Sir, Enclosing Duplicate of our last on 29<sup>th</sup> ult., we have to acknowledge Despatch 279 of 26<sup>th</sup> Nov. last, received on 6<sup>th</sup> inst., and your letters at Montevideo of 15<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup> ult., received on 14<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> instant.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 279, 4. Respecting the loss of the 'Sparrow Hawk' we still wait full information as to her voyage to Sandy Point, as well as the details obtained from Capt<sup>n</sup>. Campbell about the wreck, sale of Hull &c and his expenses there. Since our last Capt<sup>n</sup>. Campbell's Letter from Montevideo 9<sup>th</sup> ult. has arrived, as per Copy enclosed, - we have accepted his Draft from Sandy Point 28 Oct 79 for £ 42. 2.<sup>m</sup> on 17<sup>th</sup> inst. favor Alb<sup>r</sup>. Schröder 16<sup>o</sup> - we learn at Lloyd's that they have received from Hrsh. Hc<sup>r</sup>, Valparaiso, a Bill for £ 228. 11. 11 the net proceeds of Hull, Gear & Boats sold at Punta Arenas, this Bill is to be handed to us on its due date 5<sup>th</sup> April next. We are sorry to have such a bad account of the affair from your letter of 17<sup>th</sup> ult., if Capt<sup>n</sup>. Campbell has disposed of the Chronometer we will have to account for it, we have not made any claim for his effects insured for £ 100 by separate policy - enclosed is our letter to him of this date, which can be handed to him or not, as you think fit.

3. Par 6. We have asked M<sup>r</sup>s W. Grice H<sup>c</sup> of Bootle and 134 Wool Exchange, London, to give us Consignment Letter for their vessels, but they hardly see the use of same, as all the chartering is done by M<sup>r</sup>s Grice Lummer H<sup>c</sup> of Melbourne, whom they will recommend to sign one.

4. Par 8. The Board has already instructed you as to the purchase of Land with the Land Orders, and they consequently wait your definite arrangement of this matter; there are still two nominations open for Emigrants, which must wait some Shepherds going out, as we could hardly ask the Schoolmaster his wife to get such papers signed.

5. Par 9. The letter upon his late Son's affairs at Speedwell Island was sent to Mr Baillon, who has asked us not to press for the £ 736. 8. 10 due to the C<sup>o</sup>, as the whole security is in our hands, he states that he has

sent a Power of Attorney to his Son Louis A. Baillon of Fox Bay, you can therefore arrange the matter with due regard to our interests.

6. The following were unfortunately omitted in the last Despatch; memos on Pacific Steamers calling at Stanley - sample of Baillon's Wool for Edenborough's Letter of 17 Dec 79 - two cases Butter 1628, q were not shipped p. Guadiana 30<sup>th</sup> ult. - the Office case by this St. N° 1668 contained by mistake for Doolan's Smoking Caps, a parcel of Child's Hats from Christy, the invoice n. 9.10 is included in the present shipment, they will double sell readily.

7. Enclosed is Copy of General Post Office Letter 31<sup>st</sup> ult. stating that the future Mail Service is still under consideration, and that the Falkland correspondence is sent to H.M. Consul at Montevideo to be forwarded as opportunity offers, since then there has been no communication from the Colonial Office.

8. The parcel of Tussac Seed ex 'Falcon' for Dr. Carl of New Zealand, was delivered at the Government Agent Sir Julius Vogel's, who would feel obliged for a further supply, with particulars of growth &c.

9. When Andrew Telford presented the order for £150, as per statement N° 79, he claimed 1.9.5 for lodging expenses at Montevideo, as he was not allowed to remain on the 'Black Hawk' until the Steamer started though told he could do so, as the C. had to bring <sup>him</sup> home free this was paid; he stated that his chest, left on board a schooner at Stanley, was promised to be sent on by the 'Sea Witch', we trust this has been attended to.

10. Mr. Humphreys denies having divulged our Telegrams, as implied by N° 274, 21, having only told Mr. Dean about the Dennis Brundrit's business being transacted by him, of which he would have had to be informed at Stanley.

11. The Board is much surprised at the continued & great cost of the Manager's House for Stores, Wages &c., and require full details of all the items of these accounts, and they desire that this House account be now closed.

12. The 'Vicar of Bray's' cargo of Produce Home has been insured at £15,000 at 35/- direct, that portion brought to her by Schooners is covered at 15/- extra, the value to be declared, it will be necessary therefore to send detailed account when & whence the cargo is received by her. Whilst speaking of this vessel it is well to draw attention to your original proposal of laying her down as a Hulk, she is getting more dangerous and liable for heavy repairs every voyage, the bowsprit may cause trouble as she might be detained here on the point of sailing, for the Board of Trade surveyors are very particular now, the time & expense of keeping her here after her next return until the Autumn will be more than ever, should she make another voyage she

ought to be docked and recoppered, or well patched to save expense, before being sent out as a bulk, as her copper will have been on over 2½ years, perhaps zinc might answer, it would be much cheaper - Then what cargo ought she to convey, would it be well to send her to the North for a full cargo of House Coals, or part Steam, with some Timber, Flide Salt & a few Bricks, the two latter being shipped here as ballast to the North, though we just remember coming home with a Wool cargo she always has stone ballast on board.

13. We are exceedingly sorry to learn from Mr. Hamptons that the Stores p. G.W. Britannia, 12 Nov 79, did not go on in the Black Hawk from Montevideo 18 ult<sup>r</sup>, as these goods may prevent the shipment p. S.V. Guadiana 29 ult<sup>r</sup> going on, and being necessaries left behind by yourself it casts a doubt upon the orders from Granley for Stores being bona fide. With reference to Par 8 of last Despatch, upon more mature consideration it was decided we ought to keep faith with the arrangements made with you for shipments of Stores this year; and execute the order for the present Steamer, instead of combining it with the 'Lioness' cargo, this has been done and if the expense of the vessel's shipment is more than we can afford, the later shipment by S.V. of 30 July must not be sent, and that of 30 Sept. must be reduced, the Books and a few things will be procured for this Steamer. As Iron has risen as much as 100% in some articles, the Board ordered the last Order N° 36 to be executed in full by the 'Lioness', which will also convey the balance of former incents for iron stores: this vessel having been delayed at Middlesbrough, where she received 250 tons best House Coal, and here docking, may not leave so early as arranged, but will certainly leave the Docks on 21<sup>st</sup> Feb<sup>r</sup>. or a few days afterwards, this delay of a week may perhaps result in enabling something particular being procured for her, as the Mail due on the 15<sup>th</sup> prox<sup>r</sup> may bring an Order.

14. On reply to your 15 Dec, the Pacific C° are right in charging the freight at Montevideo for the P. Mendoza, as it was not paid at Liverpool. The payment to Cowdell is entered as to be made on 1<sup>st</sup> Apr<sup>r</sup> next. Referring to N° 551, 5, as there used to be a payment made to Mr. H. P. Cobb on the 1<sup>st</sup> prox<sup>r</sup>, we wrote him enquiring if you had mentioned this to him, & learning that he had instructions as to the application of the money, these payments of £150 quarterly will be made to him.

15. We learn that Mr. Waldron has purchased, so it is reported, at all events chartered the steamasted Sch. Britannia, 218 tons for Port Howard to sail in about a fortnight - she is an old vessel

built at Garmouth in 1866, being now only A 1 in red.

16. We have been disappointed in getting off the new Schoolmaster Mr. John Bruce Frazer by this Steamer, but he will go out by the 'Lionel's' with his wife and boy, 3 years old, and Furniture so that they will all land together in comfort: we offered passage to Mrs. Hansen but she proceeds with her child, under 8 years of age, by this P.V. to Montevideo.

17. This morning we received a Telegram despatched from Montevideo on 26<sup>th</sup> "Stanley cargo tea of dublin vicarage bulljoint" - which was immediately taken to Lloyd's and means - Craigie Lee of Dublin wrecked at Bull Point, all hands saved, some part of cargo may possibly be recovered - she is an iron Barque of 622 tons, recorded as sailing from Sydney on 10. Aug 79 for Malden Island - under these circumstances we informed Messrs. Grice & C° of the wreck but they do not know anything of the vessel. We fear this Telegram shows that the 'Black Hawk' did not unfortunately arrive at Monte Video until the 26<sup>th</sup>, in which case we shall not be able to carry out the expectations mentioned in Par 13, of sending any particular stores ordered by Mail arranged to be here middle of Feb<sup>o</sup>.

18. The Epitome of Stores ft. 'Lionel's' shows her cargo, but the amount devoted to Yates will be much exceeded as we have ordered 72 bbls Crushed Sugar, most of the balance of Provisions will go, if possible a couple Boats, 16 or 18 feet, a Dinghy for Martin, 1500 Wood Posts, two miles Morton's Wire Fencing, 15 hds Tobacco, 9 3/4 tons nearly, the balance of Hosiery & Sluffs can hardly be afforded, 200 Tallow Candles, 6 Tarponkins for Hide Depots, Kerosene Lamp oil 45 cs as ft. V of Bray, could not these cans be returned to be refilled: if possible some Compressed Hay at Gravesend.

Sir, Our last Despatch went forward by the R. Mail 'Sir Tamar' (as per Duplicate enclosed) on the 30<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>o</sup>; the present and our next Despatch on the 23<sup>rd</sup> prox<sup>t</sup>, by a Pacific Steamer from Liverpool, ought to arrive about the same time: as premised in our last we are not able to answer the expected Despatch, nor to send any Stores urgently required, which is a pity as this vessel is not filled up.

2. The Sample of Wool for Edenborough's Letter of 17 Dec 79 was again omitted, this is now forwarded - also Copy of Capt<sup>r</sup>. Campbell's Letter 9 Dec 79 about 'Sparrow Hawk' now enclosed.

3. We learn that the 'Britannia' has been bought by Mess<sup>r</sup>. Townsend & Spearing for £700, doubtless with the intention of being employed for Mr. Waldron, she left the Docks on the 14<sup>th</sup> with a full cargo and seven Rams, one a Merino, we have not yet heard from Mr. John Waldron these breed of these though they looked like Cotswolds or Lincolns, certainly they are not his former style, Romney Marsh, from Fassell of Hode near Canterbury, you had better therefore watch the influence they have upon his Wool, which at the present has been superior to the Co<sup>r</sup>: both in quality and weight of wool from each Sheep. Should there ever be a remark on the extreme rate of one penny per pound charged by the Co<sup>r</sup>: for bringing home his Wool, they must be told that full time is taken for payment of the freight, that on Waldron's & Glickney's by the 'Falcon' is not yet paid and the Brokers will doubtless not meet same until end of this month or even later.

4. In order to compensate for delay in Dry Dock the loading days in London for this vessel have been extended until the 24<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>t</sup>, since coming into the London Docks many delays have occurred through fogs or the want

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have sailed last week as arranged. At last moment finding there was space 50 tons House Coal were shipped, as being an article always required and only to be sent by sailing vessel, Mr. E. Packe was enquiring the other day if the 'Britannia' could convey 30 tons Coals for him, so if supply rather too much arrangements might be made to ship some to West Falkland - or consumption might be lessened by allowing the lower paid servants of the C° to have Coals at a reduced price, since they need not pay full freight being only put on board to fill up: 'Britannia' has 60 tons Coals for Waldron: it is reported that she could not take all the cargo the West Falklanders wished to send, and Messrs. Langridge talk of chartering a little vessel hoping to get goods from ourselves and Dean. Capt. Burt of 'Falcon' having stated that a 16 foot Boat was much required at Stanley for towing lighters we send one, also an 18 foot Boat as there is space: Capt. Burt was asked by Martin to get him a soft Dinghy, which has been built by Harvey of Littlehampton and is now shipped, Freight, Insurance and Charges to be paid on same, even with carriage to London she is a cheap boat being so well built and finished off. With all these extras the 'Leone's' is not full, we do not see how we shall be able to fill Produce vessels in future as we used to do, in consequence of having to charter larger vessels for our increased quantity of Wool home, and shipping goods by Steamers so frequently, it will be advisable therefore for you to let us know what cheap rough stuff can be shipped on such occasions of having space to spare.

Messrs. King & Browne now say they can supply Crystal Oil at 1/- per gal: Best at 7/8 per gal: in original American Cases with 2 can of 4 gals each, tins and cases being free. Arnold states that the Fir Spars at 1/- each are exceedingly cheap and too good for telegraph posts. As Singers C° would not supply a Sewing Machine for Mr. Haggern without the money before delivery, we have obtained a better machine from Sellers and Allen, a stand can be supplied to work with the foot for 1. 16. extra, on which the machine would fit, particulars and instruction book are enclosed. We have made out a list of the goods not executed from the present students, but having spent so much money it is impossible to say when these goods can be supplied.

5. The Passengers by this vessel are Mr. John Bruce Frazer, Wife and Son, 3 yrs old, engaged as Schoolmaster & Store Keeper for Darwin at £120 a year with Butcher's Meat, Fuel and unfurnished house or lodging - £8 has been given him for Wages during passage out - he takes with him a quantity of Furniture, which cost us carriage from Arbroath £10.11.2 and uses his own bedding on the passage : and Samuel Hawkins on account of the Rev. Foran, his bedding has cost £2.13.10 - you will charge the Rev. Foran his passage out, including this or it can be paid for and taken ashore with him, having a Cabin to himself and good fare the charge must be commensurate. We pay the vessel for provisioning these people, 3½ adults, 10 months with the Captain Ten Pounds (£10) per adult, some light food & medical comforts being provided for the child.

6. Mr. Colmested is going to marry and talks of returning by the Pacific Steamer leaving Liverpool on 16<sup>th</sup> June - Mr. E. Packe may also take passage by this Steamer.

7. I am happy to report that the Wool Sales have commenced with much improved prices, our Wool ex Leibnitz 'Mary Lester' and 'Falcon' will be put up to auction this afternoon and we hope to be able to forward priced catalogue.

Sir, Enclosing Duplicates of our last Despatch on the 21<sup>st</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> and Letter of 26<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup>, we have now to acknowledge your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 280 and 281, which arrived on the 24<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup>, the original of the first being received on the 8<sup>th</sup> instant ex 'Sea Witch', which vessel reached the Docks on the 13<sup>th</sup> instant.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 280, 3. The Additional Port Regulations dated 19 Dec 79, ordering that the Manifest of the cargo of Vessels entering Port Stanley shall be a duplicate or copy of that lodged at the Custom Houses here cannot be carried over as no vessel is provided with such a Document, this has been explained to the Colonial Office, where we learn that since the above was passed instructions have been sent to the Governor respecting Customs Regulations, which will doubtless cause the Regulations to be altered, we shall therefore continue to send the same Manifest as heretofore.

3. N<sup>o</sup>. 281, 2. A claim has been made at Lloyd's for the St. 'Trent' £1,255.60 or £ 267.3. - Humphreys' payment for average (the receipt for this now at Stanley is to be sent here) £ 59.3. - the extra expenses at Montevideo and £ 1.50 Humphreys' Grants for Average receipt - and a claim on R. Mail C. £ 14 for damage to Sheep Dip.

4. Par 4. All particulars have been furnished in last advices about the loss of 'Sparrow Hawk', on which we wait your observations, you do not mention the amount of the Bill drawn by Capt<sup>n</sup> Campbell upon us for his expenses at Punta Arenas, should another Bill be presented we shall endeavour to claim it with the other two from the Underwriters.

5. Par 5. The Board confirms my letter of 26<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> respecting the Mail Service and trust you will fully employ the 'Black Hawk' at the Islands in a profitable

, manner during the time she is not running the Mails, - of course you will avail of every opportunity to give future anticipations of Mails home, it will be most unfortunate if we do not get advices about the dates arranged - as there is an uncertainty about your running the 15 May Mail we shall not ship Stores on 29 Apr by the R. Mail C° as proposed, unless we should hear before that date that they are safe to go on: the policy for Capt<sup>r</sup>. Dixon's Effects £100 on 'Valk Hawk' has been continued for a year from the 9<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup>, but we have taken the precaution to be able to transfer it to the name of another Captain if he quits our service.

6. Par 11. With respect to Capt<sup>r</sup>. Dixon's expenses at Montevideo, the provision Bills sent do not give the particulars of Stores complained of, they are however heavy in Eggs, Fish &c, still this may not be extravagance to be objected to if the usual victualling stores are not consumed at the same time, we must therefore leave the matter to your discretion and as he has not the character of being economical, you had better make him understand that such expenses will be more closely looked into in future.

7. Par 12. It is most unfortunate that Story's Furniture has been so badly packed, we wait full details of damage and expenses of repolishing before making claim, with respect to the Carpets not being made properly, there must be full evidence that the dimensions you gave have not been carried out, as this Office had not anything to do with the order for Furniture or Carpets, this matter being attended to by yourself only.

8. The late Newspapers, enclosures for this Despatch &c will go in a parcel by this Steamer for Mr. Humphreys, in which the foolscap Chromograph ordered by your letter of 12 Jan<sup>r</sup>. will be enclosed - The trap for soil pipe of House we shall ask Mr. Dean to convey by the 'Sea Witch', which is to return at once and be laid down as a bulk: Messrs H. Langridge's vessel out is now delayed until end of May, by which time we trust we may have goods to send though I have held out no hopes to him believing the Directors will not ship Stores for some time, unless it be actual necessaries for Camp use - The draft Ale & 'Lionels' will carry you on to the middle of September next, expected advices ought to inform us the quantity to be shipped by Pacific S.W. of 15 June, which will be the only opportunity before the Produce vessel in the Autumn.

9. On the 18<sup>th</sup>. inst. Mr. Stickney paid his Sons' Account £830. 7. 5 and offered to pay interest on £321. 11. 3 the amount of cash advanced to them, he was told that we understood interest on the whole amount would be due from the date of receiving the account of balance in England, which was the 17 Nov<sup>r</sup>. last year, as he demurred to this, saying interest was never charged on the Stores & vessel's work, no interest was taken the matter being left for you to make a charge, which ought to be done on such a long outstanding account, let us have full particulars of the arrangement concluded for future information.

10. You will notice with satisfaction the prices I wrote on the Sale Catalogue of the 'Falcon's' Wool sent at last moment of the Sale on 21 ult<sup>r</sup>. by the 'Lioness' - Messrs. Waldron's and Stickney Wools were sold on the 3<sup>d</sup> inst. at the same good prices, and it is anticipated the 'Vicar's' Wool will realize as good or even better prices at the May Sales - the parcel contains printed price Catalogues of both sales and a return of prices for the whole of last year's Produce in Wool - also statements of realization of each year's cargoes of Produce &c. from 1875. Mr. Waldron's Rams by the 'Britannia' were Cotswolds, Mr. Stickney says the best crop is Merino & Leicester, his average weight of fleece being greater than ours and of a better wool, and they do not suffer from the loss of belly wool like the Cheviots.

11. I have to request that with each shipment of Produce you will send the following particulars, viz.: the weight of each bale of Wool, this list not to include the weight of any already sent or to follow afterwards, as in case of loss, or if numbers on any bales are indistinct, there arises a difficulty of identification: should you be unable to send these particulars with the shipment the following Mail (by which copy should always come) will do. In sheepskins the number in each bale should be stated, as also the weights (gross & tare) of the Tallow. I may mention that all insurances are based on shipping weights (nett) of Wool, number of Sheepskins, shipping weights (nett) of Tallow, and therefore this information is always required for all goods insured by the C°. I may add that the Wool weights of the first ship last year were not sent until all the wool was sold and settled, the weights for the whole year being kept back till the last shipment - also that though the tare of the Tallow is marked on the cask, no record of same was sent to this office, and as to cargo not the C°'s own it is the exception to receive any particulars of.

12. Mr. Clay having written to his friend Mr. Sawyer about getting leave of absence to come to England and marry, the Directors would approve of your granting this at the end of

his term, or a little before if this would be better for his superintendence and he would enter into another Agreement, always provided that arrangements can be made for his duties being attended to during his absence.

13. Langley's Invoice £15.- for Tallow Cask Brands was omitted in the "Lionels" Accounts and is now forwarded: Arnold entered 1620 Posts on Invoice, as later recorded in his Cargo Book 4563, 57 were deducted on paying the Account, if these are delivered payment is to be made for them hereafter. Arnold states that 12 over were put into the barge to make up any deficiencies. No. 2722 entered on manifest was not on board, Nos. 2743 to 2756 found by myself on board and were numbered were not entered on the Manifest, but being only private parcels I presume this omission will not bring the Company into discredit at the Stanley Customhouse.

14. Twenty Pounds has been paid the "Falcon" for the two passengers she brought home, it was not distinctly reported whether this was settled at Stanley or to be paid here, if the former the payment will be refunded.

15. Mr. Charles Williams received his £600 Bill on the 13<sup>th</sup> inst., he talks of purchasing Stores and returning with them as soon as possible.

The Father of Donald M<sup>c</sup>Donald, at Fort William, who landed by the 'Matilda' at Stanley 23 Sep 67, would feel obliged by some particulars of him: he sends copy of his letter dated at Stanley May '73, stating that he was going to Australia in the Barkantine 'Eda', Capt<sup>n</sup>. Gullock (this vessel is not entered in the Shipping Report) - and copy of letter 11 Dec 79 from John M<sup>c</sup> Hinnon stating that he had embarked as above, but had been lost at sea according to accounts sent to the Co<sup>r</sup>. Storekeeper, please make a few enquiries and inform us what is known of him.

17. Referring to N<sup>o</sup>. 552, q, we learn that Telford's box is not on board the 'Sea Witch', this is not right, it ought to have been forwarded directly free of charge.

18. We regret to learn from Blumptreys' Letter of 26 ult<sup>o</sup>, so hand this morning, that the G.W. 'Tamar's' cargo of Stores, shipped hence on 29 Jan<sup>o</sup>, was being landed as the H.B. 'Hawk' was not there and he had no advices from you when you intended sending her up again - our Telegram Out N<sup>o</sup>. 17 of 25 ult<sup>o</sup>, being the word "stop" (to stop the Stanley Mail of 2 Apr<sup>o</sup>) had arrived & would be forwarded in a day or so by H.M.S. 'Garnet', together with all Mails from England received prior to her departure.

19. From the date of the 'Falcon's' arrival the Falkland market has been unfortunately very quiet, which has prevented our realizing, after Easter and when the Parliamentary Elections are over we hope to be able to put up a small quantity to test the market, until then samples will not be drawn, this accounts for our not being able to send a report on the Falklands.

20. The 'Sea Witch' is to sail by the middle of next month, this will be an excellent opportunity for writing to acknowledge the Mail in due next week, and will reach you about the same time as the intended Mail of 4 May, which may not now be carried out.

Lor, We enclose Duplicate of our last on 23<sup>rd</sup> ult. and unfortunately have not received the Despatch expected from you at the end of last month: on the 27<sup>th</sup> ult. a Telegram from Montevideo of the same date reached Lloyd's, reporting damage to the 'Jane Law', presuming our Mails arrived at that time we shall not receive them until towards the end of this month; to be on the safe side we must acknowledge them by the Royal Mail Steamer of the 30<sup>th</sup> inst., as well as by the Pacific Steamer of the 5<sup>th</sup> proximo. We understand that H.M.S. 'Garnet' left Montevideo on 28<sup>th</sup> Feb. with our Telegram Out N° 17 and all Mails arrived up to that date, as she would probably leave Stanley towards the end of last month we expect her Despatch by the middle of May if not before.

2. We have compromised the claim for damage to the Sheep Dip &c by the St. 'Trent' for Nine Pounds (£9).

3. We have the pleasure of reporting that Mr. Dean's Wool ex 'Sea Witch' sold on the 7<sup>th</sup> inst. at very good prices, from the priced Catalogue herewith you will see that Mr. Clymonts, marked <sup>Sample of this Wool can you sent.</sup> 7, fetched sixteen pence a pound, the highest price ever given for Falklands Wool, but the Brokers state it was undoubtedly the finest lot they have ever seen from the Islands; under such circumstances the Directors wish you to enquire and report upon the breed of Sheep on Mr. Clymonts Farm, the Dip used and any further particulars which could be carried out for the improvement of the Co.'s clip.

4. Mr. Thos. W. Allday, the Co.'s late Butcher, has applied for £. 17. 6 Wages from 1<sup>st</sup> to 10<sup>th</sup> June 1878, which he states were not paid to him, as this cannot be ascertained here we are obliged to request that the matter may be examined at Stanley and the result reported: the correspondence is enclosed.

Gir, Our last went forward by the 'Sea Witch', which passed Deal early on 23<sup>rd</sup>, and as the Mails are so irregular we write by this opportunity to acknowledge your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 282, 283, 284 received this morning by the Pacific P<sup>r</sup> 'Magellan', which brought the Falkland Mail Bags, and N<sup>o</sup>. 285 received on 24<sup>th</sup> inst. in Mr. Humphreys' Letter of 24<sup>th</sup> ult. by the German P<sup>r</sup> 'Galier'.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 282, 3. The transactions and uncertainties about the Mails are very unpleasant but the Board believes you have done your best - Copy of the Ordinance compelling vessels to take Mails at 1<sup>d</sup> per letter is not sent. Since our remarks <sup>in N<sup>o</sup>. 555, 5,</sup> on Humphreys' Telegram Home 26 about the Mails being forced upon the 'B. Hawk', we have learned that the Law Officers of Crown advised the Post Office many years ago, that a vessel in the Chinese Harbour Canton could not be compelled to carry Mails to the English Colony Hong Kong. It will be necessary to keep in view the Pacific Steamers calling, as Mr. Humphreys has doubtless informed you that the "Hermes" German Line cannot undertake the service. Enclosed is R. Mail notice that from 24<sup>th</sup> prox. they will despatch two steamers a month to the River Plate on the 9<sup>th</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup> of each month.

3. Par 5. It is not stated whether the balance of Wages 29. n. 4 due to the late deceased W. Mittelstedt is in the hands of the C<sup>o</sup> or the Gov<sup>t</sup> - believing that the Gov<sup>t</sup> usually take possession of the property of strangers dying in the Colony we shall not be able to hand this sum to his Brother, though we must send him the Box coming P. V. of Bray, we presume he did not make a Will as it is not mentioned.

4. Par 10. The explanations upon T. Alday's complaints are sufficient, he has not taken any legal measures but has asked for £ 2. 17. 6 Wages from 1 to 10 June 78, this appears to be due to him according to your statement, though the C<sup>o</sup> have a claim for damage to their house let to his Wife, if you can send legal evidence of this do so, if not we had better pay the small claim & have done with him.

5. N<sup>o</sup>. 284, 2. We have applied for balance of Sparrow Banks' Policy charging the Underwriters the two Bills <sup>62. 6. 3</sup> as expenses, so this they object but we may now be able to settle the matter by claiming the expenses 46. 14. 7 as by the account you sent - we cannot

6. Par 9. The reason of the Stores P<sup>r</sup>. P.W. Britannia, 12 Nov 79 being left at M. Video when the B. Hawk sailed thence on 17 Dec 79, has not been so fully explained before, we now perceive it was the best course to pursue. The delay and trouble about the Cargo p<sup>r</sup>. G.V. 'Tamar' 29 Jan 80 is unfortunate, we shipped on reconsideration so throw in a small supply of needed Provisions under belief you would certainly start the B. Hawk on 16 Feb to send the B. Alan-<sup>import</sup> cing Acct. for last year, and though N<sup>o</sup>. 551, 8, said we might not ship them, it told you that Frazer was likely to come out by that Steamer and would have to go on - of course neither Office knew of H.M. G. 'Garnet' going down, you have not acknowledged Telegram Out 8<sup>th</sup> 81 which she carried down.

7. Par 12. It is a great pity the Fencing sent P<sup>r</sup>. 'Lionels' costing £116.2.9 from Morton is not required, Clay ordered it & ought to have known that there was already some on hand - could it not have been sold for the fencing you have just ordered Humphreys to purchase at Monte video.

8. Par 13. Enclosures shall in future be past into the Despatches themselves.

9. Par 15. Martin certainly promised that his Steam Launch was to be employed for the Co<sup>r</sup>. service without charge, I shall write to him to this effect by the next Mail, which will be by the Pacific P.W. 'Magellan' on the 1<sup>st</sup> proximo.

10. N<sup>o</sup>. 285. We have adopted your suggestion and told the R. Mail C<sup>o</sup>. not to accept any more through freight.

Solicitors Messrs Bischoff Bonapras Bischoff &c who state that the usual Board of Trade Ship's Articles constitute an Agreement between the Master & the Crew, not between the Master & the Owners - Copy of Correspondence is enclosed. 13. P<sup>r</sup>l 201 - Extra Stores £2000 is continued to 28 Apr 81. Hulls Insurance £1000 is continued to 25 Apr 81 at same valuations. The R. Mail C<sup>o</sup>. inform that the Trent's Average Deposit paid by the C<sup>o</sup> at M. Video will be returned to our agent there.

14. The 'Fairy' is still entered in the Board of Trade's

15. Charles Williams returns by this Steamer -

Sir, Though we addressed you on the 29<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup>. we write again on the regular Mail day, but have instructed Mr. Humphreys not to send the Duplicate of our last with this.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 284, 15. We adopt your suggestion and have this day written Martin that he has no right to make a charge for his Steam Launch towing boats to & from the 'Falcon', as she was conveyed out free by our vessel under promise that he would employ her for the Co<sup>r</sup>. service.

3. Par 18. Michael Barrett did not have anything promised to him beyond the regular Agreement, we regret to learn that he is likely to be discontented, everything was fully explained to him and he appeared to be the right sort of man to send out, having a good opinion of him and as his most careful services are so indispensable in conveying the Tallow casks, we must leave it to you to do the best with him.

4. We were much disappointed that there was not a letter or any Return from Mr. Clay, and have written him to say that as the Mails are so uncertain he ought to prepare these beforehand to be ready at Stanley for first opportunity.

5. We believe that Messrs Langridge &c. have given up their hopes of being able to charter a small vessel for Stanley with cargo for E. Packe, Holmested, C. Williams and Dean, consequently there may be some freight to be earned by the 'Vicar of Bray' - since above this may still be carried out when E. Packe returns from the Mediterranean.

Sir, In continuation of our last on the 4<sup>th</sup> instant I am now able to give the Board's decisions upon your late Despatches.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 282, 9 - 284, 22. Since you report that the 'Black Hawk' could be dispensed with and might be sold here, we have enquired as to the latter and learn she would not realize more than £800 to 1000 if sold as a Merchant vessel, or £1000 to 1200 if sold as a Yacht, this therefore is out of the question and the Directors consider it will be better to lay her up and not make any alterations in her fittings, until it is positively decided how the Mail Service will be worked: when laid up it will be necessary to send Certificate of this as we may be able to claim something from the Underwriters for their risk ceasing for a time: we have asked Mr. Humphreys to give some idea what she might realize at H. Video being well approved of there.

3. N<sup>o</sup>. 284, 8. It is decided that the 'Vicar of Bray' is to return as soon as possible to be laid down for a Hulk, we shall therefore just sight and patch her bottom, if necessary, as Lime stanching would not answer and start her at once with the Sheep Dip ordered, the deadweight Stores & those asked for by Indent N<sup>o</sup>. 37, with the balance of former ones not executed but not a very heavy cargo for fear of damage - we hope to do this by end of next month, as the sooner she is off the less expense here and the better arrangement for delivery of Stores at Stanley, between the 'Lioness' and the first Produce vessel for S.A., which we anticipate starting by the middle of October next, to arrive first week of Jan. 81 and leave at the end of February: There are no suggestions as to shipment of draft Ale, as arranged with you, but as we must not risk steamer shipments at present we shall send the 50 hds in Indent 37 by the 'Vicar', which ought to arrive about the time that the 'Lioness' stock is consumed.

4. Par 17. The Board has carefully considered the proposal for the increase of the House provided for Dr. Houston by the C<sup>o</sup>, and are of opinion that the present house is sufficiently large and that no outlay is needed.

5. Par 23 of 285. It does not appear that the Underwriters would take much notice of Capt<sup>r</sup> Campbell being put in command of another of the Co<sup>r</sup>'s vessels, the matter must therefore be left to your discretion if you consider him the right man to employ.

6. N<sup>o</sup> 282, 15. We have been obliged to send the 'Star of Peace's' Bill for £1537.8.5 to Melbourne for acceptance, as Capt<sup>r</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Grice &c<sup>r</sup> could not take it up here, we shall not therefore have the cash until the early part of August - This Despatch is presumed to be onboard her, it is not yet delivered.

7. Mr. James Meek, whose correspondence was sent some time since, reports that our Sheepskins are much improved but states that better processes of treatment would result in much good to the Co<sup>r</sup>, we have offered to support him in anything of the kind if he will go out on his own account: we are glad to see that Mr. Humphreys reports favorably upon the Sheepskins sent up to Montevideo and trust that you will go into the matter most carefully to decide whether that market is a better one than here.

8. The Admiralty will publish in July next, at our request, a Chart of the Bay of Caribou and Bull Road upon a large scale, this will be of great advantage to our vessels going to the Co<sup>r</sup>'s new Station at North Arm.

9. The Auditors desire me to draw your attention to the fact that there is no Certificate of Audit of the Stanley Accounts at the end of last year, and that you have not sent a Balance Sheet nor a Profit & Loss Statement.

10. By letter dated 16 ult<sup>r</sup> received from Mr. Humphreys this morning we are informed of the proceedings at M. Video in respect of the Mails and the Black Hawk and that the German S<sup>r</sup>. Ramses' left that port on 15 ult<sup>r</sup> with the English Mails the 'B. Hawk' being detained until the 17<sup>th</sup> - we fear it will be impossible to make any claim for this detention - he reports that the 'Letitia' or 'Ready' had just arrived from Stanley with a Mail, we trust to get that with the 'Garnet's' by the S<sup>r</sup>. Arancaria which left M. V. on 25 ult<sup>r</sup>: in the present uncertainty of the Mails we think it proper to state that we shall write by every opportunity to Montevideo as follows - on 22<sup>nd</sup> by R. M. Sir, Our last was dated 18<sup>th</sup> inst. - Duplicate accompanies this separately to care of Humphreys. This morning we received Despatches 286 and 287, of 23<sup>rd</sup> March and 5<sup>th</sup> April, with Enclosures, these you have numbered 486 & 487 in error. As the Mails are so uncertain you must follow our plan of sending the Duplicates to Humphreys to be forwarded by different opportunities, as Duplicate of N<sup>o</sup>. 286 has now arrived with the Original.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 286. 2. With respect to your remark about the Orient C° objecting to the Post Office compelling them to carry Mails by their Steamers at one penny a letter, they were obliged to submit to such an arrangement by virtue of an old Act of Parliament, the conveyance of correspondence between the Mother Country and the Colonies has always been considered the special duty of the Government to enforce under all circumstances, and I am of opinion that for the public good the Governor of the Falklands had the power of making Ordinance N<sup>o</sup>. 1 of 1880, for Colonial & all other vessels to carry letters at one penny each especially as it received the sanction of the Legislative Council who represent the Colonists in general, the Board may instruct that legal advice may be obtained upon this point.

3. N<sup>o</sup>. 284. 2. As expressed in our last we shall use our best endeavours to get the Vicar of Bray away by the end of next month or 3<sup>rd</sup> July, even sailing on 10 July her average passage out being 81 days would bring her to the date you state that the Wool Bagging ought to arrive at Stanley, viz: 1<sup>st</sup> Oct<sup>r</sup>, it will therefore be shipped, together with Indents 1<sup>st</sup> 38 and 39 now received - of course she must have a light cargo for speed and safety: it is doubtful whether we ought not to send a small supply of draft &c by the Pacific St. of 15<sup>th</sup> prox<sup>r</sup>, but until further Despatches arrive from you it may be too risky for detention at Montevideo, perhaps we may be able to ship a small supply by Langridge's vessel, if starting sometime before 'Vicar', and if a smart sailer.

4. We have seen Sir Julius Vogel about the Tussac Seed for New Zealand, which you state could be obtained next December, pray see that this is done and send it off by mail conveyance.

Sir, Duplicate of our last on 22<sup>nd</sup> ult. is sent with this to Mr. Humphreys: we have now to acknowledge your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 288 of 21<sup>st</sup> April, per German S.V. Ramses' to Sandy Point, which arrived yesterday. Original of N<sup>o</sup>. 282, P. 'Star of Peace' to Hamburg, was delivered here on 27<sup>th</sup> ultimo.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 288, 3. We regret to learn that Scab has done so much damage in Lafonia as to cause a serious diminution in the weight of Tallow produced by the melting now just ended - the Board trusts that the greatest pains will be taken to eradicate this pest so that next season may show an improved result, of course allowances must be made when old sheep are melted down and it is satisfactory to hear that the old Ewes are being got rid of, as ceasing to breed from such animals must lead to improvement in the flocks on all sides.

3. Par 4. We complain to Mr. Dougall about deficiency of weight of their Sheep Dip, and shall take steps to satisfy ourselves that the kegs are of the proper weight in future: when such a deficiency as 30 and 40 lbs in kegs required to contain 200 lbs was discovered, a proper certificate ought to have been sent to this office to enable a claim to be made. The Spirits of Tar is already ordered by N<sup>o</sup>. 284, 18 to be sent in casks, this is the result of Fenners proposal to save money in packages for this article, and to insure greater security than jars, which induced us to ship two casks by the 'Vicar' last Sept. upon trial, it is satisfactory to find the plan approved. Complaint has also been made to Morton about Gorby's Shears, as per Par 5, and 15 doz of a different kind will be supplied.

4. Par 7. Due notice is taken of your remarks about the German P.V. Ramses' having brought the English mails from Montevideo in order to prospect the Colony to see whether the the Hosmos C° can undertake a mail service with the English Government, as it is reported has been proposed to them: we informed the Pacific Steam Navigation C° of this steamer going to Stanley, on the 28<sup>th</sup> ult. but have had no reply, and mentioned the promises of support you had received from the Settlers for Produce to England should their steamers call at Stanley, adding that arrangements ought to be made before end of August, as otherwise we then charter our first Produce vessel.

of next year - we trust the 'Lioness' will do her work well, with quick despatch, since returning about that period we might charter her again on favorable terms, for the Mfrs. Robinson are rather partial to our business, we hope therefore you will send full report on the vessel and her Captain.

5. This Despatch brings an order for Drugs in Dr. Heuston's handwriting, with your remark at the back that they are for use in the Camps, except some few to be invoiced for his own use, the last drugs having come from Apothecaries Hall. The arrangement between the Colonial Office and Dr. Heuston was that he is to find his own drugs, I regret exceedingly to find that though you were supplied with copies of the correspondence with the Colonial Office upon Dr. Heuston's appointment, the three last letters stating this very circumstance were not sent to you, they are now however enclosed, viz.: The Colonial Office to the C<sup>o</sup> 9 & 19 Oct 78 and our reply 14 Oct 78. This true that Dr. Heuston took out Drugs from Apothecaries Hall but not on our account, as I only introduced him there, out of consideration for himself, to enable him to procure a supply at a cheaper rate than he would otherwise have paid. However being a necessity we must send them by the 'Vicar' and charge him with the whole cost.

6. Par 8. We are sorry to find you have suffered so much inconvenience through not receiving letters from your family in consequence of the break in the postal arrangements, when this matter was debated here with you, it was your own proposition that the public should be put to as much inconvenience as possible to force the Government to accept the Co's proposals for a new Mail Contract, this we have been obliged to carry out without distinction of person to all applying about letters for the Colony by referring them to the Colonial and Post Offices, and as the rule was laid down that no indulgence was to be granted to anyone, Mr. Humphreys, as a matter of course, was instructed that he was only to take charge of our own correspondence, had we allowed him to receive letters from other persons we might have rendered ourselves liable to penalties for conveying letters surreptitiously, when giving forth to the Government and public that our vessel was no longer employed in the Mail Service.

7. With respect to the outbreak of Scab in Tasmania attributed to the delay of Dip Materials in 'Trent', it

appears strange that this did not affect the flocks in the North Camp, which must have been deprived of the usual dipping the same as those in Lafouia, the like complaint of outbreak of Scab in Lafouia occurred last year, when the same Despatch reported the North Camp as free and now this occurring again forces us to think that the sheep in Lafouia cannot be so well managed as those under Mr. Patterson.

8. Mfrs<sup>s</sup> Langridge &c<sup>o</sup> have chartered the three master Pch. Obziah, 219 tons, for Stanley & Fox Bay, sailing soon after the 21<sup>st</sup> instant with cargo for Mr. Edw<sup>d</sup> Packe & other West Falklanders.

We wrote you on the 1<sup>st</sup> inst., Duplicate of which accompanies the present to the care of Mr. Humphreys.

2. The Directors of the Company have carefully examined the Accounts and have come to the conclusion that the Island Administration is much too expensively managed. They feel quite unable to place their fingers on the exact spot where retrenchment can be carried out, but they wish the Colonial Manager to understand that they have made up their minds to have these expenses materially reduced. At the present moment they are paying about £19,000 a year, and they must insist upon this being reduced to about £13,000 a year, say a reduction of one third.

They cannot expect a reduction to be made at once, neither can they specify the exact direction in which it must be made, but such a reduction must be made and steps taken at once by which it would eventually take place; by not renewing engagements as they fall in, by diminishing surplus labour and <sup>by</sup> economising and limiting Camp supplies, the process may be set in motion at once but the Colonial Manager must look upon £13,000 a year as the sum they intend eventually to devote to this purpose instead of £19,000 a year.

Of course Sled outbreaks and unforeseen casualties must be exceptionally dealt with, but undue expenditure, which cannot but be going on, the Directors will and must for the interest of the Company put a stop to - the property sent home is by no means adequate in value to the expense it costs in its production. Among other items which the Colonial Manager will have to deal with is the bonus given to the employes of the Company, which appears to have been paid so all indiscriminately, and so have had no beneficial effect in stimulating their zeal or carefulness.

3. The Island Journal should be sent in Duplicate, as if by <sup>any</sup> accident the single copy now forwarded should be lost great inconvenience would be caused, which would

be avoided if the next mail brought a prefs copy - this applies to other important documents relating to Accounts.

4. In accordance with your 28<sup>th</sup>, I, we opened an Insurance for £4,000 upon effects Holmested & Blake's Produce coming home by the S<sup>r</sup> 'Britannia', but at request of the former gentleman this has been cancelled because he had already opened an insurance himself which he considered was done at a cheaper rate than ours, on further enquiry however we learn that this is not the case and from the terms of their insurance and the class of vessel it is probable they will sustain a loss - we are pleased that objection was made to our proceedings, since the examination of the matter shows that our insurers obtain the best terms for the Company and its clients.

5. We cannot learn anything at the Colonial Office respecting the Mail Service, we trust that in all proceedings upon this matter you take the precaution to transact them under protest. As N<sup>o</sup>. 288, 8 acknowledged our letter of 26<sup>th</sup> Feb<sup>d</sup>. without setting aside the proposal for the 'Black Hawk' to leave Stanley on 28<sup>th</sup> of this month to meet the Pacific Steamer of 15<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>d</sup>, we deemed it advisable to ship by her 16 hhds cale as the 'Vicar' is so late, but learning that the 'Araucania' cannot take cargo for the River Plate we shall endeavour to send it by Lamport & Holt's G<sup>r</sup>v. 'Pliny' leaving Liverpool on 12<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>d</sup> if they can satisfy us that she will reach Montevideo in time.

6. We have been applied to by the Mother of Robert Cartmell for money which he promised to remit to her, please remind him of this as she is in need of assistance.

7. Unfortunately there are no news of the 'Vicar of Bray' her departure may consequently be delayed until 9 or 10<sup>th</sup> prox<sup>d</sup>; the Board has ordered 8 to 10 Romney Marsh Rams to be sent out by her; Mr. J. L. Waldron may send 2 or 3 married Shepherds from Scotland, we believe the 'Uzziah' will convey two single men for him, she will not get away until the 26<sup>th</sup> instant.

8. Mr. E. Packe is prevented leaving by the G<sup>r</sup>v. 'Britannia' on 15<sup>th</sup>, though Mr. Holmested & Party will go.

Sir, Our two last Despatches of 28 & 29 ult. went on by the Schw. 'Uzziah', which passed Deal on 2<sup>nd</sup> instant, the Pacific Sv. 'Patagonia' conveyed Duplicate of the first N<sup>o</sup>. 564. Yesterday we received your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 289 (wrongly numbered 489) of 29<sup>th</sup> Apt. last by the 'Allen Gardiner' to Sandy Point, whence the Pacific Sv. 'Iberia' brought it to England. This vessel leaves the Docks on 9<sup>th</sup> inst.

2. We can now inform you that the Colonial Office has concluded a Contract for one year with the Deutsche Dampfschiff-fahrts Gesellschaft Kosmos for their Steamers to convey Mails, Passengers & cargo to and from Stanley, commencing with the Sv. 'Tak Karah' to leave Montevideo yesterday with all Mails then there, which we conclude will be our Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 556 to 561. The next out Mail is to leave Antwerp on 19 Aug, Montevideo 17 Sep, arriving at Stanley 22 Sep - The first Mail home is the Sv. 'Obis' leaving Sandy Point 8 Aug, arriving Stanley 10 Aug, whose Mails we calculate will be delivered at Havre on 17 Sep - There is not time to write to Sandy Point by the Pacific C. to catch her, but we hope to be able to do so for the Sv. 'Tenderah' leaving that port on 27 Oct. We enclose the Returns the short time allows us to draw up, the Kosmos C. promise printed ones as soon as possible, and state that their Agent to reside at Stanley, Capt. Geermann, goes in the Sv. 'Memphis' from Antwerp on 19 Aug - They ask for freight for her at 5<sup>1/2</sup> to 5<sup>3/4</sup> per Meter cube or 1,000 kilos, & imagine the Board will not ship by her having sent so much in this vessel.

3. Capt. G. P. Smith having done very well with the 'Vicar of Bray' has been appointed to take her out & dismantle her, at the same rate of pay £14 a month as per copy of Agreement herewith: he is very economical, has learned at Shipping Office all about the discharge of Crew &c for whose wages to England & passages we are answerable, unless employment found on another vessel or otherwise, so pray consult with him the best course to pursue, as he has the C. interest at heart. She carries a full number of Passengers, well provisioned, balance over to be deleted to Store, also Whale Boat which Capt. Smith says would just

for extra Water for Passengers and Ten Romney Marsh Rams.

4. M<sup>r</sup>. P. L. Simmonds informs us that the Crystal  
Palace will hold an Exhibition of Wool, Feathers &c early next  
year, it will be under his management and he will be obliged  
by your sending a full assortment of our Wool, some Penguin  
skins, Fur Seal skins and anything else you think interesting,  
please therefore prepare such articles for early shipment to London.

5. N<sup>r</sup>. 289, 5. Since you state that Oatmeal provided  
as part wages for our Shepherds does not answer you had  
better relieve Wallerston of this arrangement, if he is worthy  
of this consideration, and we must not engage Shepherds on  
such terms in future.

6. Par 10. I am sure the Directors will be pleased, after  
their late Despatch on the excessive expenditure at the Colony, that  
you are of the same opinion and propose a reduction at Darwin,  
upon this we must wait your further advices, for though the  
Board has laid down the law that they will not spend so  
much the reduction must of necessity be under your direction,  
and for which you may depend on their full support.

7. Par 11. We are extremely sorry <sup>your</sup> of the difficulty at  
Goose Green with respect to the refuse not being carried away  
by the tide, when Martin was here he explained how this was  
carried out & expressed fears that it would result in evil, but  
every endeavour must be made to overcome it for your pro-  
posal to stop the works for a year would cause a most  
serious loss to the Comp<sup>y</sup>, as through the unfortunate low  
value of Wool, the Tallow provides part of the Dividend.

8. Par 12. You have done well to prepare so much  
information and cargo for Steamers calling with Mails,  
this should now be furnished to Capt<sup>r</sup>. Peermann, the Repre-  
sentative of the Thosmos Line, who being independent  
will doubtless be able to obtain cargo from all the Colonists  
and thus work the matter to the best advantage for the Islands  
and his Comp<sup>y</sup>, so that there may be a more frequent service,  
for we believe Steam communication will greatly benefit us all.

9. Par 13. We have no Agreement with Dr. Bernton  
that was undertaken by the Colonial Office, we only subscribing  
£100 a year and providing House, Fuel, Butcher's meat & Horses.  
if the Government Agreement for their £200 states that he is  
entitled to half pay from embarkation to arrival at Stanley,  
the same would apply to our portion, Dr. Bernton will  
doubtless be able to satisfy you on this point - when the  
present pressure of business is past we shall enquire at  
the Colonial Office.

Leemann will be at Montevideo 15 Sep with letter of introduction from us, asking him to assist as it will improve the Colony, and saying that as the R. Mail, Pacific & Lamport's Co<sup>'s</sup> have had every opportunity to establish such a service, we must not complain that the Foreigners have stepped in to fill up the gap.

3. The Directors are of opinion that a wise use of Wire Fencing, even on a large scale, would improve the Sheep Farms and reduce the expenses, but though it is now as cheap as it ever can be, they could not send any out until your report on such a matter and proposals for its erection at various parts of the Co<sup>'s</sup> land, with plans, lengths &c.

4. Capt<sup>n</sup>. Smith has been paid upto and including this day, as the Ship's Articles commence tomorrow - he has charge of Capt<sup>n</sup>. Hansen's Chronometer which he brought home to be repaired, the cost £2. 10. we shall pay and pass to

We require explanation of the large "Amount of Wages Earned" upon the return of Establishment received in £. 289, as it does not tally with three times the "Wages per month" with the addition of "Extra Payment" for the three months January to March 1880, the amounts being 660.16.8 - 283.16.11 - 4797.4.0½ - "Total Amount paid" 2377.12.11.

Sir, Enclosing Triplicate of our last on 8<sup>th</sup> instant we have the pleasure of informing you that the 'Vicar of Bray' left Deal early yesterday morning in light sailing trim, the Passengers well contented, the Rams in good order, so we trust she will make a favorable passage. I discovered at Gravesend that Mr. Waldron's Shepherds, Skilling and Campbell had a dog each, they will be charged here @ £3 each: these men stated that they did not know whether the dogs had had the Distemper, but that being over two years old, it was most likely they had passed through it and there was no danger, however you had better take the precaution to keep them on the vessel until the Coaster is ready to take them round to West Falkland. It would also be well to let Mary McInnes remain onboard until W. Doolan comes in to marry her, a few expenses, goods, and balance of cash brought up her Advance to £15, receipt was sent on.

2. At last moment Gun & Shot Wharf sent an account £17.6 for heading up &c. the 27 casks Blacksmith's Coals: we find it will be better to include the cost of Holmested's Stove in the Stores, this amount £17.4. - with the former increases the General Parvoice to £3,991.4.5.

3. We are informed that the Sheepskins Bales are so large & heavy, about 20% less should be packed in each bale and it should not be pressed so tight: also that these Sheepskins are so valuable to be used for Dunnage, please see that this is not done in future.

4. Yesterday at 10 A.M. Telegram No. 27 arrived, the word "Black", showing that the "Black Hawk" had reached M. Video on 10<sup>th</sup> inst., her Mails ought to be delivered about the same date next month, so we trust to be able to answer them by the first Kosmos Steamer from Antwerp on 19<sup>th</sup> August.

Sir, Duplicate of our last on 13<sup>th</sup> inst. by Pacific  
Gr. 'Cordillera' accompanies this to Montevideo to the  
care of Mr. Humphreys, to be transmitted subsequently  
to the Original. Yesterday we received your Despatches  
N<sup>o</sup>. 290 and 291 (the figure 1 being still put instead of 2)  
dated 10<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> June, the former by the German Pt.  
'Ramses' to Havre, the latter by the French Pt. 'Niger'  
to Bordeaux, having been put on board her at Montevideo  
by Mr. Humphreys.

2. I can now inform you the Board's decisions  
upon those portions of your Despatch 289 not alluded to in  
our N<sup>o</sup>. 566 which acknowledged it. Par 3. It is considered  
to be safer not to make experiments with our Sheepskins,  
the last sales here have been very good, if the buyers learn that  
some are shipped to different ports they will not come to this  
market so readily when ours are on offer.

3. Par 9. Mr. Baillon cannot pay the £250 you told  
us to ask for, he states his Son is coming home when the matter  
can be arranged, the Board is satisfied that the C°. is covered  
on your assertion that the Wool on hand will leave a balance,  
if there are further expenses you must protect us.

4. Par 10. You are to endeavour to check waste in use  
of fuel & meat and must exercise discretionary powers in favor  
of economy upon all sides. The Directors can hardly see how  
married men can be dispensed with altogether and children  
being the result, it will be better to educate them properly  
by means of Mr. Frazer who has undertaken that duty in con-  
junction with Storekeeping, which latter cannot fill up his  
whole time. Mr. Waldron's Shepherd Alex<sup>r</sup>. Mackintosh, pas-  
-senger by our 'Vicar', told me that he was extremely disappointed  
on learning that there were no means of educating his children  
on West Falkland, I told him the arrangements for our people  
and that perhaps his children could be sent to Darwin, he  
said he should represent the matter to the Government as a  
grant ought to be made out of the taxes for Schools, should  
he do so we might participate in the claim.

5. Par 11. With respect to Goose Green you must  
do the best with the present establishment, cannot the offal  
be buried or destroyed by fire, we understand that in the River

Plate with all their appliances the stinks are awful though this is not considered unhealthy, if you cannot obviate the bad smell it must be submitted to. With respect to there not being room to hang up the carcases to cool, we find the number of skins has not much if at all increased or of sheep melted down since the shed was erected at a cost of £1500 so it is unfortunate such an outlay has not provided sufficient accommodation. As regards stopping the works for a whole year this is not to be thought of.

6. Par 13. By correspondence with Government enclosed you will perceive that Dr. Heuston received half salary for the period of his passage out, so that he is entitled to the same arrangement for the Co's. portion of his pay.

7. Despatch No. 290 is so important that it cannot be answered offhand, we are to have a Board for its consideration next week.

8. We forward correspondence with the Cosmos Co. on their Mail Service to Stanley with their two Itineraries and our Table of Direct Services Outward & Homeward and Outward & Homeward in conjunction with the Cosmos and Pacific Steamers through Pandy Point. You will perceive that their Agent at Montevideo is now changed to Gustav Moeller. The Representative of their Valparaiso Agent Mef. Wprwck &c: has called here offering services, I had intended to observe that probably they might be able to do better for us than Mr. Caribey but find by last Despatch you have already given him an order. The Board decided on 21<sup>st</sup> that it would be advisable to send out a small vessel only early in October next for a portion of our first Produce of 81, in order to give the Cosmos Steamers of 11 Feb and 15 Ap<sup>r</sup> an opportunity of bringing home some Produce to test this route by experiment, the small size was fixed on, 300 to 350 tons Register, because of the difficulty of fitting her here, now as you say there is so much Coal this is increased, so we may instruct Mr. Humphreys to charter in Montevideo which you say is so much cheaper & better, the only rough stuff is the Wire Fencing you recommend to divide Packe's land from the Co's. unfortunately you do not give the length for this as I think the Directors feel inclined to do it and now is the time to buy.

9. M<sup>r</sup>. Rownson state they have now received from Germany the square Nails ordered for the 'Vicar of Bray', they are difficult to obtain being so seldom used as they split wood so much through being square are they used in the Colony.

10. The 'Vicar of Bray' is insured for £2,000 for the voyage out and thirty days after arrival @ 4%, what sum shall be insured as her value for a Stale.

Sir, Though but little to say we carry out our principle of writing by every Mail, and now enclose Duplicate of our last on 23<sup>rd</sup> instant.

2. Upon Statement upon Accounts N<sup>o</sup>. 86, dated 15<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup>, are the following discrepancies - Thorpe's Order is £9 more, having paid him £33 - C. Phillips' Order is £20 less, being £80, a reduction noticed on Statement N<sup>o</sup>. 87, dated 17<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup>, though the amount is not named. These people came home in the German S<sup>r</sup>. Rambes, also F.L. E. Gov<sup>r</sup>. Callaghan and Capt<sup>r</sup>. Rowlands.

3. The 'Salem' and Jane Law passed Deal on the 25<sup>th</sup> for London: the tonnage of the former being 427, not 505 as reported from M. Video, the Charter is not so remarkably cheap as was imagined, so that what with the risk of getting a vessel at M. Video it may answer our purpose to charter here, especially if we can procure one ballasted for Wool, and we need not decide until two further Mails come in, the Black Hawk's due 12<sup>th</sup> prox<sup>r</sup>: and the German Mail leaving Stanley 10<sup>th</sup> Aug, due here 18 Sept, by which time you may have ordered something.

4. We have not heard further from the Kosmos Co. - This day the enclosed small Falkland Island Mail Service, 1880-81, has been printed for distribution to our friends, the Government Offices & others interested in the Colony.

Sir, Your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 292 and 293, both dated 1<sup>st</sup> July, were received on the 1<sup>st</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> inst., the first by the 'Douro', the last by the French Gr<sup>r</sup> 'Orenoque' to Bordeaux, so we presume it was put on board her at M. Video independent of the English Mails.

2. The Board having considered the two former Despatches enables me to give their views on the same. N<sup>o</sup>. 290, 3. As before stated there is now, through sending fine Stores by the Steamers, a difficulty in filling profitably a chartered vessel which must go out for our Produce, as there is now regular steam communication with Stanley it will be better to adopt your views and charter out only occasionally for rough stores, that is provided the intended test shipments of Produce home by the German Steamers of 12 Feb and 16 Apr. next year answer well as regards expense - unless therefore your Despatch due 18<sup>th</sup> prov. brings P<sup>r</sup>udent for rough goods sufficient to nearly fill a vessel of 300 or 350 tons we should not despatch one next Oct<sup>r</sup> for our first Produce but leave you to charter in Montevideo - we write Humphrey to arrange codeword for him to attend to this - in this case we should execute your P<sup>r</sup>udent's N<sup>o</sup>s 40, 1, 2 by the German Gr<sup>r</sup> of 20<sup>th</sup> Oct<sup>r</sup>, though there several rough bulky articles in them - there are no orders for Draft &c &c nor have you attended to our wishes to be informed how & when to ship this article which places us in a dilemma, still we shall be justified in sending the new brewings by above Steamer.

3. Part 6. We claimed £100 for Campbell's Effects lost in the 'Sparrow Hawk', but the Underwriters pointed out that his Protest states he saved some in the first boat, we therefore compromised for 75% and have received £74. 5.. 0.

4. Par 7. The Directors consider you have done well to get rid of Capt. Dixon, since his return he has made a claim of £103.3.- for expenses of his wife & self home, this will be submitted to the next Board and of course resisted, but in case of need you had better send the Agreement signed as terminated and all other papers necessary for the Co. defence at law.

5. Par 16, 17. We must leave it to you to make the best arrangements for obtaining the Wool of other Settlers for our vessels as this certainly helps our freight home, but as Steamers are now calling they may undertake this business, still if money or stores are advanced to Settlers their Produce ought to be consigned to us.

6. Par 18. As the Mail Service is now concluded by the Government here with the German Line of Steamers to the West Coast, the Directors cannot take any further steps, they regret there has been so much illfeeling in the matter and that so much obloquy has been thrown upon the Co. for had the 'Black Hawk' been properly managed there would have been no need to terminate her Contract, still if Steamers calling leads to the progress of the Colony we shall be content. With respect to the Land Purchases you must work the matter to the best of your abilities for the Co. interest, the Board feels that any representations here would result in the Colonial Office telling them that they can only be guided by their Officer the Governor, who as a disinterested person would only advise what is best for the Colony in general.

7. Paro 23, 4, 5. The Directors are extremely dissatisfied with the state of affairs on Laponia as it is evident Mr. Clay does not take proper care in the management, nor does he appear to have full control over his men; if you yourself consider it would be best to remove the Cattle why do you not do so, the only remarks we can make on this point are, that they might escape to the mountains North of Fitzroy, and we have always heard that they make the greatest endeavours to return to their breeding grounds failing this pine away to die, however you on the spot can best judge therefore pray carry out your proposition if there is a fair chance of its proving successful.

8. Par 26. We shall endeavour to send some Little's Sheep Dips as you wish to try it, though we have not had full report on the last Mr. Dougall's Dip, these small trials of Dips are not satisfactory unless there are more particulars sent to enable a judgment to be made, such as quantity used & expense per sheep, weight of wool afterwards given per sheep, the wool packed separately to obtain Brokers special examination of same and various other particulars you may think of.

9. Par 27. As before stated the Directors consider we ought to go in largely for Fencing when it can be afforded or even at the present time though we have enough to do with our money, they would therefore support any well arranged plan for the division between Capt. Pack's & their own Land, it is a pity length and sort is not given as we might ship it by the Sept<sup>r</sup>. vessel as Iron Fencing is so cheap now - by later Despatches we send Mr. Clay says it would be most serviceable in Lafonia, let us therefore have full particulars of where proposed to be put up, the lengths, style best suited &c & I feel sure the Board will support your well digested proposals for such an outlay, despite of their late order for retrenchment as they hear on all sides from the River Plate & the West Falkland that Fencing enables Farms to be managed much more cheaply.

10. Par 29. The Board do not think it well to advance Capt. Rowlands cash towards purchase of a vessel for sealing purposes, I believe he is going to apply to your Agent for the money you state you will lend him, at present he is reading up for passing as Master, I have shown him all attentions in my power I shall continue to do so.

11. N<sup>r</sup>. 291. As the Kosmos C° have appointed Capt. J. H. M. C. Seemann their Agent to reside at Stanley, your application of 17<sup>th</sup> June to represent them at the Falkland Islands was not sent on.

12. As a Board cannot be held for consideration of your Despatches 292 & 293, through the absence of our Chairman abroad and other Directors at the seaside, I can only give my own opinion on some paragraphs necessary to be noticed as the next mail will not be until 20<sup>th</sup> Oct<sup>r</sup>.

13. N<sup>r</sup>. 292, 4. All day has been paid 2.17.6 for the Wages claimed from 1 to 10 June 78, which were not settled at Stanley.

14. Par 5. Copy of this is forwarded to Edinburgh &c, we consider they take pains with our Wool, latterly they have at our request sent more particulars & we shall urge them to more care & precision in future: the Wool Sales commenced yesterday this morning came their circular, now closed, which unfortunately shows that our class of Wool is lower in price.

15. Par 8. I think the Directors will observe as to your crossing our flocks with Rams from West Falkland, that if you were so certain of the improvement it would occasion why have you not carried it out on your own responsibility, as they have always supported you when any alterations have been properly explained, it will therefore be well to commence this plan as soon as possible since giving up our own vessel we shall not be able to send out Rams so well as heretofore - one of the Directors is strongly

of opinion that we ought to obtain 3 or 400 Merino Ewes from the River Plate to improve our Sheep, as the cross with English Rams throws a wonderful fleece, but then the expense would be heavy although the improvement would be so much quicker through females than the Merino Rams we sent out: I have not had time to consult your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 31 as the Book is in the Bank Box but it will be produced at the next Meeting.

16. Par 12. On 26 Nov<sup>r</sup>. last we received your Bank Book from the Central Bank in closed envelope without any instructions to forward same, and as this Book remained here on a former occasion until your return I put it into my drawer as before, for you had said you wanted it, it shall be sent on in our next parcel.

17. Par 15. As before observed I do not know what the Board will decide as to sending out more Shepherds in face of the retrenchment order - Simpson has offered to go out again but we have put him off until arrival of next Despatch - yesterday I received Doolan's letter from Montevideo dated 13 July (copy enclosed) saying he was about to get married and return to Stanley and consequently could not marry Mary McInnes who lately left in 'v' of Bray for this purpose, my answer to him (open for your perusal) upbraids him for such conduct - we beg you will befriend the young woman, my wife and I found her a well disposed, careful creature & thought her too young to marry, as she has never seen Doolan it may be well, if she can get over the disappointment, that she should not become the wife of such a wild fellow.

18. N<sup>o</sup>. 293, 4. Private, no doubt the Board will order £500 Silver Specie to be sent out by next Mail P.W., as we shall then be in funds through 'Lionel's' arrival.

19. Yesterday I had a visit from Thomas Herr Egg the new Governor of the Falklands to obtain information about the Colony; he has just left Barbados where he was judge, is married and proposes to go out by the German S.V. 'Heben' leaving Antwerp on 21 Oct<sup>r</sup>. next, with his wife & two daughters 15 & 17 yrs old (as Punderswood him) leaving two sons in Barbados to join him here after - he is rather an elderly man, very quiet & expresses great desire to please & improve the Colony, has seen Mr. Callaghan - I am to let him know our next Board Meeting to enable him to make the acquaintance of the Directors.

20. Mr. Louis Baillon called some days since, asking for an advance of Cash which I granted to the amount of £25, he says he will require more shortly - he explained that the Geddwell Island Acc<sup>t</sup>. would be balanced by the 15 bales Wool sold at 'Falcon' and the 20 bales Wool coming at 'Lionel', if £107 were transferred from Baillon Bros'. Acc<sup>t</sup>, this I observed was not Cash which you intended to give when telling us to apply to his Father for £250 - as they

Father for £250 - as they cannot pay anything just now the matter must wait your further advices.

21. Referring to N<sup>o</sup>. 566, 4, we now send particulars of the International Exhibition of Wool at the Crystal Palace in June next year, as the Directors wish to exhibit specimens of the Co<sup>'s</sup> Wool, that of other Settlers if much different & the other Produce of the Colony suitable for such a list given - the papers are P. L. Simmonds' Letter of 10 Aug 80 - Printed Notice with Programme of Objects admissible - Printed Instructions for Exhibitors. These papers I submitted to Mr. Herr who wishes me to procure Copies for him as he will interest himself in the matter & render all assistance in his power.

22. By Book Post we send 50 of our Mail Tables for distribution amongst our people first, any over to be then handed to the inhabitants of Stanley - also two books upon Sheep Raising in England by Bowes of Liverpool for yourself Mr. Clay.

23. Biggs' Watch was kindly taken out by Mr. Edw<sup>r</sup> Packe - I have just received from Brodstream a silver Hunting Watch with small glass in front but unfortunately there is no record of the owner though I took it there myself on the 14 June for repairs, that was the day Capt<sup>r</sup> Smith came here with his Passengers, he must have handed it to me & I have asked him to tell you whose it is, for it will be sent out in our next parcel - the N<sup>o</sup>. 9491 by G. E. Brodstream.

24. The Returns of the 'Black Hawk' have been omitted to be sent lately.

Sir, We write this Despatch, about Stores out and Produce home only, in hopes of its reaching you before the regular Mail of 20<sup>th</sup> inst: per Hamburg S<sup>r</sup>. 'Theben', so that you may prepare full answer for that Steamer to Sandy Point, which could come to London by a Pacific Steamer arriving here about 10<sup>th</sup> Jan<sup>t</sup>. next, thus a full month before the next Stanley Mail leaving 1<sup>st</sup> January, but even should it only arrive with the regular Mail about 24<sup>th</sup> prox: you will have time to send detailed reply as above, because she must remain some time to deliver her Passengers and Cargo.

2. As already anticipated to you the last Board decided not to engage a vessel here at the present time for the first Produce of next year but to charter in Monte Video, instructions go out to Mr. Humphreys to do so by this Mail for a vessel of 300 to 350 tons register, and as you will already have prepared him for the time of arrival at Stanley H<sup>c</sup>: we trust the matter will turn out well, so that we receive a good cargo by the end of April next, thus being in time for the May Wool Sales, which you assert can be done at a lower rate than former charterings.

3. We are therefore shipping your Friends of fine Goods by the S<sup>r</sup>. 'Theben', also £500 Silver Specie, and shall send the rough Goods by Dean's 'Dennis Brundit' to sail at end of this month, as per epitomes enclosed, which will finish the stores you have ordered: though it was arranged between us that you were to send from time to time the requirements of Draft &c this has not been done, a late Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 298, 10. mentions that the consumption has increased but no definite order is given, we calculate the Vicar's 34 hds would last until end of Feb<sup>t</sup> next, but to be on the safe side we asked M<sup>r</sup>. Bals to ship 20 hds P<sup>r</sup>. 'Theben'

They hesitated sending so much, the beer being <sup>old</sup> and wished us to delay until end of month for the new brewings, as this could not be done, ten hds only have been shipped, if your Despatch of 30 Oct due 10 Dec reports a scarcity we shall ship some by the 'Luxor' from Hamburg 18 Dec.

4. Now comes the difficulty of our Second Produce vessel for next year which ought to leave here middle to end Feb 81, arrive Stanley end April, leave middle June to be back here end August in time for the Autumn Wool Sales: presuming you will send Wool by the German Steamers of 1 Jan, 12 Feb and 16 April, and that they would hardly convey our rough Tallow and sundries, and that by end of April next you will require Coals & rough Stores as per List herewith, these two works must of necessity be done by a sailing vessel hence, also your next Despatches will doubtless order Wire Fencing for Packe's Land and our own Farms in Lafonia &c, all this having to be considered we require a full report on the subject to enable the best possible arrangement to be made, with an especial List of the Rough Stores needed and hints as to filling up the vessel, which ought, we imagine, to be a vessel of 300 tons register, the 'Lionel' brought just upon 190 tons gross Tallow, perhaps the increase may be over 200 tons next year.

5. Mr. L. A. Baillon Jr. reports that he will ship by the St. 'Theben' a quantity Little's Sheep Dip and other Stores, Messrs. Morris Little & Son say they will send by her 2,000 gallons Sheep Dip, which we have undertaken to receive, store & sell if necessary, after Mr. W. G. Little's visit to the Islands, where he intends going after inspecting the River Plate: this being the only opportunity we have accepted several parcels for individuals having friends at Stanley, upon all of which full steamer freight must be charged even to stowage for yourself & others enclosed in the Office case, as well as your North British Almanacks.

6. Before closing I had better report that we have received your Despatches Nos. 294 to 298, to be answered on 20th the 'Lionel' arrived 8<sup>th</sup> ult., 'Dennis Brundrit' on 14<sup>th</sup> ult., 'Sea Witch' on 4<sup>th</sup> inst., the 'Britannia' yesterday. H. E. Govt. Herr with his wife, two daughters, male & female servants with little girl, by the 'Theben' from Antwerp - W. Simpson wife is engaged as Shepherd will go by 'Theben', with 4 or 5 single Shepherds if we can get them, Baillon talks of sending a Shepherd & a Laborer.

Sir, I am now enabled to reply to some paragraphs of your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 292 and 293. - and to answer N<sup>o</sup>. 294, 5, 6, 7 and 8 - 294, 5 received 1<sup>st</sup> ult., 296 on 7<sup>th</sup> ult. and 297, 8 received on 21<sup>st</sup> ultmo.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 292, 5. We passed on your remark to Messrs. Edenborough &c who replied as per correspondence enclosed which we think conclusively proves that as Wool Brokers they look after our business well, and having many more Sale days than Messrs. O'Boare & Hudson are able to offer our Wool when a favorable time occurs, which would not be the case were another broker employed, this has been explained to Mr. L. J. Baillon and we send the full correspondence with Lists of Sale days to enable you to satisfy our other Clients.

3. <sup>Part 2</sup> As already stated the Board is quite willing to let you try any crops of Rams you deem suitable, which you might have done even though we sent Rams from England, it has always been perceived that as long as there was any trace of Merino breed in our Wool better prices were obtained, when the Cheviot & other breeds made it coarser it was concluded the extra weight per fleece would compensate for the lower value, but the consumption being at present more for fine wools you are quite right in having Merinos from Montevideo, a plan we supported by those three magnificent Sturgeon Merino Rams from London at the end of last year - and the Directors would be pleased if you could improve our Wool by using Waldron's or Stickney's Rams.

4. <sup>Part 3</sup> The Board is not prepared at present to enter into the question of Education at Stanley as the C<sup>o</sup>. looks after this matter at Darwin, it has been mentioned to the new Governor, Mr. Kerr, who is quite alive to the necessity of it for the credit of the Colony and we trust he will find means to cure the evils you bring to notice.

5. N<sup>o</sup>. 293, 3. With respect to your remark about the London Assurance Corporation having taken the Government Fire Insurances at less than half the North British rates, we learn that the rate is reduced from 2½ to 2½ per cent - our Fire Insurances are now transferred to the National Fire Insurance Corporation who take them at 2½ per cent and allow 10% discount, enclosed is Copy of their Policy N<sup>o</sup>. 520 for Store Buildings, Offices £ 2,000, Stores in them £ 5,000 - they suggest that Petrolene Oil and other inflammable Stores should be kept outside and we require plans & particulars of these buildings for their satisfaction. The Board will be glad if you can assist the National Office in obtaining business at the Falkland Islands, the House & Extra Stores will be transferred to it.

6. N<sup>o</sup>. 295, 4. The Directors must really depend upon you to make the best possible arrangement for purchasing Land at the Colony, they regret that you have had so much trouble about this matter but trust it will soon be amicably settled by the new Governor.

7. N<sup>o</sup>. 297. The Board has read with the greatest interest this Despatch in reply to their order for retrenchment in N<sup>o</sup>. 561, 2. They consider it an excellent description of the Co<sup>'s</sup> working as it gives more full details of the various branches of business than were ever collected before. The Directors are glad to perceive that you are alive to the necessity of economy in all branches of the Co<sup>'s</sup> business, and they trust you will endeavour in every possible way to continue reducing expences wherever justifiable. With regard to Mr. Clay the Board would have been gratified had you seen your way to abolish his office and take upon yourself his duties; and they wish you to understand that it is quite within your discretionary power to dispense with him if you think fit. Your Despatch now under reply points to dissatisfaction with the state of Lafonia, where Mr. Clay is more directly responsible as compared with the outside stations; we may also point out that Mr. Clay is desirous of coming home and as the C<sup>o</sup>. may give him six months notice after the expiration of two years from 8 Nov 76, and the Agreement for five years will expire on 8 Nov 81, favorable terms could be made for his leaving the Company's service.

8. N<sup>o</sup>. 298, 9. If possible to improve the 'Black Hawk' for Island work at a little expense it would be wise to do it, we have applied to Nicholson but he has not yet been able to send full particulars.

9. Par 11. From our recollection of the plan of the House at Darwin now given up to Dr. Beeston, we cannot understand there are so few rooms as you state, under present circumstances we cannot incur any expense unless he will consent to pay 10 per cent on any outlay for increasing the accommodation the C° grants <sup>time</sup>.

10. Par 12. This is not considered that Antwerp would be a better market for Sheepskins than London, perhaps better prices might be obtained at Liverpool at times, but it is doubtful whether the extra expense of sending them there would be recouped, perhaps if Steam freight answers for our Produce the Fosnos C° might ship to Liverpool from Havre at same rate as to London.

11. Par 13. If you cannot appoint an Auditor at Stanley through there being no suitable person, how is it possible for us to name any one, the matter must therefore rest as it is until a favorable opportunity offers for this duty being again carried out.

12. Par 29. The Newspaper account at Gilbert's has been closed, Messrs Kirkland Cope & Co: called here about attending to this matter so I gave them the names of the residents; Mr. Flerr has seen them about supplying him with different Magazines to those sent to others that there may be an exchange of such at Stanley, this is very considerate of him.

13. Par 30. This sad woear that the sale of Steam Coals has been prevented through the improbability of moving the 'Egeria', we have always understood that Steamers ran alongside bulks to receive coals instead of the bulks being moved to them - or is it that the 'Egeria' is so badly placed they cannot go to her, we trust the Vicar of Bray being now devoted to this purpose will prevent such unfortunate losses in future.

14. Par 31. Understood from Mr. Staudt, the Managing Director of the Fosnos Line, that their Agent Capt. Seemann would only attend to Steamer business, should he interfere with Stores it will, as you say, be inimical to their prospects for carrying Produce by their Steamers - Par 40. Your applications for the Agency have been sent on to Hamburg but Mr. Staudt has not made any remark on same.

15. Par 32. Mr. George Dean has called here but did not allude to his Father retiring from business or that their Store business could be purchased by the C°, he has to be here again when I shall question him on the subject; we have heard that he returns by the R. Mail C° on 9 or 24 Dec<sup>r</sup>. and proposes to arrange that he may leave the Islands, making periodical visits to Stanley to superintend his Farms & Store business.

16. Par 33. John King called to receive his Cash, did not see any of the Directors & had very little to say for himself.

17. Par 38. We asked Messrs. Edenborough to give a description of "kempy" Wool, this they did by letter of 27<sup>th</sup> Sept<sup>r</sup>, and sample of such Wool, both are forwarded to you.

18. Par 40. The information on our next year's Produce mentioned here and at Par 10 does not appear to have been sent on, even if we had it we should not be able to arrange on this side the shipments of Wool &c. by the Fluvius Steamers next year, we agree with you this ought to be commenced as soon as possible and trust you will avail of their departures from Stanley on 1 Jan, 12 Feb and 16 Apr., bearing in mind the cargo needed for our first Produce vessel to be chartered in Montevideo, and the second Produce vessel to leave London middle to end February next.

19. There has been an enquiry whether we could supply Cattle & Sheep for St. Helena as the supply from the Cape of Good Hope is not so abundant now, you had better send statement as to number of Sheep & cattle the C° could furnish, the price, what fodder can be furnished, the best season for shipment, the expense of shipment & time required &c.

20. The Admiralty have kindly issued for us a large scaled Chart of Bay of Harbours to enable our Teleconers and Chartered vessels if necessary to go up to our new Settlement at North Arm with safety, six are sent out, if any alteration or improvement can be suggested let us have full particulars.

21. The Flying Squadron under Rear Adm<sup>r</sup> the Earl of Clanwilliam is to visit Stanley on 18 Jan<sup>r</sup> next, the vessels are the Inconstant Capt<sup>r</sup> Fitzgerald, the Admiral vsl, Bacchante " Lord Scott Carryford " Stephenson C.B. Cleopatra " Durrant Tourmaline " Dennistoun

The Bacchante has the two Sons of the Prince of Wales on board: we have written to the Admiral and all the Captains with Charts, Cards & Mail Tables, as per Copy of Letter to the Admiral enclosed, who has thanked us for the useful information: we send the Admiralty October Navy List to afford you particulars of the vessels, officers, crew &c. - H.E. Gov<sup>r</sup> Flerr is alive to the necessity of making preparations for their visit, in which you must join, and believing that you place the Black Hawk at the

Place the 'Black Hawk' at the service of the Officers for a cruise I am desired by our Director, Emanuel Butcher Esq, to request you will inform Capt<sup>n</sup>. Stephenson, a personal friend of his, that this vessel was built by Mr. Nicholson at Gosport under his superintendence and after his design.

22. Capt<sup>n</sup>. Dixon applied for his expenses home in a large amount, which we declined to pay him.

23. We send correspondence with Mr. L. J. Baillon about his request for a reduction of Interest, Freight &c. which the Directors must leave to you for settlement, premising that in most Colonies advances uncovered are charged interest at 10% at the very least.

24. Respecting the Wool Exhibition at the Crystal Palace next June, Mr. P. L. Simmonds trusts we shall send hair & fur Sealskins, Penguin Skins & Oil, as well as Wool and other allied articles.

25. Capt<sup>n</sup>. Rowlands tells me he hardly thinks it worth while to continue reading up to pay as Master and may be off at any moment, he has gone to Gosport to look after a vessel, having seen your Agent who will advance him Cash.

26. We ship a small quantity of Stores by this Steamer sending freight accounts & other information to enable you to calculate the cost to a nicety and inform us the same, unfortunately our suppliers have not furnished dimensions which prevents us checking Messrs. Knöhr & Burchard's Freight &c., but we have asked them for details which shall be sent on: the rate of Insurance is 15% per cent, Specie 10% per cent - our Passengers are W<sup>m</sup>. Simpson & wife, reengaged at his late Wages £66 a year, return passage not allowed - John Ritchie (through James Campbell of Duffus or Newland, near Elgin) William Bell (through Fleming, Dundee) both at £45 a year rising to £55, passages out thence: the latter has a Dog for which the Cosmos C° make a reduction of £1, this makes the fare Five Pounds, which being expensive, could not arrangements be made for Dogs to be supplied at the Pds, Simpson says he can do so this friend Ritchie did not bring one in consequence: none of above have had addresses: the two latter are upon Emigration Forms which closes the

Land Order Account, Landing Certificate for them will have to be signed by the Colonial Authorities and sent here.

Vorwerk &c<sup>o</sup> who are Agents there for the Hispanos Steamers - enclosed is Copy of Graalff's Letter of 24 Aug to me from Stanley and my reply - also copy of Staude's Letter 1 Dec<sup>r</sup> respecting this Firm - Mr. Curfey has now executed the order for Flour: with respect to remark about your power to obtain necessary supplies the Directors have always allowed you to do this.

3. Par 3. We have complained to M<sup>rs</sup>. Wild about the Rum though we feel confident their is good & excellent value for the price charged, you ought to have told us before that strength was not considered in the duty then the youngest strongest spirit could have been shipped, they are therefore justified in saying that they have been placed at a disadvantage, however M<sup>rs</sup>. Ruck will have a trial.

M<sup>rs</sup>. Stewart &c<sup>o</sup> feel aggrieved that the quality of their Tea has been called in question, it being the best procurable even at a loss of part of their profit, they conclude it was too good & that a commoner rougher article would have suited - Travers will have our next order though they have not supplied the 40 1/2 chests Tea by the 'Sea Witch', this is sold by a Mr. T. B. Waters, who we are told is a sort of amateur broker. M<sup>rs</sup>. G. B. Yates & Son regret that their

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efforts to please are not successful, formerly they always got great credit for their Provisions, just lately their prices were considered high so a cheaper kind has been sent (of which you have ordered more) but some one else shall be tried as Travers do not deal in Provisions, you must therefore be mistaken about their supplying Dean with such goods - enclosed is their Produce Markets Review and copy of the correspondence with these three Firms.

4. Par 4. The Board is willing to pay the expense £19. 9. of the Telephone between the Office and your House, but cannot entertain anything of the sort for Darwin Harbour,

5. Par 4. With respect to the Commission to Martin of  $\frac{1}{3}$  p. cwt on all Tallow over 20 lbs per Sheep, this was to be calculated on the London weight - leakage from the cask on the voyage was not taken into consideration, as this may occasionally occur it will be proper for you to come to some arrangement with him on this point.

6. Par 9. You have entirely misconceived the meaning of the first point on which you comment, and though on matters of fact the Directors would be glad to receive any correction from the Islands, in the present instance the statistics are based exactly on the returns received from Stanley - with this remark the subject is dismissed.

10. Par 16. The Board wish you to make a fair Agreement with Mr. Fell but limiting it to taking such Buildings and for such amounts as the Colonial Manager has previously sanctioned and subject to depreciation to be determined by the Colonial Manager without appeal: if you consider the C° are not likely to require Large Pold in Adventure Sound he can have it from year to year upon an agreement at a fair rent.

11. Par 18. As previously reported your application to act as Agent at the Falklands for the Kosmos German Steamers has been sent on to the C° at Hamburg.

12. N° 300, Par 9. The Board wish you to write to the Liebig C° in the River Plate detailing the position of our Tallow Works at Goose Green, the kind of refuse, the means at command &c. asking their advice on the subject of turning the refuse to some account or getting rid of it in the easiest & best way possible. The Brokers intimated that there was no special difference in the Lively Island Tallow & enable special report to be made merely observing that the price realized would be the criterion of its value.

13. Par 10. The Directors will carry out your suggestion to allow Dr. Hewston to have the Drugs for the C° servants free but he will have to purchase those used for patients who employ him outside the C° staff: they are desirous to make him comfortable in his House and wish you to send estimate of the cost of proposed addition of Surgery and room over this.

14. Par 14. If the Cattle are taking up the space that can be more profitably occupied by Sheep they certainly should be removed or done away with, but the Board consider that at all events a tame herd should be kept up outside Lafonia if only for the supply of Beef for Stanley; and they decidedly disapprove of the suggested arrangement of killing off the C° herds and purchasing Beef from Lively Island for the Stanley Butchery. This is in the recollection of the Board that formerly the C° Beef was highly praised for its quality, and they are of opinion that, with proper management, it should be so still. As you have ordered the Cows in Lafonia to be killed off, the Bulls must as a logical sequence soon follow if not killed at once. Mr. Clay complains of the Wild Horses in Lafonia, these two being, as the Board

understands, of no value should certainly be destroyed, subject to any objections you may raise on either of the above points.

15. Par 19 & 37. The Board cannot decide about Wire Fencing until fuller details are received, which you ought to have provided, and they have now resolved to await report from Mr. Garvey - they certainly consider that Capt. Packe ought to pay his share of the fence dividing his land whenever the Co. can send out the material for the same.

16. Par 24. I wrote to James Campbell on 18 Aug last in the interests of science believing that he could procure in his spare time a few Penguin Skins & a Pealskeleton or two for which he would obtain a little remuneration, but as you state he has now removed to the interior of Lafonia & cannot attend to such matters you did right not to deliver this letter to him, but if you did not stop the duplicate sent in case on 19 Oct. he would know all about it.

17. Par 24. The freight of 'Uzziah' was accepted at a low rate before the 'Viceroy of Bray' arrived home, it being then thought she would not return for some time, so that some Sheep Dip & other necessary stores ought to be sent out beforehand - then when the 'V. of Bray' did come the Board ordered that to be sent back as soon as possible & not to be loaded deep.

18. As before explained you are making a great outcry about a very little matter, it is not the fact that the Store does not get the benefit of Trade Discounts, and as for the little Cash Discount the London Office is entitled to it when it is able to find the money to obtain it, which it cannot always do; we send statement showing that the discount we obtain for cash has amounted to 1 £ 7/10ds per cent for the last 4 years, if such a trifle prevents your competition the Store must be in a very poor way.

Par 32. I am sorry to learn Mr. Magovern refuses to take the Tellers Sewing Machine, not being able to procure the one he named Copeslates recommended this make, I thought it so good myself that I bought one for my Wife, as her Simpson's Treadle Machine is rather heavy at times, & it has been in constant use with every satisfaction, ever since, you can therefore well recommend it to some one else: Mr. Magovern letter says it is broken, if this be true it should be returned for repair.

Par 39. Fine Oatmeal shall be shipped in future.

Par 44. A. J. White's Acct. for Pickney's Medicine is actually entered in the General Invoice as 3.14.3, the amount he asks you to pay, though you imply 4.2.6 was charged to the Store.

19. Par 30. It is most unfortunate to learn that the casting and box sent out for the Boomer Wool Pres do not suit, every pains was taken as to directions on this side as both yourself and I inspected the new arrangements & considered they would work well, if you must do your best to turn them to account but if quite useless they must be returned though we do not see at present what claim can be made for the misfit, we hope you have the dimensions given to Mess<sup>rs</sup> Ladd so as to be able to prove them in the wrong.

20. Par 33. As you will have seen from the copies of our Correspondence with the Flosmos C°: we have already objected to their Passenger Rates and Cargo Freight, they reply the C° cannot make a reduction until they find how the business of the Colony answers their purpose, but will endeavour to make reductions to those who support them. We have written to the Crown Agents for the Colonies respecting the continuation of the Contract for next year and intimated that the Flosmos charges were high - also that their Steamers ought to call at an English Port, naming Southampton as a suitable place.

21. Par 34. The Board cannot undertake to supply a Steamer for Island service as the first cost would be so heavy and the working very expensive and risky, Capt<sup>r</sup> Leemann would naturally like to see a Steamer at the Colony as he would assist the business of the Flosmos Steamers: the above applies to the request for a Steam Launch, which if necessary for further facilities as at Par 56 for the German Steamers will, we anticipate, be provided by the Flosmos Steamers - the Directors much regret therefore that they are obliged to refuse your Steam Launch, this must not be taken as a refusal to yourself as you would imply by making a reference to the fact that Martin, the C° Engineer, has a small steam launch taken out for him, as explained before this was a mere toy being only a small open boat with an engine put into it, and as at that voyage the 'Vicar of Bray' required an extra boat on account of the number of her Passengers we agreed to let her go to save us this expense and Capt<sup>r</sup> Dyer said better put her down below, where there was room, on account of her small size, the matter must not therefore be taken as a precedent.

22. Par 36. The Board agrees with you that it will be proper to purchase the 1000 acres at 4/- each, on the two Sections N° 17 & 18 of the Co's Land leased from the Government, when they fall in next year to make sure of the renewal of these Leases.

23. Par 40. The Board regrets to learn that the Shepherds Houses are in such a bad state for the want of a little paint, some shall be sent by our next vessel as the Directors wish the Houses to be painted at once.

24. Par 41. We are sorry to hear that the Chimneys of the Shepherds Houses are so badly built as to smoke which must naturally annoy our people very much - as Oliver the bricklayer sent out for your House has built the Chimneys so well it is a great pity he was not asked to instruct Steel on this point, we may be able to get some advice from an Architect on the subject.

25. Par 42. The Directors consider that Third class by Steamer is quite sufficient for working men, as the Falmos Steamers can hardly compete with the R. Mail & Pacific Boats from the River Plate & Brazilian Ports there would not probably be so many passengers, consequently their third class might be more comfortable.

26. Par 48. A Policy of Insurance for Steamers £15,000 has been opened for Produce at 2½% Stanley to London via Havre Schooner risk additional, from Choiseul Sound & Lively Island & from other ports 1% ad. We have also opened one for £15,000 on Ship or Ships from Falkland Islands to London at 3% per cent, Schooner risk additional as above - these Insurances are at lower rates than formerly so I do not think our Clients can now complain of that the West Falklanders can do it so cheap. Copies of the covering notes are enclosed to explain everything fully.

27. Par 11, 14, 60. You have placed us in uncertainty and in a dilemma through not attending to N° 571, 2 - as the contingency of order for Stores & heavy cargo therein expressed did not occur you ought to have sent instructions to Humphreys about chartering first Produce vessel in Montevideo, he writes on 10 Nov that the 'Dunderah' had brought letter from you with no instructions about chartering & as he could not hear again from you until 16 Dec p. 'Theben' via Sandy Point, he should charter vessel at end of Nov. - now as you propose that the first Wool should come home by Steamers we had a fear that this vessel would not get a cargo, the letter arriving 8<sup>th</sup> inst. we had serious thoughts of telegraphing to stop the charter but considered it too late to do this, and as particulars would reach you on 24 Nov p. 'Theben' we concluded you would not arrange with Capt. Feermann for space to be reserved in the Falmos Steamers from Valparaiso. Your menos about the Second Produce Vessel are also very meagre, there is a small &ndent but no mention of deadweight

such as Coals, Bricks or Salt &c. for the vessel of 200 to 300 tons you ask for, true the memo on Stores p. W of Bray dated 26 Oct 80 complains of our having sent Coals for Horse or Steam by her instead of genuine Steam Coals, stating that you have fully 350 tons now on hand, we conclude therefore a few Steam Coals may be shipped as the last report was 140 tons on hand, perhaps in anticipation of the Flying Squadron visiting Stanley we should be justified in sending a decent supply, but then they cost so much more in this port, that is the Welsh: if there is such a large stock of Coals on hand why not reduce the price to induce the inhabitants to burn them instead of Peat, it is evident they cannot cost the freight put upon them being a necessity as ballast for our vessels going out. Respecting Draft Ale you say the consumption is about 10 hds a month but as the stock on hand is not given we cannot judge the quantity to ship nor the date when to do it, we endeavoured to ship 10 to 15 hds by the 'Fair Rosamond' but she could not receive bonded goods, now we must reserve all for the vessel in February. Under this uncertainty and looking to the fact that on 11<sup>th</sup> prox. we ought to get advices p. P. G. 'Theben' via Sandy Point wherein you will reply to our N° 572 (which unfortunately could not leave Montevideo earlier than 573) written specially about Stores, it is now decided to delay chartering until that date.

28. The Board desire me to observe that it is essential that the Island Accounts for 1880 should leave Stanley on or before the 12<sup>th</sup> February 1881.

29. Our Wool ex 'Lioness' and 'Britannia' was sold by Auction at the Public Sales on the 3<sup>rd</sup> instant and realized good prices, also Mr. Dean's ex 'Salem' and 'Dennis Brundrit' - on the 6<sup>th</sup> there was sold Stickney's ex 'Lioness', Waldron's ex 'Britannia' and Dean's ex 'Sea Witch', also at good prices - sale Catalogues are sent to yourself and all concerned, and we forward copy of Edenborough's Letter 9<sup>th</sup> inst. showing the average prices obtained, being Waldron 10 1/8 Stickney 10 5/8 Bonner 10 1/4 Baillon 10 1/8 Company 9 7/8 - unfortunately they have omitted Holmested's though this was the highest, 11 3/4, on our sale day.

30. As your return ex 298 of Distribution of Stores in Decr. 79, dated July 80, showed that there was close upon £15000 worth of Stores and we were insured for £7200 only, the Board decided to increase to £10000 so £2800 is taken by the National Fire Office from 22 Sept 80 - £1200 in Stone Store Building at 2/- £800 in Millinery Store Wooden Building @ 4 1/2/- and £800 in two Hulks in Harbour @ 4 1/2/- your return gives more than double this amount as in the Millinery Store, but this being a Wooden Building such a heavy stock must not be kept there, for the satisfaction of the National we require particulars, plan &c. of this building and its position in the

Town of Stanley - also Plan & particulars of the Stone Store Building. We further enclose Copy of the Fire Policy £8,500 with the National for Wool Sheds and Wool in the port of Darwin, Walker Creek and North Arm, being the usual Insurance effected for the clipping season, running from 1 Dec 30 to 1 Aug 81. Writing about Plans reminds me that you have not yet furnished as requested a full plan of our Tallow Works, as you will have to prepare one for the advice of the Liebig C° upon the refuse we wish a copy sent to this Office with all the details, enquiries and letter sent them.

31. The S.S. 'Britannia' is to sail early next month with Stores for Mr. Waldron and to bring back his Wool &c; she conveys Stores for Mr. Baillou, also two Shepherds and some Rams. Mr. John Waldron offered to let her call at Stanley if we gave him 50 tons, but of course we have to keep <sup>our</sup> cargo for the Feb<sup>rd</sup> vessel.

32. The Pacific C° have reduced their first class single fare from Liverpool to Sandy Point from £55 to £40 in hopes of getting some of our Passengers, I have asked them whether this applies to the home voyage as well and what would be reduction upon second & third fares out & home, stating we were more likely to avail of these classes, but the matter cannot be decided until the Directors meeting tomorrow - if they decide on a considerable reduction it might answer our purpose to send Shepherds out & home by this route provided the detention and expenses at Sandy Point are not too heavy - on the latter you might enquire of Mr. George Dean who avails of this route by the Magellan leaving Liverpool on the 29<sup>th</sup> inst., he will be able to tell you whether there is any lodging house where Shepherds & others could stop. We fear your good desire to save the C°'s money by sending the late Passengers by the R. Mail C° Steamer will not result in much as their detention at Montevideo was long and it is such an expensive place. Capt. G. P. Smith, with the Officers of the 'V. of Bray' and Ross family arrived in the S.S. 'Elbe' on the 15<sup>th</sup> inst. He has certainly done very well for us in dismantling & arranging matters for his vessel.

33. We send the following Shepherds by this vessel, Wm. Saunders (Mrs' Fleming, Dundee). Alex. Munro (through Hugh Campbell, Duffus) and Robt. Grigor, all at wages £45 to 55 - the first has a Sheep Dog - the last is a friend of W. Simpson; we engaged Charles Grant, the Brother-in-law of the latter, a young man of 21, at wages £40 to 50, not being a regular Shepherd, but Simpson promised to teach him everything necessary, he has not come up for this Steamer though he writes he will be prepared for the next opportunity, perhaps he may come by the Feb<sup>rd</sup> vessel. The other Passengers are Mr. W. Stirling Jones, 2 class, Nephew of

The Bishop of the Falklands, going out to Steppel Island to learn farming, and Robert Gilles, with dog, a Shepherd for Holmested & Blake. Our Passengers' Bedding & Utensils are this time supplied by Silver here, as per copy Invoice enclosed, at about the same price as those supplied at Antwerp for the G.W. 'Theben' to enable you to decide which course had better be pursued in future. Mudie's Box of Books is in charge of Saunders.

34. We were sorry to learn from Capt<sup>r</sup> Smith that the good bedding V.S. provided for the 'Vicar of Bray' had to be destroyed on account of the dirty condition of Waldron's Passengers, of course you have made a claim on him for this loss.

35. Although no strong Books & Shoes are ordered we shall send a supply by the Steamer of 1<sup>st</sup> Feb<sup>r</sup>. next, as you state on the Notes on Stores per 'V. of Bray' dated 26 Oct 80, that 'the Camp men are nearly barefooted'.

36. Burgomans & Bulcke of Antwerp inform us this day that they have a vessel of 800 tons to load Guano at the Falklands, being now on her way from Sunderland to the River Plate, they must surely mistake us for the Chinchas, had this struck me before I should not have troubled to write this paragraph.

37. The 'Denderahis' cargo 60 bales Sheepskins, 2 bales Wool for the C<sup>o</sup>. and 27 bales Wool for Waldron were sent from Havre to Southampton and arrived in London yesterday morning - freight on first 50. 19. 9 second 2. 17. 7 third 53. 5. 3, total 107. 2. 7, is very expensive, so that as you observe the Flormos C<sup>o</sup>. cannot expect to obtain much support from Sheep Farmers.

38. As the Post Office acceded to our request to despatch a Mail this morning to be sure of arriving at Antwerp in time for the 'Luxor', the first part of this Despatch was posted yesterday, they will send another Mail this evening so we avail of it to communicate the latest intelligence.

39. We learn this morning from the Pacific C° that their fares for Passengers to & from Sandy Point, 2<sup>nd</sup> & 3<sup>rd</sup> class, is reduced to £25 and 13, and they hope that the large concessions thus made will lead to our sending our employes by this route. Enclosed is their Itinerary for next year. We shall forward Duplicate of this Despatch further advices by their S.V. 'Magellan' on 30<sup>th</sup> inst. via Bordeaux.

40. On the 14<sup>th</sup> we forwarded your letter to M<sup>r</sup>. Ball<sup>ton</sup> of 29 Oct<sup>r</sup>. last <sup>also account</sup>, received in N<sup>o</sup>. 300, expecting a Remittance by return, instead of this he asked for further details of Accts., then telegraphed for the nett proceeds of the 20 bales Wool ex Lions<sup>d</sup>, which was furnished as £342. 3. 10 - Then we asked direct for Cash - this morning a letter from him states that the Speedwell Poland Farm has been sold to Mr. Edw<sup>r</sup>. Cobb of Bath for his Son Reginald, with a prospect of a deferred payment of £400 next February, which with the proceeds of the Clip of 80/81 absolves him from further payments - we do not consider this correct behaviour and have written him accordingly - expenses are still running on and the Wool proceeds cannot be touched for 6 months, probably 9 months - this is another instance of persons trading on this Co's. means, as you observe in Letter of 29 Oct 80 it would have been far better to have worked the concern ourselves, in which doublets some of our time expired Shepherds with balance of Wages in hand would have been only too happy to assist.

41. We have received the enclosed letter for M<sup>r</sup>. Balliday from his Mother who complains that she has not heard from him for two years, it will be proper therefore for you to induce him to write to her.

42. It is unfortunate that we cannot decide the charter of a vessel for next month as Messrs Harvey's 'Clymping' would, it is believed, undertake the business at £1600 and cur the Timber Port which will be necessary, as these Littlehampton vessels are so good, well commanded & grant us various indulgencies. The Board of  $3\frac{1}{2}$  prov. may think it well to entertain her.

Sir, As intimated in our last we now forward Duplicate of same No. 577, dated 21<sup>st</sup> inst., with other Duplicates, in hopes this will arrive P. Rossos Pr. 'Phis' about 11<sup>th</sup> Feb<sup>r</sup> next.

2. Referring to 577, 32 V, 32 we now learn that the Pacific Steam Navigation Co. of Liverpool are desirous of appointing you their Agent at Stanley, with a Commission of Five per cent (5%) on the Fares of all Passengers booked by you for their Steamers from Sandy Point or Montevideo - the reduced fares from the former port being £ 40, 25 & 13 for 1<sup>st</sup> 2<sup>nd</sup> & 3<sup>rd</sup> class Passengers, enquiries must be made whether any reduction can be made on the fares from Montevideo - the Board thinks it would be proper for you to undertake this business, as such arrangements will not occupy much time and may lead to a reduction of our expenses. We notice with satisfaction that W. Humphreys considerably reduced the Fares for Capt. Smith & other passengers by the S.V. 'Elbe' on account of their waiting for her at Montevideo.

3. We send Mohr, Nicke 16<sup>th</sup>, of Hawre, account of the 'Denderah's' Freight on Sheepskins & Wool to London £ 107. 2. 7 and Cartage to Warehouse here £ 3. 17. 1. The Agents of Mr. Rossos Co. here have called to enquire whether the S.V. 'Memphis' could call here early in February next, to receive the cargo we are sending that month by sailing vessel and have been told that it being Gales and other rough stuff it would not answer us or them to do so, it shows well however that they are willing to undertake any business for us - that Steamer will convey £ 100 assorted strong Boots, alike quantity going by the sailing ships. With respect to this vessel you state she might leave end February, but as it is of importance to get our Wool here by end of August we shall endeavour to despatch her the third week of February, as she will, being smaller than usual, be better able to go round to Darwin for the Tallow. We are told from Hamburg that the German vessel 'Bans' Cap. N. Lemonti, 344 tons, of Hamburg, has been chartered for the Falklands, suppose this will be the vessel Humphreys has engaged for us.

4. The samples of Wool ex N<sup>o</sup>. 300 being from crops of

Sir, Our last dated 30<sup>th</sup> Dec<sup>r</sup>. 1880 went forward by the Pacific P.W. 'Magellan' via Sandy Point, Duplicate being now enclosed: on the 26<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> we received your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 301 of 24<sup>th</sup> Nov<sup>r</sup>. last through Sandy Point, which ought to have arrived on 11<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup>, as the General Post Office and the Pacific C° do not know the reason of this delay we have complained to Mr. H. L. Reynard, the British Vice Consul at Sandy Point, to whom we presume the Mail Bags would be handed. The Flaminos C° received their letters ex "Fleben" at Hamburg on the 11<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup>. This present Mail is delayed through an accident to the S.V. 'Memphis' in the River Elbe, the 'Marda' being sent instead of her.

2. As the Board considered it would not be right for you to undertake an agency for the Pacific C° for Passengers home by their Steamers through Sandy Point, since this Comp<sup>r</sup> is endeavouring to support the German Steamers calling at the Falklands, they cancelled Paragraph 2 of Despatch 578 and ordered a Telegram to be sent to Monte Video to go on by the same Steamer that conveyed the Despatch, we therefore sent on 20<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> Telegram Out N<sup>o</sup>. 19 - "Send Cobb. Magellan cancel paragraph two December 1880 - 'ter Miskish - Gilarion failure end February'" - which we trust reached you at same time as Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 578. The Pacific C° state that their Passenger fares between England and Montevideo cannot be altered. The German C° have reduced the Passenger fares between the Continent and Stanley to first class £ 38 (Thirty-eight Pounds) second £ 29 (Twenty-nine Pounds) third £ 15 (Fifteen Pounds), so that we shall not now hesitate as to sending people by this route and you must do the same with all our time expired sermons.

3. It was proposed to ship 20 hds Ale & 3 cases Boots & Shoes by the S.V. 'Memphis' but the late dreadful severe weather prevented their being sent to Hamburg or Antwerp & they were shipped by the S.V. 'Maskelyne' from Liverpool to catch her at Montevideo. As Despatch 301 about Stores out did not arrive at the expected time we could not delay chartering the second

Produce vessel having a favorable offer of the Barque 'Hilarion' 391 tons, Capt<sup>n</sup> Cheesman at Liverpool, which we accepted on 13<sup>th</sup> ult., she is larger than was thought to be required but no smaller vessel under offer had Timber Ports which are an absolute necessity for the large Logs ordered, then it was considered that being at Liverpool Steam Coals (needed after visit of Flying Squadron) House Coals (presuming our late Despatch to sell at lower price would clear the mangled stock & real House could be sent) and Salt would be cheaper - the latter we decided only a few days before the frost set in was in sufficient quantity at Stanley, after receipt of 30s the weather prevented delivery at Liverpool, so of the 50 tons you order 30 tons will be shipped here in some Tallow Casks in bags to economise space - also we thought it would be so much better to ship the 500 Tallow Casks whole if possible, as if in shock with utmost care there must be some damage besides the delay of setting up at the Tallow works: then Baillon the South Am<sup>n</sup>. Missionary Soc<sup>d</sup> asked for freight, now it is doubtful if she can take all that has to go, however some if not all the House Coal must be sold here to make room for freight paying cargo. The stock of Ale at Stanley, 40hds, being now given enables future shipments to be arranged, this lasts to end March next, the 'Mosquidys' 20hds carries on to end May, we purpose shipping 40 hds by 'Hilarion' to last to end Sept<sup>r</sup>, it is not necessary to send P. 'Thelon' 5 Apt. as they would arrive same time as 'Hilarion', then if German Contract continues 20hds P. 'Pak-Karah' 18 May, 20hds P. 'Luxor' 8 June, which would last to end Jan<sup>r</sup>. 82, then we must wait until the new Beer is obtainable and ship 20hds end of Oct<sup>r</sup> or soon afterwards to arrive end December of this year.

4. N<sup>o</sup>. 301, 2. This Despatch was the first intimation of the 'Cairnsmore's' accident for the Telegrams to Lloyd's and M<sup>s</sup>rs. Nicholson & M<sup>s</sup> Gill have not come to hand, as the Govt. Post Office and the Pacific C<sup>o</sup> do not know anything about them we enquire of Mr. Reynard but you had better also look into this mishap: we immediately sent full intelligence to M<sup>s</sup>rs. N & M<sup>s</sup> G about it being too late to telegraph for 'Luxor' or 'Magellan' and the next Flotilla S.V. is being now arranged to send the Passengers and necessities for the Cairnsmore from Liverpool to catch the 'Uardia' at Montevideo.

5. Part 4. We are glad to learn the good prospects for the clip of Wool to arrive this year - also that you will forward samples of our Wools & those of other Setters for the Wool Exhibition at the Crystal Palace next June, continue to send whatever

you can by every opportunity for Mr. Simmonds has reserved space and would prefer our articles being entwined with Penguin Skins, Fur Sealskins &c &c which could be received quite late, even after the extended time the 1<sup>st</sup> April next.

6. Par 5. The suggestion for two Lightning Conductors to the Stanley House is so good that we shall use our best endeavours to send the materials by the 'Hilarion'.

7. Par 7. We received a few days ago from Humphreys Charterparty of the German Bge 'Hans', 344 tons Register, Capt. C. H. Le Moult for loading our first Produce Home at £750, with £10 gratuity to the Master, 25 weather permitting working days for receiving cargo, to load at Stanley & proceed to Darwin, if returning to Stanley £50 extra freight to be paid, she left Montevideo 24 Dec<sup>r</sup>: you will find that her tonnage in Bureau Veritas and the German Consuls Book is only 312<sup>97</sup>/<sub>100</sub> tons and as German vessels are smaller carriers than English you may still be able to favor the German Steamers with some cargo home and yet have a good supply for the 'Hilarion' - as she is larger than anticipated we sent notice of her charter in Telegram Out N<sup>o</sup>. 19 in hopes you would be able to offer to the West Falklanders and others cheap freight for their Produce home.

8. Par 12. The Board considers that much economy may still be practised in the Co's working expenses & trusts you will spare no efforts towards this being done having a due regard to efficiency. With respect to Mr. Clay everything points to the conclusion that his office would be far better in your hands, you have time enough to attend to it by means of the Superintendents & Overseers already appointed and at work, under these circumstances therefore the Directors are of opinion that six months notice should be given to Mr. Clay, if you think it advisable that his services should be dispensed with, to terminate his Agreement before the 8<sup>th</sup> November next, the time at which the five years will expire - on this point you may think it advisable to consult with Mr. Garvey.

9. Par 13. As you state that the addition of a Surgery and Bedroom over to Dr. Flinston's House at Darwin would not be expensive the Board wish it to be done at as moderate a charge as possible, giving us full particulars of same.

10. Referring to the Shephards Houses suffering from Smoky Chimneys we now send Drawing from Mr. Banks, Architect, showing how they should be built to prevent smoking, another copy will go in the 'Hilarion'.

11. The Schr. 'Fair Rosamond' sailed on 1<sup>st</sup> Jan<sup>r</sup>. with Capt. Rowlands and a cargo supplied by Mr. Dean, to pass the Customs & clear out Capt. Edward Crump was nominal Master under engagement by Capt. Rowlands, who owns 20/64 other Mr. George M. Dean 24/64 and Capt. John Key Thomas 20/64. Since her departure we have observed that the Argentine and Chilean Governments have given notice that trading, sealing &c on the Coasts of Patagonia, Straits of Magellan &c is forbidden unless vessels have obtained permission from the said Governments, we have informed Capt. Rowlands of this & referred him to you for further intelligence and advice. The Schr. 'Britannia' sailed 21<sup>st</sup> ult. with cargo for Waldron & others, two Merino Rams from Sturgeon for former could not be put on board at last moment on account of bad weather, but she had four Rams for L. J. Baillon Jr., a cross of the Leicester & Lincoln breeds.

12. Referring to N<sup>o</sup>. 298, 3 we have been in correspondence through the Danish Consul with W. Mittelsted's Brother Mr. Niels Joachim Mittelsted of Gvenborgs, Denmark, and have this day paid the Consul the £29. - 4 balance of Wages due to the deceased W. Mittelsted to be handed to the said Brother for distribution to his Mother, Sister and himself.

13. This morning we received Telegram Home N<sup>o</sup>. 29 "Tell Cobb suspend payment Baillon ground misrepresentation" - we immediately telegraphed this to Mr. Edward Cobb at Bath and write him full information this evening. This Telegram must have left Stanley by the 'Luxor', been delivered at Sandy Point and come up to Montevideo by a Pacific S<sup>r</sup>, which will deliver a Despatch explaining it about 9<sup>th</sup> prox. - we conclude it is caused by the information in Desp<sup>r</sup>. 577, 407 we told Mr. Cobb that a letter posted for the 'Marda' early tomorrow would probably reach Antwerp in time for her.

14. N<sup>o</sup>. 301, 19 - It is M<sup>r</sup>s. Gideon &c of 8 London Street, Fenchurch St. and St. Helena who have enquired about Sheep for that Colony, the requirements would be for 150 to 200 Sheep and 20 to 30 Cattle three or four times a year, they sending provender and water: the Schr. 'Flying Scud' <sup>Capt. Brooks</sup> 172 tons left St. Helena on 23 Dec<sup>r</sup>. last for Ascension & Falklands intending to carry Sheep back to St. Helena, we have an idea that Mr. George Dean has seen M<sup>r</sup>s. Gideon on the subject.

15. We learn this morning from M<sup>r</sup>s. Nicholson & M<sup>r</sup> Gill that they are sending by the 'St. Plato' from Liverpool on 12 inst. for the Cairnsmore a Surveyor of the Liverpool Underwriters Association and three men, with 16 half Boams, 6 Stanchions, 2 Forges, 3 Standards of Deals & the necessary Tools - also 1½ ton Bread and 5 bals Flour, which they hope will be transhipped to the 'Marda' at Montevideo - this has been told Capt. Seidell through M<sup>r</sup>s. Burgmans & Bulcke of Antwerp.

16. Our Agent at Dundee Mr. Fleming has sent some notes upon Draining Bogs, which we hope will be carried out to our advantage - it went in a parcel No. 4233 to Antwerp for the 'Marda' with a number of enclosures & newspapers £: - also a parcel for Dr. Houston for which a charge is to be made.

17. The 'Hilarion's' Passengers will be Jane Allan to marry George Stewart, two Shepherds for L. N. Baillon &c if possible one Shepherd for Stickney - Charles Grant, Simpson's Brother in law, left out of 'Luxor' 21 Dec 80 has not applied again: enclosed is Epitome of her Cargo she has not yet arrived from Liverpool but must certainly leave end of month or first two or three days of March.

Should anything further occur we shall write tomorrow in continuation of this Despatch.

Sir, Our last was dated 8<sup>th</sup> inst. F.S. Warda' as per Duplicate enclosed - on the 14<sup>th</sup> inst. your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 302, dated 31 Dec and 1 Jan came to hand, on the 18<sup>th</sup> inst. I wrote an official letter replying thereto on many points in hopes of catching the 'Warda' at Montevideo. Duplicate of this is also enclosed, a copy having been sent on 18<sup>th</sup> to Liverpool for Lamport's Pt. Dalton.

2. As only one of the Directors have called full reply to above Despatch must be deferred until after next Board, it may arrive simultaneously with this as we shall write F. 'Cordillera' on 8<sup>th</sup> proximo.

3. N<sup>o</sup>. 302, 10. Messrs Vorwerk Bros. V.C. will ship from Hamburg F. S. 'Theben' on 2 Apt. the Beer, Ale, Sugar & Maicke ordered, so the 'Filarion' will not carry any Lucifer, nor Gunpowder as the stock end of 79 and two last shipments appear to be sufficient. Par 24. The mistake about the Pipes <sup>wasmere</sup>, so you must do the best with them.

4. There is not anything further to report upon Speedwell Island Farm, Mr. Baillon asked about telegraphing to Montevideo to catch the 'Warda' after arrival of next mail due 9<sup>th</sup> prox<sup>o</sup>, if this happens to be delayed a day it will be close work to carry out his proposal. I am told there is not a copy of the Lease granted to Mr. Baillon this is unfortunate for the Board's decision on the matter.

L. A. Baillon's Cash advance account here is running up very fast, close upon £500, of course his Wool must be consigned to us, & come home by the 'Filarion' if not received by Waldron's "Britannia".

5. Respecting the continuation of the Mail Contract with the Kosmos Steamers we find on correspondence with the South Western Rly. and the Southampton Dock C<sup>o</sup> that there would be very little if anything saved in sending Stores to Southampton instead of Hamburg so for the present we have given up this idea as we cannot offer sufficient cargo to induce the Steamers to come to Southampton - we are however trying to arrange for their calling at Dartmouth for Passengers and Mails, which they are willing to do for an increase of Subsidy - enclosed is Copy of Letter to the Crown Agents on 16<sup>th</sup> inst. We are disappointed that the Kosmos C<sup>o</sup> cannot at present give any date for the Mails Out & Home supposing the contract will be continued, it must however be settled next month as Mr. Staude, the Managing Director, is coming to London to arrange with the English Government: the

Agents here complain that the Steamers do not get much Falkland freight, but I think with cargoes from Valparaiso &c they have made a good beginning and tell them we cannot change our mode of freightage all at once: it being difficult and almost impossible to keep an account of the steamers earnings on this side, we trust you have recorded this at Stanley and will report full particulars to this Office, as soon as the first year's Contract has terminated.

6. As it may be necessary to arrange for Passengers home by the 'Bilarion', she has a single cabin on the Starboard side, leading out of the main cabin, which would accommodate an adult and a child - Jane Allan occupies this - on the port side separate from the main Cabin is a Cabin having entrance from staircase or companion, with double upper berth and single lower berth to accommodate three adults, thus a married couple and two children might occupy it - we hope to have 3 Shepherds in it, two for Baillon, one for Stickney. The rate of Passage money will be £ 17. 10. - outwards, we have to pay Nine Pounds each to the ship for provisions as they all meet at the Captain's table. By the last Mail I received a letter from George Stewart complaining that Jane Allan had not been offered a passage out to him, this is not the fact, we told her of two opportunities but she was not ready so could not go until now, this is told him in the enclosed letter - he says he will pay her passage money as soon as she is landed.

Sir, Our last dated 26<sup>th</sup> ult. went by the 'Hilarion', which sailed from Gravesend on 28<sup>th</sup> passed Deal that evening and Shoreham the next afternoon. This morning we received your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 303 of 27<sup>th</sup> January, by 'Hermes' St. 'Luxor' to Sandy Point, thence F. Pacific St. 'Iveria'.

2. The Board of yesterday having considered your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 302 I am now to state upon Par 12, respecting the Legislative Council, that the Directors can only say that the fair claims of the West Falklanders ought to be duly considered - and they trust that due provision will be made for the sanitary improvements needed in Stanley.

3. Par 16. It is quite possible that there are many inconveniences for Third class Passengers on board the German Steamers but not quite so bad as Simpson's wife appear to have told you or H. E. Govt. Herr would not have written that they were contented in the 'Theben', and as the Scotch are frequently so dirty, with the 'Black Hawk' and the 'Visar of Bray', we really do not see that we should go to more expense than third class for them: we complained to the 'Hermes' Co: about there not being a division for males & females, they state there must be a mistake on this point since their rules provide for a proper separation of the sexes.

4. Par 14. We regret to learn you expect so much trouble from the establishment of a Township near Darwin, on such a point Mr. Sargeant would not have any influence as this would come before the authorities at the Colonial Office, who would be certain to refer to their own Governor it is at Stanley and with Govt. Herr that the negotiation must be carried on and to conciliate and convince him is the main point, the Directors trust therefore that you will be able to overcome the difficulty.

5. N<sup>o</sup>. 303, 2. You still do not state to whom at Sandy Point the <sup>missing</sup> letter or telegram about the 'Cairnmore' was sent, we

have complained to Mr. Reynard, the British Vice Consul at Sandy Point upon this matter but it would be best to appoint an Agent here to attend to our business.

6. Par 4. This most unfortunate that the Flying Squadron was forced to leave in such a hurry as this will prove a serious loss to the Colony and this C° in particular through Steam Coals, Stores & Fresh Provisions not being required.

7. The arrival of the 'Flans' is not reported, we are however glad to hear she would be ready about the time we anticipated the middle of last month, so as to arrive here 20<sup>th</sup> to end of next month.

8. By desire of Mr. Baillon and at his cost we sent on 3<sup>d</sup> inst. 11.48 A.M. Telegram Out N° 20 - "Keep Aitken Speedwell till affair completed ask Perks wait April Mail" - in order to go down by the St. 'Uarda' from Montevideo.

9. Yesterday at 12.1 P.M. Telegram Home N° 30 arrived - "Black wrecked Staten Island" - This notifies the loss of our 'Black Hawk'. Lloyd's also had Telegram that she was totally wrecked, the crew saved. This is a very unfortunate occurrence, the Directors wait further particulars and seem to be of opinion that she ought to be replaced by a Steamer.

10. As it might be useful on emergencies to telegraph to Lisbon for the R. Mail or Pacific Steamers we have arranged with Messrs. Knowles Rawes &c to receive Telegrams & shall now have our Indicator, the word "Fleetwing", registered at the Submarine Telegraph C° - This indicator serves at the Eastern Telegraph C° for us here and Humphreys at M. Video.

11. We cannot find a copy of a Falkland Islands Govt. Lease in this Office and therefore wish one to be sent at once.

Sir, Enclosing Duplicate of our last on 8<sup>th</sup> ult; we have to acknowledge your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 304 of 29<sup>th</sup> January received 11<sup>th</sup> ult., and N<sup>o</sup>. 305 of 11<sup>th</sup> February, Duplicate received from Montevideo 21<sup>st</sup> ult., Original on 28<sup>th</sup> ult., the S<sup>r</sup> 'Obis' being detained at St. Dago, Cape Verd Islands, though accident to machinery, arrived at Havre 30<sup>th</sup> ult. with our 78 bales Wool and 47 bales Sheepskins.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 304, 8. As Martin declines to accept the London weights of the Tallow for the calculation of his Commission on the extra quantity produced per sheep, arrangements must be made for the weighing at the Tallow works being checked by an independent person, the weighing machine being first tested for correctness as we believe the difference between the Island and London weights arises in some measure through faulty scales.

3. Par 9. It is unfortunate that Barrett, the Cooper at Goose Green, is so misbehaved as to require dismissal, you do not ask us to send a successor so we suppose you will be able to appoint some one at the colony, under these circumstances it is good that so many of the Tallow casks for the next melting went out whole in the 'Hilarion.'

4. Par 14. As before stated the Board delays decision as to providing Wire Fencing until in receipt of W. Harvey's report, but meantime they told me yesterday to ask for places & particulars of erection of the fencing shipped from 9 June 77, which by our accounts measures nine miles.

5. Par 25. As you do not give a decision about the Shepherds Bedding for the German Steamers I presume we had better continue to obtain it from Silver - the bedding &c was not given to our Shepherds considering it would be needed for passengers home. Baillon's Shepherd, John Taylor, by this Steamer, whose Agreement is enclosed, has been told the bedding &c belongs to him having been charged to Baillon - the Hilarion's bedding belongs to the Co. being provided for the passage charged Baillon and may come into use if you send Passengers home by her.

6. N<sup>o</sup>. 305, 3. We are pleased to find you are still alive to the necessity of improvements in our Tallow, as before stated the Brokers say they sent all the information they could about the last shipment, the price realized being really more decisive than any detailed report, but they promise to look very closely into your remarks on the Tallow expected by the 'Hilarion'.

7. Par 8. With respect to late business with Mr. L. N. Baillon &c the Directors decided to grant him advances after explanations he gave them, and though he has shipped some few stores by Mr. Waldron's vessel 'Britannia' they were hardly such as we could supply - being in want of some light stuff for the 'Hilarion' I exceeded the advance agreed upon for stores by accepting a wool shed from Arnold, on which 25% is to be charged for freight, insurance & expenses to Stanley, and on which we shall earn schooner freight for delivery at Fox Bay: of course you have the security of his Government Leases and he has arranged to ship all his Produce to us. Enclosed is a detailed account showing £275.2.10 for Personal & other expenses, bearing interest at 5% from dates of advances, and £327.9.1 for stores on which 25% is to be charged.

8. Par 11. We can now understand how the 'Black Hawk' was at Staten Island when she was wrecked, yesterday we received through Mr. Humphreys Capt. Campbell's letter written at North Arm on 20<sup>th</sup> Feb. (copy enclosed) detailing that the wreck took place at Back Harbour on the night of 10<sup>th</sup> Feb, he had left a boats crew for salvage purposes for whom you will have to send a vessel: Campbell was brought to North Arm by the Am. Sch. 'Adela Chase', on arrival at Stanley you will of course have taken care that he made a full & proper protest to be sent here as soon as possible to enable the insurance to be recovered: The General Registrar of Seamen has sent notice that we are to furnish list of the Crew on the form herewith. The Board decided yesterday to build a steamer, somewhat larger than the one proposed by Capt. Seemann.

9. Par 12. We are sorry to hear the St. 'Plio' did not bring from Sandy Point the Despatch sent there for her being £c 578 written on 30 Dec 80 by Pacific St. 'Magellan' - the Mails at Sandy Point are evidently not properly looked after, Humphreys informs that the missing Letter fr. 'Theben' of 21 Nov 80 was carried to England by the Pacific St. 'Patagonia' instead of being delivered at Montevideo & was returned to him from London on 7th March - we have heard though no positive evidence is given, that the Pacific Steamers do not stop at Sandy Pt if the weather is bad; I think we should do well to appoint our own Agent there and believe Mr. F. G. Meidell who acts for the Fosnos C. would do no justice if you might write & enquire his terms &c

10. When Alex. Fraser came here to present his order he said he was entitled to his Gratuity on the Dividend payable at Christmas last, & told him to write to his Office on the subject so that the claim might be sent on to you, this has

not been done so he may have written you direct, if he is entitled to it you might enter it on the remittance sheet.

11. We omitted to state that the 110 bales Sheepskins and 1 case Wool Samples per G.W. Ramses arrived 18<sup>th</sup> Feb<sup>o</sup>. last. Mr. Waldron's 27 bales Wool & "Denderah" in London 20 Dec 80, were sold by Messrs. G. Boare & Hudson on 16<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>o</sup>, Lots 81 to 86 as per catalogue sent to you, Messrs. Edenborough & Co furnished report on same as per details herewith - Lot 85 was 5 bales Pickney's Wool ex Linen & Sep 80, Lots 86, 87, were 69 bales Dean's Wool ex Sea Witch 4 Oct 80, not sold at their sale 6 Dec 80.

12. We learn from the Crown Agents for the Colonies that the Government cannot pay any extra Subsidy for the Mail Service to have the German Steamers call in at Dartmouth for Mails and Passengers, they have not stated whether the present Contract is continued but Mr. Staudt the Managing Director of the Flotmos C° called here on 24<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>o</sup> to state that it was renewed for another year, he gave me the names and dates for their steamers on which the enclosed Mail Table has been drawn up though we cannot publish it for the benefit of the public until official notice has been received from the Government - copy of this goes now over by the present Mail to H.C. Govt. Herr. The Pacific C° having been obliged to alter some of their sailings and dates revised Time Table, "May to December 1881", is sent herewith.

13. The shipment of Stores by this steamer executes all your Orders except 20 tons Salt & the 10,000 ft Match Boards just ordered: Messrs. Vorwerk are to ship the Goods you ordered at Hamburg upon our instructions as per enclosed letter to them. The arrival of the Stock of Stores at end of last year enables us to arrange future shipments of Draft Ale, the stock 42 hds would last to end of April, 20 hds ft. Maskelyne, 40 hds ft. Hilarion to end Oct, the only shipment before the bad weather will be the Menes on 7 June by which we shall ship 40 hds to last until end Feb 82 - the first steamer after the Oct. brewings will be the Menes on 13 Dec, 20 hds, which arriving 18 Jan 82 will be in time in case of consumption having increased: after this further shipments must depend on your advices.

14. No. 304, 14. Notwithstanding the further explanations the Board adheres to their decision as to your owning a Steam Launch, which they consider as you propose it would be very undesirable and that there ought not to be any monetary transactions between yourself and the Company.

15. In the interest of science the Rev. Prof. Bridges promised to obtain for Prof. Flower of the Royal College of Surgeons, some Fuegian Skulls & Skeletons, if he sends a case to your care please forward same by your vessel or first steamer.

Our last was dated the 5<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup>, this steamer having been delayed a week there is a doubt whether it will arrive in time for the 'Hermes' St. Ramee's to deliver at Stanley on 14<sup>th</sup> prox<sup>r</sup>, delays are however to be expected upon this route until better arrangements are made, the mail from Stanley of 9<sup>th</sup> March due 21<sup>st</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> did not arrive, but came by the next Pacific Steamer a fortnight later on the 5<sup>th</sup> instant.

2. Your Despatch 306 arrived in duplicate on 2<sup>nd</sup> inst<sup>r</sup>, the original was delivered on 5<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup>. - N<sup>o</sup>. 307 reached us on 2<sup>nd</sup> inst<sup>r</sup>. - N<sup>o</sup>. 308 was read on 3<sup>rd</sup> inst<sup>r</sup> in duplicate, the original arriving on 5<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup>. - N<sup>o</sup>. 309 was received on 3<sup>rd</sup> instant.

3. N<sup>o</sup>. 306, 3. We are sorry to hear of Robert Grigor's death, you do not ask to have him replaced, but as Alex<sup>r</sup>. Fraser returned 8 Feb last, who you said could be reengaged, wishes to enter our service again we may send him by the 'St. Menes' on 7<sup>th</sup> prox<sup>r</sup> - this G<sup>r</sup>. will convey the Rev<sup>r</sup>. and M<sup>r</sup>. Brandon, and John & Richard Aldridge to return to their Mother M<sup>r</sup>. Williams. M<sup>r</sup>. L. A. Baillon Jr., wife and 2 children hope to join her at M. Video.

4. Par 6. The alterations for the Wool Prefs were made & shipped by the 'Bilacor' 26 Feb last, I fully thought this was intimated in a previous Memo on Stores. Par 14. Respecting the heavy stock of Turpentine we sent copy of Fenners letter 16 Feb last showing it had been supplied at the fair price of the day, we trust therefore if not now required for Sheep Dip you have sold it to best advantage.

5. Par 8 and later Despatches. The Board will delay all remarks upon Mr. Carvey's visit and inspection until his report is to hand and they have had the benefit of his verbal explanations.

6. Par 9. The loss of the 'Black Hawk' is certainly most unfortunate, Capt<sup>r</sup>. Campbell appears to have behaved very stupidly and against your orders, the Directors quite approve therefore of your decision not to employ him again, we trust to receive the Protest as soon as possible to submit to Underwriters for recovery of the Insurance and hope the men will be fetched from Staten Isl<sup>r</sup>. and the affair settled as economically as possible.

7. Par 11. The Directors are exceedingly gratified with your good report on the clip of Wool for this year - the Bge 'Hans'

Le Moult, arrived on 16<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup>, her Wool is reported as improved in quality and in the getting up, we beg therefore that you will accept our thanks for this improvement and express the same to Mr. Clay, the Overseers and all other employees of the C°. As matters look so well the Directors had the pleasure of issuing a circular of the 11<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> of their proposal to declare an interim Dividend, which was voted at an Extra-ordinary General Meeting on the 25<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> and Four per cent was paid on the 30<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> to the great satisfaction of all our Proprietors.

8. Par 16. We are taking steps to learn the mode of burning Tallow Refuse in a retort and will inform you the result in hopes something can be done in case the report from the Liebig C° does not give a plan for getting rid of it.

9. Par 17. We must endeavour to supply a Stallion the difficulty will be his transmission having given up our sailing vessel and your proposal that our future charters for the Tallow once a year shall be small vessels only: the Kosmos C° must be applied to, though at the rate of £20 from Stanley to the West Coast of America their charge might be exorbitant and then there would be the expense & risk of getting him to Antwerp.

10. Par 20. Should we make a parcel for the S.W. Menes' Doolan's two Watches shall be returned - also one belonging to James Nicol, who has applied for it.

11. N. 308, 2. I am very sorry the enclosures were omitted in N. 579, the List of Lloyd's Agents must be sent next opportunity.

12. Par 4. We have written to the Kosmos C° on these points the high charge for Passengers between Montevideo and Stanley, and the reduction of 10/- in freight on Wool to England, as they seem desirous of pleasing we hope some alteration will be made. The Mail Contract with this C° has been continued for another year, we have therefore issued a Mail Table as per Copy herewith, and learning from the General Post Office that H. E. Govt. Herr wished the Pacific route to be notified to the public, we have done so and furnished copies to all the Government Offices and friends of the Colonists: the Crown Agents inform us that the Contract is continuable from year to year and that if they do not inform us during March of each year, that notice will be given on 1<sup>st</sup> Sept. for termination at end of June, we may consider there will not be any change: the calling at Dartmouth for Passengers & Mails has been given up as the Colony could not afford any extra subsidy and the Treasury would not make a grant, we trust that the Colonial income will be better next year: we send the Post Office Mail Table & the Kosmos small pink issue.

13. Par 6. We have arranged with the Underwriters that Oil may be kept on the W. Phand' Bulk, insured by Policy 530 for £1000 and have written the National about Pol 518.

14. Par 10. № 309, 2. Respecting the Camps outside Lafonia we are quite alive to the necessity of holding it and buying from time to time what we can so that when the Leases fall in it may not be valuable to others, we trust you have acted upon 582, 4 and been able to conciliate and convince Govt. Herr that we have a right to the renewal of the Leases of Sections 24 and 25, but to support you we addressed the Colonial Secretary of State yesterday, as per copy of letter enclosed, and hope it will have the desired effect. The copy of proposed Ordinance about Land & Leases of Crown Lands is received, when printed we ought to have two or three copies for our Books of the Laws and Ordinances - we send List of Ordinances required to make good one book and all future printings must be sent in duplicate.

15. We send particulars of the Local Meat Markets Co. who have established a Depot for receiving Frozen or Dry Air preserved Meat from the Colonies, where it can have the advantage of being stored and thawed by degrees whereby the flavor is retained and it enters into consumption without deterioration, and a enquiry has been made whether we could supply a Steamer with carcases of Sheep we wish information on the following points: the best Port for Steamers to call at, presuming that Stanley is too far from our feeding grounds and it would be unwise to kill Sheep there after a long drive as the meat would be in a heated condition, and we have always understood there is not sufficient pasture near Stanley to let them graze for two or three days after arrival: - the shed room that could be provided under which to kill and hang up the carcases to cool and afterwards hang up the sheepskins to dry: - the time that a carcass takes to cool and the average weight when quite cold, we have been informed that meat carefully killed in proper condition can hang in the climate of the Falklands ten to fourteen days without deterioration if this is really the case preparations could be made before arrival of Steamer so that there would be but little delay in loading her and of course speed is a great point when a valuable expensive Steamer is concerned, and this fact would enable the preserving and transmitting Company to give us better prices for our Sheep: - how many sheep can a butcher kill in one day & how many butchers can be provided for this purpose: - which will be the best season for shipping, can two or three shipments be made, and what interval of time will be best between them: - could other Sheep Farmers supply sheep, how many, at what price, whether of a different breed and size: - if carcases would not answer could legs only be supplied and the other part turned to good account: - can Cattle be provided in like manner. Mr. L. A. Baillon Jr. states that he is going to try a new preservative upon a carcase taken out with him, I offered to bring home by Hilarion any carcases or meat he might prepare with it.

16. The Registrar of Shipping at the Custom House has applied for the Black Hawk's Certificate of Registry, if not given up to the authorities at Stanley it must be sent here.

17. Mr. Malcolm Bethune brother of William Bethune in our service has applied to be engaged as Shepherd, we have told him there are no orders for Shepherds, he writes the enclosed letter to his Brother about emigrating himself, his age is 40, wife 37, girl 18, two boys 10 & 7 years.

18. It was a mistake to report in last Despatch Par 13 that all Stores were executed, Rowson still have a hhd, case & crate which will be shipped by 'Menes' from Hamburg on 6 prox, together with 40 hds. Ale and your Students N<sup>o</sup>. 47848 dated 12/25 Mch last; the Hydraulic Press Plate ought to be ready for Mr. Ward on 6 Aug next.

19. We were in hopes of sending you the Specification for building our Steamer but it is not quite ready.

20. We have received this afternoon from Messrs C. M. Lampson &c of 64 Queen St. £184.12.5 to be paid to Dennis J. Buckley, Master of Sch. 'Felix'.

Sir, Enclosing Duplicate of our last on 10<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup>. we have to acknowledge your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 310, the Duplicate arriving from Montevideo on 26<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup>, the Original also from Montevideo on the 2<sup>nd</sup> inst<sup>r</sup>, if this had come on by the S.V. 'Denderah' we should have received it earlier as she reached Havre on the 30<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup>.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 310, 3. Mr. Humphreys reported that as the S.V. 'Uarda' had left when the 'Cairnsmore's' Passengers and Materials arrived P. P. Plato from Liverpool, Mr. Dean's Agent at Montevideo had arranged that the S.V. 'Memphis' should deliver them at Stanley for £250, we cannot understand why Dean's Agent interfered in the matter as the 'Cairnsmore' was in our hands: your draft for £570. 18.6 on N. Rundell Esq, Liverpool, arrived in the Duplicate of 310 and was posted that day but was unfortunately miscarried in the post, to the present no record of this Bill has come to hand.

3. Par 15. This most unfortunate that Capt. Campbell could not reach Staten Island in the S.C. 'Felix' to bring away the men left there ex 'Black Hawk', we trust the S.C. 'Foam' has accomplished this and that the next Despatch will bring Campbell's Protest &c to enable the claim on the Underwriters for total loss to be made. Specification of the Steamer is forwarded, the Board meet tomorrow to accept a Tender but as the earliest time for completion of building is seven months you must not expect her under nine months from the present.

4. Par 18. We regret to learn that H. M. S. 'Danae' did not take our Coals; in accordance with your suggestion we have written Commodore Wilson on the Australian Station and trust it may result in other homeward bound Steamers coaling with us; we are informed that Mr. Dean's House Steam Coals are exhausted & he will probably buy some from our stocks, he has chartered the 'Britannia', Capt. E. G. Gafston, to load Flouse Coals, Timber &c at Glasgow and call at Cardiff for Steam Coals, it is anticipated she would leave the former port before the end of this month.

5. Par 19. The Indents £9 & 50 are to hand and will be executed as far as the five goods are concerned by the next

Steamer on 9 Augt., unless the Directors decide to send out any quantity of Iron Fencing, which with the rough heavy goods you have ticked would necessitate the chartering of a small vessel - the present Steamer conveys all stores ordered up to Order N<sup>o</sup>. 48, dated 25 Mch last, received 3<sup>rd</sup> ult. ex N<sup>o</sup>. 309. As such frequent shipments are now made and stores needed can be obtained so quickly and by stated periods, we consider that it is not necessary to keep on hand such a large heavy stock of stores as you had on 31 Dec<sup>r</sup>. last, and we were in hopes that there would have been a greater reduction since 31 Dec<sup>r</sup> 79 than there has been. Par 20. Steps will be taken to obtain clothing from Scotland, you ought not however to reproach us with buying our goods from Messrs. Heyam & Son by calling them Jew shop-sellers, they were recommended to us by the Hudson's Bay C° who deal very largely with them, and they ship extensively to Australia & other Colonies for merchants here.

6. W<sup>r</sup>. L. A. Baillon has effected his Insurance upon his Produce home - he left on 24<sup>th</sup> ult. with his family by the R.M.S. 'Douro' to catch the S.W. 'Menes' at Montevideo. This steamer conveys two Shepherds for Mr. Blake, Robert Grant & Donald M<sup>r</sup> Gilray with a Dog each.

7. Enclosed are particulars of our Exhibits at the Wool Exhibition, Crystal Palace - also two books of the Uruguay an Exhibits and account of Montevideo. W. Cromwell Esq. the Consul General here for Uruguay has taken great interest in the matter and tells me that if necessary or desirable he could obtain your appointment as Consul at the Falklands for Uruguay.

8. The Mother of Robert Grigor, who was drowned at North Arm, has written for particulars of the sad accident and about his effects, her address is Tandland, Chanbya, Elgin. The Mother of Mary McPines, who went out last year in the 'Vicar of Bray,' wishes her to come back if not properly settled. John Gardiner, formerly a Royal Marine at Stanley, a Bricklayer &c., wishes to emigrate with wife & 3 children, 4½, 2 yrs & 3 mths, the wife would go out as parlour maid or nurse. Alex<sup>r</sup> Fraser could not reengage for this steamer but may do so for 9 Aug, he knows a young Shepherd who would accompany him, but as you do not ask for Shepherds or give any intimation of future wants we are hardly justified in engaging him.

9. Referring to N<sup>o</sup>. 308, 6, the National Insurance Co. have been informed that Lamp Oil will be kept on the 'W<sup>m</sup>. Strand' and they have endorsed on the Policy 538 that we can stow a small quantity Paraffin in her, but the same is warranted not to give off an inflammable vapour under 100° Fahrenheit. Lloyd's Policy 530 for £1000 on the Hulls is also arranged to cover oil risk.

10. The prices realized by the Four Sealskins ex 'Hans' were omitted to be entered on the Catalogue of 25<sup>th</sup>. ult. - Lots 1 to

5 - 222 Wigs sold at 6/- each, Lot 6, 6 small Wigs @ 6/- each -  
 Lots 7 & 8 - 9 & large Rugs at 6/- each. The Wool ex SW. "Oasis"

Sir, The Directors have this day had an interview with Mr. Harvey at which his Report and verbal explanations were partially considered, you will find that he has fully gone into the matter and they trust you will carry out his many practical suggestions as to details, with regard to the large questions which he starts the Directors will await your replies to the proposals that Mr. Harvey makes - he brought a Chart of the Islands with the leased Sections carefully marked out by Mr. Bailey, to whom the Directors wish you to present five guineas. As to Mr. Clay's engagement the Board must leave it to your discretion, but think you ought to urge him to travel more frequently over the Camps to see that the Shepherds are moving about, looking after their Sheep. The utmost care must be used to test Mr. Harvey's report about Sheep being liable to fluke on Sections 35, 38 & 44. With respect to Iron Fencing for Lafonia we delay sending any until the Wild Cattle and Horses are exterminated, and even then from all accounts of the nature of the land it is doubtful whether the number of Shepherds could be reduced by the erection of divisional fences. \*

This is decided that the Co<sup>'s</sup> Sheep are to be dipped with Tobacco and Sulphur only, though as Little's Dip appears to be on sale at the Islands your wish to have 3,000 gallons sent next October shall be carried out.

\* and as to Captn. Packe's boundaries we wait your proposals as to size and length of wire, the timber to be obtained from Sandy Point, when labor will be ready to erect it and the best season of the year for its arrival.

The Directors consider your proposal to purchase Land on Choiseul Sound good and we shall write the Government on the subject, enquiring whether the price can remain at 4/- an acre.

2. We have gone carefully into the question of a Steamer and we very much fear a vessel for any ordinary work will not be suitable for working about the Islands and also be a great deal too expensive for local work.

A vessel of say 130ft by 20by 12, as per specification sent you, would carry about 240tons of cargo & coals and cost say about £7500, too small to pay as a trader to Montevideo and too expensive for the local work, a vessel about gofeet longer, 2 feet more beam & 2 feet deeper would not cost more than £2,000 more and carry double the stuff and be a much more profitable vessel for any distant sailings. The most useful vessels for the Island work would, we think, be a couple of steam launches of as large a size as we can make arrangements to have taken out with a mast at least and decked over. Please let us know what your ideas are to this suggestion, the Directors cannot see how it can pay to use a Steamer costing £7500 for merely local work, there would also be a considerable sum to be added for expense of sending her out, as well as her outfit.

Sir, We enclose Duplicates of our last Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 385 and 386 P. S. Menes' on 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> inst. and Memos upon Isores by her, which ought to have accompanied N<sup>o</sup>. 385. There was a mistake in my letter of 7<sup>th</sup> inst., the word Masters should have been Mansel.

2. Enclosed is Copy of Colonial Office Letter dated the 13<sup>th</sup> inst. stating that the Secretary of State for the Colonies approves the Governor's decision that the Leases of Sections 24 and 25 having expired, those Lands are reserved for public purposes though the C<sup>o</sup>: is allowed to continue as Tenant from year to year. On further examining the proposal of buying Government <sup>land</sup> on the North Peninsula we find it was wrong to state at the end of first paragraph of our last Despatch that we should write to the Home Government about the price continuing at 4/- an acre, this business must be arranged with H. E. the Governor at Stanley, and your decision to buy any land must be made with the utmost caution on account of the expense of fencing as some of the land towards Wickham Heights is bad.

3. The charge by the Hosnos C<sup>o</sup>: for a Stallion by one of their Steamers from Antwerp to Stanley would be £30, with a man to look after it at £15, a strong box to be provided by us & the whole of its fodder, as these charges are high the Directors wish you to enquire whether a good suitable Horse could not be procured from the River Plate. Should more Merino Rams be required from that quarter we are informed that the Rambouillet breed produce better Wool and in larger quantity than the German Merinos.

4. Mr. Harvey has met the Bill for £38 and it is arranged that the account 3.2.1 is to be debited to Stanley Office in your books.

5. The 296 bales Wool P. S. 'Denderah' arrived here on 3<sup>rd</sup> inst. and were sold on 16<sup>th</sup> at fair prices, report on them and priced Catalogue ~~are~~ sent - we have opened another Policy for £5,000 upon Wool Y: by Steamers so as to close such Insurance at the end of the present year; should you decide

to ship any Produce early next year notice must be given so that fresh insurances may be effected.

6. The Board's decision not to build such a Steamer as per specification sent is generally approved, the size of proposed Steam Launches is 6ft by 12 ft by 6 ft deep, though perhaps a little more length would be better, with Engines of 10 to 20 horse power: the Kosmos Co: have been applied to about taking them out in sections but as their steamers are small the excellent suggestion has been made that they should be shipped to Montevideo by the larger steamers, put together there, which could be done with far more certainty than at Stanley, and then towed down by the Kosmos Co:, on this latter point we hope to supply further information by next Mail.

7. I am directed to send you the Twenty-ninth Annual Report, with Balance Sheet, Profit & Loss Statement &c for the year 1880, which was adopted at the Annual General Meeting held on the 20<sup>th</sup> instant, also the Circular to the Shareholders on 21<sup>st</sup> inst. with the Resolutions passed at the said Meeting. The Directors were pleased at being able to pay a Dividend of Ten per cent and trust that your exertions will enable them to continue this and even exceed it.

8. We have had a visit from Capt. H. C. Cawley of the Royal Engineers, appointed by the Government to visit Stanley to report upon the defences of the Colony and the formation of a Naval Depôt for Coals &c there, he is to be accompanied by a Naval Officer, whose name we cannot give at present as he may be appointed from one of the men of War on the Station: all the information in our power was furnished to him with letter of introduction to yourself and the Board will feel obliged by your making his short stay as agreeable as possible.

9. As the Kosmos Steamers declined carrying for Mr. Dean has allowed us to ship five barrels by this vessel - the remainder of your Provisions 49 £ 50 will be sent by the P.P. 'Marda' of 9 Augt even including the rough stuff as we have obtained a reduction of the freight to 4/-, and though it will be expensive sending Timber &c we think it well to accept the Kosmos terms, thus getting the thin edge of the wedge in for a permanent reduction of their charges, for as stated in our Memos on Stores p. 'Memos' 7 June 81 they are higher than is apparent, through the latter cube being 5 feet less than the English ton of 40 cubic feet: still we do right in sending as you would not have ordered unless absolutely needed and there is very little chance of our requiring a sailing vessel for a long time. One of our Share-holders suggests that it would be proper to deduct five per cent at least from the value of Stores at the annual stock-taking, before the 20% is added for charges, to compensate for deterioration &c, the Board looks with favor upon the proposal and will be glad to hear your opinion on the matter, for we fear there is a great quantity of old stock which will never fetch the valuation put upon it.

10. With reference to the refuse from the Tallow Works, we consulted Mr. Fenner who is of opinion that a retort for burning same would not answer through it being very expensive to procure and put up, liable to get out of order and soon wearing out; some years since his firm manufactured manure by drying fish refuse upon a kiln, of which he sent some rough drawings and two letters dated 20th inst., copies of which are now enclosed; the plan appears feasible and we think a small trial should be made as we believe you have iron plates or tiles for the tops, it is a great consideration that he thinks peat would be the best fuel and that the ashes would be useful to throw on the meat refuse whilst drying, as this would naturally prevent some of the bad smell as well as doubtless make the article more saleable.

11. Alexander Fraser is applying to go out by the 9 Augt. Mail as you recommended him he will be engaged as old hands must be so much better.

Sir, Your Despatches Nos 311 and 312 of 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> May through Sandy Point arrived here by a Pacific G.W. on the 6<sup>th</sup> ult. - N<sup>o</sup>. 313 in Duplicate and N<sup>o</sup>. 314 by the 'Ramses' to Montevideo arrived on 2<sup>nd</sup> inst. by a Pacific G.W. to Bordeaux - Original N<sup>o</sup>. 313 <sup>p. Fairy</sup> with enclosures was delivered this morning by the 'Leibnitz' from Montevideo, the 'Fairy' having reached here the 10<sup>th</sup> ult.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 311, 3. Barrett's Brother would like to have some information about him and an address if he has left the Colony.

3. Par 7. As our consumption of Draft Ale has decreased it is unfortunate that the Menes of 7 June took out 40 hds, your last Pudent N<sup>o</sup>. 52 does not give any instructions on this point though we advised that the next shipment would be 20 hds of the New Beer by 'Menes' on 13 Dec, we trust your further Despatches will give positive advice on this subject.

4. Par 12. The Board regrets that there has been so much trouble and ill-feeling about the loss of the Black Hawk but the matter being now settled no more will be written on the point. The Underwriters have paid 99 per cent on her loss and the further papers of her sale &c. will now be submitted, but they strongly object to Capt<sup>n</sup>. Campbell's claim of £175. 6.s for his effects, copy of List enclosed, which does appear absurd, our Agents report that there is very little likelihood of its being met and state that they cannot make a claim on the Underwriters for £100 being the expense of saving the crew.

5. N<sup>o</sup>. 313, 2. There is not a number missing between the Hilarion 26 Feb 81 and the Theben 5 Ap 81 as the first number by the latter is 4728 Burrows' case of Books - freight is to be charged on the Governor's case 4832 and Holmeed's 4813 by the Theben 5 Ap 81.

6. Par 4. We learn it is better to have 1 cut Sacks for coaling Steamers, they cost about 4/- each and with careful usage might last 5 or 6 years - There have been some enquiries lately about coaling Steamers at Stanley going round the Horn for San Francisco, but we are not able to undertake such business until there are proper means for doing it expeditiously and at a

cheaper rate than 6/- & 6/- a ton, as a large portion of the carrying trade is now performed by steam we must endeavour to participate in it and may be able to do something soon as the Admiralty are thinking of establishing a Coal Depot at Stanley - steamers can purchase coal at Montevideo at 4.3 to 4.5 shillings per ton, receiving any quantity on board in a few hours, then can go quickly through the Straits to Coronel or Lota and buy the native coal at 9 or 10/- a ton, to secure such business we must offer intermediate advantages so the Board wish full information on the point, especially the labor you could command as the Colony suffers a disadvantage in there being no cheap native labour - though in view of the Canal through the Isthmus of Panama the Co. must avoid any heavy outlay - another disadvantage is that vessels bringing coals cannot procure cargo home.

7. Par 7. We are glad to hear that Little's Sheep Dips is so much approved of, for the present however the Board considers we ought to use Tobacco & Sulphur, still they leave it to your judgment to use Little's Dip where you deem it safe and advantageous as of course it is much cheaper than the other: this steamer carries 3,000 gallons of this Dip and as you order more we must send 3,000 gals by next steamer or vessel.

8. Par 7a. With respect to the accounts it was unfortunate that they were so delayed but no injury has been done as the only true record of the Co's position is the Balance Sheet prepared here at the end of each year and submitted to the Proprietors at the Annual General Meeting in June every year, of which you lately had a copy to 31<sup>st</sup> Dec: last.

9. Par 8. Enquiries will be made about Timber from Norway and a vessel thence for its conveyance - the subject of freight by sailing vessels requires serious consideration for we fear the expense by this steamer will be excessive upon rough cheap stores even at the reduced charge of 4/- & 5/- per cubic meter, the last Student has the rough stuff ticked for vessel, this will not be shipped by next steamer but how is it to go there being but little chance of sufficient deadweight for a vessel, then if a vessel is chartered of course she could convey the fine stores as well and much cheaper than the Steamers, I was thinking you might be ordering a quantity of Iron Wire for fencing when we should have good cause to take up a vessel but the Land question being unsettled this fencing on Northern Peninsula may not be required and fencing on Lafonia would not appear to be so much needed or so very beneficial - will it therefore be proper to save all rough cheap stores for the Tallow vessel once a year or make two shipments for the purpose of getting part out earlier - as our finances are so much easier now it is not so indispensable to have our Produce home so quickly,

as formerly so that the Tallow and Hides could come at twice, tho' of course too much delay would lose interest - then again the Tallow is best sold in small parcels at intervals - and the constant shipments of Wool by steamers keep us well in funds: from all this you will be able to consider the matter and send your views for future guidance - should the Admiralty establish a Coal Depôt there would be better chance of getting vessels out.

10. Par 11. Regarding the Land question the Directors may decide to write or see the Secretary of State for the Colonies, but as before stated the Home Government cannot but support their Officer in the Colony so for the present it must rest with you to do the best you can.

11. Par 13. We have not heard of the Phosmos Co. inst-  
-ituting a Steamer and Bulk for the Colony and cannot think they have such an idea, as the Mar<sup>t</sup>. Dir<sup>r</sup>. has expressed satisfaction with the business we have given this Co.

12. Par 15. The Board is much gratified that you have arranged to abolish Mr. Clay's office as they look for a great improvement in Lafonia through your superintendence of the farming operations, business in Stanley having decreased you can now devote more time to the genuine support and business of the Co. that of sheep rearing & operations attendant thereon, for though Patterson and Finlayson are good men there is nothing like your personal inspection of the whole camp for keeping everything in order.

Telegram Home N<sup>o</sup>. 31 about Clay coming home was received on 6<sup>th</sup> July and the information immediately transmitted to Mr. Sawyer.

13. Par 17. Though you complain of the arrangement made here with Mr. L. A. Baillon &c respecting his stores by the 'Hilarion' there cannot be much lost to the Co: as you must take into consideration that without his goods we should not have been able to fill up the vessel, nor would our bulk have earned money for storage, nor our schooners for conveyance to his settlement on West Falkland, besides the 25% is the rate fixed by your Office for such business with the West Falklanders.

14. Par 18. I am extremely sorry to hear that the Timber Logs per Hilarion from Ross are so bad as to be sent back, on her return they shall be properly examined & a claim made on the suppliers, who however took every pains to select good timber for & went over the stock with Mr. Ross myself for some hours to search and pick out the exact dimensions asked for.

15. N<sup>o</sup>. 314, 3. Alex<sup>r</sup>. Fraser returns by this Steamer under engagement as Shepherd as per enclosed Agreement - having had an advance of Wages Ten Pounds - Donald Paterson

with a dog goes out for Mr. Blake - yesterday Roderick Campbell, Brother of Donald Campbell for Waldron per Vicar of Bray 9 July 80, called here wishing to go out, he would not engage with us having heard that his Brother gets £72 for the third year so paid his own expenses to Stanley & will do the best for himself there, he had a dog also. We shall do our best to send three good Shepherds by next Steamer.

At Par 10 you say that Malcolm Bellume may come without stating whether we should engage him nor whether if terms can be made with him he is to be one of the three asked for, we have taken it that he might go out on his own account & have written him accordingly tho' doubting whether he can provide £60 and other expenses for his passage.

16. Par 6. It is good that you have had a friendly discussion with H. C. Govt. Herr upon the Land question which we trust will result in a favorable arrangement - our Chairman is now abroad and will not return until middle of next month, thus the proposed delegation to the Colonial Minister must be deferred, your next Despatch may however afford better reasons for an interview.

17. Mr. Dean's Britannia sailed from Cardiff on 12<sup>th</sup> with 350 tons Steam Coals, over 200 tons House Coals and a good quantity of Timber and Posts £: for fencing. Humphreys informs us that the Norwegian Barque Skudenes, 151 tons, Capt. T. Pedersen, left Montevideo 21<sup>st</sup> June for Stanley to load a cargo of Produce for Mr. Dean & Son for London.

18. Capt. Caulley left Pt. Pacific 'W. Cordillera' on 13<sup>th</sup> ult: for Sandy Point to come on to Stanley by the Flosmos 'Pt. Sakkaraki' due 19<sup>th</sup> of this month, he took with him Capt. Snow's work on the Falklands, which he will probably hand over to you for return to this Office.

19. The Flosmos C: cannot tow Steam Launches from Montevideo to Stanley.

20. Mef's Vorwerk of Hamburg have executed your order by present steamer, sending Invoice £: to you direct, they considerably arranged for the freight to be at the reduced rate we obtained, viz 4% and 5% your further order for them will be despatched next mail.

21. Your Telegrams to Lloyd's announce disasters to the 'Cambria', we wrote Owner who has not replied - 'Lufsex' dismasted, we have given information to George Marshall &c: who have not decided anything at present. 'Spirit of Morning' owner would like further information.

Sir, Enclosing Duplicate of our last on 9<sup>th</sup> ultimo we have to acknowledge your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 315 and 316, dated 12<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup> July, received on the 30<sup>th</sup> ult.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 315, 2. Copy of this Paragraph has been sent to Messrs. Edenborough & C<sup>o</sup>: with request that they will attend to same and especially put numbers of bales of Wool in their Report, as of course it is of importance you should be able to find out which flocks ought to be improved.

3. Par 4, 5. The 5% prime on Freight upon Sheepskins p. Steamers to London has been entered to compensate the C<sup>o</sup>. for paying freight and trouble of receiving these goods, if objected to it must appear in future as Agency or Commission. I have also complained some time since that no General Statement of Produce Home in 1880 has been made, the Clerks are now instructed to this matter so I hope to send it next Mail.

4. Par 8. With respect to sending the Reports of this Company from the commencement of the issue of them to the year 1867 inclusive for record at the Stanley Office, we should be happy to do so if possible but on examining our old papers we find they are not in existence, there is not however much to be learned from them as the Reports were very meagre and the Accounts not so explanatory as at present.

5. Par 12. It will be instructive to have the details of our Land leased from the Government and we trust you will be able to arrive at a favorable decision with the Governor respecting the rent on same, for as you justly observe a moderate rental would be better than purchasing large areas, especially as fencing same would be very expensive and as the Wild Cattle & Horses cannot be extirpated as in Laponia, very costly to keep in proper repair; still small portions might be bought in favorable positions to make the surrounding Land less serviceable to others, that is provided it is determined to continue farming on the Northern Peninsula instead of concentrating all our efforts upon Laponia.

6. N<sup>o</sup>. 316, 2. Referring to our last Despatch and my letter of 10<sup>th</sup> ult. about chartering a vessel for Stores and the first Produce home of next year, the Board of yesterday looked with favor on this proposal but delayed a decision until arrival of next advices, as the

word Fidalgo can be wired on 1<sup>st</sup> prox<sup>r</sup> to catch the present G.W. - Capt<sup>r</sup>. Seemann's proposal to reduce the freight for C°'s wool by steamers might have modified this arrangement provided our Steamer had been out to enable you to collect the large quantity of 500 bales for each of three consecutive Flomos Steamers, viz: Pakkarah 25 Feb 82 - Narda 29 Ap 82 - Theben 1 July 82 - this collection being now impossible we see no other means of getting our first Produce home than by chartering a vessel of 350 to 450 tons to leave London 20/30 Nov 81, arrive Stanley 30 Jan 82, leave Islands 15 Mch 82 to return here end of May next with at least 700 bales Wool - the 300 bales you state will be ready by end of Dec<sup>r</sup> could be shipped by the 'Pakkarah' and the 'Narda' could take what the vessel left out, but the Flomos C° ought to reduce the freight upon these smaller quantities, as it appears their anticipations of a large trade with Chili at the conclusion of the war will not be realized, the Managing Director having confessed as much and offered to make a reduction on rough & other stores by the 'Theben' on 11 prox<sup>r</sup>, this has been declined as everything must be saved for the vessel, except some few articles as perlist herewith.

7. Par 5. Capt<sup>r</sup>. Dixon has frequently asked to be received into our service and last month before your Despatch arrived he applied to command the Steamer, which I promptly declined so trust we shall not be further troubled with his applications.

8. No. 315. 13. It is most annoying that Despatches 585 and 586 were not delivered by the St. Menes since we are deprived of your remarks upon Mr. Garvey's Report (a printed Copy of this is now sent) and upon the proposal of Steam Launches for Steamer; considering that you would advise the latter I have lately been enquiring about buying a secondhand one or getting one built cheaper so that the Board might decide yesterday which course to pursue, the want of your reply has prevented this, though the Directors took into consideration a proposal from the Flomos C° to work a Steamer at the Islands, with a bulk, on shares, this I am ordered to decline, stating that we delay decision upon Steamer until your Despatch arrives, the uncertainty is however most unpleasant; we have written to the Post Office complaining of the non-delivery of the Mails: the whole correspondence with the Flomos C° is sent for your guidance - also the correspondence about the excessive freight charged for the Timber ft. St. 'Narda' on 9<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup>, their measurement being 3,290 cubic feet @ 4/- 85/- Ocean freight and 1/- Hamburg freight ft. cubic metre 243. 2. - whereas our measurement is 2,372. 8 at above rate 174. 13. 9 this difference Mr. Staude offered to have as a L 68. 8. 3 compromise, but we have offered L 20 in preference to telegraphing you to measure the timber, which might have led to complications with Capt<sup>r</sup>. Seemann about the cubic metre and would certainly have given you great trouble and some expense.

9. The Wool 140 bales of Mr. Ramses' arrived here on 12<sup>th</sup> ult. (The eschabale H & C having been discovered at Havre) and one bale Sheepskins - as so much Wool was coming home we thought it wise to sell as soon as possible so it was put up on 25<sup>th</sup> ult. and sold at fair prices from 9½ per lb downwards, all but 20 bales - Stickney's 110 bales was put up yesterday, M<sup>srs</sup> Hobare & Hudson have not furnished Catalogue so particulars cannot be given. The 'Dennis Brundit' arrived on 25<sup>th</sup> ult. with 981 bales Wool as per copy of Manifest enclosed - the 'Skudenesmae' is reported to have 1,000 bales Wool on board - 'Maldron's Britannia' with 468 bales Wool has not arrived yet. M<sup>srs</sup> Edenborough & Co's sale days account is sent showing the number of days they have at command, thus enabling them to sell Wool whenever the market is favorable, they have just sent M<sup>srs</sup> Hobare's Catalogue the ½ bred Merino fetched 10½, ¾ bred Leicester 9, ¾ bred Cheviot 7½.

10. The Black Hawk's Chronometer has been received, this is not entered on the goods saved from her wreck, further accounts of her loss expenses are expected.

11. Copy of Varda's freight note was not made out 10<sup>th</sup> ult. as it ought to have been it is now sent - also Vorwerk's Antwerp Nail Acc<sup>t</sup>. £ 14.18.8 They have been told it ought to have accompanied the goods on the steamer. Regret to find that the Junior Clerk neglected to procure Bedding & Utensils for Alex<sup>d</sup> Fraser, I trust he obtained them himself at Antwerp, the Agents there have not made any claim so he will be entitled to be repaid any outlay he may have made.

12. Enclosed is correspondence with M<sup>srs</sup> Parry & Co Eastcheap, London & Buenos Aires respecting some Mr. Dougall's Sheep Dip they wish to dispose of at the latter place, being 380 kegs, particulars are to be sent to you for your decision. M<sup>srs</sup> Morris, Little & Son have increased the discount on their Sheep Dip to 7½ per cent, they state it is now made stronger and improved by the addition of certain articles. We have been solicited to try Geys' Sheep Dip, manufactured by Geys' Sanitary Compounds Co: as per circular enclosed, this is said to be an infringement of Little's Patent, to avoid which they use articles which do not combine so well and the result is an inferior dip - M<sup>srs</sup> Blagden & Son of Buenos Aires, formerly Little's Agents, are now selling this Dip and are said to have engaged Mr. Austin Stickney as their travelling Agent who is to visit Stanley to push the sale, we do not think it would be advisable to have anything to do with this dip as Little's is reported to answer so well.

13. Mr. Holmested wrote me on 15<sup>th</sup> June last complaining of the charge of 5 per cent interest for money paid by us for his firm, he uses strong language, is going to object to it, I have referred him to you. Mr. Robert Blake has applied

for One Thousand Pounds (£1000) which will be advanced  
whim early next month.

14. You will be pleased to hear that we have been  
awarded a Silver Medal at the Crystal Palace for our  
Exhibition of Wool there "showing various qualities of Wool  
and gradual and very great improvement in breed" - as per  
Award of Prizes herewith.

15. From the London Gazette of 19<sup>th</sup> ult. we perceive  
that Mr. George J. Lazar is now American Consul at Stanley.

16. After some correspondence with Mr. Malcolm Bethune  
he informs that he cannot pay his passage out and that a Brother  
at Cape Colony wishes him to come out there and that his Brother  
at the Falklands was also going to the Cape, we had intended  
offering him a cheap passage by the vessel, but can now do  
this for Edward Sims, wife and 2 children, formerly with  
Greenshields & has worked for the C°, who has written to  
some friends at Stanley about an engagement there.

17. It is a pity that neither you nor Bumphreys  
have scut list of Timber obtained at M. Video, this would  
have guided us in sending a supply by the vessel, now we  
must ship the kinds usually ordered for we fear a cargo from  
Norway would not answer, enclosed are particulars from  
Limson & Mason - we may send a couple houses 24x12 made  
in London as before. It was hoped you would have sent  
particulars of the Hydraulic Presses for Wool required at North  
Arm, we can afford one now and this would have been a  
good opportunity, when ordering this may give full details  
of the one it is to match, as our two Hydraulic Presses are  
not exactly the same, so that all the parts may be inter-  
changeable, and the box exactly the same size to make  
our bales all equal measurement. Talking of measurement  
of bales of Wool we send statement showing that the freight  
money by vessel is much cheaper than by Steamer.

18. By Book Post we send Pamphlet of the Cruise of the  
Pr. Ceylon round the World, it being proposed that she  
should call at Stanley about 16<sup>th</sup> May next year. Col. Webber  
the Secretary of the Peter Oceanic Steam Yachting Co. referred me  
to Capt. R. D. Lusham about Coals, I have not been able to  
see him yet, should a supply of any particular kind be  
required we could provide it by the vessel.

19. Charts & Mail Tables have been sent to Capt. Bon-  
nie Clarke of H.M.S. 'Pappho' going to the Pacific Station,  
though the Admiralty have informed she will not call at Fr. P.

20. Messrs G. Marshall & C° cannot instruct about their  
'Sulphur' not having heard from Capt. Stap, they wish to put her  
with this C°, a Mail is expected tomorrow, we may be able to  
write on 8<sup>th</sup> for this Steamer at Bordeaux.

Sir, Our last was dated the 6<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup>, Duplicate enclosed. Your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 317 of 30 July was delivered in duplicate ex S<sup>t</sup> 'Gakkarak', the Original was received on 7<sup>th</sup> inst. ex 'Skudenesoe' - N<sup>o</sup>. 318 of 18 Aug came to hand as Duplicate ex 'Gakkarak' - N<sup>o</sup>. 319 and 320, of 19 & 21 Aug, arrived as Duplicates on 26 ult<sup>r</sup> from Montevideo by an Italian Steamer to Marseilles, the Originals came on 30 ult<sup>r</sup> from the 'Gakkarak' at Cavre - she brought 101 bales Wool for Stickney which has not been reported.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 317. 2. The Board does not look with favor upon expeditions for sealing purposes with any of the Co<sup>s</sup> vessels, & as the Steamer has not been sent out the proposal for the 'Fairy' to undertake such business falls to the ground as she will have to be most actively & judiciously employed in delivering Stores and collecting the Company's Produce.

3. Par 3. The charge of 5% for Commission on payment in London may be reduced to 2½ %, not being calculated where you have full control over the matter.

4. Par 4. With respect to the Insurance upon Mr Baillor's Wool the Underwriters would have paid any loss while Schooner borne and we should of course have claimed it but cannot now ask for a reduction - if the C<sup>o</sup> has made an error a small allowance might be agreed upon. Upon future occasions if outside Wool is only insured from Stanley schooner risk not being taken, proof will be required that the bales are sound when shipped at Stanley, otherwise there will be no proof as to when damage was received - this difficulty would not occur if insured against total loss only.

5. Par 7. It is unfortunate that the non arrival of a Steamer for Island service will prevent you accepting the Kosmos Co<sup>s</sup> proposed reduction of freight on Wool to England, since from your calculations & explanations this business could have been successfully carried out, we write later on about the Steamer but trust the matter will be kept in view so that early arrangements may be made for the Wool & other Produce of 1883.

6. Par 8. & N<sup>o</sup>. 318. We are glad to hear the 'Hilarion' has been loaded without demurrage, the bad weather

permitting working days for loading are always looked upon as a long time by ship owners so that if you really think it will be necessary to extend this time we shall have to pay more for our charters, perhaps you only mean such an arrangement for the Fallow or second Produce vessel which loads during the winter of the Falklands and her cargo is more difficult to place on board and stow, we shall not therefore make any difference in the loading time for the vessel about to be chartered for the first wool of next year, but if it is really necessary to secure longer loading time for the Fallow vessel to be chartered next January or February we ought to have the earliest possible intimation of this unless the arrival of an Island Steamer enables the Cosmos C° to undertake to bring home the second Produce of next year.

7. N° 319, 2 to 6. Due note is taken of the alterations at North Arm, which the Board trusts will lead to the better condition of the Sheep on that Section as the report upon Scab and necessity for redipping is distressing - with respect to Little's Sheep Dip the utmost caution must be used in substituting this dip for the old established Tobacco & Sulphur since Waldron's Wool dipped by it has not sold so well as expected, on learning from you that his Wool P. Britannia had been dipped with Little's Dip three times we wrote our Wool Brokers Messrs. Edenborough & Co on 19<sup>th</sup> ult. to specially examine same, received their letter of 7<sup>th</sup> inst. saying this wool was not approved by the buyers through its being impregnated with Sulphur, this we cannot understand having been told that there is no Sulphur in Little's Dip, can it be the result of the Lime & Sulphur Dip, tho' it is doubtful whether Waldron ever used this dip - Then again the Tobacco Dip has Sulphur but we are told that Flowers of Sulphur used with Tobacco does not injure Wool, because it does not chemically change or being mixed with Tobacco extract though with other materials it does - the report on this Wool is therefore mysterious and we hope you will use every endeavour to sift the matter thoroughly. Mr. Clay arrived on 2<sup>nd</sup> inst. P. R. M. S. 'Trent' and attended the Board the next day, giving some few explanations - he implies that without your personal supervision troubles will arise through the Superintendents being Shepherds risen from the ranks, whom the Scotch Shepherds will not entirely obey, it is therefore fortunate that you will be able to devote your entire, or almost your entire, attention to sheep forming through the management of an Island Steamer and the looking after Freight not devolving on you. We had arranged according to former Despatches to send three Shepherds by this Steamer and immediately instructed the Agents to engage three more, five were engaged but two have failed to come up, three left on 9<sup>th</sup> and we telegraphed to Scotland that the others might still come up to go over to Antwerp by Great Eastern Rwy this evening.

8. Par 9. Another complaint has been made to Graves about the Tallow Casks he supplied and the order to him for 300 more by the vessel has been stopped after he had obtained about half the number, his written reply is to arrive this day and will be sent on, meanwhile we must observe that the casks supplied by him arrive here in good order without leakage, are approved of by the buyers of our Tallow, save the Company money through the wood being already saturated with grease and thus not imbibing our Tallow - Mr. Graves must not be blamed for some being roughly shooked, which was done by my order from a large alongside when the 'Bilarion' had no more room to receive them whole, the Cooper's assertions that he could not put them together are only evidence of his laziness, and you must not believe him when he states he could buy such Casks at half a crown a piece - to show you that Graves is the right sort of supplier, Mr. Tuning, our Director who sells the Tallow observed when reading this paragraph that he had only lately recommended Mr. Graves to two New Zealand and an Australian Firm for providing Casks to send out for their Tallow home - however we shall now procure new casks from Harper and endeavour to pack as many stores in them as possible.

9. Par 10. The description of the success of Mr. Dean's Tallow Works is surprising, the Board depends on your carrying out your intention to visit same as soon as possible in hopes the experience you will then gain may result in our method being improved to the great advantage of the Company's finances.

10. Par 11. You have done quite right to draw our attention to the loss occasioned by the C<sup>o</sup>: allowing 5% interest upon cash deposited with them, which having money at command here bringing in but poor interest must be stopped; you had better therefore commence by giving notice that the interest will be reduced to four per cent (4%), to be further reduced at a future time if necessary, and give orders on London for those who wish to remit their cash here and arranging for others to be paid off, giving timely notice to enable Specie to be sent out, devising the cheapest means possible for this purpose, which perhaps could be done at a more reasonable rate through the River Plate Bank at Montevideo than paying freight & insurance all the way from London.

11. Par 16. You do not report <sup>that</sup> the St. Gakkarah brought from Sandy Point the Mail Bags not delivered by the St. Menes' 13 July, though we learn this from other quarters, when you write of answering N<sup>o</sup>. 585, 586 we imagined at first that she delivered the duplicates only which were forwarded in N<sup>o</sup>. 588, but the notice of Mr. Harvey's Report shows the Originals St. Menes' of 7 & 8 June - there has been great complaint about the non-delivery of the Mail Bags, six in number, and we fear the Fosnos C<sup>o</sup> will prove to be in fault.

Whilst on the subject of the Flosmos Steamers we have to report that the London Mail of 13 Dec next will be conveyed by the 'Luxor' instead of the 'Menes' - this latter vessel bringing home the Stanley Mail of 25 Feb next instead of the 'Sakkarak'.

12, Par 18 & N<sup>o</sup>. 320. After full and mature consideration the

Directors have come to the conclusion that it will be better not to build or purchase a Steamer for Island service but allow the Flosmos C° to establish a steamer for the whole business of the Colony, for their Agent as an independent man will be able to work such a business without the antagonism always displayed towards this C°, who would also be looked upon as monopolists by other settlers, and at a very much cheaper rate through the assistance in men & materials to be obtained from their Ocean Steamers, thus being able to charge lower freights than we should doing only half the business of the place, a benefit we should reap without any risk, for on discussion at the Board it appeared questionable if this C° with our own business only and the one or two small Settlers still our clients, the larger Sheep Farmers now doing their own business, could employ a steamer all the year round and the Directors were appalled (to use their own words) at the expenses and risk of such an undertaking. As the Flosmos C°'s Agent will be able to devote his time to looking after freight for their Ocean steamer through the Island steam tender we believe the Colony will progress more rapidly than if the C° or Mr. Dean undertook such business, and we have been informed that the latter intended to have started a steamer if the C° had established one, in which case it would not be possible for the Colony to support two steamers; and moreover the Flosmos C° have assured us that if allowed to commence steamwork and obtain our business, their Island Steamer is not expected to realize a large profit on itself but the charges for island freight to be moderate in consideration of the extra business such a craft will bring to their main line. Another consideration with the Board was that your time and energies would not be taken up with outside business and thus could be more devoted to Farming operations which are really the mainstay of the Company. This decided that our Bulk and Warehouses at Stanley are to be used for storage of the Produce collected by the Flosmos Island Steamer upon equitable charges to be arranged between Capt. Geemann & yourself - and that we as charterers of vessels out occasionally & thus able to lay down Steam Coals at a moderate rate are to supply the Steamer with coals whenever such are required at Stanley. The Flosmos Directorate are to decide this week whether they accept our terms as above and will then enter fully into all arrangements, and

into all arrangements and charges for work, which we feel confident they will carry out in a straightforward businesslike manner, for our Director Mr. J. G. Robinson, having knowledge of their conduct in transactions with the Pacific Steam Navigation Co. of Liverpool, has satisfied our Board that whatever business they undertake it will be performed in an honorable spirit. There is also another proviso, viz: that in consideration of this work devolving to them they are to send out a proper steamer directly with the least possible delay. With reference to your remarks as to the expense of moving the Co<sup>o</sup>'s Produce in the absence of a steamer, the Board are of opinion that the cheapest mode will be by chartering vessels at Stanley when required to support the *Fairy & Perseverance*.

13. We have been troubled by applications from the Board of Trade for Returns of the 'Black Hawk's' Crew and an account of the Wages and Effects of the deceased Seaman, they are now attended to, but the circumstance is mentioned as the Shipping Master at Stanley ought to have furnished all this information to the proper quarters here.

14. The 'Britannia' with Waldron's Produce arrived on 12<sup>th</sup> ult., copy of her Manifest is enclosed, also particulars of the sale of her hides & wool, the latter catalogue containing the sale of Stickney's 101 bales Wool ex St. 'Gakkarah' at Havre 29<sup>th</sup> ult., this consignment not being reported by you. We also send Manifest of Dean's Cargo per Bge 'Skudensnaes' arrived here on 4<sup>th</sup> ult., the Brokers tell me there is a large case addressed to myself, I have not yet been able to learn the contents. The 'Dennis Brundit' is to sail early next week with a full cargo <sup>of Stores</sup>, having been detained to receive 150 hds Bals. Ale of the new brewings.

15. The 'Gibraltar' cannot be expected until the end of this month or even later, she has a large quantity of Holmested & Blake's Produce upon the sale of which Mr. Robert Blake has instructed us to pay his Father Twelve Hundred Pounds (£12 00) being repayment of a loan made some years ago, and we are then to stop the half yearly payments of £20 each made to his Father: The Accounts herewith will show you that Mr. Robert Blake has drawn

£1234 19 8 (Twelve hundred and thirtyfour pounds nineteen shillings and eight pence) and he has this day requested us to pay Messrs Browne &c about Fifteen Pounds for freight by this Steamer. He leaves tonight with his family and some labourers and intended that one of his friends would charter a vessel for him with Stores out.

16. The Board desires me to say that you will doubtless bear in mind the extreme importance, now that we grant interim Dividends, of sending the Annual Accounts by the Mail of 18 Jan<sup>t</sup>. next - duplicates following by succeeding Mail.

17. We had arranged to send three Shepherds by this Steamer and on learning by your last Despatch that more were required informed our Agents to engage three extra, two had already agreed but have declined at last moment, those now sent are John Munro, 20 yrs, Wages £45 to 55 upon usual Agreement, through Hugh Campbell of Plewland nr: Duffus, Elgin, father of James Campbell - Alexander Walker, 23 years, £45 to 55 - Peter McPherson, 19 yrs, £40 to 50, these two through our Agent Mr Peter Fleming & High Gv, Dundee : each have a bundle of the regular Bedding & eating Utensils from Silver &c - they have not received any Advances & have each a large heavy box: the other three Shepherds we hope to send by the Vessel.

Mr Alan Kerr the eldest Son of the Governor goes out by this Steamer to join his Father & Mother - there are also other Passengers for Waldron & Stickney and probably some Rams for the former.

L<sup>r</sup>, This morning I inspected with our Broker Mr. Langridge the Barque 'Skudensnaes' 451 tons register, Capt. Hjelmsen, found her a very suitable vessel for our work and Mr. Dean having told me that his Son spoke most favorably of Captain and that her cargo of Wool was turning out in excellent order, a Charterparty has been signed at £1950 for the round, loading time here until the 22<sup>nd</sup> Nov., 65 weather permitting working days at Islands, with all our usual clauses untouched as per Copy of Charterparty inclosed. As this Charter has been decided on so late it was necessary to obtain plenty of time for loading here but we shall try to start her from 12<sup>th</sup> to 16<sup>th</sup> of next month, and as she ought to return here as early in May as possible for the Wool Sales of that month, we trust you will prepare beforehand to expedite her as much as possible - the Captain told me she is a good sailer having come here in 63 days despite a long continuance of easterly winds, so if fortunate in proffesges & your preparations are good she ought to be back by end of April. Should you find the delay of the round to Darwin can be avoided by loading all cargo in Stanley there will be a reduction of £50. The Cabin though small will accomodate four Passengers so the three Shepherds cargo and as one of those not come up for this Steamer is a married man his wife may accompany him, though I think both ought to be declined for not keeping faith with us. Having proposed to the Inter-Oceanic Steam Yachting Co. that we should supply Coal to their 'St. Ceylon' calling at Stanley 16<sup>th</sup> May next we shall certainly ship 100 tons Welsh Steam Coal, perhaps 150 tons if they accept our offer of 45/- a ton - 30 tons Guinny Coals in 80 cts, 20 or 30 tons Flake Salt, 20 tons having been sent out of the 'Bilarion' - a quantity building Timber from Arnold and from Millar - we were thinking of sending two Shepherds Houses but Mr. Clays says none are required. We learn that the 'Dennis Brundritt' may have some cargo sent out, that she cannot receive 10 tons Sulphur for Stickney, nor House, Timber & Scow for M<sup>r</sup>. Clymont, thus though we have not much cargo we may if fortunate be able to fill up the vessel with the goods of others. When we first thought of a large vessel it was supposed a large quantity of Wire Fencing and Wooden Posts would have had to be sent, but from Mr. Hearvey's explanations and your not ordering it does not appear that Fencing would be advantageous to us at present. Sir, We avail of this vessel to forward Duplicates of our Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 591, 592 of 11 & 12 inst. P. S. 'Theben' which left Antwerp on the 13<sup>th</sup> instant.

2. The Flosmos C<sup>o</sup> have informed us that they will undertake the business of providing an Island Steamer & have communicated with their Agent Capt<sup>r</sup> Beemann, who is to send various information, as per copy of their letter of 11<sup>th</sup> now enclosed, the Directors wish you therefore to consult and arrange with him for the best convenience of all parties, reporting fully for our guidance in fixing terms for permanent arrangements: you will perceive their remark as to the cost of such an undertaking which fully bears out the observations by the Board some time since, that they did not see how a Steamer would pay herself with only the Co<sup>'</sup>s business to rely on, so that we have done wise to hand the matter over to those who can obtain <sup>at</sup> the whole freightage of the Colony. The Flosmos C<sup>o</sup> report that as the right sort of Steamer has such particular requirements they may not be able to pick up a secondhand one or a vessel nearly built, so that if obliged to build there will be more delay than anticipated but they promise to push the matter on as quickly as possible.

3. The enclosure in Despatch 591 being Copy of Patent for Little's Sheep Dip ought not to have been sent, it was intended you should have copy of Analysis furnished by Mr. Little Jun<sup>r</sup>: as well as the ingredients used, the Patent particulars was only lent by Mr. Farley for my perusal, however you profess it is now and copy of Analysis is now sent as well.

4. By Telegram at Lloyd's dated Montevideo 10<sup>th</sup> inst. we learn that the 'Hilmorano' crew have been landed at Stanley by the 'Penrith' - this shows that advices to 14<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup> went on to Sandys Point and are due here by Pacific P.V. on 10<sup>th</sup> proximo.

5. Messrs Townsend & Spearing are in treaty with the Pacific Steam Navigation C<sup>o</sup> to send Passengers by them and have informed Mr. Saunderson that one of their partners is in the Colony, implying of course that they can establish a good business, we have not heard of this visit so consider it

The 'Skudenes' will probably have over 100 tons Ballast in her towards the Wool cargo, but we think she might require more so if no hides or other weighty stuff ready it would be well to arrange for obtaining ballast speedily. Thirty tons Salt are ordered, Mr. Clay who has just looked in, thinks fifty tons would not be too much and considering you will now be carrying out the Board's orders to exterminate the wild cattle and horses on Lafonia we may send twenty tons more at last moment if vessel has space for same.

Sir, We write by this Steamer to be sure that the Rosario P.W. 'Ramsey' will carry it on through the Pacific C° state that their next Steamer, by which we shall also write, will arrive at Sandy Point in time. Enclosed is Duplicate of our last on 18<sup>th</sup> ult. by Mr Dennis Brundrit which passed Deal on the 21<sup>st</sup> ult.

2. Referring to your 319, 19, we trust you will send Copies of all Photographs furnished to Capt<sup>n</sup> Caulley, Mr W. G. Little has kindly sent us a number of most interesting Photos taken by himself when at the Falklands.

3. We have only on 24<sup>th</sup> ult. had our notice drawn to the addition of the Maggie Rock upon the Admiralty Chart of Stanley Harbour through our being about to print off some more small Charts, it is therefore <sup>fortunate</sup> it was discovered in time, if it was known to you it ought to have been reported to this Office, a new Chart will be sent out, the Chart of the Falklands brought from Mr Bailey by Mr Harvey has this rock upon it.

4. We have received from Lloyd's this morning copy of Telegram from Montevideo yesterday about the fire upon the Bge 'Eta' and have written her owners the Swansea Merchant Shipowners C°, advising about Mails &c. This shows that the 'Denderah' had come up with the Stanley 22 Oct Mail. We are informed that the 'Cambria' is not such a bad vessel as reported at Stanley, on which report your letter to Lloyd's of 13 July last is founded, having received heavy repairs at Stanley before starting of which there is a good Lloyd's Certificate, it is stated that Capt<sup>n</sup> Jones had been badly advised in engaging a bulk at 5/- a day to store some Coals.

5. I regret to state that there are <sup>no</sup> news of the 'Bilarion', should she not arrive shortly our good intention to return the Steam Engine by the 'Peninsular' as expressed in the P.P. of N<sup>o</sup>. 592 cannot be carried out, tho' every endeavour shall be made, the latter vessel is loading well and if matters progress as arranged she could leave the Docks 16 to 19 instant, we shall be able to report fully by Mail of 15 inst. - should the Mail due 10<sup>th</sup> inst. bring orders for stores we must keep her until the allotted loading time the 22<sup>nd</sup> if necessary - we propose to secure three Shepherds for her.

The Chairmen and myself have just had an interview with Mr. Stauder the Managing Director of the Kosmos Steamship Co., who states that they will have to build a Steamer for Island Service, which they will use every endeavour to start hence before or by next May, she will be a thorough good and expensive vessel such a one as we could never have made pay. We are pleased to learn from him that the English Government have concluded a Mail Contract with the Kosmos Co. for four years until 1885, their Steamers calling at Dartmouth for Passengers and Mails out thence, this arrangement commencing next June.

Sir, Our last was dated the first instant for this same route we hoped to have received the Stanley Mail of 14<sup>th</sup> Sept<sup>r</sup>. by the Pacific P.W. 'Iberia' but she only delivered on the 9<sup>th</sup> instant a letter from Mr. Humphreys, as he reported that the S.W. 'Luxor' had brought to Montevideo on 9 Oct the Captain and part of the crew of the 'Filmodan' (who were conveyed to Sandy Point by the P.W. 'Uarda') we concluded she would leave the Mails, the 'Luxor' was due at Havre on 13<sup>th</sup> but to the present we have not received any Despatches.

2. The 'Sea Witch' arrived on 5<sup>th</sup> inst. having left Stanley on 3<sup>rd</sup> Sept<sup>r</sup>, you did not write by her though the sailing of the 'Bilarion' on 25 Aug could have been reported, copy of the Sea Witch's Manifest is now forwarded. The 'Bilarion' arrived on 12<sup>th</sup> inst., the Steam Engine was sent yesterday to Messrs. Robey at Lincoln, but we shall not know until tomorrow whether it can be repaired in time to send back by the Skudeneses. We understand that some Broker is endeavouring to charter a vessel for Mr. Robert Blake to call at a port on the West Falkland to remove a house and take it to another port, so our surmise about Hobmested & Blake separating partnership as reported to you is doubtless true. Mr. Waldron is going to charter a vessel early next month, his Brother shipped for him two French Merino Ramboillet Rams P.W. 'Theben' from Antwerp on 13<sup>th</sup> ultmo. Mr. Dean has sold the 'Sea Witch' and will probably replace her by a fast sailing larger vessel: he is going to purchase a Steamer for Island service putting Capt<sup>r</sup>. A. J. Wimber in command of her.

3. Mr. Glendinning complains that you did not carry out your promise to come onboard the 'Bilarion' to arrange his accommodation though she lay eight days in Stanley with himself and family onboard, it appears he only had the one cabin, on port side, with two berths for himself, wife and three children, though the C<sup>o</sup> had the right of the other cabin with two berths - the provisions also were not properly supplied as there was no light food or medical comforts for the children, we cannot understand why you

fixed the large amount of £35 for the provisions of these passengers and mean to complain and obtain a reduction for the short supply - another time it will be better to supply small stores from the Co<sup>rs</sup> own Store leaving the ship to provide meat bread &c. - to compensate Glendinning for not receiving wages as long as he might have done and the inconveniences on 'Hilarion' we agreed to pay his fare to Lockerbie.

4. You have not reported how Mr. Clay's Agreement was cancelled, whether by letter agreeing to this or by clause added to the Agreement, we have asked him but he does not appear to know so please send particulars.

5. We have written and sent Stanley Charts to Capt<sup>r</sup>. A. T. Dale of H.C.M. S. 'Diamond' now fitting out at Greenwich for the Australian Station.

6. With respect to the Cosmos Steamers calling at Dartmouth for Passengers and Mails next year, this will most probably commence with the S.V. 'Memphis' sailing from Hamburg on 11 Feb 82.

7. Through the Mails not arriving in time we have not been able to supply any Stores asked for by the 'Skudemas' and therefore ordered 20 more tons Salt and have accepted goods for Mr. E. Packe and a wooden house for Mr. Clymont and may get other goods for him - also for Gov<sup>r</sup> Herr - we hope she will leave the London Docks on 18<sup>th</sup> or 19<sup>th</sup> and sail without delay - we have three Shepherds by her, Mr. Packe sends one Shepherd.

Capt<sup>r</sup> Wildbur will give an order on M<sup>rs</sup> Ulthoff for payment.

2. Mr. Langridge reports today that M<sup>rs</sup> Sharp have taken up the 'Border Queen', 183 tons register, at £1,000 lump sum, London to Bill Cove and back and Shallow Bay.

Sir, On the 2<sup>nd</sup> instant we received your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 321 of 29<sup>th</sup> August, N<sup>o</sup>. 322 of 12<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> September, N<sup>o</sup>. 323 of 20<sup>th</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup> October by the R.M.S. 'Denderah' to Havre - thus bringing the two first Despatches from Sandy Point, which ought to have arrived here by the Pacific S<sup>r</sup>. 'Peria' or the Hosmos S<sup>r</sup>. 'Luxor' nearly a month previous - complaint has been made to the Post Office about this delay and mistake. Duplicate of N<sup>o</sup>. 323 was received from Mr. Humphreys at Montevideo on the 2<sup>nd</sup> instant by the R.M.S. 'Elbe' to Southampton. Enclosed is Duplicate of our last on the 19<sup>th</sup> ultimo.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 321. The Directors have carefully read and considered your able and interesting reply to Mr. Harvey's Report and I hasten to say that they never authorised its being printed or in any way communicated beyond their own Board, far less that it should have been sent to the Governor of the Islands; they were lost in astonishment at this step and have most strongly censured Mr. Harvey for so acting. The Report has not been circulated among the Shareholders else they would have printed your reply along with it. Meanwhile they desire me to say that they have never thought your character needed the elaborate justification you have made as to the leasing of Lively Island &c., which however may have been a relief to your feelings. You have fully proved that you acted in that rather on the direct orders of the Board and therefore the censure falls upon them rather than you. It is easy to be wise after the event and very possibly now the Board might hesitate to part with their own lands even on lease - but things were different in 1869.

The Board never entertained the idea of taking any action upon Mr. Harvey's Report until they had your answer to its various suggestions, of which indeed such

as the transfer into Lafonia of all the outside flocks and the retiring from Stanley, were far too rash and visionary to be seriously thought of and they are glad to find that you have so satisfactory an answer to this portion as well as to much of the rest of the Report; at the same time without in any way fettering your judgment (upon whom the responsibility rests) they think that as to the details of shepherding & other such matters, there are some hints worthy of consideration which they leave it to your discretion to adopt, if and when you see occasion. They are pleased to find that the suggestions as to the Woolsheds emanated from Mr. Clay or yourself and were already in process of execution.

But while the Directors decline to adopt the chief proposals made by Mr. Farver for remodelling the system of management, they feel it only just to him to say that they have read with much pleasure the interesting account he has given of the natural products and the physical geography of the Falkland Islands generally, and the useful epitome he has made of their Property which is thus brought before their eyes in a very tangible form.

3. No. 322, 7. The Board has decided to supply the Wire Fencing for Capt. Packe's boundary Swan Inlet to Island Harbour and will send 8 miles by the Tallow vessel at end of February next, and perhaps they may also ship by same opportunity Fencing to continue the boundary from Island Harbour to Fitzroy, say five miles more: and as Iron will never be so cheap as now and there may not be a cargo vessel until early in 1883, the Directors may deem it wise to purchase the five miles of Fencing for Lafonia from North West Arm to Fresh Water Creek - in these three cases the top wire will be N.<sup>o</sup>. 4 the 6 lower wires N.<sup>o</sup>. 6 Solid Black Annealed from Rylands, and the Straining Posts N.<sup>o</sup>. 4 and Winding Brackets N.<sup>o</sup>. 5 from Morton - you will therefore have to lay out your plans for obtaining wooden posts and swingers from the Straits of Magellan.

4. Par 8. As the Company has decided not to own a Steamer for Island service the Board think rather favourably of your suggestion for a Steam Launch for use at Stanley as you assert that if sent out in parts, which is necessary for the size we ought to have, Myles could put it together, so please send such dimensions & particulars as you deem necessary for ordering such a craft.

5. Par 11. Upon your explanations as to reductions upon and sale of old Stores the Directors waive for the present their intention to deduct 5 per cent for deterioration at end of each year.

6. Par 13. Since the debt on the Darwin Church has been standing so long and you report that the Shepherds and others for whom it was erected are not likely to subscribe further, we think it had better be written off as a bad debt.

7. Par 16. The Board has carefully considered the proposal of the Underwriting and Agency Association of N. 20 Bucklersbury to appoint you their Agent at the Falklands, but do not consider it would be proper for you to undertake such business, I have therefore been instructed to decline the same.

8. Par 18. We are extremely sorry to hear that the 'Fairy' is in such a bad state, being very old it would not answer to repair her thoroughly, she is therefore to be patched up sufficiently to do the work at present required of her.

9. Par 21. The enquiry about a small cargo winch to be attached to the Engine's Boiler has been sent on to Messrs. Robey; I regret to state that through all the parts of the Engine not having been sent from Stanley with it, it cannot be returned by this Mail as Messrs. Robey cannot make trial of the working after repairs, which is now delayed until the parts can be made.

10. Par 22. With reference to the difference in the Profits shewn in the printed Profit & Loss Account for 1880 and the account you made up, is caused in the case of the Black Hawk by the last insurance premium paid for her being debited her in 1880 in your books, but our having taken this into consideration made the accounts different: a payment for insurance makes the difference in the Store Account: the Farm Acc<sup>t</sup>. you say you understand. We do incorporate your Profit and Loss Account in our Printed Statement, but of course it must first be corrected in such a manner as to agree exactly with our Books, which may have items you had not received at end of year - your Account may have items we had in previous year which must therefore be deducted. We would here remind you how important it is that we receive a statement showing every item that makes up the balance of your London Office Cash Acc<sup>t</sup>, which we have not received to the present time of any value - we want a full list of items alone, anything you cannot account for has no business in the account, we trust to receive this document made up properly for the end of the present year - no item in the List ought to be entered as balance from previous year, the detailed items must be given making up the exact amount of the balance, otherwise the list will be of no value - it appears to us if the account is properly kept the balance can only be items which you shortly expect to see in the London Books and then transfer to Head Office Acc<sup>t</sup>, and all items would be recent transactions easily picked out.

11. Par 24. We have appealed to our Solicitors about C. H. Williams' matter, Messrs. Bonapras Bischoff & Dodgson's Letter of 7<sup>th</sup> inst., as per copy enclosed, advises that you should not take any notice of the matter until he actually commences an Action; enquiries are being made whether he was a Bankrupt before leaving England: the Office here has not yet discovered whether the interest was abandoned by the Board.

12. Par 27. There is no record here of Robert Hunter having been sent for by this Office or that he ever called here, neither the Directors nor myself have any knowledge of such an occurrence.

13. Par 28. A Silver Race Cup has been obtained from Messrs. Mappin & Webb, where you purchased one when in London, and enclosed by Messrs. M. Alpin Cooper in their case of Clothes for yourself - the cost £15.6 pases to you through Debtors at Stanley.

14. Par 30. Besides the Sheepskins not entered on the Hilarion's Bill of Lading there were some Bones and old Bagging, everything onboard being delivered - the Co<sup>r</sup>. Hides were 12 over the number given and H & B Hides 11 over. It is most unfortunate that the five Logs Timber were returned for there is no real reason for the complaints on them as Kemp's Certificate of 23<sup>rd</sup> Nov<sup>r</sup>. shows - fortunately Messrs. Ross &c will allow the amount paid for them less a reduction for the piece cut off the largest - others are ordered to replace them, it is very difficult to find a vessel with a Timber port nowadays, especially such a large one as the Hilarion had, being one of the inducements for taking her, and to pick up better logs almost impossible, as the few flaws now apparent have been discovered after they have passed through the Tropics once upon Coals and again in a hot wool cargo.

15. Par 31. The Directors have already sanctioned the use of Little's Dip so we consider under the reports received and the circumstances detailed that you are quite justified in giving it a careful extensive trial, for good numbers of Sheep are necessary to show the true effects of a Dip, I believe one of the chief benefits is that it waterproofs the fleece in a measure thus adding to the health of the sheep in the damp boisterous climate of the Falkland Is<sup>s</sup>: it can be shipped in casks at a reduction to  $\frac{3}{4}$  a gallon, if drums are returned fit for use  $\frac{3}{4}$  each will be allowed for them: we are to receive a cheque for the 20 gallons allowed by Mr. Little Govt. at the Islands for experiment.

16. Par 32. The Board cannot hold out any hopes of being able to pension old servants at the Colony having always allowed high wages and taken care of them in every way; it being necessary to make different arrangements with the Castle if the Smiths cannot be profitably employed in other work they must have notice to leave.

17. Par 38. We are most pleased to find that you do not consider it was wrong to send the Timber per "H. H. Ward" 9<sup>th</sup> Aug<sup>t</sup> last despite the heavy freight it cost, later on when answering next Despatch we shall go into the matter of sailing vessels out.

18. N<sup>o</sup>. 323, q. The Directors approve of the alteration made in the gratuity upon Dividend to the gathering of Sheep for clipping, and trust it will lead to a great improvement as to the eradication of Scab, for there is no doubt the sheep cleaned after dipping are frequently again diseased by those escaped at the gathering.

19. Par 15. Barrett's account of Graves' Tallow Casks does not make them to be so bad as yours, so he may have unnecessarily complained to you, this view of the case appears to be strengthened by Graves' report of 2<sup>nd</sup> inst<sup>r</sup>, now enclosed, upon the condition of the casks he supplied just received by the "Hilarion", which proves that they answered well - however if possible your suggestion shall be carried out to let Barrett obtain Tallow Casks for the next shipment. Little's Sheep Dip can be supplied in 40 gallon casks these would be capital for small stowage with our larger casks, provided they can be thoroughly cleaned from the dark dip for our white tallow, on which point we have written Mess<sup>s</sup> Morris &c.

You will be pleased to learn that the "Hilarion's" Tallow has sold very well, the different qualities being well marked, the Broker's Report of 8<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup> upon the third sale of 90 casks give instructions for future shipments, recommending that the Carcase and Kidney Fat should be melted together so as to make the whole quantity of Tallow hard and white and one uniform quality, so that the MC and MK marks are dispensed with, the NC MK mark need not be used, and there will only be the pressed, dripping and refuse to bear marks, all the rest being only marked FIC - this will much simplify matters at the Tallow Works, enable the Brokers to sell and advertise without distinctions and will be appreciated by Buyers. Another Iron Digestor Top has been cast in a stronger manner and sent by present Steamer with Mr. Alpin Cooper's Case as we had no occasion to ship, the freight for C<sup>o</sup> will have to be charged from their account to you: another new top will be sent by next Steamer or vessel.

20. Par 17. The Committee of the Free Church at Edinburgh who allow a small stipend to the Presbyterian Minister at our Colony, have written about a successor for the Rev<sup>r</sup> J. Yeoman and have been informed that the appointment is with the Colonial Office, from whom they learn that the Government Grant of £120 a year will be continued: the Board has decided

that it will be proper to continue our grant £20 a year and provide House, Butcher's Meat, Peat Fuel and Horses, when visiting our people, for a suitable Scotch Clergyman.

21. Par 20. We are extremely annoyed at learning that our Telegram Out N<sup>o</sup>. 21 'Fidalgo' to announce charter of vessel for first Produce has not been received - it was sent on 1 Oct last to catch 'Arancaia' the bearer of Despatch 590 which you now answer, arrived at Montevideo on 2 Oct was put on board that Steamer to the care of H. C. M. Consul by Humphreys, who said he should send a Duplicate by S.V. 'Galicia' to Sandy Pt: on 20 Oct, we hope he would be wise enough to send Triplicate by the direct S.V. 'Sheben' from Montevideo on 11 Nov<sup>r</sup>, though after all that Steamer conveyed full details of the Charter of the 'Skudenesæs' as per N<sup>o</sup>. 591 and 592. It is a great shame that the British Consul at Sandy Point does not attend to such simple duties as forwarding letters & telegrams, we believe the delay of the Stanley 19 Sept<sup>r</sup>. 81 Mail is his fault, the Post Office state that they have written to the Foreign Office upon this matter. However as you would learn all particulars of the 'Skudenesæs' about the 16<sup>th</sup> Nov<sup>r</sup>. (Telegram from Valparaiso 29 Nov to Lloyd's about vessels in distress shows she was to her time) we trust it was in time to prevent positive engagements for Wool home by the Thomas C<sup>o</sup> Steamers, or if not that knowing our views as to probable intentions you made a proviso with their Agent for alteration of terms in case of need. Though you observe that there was no order for rough stores I believe we did very well with the 'Skudenesæs' as she had good dry ballast on board, this you suggest for the Fallow vessel and it will be carried, for it is decided to send one towards end of February next with the rough Stores ordered by your last Orders N<sup>o</sup>. 54 and 55, shipping as much of the Fine Stores as possible by the S.V. Memphis of 16 Feb<sup>r</sup>. next though perhaps a third of each sort of these latter may be reserved for the sailing vessel.

22. Par 10. As further accounts of expenses & receipts for 'Black Hawk's' wreck have not been received we waived on 1<sup>st</sup> inst. balance of claim 1% to other Insurance as the Chronometer is in our possession and the Underwriters having declined to attend to Capt<sup>r</sup>. Campbell insurance the whole affair is now settled.

23. Par 27. An Hydraulic Wool Press for North Arm will be sent by the vessel.

24. The 'Skudenesæs' left Gravesend 22 ult<sup>r</sup>, passed outside Goodwins, put back to the Downs 25 ult<sup>r</sup>, was in trouble there on 26/27<sup>th</sup> for which we have advanced £50 (Fifty Pounds) and insurance of this against homeward freight, and sailed from Deal on 29 ult<sup>r</sup>. - She conveyed three Shepherds for us Walter Haig, 24 yrs, Wages £4 5s 5d for 5 years, with dog - Alexander Smith, 20 yrs, William Smith, 17 yrs, Brothers, Wages £34. 10. - a year for 5 years - on behalf of these two young men we pay their Father Twelve Pounds (£12) by four payments on 1 Apr<sup>r</sup>, 1 July, 1 Oct 82 and 1 Jan 83. Mr. E. Packe.

Sent a Shepherd Alexander MacLean, about 24 yrs, with two dogs, for whose fare and expenses he has paid. The six cases C. Packer's Fencing from Morton for which we gave Nos 7378 to 7383 were actually onboard being marked £~~10~~ 6, so that I had a great deal of trouble for nothing. We understand that the mate, a very careful man, thoroughly understands stowing Wool so you had better leave it mostly to him under a little inspection: The General Invoice has been increased to £4,748 5. 2 through Mr J. T. Morton having omitted to send an invoice for 2. 12. 6. If you can start her from Darwin, if she has to go round there, so much the better as vessels always make better passage home from this port, than when they call in at Stanley.

25. The Kosmos Co: are building a Steamer at Elbing on the Baltic Sea for Island service, she is to sail from Hamburg the latter half of next June. Mr Dean has purchased the St. 'Rane', 159 tons register, for Island service, she is said to leave England by end of next month under command of Capt. A. J. Wimber, late of the 'Sea Witch'.

26. The Kosmos Steamers 'Memphis' out on 14 Feb next and the 'Menes' home on 25 Feb next commence the new arrangement of calling at Dartmouth to receive and land passengers and mails.

27. The Board desires me to ask you to send here a copy of the Lease of Lively Island.

28. Telegram Home N<sup>o</sup>. 32 dated Montevideo 7 inst. arrived here 8 inst. 9.30 AM - "Federal avance filter Blanke-neese Dora Harmsen Bremen or Bottomry reply." - This shows that the 16 Nov. Bill had come up in M. Video. We wrote that day to J. C. Filter Esq. Blanke-neese about his 'Avance' - and to J. A. Harmsen Esq. Bremen about his 'Dora', so the present they have not replied, but learning from Messrs. Clod Routledge & C: who knew them both, that they were good owners and would accept their Captain's drafts and it being necessary to telegraph yesterday in order to catch the St. 'Cordillera' at M. Video, we sent at 2.53 P.M. Telegram Out N<sup>o</sup>. 22 - "Fictionist Avance Dora" - thus giving you permission to take the Captain's drafts for the expenses of these two vessels.

29. On 2<sup>nd</sup> inst. we received from Lloyd's particulars of your Telegram about 'Dora', 'Avance', 'Alumina' and 'Duke of Argyll', we offered services to Messrs. Montgomerie & Workman, Owners of the latter, but being in Dean's hands they telegraphed on 10<sup>th</sup> inst. to Capt. Handyside through the Eastern Telegraph C: Mr. Blakes vessel 'Border Queen' for Hill Cove passed Deal on 8<sup>th</sup> instant.

30. The Chairman having read Par 3 on Wire Fencing considers it will be right to supply the 5 miles for Island Harbor to Fitzroy, and the 5 miles for North West Arm to Fresh Water Creek so these two lots will be sent, with the 8 miles, by Tallow vessel next Feb.

31. The Wool Sheds and Wool in them at Darwin, Walker Creek and North Arm are insured for £8,500 from 1<sup>st</sup> inst. to 1 August next, upon same terms as Policy 516 for last year.

32. The cases by this Steamer are N° 7430 Machinery & N° 7431 Clothing for yourself, this contains the Photographic affairs you ordered from Ackland - the damaged Table Knives from your House sent home p: 'Hilarion', now repaired by Morton; all these 16 large 3 small being all broken off short at the tang must have been done by malicious foul usage, the Cutters have never known such a case - also a Telescope for Martin brought and repaired by Capt. W. Cheesman of 'Hilarion'.

33. Since writing about the Steam Launch I have obtained Miller & Pupp's Circular, Manufacturers of such vessels and forward same for your guidance.

34. This afternoon we received M<sup>r</sup>. Bonapas' Letter of his date about C. H. Williams' Bankruptcy, copy is enclosed.

35. John Henry Waldron were here on 25<sup>th</sup> ult. The latter told me he would leave England on 17<sup>th</sup> inst. but should call here during the Exhibition, but has not been so far perhaps he is not going yet.

Sir, Enclosing Duplicate of our last on 13<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>o</sup>: we have now the pleasure of acknowledging your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 324 and 325 of 15<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup> Nov<sup>o</sup>: last which came to hand on 5<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>o</sup>: - we are exceedingly concerned at finding that you did not receive our N<sup>o</sup>. 592 with N<sup>o</sup>. 591 p. Gr. 'Theben', as is was posted on 12<sup>th</sup> Oct<sup>o</sup>: and ought to have reached her at Antwerp and it contained full particulars of the charter of the 'Skudenesnaes' - we have complained to the Post Office about this non-delivery of an important Despatch.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 324, b. The Directors are still of opinion that the result will prove their wisdom in declining to own a Steamer for Island service, if you think the 'Hosmos' C<sup>o</sup>: cannot make such a vessel pay how can we, and if they have eventually to sell her to us at a cheap rate we shall learn from their failure how to manage better and the experience gained will enable us to make better arrangements - you will also be able to see how Mr. Dean's Steamer the 'Ranee' is worked and as there will now be two steamers at the colony, we need not fear very high charges for any work required: it is said the 'Ranee' is having her cabin enlarged 8<sup>ft</sup>: and will leave Liverpool at the end of this month.

3. Par 7. The Board approves of your suggestion to purchase a secondhand Yacht of about 100 tons register and will endeavour to send one out as soon as possible - we are told that the 'Fair Rosamond' has been well managed and has done so well that Capt<sup>r</sup>. Rowlands has been able to nearly pay off the money he borrowed upon her.

4. Par 8. We are exceedingly sorry to learn that the Accounts for last year cannot leave Stanley until 25<sup>th</sup> prox<sup>o</sup>, as the Shareholders will expect the interim Dividend to be continued we shall have to estimate the Island Profits to enable the Board to come to some decision early in April.

5. Par 9. It is most unfortunate that Telegram Ord N<sup>o</sup>. 21, being the word 'Fidalgo' to denote chartering of first Produce vessel here, was delivered nearly a month later than it ought to have been, however no ill effects have arisen thereby, and though you consider steam conveyance for the wool would

have been better we could not see how the arrangements proposed for this end could have been carried out; these are now modified according to Par 13 which states that it would not have been necessary to send the whole 1,500 bales by Steamer to ensure a reduced freight, we feared 500 bales could not be collected for each of three steamers: with respect to filling the "Skudeneskaes" we consider we did very well to do so with the extra timber and only  $99\frac{1}{20}$  tons of Steam Coal, of which you cannot have much though largely supplied with House Coal and if our hopes of the S.V. 'Altata' and 'Ceylon' coaling at Stanley are likely to be realized we were bound to make some preparation for them. The arrival of the S.V. 'Ceylon' is delayed until the 29<sup>th</sup> May next as per enclosed Time Table, the C. will most likely be appointed Agent. We send copy of our letter to Post Office on 23 Dec<sup>t</sup> about the Telegram not delivered and their reply of 27 December last.

6. Par 11. In recovering the value of damage to Wool no claim can be made when the extent of the damage is less than 3 per cent of the value of the bale: it frequently happens that the extent of the damage is less than this minimum allowed, but in some cases a damaged bale actually fetches more than other bales as the sea water causes the weight to increase in a greater proportion than the price is decreased.

7. Par 15. The Directors think it well to carry out the proposal for iron rigging and materials suitable for the repair of a 1200 ton iron vessel being sent out amongst our Stores, and have instructed that estimates be obtained, which if amounting to £4 or 500 are to be shipped, if above that sum the particulars will be sent to enable you to decide whether a much heavier outlay would answer our purpose.

8. Par 16. It is gratifying to hear that the arrangements to keep the Store well supplied have been successful, though we have been obliged to inconvenience you by not carrying out your wishes to receive certain stores by S.V. Through having to reserve them for sailing vessel, we avoid this as much as possible though compelled to do it occasionally. The last three Indent's N°. 54, 5, 6 are mostly for sailing vessel still we shall pick out some Stores for the S.V. 'Memphis' of 14<sup>th</sup> prox: and charter a vessel for our Tallow &c to sail end of Feb<sup>d</sup>, which will convey the furniture for your Brother George mentioned at Par 17, as well as man & wife and a lad for him. It has been considered better to order six miles fencing for North West arm to Fresh Water Creek, particulars of the four lots are enclosed.

9. Par 18. We are glad to learn that you have taken the precaution to have Bottomry Bonds for the expenses of the German vessels 'Dora' and 'Avance' - Telegram Out N<sup>o</sup>. 22 authorizing acceptance of Captain's drafts on Owners was obliged to be sent before hearing from the owners, who since then have rather demurred to meeting Bills - on the 30<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup>. Telegram Home N<sup>o</sup>. 33 arrived "Avance 700 fanatic ramses 8,000" which we could hardly understand as the 'Avance' was bound to New York, however insurance was opened for Produce by both vessels, also this amount for expenses of 'Avance', though there was difficulty in doing this as she has been in distress before and is an old vessel - now the Bottomry Bond for £700 is insured at the high rate of Ten Guineas per cent (£10. 10. 0.) we trust you have entered in the bond that this charge is to be paid by the ship, this must always be done - also Bottomry Bonds must be taken for foreign vessels, whether owners are known or not, as the commission for cancellation 10% if on the Continent or 7½% on London is a fair & low charge. The German Consul, as per copies of letters herewith, states that a Bottomry Bond had better not be entered on the ship's certificate - we consider that when a bond is given as collateral security the fact should be stated in the bond. We instruct M<sup>s</sup> Graal & Hengsterberg of Valparaiso to register our telegraphic Indicator 'Fletching' there, so that your telegrams can be despatched thence and we can wire there for you in case of need, they are told this day that all telegrams must be read and attended to by themselves, duplicates being forwarded by first subsequent opportunities.

10. Par 20. Arnold has been told to prepare Baillon's Woolshed for the Tallow vessel, if the arrangement to carry and pay for same at 25% was unfair and brought about by Baillon not being candid on the subject, same must be cancelled and fair charge must be made by your office.

11. P. G. The Board has read the Circular of the Bishop of the Falklands dated 4<sup>th</sup> Nov<sup>r</sup>. 81 about building a new Church at Stanley but cannot do anything without the sanction of the Proprietors, they will doubtless recommend a subscription at the next General Meeting.

12. N<sup>o</sup>. 325, 2. Your proposal to purchase the 'Gulper' for a bulk is good and the Directors instructed me to take steps to make an offer for her here, commencing at £750 and rising up to £1000, but M<sup>s</sup> Marshall are not in a position to do anything, as some of the underwriters have not yet settled & they say the whole affair is a deadlock - nor is anything to be done at Lloyd's most of the insurance being done in the North; since you say that the Egeria is always fully employed, the

Vicar of Bray is <sup>not</sup> mentioned, though N° 324, I states she is full  
of Steam Coals (late Despatches have omitted to name tons on board)  
and that such a bulk would be most serviceable, amongst  
other purposes in anticipation of storing Wool &c for the Hos-  
mos Steamers, the Directors leave the purchase to you, not  
mentioning a fixed sum bearing in mind how the 'Dennis  
Brundib' was lost through Dean purchasing that valuable  
vessel for a mere song by bidding a few pounds more than our  
limit - we wish you therefore to do the best as economically as  
possible, taking care to get a clean bill of sale for her as the Hosmos  
Co. have a heavy claim for salvage and the Captains & Crews  
wages and other expenses have been running on for some time.

13. We send copy of C. Thomas & Bro's report 15 Dec 81 on  
the Tallow ex 'Hilarion', confirming our Brokers advice as at N°  
598, 19 that the Carcass & Hides fat should be mixed together  
to make a uniform quality and thus have only one kind of Tallow  
with a small quantity of the inferior and refuse.

14. We were extremely surprised at receiving a letter  
from Mr. C. P. Clay dated 26 ult<sup>o</sup> stating that he considered himself  
still in our service - I had already asked him to show me the  
cancelled Agreement, neglecting to do so I wrote twice for this  
information, not obtaining same we asked the particulars in N°  
595, & as you had not stated the details of the cancellation of the  
Agreement between the C° and him dated 23 Sep '76, which of course  
will now be given; copies of his letter and our reply on 2<sup>nd</sup> inst<sup>r</sup> are

a certainty of her calling at Stanley for Coals being such a small steamer.  
Mr. Walter James representing Mr. Joseph Thomas of Haverfordwest  
owner of the 'Cambalu' asked me at Lloyd's whether she had  
left Stanley, I said she was not mentioned in our last Despatch  
but a photo dated 12 Nov last entered her name as being in the  
Harbour, we then met Mr. Dean who had not heard anything  
about her, on enquiry at Capt. Boziers office there was no report  
upon her - Mr. James considers Mr. Thomas' interests have not been  
properly looked after and that your letter of 13 July 81 ought to have  
been supported with proper evidence of her unseaworthiness or else  
the charge of sending her to sea in a bad state withdrawn.

Enclosed is copy of M<sup>r</sup> Rolley & Co's letter of 5<sup>th</sup> inst. stating they could supply a Steam Winch to be attached to and worked by the boiler of their Engine now with them for repairs at £76. 12. 6, considering that you do not mean such an expensive article we shall not supply it until hearing from you that such a winch would pay. We are trying to return the Engine by S<sup>t</sup>. Memphis on 14<sup>th</sup> prox<sup>r</sup>.

17. Enclosed are letters from Capt<sup>r</sup> Cheesman requesting that his Son now with the Co<sup>r</sup> Engineer may return to England in the 'Skudenesao', we have agreed to this if possible you naming the passage money to be charged if she cannot bring him. I believe he writes you about passage per Steamer.

18. This morning we received from Bullivant V.C. estimate for Iron wire Rigging for iron vessel of about 1200 tons register, it amounts to £452 but there is no mention of blocks, deadgees & sundries so it must be amended, at this price I should be justified in sending it by the Tallow vessel, they supplied the rigging for the 'Sussex' so know exactly what is required. The Wool Box for Flydraulic Pres<sup>s</sup> will be supplied by Tyler V.C. at £37. 10. according to your specification and can be shipped with the Pres<sup>s</sup> by Tallow vessel - by her we may execute any Pudent coming home by S<sup>t</sup>. 'Ramses', as Claude reports she is due at Havre 31<sup>st</sup> inst. As Iron is cheap & there may not be another sailing vessel for a year the order for iron has been increased all round, also the cheap bulky ironmongery. You ask for a first class vessel this time but it is impossible to get an English one with a timber port to take in such logs as were most improperly returned by the 'Bilarion' - we wanted to have tried an iron vessel but this requirement prevents it, perhaps one may be picked up with an unusual large hatch-way otherwise a Norwegian or such like must be chartered. It strikes me to observe that in asking for iron rigging you do not mention iron masts, if these are lost like the 'Sussex' and 'Duke of Argyll' how can the rigging come into use.

19. I regret to state that the Clerks have neglected to prepare copies of the late Reports and Account Sales of the Produce ex 'Bilarion' now all sold.

Sir, Enclosing Duplicate of our last on 10<sup>th</sup> ult. we report the receipt of your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 326 of 22 Dec 81, the Duplicate arrived on 31<sup>st</sup> ult. through Humphreys from Montevideo, the Original came yesterday by the G.W. Rance' direct to Havre.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 326, 2. It is unfortunate that you look with such disfavor upon the charter of the 'Skudanca' which appeared to us an absolute necessity if our wool was to come home after your observations as to the means of collecting it for the Rosario G.W.; and when you see the cargo she has it will be plain that it could not have been delivered at the cost you name by steam: if the stores mentioned are run out it must be through a sufficient quantity not having been ordered, and as we have supported you so well in this respect we do not see how this side is to blame. Through the Rosario Steamers have been calling at the Colony some time the supply of Stores is still in a state of transition between sailing vessel and steamer, and as Dean's and the Rosario Island Steamers will enable the Wool and other light Produce to be collected for Steamers to convey to England, only one sailing vessel will be required for the Tallow & other rough Produce, proper arrangements must now be made for this service and we must now request you to forward full particulars on the subject. Please in future give number of Sudent and number of Despatch instead of stating name of steamer bringing same.

3. Par 8. We regret to learn that the 'Theta' has gone to Dean despite her owners orders for consignment to the C<sup>o</sup>, regret to state that the Letter of the Swansea Merchant Proprietary C<sup>o</sup> ordering their vessels to us has not yet been found. The matter of the Card shall be examined and a new set printed.

4. Thanks for the information about Sheep carcasses for refrigerating Steamers, we have already refused an offer to send a Steamer down from Montevideo to obtain carcasses believing it was wise to refuse such business until it could be carried out thoroughly, because any mishap or undue waste of such shipments would damage future operations, this outlet for the C<sup>o</sup>'s surplus Sheep must some day be tried so pray bear it in mind, lay out your plans and furnish all information to this office.

5. Par 13. You may certainly depend on the Board's approval of your offer of the use of Land to the German Govt.

for the erection of their instruments to observe the Transit of Venus, Mr. Staude informs that their steamers are likely to take out the party and we are rather surprised the English Govt. has not yet made any preparations though perhaps this may be left to H. E. Govt. Flerr to arrange.

6. Par 15. We have observed the same thing about Waldron's Wool that there is a large quantity of locks & pieces for the number of bales, which must materially reduce the price obtained for the perfect fleeces, though full skirting is a very proper thing, because if an inferior bit of wool appears at the examination of a bale before the Auction, the price of the whole bale is reduced though the remainder may be perfect Wool, we are glad therefore to learn that you have issued strict orders about clapping & skirting the clip coming home this year.

7. Par 16. Your report of inspection of Lafonia is very satisfactory and it will be pleasing to the Directors to find that their decision to send out Iron Wire Fencing for Lafonia, North West Arm to Freshwater Creek and Adventure Sound to Bodie Creek, will prove so beneficial to our sheep farming operations.

8. Par 21. Mr. J. C. Filter has informed us that he would pay the Avance's Account, but to be on the safe side we have sent <sup>up</sup> your letter of 17 Dec last to Mr. J. P. Edwards H. B. M. Consul at New York with the Duplicate Bottomry Bond and shall wire or write if payment is made here.

9. Par 24. I should think the Board of 6<sup>th</sup> instant will adopt your suggestion for a donation to the Darwin Library, which might be sent out in books by the vessel but then the proper sort might not be obtained so perhaps it will be better to await list of requirements from the Librarian: taking an interest in the welfare of the Compy's people I collect and send many things, books &c and instructed the Clerks here to put up the latest edition of the works you mention which were not needed in this office, as they have sent such old copies I can only regret their behaviour.

10. Your Memo of 24 Dec 81 with two Bills of Lading of 147 bales Sheepskins and 229 bales Wool pt. P. Ramses' arrived on 30<sup>th</sup> ult. but I cannot say how it came before the Duplicate and Original 326 as the Envelope is mislaid - this has just been found & brought in to me, but does <sup>not</sup> throw any light on the point though it appears to bear the Havre postmark.

11. The Barque 'Cordova' Capt. Jones 521 tons has been chartered for the Tallow Ship to sail at the end of this month with all Stores on board 54, 5, 6, 7 (a small cow-

sigment going by the S.W. Varda' on 14<sup>th</sup> inst.) together with  
the four lots Iron Wire Fencing, Iron Wire Rigging for a  
vessel of 1,200 tons Register, our Steam Engine &c - as Iron  
has gone up we ordered before the rise an extra supply as  
we shall not have a vessel for another year, and have  
increased the Oils, Tars and such like rough cheap stuff.  
I shall propose to the Board to send One Thousand Pounds  
Specie (£1000) by her to pay off some of the Deposits &c  
on which we are paying 5% interest; for we have a  
plethora of cash here now and cannot obtain such an interest.

12. Enclosed<sup>are</sup> Phosnus Mail Service Table from  
the C. of the new contract calling at Dartmouth, Fahrplan  
of their Steamers for the present year and Post Office  
Time Table for this year, on these we must draw  
up a Mail Table as usual for the benefit of those  
connected with the Colony.

There are a great many more memo's on  
my list for next Despatch but time does not unfortunately  
permit me to write about them, but as this  
Steamer, being Dean's for Island service, cannot  
with utmost speed arrive more than four or five  
days before the direct Phosnus S.W. Varda' entered  
on our Mail Table for 14<sup>th</sup> inst.; but Mails now  
delayed until 17<sup>th</sup>. Through receiving same at  
Dartmouth, perhaps no great injury or inconvenience  
will arise.

Sir, Our last dated 2<sup>nd</sup> inst. went forward by Mr. Deans  
G.W. 'Ranee' but correct Duplicate cannot be sent as part of  
this Despatch was not copied or else the copy has been lost,  
we require therefore certified copy of that part between  
the words "Land to the German Gov." at the bottom of one  
page and the words "sigment going by the G.W. Almada"  
at the top of another page - the remaining Duplicate as  
far as we have it is enclosed: the G.W. 'Ranee' left Liverpool  
6<sup>th</sup> inst. had to put back and finally sailed on 9<sup>th</sup> inst.

2. The last heard of the G.W. 'Almada' was that she had  
coaled at Bahia - I was thinking it would be well to devote  
a codeword for ordering Coals should she or any other G.W.  
take a supply but find the words "famels" and "familiar"  
are already devoted to this purpose, in receiving an order  
through these words we should only charter a vessel from  
Cardiff or Swansea, or arrange with one loading there to  
leave a certain number of tons at Stanley on passing round  
to the West Coast. On availing of Valparaiso for Telegrams it  
must be borne in mind that Telegrams from there come through  
Montevideo costing 1.1.4 a word, the charge from Montevideo  
being 1.15.8 a word.

3. We presume M<sup>s</sup> Schröder & C<sup>o</sup> of Valparaiso & Piquique  
have sent you one of their circulars notifying that they have a  
house at Sandy Point, this might be useful on some emergency,  
though perhaps Mr. F. H. Midell, the Kosmos Steamship Agent  
would attend to business there better perhaps than any one else.  
Mr. Fraser of A. C. Curphy & C<sup>o</sup> of Valparaiso called here lately and  
said they would do business there at 3 per cent Commission.

4. In anticipation of the Kosmos C<sup>o</sup> commencing an  
action against the Ship 'Sulphur' for their claim of £2000 for Salvage  
by their G.W. 'Menes' on 15 July last, M<sup>s</sup> Marshall & Sons have  
requested us to become bail for the vessel, as per copy of their  
letter of 1<sup>st</sup> inst. herewith, and we accordingly sent Telegram  
out N<sup>o</sup>. 23 on 3<sup>rd</sup> inst. to catch the G.W. 'Araucania' at M<sup>rs</sup> Video  
"Bail Sulphur salvage action Falklands value of ship only  
not cargo or freight - Cordova 521 failure 28 February" and  
took advantage to add the last five words to notify charter

of the Barque 'Cordova' 521 so Reg'd, Capt<sup>r</sup>. Hugh Jones, for Stores out and Tallow &c home, she is loading fast just now but from the dilatoriness of merchants in sending goods alongside at first I fear it will be impossible to fill her up so well as usual through not knowing the space to spare early enough to order other goods, which will lead you to say we have paid too high a freight for the Stores which had to be shipped: since the charter your later observations on the subject have been different, the 'Trofack's' was mentioned as the sized vessel now it appears as if a smaller one would have done, but to ship the long Timber logs it was necessary to engage a vessel with a large hatchway, then again we had to consider passenger accommodation for Mr. G. Cobb's & Mr. Baillor's people & there being two cabins to spare we shall try to engage a married Shepherd for ourselves - also being iron there will be less damage to cargo both ways and the insurance is cheaper - & it was anticipated a quantity of cargo would be sent out for repairing the "Duke of Argyll", which has not as yet been decided. The Directors have decided to send by her £1500 Specie to pay off Deposits and purchase Land as proposed by you - £1000 Silver, in which I shall endeavour to get some Crown pieces, and £500 in Gold. Thomas Hardy formerly Cooper called lately to say his box of Tools was left at Stanley, if such is the case it ought to be sent home by the 'Cordova'.

We have been asked to procure Turfie seed and plants for cultivation in Ireland, as it would redound to the Co<sup>r</sup>'s credit to be the means of introducing such an industry for the relief of the distress there the Board wish to receive by the 'Cordova' some growing roots in earth or peat, as doubtless a little care on the passage home would enable this grafts to be propagated faster in this manner than by seeds, which ought also to come by her as well some be sent by steamers in succession. The loading days terminate on 25<sup>th</sup> inst. but most probably we shall be forced to avail of the two days detention allowed by Charter.

5. The last Board on 6<sup>th</sup> inst. discussed the interim Dividend which ought to be declared soon and regretted your report that the Accounts for last year cannot be here so early as we expected, and the Directors bid me to observe to you that you need hardly have gone to Darwin when required at the Stanley stocktaking for these accounts. The Silver Medal for the Wool Exhibition at the Crystal Palace last year was produced at this Meeting when I was instructed to endeavour to send a copy for the Stanley Office, and am now happy to be able to report that a bronze copy handsomely mounted under glass will go by the 'Cordova'. The office chart of the Islands has been perfected as to leased sections by the one brought by Mr. Farrey, but the list he received from the Gov<sup>r</sup>. Surveyor's office does not contain Nos. 6, 13 and 21, is there a mistake or have these numbers not been used: Mr. Mortimore points out that it would be wise to endeavour to exchange with Capt<sup>r</sup>. Packe his Sections 2 and 16 for our Sections 35, 38 and 44, which would make his farms more together without being

divided by our land and then we ought to buy Sections 2 & 16 from the Government as a beginning of the purchase of the North Camp or Choisuel Sound land.

6. On 3<sup>rd</sup> inst. we received ex St. Ramses' 229 bales Wool 147 bales Sheepskins and 1 pkge Wool Samples, which we trust have come to a rather better market. I was much surprised and annoyed the other day by being informed by M<sup>r</sup>. Edenborough C<sup>o</sup>: that they had not insured our Wool at the Warehouses here, this has been a serious omission and might have resulted in great loss, it is singular that neither the London nor the Stanley Office drew my attention to this, M<sup>r</sup>. Edenborough have now strict commands to insure in future.

7. On 1<sup>st</sup> inst. Lloyd's furnished copy of your Telegram about 'Bride', 'Rosolland', 'Leon Bespro' in distress at Stanley - we wrote owners of first M<sup>r</sup>. J. G. Boskin & Son, Ship Brokers, Padley's Quay, Swansea, offering to enclose letter p. 'Ranee', but they replied they hoped she would have sailed, though trusting you had advised Capt<sup>r</sup>. Evans.

M<sup>r</sup>. George Robertson Sons & C<sup>o</sup>: Tailmakers & C<sup>o</sup>: 10 London Dr. Fenchurch St. having undertaken a contract for repairing the 'Duke of Argyll' send out by this Steamer Capt<sup>r</sup>. Heggum and three men with materials for the purpose, and will forward a mast and other gear by a vessel which Mr. Dean is likely to charter soon (so they say) or by a small vessel going round the Horn, Mr. Dean has granted credit & entered into all these arrangements so do not think you will be called on except as Lloyd's Agent, Mr. Robertson has just reported above as we offered to convey goods by 'Cordova' but they cannot be ready intime.

8. The Cosmos C<sup>o</sup>: wish to arrange for use of Co<sup>r</sup>. Diving Apparatus in case of need for their Island steamer in preference to providing such machinery on board, we wish you therefore to come to fair terms with their Agent Capt<sup>r</sup>. Seemann: enclosed is their Mail Service Table & Fahrplan for the present year & Post Office notice of Mails out - unfortunately I have been too engaged to draw up the Mail Table we usually issue for the benefit of the general public, but must do this as soon as possible after the 'Cordova' has got away. We have requested the Agents at Dartmouth M<sup>r</sup>. G. H. Collins & C<sup>o</sup>: to send you by this steamer their cards and Chart of Dartmouth Harbour with particulars of their Coalting Station there.

9. After considerable correspondence Mr. J. C. Filter and the Underwriters of the 'Avance' agreed to take up the Bottomry Bond by paying her expenses at Stanley £ 994. 14. - Com<sup>r</sup>. 7½% 37. 6. 6 Insurance Policy £ 66. 11. 9 and on 11<sup>th</sup> inst. their Agent here M<sup>r</sup>. E. E. Wendt paid us £ 601. 12. 3, the Bottomry Bond was endorsed as cancelled and handed to them, on the understanding this was done in favor of a German vessel as we are Consul and for the credit of the Port, and M<sup>r</sup>. Edwards the British Consul at New York was informed of the cancellation - afterwards they wanted the interest of this Bond assigned to them to enable them to claim the 35 per cent commission and they have this day returned the Bond with Policy of Insurance and received back £ 601. 12. 3, we have

therefore telegraphed the British Consul to claim full amount of Bond.

10. The offers of several Yachts were submitted to the last Board, Mr. Mortimore undertook to examine two of them but I understand he has been presented to the present time. Mr. Staude told us that his sealing Sch. 'Kimrod' 92 tons Reg. was to be sold at Sandy Point, failing a purchaser there his Captain would bring her to Stanley for sale, from description I build, formerly 'Ernest' of Salcombe, she would be a very suitable vessel.

Sir, Enclosing Duplicate of our last on 17<sup>th</sup> instant I have now to report this vessel as leaving the London Docks this day with a full cargo - and are sorry to say that she conveys N<sup>o</sup>. 4466, 1 cask Coffee and 7,467, 1 case Office Sundries intended to be shipped by S.V. 'Uarda' at Antwerp on 15<sup>th</sup> inst., but unfortunately Messrs. Browne & C<sup>o</sup>'s Clerk omitted to give instructions to Brongate Wharf to send them over by the S.V. Baron Osy - we regret extremely the inconvenience and loss the detention of the latter will occasion but the fault does not rest with us.

2. We ought to have mentioned in our last dear copy of paragraph 14 of your N<sup>o</sup>. 326 about the Hydraulic Wool Presses was sent to Messrs. Hayward Tyler & Co. as they were preparing a Press and Wool Box for shipment by this vessel, and they advised certain parts and an Hydraulic Pump to be sent out to enable the extra parts you speak of being used for dumping Wool bales at Stanley prior to shipment by Steamers for London, as you will perceive by copies of correspondence herewith, in which you will notice that we have taken the precaution to arrange for any part not required to be allowed for on return here, it is hoped however that their ideas may prove to be correct so that freight may be saved by the extra pressing at Stanley.

3. Referring to our last, Par 5, the Directors wish to know the position of the Estate of the late Andreas Petaluga, for as he leased eleven sections of Land from the Government there is doubtless some that would be worth our buying whenever it comes into the market, and several members of the Board and of the Corporation are of opinion that the Comp<sup>any</sup> should purchase more land for the increase of our Sheep in future years.

4. Enclosed is copy of introductory Letter from Messrs. Cory & C<sup>o</sup> in favor of Capt. W. Meyer of the S.V. "Car-

-donyx" proposed to call at Stanley for Coals, which we have offered at 5/- - they also talk of the Hansa Steamers from Bremen to the West Coast calling at Stanley for coals - we must remind you that we are to supply the Kosmos Island Steamer, now named 'Malvinas', with coals, it will therefore be necessary to arrange some time beforehand with Capt<sup>n</sup>. Seemann the quantity and time for a cargo of coals for this purpose.

5. We have the pleasure of sending Bronze Copy of our Crystal Palace Wool Exhibition Silver Medal for last year's display of Falkland Wool, unfortunately the date 1881 does not appear on the little shield below the inscription but it is too late now to remedy this omission.

The Passengers by this vessel are Mr. and Mrs. Harrison and George Bowles for Mr. George Cobb, their passages being paid here, there is some Furniture and a cooking Stove for him freight paid here. Mr. Fleming, our Agent at Dundee, could not obtain a married Shepherd for Mr. Baillon, nor a couple Shepherds for us, as we intended to have availed of an extra cabin to send out a married Shepherd or two young men, though you have not asked for them, believing the increase of our flocks would warrant our doing this. The above three Adults are provisioned on our scale by the ship to save the trouble of extra provisions being handed to the Store at end of voyage. There is a large quantity of cargo for Capt<sup>n</sup>. Pack & Pack Bros. freight paid here - also Baillon's Wool Shed &c on which a fair freight is to be charged - these and a few Government Stores paid here have made her so full that a good number of the Tallow Casks have had to be stooked - we shall therefore do very well with her and satisfy my anticipations expressed in last Despatch. The £1500 Specie comprises the following Coins - £300 Sovereigns £200 half Sovereigns - £100 Crown pieces £300 half crowns - £230 florins - £350 shillings - £20 sixpences in various bags as per details on the invoice - there is an extra shilling in one of the bags to be returned by the 'Cordova' as it belongs to a packer named Hennett, reason stated on invoice.

7. The Mail irregularities have been partially explained by information from W. Staudt, who has been told by the Crown Agents that Mr. Collins the late Postmaster has been convicted of the embezzlement of post office letters and sentenced to seven years penal servitude.

On the 7<sup>th</sup> instant we received your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 327 of 18<sup>th</sup> January last, on the 18<sup>th</sup> instant N<sup>o</sup>. 328 dated 6<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> ultimo arrived - and we now forward Duplicate of our last by the Barque 'Cordova' which passed Deal on 6<sup>th</sup> inst.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 327, 2. The arrangements of freight to be charged by the Flissnos Island Steamer, now named 'Malvinas', must be left to you, with M<sup>r</sup>. Dean's S.W. 'Ranee' and the opposition you say the Island Schooners will make we shall not have to pay exorbitantly - the Coaling by this C° was arranged to be done as cheap as possible because it was considered vessels chartered by us would assist with our rough Stores out, so that probably fifty shillings (5/-) a ton would doubtless leave us some profit: as for Bulk for storing Produce collected for Flissnos Ocean Steamers, we thought a new one would be required & trust you will be able to buy the 'Sussex' for this purpose, as she would doubtless prove an everlasting depot for such storage.

3. Par 3. We are glad to hear the shearing is progressing so well, also the baling which is being pressed harder, this is wise in anticipation of the extra freight the Wool will cost coming home by Steamers. It is a great pity you cannot proceed in H.C. M. P. 'Dwarf' to Port Stephens to inspect M<sup>r</sup>. Dean's Tallow Works, as the experience you would thus gain might be most useful for our own Tallow Works.

4. Par 5. The account of M<sup>r</sup>. Collins' behaviour and defalcations is melancholy, it is to be hoped that after such a discovery the Government Office will be more carefully managed: Par 6. The Board gives you credit for the promptness in the explanations with H. E. the Governor respecting the mistakes in the Custom's duties payable by the Compt<sup>r</sup>.

5. Par 9. On the 3<sup>rd</sup> instant we were surprised by the Post Office returning our Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 595 sent on 15 Nov 81 by the S.W. 'Cordillera' to Sandy Point, where it had been put on board a French Steamer bound to Europe by mistake - it was then noticed that improperly N<sup>o</sup>. 598 did not contain Duplicate, though you have since received the Duplicate in N<sup>o</sup>. 597 by the 'Skudeneskae' - this original N<sup>o</sup>. 595 is now enclosed together with copies of the Post Office correspondence on the subject.

6. N<sup>o</sup>. 328, 18. It is quite new to us that it was arranged between the Crown Agents and the Gosmos C: that the latter should provide a steamer for Island service and we consider that both parties ought to have informed us of it, unfortunately your copy of the Agreement for this purpose does not bear a date, this must be obtained from Mr. Gaudie and should it prove to have been signed during the time when he knew we were arranging for building a steamer I shall blame him for want of candour - however it still appears to us that under all circumstances this Comp<sup>r</sup>. has acted wisely not to enter into such a business, and as the Gosmos C: must keep their Island Steamer until 3 Jan 85 they must surely work her at any freight to be obtained in preference to letting her lie idle, which probably the English Government would not allow.

7. Par 19. We are glad you have come to a decision as to shipping rough Stores by one vessel yearly which is to bring back the Tallow, this agrees with our ideas on the subject as already mentioned to you, also the despatch of fine goods by each Gosmos G.W. from England or as often as required, but I cannot understand your observation to send orders for these goods by each Sandy Point mail, this I think should be modified by all Mails bringing orders especially as the Sandy Point route is not quite reliable. We quite concur with your ideas respecting the coasting trade and have never had the intention to fetter you with instructions from this distance.

8. Par 21. The arrangement with Dean for contracting to coal the English Government Steamers at 5/- (fifty shillings) a ton meets with the Board's approval, for though there would not be much if any profit on this price, there would be other benefits accruing to the C: through often of War calling at Stanley - as we have already stated we must have ample time to execute such orders from Cardiff or Swansea by means of small vessels expressly chartered by ourselves, or a certain quantity put on board a large coal vessel going round the Horn.

9. Par 23. The Directors have already given their consent for the purchase of another Bulk leaving you to do your best in the matter, but I doubt whether the next Board will look with favor on your proposition to buy an old vessel fill her with Coals and send her out to be turned into a bulk at Stanley, the cost of such a vessel would be more than you anticipate, then consider the number of tons of Coals she must receive to make it pay, the expense of bringing the crew back & - still the matter shall be borne in mind, meantime in case of your buying the 'Sussex' or other vessel for a bulk we appoint the word "Fidgety", with name of vessel following if absolutely necessary, to be telegraphed to notify that she is "purchased for Produce Bulk."

10. Par 25. Doubtless the next Board will afford to your

proposal for a Steam Launch, 50 to 55 long, especially as you can now arrange for it to be put together by Myles if a composite vessel can be obtained, the frame being iron with wood planking - the difficulty will be to get it out through the Hosmos C°: said they would charge a reduced freight a fixed price was not named, and in addition to their charge we have to deal with the Gent. Steam Navigation C°: for taking it to Hamburg, then to wait for the Tallow vessel next February would delay it too long - it has just struck me that perhaps the Hosmos Island Steamer would call here for it as being of great assistance to her at Stanley.

11. The Cordova left the London Docks on 27<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup>, through mismanagement the Owners detained her at Gravesend until 4<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup>, we therefore gave notice on 2<sup>nd</sup> inst<sup>r</sup> that the two days allowed by Charterparty for our Passengers had not been used and would be available for us at the Islands. As Capt<sup>r</sup>. Jones declined to sign Bill of Lading without a clause being added to exonerate vessel from Burthen of Captain, Crew or Passengers, the same was sent unsigned and on 2<sup>nd</sup> inst<sup>r</sup> notice was given to Capt<sup>r</sup>. Samuel Parry, the Managing Owner, that we held himself, the vessel and all concerned answerable for this Specie - we have since been informed that such a clause would not exonerate Capt<sup>r</sup>. Jones as he is part owner. Upon further consideration of this Charter we wrote Capt<sup>r</sup>. Parry on 6<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup> that the Cordova could not assist with her Boats & crew, through not having a proper Long Boat and being untrained, consequently we should not be answerable for any delay at the Islands over the 45 working days allowed for discharge and loading, he replied on 11<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup> that we were incorrect, you will however find that she has not a proper long boat and that her crew, as per list enclosed, are old or young boys, the Carpenter told me himself that he had not been to sea for 20 years & it is doubtful whether he ever was a sailor, and the Cook shipped at Gravesend had never been to sea in his life, being of the full age of 46. We gave permission for the old deck planks to go out as Dunnage to enable a better price to be obtained for them at Stanley if possible through you - but noticing that when the Stores came on board at Gravesend there was a large quantity of Wines & Spirits for Capt<sup>r</sup>. Jones, for the shipping of which he did not ask our permission, particulars of these were obtained and I wrote him on 17<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup> warning him not to dispose of same as the Customs and ourselves were very particular with such articles. Another trouble was that Capt<sup>r</sup>. Jones telegraphed on 2<sup>nd</sup> inst<sup>r</sup> and wrote that the Passengers were not satisfied with our Provision Scale, we replied he must do the best as they had no cause of complaint our scale being ample and extra Cabin Bread having been added at request of Capt<sup>r</sup>. Parry - as usual we also put on board some bottled Stout for their use - and have since paid

Mess<sup>r</sup>s Darby & Meager, who provisioned the vessel, £23. 18. 5.  
One reason of the close management of the 'Cordova' is that she has lately been purchased by needy Welsh people, there are twelve owners, Parry owns 12 shares, Capt<sup>r</sup>. Jones &c, his relations to each & several two shares only, being a sound substantial vessel there is no fear of her doing her work well, and having now fully informed you on all points it will be your own fault if you do not insist upon the Charter being properly carried out.

12. Mr. Harnsens, the owner, has accepted the "Dora's" Bill for 969. 18. 11, 7½ p. cent Commission being added to her account instead of 10% as the Bill is payable here - the account of her expenses has not been received. This morning Mr. Edwards, British Vice Consul at New York has remitted draft 671. 18.- for "Avance's" Bottomry Bond, being the ship's account 497. 14.- with 35% Commission 147. 4.- added to it.

13. The Wool and Sheepskins ex St. 'Ramses' 3 Feb last have been sold at fair prices as per Account Sales enclosed, except one bale Cheviot Ram Wool lot 431, only 7¾ being bid.

14. We have already informed that the arrival of the Yachting 'St. Ceylon' will be the 29<sup>th</sup> May, this Compt<sup>r</sup>. is now appointed Agent at Stanley, honorary Agent, and the Steam Yachting C<sup>o</sup>: her owners trust she will enjoy the usual Yacht privileges as to port charges, which have been granted either at all foreign ports and they beg you will kindly arrange that the Passengers see everything of interest in the Colony: any Coals required are to be supplied at 46/- a ton by draft on Mess<sup>r</sup>s Culliford & Clark, 32 Great St. Helens, whose letter of 9<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup>. is enclosed together with our reply of 13<sup>th</sup> instant.

15. The Board has decided that it will be proper to submit Bishop Stirling's Circular of 4 Nov 81 respecting Subscriptions for a new Church at Stanley to the Annual General Meeting, which will be held towards the end of next June.

16. On 7<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup>. Lloyd's sent us particulars of your Telegram about 'Peckforton Castle' - 'Border Queen' - and 'Lady Dufferin' - which we consider shows that the St. 'Menes' arrived at Montevideo on 6<sup>th</sup> thus being rather behind her time.

17. The Directors wish to know when the last Montevidean Merino Rams arrived at Stanley, their cost landed and what steps you are taking to obtain fresh blood for the C<sup>o</sup>'s flocks of Sheep. We have to remark that the last Despatches have not brought full account of the Lambing, if not on the way here please furnish by return. The following Enclosures were not found in Despatch 328, Dup N<sup>o</sup> 327 - Dup Dora's acct - Dup Statement & Indent.

18. Mr. Dean has chartered for the round the Norwegian Bdg 'Bjornotne Bjomeson', 415 tons, with Timber and Coals and to convey for the "Duke of Argyll" iron Masts and other gear and rigging &c. The Indent for Stores N<sup>o</sup> 58 dated 18 Jan 82 will be executed by the St. 'Obis' on 21<sup>st</sup> prox<sup>r</sup>.

Sr. Obis on 21<sup>st</sup> prox: - also some Photographs presented to you by Major Caulley, who was afraid he could not send the Instantaneous Shutter through not knowing the size of your lens but Auckland can now procure it through my having furnished particulars of Ross' Lens sent you 5 Aug 81. Our Agent at Dundee Mr. Fleming is looking out for a married Shepherd for L. & S. Baillon, he reports that Wages are rising, we shall have to commence with £50, rising £10. in each year and that the married man will expect £60 to £70 - I proposed that the free return home passage should be omitted in our Agreements and learning from him that this will not make much difference our next engagements will be without it, as the fact of their being able to come to England free may sometimes induce men to leave us who would otherwise contentedly remain in the Colony: enclosed are slips of Fleming's Advertisements of Journeys through Scotland to select Emigrants, showing that from the business he transacts he is the right man for our Agent.

19. Enclosed is correspondence with Messrs. Vorwerk Brothers &c: of Hamburg respecting their Valparaiso Firm naming us as their Agents at the Falklands in all their Charters of vessels, and requesting a return to them of one third of any Commission paid by any vessel, to which we have agreed.

20. Unfortunately, an old Yacht has not yet been found fit to purchase, the 'Egidia' was examined but for certain good reasons is declined, the 'Hornet' is proposed, her age 28 years is however considered too much, other vessels are very high priced.

21. Some days since our new Mail Table was sent to the Committee for the Transit of Venus at the Royal Society, with offer of assistance for any men of Science going out to observe it on 6<sup>th</sup> Dec<sup>r</sup>. next, this morning we receive a letter from the Secretary of the Committee saying that they have no longer the intention of establishing an observing Station in the Falklands.

22. You have not stated whether the Store takes the goods from Gosnell 11.13.2 and Hindley 13.11.6 shipped ft. Hilarion 26 Feb 81, as these Invoices were not to be paid until you stated whether they could be sold to advantage.

The Board of yesterday desire me to state with respect to Par 3 of your Despatch 328 that it was very improper not to have written evidence of the notice to leave and termination of Mr. Clay's Agreement as Camp Manager - and as to the melting of carcasses and kidney fat together so as to make one quality of the whole of our Tallow, which Par 11 states cannot be done without extra expensive plant, the Directors cannot understand why the entire carcasses of the Sheep, without the kidney fat being taken out, cannot be boiled down in the Digesters whereby the two fats must certainly be melted together and they desire this plan to be tried, for it must surely be more simple than making a division of the fats, would thus save time and labour, making the Tallow Works more profitable and as we have already stated a better price would be obtained here.

2. Par 14. Another appeal is to be made to the Underwriters respecting the Insurance of Capt. Campbell's effects lost at the wreck of the 'Black Hawk', and if he will send in a more reasonable claim every endeavour shall be made to obtain some compensation for him.

3. Par 25. The Board has issued instructions to obtain a Steam Launch as near as possible to your description as soon as possible, it must however be built to our order which will take time for it would not do to pull a secondhand one to pieces to send her out in sections.

4. The Board makes a subscription of Five Pounds (£5) to the Darwin Library, if you will send a List of Books to be purchased every endeavour shall be made to get them out free.

Enclosing Duplicates of our last two Despatches on the 21<sup>st</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup> ult., we have to acknowledge your Dispatch N<sup>o</sup>. 329 dated 25<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup> February, Duplicate arrived on 3<sup>rd</sup> inst. F. R. M. S. Trent from Mr. Humphreys, the S. V. 'Henes' delivered the Original on 8<sup>th</sup> inst., being the first Flomos Steamer calling at Dartmouth homewards. This Dispatch was not numbered but the consecutive number 329 has been written upon it: the three Letters relating to Statement were not found, nor the address for the Remittance of £5 to Norway mentioned on Statement upon Accounts N<sup>o</sup>. 118.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 329. Your proposal for coaling H. M. Steamers appears to be bearing fruit, as the Admiralty wrote us on the 13<sup>th</sup> inst. respecting a Contract to which we replied on the 15<sup>th</sup>, as per copies enclosed, they now however state that there is no urgency in the matter & will write further on the proposition of one third North Country Steam Coals to be mixed with two thirds Welsh Steam Coals could hardly be carried out upon the small demand of 250 tons yearly, but we learn from other Contractors that they are not so particular on this point if the Welsh Coals are good.

3. Par 16. We are glad to learn that Capt. Hjeldeon of the 'Skudsmæs' has given such satisfaction and that she will soon be loaded with a full cargo, should she make as quick a passage home as she did out the Wool will be in time for the May Sales when good prices usually rule.

4. Par 17. It is so far satisfactory to hear that but few cases of Scab amongst our Sheep have been discovered, though with the present appliances of dipping and the character and quantity of Dip supplied this disease ought to be eradicated - The Board remarks that if the Lambing Account is really a complete one, as stated, the number 28,762 shows a great falling off in comparison to former years and full explanations upon this point are required.

5. Par 19. The Rev<sup>d</sup> and Mrs Yeoman came on from Montevideo by the S.V. 'Maskelyne' landing at Southampton on the 2<sup>nd</sup> inst<sup>r</sup>. - He has had an interview with our Chairman.

6. Par 21 & 23. No 603, 5 will have cleared up the mystery of Despatch 595 not reaching you, it is to be hoped the Mails will now be delivered with regularity.

7. Par 25. The expression "most improperly" may be rather too strong a one to have used with reference to the sending back the questionable Logs of Timber per 'Hilarion', and was certainly overlooked by the Chairman in reading over the Despatch, (No. 599, 18) as is his custom before posting it; but had it been of a still more offensive character it would not justify or excuse the highly improper sentence with which you have concluded the paragraph now under reply, the Board feel sure you only wrote it under a momentary ebullition of feeling and that you would never be so far forgetful of your duty as to fulfil the threat it contains.

8. Par 26. We cannot furnish any particulars of the 'Gufex' beyond the fact of her being advertised for Sale by Public Auction on the 27<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup>, it is extremely doubtful if the Board of 26<sup>th</sup> will give instructions to purchase her - if necessary to telegraph to catch this Steamer at Montevideo the single word "Fidgety" (already given) will mean that the C° has purchased her - "Fiducial" Dean has purchased "Fieldfare" the Cosmos C° - "Fieriness" that some one has bought her for fitting out, as there has been a proposal to this effect. Whilst on the Telegraphic Code please state the uses of the words "Fell" - "Felspathic" - "Felspar" - as these details have not unfortunately been entered upon our List.

9. Par 18. We have insured Baillon's Wool £2,000 p. 'Skudemas', 'Cordova' or ships from Fox Bay to London @ 30/- (Thirty shillings) per cent f.p.a col cl fga gar. Mr. Fleming has at length succeeded in engaging for him as Shepherd George Mackay and wife, who go by this Steamer, Wages not known yet - the Agreement is newly printed for our engaging for others as I do not like using the Compy's form for other Sheepfarmers, the return passage is omitted, and this will be the case with our future Agreements as per specimen copy herewith. You will find in the Times an account of Dr. Barff's new Antiseptic for Preserving of 1<sup>st</sup> inst<sup>r</sup> meat, some of which was taken out by Mr. L. A. Baillon and the specimens brought home by the 'Hilarion' 12 Nov 81 arrived in good order, Mr. E. J. Baillon stated their Firm had a royalty for using it at the Falklands - he called on 6<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup> handed

The two Photographs for which I am obliged: he asked for cash and was told no credit had been arranged from Stanley as ought to have been done, but that being one of the Co's clients advances would be made when he needed money. I can now report that Mr. Flay's Wages are £50 & 60 for five years, so the Agent has done well for Baillon and they both appear quite a better class of persons & leave Paddington this day at 5 P.M. We have arranged with the Great Western Rly that Passengers for the Flamingos Steamers on our account travel in first class carriages paying second class fare and in second class carriages for third class fares, though Mr. & Mrs. Mackay are not Co's servants & have for the credit of the Colony granted them this privilege, and we now instruct Messrs G. H. Collins &c: of Dartmouth to sign certificates on our behalf to obtain these advantages in travelling from Dartmouth to London for any of our servants you may send home, on your furnishing Messrs. Collins with their names & particulars, but it must be understood such privileges are only for persons connected with this Company.

10. The name of Dean's vessel was spelt wrong in N<sup>o</sup>. 603, 18, it is "Bjornstjerne Bjornson", Capt N<sup>o</sup>. A. Nielsen, she passed Deal on the 15<sup>th</sup> instant.

11. Referring to the payments of £12 a year for A.Y.: Mr. Smith, Shepherds by the 'Skudehaes', as mentioned in N<sup>o</sup>. 598, 24, their Parents state that they expected double this amount, being this sum from each Son, we told them therefore to write to them that they might arrange this with you.

Messrs. Thomas Paget &c: 155 Fenchurch St., have asked us to collect for them from Mr. James Turner £16. 12. 3 and have forwarded the enclosed Bill for this amount at fourteen days after sight, to which we request your attention.

12. The Directors have the pleasure of reporting that an Interim Dividend of Five per cent upon the transactions of last year was paid on the 29<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup>, the Annual General Meeting will be held in June when the balance of Dividend will be declared.

13. This morning we receive another letter from the Admiralty stating that the draft of Contract may be modified in any manner to suit and then discussed at an interview, should this result in a Contract being entered into and there is need to telegraph same for early supply to G.C.M. Steamers the word "fighting" will give you this information. Referring to Par 8 the business indicated by the word "Fedspar" has been discovered.

14. I can now report that the Directors have purchased the Yacht 'Hornet' 101 tons Register and intend fitting her out for Island service, she is now at Dartmouth it being undecided whether to make the alterations there or here, though I shall propose to the Board to do it here for the sake of careful inspection and as you state she will not be wanted until October next I think it would be well to delay her until middle of July to enable a useful composite Steam Launch to be built and sent out by her in parts should the Board decide to despatch her at once the rough steam piping and galley stove ordered by Indent N<sup>o</sup>. 59 ought to go in her, as such goods are surely not suitable for steamer freight.

15. The enclosed particulars of the Sale of the 'Sussex' was obtained this morning, it is reported that the reason of the sale is a difficulty in arranging with the shippers of the 1,500 tons Ynisfaio Merthyr Coals Mess<sup>r</sup>s Sir John Pirie and C<sup>o</sup>, but having just called there a partner Mr. Heriot says there is a likelihood of the matter being arranged, these Coals are on the Admiralty List and he said they burn very well in a grate, but even if we enter into a Contract with the Admiralty such a quantity could never be disposed of during the time they would remain in fair condition.

16. By this Steamer we have executed all Indent N<sup>o</sup>. 58 except some few Books which Burrows could not get ready in time as per list enclosed, they will go out by the mail P<sup>o</sup>. of 23 June. Office case N<sup>o</sup>. 8929 contained another copy of the Crystal Palace Wool Exhibition Medal with the date of 1881 upon it for your Office, the copy already sent being without a date is to be sent to the Darwin Library Room. Major Caulley sends you eight photos of Stanley and an Instantaneous Shutter for your Photographic Lens - also a parcel of Photos for Mr. Funziker. Mackay has a parcel for you containing amongst other things a package from the Zoological Society and one from the Meteorological Soc<sup>t</sup> addressed to you.

17. The Uruguayan Consulate states that a Consul will have to be appointed at Stanley and they consider you ought to apply for this Office, this appears reasonable to us especially as the C<sup>o</sup>. now get down labourers for the Tallow Works &c so your authority might prove useful to this Company.

Sir, Our last was dated 21<sup>st</sup> ult. by the direct P<sup>r</sup>. 'Pbis', duplicate now enclosed: on the 9<sup>th</sup> inst. we received your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 330, 13<sup>th</sup> March, in duplicate and N<sup>o</sup>. 331 dated 25<sup>th</sup> March, the latter's Enclosures being in order.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 330. The Board is pleased to hear that you have started the 'Skudensnaes' so quickly with a full cargo, which we trust will come to a good market though Wool is rather drooping at present.

3. On the 9<sup>th</sup> inst. Lloyd's favored us with Copy of your Telegram respecting the 'Mohur' - 'Fornica' - 'Utrecht' - and Admiralty Court decision of £1400 for salvage of 'Sussex': On the 12<sup>th</sup> inst. at 2.5 P.M. Telegram Home N<sup>o</sup>. 34 arrived "Federal Fornica Bolte Elsleth endeavour buy Sussex" - we immediately wrote to Mr. G. Bolte, owner of brig 'Fornica' at Elsleth, telling him that if he guaranteed payment of Captain's draft for her expenses Bottomry Bond would not be required, which could be telegraphed on 14<sup>th</sup> to catch the P<sup>r</sup>. 'Pbis' at Montevideo, Messrs. Browne van Panter & Geveke have called about the 'Utrecht', which they chartered, so we may get her business and shall include instructions in above telegram. For future occasions the word "Figshell" after vessel's name notifies that the C<sup>o</sup>. is to attend to her business taking Bottomry Bond for expenses - the word "Figurable" that we transact her business receiving Captain's draft on Owner.

4. Referring to N<sup>o</sup>. 605, 8, 15, the Sale of the 'Sussex' was postponed for decision of Admiralty Court and cannot be held until after arrival of next Mail, meantime the Board has decided to bid £2,000 with further discretion for a higher amount should the biddings run high.

5. It has been decided to decline for the present a Contract for Coals with the Admiralty as they will not guarantee a consumption of 250 tons annually the quantity they would like us to keep on hand, but as they would take the Patent Fuel, which once laid down will keep any length of time without deterioration, we may still be able to arrange the matter in conjunction with our supplying the Rossos Island S<sup>r</sup>. 'Malvinas' having enquired of the C<sup>o</sup>: if she will burn Patent Fuel.

6. We are informed that the Rev. <sup>W. H.</sup> Gill Phillips is appointed Presbyterian Minister to succeed the Rev. J. Yeoman, he is to leave by the S.V. 'Denderah' on 23<sup>rd</sup> prox: with Wife and two children 3½ years and 20 months old, he has asked us to take out his Furniture in the 'Hornet' which doubtless the Directors will agree to. We have heard that a Mr. Durose is appointed Schoolmaster but have no certain information on this point.

7. Numerous enquiries have been made about a Steam Launch without any positive result as there are so many difficulties in the way, the Steamers and vessels calling at the Falklands are too small to convey a small Launch and one fit to be sailed out costs a heavy amount, would be expensive to manage and would almost compete with the Flosmos C°, which would be contrary to the arrangement with them: having heard of the 'May Flower' 39 ft 2 ins long & inspected her as she was offered cheap thinking the Flosmos C° would convey her, but they decline naming a rate from London though if delivered at Hamburg or Antwerp the freight would be One Hundred Pounds (£100), the Directors think favorably of such a vessel to commence on and have instructed that full particulars be sent with their desire that if suitable you will telegraph the word 'Filament', which will mean that such a craft is to be sent. Then we had a specification from Forrest M for a Steam Launch 65 ft long costing £1950 being wood £75 more for yellow metal, to be sailed out at an expense of £200 to 250 perhaps more, if you think such a vessel could be made to pay telegraph the word "Filefish", - this launch would be upwards of two months building and nearly three months getting out. Another estimate was from Miller & Tupper, whose circular was sent 13 Dec last, for iron frames <sup>55 ft long</sup> and wood keel only with 2 Engines £480, four tanks & Donkey Engine £85, the planking deck &c. to be provided by us and put on at Stanley, this was the vessel which I thought the Board would order for the 'Hornet' as mentioned in N° 605, 14: should this meet your views and there is a certainty of the planking &c. being properly done at Stanley the word 'Filiation' could be wired, which would enable it to be prepared for the next Tallow vessel: it was considered at first that the planking could be fitted here to be bolted on at Stanley, but the shrinkage of the wood going out through the Propriis would prevent it fitting to the holes in the iron frames.

8. Mr. Robert Blake addressed me on 6 March from Hill Cove requesting us to pay £45. 16. 6 to W. Blake Esq on the 1<sup>st</sup> Nov: next and continue this payment on that date every year, which we have written him shall be done.

9. Mess<sup>r</sup>. Graafls & Hengstenberg have registered our Indicator "Fleetwing" at the Valparaiso Telegraph Companies. The Kosmos C<sup>o</sup> have not published the rates of Passage money for distressed British Seamen, nor is there a reduced rate for seamen leaving the Colony on their own accord, could you not arrange something with Capt<sup>r</sup>. See-mann their Agent at Stanley and report same here, as it would be useful if the Steam Launch should after all be sailed out, though we ought also to know it for the return of the Hornet's Captain and part of his crew, but this information cannot unfortunately arrive in time for her.

10. The 'Hornet' arrived in London from Dartmouth yesterday, she is now in dry dock for coppering, caulking &c, will have inner skin put in and some planks to strengthen her for cargo carrying, it is feared new deck must be given her, the masts must be shortened, also bowsprit, her rig will be made fore and aft like the 'Fair Rosamond', we cannot go wrong if we follow the example of Capt<sup>r</sup>. Rowlands who fitted her out well knowing the requirements for Island service: she shifts without ballast in smooth water being cemented between her timbers, though 10 to 15 tons iron Kettledge now in her will be sent to save ballast: we propose starting her early in July, perhaps even end of June to enable her to be ready for your work end of September, with an assorted cargo of Provisions, Clothing &c and any orders received next Mail, as the Indians 59 and 60 will be conveyed by the P<sup>r</sup>. 'Denderah' on 23<sup>rd</sup> prox<sup>r</sup>.

11. Mr. Botte owner of the 'Fornica' has replied the Underwriters at Hamburg will make arrangements for the repairs of the hull, which may have to be done at Montevideo on account of the delay and difficulties of proper repairs at Stanley, should we learn anything tomorrow it will be telegraphed: Mr. Botte requests you will advance a little cash to the Captain if necessary and his draft shall be promptly honored. Mr. Geveke has called about the 'Utrecht' again but as she was not included in your Telegram about 'Fornica' N<sup>r</sup>. 34 Home it is presumed she is in Dean's hands and he has gone to see him though he would prefer the vessel being attended to by us - should there be anything included in our Telegram about her of course you would hand it to her Captain.

Sir, Yesterday we sent Telegram Out N<sup>o</sup>. 24 "Fictioned 'Formica' expenses Captains - vessel Hamburg insurers not replied", to catch the S.V. 'Ibis' at Montevideo, trusting it would arrive in time as she may be there earlier than her published time through not coaling at St. Vincent. We hope you will understand same as if the repairs to hull are considerable Bottomry Board ought to be taken. Mr. Geveke has written the Captain of the 'Utrecht' but could not telegraph under the uncertainty of his position at Stanley.

2. Yesterday we received a letter from Mr. Humphreys dated Montevideo 19<sup>th</sup> April last stating that H.M.S. 'Firefly' had arrived on 15<sup>th</sup> with an enclosed letter which he forwards, this proves to be an envelope dated 1 Apr 82 containing an Admiralty Bill for £132. 4. 6, we presume therefore that your Despatches of this date may now arrive at any time. Humphreys states that you ask him to tell us the rates of freight for 1600 Welsh Steam Coals from Stanley to Valparaiso, Callao or San Francisco, which means that you propose doing something with the Coals in the 'Sussex', your advices on this point may arrive in time to enable the Board to decide something before the Sale of the 'Sussex' takes place.

3. We have just had an enquiry from Messrs Laws Surveyors &c, 101 Leadenhall St. and Newcastle about coaling the S.V. 'Miraflores' to be launched next week at Newcastle for the Chilean Government, being a small Tug going out to Valparaiso, and mentioned 55/- (fiftyfive shillings) a ton - it was stated that it depends on wind & weather & the Captain whether she calls in, as if the wind takes her near the Straits she would go through and coal at Lota or a port South of that, we hope by next Mail to be able to give further particulars.

Sir, Enclosing Duplicates of our Despatches 606 & 607 on the 16<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> ult. we now acknowledge your Despatches 332 of 31<sup>st</sup> March, received on 27<sup>th</sup> ult., N<sup>o</sup>. 333 and 334, dated 27<sup>th</sup> April and 1<sup>st</sup> May, duplicates received from Montevideo on 5<sup>th</sup> instant, the S. V. "Memphis" delivering the Originals through Dartmouth on the 12<sup>th</sup> instant.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 332, 2. We are glad to find that it is now arranged to engage only one vessel a year for the Tallow, Stores being shipped per Flosmos Steamers whenever required, our Produce being sent home by them as quickly and often as possible, you can therefore arrange this latter with the Agent at once.

3. Par 14. It is very annoying to learn that such a blunder has been made with the Tallow J. G. Bilarion 12 Nov 81 by mixing up the lots belonging to the Company and other Sheep Farmers, the matter is now being enquired into. The Board holds you to be correct in considering that the original Broker's Sale Accounts should be retained by us as the sellers, accounting to our Clients by our own statements or accounts.

4. Par 16 to 20. The account of your trip round the Islands in H. M. S. "Firefly" is very interesting, we trust the experience gained at W. Dean's Tallow Works, Port Stephens, will lead to improvement at our Tallow Works, Goose Green, at which there is no doubt considerable needless expense.

5. N<sup>o</sup>. 333, 5. We shall do our best to send some Coal Packs, 2cwt, in the "Hornet", say 100 or so for trial, but if expensive only half that number as if approved more could be shipped by the Tallow vessel.

6. Par 6. Upon your recommendation the Board granted Eleven Pounds to George Mercer for his passage home, being the whole of the cost as he travelled third class by a Pacific Steamer to Liverpool.

7. Par 7. The Directors do not look with favor upon the C<sup>o</sup> entering into the matter of establishing a Patent Slip at Stanley, there is a great chance of such a speculation <sup>not</sup> proving successful even in the hands of a private nautical individual, and no estimate of cost or feasibility of erection can be made until full particulars of proposed position, measurements of shore, depth of water, rise of tide, inclination of ground &c &c are sent from Stanley.

8. Par 8, 9. On reading that the Canvas was so urgently required for the 'Utrecht' the Board observed that they trusted a high price had been obtained for it — we have fortunately been able to ship by this Steamer all the Stores ordered by Ordents 59, 60 and 61, except a few Books as per list from Burrows — The Canvas is from the Edinburgh Ropery & Sailcloth C° as you particularly wished but is a very large order for a first trial with this house.

9. Par 12. We have again written to Mr. G. Bolte at Elsleith about his 'Formica' but he cannot come to a decision until further information is received from the Captain, we hope therefore you have been very careful in this matter as from appearances it would be risky to assist her: from advice lately received from Mr. Humphrey it seems Telegram Home N° 34 about this vessel was delayed over three days between Montevideo and London.

10. Par 13. Bethune's Cash was sent to Dartmouth to enable him to go on to the Cape by the Steamers from there: White brought home the birds for the Zoological Gardens and speaks in high terms as to their treatment onboard the G.W. 'Memphis.' I mean myself, family & other passengers: according to your advice we applied to the 'Hosmos' C° for a reduction of the passage money which is declined as the Managing Director's letter of 17<sup>th</sup> inst. Copy enclosed, states that Capt. Seemann had already made an allowance and gives good reasons for believing that Passengers are treated as well as possible on board their Steamers and we are aware that the Falklanders usually expect too much.

11. Par 19. From above letter you will perceive that the 'Hosmos' C° do not expect us to keep a stock of Coals for their Island G.W. 'Malvinas', on submitting this to the Board held on 19<sup>th</sup> it relieved the Directors of a responsibility and they decided not to enter into any Coal Contract with the Admiralty for the present. Messrs. Adamson & Ronaldson 34 Leadenhall G.W. have enquired if we could coal their G.W. 'Hansa', 3084 tons gross, proceeding to Honolulu, we gave a letter of introduction to you for Capt. Saunders and wrote that a moderate quantity could be supplied at \$1- a ton if an arrangement could be reported by this Mail, as they have only thanked us for the letter of introduction perhaps Mr. Dean has undertaken to coal her from the 'Sussex's' Coals. You have not furnished details of mode prevalent at Stanley for coaling Steamers, this must be done for future guidance, the price we have mentioned is for delivering the coal on board only, not even stating into bunkers as this would necessitate the trimming of the bunkers to let the coal go down, we presume bunker trimming would be expensive at Stanley from the paucity of laborers, though at the large coaling ports this is frequently

or mostly undertaken by the providers of coal and is generally expected by steamers - is the moveable Steam Engine used for whipping up the baskets or sacks filled with coals?

12. Par 23. I am sorry you should think I had not attended to your observation that you informed us of the Agreement for Island Steamer between the Crown Agents and the Flosmos in confidence, but am happy to report that no injury has been <sup>done</sup> by my asking the former for the date, which has not been given, and no application was made to the latter - the Flosmos C. inform that the charge for discharged Seamen to Montevideo is £3.10.<sup>m</sup> each.

13. Par 24. With respect to the Commission to be allowed to M<sup>r</sup> Vorwerk for the introduction of ship's business by them & concluded there was a regular allowance for such matters, if not you must do your best when any ships come from them.

14. N<sup>o</sup>. 334 & parts of 332, 3. The troublesome business of the 'Sussex' has been closed by the vessel and her cargo of Coals having been purchased by Mr. Dean for Five Thousand Pounds (£5,000) - at your suggestion the Directors were prepared to offer at the Auction £2,000 and upwards to secure her as a Hulk, but through the difficulty of her cargo M<sup>r</sup> Marshall were not able to put her up for sale, after many delays they purchased the Coals and then came to terms with Mr. Dean, who has further entered into a contract with M<sup>r</sup> Robertson to fit her out for £3,500 (Three Thousand Five Hundred Pounds) so that with the further charges sure to run up at Stanley she will prove a very expensive and risky speculation. Your proposition to ship the Coals if bought in small vessels from Montevideo to the West Coast might have succeeded, but we were warned that there would be danger of fire through these coals having been wetted on the 'Sussex'. M<sup>r</sup> Marshall consider you ought not to have given bail on the Coals and have declined to pay Commission on that amount, however the charge named 5% makes 2½% on the whole, which agrees with the views of one of the Directors, and as they have promised the money £14 82. 10. 3, as per account enclosed, shortly we must think ourselves well out of an unpleasant business.

15. We have made another application to the Underwriters on account of Capt<sup>r</sup> Campbell's Insurance in the 'Black Hawk' but have not obtained more than £30 and have therefore received £29.14.<sup>m</sup> on his account.

16. Alfred North formerly in our service has called expecting a remittance of Cash for his Horses sold by Saen<sup>t</sup> Pimm, Deen's Blacksmith, please make enquiries into this matter.

17. Mr. Edward Baillon has drawn some money and has ordered some Stores to go by the 'Hornet' for which we are to pay.

18. The 'Skudosnae' arrived on the 25<sup>th</sup> ult. and delivered

her cargo in good order, our Passengers spoke well of themselves and Capt<sup>n</sup> Hjeldein's attentions to them - the Captain brought a live Penguin which he sold to the Zoological Gardens - Capt<sup>n</sup> Cheeseman paid Twelve Pounds (£12) for his son's passage: she had a bundle of shooks onboard being imperfect being staves which the Mate says ought to have been landed at Stanley, it is gone to the wharf to let Mr Graves see the condition of some of the casks he supplied for Tallow. Her Wool was sold on the 10<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>t</sup>, the prices were not so good as anticipated.

19. The 'Dennis Brundit' arrived on the 9<sup>th</sup> instant, the parcel of Eggs addressed to Mr Montague Hughes-Hughes was forwarded to him as soon as received here: she is to sail about the middle of next month with outfit for the 'Puffex'.

20. M<sup>r</sup> Bindley wish the Lamb Notes sent out in February 26 Feb 81 to be used at whatever rate you think we ought to pay, or disposed of to best advantage.

21. The Company's Annual General Meeting was held on the 19<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>t</sup> when a Dividend of Twelve and a half percent (12½ %) was declared upon the Accounts for last year, we send you Copy of the Report submitted dated the 10<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>t</sup> and Circular of 20<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>t</sup> giving the Resolutions passed.

22. The Lord Bishop of the Falklands addressed a letter to the Directors from Stanley last month appealing to the Company for a Subscription towards the Cathedral he is endeavouring to build at Stanley, this has been answered by the Chairman, the letter being now enclosed to be delivered to the Bishop - you will perceive that a Resolution was passed at the Annual General Meeting authorizing a contribution of £200 (Two hundred Pounds) at the discretion of the Directors, who desire the following information for their guidance.

The total present Population of Stanley, distinguishing if possible the members of the Church of England, Dissenters and Roman Catholics.

The state and condition of the present building used by the Church of England at Stanley.

How many it holds, if full.

The usual average attendance

23. № 333, 20. Considering the advantages your Brothers enjoy from their connexion with the Company we do not consider 60/- a ton too high a freight by our vessel.

24. I called on 6<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>t</sup> at the Italian Consulate on behalf of the Comp<sup>y</sup> and yourself as Consul to express our regrets for Gen<sup>l</sup> Garibaldi's death.

The Passengers by this Steamer are the Rev<sup>2</sup> and Mr. Philip with two children, whom the Directors recommend to your particular kind care and attention as the Presbyterian Minister for our Darwin Establishment - Mr. H. T. Blissett, on Government account reported to have been in the Commissariat Department - Mr. & Mrs. Durose, Schoolmaster for Stanley, with his Daughter - Capt. and Mrs. Hansen with Nurse and two children.

The Stores are according to Prudents, with the order from Mef's Vorwerk Bro. & C° at Hamburg - were regret to report that two cases Tobacco from Wills of Bristol have been unfortunately left behind and must now go on in the 'Hornet', strong complaint has been made to the Brokers of the Glosmos C°. The value of these Stores is more than expected and as there were remarks at the Annual General Meeting upon the large stock at Stanley and in transit, which the Proprietors considered could not be required in such quantities and value, the Directors agreeing with this view desire that a reduction may be made by the end of this year for as small supplies can now be regularly and quickly delivered by steamers there is not the necessity for holding a large stock as in the time of sailing vessels.

26. The 'Hornet's' outfit has taken longer than expected, weather having much delayed work so that possibly she will not sail until a few days after the middle of next month, we are happy to report that she turns out remarkably sound and good in every respect but proves to be only about 65 tons Register according to the new measurement, this is however not quite settled yet. Unfortunately you have not given us any idea as to cargo for her, the Board has therefore instructed me to fill her with useful saleable goods, mostly provisions - a little cargo is being offered by others - the Rev<sup>2</sup> Mr. Philip's Furniture will go out in her to be delivered at Darwin free - time does not unfortunately permit of list being made out but bearing in mind your wish to have Prudents for Steamers executed as written we shall forward all next orders entire, looking upon the 'Hornet's' cargo an extra supply though when it arrives you will be able to allow for it.

Sir, Enclosing Duplicate of our last Despatch on the 23<sup>rd</sup> ult: we have the pleasure of reporting that this vessel is ready for sea and having been most carefully fitted out the Directors trust she will do good service at the Islands. On the 7<sup>th</sup> inst. we received your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 335 dated 24<sup>th</sup> May last, which will be answered after the next Board Meeting.

2. On 24<sup>th</sup> ult. Lloyd's received Telegram from Montevideo 26<sup>th</sup> June that the 'Star of Brunswick' was ashore at Bull Point and would probably be a total wreck, five of the crew drowned - and another on 12<sup>th</sup> inst. from Monte Video 10<sup>th</sup> inst. that the 'Capricorn' had got off, put into Stanley but damage not yet ascertained; this latter shows that the Gt. 'Ithaca' had got so far with our Mails.

3. Alfred North formerly in our service being very anxious to return has written to a friend at Darwin to be answerable for his passage out, should any application be made let us know if we can advance his passage money here.

4. In accordance with your wish we complained to the Swansea Merchant Shipowners Comp<sup>t</sup>. that their vessels 'Eta' and 'Theta' did not consign themselves to the C<sup>o</sup>. though their Captains had orders to do so, and now enclose their reply of 8<sup>th</sup> inst. stating that the Captain of the 'Eta' found his business could be done cheaper by some one else and as you would not lower your terms he went there and that the 'Theta' followed his example.

5. We received the sample of Glass figured but can not supply what you want as the size is not known.

6. I now give the following memos about the 'Hornet' for your guidance - gross tonnage 64  $\frac{86}{100}$  nett Tonnage 54  $\frac{52}{100}$  Official number 4560, Port of London - Letters J. C. W. V. - 15 tons 15 cwt movable Iron Hinkledge for ballast under cargo platform, this platform is to be lifted at times to let air into the timbers - the hold will take 50 tons weight & measurement, 60 tons light measurement - she is modelled, with good hair felt underneath, up to 8 $\frac{1}{2}$  feet forward, 11 feet 1 inch aft; 22 oz

Metal fore and aft, 20oz in centre, plan of this enclosed - there is a dumb cleat put under centre pintle of Rudder to prevent grinding of pintles - she sails best 2 feet 6 ins by the stern - has good suit of old sails, new suit made by Lapthorn whose plan and measurement of sails, masts and bowsprit is enclosed - a very excellent cooking stove has been put below in the forecastle, this space is rather large for the crew but we could not help it having to put a bulkhead just forward of the foremost to let the chains go down - there are two iron tanks under the cabin floor one holding 300 gallons the other 160 gallons Water -

7. We have engaged Capt<sup>n</sup>. John William Liddell to take her out at £15 (Fifteen Pounds) a month, engagement to cease if finding employment at Stanley, otherwise passage & half pay found to Montevideo for other employment there, failing these second class passage and half pay to London. As you have not given any ideas about the crew a Mate, Boatswain, Cook Steward, and two A.B. Seamen have signed articles for two years, some leaving half pay for their wives - she is provisioned for ten adults for ninety days as we hoped to get some passengers but there is only Mr. Campbell, Brother of one of Mr. Bonner's Shepherds who has paid Fifteen Pounds for himself and Two Pounds for his dog, he is a qualified Shepherd and hopes to get service with Mr. Bonner.

8. During the repairs Capt<sup>n</sup>. Champion inspected her three times and gave Certificate dated 29<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>m</sup>, copy enclosed, showing her to be a strong good vessel, but even with this there was a difficulty in insuring her, this is now done for Fifteen hundred (£1500) for one year from date of sailing from London at Twelve Guineas (£12.12.-) per cent, the Underwriters making a stipulation that she was not to go sealing, which must be attended to as we agreed considering you only wanted her for the Co<sup>o</sup>. own Island service.

We have the satisfaction of reporting that the Schooner "Fornel" left Deal early on 17<sup>th</sup> and passed the Start on the 20<sup>th</sup> having had the wind dead against her all down the Channel, but Capt. Liddell writes that she sails well and is all he could wish, which satisfies us that she is a really good vessel: enclosed is Duplicate of Despatch by her dated the 14<sup>th</sup> instant.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 335, 2. The Directors are extremely pleased to

hear you speak so confidently about the eradication of Scab in our flocks taking place so soon and trust your anticipations may be verified, still they must counsel the necessity of constant and careful dipping to keep the Sheep clean & healthy, especially as the Dip now used, Little's, is not so expensive as former preventives and appears to have a beneficial influence upon the Wool, which was not the case with the other remedies. With respect to the Lambing having been reduced upon Walker Creek and Darwin Sections. To prevent these lands being overstocked, the Board is rather surprised to learn that any of the farms are likely at present to be overstocked, but if a reduction of Sheep upon them was absolutely needful, would it not have been better to kill off more wethers and older ewes thus allowing the younger ewes to breed, as the lamb not born one year cannot be produced hereafter, and this breeding would also have had the good effect of fining our wool, so much needed, since you report we are now crossing with Merinos and other fine woolled Rams.

3. Par 3. The Directors are satisfied with your explanations upon their disapproval of your remarks upon the loss of Timber being returned, as you acknowledge that their censure was temperate though necessary.

4. Par 5. We consider you should furnish an estimate of the amount we should be justified in advancing <sup>in</sup> Cash to one of our clients visiting England, for though it is true as you observe that we have a knowledge of his account with the C° through the copies of your books sent home, it is beyond our power to estimate the expenses of his Farm and the advances to be made at Stanley during his stay in England, please therefore advise in future.

5. Par 6. We are indeed surprised at the purchase of the Sch. 'Nimrod' but from explanations it appears to be a good speculation and we trust a large profit will be made on the sale, which we presume must take place, for though our 'Fioneer' is smaller than we endeavoured to obtain, her speed and handlings will enable her to do a lot of work and we are morally bound to support the Flossen Island Gov. 'Malvina's'. I have just returned from inspecting this vessel at Hamburg and found her to be very strongly built, excellent accommodation for first and second class passengers, large cargo space, quick steamer, full power for towing, a centrifugal pump for salvage operations, moderate consumption of coal, improved arrangement for water ballast and fitted out with the utmost care, so she will be a credit to the Colony and we wish her every success, believing that steam is now a necessity of the day and that she will improve the place. She will be commanded by Capt<sup>r</sup>. Meyer who was Chief Officer of the Gov. 'Theben' being thus acquainted with Stanley, she is intended to leave Hamburg on 27<sup>th</sup> inst. going direct only calling at St. Vincent for coals, anticipated passage 33 days, and will carry duplicate of this Despatch: enclosed are some tariffs of charges for passengers & cargo round the Islands.

6. Par 8. As Capt<sup>r</sup>. Packe considers he cannot exchange land with the C° will he negotiate for the sale of his land contiguous to ours, for some of the Directors think it would be highly advisable to obtain the four sections he rents so that the C° would then hold the whole block of land South of the Wickham Heights.

7. Par 10. Whatever may have been the instructions about Tallow when we were making Greaves you are now to attend to the order to make only one kind of Tallow by boiling together the different proper fats. Par 12. We regret to learn that the number of Sheep boiled down is so small as we had trusted to a large increase in this portion of the Co°'s work, the observations at par 2 being thus confirmed.

8. Par 11. Three iron beams have been ordered for the next Steamer but cannot be supplied of the exact size entered on the plan, Mess<sup>r</sup>. Rowson assure us they will be suitable for the reservoir at Goose Green though further details of their use, gallons of water to support &c. &c. ought to have been furnished.

9. Par 13. The letter addressed to Mr. Martin has been sent to Mess<sup>r</sup>. D. H. Dade & C°, New Church Gov. Bermondsey, the address which it bore, we do not know consider you were entitled to return it whatever high sounding title they may have bestowed on Mr. Martin.

10. We have as usual favored your Father with a Copy of our last Annual General Report.

13. Par<sup>t</sup>. Upon further consideration we do not think it will be advisable to enter into the Uruguayan Consulate as affairs there are so changeable.

Sir, Our last went by the S.V. 'Cordillera' through Sandy Point, Duplicate being sent by S.V. 'Malvinas', which passed Dover on 5<sup>th</sup> inst. bound to Stanley direct.

Your Despatch N. 336 ff. 'Formica' to Montevideo arrived on the 1<sup>st</sup> inst. by the R. M. S. 'Neva' to Southampton; on the 10<sup>th</sup> instant we received Duplicates of N. 337 and 338 from Montevideo through Humphreys by S.V. 'Leibnitz' to Southampton, the S.V. 'Theben' delivered the Originals the next day, having arrived at Dartmouth on her appointed day.

2. N. 336, 3. We regret to learn that the Consignees of various cargo by the 'Cordova' taken to oblige their friends on this side should have given trouble about receiving it, in future separate Bills of Lading must be issued with the clause you recommend upon them.

3. Par 7. We think it would lead to good results to offer prizes for the best sorted, skirted and rolled up Wool between our three clipping stations as you recommend, and care shall be taken to instruct the Brokers to give a decision on the point, though perhaps it may have been decided by the buyers as the bales are not thoroughly opened at the Dock warehouses.

4. Par 9. We are sorry to hear that M<sup>s</sup>rs. Dean have broken the rule of charging one penny a pound weight upon hay pressed Wool, thus necessitating our returning a  $\frac{1}{4}$  per lb to M<sup>s</sup>rs. Bonner & Baillon, we must however go with the times as freights are becoming reduced and as all outside cargo carried for others helps to reduce the freight on our produce, we must be content to do the best as circumstances arise.

5. Par 10. The barb iron Wire fencing shall be obtained for the next direct Steamer ab<sup>o</sup> the Copper Coin - this Steamer carries all the last Indent N. 3 with the exception of some smoking Pipes as per memos, and the numbers commence at 1. As your indents are now num-

 now affix our number but refer to them by your number.  
 The 'Dennis Brundritt' passed Beacky Head 31<sup>st</sup> ult<sup>r</sup>. with Stores  
 for W<sup>r</sup> Dean and sundry outfit for his purchased vessel 'Sussex'.

6. Par 10. As you command the payment of £750  
 to Mr. Blake as ordered by statement N<sup>o</sup>. 120 I may inform  
 you that Messrs H & J. Sharpe called on the 24<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup>. to say  
 it was not required. Mr. Blake Gen<sup>r</sup> has been told of the  
 £400 to be paid him on 15<sup>th</sup> proximo.

7. Par 15, 16. The Board wishes you to bear in mind  
 their desire to obtain some of Capt<sup>r</sup>. Packe's land, viz Sections 2  
 15, 16 & 17 to make our block of Land South of Wickham Heights  
 a ring fence as it were - and the Directors certainly consider that  
 a portion of the Government Leased Land ought to be purchased  
 every year as you state it can be done under the leases, and  
 though the Colonial Office object to this you are to bring the  
 matter to an issue by asserting our rights. It has doubtless been  
 a mistake not to have secured some land on West Falkland where  
 it and the climate are so much better than Lafonia, but since  
 that Island is now closed we ought to obtain land whenever  
 possible for the future increase of our flocks of Sheep.

8. Par 17. It is good that you have arranged for the  
 Hormos Steamers to bring home our Wool next year, it will  
 be covered by Insurance as formerly, each shipment is to  
 bring an account of the manner in which the wool has been  
 brought to Stanley from the outports.

9. N<sup>o</sup>. 337, 2, 3. The matter of raising extra Revenue  
 must be left to be decided by the Colonists, the Directors  
 considering that you have protected this Co<sup>r</sup>'s interests by  
 urging that the tax should be on Land and not upon Wool,  
 we await the result with interest and if likely to be deferred  
 we ought to be furnished with an estimate of our share as this  
 would be a direct reduction of income. It is natural that the  
 Colonists should expect to have a voice in the expenditure when  
 they provide the funds, this we must defer to their united  
 judgment counselling as little direct opposition as possible  
 to the ruling authorities.

10. Par 9. For the present we must be content to pay 2½  
 interest on Deposits though our spare cash here does not produce that  
 interest, according to your accounts we are answerable for 3892.10.11  
 at the end of March which must be reduced whenever possible.  
 We are not able to advise as to investing small amounts being  
 the savings of our employes.

11. Par 11, 12. It is satisfactory to learn that the condition  
 of the 'Cordova' has improved so much since leaving London, and

that you find Capt<sup>m</sup>. Jones different to what he was here, I believe his partner exercised too much influence over him & prevented his proper management of the vessel. We regret to find you take so many exceptions to her cargo, we did the best in providing Stores for a larger ship than anticipated and if certain goods are in too large quantity consumption should be induced by a lowering of price whenever they are sent out because there was space, as in such instances they need not be charged full freight: to prevent complaint in future and relieve us from considerable difficulty we trust full & explicit instructions will be sent for the cargo of the Tallow ship next February: your suggestions for a cargo for the 'J. Cornet' arrived in last Despatch but too late as she had sailed some time.

12. Par 20. We took it for granted that the Rev<sup>r</sup>. W. H. Phillips is to reside at the Co's establishment Darwin Harbour, otherwise our allowances and grant must cease.

13. Par 25. It is unfortunate that the money offers we make for coaling Steamers do not bear fruit, still we must continue to offer facilities whenever there is a chance in hopes of business falling into our hands some day. I am sorry to have to report that the Yachting St. 'Ceylon' has not carried out her intention of calling at our Colony.

14. N<sup>o</sup>. 338, 1. The Directors are very gratified at hearing there were only 5 scabby Sheep in North Arm Section, as these were in one flock it shows the Shepherds tending those sheep must have been negligent of their duties and we trust you expressed your strong disapprobation of such conduct, being in one flock only it can be more easily eradicated so we hope never to hear of it again.

15. The Board intends sending out some Rams & Ewes for improving their flocks by the Tallow Vessel next February, proposing ten of each as the former would arrive in time for a short number of Island Ewes, for care must be exercised as to numbers because they will not be acclimatized, some of our best sheep ought therefore to be reserved for them: we have asked the Woolbrokers for advice but incline ourselves to the Romney Marsh breed as their wool is so much finer than the Cheviots and they are as hardy for our rough climate, which certainly has the effect of coarsening wool: we require a full report on the stud flock produced by the cross of the Monte Videan Merinos with the Island ewes, so that a decision may be arrived at whether the importation of River Plate Merinos

answers the purpose of fining our Wools, which in the present state of the market is an absolute necessity, of course Merinos are more easily drawn from the River Plate than from Europe, but are they the right sort and coming from such a warm climate is their constitution strong enough for our climate: you ought also to learn all you can about the Rambouillet Rams imported by Waldron, for there is no disguising the fact that his and other Wool from the West Falkland fetches better prices than ours. We may be able to ship the Ewes in lamb as their Ram lambs would be first blood for breeding purposes, under all circumstances a qualified Shepherd, if not two, ought to go out with such a shipment, please therefore bear this in mind and let us hear whether one or two would be required for our staff, whether to be married or single, and as many hints upon the whole matter as possible since reply to this will arrive some time before we have to make final arrangements for the before mentioned and the Tallow vessel. Speaking of this our only vessel for some time and I presume no other for another year I may observe that in all probability she will have to convey the Steam Launch, which will take some time to build and cannot be sent as you propose by the Coal Vessel.

16. On the 11<sup>th</sup> instant Mr. Snell called with Martin's letter of 23<sup>rd</sup> June saying that he had not received the case addressed to him £. 8,627 per 'Cordova' - we assured Mr. Snell it would reach him by first opportunity, but we think Martin ought to have been informed of its arrival if there were no means just at that time of sending it to him.

17. When the Rev. W. H. Philip's Furniture arrived in the London Docks it was found that there was a great deal more than he had reported and we were obliged to charge freight on the extra quantity, which with the carriage and insurance has been paid by the Colonial Committee of the Free Church of Scotland in Edinburgh, the Rev. Philip has been informed of this.

18. I am directed to qualify Par 10 about interest upon Deposits, by observing that it doubtless pays the C° to allow 2½ per cent upon a moderate amount of Deposits and that if necessary or any emergency arises you might allow even more, as the fact of our surplus not bringing in much interest during a depression in the Money Market need not be taken into consideration.

Partridge & C<sup>o</sup>, 4 Billiter Street, who tell us it will be almost impossible to get a large vessel to drop it at Stanley going round the Horn as you propose, they are trying to get a small vessel under 200 tons register to accept 27/8 to 3 of P. ton, the quantity not to exceed 400 tons, please inform the greatest number of tons that can be discharged into our bulk in the day as the quicker the operation the less freight we shall have today - we asked Hawkes to tell us the greatest number of tons that could be received. The Admiralty have applied again about a Contract for Coals and are informed of this shipment, when matters settle down with respect to the Coals in the 'Pulsex' and the yearly supply needed for the S<sup>t</sup>. Malvinas' we may open negotiations with them again.

20. Par 6. Mr. Hawkes had an interview with the Board on the 21<sup>st</sup>, he appears to know but little about a Steam Launch but is to give me as many hints as possible to get a composite one built by Miller & Tupp for the Tallow vessel - he brought to the Directors' notice the need of a new Jetty at Stanley as the sunken hulls & the Gov<sup>t</sup>. Jetty have caused the water so shallow, this has not been mentioned by you the Board have however ordered me to take his views, draw up a plan for this in order perhaps to send the material out by the Tallow vessel, you are desired therefore to send full report & particulars for such a Jetty which should arrive as soon as possible to enable preparations to be made.

21. Par 10. I regret you have to complain that several paragraphs of your Despatches have not been answered, the fault is not mine having mentioned the matters several times, they are now however being attended to - 323, 13 and 329, 24 about the Agency of the Swansea Merchant Shipowners C<sup>o</sup> were answer'd by our 609, 5. Your 323, 29 about sending out Andrew Carlyle,

on 8 Nov 78, N<sup>o</sup>. 529, 16, were reported that he wished to reengage, you replied 2 Jan 79, N<sup>o</sup>. 263, 9, that he was a grumbler and would not be engaged even if on the spot - since your remark on 20 Oct 81, N<sup>o</sup>. 323, 29, that he would suit for North Arm we have not heard from him and his address is not known in the office. N<sup>o</sup>. 328, 8 about renewal of Writs by Mr. C. H. Williams, we send copy of M<sup>rs</sup>. Bompas & Co's Letter of 21<sup>st</sup> inst. but presume now that he has left the Colony the matter is closed. N<sup>o</sup>. 329, 7 copy of C. Thomas & Brothers' letter to M<sup>rs</sup>. James Goff FC 14 Dec 81 about Tallow ex 'Hilarion' 12 Nov 81 - the original of this has been lost in our Office but M<sup>rs</sup>. Thomas have kindly sent us copy, a copy of which is now forwarded to you.

22. Par 14. We are sorry you report that an excessive quantity of binding Wire has been sent with the Wire Fencing, complaint has been made to M<sup>rs</sup>. Rylands Bro's who confess they are to blame but trust any claim on them will be made as low as possible for any allowance would be a direct loss to them, it is true as they observe that we shall be able to use it in the course of time, the matter must be left to your decision if a claim is to be made - copy of their letter 21<sup>st</sup> instant is enclosed.

23. Par 24. We wrote to Mr. Bolte, Elsfeith, owner of the 'Formica', who has accepted Capt<sup>n</sup>. Wicting's Draft 297. 1.<sup>m</sup>, about providing funds for the bulkhire of the cargo, he said he must see the underwriters at Hamburg, learning that there was a Bottomry Bond on her, freight & cargo for £3,000, insured up to £1900 at Lloyd's, we wrote again strongly and he tells us the underwriters have provided funds for repairs at Montevideo and would send by her to Stanley cash for further expenses - to be on the safe side we telegraphed on 21<sup>st</sup> inst. to catch the 'Cordillera' at Montevideo, N<sup>o</sup>. 25 out, "Insurers Formica's cargo promised cash with vessel retain cargo until fully satisfied" - which will we trust arrive in good time to enable the matter to be properly attended to, the cost of this Telegram £10. 19. 4 ought to be paid by her.

24. I ought to have reported in Par 20 that Mr. Hawkes has decided not to return to Stanley.

25. With respect to the extra Revenue to be raised by the Colony the Directors suggest that the Taxes might be two thirds on Land and one third on Wool and other produce

at an ad valorem export value.

26. We have prepared for insuring Produce ~~ff. G.W.~~  
Malvinas' by getting the following rates from Lloyd's - Wool  
and Produce to Stanley from Choiseul Sound, Lively Island,  
Darwin and North Arm at  $3\frac{1}{4}$  per cent - from all other parts  
of the Islands at  $3\frac{1}{8}$  per cent.

We have thought it right to continue the insurance of the  
Wool Sheds at Darwin, Walker Creek and North Arm at  
Five hundred Pounds each (£500) through the year, though  
hitherto only insured during the clipping season.

27. We regret the full particulars of the Hornets'  
Accounts are not quite ready, she will cost very much  
more than we ever intended but the shipwright has  
proceeded on the principle of doing the thing thoroughly  
well and we know we possess in her a very strong useful  
vessel which with due care will not require any outlay  
for years, being metallled very heavily and provided with  
a new suit of Sails. She is insured for £1500 at  
12 guineas per cent for one year from 14 July last.  
The half pay to Capt<sup>n</sup>. Liddell and others due 13<sup>th</sup> prox:  
will be debited to Debtors at Stanley.

Sir, Enclosing Duplicate of our last on 25<sup>th</sup> ultimo we have now to report the Charter of this vessel to convey 600 tons Ocean Merthyr Steam Coals through Mess<sup>r</sup> W. S. Partridge & C<sup>o</sup>, the London Agents for these Coals, at Twentyeight and six pence ( $28\frac{1}{2}$ ) per ton delivered at Stanley, as per enclosed Charterparty dated at Swansea 26<sup>th</sup> ult. with the Owners Mess<sup>r</sup> Richardson Brothers, for whose vessels we were appointed Agents at Stanley many years ago. Every endeavour was made to limit the quantity to 350 tons as you wished, but no vessel would call in with that quantity and as the quantity is but small after all we think we have done well to get it at that freight. You will perceive the demurrage for any delay is four pence per ton on the ship's register tonnage, as Hawkes informed us that 80 tons Coals could be received per day it was concluded the Compt<sup>r</sup> would be on the right side in engaging for a discharge of Fifty tons per day. The "Inverness" other cargo is 600 tons Main Duffryn Smelting Coal <sup>for Valparaiso</sup> which the owners undertook should be properly separated from our Coal by boards. The Bill of Lading will be enclosed in a letter from Swansea.

2. Yesterday your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 339 and 340 dated 26<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup> July arrived and will be laid before a Board on the 18<sup>th</sup> instant and answered by the Pacific Mail on the 19<sup>th</sup> instant.

3. George Mercer has applied to be reengaged to go out by the S<sup>t</sup> V. 'Obis' on 24<sup>th</sup> prox<sup>r</sup>, as you have not recommended him for further service he has been told we cannot engage him here, though perhaps you might on his arrival at Stanley as he proposes to return with his Brother, who is in Dean's employ, by the 'Obis'. Mr. Sherring a sister of Mr. Martin has asked for a passage out and is told we cannot convey her free and that she could write Mr. Martin about paying her expenses, as if he is

agreeable we might be able to offer her a passage by our Tallow vessel next February.

4. Referring to your N<sup>o</sup>. 338, 2 about Agency for Guano vessels chartered by the Chilean Government, we have applied to the Chilean Consul here and learn that there is not likely to be any change in their allowing Guano to be shipped by vessels not under their control.

5. We have had to pay nineteen shillings (19/-) to the buyer of bale of Wool D<sup>H</sup> N<sup>o</sup>. 283 Mr. Skudenesmae's sold in Edenborough's Sale 10 June last, Lot 633, for extra tare of wool pack as this bale had three bales dumped into one.

Sir, Enclosing Duplicate of our last Despatch on the 15<sup>th</sup> instant we have now to answer your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 339 and 340 received on 14<sup>th</sup> instant.

2. We are all exceedingly grieved to hear that such a serious disease as Smallpox has been introduced into the Colony, but trust that with due care & attention serious consequences will be avoided.

3. N<sup>o</sup>. 339, 5 - 340, 8 - We are pleased to learn and it must be gratifying to you that your exertions to obtain more careful treatment of Passengers by the Frosnes Steamers are now being rewarded, and though these Steamers are precluded from their size and trade in offering superior accommodation for Passengers, it is to be hoped their endeavours to make people as comfortable as circumstances permit will be appreciated.

4. Par 6. As already explained we are bound to entertain all and any offer of Steamers calling at Stanley, we know there have been numerous disappointments in this business but as each offer to coal Steamers must make the Port more known, Stanley may yet become a Coaling Station in a small way, but as from your description the facilities are so few at present we must not expect immediate success, we certainly expected that the E<sup>c</sup>: gave more assistance than the one man who you state tallies and weighs for us, and as for the Steam Launch towing the coal hulk to the Steamer, surely if the Hulk is moored in a good position she might more easily steam alongside on entering the harbour: you have not stated the greatest number of tons that could be delivered in a day, this ought to be done, as well as the usual quantity to guide us as to future operations: Par 19. We wait reply to N<sup>o</sup>. 611, 13 & 19, and your remarks upon the cargo P. 'Gouverneur' before opening further negotiations with the Admiralty for a contract.

5. Par 13. We are now able to send the Account of the 'Hornet' being 1976. 15. 8 for the vessel and 60. 8. 5 for the Voyage Account - the former as already explained

is far more than anticipated or wished, but when it is considered that she is 167 tons Builder's measurement the cost for such a vessel at £13.10/- a ton is not so high, for she is thoroughly equipped and will not require any outlay for years - as for deck it was indispensable to put a new one as it had not been renewed since her launch, and to strengthen her she has new knees, ironriders, breasthooks & crutches, the present deck is 2½ ins thick & 6027 bolts have been put in, Mr. Meager states that though his account is heavy he would not do the work again for the same money and the account, as per copy enclosed, may be submitted to any shipbuilder without fear of objections being made to it: There is still on hand a small Cutter valued at £13 or 14, which we had hoped to have sold to one of the Royal Naval Artillery Volunteers - under these circumstances you will have to do the best you can with her and we trust she will be found to do the Co's. work well.

6. Par 14. We were not aware that you expected a report upon the Repairs of Robey's Engine sent home by Hilarion 12 Nov 81 and returned by 'Cordova' 25 Feb 82 - enquiries shall now moreover be made upon the points you mention.

7. Par 15. Having already made so many enquiries about Tallow making, all of which have been forwarded to you and having stated that this Co: ought to make a standard quality of Tallow by mixing all fats together, we do not perceive what can be done upon Martin's report of his work, he must be told to carry out the Board's orders to the best of his ability and if Mr. Dean's process of Tallow making is better than ours, we must alter our system to his.

8. Par 17. The Directors decided yesterday to obtain a Steam Launch from Miller & Tupp for the February vessel availing of any hints Mr. Hawkes can furnish - and he is also to make plan of Jetty, if possible, so that some of the material might go out by the same opportunity, as your reply to our observations on this matter ought to arrive here in time to enable some plan to be carried out.

9. N<sup>o</sup>. 340, 7. This considered it will be proper to capitalize the cost of erecting Wire Fencing, which must then be depreciated ten per cent yearly on the same principle as the Co's. Farm Buildings, Shipping &c.

10. N<sup>o</sup>. 339, 9. Since passing this paragraph we have had a visit from Mr. G. Bolte, owner of the 'Formica', who reports that her repairs at Montevideo amounted to £2300 and as Bottomry Bond could not be obtained he and the

Underwriters had abandoned her, he stated that Messrs. Vorwerk & C° of Valparaiso were the Charterers and had put the cargo of Barley on board for the Cape of Good Hope, which cargo was now at Stanley under charge of the 'Fornica's' Boat-swain: we thought it well to inform Messrs. Vorwerk of these facts as per copy of letter to them now enclosed. Mr. Bolte stated that he ought not to have accepted the Bill for £297.1. - , as with the exception of about £15 it was all for cargo and average expenses, having paid this amount on 5<sup>th</sup> inst., the due date, he earnestly requests us to collect for him all the expenses not due by his vessel from the cargo now in your possession, which of course you must not part with until these charges, bulkhire and all expenses are paid in cash or by good approved Bill. He tells us that the report of the £3,000 Bottomry Bond at Valparaiso is an error, it probably arose through attempts at Montevideo to issue one.

11. The Board have decided to send by the Tallow vessel ten Romney Marsh Rams and Ten Ewes, the latter to be tupped by Messrs. Sturgeon's Merino Rams before sailing so as to lamb about next May after arrival, thus producing fine woolled acclimatized sheep for our stud flock: we shall purchase half the above from Mr. H. Rigden of Lydney and Mr. F. Neame Jr. of Mackenrade, Faversham, Kent, as they breed for fine wool, we have already sent out their Rams. Messrs. Sturgeon have received great praise for their Merino Rams sold to Mr. Dean who reports that they are improving his flocks very much.

12. We are supplying Mr. E. F. Baillon with more Cash, he writes that the present shipment of their Produce or that of next year will balance their Account, we have replied that this is scarcely possible seeing that the Stanley Acc<sup>t</sup>. to end of May last and the London Acc<sup>t</sup>. to this date show a debit balance of £2,113, and the Produce p<sup>r</sup>. 'Cordova' may realize £1,000 to £2,000 - however we must continue to support him though he writes about requiring £130.

13. The 'Inverness' sailed on 17<sup>th</sup> from Swansea with 401 tons Ocean Merthyr Steam Coal @ 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> a ton 220.11.- & 2/6 for Bills of Lading as per enclosed Invoice £220.13.6 the freight at 28/6 a ton amounts to £541.8.6 of which one third 190.9.6 has been paid here - one Bill of Lading went with the vessel, one is now enclosed and another will be sent by next Mail - which will convey Indent N<sup>o</sup>. 5 for stores.

Sir, We wrote you last on 19<sup>th</sup> ult. per Pacific Steamer through Sandy Point and now enclose Duplicate. Your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 341 and 342 were received on the 11<sup>th</sup> inst., the 'Cordova' arrived on the 18<sup>th</sup> instant.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 341, 2. We agree with you that the best has been made of the 'Cordova's' Charter and consider though perhaps a less vessel would have done, the business will show a profitable result: though not mentioned I presume you took into account the two days not used in London in settling with Capt<sup>r</sup>. Jones for the demurrage. You complained of the Passengers' treatment outwards, I was therefore surprised at learning from Mr Hawkes that on arrival at Stanley they remained on board in preference to going to the lodgings on shore provided for them - This is now confirmed by Capt<sup>r</sup>. Jones - Par 3 - Weights of Stickney's Wool shall be obtained, Mr. Dean has promised this.

3. Par 6. We send Statement of freight paid the Kosmos Co. for Produce home from St. Denderah' 20 Dec 80 to Mr. Ramsay 3 Feb 82 amounting to £1,654. 5. 2.

4. N<sup>o</sup>. 342, 4. The Directors are extremely gratified to learn that the Smallpox has not spread to the inhabitants of Stanley through Mr. M<sup>r</sup>. Clymont being ill with this disease onboard the Kosmos St. 'Sakkarah', we send copy of Testimonial to Capt<sup>r</sup>. Danielsson from the Passengers he conveyed from England thanking him and his Officers for their kind attentions during the voyage and their efforts to counteract this dangerous disease.

5. Par 7. We could not close the Black Hawk's Account until certain details had been received from Stanley, these having now arrived the matter will be attended to.

6. Par 8. The Board considers the Kosmos Co. are not entitled to a reduction of Commission for advances for their Island St. Malvinas, though you

are right as to the Board wishing to deal liberally with this Steamer, we have not heard from Mr. Stande on the subject.

7. Par 9. We regret to learn that the 'Dinapore' has not placed herself in the Co's hands though Messrs. Balfour Williamson & C<sup>o</sup>: of Liverpool appointed us their Agents, we wrote them complaining of this and they state by letter of 20<sup>th</sup> inst. (Copy enclosed) that Mr. Dean has acted for the Valparaiso Firm for many years & has given satisfaction, they will send copy of our letter to Valparaiso.

8. Par 10. It is to be regretted that there should be a difference of Duty upon manufactured Tobacco which causes the English to pay 3/- a lb against 2/- for other kinds, we have written Messrs. Wills of Bristol who are going to move in the matter as per correspondence enclosed.

9. Par 13. We are glad you are satisfied with the Cooper you obtained from Montevideo and that he has attended to the Co's interests by working up casks & shooks which others had condemned - as already stated there has been no complaint lately as to loss of Fallow on the passage home but the present casks do look to be in excellent order.

10. Par 14. The Board is obliged for the information regarding the present Church at Stanley and the proposal for building a Cathedral there, at present this Co's proposed Subscription is to remain in abeyance until there is a likelihood of such a large expensive building being completed.

11. Par 17. This very annoying that the S<sup>r</sup>. 'Luxor' has not brought Despatch 610 of 25 July, which the Pacific S<sup>r</sup>. 'Cordillera' had to leave at Sandy Point, as you report that there was a letter for Capt<sup>n</sup>. Liddell of the 'Hornet' from Bordeaux, it is strange you did not receive ours sent by that route for some days after the despatch of that Mail I was told by the Clerks that the Hornet's Bill of Lading had not been enclosed, but was put into a separate envelope addressed to yourself and posted on 27 July for the Bordeaux Mail p<sup>r</sup>. 'Cordillera'.

12. Par 18. Dr. Hamilton's payment of £5 has been sent, there has not however been time for communication with his father Major Hamilton about the Whisky, which we shall endeavour to get off by next Steamer.

13. A Steam Launch has been ordered of Miller & Tupp as per particulars herewith - at the suggestion of Mr. Hawkes no arrangement has been made for deck or internal fittings

in which he justly observes it will be better to please yourself, he even said planking for outside and inside skins need not be sent as there is sufficient at Stanley, we however consider it will be safer to send a supply so shall obtain the measurement quantities from Miller & Tupp and ship same through Ross or Arnold - you will have to prepare a little steaming apparatus for bending some of these planks - we must also send sufficient yellow metal for though there may be a stock in the Store such goods will always come into use.

14. We understand it will be absolutely necessary that warm sheltered covered places are provided for the Ewes to lamb in which are coming by the Tallow vessel, as they will arrive in the Winter, pray therefore make the best arrangements possible as if they produce good lambs it will prove of great advantage to the C° - some dried Tufac Grabs ought to be provided though we shall take the precaution to put a very full stock of Provender on board.

15. Mr. Stuart A. Caley of J. A. Caley &c° Preserved Tongue Curers, Concordia, Entre Rios, has applied to the C° as to establishing a manufactory at Darwin Harbour or Goose Green for preserving mutton, the Directors have promised him assistance and encouragement and he is to make arrangements with you, but the Board desire you to be careful not to make any Contracts whereby this C° may be bound to perform certain duties which may at sometime be difficult or impossible: Mr. Caley will return to the River Plate shortly and will then write you to appoint a time for coming to the Colony to inspect our works, as he has asked whether we could rent him a shed room as he would be averse to building on other people's property: he came to England in a steamer with Mr. Waldron who has given him considerable information - I was speaking to him of the drawback of not being able to work all the year round through the Sheep being fat only in the Summer and Autumn, but learned with much pleasure the other day from Mr. E. Packe that they are sufficiently fat for preserving all the year round, especially on West Falkland, this has been communicated to Mr. Caley who is aware that the West Farmers could easily send Sheep across up Brenton Lock, Darwin Estuary being so narrow. The Correspondence is enclosed.

16. We have had further correspondence with Mr. Bolte owner of the 'Fornica' who accuses us of misrepresentation because the Bill for £297.1. which he paid was for charges on the Cargo as well as on his ship, we strongly repudiated this, as per copies of letters enclosed, and now learn from him that the 'Fornica' has sailed from Montevideo for Stanley to resume her voyage to the Cape of Good Hope, having given a Bottomry Bond for repairs, in which (as I understand the letter) the £297.1. is included, you will therefore have to exercise great care in settling this matter - the original Average Statement dated Bremen 25 Sep 82 showing 80.6.2 upon the Cargo of Barley and 219.1.1 upon the Vessel & Owners as sent us by Mr. Bolte is now forwarded, copy being kept in this Office. It is a great pity you have not furnished us with particulars of the cargo, estimated value of same, the shippers at Valparaiso and consignees at Cape of Good Hope, name of person this vessel in whose charge it was left at Stanley, the hire of bulk &c &c.

17. I am directed to observe that it is essential for the Balanced Accounts of the present year to leave Stanley on the 2<sup>nd</sup> February next to arrive here on the 17<sup>th</sup> March, the Duplicates being sent by the Direct Mail of 10<sup>th</sup> March due here 20<sup>th</sup> April 1883.

18. We have engaged for Mr. Louis A. Baillon a Shepherd James M. Laren and wife, the latter to perform house duties at yearly wages Seventy Pounds for five years from arrival at the Falklands - the cost of passage our Thirty Pounds to be repaid at termination of Agreement. They leave by this Steamer with two dogs, having been obtained by our Agent Mr. Fleming of Dundee - Five Pounds has been advanced them, out of which they may pay their expenses to Dartmouth &c and account for the balance to Mr. Baillon, they appear a very good couple, each has a parcel for you, I have granted them the favor of travelling second class for third class fare.

19. Mr. James Fooking, Shipbroker, 155 Leadenhall St writes us that the S.S. 'Altmore' 1352 nett tons, now at Champauro might call at the F. P. coming home. He has asked the Owners to give this C? the coaling.

20. By this Steamer we send the Stores ordered by your Indent N<sup>o</sup>. 5, excepting 500lbs Apple Rings which J. T. Morton says are not in stock, and some few Boots which Burrows say require more time, though unfortunately they have not sent list of the sorts not ready, and the order for Lager Beer and Cigars from Vorwerk of Hamburg, the latter are entered in Indent N<sup>o</sup>. 6 with a quantity Nails from Hamburg, which, with the English Goods, will go by the Flosmos Steamer of 29<sup>th</sup> Dec<sup>r</sup>. next. The Barb Fencing is shipped from Antwerp, when ordering these goods, Mr. Dennis, showed me specimens of the tools for erecting same and deeming they would be useful and expedite the work some are sent - This order ought to have gone through Vorwerk N<sup>o</sup>. but the circular sent by them was lost in the Office and it was only by the merest chance that I learned Dennis was the London agent and ordered it through him.

I have now to report that by copies of correspondence with the Flosmos C<sup>o</sup> enclosed you will see that on 3<sup>rd</sup> inst. They offered to reduce the freight upon Stores out to 45/- and 5% provided the total shipment by any one Steamer reached 10 Meter cube or 10,000 kilos, in anticipation that the freight from London to Hamburg might be raised, we thanked them for this concession explaining that we could not accept same because, only shipping such Stores as were ordered, we could not guarantee that each shipment would amount to 10 Meter cube, but that as we now shipped all Stores out by their Steamers we were entitled to some consideration - two days since we received from Messrs. Browne & C<sup>o</sup> the Account of the 'Neko's' freight and charges amounting to 162.14.11 the Hamburg freight being entered at 50/- & 5%, this morning we receive a "rectified account" for 149.10.8 the Neko's freight being charged at 45/- and 5% upon 50.326 cub. Meter, these dimensions are however more than we make the shipment to be. N<sup>o</sup>. 885 was not used in this shipment. We send a Flosmos Time Table for January to June 1883, & have not yet been able to go through it to arrange our Mail Table.

21. The last Mail brought me a letter from Mr. Biggs asking me to send his application for the appointment of Surveyor to Lloyd's Register of Shipping, and four certificates,

This has been done with my recommendation, as from  
the length of time he has been in our service I believe  
he would fill the office usefully & honorably.

Sir, Enclosing Duplicate of our last on the 27<sup>th</sup> ult. we have to acknowledge receipt of your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 343, dated 26 and 28 Sept<sup>r</sup>, which arrived from Sandy Point on the 7<sup>th</sup> inst. by this present Steamer.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 343, 2. The Directors are pleased to hear that Scab has been so effectually kept under and trust this careful management of our flocks will be continued: they are much obliged for the information about Sheep for boiling down and perceive that you are right as to Ewes lately having had a lamb not being fit, also that older Wethers are likely to produce more tallow - as you justly observe prudence is a great point and we are strongly urged to avoid overstocking on any of our runs.

3. Par 5. You appear to have mistaken our remarks and instructions about melting Tallow, there is no alteration necessary to the present mode of preparing it, which may be described as white, green and brown, the present shipment is selling well, is much looked after, so pray continue to make the one kind as now done, for which the present plant appears to be sufficient: the Brokers cannot give further intelligence than their reports and the value per cwt as sold is the proof of success.

4. Par 9. M<sup>s</sup>rs. Tyler & C<sup>o</sup>: have had copy of this paragraph and are now making a longer Ram for shipment by steamer next month.

5. Par 10. You will already have learned from the Kosmos Co<sup>o</sup>: correspondence that it is arranged we are to receive an allowance upon all business performed for this C<sup>o</sup>: by their island G.W. Malvinas'.

6. Par 15. We are not able to suggest how the Government arrangements for storing Bonded Goods can be altered and cheapened, the charge for Rent is very high this is the natural consequence of the small business which requires wellpaid officials to attend to it, you have adopted the best plan to prevent extra expense by paying the

duty at once and as our shipments of Wines & Spirits are small through the frequency of Steamers there will not be much interest lost.

7. Par 16. We cannot understand how our Despatch 610 of 25<sup>th</sup> July last off Cordillera to Sandy Point should be still missing, as it is recorded here that Duplicate was sent with Duplicate of N° 611 by the S.V. 'Malvinas' - and that Triplicate was enclosed in N° 611 on 25<sup>th</sup> Aug<sup>t</sup> last by the S.V. 'Uarda' direct.

Your Telegram Home N° 35 dated Montevideo 9<sup>th</sup> inst. received 10<sup>th</sup> inst. 9.50 AM - "Faction Hornet fourth October" shows you received Original of this Despatch 610 from Sandy Point by the S.V. 'Memphis' about the 3<sup>rd</sup> instant, and she is now bringing your last advices. We are very glad to learn that the 'Hornet' arrived 4<sup>th</sup> ult.

8. Par 17. Messrs Edenborough will act as judges for any rules and prizes you may fix for sorting & packing Wool, we send their memorandum received on 16<sup>th</sup> ult. and copy of my letter to them 14<sup>th</sup> inst. on this subject.

9. Par 18. Unfortunately the Barb Wire Fencing ordered of Feltin & Guillaume, Mülheim on Rhine, was not shipped at Antwerp by the S.V. 'Keko', we must try to send it by the next Steamer.

10. Par 19. Mr. Mr. Clymont asks too much £12,500 for his Station which suffers a great disadvantage in not possessing an access from Falkland Sound.

11. Par 23. We have purchased ten Romney Marsh Rams and ten Ewes for the Tallow vessel, the former are this years lambs so will come into service May 84 after being well acclimatized - the Ewes born last year will be tupped by Sturgeons Merino Rams next month so as to lamb after arrival at Stanley, and it is absolutely necessary that proper sheltered places are prepared for them as excellent results are anticipated from this trial, as though you say it is wrong for them to lamb in the middle of winter this constantly occurs here without bad results. The Board approves of your suggestion to send some Rams by Steamer and have ordered six or eight to be shipped at Hamburg or Antwerp 23 or 28<sup>th</sup> prox<sup>t</sup>, they will be last years Lambs and will be two years old next May when put to the Ewes after being three months in the colony for acclimatization - par 24 - Malcolm Bethune having left for New Zealand and no good Shepherd offering we may not send a man

by the Steamer but grant gratuities to the crew for each Sheep landed alive, especially as we ought to have two men for the 20 Sheep by the Tallow vessel and you do not want to increase the staff of Shepherds.

12. Par 30. Mfss<sup>r</sup> Rylands accept the offer that the Binding Wire sent in too large quantity by their mistake should be returned by our Tallow vessel freight free and allowed for by them: of course you will take care to reserve sufficient for our wants in the immediate future and can doubtless dispose of a good quantity to others.

13. We forgot to report in our last Despatch that George Mercer returned by the last direct St. Neko', he was surprised that you had not recommended him for reengagement having given him a good certificate, he was good enough to give me the names and positions of the shepherds houses on Lafonia and North Camfr for my Map, these do not agree with your Distribution of Shepherds List as we have no record of Sag Rincon, Rincon Chico or Mops Side, please give the positions of these houses - The Distribution List and the Wages List do not agree, the names of some Shepherds appearing on one though not on the other.

14. On 10<sup>th</sup> inst. we received notice of Lloyd's Telegram announcing that the 'Avona', Sunderland to Valparaiso had been lost on Flint Point at the entrance to Port Salvador. The Bdg 'Bristol' 351 tons has been chartered for Capt James Waldron, we believe she is to sail next week, I presume it would not be wise to send letters or duplicates by his vessels, still let us know whether the St. Malvinas' multiplies and quickens the Mails to and from West Falkland.

15. N. 342, 18. Major Hamilton has to delay sending the Whiskey for his son Dr. Hamilton until he hears from him.

16. We learn that Mr. C de Freville Green sailed in the St. Neko' on 28<sup>th</sup> ult. to undertake the office of Colonial Secretary at Stanley, he was formerly Assistant Inspector of Constabulary at the Gold Coast Colony.

17. Mr. F. L. Bumphreys our Agent at Montevideo has been to London but I have not seen him, he called here twice during my absence, we have written him that he ought to have taken more pains in the matter by writing to make an appointment, he did not leave an address to enable me to arrange for a meeting.

18. On the 15<sup>th</sup> inst. Mfss<sup>r</sup> H. & D. Sharpe paid in Two Thousand Pounds (£2000) for Mfss<sup>r</sup> Holmested & Blakes Account from the proceeds of their Produce by the 'Border Queen' which

ought to have passed through the Co's hands - what with this and the Cordova's Produce we have a plentitude of Cash and cannot get more than  $3\frac{1}{4}$  from 30<sup>th</sup> 3 $\frac{1}{2}$  to for it upon Deposit, so bear this in mind when calculating their interest account.

19. One of the Directors was asking at the last Board whether any steps had been taken towards the purchase of some of the Freehold upon some of our Government Sections, as matters are now progressing well the Board considers it would be wise to lay out a little money in this way.

Mr E. F. Baillon wrote us that part of Speedwell Island had been sold to your brother Mr H. C. Cobb, we replied that this Company never alienated any part of its Freehold and presumed he meant that a portion of the sheep farm on that Island had been taken by your Brother.

20. Messrs. Edenborough &c: our Wool Brokers have kindly promised to take any pains & trouble about the prizes between the three clipping stations but cannot draw up any rules on the subject, enclosed is copy of their memo about it, they state that the chief thing is to sort, skirt well and pack up as clean as possible. The Cordova's and Luxor's Wool (together with Mr. Dean's) was sold on the 25<sup>th</sup>. the prices being rather lower than lately - they cannot make any particular report on the half breed Merino it being an inferior lot, quite dirty and not well packed, I myself saw plenty of dung all through it and one of the bales actually had a quantity of ruddle amongst the wool, not merely a heavy marking but the ruddle rolled up in the wool in lumps. As our Wool will be coming home next year by the Hosnos Steamers to Havre we consider it would be preferable for it to be sent thence to this port by the Steamers of the General Steam Navigation Co:, as it would be less knocked about than transhipment at Southampton for the South Western Rly to Nine Elms and then another removal to the Docks or Wool warehouses, the freight would be about the same you had better therefore propose this to Capt. Seemann and we shall write to Mr. Raoul Nicole the Agent at Havre and request Mr. Staudt to do what he can in this respect to oblige us.

21. N<sup>o</sup>. 343. 32. We wrote to Mr. Hawkes about a successor, he knew of a man who would suit and was to make enquiries, this morning we receive letter saying that the person declines the offer, as you place so much reliance upon Mr. Hawkes' capability of choosing a man we must write him to issue an advertisement in the local papers and do his best to find some one, if in the meantime you

if in the meantime you should engage any one at Stanley telegraph the word "Fillet" to prevent us agreeing with some one.

22. There has been considerable trouble with the cargo ex 'Cordova' - only 64 bales Wool & were landed so Fifteen Pounds (£15) has been deducted from the freight <sup>for one bale</sup>. Capt. Jones asserts that it was not received should this prove to be the case on careful examination at Stanley this money is to be refunded to the vessel. There was one bale more of the Pebble Island Wool landed making 365 bales in all. The C. Tallow proved to be 528 casks though the Bill of Lading had 529, as you reported there might be one short, no claim was made. 1195 Hides were landed for the 1158 on the Bill of Lading, the Wharfingers had great trouble to make out the marks T B on the 147 Hides and H & C on the 96 Hides and showed me that it was impossible to find these numbers all marked so some were taken from the general bulk of the same sort, another time if the marks on the hides cannot be made more distinct, a rope yarn ought to be tied on or a wooden tally affixed. The gross weight of the Tallow proves to be 120. 2. 12 lbs than made at Islands, also the Island tares are if anything rather light, particular attention is called to this with respect to Martin's commission on the extra weight of tallow obtained from each sheep. N<sup>o</sup> 342, b. You ought certainly to have sent certificate of the dirty condition of Dean's wool, he brought a claim against us for tallow damage but afterwards waived it - we had a few bales slightly tallow damaged but could not substantiate a claim as the ship produced certificate of the Dock people having found her properly Dunnaged. Capt. Jones was paid four pounds and six pence (£4. 6.) for the coil of Rope left behind. The four Gold Nuggets sold for Two Pounds Three Shillings and two pence (£2. 3. 2.) the weight was correct. W. Peck's Watch is not worth repairing, is it to be returned or sold for 5/- or 6/- the value of the silver in the case.

23. At noon this day we received a further sum of Nine Hundred Pounds (£900) from Messrs F C & D. Sharpe to the credit of Messrs Holmested & Blake.

24. Andrew Rutter has gone to Old Cleeve, Washford, Somersetshire where he is about to be apprenticed to Mr. Wm. Garrison, a House Carpenter & Builder, for five years, to whom we have undertaken to pay the £2. 1. 5 by instalments, Rutter expecting further cash from the Colony for his support during

part of the third, the fourth & fifth years of his apprenticeship: we have received a good account of Mr. Garrison from Mr.  
Thomas Ponsford, Solicitor, Bardon, near Taunton.

25. No. 341, 3. The weight of Stickney's 92 bales Wool marked  $\frac{1}{2}$  per cordova was 399. 1. 27 the freight at  $\frac{3}{4}$  a lb and 5% £146. 16. 3. The weight of Dean's 50 bales Pebble Island Wool was 98. 1. 23 the freight @  $\frac{10}{7}$  each £5% £ 26. 5. -

26. Messrs. M. Dougall state that many improvements have been made in their Sheep Dip, one kind only soluble in hot water waterproofs the fleece, thus protecting the animal in cold weather whereby the quantity of wool is increased and the quality improved, this is now much used in Scotland instead of smearing. do you use Little's Dip with cold water as we have heard that only warm applications will affect or get under the scab to kill the burrowing insect: a couple of Mr. Dougall's notices are sent for your information though as long as Little's Dip is effectual a change is not needed, but if it would be wise to experiment with Mr. Dougall's they are open to grant reduced terms for their Sheep Dip.

27. As Indents N<sup>o</sup>. 6 dated 1 Sept 82 ex N<sup>o</sup>. 342 do not state them to be for the Tallow vessel <sup>27</sup> we are preparing to ship these stores by the direct Flosmos Steamer of 29<sup>th</sup> Dec<sup>r</sup>, some few of the articles state by sailing vessel and though this is not put to the timber it will be reserved for the Tallow vessel, the Peat Grates have to be cast so they must wait with the Kitchen Ranges from Dundee - the Flosmos C<sup>o</sup> wish the goods to leave here on 9<sup>th</sup> prox<sup>r</sup> as a precaution against detention through fogs and ice: 75 hds Ale is a large quantity to be sent by one steamer, the extra being 50 hds on one page and 25 on another page of c<sup>r</sup> N<sup>o</sup>. 7. The Flosmos C<sup>o</sup> have now reduced the outward freight to 45/- and 5% per cubic meter.

28. Should any double bales of Wool, that is two bales prefed and bound by iron hoops or cord as one, be shipped by the Steamers next year or the Tallow vessel this fact ought to be mentioned on the Bill of Lading, as the 'Cordova' endeavoured to set aside our claim for the bale of wool by stating that she delivered more bales than she received, because after landing the double bales were cut asunder thus producing two each.

29. We forward Flosmos Itinerary for the first half of next year, also the Pacific Steam Navigation C<sup>o</sup>'s Itinerary for the whole year, these have enabled us to draw out the Falkland Mail Table now enclosed - There was a doubt at the Post Office whether it could be received as there was such a long break in the Flosmos Steamers from 29 Dec 82 to 9 March 83 but the Flosmos C<sup>o</sup> inform us that they have satisfied the Colonial Office, and that the reason of their issuing the

Itinerary for half year only is because they anticipate to be able to run their steamers more frequently and then make shorter intervals for calling at Stanley.

Sir,

Our last went forward on the 28<sup>th</sup> ult. by the Pacific S.V. 'Cordillera' to Sandy Point - your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 344, dated 3<sup>rd</sup> ult., was received in Duplicate on the 12<sup>th</sup> inst. by a French Steamer to Bordeaux from Montevideo, the Kosmos S.V. 'Memphis' delivered the Original on 15<sup>th</sup> inst.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 344, 3. We are sorry to hear there is such improper behaviour between Captains of Vessels and the Messrs. Dean & Son, until you can produce evidence of bribery borne out by trustworthy people we fear no remedy can be applied, though we must adopt your suggestion to obtain as many agencies as possible to prevent the port of Stanley falling into worse repute than it bears at present.

3. Par 5 & 7. It is unfortunate the S.V. 'Hornet' has not pleased you, most of your complaints have been refuted by good authorities, we are confident she is a good vessel though regretting that she cost more than we wished or anticipated and believe she will do good service for many years - a ship's closet shall be sent out by the Tallow vessel - with respect to the provisioning we put on board a very full supply as such stores would not cost anything going out, if improperly consumed on the passage out you could have made Capt. Liddell answerable for this.

4. Par 10. We are given to understand that parts of private warehouses can be made into Bonded Stores by permission of the Customs authorities on the expenses for Officers being paid, we trust therefore some inexpensive amicable arrangement will be made.

5. Par 11. Capt. Liddell has given us a few very short particulars of the present Jetty and the proposition for extending the same, but not sufficient to work upon as he could not draw a plan of it and the shore, nor had he taken the inclination of the latter; until plans, full particulars and much more minute information, with estimates of cost, expenses &c <sup>are furnished</sup> we really cannot move in the matter - as regards a Patent Slip it would certainly be beneficial to Stanley

and would under careful management pay, the Board has however decided that it is a speculation into which they cannot enter though willing to advise and assist any one undertaking such a business.

6. Par 14. This unfortunate you have delayed sending the full indent for the Tallow vessel until the next Mail due here 18<sup>th</sup> prox<sup>o</sup>; as that drives it off so late we shall have to put up with any vessel then on the market - and being by the uncertain route through Sandy Point if not in time might lead to serious consequences

7. Par 16. As already reported we asked Mr. Hawkes to look out for a Marine Superintendent as he was not successful we advertised ourselves and received a great number of applications, which it was unnecessary to follow up as you have appointed Mr. M. Lauchlan: we had intended to engage a Certified Master so as to recommend him for the office of Surveyor for Lloyd's Register of Shipping now applied for by Mr. Biggs, our Carpenter, but learn from the Secretary there would have been the same objection as there is to Mr. Biggs, which is that he would have to carry out on behalf of the Company the repairs &c. he may recommend when surveying a vessel; I explained to the Secretary that there were no independent people at Stanley fit to undertake this office, and that if it was necessary to appoint a person unconnected with the businesses of the port they would have to pay the salary of a suitable person on their own account.

8. Par 28. My letter of the 1<sup>st</sup> inst. to catch the last Despatch at Lisbon will have reported about the Steam Launch coming out by Pacific Steamer to Sandy Point, further investigation into this proposal shows that it would be so risky and expensive that the Directors have abandoned it and she will now be sent in pieces by the Tallow vessel as originally intended.

9. Par 30. We are glad to learn the 'Fornica's' business is settled, an account ought to have been sent as we cannot understand why you have repaid Mr. Botte the whole amount £ 297. 1.<sup>7</sup> of the Bill he accepted for his vessel, as we only requested you to collect on his behalf a small portion of that Bill.

10. Par 32. We have not heard of Mr. Edw P. Baillon shipping any quantity of Stores out and can hardly think he has much to spare for this purpose: Mr. Andrew Baillon has applied for an account of the Speedwell Island business and we have referred him to you not having the items here.

11. Par 24. From enquiry at the Chilian Consul we learn that he does not know of any sale of Guano, tho' he said the Compagnie Pacifique of Paris are he believes in treaty for some such Contract, we wrote them offering our services at the Colony but have not had a reply - the Firm Freyfus have given up their office here for the present, though we shall endeavour to learn if they commence this business again: we understood that you had given up the Chilian Consulship, if this was not so or it is resumed again it should be entered on our business cards.

12. We report with much pleasure that our Tallow ex 'Cordova' has sold very well, the Brokers state that the buyers and experts consider it to be rather tender, that is not sufficiently firm, to correct this it would be better by being more carefully packed, that is being well stirred up in the casks before being allowed to cool, pray therefore continue to make the Co's Tallow in the same way with the above improvement: referring to Par 22 of our last Despt: giving notice of the great difference between the Island & the London weights, we send statement to guide you as to allowing the Commission to Martin for extra production of Tallow from each sheep, which must be paid according to the London weights for the casks being very sound there has not been any leakage on the voyage home.

13. Mr. Waldron's vessel the Barque 'Bristol', 353 tons, Capt<sup>t</sup> J. P. Hendra passed Deal about 6<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup> for Port Howard, we are informed she conveys plant for a Tallow Establishment he is going to institute.

14. With respect to the Duty upon Tobacco at the Colony M<sup>r</sup> Wills of Bristol have sent us copy of a letter to them from the Colonial Office, dated 28 ultimo, wherein the Governor is desired to assimilate the duties upon cut and foreign Tobaccos, we presume your reply to his will confirm the order for cut Tobacco from M<sup>r</sup> Wills.

15. Andrew Rutter who came to England in the 'Cordova' has been apprenticed for five years to M<sup>r</sup> William Garrison, House Carpenter and Builder, of Old Cleve near Washford, Somersetshire, from the 13<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>r</sup>, the Endenture being dated the 4<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>r</sup> - we have paid M<sup>r</sup> Garrison Five Pounds and have undertaken to pay him the balance of the £42. 1. 5 as per Statement upon Accounts N<sup>r</sup>. 130 by degrees.

16. As the Wool of next year will be coming away from the sheds quicker through being shipped by Steamers we

have considered it well to reduce the values for Insurance to £1500 each for Darwin Harbour and North Arm, £1,000 for Walker Creek, the three Woolsheds being valued at £500 each; this insurance is done at the National and includes the storing on board the Co's bulks waiting shipment.

17. We forward specimens of our new Agreement for Shepherds which does not grant a passage from the Colony. Mr. Bethune and family have just returned from the Cape of Good Hope where it was too hot for them and are desirous of returning to the Falklands, he may decide to go by the present Mail Steamer leaving his wife and children to follow by our Tallow vessel, in the latter case it will be arranged that he pays for their passages if not engaged by the C: and makes an allowance for the expense even if he engages. Mr. Collins has written to say that he will not be able to go out to Mr. Pettit by the Tallow vessel.

18. We are informed that Mr. J. H. Wahlen is now the Fosmos Agent at Sandy Point - Mr. John Waldron called yesterday and reported that his Brother James left by the Pacific S.V. 'Cordillera' of 28<sup>th</sup> ult. to return to the Colony through Sandy Point - his Son a Medical gentleman has gone to Montevideo to travel with Uncle by the present Steamer from that port.

19. We ship eight Romney Marsh Rams by this conveyance, 4 from Rigden & 4 from Neame, provisioned for 55 days as per Memo of Provison from Sturgeon, which born last year will have three months acclimatization before being put to the ewes next May - the Fosmos C: having considerably allowed them to be shipped at Dartmouth and waived the regulation of a Shepherd accompanying them, it has been decided to give gratuities to the Captain (if necessary) and crew amounting to One pound per head for all landed alive in good condition - Mr. Staudt writes this will be satisfactory but unfortunately does not state who will be deputed to attend them & be entitled to the gratuity, & hope to be able to arrange this at Dartmouth & report from there.

20. Mr. Harrel has written about getting out, we sent Mail Table, and explained that after the present the next direct Steamer did not sail until 10<sup>th</sup> March, he appeared to imagine that he could travel direct by the 16<sup>th</sup>, or 18<sup>th</sup> prov. Steamers.

Sir,

Enclosing Duplicate of our last on 29<sup>th</sup> ultimo by the direct G.W. 'Sakkarah' we write a short Despatch in anticipation of one to be sent on 30<sup>th</sup> inst., so that we may be sure this is at Sandy Point to be picked up by the G.W. 'Luxor' on 7<sup>th</sup> March next.

2. I have the pleasure of reporting that the eight Rams were safely put on board the G.W. 'Sakkarah' at Dartmouth on 31<sup>st</sup> ult<sup>o</sup>, I went down myself to look after the matter and was much annoyed at finding that Mr. Rigden had made a most unfortunate mistake in sending four Rams born last year instead of Rams born in 1881 to be ready for Ewes next May, of course they could not be returned so had to be shipped and you must do the best with them, several breeders here saying they will do good service though not to the extent we anticipated - Mr. Bellume went out with them having my instructions to explain everything to you and under his advice to the crew and supervision we hope they will all be landed in good order as they are not insured: they are provisioned for 55 days so a good supply ought to be landed. The Sakkarah's Antwerp Bill of Lading was wrongly delayed there but is now forwarded, Capt<sup>n</sup>. Danielsen showed me the return of cargo received there (in fact gave me a copy of the Steamer's Manifest) so the Goods have been properly shipped. Unfortunately there is a mistake at Hamburg about one bag of Rice and Allen's Box as per memo enclosed, which also gives an account of the numbers not used, we require therefore particular acc<sup>t</sup>. of delivery.

3. We deemed it best to advise and assist Mr. Bellume in returning to the Colony as the trip to South Africa, so unfortunate to himself, will show many of our Shepherds not exactly satisfied that remaining at the Falklands would be better than trying other Colonies - should you engage him it is arranged that he pays one third of the expense of his wife and three daughters going by our Fallow vessel, One Pound was lent him at Dartmouth and we may have to advance a little money to the wife here, I have been to see

them and arranged for the girls going to a Board School near their lodgings. I ought to have mentioned in the last paragraph that Mr. Riden reduced the price of his Rams on account of their immature age for our work, Mr. Neame's four Rams appeared very good, Bellune saying they were the right sort, he seems to be a clever Shepherd and takes great interest in the C: so I hope you will be able to reengage him. You will please understand that Riden and Neame supply the ten Rams & ten Ewes for the Tallow vessel, they have been chosen for their fine wool and its closeness on the skin.

4. Lloyd's Register of Shipping inform us that they are not prepared to appoint an Agent at Stanley at the present time, they write Mr. Biggs to this effect and return his testimonials, as per letter enclosed.

5. Referring to N<sup>o</sup>. 615, 19 and N<sup>o</sup>. 616, 10 we hand you copy of correspondence with Mr. Andrew Baillon about the Farm on Speedwell Island upon shares with his late Brother and this C: and have to report that Mr. H. P. Cobb has paid £159. 18. 11 on behalf of Mr. Edward Cobb upon instructions from Mr. Andrew Baillon, which we believe to be on account of Speedwell Island through Mr. H. P. Cobb writes it is on account of Mr. Louis Baillon.

6. Messrs. Hindley have called again to learn the decision upon the Lamb sets sent on 'Hilarion' 26 Feb 81, which you reported were not suitable but which we told you, 23 June last N<sup>o</sup>. 608, 20, that they wished to have realized in the best manner you could arrange.

7. The interesting Photographs of the 'Hornet' 'Wimrod' &c: which you kindly sent last mail were yesterday submitted to the Directors, who were much pleased with them and desire their best thanks, we hope you will frequently oblige us with such views of the Colony.

8. We regret to learn that the Pacific W. Africa bringing the next Despatch is delayed as it will defer the chartering of the Tallow vessel, and if heavy orders come in prevent her sailing as early as arranged which will be bad for the Ewes in lamb; we trust the Agent will specify such goods as you want by steamer for the next direct steamer 'Ramses' will be due at Stanley nearly if not quite a month before the Tallow Vessel.

Sir, Our last was dated the 16<sup>th</sup> inst. and ought to go on from Sandy Point with this Despatch by the Flosmos St. 'Lucor'. On the 24<sup>th</sup> inst. we received your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 345 and 346 by the Pacific St. Africa to Bordeaux.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 345, 2. The Passengers for your Brother by the 'Cordova' were provided with Cabin accommodation at the usual low rate, the provisions were supplied by the merchants who furnished the ship's stores upon the Co.'s scale which is considered liberal and Capt. Jones did not make any claim for extra supplies to them - as they had bedding going out with them it was used by themselves in their berths, at my advice, in preference to its being stowed in the hold and getting damp thus being dangerous for use on arrival.

3. Par 5, 21. We are extremely concerned at your expressing doubts respecting the putting together the framework of the Steam Launch as you agreed this was the best mode of getting such a vessel into service at Stanley - all the timber is ordered according to Miller & Puppi's estimates but will have to be moulded and steamed for bending at Stanley and as the C. has qualified workpeople in their service it was presumed such work could be carried out, and as the arrangements are now too far completed to be altered we trust the undertaking will be successfully completed - copies of Miller and Puppi's contract, letters &c. and instructions from them will be sent by the vessel, also any further hints we can now obtain.

4. Par 10. The Board receives with satisfaction the report of the favorable health of the Sheep and trust the expected accounts of the lamb cutting will show a larger increase of stock than last year's, since dissatisfaction was expressed at the Extraordinary General Meeting yesterday at the small increase of late years, also that the number booted down was less last year than formerly, as the Fallow brings in a large portion of our income this ought to be looked into.

5. Par 16. We are sorry there should be a temporary difficulty about the Flosmos Steamers lying alongside our Stables to receive and deliver cargo, but trust you will get over it as your report Capt. Seemann is so attentive & considerate, the mat-

-ter shall be mentioned the next time we write to Mr. Stauder - his last reported that the S.V. 'Theben' left Montevideo on 13<sup>th</sup> inst. without receiving cargo there and not intending to call at any Brazil port to fill up he anticipates she has a large quantity of our Wool on board, your last Despatch makes no mention of a shipment, if intended it might as well have been reported, we have taken the precaution to increase the Insurance for Steamers.

6. Par 22. This most unfortunate Mef<sup>r</sup>s. Tyler &c<sup>r</sup> have made another mistake about the Fly hydraulic Wool Pres<sup>s</sup> we sent them full copies of your remarks and order which they seemed to consider most carefully and to understand - copy of this paragraph will now be sent them and the plan you propose carried out. As there are continual difficulties with the Fly hydraulic Wool Pres<sup>s</sup>s the Board deems it would be wise <sup>to</sup> have an extra one made as a standby in case of breakages or other faults, this should be an exact counterpart of the most suitable pres<sup>s</sup>s we already possess so that all parts may be interchangeable, if you consider this can be carried out with advantage the fullest details of our best pres<sup>s</sup>s will have to be sent as soon as possible, so that endeavours may be made to have it landed before the next wool pressing commences, then if any of our three wool pres<sup>s</sup>s broke down this new one could be substituted; and

7. Par 23. We consider you have done right to place the responsibility of the miscarriage of the Cheque at Montevideo upon Mr. Dettleff and we trust the matter has been arranged without further complications.

8. Mef<sup>r</sup>s. Hinöhr & Burchard the Shipbrokers of the Flornius C<sup>r</sup>: at Hamburg write that Jordan's Box for Allen N<sup>o</sup>. 1251 must be on board the S.V. 'Gatkarah', we trust it will be found, as the 30 pkgs Provisions on Bill of Lading, being Morton's who only sent 29, clears up the one bag of Rice struck out - if this proves to be the case she loaded all the cargo sent to Hamburg, for her. Enclosed is return of Consignments of Stores to Stanley for 1881 and 1882 which shows that our shipments last year were very heavy, only three former years 1875, 6, 7 being larger.

9. Mef<sup>r</sup>s. Kirkland Cope &c<sup>r</sup> ask for name of remitter of n. 5.7 on Statement N<sup>o</sup>. 132. Mef<sup>r</sup>s. Octzmann &c<sup>r</sup> 67 Hampstead Road write that Mr. J. Norton advises them of a remittance through us, we have told them there is no record of this. Mrs. M<sup>r</sup> Prines, 51 Crawford St., Greenock, is in distress at not hearing from her daughter Mary (p. 2 of Bray 9 July 80) who she has heard is married to William Welch.

10. The Colonial Office advertise in the Lancet of 20<sup>th</sup> instant for a Medical Man for West Falkland, two have called here for information which has been given.

11. The Barque 'Wave Queen' 313 tons Register Capt<sup>r</sup>. R. B. Peak has been chartered for the Tallow Vessel as per Charter

7

dated 24<sup>th</sup> inst - objection was made to granting 45 days for discharging and loading at the Islands, being much smaller than former vessels for which 45 was sufficient we agreed to 40 days - she is just re-clasped for eight years, has a very accommodating Captain who has been in her since built, sails fast and is a large carrier. Mr. Bettune and three daughters will go in her, also a Shepherd to attend to the 20 sheep, as there are so many we thought of sending a couple, but Mr. Bettune having returned by the 'Pakkarak' your ideas in letter of 29 Nov<sup>r</sup>. will be carried out: we trust she will be able to leave Gravesend on 26<sup>th</sup> February. The Pudent for Stores per Mail will be executed by the Mr. 'Ranses' of 9 Moth next. Unfortunately you have omitted to state the number <sup>of tons</sup> of Steam Coal on hand.

12. continuation of Part b - and unless there is an objection to having uniform Hydraulic Presses at the three Stations (on which the Board wishes information) they would suggest that for the future all presses should be of this uniform pattern and one kept in Store at Stanley to meet future breakdowns.

Sir, We wrote on 30<sup>th</sup> ult. by the 'W. Africa' via Sandy Point and now enclose duplicate of that Despatch as well as Duplicate of the former one dated 16<sup>th</sup> ultimo by the same route: I wrote on the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> instant to catch the 'Africa' at Lisbon to answer your Despatch 347 received on 31<sup>st</sup> ult., which having been approved at the last Board will be sufficient reply to it.

Your Despatch 348 arrived on the 15<sup>th</sup> inst. P. 'Theben', she delivered at Havre 338 bales Wool and 49 bales Sheepskins for us, 24 bales Sheepskins and 6 packages Samples of Preserved Mutton for Waldron.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 348, 5. With respect to cost of G. Mercer's passage on returning I told him that as you had not recommended him for reengagement we could not grant it but that he could apply to you respecting same, the Board have now decided that after he has performed two years proper service he may be allowed Ten Pounds (£10) for the passage he paid for himself - this will be a guide for some such arrangement with W. Bethune should you take him into our service again.

3. Par 18. We are glad to hear that every thing is working smoothly in the Camp, I am however directed to call your attention to the further serious falling off in the number of Lambs which is very greatly to the Co<sup>'s</sup> disadvantage, this reduction has been going on since 1878 although the number of Ewes increased year by year up to 1880, the Board desires therefore that you make the strictest investigation into this most unfortunate occurrence in the Co<sup>'s</sup> business, since it must materially diminish our profits and even threatens a cessation of them - if needful to procure better attention from the Shepherds the Board suggests prizes for the largest proportion of lambs reared, as of course with proper management they must be born,

4. Par 20, 21. We have received two cases Furniture for Norton from Getzmann &c. - as soon as the Army and Navy Cooperative Soc. wrote about your Wine we telegraphed them to deliver immediately but it has not arrived. This vessel the 'Wave Queen' is quite full having taken a large cargo for her size, the Board decided that your limit of tonnage was to be adhered to and as the Steam Launch and the Timber ordered has taken up a large space 50 tons House Coals have been shut out, this was the best thing to retain as I considered a supply could be sent with the next shipment of Steam Coals though you will object the quality from South Wales will not be so good as the North Country House Coal, still the shutting out cannot be avoided, this applies also to ten long spars which could not be reeved down below and as she has not much deadweight in her bottom Capt<sup>n</sup>. Peak decided only two could be taken on deck as the Sheep Pens were heavy, this reason prevents a second hand 20 or 30 feet Ship's Boat being sent. Wills would not ship any Tobacco on the chance of its being returned if the duty was not reduced. The Passengers Mrs. Bethune and three daughters and W<sup>m</sup> Ferguson Shepherd to look after the sheep are provisioned by the ship at Eight Pounds (£8) for four adults upon the Co<sup>'s</sup> scale to meet with the Captain who appears a very careful honest man and promises to make them comfortable. The Sheep are 10 Rams and 10 Ewes, five each from Rigden, five each from Neame, the latter tripped by Sturgeon's Merino Rams, we trust they will arrive safe and lamb good animals for breeding purposes, the Captain, Mate and Ferguson are each to receive a gratuity for those landed alive in good condition.

5. The Board decided at their last Meeting on the 19<sup>th</sup> inst<sup>t</sup> not to enter into any Coal Contract with the Admiralty as the terms though modified are still one sided since they will not name a time <sup>for</sup> the consumption

of any quantity and it is doubtful whether they could prevent their Steamers going to Dean when our stock proved to be old. You have omitted in the last two Despatches to state the number of tons of Steam Coals on hand, I presume the Board will attend to your requirements for a further supply in the same manner as the 'Inverness' shipment, when the House Coals and Spars could be shipped.

6. With respect to the more frequent calls of the Cosmos Steamers it appears that I have misunderstood Mr. Staude's remarks, as he now states that they cannot give more than the twelve services a year as at present unless the English Government will grant them a larger subsidy, but that they are endeavouring to arrange for the arrivals at Stanley to be more regular as to the days between each Steamer. Mr. Berthune has written to his wife complaining of not getting proper food and meals on the 'Takkarah', copy of his letter has been sent to Mr. Staude who does not believe it, I shall be anxious to know if he complains to you and affords proof of the want of attention to him. We are sorry to learn that the P.R. 'Malvinas' has come to Montevideo badly damaged as this may prevent the Wool being collected for the homeward Steamers.

7. The father of the two Saunders has sent us their letters about Cash forwarded to him, William T. Saunders writes on 22 Oct 82 that he has sent £ 28 to his father, your statements do not give any such remittance, please enquire if it was sent through the Post Office.

8. We have no record of Martins Commission for extra Tallow produced from each sheep boiled down for the years 80 and 81, this ought to be supplied to make our returns of Tallow correct.

Sir, Our last Despatch on 26<sup>th</sup> ult. was conveyed by the Bdg 'Wave Queen', Duplicate being enclosed, she passed Deal on the 1<sup>st</sup> inst. with a fair wind and has been fortunate in getting away so well, many vessels having been detained in the Channel for weeks past. Your Despatch N. 349 dated 26<sup>th</sup> Jan<sup>st</sup> last P. G. Malvinas' to Montevideo arrived on the 3<sup>rd</sup> inst. by Gv. 'Leibnitz' to Southampton.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 349, 2. We are glad to hear the Accounts for last year are favorable and coming forward by H.M.S. 'Firefly' on 3<sup>rd</sup> Feb<sup>st</sup>, as these advices ought to be here earlier than the Mail of 2<sup>nd</sup> Feb<sup>st</sup> by S.V. 'Gatkarah' to Sandy Point, besides by the two opportunities we are safe to obtain either original or duplicate.

3. Par 3. We do not think it would be correct to put the publican to the expense of a legal opinion as to the power of the Licensing Ordinance of 1882 (N<sup>o</sup>. 11 of 1882) as Clause 78 expressly repeals all former Ordinances upon this subject, so that he is bound by the regulations of the last Ordinance which is now the law of the Colony.

4. Part 4. We now notice that the duty on Tobacco is to be three shillings per pound upon all sorts, which is in accordance with the Colonial Office Letter to Capt<sup>l</sup> Wills of Bristol as per N<sup>o</sup>. 616, 14, you have not said whether the order for their Tobacco is to be sent, perhaps you will decide when answering the above mentioned Despatch.

5. The Directors do not consider par 3 of last Despatch about the falling off in the Lambing strong enough, I am therefore to observe that they are surprised that you have not made any comments on such a loss to the Company, since there has been no previous preparation to expect it and they do not find that you have reported bad weather at the time of lambing, which would naturally cause a little decrease, nor has there been any intimation of a short supply of Rams, in fact no report or observation to mitigate the lamentable fact of a serious falling off in the Co<sup>l</sup>'s prospects, as the continued diminution

of Lambs will throw us back for years and we have already complained in the early part of last year of the previous short lambing - the very existence of the C° depends on the lambing being kept up and not only kept up but also increased as far as possible since with the C° large tracts of land there is full scope for this.

The Board expects full explanations upon this state of affairs and details of the steps taken to remedy it, since there does not appear to have been an extra number of sheep boiled down, but if too many Ewes have been sent to the Tallow works by all means keeps them now for another breeding season.

6. The following is about the 'Wave Queen' - the guarantees for the Sheep are Captain 4/- Mate 3/- Ferguson 2/- Ferguson received Four Pounds (£4) as advance of Wages - M<sup>r</sup>. Bethune received Five Pounds (£5) to be repaid by her husband - were there two Rags? Dno: 5g. 14. 1 in the Despatch - you will observe that the Charterparty Gravity of Ten Pounds (£10) to Capt<sup>r</sup>. Peak is payable here - we had to buy some Rope at Gravesend for lashing the Sheep Pens I write him by this mail that any not used is to be handed over to you - the rings on the water tanks for the Steam Launch are to draw them out from their places not for lifting, the best plan for lifting is to put a toggle into the man hole - M<sup>r</sup>. Bethune asked if she could have the bedding & bed clothes, I said yes provided they would not be required for Passengers coming home - Baf<sup>r</sup> H.C° will now allow 2½% on Invoice price when more than 100 hds are supplied during the year.

7. Mr. Mansel and Mr. R. H. Buckworth left by the R.M. G.W. Est<sup>r</sup> on 1<sup>st</sup> inst<sup>r</sup> for Montevideo to go down by this steamer to Stanley, the former to again undertake the management of Capt<sup>r</sup>. Pack<sup>r</sup>'s property. The latter has sent a Sheep Dog by the 'Wave Queen' paying four Pounds (£4) freight for it and providing a kennel and 56 lbs Dog & Biscuit. We consider the cost of the passages of the Bethune family to be £45 the husband will therefore have to be charged Fifteen Pounds if engaged by the Company. Yesterday I discovered that Eley Bros. had not supplied the ½ dog Nipple Springs so bought them of Blanch and enclose them in this Despatch.

8. Yesterday M<sup>r</sup>. H. D. Sharpe paid 2. 18. 7 to the credit of Mr. Robert Blake of Bill Cove, this we presume to be the new Station he has made on dividing the Sheep Run No. 8 with Mr. Holmested.

Enclosing Duplicate of our last by Dr. Ramses' I am happy to report that she carried the Donkey Pumps for the Steam Launch's Water Tanks, which is more powerful than anticipated, throwing 2,400 gals per hour instead of 1,500 gals as per Miller & Tupp's letter of 9<sup>th</sup> inst. herewith.

2. This morning I have seen Messrs Shaw Savill & Co about coaling their S<sup>r</sup> 'Westmeath' coming home from New Zealand; which might require 1,000 tons next July, the price named 60/- together with the impossibility of guaranteeing that quantity precluded any arrangement being made, since Coals can be obtained at New Zealand at 14/- to £9/- per ton but as these native coals require 35 to 40 per cent more in quantity than Welsh to keep up the same steam & consequently take up a large extra space which might be devoted to cargo a reduction of price might tempt a steamer to call, we shall be anxious therefore to learn your remarks on the statement upon the Coals per 'Governor' showing a cost of 52/6 a ton sent you in our letter of the 1<sup>st</sup> ult.

3. We must warn you to be very careful in purchasing Sealskins as the value here has fallen excessively, some sorts being entirely unsaleable.

4. Dr. W. F. Anderson (initials indistinct) of Stanley, N.B. informs us that he has been appointed by the Colonial Office Medical Officer for West Falkland & asks for various information, which has been furnished as full as known here.

Sir, Since our last on the 13<sup>th</sup> inst. by this route we received your Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 350 by S. V. 'Sakkarah' to Sandy Point and N<sup>o</sup>. 351 by H. M. S. 'Firefly' to Montevideo, both being brought by the F.W. Cordillera to Bordeaux, and delivered here on the 14<sup>th</sup> instant.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 350, 3. The Board is very glad to receive so promptly the Balanced Accounts for last year and congratulate you on the good result shown through our Depreciation made at a full rate and the Repairs for keeping Buildings and Plant in proper order diminish the Profit shown, the principle is correct and if a fault is one on the right side, should there ever be an urgent necessity for a relaxation it could be made for a year or two without damage to future prospects since care has been taken to keep everything in order.

3. N<sup>o</sup>. 351, 9. We have not increased the Insurance upon Wool in the three sheds as the greater part of the 400 bales mentioned as on hand must have left by the S. V. 'Luxor' before this intimation arrived, but the Board has ordered that the Insurance upon the next clip of Wool is to be increased to £ 6,000 (six thousand pounds) in the sheds, please advise the proportion for each shed; when the Wool is moved into Stanley it is covered by the Produce policies for Steamers during transit by schooners and steamers and storage in bulkes in Stanley Harbour.

4. Par 12. The matter of a Coal Contract with the Admiralty has been explained by late Despatches and the Directors are sorry they cannot accede to your views, but they trust you will still continue to use your best endeavours to get H. M. Steamers to coal with the E<sup>c</sup>: for if our calculations as to the cost of the Steam Coals &c. Diversions are too high we might induce the Admiralty to come to terms for a real Contract by a reduction of price,

The Board says the present offer is not a Contract, we are to be bound to keep a stock of Coals but they are not bound to take them, hence the objection, still this difficulty may be overcome. You are in error when you think that my energies are devoted to outside steamers, the owners of such likely to pass the Islands come here for information & terms, which are given to the best of our knowledge in hopes of business being drawn to Stanley, and as steamers are increasing you must surely agree it is best to make the place known as eventually it might become a coaling station. The stock of Coals on hand is again omitted.

5. Par 13. It is most unfortunate that the Walker Creek Hydraulic Wool Press has broken, our wise proposal for an extra Press for emergencies as per N° 618, b & 12 will therefore be more essential than ever, if you are prompt in sending dimensions & full particulars it could be shipped next September to arrive during November & thus be ready for next clipping.

6. Par 15. We shall be exceedingly anxious for your report of Camp inspection as this must give some decision about the short lambing and the crossing with Merinos to fine our Wool, which is so necessary for the present demand by manufacturers. In N° 345, b you say the Merino crofs ought not to be tried until the Romney Marsh strain had passed through our flocks, having imported these Rams for many years we considered their blood & wool had well crossed our Chervilots - and this having occurred was the reason of your procuring Merino Rams from Montevideo in 1879. Your further remark that "the quality of the North Arm Hogget wool this year will be instructive", we therefore now draw your attention to the sale of the Thibens 15 Feb 83 Wool on the 15<sup>th</sup> inst., when 19 bales <sup>NA</sup> Hoggets  $\frac{1}{2}$  bred merino fetched 10 $\frac{1}{4}$  all the highest price realized at this sale, as per Messrs' Enderborough Vbd's priced Catalogue herewith, being lot 330. Lot 337 Ram  $\frac{1}{2}$  bred Merino only fetched 9 $\frac{1}{2}$  but coming from Darwin Harbour it may not have been the same crofs: we have asked the Brokers if they can obtain from the buyers of lot 330 the number of fleeces in any of the bales to enable an estimate of the weight per fleece to be made, we fear this can hardly be done so request you to order that a number may be weighed separately to arrive at this information, which will give the value produced by each sheep, as although the value of wool from merino sheep is higher the weight is less, still perhaps the greater quantity of yolk in merinos may make up the difference and certain it is that this yolk matting the wool together is beneficial for the health of the animal in such a rough windy climate as the Falklands. This pointed out that wether & ewe wool ought not to be mixed as in lot 334 - an inferior fleece was found at end of a bale which lowers the value of the whole bale.

7. One of the enclosures is the acreage of the Company's Land for the Tax as per Ordinance No. 14 of 1882, on which there are no comments - we notice the Co's Islands leased to other Sheepfarmers are not deducted from the total of 676,518 acres - we shall be glad to have an explanation upon clause 2 of this Ordinance which exempts certain Land leased in sections by the Government - when the tax on land and that on tenements is paid full particulars must be sent: the Journal Entry of Rent paid to Government does not give the section upon which 26. 13. 6 was paid, nor the £33, please supply fuller particulars.

8. It was reported at the last Board that the centre of the Company's Stores was very frequently heated through heat generating in the centre of the pile from being too long piled up - after being salted for 10 days or a fortnight the pile should be turned over and fresh salt put in, it will be well to give orders to this effect. One of the Directors wished to know how many head of Tame Cattle we had, as this information could not be found it was decided to ask you to furnish same and continue it every six months.

9. The Stanley Wages List does not give the office filled by Holway whose pay is £9 a month. I am to remark that the Cash Specie sent by the 'Cordova' 27 Feb 82 does not seem to have reduced the Cash Deposits on which we pay interest. The Stores ordered will be shipped by the S.W. illenes of 1<sup>st</sup> May.

Sir, We now enclose Duplicates of our two last Despatches by the Pacific route through Sandy Point and acknowledge your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 352 and 353, dated 9 and 13 Mch last, the Duplicates being received from Montevideo on 14<sup>th</sup> ult., the Originals and Enclosures were delivered on the 24<sup>th</sup> ult. by the direct G.W. 'Luxor'.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 352, 1. With respect to your request for the measurement of ~~DB~~ 600 bales Wool at Theben 15 Feb 83, we can only send copy of Nicols Freight Acc<sup>t</sup> 569.9.2 of 19 Feb 83 where our three lots of Wool are lumped together as 301 bales.

3. Par 2. We are much gratified at learning that this year's clip has so much increased, also that the average weight of Wool per sheep has risen to 6 $\frac{1}{4}$  lb as this will partially compensate for the lesser numbers of sheep of which we have been lately complaining.

4. Par 3. M<sup>s</sup>rs. Tyler were immediately consulted about the broken Bedplate of the Hydraulic Wool Press and as they considered it would be better to have it here to be certain of replacing it properly we sent Telegram Out N. 27 "Bed" on 23 ult. to catch S<sup>r</sup> 'Cordillera' at Montevideo having Despatch N<sup>o</sup>. 622 for Sandy Point, and trust it arrived there in time for the 'Memphis' to pick up and deliver to you on 4 May.

5. Par 5. It is satisfactory to hear that the Coals supplied are being sold, we received Telegram Home N. 36 on 22 Mch as per particulars in my letter of 27 Mch and on 4 ult. we replied by Telegram Out N. 26 "Fictionist Carlos Geemann arranges Emil Famine Elise Coals Timber" to catch S<sup>r</sup> 'Britannia' at Montevideo having Despatch 621 for Sandy Point, which had ample time to be delivered for the 'Memphis' to hand to you on 4 May - Mr. Stande wrote us about the Emil Julius' being under Capt. Geemann's recommendation & we can only now send copy of Mr. Hagen's Letter of 31 Mch last. We are pleased to hear that the Ocean Merthyr Steam Coals are approved, M<sup>s</sup>rs. Partridge informs us that the double screening is now seldom asked for since with their Coals it does not make much difference to compensate for the extra charge of nine pence per ton and shippers find that the double screened do not bed so well in the holds of vessels and arrive out almost more broken than the once screened coal.

6. Par 6. The Directors have considered very carefully your further explanations about a Coal Contract with the Admiralty and though agreeing with some of the observations adduced to their former decision not to enter into one at present, they acknowledge the great interest you have taken in the matter but repeat that as the Government expect this C° to act it would not be a Contract but a onesided stipulation, we are to keep a good stock of Coals at a considerable outlay of Cash, with interest accruing, use of bulk depriving us of the means of storing cargo from vessels in distress, preventing us accepting the offer of an enhanced price for coaling a mercantile or foreign Steamer because we must reserve a stock for St. M. Vessels at a price which you acknowledge does not return our outlay - and though you think that a contract would increase the coaling it appears that St. M. Steamers still visit the Colony without our running any risk.

7. Par 7. We have not heard anything of the Shepherds you report as desirous to reengage with this C° after having been in New Zealand but will certainly carry out your suggestions if they apply as we have always considered former servants must be better for us if of good character than new men: Wallace & Maxwell when here on 23 ult. could not decide about returning but are to write as soon as they have made up their minds - we have informed Fleming of our anticipated requirements for the direct mail of 12 Sep to arrive 16 Oct in time for lambing, shearing &c: as your advices due 30 May and 15 June ought to bring direct orders on the subject as to number and whether some may be married: W<sup>m</sup> Douglas, Brother of Thos. Douglas formerly in our service, has applied for engagement, he is 33 years old with a wife and 4 children, these come expensive by Steamer. You did quite right, N<sup>o</sup> 353 Par 2, to send Mr. Wallace second class, a girl was born three weeks before arrival at Dartmouth, she & her husband report they were made most comfortable - the Board consider females returning for us ought to travel second class by the German Steamers until better regulations and accommodation are provided on their larger boats now building.

8. Par 8. I believe we have already told you that copy of Williams' Will could not be found at Somerset House, we then wrote to the Mayor of Bangor but received no reply, further enquiries shall now be made. We cannot do more with the Government Merchant Shipowners C° than what is reported, they instruct their Captains to go to the C° so you must endeavour to get their vessels by all legitimate means.

9. Par 9. We trust that you will be appointed a Member of the Legislative Council for as having the care of the very large interests of this Corporation in the Colony it is but right that you having full knowledge and experience of the Islands should have a voice in the management of the Falklands.

10. Par 10. We wrote on the 26 ult. to W. G. Wills Esq.

M. P. with copy of the Petition of 2 Mch 83 about the Tobacco Revenue asking for his support at the Colonial Office, yesterday their Manager called to enquire the quantity of Tobacco imported into the Colony, I could only give him our four last shipments from Brazil of over £700 lbs each, which is but a very small quantity, can you furnish the total quantity per annum imported from England, also from America.

11. Par 13. We are glad to hear the fence from Swan River to Island Harbour is erected and trust the continuation to Fitzroy River will soon be put up - but the Directors are especially gratified at learning your intentions to substantially increase the breeding stock, this being a prime necessity if our present success is to be continued - it was remarked at the Board the other day that we can now afford some fencing & as it must be beneficial to cut off promontories and make other divisions more attention ought to be paid to this matter, for Sheep Farmers in S. America and the Colonies all agree as to its being a saving of expense in the number of Shepherds required and the extreme extent of land being able to be utilized - one of the Directors enquired whether the wood posts you obtain from the Straits of Magellan are as lasting as the hard wood from the River Plate, the latter may cost more to buy but considering the heavy island expenses for erection and the rough climate there good hard wood would perhaps be cheaper in the end.

12. Par 14. We are disappointed at hearing that a large amount must be laid out to put the Co<sup>o</sup>. buildings into proper repair, as both the Board and myself were under impression that you had reported lately that they were in good order - on 6 Aug 80 N. 297, 7, you wrote that there would be no necessity for any heavy expenditure for some years to come, though on 29 Oct 80 N. 300, 4, you reported the houses required thorough painting - however the matter must be attended to at once and properly done to make our people comfortable and in future care must be taken to keep up the Co<sup>o</sup>. buildings in an efficient state of repair.

13. Par 15. We wrote the Cosmos C<sup>o</sup> urging that their Steamers should make provision for bedding &c required by 3<sup>rd</sup> class Passengers on embarkation at Stanley & learning that this could not be done we availed of the 'Elise' at Swansea to purchase four lots of the necessary articles at One Pound each, about the same price as we pay here for our Shepherds from Dartmouth, which can be kept in the Store for issue to people coming home, if this answers further supplies can be sent <sup>cheap</sup> from time to time, of course you must let us know to avail of freight by sailing vessels out.

14. Par 16. It is very unfortunate that Despatch 6/18 had not arrived in time at Sandy Point by the Pacific St. Africa to be brought on by the 'Luxor', as the Africa' conveyed my letters of 1 & 2 Feb now considered an addition to that Despatch.

15. Par 18. The confusion about the Speedwell Estate, which you so properly describe as needless, arises through the want of candour towards us in not reporting that W. H. C. Cobb was going to buy a half share of the Trustees interest - Statement on Accounts c/c £ 139 orders a payment of £ 100 to the Trustees without giving their names and we do not know who they are - there is also a foot note that this £ 100 is only to be paid if £ 500 has been received in London on account of Speedwell Estate, but your Journal of Jan 83, received in same Despatch 352, has an entry to credit of Speedwell Estate from London Office Cash Account 549.16.9 for proceeds of 30 bales Wool ex Luxor 30 Oct 82 - still I presume we should be justified in paying the £ 100 to any persons proving themselves to be Trustees of this Estate: we await further explanations upon this matter with details of stock, buildings &c.

16. Par 19. As the Lamb Nets wrongly supplied by Hindley in October 26 Feb 81 are useless to the C: and you cannot sell them to other Sheep Farmers they had better be returned by the 'Wave Queen' as we must bring them back free of charge on behalf of Hindley who supplies us with Wool Bagging.

17. Par 21. The Bill on the French Minister of Marine fr: 9931.33 for the G.W. Romanché's expenses has been returned this <sup>day</sup> accepted - we consider the pound sterling weight to be taken in future at 25.50 francs.

18. N° 353, 3. With respect to the Sakkarah 29 Dec 82 not having delivered N° 1,250 one package by hydraulic Press Ram, we received notice on 12 ult: from the General Steam Navigation C: that it had been just discovered at their St. Katharine's Wharf; though on their G.W. Iris' Bill of Lading for Hamburg dated 9 Dec 82 - we have allowed it to be shipped by the present Steamer and have given notice to the General Steam Navigation C: and the Hosnos C: that we hold them liable for all loss and inconvenience arising from this mistake - the latter deny their liability not having received the package from the Genl. S. Navigation C: but we reply that if we had not found it entered on the 'Sakkarah's' Bill of Lading dated 21 Dec 82 we should have claimed it from the Genl. S. Navigation C: and shipped it by our 'Wave Queen' or the G.W. Ramses 9 Mch 83 which would have enabled you to put the press in order for pressing the Wool now coming home - this mishap is another proof of the necessity of an extra Press for a stand by.

19. Par 4. Our Telegram Out St. 26 will have told you to take the draft of the Captain of the San Carlos' upon the owner Mr. Daniel Jones of Swansea for her expenses. Lloyd's have furnished us with a



yesterday announcing that the 'Gipsica' had been abandoned

20. In accordance with your Telegram Home N<sup>o</sup>. 36  
ordering more Steam Coals we have chartered the Barqueentine  
'Elise' 396 tons Capt<sup>n</sup> C. Christians for Stanley, and as she would  
not agree for less than 600 tons out and there was no other vessel  
likely to offer we agreed for that tonnage as there were some  
House Coals stowed out of the 'Wave Queen', also some Spars,  
and understanding that the Ocean Merthyr are very good  
house coals we have ordered 570 tons, 20 tons measurement  
Building Timber, eight fine long Spars to be stowed on  
deck, to which the Captain required two short spars  
23 ft long each, these are obtained, also a good secondhand 22  
feet Ship's Boat : we trust you understand that the words  
"Famine Elise costs timber" in Telegram Out N<sup>o</sup>. 26 was to  
give you notice of the above. In your last Despatch said the  
2,000 gallons Little's Sheep Dip needed might go by Coal ship  
we have sent 200 10 gal drums : she also carries 5 cases Private  
Effects for Dr. A. J. Anderson, Surgeon for West Falkland,  
who is a passenger by the present Steamer, his wife & four  
children following when he has arranged for a house &c. - two  
cases Passengers Bedding, a parcel & box for the S. American  
Missionary Soc<sup>t</sup>, and several parcels in charge of Capt<sup>n</sup> Christians  
who knows several people at Stanley. Unfortunately she has  
been rather delayed but will leave Swansea by end of this  
week - Her owners M<sup>s</sup> Richards Power & C<sup>o</sup> wanted me to  
put on more coal and on my declining having already been  
forced to exceed your requirements have decided to ship  
70 to 80 tons Ocean Merthyr which Capt<sup>n</sup> Christian may  
sell to you at their cost and freight or retain on board for  
ballast as she is going on to the West Coast ; they would  
like to hear of her arrival so I offered the use of our Indicator  
for a Telegram through Humphreys if you can send up to  
Montevideo. You have again omitted to report the  
number of tons Steam Coals on hand, this must be attended  
to and the number of tons House Coals also given by every  
Despatch, for making no doubt from reports on Ocean Merthyr  
that they will answer for house use we can combine the  
two supplies in future. The Stores by this Steamer are the  
whole of Indent 12.

21. Your letter to me of 2 Feb 83 about the Agency for the National Fire Insurance Office was submitted to the Board of last month and the Directors will feel obliged by your undertaking this in conjunction with that of the North British, putting before intending insurers the two offices so that they may determine which they wish to patronize.

22. As you stated the halfbred Merino Wool ought to decide our future crops of Sheep and referring to our Despatch 522, b, we now send statement of the number of fleeces found by the buyers in three of the bales which may help you to reply to our queries upon the Wool ~~as~~ Theben 15 Feb 83.  
The 49 bales Sheepskins by this Steamer were sold 26 ult<sup>r</sup>, the Brokers state that they ought not to be trimmed so much over the haunch and at the hind leg, as the form is spoilt by the hind part of the sheepskin being narrower than the fore part of the skin. It is a long time since we have had a list of the distribution of our Shepherds at the different stations and houses, with the flocks in their charge, families, horses &c. Please furnish this by an early opportunity.

23. We send a number of our new Mail Tables for the latter part of this year and commencement of next year, also some issued by the Cosmos C° with rates, Agents and other particulars, more will follow in the Elise's Despatch tomorrow. As usual we have obliged a great number of people with our Mail Tables, also the Government Offices, Consuls &c - The Post Office promised to send me a number of the notice they print but to the present none have arrived.

Sir, Enclosing Duplicate of our last on 3<sup>rd</sup> ult. by the Coal vessel 'Elise' from Swansea we have to acknowledge your Despatches N<sup>o</sup>. 354, of 30<sup>th</sup> March, received on 15<sup>th</sup> ult., N<sup>o</sup>. 355 of 10<sup>th</sup> April, duplicate to hand 28<sup>th</sup> ult. from Montevideo, Original on 30<sup>th</sup> ult., and N<sup>o</sup>. 356, dated 19<sup>th</sup> April, which arrived on 28<sup>th</sup> ultimo.

2. N<sup>o</sup>. 354, 4. After some little trouble we learned that M<sup>rs</sup> James Finlay &c, 34 Leadenhall St., are Agents for the Compagnie Commerciale et Financière du Pacifique of Paris and they have lately told us that M<sup>r</sup>. Maître is Agent at Valparaiso with whom rests all arrangements for shipping Guano to Europe, we therefore wrote him on the 1<sup>st</sup> & 4<sup>th</sup> inst. requesting the Agency for all vessels calling at Stanley and trust he will appoint you since our claims as you are Chilean Consul and Lloyd's Agent are so strong.

3. Par 5. Steps were immediately taken to obtain a Ship Carpenter to put the Steam Launch ex 'Wave Queen' together and we hope to get a suitable man to start by the next Mail on 12 July.

4. Par 6. We regret to report that M<sup>r</sup>. Staude cannot take any Spars by the next direct G.W. 'Nekos' on 12 July, tho' we trust he will be able to oblige us by a succeeding one (see copies of correspondence herewith) so it is very fortunate that the 'Elise' took so many, in future our Tallow vessel must always convey a full supply: though the 'Elise' had also some Building Timber to fill up we shall send the quantity asked for as the Flomos C<sup>o</sup>. have agreed to reduce the freight to 35/- per cubic meter: the Photo attached to this Paragraph fully demonstrates the necessity of Spars for the 'Emil Julius' and the position of the G.W. 'Lucor' taking in Wool from the bulk 'Egeria', it is very sharply taken, I am sorry not to have received a duplicate by the later Despatch for the Co. portfolio & should like one for my own collection, M<sup>r</sup>. Staude states he has a copy.

5. Par 9. With respect to Sheep to the Straits of Magellan we heard from M<sup>r</sup>. Holmested that he was selling a great number to M<sup>r</sup>. Reynard and wrote him asking full particulars as to prices, freight &c - you say the price was 8/- which would not pay the C<sup>o</sup>, presumably considering that when boiled

down they realize more money but from a statement now enclosed it does not appear there is much difference, still if the selling to strangers produced a little more than the boating down, the latter might be the best plan as the creation of Sheep Farms in that neighbourhood adds to the production of Wool which would compete with ours.

6. N<sup>o</sup>. 355, 4. We are glad to hear so much Wool is coming home by the 'Memphis' on 5 May - we notice that Holmested & Blake's Wool is not entered though they both write that this year it will be consigned to the C<sup>o</sup>: - referring to 356, 2 Mr. Stande also intimates that she will scarcely be able to receive all the Wool & Passengers ready for her, if any of the latter are detained the consequences may be very serious, we trust therefore that Capt. Geesmann may always be informed in good time of our requirements for the homeward bound steamers.

7. Par 5. It would have been better to have sent the particulars and sizes of the followers required for our three Hydraulic Wool Presses, you state different sized bales are not now required but can the followers be usable if all made alike, after the Mail we must consult M<sup>r</sup>. Tyler &c: as anything required ought to be shipped by the direct steamer of 12 Sept<sup>r</sup>. to be ready for the next clipping.

8. Par 18. I am sorry you have been annoyed by a bad copy of my letter of 24 Feb last written on board the 'Wave Queen', where copying can only be done by a little travelling press which sometimes does not make the second copy good, of course the Clerks are to blame for sending such a duplicate as the indistinct parts ought to have been pencilled in.

9. Par 19. The Directors are very glad to receive such full explanations upon their remarks upon the late short breeding and compliment you on the tone of your observations which coupled with M<sup>r</sup>. Patterson's letters show that they were right in drawing your serious consideration to this matter, which we commenced as long ago as the early part of last year, it is therefore most gratifying to learn that every endeavour will now be made to increase our stocks and that this can now more readily be done in consequence of the eradication of Scab - also that due provision will be made for Sheep to the Tallow works which is a considerable source of income for the C<sup>o</sup>: as well as a means for improving our Sheep - it is satisfactory to find that the Fencing lately sent out is proving of such benefit, further steps ought therefore to be taken in this direction.

10. Par 20. Though you have given various good reasons for a Coal Contract with the Admiralty the Board adheres to their former expressed objections to this business, considering that the disadvantages preponderate over the advantages, we get rid of our Coals by degrees without the liability of a contract and as the storekeeping ought to be only a small portion of our business we must be content. I made an error in saying 623, 20 that the stock of Steam Coals was not given as your 352, 5 stated that 195 tons were on hand. The Return in the Despatch of the "Ships that have coaled since Jan 81" ought to have given the prices at which the Coal was sold, please supply this.

11. Par 22. You are right in reading Famine for Flamina in Telegram Out N<sup>o</sup>. 26, "Elise" the Coal vessel's name was put after Famine to prevent confusion with the other vessel "Emil Julius" - 623, 5 ought to have stated that this telegram was sent to catch S. V. 'Ramses' with Desp<sup>t</sup>. 620 and not for the 'Britannia' with Despatch 621.

12. Par 23. The drawing of the tank at Goose Green cannot at present be found, please give more particulars about it, I have no recollection of your asking for it to be returned.

13. Par 24. We are sorry to hear the Sakkarabi's cargo 29 Dec 82 was damaged and some Spirits broached, notice has been given to the Brokers here and the Kosmos C° that a claim will be made in future, the difficulty will be through our goods going by two lines of steamers, the General Steam Navigation C° hence to Hamburg, transhipping there and the Kosmos Steamers to Stanley.

14. Par 29. We have not been able to obtain the Board of Trade Instructions about Wreck & Salvage but now send the Mercantile Navy List published Feb<sup>r</sup>. last.

15. Par 30. Every attention shall be paid to Mr. Langdon on his return to England and the Directors will use their best endeavours to carry out your views as to his going back before the end of this year.

16. N<sup>o</sup>. 356, 3. We are extremely sorry to learn that our Statement about Wool sent out in N<sup>o</sup>. 620 is so wrong, it was made out by the late Chief Clerk Mr. Page and as the returns you mention ought to have been carefully copied there is no doubt such mistakes lead to misapprehensions about the working of the Sheep stock and their produce.

17. Par 4, 5. The Chronometer ex 'Kinrod' by the 'Cordova' was valued at £3 or £ only by Barraud, when we tried to sell it at the Auction Rooms below but only £4 being

offered it is now kept here in hopes of being sold at a better price : it was only on the 2<sup>nd</sup> ult. that we received Mr. Ward & Sturt & Sharp's account of the sale of the Wines & Gloves returned from the Store by the 'Cordova' 18 Oct 82 as the latter had to be dyed, the amount £3. 9. - was received on 5<sup>th</sup> ult. to the Credit of Island Administration.

18. Referring to N. 352, 8 about the Will of William Williams' Father enquiry was made at Somerset House but nothing could be found, we then wrote to Bangor & discovered a Son named Robert, who informs us that his Father died intestate and was insolvent at the time of his death, the correspondence is enclosed.

19. The 'Elise' sailed from Swansea late on the 4<sup>th</sup> ult., she carried a Coal Bill of Lading unknown to us being in a letter handed to Capt. Christian which we have only discovered in the last few days - 55 tons Ocean Merthyr Steam Coals the same as ours were put on board by the Owners, who have neglected to state how these were separated from the C. Coals : the box & parcel for the S. Am. Mfg. Soc. were not sent down so numbers 201, 2 are not used - the freight and insurance upon Dr. A. T. Anderson's 5 boxes Private Effects amount to £8. - 3 which we have asked him to pay you.

20. We send a couple Post Office Falklands Mails Notices received on 8 ult. founded on our Mail Service table - also copy from the London Gazette 4 ult. notifying that George Markham Dean and James Lovegrove Waldron are appointed Members of the Legislative Council.

21. We have sent Charts, Cards & Mail Table to Capt. C. B. Theobald of H. M. S. 'Satellite' bound to the Pacific.

22. The Wool ex S. W. 'Luxor' 30 Apr 83 proved to be 326 bales D H, 101 W C, 98 N. A and 17 W. Fell, some of the bales having had two despised together : it was sold, all but 6 bales D H, at good prices considering the state of the market on the 31<sup>st</sup> ult., one lot IV A Stogger  $\frac{1}{4}$  Merino fetching 9  $\frac{3}{4}$ , we must therefore try to extend the Merino cross amongst our flocks.

23. Mr. Holmested has remitted a Bill 327. 16. - due 31 Aug which is to go to the Credit of his Firm - Mr. Blake requests us to pay his Father £300 this month or next.

24. We had hoped you would have intimated the number of Shepherds required for the direct Mail of 12 Sep, now we trust Mr. Langdon will bring full particulars, about married or single, with addresses of those wishing to return as reported by Patterson.
