Report on Rock plants, bulbs, seeds, etc received from Mr. L. B. Morley.

On unpacking the boxes containing the Rock plants given by Mr. L. B. Morley they were found in a very mixed up condition, some of the pots were smashed and several of the labels missing, other labels were lying loose in the boxes. This made it difficult to indentify the plants and class them in their proper groups. Those that did have labels, the specific name on several was abraded with the moisture from the pots. Owing to this misfortune it will be impossible to give an exact account of each individual group of plants.

Soon after the plants were transplanted out in a temporary situation as near to the directions enclosed along with the plants as circumstances would permit. Up to the present date on the whole most of the plants have done exceedingly well, having made quite a lot of young growth. Several have flowered and others are just coming into flower namely, *Allium*, *Antennaria*, *Saxi Sandermania*, *Saxi ajoon*.

One or two deaths occurred, but this happened only in one plant <sup>each</sup> out of several groups so that these are specimens of each <sup>kind</sup> plant left that were received.

No seeds have been sown yet but it is anticipated that they will be sown about July & August. The bulbs also will be planted in early Spring.
