The result of the establishment of the Bank therefore shows that there are 220 Depositors with a balance of £30,073 7 4, or an average of £136 13 10, standing to the credit of each account.

Computing the population of the Colony at 1890 the average savings per head is £16 14 1 $\frac{3}{4}$, an increase of £2 16 11 $\frac{3}{4}$ over last year.

The Depositors have been credited with £633 14 8 in interest during the year, being £77 14 2 in excess of that credited last year, while the balance of deposits over withdrawals is £4,499 3 3 as against £2,756 16 1 at the end of the previous year.

The Investments on account of the Rank are in English Consols and Colonial Inscribed Stock, bearing interest at the rates of 3 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ and 4 per centum. On the 30th September, 1893, they stood thus:—

Since the above date, however, a further sum of £1800 was in transit for Investment on account of the Bank.

The income earned by the Bank has been £675 16 9, and the expenses incurred £637 18 8, leaving a profit of £37 18 1. No charge for management has been debited against the Bank, nor has any allowance been credited to it for the uninvested balance.
