Please inform His Excellency sheep lice reported and verified at Waldrons Port Howard taking all precautions to stamp out and prevent spreading

Sir,

Please not for the information of His Excellency the Governor that upon arrival at Fox Ray in the "Afterglow" I proceeded with Mr. Wilson to Dunnose Head where I examined all the flocks on that Station, as some of the ewes had been obtained from Port Howard two years ago, there were no signs of Lice.

I examined the sheep that were on the Chartres-Port Howard boundary and failed to find any signs of Lice.

From there I proceede to Fort Howard and dipped two flocks that were slightly infected, one flock of about 400 cast ewes that were badly infected was destroyed by Mr Evans as he did not wish to drive them over clean ground to the dip.

This was the only flock that shewed severe infection since the dipping of last February and I consider Mr Evans most thorough in his endeavours to Stamp out this pest.

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
