

a fiebt that I cannot possibly repay. I cannot thank you. Perhaps God will one day. I pray He will."





Vegetable seeds cannot be dispatched from Britain to individuals because distribution of seeds must be controlled for economic reasons. However the department of agriculture provides the necessary seeds for the vegetable garden. Flower seeds may be imported by the individual and it would be advisable to despretch your orders during the immediate future.

HEALTH BULLETIN.

FOOD.

The importance of food to health is obvious to anyone but until this century it was more a matter of rolk lore than of science. British sailors who suffered from scurvy found out long ago that lime juice helped this condition. Hobody knew why this was so until 1920 when it was discovered that scurvy was due to lack of Vitamin C.

Other diseases are likewise due to deficiencies. Beriberi is caused by lack of a substance called thiamin; rickets by lack of Vitamin D and so on. Still other diseases (and this is important to everyone who lives in the Falklands) though caused by germs, derive their chief terror from an alliance with wrong feeding habits. Tuberculosis follows the level of nutrition with deadly accuracy striking at those countries which eat badly and at those people with a poor distary scal.

Good diet does not demand special foods nor indeed the inclusion of Vitamin pills now so freely advertised It does include milk and meat; butter and eggs; brown

breed and green vegetables.

A vast number of people here do not eat brown bread at all; another large group of adults drinks very little milk; a surprising number eat meat spering-ly while the consumption of rew vegetables is by no

means wide spread.

In any attempt to raise the standard of living in this Colony food is only one factor but there is some reason to think that it ought to rank first. We know that sound nutrition will reduce the tell of disease and will also do more to secure sound minds in healthy bodies than any other social reform. Food for thought!

FOR MIN CHILDRUM Read St. John Ch 10. vv. 22-30. In this passage, Jesus says many things about Christians. Here are three.

1. They hear dis voice. This means that they believe what He says, for they know that what He says is true.

2. They follow Him. They try and do, say and think as He did.

3. He gives them Eternal Life. This is a capacity or ability to understand and enjoy spiritual things. These things are true of us if we can honestly say that we believe in and try to follow Him.

OUR GRADENING CORNER (continued)

Having decided what you are going to grow during the next sesson, the next consideration is, where and in what part of the garden the crops shall be grown? Now I feel quite certain that most people will say, "Where we grew them last sesson". It is almost



a universal practise in this country to recrop with the same crop year after year. There is no reason why this practise should be condemned provided the soil receives regular heavy dressings of organic manure.

Where this is not the case, rotation-


al cropping is all important. As a brief guide to the notation, cabbage and cauliflower may follow or be followed by potatoes, lettuce, enions and sw des. Carrots may follow or be followed by any but root crops. Lettuce may follow peas, potatoes and the cabbage tribe. Beet may follow the cabbage tribe.

Our next item on the plan is the soil cultivation. What plots are to be trenched during the coming winter?One third of the garden should be trenched annually, this will be quite enough if the task is carried out correctly. By practising this system the sub-soil is exposed every third year proving most beneficial for crops.

Stable manure now comes into the picture, why not order it now and store it in a pit adding weeds and other garden refuse to augment your supplies, thus when the digging season arrives your soil may be provided with a well retted compost.



GARDENING NOTES.

Are you having cabbage for Christmas? - This question is asked by many but the answer is seldom in the affirmative because few people ever bother to cultivate cabbage for this season of the year,

Spring cabbage is not a difficult crop to produce, but seed must be sown now. Sew thinly in a seed-bed and by the time the sarry rotatoes are Tifted, the young plants will be ready for transplanting. Very few varieties are adaptable for Spring use, but Flower of Spring, Harbinger, Barly Offenhann and Unfield Harket are recommended.

Reeds are attaining maturity now - some have already passed this state - and they should be promptly destroyed. If they are left in those out-of-the-way corners - where they are now more likely to be found the seeds will ripen, producing a further crop of repests for several years to come. Unfortunately, in a windy climate such as ours - ones next-door neighbours garden is more likely to receive the seed crop.

Those who grow winter greens, such as savoy and kale should get the plants out immediately.



GARDENING NOTES (continued)

Now, let us go into the porch or greenhouse; here we will find a mass of blocm and colour, maybe in come, tomatoes will be prominent. If we visited the perch during the winter months, would it be bright with blooms? Probably not, but most people would be delighted to possess flowering plants during the dull winter months. Several plants may be brought into bloom during the winter and early spring; among them being artirrhinum (drawf) Nemesia, Clarkia, Cineraria, Schizanthus and Daffodils. With the exception of the latter, seed may be sown now. Darfodils will be prepared for forcing but this method of cultivation will be dealt with when the time arrives.

It is often found that crowded conditions in the porch prevent one from potting up seedlings, or sowing further batches of seeds, therefore plants that have passed out of flower - such as Arums, pot Roses and even Dahlias may be placed outdoors in some sheltered corner. Dun't forget about them though because the two first mentioned will require water; the latter must be dried off gradually until the foliage turns brown, when further watering will no longer be required.

Prince of Walos College, Montevideo, apart from its modern system of education, takes every advantage of climatic and city facilities, to give the students there a very happy life. The 350 boys and girls-nearly 90 of them Englishstart work at 8.30a.m. each day and do lessons until 12 noon, of this time 15 minutes are spent doing P.T. in the playground. At 11 a.m. ham rolls and sandwiches can be bought in the school kitchen. At 1.45 p.m. lessons start again and go until 4.p.m. (4.45 on Mondays and Thursdays) on Wednesdays and Saturdays there is a helf day. Drill and games on the playing fields are part of the afternoon routines. Girls play hockey, tennis, and wolly balljunior girls, rounders. The senior boys play footbell and basket-ball. Scouts and guides, cubs and brownies, are also a feature of the school. The boarders, 14 of them, live in the school boarding nouse at Pocitos and in the summertime all the children go to the beach, which is one square away-for a bathe.

The cinema provides relaxation on wet week-ends, otherwise the children to to the beach to play. There are six English teachers and the inglish children are made very happy. The summer holiday extends for three months and in July there is another fourteen days holiday. BATTLE AGAINST BORFIDM.

There are now about 90,000 United Kingdom and Dominion prisoners of War in Garman prison camps. Many of them have been there for ore than three years-since the fall of France. From the cutset it has been Brit in's policy to · ensure that pristing shall roturn home after the war fit in kind and bedy to take up again their part in the life of their country.

Two major schemes, operated by the British Red Cross and the St. John's War Organisation; have put this policy into practice. They deal with education and rehabilitation and training. EDUCATION

Educational schemes for war prisoners have been developed to a high degree of efficiency. Courses are run on a correspondence system by the Mducation Book Section of the Red Oross and St. John working in conjunction with the International Red Cross and other bodies represented on the Comite Consulatif at Geneva,

Extent to which these education facilities have been developed can be gauged by the following figures:

To the end of May, 1943, more than 24,000 requests for books and study courses had been received. 150,000 bocks had been sent out.

REHABILITATION FOR POST-WAR LIFE

Sick, disabled, deaf and blind prisoners of war provide a problem completely different from that of the fit man. In these cases the urgent necessity is to maintain their morale, and to provide an outlet for their constructive abilities.

Second stage is to teach disabled men a trade which they can follow in post-war life.

There are 30 blind prisoners of war in Germany, and in conjunction with the St. Dunstan's organization, they are being trained for post-war occupations. For deaf prisoners forms are sent out by the National Institute for the Deaf. Once filled in by the deaf man and the camp medical officer and returned to Britain. the Institute prescribes the necessary type of hearing apparatus and it is sent out to Germany.

The local education authorities of Manchester. the centre of the cotton trade in Britain, have 11.400 people enrolled for evening classes

FIRST AID TO THE INJURED.

Remember when someone in the house gets scalded or burned that you have an excellent remedy ready to hand in tes.

Home should be the safest place on earth.
Actually there are more accidents in the home every
year than outside it. Many of these accidents can be
prevented. Here is a short list of things that lead
to accident:

- (A) Leaving toys on the stair to be tripped over.
- (2) Loose rugs on the floor.
- (3) Lack of fire screens for open fire-places.
- (4) Tea-kettles that upset.
- (5) Falls in or about the bath tub due to lack of handholds, rubber matting etc.
- (6) Turning an electric-light switch while in the bath.
- (7) Failure to have a family medicine chest and to keep it locked.

SENIOR MEDICAL OFFICE.

GARDENING NOTES.

Tomatoes were mentioned last week as a porch plant, though they cannot be recommended as worth-while unless heat is provided. However, many people find it a pleasurable hobby to cultivate the tomato which should now be well advanced; probably a few of the fruits are ripening. In heated greenhouses

ripening will be well advanced.

Whatever the cultural conditions - it is essential to "stop"the growth of the plant, Stopping-which is the removal of the leader or growing point-should be carried out when the third flower truss has formed; this refers only to plants in unheated houses. Where heat is provided "stopping", need not be performed until the aeventh or eighth truss has formed but much depends upon the head-room available.

Defoliation is at times necessary, more especially when the foliage is dense, or the light available is restricted. The removal of leaves must be performed with care and judgment. Never defoliate until the flowers on each truss have set, and always leave the

leaves at or near a truss.



IN A FEW WORDS.

Teams of Royal Air Force mechanics from almost every operational station in Britain's Bomber Command are being sent to factories where bombers are built and then return to their stations - trained to carry out "running repairs" on damaged machines. Thousands of airmen have been put through this factory course, and it is estimated that bombers are being returned to operational duties in one-fifth of the time it takes to send them to repair factories.


The Late Mr John Murray Duncan.

Jack Duncan was in his 65th year. He was born on Beaver Island and lived there in all for 56 years. He is survived by 4 brothers and 4 sisters.

The funeral took place from the Tabernacle last Tuesday afternoon.

The Tabernacle is the United Nonconformist Church

of the Colony. It seeks to minister to people who
in Britain and clsewhere would attend Methodist, Baptist, Congregational, and Presbyterian Churches, as well
as other centres of Monconformist worship.

Originally the Nonconformist Church in the Falkland Islands was in Darwin, and was presbyterian. The Church building is now used chiefly as the local school although services are still held in it, when a chaplain or minister is visiting in that district.

Amongst the Darwin ministers of last century were the Revs. Ewing, Phillips, and Yooman.

As Stanley the capital grew in population, the Larwin minister visited the town occasionally and held services in an infant Schoolroom, which stood on a site now occupied by the Government School.

when in 1388 the Rev. George M. Harris a Eaptist
minister was sent out under the personal interest of
the famous C.H. Spurgeon of the Metropolitan Tabernacle,
London, and held his services in the Epeedwell, John
Street: It was under the second minister from Sourgeon's
College the Rev. C.E. Lawson Good trat the Monconformist
ministry was transferred from the Spectwell to the

present Church, which had been built by local effort,

and came out from England in sections.

The building was called the "Tabernacle" and is therefore linked directly with the great Church of the same name in London, which was so badly blitzed in this present War.

Le Good who was twenty four when he came here died

in Stanley and the congregation mourned the loss of

their young Pastor,

The Rev. Ernest Charles Murphy arrived in 1892 and stayed until 1896. In these days the Tabernacle ministers were also responsible for a school, which met in the "Schoolroom" at the rear of the Church. From 1896 to 1898 the Rev. Herbert Hill was the Pastor. Then came a gap. A local lay-preacher Mr Browning carried on the services and in 1909 the Rev. Robert Johnson a Methodist arrived and carried on the pastorate until 1915, doing a great amount of faithful work.

From 1915 until 1934 the Church was kept open, through local efforts, without a Pastor. The Rev.W.F. McWhan commenced his ministry in September 1934 and was assisted by Mr O'Neill. Mr O'Neill returned to N. Ireland in 1939 and the Rev. E. J. Brain has heen

colleague minister since 1939.

The distance from Britain has made the obtaining of ministers for the Tabernacle rather difficult, but it is hoped that the Church will have no gap in its ministry in the future.

AXIS AIR LOSSES.

Germany and Japan lost during January more than 1100 aircraft quite apart from German losses in Russia. The details make interesting reading. Three hundred and seventy five were accounted for in N. Africa (which includes Italy), elsewhere in Europe 93 and over Britain 27. The Middle East downed nine and in India and Burma another 39 were destroyed. This makes a total of 543. The losses inflicted by the American Air Force amounted to 567 a grand total of 1160. This represents a drain on Axis men and machines that hast tear hard considering the period was not one of exceptionally heavy fighting in any of the spheres.







GARDENING NOTES (continued)

If successful crops of Spring Onions are to be expected, the removal of soil from about the bulbs must be carried out whenever required because it is often found that wind returns the soil. Care must be exercised that the roots are not unduly exposed when removing the soil. The plants will fall about after the operation, but do not be alarmed they will recover within a day or two.

How and when does one prune Lilac? This question is often asked but usually at the wrong time of the year. Lilac should be pruned immediately after flowering; however, if pruning has not been done, it would be advisable to get on with the task now than

to leave it undone for another year.

When pruning, all the old flowering shoots must be cut back to within two inches of the old wood. All weak and straggling growths should also be removed. Finally the soil should receive a top-dressing with well-rotted manure.

Flower beds and borders require some attention just now. Several plants have passed out of flower and become an eyesore, therefore all the old flower-spikes may be cut back to the base foliage; in some cases this treatment tends to induce a second crop of blooms. Dead and withered blooms should be removed at intervals from all plants, this action tends to prolong the flowering season, and is especially so with plants under glass.





The present Catholic Church of St. Mary's, known as "St Mary's Mission" was constructed at the request of the Salesian Fathers in charge of the Mission. The Bishop at this time was the late Rev. Monseigner The building was erected by Messrs Smith and Brunell under the supervision of Mr Vincent Biggs, who was in tharge of the Carpenters of the F.I.C. in the year

The first parish priest was the Rev.Fr.P.O. Grady, later a Fr. Vincent Giaccarde, held the position, and the Rev.Father Diamond.

In the year 1905 the Rev. Fr. H. Higone arrived for the third time and took charge of the Parish until his death in 1937.

In 1934 the Rev.H.F. Drumm took up duty here, and in 1937 was appointed Parish Priest.





GARDENING NOTES.

Of late we have experienced long hours of bright warm sunshine followed by a heavy downpour which has been most beneficial to crops. Now when rain follows a period of bright sunshine, it will be noticed that the soil surface becomes baked, and if the soil is of a heavy nature, it soon cracks open and moisture is permitted to escape. Whether the surface cracks open or not, moisture is brought to the surface by capillary attraction and the roots - esp cially in the case of plants that thrust their roots deep into the ground - are starved.

At the moment most crops have almost attained maturity and are not likely to suffer any real harm, but winter greens and any other young crops will suffer if the soil surface is allowed to remain in the baked condition. This state can be obviated by the use of the hoe or pronged cultivator, by lightly breaking down the soil surface to a fine tilth.


Should the soil show signs of baking, whether it be summer or winter-provided a crop is being cultivated the surface must be broken up. This treatment also applies to flower beds and borders.



BRITISH JOURNALISM IN WARTIME.

By William Allison

The dogged, mercurial spirit of British journalism was never presented so faithfully, so dramatically, as during those frightful nights of 1940 and 1941, when, in spite of all that the Luftwaffe could do to smash the heart out of London, Fleet Street's national newspapers persisted in coming out every day without a single break.

Only those who endured it know at what cost of human courage and endurance this miracle was accomplished. But done it was, sometimes under unbelievable

conditions.

In the Carly days of the blitz, newapaper staffs had to grope, run, or stumble their way to their office under a hail of shwapael crashing buildings, and through street after street tumbled high with debris.

From every corner of London they came, running this nightly gauntlet of death, cheerfully but grimly reporters, sub-editors, executives, compositors, taperoom boys, each and every one of them with one inflexible purpose. The paper must get out. It's a creed of continuity and of duty to the public as sacred as that of the theatre.

Later, things became so bad that London's staffs had to sleep in their offices, or in nearby hostels, rapidly acquired and furnished. One sub-editor is reputed to have worked and slept in his office for five weeks on end, before going home to his wife and family.

In its long and honourable career, British journalism - whether in London or the provincial cities never had a testing time such as this. It came through not unscathed, but with a high courage that enhanced its reputation throughout the free world.

The impact of the war generally on journalism here has been gradually to reduce the sizes of our newsrapers - because of paper rationing - to a ghost of their former sizes, while their staffs, cut to the bone for national service, have shrunk to little more than skeleton proportions. Yet in spiteof it, they have maintained a superb standard of news service.





YOUR WATCH.

Hints on obtaining the best service from your watch.



Of all machines in common use a watch is expected to run continuously day after day, month after month without a seconds pause. That they have performed this valuable service of accurate time-keeping so successfully reflects creditably on the skill, and

workmanship of their construction. However, despite their excellent performance it should be remembered that a watch is a delicate mechanism requiring careful treatment, regular lubrication, and occasional cleaning if it is to continue to give reliable service.

Wertime has made it essential for all of us to make our watches last as long as possible, and it is with a view to helping readers to obtain the most efficient service from their watches that I put forward the following hints which I hope will prove useful.

(1) General Care Treat your watch as carefully and gently as possible despite its claim to be "shock proof". Never knock, or strike your watch in order to make it start as there is a great danger of doing permanent damage to the balance staff, and the pivots. Should normal winding fail to start it then rock it gently back, and forwards in the plane of the watch.

(2) Winding. This should be done regularly at the same time every twenty-four hours, preferably when taken off the wrist, or just before turning in for

the night.

(3) Regulating. This should be done by a watchmaker as there is some danger of damaging the balance, and the hairspring, by using any old instrument to adjust the regulator.

(4) Lubrication. This should be done every nine

months or so, this will ensure sweet running and of course only the best watch oil should be used. Machine oils etc. are much too thick and only tend to clog the pivots in the holes, eventually making it necessary for the watch to be thoroughly overhauled before the prescribed time.


(5) Cleaning It is advisable to have this done every two years, and should be done only by a competent watchmaker. If a watch is accidentally dropped into water, and no watchmaker is available it will be advisable to put the complete movement into a receptacle filled with benzine or petrol keep it there for at least twelve hours then carefully left it out and place in a small box for safety. It must be remembered that a thorough overhaul and clean is most necessary in this case, for once rust starts to


work on the mechanism the watch is ruined.

(6) Damage or Mechanical failure. If a watch is badly knocked or let fall accidentally it should be examined as soon as possible, this will ensure if any damage has been inflicted it can then be attended to and rectified. Failure to have this examination made, may, at a later date cause serious trouble and eventually put the watch beyond repairing. Mainsprings do snap quit. Proquently in this part of the hemisphere, this is due in most cases to the extremes in temperature. (This springs are made from very highly tempered steel and susceptible to the variations of heat, and cold). Never lay your watch on any stone or marble surface as the sudden cold shock will cause the spring to contract and break. Hairsprings should never be interfered with. Failure to observe this rule will put the timing out and make the watch unreliable.

By observing these simple hints I am certain that you will have a real friend in your watch, and one that will never let you down.

GARDENING NOTES (continued)

It is rather late now to sow lettuce for use during the winter months, but if you possess a cold frame or any other glass protection, you can have lettuce for early spring use by sowing the seed now. Sow thinly and thin early; by so doing, strong, compact plants will be the result and in this condition they are ready to withstand the vigours of winter.

Cauliflower seed should also be sown in frames now; they may be sown in drills, or broadcast, but here again, sow thinly if strong sturdy plants are to be secured for transplanting next spring. If you don't possess a frame try a sowing under the shelter of a hedge or close fence.

Reference has been made-and will continue to be made to frame culture. Too much emphasis cannot be placed upon the value of the frame, in fact it is indispensable in any garden. The glass lights do make excellent targets for mischievious boys as many of us already know to our sorrow. However, it is possible to fix a wire-netting guard, or some other substitute over the lights to prevent destruction.

Those seedling Antirrhinums, Clarkias, Cinerarias and Schizanthis should now be ready for thinning if they are not being "pricked off" into seed boxes. When thinning, allow at least two inches between the seedlings; a sturdy, healthy plant will be the result, which should always be the cultivator's aim.

EDUCATIONAL CLASSES


CONCENTRATION OF INDUSTRY IN BRITAIN.





IN A FEW WORDS.

Britain has saved hundreds of thousands of tors of shipping during this war by the study of the most economical methods of packing and leading stores. Wheeled vehicles are boxed by the Ministry of Supply before they are received by Army Ordnance and it is estimated that 100 cased vehicles can now be carried in the space formerly occupied by 60 vehicles on wheels.

British railways have made stringent economies in their use of fuel. The proportion of loaded to total wagen miles has increased from 67.5 per cent before the war to 75.5 per cent. From less heating of trains, a saving of 30,000 tons is being achieved.

Sixty feet below the pavement in a Greater London district is a unique war factory. Two years ago it was an uncompleted extension of the Underground Railway. The 5½ miles of tunnel have now been converted into a bustling production centre, air-conditioned and equipped. Eighty per cent of the workers are women. They are turning out vital parts for aircraft at machines and benches laid out in a single row along what was meant to be railway track, and on what were meant to be station platferms are tool rooms, workshops and glassed-in offices.

Early in the war a number of women artists in Britain formed a training centre under an experienced instructor for tuition in practical draughtsmanship. Soon many were engaged on plans for wer weapons, aircraft and tanks. Four thousand drawings are needed for building one type of bember and over 200 women from the training centre are now engaged in the drawing offices of various Government Department.

GARDEMING MOTES.

The time has now arrived to prepare daffodil bulbs for fercing, and the kind of bulbs to choose for the purpose, are those that are sound a d large with raised shoulders.

Place the bulbs in pots and bexes; the latter should be three inches in depth at the least, and ensure that the shoulder's of the bulbs are just below the soil surface, Firm planting is essential, so be certain that the soil is pressed firmly home, an inch apart is maple spacing for bulbs which are to undergo forcing conditions.

Having completed the planting, give the soil a thorough seaking with water; the receptacles must then be placed outdoors, preferably on a hard bottom, covered with peat-ash. A covering must now be provided, pent-mould is ideal for the purpose. Heap the mould about the receptacles, covering them to a depth of about four inches. Pot the whole firmly into place, and no further attention will be required until about the middle of swie; by then it will be found that an juch of growth has been made, and the bulbs are then ready for placing under glass.

NINEPINS.



GARDINING NOTES (continued)

At the moment another sowing of cabbage must be made now if we are to maintain a succession. The seed should be sown under glass; if this is not available, some sheltered spot in the open might do. Any of the varieties already recommended for spring use are suitable. Some of us probably lifted a few clumps of daffodils for forcing last week, but if we were wise all the preas that have contained bulbs for more than three years should have the bulbs removed from them, for the purpose of re-manufing and division of the clumps. This treatment is essential when the bulbs are being used as part of the main floral display in the flower beds and borders.

When separating the clumps, retain the large bulbs only; a plentiful supply of these are always available. The best of the disearced stock may be replanted in grass verges or banks. Replanting should be carried out as soon as possible: planting to a depth of two and -a-half inches, and from four to sixinches asunder.

The Court imposed a fine of \$1 in each of the other cases. On the recommendation of the President of the Board

of Health the Magistrate agreed to remit the fine.





MILK. .

Milk is the best of all foods - a balanced ration prepared by Mature herself. This statement is backed up by a wealth of experience and research. Doctors prescribe milk for a large number of conditions, such as tuberculosis, under nourishment, stomach ulcers and so on.

But when a physician prescribes milk it is a common - too common - experience to hear the patient say: "I can't take milk", or "I don't like milk", or "milk disagrees with me".

Fow, when one is sick he should have food that he likes not food that he detests and obviously every child should be taught to like milk so that when he is ups t by some illness this dislike of milk will not be present as an additional problem.

Ohildren are imitators. They grow up in the image of their parents. That is more natural therefore than that the child should dislike milk if he constantly sees his parents drinking something else.

Parents should understand and teach their children to understand the principle that milk is a great privilege: they should carefully avoid making the consumption of milk a burdensome duty.

We child should have less then a pint of milk every day; no prognant or nursing mother should have less than a pint and a half and no adult less than 10 cunces. These are not optimum standards, they represent the very least that should be taken of this very important protective food.

Actually nothing like this quantity of milk is drunk in Stanley and unless the parents set an example there is little hope of improvement.



BRITAIN'S WATER SUPPLY

By Barbara Stuart.

To supply seven and a half million people with pure water for drinking, washing, cooking, refrigeration, and a hundred other uses: to distribute an average daily supply of forty gallons (182 litres) to each of these millions of users: to transport this enormous volume of water over an area of roughly 537 square miles (1,383 square kilometres) - this is gigantic task for which the Metropolitan Water Board in London is alone responsible. Moreover, this scrice is provided at an average cost to each person of only twopence-halfpenny a ton!

Water is the most vital necessity of life: there is no substitute for it, and no living thing can be independent of it. It can either come as the bringer of health and prosperity, or it can carry contamination and disease over a large area. The responsibility of those who control the water supply of a large city is very great, more especially in wartime. The supply itself must be guaranteed and

its quality safeguarded.

For forty years the great organisation of the Metropolitan Water Board has faithfully carried out both these duties, and the unfailing standard of its service may be judged by the excellent health enjoyed by London's citizens, and the fact that never once, during all the air raid disasters of 1940-1941, has the city's water supply failed or suffered contamination.

London is, of course, fortunate in possessing

splendid natural resources.

It is fed by two rivers, the Thames and the Lee, and by fifty-five underground wells. From most of these wells, the water is of such purity that it can be used as it is, but for the others, and for all river water, an elaborate system of water purification is carried out.



Sunday dawned with every promise of A fine day and by 9 oclock the sun was blazing down from an almost clear sky so we brought in the norses and saddled up getting away by 10. We had originally intended walking to Mount (sborne but the novelty of the ride appealed to Charles and Wally, the former because he had been on a horse many years ago and the latter because he had never ridden and had already done too much walking. As might be expected with novices riding horses away from home progress was slow and we were late reaching deritos, whore we found nebody home. Charles fed the hens then we had a snack and deciding to leave our food behind, taking only an apple each we set out on foot across the valley to the foot of the mountain. The going was easy until the ground began to rise steeply and stoneruns appeared, and then low cloud appeared, advancing rapidly and getting set to speil the splendid view we expected to get from the top. We soon nad the uncanny experience of walking above the clouds, or fog as it was by new although away on our left Port Bussex showed up clearly. This was soon blotted out and Charles hastily took a commass bearing on the highest peak before that too was swallowed up in the mist. We were about three quarters of the way up when the rain commenced and we hopefully said "it mightn't be much". It was soon obvious however that wer were in for a wetting but we decided to keep on and get slightly wetter and there was always the hope that it might clear. In any case Charles had walked all the way from Stanley specially to make the climb. The summit was finally reached, at least it seemed to be the top as we sould see nothinghigher within a redius

of 20 yards which was the limit imposed by the rcg. By now it was blowing hard and the rain teeming so we simply walked over the top into the shelter of some ricks, ate our apples and worked out a pian of campaign. We knew Darwin was behind us yet the compass showed us facing south - something wrong here - maybe iron in the rocks, so distarding the compass for the time struck out to the south east intending to go round that end of the mountain. Going was not easy however, the mountainside being almost perpendicular but turfed and arfording a rair foothold. Below us we could hear what might be running water, a brook at the foot of the slope, and steered a diagonal course downwards until the sound identifying itself as lapping water we hastily changed our course uphill as neither of us wished to plunge into the pond of fabulous depth. We were lucky, for working further to the right we eventually came to a gentle slope and found ourselves in a veritable crater with the pond at the bottom, and believe me it looked bottomless. A slight lifting of the mist showed us the slope down which we had scrambled, it looked steeper from where we stood, and ended with a smooth inclined rock the base of which was lapped by the grey waters of the pond. We gave a shiver, and the mist closed down again.

On consulting the compass again it seemed to be working as a compass should and we continued our course over the south eastern end of the mountain incidentally encountering some stoncruns of considerable extent. We soon found ourselves in the valley below Ceritos house and in the distance the Ceritos rocks. The rain had ceased by now and the cloud was lifting slowly and by the time we had ploaded to Ceritos the mountain was again in view and the sun beginning to show.

Fortunately for us Jack McLeod was at home and this meant a hot drink and dry socks, and were these welcome?

On the way home the horses made good time and on our way round the bay at Darwin we saw the last cloud clear from Mount Osborne and beheld the mountain bathed in the purple red light of the sinking sun.

Whether Charles and Wally derived any satisfaction

from being the only members of the garrison to scale the mountain was not revealed however they did enjoy the ride and did not suffer the next day which, as might be expected, was beautiful and ideally suited for climbing mountains. Needless to add we did not.

Veronica (Box) hedges should now be clipped back where this is possible. Avoid cutting back into the old wood because the hedge will become denuded, and unsightly for at least two years. Those who clip trees of Cupressus macrocarpa should give these their final trimming of the season.

The season does not appear to have been partial towards carrots, bolting being evident in many pardens. Unfortunately little can be done to prevent a crop from going to seed, therefore, the grower has the conclos of two alternatives. Firstly, that he allows the immature crop to remain in the ground and become useless, and the other - lift the crop and store it.

If carrets are to be stored in safely, care must be exercised when liming; novem area carrots without previously looseding the soil. Care must also be taken when removing the folings; avoid leaving too much, but on the other hand, don't cut back to the crown. These two points must be emphasized, because failure to observe them, will mean decay in the store, therefore, remove the foliage to within a quarter-of-an-inch of the crown.





THE CHILDREF'S MUSLUM

Down in Shoreditch, in the heart of the East-End of London, there is a small, yet significant building. By some miracle it has remained unharmed through all the bombing which has shattered so much of this acra. This simple, unpretentious and rather shabbly little place has great significance. It symbolizes that tranquility of spirit, that casual cheerfulness and normality with which the people of London have met the challenge of total warfare.





The carrot crop may be stored indoors or outside. If it is to be the former, then a barrel makes a convenient receptable, the bottom of which should be covered with sand or peat-mould. On this, the first layer of carrots is placed-crowns outwards. Mach layer may be covered, though this is not essential. The last layer of course, must receive a liberal covering.


When making an outdoor store or 'clamp', a base of sand or pest-mould is put down, and on top of this the carrots are heaped. Finally the whole is well covered with the material already mentioned. Turk sods give extra protection and provent the fine cover from being blown or washed away.





The Geffrye Museum is a purely domestic museum. Its exhibits are composed almost entirely of everyday thi things or the past, and particularly the craft of the iron workers and cabinet makers, who once were centred in the neighbourhood. Spinning wheels, spinets, cradles, early cooking stoves, bible-bexes (in which the treasured hand-written and illuminated Bibles were kept locked), lamps, carpenters' tools, old shop signs, fantastically dressed dolls of all periods. silver, glass, china and earthenware, shuff-boxes. pieces of Grinling Gibbons' carving from St. Paul's Cathedral, great lush swags of fruit and flowers, a florid plaster coiling from the Fewterers' Hall, stained glass, crude, early hand-coloured children's books, full of moral adages, delicately embroidered waistcoats, babics lace bonnets, some fine old carved doorways, and specimens of elegant Regency iron balconies are all to be found here. It is the history of everyday things, through the centuries.

Room by room, they are set out in period - reconstructions of typical domestic interiors. There is a Tudor room, panelled in oak, an eighteenth-century kitchen, perfectly reconstructed, down to the cumbersome but lethal mouse-trap, which is an object of great interest to the children. There is a Regency drawing-room, with scrolled sofa, a harp, and handsome inlaid furniture: there are Victorian rooms with their inconsequential collection of curios, samples and bricabrae; Stuart rooms, with clouded mirrors, damash covered walnut furniture, Delft china and pewter; there is an early sowing machine, examples of old wall-papers, fabrics from Indai and China and Lancashire cottons. There are glass-blowers' tools, a carpent-cr's tool chest, and a cloth loom.

Not, perhaps a really unique show? No, bot by virtue of its exhibits, but unique, nevertheless, by reason or its environment, and in particular by the nature of its visitors.

For many women in Britain Monday no longer holds any terrors as 'Wash-day'. The Laundry has come to her rescue, and all that is necessary is that she should make a list of articles she requires washing and put it in a hamper (provided by the Laundry) with the soiled-linen. At a regular day and time (in peacetime) the Laundry Van calls and takes it away, and she sees it. no more till it is returned clean at the ond of the week.

Nowadays she has the choice of various services according to her means, and the class of work she requires from her Laundry. Is he wants a really well finished article, she employs the Fully rinished Service, which is the most expensive, and all articles are returned thoroughly cleanste, and well ironed and folded.

Is she requires a less empensive Service, and is prepared to iron the linen herself, she can employ the
'Bagwash Service' which will give her linen a thorough
washing, and then rough-dry it and return to her. A
medium Service is called the 'Float-iron' Service, and
by this she can have her linen washed and ironed on a
very large and empensive machine called the 'Float Iron',
which has 6 or more heated rollers, and after being put
through these machines once her linen is thoroughly
dried and ironed, although the machine finish is not
quite so good as the Fully Finished Service.

When her linen is received at the foundry, each item is checked with the list which she has enclosed, and is then marked with her own distinguishing Laurdry

mark, which may be in Cotton or Marking Ink. After marking, the articles are sorted out into bins, according to the treatment they require. For example, all sheets and pillow cases are put into one bin, tablelinen into another, and woollen articles into another, all these classes of work receiving different treatment in the Wash-house.

In the Wash-house, it is washed in the appropriate manner, and is then placed in a machine known as a Hydro Extractor, which draws out almost all of the water, and leaves the article in a slightly damp condition, ready for the ironing process, Some articles which require still further drying are placed into a machine through which hot air is passed, and come out partly or completely dried according to the length of time they are left there.

Most flat articles are then finished on an ironing machine called a 'Calender' which consists of a well padded roller running in a heated bed, and which completely dries the sheet or other article, giving it a smooth, ironed finish, and also a polished surface to table-linen, which has been starched before it reaches this machine. Other articles such as shirts are ironed on various machines, one of which is a large electrice or gas-heated iron which is worked up and down on an endless belt, and is controlled by the operator using slight pressure on the handle.

Socks and stockings are dried on frames shaped like a leg, stiff and soft collars receive special treatmenton appropriate machines, and woollen articles receive just a light pressing, which leaves them soft and 'Woolly'

Their constant aim is to give the housewife better, and, if possible, cheaper means of getting her washing done, and doing away with all the inconventence and hard work of washing at home.

Most amateurs become uncertain on taking hold of a pruning instrument, and as a pruning operation progressess they connence to question. "Has enough or has too much been removed.". There should never be room for doubt, provided the principles advised are followed; and that one is acquainted with the different rose types or "classes". Getting back to the task on hand; all shoots that have flowered, during the summer must be cut back to within three inches of their base. Hew,

or unflowered growths are retained but they should be shortened back one third of their present length. Side-shoots are cut back to two buds, and all suckers are removed.

The harvesting of potatoes appears to be well advanced in several gardens. Fortunately the disease known as 'Black Rot' is not so prevalent this season; this is due to the comparatively dry late summer and autumn which has prevented the disease from attaining the advanced stage, namely, the serious infection of the tubers.

There is no time to discuss 'Black Rot' this week but growers would be well advised to select 'seed' from sound roots while harvesting is in progress. By so doing, the spread of this - or any other disease - may be controlled.


So everytime that Bobbie left for Church, Witchie protested loudly as he was politely shut in the back kitchen.

During the school holidays, as soon as it opens, the children come clattering noisily, in, for a day of instructive amusement. But however noisy, they are not destructive. Although allowed to wouch, they seldominiume the things: you see them pendering over the intricacies of a harpischerd, or studying the complications of a turn-spit cooking stove with equal care and interest. Sometimes they come in little groups - to study, or in separate units of two or three-to play. In 1942 there were 12,750 spare-time visits to the museum, excluding the 12,552 school-time visits, accompanied by turchers. They are given points and chalks to draw (rather freely) what they admire best in the museum.

One small room was crowded with laughing and talking children, some sucking their point brushes in the agony of creative frustration, others crowded found a boy who was modelling an Elizabethan frigate. These model ship classes are particularly popular among the elder boys. Younger children enjoy playing with the huge Victorian dolls! house, arranging and re-arranging the quaint old toys inside.

However, much as they admire the various period rooms at the Museum, no interior has evoked such a spentaneous burst of enthusiasm as the madern living-room which has just been set up, as a tail-piece to the period interiors. This is regarded by the children as the seme of perfection.


Thus is the history of Britain and culture, love of beauty and freedom, a sense of responsibility, as well as an interest in the past and a sense of their stake in the future, fostered in these London children, who, though living amid the bombed streets, have their own special refuge - the children's museum - the Gerfrye.



GARDENING NOTES. (continued)

Black kot (Bacillus phytophthorus) of potatoes has always been a cause for discussion among growers in this country, more especially at this season of the year, for it is at this time, that we come into direct contact with the disease. A fifty percent loss has been known among a crop. Losses of course are always greater during wet seasons, but the disease is always evident to a greater or lesser extent, according to climatic conditions.

The disease is one of the earliest to show itself.

Affected plants may be seen as early as December, but
they continue to make their appearance till much later.

Diseased plants are outstanding even from a distance, by their yellow foliage, but the most characteristic feature is to be found at the base of the stem. Affected stalks will come away easily, and be found to be rotten and black at their bases, generally ceasing just above the soil level. On exemination, the pith will be found to be blackened or completely destroyed.



GEMS FROM LNEWY PROPAGANDA.

"In view of the length of the Eastern front, and the width of the area conterned, the German military command could not establish sufficiently strong reserves in all places which could possibly be endangered to oppose Soviet attacks immediately with full vigour. Thus it has been experienced, that, in the course of Soviet attacks in varying places, the attacking party at first advanced somewhat owing to its numerical supericrity. Given the length and inadequancy of communications some time clapsed before sufficient German reserves could be despatched to the place where such a penetration had been effected. "Berlin military spokesman quoted by Transocean, 13/11/42.

"The Germans sent all available reserves to Italy, with the result that they were obliged to adopt elastic methods in Russia; that is, to carry out withdrawels according to plan. The German success in avoiding the most serious consequences of Badoglio's defection was a first-rate defendive victory, but one is obliged to pay a price for every victory, and in this case the price was territory on the hastern front. We have shandened this ground since the middle of August in order to avoid being attached from behind in Northern Italy, on the Brenner, in Southern France, or in the Balkans."







WIRSTON CHURCHILL G.H., M.P.

In two instalments

by A.R.C.



of all the great public figures of s the last forty years, none has stood out so strongly and so challengingly as Winston Churchill does today. To Lnglishmen everywhere he is a symbol or common-sense in chaos and strength in adversity - a rock against which the waves of danger, defeat, mistrust and corruption best in vain. In the years preceding his

appointment as leader of the British people he carned the affection of the man in the street by voicing publicly and often the uncasiness and distress of the nation at the trend of public events at home and abroad. As Prime Minister he succeed in keeping that affection by the uncompromising directness of his policy, and by the vigour with which he pursued it.

So extraordinary a man must have lived a varied and unusual life - a brilliant background well worth painting in to finish off the picture so powerfully dominated by the grim, quizzical, relentless figure of the Churchill of the second Great War.

Winston Churchill, son of Lord Randolph Churchill, and grandson of the Duke of Marlborough, was born at Blenheim Palace on the 30th November, 1874. As a boy

he was a difficult blend of the naughtiness bred of an unusualty sensitive and enquiring mind, and the traditional recklessness of his family. His brilliance, so noticeable also in his father, gave him a glamour which, coupled with his great natural abilities, helped him to succeed where more dreary, though possibly equally clever politicians failed.

In due course young Churchill passed through Harrow and Sandhurst to the Army, and in 1897 he was serving with the Malakand Expedition on the North-west Frontier of India. His life of adventure and travel had begun.

Let us see how the next few years were occupied.

1897. The Malakand Expedition, about which he after-wards wrote an account.

1397. Served in the attack on the Tirah (Indta)

1898. Served in Egypt with Mitchener during the rebellion of the Mahdi, and at the battle of Omdurman took a leading part in the famous charge of the 21st Lancers.

1899. Wer correspondent for the Morning Post in South Africa. Was present at the disaster to the armoured train at Chieveley, and was captured by Louis Botha. Was taken to Pretoria and imprisoned, but escaped, and after a series of fantastic adventures which included train jumping, hiding in a coal mine and a 300 mile journey amongst bales of wool in a railway truck, he made his way to Portuguese East Africa, and so back to Durban.

1900. Fought at Spion Kop. At the advance on Johannes-bury, which was being enveloped in a pincers movement from the East and West, it become necessary to send despatches from Sir Ian Ha ilton on the West to Lord Roberts on the East. Churchill, now a lieutenant, was given the job. There was only one reasonable way to make the journey - by making a detour of eighty miles to the southward. Churchill, preferring the direct route, rade through the enemy-held town on a bicycle, and out at the other side, to find Roberts Tifteen miles farther on.

At that time he was twenty-five years old.


EASTER MONDAY AFTERMOON IN STANLEY.

As the season advances, the foliogo usually dies off, by which time the bacteria have passed along the underground stems and entered the tubers. Diseased tubers are recognised by being soft and discoloured, ultimately becoming wet and rotten. In serious attacks, practically all the tubers decay in the ground, but if the disease has not advanced so rapidly, tubers may remain sound for some time, but decay badly in store, and worse still if left in the ground. Those tubers which are only slightly affected survive the winter, and if planted the following season, give rise to more diseased plants.

Black Rot is propagated by the use of diseased "Seed"; this might be so slightly affected as to appear quite sound. Great care should be exercised that no seed is saved from diseased plants, no matter how slight it might be. Remember that affected plants, are distinguished by their haulus, the appearance of healthy tubers attached to diseased haulus are dangerous.



Seventy years age, Samuel Butler described the criminal prosecution of an unifortunate man who, in the paradoxical kingdom of BREWHON (nowhere split backwards), was charged with "having developed consumption of the lungs". The most damning fleature of the case was a previous conviction for "aggravated branchitis", and this propensity to take ill caused the Errowhonian Judge to sentence the chronic invalid to life imprisonment. In a go as you please age Butler's ideas were considered amusingly fantastic. Today perhaps they are less funny.







IN A FEW WORDS.

Despite war conditions of living; individual interest in education is marked in Britain. One hundred and thirty thousand of London's war workers now deveta their scanty leisure hours to studying at Evening Institutes. Among the subjects andertaken are arts and crafts, agriculture and nursing, elementary medicine and languages.


Workers in a north-western aircraft factory in Britain who worked right through a weak-end to assemble a bomber in the fastest time they sould, completed the job in 24 hours 45 minutes-more than five hours less than the time estimated. Immediately afterwards the bomber was on its test flight. Many of the workers were women who had never been in airdraft factory before the war.


Parachutes for the R.A.F. are new being made in Britain from a synthetic silk obtained from wood charcoal. The silk, of which there are 64 yards in each parachute, takes a breaking strain of 400 pounds. The synthetic silk was found equal to the task and is now allost universally used.

A factory in Britain, which before the war specialised in the manufacture of icecream, has been taken over by the Ministry of Food for the dehydration of vegetables for the forces. The factory can handle 400 tons of vegetables per day.

Hundreds of British tankers are being fitted with a device for ship-saving which has already proved one of the most successful of the war. One ship in which the apparatus was first demonstrated was struck by three torpedoes when outward bound but the master sailed it 1,200 miles to the U.S.A.

plastic badges and buttons are now in general use in the British army. As a result 2,000 tons of brass will be made available every year for the manufacture of war materials.

PUBLIC NOTICE.

A telegram was sent to the Secretary of State informing him of the fire at the Town Hall while it was still in progress. In reply the Secretary of State telegraphed "I am very sorry to hear of the d struction of the Town Hall by fire and much regret serious inconvenience which will, I fear, inevitably be occasioned to the administration and to the public".

Georgia who replied as follows: - "Very sorry to learn of destruction by fire of Town Hall which building and records will be most difficult, if not impossible, to replace. Its loss is the more serious at a period when its use was so vital to the Colony, Please accept out deepest regrets.

The offices of the Judical and Legal Departments will be re-opened for business in Marine House West as from tomorrow morning Thursday, the 20th April. THE RT. WON.

WINSTON GRURGHILL C.H., M.R.

For the next decade he was Engaged in shaping his political future - an occupation not productive of any attention-arresting events, but one which, because of his own rocket-like quality, kept him in front of the public, and marked him out es a man to be watched. He had a genius for being at the right place at the right time, and such photographs as the famous one shewing Churchill watching the battle of Sidney Street tickled the popular imagination, and ensured his not being forgotten, and then in 1914 came the Great War.

By this time Courchill was First Lord of the Admiralty, and in that position, in the first months of the war, he did three things of major importance. He mobilized the Fleet three days before the outbreak of hostilities in defiance of the instructions of the Cabinet; he arranged the transfer of the B.L.F. to France without the loss of a man; and by his energetic support of Admiral Fisher he ensured the arrival of a strong naval squadron in the Falkland Islands just in time to save the Colony from almost inevitable capture, and to destroy the enemy force of Admiral von Spec.

He was always a man of action, and when the schemes of the politician went adrift; as they did over the Dardanelles affair, he temporarily locked up his despatch case, hunted out his sword and went one more asoldiering as Colonel Churchill. He was never a man to rest on his laurels or to be crushed by his failures. In private life, too, his brilliance was made manifest not only in his writings (his biography of his arc stor, the first Duke of Harlborough is a classic) but also in his paintings which were good senough to earn high preise from his friend Sir John

Lavery.

In 1918 came the end of the War, the uneasy peace, and all the exasperations, disappointments, blunders and heartbreaks of twenty years. Through all this weary time the trumpet voice of Churchill heartened the man in the street and made him realise that there was one politician at least who realised that the time to compromise was the time when one's own strength was such that the decision of one's opponent was of little importance.

And when the period of greatest trial was come, the one man who could cope with it was not found wanting.

FACTS ABOUT BRITAIN.

The film version of Mr.Winsten Murchill's book "Marlborough - His Life and Times" is to be produced in England with the scenario by Mr.Duff Cooper. The Duke of Marlborough, an ancestor of Mr.Churchill's, was the great English military genius who lived 1650-1722.

Sixty thousand plants, shells and animals collected 200 years ago by the Swedish botanist Carl Linnaeus have been photographed as a record in case of destruction by enemy action. The collection has been in the keeping of the Linnaeun Society in Britain for many years, but copies of the photographic records have now been sent to Sweden and America.

In London a new British railway engine has been named Malta G.C., by General Sir William Dobbic who was governor of Malta during the seige.

Members of the London Passenger Transport Board - which runs all London's Underground, train and bus services - have knitted 200,000 garments for their colleagues in the services.



At about six o'clock last Sunday evening fire broke out in the upper storey of the Town Hall and by ten O'clock the building was completely gutted.

The Fire Fighting Services were in action within a very few minutes of the alarm being given and in apite of the fact that there was little wind all their efforts were unable to keep the fire under control. The building being constructed mostly of wood and being of such a great size burnt like a torch and the speed of the flames was so rapid that they could not possibly be held. The Fire Services were, however, able to save St. Mary's Chapel, the Gymnasium and the Power House. In spite of the fact that at one point the whole of the east wall of the Town Hall was ablaze and a breeze was blowing from the west, the paint on the Gymnasium is not even blistered nor have the tons of water poured on the roof damaged the building in any way.

Luckily only one man was in the Town Hall when the fire started and he escaped owing to the fact that he was in a different part of the building. Many attempts at salvage were made but the fire spread so rapidly that very little has been saved. When we consider the number of public offices in the Town Hall it will be understood that much inconvenience is bound to result to the public as a result of this fire but we understand that arrangements for carrying on public business are well under weigh and that the offices will re-open in other quarters very shortly. Most of the telephone services were restored by Tuesday evening. The help given by the Garrison in fire fighting, in relieving the civilian fire fighters throughout the night, in subsequent site clearing and demolition and in keeping essential services operating is beyond praise.

There is no need for us to emphasise what a tragic loss the Town Hall is both to Stanley and to the Colony. It was by far the finest building in Stanley and has always been the centro of our social life. When and how all the facilities provided by the Town Hall can be replaced is a matter for the future. But we are sure they will be.



In Britain it has been proved that the disease cannot be contracted directly from contaminated soil unless it has been deliberately dosed with bacillus, and also kept in a water-logged condition. On the contrary this does not appear so in this country, and if this is the case, contaminated soil should be reserved for other crops. This suggestion, is of course out of the question, and on the other hand, collaboration of this statement necessitates research on contaminated areas.

If the disease is to be controlled in store, the crop should be stored in sacks placed in an airy, but frost proof shed.

THE KING AT WORK

by J. Wentworth Day.

Into the tirelit dask of a January evening at the Village Inn in the tiny Merfolk village of Hillington, a shephera stumped, be btail at his heel. We were talking about shorting. For, in Norfolk, they know only three seasons of the year - spring, summer and the shorting season. The shephera cocked and ear.

"I see th King, come dinner-time", he remarked. "Walkin' up the street he were, gun under his arm. Bin a-shutin'. He's a rare nice young gonnelmen - give me the time o'day when I lifted my hat.

"I recken he's a-gooin' the same way as his owd dad. That were a rare nice owd gennelman that owd hing were-we cud du wi' a few more like him about. But this 'un's a-comin' on same as his dad. I 'ouldn't like to put in his day's work, bor! There aren't no trade union for he".

The Nortalk sudience of six grunted sagely.

I pondered the shepherd's words. For who, of all his millions of subjects to-day, realises the immense scope, the wide range of knewledge, the toil, energy, and travelling which the king buts into his average day of wor-work. It receives little publicity. Perhaps a bare two or three lines in the Court Circular will tell you that yesterday his Manisty visited a navel dockyord, or inspected a Factory in the Morth: or reviewed a division of traps; or that he was present at an Air Force station "somewhere in Britain". That is all. It does not tell you more. For security reasons, it is necessary to help the details of the King's working day more or less a secret.

his day in London begins at nine when, apart from a mass of Cabinet and Government papers and Memoranda, at least one hundred private letting from his subjects are placed on his desk. That is the daily average. They range over every conceivable subject, from personal friends and relatives, to grouses about pensions, pay and working conditions; appeals, revelations and

the outpourings of cranks. Every letter is sifted, dealt with by secretaries and, as often as not, answered to ed the same day. Those which have to be referred to

Government Departments take langer.

So much for his post-bag. Then his Majesty begins to see people. He sees dozens in a week. The Prime Minister attends at least once a week, and at least one or two Cabinet Ministers are received each week. The King keeps abreast of all their work and knows its scape and implications. That, in itself, is a Herculcan task for any man, ten times greater in its demands on personal energy and acumen than the burdens carried by the chairman of any great corporation.


Leaders of the Services, Field Harshals, Air Marshals, Admirals, Generals and the rest are also seen and talked with. All the High Commissioners, Governors and Ambassaders are seen on appointment to their positions or on retirement. Then there are members of Deminions Governments, Amdassaders from Allies, leaders of Allied troops, fleets and air services, and, in addition to these highly important but more or less routine audiences, His Majesty sees and talks with these who are engaged in great tasks of commerce, civilian welfare, nursing and the rest. Sir William Beveridge was one of the recent callers at the Palace.

Although His Majesty gives the closest personal attention to all matters of State and to all complaints brought to his notice by his subjects - he frequently orders a special report on such matters to be furnished to him by the Government Departments concerned - he never signs a letter. He signs only

State papers and private correspondence.

The war has probably trobled the demands on the King's time, energy and knowledge. When you read that he visited, say, a factory in Sheffield, it probably means that he was working from 9.a.m. till 6.p.m. the day before in London, dined, left London by 7.30 p.m. and arrived in the neighb urhead of Sheffield late at night. He may sleep abound a train or elsewhere. The time and place of his arrival are never made public. In fact, they are close secrets.





OMEHINTS
