I have consulted the L.G. in regard to Res (70) although Circular of 26/9/42 has not been received. Para 2 of Res (70) indicates that it ~~was~~ referred to Brazilian Exchange.

What has happened is, that Brazil has changed the name of its currency from "milreis" to "Cruzeros", while the exchange rate is hardly affected.

The only dealing we have, or are intended to, are the negotiation of bank drafts through a "Brazilian Special Account" i.e. cover cost of purchases made in Brazil. No transaction has been made at this end concerning Brazilian currency itself. Since all these transactions come under the Defence Finance Regulations which are amended from time to time by B of E. Circulars, I do not think any legislative action is necessary in this case, in which the Cabinet concurs.

Estate Louis Williams show "Norman E. Rowe" of Buenos Aires as the source of supply ^{on} many of his Import licence applications, and Mr. Les. Hardy show "Fox Films, Buenos Aires" on some of his, but I do not know how the goods are actually ordered. I have never been instructed not to grant licences for the obtaining of goods from the Argentine: all that I understood was, that payments for such goods could not be made direct.

I suggest that Mr. Rowe be asked how he places his orders, and that he be informed that he must place his orders with his agents in Montevideo who must buy the goods in the Argentine on their own account, re-selling them ultimately to Estate Louis Williams. I cannot find any record of Mr. Rowe's having been given these instructions.

This is primarily a question of financial control, but it relies for its effectiveness on co-operation with the import control authorities. May I suggest, therefore, that instructions dealing with questions such as that raised in red 116 be passed to me for noting as they are received, so that I am not left completely in the dark.

For some reason Castiglioni & Lucas-Calcraft are having trouble with the Uruguayan exchange control but McLean & Stapledon are not. It may be due to the attempt to overcome restrictions by a series of transfers of under £500. In any case we are not concerned with the reasons.

2. Mr. Rowe now seeks permission to trade direct with the Argentine. The existing arrangements are set out in 116. They were brought into force, although apparently irregular, in order to overcome the difficulties caused at that time by the Central Bank of Argentina refusing to negotiate Falkland Islands cheques. It seems that the Central Bank is now willing to accept remittances from E.L.W. This being so it would probably be in order for this Government to grant the necessary exchange permits but I think we should obtain permission from London before doing so, with reference to 116. If Y/E agrees I will draft the necessary telegram.

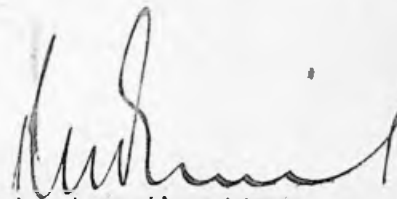

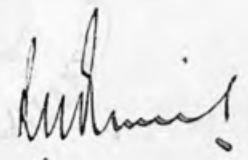

With reference to your letter of the 11th September and our conversation of that date regarding Argentine Exchange, I see that through inadvertence the Form A.1 was not actually signed by myself. This turns out to be just as well, because I find that the Application is ~~not~~, after all, irregular. The Beneficiary is entered as the "Estate Louis Williams" whereas it must, in all cases, be the seller of the goods in the Argentine. Your Agent in Buenos Aires is also inadmissible as Beneficiary. What is required is a separate A 1 form in favour of each and every Argentine firm to whom you owe money, and each application must be backed by an original account from the firm in question made out in sterling by them. Again, your Agent's statement as to the sums owing is inadmissible. I very much regret the inconvenience to which this decision must subject you, but the procedure is quite clear, and even if I had signed the Form A 1 I should have had to withdraw it. Meanwhile, I should be glad to hear why the Central Bank has refused permits for the E 1 forms as soon as you are advised on this point.

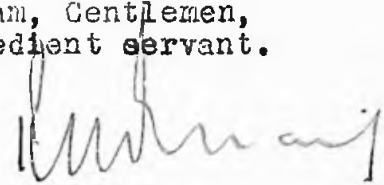

Arising out of the recent appreciation of Argentine peso against the United States dollar in the free market in Buenos Aires from around 4.22 pesos = United States \$1 to around 4.00 pesos, the Argentine authorities have made the following changes in their official exchange rates -

- (a) The official buying rate for exchange arising from "non-regular" exports (i.e. exports to which preferential rate is given) was altered on 19th April from 421.82 pesos = United States \$100 to 397.02. The corresponding rate for sterling was changed from 16.95½ to 15.96.
- (b) The previously agreed buying rate of 16.95½ for sterling financial (i.e. non-export) remittances from the sterling area to Argentina has been abolished. Instead new arrangements have now been agreed on the basis of the free market rate in Buenos Aires thus placing sterling and dollar remitters on equal footing. Accordingly the Argentine Central Bank will cable the Bank of England each day the rate for sterling based on the closing rate for United States dollars on the free market and the sterling dollar cross rate of 4.02 repeat 4.02 less ¼ commission. (The Argentine authorities still use the original Bank of England official selling rate of 4.02 as the cross rate.) This rate is firm for the following day (or days in the event of the Buenos Aires market being closed) to cover all financial remittances from and peso requirements of the sterling area.

Rates quoted by the Argentine Central Bank are stated to be net except for transfer tax and stamp duties due from beneficiaries. You will appreciate that the rate for sterling may fluctuate daily, e.g. on opening day of new system on 18th May their buying rate quoted was 15.98. On 19th May it was 15.97.

2. Owing to fluctuation in the rate for financial remittances to Argentina the Bank of England are not publishing rates for the Argentine peso but are informing London banks daily in order to enable them to calculate sterling amounts for immediate remittance over Special Account by cable in settlement of peso debts. The Bank of England will no longer sell pesos to authorised dealers for the public.

3. Financial remittances from Argentina to the sterling area should continue to be made through Special Account. You probably know that in order to obtain more favourable rate than the official selling rate of 17.13, Argentine remitters to sterling area for non-import purposes are permitted to purchase United States dollars in Buenos Aires free market and exchange them at Argentine Central Bank for sterling from Special Account at fixed rate of United States \$4.02 = £1. They are thus able to secure in effect parallel rates to dollar rate available in the Buenos Aires free market for similar remittances to the United States of America.

Canadian Nationals.

You have already received in Lord Moyne's Circular despatch of the 16th May, 1941 a copy of the Agreement between the United Kingdom and Canadian Controls on Anglo-Canadian residence, laying down, inter alia, the principles by which the residential status of Canadians in the United Kingdom is determined.

2. In accordance with these principles (and subject of course to F.E.142 where applicable) Canadians in the United Kingdom are treated as residents of Canada if:

- (a) they arrived in the United Kingdom from Canada after the 3rd September, 1939,
- (b) they were in this country on a visit on the 3rd September, 1939 and have remained here for the sole purpose of assisting in the war effort,
- (c) they are serving here as full time Canadian Government officials.

As such persons are subject in all respects to the Canadian Exchange Control Regulations they are given exemption from United Kingdom Defence (Finance) Regulations Nos. 1, 4, and 5, relating to the acquisition of securities, gold and foreign currency respectively (except for the purpose of any business in which they may engage in the United Kingdom) unless and until the Canadian Control decide they should be treated as United Kingdom residents.

3. The following Canadians are treated as residents of the United Kingdom and as such are subject in all respects to the United Kingdom Defence (Finance) Regulations:

- (a) those who were normally resident in the United Kingdom on the 3rd September, 1939 except those referred to in paragraph 2(c) above,
- (b) those who were in the United Kingdom on a visit at the outbreak of war and have remained here for reasons of personal preference.

4. The uniform application of this procedure in the United Kingdom at this juncture involves the withdrawal of certain exemptions given prior to the Anglo-Canadian Agreement on the strength of certificates issued by the High Commissioner for Canada in the United Kingdom. In cases where persons who will no longer be exempted under the present procedure have undertaken commitments abroad on the basis of an exemption enjoyed hitherto permission may be given for them to retain foreign currency held now or received in the future (or to purchase foreign currency from the United Kingdom control) to meet such established commitments. The retention of foreign currency will, normally,

be limited to the amount required to meet commitments for, say, 12 months; (thereafter exchange would be sold for this purpose if necessary.) "Established commitments" will be interpreted liberally to avoid causing hardships. As a further safeguard against hardship it will always be open to the High Commissioner for Canada to make representations where, in his opinion, exceptional circumstances warrant special treatment.

5. Please apply a similar procedure in your territory and inform the Foreign Exchange Control Board, Ottawa, of any exemptions from the operation of your Regulations which you grant together with details of the foreign currency assets affected.

6. If you encounter any difficulties please refer to me.

CONFIDENTIAL**IMPORT OF STERLING NOTES INTO THE UNITED KINGDOM**

1. Once notes have been admitted into the United Kingdom they can be encashed without question.
2. Under our Statutory Rules and Orders -
 - (a) Any amount may be brought or sent into the United Kingdom from Eire, except by persons -
 - (1) who are travelling via Eire in the course of a journey from some other place outside the United Kingdom;
 - (11) who while travelling from Eire touch at a place outside the United Kingdom.
 - (b) Up to £10 in high or low sum notes may be brought into the United Kingdom by a traveller from any country other than Eire. (The expression "traveller" does not include a person employed in any capacity on board ship or aircraft.)
3. Import is allowed administratively in the following circumstances:
 - (a) Remittances through the post up to £10 in high or low sum notes except where regular offenders are concerned.
 - (b) If the holder can prove that he acquired the notes on or before the 20th August, 1940, and can explain satisfactorily why he did not take advantage of the special arrangements made at the time the prohibition on import was introduced.
 - (c) Where it can be proved that notes have been brought out of territory occupied by the enemy (e.g. by refugees). The date of acquisition is immaterial.
 - (d) When remitted by banks in sterling area countries with the permission of the local Control.
 - (e) Notes sent or brought in by people from other sterling area countries where it is shown that the local Control approved the despatch or taking out of more than £10.
4. It is recognised that certain of the concessions mentioned above help to create a small market in which the enemy can sell. But it is felt that the gain in administrative convenience outweighs this disadvantage. The concessions mentioned in paragraph 3 have of course not been made known to the public.
5. Notes imported without permission are liable to seizure and forfeiture. In practice forfeiture is not applied unless there has been a deliberate attempt to evade the Regulation.
6. Where the import of seized notes is refused and
forfeiture

forfeiture not applied, they are returned, on application, to the sender or, in the case of notes brought in by a traveller, to the place where he acquired them, leaving him to make the best arrangements he can for their re-sale. In both cases the notes are despatched direct by the United Kingdom Control, at owner's risk, by registered cover, uninsured.

7. The special needs of merchant seamen are catered for by arrangements drawn up in 1941 in conjunction with the Ministry of War Transport. Details of these arrangements are known in the Colonial Dependencies.

8. Above is not exhaustive and other cases are treated on their merits.

✓ 1. (a) I attach a note which summarises briefly United Kingdom policy in regard to the admission of sterling notes.

(b) I should be glad if your policy regarding the admission of sterling notes were based broadly on United Kingdom practice since no doubt ultimately such notes will be sent to the United Kingdom. I am referring here in general to your administrative policy in treating cases on their merits for you will not of course make public a policy designed to cover administrative concessions.

(c) But if for good local reasons your policy is already more restrictive there is no need to adopt a more lenient one.

(d) I should be glad however if you would refer to me any case which calls for treatment under paragraph 3(b) of the enclosed summary since the Bank of England have certain records which often enables them to check a claimant's story.

2. (a) As regards the export of sterling notes I should like to know whether your practice corresponds with that in the United Kingdom which is -

(1) to stop the export of notes (otherwise than to Eire) through the post

(11) to limit the export of notes by travellers otherwise than to Eire whether or not they are authorised to carry any other currency to -

(1) £2 when the destination is in enemy territory

(2) £10 when the destination is elsewhere.

Where the total amount of sterling notes and any foreign currency to be taken out exceeds these figures a Certificate "C" is required. If it is considered that there is a case for letting a traveller have more than £10 in total (e.g. for a long voyage) his additional requirements can be met by taking travellers cheques and/or foreign currency usually of the country of destination. Applications for permission to take out more than £10 in sterling notes are invariably refused.

(b) I appreciate that local conditions may in certain circumstances lead you to approve the export of sterling notes by travellers above the amounts mentioned in the preceding paragraph. In such cases please bear in mind

the import restrictions in force in the United Kingdom and other sterling area countries. In this connection I would suggest you draw no distinction between Eire and other countries. Travellers to whom the local equivalent of Certificate "C" has been issued should be allowed to retain the document after cancellation by your local customs; they will then be in a position to produce it should such evidence be required at the place of disembarkation.

(c) Your local equivalent of Certificate "C" should not of course be issued to cover the export from your territory of sterling notes which you are not prepared to allow through your import control.

3. The arrangements for dealing with sterling notes in excess of local requirements remain in force. You will observe from Section 3(d) of the enclosed memorandum the United Kingdom admit sterling notes exported from your territory with your approval.

4. Sterling notes mean Bank of England notes and notes issued by banks in Scotland and Northern Ireland.

5. If any special problems are encountered locally and you feel that your general administrative policy should differ from that in the United Kingdom I should be glad to be informed of the extent of such differences.

Messrs Castiglioni & Lucas-Calcraft, and we also
instructed Messrs C. & L-C. to the effect that this
transfer was to cover goods that had already been
handled by them ex Buenos Aires.

We were due a further identical sum of £629.-- to
Messrs Castiglioni & Lucas-Calcraft, in Montevideo
for goods of Uruguayan origin, (£321.- and £108.-
for importations of 19th May and 12th June 1944)
so we instructed Messrs Hambros Bank Ltd., London
by telegraph to remit in all £1058.-- to Montevideo
in the usual manner.

Under date of 29th June 1944 Messrs C. & L-C.
wired us from Montevideo to the following effect:-

"New dispositions of Banco Republica prohibits
liquidate transfer exceeding £500 for payment of
transshipment merchandise. The last transfers of
£866 and £1058 have not yet been liquidated.

London Bank suggests you withdraw these
transfers and re-send them in sums of less than
£500 "

We immediately interviewed Mr. Lellman in the
Treasury, explained the situation to him and suggested
leaving those £1495.-- in Montevideo, (to be used
later on for Montevidean purchases) and to send various

other remittances, for sums of less than £500.- each, and for goods "to be imported". This was agreed to and we then sent the following telegraphic remittances:-

When the mail came in 14th July it brought us two letters from Messrs Castiglioni & Lucas-Calcraft, both dated 30th June last. One letter simply said:-

" We confirm telegram informing you that Banco de la Republica had prohibited the liquidation of more than £500.- at a time for payment of transshipment merchandise. You will have to return the £866.- and £1058- to London and have them sent out again in smaller sums than £500.- at various times. "

The other letter said:-

" The new orders of the Banco de la Republica are of 1st June 1944, and they preclude being able to continue liquidating payments in the previous form. As a transitory solution we have agreed with the Bank of London & South America that you make remittances of less than £500 at a time, but it is almost certain that the Banco de la Republica, when they see a succession of such amounts will again prohibit such transfers. "

And evidently this is what actually has happened, as on the 14th July last Messrs Castiglioni & Lucas-Calcraft telegraphed to us as follows:-

" BANCO REPUBLIC-A PROHIBITED ALL STERLING TRANSFERS FOR PAYMENT OF ARGENTINE MERCHANDISE/."

Until last night that was the latest news we had, and by the last mail we wrote to Messrs Castiglioni & Lucas-Calcraft pointing out to them that we could get no news here confirming that attitude of the Banco de la Republica as applicable to other importations here, and that they should endeavour to find out in what manner Messrs Macleod & Co. of London, who also handle considerable Argentine

---- merchandise transhipped at Montevideo, were getting their purchases liquidated, as anything done by Messrs Maclean & Stapledon in regard to transfers of funds and their liquidation, must also be possible in connection with our identical operations.

News in this connection cannot be expected until after the mail reaches Montevideo

But in the meantime our shippers in Buenos Aires have also been busy, and we understand that one of the interested parties, being the Customs House Agent who earns a certain amount of money from the handling of shipments and who therefore saw his income liable to be curtailed if our shipments were interrupted, has petitioned the Exchange Control Authority in Buenos Aires, being the BANCO CENTRAL de la REPUBLICA ARGENTINA, and this morning we have received a telegram from Buenos Aires, which, translated, reads as follows:-

" BANCO CENTRAL PROVISIONALLY AUTHORIZES
TWO THOUSAND POUNDS PER MONTH FOR DRAFTS
IN NAME OF Messrs GOMI, PONTIN y Cia. "

(Messrs Gomi, Pontin y Cia. are the firm who finance our purchases in Buenos Aires until such time as covering remittances come through. They have been rendering this service to us for nearly twenty years).

In view of all this, and as we must do something as soon as possible to cover our debts in Buenos Aires, we hereby wish to have authority to:-

- A) Instruct Messrs The Bank of London & South America Ltd. at Montevideo, to return the pending transfers of:-

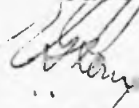

which they at present hold in Uruguayan Special a/c. in Montevideo to the order of Messrs Castiglioni & Lucas-Calcraft - to return them to their source that being our account with Hambros Bank Ltd in London.

- B) To obtain from you as Competent Authority (Finance) a new Form A.1. for a consolidated amount of £1495.-- approved for a transfer to Buenos Aires to the order of Messrs Gomi, Pontin y Cia.

If you agree to this it would, at any rate, help out the situation until some settled method can be re-established for the importation of Argentine merchandise and the liquidation of the cash involved.

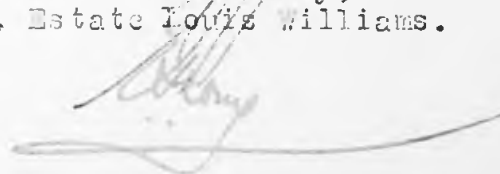
During 1940 a certain sum of money was deposited with us with instructions that we were to send same in Postal Money Orders in sums of £10.- per month to Madame Dugas.
