The Government House as originally  
designed in 1844 would consist of a  
centre and two wings.

At present the centre and  
right wing only are completed.

The House consists of a  
Drawing room 32 feet x 21 feet, a  
Dining room 19 feet x 19 feet a  
small study 10 feet x 10 feet a bed  
room on the ground floor 12 feet x  
8 feet. Off this bedroom in 1875  
a conservatory 12 feet x 8 feet was  
built and connects the Drawing  
and

and Dining rooms.

Upstairs there are only two bedrooms  
of the following dimensions 21 ft x 21 feet  
and 11 feet x 21 feet and one small room  
10 feet x 6 feet.

In a wooden building added to  
the original plan are the kitchen, scullery,  
Butler's pantry, servants' bedroom and  
outhouses.

The supply of furniture is kept  
up from the public funds, the government  
paying a per centage on the cost price.

The value of all the furniture  
is estimated at £300.
