Your Excellency:

I have the honour to submit a draft scheme for the demobilisation of the Defence Force which I understand Your Excellency wished me to prepare. Having studied red 5 on C/12/43 I do not feel there are any points raised therein that affect this Force save the returning volunteers, if and when they return, and then only so far as their qualifying service is concerned; that is we are a "supplying command" for all troops, save members of the Defence Force. The disposal of the volunteers cannot be settled in any detail until they are demobilised and the date, in their case, may be different to the local demobilisation date.

In preparing the draft many points have arisen upon which I had no idea of Your Excellency's views and wishes, and in these cases I have put up what I have felt to be the best proposition to meet the point from the angle of the Defence Force, but knowledge of wider consideration may well mean amendment. I have throughout worked in close consultation with the Adjutant and Quartermaster, whose vast knowledge of local conditions has been a great help, and have asked them to treat the question as one of great confidence at this stage.

# PHASES OF DEMOBILISATION.

## GENERALLY.

In order to ensure fairness to all for qualifying service, it is vital that all Officers and men are demobilised at the same time and day.

The four main phases are:-

- 1. PREPARATION FOR DEMOBILISATION. (This will take one week).
- 2. LEAVE PERIOD. (28 days' leave, on pay, to all personnel on full time military pay).
- 3. DEMOBILISATION DAY.
- 4. RE-ENLISTMENT AND REFORMATION OF FORCE, and closing of records and books up to demobilisation day

As for Phase 1, but personal equipment and arms will be returned to store during the fourth week by arrangement between the Officer Commanding, Infantry Company, and the Quartermaster.

As for Phase 1.

- All uniforms, issued by Defence Force, will be returned to store during the last week, at times to be arranged between A.R.P. Liaison Officer and the Quartermaster.
  - (i) All members of the Force will parade at Headquarters, including any Mounted Infantry Section in Stanley, in civilian dress.
- (ii) Discharge papers will be issued and the parade
- (iii) Discharge papers for Mounted Infantry will be circulated by arrangement of Officer Commanding, Mounted Infantry.
- (iv) If this parade is approved, it is submitted, for consideration, that His Excellency might be kind enough to bid farewell to the Force.

(v) In view of the number of men involved, it is suggested that a public holiday be declared.

- (vi) It is suggested that some form of gratuity could, with advantage, be issued to members, based on their length of service on full time military pay, in order to bring local conditions more into line with the United Kingdom procedure, where, in addition to gratuity, troops will, on demobilisation, receive a complete new outfit of civilian clothing. The figure suggested is 3d. for each completed day of service on full time military pay. This would amount to a total disbursement of just under £2,000, and would amount to, in the case of a man who had been in continuous service on whole time military pay, £22 up to the 30th June, 1944.
- (v1i) Night operators at the Telephone Exchange will be with-drawn.

  N.B. The question of their re-employment, as civilian operators, or future night use of the Exchange, is a matter that is being raised by the Superintendent, Electrical and Telegraphs Department.
  - (i) Re-enlistment and reformation of the Force will be commenced on the day following "demobilisation day".
- (ii) In order to deal with re-enlistment and closing up of books and records, and storing equipment, the following members of the Force will continue to be employed, but as civilians at their present wages, unless they re-enlist immediately. They will be so employed until the work of winding up is complete; say four weeks as a minimum.

- 2. Reserve List. There are no members of the Force now, nor have there been, on this List. While it cannot be said with certainty, it is felt very likely, that the Reserve was unpopular in that no provision is made in the Defence Force Ordinance of 1920 for members enjoying the priviliges of the Club, as laid down for Retired members (Section 13 (4)).
- 3. Active List. The present Active List is composed of four categories of members for purpose of demobilisation. The following Schedule shows the suggested disposal of each category after the day of demobilisation, with any alternatives, or options, for the individual concerned

- 1. PEACE ESTABLISHMENT.
- (a) The post-war needs of the Force for permanent maintenance and personnel (civilian) will be much greater than now, if recommendations in Schedule "C" are adopted, particularly Sections 1(a) and (d), 2(a) adopted, particularly Sections 1(a) and (d), 2(a) and (b), 5(a) and (b). - (b) I consider the minimum staff that would meet the needs would be Quartermaster, commissioned rank with an annual allowance of say £25, one Quartermastersergeant as inspector and caretaker of all buildings, arms, equipment and stores, and issue of stores, at £200 per annum.
- (c) The present allowance of £36 paid to Caretaker of Headquarters to be increased to £50.
- (d) The establishment of the Force is difficult to lay down until it is known what response there will be to calls for re-enlistment, or whether conscription, in some form or other, is to remain.

I feel that the adoption of the following organisation would ensure a sizeable force which should be within local conditions of man power to supply.

The war has brought out many times the need for a recognised establishment and organisation into different categories. The pre-war arrangement of all infantry was completely altered on active service conditions, with the consequent regrouping etc., after war broke out.

- (a) The basic roundation of conscription, in peace time, is whole time military training, which could never be adopted in the Colony without most serious disturbance of civil life.
- (b) I feel that something could be done to give men a certain amount of elementary military training, and I suggest that in the framing of the new Ordinance we should introduce a scheme of short term enlistment on a voluntary basis, or, if thought desirable, on a compulsory basis.

A man could join for one or two years after which he could be transferred to the Reserve List.

Should a man, index three years, wish to become a full member of the Force, then the period of service, under his short term contract, would be counted as service.

I think the Officer Commanding, South Georgia, should be asked for his views on the peace time Force there.

- (a) The question of the Mounted Infantry being continued in its present form will present serious difficulties. If, as I understand, the present Officer Commanding, Mounted Infantry, is leaving the Colony at the end of the war, I cannot, at this time, think of anybody in the Camps to replace him, who would take the same personal interest and show the necessary keenness to There is little doubt that the farmers carry on. generally do not take kindly to their men being taken, even for a short time, for military duties, but, I think, this is mainly due to their present labour difficulties rather than apathy towards the defence of the Colony, or the Force, and that, with the return of more normal conditions, they would be more helpful. At the same time there are, in the Camp, a number of men who are very keen members of the Force, and whom it would not be fair to deprive of their priviliges of joining the Force, should they wish.
- (b) In order to meet these difficulties, and their attendant problems, I feel that the Mounted Infantry, if reconstituted, should be formed as a mobile reserve, and that their annual training of a week, or a fortnight, should be done in Stanley, where better facilities exist.
- (a) Of the present Officers of the Force, in addition to myself, there are seven Officers holding permanent commissions, who will remain so if Schedule "B" is adopted. They are Majors Fleuret and Greenshields, Captains Aldridge, Kinneard and Sheppard, Lieut. C. Andreasen and 2nd-Lieut. Laurenson, or in categories

an Instructor. Until the reformed Force begins to take shape, in the way of numbers, I am not prepared to make any recommendations at this stage.

- (c) The appointment of new Officers to complete the new establishment will have to be considered when the new Force begins to take shape.

  While the present Officers should naturally have prior consideration, the difficulty of their civil occupation will arise as before.
- (d) At this stage, and in view of the work involved, I would strongly recommend the appointment of a Quartermaster immediately after demobilisation.
- (a) The Defence Force Club directly, and its subsidiaries indirectly, are governed by the Defence Force Ordinance, and must, therefore, be considered in connection with demobilisation. Membership is limited to members, and retired members, of the Force, and was, and is, a very jealously guarded privilige.
- (b) The admission of "conscripts" was never popular, but could not be avoided, but I feel very strongly that as their service was for war only, then their membership must be for war only, and this is the basis underlying Schedule "A".

  There are, I fear, bound to be one or two hard cases that will arise under Schedule "A" 4, (e.g. young men who would have joined the Force in any case), but any exceptions will only breed very great dissatisfaction.
- (c) The Management Committee of the Glub, and all subsidiary Clubs, that is in office at the time of demobilisation to continue to act until a General Meeting can be called, or a period of three months, whichever is the less.

I submit the following notes of Your Excellency's instructions of this morning and will be grateful if these could be confirmed.

- (a) No demobilisation to take place until such later date as Your Excellency may direct. it when the state of emergency ends.
- (b) Any member of the Force, at present on full time fillitary pay, may be "granted indefinite leave subject to immediate recall" provided that he can satisfy me that he has a bona fide offer of employment in civil life. The fact that such release may reduce any battery to such an extent that it can no longer function as a battery is not to be considered. The employment, which a man is offered, must be of such a nature that it is not used as an excuse for release from full time duty with the idea of eventually coming to Government for work.

No publicity to be given to this instruction; it is intended as personal to me.

- (c) At this stage no vacancy for additional employees exist in the Public Works Department.
- (d) The actual closing down of any battery will be left until such time as the personnel are entirely reduced, and details of final closing down shall be left to my discretion. The Force Commander wishes that Charles Point (Examination Battery) be the last battery to be closed down, and in order to do this it may be reinforced at the expense of Canopus.
  - (e) The Fire Commander may be released from the Force at any time now that he may wish. when the batteries are really reduced
- 2. The actual result of paragraph 2 (b) above will, I estimate, mean that 3 or 4 men will be affected. Each man that is released, however, will aggravate the question of the proportion of officers to men. There are, at the moment, 7 officers on batteries, 1 at Headquarters and the Liaison Officer to C.G.D. on full time pay. One's maximum needs, at the moment, are for 4 officers. My comments on the draft demobilisation scheme are as follows:-

#### SCHEDULE A.

- 2. Phase 1. No provision is made for a review and inspection by Your Excellency except a farewell "cirro" parade for serving members during phase 2. Not only will Your Excellency wish to review, inspect and address the Force and Civil Defence Services on a uniform cerimonial parade, but I feel that the majority of the personnel would appreciate such a parade. It is the only fitting end to five years of active service. The O/C., F.I.D.F., omitted this ceremony presumably because he does not think that the drill standard of the men on the batteries is sufficiently high, but he is prepared to arrange it if Your Excellency desires. There is no reason why the gunners should not be doing drill every day now.
- 3. Phase 2. Fire Fighting Unit. The present unit will be on call only until the end of phase 2. I have already asked the C.C.D., to draft a scheme for the part time reorganization of the Fire Services. It is important that this new organization should be working by the end of Phase 2 as there must be no gap.
- 4. Phase 3. (vii). We shall certainly have an all-night telephone service if only because of fire alarm.

#### SCHEDULE B.

6. Ammunition. some of this is War Office property. We must therefore obtain, in due course, War Office instructions as to its disposal. Meanwhile the O/C., agrees that it should be left in situ.

have to be decided now because if the entire force were revived while the war is still going on to a voluntary basis it would be very difficult to re-introduce any measure of conscription after peace had been signed. I have discussed this with the O/C., and we agree from every point of view conscription should be retained for the 18-19 age group. So long as the Argentine problem is unsettled we shall need an efficient Defence Force. The pre-war organization and scale of training was quite inadequate and since then, of course, military training has become far more complicated. If every boy in Stanley is put through two years part time training as he reaches the age a more adequate for war time development will be created. In addition there is every

every thing to be asked, in local circumstances, for putting youths through a period of discipline and activity. In our view these young conscripts should be given the privileges of the Defence Force The object of the older voluntary members being to encourage Club. The object of the older voluntary members being to encount them in every way to remain on as volunteers in the force. The conscripts would have to be paid, but such pay should be nowind say, 1/- a parade.

9. The suggestion is that Proclamation 6/44, calling out the Defence Force on active service, should remain in force until peace, but that subsequent Proclamations calling out all specific age groups should be repealed from a certain date. On the next day a Proclamation should issue calling out again the 18-19 age group. It would be simplar merely to demobilise the 20-52 age group, but the 6/0., is very anxious to have a clear-Gut-line affecting everybody in the Force on a given date. During the period between demobilisation and peace we can reduce the Defence Force Ordinance, which has to be done in any case. redraft the Defence Force Ordinance, which has to be done in any case, and submit the Imperial policy, inserting provision for short term conscription as suggested above. I submit that this suggestion be very carefully considered. Without some such measure of permanent conscription an efficient Defence Force is an impossibility.
