INTRODUCTION

It was always my intention to update the Falkland Islands 1891 - 1992 Rifle Association booklet, thus here is the continuation - from 1993 to 31st December of the Millennium Year 2000 inclusive.

Throughout the records I will abbreviate the Falkland Islands Defence Force Rifle Club as the FIDF.RC, except where the name Rifle Club or Association were used, prior to an administration instruction given, as explained later on!

Since 1992 there have been several prize donations made; prize donors I will describe in the update of events.

In the first issue, space was provided so that members and individuals would be able to keep up-todate records of all events competed for during each year (these results being available from the *Fanguin News* during the shooting calendar - October to April).

I donated a copy of my first booklet to the Secretary's case, so that all winners could be entered accordingly. However, I am aware that this has never been accomplished.

As the FIDERC is becoming more and more involved in various competitions internationally - such as the Small Island Games, the Commonwealth Games and a possibility of entering into the Olympic arena - pressure is constantly building on the FIDERC committee members and club finances.

Prior to participation in such events, careful consideration is necessary and in the past, this has been left to other individuals and organisations. The FIDERC has probably the smallest membership in the shooting world and it is difficult to fulfil all these ambitions - three factors loom very large on the horizon: organisation, finance and competitiveness.

In this booklet, I must put on record various items, such as public funds, labour and events leading up to the Rookery Bay Range, and issues that have been highlighted in various ways since it's inaugeration in 1990.

MISCELLANEOUS

Having lost a very large part of the FIDF.RC records during the 1982 conflict, I endeavoured to rerecord the lost winners of many competitions. I appealed through the *Penguin News* for results and information which would enable me to produce some sort of record of these missing years, however, I was rather disappointed with the response I received. Incidentally, most of the information that did become available, was received from Islanders now resident in New Zealand - for this I offer my grateful thanks.

I am sure that many folk out there have, somewhere, a lot of material which could have completed my first booklet. However, it seems that these records may be lost forever. See Booklet 1891 - 1992.

In the first booklet, I must apologise for the omission of an outstanding achievement by Mr. Ron Betts when he won the Grand Slam in 1976 on the Sappers Hill Range. His triumph was completed as he Captained the winning team in the final competition of the meeting - the Bonner Memorial Team Trophy. Scores throughout were as follows:-

Turning now to the Rookery Bay Range - the first Possible scored on that range was at 600 yards on 6th February 1993 by Stan Smith (see record of Possibles).

At the Local Bisley of 1993, Stan Smith won all six individual trophies, coming second in the Team event:-

<u>Note</u>: The Open 5/600 Yards was re-named the B.E.J. Memorial Trophy in 1991. This was in memory of the late Mrs. B.E. Johnson, who was a staunch supporter of the Rifle Club's activities for many, many years.

SAPPER HILL AND ROOKERY BAY RANGES

The Sapper Hill Range and it's beautiful clubhouse were built by the Falkland Islands Government in 1926/27 from public funds under the direction of the late Governor Arnold Hodson CMG. Sadly, they were completely destroyed during the 1982 conflict, including the butts which were occupied by Argentine forces between 2nd April and 14th June.

During the rehabilitation, military authorities decided that Sapper Hill could no longer be used as a Rifle Range, due to the safety margin crossing the southern approaches to Stanley. Therefore, an alterative had to be found.

At first, the north side of the Mount William area seemed a good prospect, but on closer inspection it was found to be unsuitable due to large peat deposits.

The late Timothy Dobbyns then offered an area on Riverside Farm to establish a range; after much consideration by the FIDF.RC the offer was declined - mainly due to the distance from Stanley.

It was after this that the Rookery Bay site became available and was chosen for the new range.

The establishment of the range proved to be a long, drawn-out process after plans were submitted and the time waiting for construction to commence seemed endless. At that particular point, it was my firm belief that no-one in authority was interested in a new range being constructed at all. I must emphasise that if it had not been for my continuous commitment to the project, coupled with assistance of the then Secretary, Mr. Gerald Cheek, I doubt very much if the Rookery Bay Range would have ever become a reality.

After plans were accepted, Legislative Council included the sum of £15,000 in the FIDF expenditure budget 1988/89. At that time, Lt. R. Bell was in charge of FIDF activities and weaponry and, as I understand it, without further approval undertook to engage an outside contractor to commence excavation at the new site. Within a few weeks the £15,000 had been completely used and a very large area had been excavated - leaving "a bloody great hole and an environmental disaster around the site" - with contractor and employer saying "thank you very much - £15,000 gone - end of lesson".

The normal procedure for public expenditure is carried out by the Secretariat through public tender, with tenders being scrutinised by the Tender Board Committee before being offered to the contractor who is thought to be best qualified to undertake the work involved.

A further problem arose when there was no cash left to complete the work. The FIDERC then began to lobby Legislative Council members in an effort to obtain further funds to finish the job and rectify the mess that had been created. After lengthy discussions, coupled with strong support from the late John Cheek, a further £15,000 was granted with a specific statement that this grant must only be used by the RC to complete the range facilities.

Heavy machinery was needed to complete the task and the RC contacted local contractors to undertake the work - however, all declined. A dead end once more? This was very disappointing indeed and at this stage it appeared that the reality of a rifle range was further off than ever.

One morning shortly afterwards, there was a knock on my door and I was greeted by a gentleman saying "Good morning, Mr. Smith, I understand you have a problem with the construction of a rifle range." He asked for a plan, which I produced, and after a short study told me there would not be much of problem to carry out this work. I was only too pleased to accompany him to the site so he could survey the job and, on visiting and hearing what would be required in the way of butts and mounds, he pointed out that there were no mounds on the plan, but agreed to take on the job.

The gentleman in question was Mr. Gordon Forbes and I learned later that the RC Secretary, Mr. Gerald Cheek, had approached him on the subject during a social function prior to his visit to me.

Gordon Forbes Construction were immediately tasked to commence the construction of the butts and, in less than four week, all major works were completed. While the work was in progress Mr. Harry Ford and I prepared targets and frames; then, assisted by several members, set the frames in place before the contractor returned to secure them as a permanent fixture.

The construction of all five mounds at 3, 5, 6, 9 and 1,000 yards were constructed courtesy of Gordon Forbes Construction.

I would like to put on record the gratitude of the RC to Gordon Forbes Construction; they came to our rescue, produced a completed job in very quick time and made possible the opening of the Rookery Bay Range on 28th October 1990. It is significant to note that approximately £3,000 was saved from the second allocated expenditure.

The question of who actually owns the Rookery Bay Range remains.

Soon after the opening and just before shooting commenced, it became obvious that automatic weapons were being used by unknown parties. This was splintering the frame superstructure to the extent that several parts needed to be replaced before full-bore shooting could be resumed.

There is little doubt that the automatic weapons used were by the Falkland Islands Defence Force or British Forces Mount Pleasant. After contact with the appropriate headquarters, no further problems occurred.

Variation of Opinion

Prior to and after World War II (1939-1945), football, badminton and small & full-bore rifle clubs were all FIDF subsidiary organisations. The Football Club was the first to become a self-supporting club and later - due mainly to the lack of membership - the Badminton Club ceased to operate. After the 1982 conflict, the .22 indoor range was closed down, as authorities declared that it was unsafe within the FIDF Drill Hall - a decision which appeared to suggest that .22 shooting was no longer required and ended 70 years of .22 rifle shooting. This was very sad indeed, as throughout the years this range had been used by shooters to better their preparation for full-bore marksmanship.

From the outset, the safety of the FIDF indoor rifle range had proved adequate. 3/16" iron tank squares backed the wall section, re-inforced by a 3' x 3' sand pit which killed the force of the bullet before it even came into contact with the iron plate.

After the inauguration of the Rookery Bay Range in 1990, I received a written request from Major Brian Summers, asking if I would be prepared to undertake the Chairmanship of the Rifle Club and, if so, I should hold this position as long as I remained an active member of the club. With the full support of all members of the club, I accepted this post.

In May 1994, I left the Falklands on an overseas holiday which would perhaps last for more than a year. Prior to my departure, I suggested to Major Summers that Mr. Pat Peck (a retired and previous commandant of the FIDF) may be prepared to take over the reins as Chairman during my absence. This suggestion was accepted.

During Mr. Peck's term of Chairmanship of the RC, Major Summers suggested that it may be time for the RC to become a separate body, in keeping with changes that were taking place within the Islands. It was thought that this might become a reality in the very near future. This was the first indication that the FIDF were prepared to relinquish the hold on their last remaining subsidiary club.

Prior to this, the RC had slowly been edging away, by deleting FIDF from its letterheads, announcements and sweepstake notices. However, opinions on this matter were divided. From 1994 to 1996 elements within the FIDF were continuously complaining about this omission - a rather trivial complaint as, if it was of so much importance, I am sure this could have been overcome by other means than sarcasm to committee members, organisers and helpers.

In 1996 sudden changes engulfed the FIDF; Major Summers was retired and replaced by Lt. M. Clarke who was promoted to the rank of Major soon afterwards.

Shortly afterwards, the Commandant of the FIDF requested that he should be able to attend the next Rifle Club Annual General Meeting as an observer, to obtain some insight into the club workings. He was quite entitled to do this.

During the 1997 A.G.M. the Commandant was again in attendance. He advised the meeting that he had no objections to Mr. Pat Peck remaining as <u>Vice</u> Chairman of the RC, but that it had always been understood that the Commandant or an officer within the FIDF retain the post of Chairman. He insisted that all activities be referred to as FIDF.RC.

He went on to say that major changes were near completion - the range facilities were to be demolished and re-constructed. Nothing of this had been mentioned previously and it was generally felt that it would have been very nice if the RC had been included in any constructional changes and members' views on the matter taken into consideration.

The Commandant then suggested that a vote be taken to decide if a separate club should be formed or if the RC should remain within the FIDF. After a lengthy discussion, the meeting voted in favour of continuing within the FIDF - at least until plans for the new construction were available.

Due to what appeared to be a further stamp of authority, there is little doubt that this led directly to the sudden resignation of Mr. Pat Peck from the Chairmanship - or Vice Chairmanship.

When the new committee was elected in 1997/98, Mr. C.J. McCallum was voted in as Vice Chairman and Mr. T. McCallum replaced Mr. G. Cheek as Secretary.

Shooting continued on a regular basis without further change until a breach of security within the Drill Hall complex in October 1999. After this, the Commandant of the FIDF closed the Rifle Club range, citing inadequate safety surrounding the butt facilities - although no incidents were reported since the opening of the range in 1990 - and indicating that he alone would be held responsible if anything arose regarding safety in that area.

This closure would appear to be further pressure from the authorities and another thorn in the side of the Rookery Bay Rifle Range.

Following this incident and due to new safety procedures, the RC was directed to find aother venue for their annual sweepstake draws. Having used the FIDF premises since I became a member in 1957 and having previously been directed that to use "FIDF Rifle Club", it seemed inconcievable that the club be deprived of this facility.

After these incidents were overcome, shooting resumed and another venue was found for the fortnightly sweepstake draw.

However, much debate continued as to the future life of the Rifle Club.

Dear Tim,

The issue of the Butts etc. on Rookery Bay Range was discussed last week at Executive Council.

Whilst I do not as yet have written details of the outcome, my understanding of the situation is as follows:

1. A new club independent to the FIDF Rifle Association is to be set up.

2. Once set up, the Butts will be leased to the new Club by FIG and the new Club will then be responsible for ensuring that such safety standards as directed by HE the Governor are maintained.

3. The storage of ammunition and weapons must be to the standards approved by the Chief Police Officer.

Whilst not part of the Exco deliberations, it has been considered appropriate, for historical reasons, for the FIDF Rifle Association to remain in existence as the Falklands National Rifle Club.

This will require persons who wish to participate in competitions overseas to be members of the FIDF Rifle Association by payment of an annual subscription of $\pounds 12$.

This is the same stipulation as imposed upon members of the FIDF Sports Club by the local Committee of the Overseas Games Association should they wish to compete for representing the Falklands overseas.

Controversy in 1996

Due to inclement weather in 1996 the Mark Gleadell Memorial Trophy was abandoned at 300 yards. Some members completed the range, others did not shoot and others abandoned half way through. Then Secretary, I declared all scores nul and void. A slight controversy arose surrounding this decision and an urgent committee meeting was convened to sort out the problem. A secret vote resulted in a 5 - 4 voting in favour of letting the 300 yard scores stand and the competition be completed on a later date.

In writing up the minutes after the meeting concluded, I had the opportunity to check the secret vote slips that were lying nearby. I was astonished to find that the authentic count should have read 5 - 4 in favour of the 300 yard scores being abolished. However, I had no witnesses to clarify the error. I could only assume that some favouritism had made its way into the system, in an attempt to convince me that my original decision was wrong.

I think in circumstances such as these, secret vote counts should be double-checked by two different members of the committee.

Visiting Gunsmith/Coach

In 1996 the Shackleton Scholarship Fund made it possible for the Rifle Club to bring a qualified gunsmith/coach to the Falklands. Mr. Arthur Clarke accepted the invitation and visited the Islands from November 26th to December 2nd.

Arrangements had been made with employers, allowing RC members to attend courses run by Mr. Clarke. With the exception of a couple, the majority of club members made themselves available and the interest shown can only be described as outstanding.

From these courses - which were split into two groups of three days each - it soon became apparent that both scores and the level of weaponry care were showing a marked improvement. Those members who attended were thrilled with having the opportunity to be involved with an experienced tutor.

During the visit many subjects were discussed with Mr. Clarke - range disciple, safety, insurance etc. One main concern was whether the RC was affiliated to the NRA and covered by all NRA regulations. Mr. Clarke promised to investigate this upon his return to the United Kingdom.

Mr. Clarke's visit ended with a meeting with the FIDF Commandant, Chairman of the RC, who expressed his concerns regarding insurance, safety regulations etc. Mr. Clarke assured him that all these points had been discussed and he would be reporting back to the RC as soon as possible.

I am pleased to report that within a few weeks Mr. Clarke confirmed that the Rifle Club in the Falklands did indeed come under the arm of the NRA and was covered by all NRA Regulations. The covering letter should be found in the RC Secretary's files - I, as Secretary at the time, placed it there.

Handicap System

During 1996 it was proposed and carried in Committee that the previous handicap system (which was described in my first booklet) should be brought more into line with the ever-changing times.

Mr. C. Harris drew up a new handicap scale which was taken from the previous year's scores. This proposal was put forward at the Annual General Meeting by Mr. Harris, seconded and duly carried prior to the 1997 Local Bisley.

Editor's comment: Perhaps it would be legitimate to produce the odd poor score during the season's shooting??

Counting Out

The V Bull counting out system is used to determine competition winners by the most V's and the placings on count back.

The RC dedided at an Annual General Meeting that they would still dedide the winners by the tie shoot system where trophies were involved. If any two or more shooters scored the same aggregate (regardless of V bulls) there would be a tie shoot decider, one sighter and five shots to count, then shot for shot.

Where no trophies are involved, V bull count out rules operate. This is purely a club ruling and seems to operate very well, creating a greater interest for members taking part in competitions on the ranges.

I have little doubt that when the metric system comes into operation, this system will be used by all organisations worldwide in the next few years. I think then the RC should fall into line with the metric winners scoring rules.

United Kingdom Millennium Meeting

During my visit to the Falklands in December 1999 and January 2000, I was fortunate enough to take part in the Local Bisley Millennium Meeting. This was the start of the build-up to the United Kingdom Millennium Meeting scheduled for July.

At the end of the Local Bisley, the following members were selected to represent the Falklands in the UK competitions:-

Messers K. Aldridge, C.J. & T.A. McCallum, G. Cheek, M. Pole-Evans, D. Pettersson, G. Goodwin, A.H. Ford and Mrs. Susan Whitney, accompanying member P.W. Peck; with R.K. Betts and J.S. Smith joining the party at Bisley.

This was the largest contingent of Falkland Islands members to ever take part in any UK meeting. (For the record, eight members attended in 1964).

Thanks to sponsorship from Fortuna Ltd. Mr. D. Dyson and Mr. M. Wood were able to visit the Falklands from February 1st - 8th, to give expert advice in all aspects of target rifle shooting. Since this visit, scores have dramatically improved - with the highest-ever score recorded in the club's lifetime being made.

The team began to arrive in the UK in late June, with the main body arriving on July 5th. Some took up residence in the camp on arrival, while others took the opportunity to visit relatives and friends before assembling a few days prior to the commencement of the meeting.

Incidentally, within the party were the Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer and most - if not all - of the committee members. This would prove valuable as any queries that arose during the competition could be resolved.

A full report on events will be provided separately by Derek Pettersson.

I refer again to my visit, when I detected an element of anxiety in that there was a lack of information on the UK Millennium Meeting getting through to club members. This is essential in the smooth running of the build up to and during the competitions.

It did arise during the meeting that the Chairman was confronted with an ultimatum. The committee was immediately called and the point in question was quickly resolved.

In conclusion, I must record the wonderful donation made by Cable & Wirelss PLC, which provided the team with track suits bearing the Rifle Club emblem and individual names.

The Falklands Rifle Club

A general meeting was convened on March 21st 2000 and, after a lengthy discussion, it was unanimously agreed that the way forward was for the club to break away from the FIDF - it would become a separate entity, to be known in the future as the Falkland Islands Rifle Club.

Following this decision, Mr. P.W. Peck was re-elected to chair the newly-founded club.

It was agreed that the Government Principal Crown Counsel should be invited to attend the next committee meeting to put in place any legal aspects appertaining to the transition.

The future

It is my belief that, as the Rifle Club becomes increasingly involved in worldwide competitions, the time has come to have a qualified coach and armourer within the club. This would enable members to fully exploit their potential.

Training overseas is essential if we are to compete successfully against the high standard marksmanship of so many TR competitors; and for those representing the Falklands in the Small

Island Games, Commonwealth Games and Bisley UK a qualified coach and gunsmith is essential. Again, the matter of finance rears its head and for a club with such small membership, undertaking these commitments becomes very difficult.

A four-monthly sweepstake which operates between June and September each year is well supported by the general public - without this, the Rifle Club would not survive. However, in more recent years the Falkland Islands Government has contributed funds to enable teams to be sent to the Small Island Games and Commonwealth Games.

Those in control of R.C. activities must be aware that tight financial control is an absolute necessity.

<u>Tributes</u>

I take this opportunity to pay tribute to all those companies and individuals - too numerous to mention - who have contributed cash and trophies to the FI.D.F. R.C. prize programme over the years. Prior to the annual Local Bisley prize distribution, the display of trophies is absolutely outstanding with an array of silverware dating back as far as 1913.

I would like to individually mention the Falkland Islands Company Ltd. who have not only donated several trophies, but also assist financially by waiving freight rates on material and making cash donations to assist R.C. members who are attending overseas competitions.

Thank you one and all for your generous support.

Longest Serving Member

Mr. A.H. Ford remains the longest serving member of the F.I.D.F. R.C. having joined in 1952. He also has the honour of serving on the Club's Committee continuously since joining.

Harry has devoted much of his spare time to the upkeep of the target butts and maintenance at the Sapper's Hill Range. With the move to Rookery Bay Range in 1990, Harry took over this work of his own accord and today remains a backbone of the Club, carrying out that work which is essential if rifle shooting is to continue.

Congratulations are extended to Harry for all his work over the years. He is always there to offer guidance to new members on maintenance and all aspects of rifle shooting.

Harry has also contributed many prizes for competition within the shooting calendar.

Harry maintains a strict and tight control of ammunition tallies - with quantities issues, returned, stock in hand, all instantly available. There is no doubt that this will continue as long as good health permits him to do so.

Conclusion

On December 31st 2000, I completed this booklet on full-bore shooting in the Falklands as a followup to the 1992 Edition. I have been fortunate in holding honorary positions as Secretary and Chairman since my first booklet, but due to health reasons was unable to continue to take an active part in RC activities.

This update proved much simpler to compile than the previous edition and again, I believe all entries to be authentic. As events unfold in the years ahead it is my wish that a full and accurate account of all events be recorded, as full-bore shooting claims a large part of the Falkland heritage.

I became a member of the Rifle Club during the 1957/58 shooting season and from 1972 I served as Secretary for several years, having been relieved of the post by special request.

During my membership I have been fortunate enough to win all the major trophies, both at Local Bisley and other club competitions up until 1997 - the only exception being the Consortium Cup, which I competed for twice since it's introduction in 1968; it slipped my grasp, however, as it was allocated as a consolation trophy.

I take this opportunity to thank all who trusted me in my capacity as Treasurer/Secretary, Sweepstake Organiser and Chairman. Without the excellent assistance from all committee members concerned, the task would have been much more difficult.

My sincere thanks to fellow club member Harry Ford, who was always available whenever I required assistance in any aspect of the club's activities.

Finally, special thanks go to all who have helped in the update of this booklet. Without the assistance and guidance of the Government Printer, Mr. Tony Pettersson, these booklets would never have been possible.

To conclude, as a member - now a visitor - I cannot close without expressing my views on the decision to turn the Junior Grand Aggregate into an handicap ruling. It is an aggregate, not a competition - let it stay that way. The Grand Aggregate is open to all competitors. The Junior Junior Grand Aggregate A & B classes cannot compete, therefore the Junior Grand Aggregate is open to C, D & E classes (or X A and O T F - if that sounds better).

I was informed that this handicap was passed in committee. I would only be convinced if I saw it dated, minuted and signed with voted for and against recorded. I have a strong feeling that this was an on-the-spot decision - apologies if I am wrong.

I realise that times move forward and changes are made - hopefully for the best. You may think me old fashioned and say that change benefits all concerned; I am sorry, but that is ridiculous. In my view this decision deprives the under-dog of a chance to win a prize or trophy in their respective classes. Is there an element of want creeping into the system? I hope not!

PRESENTATIONS

Stan Smith Challenge Shield

Presented March 1992. To be competed for in conjunction with the Easter Prize Competitions. Shooting over 3, 5, 600 yards. Gun score possible 150pt

Wimbledon Cup

Presented to the FIDF RC during the visit of the overseas team as part of the Heritage Year celebrations on December 3rd 1992. Competed for over all five ranges under handicap conditions. Shooting over 3, 5, 6, 900 and 1000 yards. Possible 175pts.

Chris McCallum Trophy

Although the first trophy was presented and competed for in the 1992 Heritage Year competitions, a further trophy was presented and competed for in early 1993 as a challenge trophy. Shooting over 3, 5, 600 yards. Possible 150pts.

Mark Gleadell Memorial Trophy

Presented by Mr. Ian Gleadell in 1995. Shooting over 3, 5, 6, 9, 1000 yards. Possible 250pts.

Cable & Wirelss Trophy

Presented in 1996. Shooting over 3, 5, 600 yards. Possible 150pts.

Leif's Shield Team Trophy

Presented in 1996. Shooting over 3, 5, 600 yards. Possible 150pts.

Kelper Store Trophy

Presented in 1997. Possible in 1997 was 105pts, 1998 Possible was 150. See winner's scores.

Turner Trophies

These two cups were competed for at Fox Bay in about 1913. They are engraved as follows:

- Presented by M. Buckworth to the Best Rifle Shot on West Falklands. Won by H.J. Stanley-Turner MBE MD FRS(E), late of Fox Bay.
- Presented by T. Stickney, Fox Bay Rifle Club 1913. Won by H.M. Stanley-Turner MBE MD FRS(E), late of Fox Bay.

In 1983 both these Cups were re-presented to the FIDF RC by his daughter, Mrs. Dorothy Tindal-Carill-Worsley AE. They have been incorporated into the Local Bisley prize competitions.

Victory Bar Trophy

Presented by Mr. & Mrs. A. Jacobsen in 1997. Further donations have been made - Magpie Trophy, Sighters Aggregate and Champions Shield.

Magpie Trophy presented by the Philomel Store in 1995. **Sighters Aggregate** presented by A.H. Ford in 1998 - both were competed for at Local Bisley only. **Champion's Shield** presented by K. Aldridge 1997/98.



An important event in the history of the Falkland Islands Rifle Association was the visit of the Great Britain Rifle Team this month.

The team - comprising Colin McEachran, Hamish Hunter, Bob Aitken, Jim Scobie, Andrew Tucker, Colin Cheshire, Larry Orpen-Smellie and Ken Chard - was the first overseas team to visit the Islands. They arrived on December 1st and were greeted by the Chairman of the Rifle Association, Stan Smith and the committee, with a fleet of Landrovers to transport their guests to Stanley.

At a later reception, Stan told the visitors he had previously tried to arrange such a visit in the early 1970s without success and was very much looking foward to the forthcoming week. The Governor David Tatham, Mrs. Tatham and Councillor Peck and his wife were also at the reception. Stan Smith was then presented with a trophy made on behalf of the National Rifle Association.

Events went on over three days at the Rookery Bay Range, all major pries going to the visiting team. The range saw the highest ever recored scores made in those three days.

<u>"Falkland Islands Rifle Club Bisley</u> 2000 Competition"

February 4th 2000

Sunday January 30th brought the final competitions of the Local Bisley. Sixteen members took part and the first competition was the final, which produces the overall champion.

This is shot for over 900 and 1000 yards and the top eight competitors from the second stage qualify. All other competitors shoot in a separate competition, entitled the Consortium Cup.

Scores from the second stage are carried forward to the final and Harry Ford held a one point lead from Mike Pole-Evans, Stan Smith and Ken Aldridge at commencement of shooting at 900 yards.

With conditions reasonable, some good scores were achieved with Mike and Ken both scoring 71 our of 75 to put them equal first. However, conditions deteriorated at 1000 yards with very big win changes needed. Scores took a noticeable drop, with only Derek Pettersson and Susan Whitney from the finalists making over 50 out of 75.

With only Mike Pole-Evans and Stan Smith left to shoot, Derek's score of 55 meant he had a one point lead from Ken.

Mike started very well with two V bulls, but followed this with two misses in the next four shots. From there on, the fight started as he followed up with several magpies. With one shot to go Mike needed a magpie or better to win, or an outer to force a tie shoot. He managed a magpie to win the championship by one point from Derek, with Ken taking third and Susan Whitney fourth.

The Consortium Cup had eight competitors also. In this event each competitor fires 15 rounds at 900 and 1000 yards and are given a handicap score. Garreth Goodwin scored 68 at 900 yards to take a two point lead from Pat Peck, with Gerald Cheek a further point behind.

Most competitors had similar problems as the finalists at 1000 yards and, again, only two shooters managed to get above 50 - Derek Goodwin and Gerald Cheek. However, this was not enough to secure the cup after handicap points were awarded. Jason Lewis came out on top with 135.3 points, followed by Nigel Dodd in second with 132.9 and Derek Goodwin third with 130.8.

The final competition was the Bonner Memorial Team Shoot. Here the four top competitors at 300 yards in the first stage pick the teams for a seven round shoot over 300, 500 and 600 yards.

Some good scores were recorded at 900 yards with Dave making 34 out of 35 and Mike 33.

One who did complete his shoot was Mike Woods, who, after scoring 23 out of 35 was heard to say "Forget my lesson on wind readings which I gave you, I'm going to have to rewrite it once I get home."


The hampers were won by the top eleven competitors. Several cases of wine, beer and minerals kindly donated by Lewis Clifton of Byron Marine were also shared out.
