Complaint received has been given to Chief Constable by his son Inspector Sellman who had reported that he saw Lawlor apparently under influence of drink.

2. On a separate paper an application has been received from Constable Lawlor for permission to resign on grounds of ill health.

3. With exception of 3 occasions upon which Constable Lawlor has been under influence of drink his service has been satisfactory & he has done useful work as Inspector of the Dyfme Inn: his resignation for other reasons is accepted
