BRITISH ANTARCTIC EXPEDITION.

On 7 October last I took the liberty to write to you concerning my Son T.W.Bagshawe, and you very kindly wrote to me in reply on 15 December.

My Son - a boy only just 20 years of age - has been abandoned, with another young man Lester, by the leader of the Expedition - Cope.

The two boys are now supposed to be at Water Boat Point, Andvord Bay.

From what we can gather they have been left alone until whalers can get into communication with them about February of next year.

The place where they have been left is, fortunately, not out of reach.

I understand the two young men have sufficient stores - that is to say food provisions and fuel to last them out.

They have also a few dogs, which I understand were bought in the Falkland Islands.

Can you keep any oversight on them?

I and my Family will very much appreciate anything you can do.

I am sure you will recognise the fact that I do not want to bother you unnecessarily, but I am writing to you because you are nearer in touch with the Antarctic Regions than anybody with whom I can communicate.

W. Bagshawe and Mr. Lester an opportunity of returning, but they declined to come away.

Dear Sir,

Last year I wrote to you in reference to my Son - T.W.Bagshawe - who went to the Antarctic with the Cope Expedition.

At the present time my Son, and another young man - Lester - are isolated, and really abandoned at a base Andvord Bay, Water Boat Point in the Antarctic.

Mr. Cope is, I understand, now in Montevideo.

Captain Wilkins is in London, and is to be a member of the Shackleton Expedition which is to leave England this month.

The Royal Geographical Society does not recognise or give any help to the Cope Expedition.

The Norwegian Whaling Industry seems to be in a somewhat difficult position at the present time, on account of general unsettled conditions in Europe.

I have seen lately Mr. Lars Christensen and also Mr. Johan Rasmussen, both of Sandefjord, Norway.

They cannot state definitely at present the prospects for this year, but I believe that in any case only a very restricted fleet will go to the Whaling Regions.

It will be a month before I can know anything definite.

I have also seen Sir Ernest Shackleton who expects to leave England before the end of August. He will sail for the South from the Cape (South Africa) and he was not expecting to touch at Andvord Bay.

I am to see him again, and think, if other means fail, that he may go out of his way to rescue the two young men.

6 August 1921.

Are you sending any expedition to the South from the Falkland Islands? I believe that Mr. Hamilton is well acquainted with all that has passed in regard to the Cope Expedition.

I understand that my Son and Lester refused to come back on a Whaler in the early part of this year because they wanted to do useful work, and to bring good results back to England. They would otherwise have returned more or less in disgrace having failed in the work for which they went out.

I believe they have provisions enough to keep them in health.

I think Lester particularly wants to come back in the early part of next year (1922).

My Son went out with the determination to justify his voyage, and to bring back valuable information.

There is no great urgency for my Son to return to England. I want him to do good work whilst he is away.

But, of course, he could not be left alone. My present thoughts are that it would be best for him and Lester to be picked up by the Shackleton Expedition if that can be arranged, but I have no certainty about that today.

I hope that you will pardon the delay in writing this letter for I have been waiting for the adresses of the whaling Companies who may be sending factory ships to the South Shetlands this year.

They are as follows:-

Those marked x are most likely to be sending ships to the immediate neighbourhood of Andvord Bay, but it may happen that any one of the companies may take out a license for that locality.

I would advise you to write to each of these companies asking them if they are sending ships to the South Shetlands this year, and if so, would they make an effort to call, (for which they would probably have to be compensated) at the South Side of the entrance of Andvord Bay. Lat 64.50.S. Long

63.30 W. where two men of the British Imperial Antarctic Expedition have been wintering on the mainland, at the foot of an ice slope which reaches down to the water, and at a Penguin Rockery, where a "Waterboat" had been ahandoned by the Salvesen Whaling Co when Capt Skonthorp was in charge, and if necessary, bring the two men back to Monte Video at the end of the Whaling season.

If you receive a reply from every one of these companies to the effect that they will not be sending boats to that neighbourhood this year, then write them again and ask if they have any Whale Catchers in a seagoing condition at Monte Video, and if so on what terms would they hire to you one of these vessels with a Captain and crew who know the local conditions around Sven Foyn Harbour, and Port Lockroy, for a round trip from Monte Video, Andvord Bay and return. You should point out that there are supplies of coal at Sven Foyn Harbour owned by Odd Whaling Co, and Lars Christensen and also at Port Lockroy owned by Norge Whaling Co. (C.Nielsen and Co.) which might be purchased for use on the return journey.

This is absolutely the only useful thing to do, in my opinion. It is quite unnecessary to write to the Governor, Falkland Islands, or Mr Hamilton, Stipendary Magistrate, West Falklands, for practical assistance; although both these people know the circumstances of the case already and will I am sure help in any way possible without encouragement. There is not as a rule any boat at the Falkland Islands suitable for a trip to the South Shetlands and furthermore not a Captaim or crew who know the conditions in that district and to send those who do not know the conditions would only lead to further trouble.

Unless the Factory Ships go to the South Shetlands this year, it is not advisable to start from Monte Video until the last week in January with the Catcher.

The total cost of the hire and insurance of a catcher and crew I would estimate at less than £2,500 but this is only a rough guess.

Mr. Cope assured me that he had already asked the majority of the companies whose addresses I have given, to send a catcher to Andvord Bay if they had no definite information that the two men had already been visited.

He will also, I am sure make every endeavour, which will undoubtedly include writing again to these people, to get the two men back this year or the beginning of next, if he does not succeed in getting a boat to go there himself.

Anything further than your approaching the Whaling Companies direct for assistance, if they visit the South Shetlands in the course of their business, or failing this, the hire from them of a catcher to be sent out from Monte Video, captained by a man who knows the local conditions in the neighbourhood of Sven Foyn Harbour Andvord Pay and Port Lockroy, will I am sure only bring further trouble to you and is absolutely unnecessary.

Giving you my assurance that I firmly believe that, barring pure accident, and the normal change of sickness, there is really no need to worry about the safe return of the two men.

I wrote to you on the 3rd inst and am happy now to tell you that so far as it is possible to foresee, good arrangements have now been made for the rescue of my son T.W.Bagshawe and Lester from Andvord Bay, Water Boat Point, in the South Shetlands.

Whom I like very much and on whom I place very great reliance will see on his part to the rescue of the Boys.

I have just had a telegram from Ar. Lars Christensen of Landefjord, saying that the "Thor l" left there on the 6th inst for the South Shetlands. She is calling at Cardiff evidently for coal.

I suppose Captain Hansen is in charge of the "Thor 1" and he has instructions to pick up my Don and Lester.

They have got to be brought off Andvord Bay - they cannot rescue themselves.

may I ask you if you will have the goodness to do anything that is useful on your part.

I have been in constant communication with "The Central News" in London and failing any other means of rescue we should have sent out a special boat, but that is fortunately not now necessary.

8. 10. 21.

I have sent letters and three small boxes by "Syend Foyn 1" to my Son.

After calling at Cardiff she went back to sandefjord, but I understand she is sailing from Norway immediately for the South Shetlands.

I have not seen Captain Cope and don't want to see him, or to hear any more about him. I saw Captain Wilkins, but he has gone on the Chackleton Expedition; I blame him as much as Cope for leaving the two inexperienced doys under such conditions.

I confirm by conversation with you with reference to the arrangements made in connection with the above Expedition.

As far as I can see at present no satisfactory arrangements have been made for the supply of food in particular and other stores.

y son I. . Bershaue who is soing with the ampedition is under age, and has not in my opinion sufficient experience to realise the risk which he and other members of the Expedition would incurr if they started without adequate supplies of foce and other things necessary to keep them for possibly one or two years in the antarctic regions.

lam informed that the members of the Farty consisting of - Nr. J. T. Gope, Captain W.A. Wilkins, Nr. C.W. bester, my son and probably unother man are meeting in the Palkland Islands. If, when they reach the Palkland Islands, either Captain wilkins is not there, or if the supplies of feed and other stores are not in your opinion sufficient, I want you to do all you can to restrain my son from proceeding with the Expedition, and to persuade him if you can do so to return to England with you. I quite understand that you can only use your influence with him, and that you would have no means of pressing him to do so you consider best.

At the same time I feel that I can rely on you to make the best arrangements should it be necessary.

If on the other hand the arrangements are not in your opinion satisfactory, and my son is not willing to accept your advice to return to England, I wish you to place the whole matter in the hands of the Governor of the Falkland Islands, and in that case I wish the Governor of the Falkland Islands to do all in his power to stop my son from proceeding with the Expedition any further, and if necessary to detain him in any manner he may think fit so that he cannot proceed whether he wishes to or not.

I should like to take this opportunity of thanking you for the help you have already given me, and I feel certain that I can leave my son in your hands, and that you will do your best for him.

British Antarctic Expedition.

My son T. W. Bagshawe who is under age is leaving England with the above Expedition.

I am not altogether satisfied with the arrangements which have been made, and I consider that it would not be advisable for him to proceed further than the Falkland Islands unless proper arrangements are made before finally leaving for the Antarctic Continent.

Under present arrangements the five members of the Expedition will probably be left alone for a period of one or even two years, and I do not consider that they should be allowed to go forward unless they have sufficient supplies of food and other stores. In my opinion my son is not capable of forming a reliable decision on these matters.

I enclose copy of a letter which I have today handed to the Captain of the S.S. Svend Foyn. 1, on which he is sailing. If the arrangements are not in your opinion satisfactory, I ask you to use what influence or power you have to restrain him from proceeding beyond the Falkland Islands, and if necessary to detain him by force.

I feel sure that I can rely on you to do what is necessary should the occasion arise.

BAGSHAWE & CO., LTD. C O P Y. of letter from :-Edward Cooper & Son, 1523, Calle Zabala, 17 November 1921 Montevideo. A.Bagshase Esq., The Grove House, nunstable. Dear Sir, Since writing you on the 29th ultimo we have received your letters of the 15th and 20th. idem and take due note of all you write. The letter you have received from Cope denotes clearly the type of individual he is, and does not surprise us in the least. We understand that before leaving here he left at the British Legation a list of his local liabilities (debts and monies horrowed) the total amount he stated he would remit from England not later than the 31st ultimo. We believe that all parties interested in that list would have been very much surprised had the remittance arrived. The first whaling ship to go South this season was the "Solstreif" the boat which took Cope down last year and brought him back here in April last. We looked up the Captain and he promised to send us a wireless through the Falklands as soon as he had any news to communicate, atmospherics permitting, about your Son and Lester. He pointed out that the date of his reaching Andvord Bay all depends on ice conditions, but it was possible that he might be able to communicate as early as Christmas. The Whalers all call here on their return from the South as the "Catchers" (small steamers with harpoon guns in the bows) all winter here, and these are convoyed down South and back by the Mother Ships, such as the "Solstreif", "Ronald", "Svend Foyn 1". etc. which bring out the Catcher crews and stores 1

and take the crews back to Norway at the end of the Season.

I have to thank you very sincerely for your kindness in sending to me the interesting photographs of Andvord Bay and that part of the World.


I very much appreciate this kind attention from you and hope some day when you are in England to be able to thank you personally for the kindnesses you have shown to me and to my Son.
