Council nevertheless advised that the Odd Whaling Company should be informed that they should furnish the name of the floating factory which it is intended to substitute for the s.s. "Guvernoren", on account of the loss of that vessel, to the Crown Agents for the Colonies, who would be asked to make the necessary addition to the licence before issuing it.

(Dr Pearce) had been given leave of absence and that the Assistant Colonial Surgeon (Dr Craddock) had been appointed to act as Colonial Surgeon and Health Officer during Dr Pearce's absence or until further notice. Dr Craddock then took the necessary oaths and assumed his seat on the Council.

The Governor concurred and ordered accordingly.

4. M.P. 564/15. The Governor informed the Council that a question had arisen with regard to the payment of Police Constables in respect of services rendered in attending concerts, &c., Council advised that if the Chief Consyable considered it necessary in the interests of the peace to detail an officer

to attend a concert or similar gathering no charge should be made against the party responsible for the concert but that if a constable was detailed for this purpose at the request of the party concerned a charge of five shillings should be made in respect of each attendance, and that this sum should be paid into general revenue, one moiety of the sum to be refunded to the police constable detailed for the duty. Council further advised that in the particular instance on which the question had been raised, viz., the attendance of a police constable at a concert arranged by the Rev. C. McDonald Hobley in aid of the St Mary's Cinematograph Society and held on the 15th July the summof ten shillings which had been received from Mr Hobley in respect of the services of the constable, should be refunded as the constable employed was on ordinary duty. The Governor concurred and ordered accordingly.

5. The Governor informed the Councilthat it was the desire of the Secretary of State as conveyed in his Circular despatch of the 26th May, 1915, that general effect should be given throughout the Colonies to the Regulations with regard to the carriage of literature embossed for the blind which His Majesty's Government had intended to lay before the Postal Union Congress which, but for the intervention of the war, would have been held at Madrid during the autumn of 1914. Council advised that under Section 3 of The Post Office Ordinance, 1898, an Order of the Governor in Council should be issued giving effect in this Colony to the wishes of His Majesty's Government, and enforcing the following Regulation:—

"The maximum limit of weight for a packet transmissible as "printed mapters" shall be 6 lbs., in the case of literature embossed for the use of the blind and the postage shall remain at the present "printed papers" rate for packets up to 20 ozs., and thereafter to be uniformly 5d., irrespective of the weight".

and that the sheep exported were chiefly for the Farmer and the Butcher in the Argentine, and that from enquiry made it appeared to him that the difficulties in the way of a frozen export trade were :-

- (a) the number of sheep available for killing annually is too limited to allow of a frozen export trade to be maintained, while the cost of establishing the refrigerating plantsand stores necessary for any such trade would not in the circumstances be justified,
- (b) The sheep of the Falkland Islands are thin, and though heavy wool growers, are not suitable for the meat market. Owing to the inferior feeding of the animals the meat is "watery" and of unsuitable quality for freezing,
- (c) the difficulties of live transport from the

principal outlying Islands and Districts, and feeding, are great, dead transport not being feasible for want of refrigerating chambers and storehouses.

After consideration the Council held similar views, it being stated that the increased number of sheep exported in 1914 was very exceptional and not likely to be repeated, the export number this year being estimated at about 9000 only.

The Governor thanked the Members for their attendance and adjourned the Council sine die.

In addition to this military pay the Council, advised that each man called out on active service should receive, from his employers, if willing, or from the Government, an allowance which would being the total of his receipts up to a sum equal to the pay of his civil employment, no separation allowances to be made. The opinion of the Council was that in framing a schedule of pay for Volunteers called out on active service the principle to be observed was that no man should receive less than his standard daily wage for working hours, while so called out.

The Council advised that the application was one which might be entertained, and advised that the annual salary of each Constable be raised (subject to the approval of the Secretary of State) from £72 to £84, on the draft Estimates for next year.

The Governor concurred. (M.P. 737/15).

12. The Governor stated that Mr M. C. Craigie-Halkett had represented that he had for some time been compelled to have his ash-pit cleared at his own expense, whereas many other public officers, occupying Government quarters, were able to have their ash-pits cleared bythe Government carts, free of charge. The Council advised that the ash-pits of all houses belonging to the Government should be cleared by the Government carts free of charge.

C. Craigie-Halkett, the Postmaster, might be added to the list.

His Excellency added that he had returned a reply expressdutiful concern and sincere regret.
- 4. The Governor requested the Council to consider the question of Mr Bugge's application to employ a third whale catcher innconnection with his lease of Deception Island on behalf of the Hektor Whaling Company. - 2. The Governor asked the Council to consider the draft Estimates for the year 1916, which were to be submitted to the Legislative Council on the 29th November. His Excellency stated that the draft Estimates in their present form provided for a Revenue of £29834, and an Expenditure of £32381 (not including the Stock Department), leaving a deficit of £2547, which it would be necessary to provide for (in the event of the Estimates being passed in their present state) by extra taxation. The Council proceeded to the consideration of the several items of Expenditure for the year 1916, and, with minor alterations, advised that the Estimate of £32,529 (not including the Stock Department) be laid before the Legislative Council for approval. With regard to the additional revenue required the Governor said that he proposed to introduce a Bill amending The Tariff Ordinance, 1900, to provide for increases in Export Duties on Wool, Sheep, Sheepskins, Hides, and imposing duties on Meats, canned or preserved, and Guano, as follows :-

Whale Oil to remain at 3½d. a barrel of 40 gallons

Export Duty on Wool to be 1/3 for every hundred lbs, at the rate of 1½d per ten pounds. This to give an increase of about £1880.

Export Duty on Sheep to be 3d. each, to give an increase of about £10.

Export Duty of Sheepskins to be ld. each, to give an increase of £80.

Export Duty on Hides to be 6d. each to give an increase of £10.

Export Duty on Canned or Preserved Meats to be one twelfth part of a penny per pound, to give about £200.

Export Duty on Guano of all kinds to be lad. per lb.

In all an additional revenue of about £3100;

Should these amendments in the rates of Export Duty be approved the estimated Ordinary Revenue for the year 1916 would be £32874, and the Expenditure (including Public Works Extraordinary, but not including the Stock Department) with the minor amendments made by Council, would be £32529, leaving a surplus balance of £345. The Council concurred and advised that the draft Estimates as amended be laid before the Legislative Council for consideration and approval.

The Governor in Council considered the necessary Ordinances to be passed by the Legislative Council at the Meeting called for the 29th November to be urgent.

Arising out of the Governor's announcement that the work of the Savings Bank would be transferred to the Treasury, where by law it properly belonged, Mr Harding stated that he presumed that the salary of £50 per annum, allotted to the Manager of the Savings Bank, would pass to the Treasurer, and requested that a reference might be made in the Minutes of this Meeting to his remarks made at a Meeting of the Legislative Council during 1914, on the subject of the disproportion existing between the responsibilities of the Colonial Treasurer and the amount of his emoluments. The Governor stated, that he would allow the salary at the rate

of £50 a year to the Manager to remain on the Estimates and that, subject to the approval of the Secretary of State, it would pass to the Treasurer together with the management of the Savings Bank.

The Governor thanked the Members for the careful attention given to the draft Estimates and adjourned the Council sine die.
