In cases where any services are rendered by a Receiver in respect of any ship in distress bot being a wreck, or in respect of cargo, or other articles belonging thereto, the following fees instead of percentage that is to say: If such ship with her cargo exceeds in value £600 the sum of £2 for the first and the sum of £1 for every subsequent day during which the Receiver is employed in such service, but if auch ship with her cargo is of less value than £600, one moiety of the above mentioned sum.

6d. a call not exceeding five minutes duration, or 6d. for a message not exceeding 30 words.

In the case of non-subscribers there is am additional charge of 2d for the use of the Exchange.

Non. subscribers in the Colony who wish to communicate with anyone in Stanley (whether subscriber or non-subscriber) is required to pay similar fees as those mentioned above, to the operator in charge of the station where the message is despatched. In the case of a message to a non-subscriber in Stanley a further fee of 2d will be charged to the sender for delivery.

RENTAL, OF INSTRUMENTS.

To annual subscribers £8 per annum for each instrument.

To subscribers for a period of 3 years an annual subscription of £5..5..0 per annum is charged.
