kill the lot, than go through the

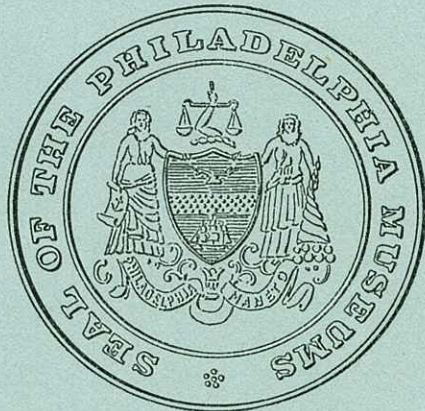
