## 12 DRURY STREET OR 5 LOWER ROW

This house is one of the original "two roomed kit houses worth £50 each" that were shipped down on board the Victory which arrived in Stanley 13 October 1849. Twelve cottages were built on Drury Street (or Lower Row as it was originally called) for the military pensioners who also arrived on the same ship. This house was originally 5 Lower Row and was allotted to **Thomas DOWERS**, a private and military pensioner from Ireland, who had arrived with his family 13 October 1849 on board the Victory.

On 23 July 1856 Crown Grant 106 was issued to **Thomas DOWERS** for services performed, being Pensioners Cottage Allotments 5 containing 24 poles and measuring 60 links x 250 links. [CG 106]

Thomas, age 45 and a publican, died 10 December 1859. His widow, Ann, and their children, Charlotte and Ann, departed on the British barque *Sunrise* 31 March 1860.

On 17 August 1864 **Arthur BAILEY**, Surveyor General of Stanley, granted to **Henry WHITE**, mariner of Stanley, Pensioners Cottage Allotments No 5 containing 24 poles "*Together with the dwelling houses thereon erected*" for £60. [BUG-REG-1; 265]

Henry, age 46 and a sealer and native of Quebec, Canada, accidentally drowned in a shipwreck 29 April 1875. His widow, Harriet, died 24 July 1888.

In 1891, for tax purposes, 5 Lower East Pensioners Row was valued at £12. [FI Gazette]

On 3 November 1896 **John WHITE**, shepherd of North Arm and eldest surviving son of Henry, granted to **Daniel CUSACK**, shepherd of Douglas Station, Pensioners Cottage Allotments No 5 containing 24 poles "Together with the dwelling house thereon erected" for £75. [BUG-REG-5; 193]

Daniel died 4 December 1918. His widow, Sarah, died 8 March 1922 and left 12 Drury Street to her eldest surviving son from her first marriage, **Ernest Robert GLEADELL**.

On 20 November 1922 **Ernest Robert GLEADELL** granted to his youngest sister **Rose HIRTLE**, by her attorney John S Summers, Pensioners Cottage Allotments No 5 containing 24 poles "together with the dwelling house thereon erected" for £200. [BUG-REG-9; 96]

Rose emigrated to the UK in 1945 and the property passed to her eldest son **Wallace HIRTLE**. Wallace died 13 September 1993 and left the house to his widow, Mary.

On 18 March 2004, 12 Drury Street was gazetted as being a building or structure in the Falkland Islands designated as being of architectural or historic interest.
