

LAMPETER TESTIMONIAL

To Bishop of Argentine  
and Falkland Islands

HOME AFTER NINE YEARS

Home again after nine years  
abroad the Right Rev. D. Ivor  
Evans, Bishop of Argentine and  
Falkland Islands, was presented  
with a town testimonial given by  
the citizens of Lampeter.

At a service given at St.  
Peter's Church in honour of his  
visit the Bishop expressed his  
sincere pleasure at being back in  
his home parish after so long an  
absence. In a forceful address  
he spoke of the urgency of the  
world situation as it had presen-  
ted itself to the bishops at the  
Lambeth conference, and commended  
their report to the careful atten-  
tion of all Christian people. He  
stressed the threatening break-  
down of our civilisation and the  
possible frustration of God's plan  
for the world. He uttered a strong  
warning against totalitarianism,  
whether in politics or religion.

"God created men free, and no  
system of force could be toler-  
ated which took away man's  
essential freedom," he said.

In conclusion, the Bishop urged  
the vital necessity for Christian  
people to close their ranks and  
join together in the great and  
large work to which God calls all  
His people.

At the close of the service,  
the Bishop stood at the porch  
and exchanged greetings enthu-  
siastically with his old acquaint-  
ances.

As some people may not have heard  
Mr. Winter's broadcast talk on  
last Sunday owing to a break in  
transmission and because others  
may have been at Church, the talk  
was rebroadcast on Monday evening.

BROADCAST TALK BY  
MR. R.S. WINTER.

Good evening.

It is my purpose tonight to  
tell you something about the elec-  
tions under the new constitution  
which will be held early next year.

The Order-in-Council pro-  
viding the constitution will be  
made by His Majesty's Government  
some time this year.

It was prepared by the  
advisers to His Majesty's Govern-  
ment who are constantly engaged in  
drafting such orders. I par-  
ticularly want to emphasise this  
because of points which arise  
during this talk.

Those of you who listened to  
His Excellency's address to the  
Legislative Council will know that  
there are to be four elected mem-  
bers to the new Legislative Council  
- one each for the East and West  
Falklands and two for Stanley. The  
reason for this will be obvious -  
it will ensure as far as possible  
equal representation based on the  
number of population.



the high tension circuit, (b) large distributor gaps, due to worn rotors, and (c) badly adjusted gaps on sparking plugs.

Engine conditions also influence the interference appreciably, maximum interference occurring at rapid acceleration from low speed and at wide throttle under heavy loads, for example, when climbing hills in bottom gear.

If interference persists, even after taking the above precautions, suppressors can be fitted.

A good all-round interference suppression system is that used on British military vehicles. It consists of 5,000 ohm resistors at the coil and sparking plug terminals of the distributor, and 15,000 ohm resistors at the sparking plugs. (See diagram below.)



A1 to A5 5,000 ohm Carbon resistors.

B1 to B4 15,000 ohm Carbon resistors.

All resistors to be as near as possible to terminals.

Motorists will ask whether the use of this type of suppression has any bad effect on the performance of their cars, whether it causes difficult starting from cold, poor slow-running, or bad acceleration and running at high speeds.

In 1939 the Automobile Research Association carried out tests on a number of vehicles of widely different types. The conclusions were, briefly, that there was no effect at moderate or high speeds, or under appreciable load, but that some engines were affected at lower speeds, the maximum loss of power being nine per cent.

Generally, the loss was much smaller.


