MEMORANDUM.

The Colony.

The excess of assets over Liabilities is estimated to amount to £306,899 on the 1st of January, 1937, as against £296,904 on the 1st of January, 1936. The revised estimate of the ordinary revenue exceeds the revised estimate of the ordinary expenditure by the sum of £15,279 and is more by £4,445 than the revised estimate of the total expenditure, excluding an appropriation of £1,000 from Land Sales Fund.

It is estimated that at the beginning of the year the Colony's General Account will stand at £60,149 as against £55,705 on 1st January, 1936.

Revenue 1936.

The revised estimate of the revenue is £57,159 or more by £5,870 than the approved estimate under all heads. This increase is due mainly to the payment under Head I. of the arrears of the Dependencies' Contributions for the years 1933, 1934 and 1935. The following increases and decreases are to be remarked under other heads :

I. CUSTOMS DUTIES - £13,739. Owing to smaller importations the receipts under subhead 1, "Salt", "spirits", and "Matches" are down, respectively, by £40, £185 and £100.

IV. FEES, FINES, REIMBURSEMENTS - £1,990. A decrease of £632 is anticipated and is due entirely to reduced receipts under subheads 1, "Supreme Court" and 8. "Hospital and Medical" by way of death duties and hospital fees.

V. INTEREST - £15,050. An increase of £450 is anticipated and is more than accounted for under subhead 3. "Joint Colonial Fund". This increase is due entirely to Savings Bank deposits placed in the fund which it is estimated will

produce/

produce £800 more than the original estimate. Owing to the unusually high cost of Government Stock Securities it has been considered inadvisable to purchase further securities for the Savings Bank which might possibly be re-sold at a loss when such securities had fallen to a lower level and large deposits withdrawn from the Bank, and although the 1935 estimates under this Head were based on the payment of Land Sales Instalments payable in 1935, no instalments were collected in that year thereby reducing the interest from that fund by £250.

VI. POST OFFICE - £5,905. A total increase of £2,430 is anticipated due to extraordinary sales of stamps under subhead 1.

VII. TELEGRAPHS AND TELEPHONES - £2,715. An increase of £365 is expected to be realised and is practically accounted for by increased traffic in wireless messages.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS - £5,920. A total decrease of £1,604 is anticipated and is chiefly due to a reduction of the surplus interest received from Savings Bank Investment of £1,250 and placing of Deposits in the Joint Colonial Fund which as will be observed from V. is estimated to yield an excess of £300. It is also anticipated that after providing for securities to the value of 110% of the Note Security Fund no surplus interest will be available for transfer to revenue thereby resulting in a decrease of a further £350.

X. CONTRIBUTION FROM DEPENDENCIES TO COST OF CENTRAL ADMINISTRATION - £15,170.

There will be an increase of £5,170 under this Head being arrears of contributions for the years 1933, 1934 and 1935, payment of which has been approved by the Secretary of State.

Expenditure 1936.

The revised estimate of the expenditure under ordinary heads is expected to exceed the original estimate by £768.

To date a sum of £350 has already been spent on the repatriation of families to the United Kingdom and an additional £200 will be required under Charitable Relief for payments which could not have been foreseen. Expenditure on the Survey of the Stanley Harbour was not provided for as no decision to carry out the work had been arrived at when the 1936 estimates were prepared and the expenditure on this account for the present year apart from the services rendered by the Harbour Department amounted to £225. An excess of £695 is anticipated under Head XX. "Public Works Extraordinary" and is due to the additional work undertaken in erecting a new quarantine station at a cost of £1,110 approved in Secretary of State's Telegram, No. 69 of the 4th of August, 1936, and also the sum of £346 spent on improving tracks to the Camp and £350 on improving the Stanley Common. Against this the provision of £950 for the building of a Magazine was not utilised as the work was not proceeded with.

Revenue 1937.

The revenue to be derived from all sources during 1937 is estimated at £65,734 and excluding Land Sales, £59,182 as compared with £57,841 and £51,289 in 1936. The increase in the estimates is due to the contribution of £3,200 from the Land Sales Fund under subhead 12. Head IV. and to anticipated receipts under subhead 6. "Savings Bank", Head IX. Miscellaneous consequent upon the fresh legislation introduced in 1936 limiting the aggregate amount of individual deposits. A comparison, where necessary, of the principal differences in receipts estimated under the several heads with those estimated for 1936 is given below :

plant is worn and inadequate for present requirements. It is proposed to purchase two engine generators of 70 K.W. each from Messrs: Petters. The installation of this plant will provide a day and night service and in addition power will be available for domestic and commercial machinery.

14. Improved Heating, Defence Force Headquarters - 2350.

Provision includes for central heating in the Drill Hall. The building is heated at present by a small combustion stove which is totally inadequate during the winter months.

APPENDIX III.

Grades of Salary. New Grades of salary have been introduced and salaries have now been fixed according to the duties required to be performed in the various posts. On the contrary a reduction will be effected when the scheme is in full operation.

DEFICIT.

The revenue is estimated to exceed the expenditure in 1937 by £1,338. Where it appears necessary detailed annotation is given below :

The estimate under subhead 22. Carriage of Mails, is reduced by £250. A new subhead 29, "Celebrations, His Majesty the King's Coronation" is added.
