## 5 PIONEER ROW OR 14 UPPER ROW OR 17 PENSIONERS COTTAGE ALLOTMENTS

This house is one of the original "two roomed kit houses worth £50 each" that were shipped down on board the Victory which arrived in Stanley 13 October 1849. Eighteen cottages were built on Pioneer Row (or Upper Row as it was originally called and Upper Pensioners Row in the latter part of the 19<sup>th</sup> century) for the military pensioners who also arrived on the same ship. This house was originally 15 Upper Row and was allotted to **Thomas SIMPSON**, a private and military pensioner from England, who had arrived with his family 13 October 1849 on board the Victory.

On 13 July 1856 Crown Grant 114 was issued to **Hannah SIMPSON** as the widow of **Thomas SIMPSON**, who had died 14 April 1855, for his services performed, being Pensioners Cottage Allotments 17 containing 24 poles and measuring 60 links x 250 links. [CG 114]

**Hannah SIMPSON**, a widow, was married to **James ANDREWS**, a ships carpenter, 22 December 1856.

Hannah ANDREWS, age 46, died in Stanley 22 March 1865 from general debility.

On 15 February 1877 **Francis SIMPSON**, herdsman of Hill Gap and only surviving child of Hannah, granted to **Charles GLEADELL**, labourer of Stanley, No 17 Pensioners Cottage Allotments containing 24 poles "with the dwelling house and all other erections thereon" for £45. [BUG-REG-3; 61]

On 29 July 1879 **Charles GLEADELL**, labourer of Stanley, granted to his son, **Enoch GLEADELL**, labourer of Stanley, No 17 Pensioners Cottage Allotments containing 24 poles and bounded "on the north by a road 60 links on the East by lot No 18 250 links on the south by Crown Land 60 links and on the west by lot No 16 250 links. Together with the dwelling house and other erections thereon" for £65. [BUG-REG-3; 128]


On 1 January 1884 **Enoch GLEADELL**, labourer of Stanley, granted to **William Henry BOUND**, publican of Stanley, No 17 Pensioners Cottage Allotments containing 24 poles "with the dwelling house and other erections thereon" for £80. [BUG-REG-3; 188]

On 23 March 1889 **William Henry BOUND**, publican of Stanley, granted to **Paulen PERRY** of Stanley, No 17 Pensioners Cottage Allotments containing 24 poles "with the dwelling house and all other erections thereon" for £200. [BUG-REG-4; 110]

On 1 January 1884 **Enoch GLEADELL**, labourer of Stanley, granted to **William Henry BOUND**, publican of Stanley, No 17 Pensioners Cottage Allotments containing 24 poles and bounded "with the dwelling house and other erections thereon" for £80. [BUG-REG-4; 110]

In 1891, for tax purposes, 14 West Upper Pensioners Row was valued at £15. [FI Gazette]

**Palunia PERRY**, age 81, died 31 December 1930 and under her will dated 18 November 1930 the property passed to her daughter **Paulina ANDERSON**. [BUG-REG-4; 110]
