Enclosing Duplicates of our last on 19<sup>th</sup> ultimo  
F. Pacific S. W. Walparaiso' through Sandy Point and my  
extra letters of 22<sup>nd</sup>, 23<sup>rd</sup> October to catch her at Lisbon, we  
have to acknowledge your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 422 of 15<sup>th</sup> Sept.  
brought up to Montevideo by the "Gornet" and received here  
24<sup>th</sup> ult. ex Pacific S. W. "Galicia" to Lisbon - and N<sup>o</sup>. 423 dated  
27<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup> Sept. per "Tolmes" to Montevideo received yes-  
terday from Southampton by Ship letter, with Enclosures  
memo of 1<sup>st</sup> Oct. and your letter to me all in order: This S. V.  
"Tolmes" arrived at Havre on 3<sup>rd</sup> inst. without Cargo and  
Hugh Cameron, Shepherd, and on 2<sup>nd</sup> inst. we received from  
Montevideo your Envelope of 1<sup>st</sup> Oct. containing three  
Bills of Lading of the "Tolmes" cargo, evidently brought to  
Montevideo and handed by the Captain to our Agent being  
posted 8<sup>th</sup> Oct. - we send details of the above to the General  
Post Office asking the reason of delay, but as their explanation  
of the delay of N<sup>o</sup>. 420 did not amount to much I took the pre-  
caution of writing on 2<sup>nd</sup> inst. to W. Gifford Palgrave Esq., Minister  
Resident and Consul General at Montevideo, asking him to issue  
instructions for quick and earliest attention to the Falkland Mail  
Bags and sent him a copy of our last Mail Table.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 422, &c. We are all grieved at the misfortune  
to the "Gornet" and trust her repairs will be properly carried  
out at Montevideo and not cost too much money, the Protest  
& seal will enable us to claim the expenses from the Underwriters.

3. Par 4. The bottle jacks have been returned to  
Rowson but they have not replaced them by Screw jacks this  
shipment so it must be attended to by the next Steamer.

4. Par 5. We had already ordered Lloyd's Register  
of Shipping which goes by this opportunity, there will con-  
sequently be ample time before next year's issue for you to  
decide whether this or the Universal Register is to be  
supplied in future.

5. Par 6. This unfortunate Neal Tyler's Hydraulic  
Pumps are dearer than formerly, copy of their letter 3<sup>rd</sup> Nov.  
in reply to our complaint explains the reason & I believe  
you advised it would be safer to have the better kind.

6. Par 7. We have <sup>not</sup> heard anything from Mr. Kirsten about his Steamers calling at the Falklands on their way to the West Coast of South America and learn from others that this proposal has been abandoned.

7. Par 9. I have enquired at one of the engaging Offices and am told that the new Captain of a Vessel has to sign upon the Register at the Custom House and then his name is entered on the Ship's Articles without the former Captain attending or signing, this is reasonable as he might have left the country in another vessel.

8. The Colonial and Indian Exhibition closed yesterday the 10<sup>th</sup> inst. the samples of Tallow you were to send never arrived, our Executive Commissioner has been applied to respecting Tallow, Oils and Fats from the Colony and I have to report to Mr. Leopold Field on the subject - we have arranged that most probably our show of Wool &c. will remain for next year's Exhibition.

9. The Directors desire me to observe that they trust that the Stanley Balanced Accounts will be sent off by the earliest possible Mail to give ample time for their combination with our Accounts for the Annual Meeting.

10. On 5<sup>th</sup> inst. 9.28 am Telegram Home N. 60 arrived - "Beaumont leaves November 1st for J. P. Smith Thomas Carnarvon" meaning that the "J. P. Smith" had put in in distress was in Dean's hands but we were to get her business if possible, we immediately wrote to Mr. Thomas who replies that by telegram the Captain has been invested with full authority to act and he does not feel disposed to interfere - the same morning Lloyd's sent copy of your telegram about her and the Ada Brown's leak having been found and stopped. The next day we wrote Mr. Beaumont that her Husband would leave 28 Nov., the appointment is at Busselton Western Australia, a seacoast Town South of Perth. The Dennis Brundrit sailed 29<sup>th</sup> ult. - we have sent our new Mail Table 8<sup>o</sup> to Capt. Reynell J. Fortescue of H. M. S. 'Swallow' gone out to the Squadron on the South East coast of South America.

11. Since commencing this Despatch which was to have left by the St. Selimbra on 13<sup>th</sup> we have received notice that her sailing from Cardiff is delayed until the 16<sup>th</sup> inst. the date has therefore been altered to the 13<sup>th</sup> for the St. Kosmos J.W. Theben. The 'Selimbra' has received all our cargo here and will take Mr. Dickie & W. Kennedy our Shepherd onboard at Cardiff, also 30 Rams for us, 10 from Hobbs 10 from Pott as before and 10 from Mr. Ferrow which are more Cheviot breed than the others, we shall be glad <sup>safely</sup> which breeder is most approved of for future shipments, as the 'Selimbra' ought to convey 20 more next April - there are 21 for Cameron supposed to be pure Cheviots, I have written Kennedy that he will be entitled to pay for looking after these

21 Rams - Mr. Blake takes out 16 Romney Marsh Rams & there  
are 14 for a Mr. Sutherland - Capt<sup>r</sup>. Fowler has a gratuity cer-  
tificate of ten shillings each for ours landed alive & in good  
condition and will I suppose expect the same for Cameron's.  
Mr. Spurring the Chief Officer has one for five shillings each.  
As the Directors consider that the expense of my journey to  
Cardiff ought not to be incurred we have employed Mess<sup>r</sup>s G.  
W. Jones, Ingram &c<sup>r</sup> to attend to our matters, so if they write  
to you you will understand they have authority for so doing.  
Mr. Blake ships 100 drums Mr. Dougall's Sheep Dip which is on  
our Bill of Lading - and we have allowed them to send 100 drums  
for us at their expense & not to be paid for unless used and proved  
serviceable according to their correspondence with you direct.  
There is a large quantity of Stores for C. Williams from Hooker & Gates  
and others - Mr. J. T. Morton ships goods for Mr. Langdon. Your  
423, 5, asks for 400 Tallow Casks in shooks by the 'Selembreia', this is  
impossible but as she has 178 extra casks for the Coals, Coke and  
Lime and there are 130 Ale and 2 Vinegar casks, we trust this quan-  
tity will be sufficient as we cannot ship such goods as shooks until  
the 'Selembreia' next April. With regard to your wish to receive  
some superior Cigars for Mr. Barkly and yourself in bond through  
this Steamer's Store supplies, I have done my utmost to accomplish  
this with Capt<sup>r</sup>. Fowler's assistance but finding it impossible hav-  
ing sent them duty paid, though this was not agreed to until learning  
that the extra cost would be under one penny each Cigar, which  
I concluded you would both readily pay to obtain the fine article  
we have shipped - Capt<sup>r</sup>. Fowler has kindly taken charge of the case  
in his stateroom - freight and insurance to be charged at Stanley.  
Mr. Burns of Dumfries cannot get a Sheep Dog for Cameron, nor  
can Mrs. Morrison of Isle of Harris get one for her Husband.  
The Falkland Islands etc at £<sup>r</sup> has requested that the 'Selembreia'  
may be allowed to put upon one of our bulks 200 tons Coals in bags  
on her arrival, that she may go round & fill up her holds refrigerat-  
ing, and take them on board again before leaving Stanley for  
homeward steaming, we gave permission for this provided you  
can find space and agreed that the charge for rent should be  
made as low as possible. Mr. Woolly has just called to say that  
he goes out in sole command and wants a letter from me about our  
giving them more than 4,500 carcasses, he has one for 6000 the  
Board's limit, but if absolutely needful I think the Directors would  
not mind you going higher than this figure, but we must have  
the earliest intimation of the number provided or likely to be killed  
for them to enable us to arrange terms for the extra payment. Mr.  
Woolly tells me that John Bayley is engaged by Mr. Cameron to  
look after his Rams, we have written Kennedy if this is carried  
out we will not have any claim on Cameron. We have paid for the two  
Sheep Pens for our Rams, 15 on each side of hatch, as I insisted upon their  
being placed midships being the safest part of the vessel.

• 12. N<sup>o</sup> 423, 4, 24. We are sorry to learn that Mr. Whisham's  
Canvas is not approved, in future the Edinburgh Ropery Co<sup>s</sup>. canvas  
will be sent - you complain of the groceries please specify whether  
from Croft & Blackwell or J. S. Morton, we shall cease dealing with  
Morris Millar &c: for Tea and shall <sup>try to</sup> get it from the Civil Service  
Supply Association Co<sup>s</sup>. or a Broker in Mincing Lane just recom-  
mended to us - we employed Hastings for Bacon &c: fearing his  
wares were good, I believe we ought to return to Gates unless the  
Civil Service Ass<sup>t</sup>. would supply our small quantities - Croft must  
replace the improper harness collar and reimburse all charges, he  
is proved to be the right man as he now supplies the whole of the  
Colony as well as Tierra del Fuego & Patagonia. Vizd<sup>t</sup>. W<sup>r</sup>d<sup>t</sup>. Gilbey  
Wine & Spirit Merchants, Pantheon, Oxford St<sup>r</sup>, have offered their  
Agency at the Falklands to us as per letter dated yesterday, copy  
enclosed, circulars going by 'Selenubria', we think it would be well  
to accept this so I must learn further particulars.

Par 25. Your letter and specification has been sent to Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Welch &c:  
for answer this morning but it has not arrived - the Board considers  
it would be difficult & very risky to work such a charter as you propose  
we must send these details on 15<sup>th</sup> to Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Welch for their advice and  
shall endeavour to send full & definite decision by next Mail.

Writing upon Stores we send copy of Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Townsend & Spearings  
Circular of 5<sup>th</sup> July last about supplying [redacted] Stores, skipping  
Sheep and bringing back Produce by a Steamer kindly lent me  
to copy by Mr. Langridge, this must be by the S<sup>r</sup> 'Granville' already  
reported, which it is considered will be a losing charter.

From the extracts of the Thosmos Co<sup>s</sup>. letter of 10<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup> you will  
see they are inclined to assist in getting out Stores at a cheaper  
rate by allowing the reduced Valparaiso rate provided we can  
give their Steamers good cargoes of Produce to England, but  
even then the expenses to Hamburg bring it to 35/- for Meter cube,  
then adding one seventh for the less measurement of Meter in com-  
parison to English cube it amounts at once to 40/- the charge  
proposed by Townsend leaving nothing for our Schooners  
delivering at West Falkland, therefore this business requires  
your further careful consideration.

13. Par 8, 10, 16. The Thosmos S<sup>r</sup> 'Totnes' behaved  
remarkably well stopping so long at Sandy Point for the Pacific  
S<sup>r</sup> 'Clopaci' and then getting the mails from her ashore at  
Delgada Point, I doubt if an English Captain would have  
taken so much trouble. I am sorry you did not receive  
Telegram Out N<sup>o</sup>. 38 announcing that the Ada Browne was  
consigned to us.

14. Par 24. We send particulars of prices of ships  
stanchions for your guidance as to Capt<sup>r</sup>. Fowler's offer.

15. Par 22. We sent your memos about Mr. Dixon's land  
to him and as you implied that he had no correct title to same  
he said he should give up the matter as you now say we might  
make an offer of £60 the matter must be further examined.

16. Par 17. We regret to learn
