With reference to your letter No.56768/28 of 13th July, I am commanded by My Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty to return, with thanks, the two photographs purporting to represent the German warship "DRESDEN" in the act of surrendering during the Great War at the island of Juan Fernandez.

2. As regards paragraph 2 of the letter from the Governor of the Falkland Islands, I am to state that both British and German official accounts agree that a white flag was flown by the "DRESDM", and there is now no controversy on that point. The German account states, however, that the War flag was also shewn and that the White flag was for parley, not surrender.

Should this be true the fact that one of the photographs, apparently, shows a white flag as flying at the height of the lunnels on the foremost must may save to assist in its settlement.
