The consulates in this Colony of any Foreign Countries in which is accorded or in which here after may be accorded to British Consular Officers the privilege of exemption from Customs Duties in respect of Official goods imported into such Foreign Countries by His Majesty's Government for use of His Majesty's Consulates shall have a like privilege granted to them of exemption from any duties that may be levied in this Country on goods which may be imported by their respective Governments as bona fide official supplies for the use of such Consulates.

Shipping Report for 1914.

The increase of shipping during 1914 as against that of 1913 was 37.3 or 51,551 tons more.

All of the 13 sailing ships that entered were foreign. 41.3 of the steam ships were British. The increase in foreign shipping is attributable to the Whaling Industry, in which mostly Norwegian vessels are employed.

During the year only 2 sailing ships entered in distress, namely the Wyndford and the Lady Elizabeth. The former after under going repairs left after a stay of 6 weeks. The latter vessel was sold to the Falkland Islands Co., and is now dismantled. The F.M.S. Glasgow called in during the year. The German ship Deutschland entered at South Georgia for exploring purposes. The Chilean steamer Rio Gallegos entered twice for the purpose of salvaging cargo ex Oravia, which was wrecked off the Lighthouse in 1913, but without any apparent success.
