

Sir

I have the honour to inform you that in June last I transmitted to the Secretary of State for the Colonies an Ordinance for establishing a Close Time in the Seal Fishery in this Colony and its dependencies.

The Close Season was to commence on the 1st of November instant.

I expressed a hope that it might be possible to allow one of Her Majesty's Ships of War to visit the Islands during the Close Season for the purpose of protecting the fishery and deterring strangers from violating the Law.

I am informed that an American sealing vessel has landed a party upon Bird Island, which is leased from the Crown by Messrs J. M. Dean and Sons of this place, and that they are now engaged in killing and capturing seals and committing other trespasses.

By this mail I have written to the Secretary of State for the Colonies on the subject, and I think it my duty to inform you of it and to inquire whether you have received any instructions with reference to the protection which has been applied for.

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of this day, having reference to previous correspondence on the construction of a magazine for the storage of Naval munitions of War, and asking for information respecting a site, and cost of construction.

2. In reply to your first and second questions, I have the honour to inform you that the ground pointed out to you is the property of the Crown, and can be devoted to the service required without any cost.

3. As to the cost of construction it is difficult to get precise information, but I will endeavour to procure such an approximate estimate of the cost as is possible.

4. The charge of the magazine could be confided to the chief constable, who already has charge of the Government Magazine.

5. The Government Magazine, which you have seen since your letter was written, can be used at once for Naval purposes to the fullest available extent pending the erection of a larger or more convenient one. From an inscription on the inner door of the Government Magazine it would appear to have been formerly used by Her Majesty's Ships for storing gun powder.

I have the honour to transmit herewith, copies of two letters addressed to me by Captain Brent R.N. in February and March last, on the subject of the construction of a magazine to store a year's supply of munitions of war for H.M. Ships on this station.

Subsequently Captain Brent inspected the Powder Magazine belonging to this Government, and suggested - that with the permission of the Colonial Authorities, - a temporary use might be made of it, pending the construction of a separate magazine.

I transmitted copies of the correspondence on the subject to the Rt Hon^{ble} the Secretary of State for the Colonies, recommending that Captain Brent's proposals should be complied with, and that every facility should be given for the storage of munitions of war, and other stores for the use of H.M. Ships.

I have by the last mail been informed by Lord Derby that the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty concur in these arrangements and propose to pay the Chief Constable at Stanley one shilling a day out of Naval funds for such time as he may have charge of any of the stores in question and also to pay any expense connected with landing and transporting the stores to and from the magazine.

Lord Derby has expressed to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty his concurrence in the arrangement which can therefore be carried into effect whenever it may be convenient to the Naval authorities. Naval Stores can at all times be landed at the Dockyard Jetty.

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of a letter from Your Excellency dated the 31st of December last, informing me that the "Malvinas," a coasting steamer provided by the Kosmos Company in their contract with this Government, for service between Port Stanley and the other Ports of the Falkland Island group, had been employed by you, with the consent of Captain Everhardt, to proceed to Eden Harbour for the purpose of rendering assistance to the "aviso" Angamos, belonging to the Republic of Chili.

2. I beg to assure you of my sincere regret for the loss your Government may have sustained by the accident to the "Angamos," but it is my duty to protest against the detention of the "Malvinas," and her occupation in a salvage service which has removed her for so long a time from the service to this Government which she is bound to perform, and which has occasioned much inconvenience and detriment to the inhabitants of the out ports of this Colony.

3. I gave permission in writing to the Agent of the Kosmos Company in Stanley, for the Malvinas to proceed in November last to Punta Arenas for a cargo of wood for the use of the inhabitants of the West Falkland Island, with the understanding that she was to return to Stanley in time to meet the Mail Steamer due here on the 13th of December, and to convey mails and passengers to the out ports.

4. Since the "Malvinas" left this Colony in November last I have received no authentic information respecting her, other than that contained in Your Excellency's letter of the 31st of December last.

5. I cannot excuse the conduct of Captain Everhardt of the Malvinas in not returning to perform the conditions of the Contract between this Government and the Kosmos Company who are responsible for his acts.

If you will kindly accede to my request I will make a formal application to the Senior Officer to be forwarded by you.

Should the man be obliged to go to Monte-Video with you, it would be impossible for him — after receiving the formal sanction of the Senior Officer for his discharge — to return to Stanley for more than two months from the time of your arrival at Monte-Video, as there will be no earlier means of direct communication, and I feel assured

assured that in so pressing an emergency you will be considered as justified in complying with my request.
In the event of it being necessary for the man to rejoin his ship before his final discharge, he can return to Monte-Vidéu on my being so informed, but I trust that such a course will not be found necessary or expedient.

I have the honour to inform you that Captain Brown of the British Barque "Wylo", now in Port William, tells me that on the afternoon of the 7th of March instant, as he was attempting to pass through the Straits of Le Maire, he saw a Barque on shore on a point near the North western extremity of Staten Island, she appeared to be 8 or 900 hundred tons burthen, all sail was set on her foremast except the upper topsail, on her mainmast only the lower topsail was set. She showed no colours. It was a dead lee shore for the "Wylo" and night was coming on with bad weather so that it was impossible for him to attempt to render any assistance. He was afterwards driven back and had to pass to the Eastward of Staten Island.

I have the honour to inform you that the Schooner "Rippling Wave" which arrived here under Chilean Colours on the 28th instant, left this Port on her last voyage as a British vessel, duly registered in the Office of the Colony.

The Master has given no notice of the sale or transfer

of the vessel to foreign owners, and he has not returned the certificate of British Registry to the Registrar as required by Law.

He alleges that the sale only took place on the 12th of March instant, and that the documents are being forwarded from the Chilean authorities, and that he, having been blown off the coast without having his papers on board is unable to comply with the Law.

I have required him to give substantial security via bond for five hundred pounds, for the due fulfilment of all the requirements of the Law before he is allowed to leave this Port, and I have the honour to request that you will assist me in preventing the Schooner from leaving the harbour until he has conformed to these requirements.

I have the honour to inform you, that in consequence of the extreme uncertainty attending the transmission of mails sent from this Colony to the Post Office at Punta Arenas, I have directed the mails, now forwarded by the Kosmos Company's Steamship "Hekto", to be enclosed in a sealed bag addressed to yourself in order that you may take such steps as may be necessary to ensure their transmission to their proper destination.

In explanation of my reason for taking this course, I have to inform you of some of the most recent irregularities of the Post Office officials at Punta Arenas:-

On the 20th of June 1885 a mail for England addressed to the Post Master General, London, was sent from this Colony by the Kosmos Steamer "Totnes", and delivered to the Post Office at Punta Arenas to be forwarded to England by the Pacific Company's steamer. Instead, however, of being so forwarded, the mail was returned to this Colony, on the 15th of July, by the Kosmos Steamer "Sakarah".

On the 19th of December 1885, a mail was similarly forwarded to Punta Arenas by the "Totnes" and instead of being forwarded to England it was sent back here by the "Ward" on the 11th of January 1886.

of the detention of the outward mail for this Colony by the P.S.H. "Cotopaxi" in February 1886, and of your own discovery of this act of negligence, and also of the mail being forwarded by the British Barquentine "Severn" on the 11th of March following, you are yourself aware.

Her Majesty's Government, through Mr. Fraser the British Minister at Santiago addressed a strong remonstrance to the Chilean Government on the subject of these irregularities on the 31st of July last, and a communication was afterwards received by the British Postmaster General from the Director General

General of the Chilean Post Office to the effect that the Postmaster at Punta Arenas, who was responsible for the irregularities complained of, had been dismissed from the service of the Chilean Government as incompetent and expressing his confidence that the newly appointed Postmaster at Punta Arenas would carry out faithfully the instructions he received and give no cause for further complaint.

Notwithstanding this assurance, however, the mails for England which were sent from the Post Office here on the 24th of February last, by the "Menes"; to the Post Office at Punta Arenas, for transmission to England, were returned here on the 29th of March by the "Götines". The seal of the bag addressed to the "Postmaster General, London" had been broken and the label removed, and the separate parcels of letters for Monte Video were found in the bag with the English mail.

Letters addressed to persons in Punta Arenas were also returned here - one of these letters, I am informed, contained a remittance of money from the Falkland Islands Company -.

I have reported this occurrence to the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and I have now the honour to request that you will be good enough to cause the mails now forwarded to your care, to be sent by the Romos homeward bound steamer, which will be due at Punta Arenas on the 23rd of April instant, and request the Captain to land them at Monte Video to be forwarded to England by the Royal Mail Steamer which will sail from that Port on or about the 2nd of May proxim.

Should the Romos steamer not go to Monte Video, the mail could be forwarded to London from Havre on her arrival there.

Sir,

I have the honour to inform you that the Transport "Maipo" belonging to the revolutionary party flying the Chilean Flag arrived here at noon on Saturday the instant. She had a crew of 135 men and several soldiers on board stated by the Commandante Militar to be about 60 in number, but by the Pilot and others who went on board two hundred, her armaments were two forty pounders and machine guns.

The Commandante said they were bound for the Cape de Verde Islands and had put in for repairs to their engines and for water and coal. I pointed out that I was unaware whether or not they had been recognized by England as belligerents and therefore I could not do so, that as a matter of humanity I would sanction however their being supplied with 40 tons of water and 75 tons of coal sufficient with what they had on board to take them to Montevideo of which however they only took 10 tons of water and 40 tons of coal respectively and requested that they would take their departure on morning of the following Wednesday, the time however was extended to sunset on Wednesday.

In that evening I received a letter from the Commandante saying that owing to the darkness they had not been able to get away but would do so at day-break the following morning which they did. I may add that

requested the Commandante not to allow the crew ashore as it was reported to me that they were a ragged dirty set and he readily assented.

4. Subsequent events proved that the statements made by the Commandante were untrue as no sooner was the "Maipo" off the Volunteers Point than she met a Steamer whose name I have since ascertained is "Wandile" and after communication they steered away to the Southward and subsequently at San Sebastian Bay took in 16,000 stand of rifles four guns with shell and other ammunition as also a supply of coal.

5. This information was obtained from the crew of the "Wandile" which at time of writing is in harbour here.

6. As the master of the "Wandile" concealed the name of his vessel I prosecuted him under Section of the Merchant Shipping Act the result being that he was convicted and fined £50.

7. The object of my letter is whilst affording you the foregoing information to ask you whether you cannot spare one of the vessels under your command to be stationed here during the continuance of hostilities in Chile.

8. Had the Commandante been otherwise than amenable to reason I had no means at my disposal to enforce respect to my orders, and this I scarcely think is the position in which a Governor should be placed.

I am sending this by Lieut Comd Dowdell who kindly at my request gave myself and two of my officers a passage to the W Falklands to visit Port Edgar, Fox Bay and Port Howard

as I have not since my assumption of the Government had an opportunity of visiting the ant stations I should be glad if you would permit the "Magpie" to return to Stanley to take me round the island - her draught of water will enable her to go where a larger vessel could not.

It is very necessary that during the close season for seals that a man of war should be stationed here as the American sealers frequently come into our waters to fish.

During the stay of the "Magpie" here an American vessel the "Sarah Hunt" came in with 600 seal skins which the master stated he had procured off the Horn. - It is far more probable that they were obtained from some of our outlying islands.

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 6 December last, with enclosure, relative to a correspondence which has taken place on the subject of a concession in the Shetland Islands - erroneous published in the "Southern Cross" as in the Falkland Island. I repeat that the publisher's error should have entailed upon you so much trouble, and which might possibly have been avoided had I sent in the first instance a copy of the paragraph in question direct to yourself.

I am glad that the attention of Lord Rosebery has been drawn by you to the manner in which South Georgia has been shaded on the map to which you refer in view of the recent action of the Argentine Government entering a protest against our occupation of the Falkland Islands of which South Georgia forms an integral part.

I communicated to Lord Knutsford, when in Office, my desire to visit South Georgia as I had received applications for renting land there and was informed that the Admiralty would be communicated with. The description of the climate, soil, harbour, &c. differ so much that I think it would be advisable that the Island should be visited in order that reliable information might be obtained and, if practicable, it might be settled.

I am not aware that the Island was ever visited by any of my predecessors and certainly no steps have been taken to assert our rights thereto. No little that is known

Known of South Georgia is from the report of the German astronomical party who observed the transit of Venus from that island.

American vessels used to visit South Georgia for sealing purposes and I understand were very successful. I have also gathered that the land in the valleys is equally good for pasturing purposes as what we possess in these islands.
