I saw Mr. Shul on 20th March 1923. He enquired
whether anything could be done to help him to get
the license for South Shetlands for which he had
applied. He is anxious to form a local company
but he did not think that more than £8000 could
be raised locally towards £100,000 or £120,000
which would be required. He was enquiring also if
he got a license he could raise the necessary capital
in England.

2. I told him that I had already asked S.O.S.
to reconsider his decision with regard to his application.
Mr. Shul had been given extra time to submit his

Sir,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of Colonel St. Johnston's despatch No. 12 of the 9th February forwarding an application from Mr. Mitchell Steel for a licence to take whales at the South Shetlands and the South Orkneys.

2. In his despatch Colonel St. Johnston states that very little fishing is being done at those Dependencies at present, but, as regards the South Shetlands, I would point out that, including the additional facilities promised to Messrs. Calvesen and to the Southern Sealing and Whaling Company during the war, the Government is committed to the use of 35 cutters at that Dependency. In these circumstances I am inclined to think that the limit of safety has already been reached; and I am certainly of opinion that no additional facilities should be granted, at any rate pending further investigation of the industry. In this connection I may observe that, in paragraph 62 of their Report, the Dependencies Committee expressed the view that it is desirable to permit the use of

floating

floating factories no more than is absolutely necessary.

3. It is true that no operations are now being carried on at the South Orkneys but I am not satisfied that that field can be satisfactorily worked except by a very experienced firm already established in another Dependency.

4. Therefore while I am anxious to extend British interests in the whaling industry and should be glad to foster local enterprise I regret that I do not consider that I should be justified in granting Mr. Mitchell Steel's application and I request that he may be so informed.

5. You will learn from my despatch No. 84 of the 19 July that I have also refused the application of Messrs. Chr. Neilsen and Company for whaling facilities at the South Orkneys.

6. The proposal, referred to in my despatch No. 87 of the 12 July, to allow the Tunesberg Company a lease for a land station at South Orkneys for a term of five years stands on quite a different footing.

With reference to your letter of the 23rd January, 1920, I am directed by the Administrator to inform you that, on the matter of your application for a Whaling Licence being referred to the Colonial Office, the Secretary of State has decided with regret that he is unable to accede to your request.

2. In the case of the South Shetlands, the Secretary of State considers that, pending further investigation of the industry, it is undesirable to permit the use of floating factories more than is absolutely necessary, and while His Lordship is anxious to extend British interests in the whaling industry and should be glad to foster local enterprise, it is with regret that he does not consider that in the present circumstances he would be justified in granting you the licence for which you have applied. With regard to your application for a licence at the South Orkneys, His Lordship is not satisfied that these whaling grounds can be satisfactorily worked except by a very experienced firm already established in another Dependency.
