Government Bills on the Home Departments are usually negotiable at par, but the rate of Exchange is in all cases entirely dependent on the amount of specie in circulation. Sometimes as much as 5 per cent is demanded for coin, and in the case of private bills of a commercial nature it is not uncommon to pay 7 and even 10 per cent

COINS.

Coins of every description are in circulation - but principally British Coins.

British gold and silver coin is imported into the Colony by the Colonial Government to the extent of from two to three thousand pounds per annum.
