In consequence of the serious delay which has recently occurred in the furnishing of Bills of Entry and payment of Customs Duty on goods imported direct to the West Falklands.

I am directed by His Excellency the Governor to forward to you for your information and guidance a copy of the Customs Consolidation Ordinance of 1882 and to call your particular attention to the provisions of Sections 33, 37 and 38.

These sections were enacted for the benefit and convenience of the Colonists living at a distance from Stanley, and to prevent the necessity of requiring all vessels arriving from Ports outside the Colony to enter at the Custom House in Stanley, and the Governor hopes that for the future the provisions of these sections will be strictly and promptly complied with, and the necessary returns and payments forwarded at once to the Treasurer as the Law requires, and thus obviate the necessity for further Legislation.

 measure was finally abandoned.

3. Sir H. E. Hicks Beach wrote in May 1878 to
 Gurney Callaghan in reply to his report on the
 opposition the measure had experienced - that
 the proposed measure would lose much of its
 utility unless the sheep farmers in general
 cordially co-operated in carrying it out, and that
 as it appeared that the great majority of them did
 not wish to have the protection it would afford,
 he should not insist however much he regretted such
 a result; upon the Bill ^{being} proceeded with against
 their wishes.

4. The Governor is not aware that any change has
 since taken place in the opinion of the majority of the
 sheep farmers, on the question but His Excellency will
 cause copies of your letter to be sent to each of them
 for the purpose of ascertaining their views on the subject
 and should he find that they concur in your sug-
 gestions he will lose no time in taking legislative
 action in the matter.

(To be communicated to His Excellency,

The "Sheep Ordinance" of 1867, is not in my opinion satisfactory.

The welfare of the Colony depends chiefly on the prosperity of the farmers, and I think prosecutions for having scab or any other infectious disease, ought to be conducted by Government.

At present if a flock is infected by neighbour's scabby sheep, it appears, that a claim for only £50, can be made.

I do not advocate Government undertaking to clean a flock or run; as an arrangement of this kind, would entail the expense of inspectors, &c. &c.

It would not do for obvious reasons, to offer a reward, for information of the presence of scab.

Let the information be made by the farmers, whose land joins an infected run, officially to Government, and on receipt of this information, let Government serve a notice to the owner of infected run, ordering him to clean his sheep within six months.

If this is not done fine £100 or £50, and increase or double the fine every six months, if the owner or manager does not comply with terms of notice.

If a farmer has scab, at any rate on the West, it is always known to the neighbours. the information quickly comes through the men.

If a flock is infected through contact with a neighbour's sheep, I think all expenses in connection with cleaning the flock or flocks, should be paid by the said neighbours.

The farmers themselves might be made inspectors, and a run declared clean by Government, if two neighbours of the infected run, signed a paper to that effect.

The fact is, that many men work underhanded, or with hands who do not understand their work, and many have insufficient paddock accommodation, so that curing scab is rendered next to impossible; if Government took the matter in hand, they would be compelled to go to work in a methodical manner.

All fines of course go to Government.

I think, an Ordinance run more or less on these lines would work, and have the effect of stamping out scab; under the present Ordinance, I see no possibility of our ever obtaining what all wish for.

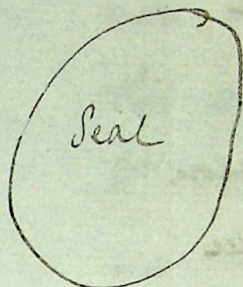

Briefly to your letter received yesterday I regret to have to inform you that your son R Rogers was drowned in Stanley Harbour whilst proceeding off in a small boat to the Screw Steamer "Ranee" of which vessel he was steward -

His body was not recovered for some months afterwards, when it was discovered washed up on the beach of this harbour. a Coroner's inquest was held and a verdict of "Found drowned" returned. Your son's remains were afterwards subsequently buried in Stanley Cemetery. His clothes and effects were sold and realized with the Balance of wages accruing to him the sum of £11. 10. 10.

This amount has been paid into the hands of the Board of Trade in London to whom you should apply for payment of the same.

I may mention that I likewise transmitted to the Board of Trade some months ago a small packet containing some of his private letters for the purpose of their being handed over to his relations should they claim them.

Minute on Mr Cobb's letter to the Commissioner

With reference to Mr Cobb's letters of the 10th, 11th and 12th
instant, on the subject of the Amended Customs
Duties Consolidation Ordinance. I have only to remark
- that at the meeting of the Legislative Council at
which the Ordinance was passed. I remember that
Mr Cobb made certain objections to the provisions
of the Ordinance - particularly with reference to the
amount to be paid to Customs House Officers while on
board vessels - and to the responsibility imposed upon
Agents and Consignees for the payment of penalties
incurred by Masters - in these objections Mr Deane
said that he concurred. After replying to the objections
which had been raised. I looked first to Mr Deane
and then to Mr Cobb, and asked them separately if they
withdrew their objections. I observed that they each
made an inclination of the head towards me but heard
no reply in words. and I am quite certain that neither of
the gentlemen rose to state formally that they persisted
in their opposition - I therefore declared that the second
reading of the Bill was carried. and afterwards it
passed through the other stages without discussion. I
made no report to the Secretary of State in transmitting
the Bill for Her Majesty's allowance - The draft had
already been submitted to the Secretary of State and had had
his approval.



In reply to a letter addressed by yourself and certain other inhabitants of Stanley to the Lieutenant Governor, praying that the introduction of the Town Lands Ordinance of 1886 may be deferred until further communication with the Secretary of State on the subject, I am directed by His Excellency to inform you that he proposes to make an alteration in the Ordinance when submitting it to the Legislative Council which will secure the right of purchasing a frontage to the owner of the adjacent tenement.

This enactment will give much more protection to householders than is provided by Ordinance 204 of 1871, which only permits of the sale of all waste lands of the Crown by Public Auction to the highest bidder.

The plan of Stanley as far as His Excellency is aware, has never been legalized by any Ordinance, and contains some reserves which are thoroughly useless.

That it can never be modified, or any of the reserves on it for streets, or otherwise, disposed of by Ordinance, is His Excellency's strong contention which could never be maintained.

The Secretary of State does not recognize it evidently, or he would not have directed an Ordinance to be passed to legalize the sales in Philomel Street, after being made aware, as he was, that the land was part of the old reserve for that street. I have re - re
