U.S. dollar notes.



1. I understand that the Falkland Islands Government have asked the Crown Agents for the Colonies how to dispose of a surplus of U.S. dollar notes acquired in the Falkland Islands from travellers.

2. I have ascertained that the U.K. Control are willing to buy the notes at $\frac{1}{4} \text{ £} = \text{£}1$, which is the rate at which notes are purchased by them from authorised dealers in the United Kingdom. It is hoped that resale at this rate will not leave the Falkland Islands Government out of pocket.

3. If you see no objection, I shall be glad if the notes can be set aside and held by the Falkland Islands Government on behalf of the Bank of England, and that I may be informed of the amount set aside, so that arrangements may be made for the sterling equivalent to be paid to the Crown Agents for the Colonies for account of the Falkland Islands Government. In due course when the necessity arises I will inform you how the notes should be disposed of (expenses of disposal would be met by the Bank of England).

4. In future it is suggested that Falkland Islands Government should buy notes (from residents or non-residents) only on the following conditions:

- (a) Up to $\frac{1}{2}$ £ a head without question whether brought or sent into the Falkland Islands by the owner so long as it is not an habitual practice, and

(b)

- (b) Over £50 a head if the notes have been acquired by the holder direct from a United States source (which would include members of the U.S. Forces, or brought direct from a sterling area country with local Control approval, so long as the amounts are reasonable having regard to the station of the holder.

5. To ensure that enemy-tainted notes which would not be admitted into the United States are not realised in the Falkland Islands I should like you to refer to me before buying notes in circumstances other than those mentioned.

6. Any further surpluses of U.S. dollar notes acquired may be dealt with as in paragraph 3 above for payment of the sterling equivalent (at £4.11 = £1) to the Crown Agents' account from time to time as notes are set aside, if you will inform me of the amounts involved.

7. As the Falkland Islands Government will be reimbursed in sterling for notes acquired locally in local currency, the local rate of purchase might be fixed sufficiently above £4.11 = £1 to cover the cost of transferring sterling from the U.K. to the Falkland Islands and any expenses incurred by local Government in handling the notes.

8. A convenient rate to use would be 4s.10d. per dollar (= nearly £4.14 = £1) (which is the rate at which notes are purchased from the public in the U.K.)

9. Notes could of course be resold locally to residents of the Falkland Islands for the purposes approved by local Control, but not normally in amounts exceeding £50 per head because the holder would have difficulty in taking larger amounts into the U.K. I would suggest selling at 5s. = /1 (i.e. $\frac{1}{2}$ = £1) which would be slightly more favourable to Falkland Islands Control than effective rate at which dollar notes are sold to the public in the U.K. (i.e. $\frac{1}{4}.02\frac{1}{2}$ = £1. less one-eighth per cent commission).

10. For audit purposes please send to the Chief Cashier, Bank of England, Dealing and Accounts Office, London, E.C.2, direct each month a Certificate showing the total amount of notes held on their behalf at the close of business on the last working day of the preceding month. Please also send me for the Bank of England specimen signatures of the authorised person or persons who will give the certificates.

The attention of the public is invited to the Defence (Finance) Regulations, 1945, made by His Excellency on the 26th April, 1945, to the effect that no Bank of England notes of the denomination of £5 or higher will be accepted by the Colonial Treasury after the 31st of May, 1945.

2. As most people know, considerable quantities of English notes have, in one way or another, passed into enemy hands during the war. Only recently a large stock of them was found hidden with what is believed to be the gold reserve of Germany in a salt mine in that country. Many English bank notes have also been distributed in South America by the enemy in an effort to lower the value of British currency. In order to lessen the risk of such a plan succeeding the British Government has forbidden the use of £5 notes on ships and has declared the Bank of England notes of £10 value or upwards shall no longer be legal tender.

3. In these circumstances Bank of England notes of £5 or upwards will be of no value to the people of this Colony and the Regulations issued by His Excellency are designed to call in all such notes by the 31st of May.

4. This does not allow very much time and the following arrangements have been made to help any people who happen to have English £5 notes or English notes of higher values to exchange them for local notes before the end of May.

5. Anybody on West Falkland who has high value English notes should send them to the Post Office at Fox Bay before the 31st of May. The Postal clerk will exchange these notes for the same value in Falkland Islands notes.

6. Anybody in Stanley who has these notes should take them to the Treasury for exchange.

7. In Lafonia the notes will be exchanged by Mr. Goddard.

8. A Treasury Official will visit all the other farms on the East Falklands during May and he will exchange notes belonging to people in this area.

9. It is important to remember that after the 31st of May Bank of England notes of the value of £5 or higher will not be accepted for any purpose.

10. This Regulation does not apply to Bank of England notes of the value of £1 or 10/- but only to £5 notes or upwards.

11. Finally it should be remembered that the import or export of any bank notes without a permit from the Treasury is already prohibited by the Defence (Finance) Regulations, 1939.

Dear Goddard,

I enclose for your private information
copies of a Regulation and a draft Broadcast Notice which
it is intended to issue as soon as "Fitzroy" has left
for Montevideo.

They are self-explanatory, I think, and I write to
ask whether you would be so very kind as to undertake
the changing of notes for us in Lafonia? I do not
imagine there will be very many.

Our difficulty is, of course, that if we were to
give no time-limit or even a lengthy interval, the news
might reach the Plate that Sterling £5, £10, £20, etc.,
notes could be exchanged at par in Stanley although
demonatised elsewhere already, and a nice racket might
be started. So we are trying to get the job done
between two sailings of "Fitzroy".

If you would help by exchanging any notes offered
until the 31st May and would then send them in, we should
be very grateful. As a safeguard, perhaps you would be
good enough to telephone on the 1st June, giving the
Treasury the serial numbers of the Sterling notes in your
hands. Then, when you send them in, we will credit
your account with the equivalent in local currency.

I shall be most grateful for your help and in order





Import and export of sterling notes and foreign currencies. Under the Importation of Notes (Foreign) Order, 1945, S.R. & O. 1945 No. 241, issued on 5th March, the import into the United Kingdom of French franc, Belgian franc and Dutch guilder notes (repeat notes) is prohibited from 12th March, but exemption is given to travellers enabling them to bring in such notes up to an amount not exceeding the equivalent of £5 in the aggregate.

2. The Currency Restrictions (Travellers' Exemption) Order, 1945, S.R. & O. 1945 No. 242, also issued on 5th March, alters as from 12th March the amounts of sterling notes and foreign currencies (i.e. currencies other than sterling) that may be taken out of the United Kingdom by travellers without obtaining special permission (by Certificate "C").

The present position is as follows:-

(a) Travellers to liberated and "enemy" countries in Europe may take out -

(i) Sterling notes up to £5, and

(ii) Foreign currency up to the value of £10.

For this purpose liberated and "enemy" countries in Europe include:

Albania	Finland	Latvian Republic
Austria	France	Lithuanian Republic
Belgium	Germany	Luxembourg
Bulgaria	Greece	Monaco
Czechoslovakia.	Holland	Norway

(b) Travellers to Eire may take sterling and Irish currency up to any amount.

(c) Travellers to other countries may take £15 in all in sterling notes and foreign currency but of this total not more than £10 may be in sterling notes.

3. The purpose of these measures is as follows:-

(a) The reduction to £5 in the amount of sterling notes that may be taken to European liberated and "enemy" territories and the limitation on the import of French franc, Belgian franc and Dutch guilder notes to a total of £5 is designed to restrict trafficking in sterling notes against local currencies in black markets on the Continent.

(b) The amount of foreign currency that in addition to £5 in sterling notes, may be taken by travellers to liberated /and

and "enemy" countries without a Certificate "C" has been increased to £10 because of high prices in those countries. A further consideration is that sterling notes taken out are intended for use on return to this country. The amount of sterling notes and foreign currency that may be taken out by travellers to other countries has been increased to an aggregate of £15 to bring the total for those countries into line with that for the liberated and "enemy" countries.

4. Travellers from the United Kingdom will not be permitted to export sterling notes in excess of the limits above even when authorised exceptionally by the issue of Certificate "C" to take out more than £15 in all of sterling notes and foreign currency. Travellers are being warned that sterling notes should not be exchanged abroad although they can be used on British ships and aircraft.

5. Authorised dealers in the United Kingdom have been instructed not to sell notes of the liberated and "enemy" territories mentioned in paragraph 2 above in excess of the equivalent of £10 per person in view of the limitations on export of these currencies.

6. French franc, Belgian franc and Dutch guilder notes brought in by travellers in excess of the exempted aggregate of £5 will be seized by the Customs. The manner in which such notes will be dealt with will depend upon the outcome of discussions with the French, Belgian and Dutch authorities with a view to making reciprocal arrangements regarding restrictions on note traffic.

7. Copies of the relative S.R. & O.'s and F.E. Notices (F.E.216 which includes a new "Warning to Travellers" and amendment slips Nos. 68 and 69 amending F.E.175) which have all been issued with effect from 12th March are being forwarded to you in the ordinary course.

8. I shall be glad if you will take parallel action so far as is consistent with local conditions. I suggest that you could allow the export of local currency instead of sterling notes, if desired, within the limits applicable to the export of sterling notes from the United Kingdom but you would not of course allow the unrestricted export of notes by travellers to Eire as in the United Kingdom.

9. Please refer to me if you have occasion to seize any French, Belgian or Dutch notes and also before authorising purchases of any of these notes by your authorised dealers.

2. Transfer of Sterling to Argentine Hitherto I have been able to pay School bills for my elder son at St. George's College, Buenos Aires by means of an arrangement with Mr. Gus Yonge of Magellanes who owns Bluff Cove Station East Falkland. He pays dollars into my account at the Bank of London & South America, Buenos Aires, while I pay pounds into his account at the Falkland Islands Company, Stanley.

In February of this year I requested from Mr. Yonge the dollar equivalent of £200 but a telegram I received this month advises me that he had not yet been able to transfer the necessary dollars.

My credit balance at the Bank is therefore several hundred dollars short of the amount of the bill presented by the College to the Bank for payment in March 1945.

Can you, by any means at your disposal, by letter or telegram, secure me the equivalent in Argentine dollars of at least £100, preferably £200 because there will be another bill to meet in August, and credit same to my account at the Bank. You will realise the urgency of my request and I hope you can temporarily waive formalities so that the money can go through this mail. I am asking the Falkland Islands Company to do anything in their power to help.

3. Under the provisions of the Will of the late Mrs. G. J. Felton the sum of £500 is left to relatives in the U.S.A. As executor for the Will I am at a loss to know how to discharge this obligation in conformity with the regulations governing the transfer of sterling to Foreign Countries. Can you offer any suggestion as to how this can be done under present circumstances?

I have tried to get you on the telephone several times during the past week to discuss these three matters, but conditions have made it quite impossible. I hope Mr. Slade's overhaul of the line between Stanley and Teal Inlet will put things right.



1. Norway is now treated as a separate "Monetary Area" under a monetary agreement with Norway which came into force with the lifting of Trading with the Enemy restriction.

2. Balances on Sterling Accounts of residents of Norway (called Norwegian Accounts) are available for transfer to other such accounts and for payment to residents of Sterling Area.

3. Exports from United Kingdom to Norway must be paid for in Sterling from Norwegian Accounts or in Norwegian Kroners.

4. Norwegian Kroners have been specified. Official rates in London (subject to bank's normal commission) are - T.T. buying 20.05 = £1 T.T. selling 19.95 = £1.

5. Applications for maintenance remittances to Norway will be judged by normal standards (i.e. by reference to pre-war remittances or hardships).

My circular telegram No. 147 of 28th July, 1940.

I enclose a memorandum of the conditions under which maintenance committees from your territory to persons outside the sterling area may now be permitted. It supersedes the previous instructions on maintenance given in my circular telegram under reference. Reference should be made to me where reference to London is indicated in the memorandum.

REMITTANCES FOR MAINTENANCE OUTSIDE THE
STERLING AREA

A. INTRODUCTION

1. With the exception of certain special arrangements referred to in B. below, this summary covers remittances for:-

- (a) Personal maintenance of persons outside the sterling area who are regarded as residents of the sterling area.
- (b) Personal maintenance outside the sterling area of non-residents.
- (c) Maintenance of property outside the sterling area.

2. The conditions governing remittances to residents while they are outside the sterling area apply equally to drawings by them for maintenance on their resident accounts so long as payments from both sources do not exceed the appropriate rate.

3. Non-residents may of course draw freely on their sterling area currency balances for remittances to their country of residence or other country in the same group but, except as stated below, remittances elsewhere outside the sterling area may not be made by them out of their sterling area currency resources.

4. The conditions on which non-resident-owned blocked balances may be used for maintenance on the grounds of hardship were given in my circular savingram confidential of 13th May, 1944, paragraph 13. (The limit of £30 per month on remittances to the Argentine referred to in paragraph 13(b)(ii) of that savingram has now been increased to £50. It is not expected however that circumstances will arise that would justify remittances on this scale on hardship grounds.)

5. Remittances outside the sterling area, either on behalf of a person regarded as resident in any other sterling area territory, or to such a person while outside the sterling area, should not be approved unless the prior consent has been obtained of the sterling area control of the country where the person concerned is regarded as resident.

6. If remittances in excess of the rates given below have already been authorised, no reduction need be made if there is reason to believe that it would cause hardship, although I should be glad to receive particulars of the cases involved.

B. SPECIAL ARRANGEMENTS

The following special arrangements are not dealt with in detail in this summary:-

(a) Migration.

(b) Remittances by -

- (i) H.M. Forces to their dependants outside the sterling area. (Non-commissioned members of the Forces should, in general, be referred to their Service Paymasters. Where, however, they wish to augment remittances already being made through Service

channels,

channels, reference should be made to London. All applications received from commissioned officers should also be referred to London.)

- (ii) Persons normally resident outside the sterling area who have come to the sterling area to do approved war work or to join H.M. or Allied Forces (for which see Notice F.E.142).
- (iii) Members of the U.S. Forces in the sterling area (for which see Notice F.E.132).
- (3) Remittances to -
 - (i) Enemy territory (for which see my circular savingram of 9th May, 1941, as amended by that of 22nd September, 1943).
 - (ii) Liberated territories.
 - (iii) Refugees and displaced persons in any countries outside the sterling area.
 - (iv) China by Chinese nationals.
 - (v) British subjects in Switzerland.
- (4) Drawings on their sterling area cur. accy balances by -
 - (i) Persons formerly resident in enemy territory who have removed to any enemy territory outside the sterling area (for which see my confidential circular savingram of 15th August, 1944).
 - (ii) Foreign nationals who have taken up permanent residence outside the sterling area (for which see circular savingram confidential of 17th February, 1944).

C. REMITTANCES FOR PERSONAL EXPENDITURE TO STERLING AREA RESIDENTS OUTSIDE THE STERLING AREA.

1. Remittances to evacuees.

- (a) Evacuees from the United Kingdom.

Remittances to children evacuated from the United Kingdom and adults accompanying them should normally be made under arrangements supervised by the Children's Overseas Reception Board and should not be approved without reference to London, in accordance with my circular telegram No. 99 of 4th October, 1943. It was recently decided to bring these arrangements to an end as it should soon be possible for all evacuees in North America to obtain passages home. The agreed procedure is as follows:-

- (i) The issue of new C.O.R.B. permits has been discontinued.

(ii) Upon application, permits which expired on 30th September, 1945, are being extended to 31st December, 1945. If the applicant states in writing:-

- (a) that the evacuee's name will be placed at once on the waiting list for a homeward passage;
 - (b) that the journey home will be made on the first possible boat in which accommodation is offered.
- (iii) Remittances will not be allowed after 31st December, 1945, except for the following classes of evacuees, and then only after full consideration of the merits of each individual case:
- (a) Children wishing to complete the current school year (i.e. to June, 1946) whether or not it leads to any particular examination; children wishing to continue for a further year in order to "graduate" at the end of it or to sit for an examination such as the Junior or Senior Matriculation (i.e. to June, 1947). (Remittances to adults in charge of such children will normally cease at the same time as remittances for the children but applications to continue remittances to adults aged 60 or over would receive consideration.) Children not near Matriculation age must return or be able to satisfy G.O.R.B. that they cannot get home before the new school year 1946/47.
 - (b) Students taking a University Course. (Applications on behalf of students who are taking similar courses or receiving training at a recognised institution will also be considered.)
 - (c) Children accepted as immigrants by the Canadian Authorities (to whom remittances on the G.O.R.B. Scale will be permitted until the end of the calendar year in which they reach their eighteenth birthday).
 - (d) Children with no home in the United Kingdom owing to the death of their parents or absence of near relatives.

Any existing arrangements under which remittances are made locally for the benefit of children evacuated from the United Kingdom and adults accompanying them should now be brought to an end on the same conditions as in the United Kingdom

(b) Evacuees from sterling area territory in the Far East

Remittances for living expenses may be made to sterling area nationals in North America who were evacuated from sterling area territory in the Far East (and did not immediately establish

residence

residence in a sterling area country) at the rate of \$25 per month for the first member of a family and \$15 per month for each other member (or if the family were receiving remittances at a higher rate from the territory from which they were evacuated before it was overrun by the enemy, remittances at this higher rate may be permitted, if reasonable, having regard to their present needs); such remittances may be supplemented by additional amounts for reasonable medical, surgical, hospital, dental and optical expenses on production of bills. But as evacuees from the Far East may have dollar assets they should be required to use up dollar balances and income for maintenance at rates not in excess of those above before being allowed to receive remittances. Moreover, an evacuee who has any sterling area currency balances blocked under the local equivalent of Regulation 30(2A) of the United Kingdom Defence (Finance) Regulations should be required to draw on them for his maintenance until they are exhausted before being allowed to receive remittances from third parties. (Please see paragraph 4(e) of the memorandum enclosed in my circular telegram confidential of 24th August, 1944.)

(a) Evacuees from other sterling area territory (i.e. except the United Kingdom or the Far East).

Any arrangements approved locally for remittances to persons evacuated from sterling area territory other than the United Kingdom will have to be reconsidered with a view to bringing them to an end in the same way as the C.O.D.B. arrangements as soon as it is clear that the evacuees may reasonably be expected to return to their own homes. Meanwhile remittances from your territory may be permitted as follows:

(i) Adults aged 60 or over

Remittances to adults aged 60 or over may be permitted if they are nationals of a sterling area country. Amounts of \$30 a month per person may be approved for living expenses and may be supplemented by additional amounts for reasonable medical, surgical, hospital, dental and optical expenses on production of bills.

(ii) Children

Remittances to children may be permitted if the children were under 16 years of age at the date of their departure. Amounts of up to \$10 a month per child may be approved for maintenance and supplemented by additional amounts for educational and reasonable medical, etc. expenses as above. Remittances for education and maintenance should normally be approved only up to the end of the school year in which the child reaches its eighteenth birthday. Further remittances may however be authorised to enable a child to pursue a course of higher education in order to qualify for a career of national importance. Such remittances for higher education should be reviewed annually and renewed only if a satisfactory standard of progress is maintained. (It is considered that remittances for a child's primary or secondary

education

education should not normally exceed £180 a year in addition to the amount allowed for maintenance, and that £340 per annum should be sufficient to cover all expenses of an American University, like Harvard, except during the vacation when it is customary for students to maintain themselves by working. The amount of £340 per annum (U.S. \$1,360) is made up of: tuition U.S. \$200; residence at the University U.S. \$500; clothes U.S. \$150; books U.S. \$30; and incidentals U.S. \$280.)

(iii) Adults in charge of children

Remittances to adults evacuated to take charge of children may be permitted up to £20 a month per person and supplemented by additional amounts for medical, etc. expenses as above. When the children for whom an adult is responsible cease to be eligible for remittances, authority for remittance to the adult should not be withdrawn if you are satisfied that the latter's continued presence is necessary for the protection of the children, or that the adult is a sterling area national aged 60 or over, or is genuinely unable to return to the sterling area.

2. Remittances to sterling area residents (other than evacuees.)

Remittances may be made at discretion to sterling area residents other than evacuees if they are aged 60 or over and are also nationals of a sterling area country up to £20 per month per person plus additional amounts for medical, etc. expenses as above.

Remittances to sterling area residents under 60 should not be permitted (apart from any salary payable to them from the sterling area) as they are expected to be able to earn sufficient to be able to maintain themselves. Where, however, hardship arises from circumstances beyond their control, e.g. chronic ill-health, reference should be made to London.

D. REMITTANCES FOR PERSONAL MAINTENANCE TO NON-RESIDENTS

1. Old Commitments

The resumption or continuation of regular remittances for maintenance or financial assistance made before the outbreak of war to non-residents may be permitted on the previous scale provided that the circumstances of the beneficiaries have not changed for the better. Any reduction in the scale should be made only when it is clear that hardship would not result. The resumption or continuation of remittances made to a country formerly inside but now outside the sterling area may be permitted on similar conditions on the basis of remittances made when the country was in the sterling area.

2. New Commitments

(a) Sterling Area Nationals

Regular maintenance remittances to nationals of a sterling area country should be permitted only to relieve hardship (measured by absolute and not comparative standards) and then not without prior reference to London. Single payment (i.e., not to be repeated within at least six months) may however be allowed at discretion up to £25 by close

relatives,

relatives, i.e., parent, grandchild, brother, sister, grandparent, or grandchild, to alleviate a particular catastrophe, such as operation or grave illness.

(b) Non-Sterling Area Nationals

Regular maintenance remittances to non-sterling area nationals should not be allowed as the responsibility for providing for such persons is considered to fall primarily on the country in which they live. Reference however should be made to London if any applications are received to make continuing maintenance remittances that seem to justify exceptional treatment. Single payments (defined as above) may be allowed at intervals up to £25 by close relatives (i.e., parent, brother, child, brother, sister, grandparent, or grandchild) to alleviate a particular catastrophe, such as operation or grave illness.

(This concession does not, of course, apply to refugees or to displaced persons.)

E. REMITTANCES FOR THE PURCHASE OF PROPERTY OUTSIDE THE STERLING AREA

Remittances for the purchase of property outside the sterling area may be permitted to cover the cost of reasonable replacement of property owned by sterling area residents except in Italy. (Applications for the maintenance of property in Italy should be referred to me for the sterling area.)






