Maracaibo, but lost altitude and crashed in the remote Sierra de Perija region near the border with Colombia.

"When it was flying over Venezuelan airspace, they had problems with one engine and then with another engine, and at that moment it went down," Chacón said.

Venezuelan rescuers in surgical masks waded knee-deep in mud and water searching for bodies in fields where the plane went down.

By midday, rescue workers had pulled 56 bodies from the charred remains of the aircraft, said Col. Antonio Rivero, head of Civil Protection agency.

Lagos: 'A great day for Chile'

IN A solemn joint house session Chilean Congress overwhelmingly approved on Tuesday a package of constitutional reforms which now fully reflect the "democratic spirit of the Chilean people," said President Ricardo Lagos.

"It's a great day for Chile," said President Lagos adding that the current 1980 constitution, "was born as an expression of an authoritarian (military) regime, which did not express the feeling of the majority of Chileans, or national unity."

The approved reforms entitle the Chilean president to remove any and all commanders of the three services and from the military police or Carabineros.

The National Security Council is no longer the guarantor of institutions, but rather an advisory body which will meet and debate when convened by the President.

As of March 2006, there will no longer be nominated or for life Senators and Presidential mandate is cut from six to four years with no immediate re-election.

The constitutional court is the only court in the land with the exclusive responsibility of interpreting

ing the constitution and constitutionality of bills.

The Lower House can name inquiry and/or monitoring committees with the approval of two fifths of elected Deputies.

On closing the session Senate president Sergio Romero said "we are before a new beginning which signals the definitive end of the prolonged political transition, based on an exemplary constitutional consensus."

"We look forward to a closer relation between the electorate and its elected representatives, new spaces of participation which will help consolidate economic development and a better quality of life for all Chileans," he added.

"I trust and hope that as we have reached a consensus on the Constitution, further on we can reach a consensus on the electoral system which really reflects the feeling of Chileans," said President Lagos.

This is the next major political reform, but will have to wait until 2006 when the new government takes office.

Chilean elections are scheduled for next December.

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



Ring tones for Christmas

STANLEY and parts of East Falkland will soon benefit from a mobile telephone network, possibly by the end of the year, if plans by local telecommunications provider Cable and Wireless go ahead.

Traffic Manager for the company, Brian Summers, told *Penguin News* that despite objections raised about the siting of masts needed for the network, "ideally, we'd like to get it in by Christmas."

Cable and Wireless intend to have a Global System Mobile (GSM) network in place that will provide coverage for Stanley, Mount Pleasant, the road in between, and limited coverage as far as Goose Green.

The system would be compatible with standard UK mobile phone handsets and would include a voicemail and text messaging service. International text messaging would also become available, but not until "April or May" according to Mr Summers.

He explained that, "Providing your UK handset isn't 'simlocked', you would be able to remove your UK sim card, and insert a local Cable and Wireless one for use in the Islands."

Mr Summers was unable to give any indication as to the pricing structure at the moment as he said, "The whole pricing regime will be discussed with the government consultant Dr Doyle when he visits the Islands in September."

The Planning and Building Committee held a meeting on Tuesday at which they considered several planning applications from Cable and Wireless for the equipment needed to run the proposed network.

As well as one site on the Mount Pleasant Complex, there were three applications for masts in Stanley, one at the site of the Earth Station on Darwin Road, one on the South side of H Jones Road, to the East of Hillside Camp, and one in the Malvina Gardens, to the South of the Taxation Office.

It was the latter application that caused the most concern and prompted several letters of objection from members of the public who felt the proximity of this site to a children's playground and nursery may present health risks.

There was also an objection based, "solely on aesthetic grounds." The objector felt that, "The proposed mast structures are not only ugly, but are also very tall and will undoubtedly dominate Stanley." The author of the letter was also concerned that allowing these tall structures (up to 20 metres high) to be located in Stanley could set a precedent, "for further obtrusive development such as large advertisement boards for example."

The health risk concerns voiced by several objectors centered on the suggestion that emissions from the masts could be detrimental to health - especially among children.

Advising the committee, Chief Medical Officer, Dr Roger Diggle said that mobile technology is used worldwide and that there are masts in urban areas in every country in the world. He said that it was very difficult to prove that mobile phone technology was entirely safe but, "having said that, there is no evidence to suggest it is unsafe."

There had been a suggestion that the masts be located outside of

Stanley, as it was thought this would lessen the health risk. Dr Diggle dispelled this myth saying that the greater health risk came not from the masts, but from the telephone handsets themselves. Although the emissions from the handsets are much lower than the masts, the close proximity to the user's brain means the risk is potentially higher. With this in mind, the further away the GSM masts are from the handsets, the more powerful a signal the handsets would have to transmit.

In a letter to the Chairman of the Planning and Building Committee, Chief Executive Officer of Cable and Wireless in the Falklands, Rick Hall, moved to reassure committee members that the health risks were minimal.

He said, "... based on the current weight of scientific evidence there are no known adverse health effects from exposures below international guidelines." He said that typical exposure in Stanley would be less than 1000th of international guide lines, "at most."

Mr Hall said despite the lack of any evidence regarding a health risk, Cable and Wireless have still taken a "precautionary approach" to choosing the sites of the towers. He added, "The scrutiny of the proposed GSM service in Stanley is welcomed by Cable and Wireless," who, he said, were also willing to fund independent verification that all aspects of the network were, "well within the international guidelines in all cases."

Dr Diggle broadly agreed with Mr Hall and said at the meeting that he felt, "health is probably a small (factor)," adding, "No site is fundamentally unsafe." (continued on page 3)

News in brief

Fuel spillage due to failure in base of tank

HAVING contained the fuel leak discovered on August 13 at the Petroleum Storage Depot at the Mount Pleasant Complex, the MoD responded, through Defence Estates Overseas by contracting international engineering and environmental consultants, Parsons Brinckerhoff (PB). A team arrived late on August 16 and undertook an assessment.

The PB representative Tim Greaves said, "Any fuel spill is of course undesirable but the response to the spill was prompt and effective, such that only small amounts of fuel entered the sea."

PB have assessed that the likely cause of the spillage was due to a failure in the base of one of the storage tanks. The MoD is now planning to undertake inspections of the remaining tanks in order to avoid a reoccurrence.

Medi-vac to Monte

THE British Antarctic Survey (BAS) has completed a precautionary medical evacuation from its Rothera Research Station on the Antarctic Peninsula.

A spokesperson for BAS said that the member of staff was not in any danger and has been under the care of the research station's resident doctor. The BAS Medical Unit, based at Plymouth's Derriford Hospital, advised transfer to the UK for assessment and treatment.

On August 18, the BAS de Havilland Dash-7 aircraft left Canada for Rothera via Stanley. The aircraft with the patient arrived in Stanley for onward flight to UK via Montevideo yesterday.

New vet takes up post

A NEW Veterinary officer, Vic Epstein, will arrive this weekend. He comes from Goondiwindi in Queensland, Australia.

News from the Public Meeting

'Avoiding panic' key to Budget

AT the Public Meeting on Tuesday, the Chief Executive Chris Simpkins and the Deputy Financial Secretary Keith Padgett gave a presentation on the budget, outlining the process involved in preparing it, and how the reduction in fishing income is being managed.

The key to this, according to the Chief Executive is to, "avoid panic". He said that government hope they are managing a "temporary dip rather than a total loss of revenue" in the illex fishery. Mr Simpkins stressed that although there obviously had to be some reduction in capital investment, some projects would continue to be funded as they often contribute to the economy themselves. He cited the camp roads programme as an example as the number of jobs created by the programme is substantial.

He also explained that the government reserves, what he called "our rainy day fund" was kept at roughly two and a half times the

annual expenditure budget, and currently stands at approximately £80 million.

Education and health care were described by Mr Simpkins as "critical services" that would still have to make certain budgetary cuts, but it was hoped to keep the impact of this to the absolute minimum.

Finally, Mr Simpkins explained that the budget deficit for this financial year would be around £400,000. This is in the context of an approximate £8 million reduction in income since the illex fishery had to be closed.

Mr Padgett continued the presentation with a more detailed breakdown of the government's income and expenditure.

He told the meeting that 42% of the government's income comes from fishing, while 15% came from tax. Mr Padgett said 15% was an extremely low proportion of government income from tax, which in most other countries would be substantially higher.

Councillors aware of student fees issue

FOLLOWING last week's editorial regarding student university fees, Councillor Jan Cheek, who holds the education portfolio said she wished to "set the record straight" on the matter.

Mrs Cheek said that councillors are aware of the issue and that government officials have for some time, "made representations up to ministerial level" with regard to securing the substantially reduced 'home' fees for Falkland Islands students attending UK universities. Currently, the Falkland Islands Government are re-

quired to pay the much higher 'overseas' rates for university education for Falkland Islands students.

Mrs Cheek added that the matter is being pursued and also said that it was not just a Falkland Islands issue but affected all the Overseas Territories.

Councillor Summers said the view of the British Government is that it is a "residency issue" meaning that any British national who is not resident in the UK would still be subject to overseas fees. "We will keep hammering away at it," he said.

Gordon Forbes legal case to be resolved soon?

A MEMBER of the public raised the question of legal costs in the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) versus Gordon Forbes Construction (GFC) case, with costs so far amounting to £1.9 million pounds. The questioner asked when the case might be over and whether a more economical method of solving the dispute could have been used.

Councillor Summers responded by saying the £1.9 million already spent on the case was, "a horrible amount of money" but said that GFC were

claiming they were owed £3.6 million, so even with the amount already spent, FIG are, "still in positive ground".

Mr Summers said it was hoped the case would soon be resolved, but he couldn't be certain.

With regard to an alternative solution to the dispute other than legal action, Mr Summers said a less costly method would obviously have been explored if possible, but that in this case it was clear that there was, "no realistic prospect at the offset."

Concern over sewerage works and health and safety

SEVERAL other matters were also raised at the meeting.

A query about the sewerage pipe works being undertaken in front of the Jetty Centre and where Crozier Place meets Ross Road, prompted Councillor Summers to say that the, "job is not finished."

Councillors assured the meeting that the works being undertaken were the most cost effective and allowed for long term upgrading. They also assured that all areas affected would be suitably tidied up when work had been completed.

There was a question from the floor about the Island Plan which

Councillor Summers said, "Exists in a modified form, is currently with the printers and should be available soon."

FIG's view on health and safety was also queried, with particular reference to Public Works Department employees.

Councillor Summers said, "We're very cautious about health and safety," adding that were comprehensive legislation to be passed, "It would cost a huge amount of money."

Councillors did reassure the meeting however that where appropriate, safety equipment was provided and should be worn at all times.

'Protecting society from illegal imports'

IN response to a letter in the August 5, *Penguin News* in which Mount Pleasant resident Mr Clark complained of the treatment his St Helenian family received from Customs and Immigration officials on the incoming flight from Chile on July 23. Collector of Customs, Robert King has outlined the responsibilities of his department.

He said that one of the main responsibilities of the Customs and Immigration Department is to exercise controls in order to protect society from illegal imports. In fulfilling this role, customs officers have powers to examine at any time, personal baggage or other items carried by arriving passengers. They also have powers in respect of the search of persons "where there are reasonable grounds of suspicion." Mr King added that these procedures inevitably involve "some invasion of an individual's personal privacy."

"Customs and Immigration officers always endeavour to perform

their statutory obligations as discreetly as circumstances and available facilities will allow, and to avoid in so far as possible any undue delay and inconvenience to the travelling public as a whole." Mr King said the facilities available at Mount Pleasant Airport, "were unfortunately not designed with Customs activities in mind," adding, "only limited space is available for all the activities and processes conducted there."

In conclusion Mr King said he has closely examined the activities of the officers who were on duty in respect of the LAN flight of 23 July and is fully satisfied that their actions were justified, "that there was no discrimination and that their conduct was polite and professional."

He said however that he did accept that "more explanation could have been afforded to the individuals subjected to examination and I regret any additional distress this may have caused."

DR Rebecca Edwards is to return to the Islands to take up a job share with Dr Richard Davies who is already practising in the Falklands.

Dr Edwards is the daughter of Councillors Norma and Roger Edwards and is married to Christopher Lee of Port Howard.

Because of her urge to return to the Falklands and work at the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital, Dr Edwards gave up her Medical Rotation course for a GP course. She has recently been working in a busy practice in Wadebridge, Cornwall and will take up her post in the Islands on October 1.

Other hospital staff movements include Dr Bennebroek who will arrive at the end of the year as a replacement for Dr Khanbhai who leaves in December.

Both locum Dentists, Julia Fisher

From an aesthetic point of view, the committee were reasonably satisfied with the proposed sites at the Earth Station and H Jones Road as they are close to existing masts. The proposed Malvina Gardens site is also near an existing mast used by the Fire Station. Cable and Wireless have volunteered to allow the Fire Station to use the GMS mast and eliminate the need for their own. This mast would also be partially obscured by trees surrounding the area. The committee approved all applications except for the Malvina Gardens site. It was felt that advice should be taken on the risk posed by the emissions, bearing in mind the close proximity of the playground and nursery.

Mr Summers said that if planning permission is not granted for the central Stanley mast, Cable and Wireless would still hope to have the system in place by Christmas

adding that even without the central mast, most of Stanley should still be covered by the other two sites.

He said that if the application for the Malvina Gardens site was turned down, "We will look for an alternative site."

One member of the public had suggested that Cortley Hill (which Cable and Wireless already use for other purposes) on the North side of the harbour be used to site a mast rather than in the centre of town.

Mr Summers said that although this site was, "a possibility" which is, "not completely ruled out," it is, "not a preferred site," for a number of reasons.

Firstly, there is limited power available at this site and certainly not enough to run a GSM base station. Secondly, Mr Summers said that in the next few years, the existing installation at the Cortley Hill site, "would not be needed."

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


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

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Your questions answered

Q WHEN the vessel *CFL Pioneer* was berthed at FIPASS a minimum number of crew were always on board or at least on hand to be able to move the vessel if required. If this was a requirement of the authorities why has the *Elqui* been allowed to remain at FIPASS without a standby crew?

Harbour Master, Jon Clark provided the following answer.

A THE *CFL Pioneer* was the first sizeable vessel to be berthed for an extended period at the east side of FIPASS. The characteristics of the berth for a relatively large vessel were largely unknown, such as susceptibility to weather and any stresses on the causeway pontoons. Hence a skeleton crew was required to be kept aboard as has been the practice at other berths at FIPASS.

The other circumstances of the two vessels were also different. The *CFL Pioneer* was laid up for

commercial reasons, was fully certified and in good condition, whereas the *Elqui* was forfeited to the Crown in the form of the Government of South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands (GSGSSI) and, after the departure of the crew, was uninhabitable.

The Government of South Georgia has determined that the vessel should be disposed of in such a way that she should never again be used for fishing illegally, either by scrapping or scuttling. This is in the interest of all concerned, GSGSSI, the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) and commercial fishing companies.

Having now gained some experience of using this particular berth over a prolonged period, it is possible that the crewing requirement during lay-up may be relaxed in the future, provided the ship is watched and FIG indemnified against any mishap (as GSGSSI has done).

'Tab' to raise funds for the hospital

CORPORAL Mark Sefton and Corporal Jens Pedersen who both work at Hillside Camp in Stanley are planning a Sponsored 'tab' from Stanley to Mount Pleasant in the first week of October.

They are already beginning to look for sponsors with all funds raised going to the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital in Stanley.

Corporal Sefton of the Royal Air Force is the Master Chef at Hillside and with the support of Corporal Pedersen from the Army, the pair plan to cover the 37 miles

in military kit carrying 40 pounds over the course of a day.

The word 'tab' is a military term describing a method of advance by foot, which requires soldiers to run much of the flats and downs of a route whilst powering up the hills. The combination of the distance and the weight will prove to be a challenge.

With sponsorship from both military and civilian personnel the pair are hoping to raise a large sum for the hospital.

Veterans angry at UK Lottery refusal

THE Falklands Veteran Foundation have reacted angrily after being turned down by the National Lottery.

The charity hoped to build a refuge in the Falklands for veterans of the conflict and had appealed to the lottery for £80,000 to build a two storey refuge in Stanley overlooking the harbour.

Foundation volunteers have spent three years raising £20,000.

The Falklands Veterans Foundation have been granted a 50 year,

rent free lease on a plot of land on Rowlands Rise by the Falkland Islands Government.

The former soldier Simon Weston who suffered near fatal burns during the 1982 conflict led criticism of the Big Lottery Funds decision.

The appeal was turned down in a letter from the fund that questioned the lack of psychiatric support for veterans and the cost of the lengthy flights to and from the Islands.

Interference on the calling channel

THE Royal Falkland Island Police have received complaints from members of the public regarding unnecessary interference on the two metre-calling channel.

A spokesperson for the Police said that under the Telecommunication Ordinance there are three specific offences: to send any false

or misleading messages; to deliberately cause interference with the channel; or to transmit or operate radio equipment without a licence.

The spokesperson advised that the Police will take action against any person caught committing any of the above offences and any other relevant offences.

Elqui prepares for her final voyage

FOLLOWING a conviction for illegal fishing and failure by the vessel owners to pay their fine, the longliner *Elqui* was awarded by the court to the Government of South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands (GSGSSI).

Operations Manager for GSGSSI, Gordon Liddle explained that the principal objective of the GSGSSI has been to ensure that the vessel cannot fish illegally again. As the vessel has no commercial value to a legal operator and as GSGSSI would have no control over its final ownership were they to attempt to find a buyer, "sinking or scrapping were considered the only two options."

Scuttling has become the preferred option as the cost of removal to a scrap yard far outweighed the scrap value of the ship. This was largely because the ship was not in a fit condition to be flagged in the Falklands and sail to another port safely under its own power and the costs of towing are extremely high.

The vessel could not be sunk in the state in which it was left by its previous owners, Glencagles Corporation, so advice was sought from the Attorney General, the Marine Officer and several others. Mr Liddle said this was done to ensure that all the correct procedures were being followed and that there would be "no pollution risk whatsoever to the marine environment."

He added, "the Marine Officer has been consulted throughout the



cleaning process, continues to be so and is content with the work that is presently being undertaken, the Environmental Planning Officer is also in the picture."

The work presently being carried out is long and complex and includes the removal of all hydraulic fluids, this is to include emptying and cleaning storage tanks, hydraulic pipelines and hydraulically operated machinery.

Mr Liddle said the fuel tanks are not only being emptied but are being manually cleaned as they become empty, adding that this work is being done safely including the use of air sampling equipment to ensure that there are no dangerous concentrations of gas.

The engine lubricating oils have all been removed, both from

storage tanks which have been manually cleaned and from the main engines, generators and motors. These too have been manually cleaned to ensure no unacceptable hydrocarbons remain

The galley fryers have been cleaned to remove cooking oils and all food and other domestic waste has been removed and burned.

Paints and batteries have been removed and all the fishing gear has, or is being, removed including lines, winches, deck lights, radars and other navigational equipment, plastic baskets, hooks and snood lines etc.

Mr Liddle said that some objects have been offered to the Museum and National Trust, in particular an "old and rather interesting binnacle compass on the monkey deck."

With the cleanup process completed the ship will be an empty shell with no remaining loose materials or oils, gasses etc on board that could cause any adverse environmental impact or any hazard to other shipping.

Mr Liddle described the project as "a costly exercise for the Government of South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands but one that shows their determination to ensure that pirate fishermen do not profit from their crimes."

When selecting a site for scuttling the *Elqui* Mr Liddle said there are some issues that have to be borne in mind. It should be in waters sufficiently deep to ensure that it is not a navigational hazard and

that the ship will not immediately break up by pounding, thus releasing any deck timbers to the surface. Mr Liddle said that at the correct depth the timbers will "waterlog and remain permanently on the bottom."

The site should also be reasonably close to Stanley to reduce the towing time and the possibility of the ship sinking accidentally in a less favourable position.

It is planned to put the *Elqui* next to rocks or a natural reef because even if inshore trawling were to be permitted by FIG in the future, ships could not trawl immediately next to rocks therefore the *Elqui* would still not be a hazard. Mr Liddle stressed that there would be a minimal affect on marine life and that, carried out correctly, the hulk could, "provide a haven for fish and become an artificial reef."

A licence to scuttle the vessel in Falklands waters will be required from FIG this will be considered at Executive Council on August 25.

Falkland Islands Salvager Lyle Craigie-Halkett has had the unenviable task of cleaning the ship which still contained rotting fish when work began.

Lyle reported that the work is slightly ahead of schedule and attributes this to the hard work of his gang, Gerard Smith, Gordon Peck and Arthur McBain plus the Sullivan Shipping launch crews.

Lyle has worked for the South Georgia Government on other occasions. He and his team removed several thousand tons of heavy fuel oil from the whaling stations at South Georgia in 1990/91 and more recently undertook the major clean up operation of the whaling stations in 2003/4.

After spending most of his life at sea, Lyle moved into salvage and has worked on some interesting projects around the world such as being involved in locating Vasco Da Gamma's three uncle ships that were lost of the coast of Oman in 1553. During another expedition in the South China Sea, Lyle discovered a silver ingot on a 12th century wreck and donated it to the Falklands Museum for their maritime section.

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Booklet remembers Dean Brandon

Dean Lowther Brandon was Colonial Chaplain to the Falkland Islands (1877-1892) and Dean of the Cathedral on its completion (1892-1907).

Through his 30 years of service in the Falkland Islands, Dean Brandon won over the hearts and affection of the Falklands people, pointing them towards God in his own manner. On horseback he rode across the islands from farm to farm visiting families wherever he found them. He had a magic lantern and carried this with him wherever he went. No one carried the torch higher for Christ than he did. There is perhaps no clearer evidence of this than in the building of Christ Church Cathedral, Stanley, for which Dean Lowther Brandon was responsible together with Bishop Stirling (the first Bishop of the Falkland Islands). It was a major project.

Lowther Brandon's arrival in the Falklands in 1877 was the catalyst to build a Cathedral Church, which would serve as the Cathedral of the South American Diocese and also the Parish Church of the Falkland Islands.

Nearly a century after the completion of those unforgettable thirty years of unique service from 1877-1907, Dean Brandon remains strong in the folk memory of the Falkland Islands, and has contributed to the binding of the Falkland Islands people.

He returned to his native Ireland after his service in the Falkland Islands, and spent the last



twenty five years of his life living and working among his people. He was born on 25th January 1846 and he died on the 16th July 1933, aged 87 years.

His memory lives on today in the Falkland Islands particularly because of his "magic lantern" and the part he played in the creation of the Cathedral, surely a monument to his life here.

A small but comprehensive booklet about Dean Brandon has been compiled by Canon Gerry Murphy, Chaplain to the Falkland Islands from March 1987 to October 1991.

Appropriate disciplinary action could result, the case could be dropped, or if either employee or employer is still not satisfied then the matter may have to come before the court.

With this process in place any decisions taken would be seen as fair, open and transparent.

The Reverend Dr Ewan Christian Brew Corlett 1922 - 2005



By Reverend Ian Faulds, Editor of the *Isle of Man Church Leader*. THE Reverend Dr Ewan Christian Brew Corlett (pictured above), son of Malcolm James and Catherine Anne Corlett, was born in Burma in 1922 and educated at Port Elizabeth, South Africa, King William's College, Oxford University (MA) and Durham University (PhD, Naval Architecture).

During a life packed with achievements, he went on to become a legend in marine and Church circles. He had a lifelong passion for the sea, initially wanting to pursue a career in the Royal Navy. When this was thwarted by a childhood illness, he directed his inter-

est in engineering to naval architecture and so began a career that was to peak with his appointment as Assessor to the Herald of Free Enterprise Inquiry in 1987.

It was his work in securing the return of Brunel's *SS Great Britain* to Bristol, however, that first brought him to the attention of the British people. When he left the British Aluminium Company (where he completed important work on *RY Britannia* and the water speed record boats for both Donald Campbell and John Cobb) in 1953, he received, as a parting gift, a print showing the great iron ship on her maiden voyage in heavy weather off Lundy Island.

Isambard Brunel and the background to the ship fascinated him and, in 1967, he wrote a letter to *The Times*, highlighting the national and international importance of the vessel, launched in 1843, which was lying aground at Gypsy Cove in the Falkland Islands.

This letter led to the formation of the *Great Britain* Project, to which he became technical adviser. He surveyed the vessel in the Falklands in 1969 (travelling to the Islands with Lord Chalfont on H.M.S. *Endurance*), carried out the background technical work which established the feasibility of a salvage attempt, and was on board with Prince Philip when the vessel was brought up the Avon and returned to her original build-

ing dock in Bristol.

He then advised on the technical aspects of her conservation and restoration and wrote the definitive technical history of the vessel, *The Iron Ship*. He remained involved throughout, even attending the 're-launch' of the ship, after a major restoration project, on 19th July this year.

In March, 1996 he received an award from the World Ship Trust, particularly recognising the importance of his contribution to the saving of the *S.S. Great Britain*. The award was presented to him by Prince Philip at Buckingham Palace. He had a broad interest in marine archaeology and researched or corresponded on a wide variety of topics, including the design and performance of twin hulled ships and the Graveney boat. He was the author of many technical papers and articles and a seminal book on *The Revolution in Merchant Shipping, 1950 to 1980*, something with which he had been closely involved. After an initial career in the UK, he moved back to the Isle of Man in 1976, where he moved to Port-e-Vullen, Maughold, which had been the family home since the seventeenth century. He continued to lead his consultancy business, Burness Corlett and Partners, on the Isle of Man until his retirement in 1988. Amongst his professional achievements, he was a liveryman of the

Worshipful Company of Shipwrights, becoming Prime Warden in 1990, Vice President of the Royal Institute of Naval Architects (1971-1982), Trustee of the National Maritime Museum (1974-1992), Fellow of the Royal Academy of Engineering (1978) and an Honorary Fellow of both the Nautical Institute and the Royal Institute of Navigation.

He received the Royal Institute of Navigation's bronze medal in 1980, and was awarded the OBE in 1985. His Christian faith was always a matter of great importance and, in 1988, he decided to train for the priesthood, being ordained in St. German's Cathedral, Peel, by Bishop Noël Jones in 1991. As a non-stipendiary curate for the Parish of Maughold from 1991 to 2004, he was active in taking services, making pastoral visits and generally supporting the Vicar. He was very proud of the fact that two direct ancestors of his had been Vicars of Maughold in the sixteenth century. He also served on the Diocesan Advisory Committee and personally visited and made security reports for every church in the Diocese. In 1946 he married Edna Lilian Buggs, who predeceased him in 2002. They had three sons, Nigel (b. 1950), Brian (b. 1953) and Malcolm (b. 1956) who all survive him - and who all follow in his engineering footsteps!

Stages of tissue repair and the implications for (self) treatment

FOLLOWING a soft tissue injury like a ligament sprain, muscle tear, tendon strain etc, the body responds and goes through stages of healing. In the following outline, the number of days given for each stage is approximate. You have to be aware that the stages do overlap and that there are differences between individuals

1. Acute Stage – characterised by inflammatory reaction

During the first 48 hours post-injury vascular changes predominate. Plasma and cells leak into the surrounding tissue as oedema. The swelling can take a few hours to develop and the amount of swelling is dependent on which type of tissue is involved. Muscles tend to cause considerable swelling and bleeding but tendons do not easily swell. Within this stage, neutralization of chemical irritants, cleaning up of the dead tissue, early formation of new cells and formation of new capillaries begins. Usually this stage lasts 2-3 days. Clinically signs of inflammation are present with swelling, redness, heat, pain and loss of function. Treatment is aimed at relieving

and promoting healing.

The RICE- principle has to be commenced as soon as possible. RICE - Relative rest (relative rest rather than complete immobilisation, move around within pain limits), Ice, Compression (with tubigrip, bandage etc) and Elevation. Exercises are limited to gentle movements within the pain free range.

2. Repair stage

This stage is characterised by the synthesis and deposition of collagen. The immature collagen replaces the exudates that initially formed the clot. Some tissues -like bones, synovial joint lining and skeletal muscle- are capable of direct regeneration. All other soft tissues have to reconstruct the damaged tissue by scar tissue formation. Scar tissue does not have the exact same properties or tensile strength as the tissue it is rebuilding but it should resemble the tissue closely to ensure that normal function is regained. Initially the immature scar tissue is thin and unorganised and can easily be injured if overstressed. However, appropriate and graduated movement and loading will stimulate growth and alignment and minimizes any adhesions

to surrounding tissue.

Clinically the signs of inflammation decrease gradually until absent. Pain can be caused when stressing the damaged tissues.

At this stage you can gradually increase your functional movements (things you would perform during your normal daily activities) when there is enough tensile strength within the wound to withstand this. In practice you will still be guided by pain on movement. You can gradually increase your range of movement into mild discomfort but stay clear of pain.

3. Remodelling stage

The scar tissue is attempting to take on the physical characteristics of the tissue it is replacing. It starts 14 to 21 days after injury and continues for 6 months or more. Initially the immature scar tissue is weak and the fibres are randomly organised. During the remodelling stage the fibres will get rearranged in a linear and lateral orientation. Immature scar tissue is converted to mature strong scar tissue. Because remodelling

of maturing scar tissue occurs in a response to stresses placed on it, it is important to use controlled forces that duplicate normal stresses on the tissues.

In this stage it is important to gradually return to all your normal activities and sport. Your range of movement should return to normal and should be pain free although if you really overstretch the tissues they may stay sore for quite a while longer.

When it goes wrong!

Pain that recurs from an old injury may be the result of too early return to function, before proper healing has occurred, resulting in re-injury.

It can also be caused by tearing of scar tissue that has adhered to the surrounding tissues and therefore will not have good mobility. This is generally due to too long a rest period or immobilization.

Or by contractures or poor mobility in structures which become stressed with repeated or vigorous activity. This may happen if you do not ensure you regain your full movements.

I did an equipment check recently and I specifically seem to be missing a wobble board, a wobble disc, weights and Tens machines amongst other things. Please understand these things were lent to you on a short-term basis and other people might need them now.

MISSED APPOINTMENTS. In the last month, four hours of physiotherapy time have been wasted by people not keeping their appointments and not notifying reception.

Although it is nice to have time for a cup of tea and just sit down and have a chat rather than work, it does mean that other patients have to wait longer for an appointment. So please, if you can't keep an appointment, cancel it!

Recipes for the Falkland Islands

Spotted dog soda bread

Ingredients

- 1 lb flour
- 1 level teaspoon bicarbonate of soda
- 1 tablespoon caster sugar
- 1 level teaspoon salt
- 1 level teaspoon mixed spice
- 4 oz sultanas
- grated rind of one lemon
- 1 egg beaten
- 12 fluid ounces of milk.

Method

Sieve flour and bicarb together then add sugar, salt, spice, sultanas and lemon rind. Mix well.

Place the beaten egg and milk in a jug and make up to 14 fluid ounces if necessary.

Make a well in the centre of

the dry ingredients and add most of the egg mixture.

Work quickly to mix to a soft consistency, not too wet or sticky and avoid over mixing.

When it coheres turn onto a floured surface and pat into a round loaf. Place on a baking sheet and using a sharp knife cut a deep cross on the top.

Bake at 200C (400F) gas mark 6 for 30 - 40 minutes.

Serve while still warm with butter and jam. If the bread is a day old, toast before serving.

For a savoury version replace the sugar, spice, sultanas and lemon rind with black olives, sunblushed tomatoes and caramelised onions.

Shipping activity from August 15 - 22

TWO reefers were in Berekely Sound this week. *Frio Marathon* in for transshipping and the *Astra* leaving on August 20.

As well as the tanker *Baltic Pride* which was in for bunkers, there were also five trawlers in Berekely Sound. The *Esperanza* left on August 18 after transshipping, and the *In Sung 205* and *Agnes 2* left on August 17 and 18 respectively after bunkering. The *Pratadina 28* and *Aurora II* both left for fishing grounds on August 20 after transshipping.

At FIPASS, the *Elqui* remained under arrest, and the longliner *Koryo Maru II* arrived on August 20. Also at FIPASS, the survey vessel *GSI Admiral* left for the high seas on August 21 after two days in port for a crew change, and to take on stores and water. The tanker *Baltic Pride*, left for fishing grounds

on August 16 after coming in for bunkers and stores.

The yacht *Le Sourire* arrived at the Government Jetty on August 19 for a port visit.

At Mare Harbour, the *Saint Brandan* arrived on August 11 to discharge and load cargo, and the *Indomitable* and *HMS Dumbarton Castle* arrived on August 22 and 8 respectively, both for a port visit.

There were two reefers in Port William with the *Palana* and the *Astra* both in for transshipping.

There were eight trawlers in Port William during the week. *Playa Pesmar Dos*, *In Sung 207*, *Arpon* and *Figaro* all left for fishing grounds after coming in for licences. *Petrel* and *Argos Vigo* both came in for medical and transshipping, the *Igueldo* for transshipping and the *Aurora II* for a crew change and an Inquest.

Wool report - week ending August 19

IN another very disappointing week for Falkland Islands' wool-growers, greasy wool prices slipped "across the board" at sales in Australia and New Zealand. As shown in the attached Micron Price Guide. Price falls added to those experienced last week.

Adverse currency movements during the week meant that price falls, once expressed in terms of pence per kilogram clean, were actually worse than those noted in Australian and New Zealand market reports (prices in their own local currencies).

Non fleeces wool types were also reported down in price for the week, however losses were less for lower VM lots.

In Australia 86% of the 53,001 bale offering was sold. Included in the offering were 4,681 bales of crossbred wool of which 89.7% was sold. In New Zealand, 17% of the 14,000 bale offering was passed in.

Auctions continue next week in New Zealand and Australia where almost 65,000 bales will be on offer. Sales resume in South Africa.

*Prices quoted correspond to average gross auction prices. It should be remembered that no selling or freight costs have been deducted from the stated prices.





Baton relay: by road, sea and horse

THE Commonwealth Games Queen's Baton Relay has reached the Falkland Islands.

Yesterday the baton journeyed from Stanley to Port Howard by Islander aircraft before being transported by various modes - including by foot, motorbike, Land Rover and on horseback - to Fox Bay.

West Falklands residents were then invited to a reception at the Southern Cross Social Club at Fox Bay where they had the opportunity to examine the impressive baton close up.

The baton - which traditionally carries the Queen's message to the athletes - uses technology to allow people from all over the world to keep track of its progress on its way to the Opening Ceremony of the Melbourne 2006 Commonwealth Games.

Technology housed inside the baton enables everyone to pinpoint the baton's location via the internet - where supported by satellite coverage - and a camera mounted in the baton can transmit video footage of key moments to the official Commonwealth Games website, www.melbourne2006.com.au.

From Fox Bay, the baton was moved to *HMS Dumbarton Castle* for its return journey to East Falkland - including a quick helicopter flight to the highest peak in the Islands, Mt Usborne, for a photo opportunity. The baton team then spent last night at Darwin Lodge and hosted a reception in the Goose Green community hall in the evening.

Today, the baton will be carried by a series of relay runners from Mount Pleasant, with Group Captain Gordon Moulds starting the relay at 9.00am. The baton is expected to be delivered to His Excellency the Governor at his residence at around 3.30pm. More than 110 people are predicted to carry the

baton during today's relay.

According to the Games' official website, the Melbourne 2006 Queen's Baton Relay is the world's longest and most inclusive relay - travelling to all 71 nations of the Commonwealth in a year and a day.

"The design and technological features of the baton that will travel this epic journey reflect the relay's efforts to showcase the diversity of the Commonwealth and unite its communities in celebration of the Melbourne 2006 Commonwealth Games."

Seventy-one lights on the front of the baton indicate the 71 nations of the Commonwealth that the Queen's Baton will visit on its journey to the Games. These progressively light up as the baton arrives in each Commonwealth country, symbolising "the gathering of the nations at the four-yearly festival of sport and culture."

The baton will be flown out of the Islands on Saturday.

Off to college

THIRTEEN Falklands students are heading to college this month after they gained GCSE passes last week.

Seven students will go to Peter Symonds College in Winchester, four will go to Chichester College, one will study at Bootham College, York and another will head to Atlantic College in South Wales.

Two others achieved sufficiently high grades to attend college but have deferred entry until next year.

Director of Education, Sylvia Cole, congratulated the Year 11 students who reached or exceeded their predicted grades. She said the results were as expected and produced "few surprises". However she added, "Some students will feel that, with more attention to their studies and some harder work, they could have done better."

With a very broad intake of students, Mrs Cole said, results in external exams will always give a wide range. "Mixed ability classes reflect pupils who have talents in many areas; these could well be utilised in jobs in the Islands, rather than studies in the UK."

Mrs Cole singled out Emily Hancox and Liam Stevens who performed particularly well in their GCSEs and who, "...are to be congratulated on their grades through which they achieved a high number of points."

Close behind them, she said, were Ashley Jaffray and Gillian Cotter.

According to Mrs Cole, some students are already enquiring about re-sits and, she said, "I am confident that higher grades can be achieved with some hard work and revision."

Stanley burials for seamen

TWO fishermen who lost their lives in separate incidents at sea last month have been buried in Stanley's cemetery.

An inquest into the death of Basuki, an Indonesian man who died on August 10, was opened and adjourned, however his body was released for burial. His funeral was held on August 22.

Vietnamese seaman Nguyen Van Thanh died on August 19 and an inquest into his death is expected to be opened next week. He was buried in Stanley on Wednesday afternoon.

Police tackle 'worrying' underage drinking trend

A DRAMATIC increase in underage drinking over the past year is "evident and worrying" according to police.

A paper on the subject is to be discussed by the Police Committee at its meeting next week and advises finding an approach to stopping the trend "at the earliest opportunity."

According to the document, the youths concerned are drinking a concoction of alcohol that is being obtained from various methods and ranges, "...from getting adults to buy it for them to stealing it from

family and friends." Police say the prominent night where offending takes place is either Friday or Saturday, particularly between 8pm and 10pm.

The social reasons why this age group offends is complex and lengthy, police say. They recommend the Drug Awareness and Resistance Education programme is targeted at the Community school, "...because this is now the age group that alcohol is affecting."

As a possible solution, the paper suggests empowering parents who

have problems with their children and putting the responsibility on the child and the parent.

"For those parents that are unwilling to take the responsibility then the court could deal with it in conjunction with the child.

"This form of punishment on the child will be much more beneficial and keeps within the aims of keeping families together."

This issue and more are to be discussed by the Police Committee which meets at Government House on Monday, September 5, at 10am.

It's sometimes easy to lose sight of this, usually around the time I start to crave a night out in which not one single person knows:

- a) my name
- b) the job I do
- c) who I'm related to and who I'm not - and, in fact, my entire family and relationship histories.

However after a few weeks away, in which I had time to enjoy being anonymous and had the chance to explain where the Falklands are (particularly entertaining was chatting to one charming fifteen-year-old who thought Argentina was part of Spain...), it is lovely to be home.

My last visit to Britain was only two years ago but the place has a different feel to then. Many people no longer feel safe in their homes and there was an undeniable inherent distrust in foreigners in around 90% of the people I met.

This was highlighted to me when asked by a gentleman - who had only minutes earlier reiterated his love of his country - what Islanders' impressions of the UK are now and just how desirable it is to be British in 2005.

His exact words were "Why on earth would Falkland Islanders wish to be associated with Britain as it is today? This country has gone down the pan and all anyone cares about is not their neighbour but themselves."

This me, me, me attitude seems to have been recognised by most Brits as the fundamental problem with their country. And, I believe, it could present problems for the Falklands as we strive to retain our place in the British consciousness.

I had an interesting - albeit rather disturbing - conversation with three men during a night out in Liverpool. It's fair to say this small group, consisting of a plastic surgeon, a social worker and a PR account manager - all in their early thirties - could be considered a representative cross section of modern Britain but I hope their opinions don't reflect those of the majority.

For their collective view was that the fact Britain spends a million pounds a day to defend "a measly two and a half thousand people at the other end of the world" while the UK public everyday witnesses people on their streets living in poverty, is outrageous.

I know this is an argument we've all heard before, but it pays to remember that the traditional supporters of Falkland Islanders in Britain have become the older generation - a generation who's voice inevitably cannot compete with the thirty-something movers and shakers of today.

As time moves on, we have our work cut out in our appeal to the great British public to support our wish to be a part of them.

I WAS overwhelmed by the hospitality extended to me by the staff of the *Shrewsbury Chronicle* during my week with them; the team was dedicated and busy but still made time for me to ask untold questions.

There were many parallels between the *Chronicle* and *Penguin News* - after all, in essence we are both community newspapers - and so it was, I looked forward to my scheduled morning in court with curiosity. Would their courts be full of drink drivers and speeders like ours?

Hmmm, not quite. While the court proceedings themselves were identical to home, that's where the similarities ended.

The court room was one of three Magistrate's Courts housed in the one building and the defendants were predominately homeless men charged with theft. Add to that the metal detectors and bag searches we went through to enter the building and the bullet proof screens the defendants appeared behind, and it makes one glad to be able to call the Falklands home.

Perhaps the lack of anonymity borne from small community life really isn't a terribly high price to pay...

Royal Marine trainer bows out

AFTER two busy years, the Falkland Islands Defence Force (FIDF) said good bye to its Royal Marine training instructor this week.

WO2 Nick Watson was with the force in the role of Permanent Staff Instructor (PSI) and left the Islands yesterday to take up a position at the Commando Training Centre in Lymington.

When he arrived in 2003, WO2 Watson brought with him extensive experience from his twenty-odd years with the Royal Marines during which he served in all three commando units. His career has taken him to a number of "very interesting" countries, varying from "temperate, to arctic, to jungle, to desert."

He was accompanied to the Falklands by his wife Ali and their two sons, Callum and Tom.

So, with his extensive experience, how did the Falkland Islands Defence Force - in the past sometimes christened by Islanders as "Dad's Army" - measure up?

On the eve of his departure, WO2 Watson was full of praise for the small force describing their role in the defence of the Falkland Islands as "massively important." They provide a very valuable contribution to the defence of their own country," he said.

He described the term "Dad's Army" as "naive" and added, "it's very shallow to knock somebody who is prepared to give up their quality family time to do something that is overwhelmingly beneficial for their own country."

He praised the level of commitment to be found among the force, which, "...from the majority is very impressive - it can't be faulted. This is particularly bearing in mind, whereas I only have one job, many of the people in the FIDF have three, sometimes more."

He added, "I have thoroughly enjoyed working here and I have the highest respect for the command and control within the FIDF."

As a result of the reduced budget for FIDF, councillors have decided the now vacant post of Permanent Staff Instructor will not be filled immediately and will instead be "gapped" for a year. Will the FIDF cope?

"The FIDF have outstanding talent inherent within the force, there will be no problems; however the

PSI brings current military doctrine and thinking to the force, the benefits of which are obvious." WO2 Watson said.

And what would this Royal Marine say to potential new recruits? "I would urge any individual who has the slightest interest in trying to do something worthwhile for their country to give it a go. If they don't like the thought of flying around in helicopters or rigid raiders at night or firing different weapon systems or living off the land whilst still maintaining an operational role they can always sit on their sofas and watch videos about it."

He urged people to try it: "If they don't like it, at least they can turn around and say 'it isn't for me'. To sit and be the armchair critic, having never tried it, is just puerile."

However he added that signing up shouldn't be taken lightly: "They have to join up in the knowledge that if anything went wrong, they would be expected to bear arms."

While his wife takes up a nursing course at Plymouth University, WO2 Watson now heads back to the Commando Training Centre.

Of their time here, he says, "I have found my job very fulfilling here and the family quality of life has been second to none. Coming from a unit that was very 'time-away' intensive, it has been fantastic to have had such quality family time."

He added, "I would like to thank everyone who has made my and, more importantly, my family's stay here so special."

Child Allowance signatures: law needs to be changed

THE Attorney General says the law needs to be changed following a letter from an angry parent published last week in *Penguin News*.

In a letter entitled 'Bureaucracy gone completely mad, Mrs Jane Cotter expressed incredulity at having to obtain the signature of a Commissioner of Oaths before being entitled to her £600 Child Allowance.

This week the Attorney General, David Lang, agreed with Mrs Cotter.

He said the requirement for the signature on the Family Allowance form to be acknowledged before a

Commissioner of Oaths is not laid down in the Family Allowance Regulations.

He said he believes it was made by the Post Office so that anybody who deliberately lies on the form can be "prosecuted for perjury".

The form was approved by the Attorney General's Department and based on a form originally devised in 1988.

Mr Lang said it will require a change in the law to deal with the problem, adding, "we will try to achieve this as soon as we can."

Argentina's argument is 'weaker than Saddam's'

SADDAM HUSSEIN'S historic argument for his actions in invading Kuwait were "better than those put forward by Argentina for invading the Falklands in 1982" according to a visiting author.

Graham Pascoe (right) is working together with Peter Pepper on the first book to thoroughly research the early history of the Falklands from a British angle. It is to be released to coincide with the 25th Anniversary of the Islands' liberation in 1982.

Mr Pascoe is now in the Islands for two weeks, researching the book.

He lives and works in Germany, training professional translators and interpreters and has been interested in the Falkland Islands since his childhood - he took music lessons from a Falklands lady called Mabel Steele who lived at 'Falkland House' in Brighton. He started writing a book about the Islands in 1973 but gave up when he married and had a family.

In 2002, the 20th anniversary of the Argentine occupation, he decided it was time to "do it properly" and restarted his book. His first step was to go to the Falkland Islands annual reception at Lincoln's Inn where he met Harold Briley, who recommended he contact Peter Pepper, a man also working on a book about the Falklands. Mr Pascoe said he and Peter have kept in touch ever since.

The book, entitled *Falklands Saga - A Critical History of the Falkland Islands* is a joint work between the two men and is, at present, more than 500 pages with countless footnotes.

Mr Pascoe said he and Peter hope the book will correct most of the "nonsense" that has been talked about the Falkland Islands. "not only by the Argentines but by lots of other people as well," and present the history of the Islands as it actually happened.

Maps

He said the very first maps of the Islands are being analysed and have so far revealed some interesting facts.

The first map to depict the Falklands is now in Istanbul and was made by the Portuguese in 1519. As a result, Mr Pascoe said, "we think the balance of evidence is that the Portuguese discovered the Islands because there are two maps with a Portuguese connection." Another exists in Paris, France.

The Argentines are keen to prove that the map in Paris was made by Spaniards, Mr Pascoe said. "If it was made by the Spaniards, it proves it must be Spanish and Argentina inherited the Islands from Spain."

However, Mr Pascoe said, "We demonstrate conclusively that it was not done by the Spaniards, they want to say it was the Magellanes expedition who discovered it for the King of Spain and we prove that it wasn't, that it couldn't have possibly have been, that the map is made by the Portuguese."

Mr Pascoe said he has translated, for the first time ever as far as he is aware, the text which accompanies this map. "It was written by a complete crackpot in the 16th century



who wrote hundreds of pages on everything." He referred to the Falklands as the Islands of Sampson, or Islands of the Giants - however Mr Pascoe says that none of the man's writings are relevant.

According to Mr Pascoe the man acquired the map and wove a story around it. The interesting thing, he said, is that this man acquired the map from an old Portuguese ship's captain in Lisbon which produces another link with the Portuguese.

Mr Pascoe said it is a pity the English speaking world have been unaware of the maps although both have been published in France: the one in Istanbul was published in 1938 and again in 1955. "It is part of the book that we are bringing together all these bits that are not known in other countries."

Mr Pascoe said he would particularly like to see - but is not sure if they even exist - photographs of the British ships in the Falklands in World War I. (There is one blurred photograph in the Imperial War Museum taken in Port William.) He said there is a slim possibility that a photograph may have been taken at the time and the importance of it has not been realised. He is also keen to acquire photographs of ships in the second World War, such as *HMS Exeter* and *Cumberland*.

Other items which Mr Pascoe would like to photograph are the declarations handed out by the Argentine hijackers who landed on Stanley racecourse in 1966 and by Fitzgerald, who landed on the racecourse two years earlier and planted an Argentine flag. The Falklands archives unfortunately does not contain copies of either.

The Pascoe/Pepper book is critical of the Argentine claim to the Falklands, with self-determination being a crucial theme. Three cases comparable to the Argentine claim to the Falklands are referred to within the book: Heligoland, Diego Garcia and the invasion of Kuwait by Saddam Hussein in 1990.

Mr Pascoe said Saddam's historic argument for his actions were actually "better than those put forward by Argentina for invading the Falklands in 1982...it needs to be said that Argentina are acting like Saddam Hussein."

If anyone would like to get in touch with Mr Pascoe he is staying at The Waterfront on Ross Road and can often be found at the Government Archives during the day. He is in the Falklands until September 10.

After the ceremony everyone was ushered onto golf trolleys and transported to the beach, from which they had to board a small boat, still not knowing where they were heading. Their trip took them to a floating restaurant, the Kalidon, where they were greeted by a Greek trio playing 'Here comes the Bride'.

The group enjoyed a beautiful Greek meal washed down with lots of wine and the very potent Greek Raki.

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Your questions answered

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Q Is it true that Falkland Islands Customs have stopped the import of television equipment to the Falkland Islands from South America?

If this is correct, on what grounds was this decision made, who made this decision and for what reason, and why have the public not been informed?

A Crown Counsel Ros Cheek provided the following response

Television equipment may properly be imported to the Islands with the exception of unauthorised decoders as provided for in the Broadcasting Ordinance 2004.

It is an offence under section 5 of that Ordinance to make, import, sell or let for hire or offer or expose for sale or hire any unauthorised decoder. It is similarly an offence to have possession of an unauthorised decoder for commercial purposes.

An "unauthorised decoder" is defined in some detail under the Ordinance but in simple terms

means a decoder which is designed, adapted or used to receive an encrypted transmission without payment to the relevant service provider.

It should be noted that purchase of a decoder and payment of accompanying subscription in Chile, for example, would not usually authorise its import or use in the Falkland Islands.

The Ordinance was introduced to provide a system of licensing for the provision of re-broadcasting services and to prevent breaches of the international law of copyright by introducing measures to combat piracy.

The proposed law was first made public as a Bill in September 2004. The Ordinance was brought into force in July 2005 by publication of a notice in the Gazette. The Falkland Islands customs department will necessarily exercise controls in order to deter the unlawful importation of unauthorised decoders. The Royal Falkland Islands police will investigate any matters of unlawful possession of such decoders.

Falklands Councillors at work overseas

FALKLANDS councillors are once again on the move.

Ian Hansen and Richard Cockwell are this week attending the 51st Commonwealth Parliamentary Association (CPA) Plenary Conference and Small Countries conference in Fiji and later in the month Roger Edwards will join an EU Partnership Working Party.

This is the first meeting of this partnership working party set up to provide a forum for discussion between representatives of the Overseas Territories. Member States and relevant Directorates within the European Commission and will be held in Brussels on 21st September.

The group will discuss the current situation regarding Rules of Origin and proposals for the future.

According to a spokesperson for Gilbert House, Rules of Origin play

a large part in the development of the Falkland Islands, "particularly with regard to the marketing of fish products in the EU. They will also have an impact on any future business development aimed at these markets.

"It is therefore important that all opportunities to participate in discussions on future policy are taken and that the points that affect our development are clearly put to the Commission."

Following that meeting, Roger Edwards, joined by Councillor Jan Cheek, will attend the Labour and Conservative Party Conferences in late September/early October. Jan Cheek will also attend this year's meeting of the Overseas Territories Consultative Council, as will Councillor Norma Edwards.

Challenging rescue from Berkeley Sound

A fisherman has been safely airlifted to hospital, thanks to the perseverance of the team at 78 Squadron.

During what pilots Richie Smith and Dave Kay described as a "routine but challenging" operation a crewman from a Chilean fishing boat was airlifted to safety on Sunday.

In the early hours, 78 Squadron's Search and Rescue were called for the emergency sea rescue of the 27 year old Chilean fisherman from Berkeley Sound.

The weather had closed in on Mount Pleasant with the cloud base down to 200 feet when Flight Lieutenants Kay and Smith piloted their Sea King, supported by Sergeant Beano Green and Master Air Crewman Nick Petch towards Berkeley Sound. Temperatures were so low

it was not possible for them to gain altitude in order to use radar to navigate and the crew had to resort to night vision aids to assist them.

On reaching the vessel in Berkeley Sound, conditions had not improved. The vessel was pitching by up to 15 feet in the rough swell and with the sun still down over the horizon the rescue was impossible. Having seen the fisherman on his feet and mobile the crew made the call that his situation was not critical and returned to Stanley.

Once the sun had begun its welcome rise above the horizon the crew returned to the Chilean vessel. The sea state had not improved but the increased visibility meant the crew could carry out a safe rescue and the crewman was soon safely in Stanley's King Edward VII Memorial Hospital.

1970s kitchen, loud but fun

GET digging in your sheds and lofts - the next phase of the development at Cartmell Cottage is under way.

The Museum is looking for a wide range of items for the house that serves as a living archive of domestic life in the Falklands, and is asking for your help.

The 1849 house has been restored and furnished in period style, showing how Islanders lived in the 1850s and the 1940s. It provides a unique insight into domestic life in the Islands and has proved to be very popular with visitors, both local and overseas.

It is hoped that this year a 1970s kitchen can be added to the house and that the upstairs rooms can be furnished.

Thanks to several very generous donations by members of the public, furniture will not be a problem. However, small items are still needed, particularly bits and pieces for the pantry, such as milk basins, jugs, bottles and jars, a chopping board, biscuit tins (and all sorts of grocery tins and boxes), crockery and sugar bins. Also, a record player, dart board and an old 2-metre set.

"We are not looking for anything especially fancy - just the basic everyday items," says Museum Manager Leona Roberts, "and these are the hardest to come by because most were just dumped."

Objects do not need to be in pristine condition - Cartmell Cottage is very much a normal, working house, Leona says.

Some large pieces are still missing though, such as a mangle and, vitally, a Rayburn stove. Anyone who can help is reminded that loans are just as welcome as donations.

The 1970s kitchen is expected to be popular and is the last major phase of work at Cartmell Cottage.

"This room is going to be fun, although it might be a little loud," says Leona. "The house has existed from the earliest days of Stanley and this room will help us to demonstrate home-life through the history of the capital."

She added, "Although there are no set opening hours for Cartmell Cottage, Museum staff are always happy to open up the house to show you around - just call the Museum to arrange a time - you will be glad that you did."

'I did everything I could to defend Chile'

"I DID everything possible to make Argentina lose the war."

That was the spectacular statement made to a Chilean television programme on Wednesday by General Fernando Matthei, a former Commander of the Chilean Air Force who was responsible for the secret coordination with the British in 1982.

In the interview, the former Chilean Air Attaché to London claimed full responsibility for the strategic link with the Royal Air Force, which proved vital in gathering intelligence for the British Task Force and ensured a quick defeat of the Argentine forces with a minimum of British losses.

"The whole Argentine nation can feel resentment towards me, but I insist Chile had nothing to do with the Malvinas (war). It was me, on my own," stressed the former member of the military Junta headed by General Pinochet in the interview.

"We couldn't anticipate Argentina would commit such a folly, but General Galtieri said Malvinas was the first step and that following that was the recovery of other (disputed) territories."

General Matthei stated, "I did every thing I had to do to defend Chile - that's what I'm paid for - friendship with the Argentines was somebody else's problem..." MP

Kids' 'street life' must stop at school gate

STANLEY school children have behaviour problems that "weren't there a few years ago," the Director of Education, Sylvia Cole, has told her staff.

During a 'teachers day' on Wednesday, before the beginning of the new school year, Mrs Cole said the behaviour problem was something that teachers were going to have to look at and have "strong poli-

cies" on. She said it was essential that all staff "came from the same direction" on the issue and, no matter what language the children use outside of school, "...we must make it clear that we are not into it."

Mrs Cole told the group that they should not be seen to condone anything that "continues their street life" within the school.

Obituary: Dr Bruce Marsden 1922-2005

BRUCE Marsden was born on the Wirral, was educated in Worcestershire and spent the rest of his life in the West Country.

He often liked to say that he lived all his "earthly" life on the very colourful Devonian Red Sandstone.

In 1939 he began his medical training at Manchester University where he was to meet his wife-to-be and fellow medical student Molly. He qualified in 1945 and was soon to be called up for service in the Royal Navy. He married Molly in December 1946 and soon after, embarked on a round the world tour of duty on the aircraft carrier *HMS Glory*.

Before being "demobbed" he also served on *HMS Illustrious* and at RNAS Yeovilton where he started his career in general practice. In 1953 he moved to a single

handed practice in mid Devon caring for his 3,000 patients 24 hours a day and almost 365 days a year (with a lot of help from Molly!).

In 1981 he retired from the practice, moved to Exmouth and prepared for a lifelong ambition to work in the Falkland Islands on a one year Overseas Development Agency (ODA) contact as doctor in the KEMH.

At the end of March 1982 he embarked on an 11th hour cruise on the school cruise ship *Uganda* as a medical officer. A few days into the cruise, the Falklands were invaded and the ship was commandeered by the MOD as a hospital ship for the Task Force. A few months later Molly was to enjoy the comforts of the ship, sailing between Ascension Island and Stanley.

Bruce had again narrowly escaped the war but was to be pressed into service soon after the surrender. He arrived in the Islands on one of the first Hercules transport planes to land at RAF Stanley. His first major role was to visit patients on outlying islands with the help of a Royal Navy helicopter and the flight deck of *HMS Hydra*. As an ex-Royal Navy man, he was in his element.

Bruce enjoyed three postings to the Islands and spent two very happy years working in the KEMH. His second posting as Senior Medical Officer followed the hospital fire in 1984. The medical services were working at

full stretch and hospital patients had been transferred to the former Brewster accommodation block situated behind Sulivan House.

His final posting followed a chance encounter with Dr McLroy at the KEMH while visiting the Islands as a passenger on board a visiting cruise ship. The hospital was in urgent need of a locum doctor and Bruce obliged without hesitation (and permission from Molly.)

His interest towards the Islands was not entirely born out of altruism as Bruce's main hobby was philately. At the age of nine, his father's collection was divided between his three boys and Bruce's third happened to include the Falklands. His interest in and love of the Islands grew as a result.

Sir Rex Hunt had him summed up as he would often remark that the only reason that Bruce was in the Islands was "because of his stamps." He was an active member of the Falkland Islands Philatelic Study Group up until his death.

Twenty-eight years of general practice in rural Devon provided an ideal grounding for life at the KEMH. Bruce was always struck by the similarities between his Devon and Falkland Island patients.

He felt that qualities such as a respect for life, resourcefulness and a generosity of spirit were common to both communities. He is survived by his wife Molly, five children and nine grandchildren.

Aspartame: Medical reassurance

THE Senior Medical Officer has reassured the public after a letter sent to *Penguin News* raised the alarm about aspartame.

Robin Goodwin outlined the benefits his family have experienced from cutting aspartame out of their daily diet and warned others of the possible effects this product could have on them.

Mr Goodwin said he intended to take the matter up with councillors to recommend that all imports of products containing aspartame should be stopped or at least retailers should "display large warning signs in their shops so that people are aware and can make their own informed choice to purchase or not."

Chief Medical Officer, Dr Roger Diggle explained that aspartame is a naturally occurring amino acid that is sweet tasting and therefore can be used to sweeten foods without having to use sugar - amino acids are the building blocks of proteins.

Dr Diggle assured that the safety of aspartame has been exhaustively tested worldwide including the Federal Drugs Administration (FDA) in the US and the Food Standards Agency in the UK. He said the FDA in particular, is "very stringent regarding the safety of all the products available in the US."

However, he added, "even if a food substance is found to be safe, there will be a number of people who will react adversely to it. Examples of this are chocolate and bananas causing migraine and 'E' numbers causing hyperactivity in children. Aspartame will be no different, so there will be some people who are affected by it. The only option for these individuals is to avoid foods containing it."

Dr Diggle said that assessing food safety is a complex process that requires exhaustive analysis of data and laboratory testing. He said the Falkland Islands Government could not possibly undertake this kind of assessment. "The Falklands are therefore not in a position to unilaterally ban a substance simply because of pressure groups who largely communicate through the internet."

"Readers can be assured that the Food Standards Agency in the UK (where most of our foodstuffs come from) continuously monitor food safety and communicate regularly with the relevant departments of the Falkland Islands Government (FIG). Aspartame is currently being reassessed by the European Food Standards Agency, whose report is likely to be completed some six months from now."

Dr Diggle said any recommendations will be "carefully examined by FIG"

'Garrison deserves better'

LISTENING to the deliberations of the Legislative Council on Friday August 26, I was surprised and concerned when, during the motion for adjournment, Councillor Cockwell made the following mention of the Mount Pleasant road: "I would like to give some credit to some unsung, and possibly vilified in some ways, members of the community, that is the people who look after the MPA road. It must be depressing for them to hear all the ire and expertise which is being thrown at them for the condition of the road." unquote. He then went on to say, "Except when wet the road is not in bad condition."

As I have been trying recently to raise awareness of the deplorable state of this road, I want to state categorically that at no time have I ever questioned the ability of the work force or their workmanship: they can only work within the guidelines and with the tools they are given by the Falkland Islands Government (FIG).

It is the decision makers shirking responsibility of providing sufficient funding over the years to enable them to carry out realistic, permanent road surfacing (black topping) that is at fault, a responsibility shared for many years now by successive councillors.

To suggest that the road is not in a bad state is a nonsense. It makes a mockery of the sign posted by the side of the road as you come out of the Mount Pleasant complex which gives the military statistics for winter 2005 as: 77 acci-

dents, five injuries, no fatalities and a cost of £112,000 for vehicle repairs. The Royal Falkland Islands Police also confirm they they have dealt with a further 13 road traffic accidents (RTAs) on the MPA road so far this year and a total of 26 in 2004. All of these vehicles have ended up off the road either upside down or on their side in the ditch.

Even these statistics do not appear to cause our current councillors undue concern and this attitude of indifference, bordering on arrogance, has decided me not to bother to present my petition to them but I will do so to the next council when elected at the forthcoming general election in November this year.

I was also disturbed recently on hearing one of our possible prospective Legislative councillors, Phil Middleton relate during an interview on Falklands radio how one opponent to blacktopping the MPA road had suggested to him that it would turn Stanley into a garrison town!

Stanley began its existence as a garrison town and has been so in modern times since 1966.

We are a garrison town and proud of it - as long as we have bully boy politicians in our neighbouring country trying to intimidate us we always will be.

If there are people who disagree with this fact they can always get a one way ticket out.

Our garrison deserves better.

From the Falklands to Shrewsbury and back

SHREWSBURY may seem a world away from the Falkland Islands but the two have many friends in common, as I discovered when I spent a week with the Shropshire town's newspaper.

The most obvious link is of course Charles Darwin, who collected myriad plant and animal specimens in the Falklands in 1833, and a number of locations throughout the Islands are named for the great scientist. But the connection between Shrewsbury and the Falklands extends further than the famous naturalist.

My seven days with the *Shrewsbury Chronicle*, a weekly paper with a circulation of around 19,000, was busy and varied. The *Chronicle* is a community newspaper which reflects the lives of all its readers in Shrewsbury and its surrounding area.

Penguin News is put together by a staff of just three; our jobs consist of a number of roles - from reporting, to editing and selling advertising. At the *Chronicle*, with its staff of more than twenty people, roles are more defined. I ventured out with reporters and the paper's photographer, explored the multi-million pound operation that is the advertising department and watched the paper take form under the expert eye of the editorial team.

I also spent time at the *Shropshire Star*, a daily newspaper based in Ketley, near Telford, with a circulation of around 250,000 and a staff of hundreds. The *Star* and the *Chronicle* are both owned by Midlands News Association; their staff, from managing editors down to junior reporters, went out of their way to share their knowledge and experience to help *Penguin News* develop.

On top of my packed itinerary, I had a number of visitors. Before my arrival in Shropshire, I knew of just one Shrewsbury native living in the Falklands: Jan Miller, who runs the market garden in Stanley with her husband, Tim. But besides Jan, and, of course, Charles Darwin, that was where I suspected the Falklands' connection with Shrewsbury ended.

How wrong I was. A small piece on the front page of the *Shrewsbury Chronicle* invited anyone with links to the Falklands to get in touch and I was amazed by the number of callers I had.

My first visitor was a charming woman whose enthusiasm for the

Falkland Islands was infectious. Doreen Green, aged 78, spent a decade of her life in Stanley, from 1952, accompanying her late husband, John, as he took up a post as Assistant Secretary of the Falkland Islands Dependencies Survey, the forerunner to the British Antarctic Survey.

'I loved the life'

Two of Mrs Green's three children, Judith and Robert, were born in the Falklands and, looking back on her South Atlantic adventure she said: "I loved my years there. I loved gardening, stacking peat - I loved the life." The family lived on John Street.

After only a short time in office, Mr Green was promoted to Secretary of the Falkland Islands Dependencies Survey and he held the post until his family's departure from the Islands in 1961.

Mrs Green said leaving was difficult: "I walked to the top of Philomel Hill, looked over at The Narrows and said to the place, 'I am going to miss you'."

"And miss it I did. We had a wonderful social life and we met so many interesting people there." In particular she mentioned Mrs Joan Bound, whose friendship she enjoyed during her time in the Islands.

Fire fighters' strike

Paul Bowen, a fire fighter from RAF Shawbury, also holds fond memories of his time in the Falklands. He and five colleagues spent eight months at Mount Pleasant during the UK fire fighters' strike of 2002 and 2003.

Their task was to replace the military firemen from the Falklands who were forced to return to Brit-

ain to provide cover during the strike.

Mr Bowen said he took every opportunity to explore the islands on his days off. "We had so many trips out from the base. The wildlife is second to none - we saw penguins, seals and dolphins - and the fishing was great. There was just plenty to do, including sunbathing of course." He asked that his best wishes be passed on to the team at Stanley Fire Station, under the leadership of Gardner Fiddes.

My other visitors included John Griffiths who spent just a few days in the Islands on his way south to Halley base in Antarctica, where he spent two years with FIDS, Roy Bound, who was a member of the construction team which built Discovery House on South Georgia in 1962 and Peter Richards, a former policeman who visited the Falklands while on holiday in 2000.

Previously, Peter had applied to join the Royal Falkland Islands Police however, shortly before he was due to leave Britain, he was seriously assaulted while on duty and was unable to take up the new job.

His holiday in 2000 was clearly a delight; he told me, "I loved it, absolutely loved it."

Mr Richards was only passing through Shrewsbury on his way home to Carlisle from a holiday in Venezuela. He explained he is now involved with the RAF Millom Museum and is keen to obtain a Falklands flag for a display which commemorates the many nationalities who made up the allied forces in World War Two. He happened to pick up a copy of the *Chronicle*, saw my name, and popped in for a

chat. I duly promised to find a flag for the museum and he continued on his way to Carlisle.

HMS Intrepid

Not everyone that I met had happy memories of the Falklands. One of my visitors was Mike Quinn, who was just 22 years of age when he travelled to the South Atlantic. His visit was far from a pleasure; he was a steward aboard *HMS Intrepid*, sent to the Falklands as part of the British Task Force.

In addition to his duties as a steward, Mr Quinn also worked on deck, loading missiles. During our meeting, he recalled watching from *Intrepid* while *HMS Antelope* sank in San Carlos waters and helping to care for a number of Welsh Guards injured during the bombings of the *Sir Galahad* and *Sir Tristram*.

Now, 23 years later, Mr Quinn says the 1982 conflict is always with him. While he describes the war as "a very humbling experience" that was both "nerve-racking and exciting" he continues to have feelings of guilt about the ordeal; this is, of course, a well documented reaction in those who survive a hostile situation, as is the depression Mr Quinn suffered upon his return home: "I was completely useless for two months..."

He said he was "in awe" of the fighting soldiers transported around the Falklands by *HMS Intrepid*: "I couldn't have done the things they did."

Mr Quinn remained in the Navy until 1988 and he now works for a logistics company near Whitchurch in Shropshire.

He fears the Falklands conflict is being forgotten by Britain. "...just like Korea," and doubts the government's ability to launch a similar response to a hostile invasion of British territory.

"Britain has no ability now to do it again, certainly not alone. We would have to have outside help and that makes us very vulnerable."

When Charles Darwin first visited the Falklands, its occupants were a scattering of gauchos, farming livestock on the otherwise uninhabited land. Little could he have known all those years ago that war would one day be waged over the Islands.

Nor, more happily, could he have imagined the Falkland Islands would be a home from home - whether for just a few days, months or for many years - to people from his very own town.

Fishing, shooting, climate change: ExCo's August meeting

Environmental officer to issue bird kill licences Fishing fees set

LICENCES to shoot turkey vultures will now be granted by the Environmental Planning Officer (EPO), with a maximum limit on each of twenty birds.

His Excellency the Governor described this as a "tricky issue" and said Executive Council had a "full discussion" of a report by the Director of Agriculture.

Members decided the Governor's power to issue licences to shoot protected birds should be delegated with respect to turkey vultures only to the Environmental Planning Officer (EPO).

In the absence of the EPO the delegated power will be exercised by the Director of Agriculture (DoA).

In exercising this delegated power the Executive Council decided the EPO/DoA should:

(i) seek advice in respect of each licence application from representatives of the Tourist Board, Falklands Conservation, Farmers and the Department of Agriculture;

(ii) limit any licence to the shooting of a maximum of twenty birds;

(iii) require every licensee to provide a full report detailing when, where and how many birds were shot; and

(iv) ensure that the information submitted under (iii) above is passed to the Environmental Committee and Falklands Conservation.

The EPO will be required to follow the procedures and criteria set out above in taking a decision on the licence applications received from Pebble Island and North Arm.

The Governor reported that applications for licences to shoot any other species of protected bird should be submitted to Executive Council. "Executive Council's decision on any such application should take account of the views of the EPO and the bodies referred to in paragraph 2.3 (i) above."

It was also decided that Falklands Conservation should be invited to conduct a programme of Island-wide turkey vulture censuses. "...with a

view to identifying the size and status of the turkey vulture population, together with a study of turkey vulture feeding behaviour."

Falklands Conservation carries out regular censuses of the principal bird species in the Falkland Islands.

Mr Pearce reported, "Beauchene Island is a particularly important location for breeding colonies of black-browed albatross and rockhopper and gentoo penguins. Falklands Conservation have sought permission to visit Beauchene Island to undertake censuses of these species. ExCo gave their agreement to this."

Climate Change Convention will apply to Falklands

THE Falkland Islands Government (FIG) is to sign up to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change and the Kyoto Protocol of that Convention.

Following thorough research by the previous and current Environmental Planning Officers, His Excellency the Governor, Mr Pearce said it should be relatively easy for the government to collect the statistics required and to meet the obligations imposed by the Convention and the Kyoto Protocol. He said Executive Council therefore agreed the Foreign and Commonwealth Office should be informed that FIG wishes these arrangements to be applied to the Falkland Islands.

A number of other varied items

were also discussed by Executive Council, including the helicopter refuelling site at Fox Bay which has "reached the end of its useful life and needs to be replaced."

Councillors approved various arrangements requested by the Ministry of Defence in connection with the construction of the new facility, and to the provision of a temporary fuel store for use during the construction.

Mr Pearce said there has been considerable local interest in the proposals by Cable and Wireless to establish a mobile phone service in the Falkland Islands.

The Planning and Building Committee had earlier in the week considered two applications from Cable and Wireless for the siting of

mobile phone masts, and permission was sought from ExCo for the lease of Crown land on which to place these two masts.

Mr Pearce said that councillors agreed to grant the request in principle, but noted that the Planning and Building Committee had decided to defer until its next meeting consideration of the proposal to site a mast to the north of St Mary's Walk.

Also agreed by Executive Council was the appointment of Mr Mike Evans as the new Rural Business Association representative on the Board of Falkland Landholdings. Proposals for the restructuring of the Apprenticeship Committee, including a new Committee membership and new terms of reference were also approved.

Mineral resources: open door closed to allow 'more flexibility'

OPEN door licensing throughout Falklands waters has been closed for an indefinite period.

At the July meeting ExCo amended the Offshore Petroleum Licensing Regulations 2000 in order to enable the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) to suspend the operation of the open door licensing system for offshore hydrocarbons exploration.

Mr Pearce explained that at last week's meeting ExCo decided to exercise these powers and to "close open door licensing throughout the controlled waters of the Falkland Islands for an indefinite period." A notice will appear in the *Gazette* to that effect.

Councillor John Birmingham, holder of the Mineral Resources portfolio, said the move will give

the government the ability to be "...more flexible in a very competitive industry."

He said the decision to close the licensing has been made to "...enable FIG to ask for interest in and offer areas around the Falklands for exploration with the minimum of red tape."

MoU

A Memorandum of Understanding has been agreed with the UK's Maritime Coastguard Agency (MCA) for long-standing arrangements with the government under which the MCA provides various survey and certification services for the Falkland Islands Shipping Register.

Mr Pearce said Executive Council approved the terms of the Memorandum.

ExCo also approved the making of the Merchant Shipping (Registration of Ships) Amendment Regulations 2005.

The purpose of this amendment to the regulations, Mr Pearce said, is to "clarify the way in which the Merchant Shipping Ordinance 2001 and the Merchant Shipping (Registration of Ships) Regulations 2001 apply to fishing vessels which were registered under the pre-2001 arrangements."

Mr Pearce said the effect of this is, "...to make it clear that vessels already registered on the old Stanley Register are not obliged to meet the new and more stringent eligibility requirements of the Ordinance and Regulations in order to remain on the Register."

A NUMBER of shipping and maritime issues have been considered by members of Executive Council at their latest meeting.

The meeting considered recommendations by the Fisheries Committee for the fees to be charged for various categories of fishing licences during the 2006 season.

His Excellency the Governor, Mr Howard Pearce, reported, "ExCo took decisions on all of the recommendations received from the Fisheries Committee with the exception of the fees for longline licences, which it returned to the Fisheries Committee for further consideration. The details of the new fees are being published."

Two decisions were also taken with regard to the *Elqui*, the longliner which was recently arrested for illegal fishing in South Georgia waters.

Mr Pearce said it was decided that, because of the circumstances leading to the berthing of the *Elqui* at (Stanley's port) FIPASS and the shared interest of the Falkland Islands and South Georgia Governments in removing the vessel from further commercial use, harbour dues and berthing fees should be waived for the period of the lay-up.

He added, "It was also decided that the South Georgia Government should be licensed to scuttle the fishing vessel in Falklands waters. The scuttling is likely to take place soon, following completion of the current clean-up work on the vessel."

Mr Pearce assured that the clean-up process on the vessel has been "extremely thorough".

"It has involved the removal from the vessel of all hydraulic fluids, fuel, engine lubricating oils, paints, batteries, fishing and other associated gear, loose domestic equipment, refrigerant and welding gases, pyrotechnics and medical drugs. All of these items have been safely disposed of ashore in the Falkland Islands.

"The galley has been thoroughly cleaned to remove cooking oils, and all food and other waste has been removed and burnt.

"All liferafts and other loose materials have also been removed. Some objects of particular interest, including an old binnacle compass, have been offered to the Stanley Museum."

The result, he said, is that when the vessel is scuttled it will not cause any adverse environmental impact or hazard to shipping. "Both Falklands Conservation and the Marine Officer have been fully consulted and are content."

Also discussed by Executive Council were freight rates for the coastal shipping service, about which Mr Pearce said there has "apparently been some confusion".

Full details of these rates, he said, are to be published.

Legislative Council pass Fisheries Bill 2005

Chief Executive presents 'most important single legislative provision for years'

THE Fisheries Bill has been passed by Legislative Council, with five votes in favour, two against and one abstention.

The special meeting of Legislative Council was held on Friday, August 26, in the Court and Council Chamber for the debate of the Bill.

Government Chief Executive, Chris Simpkins spoke on the proposed legislation and moved the second reading of the Bill.

He explained the potential impact the Bill would have on the future economic vitality of the Falkland Islands, and the management of the fisheries. He said, "This Bill represents perhaps the most important single legislative provision that has been brought before this House for many years."

Mr Simpkins said the Bill represents the first major reform and re-statement of law relating to fisheries resources and fisheries management since 1986, when the Fisheries Conservation and Management 1986 was introduced to coincide with the initiation of the Falkland Islands Interim Conservation and Management Zone.

There have, he said, been significant developments in fisheries in the Falkland Islands in the intervening nineteen years, as well as a range of developments at international level in that period. "This Bill provides for updating the law to reflect these developments and, if passed, will stimulate the modernisation of the fishing industry and the promotion of economic growth."

Review and consultation

A "far reaching" review was undertaken during 2002, he said, which addressed fisheries policy, marine farming and port development. "Whilst the fisheries policy review focused on fisheries resource allocation issues, it also reviewed the mechanics of resource allocation together with other areas where the private sector interacts with the Falkland Islands Government as a regulatory authority."

The key outcome of the review, Mr Simpkins said, was the proposal to change from the current system of relatively short-term licences to introducing a system based on "transfer or property rights" in order to give fishing companies a long-term interest in the management and development of the fishery as a sustainable resource.

He said the fisheries policy review provided, "numerous opportunities for comment by the fishing industry and the public."

"The process began with a discussion with the fishing industry early in 2002 in order to gauge the direction which the review should take. A Policy Review Group, including representatives from the fisheries sector was established and a discussion document incorporating recommendations on future policy was prepared and published for public and industry comment midway through 2002."

"The results of the consultation process were taken into account and policy recommendations were examined by Executive Council during a series of meetings between March and October 2003. Since then Executive

Council has continued to oversee the preparation of this Fisheries Conservation and Management Bill, which incorporates all the policy proposals approved by Executive Council."

Property rights

Mr Simpkins said the most significant outcome of the policy review was the recommendation to introduce property rights in the fishery.

"The Falkland Islands has successfully met many challenges in the management and development of its fisheries resources over the last 20 years. In order to meet a new generation of challenges, the current licensing system, which is based on the allocation of non-transferable variable duration licences to individual vessels is to be replaced by a system of long-term individual transferable rights owned by Falkland Islanders."

"The anticipated gain is the enhanced economic performance of the sector, because fishing businesses will have increased security and flexibility, which will encourage diversification from a simple harvesting process into value-added activities. Increased international competitiveness will also be achieved, since poorly performing companies will be able to sell rights to better performing companies, should they so wish."

Implementing a rights-based regime in a relatively small maritime state is "challenging" said Mr Simpkins.

"Small markets for rights, a desire to maintain local control of fishing rights and a dependence on foreign investments in the fisheries sector are key considerations in the design of an effective and efficient management regime. Additional considerations include the trade-off between the economic efficiency gains derived from output controlled fisheries and the relative administrative simplicity of input control fisheries. He explained that under the proposed rights based system, monitoring of economic performance, including the value of rights, trades and rents agreed, will be, "key performance indicators alongside traditional biological measures of management performance."

Falkland Islands' expectations of the new regime, Mr Simpkins said, are based on international experience with rights-based systems over the last 30 years. These expectations help establish the basis or benchmarks against which the performance of a system can be judged.

"First, overall economic performance of a sector is expected to be enhanced because fishing businesses have increased security of access to the resource and flexibility in the way they decide to structure activities to take advantage of the business opportunities."

"Second, diversification should occur in the industry as companies look to investing value-added activities, such as processing and marketing."

"Third, it is expected that seafood companies would invest more in research and development because long-term rights mean that they will benefit from their investment and where those investments have longer pay-off periods."

"Fourth, and as I have said, international competitiveness should also be increased as poorly performing companies sell rights to better performing companies. No longer will they be forced to stay in a fishery, unable to exit without losing everything."

"Finally, and as the profitability of the domestic seafood sector increases, Government income from personal incorporation tax and resource rents should increase. Unusually, a win-win economic environment is created."

ITQ

Fisheries in the Falkland Islands have traditionally been managed using effort limitation said Mr Simpkins. "This bill has been framed with the flexibility to allow fisheries to be declared either in terms of total allowable effort, as now, or total allowable catch. In the first instance, fisheries will continue to be managed using effort controls. The terminology of Individual Transferable Quota (ITQ) systems will be used and, whilst elsewhere these usually refer to catch, in the Falkland Islands, the quota will refer to a unit of fishing effort."

"Companies awarded property rights or quota in a particular fishery will be awarded a proportion of the total allowable effort declared for that fishery. In due course, total allowable catch could be used particularly for the longer lived fish species."

Mr Simpkins said property rights may also be allocated either as individual transferable quota (ITQ) or provisional quota (PQ). The nature of the fisheries will determine which type of right is used. This will be assessed, taking into account the levels of biological exploitation and the levels of local investment in each fishery. Both ITQ and PQ generate an annual or seasonal catch entitlement at the start of each season or year.

"Catch entitlements accommodate the joint venture arrangements, which currently prevail in some of the fisheries but also serve to create a more robust market for trading rights. Catch entitlements are tradable, but expire at the end of a fishing season or fishing year. Catch entitlements, rather than ITQ, or as now the fishing licence, become the day to day currency of the rights based regime. Fishing vessels will still be required to have a fishing licence. The fishing licence is retained in the new management system to regulate fishing activity with respect to gear types and sizes and mitigation measures to limit the impact of fishing on dependent and associated fish stocks, on marine mammals, seabirds and the marine environment. Conservation and sustainability of the fishery remain key."

Unlike ITQ, Mr Simpkins said, joint venture companies can own catch entitlements even if Falkland Islands status holders have a minority share holding. He said the threshold for local ownership may be set at different levels in different fisheries.

"This allows existing joint ventures to continue with minimal disruption and leave the security of short-term access to fisheries to foreign in-

vestors. It is also expected that local companies will be more willing to trade short-duration catch entitlements rather than ITQ because this trade does not affect the company's long-term access to the fishery."

"In time the catch entitlement mechanism should see a faster rationalisation of the fishing fleet and effort than would otherwise have been the case if ITQ's alone were to be implemented."

"The Fisheries Ordinance has always covered main-stream fisheries management and conservation. In the current system, the issue of priority in licence applications and long-term licences has been a matter of policy rather than legislation."

Mr Simpkins said this Bill incorporates the issue of access to resource into the main instruments of fisheries legislation. "There are still issues, which will be the subject of policy decisions but the process is set out much more tightly in this Bill."

He said the proposed property rights system entails significant change in the operating environment for the private sector, adding, "There are also significant changes in the administration of the fishery, particularly in relation to the process of creating, awarding and administering property rights."

According to Mr Simpkins, the new system does not alter the Falkland Islands Government's powers to manage the fishery to achieve conservation targets. "If anything, these provisions are strengthened."

He said that, similarly, the new system does not alter the Government's ability to raise revenue from the fishery. "Fees for ITQ and PQ can be levied in much the same way as licence fees are currently levied."

"Property rights are not necessarily a panacea for fisheries development. Current Fisheries Policy or what might more appropriately be described as Licence Allocation Policy, has served well. However, current policy has run its course and is in need of major revision and development. Whilst a range of options were available for policy development, the property rights route was selected as the most appropriate."

International co-operation

Mr Simpkins said that the Bill before the House makes provisions for international co-operation in relation to information exchange and combating illegal, unregulated and unreported fishing activity.

"The Bill formalises existing procedures whereby any fishery vessel blacklisted by CCAMLR (Convention for the Conservation of Antarctic Marine Life Resources) or other regional fisheries management organisations would not be authorised to fish in Falkland waters. Information including evidentiary material could be exchanged with other countries in support of the objectives of the agreement to promote compliance with International conservation and management measures by fishing vessels on the high seas and the agreement for the implementation of the provisions of the United Nations Conventions on the Law of the Sea, relating

to the conservation of straddling fish stocks and highly migratory fish stocks."

Part 5 of the Bill, said Mr Simpkins provides for the establishment of a disputes commission. The purpose of the disputes commission, he explained, is to review and adjudicate on certain matters, which may be referred to the commission. "It provides a dispute resolution mechanism, which can focus on fisheries issues and deal with them in an expeditious manner."

"It is expected that the introduction of property rights will see greater engagement between the government and industry on some fisheries management issues. Experience elsewhere suggests that strong and dynamic industry associations are likely to develop. The Bill provides for the establishment of a Falkland Islands fishing companies association. Additionally, provision is made for the application of a levy, which may, in turn, fund the activities of the association."

"The provisions in relation to enforcement and penalties are substantially overhauled. The Bill proposes the powers of fisheries officers in relation to offending vessels should be extended. The circumstances in which the Courts may order a forfeiture of a fishing vessel upon conviction for certain offences are also extended."

"The Bill introduces a requirement that any overseas person in charge of a fishing vessel in Falkland Waters must be in possession of an Overseas Master Fishing Licence. The licence may be revoked if the holder is convicted of an offence under the ordinance, or if the holder has been convicted of any offence involving violence towards or maltreatment of any member of a crew of a fishing vessel, of which he was, at the time, an officer."

"The Bill also provides that, in these circumstances a person may be prohibited from holding an Overseas Master Fishing Licence for a period of up to five years, with a prohibition being published in the Gazette."

Mr Simpkins said the Bill requires Executive Council to review the operation and success of the fisheries policy, "at least every 12 months" to "examine whether objectives are being achieved in relation to the property utilisation, conservation and management of fisheries resources and associated issues in order to consider whether policies in relation to fisheries resources and fisheries management control and conservation should be changed."

Concluding his address Mr Simpkins said some three years have passed since the review of fisheries policy began, which "alone indicates that the process has not been rushed - on the contrary, consultation with all relevant interested parties has been extensive. An enormous amount of effort and time and energy has been invested in the process, which results in the Bill before the House today."

Mr Simpkins paid tribute to Councillor Cookwell, the Attorney General, the Director of Fisheries and the former Economic Advisor for, "their stamina throughout the process."

Councillors debate the Bill: Summers abstains from voting

COUNCILLOR Mike Summers abstained from voting on all the issues put before the house on the Fisheries Bill. However he did comment on the process of the Bill and was particularly critical of the Foreign and Commonwealth Office.

He outlined his personal interest in the fishery industry. "I have a 25% interest in a trawler that works in Falkland Islands waters fishing for finfish. That, in terms of the Falklands fishery is relatively small beer."

"I have no interest in loligo and no interest in toothfish. However, I understand, that anybody who's involved in the fishing industry in the Falklands has the potential to be interested to a greater extent. I therefore accept that members of the public would expect me to declare an interest and do have the legitimate right to know what that interest is and to expect that it might grow in the future."

"There is also the issue that, since I am involved in the fishery, other people who are involved in the fishery might expect that I might at another time have a different interest. That is equally legitimate. There will, therefore, be a perception amongst members of the public and members of the fishing industry that my interest is over-riding. I don't believe it is but I accept that they have the right to believe that."

He therefore asked that it be recorded that he would abstain from voting on all the many issues before the house on the Bill.

However, Councillor Summers did take the opportunity to comment on the process behind the Bill. He said the policy document that supports the Bill was produced in 2003: "The Foreign Office signally failed to deal with the issues that they should have dealt with in terms of the policy at that time and held up this Bill for an inordinate amount of time."

Councillor Summers said when the Bill was finally drafted in its first stages, the Foreign Office again failed to deal with the issues that were put forward to them. "...this put this Council and the Falkland Islands Government in a rather difficult position... He said councillors were in a position to be passing, "at least, one of the most important pieces of legislation to come before this particular Council, very near the end of its life. That is not really satisfactory - it doesn't mean you shouldn't do it, but it's not satisfactory."

Councillor Summers added that it has also resulted in the fact that some of the discussion and some further consultation that, perhaps, should have taken place, "has had to be curtailed."

"It has also meant that we have ended up having a special ExCo (Executive Council) and special LegCo (Legislative Council) to deal with this piece of legislation - I don't think that's satisfactory. Probably not all of the blame for this can be put in front of the Foreign and Commonwealth Office, but I think the majority of it can, and I think, therefore, it is appropriate that it should be recorded."

In terms of the content of the Bill, Councillor Summers said he accepted and supported the principles and the purpose of the Bill, including a number of issues that had been raised by the Chief Executive that were not previously contained in Falkland Islands

Fisheries Legislation, dealing with the protection of individuals on board fishing vessels and the exclusion from fishing in the Falklands of miscreants.

Councillor Summers said he believed that there is no loss of control by the Falkland Islands Fisheries Department over conservation management of the fishery under this new Bill.

He said, "I think the fact that the ownership of property rights in the fishing industry will be transferred to Falkland Islands' companies - to status holders - can only be a good thing."

"It has taken a long time in the development to rest control of the fishery from basically foreign interests back into Falkland Islands interests and I think we will see significant development as a result, therefore, I support the principles of this Bill."

However, Councillor Summers said there were issues of content with which some will feel, "unhappy" adding, "we will have to deal with that."

He said that it did not become apparent in the production of the policy document for the Bill that it was intended by the Foreign Office - and the Governor - that Executive Council should have a very limited role in the management of the items that fall under the Bill.

"It took a long time for that to be brought to the surface. In fact, it only really surfaced when the first drafts of the Bill became available. It was never discussed as a matter of policy, even though we were assured that all policy matters that are relevant to this Bill had been discussed in Executive Council - that had not. As I understand it, requests to have that policy reviewed by Executive Council were denied by the Governor. I think that is wholly inappropriate, and, I have to say so in this House."

"We did finally, at five to twelve, or even one minute to twelve in terms of the drafting of this Bill, get agreement from the Foreign and Commonwealth Office that Executive Council should have a role in the management of the fishing industry. And that the Governor acting in his discretion, should not be the principle management role over the Falklands fishery."

"I think that says a lot about the current relationship between some of the parties. I am very happy that now Executive Council does have a role through an amendment that we have been able to make to Section four of the Bill. Had that amendment not been made, I would have voted against this Bill."

Councillor Summers said there is still a provision in the Bill for the Governor to be able to act in his discretion. He said the reason for that is

that there are legitimate interests of the United Kingdom Government to deal with issues that involve international affairs, "foreign affairs," if you choose, on which they, on many an occasion, need to act, and, I think that's quite right."

However, he said, "There is no provision in the Bill for the Governor to have to report to Executive Council any time that he acts in his discretion. I have objected to this but I do understand that there are Constitutional issues about doing this."

In the further review of the Constitution, Councillor Summers said, he hoped either this council or the future council will, "pursue this issue and ensure that not only, in terms of the fishery but any other matter that involves the governance of the Falkland Islands, when the Governor acts in his discretion, there is a duty and obligation to report the matter to Executive Council."

In terms of the content of the Bill at large, Councillor Summers said there will be and has been comment on the issue of the sale or non-sale of ITQ and PQ. He said "I know that there are some people who feel uncomfortable with the fact that ITQ is not being sold to companies but has been passed over for free. I was uneasy about this when we first started discussing the policy but I have been persuaded that it's not necessary to raise a fee for the allocation of ITQ."

He explained that the reason for this is, "...the government will continue to receive income from the fishery and from fishing companies through licence fees and taxation, and, if the government were to start charging what it regarded as the market value of ITQ to companies, then their ability to continue to pay licence fees to the extent that we may wish year on year might be curtailed. That wouldn't be necessarily in our interests."

He continued, "There are, perhaps, other issues in the Bill that might have withstood some more rigorous economic analysis - and this may be one of them - but for the meantime I am satisfied that ITQ should not be sold."

There are some issues under the Bill that are critical to some people that are not yet defined, in particular, criteria for licensing, said Councillor Summers. "It's not satisfactory that that isn't part of the Bill, certainly not satisfactory that there aren't at least policy papers on what the intentions are in respect of the criteria for licensing. And, I think that's a serious weakness that, I believe may be dealt with before the end of this council. I certainly hope that it will."

Norma Edwards: government shouldn't give away rights

IN speaking to the Bill, Councillor Norma Edwards said she would not support the legislation. "I can't support it because I don't believe that we should be giving away our rights." She added, "The assets of a country shouldn't be there to be given away."

Mrs Edwards said she was sure the Bill was well written, and commented on the amount of work that had gone into it, adding, "it is the principle that I dislike entirely and I am afraid I would not support this Bill."

"The Chief Executive, when he spoke earlier said there must be eco-

nomical vitality, or creative economic vitality to the fishing industry."

"Well, I think there must be an alternative way to stimulating the fisheries into pursuing better economic growth and I don't think we've looked at any other ways of doing this."

"I don't disagree that we shouldn't give comfort to the fishing companies - our local fishing companies - encourage them to pursue better business arrangements and all the rest of it, but I don't think that Government should be giving away fishing rights."

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Councillors debate 2005 Fisheries Bill (continued from page 11)

Cockwell in favour: 'this will benefit all Islanders'

RICHARD COCKWELL, Chairman of the Fisheries Advisory Committee, supported the Bill.

He said he had shared the Honourable Mike Summers' concerns and frustrations over the time the Bill had taken to come through and that he personally regretted the fact that a special Legislative Council meeting was called in which to discuss it.

He said that although he respected Councillor Edwards' concerns, he didn't believe that this Bill could be compared with the Stanley Fisheries issue, saying, "The Stanley Fisheries issue was a group of inexperienced people who decided they were going to set up and manage something which they had no experience in whatsoever, with a consequent disaster. We now have an experienced fishing industry with experienced fishing companies, who are in a very different position. I don't think that the policy behind Stanley Fisheries was wrong, it was just the implementation which was wrong."

He said one thing he regretted which is not clear is "...the protection of smaller fishing companies, who feel exposed because of the issues of eligibility and granting of

ITQ and PQ." He added, "I hope that this will be dealt with within the life of this Council."

Councillor Cockwell gave his personal assurance that he did not believe that anybody who had been involved in the formulation of the Bill had any intention that smaller fishing companies should be disadvantaged. "If anything, the contrary, they should be encouraged to be able as long as they qualify to obtain ITQ."

Councillor Cockwell expressed his gratitude to the people who have spent "many, many gallons of midnight oil producing this Bill and working on the drafting of this Bill, which has been very complex."

"It's one of the most complex bills we have had for a long time. And in particular the Attorney General and the Director of Fisheries and, of course, Mike Hartle, who was the economic advisor at the time and also the members of the working group, who went through every single clause."

He said the Bill would make a big difference not only to the Falkland Islands fishing industry but to Falkland Islanders themselves. "There is not a Falkland Islander

who is not touched and has not benefited from the fishing industry and the setting up of the fishing industry in the Falklands and this gives the industry a chance to develop and expand."

He added "More of the money which has been generated by our industry, which we never see in the Falkland Islands, will pass through the Falkland Islands and we will see the benefit of it."

Councillor Cockwell corrected Councillor Roger Edwards on a point he had made (below) that the government could not recover any ITQ once it had been granted to qualifying companies, he said, "Clause 33 is grounds in which the grant of individual transferable quota provision may be revoked, so there are ways in which it can be revoked."

However, on Tuesday Councillor Edwards said that is incorrect. He said, "Clause 33 allows the Director of Fisheries to revoke the grant of ITQ to a company but not to recover quota."

"All that government can do is ensure quota is sold on, or transferred in some way, to another company the name of which appears on the relevant Eligibility Register."

Roger Edwards 'against the Bill as it stands'

ROGER EDWARDS declared an interest in the Falklands fishing industry saying his interest is presently only in toothfish. "For which there is no provisional quota under this particular ordinance."

Councillor Edwards said that although he was not entirely happy with the Bill as it stands, he agreed with the Chief Executive that an awful lot of work has been done towards it, adding, "much of the Bill was bits and pieces that were desperately required in the Falklands."

He said legislation was required to look after the safety of the vessels, the crews, and the personnel involved in the fishery.

However, he added, "My prime problem with this Bill is the time-scale involved. Government gives these rights for a period of 25 years and, during that period of 25 years, government cannot be given those rights back. They may purchase them somewhere along the way but they have no rights to get them back. Yes, we have heard that ExCo

can sit and discuss to see how the companies are doing - those companies that have these rights. They do not have the powers to take those rights back. They can force a company to sell them on. Twenty five years is an awful long time. If we think back 25 years, there was a group of people in these Islands from the Foreign and Commonwealth Office talking about lease-back to the Argentines. The Falklands war has happened, we didn't even have a fisheries zone. It wasn't until 1986 that the Falklands Interim Conservation Zone was brought into being. We had no licensing policies at all, there were no local fishing licenses. Twenty five years is an awful long time and my feeling is that it is too long to give these rights out without Government under any circumstances getting them back."

"They claim, through this Bill, that conservation is going to be better controlled. Well, those fishing companies who now have these

rights are going to be pushing like hell that the ITQ is never reduced to zero because that is all Government can do."

Councillor Edwards said he had argued some time back within council that should ITQ fall to zero for a couple of years then the government should have the rights back, so they could properly oversee conservation. He said that was refused.

Lastly, he said, it is a matter of a level playing field for all the fishing companies. "In the presence of the members of the public only the other day, the Chairman of the Fisheries Advisory Committee, when asked about what criteria would be imposed, said we don't know because we don't know who is going to apply - surely that must be a very, very odd response?"

Councillor Edwards did not vote in favour of the Bill. "Even though my interests in fishing would be enhanced under this Bill, I am afraid I cannot support this Bill as it stands."

Councillor Jan Cheek: in favour of 'investment that will boost the Falklands'

JAN CHEEK declared her interest in the fishing industry and referred interested parties to the Register of Members' Interests, which has, in full detail, all her fisheries interests as a boat owner, as an operator and as a director of several fishing companies.

Councillor Cheek said that over the years the policy has taken to devise, there has been huge input from many members of the industry and officials, adding "it hasn't been undertaken lightly."

"Undoubtedly some companies, such as those I operate, will benefit from the added security. But that added security should encourage the kind of investment that will boost the Falkland Islands' share of the value of a huge fishery of which, at the moment, only a tiny fraction

of that income comes ashore.

"I am also in favour of this Bill because of the strengthening of the powers of conservation measures. The Director of Fisheries will be able to reduce any fishery by whatever percentage conservation requirements dictate - even to the point of reducing a given fishery to zero."

"I think this is incredibly important. Serious fishing companies and the Falkland Islands interests are served by long-term sustainability and I believe this Bill works very hard to strengthen it."

"Not only does it strengthen powers in terms of conservation measures but it extends the power of enforcement of regulations for those who wish to poach or cheat in any way will find it much harder to get away with it on technicali-

ties in the future. The powers of the Director of Fisheries are much strengthened."

"I am especially pleased, as a responsible Councillor, individual human being, that there are additional powers to deal with the maltreatment of crews. We've been deeply frustrated in years past by our inability to deal with that problem and I am hoping that with the way that these (powers) can be enforced, vessel owners will think carefully about the kind of officers they employ and realise that in this part of the world, at least, maltreatment of crews is totally unacceptable."

Councillor Cheek said that having declared her interest she did support the Bill for the reasons she had outlined.

Birmingham, Hansen and Luxton: in favour

COUNCILLOR John Birmingham said he didn't think the Bill had everyone's full approval adding, "there are certain aspects of this that I am a little bit concerned about."

He said his only interest was to promote and push forward the fishing industry of the Falkland Islands.

He then read out an anonymous letter councillors had received which intimated that the Bill would only serve to better councillors. (On Tuesday Councillor Birmingham explained he had read the letter out to demonstrate the kind of misunderstanding that exists concerning the fisheries legislation.)

He said he thought people on the streets would be talking about the Bill, "more than ordinary members of the public have been discussing anything to do with fishing over the last three years."

In addressing Legislative Council he said he was a supporter of the Bill and had been convinced from some ago that it was the "way ahead" but he agreed with Councillor Roger Edwards' that the 25 year time scale is a long time. He said that there would be controls in place to "prevent anyone doing anything illegal or dishonest."

He said 25 years ago the situation in the Falklands was different. "How many people owned their own farms 25 years ago? I would suggest not too many and, looking back, I would also suggest that some people may well think that they perhaps made the wrong decision for buying them. Times do change, we have to move on. There is a risk to this Bill but there is a risk to everything."

Ian Hansen chose to be brief admitting, "...there are those who have far more experience in the fishing industry than I," however he added, "We are all aware of its importance."

Councillor Hansen said he had listened to views of all the fishing industry and, he hoped he had an understanding of the different concerns that have been expressed.

He said the conclusion he had reached is that the advantages of the Bill for the fishery and for the Falkland Islands "far outweighs the disadvantages," adding, "I believe the fundamental policy is right and correct."

Councillor Stephen Luxton declared an interest and briefly elaborated on it before saying he thought the important point to the Bill is that it is about bringing control of the fishery of the Falkland Islands "back to the hands of the Falkland Islanders."

He added, "it's about strengthening our domestic industry and, more than anything else, perhaps, about bringing more money back into the Falklands. At the moment, we only have a very small proportion of the potential income from the Falkland Islands fisheries actually come back into the Falklands and I think this is a step in the right direction in terms of bringing those assets home."

He concluded, "I am not 100% happy with every single provision...but, as Councillor Hansen said, I think the advantages very much outweigh the disadvantages."

Wool report - week ending August 26

by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices remained relatively stable at sales in Australia (some micron categories gained a penny or two per kg clean), slipped a bit at the "fine end" in New Zealand, but held up at the "broader end".

Prices in South Africa were reported down markedly, however price movements basically brought South African greasy wool prices back into line with "normal" compared to Australian and New Zealand markets.

Prices for non-fleece wool types were also reported quite firm during the week. Better style, finer, low VM types in particular were in demand.

In Australia 89.2% of the 51,393 bale offering was sold. Included in the offering were 4,445 bales of crossbred wool of which 91% was sold. In New Zealand, over 25% of the 24,350 bale offering was passed in.

Auctions continue next week in New Zealand and Australia where almost 71,000 bales will be on offer.



Shellfish back on the menu

FALKLANDS oysters and mussels will be back on sale in the shops again this weekend, after tests for toxins proved negative.

The Senior Veterinary Officer, Steve Pointing, this week confirmed three successive negative tests on samples submitted for analysis for the most important shellfish toxins and added, "The results obtained locally have been confirmed by further testing in an approved overseas laboratory."

Testing will continue on a regular basis during the remainder of the winter and spring period and will be carried out more frequently during late spring and into summer when the risk of algal blooms increases with higher sea water temperatures.

Mr Pointing assured the public will be informed "immediately" if any test result shows cause for concern.

A clear result has also been received in *histeria* testing of milk from Stanley Dairy.

However, the Chief Medical Officer said, "Ideally we need four successive negative weeks before 'at risk' people can start drinking unpasteurised and unboiled milk."

Digital Journal

ALMOST thirty years of reference material contained in *The Falkland Islands Journal* has been produced on CD by a Stanley company.

Argentine annoyance at Falklands fishing law

NEW fishing legislation passed in the Falklands has reportedly prompted the Argentine government to prepare a series of measures "to discourage and eventually sanction" companies who own long-term licences to fish in Falklands waters.

Legislative Council approved long term property rights last month as part of the new Falkland Islands fishing law.

Buenos Aires-based newspaper *Clarín* yesterday reported that officials from the Argentine Ministry of Foreign Affairs confirmed, "...the political decision to act against the unilateral move from the Islands, although they did not wish to reveal the detail."

An article written by Adriana Ruffa which appeared on the website *Pesca y Puerto* called for Argentina to denounce the "British presumption to grant rights over fisheries resources which it does not own."

She continues, "...at the same time all companies must be warned that Argentina does not, nor will it recognise licences, concessions or property rights issued by the occupying government on the Islands."

She urges, "A system of legal safeguards which discourages those potentially interested in exploiting the Malvinas (sic) fisheries resources - some of whom will certainly have substantial interests on the continent - must be laid down by law."

An instrument such as this

would clear up the future as it would be the best way to convince the islanders that they cannot do anything without a good relationship with Argentina...

Responding to Ms Ruffa's report, Councillor John Birmingham said, such articles "go no way" towards "helping build a mature and responsible relationship between the Falkland Islands and Argentina."

He said he had no concerns about the legality of the Fisheries Bill passed by Legislative Council last month and added, "We have the full support of the British Government and I take no notice of flimflam written in the Argentine press."

As for the concept that Argentina could penalise companies that fish in Falklands waters by banning them from Argentine waters, Councillor Birmingham commented, "They have jurisdiction over their own territory of which clearly the Falkland Islands are not a part."

However, he added, "If they choose to behave in an old fashioned, third world way, and punish private companies for actions those companies take overseas, it just shows the present Argentine government for what it is."

A fishery source said such moves as suggested by Ms Ruffa would be unlikely to punish Falkland Islands companies directly; instead, foreign companies with links in the Falklands would be more likely to be affected.

£45,000 fines for Quark/Freiremar

TWO fishing companies have each been fined £45,000 for exceeding the quota on a licence to fish in South Georgia waters.

In July Quark Fishing Ltd, a Falkland Islands company, and its Spanish partners Freiremar SA were found guilty of breaching licence conditions by exceeding quota in the valuable Patagonian toothfish fishery of South Georgia. The charge related to the use of the Spanish-flagged vessel, *Ibsa Quinto*.

Also in July, Quark was found guilty on a further matter, that as owner of the Falklands-flagged vessel *Jacqueline*, they failed to comply with a licence condition relating to the minimisation of seabird mortality in the course of longline fishing. For this offence, the company was yesterday fined £2,500.

Falklands councillor, Mike Summers, is the Managing Director of Quark Ltd and was present during yesterday's proceedings.

In issuing the penalties for the offence relating to the *Ibsa Quinto*, the Senior Magistrate, Clare Faulds, said she did not agree with the defence's submission that the catch weighing procedure carried out by the Government of South Georgia was a mitigating factor. Although she accepted there had been no attempt to conceal the overcatch of approximately 15 tonnes, Mrs Faulds said nevertheless, "... an overcatch there was."

She acknowledged the financial suffering Quark and Freiremar have experienced as a result of being refused a licence for 2005 and set the fine at £45,000 each.



End of an era with Marianne Danica's final call

THE arrival of the charter vessel *Marianne Danica* in Stanley on Wednesday evening signalled the end of an era for the Falkland Islands Company Ltd (FIC).

The vessel's visit was the last trip solely chartered by the FIC's freight service, Darwin Shipping Ltd. From now on, Darwin Shipping will bring freight to the Falklands in conjunction with the Ministry of Defence's shipping service.

The decision to work with the MoD ships was made, the FIC said in June, in an effort to "combat the impacts of escalating fuel and charter costs on freight rates."

First Sea Lord unveils 1982 Merchant Navy Memorial

VETERAN of the Falklands War, Admiral Sir Alan West, First Sea Lord and Chief of Naval Staff, has unveiled a new memorial to the Merchant Navy.

At a special service held at Tower Hill in London on Sunday Sir Alan paid tribute to the crucial contribution made by the Merchant Navy during the Falklands War which saw the loss of the merchant vessel *Atlantic Conveyor* as a result of enemy action.

During the 1982 war Admiral West commanded *HMS Ardent* which was lost due to enemy action.

He said, "Men and women of the Merchant Navy worked shoulder to shoulder with those of the Royal Navy during the campaign to liberate the Islands, as they did in the two world wars of the last century, and have done so since."

Sukey Cameron, the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) Repre-

sentative to the UK, laid a wreath at the new memorial on behalf of the "people and the Government of the Falkland Islands."

FIG paid for the bronze plaque for the Roll of Honour around the Memorial and also sponsored an advertisement in the official brochure.

Among the large crowd in attendance were the Chairman of the Falklands Chapel, Captain Barrow, Chairman of the South Atlantic Medal Association, Captain Martin Reed, author Leslic Thomas CBE, who is a Patron of the Memorial and visited the Islands on the *QE2* last November and Captains Green and Roberts from the *Sir Tristram* and *Sir Galahad* respectively.

Dr John Marek, AM, also attended, representing the Welsh Assembly; as a Westminster MP he visited the Islands on an FIG sponsored visit in 1997. RN/PN

This extensive archive of historical data has been designed and placed onto a CD, with easily accessible information, a comprehensive index and a powerful integrated search tool.


All of the work on the project was carried out in the Falklands with the CD produced in Stanley using a sophisticated publishing suite provided by the FCO's Economic Diversification Programme.

Argentina refuses over-flight permission

OVER-FLIGHT permission has been refused by Argentina for a Chilean DAP flight to carry spares for a fishing vessel in the Falklands.

Director of Civil Aviation, Andrew Newman, confirmed this week that DAP had requested permission to carry out a charter flight to Stanley Airport on August 30.

The purpose of the flight was to bring spare parts to the Falklands for a fishing vessel for which

the Falkland Islands Company Ltd (FIC) were the agents. Mr Newman said his department communicated through FIC for all the documentation required, the documents were in order and permission was issued.

However Civil Aviation received word via the FIC agents that the flight was no longer being made to the Islands because Argentina had refused over-flight permission.

Falklands War movie opens in Buenos Aires

ILLUMINATED by Fire, which opens this week in Buenos Aires is the first major Argentine film to portray the horrors of the ten week 1982 Falklands War.

Argentine director Tristan Bauer says he hopes the film will help Argentines come to grips with a humiliating defeat that also helped

topple the Galtieri dictatorship. Argentine movie critic Julia Montesoro said the film should spark a debate about the debt Argentina owes its veterans, most of whom never received decent pensions or assistance for post-combat disorders.

With regard to *Jacqueline's* breach of a licence condition, Mrs Faulds said while she accepted no birds were caught during the 2004 season, steps were not taken to ensure full compliance.

Mrs Faulds did not award pros-

ecution costs during yesterday's proceedings. Instead she will hear representations from counsel next Friday, September 16.

Outside court yesterday afternoon, South Georgia's Director of Fisheries, Miss Harriet Hall, declined to comment upon the fines.

Court news

Korean fines total £65,000 Cigarette theft captured on video camera

THE owners and captain of a Korean fishing vessel have been fined £65,000 for misreporting catches.

In court on Monday, the Dong Yang Fisheries Company Ltd, owners of the vessel *Esperanza*, and the ship's captain Kim Myeong Se entered guilty pleas to three charges each.

Both parties were represented in court by Richard Marlor.

The prosecution alleged that catch reports filed to the Fisheries Department between August 18 and 26 underestimated the actual level of by-catch on board *Esperanza* and that approximately seven tonnes of squid was not declared in a transhipment log filled out around August 18.

The excessive level of by-catch meant the vessel had also breached a licence condition, resulting in the third criminal charge.

Mr Marlor said the offences had been committed "inadvertently, by an inexperienced crew working for a company with a long standing record here." He said there had been no deliberate attempt to mislead.

He said Mr Kim believed all fish had been transhipped on the night of August 17, however he took full responsibility for the error.

He added that Mr Kim accepted the by-catch was significantly higher than the 10% allowed by the Fisheries Department and also took responsibility for this; again he said

there had been no deliberate attempt to conceal and mistakes had been made, "due to his crew's inexperience."

He reminded the court that the finances of Dong Yang Ltd, along with many other fishing companies, are "bad" and urged the Senior Magistrate to show "leniency".

After a two hour adjournment, Senior Magistrate, Clare Faulds said the total potential penalty facing the *Esperanza's* owners was £105,000, however she recognised the company was suffering from poor economic conditions.

Taking into account the value of the catch held on the vessel (which the Crown wished not to be forfeited), she fined the company £65,000 and ordered the payment of prosecution costs totalling £2,500.

She commented, "The master's intention in providing false information is not clear but whatever it may have been I consider his conduct to be a serious breach of the fishery legislation. The breach of the terms of the fishing licence condition is also serious. It is not clear whether the owner was aware what was going on, but in any event the owner is equally culpable under the Fisheries Legislation."

Mrs Faulds fined the captain £2,500 and ordered him to pay £500 prosecution costs.

Probation for assault by beating

STANLEY man Gary McGill has received 18 months' probation in the Magistrate's Court.

Mr McGill had pleaded guilty to a charge of assaulting Cara McGill on July 20 and the case was adjourned for a pre-sentence report to be prepared.

On Wednesday, Defence lawyer Ian Warburton said his client had benefited from time spent with the Social Welfare Department during the preparation of the report and is seeking counselling on a weekly basis.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds told Mr McGill the report suggests there is hope that the difficulties are being addressed, but stressed that it was a serious offence particularly in view of his previous offences.

Mrs Faulds said she thought a restriction on Mr McGill's freedom

could be achieved by probation rather than imprisonment under the condition that he continued with counselling on a weekly basis.

Mr McGill was also bound over to keep the peace for one year and ordered to pay £70 costs.

Also in court was Barry Charles O'Dean who entered no plea to a charge of threatening behaviour, alleged to have taken place on July 17.

Mr O'Dean's lawyer, Richard Marlor, requested an adjournment saying he had seen his client for the first time on Tuesday and had only received advance disclosure from the prosecution that morning.

Mrs Faulds agreed to an adjournment until Tuesday, September 13, and imposed one bail condition, that Mr O'Dean should not approach Miss Trina Bemtsen.

August temperatures in line with the average

TEMPERATURES in August were almost exactly in line with averages for this time of year, although rainfall was the third highest ever recorded in the Islands.

The mean maximum temperature was 5.7C, identical to the average. The highest temperature recorded was on the 10th when it reached 10.2C, and the lowest temperature being 1.3C occurred on the 18th. The mean minimum of 0.7C compares with the average of 0.5C. The lowest temperature of the month, -3.6C was recorded on the 19th and the highest minimum of 5.4C was recorded on the 10th.

Rainfall was higher than the average of 36.4mm, recorded as

49.1mm. The wettest day was on the 16th, when a total of 13.1mm was recorded.

Snow/sleet fell on a total of 13 days, which was slightly above the average of 12.2 days. Snow lay for three days. Both hail and fog occurred on three days.

The average sunshine for August of 96.7 hours was not matched by this year's total of 90.4 hours.

It was slightly less windy than might be expected, but the mean speed was 13.8 knots, compared to the average of 14.7kts. The maximum gust, 52kts was on the 8th, against a record for August of 69kts.

There were gales on two days, the 8th and 9th.

A PRE-SENTENCE report is to be prepared on a man who stole from his employer for seven consecutive days.

William Fredrick Whitney (61) pleaded guilty to a charge of stealing seven cartons of cigarettes to the value of £279.30 from the Falkland Islands Company Ltd (FIC).

The court heard that Mr Whitney had worked for the FIC for 24 years as a driver/handyman. Crown Prosecution Ros Cheek said that the FIC stock controllers had noticed a significant amount of cigarettes missing in July and, as a consequence, a video camera had been set up in the Food Hall.

On the footage, Mr Whitney was seen removing a carton of cigarettes from a shelf and place them in a bin bag before leaving. Ms Cheek said this was repeated every morning for seven days at which stage the Police were informed.

When interviewed by the Police Mr Whitney admitted taking some cigarettes, "but only on a few occasions." Ms Cheek said that when

asked what he did with the cigarettes, Mr Whitney had given the "unbelievable account" that he had "burned" them. She said that as Mr Whitney does not smoke it could only be assumed he gave them to somebody else but added that there was no evidence that he had benefited from it.

In mitigation Ian Warburton said that Mr Whitney suffers from serious health problems stemming from a stroke he suffered which left him with regular heart problems and short term memory, adding that Mr Whitney was eager for the matter to be dealt with at the earliest opportunity.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said the whole scenario required more information. She said she understood that Mr Whitney would like it over with quickly, but that dealing with the matter quickly might not help him and may not result in the appropriate penalty. She adjourned the case for a pre-sentence report to be prepared. Mr Whitney will reappear in court on October 19.

Guilty plea to underage sexual intercourse

A TWENTY-FOUR year old man has pleaded guilty to having sexual intercourse with an underage girl.

Police were notified to the offence when informed by the Social Work Department that an underage girl had fallen pregnant.

Mr Smith voluntarily attended the police station on August 4 and in an interview said he had been in a relationship for eight months with the girl and that the relationship had been sexual for five months.

An interview with the girl's

mother revealed that she was aware of the relationship but not aware it was sexual until her daughter became pregnant.

She said Mr Smith continued to support her daughter and the couple wish to raise the child together.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said it was a serious matter but that the relationship appears to be of "some substance." She adjourned the case until October 19, to allow for a pre-sentence report to be prepared.

Motorbike crash results in fine for youth

A YOUTH who crashed his motorbike on Brandon Road has been fined.

The sixteen year old admitted driving without due care and attention on July 7, resulting in a collision with another bike. He had been travelling in convoy with two friends, also on motorbikes. A witness to the incident said the defendant appeared to be travelling over the speed limit prior to the crash

and when the motorbike in front of him stopped, his brakes failed and the collision occurred. He slid for some distance along the road before eventually coming to a stop.

The youth apologised to the court for the incident and confirmed he had offered to pay for the damage to his friend's bike.

The Senior Magistrate fined the boy £100 and instructed him to pay prosecution costs of £50.

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Interactive war museum: new project needs support

I AM writing in the hope of finding support with what I see as a major step towards a museum that is available 24-7 and is available to all.

2007 will see the 25th anniversary of the Falklands War, a crucial part of history not only in the Falklands and Great Britain but also in Argentina and, in some ways, the rest of the world.

We have seen many books, articles, stories and we know the story has not yet ended as the dispute continues. The one thing we have not seen is the establishing of a dedicated museum. Though I feel this would be the greatest tribute to those who never returned. I have to admit that I would agree, that the setting up and running of such a venture would likely not be sustainable without heavy funding.

With this in mind I have continually sought other avenues to help keep history alive. I tried to save *HMS Fearless* and hope that my efforts may yet see her put to further use. Though I have deliberated long over how best to put across the full picture, I now feel that I have the right idea and just need to find support and funding to see this take shape and develop.

The greatest advance for man has been the introduction of computers and the World Wide Web. This medium has developed faster than anything in mans history and is set to continue to grow. This medium is being used by people in every country in the World today and is used as a point for reference more times a second than the use of a dictionary in a month.

The idea is simply to create the largest single reference point in regards to the Falklands and the Falklands War in the world, and make it available to the world.

This single web site would be available with information on every aspect of the war, though it would go much further to include a full history of the Falklands, the build up to and the war of 1982 and how things changed right through to today. This would be a three sided view including the Falklands, the UK and Argentine.

The main aim will be to bring together the largest library of pictures and news reel footage of all aspects, including personal pictures, of which there were many thousands taken by troops before, during and after the war. These will be catalogued and digitally mastered to be archived and used on the site.

Where possible, interviews will be made with people who were there, and follow ups to the many that took place over the years. The equipment, clothing, vehicles, armour, ships, planes, food and all the other items that went to make the armed forces of that time will be detailed with pictures detailing

all aspects.

There will be a DVD produced which will be provided for schools, libraries and offered for sale which will be a potted version that will be interactive and allow the user to link directly to the web site where an internet connection is available. A number of mobile displays with fully interactive booths will be built which could be set up at museums and venues providing the story directly through dedicated servers.

A full listing of books, films, memorabilia and other media will be available with direct links for buying through the site those items still available. There will be a fully detailed catalogue of museums where items and displays can be seen with relevance to the Falklands War.

I feel that this would be a major step towards providing a permanent record and a unique way of bringing history to everyone without the overheads of running a building and maintaining displays - all though we will aim to get people to go and see what is on display throughout museums and other establishments.

The aim will be to provide a detailed record of all memorials, and a photographic record of them for all to see along with detailed locations. With details of associations and charities linked to Veterans and the Falklands.

The cost involved in such a project will be quite high, as there is a need to incorporate as much new technology as possible, though it can be stage managed with funding being sought for each stage. The costs would be incurred in sourcing the material, securing Crown Copyright for release of documents, pictures and media, computers, cameras, video cameras, storage and office space for project management, server space and domain names, new media team, researchers, travel to gather info and pictures and conduct research. Anticipated costs will be around £250,000 to complete the main part of the project for launch in 2007, with anticipated on-going production after this time to continue to build the archive.

The aim is to find funding through whatever means are available including the lottery, charitable donations and through corporate sponsorship, which will be reflected on the site.

This is a major project that will be a world first and something which will ensure that the Falklands remain as part of the world's history, visible to all.

I look forward to your comments and hope that you will look at this as a project you would be willing to help and support.

Anti-Aspartame campaign continues

IN RESPONSE to the article 'Aspartame: Medical reassurance' in last weeks *P.N.*, I submit the following.

It is thanks to the wonders of the internet and its wealth of information that I found out about Aspartame and its dangers.

I am not trying to scare people, I am just presenting the facts as they are.

Dr Diggle said that Aspartame is a naturally occurring amino acid. I wish to correct him in that aspartic acid is an amino acid, not Aspartame. The methyl ester which connects the phenyl and the aspartic acid in the aspartame molecule, breaks down into methyl alcohol in the stomach and then is turned into formaldehyde in the liver and it is stored in the brain plaques, just like the plaques in dentistry, where it continues to do incalculable neurotoxic damage. Of course if any manufacturer labelled their products with this information, few would use it.

Phenylalanine is an amino acid normally found in the brain. People with the genetic disorder, phenylketonuria (PKU) cannot metabolise phenylalanine. This leads to dangerously high levels of phenylalanine in the brain (sometimes lethal).

It has been shown that ingesting aspartame, especially along with carbohydrates can lead to excess levels of phenylalanine in the brain even in people who do not have PKU. This is not just a theory, as many people who have eaten large amounts of aspartame over a long period of time and do not have PKU have been shown to have excessive levels of phenylalanine in the blood.

Excessive levels of phenylalanine in the brain can cause the levels of serotonin in the brain to decrease, leading to emotional disorders such as depression. (There are a great many people locally suffering from depression - is there a connection?)

It was shown in human testing that phenylalanine levels of the blood were increased significantly in human subjects who chronically used aspartame. Even a single use of aspartame raised the blood phenylalanine levels. In his testimony

before the US Congress, Dr Louis J Elsa's showed that high blood phenylalanine can be concentrated in parts of the brain, and is especially dangerous for infants and fetuses. He also showed that phenylalanine is metabolised much more efficiently by rodents than by humans.

Many products do carry a warning about Phenylalanine, but there are many products containing Aspartame that do not show this.

I understand Dr Diggle's point of view because we follow the guidelines of Britain and their health administration approves the use of Aspartame. Britain in fact was the country that backed the USA to get Aspartame onto the global market, without their approval this would never have happened.

The reason behind supporting the Federal Drugs Administration (FDA) of America was money. Aspartame sweetener is a multi billion dollar industry and the FDA will fight very hard to protect it regardless of the known health risks.

Can we afford to doubt the following extract from Dr Betty Martini D Hum: "Aspartame has been linked to a host of devastating central nervous system disorders. When aspartame was approved for use, Dr H J Roberts, director of the Palm Beach Institute for Medical Research, had no reason to doubt the FDA's decision. 'But my attitude changed,' he says, 'after repeatedly encountering serious reactions in my patients that seemed justifiably linked to aspartame.'

"Twenty years on, Roberts has coined the phrase 'aspartame disease' to describe the wide range of adverse effects he has seen among aspartame-guzzling patients.

"He estimates: 'Hundreds of thousands of consumers, more likely millions, currently suffer major reactions to products containing aspartame. Today, every physician probably encounters aspartame disease in everyday practice, especially among patients with illnesses that are undiagnosed or difficult to treat.'"

Police Committee concerned by underage drinking

THE Police Committee has heard the incidence of juvenile drinking in public or at home has dramatically increased over the past 12-18 months, and needs to be addressed. "sooner rather than later."

Chief Police Officer Dave Morris told the committee that the drinking occurs mostly on Friday and Saturday nights between 8pm and 10pm, usually in groups which vary in age and size. Children aged as young as ten wander around the streets late at night in groups ranging from three to 60 people. He said every weekend police have to "deal with these youngsters."

The offenders have been found to be drinking concoctions of various alcohol that have been mixed with either orange juice or coke. The alcohol is obtained from maybe the parent's alcohol cupboard or by older friends. Mr Morris said this is then "shared between the gang."

"Peer pressure seems to be one of the main reasons for most of these young children. Mostly they look up to the leader of the gang and whatever the leader does they think is cool and must copy."

He added. "The punishment for these offences should be child targeted and not parent related."

When a child is caught drinking alcohol, as a general rule, they are given a Citeable Caution, on

the second occasion they could face juvenile court. Mr Morris said the effect this has on a 13 or 14 year old is minimal. "The parents are left with the cost and the child has gained some kudos from her/his peers."

A Young People's Working Group has recently been formed at the suggestion of His Excellency the Governor, Howard Pearce, and Mr Morris asked that the group consider whether, for a first time offence, a Citeable Caution could be offered to any child that fully co-operates with the police.

A second offence could involve a Conditional Discharge coupled to a curfew order whereby a child has to stay in the parents nominated address between the hours of 8pm-6am on Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings for one month and if the child were to go missing between those hours during the curfew month their parents must report them.

The police would then have to go out, find the child, arrest them and return them to the nominated address. The child and parent would have to appear before the Magistrate again for further punishment and Social Services would also be required to have weekly meetings.

If a child were to offend for a third time and be arrested, the curfew period should be extended for two to three months with the ba-

sis of curfew being that the juvenile would be required to undertake some sort of alcohol awareness education.

The Attorney General, David Lang, told the meeting that parents do not take a responsible attitude to the actions of their children. He said, the proposal Mr Morris made, "assumes too much we could control what the court does." In addition he said the police should have the power to take children home after a certain hour, "in the interest of the child," and added that greater control was needed on adult drinking in the streets.

Mr Morris said the rise of juvenile alcohol consumption is "evident and worrying." He said the Drug Awareness and Resistance Education (DARE) should now be aimed more at the children in the Falkland Islands Community School because this is now the age group that alcohol is affecting.

Drinking to excess?

Also at the Police Committee meeting, Government Chief Executive Chris Simpkins asked whether there are regular visits to public houses by uniformed Police Officers at present; he suggested that this could identify whether pub goers were being served alcohol when drunk.

Mr Morris said that visits could be introduced but added that

visits by uniformed officers. "can cause incidents at times."

Councillor Jan Check said that the ordinance states people should not be served alcohol when intoxicated but she had heard that customers were "served as long as they can stand up and pass money over."

Mr Lang also said that he had received a number of creditable reports of people leaving public houses in a state of "extreme intoxication," and referred to a case where a had man died in an intoxicated state following a fall outside his home.

Speaking to *Penguin News* on Tuesday, Victory Bar landlady Cathy Jacobsen said her staff refuse to serve customers if they appear incapable and that it was normal to order a taxi for customers who arrive at the Victory in an intoxicated state.

Mrs Jacobsen said she would invite anyone who had any doubts as to how the pubs operated to "visit the establishments."

Robert Macaskill said the policy at the Rose Bar is to refuse to sell alcohol to customers, "before they become drunk and become a nuisance to other customers." He added however that it is not "illegal to get drunk if anyone wishes to do so."

The Royal Falkland Islands Police would like to inform all vehicle owners of the following.

If a person wishes to take their vehicle off the road when the vehicle licence has expired they must inform the licensing bureau at the time the vehicle is taken off the road. This must now be confirmed in writing by completing the "Vehicle Off Road Notification" (VORN) and returning it to the licensing bureau.

Failure to do this will mean that when the vehicle licence is renewed it will automatically be backdated to the expiry date of the previous vehicle licence. There is no requirement to inform the licensing bureau if the vehicle licence is still valid.

No vehicle covered by a VORN should be used, allowed to be used or parked on any designated road or public place. Before the vehicle is used again the licensing bureau should be informed and the vehicle licence renewed.

IT WAS Gerald Cheek, a competitor in full-bore rifle shooting at the 1982 Commonwealth Games in Brisbane, who had the honour of formally handing the Queen's Baton to His Excellency the Governor.

The reception of the baton by Mr Pearce at Government House marked the conclusion on Friday, September 2, of the official programme which welcomed the Baton to the Falklands.

Hundreds of school children cheered the baton all the way from the Liberation Memorial to the entrance of Government House.

With the West Falklands population having had their opportunity to view the baton on the previous day, it was the turn of East Falklands residents on Friday. Military personnel based at the Mount Pleasant Complex (MPC) and Camp school children and their teachers began the 35 miles relay to Stanley from MPC.

More than 100 people had volunteered to take part in the historic event - some running, some jogging, some walking. Great-grandmother Joyce Allan completed her stint in fine style, while the youth movements joined together and passed the baton between themselves as it headed for Stanley.

Closer to home, the youngsters were required to share the load, carrying the baton between them, as the seven-hour long 'marathon' hit the streets of Stanley. Motorised Dennis Middleton, proudly drove his chair, with baton, from St Mary's Church to the entrance of Government House, before handing over to Gerald Cheek for the final leg.

In the long history of the Commonwealth Games, the baton had never previously been to the

Falklands. In preparation for the 2006 Commonwealth Games in Melbourne, the Australians were determined that all 71 competing countries of the Commonwealth would have an opportunity to see the Baton which left Buckingham Palace on March 14.

The Falklands was the 48th country visited and the remaining 23 countries will also place their hands on the baton before it enters the 100,000-capacity Melbourne Cricket Ground for the Opening Ceremony of the XVIII Commonwealth Games on March 15 - one year and one day after it left London.

It is believed that the Falk-

lands will be the only country hosting the baton in winter, and the Falkland Islands Overseas Games Vice-Chairman Steve Dent was pictured holding the baton in deep snow on the top of Blue Mountain.

The accompanying official team also confirmed their first pictures of the baton being held on horse-back, with Nigel Knight having the honour at Fox Bay.

His Excellency the Governor who hosted a dinner and reception on Friday in recognition of the presence of the baton, described its arrival here as, "an important and historical sporting occasion for the Islands which

will provide considerable positive publicity for the Falklands."

The Chief Executive Officer of the Commonwealth Games Federation, Mike Hooper, who accompanied the baton to the Falklands, congratulated the local Overseas Games Association Committee on, "...their splendid and innovative programme which took the baton to East and West Falklands and across Falklands Sound by the Royal Navy (*HMS Dumbarton Castle*) and helicopter."

A look at the system used when opticians visit

THOMAS H Collison Ltd are currently the visiting opticians and usually visit the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital (KEMH) twice a year.

Once we have confirmation of their dates, reception staff organise the clinics and appointments for any patients that have been referred by the doctors. We also send out appointments for patients with diabetes who need to be seen once a year, we arrange for some to be seen at each visit rather than take up a huge block of appointments in one visit.

Once the patients with diabetes and those who have been referred by the doctors have been allocated appointments, the remaining appointments are offered to the public on a first come first served basis. The opticians have advised us that an examination for healthy eyes is only needed every three years.

People aged between 16 and 64 who are entitled to free medical treatment are entitled to a free eye examination once every three years. (A patient with a defined long-term medical condition receives free eye tests as determined by the doctor). OAP's (over 64 years) are entitled to a free examination every two years. Anything

more frequent than this incurs a charge of £20. Children under 16 and those in higher education between the ages of 16-18 years are also entitled to free examinations.

After the visit, spectacles usually start to arrive within three to four weeks. Upon arrival the spectacles are checked and the relevant charges are applied to the cost. We then forward the spectacles in the post with an invoice.

For people aged between 16 - 63 years the charges are:

- Frames: Cost plus 33% government charge and 10% administration/handling charge
- Lenses: Charged at cost

The following patients are entitled to a free pair of spectacles:

- Children under 16 years and those between 16-18 years in full time education (as frequently as the prescribing optician determines)
- OAP's over the age of 64 years once every two years (every two years).
- Welfare recipients (every three years)
- Patients with defined medical conditions which are affecting the eyesight, for example a patient with diabetic retinopathy, but not a patient with diabetes who is simply short-sighted).

If the value of the frame is over £40 the above charges will be applied to the difference

At other times, while the opticians are not here, reception staff do their utmost to help the public with any requests for ordering new glasses/contact lenses and with any repairs that are within their capabilities. Otherwise the spectacles will need to be returned to the opticians for repair and will then be forwarded to the patient when returned with an invoice for the cost of the repair. Local repairs are charged at £5 for people between 16 and 63 years old. They are free for all other patients.

Thomas H Collison Ltd has been the visiting optician to the KEMH for the last five years. Opticians are usually contracted in from elsewhere and are not employees of T H Collison.

The last optician who was here in April, Mr Graham Hay-Smith, worked for the National Health Service and was an Ophthalmologist.

Currently the contract is up for renewal and we would be interested to hear from people who have any comment and ideas on how to improve the service that is provided.

Recipes for the Falkland Islands

Pork pittas with salsa

Pork, pan fried in Mexican spices is stuffed into toasted pitta with avocado, red onion, tomato and coriander and topped with a dollop of Greek yoghurt. Simple, and there is lots of fresh pork available in the shops at the moment.

Ingredients

1 tablespoon olive oil
1 lb 2 oz diced pork
4 tablespoons spicy seasoning such as Old El Paso Spice Mix for Fajitas
4 large pittas
100g tub Greek yoghurt (optional)

for the salsa

1 red onion, peeled and chopped
1 ripe avocado stoned, peeled and chopped
4 large tomatoes, roughly chopped
Small handful roughly chopped fresh coriander
Juice of one lime.

Method

Heat the oil in a pan and fry the pork over a medium heat for 3 - 4 minutes. Add the spicy seasoning mix to the pan and stir to coat the pork. Cook for a further 4-5 minutes until cooked through.

Meanwhile make the salsa. Put the onion in a bowl and add the

avocado, tomatoes, coriander and lime juice. Mix well, season to taste and set aside.

Toast the pittas until lightly golden, then slit down the side and stuff with the pork, a dollop of salsa and a spoonful of Greek yoghurt. Serve immediately.

You can make your own seasoning by mixing 1 crushed clove of garlic, 1 teaspoon ground ginger and ½ - 1 teaspoon of cayenne pepper.

Serves 4

Preparation time: 10 minutes

Cooking time: 10 minutes

Approx 550 calories per serving




Onions... Who wants to peel the onions?

Dr Diggle also mentions that the EU are currently carrying out further research into aspartame. What he also failed to submit is that this investigation is being carried out because there is sound scientific evidence that aspartame is linked to the rapid increase in tumours and cancer on tests done in Italy on rats. Not only is this information available on the internet but is available in several archived news paper reports by some leading news groups.

I did take the matter up with Councillors, but quite honestly believe that it will fall on deaf ears. The Falkland Islands are moving on at an ever faster pace and with it comes better understanding of the workings of the rest of the world. For years people on the Islands were not given too much information, but the internet and global communications has changed all that. Where once Islanders could not get a second professional opinion, they can now. There are many methods available to them to achieve this and because of this our administration are being more and more left behind.

Contrary to Dr Diggle's com-

ment about the majority of food stuffs coming from Britain, almost half of this now comes from Latin America, you only have to look on the shelves and read the foreign language on the tins.

Readers need not have to believe me, but a simple test that you can do will demonstrate whether you suffer from aspartame poisoning. Don't use any products known to contain any sweeteners for 60 days. Let me know what happens.

I personally already know, as my addiction to diet cola proved. I craved for it for three weeks but refused to give in. Now I am past that moment and seldom even think about it. Remember it's not just Coke that has it in. We removed around thirty products from our home and even now we cannot be sure we are 100% aspartame free, because some manufacturers do not put it on the label, even though it is in the contents.

My daughter is living proof of what it did to her and I intend to do everything I can to ensure the health and safety of our citizens is secured. That's a promise.

Wool report - week ending August 31

by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices were considerably cheaper at the fine end of the micron spectrum at sales in Australia last week, but relatively firm at the broader end. Wool prices generally remained unchanged in New Zealand.

• Lots with high vegetable matter and low style attracted reduced buyer interest and as a consequence fell in price by more than superior lines of wool.

• Prices for non-fleece wool types were also reported in "buyers favour" during the week.

• Chinese buyers dominated proceedings on the Australian auction floors once again. For the third consecutive month China purchased over 60% of the Australian wool clip. Indian interests overtook Italy as the second biggest customer.

• In Australia 87.6% of the 56,505 bale offering was sold. Included in the offering were 4,564 bales of crossbred wool of which 95.3% was sold. In New Zealand 86% of the 11,820 bale offering was sold.

• Auctions continue next week in New Zealand. South Africa and Australia where almost 80,000 bales will be on offer.

Antarctic cruise company adds a vessel

A CHILEAN based cruise company is incorporating a second vessel for this coming season's tours of Antarctica, beginning in Puerto Montt and concluding in Ushuaia, Argentina, with a call in Punta Arenas.

Diego Hurtado, C & O Tours CEO who visited Punta Arenas over the weekend with foreign tourist operators said the company for the last three years has been successfully operating Antarctic cruises with the Norwegian flagged *Nordnorge* which has a 350 passenger capacity and a crew of 70.

But for this coming season "we've chartered the twin vessel *Nordkapp*, since we anticipate a very promising summer". The vessels have an 11,500 tons displacement and are 123 metres long.

The normal fifteen days cruise leaves from Puerto Montt, sails along the Chilean channels, calls at Punta Arenas before heading to Antarctica and back to Ushuaia.

"Europeans, Americans, Japanese and Australians are our main clients for these cruises, but this year we are promoting additional, before or after, two to four days packages in the region," revealed Mr Hurtado.

The additional packages in-

clude Patagonia, Chile's lakes area, the central valley where most of Chilean wineries are located and even more distant destinations such as Macchu Picchu in Peru, Easter Island and Iguazu falls in Argentina.

With this in mind Mr Hurtado invited tourist operators from Europe and United States to tour Chilean Patagonia and the Torres del Paine Park, which will also be offered as a pre or post Antarctic cruise option.

"Actually it was a very interesting experience because many of the European and American tour operators believed Torres del Paine had a similar landscape to Antarctica," admitted Mr Hurtado who emphasised that "our intention is to convert those fifteen days in 18 - 20 days, consolidating the spirit of the Antarctic cruises."

"We're not really in the pleasure cruise business since most tourists consider them cultural experiences and those additional days we are promoting are targeted along that line," highlighted Mr. Hurtado.

"Those five days in Antarctica visiting scientific bases, rookeries, historic sites, sighting whales and other marine life really have an impact on visitors."

Punta cardio-surgery hub for south Chile

CHILEAN national health authorities confirmed Punta Arenas as a heart surgery and homodynamic hub with jurisdiction over the south of the country.

Although it's a long term objective conditioned to the new Magallanes Region hospital currently under construction, Jorge Flies, head of regional health services said the benefits are already evident.

"We are seeing an increase in the number of heart surgeries in Punta Arenas as well as in the formation of specialists such as cardiologists and homodynamic experts," said Dr Flies who emphasised the region. "is becoming a pole

of cardio-surgery development," one of six in the whole of Chile.

The decision also implies a change in official Chilean policy because these types of highly sophisticated treatment centres are usually located in densely populated areas and choosing Punta Arenas includes a territorial concept.

Until only recently all heart surgery patients from Magallanes were flown to Santiago.

"Another immediate impact of making Punta Arenas a regional heart surgery centre is that the medical population and support personnel will significantly increase plus all the equipment logistics needed," added Dr Flies.

Chile stabilises fuel prices for next 12 months

GASOLINE in Chile will remain below the 620 pesos per litre benchmark during the next ten months, following the government's decision to intervene in the fuel market to help mitigate the impact of hurricane Katrina and international crude prices.

September prospects indicated gasoline could have reached 750 pesos a litre, equivalent to 1,40 US dollars with similar rises for jet fuel, cooking kerosene and diesel.

The first stage of the new Chilean government fuel policy has been

to disengage the current import parity with Gulf of Mexico fuel prices, which means that government owned oil company ENAP will strictly accommodate prices to production costs.

In October the second stage of the plan is to create a new oil price stabilisation fund which will receive resources from the exceptional international value of copper.

The fund will be operational for twelve months and will be used if crude prices keep increasing.

Early baby rushed to Monte

BABY Ty Wilkinson rests in a neo-natal ward in Montevideo today, oblivious to the well co-ordinated, international effort which led to his safe arrival.

Born three months too early, Ty was evacuated from the Falklands on Wednesday morning. He is now with his parents Johan and Alistair in the British Hospital in Montevideo and reported to be doing well.

His young life began at Stanley's King Edward VII Memorial Hospital (KEMH): Johan delivered her son at around 10.30 on Tuesday evening after only the second trimester of her pregnancy. He weighed in at just 1.2 kilograms.

The KEMH does not have the facilities to care for premature babies which is why Ty was flown to Uruguay. Within minutes of his birth he was moved into an incubator where Dr Tony Rocke and theatre technician Eric Black worked to stabilise him and prepare him for medical evacuation. He was placed onto a ventilator.

In the early hours of Wednesday morning, Ty, his parents and a team from the KEMH were col-

lected by the British Forces Search and Rescue team's Sea King helicopter. They were flown to Mount Pleasant where they boarded a waiting VC-10 aircraft for the flight to Montevideo, along with Wing Commander Tim Webster and Flt Lt Tess King from the British Forces medical centre.

Yesterday, Flt Lt King said the two and a half-hour flight to Montevideo went "very well."

She explained, "We were there to look after Jo primarily - we left Ty in the capable hands of Tony. We were there in case things took a turn for the worse which, thankfully, they didn't."

She added, "Overall, we're very happy with how it all turned out, and a big thank you must go to all involved."

Chief Medical Officer, Dr Roger Diggle agreed, saying Ty's treatment and evacuation went "remarkably smoothly" and "all our training and preparation for aeromedical transfers paid off."

He described the Royal Air Force as "brilliant" in that, "...they were prepared to accom-

modate all our requests regarding timing of the helicopter's arrival at KEMH and the availability of the VC-10, etc."

Johan's sister, Andrea Clausen - whose husband, Gus, also made the journey to Montevideo in his role as hospital engineer - yesterday said mother and baby are doing well. "Ty is making considerable efforts to breathe unaided but is still having a little help. We hope he will be coping alone by Friday."

She cautiously added that, although it is "very early days", the outlook is "positive".

On behalf of Jo and Alistair's families, Andrea thanked everyone who was involved in Ty's care, "...from the hospital staff to the military and the fire service who were there for the helicopter's landing in the middle of the night and the immigration team who organised Ty's passport."

She said the entire operation went, "...exactly as it should have - it was so well orchestrated, and everyone was, "...incredibly professional. We are all really grateful."

Unauthorised decoders are 'against the law'

IT IS illegal to bring unauthorised decoders into the Falkland Islands, the government's Chief Executive has reminded the public.

Chris Simpkins said it appears the passing of the Broadcasting Ordinance last year has led to some misunderstandings among residents "with regard to the legality of decoders brought into the Islands from South America," and he explained the present legal provisions.

It is an offence to bring unauthorised decoders into the country and Customs officers have the power to seize them. Mr Simpkins explained that an unauthorised decoder is one which has been imported for the purpose of receiving encrypted transmissions without the authority of the person making transmissions which it receives.

"Therefore people can import decoders if, for example, they can produce an agreement with or letter from the company making the transmissions which shows that the importer is authorised to use the decoder in the Falkland Islands."

He added, "It is unlawful to receive an encrypted broadcast and then re-broadcast it for receipt by other people without a licence from the government."

KTV have not been awarded a monopoly to re-broadcast TV programmes or a monopoly to provide satellite decoders, Mr Simpkins confirmed.

He added, "...the Attorney General will be happy to provide advice to anyone requiring further clarification."

Cathedral funeral services

THE funeral service for Falklands artist, Mike Peake, takes place in Christ Church Cathedral at 2.00pm this afternoon.

The funeral of the late Bob Stewart will be held on Monday, at 2.00pm at Christ Church Cathedral.

Southampton sails in

THE latest South Atlantic patrol ship, *HMS Southampton* is expected to arrive in the Falklands this month.

The Type 42 destroyer under Commander Rob Vitali spent time in war ravaged Sierra Leone before heading for the south Atlantic to replace *HMS Portland*.

After going through the Patagonian canals *HMS Portland*, which left the Falklands in August, is returning to England up the West coast of South America.

Waiting for junior

HIS EXCELLENCY the Governor has joined his wife Caroline in her native Holland to await the arrival of their first child.

All being well, the baby is due at the end of the month and Mr and Mrs Pearce are expected to remain overseas until the end of October.

In Mr Pearce's absence, the First Secretary, Miss Harriet Hall, has taken on the role of Acting Governor.

ON MY first day of work experience, I attended a meeting of the Police Committee where they discussed the issue of underage drinking.

While I listened to what the committee had to say, I was struck by the thought that progress could be made if only adults would talk to us adolescents. Some of the information given at the meeting was, in my view, incorrect and I think that by talking to us, you could definitely set a few facts straight. After all it's us you're trying to help.

We could help you understand more about the reasons why some choose to drink. It's all too easy to just blame peer pressure: most want to escape their problems at home and school and resort to drinking to stop being so unhappy.

We can set you straight on how young the youngest drinkers really are and what punishments might really work - such as not being allowed out of any adult's sight any day of the week. There's nothing more embarrassing than being picked up by parents, police officers or someone from Social Services after school and being escorted home.

It is easy to feel adults don't really have a clue about this and I'm not the only one who feels this way. If you just took the step of coming to us and talking the issues out, and listening to our views, I'm sure the majority of teenagers would co-operate.

Most of our views are the same: change the laws on underage drinking and smoking - maybe by lowering or relaxing the age limit - and make certain adults are more open-minded in their approach to us. Most of all, remember we are human too, with our own feelings and thoughts.

I really do feel progress could be made just by taking us seriously. We're constantly being told to act in a more mature way but this is difficult when we're not treated in a mature way.

Most of all, I would ask adults to stop harping on about this issue: it is not actually the huge problem that people make out. The *minority* is into underage drinking - not the majority. If we were all to start doing it, then you could consider it a huge problem.

The level of generalisation at the meeting was another thing that bothered me. Not all of us drink, but this is not the message that is being put across. It leads me to feel, why bother not drinking when we are all just going to be shoved in with the lot that does drink?

I don't believe all the points brought up in the paper at the Police meeting were incorrect - but some certainly were. For instance, neither my peers nor I have ever seen a 10 year old drunk! Twelve year olds, yes, but not 10 year olds. Nor have any of us seen a group of kids the size of 60 out together in town. Fifteen or twenty, maybe, but you will not find 60 kids that all like each other enough to hang out together.

Maybe over-exaggeration is half the problem.

'Positive' entry into local meat market

ALL MEAT processed during the export season has been delivered to customers and the Falkland Islands Meat Company (FIMCo) has been paid. The Falkland Islands Development Board (FIDB) has heard.

At a meeting on Tuesday morning, Falkland Islands Development (FIDC) General Manager, Julian Morris told the board an earlier concern over a possible labelling problem on meat packaging has, to date, not materialised into a claim and General Manager of FIMCo, John Ferguson and Rodney Lee (a director) will be meeting customers at the Anuga trade show in Germany in October.

Sheep skins which were prepared at Sand Bay Abattoir missed a short-notice shipment on the *St Brendan* to Simunovic in Chile in August. Mr Morris said there is the possibility of a price reduction if the customer chooses to dispute the timing, which could result in a maximum loss of £43,000.

Councillor Stephen Luxton asked if there had been any investigation into getting better quality skins tanned and returned to the Falklands for retail. Mr Morris responded that risk finance had been approved for a container of skins to be sent for that purpose. He said he hoped to get a number of skins into Uruguay and have 400 returned to the Falklands for retail.

Meat market development

FIMCo's entry into the local beef market continues "positively" said Mr Morris, with volumes above forecast. "due to the mix of carcass con-

firmations." Financial Controller Bernadette Lang explained that sales are down due to some of the more valuable cuts not being available on poorer quality animals.

Mr Morris told the meeting further investment is needed to improve the quality of the meat on sale.

The total amount needed is £25,000, he said. This includes £10,000 for a delivery vehicle, £5,000 for multi decks for displaying meat in stores, £3,000 for labelling, and £7,000 for equipment and promotions. This would ensure that a constant temperature is maintained from the chiller to the customer, said Mr Morris.

He said the time to pay this money back, at a projected £1,000 per week in extra sales, would be 19 months. He added that the increased sales would cause only a marginal additional cost due to "increased efficiency."

The board approved the investment; member Stuart Wallace, who had declared an interest in this item because of his involvement in the retail sector, said he was "happy to support the project" because he thought it was "essential to support the rural community."

Councillor John Birmingham said he was "sure retailers will be happy" with the arrangement, however he downplayed this comment when Mr Wallace asked him to clarify why he had made such a statement, particularly after he had shown his support for the project.

FOGL's 2D survey grows by £7,000 km

FALKLAND Oil and Gas Limited (FOGL) has extended its 2D survey by a further 7,000 km.

This is in addition to an 8,000 km 2D survey which commenced in June.

The seismic survey vessel *GS/Admiral* has been commissioned by the company to undertake this programme.

FOGL says its objective is to define 20 drillable prospects from the leads identified when it completed a 9,450 km 2D seismic survey. The aim of the current 15,000 km programme is to "work up" the 50 key leads that have been previously identified and "identify drillable prospects".

The 15,000 km survey is split approximately 6,000 km over the 2002 licence area and 9,000 km over the 2004 licence area.

To date 4,560 km of this survey

has been recorded and the whole survey is expected to be completed late this year or early 2006. FOGL anticipates that the results of the survey will be processed in the first half of 2006.

Once the 15,000 km extension survey has been completed, FOGL intends to carry out a 3D seismic programme in the areas of highest prospectivity.

Commenting on the announcement, John Armstrong, Executive Chairman of FOGL, said, "We have undertaken a vast amount of seismic surveying since our initial public offering (IPO) and the results continue to be encouraging."

"This 2D seismic contract extension will further enable us to define the full potential of our assets and, together with the planned 3D survey, will enable us to identify our 20 drillable prospects."

Citation for Mount Pleasant-based winchman

AN AIRMAN based at Mount Pleasant has been honoured for his efforts to save a family swept into the North Sea in March.

Master Aircrew Nick Petch was the winchman of a Sea King helicopter involved in the dramatic rescue effort to save a Leeds mother and her two children, who were in Scarborough for a day trip.

According to the *Yorkshire Post*, Mr Petch's citation for the NCO's Air Force Cross says he performed feats of remarkable bravery during

the operation, as towering waves reached as high as the aircraft's rotor blades.

Lowered time and again into the raging sea, Master Aircrew Petch managed to pluck the woman and her son from the sea but, sadly, both died later in hospital.

The body of the woman's daughter has never been found.

Mr Petch is currently serving with the Search and Rescue crew based at Mount Pleasant.

Double identification for sheep

TO ASSIST farmers who find the present system of identifying sheep prior to movement, "onerous and not exact" the Department of Agriculture is looking at an identification system to replace the movement tags used at present.

The Senior Veterinary Officer Steve Pointing put a paper to the Agricultural Advisory Committee on Wednesday which recommended a system of double identification of sheep.

Mr Pointing said the double identification options could include a station and age mark as one form of identification, in addition to another approved unique identification system.

The current legislation for live-stock movement and identification was introduced in 2002 and complies with EU directives. Mr Pointing explained that although the Falkland Islands is not obliged to comply with EU legislation, "it is a condition of being able to export meat to the EU that we have a system of identification in place that allows the veterinary section of the Department of Agriculture to trace animals back to the farm of origin."

The EU has recently bought in

new legislation which comprehensively details the system of identification for sheep and goats that is expected to be introduced in all EU member states. Mr Pointing stressed that the new legislation does not apply to third countries such as the Falklands but added that it has been considered when making recommendations.

Director of Agriculture and Minerals Phyl Rendell, said the department was working to "get ahead of the EU" adding it would be preferable to have a system in place "before being told to have it in place."

Mr Pointing said identification would generally be applied on the farm of birth at lambmarking time and that initially the use of the identification would be voluntary, "but may become compulsory at a later date." He said the cost of the identification systems would be borne by the farmer.

Mike Summers, Chairman of the committee said the primary objective is that the EU requirements for dead sheep is met and suggested the issue be discussed in farmer groups. He added that ideally guidelines need to be in place, "before people are ordering tags for 2006."

THE wedding of Martin Howells and Tracy Young took place earlier in the year.

Martin is the son of Roger and Anne Howells of Stanley and Tracy is the daughter of Jimmy and Betty Lee of Lincoln. The couple were married at the Bailgate Methodist Church in Lincoln.

The groom's friend Adam Buckthorpe was best man and the bridesmaids were the bride's sister Carey, Martin's sister Melissa and Carly Hockney a family friend. They were also attended by two pageboys, Nathaniel McNarry, the groom's nephew, and Joshua Carey, the bride's nephew.

The bride looked stunning in a long gown of dark red satin and carried a spray of red and gold lilies and roses. The bridesmaids wore long gowns of gold satin and carried bouquets the same as the brides.

The groom and the other men in the wedding party looked very smart in long black jackets and trousers with red and gold waistcoats and gold cravats. The pageboys wore matching waistcoats and cravats with black trousers.

Twenty years on, the ozone hole is larger

TODAY is the twentieth anniversary of the discovery of the ozone hole over Antarctica.

To mark International Day for the Preservation of the Ozone Layer this year, scientists at British Antarctic Survey (BAS) commemorate their discovery of the Antarctic ozone hole and commend the historic international agreement that they believe will lead to its eventual recovery.

Jonathan Shanklin, one of the researchers who made the discovery says, "The 2005 hole is larger and deeper than the holes that formed when the discovery was made but the situation would be much worse if the Montreal Protocol had not come into force."

"This agreement shows us that global action by governments to stop the release of ozone depleting chemicals really can help society to successfully mitigate a global environmental problem."

He said large losses of Antarctic ozone are still being experienced each spring because CFCs and other chemicals live for a long time in

our atmosphere. "However, the ban ensures that we will see an improvement in the future. We now need to take similar actions to control greenhouse gasses, otherwise we will bequeath future generations a significantly different climate from that of today."

Covering an area of around 22 million square kilometres this year's hole is a little smaller than the record-breaking event in August 2003.

Measurements made during August and September at BAS' Halley and Rothera Research Stations reveal a 50% reduction on normal ozone levels over the base of the Antarctic Peninsula and the Weddell Sea, and a 20% reduction over the tip of South America and the Falkland Islands.

The increased ultra violet light reaching the surface poses a medical hazard to people living under the "hole" and without suitable protection people face the prospect of rapid sunburn and potentially more serious skin damage.

From Istanbul to the Falklands

MOVING from Istanbul, a city of over 13 million, to Stanley, a town of 2,500, is a big change for Nick Barrett, and his family.

Originally hailing from Bristol, Nick has taught in the UK at Chipping Sodbury (birthplace of JK Rowling), Bath and London. Besides teaching, Nick has worked for the BBC, where he met his wife Lesley, and as a software consultant for Capita Education Services in Bedford.

Nick and Lesley have three sons; Christopher is just starting his

A Levels at Peter Symonds College in Winchester. James is in Year 9 at Community School and Andrew who is in Year 5 at the Infant and Junior School.

Living overseas is not a new experience for the Barretts. Nick and Lesley, moved to Cairo soon after they were married and Christopher, was born there. They have also lived in Colombia as well as Turkey.

One of Nick's great heroes is Isambard Kingdom Brunel. In 1970 he had an early link with the Falklands as he watched the *SS Great Britain* come home to Bristol after her final voyage from Stanley. Along with tens of thousands of others he saw the ship pass under another of Brunel's great masterpieces, the Clifton Suspension Bridge. On the 150th Anniversary of the Great Western Railway he attended Brunel's Banquet which began on the *SS Great Britain*.

Nick enjoys sport, amateur dramas and computers.

Whilst living in the Falklands he hopes to take up golf, enjoy the amazing wildlife and travel in South America.

Engineering works cause flight delays

ENGINEERING work has been blamed for a number of delays with the airbridge from the UK to the Falklands in recent weeks.

This week, the flight due to arrive in the Falklands on Wednesday was delayed by a day and will now depart this morning.

Captain Jim Philippson of Media Ops at Mount Pleasant said the problems have essentially been an engineering issue, "...as engines on the airframe needed servicing. As you can imagine this is not a small feat on an airframe the size of a Boeing 747."

Initially, another airframe was

required to fill the service Air Atlanta is contracted to provide, which resulted in a delay.

Following on from this there was a further small delay on a northbound flight as it was required to transfer essential medical equipment for the casualty evacuation service.

Captain Philippson assured, "The Defence Transport and Movement Agency (DTMA) always maintains close contact with the contractors to ensure the safety and serviceability of the service."

Senior vet moves on to pastures new

SENIOR Veterinary Officer Steve Pointing is leaving the Department of Agriculture at the end of November. Director of Minerals and Agriculture Phyl Rendell told the Agriculture Advisory Committee on Wednesday.

He said Mr Pointing, who has been with the department for seven

years, has a very good opportunity to move to in the UK and she would be "very sorry to lose him," a sentiment echoed by the other committee members.

Chairman of the committee Mike Summers, added that Mr Pointing had done a "fine job" during his time in the Islands.

News from court this week

Nine months on, 'small domestic argument' leads to £250 fine

A STANLEY woman has been fined for assaulting her ex-husband on New Year's Day.

Cherilyn King had previously pleaded not guilty to charges of assault occasioning bodily harm and of common assault, however she pleaded guilty to the latter, lesser charge on Wednesday morning.

Before proceedings began, Prosecutor Ros Cheek explained the decision not to proceed with the charge of assault occasioning bodily harm, an explanation, she said, which was vital for "transparency of justice."

Ms King works for the courts and therefore a Senior Magistrate was flown from the UK to hear the case. As a result, the case has taken nine months to come to trial.

However, Ms Cheek explained that Ms King had made a late change in plea to the charge of common assault and the prosecution had concluded that bringing the alternative charge to trial "would not serve the best public interest".

She said although the suffering of the complainant caused by the delay in proceedings had to be considered, the cost and impact on both parties of a trial would not be in proportion to what would be achieved by a conviction.

In presenting the prosecution's summary of facts, Ms Cheek explained the case had a "difficult marital background" and relations were "poor" between Ms King and the complainant, her ex-husband, Lee Mitchell.

The incident was reported by Mr Mitchell at 5.12 pm on New Year's Day. Mr Mitchell told police that

he had been assaulted by Ms King, who had grabbed him around the neck and hit him a number of times. He believed that Ms King had been drinking.

There were two separate confrontations between the couple. The first occurred, Ms Cheek said, when Ms King went to the former family home to collect their son.

The house was empty as Mr Mitchell was visiting a neighbour at the time but the door was open and she entered the house; Mr Mitchell arrived soon after and challenged his ex-wife. The prosecution alleged Ms King lost control and "lashed out" at Mr Mitchell, punching him in the face and ears and grabbing him by the neck.

Ms King then left with her son only to return a short while later, to collect some of the boy's belongings. While she was gone, Mr Mitchell reported the assault to police then returned to his neighbour's home.

During the second visit to the former family home, the prosecution alleged, Ms King, upon finding the door open again, decided to enter and collect some CDs. Mr Mitchell came home and found Ms King taking the CDs.

Ms Cheek said the two accounts of what happened next differ. Ms King stated that Mr Mitchell swore at her, and pushed her, causing her to fall over in the hallway. She stated that she then hit him around the side of the face, enabling her to get away.

Mr Mitchell's account was, when he asked Ms King what she was doing, she threw the CDs, causing dam-

age as they struck a cabinet, and then began punching him again in the facial area and around the ears, shouting abuse.

Medical examinations on Mr Mitchell showed bruising above the left ear drum, superficial abrasions to the left side of the chin, the right ear and the right side of the neck, and bruising to both lips and the neck. The abrasions, Ms Cheek reported, were all described as "...superficial, consistent with fingernail marks, and the bruising to the neck was described as consistent with pressure from a finger or thumb."

Further examination of the left ear by an ear, nose and throat specialist (ENT) due to a suspected perforation of the eardrum revealed a blood clot consistent with such perforation.

In court on Wednesday, Ms King was represented by UK counsel Stephen McNally. He said the couple had been through "twelve months of disharmony" leading up to the incident because "both parties cared so much for their son".

He reminded the court that the incident had taken place during the "festive period", a time when "emotions and sensitivities are magnified." He said his client accepts what she did was wrong: "she overreacted and is sorry for it."

Mr McNally disagreed with the prosecution's allegation that Ms King assaulted her ex-husband twice and said instead only one physical confrontation occurred. He said there was no independent evidence to support the allegation that any injury had been caused during the

first exchange between the two parties.

He cited a witness statement from someone who had been at Mr Mitchell's neighbour's house. The person stated that when Mr Mitchell returned to his neighbour's after the first incident, he made no reference to an assault.

With regard to the second confrontation, Mr McNally said his client admits to reacting physically and for this she has "expressed remorse and concern."

He described Mr Mitchell's injuries as "unpleasant" but "minor" and added that when Mr Mitchell was examined by the ENT specialist two weeks later, there was no evidence remaining of the injury to his ear.

Mr McNally described Ms King as a person of "good character" whose "good name has been tarnished by this incident." He said his client considered her actions to be, to a degree, in self-defence.

In sentencing, Senior Magistrate Roger Bird described the incident as, "in essence, a small domestic argument that went wrong." However he added that violence in any domestic argument is not acceptable: "whether man against woman or woman against man."

He described the level of violence involved as "minor" and took account of the strain and worry caused by the time taken for the case to be dealt with.

However, he added that Ms King need not have waited so long if she had pleaded guilty to the lesser charge earlier on. He fined her £250 and awarded prosecution costs of £250.

'High level of provocation' leads Magistrate to call 'victim' to court

THE 'victim' of threatening behaviour has herself been asked to attend court to be bound over.

Trina Berntsen will be asked to agree to be bound over to keep the peace.

Barry O'Dean pleaded guilty on Tuesday to a public order offence after he lost his temper with Ms Berntsen in the Globe Tavern in July.

The court heard Mr O'Dean had been in the Globe with a female friend and Ms Berntsen threw a drink over the pair. Mr O'Dean took his friend outside to a taxi then re-entered the

bar and approached Ms Berntsen. A witness said he looked "pretty angry" and was swearing.

Mr O'Dean's defence counsel, Richard Marlor, read out a witness statement from someone who had been in the Globe that evening and said Ms Berntsen had been pointing and swearing at Mr O'Dean and his friend before throwing the drink on them. Mr Marlor said his client apologised for losing his temper and asked that the matter be considered minor, due to the fact he was sworn at all night.

He said Ms Berntsen had recently taken to calling Mr O'Dean in the early hours of the morning and said, "it was her actions that led to this minor altercation."

The Senior Magistrate said she accepted Mr O'Dean had been provoked by Ms Berntsen however, she said he made a mistake in going back into the Globe. She said she did not condone his behaviour but could see "the high level of provocation."

She gave Mr O'Dean a conditional discharge and bound him over for a year to the sum of £250. He

will also pay £70 prosecution costs. Ms Berntsen is likely to appear in court on September 21.

Disqualification shortened
Also in court on Wednesday was BFBS presenter Hermina Graham, who asked for the early return of her driver's licence. Mrs Graham lost her licence for two years approximately twelve months ago after she pleaded guilty to drink driving. The Senior Magistrate did not agree to return the licence immediately, but said Mrs Graham could have it back in four months' time.

Battle of Britain commemoration at St Cuthbert's

MOUNT Pleasant will commemorate the Battle of Britain at St Cuthbert's Church on Sunday and the Falkland Islands community is welcome to participate.

It is a special day for all members of the Royal Air Force (RAF) both old and new.

In 1940 gaining air superiority by Reichmarshal Goering's Luftwaffe was an essential precursor to the Nazi invasion of Britain, known as Operation Sealion.

With 2651 aircraft at his disposal Hitler saw it as a matter of course. The onslaught, which came in three phases began on July 10, 1940. The first phase saw the channel ports and shipping take the brunt, then the RAF airfields but on September 7, the focus

switched to London.

September 15 was the decisive day, which saw the turning point and survival of Britain. London was assaulted by 500 aircraft in two destructive daylight raids but the Luftwaffe's losses were too great. Hitler's mighty Luftwaffe, commanded by Reichmarshal Goering, began to wane and never truly recovered.

Attacks continued but Operation Sealion was aborted, the RAF had won.

Report on the East to West Falklands ferry link

A REPORT into coastal shipping in the Falklands, which Julian Morris described as "the best value I have seen in some time," has been prepared by Polarkonsult of Harstad, Norway.

The report has been circulated locally to those involved in Falkland Islands coastal shipping for their comments and will now go out for consultation.

The brief for the report, which cost £4,500, was to look at the basic configurations of a cargo vessel/ferry to provide local shipping services around the Falkland Islands and the types of infrastructure required, together with indicative costs.

It was hoped Polarkonsult's answers would give a guide on the size and type of vessel, an indication of possible capital and operating costs, availability of suitable vessels, whether cargo should be containerised or not and the possibility of converting *Tamar FI* to cope with larger vehicles.

In a presentation to the Board on Tuesday, Tim Cotter outlined some strategy and policy issues. He said the ship must be in the region of 40 - 50 metres long to cope with Falklands weather and maintain a regular service, adding that smaller vessels were discounted because of "operational limitations in bad weather."

Mr Cotter said that to gain any useful advantage over the current operation, a replacement vessel has to offer roll-on/roll-off (ro-ro). The report studied in detail the capability for trucks and heavier plant to be

carried. He said a weekly East - West link is only possible by either dropping the present individual farm delivery service to the West or not servicing the international trade to South America.

Mr Cotter said it is considered any ferry operation should be between New Haven and Port Howard with "optimum use being made of the road network to reduce shipping costs."

Options for converting *Tamar FI* and the availability of other vessels were considered by Polarkonsult and Mr Cotter reported that the reality is that there is no "off-the-shelf ship" that could serve as a ferry and have a seatruck handling capability to serve the Islands.

In conclusion, Mr Cotter said the report is not an "absolute solution," but should help to focus on a practical improved transport option that may cost less than the present coastal shipping arrangement.

He said to get the full benefit the vessel requires "a different configuration" which could potentially be achieved by converting the *Tamar*, buying second hand, modifying or commissioning a new build.

Because of the costs involved in setting up a regular ferry link with West Falkland one board member suggested that all options should be looked at including that of not having a ferry. Mr Morris responded by saying that the option of "sticking with what we have got" would leave the West "disadvantaged."

Bag trial to add value to wool products

A FALKLAND Islands Development Corporation (FIDC) initiative has resulted in bags to be used for packaging wool products being ordered for a trial this tourist season in the hope of adding value to produce.

Chairman of the Falkland Islands Development Board (FIDB), Mike Summers questioned the decision to go ahead and order the 5,000 bags at a cost of £3,000 when at the previous meeting the board had not agreed the proposed funding of £10,000 for the project.

FIDC General Manager, Julian Morris said that given his delegated authority and having sourced the bags in Chile for a much reduced sum he had taken the view that it was time to "press the button" and get the bags here for trial this season.

Mr Summers asked what exactly was being trialed saying that the process of adding value to a product would "surely be for the producer to add an extra 60p (the cost of one bag) to the product."

The 5,000 bags will be available for use with wool products, said Finance and Enterprise Manager Fiona Didlick, adding that the idea has been accepted that users may have to pay some of the production costs. She said the impact on pricing and the view of Falkland wool would be looked at with the possibility of a questionnaire being carried out among tourists.

Board member Stuart Wallace said the funding was a generous help to this sector of the community but added that it has to be "purely commercial from here."

Caution exercised in East / West shipping trial

DURING two recent trips to West Falkland General Manager Julian Morris said he had met "cautious support" for an East/West shipping link to be trialed this season.

Mr Morris met 20 farmers and business owners and their individual situations were discussed. He said, "A key issue of concern was wool shipments for the coming season. The idea of a trial East-West link during the coming summer season was canvassed, for which there was widespread support."

Follow-up meetings have been held with the Rural Business Association (RBA) who, he said, "whilst understandably wary, were broadly

cautiously supportive." Island Shipping Ltd (ISL) who were also reported to be "cautious" and "wary of disrupting their established service," are now appraising a schedule to see how this might work before discussing it with customers on the West and Islands.

Mr Morris said that a regular weekly service trial would mean that other visits would have to be traded and that the infrastructure and logistics would need to be looked into.

Board Member and RBA representative Ron Binnie, suggested that the RBA and FIDB put together the first proposal and work together on it.

Alternative to pub culture?

MY visit to the Craft Fair held in the Community School over the weekend brought to mind the need for a refreshment area as a necessity, rather than a nicety, that the idea has attracted in the past.

It was pleasing to see the Community School being used as the venue for a community event, and therefore living up to the ideals behind the original concept for the building and its name Falkland Islands Community School.

Perhaps it is worth reminding ourselves that the 14 million pounds, or three years capital expenditure, was voted in the early 1990s when society demanded a radical upgrade in facilities available to all people living within the Islands.

The school was to provide secondary education to students in full time education, the leisure centre to provide sports and recreation and the whole, including the public library, to provide a venue for community education through adult learning, evening classes, and out of school hours facilities for all ages, including community events, lectures, training courses and distance learning.

The area in front of the swimming pool windows and now taken up by gardens and a long footpath could be enclosed. A consortium of business partners from the private sector could be asked to tender for the construction and instal-

lation of equipment. The facility could be run by a local entrepreneur with experience in the food trade, to provide a menu for healthy eating to all users of the school and leisure centre. As to cost, if FIG are not willing to fund to total cost, then other avenues would be explored through corporate sponsorship, or even public fund raising. After all the original swimming pool fund was by public donation, and the Liberation Monument was similarly funded.

It is interesting to note that Stanley does not have a centre. The Community School refreshment area would serve this function by providing a place where people can relax with friends after exercise, find information about current events, meet and socialise away from alcohol, provide an informal venue for small gatherings and be another step towards offering alternatives to the pub culture.

This facility, like all parts of the Community School, needs to be managed by the Community School managers. With revenue either through rental or profit sharing arrangements going towards the costs of providing modern equipment, experienced tuition and staffing, we could offer lower fees for participation in sports, leisure and adult learning.

Islands retain special qualities

She added, "With your continued support we hope the Craft Fair will continue for many more years to come."



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
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

Le Sourire chooses Stanley for engine refit

THE French yacht *Le Sourire* left Stanley this week after under going an engine refit, opting to carry out the work in the Falklands, instead of bureaucracy-heavy South America.

Hugues Delignieres, owner of the yacht, arranged for the transport of two new engines from the UK to the Falklands so that Ian Bury could undertake the change over.

Mr Delignieres who has been visiting the Falkland Islands nearly every year since 1989 said Ian was very helpful and indeed seems to "like being helpful" to the yachting community.

He said with the uncertainty of shipment to South America and "problems with bureaucracy" it was considered a more reliable option to have the work done in the Falklands.

Mr Delignieres said the engines were working well on Monday and following a few checks on Tuesday, if the weather was favourable, they planned to leave Stanley, calling at Carcass Island and West Point Island to visit on their way past.



Mr Delignieres normally sails with his wife and two children, aged nine and eleven, however for the trip to the Falklands from Tierra Del Fuego, he took on two crew members; he will now make his

way back there to meet his family.

Mr Delignieres and his family will return to the Falklands in late October/ November on their way to South Georgia and Antarctica.

Police warn: watch out for new scam

A NEW email scam has hit Stanley in recent weeks.

Sgt Dave Roberts of the Royal Falkland Islands Police said he has been contacted by businesses in Stanley who have received emails from "people trying to book accommodation or buy items in the Falklands but who say they will overpay for it."

He says the scamsters are "... offering to forward around £4,000 from a Eurocard; the business is then to keep £1,000 to confirm the booking and the other £3,000 is to be sent on to an agent overseas."

Sgt Roberts said he understands the scam is also being used in central Europe.

He advised, "If anybody receives any of these emails or phone calls along these lines, give as little or no information about yourself as possible."

"If it arrives in an email form, please send it to me crib@police.gov.fk, including the header from the email."

Tips for parents: the four goals of misbehaviour

ATTENTION seeking, the struggle for power, revenge and displays of inadequacy are all the mistaken goals of children's behaviour

To determine the child's goal:

- Check your feelings and reaction.

- Check the child's response to your attempts to correct the behaviour.

Goal one: Attention seeking

Child's belief:

"I only have a piece if people constantly pay attention to me... I will use any means possible to ensure this"

Parents' feelings and reaction:

Feeling -: Annoyed
Reaction -: Push the child away (verbally and physically)

Child's response to parents' attempts to correct behaviour:

Stops temporarily. May start again or child finds another way to gain attention.

Alternatives:

- Ignore the misbehaviour BUT also reward positive behaviour by paying attention to useful behaviour.

- Put time aside for shared interests and be encouraging and supporting.

- Tell the child which behaviour is OK and acceptable

Goal 2: The struggle for power

Child's faulty belief: I only belong when I have control, when

I'm boss or when no-one can boss me."

Parent's feeling and reaction:

Feeling -: Angry, provoked, feeling like your authority is threatened. *Goal 2: The struggle for power*

Child's faulty belief:

"I only belong when I have control. Reaction -: Try to make the child do it - power struggle/battle develops or parents give in.

Child's response:

Child's behaviour intensifies - both stuck; or child gives in with defiant compliance i.e. slams door - does as told but finds something else to provoke parent.

Alternatives:

- Withdraw from fight - fighting or giving in only increases child's desire for power.

- Act, don't talk or shout. don't get into a debate; tell the child what is happening or not happening.

- Try to remain calm and friendly, set limits or boundaries, but give the child acceptable choices - in this way you provide a 'get out' clause for you and the child, it also still allows the child a degree of power.

- Be encouraging and positive about the child's accepted behaviour.

Goal 3: Revenge

Child's belief:

"I may not be able to keep you busy with me or defeat you, but I can get even and show you I exist."

"I only belong by hurting others as I feel hurt, I cannot be loved."

Parents' feelings and reaction:

Feeling -: hurt and angry, turns to punishment because of feeling "how could you do this to me?"

Reaction -: to get even.

Child's response:

Seeks further revenge, behaviour intensifies or chooses another weapon.

Alternatives:

- Avoid retaliation or punishment.

- Spend time building a trusting relationship, offer help to the child.

- Be calming, show and tell the child they are loved and wanted.

- Be clear it is the child's behaviour you don't like, not the child.

Goal 4: Display of inadequacy

Child's belief:

"Why try? I can never be good enough; I belong only by convincing others not to expect anything from me. I am helpless."

Parents' feelings and reaction:

Feeling -: Despair, hurt, helplessness "I give up!"

Reaction -: Agree, nothing can be done, no reprimand and no reaction.

Child's response:

Passive response: fails to respond to whatever is done. No improvement.

Alternatives:

- Be supportive, express faith in the child's ability.

- Encourage any positive response - no matter how small.

- Don't get hooked up into pity.

- Don't give up

When looking at the child's behaviour, try to work out whose problem it is i.e. the child's or the parents?

Use 'I' statements, be clear about the messages you give.

'I' statements avoid blame i.e. 'I feel angry when.... I don't like it when....' These will:

1. Encourage a willingness to change in parent and child.

2. Not blame

3. Not damage your relationship

'You' statements are accusing and disempowering, i.e. 'You are ungrateful'; 'You are.....for getting into trouble'

It becomes a shared responsibility to make changes. The alternatives offered will reduce a child's need to misbehave because their beliefs will change and:

- a) They will feel they belong, are valued, are important to you

- b) Improve self-esteem/confidence for child and, hopefully, parent

- c) Shift the focus to the child's strengths and abilities and put the fun back into the relationship.

All these will help to allow your child to develop into a healthy, caring adult.

Quick and Easy Recipes for the Falkland Islands

Chargrilled chicken with spicy couscous

USE pre-cooked chargrilled chicken fillets for this quick and simple dish.

Ingredients

4oz couscous
1 ripe mango peeled and cut into one inch chunks
1 tablespoon lemon or lime juice
1x125g tub of tomato salsa
3 level tablespoons mango chutney

3 tablespoons orange juice
2 level tablespoons chopped fresh coriander
200 g pack of chargrilled chicken fillets.
Lime chunks and roughly chopped coriander to garnish

Method

Put the couscous in a large bowl and pour over ½ pint of boiling

water. Season and leave to stand for 15 minutes.

Put the mango on a plate and sprinkle with the lemon or lime juice.

Mix together the tomato salsa, mango chutney, orange juice and coriander.

Drain the couscous if necessary, stir and check the seasoning. Turn on to a large serving dish and arrange

the chicken and mango on top.

Just before serving garnish with the lime chunks and chopped coriander.

Serves 4

Preparation time: 15 minutes (plus 15 minutes soaking).

Approximately 300 calories per serving, (9g fat, 39g carbohydrate).

Wool report - week ending September 7

by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices fell markedly at sales in Australia and New Zealand last week. As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide", prices were down by between 5 and 9 pence per kilogram clean at the finer end of the micron spectrum and by between 1 and 3 p/kg clean at the broader end.

Currency exchange rates, hurricane Katrina in the USA, Chinese difficulties with the European Union over textile quotas and general global economic conditions were all put forward as factors contributing to the slide in wool prices over recent weeks and indeed, over the last 12 to 24 months. Wool prices are reported to be at their lowest levels since August 2000. They are stated as being at levels were "specialist growers cannot make money" (Wool Record Weekly).

Prices for skirtings and oddments slipped in line with fleece wool types, however stylish lots with low vegetable matter held in value a little better than poorer offerings.

Almost 20% of the Australian catalogue was not sold while a further 5% was withdrawn from sale prior to its commencement.

In Australia 81% of the 52,740 bale offering was sold. Included in the offering were 3,777 bales of crossbred wool of which 89% was sold.

Auctions continue next week in New Zealand. South Africa and Australia where almost 90,000 bales of wool will be on offer.

Surging oil prices force air industry to raise fares

ANTICIPATING huge losses because of soaring fuel prices. Latinamerican and United States airlines have began raising fares in their regional flights.

Lan Chile, Avianca and Taca have also increased international fares and in the US, on average air tickets are costing an additional 90 US dollars.

The International Air Transport Association, (IATA), estimates air company losses could reach SUS7.4 billion in 2005, while the airlines association in the United States is estimating losses of ten billion US dollars at current fuel prices.

Next week a delegation of US airlines will be visiting Congress to request a temporary suspension of the air fuel tax which could repre-

sent a 600 million US dollar savings in the last quarter of this year.

IATA's CEO Giovanni Bisignani said the 7.4 billion is 1.4 billion above the original estimate and is a direct consequence of the latest escalation of fuel prices because of Hurricane Katrina.

IATA said the estimate was based on an average barrel price of SUS57 for the whole of 2005, while the May estimate was calculated with an average barrel of SUS47.

"Once again the increase in oil prices is impeding the industry's return to profitability," emphasised Mr Bisignani during a presentation in Washington DC.

For each US dollar increase in the price of crude, air transport costs globally surge an estimated

one billion US dollars, thus "cost reductions and increase in productivity have never been so vital for the industry".

Meantime in Brazil, Folha de Sao Paulo published a report based on judicial sources indicating that Brazilian flag carrier Varig will fire 13% of its staff and split the company in two. Varig has accumulated losses of 3.3 billion US dollars and in 2004 lost another 270 million US dollars.

Apparently one of the companies will absorb the whole debt while the other will be streamlined and auctioned, thus opening the possibility of ending 2005 balanced.

On September 24 Varig creditors will meet to decide on the proposal

THE Vigo Cooperative of Vessel owners has approved the presentation of the "Rockcod Project", two years of scientific research on the commercial potential for rockcod, a bycatch in the Falkland Islands and South Atlantic fisheries.

According to *Europa Press* the survey was done in the framework of a Research and Technological Development Program sponsored and financed by the European Union.

Rockcod cooked in different ways underwent several tasting trials by Spanish experts in Vigo and was most successful. "The presentation surpassed all expectations," said Edelmiro Ulloa, technical secretary of the cooperative. The experimental 80 tons which were introduced originally to the market a few months ago have now turned into 800 with the main markets in Asturias, Cantabria and several Baltic countries. Prices are also considered accessible which has made market access more feasible.

However this is not the case in Galicia where fisheries plants do not work with this species and therefore limits its access.

"What's important is that there are by catches which can be recovered," such is the case with rockcod and this, "should help look into other species currently discarded that could also become commercial alternatives," said Mr Ulloa.

Argentine veterans protest in downtown Buenos Aires

DEMANDING compensation for past military services, a group of 30 Argentine veterans of the Falklands war protested at the main offices of the Argentine government agency managing health-care programmes for pensioners, in downtown Buenos Aires.

The veterans claim the Argentine government has refused them "historic compensation" and blamed officials for the recent death of a veteran in the northern province of Chaco.

Protestors are demanding immediate payment of 250,000 pesos

(approx \$85,000 US) each in response to the government's announcement in March that it was considering cutting compensations.

Interior Minister Anibal Fernandez said it is impossible to meet the demands of the group, which he faults for failing to join the talks the government has been conducting for a year with most of the other veterans.

"We are saying it is impossible right now," Fernandez told local television.

Paying 20,000 beneficiaries what the veterans are demanding

would cost the government 1.7 million US dollars, he added.

Fernandez pointed out that President Nestor Kirchner's government has raised the veterans' monthly pension by 430 pesos (147 US dollars) to 1,170 pesos (400 US dollars), plus family allowances and school supplies.

Fernandez also stressed that the recent death of Falklands' veteran Juan Argentino Robledo was not due to lack of medical care, as the deceased's comrades allege, but because of "a pathology problem that could not be solved."



Stand-off in East Stanley

A STAND-OFF that lasted just over two hours yesterday afternoon ended peacefully.

Police attended an address in East Stanley just before 1pm where they discovered a juvenile had barricaded himself in to a room and was reported to have "bladed articles" with him.

Back-up was called in and a wide area surrounding the house was cordoned off.

As a precaution, the fire brigade, an ambulance and medics attended the scene and a number of off-duty police officers were called in to man the cordons.

Shortly after 1.15pm, police were seen to don protective vests, and shields were taken into the house.

When *Penguin News* spoke to Inspector Len McGill at around 2pm, he confirmed one juvenile was involved and described the situation as, "...a waiting game."

At around 3pm, the wait ended when police and fire personnel were seen carrying a person from the house and into a waiting police vehicle.

Police negotiator, DS Jonathan Butler had been speaking to the

young man, with the assistance. Inspector McGill said, "of various personnel, as the situation dictated."

He said no one had been hurt in the incident.

Reflecting on the afternoon's events, Inspector McGill said the incident had unfolded well. "The response of the fire and other emergency services was excellent.



"It shows how well we can work together with the other services. Thankfully, in the end, no one else was needed."

The juvenile was taken to hospital and the incident is now under investigation.

He added, "Our principal method is to contain and negotiate. This proved to be successful on this occasion."

Rig unavailability delays Desire's drilling

DESIRE Petroleum, the company that had hopes of commencing exploratory drilling in Falklands waters within the next six months, has been unable to secure a rig.

In a letter to Desire shareholders, Chairman Dr Colin Phipps yesterday said increased oil prices have pushed up the price of rig rentals and current suitable rig availability has reduced to "almost zero" and is likely to have worsened further as a result of Hurricane Katrina.

When Desire conducted a survey of rig availability at the end of 2004, of the ten companies contacted, seven expected to have a suitable drilling unit available.

However, Dr Phipps reported, following discussions with the rig contractors who replied to the tender in March, it emerged that only one suitable rig was available.

"Despite lengthy negotiations with the owners of this rig, the Group was unable to agree an acceptable contract for drilling in

the Falklands." Therefore, he said, the current situation as regards drilling in 2005 or 2006 is unclear but Peak Well Management, the Group's drilling consultants, "continuously monitor world-wide rig availability on the Group's behalf."

Dr Phipps told shareholders the world-wide shortage in rigs has arisen because of the lack of new rig builds in recent years, coupled with the sharp increase in oil prices.

"In particular, many rigs are being used to appraise and develop fields previously considered uncommercial, in addition to the world-wide increase in exploration drilling.

"This has led many companies to enter into long-term rig contracts which tie up rigs for up to three years. However, this situation has occurred before and, in the past, has led to the building of new rigs, a process already underway now."

In addition, he said, many

companies that have entered into long-term contracts, as in the past, may not be successful in their drilling campaigns and will have to seek other companies to fulfil their contract obligations.

"It is not surprising that drilling companies are reluctant to undertake a three-well drilling programme in a remote location, such as the North Falkland Basin, when there is such high demand in their core drilling areas and Desire does not have the resources or programme to take a long-term contract; however the rig market is often subject to quite rapid changes.

"Accordingly, as the market stabilises, rig availability may well improve in 2006."

In the meantime, he said, Desire has pressed ahead with its drilling preparations "in order to be ready to drill as soon as a rig becomes available" and is also considering other ways of securing a rig.

THE SECOND premature Falkland Islands baby to be born this month is resting in hospital in Santiago.

Tanya McCallum and Jimmy Curtis welcomed their son, Calvin Christopher, ten weeks early. He weighed 1.262kgs.

Tanya went into early labour at the weekend and, on Sunday evening, was flown by helicopter to Mount Pleasant where she was moved to an air ambulance for the flight to Clinica Alemana hospital in Santiago.

Calvin was born on Monday evening. His grandmother, Elaine Jaffray, yesterday reported, "Tanya is doing very well and Calvin is doing as well as we can hope for at the moment." She said the baby is breathing for himself most of the time and is being fed through an intravenous drip.

Elaine added, "I just want to say thanks to everyone who has helped us and wished us well, the support has been amazing."

Calvin was the second Falkland Islands baby born prematurely this month. Ty Wilkinson was born three months early on Tuesday last week. He remains in the British Hospital in Montevideo with his parents Johan and Alistair Wilkinson.

His aunt, Andrea Clausen, said yesterday Ty is now stable and breathing for himself. "His vital statistics are all normal and he is sleeping lots, trying to catch up after a first, rather trying week."

Andrea said Jo and Ali, along with all the family, would like to thank everyone for their kind thoughts and words: "They are very much appreciated by us all."

She added, "It has been very much a roller-coaster this week - but hopefully things will remain stable from here on in - we just don't know what to expect."

Last LegCo meeting

THE last meeting of the current Legislative Council takes place this morning. The council is expected to be dissolved some time in October, in anticipation of an election in November.

The meeting will begin at 10.30am in the Court and Council Chamber and any member of the public wishing to attend should be seated by 10.20am.

SPRING has sprung Falklands style. Naturally the appearance of the first crocuses and the heavy heads of the daffodils about to burst into bloom are the more obvious signs that the growing season is upon us, however there is nothing like the smell of grass burning in the air for Islanders to know that a new farming cycle has officially begun.

On Friday evening, following a couple of typically dry, windy, spring days, the air was tinged with smoke; those new to the Falklands may have wondered what was happening - certainly Mount Pleasant was treated to the smell of spring just on dusk.

While those who abhor the age-old tradition of burning off the dead white grass to allow new shoots an early growth spurt are throwing their hands up in despair, mourning the loss of birds nests and promulgating the virtues of rotational grazing and flail mowing as preferred options for pasture improvement, there is no denying that in the right place - and at the right time - a spring burn is beneficial.

Most farmers are conservationists at heart and protect the wildlife on their land but there is often a point reached where white grass grows so thick around deep ditches that sheep cannot make their way safely through and become cast in the bogs - later in the season the ditch can become a perfect trap for lambs to fall into. This is one situation where 'dropping a match' is a quick fix and will produce some tasty new grass when the animals need it most, coming out of the winter.

I spent Saturday clambering around such bogs helping to burn some areas where the white grass had become so thick and heavy it was preventing new growth underneath. I did spare a thought for the loss of some small birds nests but consoled myself with the thought that there are plenty of alternatives for them to build new ones and birds are resilient creatures, it would seem, if the abundance of turkey vultures and johnny rooks are anything to go by.

On the subject of these rogue birds, the level of protection they have enjoyed in recent years has resulted in them multiplying to such an extent that they have once again become a real concern for some farmers. Johnny rooks, rarely seen on East Falkland ten years ago, are now patrolling in bigger groups than you find outside Michele's Cafe on a Friday night, and causing more hassle. So bad in fact, I've heard reports of large numbers of hoggetts with holes picked through their wool and into the flesh on their backs, and concerns that lambs have been born and carried off - dead or alive - are common.

Thirty years ago farm employees supplemented their income with 'bounty' money by disposing of turkeys, caranchos and geese - the latter because of the sheer amount of grass they eat. There were so many of these birds that farmers were prepared to pay what was considered good money to see the numbers reduced. There must have been a considerable threat to flocks because those guys were not renowned for just giving money away.

Nowadays the Camp's human population is more depleted than the feathered and many residents are involved in tourism in one form or another - that in itself is a form of protection for the 'photogenic' birds that are less than friendly towards sheep.

In addition, licenses have to be obtained for both burning the Camp and shooting certain birds and, while admittedly I think the Department of Agriculture has the date right for burning (license required after September 15), it does seem a shame that farmers have to wade through red tape to ensure they are caring for their flocks 'legally'.

And therein lies my point. People in Camp are not blood thirsty pyromaniacs hell bent on wiping out wildlife and barbecuing the Falklands. These people live in the Camp because it is their chosen home and, for many, being in Camp is a vocation. They're not exactly going to be eager, for lack of a better cliché, to foul their own nests are they?

And on that note, having put my matches away, I must get my 'posh frock' out, ready for tonight's Conservation Ball.

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News from the Public meeting

Broadband for Stanley by Christmas

A PRESENTATION by Cable and Wireless, on improvements to telecommunications planned to begin this year, formed the basis of the final public meeting of the current council.

The meeting was chaired by Councillor John Birmingham.

Mr Rick Hall, General Manager of Cable and Wireless, gave a PowerPoint presentation about the new services planned for Stanley and Mount Pleasant and the improvements to be made to the Camp system.

Mr Hall said the Softswitch system will allow broadband internet access and a number of Magic Touch features, including caller ID and 1471. Broadband is hoped to be in place by Christmas. A partial replacement of the Camp telephone system will be used to lengthen its life until 2007, in the hope that a new alternative will be invented to replace it.

Councillor Norma Edwards asked Mr Hall if he could realistically foresee Camp having a replacement by 2007. He responded that as technology is constantly improving, it was likely. He said his concern would be if Cable and Wireless implemented a new system now, it would soon be obsolete and, therefore a waste.

Dr Barry Elsby, who lives just outside Stanley, asked why he had to pay the same price for his phone service as Stanley residents when

it was of an inferior standard. Mr Hall said Cable and Wireless hoped to adapt its billing system to offer a better deal to Camp customers. He said the idea of an unlimited dial up option had been explored, however this would not be feasible as some customers would stay connected constantly and clog the system.

Mr Hall also told the meeting about plans for the GSM cellular phone network. He said the service would cover Stanley and Mount Pleasant and most of the road in between, possibly reaching as far as Goose Green.

He said prices for national calls and SMS text messaging would be similar to the rates charged by Orange in the UK. He added that international calls will be more expensive than the Orange price however they will be cheaper than the fixed price for calling from land lines.

He said Cable and Wireless hopes international roaming should be available in future, however a firm date is not yet known.

Mr Hall addressed the perceived health risks relating to mobile phone masts and said the recommended safety distance from masts is 42 inches. He said the levels of radio signals from the Stanley stations is much less than the UK, with only one network in place, compared to four in the UK.

Falklands/Argentine relations have 'gone backwards'

RELATIONS with Argentina have "deteriorated" during this council's four year term.

That was the judgement given by councillors at the public meeting when asked if any progress had been made.

Councillor Mike Summers said not only has there been a deterioration in the relationship between the Falkland Islands and Argentine governments but between the British and Argentine governments.

He said the Argentine government's actions over the past few years have been "well documented" and have meant the relationship has "gone slightly backwards" however it had caused little more than a "nuisance" to Islanders.

When asked by a member of the public if Argentina had fulfilled any of their agreed obligations required under the July 1999 Joint Statement, Councillor Norma Edwards said, "No, nothing at all."

In response to another query, Councillor Summers said no plans have been taken forward by Argentin

tina for the official inauguration of the Memorial at Darwin.

A number of other topics were briefly discussed at the meeting.

Councillors were asked if part time government employees are required to pay 5% pension contributions in the same way full time employees do. Councillor Birmingham said he would look into this.

Another member of the public questioned councillors about a lack of discipline and problems with bullying at the Community School. Councillor Cheek said the subject is to be discussed at the next meeting of the Education Board.

The "deplorable" way graves are back filled in Stanley cemetery was also raised at the meeting. A member of the public said people had observed trucks backing up and "un-ceremoniously" dumping of tonnes of dirt into graves.

Councillor Birmingham agreed this showed "a level of disrespect" and the panel agreed something should be done about it.

ExCo statement expected after FIG/Forbes ruling

A STATEMENT is expected from councillors next week, indicating what, if any, further action the government plans to take in its legal wranglings with Gordon Forbes Construction Ltd.

In court late last week, Judge Christopher Purchase's judgement revealed that the government was refused leave to appeal on their ap-

plication under Section 69.

On Tuesday evening Councillor Birmingham said Executive Council would be discussing the "whole case" at its meeting (held yesterday) and would then make a press statement.

He added, "When it all comes out, the public will understand all the decisions and background."

No piggin' smoking at The Trough

A DECISION to ban smoking in Stanley's popular late night venue The Trough, home of the Fighting Pig Band has had a mixed reception.

The decision was taken, a band spokesperson said, in the interests of "the health and preferences of the majority of band members, customers who do not smoke, and those potential customers who have told the band they would love to go to The Trough but do not attend because they would not be able to tolerate the usual smoky atmosphere."

They said it was not a decision taken lightly adding, "one of our band members still smokes, and we realise that a lot of people enjoy a cigarette."

They said however, that many smokers have commented that it is a much better atmosphere within The Trough when people only smoke outside the building.

The Trough was in a much better condition, the spokesperson said, than it would have been had smoking been permitted within the building after the first non-smoking gig last Saturday. They added that normally at least a dozen or more cigarette ends are stubbed out in the carpets, "...and some people have complained about either being burned or having had their clothes burned by cigarettes whilst dancing or moving about."

While these may seem good reasons, it's not the most important, according to the spokesperson: "The main reason for banning

smoking in The Trough at all future functions is based on health grounds. Of course we welcome both smokers and non-smokers, however we only permit smoking outside the Trough building."

One person who is "not happy" about the ban is lead guitarist and vocalist Gerard (Fred) Robson.

Gerard said the decision was made in his absence and added that there was "no compromise."

One person who attended The Trough on Saturday told *Penguin News* they felt it might be a good idea to have no smoking signs near the entrance so that smokers are aware of the new policy before they pay their £4 entrance fee.

Several smoking Trough-goers have said they are sympathetic to the non smoking members of the band but thought that a no-smoking area would have been better.

Visiting drummer

The Fighting Pig Band has confirmed the visit of multi-percussionist and drummer Pete Lockett from December 7-13 for 'gigs with the Pigs.'

It is also hoped that Pete will host a drummers'/percussionists' workshop whilst in the Islands. Pete has played for an impressive list of musicians including: Björk, Texas, Daniel Bedingfield, Ronan Keating and many more.

The Shackleton Fund is funding the flight to the Falklands for Pete while the Fighting Pig Band will pay his professional fees and other costs that might occur in the Islands.

Court news

Fight over case of beer leads to court

THREE men have appeared in court after an incident at Flat 9, Jersey Road on September 18.

In court on Thursday, Christopher Hawksworth (29) entered no plea to charges of affray, resisting arrest and causing criminal damage, while Adrian Minnell (36) also entered no plea to a charge of resisting arrest. They will both reappear in court on October 5, when the Senior Magistrate, Mrs Clare Faulds, said she hoped to hear a plea.

The third man, Murray Wade Rigs, a marine scientist technician with the seismic survey vessel *GSI Admiral*, entered a plea of guilty to a charge of affray.

The court heard how a fight had broken outside the home of Trina Berntsen at 11.25pm on September 18 after a group went there for a party after drinking at the Globe Tavern.

Mr Rigs (42) had taken excep-

tion to Mr Hawksworth and Minnell taking a case of beer from the party when they left, as he felt he had paid towards it. A fight broke out between the three men and the police were called.

Mrs Faulds said she had taken into consideration Mr Rigs' cooperation with the police and early guilty plea and that he had taken full responsibility for his actions. He was fined £75 and ordered to pay £70 prosecution costs.

Bound over

On Tuesday, Trina Berntsen was bound over to keep the peace for one year following her involvement in an incident in the Globe Tavern.

On July 11 Ms Berntsen had been abusive and used threatening words towards Barry O'Dean.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said Ms Berntsen should take it as a formal warning that her behaviour is unacceptable and is considered a breach of the peace.

Quark and Freiremar pay prosecution costs

FISHING Companies Quark Ltd and Freiremar AS were ordered to pay prosecution costs totalling £19,638 in court last Friday.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said the penalties had been "imposed equally" between the two fishing companies who were fined

for exceeding licence quotas and that costs would be applied on the same basis, with additional costs borne by Quark for the *Jacqueline* offences.

Therefore Freiremar is to pay £6,365 and Quark will pay the balance of £13,273.

A mountain-top mission for Charlie Company

THE wild reputation of the South Atlantic did nothing to dissuade the new Roulement Infantry Company (RIC) from carrying out a week long patrol of wintery South Georgia.

The seven-man patrol from Charlie Company of the first Battalion the King's Own Scottish Borderers arrived back in the Falklands last week from the mission which aimed to test the capabilities of the company in trying Antarctic conditions.

HMS Dumbarton Castle took the patrol, commanded by 2Lt Giles Barnett, across smooth seas in splendid weather towards the British Dependency, 800 miles South East of the Falklands.

Three days of sailing delivered the patrol to King Edward Point where they disembarked and, clad in arctic whites, snowshoes with ski poles in hand, they tabbed four kilometres across the mountains to Miviken, deemed a suitable place to spend the night.

A military spokesperson said the going across the mountain was tough for the relatively inexperienced patrol, "but they soon mastered the art of using snowshoes and picking the right line across the softer snow and were moving with speed and style."

The next morning was dedicated to testing radio communications back to the Falklands and watching the wildlife in this un-

spoilt Antarctic paradise. With comms established, the patrol then returned via the high mountain pass to Grytviiken where the soldiers were able to learn about the history of this small island and the whaling and sealing industries

traditionally associated with it.

The value of the exercise was stressed by the military spokesperson: "It, very importantly, proved that the RIC have the ability and capability of running patrols in the midwinter in a very

testing environment.

"They will have a further opportunity to hone these skills in future planned patrols in October and November of this year, and in the New Year with the incoming Alpha Company."

A PROPOSAL for improvements to the exercise facilities at Stanley Leisure Centre is to be discussed by councillors today.

A paper prepared by the Leisure Centre Manager, Mr Steve Dent, will ask Standing Finance Committee to provide funding for a number of new exercise machines and space to house them.

The machines facility in the Leisure Centre has had a steady decline in users over the past two years for a number of reasons including the rapid deterioration of the machines and the size of the room used to house them - the original use for this room was a storage cupboard.

The preferred option, according to Mr Dent, is to convert one of the Leisure Centre squash courts

and increase the number of machines on offer.

This would require investment of just under £45,000 which would be repaid in four years. This would allow for the purchase of two exercise bikes, two treadmills, two cross trainers, two rowers and a multigym and includes the funds required to refurbish the squash court.

In his paper, Mr Dent stresses the need for major change to keep the machines room a viable option. He adds, "The Leisure Centre and the hospital are currently undertaking a review of the exercise referral scheme and the re-development of the machines room with room for adaption will ensure that progress is made.

Two councillors at Fiji conference

FALKLANDS councillors have been overseas to represent the Islands at two Commonwealth Parliamentary Association (CPA) conferences in Fiji.

Councillors Ian Hansen and Richard Cockwell took part in the CPA plenary conference and small countries conference held early this month. Councillor Hansen told Falklands Radio this week the small countries conference - which includes any country with less than 400,000 people - was the one which "was more important to us."

He said topics sessions were held on "the impact of information technology on small countries, networking for development, fair trade for developing countries and the impact of natural disasters and global warming."

The two Falklands councillors also attended a regional meeting for the British Isles and the Mediterranean and the remainder of the time in Fiji involved plenary sessions which all the countries attended.

Councillor Hansen commented, "It was very interesting to talk to the other countries and provinces and to hear how they cope with the same problems we have.

"For instance, a lot of the small countries have the same problem we do with exporting because they are so far from anywhere."

He added, "It is always interesting to talk to people when the meetings have finished to hear how their governments are run and how the governments of some of the smaller places operate."

British rebuttal of sovereignty claims

THE British Government has officially rebutted remarks about the sovereignty of the Falkland Islands made by senior Argentine officials.

In response to remarks made by Nestor Kirchner, the Argentine president, and Foreign Minister Rafael Bielsa, the UK Mission to the UN provided statements which reiterated the "great importance" Britain attaches to the principle of self-determination.

"The elected representatives of the Falkland Islands once again ex-

pressed their own views clearly when they visited the United Nations for this year's debate in the UN Committee of 24. They asked the Committee to recognise that they, like any other people, were entitled to exercise the right of self-determination. They reiterated that the people of the Falkland Islands did not wish for any change in the status of the Islands.

"There can be no negotiations on the sovereignty of the Falkland Islands unless and until such time as the Islanders so wish."

Rig unavailability delays Desire's drilling

In particular, Dr Phipps said, Desire continues to receive approaches from companies interested in participating in the North Falkland Basin, "...and, although another farm-in partner is not required to finance the project, should a potential farminee have access to a rig it might be to the Group's advantage to reach an agreement with them. As a consequence, the Group continues to welcome such approaches."

On the plus side, Dr Phipps said,

the increase in the oil price means that Desire's drilling prospects, should they result in discoveries, are likely to be "twice as valuable as indicated in the Prospectus for the Placing and Open Offer" published in February 2005, in which a maximum oil price of \$30/barrel was assumed, even taking into account increasing costs. "It is particularly pleasing, therefore, that, as already announced, the Group has identified additional prospects in Tranches C and D and has acquired a 100% interest in Tranche F."

Falklands at TravelMart

She added that "general networking" is also valuable as it, "...brings to light interesting and useful information which will assist the Falklands tourism industry to target their marketing and advertising efforts.

"The most repeated comment for me over the week was that in

light of the terrorist threat around the world, South America is now viewed as the safe continent - so I stressed at each meeting that you don't really get much safer than the Falklands!"

Sally added that buyers from southern Europe felt their clients are slightly less adventurous than travellers from northern Europe (a relatively big market for Falklands tourism), "...and tend to require much more in depth information about their destination - something which we as an industry, with the support of the Tourist Board, can work on.

"It was also interesting to hear confirmation that it is the recent release of the film about Emperor penguins that has spurred a flurry of enquiries, and subsequent bookings, from the USA."

In a new move this year, International Tours and Travel Ltd was represented not only as a supplier, but also as a buyer. Agent Bruce Wilks had a full schedule of meetings with suppliers, "...enabling ITT to update ourselves on products available within South and Central America - crucial to be able to keep offering the best service within our outbound department, and ensure that we are using the best supplier in each country."

Despite major traffic congestion problems which meant that every transfer between the hotels and conference centre or any social event took almost double the time allocated, the event was extremely well hosted, Sally reported.

"The opening cocktail party was hosted in El Convento de los Descalzos, a beautiful convent dating back to the 17th century, with plenty of typical Peruvian music and dancing depicting the three natural regions of Peru.

"The closing dinner was held in the Real Felipe fortress dating back to 1747 built to defend the city from pirates who plundered the city in the 16th century."

Next year the show heads to Panama City.

Artist, musician and friend: a tribute to the late Mike Peake

BORN in Pontefract in Yorkshire, Arthur Peake sailed from Britain for the Falklands in 1959 at the age of 20, carrying a suitcase in one hand and a guitar in the other.

By the time he reached the Islands he had become known as Mike (although I'm reliably told that his mother continued to refer to him as 'Our Arthur' until she died.) But how did this change of name come about? Very soon after the ship sailed, a regular group gathered at the bar every night and this included two people named Arthur. Our own incomparable Harold Rowlands was part of this group and in the forthright and efficient manner that he became accustomed to, said simply, 'We can't have two Arthurs,' and turning to Arthur Peake said, "You will have to be Mike." So for the next 46 years he was known locally as Mike Peake.

Much later in life it is interesting to note that his son was not named Arthur – he was called Michael. He was also father to Bernadette and Alison and was a proud grandfather to Isaac, Cody and little Louie, who he was heading off to England to meet, when his untimely passing occurred.

Mike initially arrived in the Falklands to work as an electronics technician at the Radio Space Research Station (known locally as RSRS) on the site of the old Ionospheric Station on Davis Street East, which then was just about as far out of town as you wished to go. The building now houses the offices of Sullivan Shipping.

Mike first lodged with Mary Goodwin and her son Laurie – they also ran a dairy – before moving into five-star accommodation, a Nissan Hut at an area known as the German Camp. One of these Nissans can still be seen at the top of Philomel Hill.

It was not long before his musical talent was being appreciated by radio listeners all over the Falklands. He formed a small folk group called 'The Satellites' with another RSRS lad, Doughy Baker, and they soon recruited a vocalist, school teacher Ann Porteous who had recently arrived in the Islands. The trio recorded a series of 15 programmes and one of their songs was soon being sung on every sheep farm and all around Stanley: 'Freight train, freight train going so fast'....

Mike was what we call an 'educated' full back on the football field. Never a first teamer but always good enough for the second eleven, and typical of the guy, his distribution of the ball was excellent with pin-point passes. He could also throw a good dart.

On the stage at many an Amateur Dramatic Society production, Mike was in demand. He was a man who could take virtually any part he wanted and who can ever forget his performance as the old gardener in 'Arsenic and Old Lace'?

His working career continued in the Falklands when the European Space Research operation centre in Darmstadt was formed. A new satellite tracking station was built at the west end of Stanley harbour, known locally as ESRO and Mike worked there from 1967 until 1973 ending up as Station Manager. The high tower had a mas-

sive array of coloured lights which were a novelty in the Falklands and they could be seen for miles around.

At some stage during those years of ESRO, a No.1 best selling record in England was a recording by Desmond Decker and the Aces called "The Israelites". Someone listening to the record for the first time here on the crackly BBC World Service transmission misheard the title of the song, and very soon word swept through Stanley that Mike Peake had written a No 1 hit called the 'ESRO lights!'

On October 1, 1973 Mike joined the Post and Telecommunications Department of Government as a Technician. The P and T's headquarters was the radio station, where I then worked. Also under the auspices of the technicians was the old manual telephone exchange.

His technical knowledge was soon apparent. Our old turntables had no system which enabled us to monitor the record before it was ready to start, so often the last few grooves of the previous record would be heard – quite embarrassing. Mike soon installed a small monitor speaker system for each turntable that delighted all of us operators and budding disc jockeys at FIBS.

He was given the task of installing the new AEL transceivers that replaced the old R/T sets. He was proud to say that he had visited practically every Falklands settlement and island while on this mission.

I remember he started talking about computers long before most of us even knew the word existed. "Government will have to get moving on this and no-one is bothering," he would worriedly say. Appropriately in 1986 when the Computer Section was established it was

Mike who was appointed as the first Computer Coordinator. He continued to supervise the upgrading and enhancement of the system until he retired from the Public Service on September 1, 1999.

Sometimes when you walk into a pub there are people you hope not to meet, but you always wished, if you visited the Globe, that Mike might be there, because you could be sure of an absorbing and interesting debate with him on any subject you wished to raise. He was brilliant in conversation – but don't mention conservation – it was not his favourite topic.

I'm told that days after he first arrived in the Falklands, Mike vowed never to live anywhere else. He was passionate about the Islands and had an exceptional artistic talent to match this passion. With oils and varnish he had no equal – sometimes being able to produce a breath-taking landscape in just 30 minutes. Driving along he would suddenly shout "Stop!" His unbelievable quick eye for a possible picture would click into action. An old fence line and a piece of fading gorse bush would come alive when he got back home and got out his brushes.

Following his retirement he made many visits to Sea Lion Island and Carcass Island, capturing their mood and ruggedness in his paintings.

In ten, twenty, fifty and even one hundred years time, in places such as Port Louis where the Gildings have a remarkable collection, throughout Britain, Australia, New Zealand, Canada and who knows where else in the world, our future generations will point to a landscape on the wall and say, 'Mike Peake painted that' – his legend will live on and on.


A sweet gesture from new friends

I spent that Friday night in the Victory Bar on the receiving end of varying emotions from congratulations to, more commonly, envy, generally along the lines of people muttering, "lucky bugger" through forced smiles.

A couple of weeks later, I am standing on the tarmac at Mount Pleasant Airfield, sipping champagne and having my picture taken with Pippa Lang, the lucky lady chosen from thousands of applicants to accompany me on the trip - well, all right, chosen from two, but the competition was fierce.

After all the photos and our surely award-winning acting debut

We board the aircraft and I am given the jump seat in the cockpit for take off. While conducting this operation, the VC-10 often changes direction and it is fascinating to watch the Tornado

Our flight course took us from Mount Pleasant over the Sound and across West Falkland to Byron Heights. From there we went south and then turned and flew up the length of the Sound to San Carlos where we headed east for Stanley.

After the sorbet, main course, desert and coffee (and a drop more wine), we got our first glimpse of town. From such a height the capital looks tiny and it seems impossible that anywhere could be governed and run from such a small collection of buildings on the side of a hill.

We come around again and this time do a low fly past of the town at 500 feet. There is a great view from this height with the inevitable cries of, "I can see my house from here."

Then it is back to MPA and Pip is strapped into the jump seat as we

approach the runway, touch down and then take off again, all in one move. I swap places with Pip as we came in for the final landing and the end of what was an amazing flight.

From the friendliness of the crew, to the service of our waiter, the sight of the Tornados, to the excellent food prepared by the chefs from the Officer's Mess and In Flight catering, the whole experience was absolutely fantastic.

As civilians, Pippa and I were extremely lucky to have been given this unique opportunity to enjoy this very special flight and for that thanks must go to Hermina at BFBS, the Chief of Staff, Group Captain Moulds, the VC-10 crew, Sqn Ldr Spike Flynn, our guitarist Cpl Simon Chubb, and of course the chefs Cpl Jason Woollett and Flt Sgt Paul Phillips.

For a mere fiver, this experience was a complete bargain, so if BFBS are ever able to run a similar competition, I urge you to snap up the tickets as you will enjoy a flight you will never forget.

Up-to-date Islands in *Footprint* guide

A "MUCH improved and more accurate" entry on the Falkland Islands in the latest edition of the *South American Handbook* could benefit businesses, the Tourist Board hopes.

When staff of the Tourist Board saw the 2005 edition, (released in October 2004) they were surprised to find that some of the information was inaccurate and in some cases, years out of date.

"Also, there was such a lot of detail missing, and it didn't do justice to what a traveller could expect to find here in the Falklands," Director of Tourism Connie Stevens said.

So, after much communication with the publishers, they were able to get the changes made for this year's edition, "...which will hopefully benefit tourism service providers across the Islands."

The *Handbook* is a highly regarded guide for anyone travelling to South America and is one of few travel guides to include a reasonably comprehensive section on the Islands, although, Mrs Stevens, would like it to be better still.

"Having read the previous edition, I was amazed to find so much information missing and also to find inaccurate information, to the extent that there were businesses still listed that had ceased trading years ago.

"It wasn't just the fact that there were a number of services not listed, but it could have given the wrong impression to the prospective visitor as there is so much more available for the tourist than the *Handbook's* entry suggested."

A lengthy update was



provided to the publisher by the Tourist Board and many of these changes have now been incorporated into this year's guide.

The Tourist Board was also able to bring about an improvement in the initial contents section of the *Handbook*. In previous years editions, they noted, all countries represented by the *Handbook*, with the exception of the Falklands, were introduced by the inclusion of a small map in the front section, however, the Falklands simply received a mention, with no map to show the reader clearly where we are located.

Although space was tight, the publisher agreed to incorporate this for the Falklands, so in the 2006 edition, there is a map to clearly pinpoint where the Falkland Islands are located.

Mrs Stevens commented, "The *South American Handbook* is considered to be the main guide for travellers to this part of the world. The *Observer* calls this the 'Grandfather of all guidebooks'. Matthew Parris of *The Times*, simply calls it 'the Classic'. So it was particularly important that the correct information was published within it and that more aspects were included, to be able to whet the appetite of the prospective visitor with a more comprehensive Falklands entry."

This year many more businesses are benefiting from a mention in the guide, with 21 listed for the first time, many who have been around for some time, but were simply not mentioned in previous issues.

"There was the possibility that the last few editions could have made us look like a 'one horse town' as they did not reflect the range and variety of services available to the visitor.

"Now, anyone who buys this guidebook will get a better and more accurate account of what the Falklands have to offer and we hope it will encourage many more people to visit us."

Stamps carry work of Falklands artist

PAINTINGS used in the Falklands stamp issue to commemorate the 60th anniversary of the Allied Victory were from the brush of a former dentist in the Islands.

Gerald Roberts, 82, of Harbour House, Sherriffs Brae, was born in the Falklands at Hambledon house. His father, Captain David Roberts was the manager of the Falkland Islands Company at the time.

Paintings of ships with which his father was associated and which played a key role in establishing Antarctic bases for Britain are used as illustrations on the two £1 stamps. The same two vessels appear side by side on the third painting, which was used on the first day cover for the stamp issue.

Talking to John Thompson of the *Press and Journal* Mr Roberts said: "One of the boats was the *Fitzroy* and the other was the *William Scoresby*, a research ship studying whale migration which was converted to a minesweeper during the war.

"The *Fitzroy*, under Captain Keith Pitt, was sent on a secret operation to the Antarctic in 1943 to establish bases, and my father went along. The idea was to have bases to combat German surface raiders, one of whom who had captured the Norwegian whaling fleet down there."

Mr Roberts, a retired orthodontic consultant worked as a dentist in the Falklands from 1947 to 1950.

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
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Year 11s experience employment first-hand

FOR two weeks this month, Year 11 students from the Falkland Islands Community School invaded Stanley businesses and government departments for work experience.

Louise Taylor, the science and careers teacher, asked around town for employers to take on students. Eventually the replies came in and we had to apply for jobs we liked the look of.

After all the students had been through the interviewing process we had to wait again for acceptance letters (or refusals, in some cases).

Kim Buckettt headed to FIDC, where she spent time with many members of staff, looking at areas as varied as accounts and the abattoir. Of her time, Kim said, "I thought my work experience was great! Everyone at FIDC was really nice."

She added, "I went for the job there because I thought it would be interesting - and it was. However I think that for work experience we should go to one place for one week and another place the next; it would be good to see how different places work."

Danielle Greenough, Shaun May, Erica Berntsen and Lucas Berntsen all headed to the Department of Agriculture. Erica described her two weeks with the department as "fabulous", and added, "I don't want to go back to school!"

Shaun and Lucas were a little more understated; Shaun commented, "Working here at the Agriculture Department has been good"

He added, "I hope to do a job relating to agriculture when I've left school."

"Work experience is good: it gets you out of school and gives you a taste of work life."

Charlotte Middleton went to accountancy firm Wilkins Kennedy, an experience she said she had "enjoyed".

She said much of her time involved working with archives which she said was useful as she hopes to become an archivist when she leaves school.

Of the work experience programme she said, "I think that in a way it is a good idea and in a way it's not. If you already have a weekend job then you'll already know what work life is like and so won't need any more. But it is also good because it gives you more career choices and a taste of work life if you don't know what it's like already"

Karl Chaloner chose the Museum for his work experience. "...because I have always had an interest in history and hope to do a job that relates to history in the future"

"It's been really fun and interesting and I've done a lot of hard work."

Daniel Cant spent his time with Synergy Information Systems Ltd. He commented, "Synergy's been good. I've been working really hard, making networks, installing software and fixing people's computers."

Jane Goss worked at the library. She said it would be good to make work experience a bigger part of school life: "It would be good if we had a longer period of time away from school and in the workplace. Work experience is a good idea because it gives you more of an idea about work life."

Although the Department of Mineral Resources wasn't her first choice, Helen Davies said she enjoyed her placement

"The staff were pleasant and helped me out when I got stuck with the shredder! I am interested in office work so it was really good going there."

The remainder of the class had a variety of jobs: Lucas Biggs and Tristan Giudicelli-Smith went to the Falklands Brasserie, Lucinda Lowe, John Didlick, Andy Felton, and David Barton all tried out a variety of duties within PWD. Luci Butler went to the Seafish Chandlery, Gabi Ross went to Customs, Leif Middleton to Fisheries, Dion Robertson to Falklands Conservation and Ryan Buckettt and

Saul Zuvic worked at the Power Station, Carol Goss and April Petterson looked after children at Rugrats Nursery. Sam Davis spent her time with Cable and Wireless and Dana Morrison worked at The Wool Centre.

Ms Taylor said the point of work experience is to give students the opportunity to "...develop the skills that students learn at school that are essential in the workplace e.g. team work, communication skills and applying knowledge."

She added, "It gives the students the experience of writing a CV, writing a job application letter and having a real interview before they receive the job or not. Some of the jobs were well sought after so they also experienced the competitive side to it all."

"I think that all has gone very well; the students settled into their environments really well and, from the feedback that I have received, they have all worked hard. They have proven that teenagers can behave in a mature and sensible fashion."

They are a credit to the school."

Ms Taylor said the employers had been helpful and "...I was very pleased at the response I got, thanks go to all the employers who took on the children. Anyone who did not say yes this year, or was not contacted, but would like to take on work experience kids next time can contact me on the school number."

Ms Taylor said the school is considering changing the time of year work experience is held, "...and we're hoping that more opportunities will arise, eg taking children to work days, or a careers fair."

When asked what they thought would improve the work experience scheme most of the students had the same idea, as put by Karl Chaloner: "We should be paid, then it really would be a real taste of work life!"

As for me, I enjoyed my time here at *Penguin News*. I was kept working hard and did a lot of typing. I would like to thank Jenny, Sharon and especially Fran for putting up with me on a desk next to her!

And my suggestions for improving the work experience programme?

Being paid would be a really nice idea and perhaps getting businesses to be more encouraging about us having part-time jobs.



Fluoride and how to care for your teeth

AVAILABILITY of sufficient fluoride makes teeth more resistance to tooth decay and is especially beneficial in the developing teeth of children.

Where the fluoride content of the drinking water is less than 0.7 parts per million (700 micrograms per litre), daily use of fluoride tablets or drops is a suitable supplement for children. In the case of the Falkland Islands there is no fluoride in the tap water and therefore supplements such as fluoride drops or tablets are advisable for children up to 13 years of age. These products are available through the KEMH dental department. However, infants need not receive fluoride supplements until the age of 6 months.

People who are susceptible to decay or are medically compromised may be given additional protection by use of fluoride rinses or application of fluoride gels. Rinses may be used daily or

weekly, daily use of a less concentrated rinse is more effective than weekly use of a more concentrated one. When a child is using a fluoride rinse, extreme caution is necessary to prevent the child from swallowing any excess to avoid poisoning or dental fluorosis.

Teeth should be brushed twice a day after meals with a fluoride-containing toothpaste and also flossed. Brushing before bedtime is essential, even for babies and small children. Children should never be put to bed with a bottle (unless it contains plain water) or dummies dipped in anything.

Regular six month check-ups to the dentist are important to maintain healthy teeth.

Infant and junior school children are checked twice yearly (May and October) at school. FICS pupils have their dental checkups at the dental department.

Recipes for the Falkland Islands Pork with fruit

Ingredients

- 1 level tablespoon of chilli paste or harissa, or a chopped red chilli- whatever you can get hold of
- 4 tablespoons olive oil
- zest and juice of one large orange
- 4 pork chops
- 2 nectarines or peaches stoned and chopped

This may sound like an odd combination, but don't worry, any stoned fruit goes brilliantly with pork

Method

Put the chilli paste or harissa in a small bowl. Add the oil or-

ange zest and juice, then season well with salt and freshly ground black pepper. Drizzle the mixture over the pork and leave to absorb the flavours.

Heat a non-stick frying pan and cook the marinated pork for about three minutes on each side or until well browned.

Add the remaining marinade to the pan with the chopped nectarines or peaches and bring the liquid to the boil.

Cook for a further 4-5 minutes until the pork is cooked through.

Serve with rice or couscous.

Shipping activity from September 12 - 19

The trawlers *Sil* and *Puente Ladiera* made brief visits to Port William on September 16 and 17 respectively before departing for fishing grounds.

Wool report - week ending September 14

by Neil Judd, Department of Agriculture

GREASY wool prices recovered some of the losses of the last two weeks at sales in South Africa, New Zealand and Australia this week. As shown in the attached "Micron Price Guide", prices were up by between 2 and 6 pence per kilogram clean across the entire micron spectrum.

□ Solid general buying demand, coupled with a slight increase in the value of the Australian dollar relative to the £ sterling were explained as having contributed to the rise in wool prices

□ Several wool analysts were reported in the "Wool Record Weekly", as having "forecast that the wool market will continue on a downward trend, at least until the end of the year".

□ Prices for skirtings and oddments increased for finer types but generally remained steady for other lots.

□ In Australia 92% of the 52,483 bale offering was sold. Included in the offering were 4,024 bales of crossbred wool of which 91% was sold.

□ Auctions continue next week in New Zealand, South Africa and Australia where almost 80,000 bales of wool will be on offer.

*Exchange rates used to convert wool prices into pence per kg clean basis. Australian \$2.36 per £ sterling compared to \$2.39 per £ sterling previous week.

*Information derived from AWEX market report and Wool Record Weekly.

Argentina: missing child 81 found

THE 'Grandmothers of Plaza de Mayo' have announced the identification of another child abducted at birth by the military dictatorship of 1976-83 and illegally offered for adoption.

The 28-year-old son of Inés Beatriz Ortega and Rubén Leonardo Fosatti was born in custody in the 5th police precinct of the city of La Plata on March 12, 1977. Inés, a student union activist, was just 16 years old when she gave birth to a son she called Leonardo. Both mother and child disappeared and no trace of either had been found until now.

The 'Grandmothers' have worked tirelessly to track down babies born in captivity who disappeared under the military regime. Leonardo is the 81st missing baby whose true identity has been recovered but the organisation believes another 400 are yet to be found.

"We found another grandson, another grandson found us," said the 'Grandmothers' in a statement.

The military regime waged a so-called "dirty war" against suspected guerrillas and political opponents. Some 12,000 people are still missing, according to an official count. But human rights groups put the number at 30,000.

'Grandmothers' head Estela de Carlotto said a man had contacted the organisation's branch in La Plata in March, 2004, saying that

he had doubts about his identity. He underwent a DNA test in November, 2004 and was told on August 11 of last year that he was the son of Inés and Rubén.

Ortega was a textile worker, a high school student and an activist in the UES students' union. She was seven months pregnant when she was abducted. Ruben was a metal-worker and studied history at the University of La Plata.

The couple were living in a house in the Greater Buenos Aires district of Quilmes when they were kidnapped by a military task group at the corner of Baranda and Islas Malvinas streets on January 21, 1977.

They were both taken to the 5th police precinct, a torture centre that gained notoriety for its brutality. Inés was placed in a cell with another pregnant woman. Witnesses said she gave birth on a filthy kitchen table in the precinct, gagged and handcuffed, and assisted by the Buenos Aires provincial police doctor Jorge Bergés.

She only had Leonardo in her arms for five days. The guards then took the baby away and told her the he would be given to her family. Carlotto said yesterday the child was illegally given in adoption to a non-military family from La Plata. Leonardo, meanwhile, has said he wants to adopt the surnames of his real parents. (BAH)

Chinese presence in Latinamerica worries US Senate

THE growing presence of China in Latinamerica was considered Tuesday by the United States Senate concerned with Beijing's expanding interest in the region's energy resources.

"There's no doubt that China is increasing its presence in Latinamerica and in the rest of the world. Between 1999 and 2004 Chinese imports to the region jumped six fold and the region's exports trebled," said Norm Coleman Republican Senator for Minnesota.

Gal Luft CEO of the Global Security Analysis Institute pointed out that "...of all the regions where China is competing with United States for access to petroleum, the western hemisphere is probably the one that has greater impact in Washington and in the long term."

Mr Luft added that since 1993, China has signed several energy agreements with Brazil, Venezuela, Mexico, Argentina, Bolivia, Peru and Cuba.

Stephen Jonson, head of the conservative think tank Heritage Foundation warned about the growing "Socialist references" in Latinamerica and cautioned that if the Bolivian Indian leader Evo Morales and head of the coca planters' movement becomes president, "...China would become the only acceptable buyer of Bolivian natural gas outside Latinamerica."

Senator Coleman, who is also president of the Western Hemisphere "Peace Corps and Narcotics Affairs" Subcommittee of the Senate, pointed out that Chinese interest in Latinamerica also includes military cooperation.

"China is setting up and strengthening military programs in the region while the United States looks at how military relations are contracting because of differences over the Rome seated International Crime Court."

Morales promises legalization of Bolivian coca crops

BOLIVIAN peasant leader Evo Morales who has a comfortable lead in vote preference for December's presidential race said that if elected he would legalise growing coca which is the raw material for cocaine.

During a press conference Tuesday in La Paz, Mr Morales antici-

pated that the current "zero coca" policy would be changed for one of "zero drug trafficking," if he's finally confirmed as next president of politically unstable Bolivia.

Taxi driver jailed for 'free ride' sex offences

A TAXI driver has been jailed for a total of four years for committing sexual offences against a minor while giving her a free ride.

St Helenian father of five, Brian John Williams (48) was sentenced to one and three years in prison, to be served concurrently, for the offences he committed against a fourteen year old girl on March 26.

Prosecutor Peter Cook opened the case on Tuesday afternoon. He said the girl had attended an evening disco at The Shack and left when she became bored. Trying to locate a male friend, she headed up Dean Street and saw Mr Williams sitting in his taxi. She stopped to speak with him.

According to Mr Cook, the complainant's belief was that Mr Williams had dropped her friend home not long before, so she asked him to give her a free ride to her friend's house. He obliged, however when they arrived at the friend's home, the place was in darkness. The girl then asked Mr Williams to drive her to K4 store in East Stanley.

While driving on the By-Pass road, the prosecution alleged, Mr Williams committed the first sexual assault - digital penetration without consent. He then continued along the By-Pass road, failing to turn into any of the streets which led to K4, and stopped at the turn-off to the Canache, east of Stanley. It was here, Mr Cook alleged, that the two further offences were committed.

Mr Williams then drove the girl to K4 and made her promise not to tell anyone what had happened. This she duly did and he left her at the store.

Mr Cook said the complainant then made her way directly to the home of "an adult she trusts" and

told her what had happened.

In a statement read to the court, the woman gave a detailed account of the girl's distress as she described what had happened to her. She said the girl told her, "I'm really scared, I don't know what to do," and made her promise not to tell anyone.

However, after dropping the girl home later in the evening, the woman telephoned the complainant's sister and the two took the decision to inform the police.

The complainant was interviewed by a social worker the following morning and a video from the interview was played to the court on Tuesday afternoon. She then gave live evidence via a closed-circuit television link.

When asked by defence counsel Paul Treble why she did not "shout or open the door and get out" after the first assault, the girl responded, "I don't know." Again, he asked her why she did not get out of the vehicle when it stopped at the Canache turn-off; she responded, "It was a long way to walk."

Mr Treble asked the girl if she had been injured in the assaults and she confirmed she had not.

DNA

Mr Williams was arrested the day after the offences were committed; his vehicle was seized and a forensic examination was carried out upon it.

When interviewed by police, Mr Williams said he was sure no DNA evidence of sexual activity would be found in his taxi. However, swabs from the central console of the vehicle were examined by forensic practitioner Danielle Gill and evidence was found with a DNA profile that matched Mr Williams.

In presenting the defence's case,

Mr Treble said no one could be sure how the DNA evidence came to be on the console of the vehicle; he reminded the court that this was where Mr Williams kept his personal effects when in the vehicle and it was possible the evidence was there for "not sinister" reasons.

He questioned the "logistics and practicalities" of what the complainant alleged had happened and the lack of injury: "That just does not add up, I'm afraid the complainant was not being frank."

He suggested the complainant was a "troubled" teenager "seeking sympathy" and said the defendant did not know "why she is making this up."

Due to time constraints, Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds was unable to deliver a full judgement on the reasons behind her verdict, but she acknowledged the assaults were unplanned and that Mr Williams was of previous good character.

However, she added that she was satisfied the defendant knew the complainant was under 16 and had not given any consent, "...nor indeed was she in a position to do so," given her age.

Mrs Faulds said she had given particular consideration to the statement from the complainant's adult friend which described the girl's distress and added that, although the complainant's evidence was "not without flaw" she found her account convincing. She said there was no "satisfactory explanation" for a taxi driver to go to the Canache, "...with a 14 year old for a free ride," and found Mr Williams guilty of all three charges.

For the offence committed during the journey on the By-Pass road she sentenced Mr Williams to three

years' imprisonment and for carrying out sexual activity in the presence of a person under 16 she sentenced him to a further year, to be served concurrently. She issued no separate penalty for the third charge of sexual touching without consent.

Serving sentence here?

An administrative decision will have to be made in relation to where Mr Williams will serve his sentence, Crown Counsel Ros Cheek confirmed yesterday.

She commented, "I am not aware that there is any absolute time limit for serving a sentence here, and a number of factors will be taken into account in that decision making process."

"It would certainly be possible for Mr Williams to serve his sentence here, but a decision may be made that that would not be appropriate."

She said it seems likely that the decision will involve both the Superintendent of Police and the Governor/Foreign and Commonwealth Office, "...because of the implications of Mr Williams serving his sentence out of the Islands."

As for whether Mr Williams - who does not have Falkland Islands status - will be deported upon completion of his sentence, Ms Cheek said this is a matter for the Governor to consider, "...in accordance with his powers under the Immigration Ordinance."

She said a recommendation may be made by the Principal Immigration Officer to the Governor but added, "I would not wish to prejudge any decision to be made by the Governor, other than to say deportation must be a possibility in this case."

Falklands team meets Lord Triesman

FOREIGN and Commonwealth Office Minister Lord Triesman spent time at the Falklands stand during the Labour Party Conference in Brighton this week.

He met councillors Jan Cheek and Roger Edwards and the Falkland Islands Government's UK Representative, Sukey Cameron.

Ms Cameron said, "We were well received and spent the time updating old friends and meeting many new ones."

"It was also a good opportunity to meet a number of the new MPs who came in at the last election."

The Falklands team will move to Blackpool next week where they will man the stand at the Conservative Party Conference.

HAVING this week become an aunt for the first time, I must admit other, perhaps more nationally important, events have somewhat paled in comparison.

However, I won't succumb to the temptation of using this week's column to wax lyrical about how irresistible my new nephew is (not to mention how clever he will inevitably turn out to be), and will instead focus my energies on our loss of a true Falklands entity.

The news that Storming Norma's service on council is to end has drifted around the Islands gradually over the past year or so but, to be honest, I didn't really believe it would happen - surely someone would talk her into standing again in November?

But alas, our very own Mo Mowlem (and I'm sure she won't be insulted by that comparison) is committed to standing down next month.

While recognising that in retiring from council, Norma is in no way retiring her views, she will still be missed. She has proven to be a champion not only for the sovereignty of the Falkland Islands, but for many individuals with much smaller - but equally important - issues over the years. She never underestimates the value of keeping the feet of the government firmly on the ground and has always recognised the importance of focusing on fundamental issues - education, medical care and the Islands' history.

By no means have I ever unanimously agreed with Norma's views, sentiments or political style - on occasion I've been known to pound my desk and rant "Get to the point Norma!" at my radio during LegCo broadcasts - but her approach was admirable.

To me, Norma was one of the few politicians in this world who genuinely spoke her mind. Others may purport to do it but so many adopt a clever (and I use the term loosely) subtlety which all too easily comes across to the electorate as artificial and pompous.

But perhaps Norma's approach just isn't possible in today's society and she is right to stand down: after all, when speaking one's mind in public these days, the risk is run of committing political wrongs of one form or another.

Norma has acknowledged that this is one of her reasons for stepping down and I believe the loss of this up front and 'in ya face' politician will be felt for years to come.

SPEAKING of political correctness (a term I feel slightly queasy using), this brings me nicely to the latest amendment to the *Penguin News* Code of Practice: "Nothing shall be published that incites racial discrimination, hatred or violence."

A piece of the Falklands for Wales



A ROCK weighing four tonnes is to be shipped from the Falklands to the UK where it will form part of a new war memorial.

Royal Engineers have moved the rock from the base of Mt Harriet and taken it to Mare Harbour, ready to be transported back to the UK later this year.

The massive move is part of a project that the South Atlantic Medal Association's Wales Branch (SAMA Wales) hopes to complete for the forthcoming anniversary celebrations in 2007.

It is planned to become the central piece of a Welsh National Monument commemorating the liberation of the Falkland Islands and its people in 1982.

SAMA Wales has already gained all-party approval from the Welsh assembly and is about to launch its appeal to the people of Wales.

The design of the monument has yet to be agreed but it is envisaged to be 12 feet high and located in Cardiff, Wales's capital city.

WO1 Brian Jones from the garrison at Mount Pleasant was asked to help with the rock's move as his last task before leaving the Falkland Islands to return to the UK.

Having gained the landowner's permission and, having completed the relevant paperwork with the government, Brian gathered a team to move the embedded piece of granite.

The rock is due to arrive in

Marchwood on December 30 where it will be transported by 160 Welsh Brigade (V) to a temporary holding site near Brecon before being made into part of the monument.

SAMA Wales's Secretary Andy 'Curly' Jones, who is in charge of the operation, this week commented, "The efforts of Brian Jones and the Royal Engineers are the start of a dream. We can now see results from the Falklands and it is making my job easier in the UK."

"All the people who we need to complete this project here have been given a big boost and are taking note of a truly remarkable achievement."

SAMA Wales are now in talks with all the relevant agencies to see this monument home. Curly added, "Very soon we can reveal our full plans and design. We do however need help in various forms from fundraising to contractual aid. The cost of the completion of the monument has been estimated by contractors to be £10,000, we have already been promised a substantial amount towards this."

"We can and will finish this and remember our fallen whilst celebrating the achievements of the Task Force in 1982."

Backfilling of graves: methods to be examined

INSTRUCTIONS for backfilling graves in Stanley cemetery are to be "reinforced", the Director of Public Works has said.

At a public meeting held last week a member of the public complained to councillors about the manner in which graves are backfilled and which he felt was lacking in respect.

He said trucks had been seen backing up and "unceremoniously" dumping tonnes of dirt into graves.

The Chief Executive made enquiries to the Director of Public Works, Mr Manfred Keenleyside, who said if filling was done directly into a grave by machine this "was contrary to instruction" as it is ob-

vious that such action would "cause offence and not be acceptable".

Mr Keenleyside said he had discussed the matter further with the Works Manager, "...who will immediately reinforce instructions in relation to existing procedures and also look to see what changes can be made to any part of the operation to reduce the possibility of this occurring."

Looking at matters more broadly, Mr Keenleyside said he was "disappointed" that there had been no direct contact made with the Public Works Department on this issue by the person raising the matter at the public meeting, "...as feedback is welcomed".

FOGL: the ingredients are stacking up the right way

TWO senior managers of Falklands Oil and Gas Ltd (FOGL) visiting the Islands this week are cautiously optimistic about the company's chances of finding oil.

Exploration Manager Patrick Bird and Executive Chairman John Armstrong have given an update on their companies surveying activities and potential drilling programme.

The results from the current seismic survey have been, "pretty good" and they are pleased with the work carried out so far, said Mr Armstrong.

"It is probably fair to say that the results have exceeded the expectations of everybody involved in the company and with the survey to date."

He explained that the aims of the current survey are to use the seismic surveys already conducted to identify areas that would be worthwhile drilling. So far, he said, over a hundred areas have been identified for more detailed work and the survey that is being undertaken now is to, "narrow down the opportunities and bring the good ones to the top." He added, "the aim is to high grade the 100 down to 20, from which a lesser number will be drilled."

The licensed area of approximately 80,000 sq km has been covered in the last 12 months with reconnaissance seismic.

Asked whether he was optimistic about the prospects of oil and gas being discovered in commercial quantities Mr Armstrong said in the industry, "you look for the right signs in the right places."

"From a technical point of view you look for things like evidence of oil and gases being formed and we think we are finding evidence of that."

He said they are finding evidence of reservoirs that could contain oil and gas and features big enough to be economic if oil and gas is found.

"We think the ingredients are stacking up in the right kind of way. That does not mean there is oil and gas in the ground, that will only be revealed by drilling." He added that they have become "quite optimistic."

After surveying is completed, Patrick Bird as Exploration Manager will have the task of managing the interpretation of all the data to create a seriatim of prospects that can be considered by those who want to participate in the project for drilling.

The earliest date that drilling could commence would be late 2007 and would, "string out over several years."

Mr Armstrong said the industry has become "very tough" where rig availability is involved in recent months because the increase in the price of oil has put a high demand on rigs everywhere with rig rates going up accordingly. In particular the availability of frontier exploration rigs has reduced.

He said however that FOGL

has already begun a review of rigs that may be available in a couple of years time so they can be more informed about possibilities.

On the subject of environmental issues, Mr Armstrong stressed that the industry is more "thoughtful" of environmental issues than it was 30 - 40 years ago, adding that his company would be a long way off shore (100 - 200 miles). "These are outside the areas that are subjected to squid fishing but nonetheless we will be in consultation with Phyl Rendell, the Conservation group and the government here, acting sensibly so that we have proper dialogue with the relevant parties when drilling takes place."

Mr Armstrong said that if oil or gas is found it will have a big impact on the economy of the Falklands adding, "I dare say that is why the government has been supporting companies with activities like ours. I think it would be significant to the extent that it would introduce additional tax and revenue to the government for the benefit of the people of the Islands." He hastened to add that it was "a long way off."

"We've got to define the prospects, drill the wells, find the oil or gas and then we have to develop it and sell it before that occurs. It would provide a very stable revenue base for the government that would be independent of the fishing licenses and other income that it sees today."

"Excellent relationships have been established with the Fisheries Department, Oil and Minerals and the Governor, assures Mr Armstrong."

If oil were to be discovered early in the drilling the earliest it could be produced after that would be two to three years and it would be sold into the international market, explained Mr Armstrong. "If the field was of a modest size it would be developed and produced off shore in a floating production system with minimal impact on shore with the government taking royalty and tax from that production."

FOGL will continue their seismic survey using the *GSI Admiral* through the first quarter of 2006 and will run up to 25,000km of 2D work, "an enormous programme by anyone's standards," said Mr Armstrong. The data will be interpreted and the application of 3D surveys will be considered in places where it will be helpful to "understand what is under the sea."

Participation by other companies has been invited and it is one of the goals of FOGL to achieve the entry of one or a number of companies into the project.

If gas is discovered, "we will have to think about developing it," said Mr Armstrong. "Gas is a commodity that is internationally traded, the price is coupled to the price of oil and gas projects are now less of a second prize to oil projects, they stand on their own

merits with a growing demand. He added, "I think if gas is found we would be talking to the government about development plans."

"The demand for oil has outstripped supply," he added "it is a good time to be finding oil and gas."

The representatives from FOGL said there were many similar operations to that planned for the Falklands taking place elsewhere in the world, mentioning Northern Canada as an example.

Mr Armstrong said that 40 years ago there were no deep water off-shore operations, but as technology has progressed so has the depth of water that drilling takes place in. He said there would be no new technology involved in extracting oil from Falkland waters should there be a commercially viable discovery, adding that operations were taking place in many remote areas around world, "it is just that this is one remote area that it hasn't been used in yet."

"People are drilling now in 3,000 metres of water and the deepest of our prospects is 15 - 1600 metres," Mr Armstrong added, "there is no place in the world that large deposits of oil have been found that have not been developed."

The Falklands climate is favourable for off-shore operations said Mr Armstrong. "You haven't got hurricanes and you haven't got icebergs," he said it is easier to operate with out extremes in weather conditions.

"The problem here is to find the stuff in commercial quantities, not the development of it when that occurs."

Listeria free milk

MILK from Stanley Dairy has been given the all clear for listeria.

Senior Medical Officer Roger Diggle this week reported all the tests of the milk have proved negative.

"Therefore the general public can consider the milk from Beckside Dairy as totally safe to drink."

He said all restrictions recommended for at risk groups are now no longer necessary and the hospital laboratory will continue to test the milk on a weekly basis.

Remembering Bob Stewart, 1940 - 2005

By the family of the late Bob Stewart

BOB was born in the UK on April 13, 1940 to William and Martha Stewart.

He was one of 17 children, though many died at birth or at an early age; he leaves behind four brothers and two sisters.

Bob never knew what it was like to have a father as his died when he was just four years old. His mother brought him and his brothers and sisters up, through some very hard times, from the stories we were told. She did her best with what she had at the time; in those days money was 'tight' and times were very hard indeed for the family.

Bob, like all young boys, was a bit of a rebel in his youth. At the age of 18 he decided he wanted to travel and experience working somewhere else in the world. He had a choice of either the Falklands or Rhodesia and thankfully he picked the Falklands, as Rhodesia was not a very nice place back then.

Prior to coming to the Falklands, Bob worked on the railways as a stoker and it was due to the trains transferring to diesel power that Bob needed to obtain alternative employment and how he came to the Islands.

He arrived in the Islands in June 1958, when he took up em-

ployment as a shepherd at Fitzroy Farm; in those days Fitzroy was all part of Green Patch Farm and we believe he worked as an outside shepherd at Island Harbour.


In 1959 he moved to Green Patch, still working as a shepherd. It was while he was working there that he met his first wife, Yvonne and they were later married on September 24, 1960. They moved to the Murrell Farm, again another outside house belonging to Green Patch, and Bob continued his role as outside shepherd.

Whilst at the Murrell their first child, Josie, was born in March 1961. In November 1961 they moved from the Murrell to Stanley and lived at Moody Brook where Bob changed employment from shepherd to Filtration Plant operator.

They had two more children whilst living at Moody Brook: Robert (Ned) was born in July 1962 and later Jackie was born in May 1964.

In 1966 the family moved from Moody Brook to Stanley, where Bob took up employment as chauffeur at Government House for a short period of time.

The family moved back to Camp to Dunnose Head, again for a relatively short period of time before moving on to Douglas Station. It was while at Douglas that their fourth child, Kenneth, was



born in March 1969. From Douglas they then moved back to Stanley in late 1969, where Bob was employed by the Falkland Islands Government as a plumber and, again, as Filtration Plant Operator. During his time at the Filtration Plant, he became Senior Plant Operator.

Bob also worked in the Fire Service in the 1970s and through this became Chief Fire Officer on a part time basis. During the 70s and 80s he undertook a great deal of private work, cutting peat and plumbing, working very long hours indeed, as his family remember well.

In 1984, after the breakdown of his first marriage, and with his youngest son Kenneth working with him, he took up a part time haulage business, using two second hand lorries, which were quite old. Bob expanded on this and in 1986 set up Stanley Bus Service.

It was around this time that Bob met his second wife, Celia and they were happily married on October 24, 1986.

Between 1987 and 1992 Bob continued to work for himself and became well known as 'Bob the Bus' having started off with a 12 seater mini bus and progressing to coaches which he purchased from Mount Pleasant.

It was in 1992, sadly, that Bob was first diagnosed with Non Hodgkins Lymphoma. It soon became apparent that Bob could no longer cope with the bus service due to his health.

Mike and Cherry Ford would run the bus service for Bob whilst he was away in the UK having treatment, and did a great job in keeping the business going in some very adverse weather conditions, still getting to the Tristar on time. In 1993/94 Mike and Cherry bought the bus service from Bob and continued with the good service which was so well known.

During this period of time, Bob had also bought the laundry service from John Teggart; the business was run down and operated out of an old portacabin. From this Bob set up the laundry service to what it is today. During his time at the laundry, his daughter, Josie,

helped him to run it but sadly Bob sold this business too, due to his poor health; Bob sold the laundry to its present owners, Mike and Diane Triggs.

Bob's illness continued for some thirteen years with respites in between, however he didn't work much during this time due to the severity of his illness. During the period 1992 up to his death on September 10, 2005, his wife Celia was always there with him, by his side, on each and every occasion when he went for treatment and in between striving to keep up with her cooking business.

The family appreciate very much the support Bob had from Celia over the years and realise at times, this was very hard for her.

Without Celia's support we would not have had Bob with us as long as we have, as she always encouraged him, telling him not to give up and he would get through it, which he did and we wish to thank her for that.

Bob also brought up Celia's youngest daughter, Priscilla, who looked on Bob as 'Dad'. Priscilla accompanied her mum on several occasions, when Bob was sent overseas for medical treatment. Priscilla has been a great inspiration to her Mum and also encouraged Bob in the past to get better and in doing so gave him the will to 'fight' on.

We recall on many occasions, doctors telling us that they didn't think Bob would 'make it', yet he surprised us all and would bounce back once more - our phrase for him was that he was like a 'rubber ball', bouncing back again and full of plans of what he wanted to do next.

In 1998, Bob and his son Kenneth, set up a 'Plant Hire Contract Business', which worked for approximately two years but due to health problems and personal differences, the business was dissolved.

After this Bob undertook several tourism journeys to Volunteer Point with Patrick Watts and Patrick commented that he was a "pleasure" to work with and that "nothing ever bothered him."

He always took everything in his stride and would drop what he was doing to help someone else. He was always spoken of in good terms and seemed to be very much respected in society.

He will be sadly missed, he was much loved and will never be forgotten.

He leaves behind his wife, Celia, four children, Josie, Ned, Jackie and Kenneth, four step-daughters, Dan, Serena, Veronica and Priscilla, 11 grandchildren, Wayne, Jenny, Melvyn, Roy, Pequita, Leigh, Kerena, Leslie, Zoe, Bono and Lauren and four great-grandchildren, Tilly, Ben, Lane and Madison.

QTHE new sheltered accommodation on Villiers Street (Yates Place) has been occupied for some time now without any form of fire extinguishers or fire blankets in place.

The occupants say they do have smoke alarms.

Is this normal procedure, for safety reasons first and foremost, or insurance purposes.

Director of Health, Nikki Osborne provided the following answer

AThe key issue with regard to equipment in sheltered housing is the safety of the occupants and providing equipment such as fire blankets and portable extinguishers is only appropriate if the occupants can reasonably judge when they use the equipment safely and are physically able to do so.

The houses are fitted with fire instructions at the entrance and smoke detectors. In addition, the residents have their personal alarms with which they can alert the mobile wardens.

All decisions about fire fighting equipment are made ultimately by the Chief Fire Officer and we abide by his advice. However, his advice is obviously tailored to the circumstances of the residents.

FIG does not insure its housing stock against fire, so provision or not of equipment is not an issue in relation to that.

As a department we are about to review our fire policy and procedure and will include a review of equipment in all our buildings as part of that process. If it is determined that further equipment is

required, this will be addressed through the government's capital programme.

QI UNDERSTAND the 'old Stone House' at Goose Green is being, or has been sold as part of the Falklands Landholdings (FLH) Recovery Plan.

If this is correct (whether part of the Recovery Plan or otherwise) I would be interested to hear the justification behind getting rid of a valuable part of Goose Green's history/heritage for what will be a short term fix to cash flow?

Falklands Landholdings General Manager Owen Summers replied.

AThe Stone House at Goose Green has been identified as an asset which FLH may consider selling as part of its Recovery Plan and is likely to be offered for sale in the very near future.

Executive Council has given approval for FLH to raise funds for an approved investment plan from the sale of selected assets. ExCo did not approve, and neither was approval sought, to raise funds in this fashion to fund operational cash flow deficits which, as previously reported, are being funded by the Falkland Islands Government during the recovery period.

The sale of the Stone House will merely be a change of ownership. The house will remain in Goose Green as part of its history/heritage.

Recent changes to pension scheme

AT THE last public meeting hosted by councillors, a member of the public asked if part time government employees are required to pay 5% pension contributions in the same way full time employees do.

Financial Secretary Derek Howatt has explained that changes have recently been made to the pension arrangements for Falkland Islands Government (FIG) employees in an effort to confirm that the contributions paid into the Falkland Island Pension Scheme (FIPS) over a normal working life ensure that the pensions eventually payable are sufficient to maintain a reasonable standard of living upon retirement.

He said that any person commencing employment with FIG after July 1, 2005 on pensionable terms is "required to contribute 5% of their basic salary to the FIPS irrespective of whether they are employed on a full-time or part-time basis. This employee contribution is tax deductible. In addition to the employee contribution, FIG will make an employer contribution of 10% of basic salary to the employee's individual fund in the FIPS."

Mr Howatt said that furthermore, all FIG pensionable employ-

ees who are members of the FIPS can make Additional Voluntary Contributions (AVCs) in order to enhance their retirement benefits. He said, "AVCs are also tax deductible within limits set out in the Taxes Ordinance. Therefore both the employee contributions and AVCs are a tax efficient means of saving for retirement."

"Staff employed from overseas on contract terms are not liable to pay occupational pension contributions, nor are staff employed on a strictly casual basis, for example bank nurses or supply teachers, as they are not employed on pensionable terms."

Mr Howatt said anyone requiring clarification or enquiring about conditions of employment generally should contact the Human Resources Department of the Secretariat.

The FIPS is an Island-wide money purchase (defined contribution) scheme. FIG as an employer, participates in the FIPS to provide occupational pension arrangements for its pensionable employees. For more information on the FIPS please contact the Pensions Officer at the Treasury.

Stranded beaked whale

A CHANCE to further enhance the importance of the Falkland Islands for whale and dolphin species was presented to the Cetacean Watch last week.

On Sunday morning a call from Sue Morrison alerted members of the group to the presence of a stranded whale close to the North Arm settlement.

Oli Yates of Falklands Conservation said this always presents a good opportunity to confirm the sighting and obtain measurements for future reference, but was made especially interesting as the whale was reported by Ian and Eileen Jaffray to be a Gray's beaked whale, *Mesoplodon grayi*.

The beaked group of relatively unknown whale species (family Ziphiidae) are deep diving animals that spend very little time near the surface and almost never move close to shore. For these reasons they are rarely encountered and when they are, very little of the animal is seen, just the head and a small amount of the back. These animals dive to well over 1,000 metres and are adapted to very long periods of breath-hold diving, between 45 minutes and an hour being typical.

Mr Yates said that on arrival at North Arm, Ian and Eileen kindly guided the small team out to the whale, which was half submerged in the tide at Beach Park.

"The whale was attached to the winch of Ian's rover and pulled free of the water for better inspection,

and was found to be in poor condition." Measurements were taken by the group and several photographs to assist identification after the event.

Mr Yates said that basic impressions suggest the 5.75m whale was a Gray's, as originally identified by Ian and Eileen.

Some skin tissue was taken to send away for genetic analysis to confirm the species.

There has been considerable interest from several scientists around the world about the tissue samples and measurements, Mr Yates said, adding that initial comments may indicate this to be "an important and useful find."

"More news will be posted as more information is gathered."

"The speed at which the giant petrels devoured the body made first hand identification difficult and this enhances the need for these events to be reported as soon as possible. Soft tissue samples and an early look at the whales helps identify how the animals died and what they are."

Mr Yates said that he would ask, that if a whale is seen (especially if it's in good condition and therefore could still be alive) could people please contact him at Falklands Conservation, Paul Brickle at the Fisheries Department or Conservation volunteer Paola Palavecino as soon as possible.

He said if anyone has questions relating to whales "we will happily answer as best as we can."

News from the September meeting of Executive Council

Integrated Transport study to TAC

TRANSPORT issues featured highly at this month's Executive Council meeting with councillors considering and approving for submission to the Transport Advisory Committee (TAC) a study on Integrated Transport issues.

Acting Governor Harriet Hall said this is the result of much hard work by the former Economic Adviser and the Chief Executive. "It contains a detailed analysis of current transport arrangements in the Falklands - Falkland Islands Government Air Service (FIGAS), the road network, coastal shipping and port development.

"The study is intended to stimulate debate among the public about the future organisation off and investment in the transport infrastructure in the Falklands. It does not propose solutions but it does identify some priorities."

Ms Hall said there has been a considerable amount of investment in transport infrastructure in the Islands in recent years which has taken place alongside changing needs and requirements. She

added, "in some cases improved infrastructure has promoted changes in needs.

"The growth of the road network in particular is a case in point. But councillors and government are very concerned to ensure that people get value for money and maximise the opportunities of new developments, without compromising essential needs."

The study will be considered by the Transport Advisory Committee in October and following that there will be an extensive period of public consultation. Ms Hall said in particular there will be meetings and Camp roadshows to "focus on these issues."

The plan is then to have a further report to the Transport Advisory Committee in early 2006 which would submit recommendations to ExCo on the way forward. Ms Hall said she would "commend the report to everyone and would urge you all to take part in the debate and submit your views."

Governor may designate 'drink-free zones'

EXECUTIVE Council has received a report from the Young People's Working Group which set out an analysis of issues for further action.

The report says that the immediate problems identified are that groups of children who used to gather separately have come together in the centre of town in recent months and that this is "intimidating adults trying to use the local pubs and restaurants" and businesses are concerned that this is affecting access to their premises and may be deterring customers. Increasing levels of "petty damage to property, trespass and road traffic offences" are being reported to police and children are known to be "drinking, smoking and having sex under the age of consent."

The Young People's Working Group has reviewed existing information and is drawing together any data available that will provide evidence of a problem. To date

the group has reviewed the police information which the report says, "demonstrates that youth crime represents a very small proportion of the overall crime figures in the Islands."

Acting Governor Harriet Hall said this was an issue of "great concern" and councillors had stressed that the Royal Falkland Islands Police had their full backing for "using the powers at their disposal to take action against underage drinking and particularly supply of alcohol to underage children."

Councillors asked the Attorney General to draft legislation which would enable the imposition of bans on drinking in certain public places.

Ms Hall said the intention was not to ban drinking in all public places but, "if a specific area became known as a problem location then the Governor would have the power to designate it as a drink-free zone."

Better than forecast wool income for FLH

FALKLANDS Landholdings (FLH) has achieved a better than forecast income from its last wool clip. Executive Council heard from an update on the Recovery Plan by the Chief Executive Chris Simpkins and General Manager Owen Summers.

ExCo heard that, given the low prices offered on the wool market, FLH has fared "reasonably well" to date with £690,000 achieved for the sale of this year's wool clip. There are still 125 bales unsold, estimated to be worth £40,000 which once sold will bring the total wool income for the year to £730,000. The total income for the year was forecast at £690,800.

The investment required to implement the Recovery Plan introduced earlier this year is £1.2 million. The Falkland Islands Government agreed to fund the operating

loss over three financial years with FLH raising the necessary funds from the sale of certain assets to fund the development portion of the plan.

The paper reports that the disposal of assets is "progressing steadily" with the FLH board having recognised the importance of "not offering too many assets for sale at any one time."

To date the Old Bunkhouse at Goose Green and a number of minor assets have been sold and tenders for 3. Beaver Road and Pleasant Island have been received. Stone Cottage and No 14 Goose Green are soon to be advertised.

The income from these sales is anticipated to be "well in excess" of the £165 required to be raised annually by FLH over the next four years.

Fishing permits and parking for the Murrell

A SUBJECT of "great interest" to the public, the Management Plan for the Murrell River area in advance of the completion of the road later this year has been discussed in Executive Council.

Ms Hall said the road construction was conditional on the production of a management plan for the area.

ExCo considered a paper with three options for management, ranging from doing nothing at this stage to an onerous regime of regulation and patrolling. They decided that the middle course suggested, of a self-policing permit system was the most suitable way forward.

Ms Hall said this will involve the erection of a number of signs and a small parking area. She added, "Permits will be necessary to fish in the Murrell and will be subject to certain regulations as to the size and number of fish caught."

Councillors will consider further the exact terms of such permits - including the cost - and will finalise this at their next meeting. In the meantime they would be happy to hear any comments from the public.

Printing office to close and grazing plots retendered

THE Government Printing Office will close in June 2006.

Councillors considered an update on the future of the Printing Office at last week's Executive Council meeting.

Acting Governor Harriet Hall said the government has been in discussions with the private sector about the privatisation of this resource and as a result it has been decided to close the Printing Office with effect from June 30, 2006.

Ms Hall said whilst it is not appropriate to say too much at this stage about the future of printing in the Islands as commercial discussions are still ongoing, councillors felt that the sooner customers of

the existing service knew about the proposed change, "the sooner they could start considering their printing needs."

Another issue to look out for in the near future, said Ms Hall, is the possible re-tendering of some of the grazing plots available in Stanley.

"Many of these plots have been rented out on leases that have long since expired, and which have been rolling over on a six monthly or annual basis.

"Councillors therefore asked the Stanley Lands Committee to look at retendering these. Leases on grazing land which have not yet expired are still of course valid."

PRP holders exceptionally granted housing earlier

AN amendment has been made to the government housing policy to allow holders of a Permanent Residence Permit (PRP) housing before the usual period of four years has elapsed.

Acting Governor Harriet Hall said that, ordinarily a PRP holder will not be considered for government housing until a period of four years after the issue of the permit. She added that applicants for PRP are already told that its grant, "does not entitle them to government housing and this amendment makes this more clear.

"However in clearly demonstrable extenuating circumstances it would be possible for exceptions to be made."

ExCo also approved a paper on government housing which recommended that people who have been away from the Islands for longer than six months for reasons other than medical and education/training, should be automatically removed from the Housing List, to bring the policy in line with that applied to applicants for plots in East Stanley.

Public meeting v LegCo debate

WHAT a refreshing change to leave the councillors' public meeting, feeling that the speaker was well informed, interested in the subject under debate and prepared to answer all questions from the floor with frank honesty.

That was Mr Rick Hall of Cable and Wireless.

Contrast that with Legislative Council meetings (LegCo). The special meeting of LegCo on August 26 was called to debate the Fisheries Bill, described by the Chief Executive as "perhaps the most important single legislative provision that has been brought before this House for many years." After the introduction and thanks for all the hard work to the officials and committee members, councillors stood to speak and explain the reasons behind their votes.

These can be summarised by abstention on grounds of interference from the Foreign Office, two votes for, two votes against, and three, after weighing up the evidence, in favour. Of these last three, statements were made that there are some aspects that are cause for concern, advantages outweigh the disadvantages, and that those far more experienced in the industry influenced their decisions.

Under the present system of government there is no requirement to explain these concerns, difficulties or advantages further, nor to actively consider what is in the best interests of the Islands overall, or need to consult the opinion of the electorate. A more open style of government would allow for public debate, with an independent chair allowing speakers both for and against to speak, questions from the floor to speakers, and if required a resolution from the meeting. As the "rights issue" seems to be contentious, then that would be the motion for debate, with councillors taking part if they so wished as speakers, questioners or just listening to others. This in addition to meetings held for interested parties from the industry that cover the whole

policy document.

Legislative Council procedures allow for written questions submitted by one councillor to another. Often these are prefaced by the statement that the question is only asked and the answer given to make an issue public.

I would suggest that a more profitable use of LegCo time would be active debate, and leave public statements to public meetings. The role of councillors' public meetings should be to open up issues for discussion by the public and give all parties a chance to air their views and as important, listen to the views of others. Different subject areas to take centre stage, with the councillor responsible for policy, and Head of Department or manager responsible for the implementation of policy asked to attend and speak freely on written questions and if required answer questions from the audience.

At the last public meeting, a question asked on the apparent breakdown of discipline in school was answered by the statement that the issue will be discussed at the next Education Board meeting.

A more satisfying solution would be an open forum whereby all aspects of education, including discipline, the "youth problem", suggested abuse of the provision of overseas education, more open door access to college, more directed studies towards local employment, and the "unhealthy state" of the Leisure Centre with broken exercise machines and closure due to staff illness, would be items on the agenda. The audience could include parents, teachers, staff members, members of the public and councillors able to air individual views without prejudice and the whole to be chaired by an independent impartial person, whose role is to allow open debate. Then perhaps we would see the emergence of an effective opposition.

Clean up before horses get to town

OCTOBER is usually the month in the year when horses start to re-appear in various yards around Stanley, having spent the winter months out in Camp.

This is a reminder to all horse owners to take the time now BEFORE your horses come into town, to check the various yards where they might be stationed over the summer. Please check that the fences are adequate and not in need of any major repairs. Generally speaking, wooden fencing is preferable to wire fencing for horses, as they can see it better and are less likely to get caught up in it.

You should also check the rest of the yard looking particularly for bits of wire, rusty sheets of tin, sharp rocks and deep holes and sort out the problems NOW before the horse is exposed to these potential dangers.

It is also a very good idea to worm your horse as soon as it comes into town. If every horse owner did this as a matter of routine it would

lower the number of worm eggs being deposited on the grass at the beginning of the summer. As the weather warms up, development of the worm larvae speed up so that by the end of the summer some yards in town will be very heavily contaminated by worm larvae. During their stay in town horses probably should be wormed approximately every eight weeks. Their final worming should coincide with their return to camp or to the common in autumn next year.

You can also help to reduce the build up of larvae by regularly (daily) removing the horse faeces from the grazing area. Horse poo is great for the vegetable garden or, if it is too late to put it on the veggie plot, you can always mix it in with your compost. Ways and means of raising funds

READING about the problems of resurfacing the Mount Pleasant road, because of the estimated cost of £15 million and where this money is to come from, it occurred to me that there might be two alternative ways of raising this finance, without having to withdraw from the Central Fund.

One way could be to apply for overseas aid for developing countries from Britain, or the EU, or United States aid program or even large Commonwealth Countries (Australia, Canada etc) as the Falklands can claim to be a developing country. Even if they only gave half the money, this would help.

The second way would be for the Falklands to think of themselves as

a developing country and do what other such countries do. That is to raise a government bond in the London Stock Exchange, to be repaid over a number of years.

While you are raising this money, why not also include money for other Falklands projects needed as well? Such as police station, other road works and say bridges across Falkland Sound, built out on land pushed out from each shore. From Fanning Head to Jersey Point or leapfrogging across the Swan Islands further down or Tyssen Islands? Total altogether about £25/30 million.

Would the above suggestions be feasible at all, does anybody think?

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Legislative Council coverage:

Luxton: what I want from new council

OUTGOING councillor Stephen Luxton has revealed what he, as a voter, wants to see from the next council.

In his motion for adjournment speech Councillor Luxton said a "strong line" on Argentina would be needed: "The threat from that lot over the water hasn't diminished in the last four years, in fact, quite the opposite..."

"(With) the next council, I think, a strong line on Argentina is pretty much essential to defend our interests."

He said a hard line on budgeting would also be essential. "...and any candidates should be prepared to make tough decisions if they are to be elected."

"We might have oil... but in budgetary terms at this stage, I think the Falkland Islands should treat it very much like a white Christmas. It will be wonderful if it happens but I don't think people should be at the top of the hill with their sleigh waiting."

He continued, "Important stuff like medical services and education have taken priority in this council and, I sincerely hope, they will in the next one too."

"Camp roads have been a particular interest of mine and I hope the next council will see them through to the point of conclusion I am sad, in a way, that I won't be around to see the programme finished but I hope those that follow after November will give them some priority."

Councillor Luxton said he was also keen to see the new council avoiding regulation for the sake of regulation: "On many occasions we have regulations forced upon us from elsewhere. There often isn't much that can be done about that, and areas like conservation and our international obligations often become more complicated as a result. But for our own affairs, I think a sensible attitude must prevail."

"We don't need designated

camp roads. We don't need to clamp down on firearms. There isn't a problem with these things."

"My hope is that future councils will continue to allow people to do what they have always done and take a sensible attitude in such matters."

With this being the last LegCo meeting for Councillor Luxton, many of his colleagues used their speeches to thank him for his service.

Councillor Hansen said he was grateful for Councillor Luxton's "realistic and sensible" approach over the last few years, "...in particular his approach to the transport portfolio, which we have worked on together since my election two years ago."

Councillor Cheek said it had been a "pleasure" serving with Councillor Luxton: "He has been a hard working and conscientious councillor and I sincerely hope that we have an opportunity in future years to vote for him in a future election."

Looking back over his four years on Legislative Council, Councillor Luxton said, "There have certainly been some interesting challenges along the way and I guess it has caused most people to revise their ambitions downwards."

"Who in this room thought in November 2001 that we would be dealing with not one squid crisis but three? Not me, that's for sure."

He said some of the decisions that have been taken "were not easy but had to be made," and added, "while not everybody agrees with all the things that have been done, as is so often the case, it's a compromise."

Reflecting on his election broadcast four years ago, when he said he wished to see a tax regime that took the lower paid workers out of the tax bracket completely, Councillor Luxton said, "We now have that and I hope many people are feeling the benefit of that by now."

Commander Moncrieff joins Legislative Council

THE Commander of British Forces South Atlantic Islands (CBFSAL), Commodore Ian Moncrieff, has been sworn onto Legislative Council.

Although he has been in the Islands for around three months, this was Commander Moncrieff's first attendance at LegCo.

Previously he was commander of *HMS Endurance* for two years, and in addressing the motion for adjournment, he said, that during that time, "...I think I gained a very good understanding of these Islands and also a personal affection for them."

He continued, "I hope that my presence here, the presence of my people at Mount Pleasant, and the sense of purpose with which we go about our work here, remains a very clear, unequivocal and tangible expression of Her Majesty's Government's intent to maintain the Falkland Islands' right to self-determination."

"There is no doubt that my military presence in here (in LegCo) is very much a support to the diplomatic lever of power and that, I believe, must always have primacy in dealings between nations of the civilised world."

"But I do have a military mission and I'm clear what that is and I'm clear that delivering it is my main effort; there should be no doubt of the commitment of me and my people to that military mission, as I say, very much in support of the diplomatic levers of power."

Inextricable to that, Commodore Moncrieff told LegCo, is the fact that the forces are also part of the community: "I hope that we bring skills and a wider contribution beyond just our prime mission, one which I think needs to be developed further, one that I'm keen to make certain we develop and bring on in our cooperation with the community, of which we feel very much a part..."

The Chief Executive took the opportunity to speak to the motion. He expressed a "personal commitment" to work alongside Commodore Moncrieff, "...to secure even stronger working relationships between FIG and the BFsAL for mutual benefit."

He commented, "We may not always agree but we share a common purpose which is unassailable."

Inaugural Speaker bows out

COUNCILLORS have thanked Tim Blake, the inaugural Speaker of the House, for his four years' service.

On behalf of Legislative Council, Councillor Birmingham presented Mr Blake with a copy of *Atmosphere*, the new book by Ian and Georgina Strange.

At Mr Blake's final meeting, Legislative Council passed a motion laying down the role of Speaker.

In speaking to the motion, Councillor Mike Summers said it is intended that the motion should go at the back of the standing rules and orders of Legislative Council as a permanent record of the role of the Speaker.

He wished to make clear, "...that in bringing this motion to the house, there is no criticism implied whatsoever at the way the current Speaker has performed his functions, indeed he has performed them entirely within this code of practice and we thank him for that."

Councillor Cheek said the symbolism of the appointment by each council of its Speaker is an important marker in the development of internal self-government. "I hope that the new council will take up constitutional development and further develop our constitutional maturity."

She thanked Mr Blake for agreeing to take on the role "in this first attempt" and for his performance of the role.

At the end of the motion for adjournment speeches, the Speaker said he had one message for councillors.

"The proceedings of this house

require more debate, not because there is dissension among you with regards to the content of the legislation, but on issues that require more explanation than can ever actually be included in the introduction to Bills.

"I know they are published - but most publications are totally unintelligible in that they just mention a change of a clause or a section but a number of Bills that you put through here do have far reaching effects on the people at large and without discussion and debate, they tend to go through and, as a result, nobody has any idea what they were about..."

"So, may I ask future councillors to examine legislation that they intend to pass and see if it wants further explanation to the public. Because they are the people who are affected by it."

'Give council a go' Luxton urges public

ARE you thinking about standing for council at the next election? Well, Councillor Luxton says "give it a go."

While confirming he is "regretably" not standing for election this year, due to work commitments, Councillor Luxton says he would "recommend it to anybody who thinks they might like to try it, to give it a go. At the very worst, it will only cost you £100."

"But I would go as far as to say that everybody who can should try it at least once. Working as a councillor gives you a degree of insight into what goes on and how the country and the government works. It is probably unmatched by any other job."

Councillor Luxton says he has not ruled out the possibility of standing at a future election, "...as it's been a fascinating experience. Sometimes it can be boring, other times very rewarding but I have no regrets at all about doing it."

Councillor Luxton will be holding a workshop for people who are thinking about standing. "Unfortunately, in fine Falklands tradition, it's going to happen a bit later than I thought due to some other commitments I have for the next couple of weeks."

"But some time in the first half of October, myself and, I think, the Honourable John Birmingham and the Chief Executive will be having

a session one evening to try and let folks know what they may be letting themselves in for."

Councillor Birmingham confirmed he will be standing and added, "If anybody out there is thinking about standing but is still undecided, I suggest that you go for it."

"For all the criticisms and the rough bits of being a councillor - and there are some - there is, on occasion, a real sense of achievement."

In thanking councillors for their service over the past four "challenging" years, the Chief Executive said, "I salute your intestinal fortitude."

He added, "I know, from over 34 years of working with elected representatives, the huge commitment which each of you has made to serving the community."

"It is a commitment that frequently involves sacrifices, particularly for your families who almost certainly see rather less of you than would otherwise be the case. Public office also frequently has an adverse impact on business and professional ambitions."

"The high profile which elected representatives have, particularly in this community, is not always an experience to be enjoyed."

He suggested nomination papers should carry a government warning, "Getting elected can damage your health, family, friendships and business."

news from the final meeting

End of an era as Councillor Edwards steps down

AFTER almost twenty years' service, Camp councillor Norma Edwards has attended her last meeting of Legislative Council.

Her colleagues used their motion for adjournment speeches to pay tribute to her.

Councillor Hansen said, although Mrs Edwards was stepping down, her views would continue to be heard: "I find it quite hard to imagine - whether or not I take part in the next council or am just listening to LegCo - that we won't hear Norma's voice."

"I do think the council should be warned that they will undoubtedly hear her voice on more than one occasion, as she has said, she has no intention of retiring her opinions."

Councillor Cheek said, "I know for a fact that there are many constituents, not just in Camp but also in Stanley, who have cause to be very, very grateful for the tenacity with which Norma will pursue their needs, their requirements, their problems."

"Norma you will be very, very much missed."

Councillor Birmingham said Mrs Edwards telephoned to congratulate him when he was elected twelve years ago and said she looked forward to their working together. "Well, as time went by, we haven't always seen eye to eye, but I've always had a lot of respect for Norma."

He echoed Councillor Cheek's words about Mrs Edwards' tenacity: "There are many people in the Camp and in Stanley who have reason to thank Councillor Edwards when she has taken up their cause..."

"In future, there is no doubt we will gain from the benefit of her advice...and I look forward to that."

Councillor Luxton said no one could question the enormous contribution Mrs Edwards has made over the years. "Norma, over the time I have worked with you, you stamped your own unique style on the discussions we have as councillors and, most importantly, you have never compromised at all on the things you believe strongly in and I very much respect you for that."

In rising to speak to the motion for adjournment for the final time, Councillor Edwards described her years on Legislative Council as "a bit of a rollercoaster ride."

She said, during that time, great changes have happened to the Falklands. "We are a richer country - much richer than we were when I first came to council - and, I have to say, in my opinion, we are not

really as content as we were."

"Riches haven't made us more content. We get more gripes and grumbles and all the rest of it but I suppose it's because the more you have the more your expectations rise and people expect more money and more for their money."

"I do think that we have got ourselves so wrapped up in red tape and we live in fear of being accused of human rights infringements or racism or bullying or litigation for all kinds of things that we may or may not have said or done. And that is one of the reasons why I am not standing for council again - one of the reasons."

Argentina

Not surprisingly, Councillor Edwards - a well known "hard-liner" on Argentina - chose to attack the 1999 Joint Statement and the way it was signed, in her speech.

She said she found it difficult to accept the "vitriolic" comments of some of her colleagues at that time. (She excluded Councillors Bill Luxton, Mike Summers and Richard Cockwell, from this group.) She said, "I found it very difficult to cope with that...I did find it was upsetting because those comments were particularly nasty and personal..."

Mrs Edwards asked future councillors to advocate the rights of Islanders: "I've said all along, when Argentina give up their claim to the Falklands, that's when we should be talking to them, not before."

Mrs Edwards said she remembered being "lectured" at a public meeting held while the 1999 negotiations were ongoing: "It was said it was absolutely essential that we approve the 1999 agreement to safeguard the fishery, that it was the only way we would get an international fishery agreement with Argentina."

"Well, that hasn't happened and it's not likely to. The only thing the agreement got for us was a scheduled flight from Chile, which we would probably have got anyway, once the British had released Pinochet..."

She added, "I hope in the future that when Argentina and the Foreign Office are trying to negotiate more agreements, it will be remembered that this 1999 agreement brought nothing for the Falklands but the free passage of Argentines in and out of the Islands, which may or may not be a bad thing, depending on your point of view."

"Any agreement Argentina signs is regarded by their government as

just a step up the ladder to the recovery of the so-called Malvinas."

Other councillors also addressed the "Argentine question" during their speeches.

Councillor Summers, looking back on the last four years, said that although the relationship between the Falklands and Argentina, and the United Kingdom and Argentina has deteriorated, "I'm rather happy with it."

He explained, "I'm happy with it because the Argentine government in the last two to three years has tried quite hard to hurt the Falklands, to hurt the economy of the Falklands, and it has failed to do so. That for us is a good sign."

"It means we're in good health from an economic point of view, we're in good health from a political point of view, with the support from Her Majesty's government, and I remain confident that the Argentine government and its petty antics cannot hurt the Falklands."

"It would be nice to think that they could look at their old mother country Spain and see how the relationship between the new Spanish government and Gibraltar has begun to develop and how the Spanish government has finally realised, after decades of trying to blockade Gibraltar, that in fact the best way forward for all parties concerned is to cooperate."

Councillor Cheek asked a simple question: "When will Argentina, or those that govern that country, learn that a country that has to resort to threats, harassment and attempts at economic warfare, becomes less attractive, not more attractive to the people of the Falkland Islands?"

"We are absolutely clear in our right to self-determination. It's reinforced by every year that passes: by the things we do, by the way we develop in our government, our economy and our people."

Councillor Birmingham said he and Councillor Luxton had seen "first hand" the attitude of the present Argentine administration, "...that continues to harden."

He echoed Councillor Summers words about Spain and Gibraltar and added, "I'm an optimist and I think in the future their attitudes will change, perhaps when their administration changes."

"But up till now, and at the moment, we certainly have to just tread water."

'We're one nation'

THE policy of "one nation" must be a priority for the next council, Mike Summers believes.

In his motion for adjournment speech, Councillor Summers said he was sad, looking back over the past four years that, "...we have not achieved what we might have liked to have achieved in terms of better economic performance in the Camp."

He stated "The economics are not good," with wool prices remaining poor, "...and people are still having a difficult time."

While he said he was happy that investment has continued in Camp, citing the road programme, the abattoir, improvements in animal quality and genetic improvements, he added, "There remains much to do in Camp and the next council will need to be committed to making sure that Camp remains part of our one nation policy."

He explained, "I think, there must be a one nation policy; we are the Falklands overall, we're not Stanley and Camp divided, we are one together."

"Our politics are the same, our economics should be the same and we must strive hard to bring the Camp up to the sort of levels of income and expectation that people enjoy in Stanley."

Councillor Birmingham said he fully supported the notion of one nation: "The Falkland Islands are the Falkland Islands - this council has five Stanley members and three Camp councillors but decisions are made by all eight and they have been made by all eight on all items for years and I'm sure that in the future that will be the same."

"There's a perception outside that there is some kind of Stanley/Camp divide: I don't think there's a divide, neither on the council nor, generally speaking, amongst the population."

Councillor Edwards addressed the transport review and urged Camp residents to "read, digest and communicate with the government as to how they feel about it".

She said she is concerned by the price of shipping in the Islands: "I hope suppliers will look very carefully at their freight rates. I know freight rates will have to go up because of the oil situation, and I know they have been highly subsidised."

She pleaded with future councillors: "Please don't forget the Camp."

"If in the future the Camp is neglected, you will end up with a heap of bureaucracy in Stanley and nothing much else left to show for it."

"The Falklands is not divided between Camp and Stanley - it is one whole land and it should be looked upon in that way and treated in the same way."

Councillor Hansen: investment in tourism makes fundamental sense

COUNCILLOR Hansen has stressed the importance of investment in tourism.

He told his colleagues of "an interesting conversation" he had with people from the Isle of Man and Guernsey, while on a recent trip abroad.

"The Isle of Man are significantly reducing their expenditure on promoting tourism as they feel people know what to expect from the

Isle of Man; they have nothing new to offer to tourism, as far as marketing goes.

"Guernsey, for the same reason, is proposing an even more radical approach in suggesting that some land based tourist infrastructure be converted into sheltered accommodation."

This, he said, is where the Falklands differ. "We do still have something different to offer from other

countries. We do have a niche market in tourism."

"I know tourism is, and always will be, a volatile form of economy, but investment in promotion, investment in infrastructure, investment in assistance for upgrading existing accommodation Island-wide, I believe, is an investment that makes fundamental sense for our future economy. I would hope that the future council takes this view."

Legislative Council: questions for oral answer

Councillor Birmingham: 'Why do patients wait weeks for test results?'

COUNCILLOR Cheek has explained why test results sent away by the hospital take so long to be received back in the Islands.

In answering the question from Councillor Birmingham, Mrs Cheek explained the process that samples sent away go through.

She said cervical smears are taken in clinic then sent to the pathology laboratory.

"Here they have to be entered onto our computer system, packed and paperwork completed. It is not cost effective to send individual slides through the post so they are sent in batches when we have about 10-15 slides; this is approximately once every 10 days. They are sent by registered post.

"Most of the tests we send are performed by military hospital RH Haslar. Smears, however, have to go to a different NHS hospital, which is a designated UK cytology-screening unit.

Most cervical cytology units in the UK have a backlog for a number of reasons, Mrs Cheek explained.

"It is a time/labour intensive test. A scientist has to view each smear individually under the microscope and count the cells. After the tests have been performed they may need to be reviewed by a consultant for comment or validation.

"Results then have to be reported before being sent back to us here.

"There are shortages in the numbers of trained scientists able to undertake smears.

"There have been incidents in several hospitals of significant quality problems with smear reporting. This has led to tightening up of the quality assurance processes and an increase in the numbers of checks."

Additionally, she said, "Many UK hospitals are changing over to a new smear-taking procedure known as Liquid-based Cytology (LBC). This means that the staff are all undergoing training which is creating a bigger backlog."

Once the smear has been examined and the results reported, the results are posted to the Islands where they are received, checked, processed through our computer system and then given to the requesting doctor, who then informs the patient.

Smear results are now taking around three months to reach patients. Mrs Cheek said it should be remembered that the majority of smears are taken as part of a routine screening programme and there is no real urgency in getting back most of the results. "The laboratory does confirm, however, that

positive results are received much more quickly than negative ones."

She added, "The staff at KEMH has spent considerable time thinking about how to reduce the delay in our end of the process, and put some administrative support into the laboratory as a result. The high DNA rate in the routine smear taking clinic makes it more difficult to achieve the batch numbers that we need."

With regard to other laboratory tests, Mrs Cheek said, those that are sent overseas tend to be the more specialised and labour intensive tests. "These are sent via Brize Norton to RH Haslar. We only send them on flights that will arrive in the UK on a weekday as it is very difficult to arrange collection and delivery at weekends. This means in practical terms that they are despatched every other week.

"Although most of the tests we send are performed by RH Haslar, some tests will need to be sent by Haslar to other hospitals around Britain.

"Most laboratories will batch laboratory specimens and perform them once a week or when they have enough to justify use of the machine or reagents which again adds time. This may be as infrequently as once a fortnight. Some

tests may take several days to perform, for example, where specimens have to be cultivated. After the tests have been performed they may need referring to a consultant for comment or validation. If done elsewhere, they are then sent back to Haslar which then has to issue a report."

The results are then posted to the Islands where they are received, checked, processed through the computer system and then given to the requesting doctor, who then informs the patient. Mrs Cheek said, "If they just miss a flight, this takes another five days."

She added, "Some times results do get back to us fairly quickly but there are a lot of factors that can delay these. Please note that if a sample is urgent then it is sent on the next available flight and taken to Haslar who process it ASAP and fax the result. All samples that are urgent or show significant abnormalities are returned to us as quickly as possible for GP action. Antenatal Triple testing results are faxed through within 10 days."

She concluded, "The time taken to get results back is increasing, however we do try to ensure that patients are told that routine referred tests will take roughly six weeks and smears three months."

Ross Road bridge: many reasons for delays

COUNCILLOR Birmingham has asked what difficulties the Public Works Department has experienced in renewing the culvert over Ross Road, at the bottom of Reservoir Road.

Responding to the question, Councillor Mike Summers read out an answer prepared by the Director of Public Works.

He said Ross Road was closed for bridge works on July 11 and reopened on Thursday, September 22; this was a "significantly" longer period than originally projected.

In terms of difficulties experienced, Councillor Summers said, a number of factors contributed to the extended period working on the Ross Road bridge:

"The initial construction plan included the possibility of re-using the existing side walls should these prove adequate once full inspection was possible on removal of the roof slab. In this scenario the works would only have required casting a new bottom to the channel and new roof slab.

"The walls proved inadequate and were removed. This then not only increased the work content from the minimum work scenario but also placed a significant amount of the shuttering and concrete works in the tidal range."

He continued, "It was necessary to delay concrete pours on several occasions due to forecast low overnight temperatures, snow, rain and tidal action."

"As well as the works having to be scheduled around normal tidal movement, the concrete pour for the roof slab was delayed on one occasion by a higher than anticipated tide. A further factor in relation to the overall time needed for the works was the supply of concrete exactly when required. No criticism of the contractor is implied in this, who has co-operated very well with the Department of Public Works."

The final road concrete pour was completed on September 13, 2005. The road and bridge remained closed until the concrete had cured sufficiently to allow traffic loading. The strength gain, Mr Summers said, was determined from the compressive strength testing of concrete cubes sampled from the final pour.

He added, "It is planned to complete concrete casting of the footpath and kerbs on the bridge shortly, but this has not affected the road opening date."

Councillor Summers said the Black Top Gang has completed the works "effectively and to a high standard in exposed and often very difficult conditions."

He added, "Although the period to completion was longer than projected, down-time on this project was used productively on other works."

"The strength tests undertaken on the concrete indicate a well-controlled, good quality product."

Despite hard times, we've balanced the budget

"GOOD LEVELS" of expenditure have been maintained by the government, despite the loss of income from the illex fishery, Councillor Summers says.

Speaking to the motion for adjournment, Mr Summers said, "We have, in each of our four years, been able to maintain pretty much a balanced budget and that has been through some of the worst economic times that we have experienced since the days of the arrival of fishing into the Falklands

"The loss of three illex catches out of the last four years has put severe pressure on the budget but we have nevertheless been able to maintain good levels of expenditure and maintain the reserves at a sensible level."

He said it was a matter of "great pride" for councillors that this year in particular the Falklands has a "flourishing" private sector. "The tax revenues have increased substantially, in part due to changes in the tax regime, but also largely to do with an approach that this government and its predecessors have taken to promotion of the private sector.

"We now have a very different

sort of economy to the one we had in the early to mid 80s."

Councillor Cheek said it had been "a struggle" over the last few years to keep the government finances on "an even keel" adding, "...many of us have had to give up treasured hopes, treasured projects because of it."

However, she said she was happy that, in the life of this council, "...we've seen the Junior School extension working really well, giving a whole bright and better atmosphere for our youngest students to work in. I've been delighted to see the completion of more sheltered accommodation in the centre of Stanley where people with some mobility can have easy access to shops, Post Office, and where they are in the middle of things, socially. That's very important.

"I'm also delighted that we've completed the special accommodation within the hospital for those who are unfortunate enough to have to spend long periods hospitalised.

"There's been some criticism of some of the expenditure, but for my part, I think it's been absolutely worthwhile."

Young people at risk are minority, not majority

ADDRESSING the "serious concerns" which exist about the well being of some young people, Councillor Cheek has emphasised that "we are talking about a minority."

She said it is a minority whose parents are, "perhaps, not as responsible as they might be, a minority that is disaffected for whatever rea-

son." She wished well the committee that is looking at the problem.

"I know that some individual members are already talking to young people and I know the committee intends in future to talk to more young people to see if there's a way of diverting some of their energies into more useful activities than hanging around outside the pubs."

Understanding eating disorders

WE ALL have to eat and food plays an important part in our lives. We eat because we need to and because we enjoy it.

Like any other form of human behaviour, there is wide variation between individual's eating habits. Some people go to such extremes that they harm themselves by eating too much or too little.

Anorexia Nervosa and Bulimia Nervosa are psychiatric disorders that are physically and psychologically demanding; both are concerned with a fear of being fat.

Anorexia Nervosa is characterised by starvation and extreme loss of weight, well below what is normal for the person's size.

Bulimia Nervosa is characterised by binge eating, while maintaining a normal weight. Eating Disorders are often a hidden illness, a great deal of shame and guilt surrounds people's eating habits and their negative views of themselves. It is not always obvious to others around that someone is suffering from an eating disorder. Other people may think that the individual looks well, that their weight is healthy, yet the sufferer may be using extreme methods to control their weight, have a very unhappy relationship with food and feel very negative about themselves.

Men, women, boys and girls of all ages can develop an eating disorder. Eating disorders were more common in young women, but as boys and men become more image conscious that trend has now changed and an increasing number of men are now presenting to their GPs for help.

Eating disorders are a cultural defined illness. What this means is that in societies where thinness is not valued, eating disorders do not exist. In Western culture, images of slim, attractive young people in the

media promote the view that thinness leads to success, beauty, happiness and a better quality of life. There is pressure that we should all strive to be thin and conform to this ideal.

People who have developed eating disorders often describe a sense of control in their lives through controlling their diet and weight. Dieting and extreme methods of controlling weight also makes them feel good about themselves in the short term and gives them a sense of achievement, even though overall the cost on themselves physically and psychologically is very high. Eating, dieting or purging also become a source of comfort and an unhelpful method of helping them cope with stress.

Signs and symptoms

Eating disorders range from mild to severe and these signs and symptoms may be present in varying degrees. Only through careful assessment of the problem can the doctor or therapist help to diagnosis the type and severity of the eating disorder accurately.

□ Fear of fatness and excessive worry, anxiety, guilt or shame when faced with food.

□ Think about weight, shape and the amount you eat all the time.

□ Excessive weight loss or maintaining normal weight by extreme methods, i.e. restricted patterns of eating, starvation or binge eating. Using vigorous exercise to burn off the calories, or other extreme measures to control your weight e.g. self induced vomiting, using laxatives or diuretics.

□ Critical of yourself all the time and feel you should do better or more.

□ Feel alone in your struggle with food and your weight. Use food as a way of coping with negative feelings.

□ Irregular menstrual periods or periods stop completely (girls/women)

Assessment and diagnosis
Talk to your GP. Be honest and open about your eating habits and your feelings about yourself and your weight. The GP will ask about your life style and your general health to help rule out other illnesses, i.e. People with eating disorders will suffer from depression or anxiety disorders too. A blood test may be taken to check the effects of the eating disorder on your body in the inside, i.e. Reduced iron, electrolyte imbalance (body salts), vitamin deficiency and kidney function.

□ Medication: people with eating disorders may need treatment with medication as well as psychological therapy. Medication is often required if someone is suffering from another illness such as depression.

□ Psychological Therapy: This includes education and dietary advice. Keeping a diary of dietary intake, establishing what is a normal weight for an individual and prescribing a normal eating pattern. Education on the physical consequences of starvation, binge eating, self induced vomiting and misuse of laxatives or diuretics. Cognitive therapy includes recognising negative thought patterns, addressing body image misperceptions, introducing new ways of thinking and preventing relapse of the condition.

First US indictments for illegal sale of toothfish

A UNITED States grand federal jury in Miami indicted Spanish national Antonio Vidal Pego and the Uruguayan corporation Fadilur SA for conspiring to sell illegally possessed toothfish.

This is the first case in the United States bringing criminal charges for activities involving illegal importation and sale of toothfish.

The two defendants were also charged with false labelling and obstructing justice.

According to a release from the United States Attorney for the Southern District of Florida, Alexander Acosta, the September 27 indictment states that in May 2004 Antonio Vidal Pego and Fadilur S. knowingly attempted to import approximately 53,000 tons of toothfish from Singapore to Miami for sale in the United States well aware that the fish was taken and transported in violation of the Antarctic Marine Living Resources Convention and provisions of US law to implement the conservation measures adopted by Treaty parties.

The indictment further charges that the defendants made and submitted a false record and account

for fish intended to be imported to the US from Singapore.

Finally, in July 2004 the defendants knowingly altered, falsified and made a false entry in a Survey report purporting to reflect a toothfish cargo off-loaded in Singapore from the *FN Carran* with the intent to impede, obstruct and influence the investigation and proper administration of a matter within the jurisdiction of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, NOAA.

The grand jury also approved a criminal forfeiture count, seeking to forfeit the 53,000 plus pounds of toothfish or 314,397.30 US dollars representing the proceeds of the sale of the fish.

Antonio Vidal Pego faces a maximum penalty of twenty years in prison for the charge of obstruction of justice and up to five years in prison on each of the three remaining charges. He is also subject to a fine of 250,000 US dollars on each of the four counts of the indictment or twice the gain derived from the criminal conduct.

Fadilur SA faces a maximum criminal fine on each of the four counts naming the company, of up to 500,000 US dollars per charge

or twice the gain derived from the criminal conduct.

The release describes the two types of toothfish, Patagonian and Antarctic or Chilean seabass, their environment, life cycle, fragility and underlines the "international conservation efforts in the face of the increased pressure from both legal and 'pirate' fishing."

The harvest of Chilean seabass is regulated under CAMLR convention and the US Antarctic Marine Living Resources Act and requires specific documentation to follow legally harvested toothfish from the point of harvest to the point of final import for consumption.

The US Attorney for the Southern District of Florida commended the investigative efforts of the Special Agents of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration Fisheries, Office of Law Enforcement with assistance from the Department of Homeland Security, Customs and Border Protection Service.

The case is being prosecuted by the US Attorney Office, Southern District of Florida and the Environmental Crimes Section of the US Department of Justice.

Giant squid filmed

TWO Japanese scientists have, for the first time ever, photographed a live giant squid.

The eight metres long squid was detected when preying at a depth of 900 metres offshore the Japanese islands of Bonin by two scientists from the Tokyo National Science Museum and a marine biologist expert in whales.

They believe it's the first time a giant adult squid has been photographed in its natural habitat.

"The most impressive characteristic of the giant squid are its two very long tentacles, which differ from the rest."

In their efforts to photograph the squid a camera and depth recorder attached to a long-line, was lowered into the sea from their research vessel. Below the camera, they suspended a weighted jig, a set of ganged hooks to snag the squid, along with a Japanese common squid as bait and an odor lure consisting of chopped-up shrimps.

On September 30 Kubodera and Mori managed to take more than 550 images of the giant squid as it made repeated attempts to detach itself. The pictures show the squid spreading its arms, enveloping the long-line and swimming away in its efforts to struggle free.
