With the completion of the full reversion of the Force to its peace time basis I am now in a position to report as to the present strength of the Force in Stanley, and to ask Your Excellency's approval to proposals for its future organisation.

The present ration is as follows:-

In addition to the officers included above there is also Major F Greenshields, O.B.E., Major Fleuret, M.B.E., and the Reverend McWhan, C.F. Full returns have not yet been received from the Mounted Infantry. Of the miscellaneous, 14 are detached to the Royal Navy, and others to the Lighthouse, cutter boats, s.s. "Fitzroy" etc., or are otherwise in exempted occupations, and the "parade" strength is 4 officers and 112 other ranks.

- 2. From the experience gained in the Command of the Force during the war I most strongly recommend the formation of two units within the Force, in order to ensure that should need arise, we have trained gunners and trained infantry. In addition to which our alliances dictate two sections. In the same way I suggest the Band be a separate command to avoid previous difficulties of getting the Band together without breaking up the unity of either Artillery or Infantry and also to avoid complications with the Bandmaster who as the only R.S.M. (having been promoted as Bandmaster) when parading takes charge over C.S.Ms. etc. who have had greater experience in executive commands.
- 3. On the assumption, and in the hope, that Your Excellency will approve this proposal I feel that a definite establishment should be laid down in order to control promotion and generally fall into line with Military procedure in these matters. I submit the following scale:-

<sup>4.</sup> I would ask Your Excellency to look upon this establishment as the maximum we are likely to obtain at this time on a voluntary basis. In the event of an emergency the reserve would complete the establishment, but in the meanwhile we have a target figure at which to aim on a voluntary basis.

<sup>5.</sup> If Your Excellency kindly consents to the foregoing proposals it will be necessary to create the following additional Officers:-

1 Medical Officer Headquarters

1 Chaplain, 4th Class, Church of England.

2 Subalterns. Artillery

1 Company Commander Infantry

2 Subalterns.

I offer Your Excellency the following recommendations to give effect to paragraph 5.

Medical Officer - Dr. Sladen (on arrival). Chaplain - Reverend Calvert.

I propose that Captain Sheppard should assume command of the Artillery Section and have in confidence asked for his recommendations. I am glad to say that of the seven temporary Officers he agrees with me that Mr. W. Browning, B.E.M., and Mr. J.B. Browning should have their temporary commissions confirmed to complete his establishment. As to the Infantry Company after full discussion with the Adjutant there is no doubt in our minds that Mr. D. W. O'Sullivan and Mr. L. A. Sedgwick are the two temporary Officers who should be confirmed. Although we have every confidence that who should be confirmed. Although we have every confidence that Mr. O'Sullivan should be the Officer Commanding, Infantry Company, we do feel that he should, in fairness to himself, not be appointed immediately but that the Adjutant act as Officer Commanding, Infantry Company in the interim.

To summarise this rather lengthy report, for which I ask Your Excellency's indulgence, I submit the following recommendations

(a) That the establishment of the Falkland Islands Defence Force be approved as laid down in paragraph 3.

(b) That commissions be granted to

(i) Reverend Calvert as Chaplain, 4th Class, Church of England.

(ii) Dr. Sladen on arrival as Captain.

(c) That the temporary commissions of the following gentlemen be confirmed with seniority of the date of original commission or promotion:

Mr. W. Browning, B.E.M. Mr. D. O'Sullivan. Mr. L. A. Sedgwick. Mr. J. B. Browning.

In continuation of and in accordance with Your Excellency's instructions received at an interview on the 18th of January, I have now approached the ex-Officers concerned, with one exception, and they were all honoured to have their Commissions revived from their original date and they all agree that the proposal that all Officers be automatically placed on the Retired List on reaching the age of 50 is most welcome. The exception is that of Mr. Perry and his refusal is illustrative of his sense of duty, and was made with great regret. As Your Excellency knows Mr. Perry is now the Caterer and Barman at the Force Club and for him to hold Commissioned Rank, even though retired, would, he thought, cause possible embarrassment on occasion, in which view I heartily concur.

Since seeing the ex-Officers, I have received the resignation of Mr. Harries and he has gone on the Retired List at his own request with the rank of Sergeant. As his resignation was received immediately following the refusal of the Secretary of State to consider his appeal, I feel the two things are connected and I do not regret being unable to submit this member's name to have his Commission renewed.

I understand that the Senior Medical Officer definitely would prefer not to accept a Commission in the Force, but that he would have no objection to Dr. Hopwood being Gazetted, and I know this gentleman would accept any such offer.

On these lines I submit the following final list of gentlemen whose Commissions I would like Your Excellency to revive with the seniority stated, it being understood that the interim period between demobilisation and recommissioning shall count as Commissioned Service.

### DEFENCE FORCE ORDINANCE, No. 7 of 1920.

Regulations made by the Governor in Council under Section 37 of the Defence Force Ordinance, 1920.

(Sgb) A.W. Cardinall.

No. 1 of 1946.

Governor.

In exercise of the powers vested in him by Section 37 of the Defence Force Ordinance, 1920, and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, his Excellency the Governor is pleased to make the following Regulations:-

Short Title.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Defence
Force Regulations, 1946.

Compulsory
Parades.

- 2. The Force shall muster for the following compulsory parades during each year:-
  - (a) For trained members. Twelve compulsory instructional parades, annual Musketry Classification and the annual Geremonial Parade on the occasion of the Birthday of His Majesty the King.
  - (b) For first year recruits. Thirty-two compulsory parades, annual Musketry Classification and for the annual Ceremonial Parade on the occasion of the Birthday of Mis Majesty the King if specifically detailed so to do.

Retirement.

- 3. All Commissioned Officers of the Force shall automatically be placed on the Retired List on reaching the age of 50; this shall not, however, in any way affect earlier resignation or retirement under Clauses 11 and 13 of the Ordinance respectively.
- All Warrant Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Men shall automatically be posted to the Reserve List on reaching the age of 41, provided he has at

least seven years' service in the Force, but earlier resignation under Clause 11, or application to retire under Clause 13, may still be made. In the case of any member reaching the age of 41 without the necessary seven years' service, then such a member shall not be placed on the Retired List until he has completed the necessary seven years.

Efficiency.

4. Any member of the Force shall be deemed to be efficient in drill if he has attended all compulsory parades during the year as laid down in paragraph 1. and in musketry if he has qualified as at least a second class shot.

Promotion of Officers.

5. Officers on being Cazetted Second-Lieutenants may, on the recommendation of the Commanding Officer and Adjutant and subject to efficient service, be promoted to Lieutenant after two years' Commissioned Service.

Confidential Reports.

6. The Commanding Officer shall submit to His Excellency the Governor a confidential report on each Officer in the Force in January each year. reports shall be read to the Officer concerned before submission.

I have the honour to submit, please, the following observations and request, for your consideration.

2. Acting on the instance of the first official notification of the de-mobilisation of the Defence Force, I forwarded a letter to Capt. Aldridge on the subject of my War Office appointment as Staff Instructor to the F.I.D.F., requesting that such be reviewed and further requesting that I be permitted to continue in that appointment. I did not receive an answer but was interviewed by the Hon. Colonial secretary - Capt. Bradley, who informed me that the appointment of Staff Instructor was abolished and asked me to consider a post in the F.Is. Government Service as Chief Constable.

- 3. In my letter of the 14th Oct. '45, I formally requested for the post on the understanding that my present one was abolished. I would respectfully draw attention to para. 3 of this letter volunteering my servises with the Defence Force, especially as stated the instructional clause which covered all training.
- 4. On the resumption of activities of the F.I.D.F. I considered it mecessary to acquaint the facts governing the outside activities of my Constables, relative to their Police Duties, to all concerned. This was by forwarding a copy of my minute of the 16th May, stating the ruling that was considered essential.
- 5. Correspondence followed between the O.C. F.I.D.F. and myself which disclosed the intention of the former to appoint an instructor. This member, a Lieutenant in the F.I.D.F., very keen, is a Constable, who will I am informed take over all drills for the Force including the Unit I have been asked to command. This practice I submit, on behalf of a subordinate would be intererable to me for the reasons that (1), the Constable in question cannot be allowed preferential treatment over the others, they being also members of the F.I.D.F, or the senior Constable, who is not; and that (2) the proposed nomination is entirely without qualifications whatsoever.
- 6. In conclusion, please, may I be permitted to state that I should be informed of the reasons of the abolition of my former appointment, and the refusal, up to the present, of my offer of service as instructor to the Defence Force, the latter being in the interests of that organization.
