In consequence of having received notice from the Colonial Secretary of your order to remove within a short period from the Government Stores all liquors stored there and imported by me, I beg leave to submit for your Excellency's consideration the great inconvenience as well as the hardships I shall be put to should your order be carried in its full force - and for the following reasons - First, that I have not at the present time suitable premises to store the goods -

Secondly, It would be inconvenient on my part to pay the duties on all the liquors I have in the Bonded Stores, but rather than I should be compelled to do so, I crave your Excellency's permission for such delay in the execution of your order as will allow me to re-export to Monk Video a portion, if not the whole of the goods within a period of six months from the present date provided that they are not sold in this market in the meanwhile - when of course the duties would be paid in full -

I beg to inform Your Excellency that had I been previously aware

aware that such an order was intended
to be made and that I was not to have
the continuance of the accommodation of
a Bonded Ware-house such as there was
at the time of my arrival and as exists
in all civilized countries, I should
not have imported further supplies
of liquors than the very first parcel
which I brought down.

My Lord

Novrd 9th 1877.

I have the honour to thank your Lordship for the offer of promotion to British Guiana, but as I have never resided in the tropics, I am afraid my health at my age would not stand the climate of Demerara, and I beg most respectfully to decline the appointment Your Lordship has kindly offered me.

I should be glad to accept the pension which I thought was settled, of a hundred^a a year, as already stated by me.

If your Lordship cannot grant the pension, I have the honour to ask you to put my name down for the appointment of a resident Magistrate in Natal, or the Cape Colony.

I beg respectfully to inform Your Lordship that I fear my health will not allow me to do the duty of visiting Durban for another winter, which induces me to hope that the question of a pension may be settled in the event of there being no vacancy in the Magistracy at Natal or the Cape Colony.

Contract to build a room, attic, and porch,
at Cape Lembroke light house, and to repair the
Light Keepers dwelling house.

It is this day mutually agreed between Dennis Buckley of the one part, and George Frais Esq: by authority of His Excellency the Governor, and on behalf of The Board of Trade, of the other part as follows: viz:

1. - That in consideration of the sum of eighty pounds sterling, the said Dennis Buckley hereby contracts to build, within two months from this date, a room, at Cape Lembroke adjoining the dwelling house, of the following dimensions: - sixteen feet long, seven feet high, and eleven feet wide out to out. The floor to be planed and matched, and the inside of the room to be lined and matched. The room to contain two doors, one window and one chimney about four feet six inches out to out. Also an attic, the roof to be boarded outside and shingled. The flooring thereof to be planed on one side, and the upper joists planed. Also a wooden porch five feet by three feet clear.

2. That the said Dennis Buckley also in consideration of the above named sum of eighty pounds further agrees to execute the following repairs on the Light Keepers

dwelling house viz:- To repair the roof,
the weather spouting, the lantern ladder,
and the window sashes, and to glaze the
windows where necessary. To place
proper fastenings on the doors, and to
repair the stove in the sitting room. To
point the kitchen chimney, and also to set
the new copper boiler. Also to remove and repair
the privy.

3. That the building materials shall
be taken down to the Lighthouse on the
Government schooner by the first opportunity.

4. That on production of a certificate
stating that the work has been performed to the
satisfaction of the Locomotive Carpenter the within
named sum of eighty pounds shall be paid
at once. Provided always that if the said
Dennis Buckley shall neglect or fail to perform
this contract he shall not be entitled to any
payment whatever in respect of any portion
of the work he may have executed at the
time of such failure.
