Government Bills have been negotiated at five per cent discount during the year, owing to a great demand for specie. Commercial bills run as high as 7 and 8 per cent discount.

This successively high rate of exchange is not usual in the Colony. At ordinary times Government bills are cashed at 2 and 2½ per cent discount.
