My dear Sir,

I return the
draft with thanks, and
as far as I can see it ap-
pears all right, barring
the description of the fence
which would here be un-
suitable. The wooden
fences and stone walls
might be left in, although
no one would think of

putting them up. There
is not a fence, however, in
the Islands that complies
with the description of the
wire paid. I think the
following would be
nearer the thing:— A sub-
stantial wire fence at least
3 ft. 3 in. in height, having
not less than six wires
tightly stretched with no
great distance between.
Each of the three lowest

wires or the bottom wire and
the ground than 3 inches,
and the posts or standards
of which are not more than
20 yards apart with inter-
mediate iron or wooden
droppers or swingers between
them, securely bound to the
wires, not more than six
feet apart and with not
less than six chaining

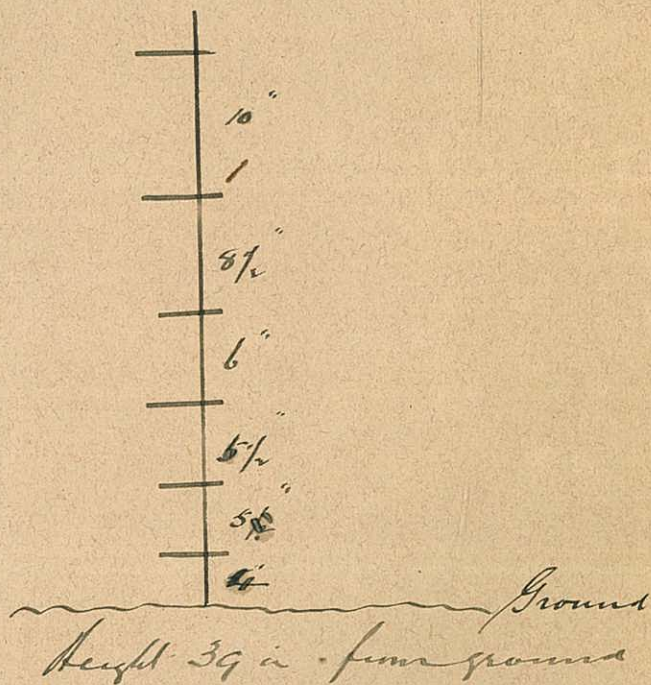

Sir

I have the honour to furnish the
Annual Report for the Blue Book,
for the year 1890.

The early part of the year was
very fine and healthy, the winter being
extremely mild. Consequently few persons
suffered from any of the complaints which
are so common in Great Britain and Ireland,
i.e. Pneumonia, Pleuritis, Bronchitis &c.

As I have mentioned on former occasions
the rarity of Pulmonary complaints is
remarkable and I consider peculiar to the
Islands, in consequence of the healthy

health giving properties of these Islands.

The air is very pure - that concentrated quantity of oxygen - known as ozone is in abundance combined with the Iodine set free from the Kelp and the large amount of Nitrogen ingested into the system is - undoubtedly a prophylactic against that insidious and fell Malady Pulmonary Phthis which annually destroys many thousands of the fairest and best in Europe.

True {Struma} does exist ^{and is indigenous} but it is hereditary and seldom develops into lung tubercle.

Many children have died from Tuberculosis, or abdominal Phthis, which is a Scrophulous disease of Mal-nutrition, the food not being assimilated to the animal economy, there are many causes for this.

one. I may prominently mention ill-assorted and early marriages and neglect of Hygiene's rules, but the great majority of the children are strong and healthy and the usual diseases so prevalent in England are conspicuous by their absence.

It is a general remark with visitors to Stanley, especially those from the River

- Plate, what rich health the children enjoy,

Unfortunately in the month of September the epidemic which passed over Europe and America visited us. This hybrid which is not to be found in the nomenclature of disease; and has been an enigma to the most eminent Medical authorities, almost an opprobrium Medicorum, partaking of a mixed character (Pertussis) or Hooping cough and accompanied with severe febrile disturbances and prostration. Many children of tender years succumbed to the Sequela or after effects. Catarrhal Inflammation of the Bronchia Thoracica &c. Adults also suffered much with violent paroxysmal coughs, muscular-pains, general absorption of the adipose tissue,

The advent of Summer brought the long wished for result, the epidemic disappeared, but in many cases leaving behind some tokens of its virulence in the form of hard brassy cough and general Malaise. Since the disappearance of the epidemic the general health of Stanley is all that can be desired.

2. During 1890, there was a severe
attack outbreak of Whooping cough,
among the natives on Kippel Island.
All natives, about 30 in number, were
attacked, as well as one adult-
European.

There were 5 deaths among the
natives, all occurring in second or
third month of ^{the} disease.

Cause of death in all cases being
a progressive inflammation of
the lungs. The mean duration
of the disease, ^(Whooping cough) was 3 months.

3. While a subject of infectious
disease, I may venture to point-
out, that the appointment of
a Board of Health for the West-
Falklands would be an advisable
thing. Such a board ought to
work in harmony with the Board
of Health in Stanley, & they ought
to notify each other with views of
infectious disease occurring in
their respective districts.

If this were done, & if the provisions

of the Public Health Act were carried out, it is perfectly obvious that the spread of any infectious disease ^{could} ~~would~~ be easily checked.

Influenza.

4. Keeping rigidly to the definition of influenza, as given in "Quain's Dictionary of Medicine"; I am to report that the West-Falklands have seen from that disease, during its prevalence on the East-Falklands in the last quarter of the year.

There are 2 kinds of "catarrh" very present - on the West-Falklands at all times. -

1. nasal catarrh [severe form of]
2. gastro-intestinal catarrh.

I have examined a great number of these cases of severe nasal catarrh, & have never detected

any rise of temperature above 100°F .

In the gastro-intestinal form, wh: is most-common in children, there is ^{among children at least,} always, a rise of temperature, sometimes up to 103°F .

These catarrhs never assume a really epidemic form. I am unable to give any reason to account for the prevalence of these two forms of catarrhs.

I may also mention that I ^{did} have not noticed any prevalence of catarrh among the domestic animals, wh: was so common during the ^{the} last-epidemic in Europe, + wh: in some cases heralded the incidence of the disease among men.

D. G. Kosmos steamers are always transacted with the appliances of the metrical system in measurement or Kilogs in weight.
