For your information I enclose a copy of the correspondence which has passed between Mr Harding and this Department on this subject. My comments on the letter from the Sheep Owners Association are as follows:

The letter from the Sheep Owners Association states that the labour charges are over and above the quarantine charge of 2/- per day per animal. This is incorrect. The quarantine charge for sheep is 2/- per day for any number up to 50 animals. I do not think the charge is exorbitant. It is probably the lowest for such service within the Empire.


I know of no country in which the farming industry is responsible either for the location of the quarantine station or the efficacy of the quarantine procedure. This I think is always a Government responsibility. Quarantine is a specialised procedure requiring

requiring efficient isolation and facilities for any treatment that may become necessary. Even though this procedure is carefully thought out occasional slips occur which permit the entry of a diseased animal into a country. It is impossible to take too many precautions to prevent diseased animals from being released in the Colony. I would prefer the quarantine station to be on an island, as is the case in U.S.A., New Zealand, and I believe Australia. But since this does not seem feasible the present location of the station is a good choice. It is sufficiently removed from Stanley to discourage curious members of the public from trespassing on it. Its location enables animals to be landed practically on the station and ensures that animals to be quarantined do not come in contact with other animals in the Colony until they are released. Some diseases are extremely contagious and might be disseminated easily if infected animals were driven through a populated area to the quarantine station, (as occurred when distemper wiped out many dogs in the Islands).

The objection of the Sheep Farmers Association refers to labour costs. As I explained to Mr Harding it was cheaper for him to pay for a certain amount of wasted labour in connection with attention on his sheep rather than to charter a boat to visit the station when required. If plenty of labour were available we should have a man living at the quarantine station when animals are being quarantined. When not attending to animals he would be employed in cultivating the land, planting shelter belts of gorse, trees etc., and generally improving the quarantine area.

The difficulty in arranging transport to the quarantine station is temporary and is due to the demands on the Harbour Master's shipping facilities for war purposes. This position is already greatly eased. I am informed that it is unlikely that any difficulty in arranging visits to the quarantine station will occur after the war.

The following seems pertinent and is submitted for your information: The most suitable type of sheep to import appears to be an animal costing 320 to 325 in New Zealand and 350 to 340 in England. The freight to the Falkland Islands (1939) was 312.-10.-0d per ram, excluding fodder and trans-shipping charges in Montevideo. If a batch of six or more animals arrive in a healthy condition the quarantine costs would amount to approximately 3% of the landed value. Had Mr Harding's full consignment of sheep arrived in good health the quarantine charges (with a man in residence on the Quarantine Station) would have been about 37.-0.-0. But one animal died in transport, one died of pneumonia shortly after arrival in the quarantine station, and a third was condemned as being infected with scrofula (Mycotic dermatitis). The presence of these diseases necessitated keeping the animals an additional 70 days. On the same scale of charges (with a man in residence on the quarantine station) the additional 70 days would cost - Labour 36.-2.-0d, Quarantine fee 37.-0.-0., dip, medicines, etc. probably 31.-0.-0. The total quarantine charges for 100 days would therefore be 321.-2.-0., which is 16/4d less than the bill presented to Mr Harding. It appears therefore that the majority of Mr Harding's expenses were incurred because animals arrived in an unhealthy condition. The complete account ~~would have~~ amounted to 325.-17.-3d, of which 33.-13.-0. was rebated.

I suggest that the animals mentioned in Schedule A. of The Live Stock Regulations (Consolidation) 1923. namely:-

Cattle, horses, sheep, asses, pigs and goats should come under the charge of 8/- per day for any number.

Dogs as stated in red I.

Food supplied by importers, or if procured by the Government, to be charged to importers, and not included in the charge of 8/- per day which is for attendance only.

I cannot think of any other animal that might be imported, but perhaps a clause could be inserted giving the Stock Inspector power to use his discretion in the case of an animal or animals imported not mentioned in the above Regulations.

These charges were in force when I took over the Stock Department, and as the above mentioned animals at 8/- per day take a considerable amount of attention, cleaning, watering, feeding etc. the charge is not excessive.

Dogs are not so difficult to look after, except in the case of disease which is comparatively rare, but all medicines to be payable by importers and not included in the charge of 1/- per day.

It must be taken into consideration that a responsible man must be employed by the Stock Department, as the Stock Inspector may not be in Stanley during the whole period of quarantine of any animals, and I am of the opinion that his wages should stand as recommended.

Sir,

I have the honour to request for your consideration certain quarantine charges made by the Agricultural Department which appear to us excessive and discouraging to importers of stock.

It is learned that Messrs. Holmstedt Blake & Co. Ltd. have been charged a sum of £14. 16. 11. for extra labour over and above the quarantine charge of 2/- per day per animal (see Stock Department circular letter dated 13th February, 1937). The explanation of the Department seems to be that owing to lack of transport facilities a considerable number of hours of a man's labour was lost to the Department and the importer has been charged with this. It is true that some consideration was given to the expense and the regulation charge of 2/- per day not charged for the whole period.

*Agreed in principle - present & cost quoted*

We are not concerned with requesting a re-consideration of a specific case but with the principle of the matter. That transport facilities for the purpose of attending to animals in quarantine are lacking calls for some enquiry and we are of the opinion that it is the function of the Harbour Department to provide transport for the various other Departments when required. We would further point out that the Farming industry is not responsible for the location of the Quarantine Station in its present position and the drawbacks arising therefrom.

Importation of breeding stock is looked upon as of the very first importance by the Farming industry. It is at all times an expensive matter and under present conditions much more so. That the importer should be put to unnecessary expense and be charged with the cost of admittedly wasted hours of labour is not encouraging.

With reference to your letter of May 7th, I should be glad if you will take over the fleeces in Stanley.

I should like some more information regarding the labour bill of 314.-10s.-11d, as 4/11d per day is a very high figure merely for looking after three sheep.

Apart from this if you refer to a letter from the Agricultural Adviser dated 18th February 1937 Circular No. 8, you will find that the last paragraph states "The wages of extra staff required for the care of stock, if necessary, over and above one permanent officer of the Agricultural Department, will also be a charge on the importer."

I presume it has not required two of your permanent staff to look after the animals in question.

Dear Sir,

I am in receipt of your letter of 7th July. I have looked into the matter and find that owing to the location of the quarantine station and the fact that boats cannot be arranged when required we have lost the use of a man for 24 hours in order to attend to your sheep, but we thought it cheaper for you if he travelled on the regular boat taking labourers to the Harbor rather than charter a special boat for you. Had we chartered a boat especially for this job the return trip would probably cost 5/- plus labour. We thought the account looked heavy and have actually omitted to charge you the basic fee of 2/- per day during the last month of quarantine. No charges were made for transport across the harbour.

MEMORANDUM NO. 38/65 FOR EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

Revision of fees at the Quarantine Station

At the Meeting of the Executive Council from the 6th to the 11th of April, I was ordered to discuss with the Sheep Owners' Association a new scale of charges for attendance on the feeding of animals kept in Quarantine to replace the present ones which have not been revised since 1937.

The charges at present are:

- Cattle, horses, sheep, asses, pigs, and goats - any number up to 50 . . . 2/- per day
- For every additional 50 or part thereof . . . 3/- per day
- Dogs, for one only . . . 2/6 per week
- For each additional dog . . . 1/- per week

The Falkland Islands Sheep Owners' Association have agreed that the charges are no longer realistic and should be revised, but they have not found it possible to make any suggestions as to what the charges should be.

Honourable Members are therefore asked to advise what the charges should be revised as follows:

- Cattle, horses, sheep, asses, pigs, and goats . . . 1/- per animal per ~~day~~ week
- Dogs . . . 5/- per week per dog



(under section 43 of the Ordinance)

No. 2 of 1965.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 43 of the Live Stock Ordinance, the Governor in Council has made the following Regulations —

1. (1) These Regulations may be cited as the Live Stock Quarantine (Amendment) Regulations, 1965, and shall be read as one with the Live Stock Quarantine Regulations, hereinafter referred to as the principal Regulations.

Citation and commencement.  
Revised Edition  
Vol. II p. 205.

(2) These Regulations shall come into operation on the 31st day of October, 1965.

2. Regulation 2 of the principal Regulations is amended —

Amendment of regulation 2 of the principal Regulations.

- (a) by deleting the word "ordered" and by substituting the word "imported";
- (b) by deleting the word "ordered" in the marginal note thereto and by substituting the word "imported".

3. Regulation 8 of the principal Regulations is amended by inserting after the word and comma "distemper," the words and comma "inoculated against hard pad,".

Amendment of regulation 8 of the principal Regulations.

4. The principal Regulations are amended by inserting the following new regulation immediately after regulation 17 —

Insertion of new regulation 17A in the principal Regulations.

"Charges for animals in quarantine.

17A. The charges set forth in Schedule E shall be payable to Government in respect of animals kept in quarantine."

5. Schedule B to the principal Regulations is amended by inserting after the word "lice" the words "and itch-mite".

Amendment of Schedule B to the principal Regulations.

6. Schedule C to the principal Regulations is amended by deleting the word "July" and by substituting the words "the first day of August".

Amendment of Schedule C to the principal Regulations.

7. The principal Regulations are amended by the addition of the following new Schedule E —
