K.E.M. HOSPITAL DOMESTIC STAFF

The domestic staff consists of a cock, three maids, one part-time maid and one laundress.

STAFF CHANGES

In March, Dr. Ashmore had to be referred to the British Hospital, Montevideo, for surgical treatment. He returned in June, fit for duty.

Dr. Cunningham, who had been M.O. in the West Falkland since 1959, left the Colony in March. His place was taken by Dr. Malone in April.

Dr. Taylor worked in the West Falkland in March, and at Darwin for the rest of the year.

Dental Staff

Mr. Carr completed his second tour early in May. Mr. Hoyle, Camp dentist, resigned at the end of May. Since then, there has been no dentist in the Colony.

Nursing Staff

The Matron, Miss Smith, arrived in February. From the beginning of the year till Matron's arrival, Mrs. Fleuret was acting Matron.

Mrs. Fleuret, who had been on the staff, with only one short break of service, since 1939, had to resign on medical grounds in August. With her departure, the trained staff consisted of Matron and Sister Stewart only, instead of Matron and three sisters. This acute shortage was met mainly by Matron and Sister Stewart doing many extra hours of duty. In October, during a particularly busy time in the hospital, we were fortunate in getting part-time help from Mrs. Johnson, who had recently arrived in the Colony, and who had been for many years in the Colonial Mursing Service. Mrs. Johnson is continuing to give part-time help. Mrs. Betts, formerly Miss P. Berntsen, who had been a staff nurse for almost four years, commenced regular part-time duties in November.

III. PUBLIC HEALTH

An epidemic of chickenpox in July and August was confined to Stanley. There were many more cases among youngsters than were seen, because the children were little affected by the disease. But all the adult cases were extremely ill for several days, and one died.

Throughout the year, the incidence of colds and throat infections was higher than usual.

The programme of immunisation against diphtheria, whooping-cough and tetanus, and against smallpox, tuberculosis and poliomyelitis was carried out as usual.

IV. HYGIENE AND SANITATION.

In Stanley and in the Camp settlements, practically all houses now have water-clasets, the sewage being water-borne to the sea.

Water supply

In Stanley, surface water is collected from a large catchment area a few miles from the town; it is then passed through a filtration plant in which the suspended colloids are removed, the acidity is lessened and chlorine is added. The treated water is pumped to Stanley where almost all houses are connected to the mains.

In the Camp, well-water is piped to all houses.

Dairies

There are two privately-owned dairies in Stanley.

Slaughter-houses

There are two slaughter-houses in Stanley, both privately owned.

V. K.E.N. HOSPITAL

The King Edward VII Memorial Hospital is the only hospital in the Colony. It is pleasantly situated on rising ground overlooking the harbour. There are thirty—two beds in fourteen wards for medical, surgical, obstetric and geriatric cases.

During the year, one hundred and thirty-two patients were admitted.

In 1966, sixteen cases were referred to consultants in the British Hospital, Montevideo. Ten of the patients required surgical treatment which could not be undertaken here.

VI. MEDICAL SERVICES IN THE CAMP

For medical purposes, the Falkland Islands are divided into three areas—
(1) Stanley and the North Camp, (2) Lafonia and, (3) the West Falklands.
The Medical Department aims to have a doctor resident in each area. During 1966, this aim was achieved except during one month when Dr. Taylor, resident at Darwin, in Lafonia, was stationed in the West Falklands, covering the period between Dr. Cunningham's departure and Dr. Malone's arrival.

The Medical Department supplies all settlements with a stock of the most-used medicines, tablets and dressings.

Almost all Camp residents can communicate with their doctor by telephone or radio-telephone, and much use is made of both systems to advise on the treatment of the minor ailments and injuries that arise.

The two De Havilland float planes of the Government Air Service are used extensively for the transport of medical officers and patients.

VII. PRISONS AND ASYLUMS

The goal in Stanley is the only one in the Colony.

There is no mental hospital. A case requiring institutional treatment and care would have to be sent to Britian. No such case occurred in 1966.

Mill Miss Denholm's arrival in September, Mrs. Johnston and Mrs. Betts continued to give part-time help. Their services were greatly appreciated.

The programue of immunisation against diphtheria, whooping-cough and tetanus, and against smallpox, tuberculosis and poliomyelitis was carried out as usual.

All occupied houses in the Colony have water closets, the sewage being water-borne to the sea where possible.

Water supply

In Stanley, surface water is collected from a large catchment area a few miles from the town. It is then passed through a filtration plant in which suspended peat matter is removed by chemical precipitation, the acidity is lessened and chlorine is added. The treated water is pumped to Stanley. All dwelling houses are connected to the mains.

In the Camp, well water is piped to all houses.

Dairies.

There are two privately-owned dairies in Stanley. The dairy herds are tuberculin-tested regularly.

Slaughter-houses.

There is now only one slaughter-house in Stanley.

During the year, one hundred and forty-three patients were admitted.

In 1967, twenty-nine patients were referred to consultants in the British Hospital, Montevideo; nineteen of them were surgical cases, requiring operations which could not be undertaken here.

VI. MEDICAL SERVICES IN THE CAMP.

For medical purposes, the Falkland Islands are divided into three areas - (1) Stanley and the North Camp, (2) Lafonia and (3) the West Falklands. Throughout the year, Dr. Taylor was stationed at Darwin, and Dr. Malone at Fox Bay. The S.M.O. was in Stanley the whole year, and Dr. Ashmore also, except for the period of his overseas leave.

The Medical Department supplies all settlements with a stock of the most-used medicines, tablets and dressings.

Almost all Camp residents can communicate with their doctor by telephone or radio-telephone.

The two DeHavilland float planes of the Government Air Service are being used more and more for the transport of medical officers and patients.

VII. PRISONS AND ASYLUMS.

The gaol in Stanley is the only one in the Colony.

There is no mental hospital. A case requiring institutional treatment and care would have to be sent to Britain. Ho such case occurred in 1967.

ANNUAL FEDICAL AND SANITARY REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st December, 1968

I. ADMINISTR TION

Dr J.H. Ashmore, for fifteen years a Medical Officer in the Falkland Islands, was promoted to the appointment of Senior Medical Officer in May on the retirement of Dr R.S. Slessor, who had been Senior Medical Officer for almost twenty years.

Dr C.M. Palone transferred to Stanley in May from Fox Bay, West Falkland, and was replaced by Dr J. Brotherhood who acted as locum tenens until Dr G. Coe arrived in the Colony. At Darwin, East Falkland, Dr D.M.A. Taylor continued as Medical Officer until June, when he went to the Falkland Islands Dependency of South Georgia to relieve Dr E Nowak, who took over, on his arrival in the Colony, as Medical Officer at Darwin.

Miss M.L. Smith, Natron, completed her contract and Miss A. Denholm was promoted to the post from Nursing Sister. During the year, Mrs E.A. Stewart returned as a Nursing Sister. Difficulties were experienced in obtaining local Nurse Probationers and the part-time help of many of our previous nurses was greatly appreciated.

Mr W.R. Vahood, Dental Surgeon, worked long hours to carry out the duties of both Camp and Stanley Dentist and Mr M. Bennett continued as Dental Technician for the whole year.

The domestic staff of the K.E.M. Hospital consists of a cook, three maids and a laundress.

III. PUBLIC HEALTH

An epidemic of Measles started in June and spread slowly through the Colony; only a small proportion of those affected were seen.

The weather during the winter was exceptionally mild and consequently the incidence of colds and throat infections was much lower than usual.

The programme of immunisation against diptheria, whooping-cough and tetanus, and against smallpox and tuberculosis was carried out as usual.

IV. HYGIENE AND SANITATION

All occupied houses in the Colony have water closets, the sewage being water-borne to the sea where possible.

Water supply

In Stanley, surface water is collected from a large catchment area a few miles from the town. It is then passed through a filtration plant in which suspended peat matter is removed by chemical precipitation, the acidity is lessened and chlorine is added. The treated water is pumped to Stanley. All dwelling houses are connected to the mains.

In the Camp, well water is piped to all houses.

Dairies

There are two privately-owned dairies in Stanley. The dairy herds are tuberculin-tested regularly.

Slaughter-houses

There is only one slaughter-house in Stanley.

V. K, E.M. HOSPITAL

The King Edward VII Memorial Hospital is the only hospital in the Colony. It is pleasantly situated on rising ground overlooking the harbour. There are thirty-two beds in fourteen wards for medical, surgical, obstetric and geriatric cases.

During the year, one hundred and forty patients were admitted.

In 1968, twenty-three patients were referred to consultants in the British Hospital, Montevideo; and one child referred to a consultant in London.

VI. MEDICAL SERVICES IN STANLEY

At the out-patient Clinics in the Hospital, 2,814 patients were seen - 992 New Cases and 1,822 Old Cases. There were 1,866 domiciliary visits made in Stanley - 571 New and 1,295 Old. The Child Welfare Clinic saw 410 cases; 34 babies received B.C.G. immunisation and the courses of Poliomyelitis and Trivax injections were completed in 44 cases. The major X-ray apparatus broke-down in January and the portable machine was used for the remainder of the year - a total of 169 X-rays were taken.

ANNUAL MEDICAL AND SANITARY REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st December, 1969

I. ADMINISTRATION

The Medical Staff consists of Dr. J. H. Ashmore, Senior Medical Officer, and Dr. C. M. Malone, Medical Officer, both stationed in Stanley. Dr. G. M. Ferguson arrived in the Colony in January and took up duties as Medical Officer at Fox Bay, West Falkland, whilst Dr. E. M. Nowak continued his duties as Medical Officer at Darwin, East Falkland. During the absence of Dr. Malone on leave, Dr. C. H. Gallimore was appointed Locum Tenens from May until December.

Miss A. Denholme completed her contract in October as Matron and Mrs. E.A. Stewart was appointed Sister-in-Charge until a new Matron is appointed. Miss B. U. Rooney arrived in the Colony in January and Miss N. Warren arrived in March as Nursing Sisters. There are also five Nurse Probationers, recruited locally.

Mr. W. R. Mahood, Dental Surgoon, and Mr. N. K. Bennett, Dental Technician, both completed their contracts during the year. Mr. R. Watson arrived in the Colony in June as Camp Dentist and Mr. B. Hughes in September as Stanley Dentist. Mr. J. J. Quinn arrived in April and took up his duties in Stanley as Dental Technician.

ANNUAL MEDICAL AND SANTEARY REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED

31ST DECEMBER 1972

I. ADMINISTRATION

The Medical Staff worked under considerable difficulties during the year, owing to shortage of staff. They consisted of Dr. J. H. Ashmore, Senior Medical Officer, Dr. E. M. Nowak, Medical Officer at Darwin, East Falkland, until September, Dr. G. M. Ferguson, Medical Officer at Fox Bay, West Falkland, until April and then in Stanley until October and Dr. N. P. Lehmann at Fox Bay from April until his transfer to Stanley in October. Dr. Ashmore was on his own in Stanley until Dr. Ferguson was transferred in April. Both Dr. Nowak and Dr. Ferguson completed their contracts and at the end of the year there were only two doctors - the Senior Medical Officer and one Medical Officer - in the Colony, both stationed in Stanley.

On the nursing side, there was shortage of staff for part of the year. Mrs. E. A. Felton continued as Sister-in-Charge until the arrival of Miss D. M. Wilson, Matron, in July. Two Nursing Sisters arrived during the year, Miss B. Teague in January and Miss M. P. Sharpe in May, bringing the trained staff up to the full complement of four by the end of July. There were also six Nurse Probationers recruited locally.

Mr. R. M. Matson, Dental Surgeon, returned to the Colony in April and carried out the duties of both Stanley and Camp Dentist. Mr. Matson was assisted in Stanley by Mrs. J. Allan as part-time dental assistant. His report for the year is on page 4. Mr. B. Hughes completed his contract in May. Dentures were sent to Comodoro Rivadavia for completion and this would appear to have been a satisfactory conclusion to the abolishment of the post of Dental Technician.

The domestic staff of the K.E.M. Hospital consisted of a cook, three maids and a laundress. A clerk, full-time caretaker and handman, part-time gardener and a part-time seamstress were also employed.

ANNUAL MEDICAL AND SANITARY REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 1973

I. ADMINISTRATION

The Medical Staff, once again, worked under considerable difficulties during the year, owing to shortage of staff. They consisted of Dr. J. H. Ashmore, O.B.E., Senior Medical Officer, Dr. N. P. Lehmann until April and Dr. F. C. Cox, who joined the staff in January. During the absence of Dr. Ashmore for three months on leave, Dr. Lazar-Vellico was recruited from the Argentine. Every effort is being made to recruit a second Medical Officer from the United Kingdom, but without success.

During the year, Dr. W. J. Maelor Evans, Medical Adviser to the Ministry of Overseas Development, visited the Colony for one week. This was the first visit from London of a member of the Administrative Staff since 1957. On the recommendation of Dr. Evans, it was arranged by the Overseas Development Administration, on request from the Falkland Islands Government, that a hospital Administrator should visit the Colony for a period of two to three months and Mr. T. Crook, D.P.A. arrived in November.

On the nursing side, Miss D. M. Wilson, Matron, and Miss B. Teague and Miss M. P. Sharpe, Nursing Sisters, continued throughout the year. Mrs. E. A. Felton completed her contract in May and her replacement had not been recruited by the end of the year. There were also six Nurse Frobationers recruited locally.

Mr. R. M. Watson, Dental Surgeon, continued his work in Stanley and the Camp during the year, assisted in Stanley by Mrs. J. Allan as part-time dental assistant.

The domestic staff of the K.E.M. Hospital consisted of a cock, three maids and a laundress. A laboratory assistant, clerk, full-time caretaker and handyman, part-time gardener and a part-time seamstress were also employed.

The Medical Services are centralised in Stanley and the Senior Medical Officer and the two Medical Officers are stationed in Stanley. The Medical Officers visit the Camp as required and also routinely. There is still a vacancy for one Medical Officer.

The Medical Department supplies all settlements with a stock of the most-used medicines, tablots and dressings, and there is a daily "doctors time" on the radio-telephone, which links all settlements with Stanley.

The two De Havilland float planes of the Government Air Service are being used more and more for the transport of medical officers and patients, costing £1,223 and £1,221 respectively.

There is no mental hospital. A case requiring institutional treatment and care would have to be sent to Britain. No such case occurred in 1973.

ANNUAL MEDICAL AND SANITARY REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st December 1974

I. ADMINISTRATION

The Medical Staff, once again, worked under considerable difficulties during the year, owing to shortage of staff. They consisted of Dr. J.H. Ashmore, O.B.E., Senior Medical Officer, and Dr. F.C. Cox, Medical Officer. Every effort was made to recruit a second Medical Officer from the United Kingdom, but without success by the end of the year. Dr. Cox proceeded on overseas leave to the United Kingdom in December.

On the nursing side, Miss D.M. Wilson, Matron and Miss B. Teague, Nursing Sister, continued during the year - Miss Teague returning on a further contract following overseas leave and Miss Wilson proceeded on her overseas leave in December. Miss M.R. Helyer and Miss D.M Forster joined the staff during the year, both recruited as Nursing Sisters in the United Kingdom. There were also six Nurse Probationers recruited locally.

Mr. R.M. Watson, Dental Surgeon, continued his work in Stanley and the Camp during the year, assisted in Stanley by Mrs. J. Allan as part-time dental assistant.

The domestic staff of the K.E.M. Hospital consisted of a cook, two part-time cooks, three maids and a laundress. A laboratory assistant, clerk/storekeeper, full-time caretaker and handyman, part-time gardener and a part-time seamstress were also employed.

Admiralty Cottage was closed during the year and was being converted into four self-contained flats for the Matron and Nursing Sisters.

III. PUBLIC HEALTH

The programme of immunisation against diphtheria, whooping-cough and tetanus, and against smallpox, tuberculosis and poliomyelitis was continued.

IV. HYGIENE AND SANITATION

All occupied houses in the Colony have water closets, the sewage being water-borne to the sea where possible.

Water Supply

In Stanley, surface water is collected from a large catchment area a few miles from the town. It is then passed through a filtration plant in which suspended peat matter is removed by a chemical precipitation, the acidity is lessened and chlorine is added. The treated water is pumped to Stanley. All dwelling houses are connected to the mains.

In the Camp, well water is piped to all houses.

Dairies

There are two privately-owned dairies in Stanley. The dairy herds are tuberculin-tested regularly.

Slaughter-Houses

There is only one slaughter-house in Stanley.

Y. K.E.M. HOSPITAL

The King Edward VII Monorial Hospital is the only hospital in the Colony. It is pleasantly situated on rising ground overlooking the harbour. There are twenty-seven beds in fourteen wards for medical, surgical, obstretic and geriatric cases.

During the year, three hundred and fifty nine patients were admitted.

In 1974, sixty-nine patients were referred to consultants in the British Hospital, Buenos Aires or the Alvear Hospital, Comodoro Rivadavia - costs totalling £20,753 being paid by Government.

VI. MEDICAL SERVICES IN STANLEY

At the out-patients Clinics in the Hospital, 3,049 patients were seen - 1287 New Cases, 1541 Old Cases, and 221 vaccinations against Smallpox. All babies received B.C.G. immunisation.

I. ADMINISTRATION

of Dr J H Ashmore OBE following twenty-one years of service in the Colony. His place was taken by Dr F C Cox. Dr B A Royappa arrived in the Colony in January as a <u>locum</u> tenens; he left the Colony in August following the arrival in July of Dr B Lee, and the medical staff was made up to full strength for the first time since Cotober 1972 by the arrival in September of Dr K B Dunnett.

Miss D N Wilson, Matron, returned from leave in May for a further tour of duty and for the months of Nay and June there was a full complement of nursing sisters, comprising Miss B Teague, Miss M Forster and Miss M R Helyer. Unfortunately Miss Felyer resigned in June, once again leading to a prolonged difficult time because of staff shortages.

Mr R M Watson, Dental Surgeon, continued his work in Stanley and the Camp during the year, assisted in Stanley by Mrs J Allan as part-time Dental Assistant.

The other Hospital staff comprised six nurse probationers, a clerk/storekeeper, a laboratory assistant, two full-time caretakers and handymen, a laundress, part-time typist and part-time seamstress.

Childhood immunisation against tuberculosis, diptheria, whooping cough, tetanus and poliomyelitis was continued. During the year routine anti-tetanus vaccination was introduced for adults who were at risk following injury. Smallpox vaccination was carried out only as necessitated by International Certification requirements.

During March and April a serious epidemic of bacterial dysentery occurred at Darwin Boarding School which necessitated Darwin School being closed until certain alterations were made to the sanitary arrangements. Although these alterations are to be regarded as of a temporary nature, there have been no further outbreaks of dysentery at the school since they were carried out.

Government legislation to control the effects of hydatid disease in the Colony was strengthened in an effort to go some way towards the eventual eradication of this disease, which this year was diagnosed in two seven-year-old children in the Colony.

IV. HYGIENE AND SANITATION

All but two regularly occupied houses in the Colony have water closets, the raw sewage being water-borne to the sea where possible. Some shepherds houses occupied for only short periods of the year rely on chemical disposal of sewage.

Water Supply

In Stanley surface water is collected from the Moody Brook, a few miles from the town. The raw water is decolourised by precipitation and filtration, neutralised and then chlorinated. The water from the Filtration plant is then pumped to covered reservoirs sited just above Stanley. Almost all dwelling houses are connected to the mains.

In the Camp the water supplies are of a varied nature but in general are pumped by wind or electricity from wells into a reservoir from which all settlement houses are supplied with piped water.

Dairies

There are two privately-owned dairies in Stanley. The milk is unpasteurised.

Slaughter houses

There is only one slaughter house in Stanley. Each Camp settlement has a 'killing shed' kept exclusively for this purpose.

V. K.E.M. HOSPITAL

The King Edward VII Memorial Hospital is the only hospital in the Colony. It has 27 beds in 14 wards for modical, surgical, obstetric and geriatric cases. During the year 394 patients were admitted, giving an average bed occupancy of 19 (70.3%).

During 1975, 46 patients were referred either to the British Hospital in Buenos Aires or the Alvear Hospital in Comodoro Rivadavia.

One hundred and forty-six operations or procedures were performed in the operating theatre. Of these, 13 were major operations and 133 were minor operations. Local anaesthetic was employed 92 times; general anaesthetic 14 times and spinal anaesthetic 3 times.

VI. MEDICAL SERVICES IN STANLEY

At the out-patients clinic at the Hospital 3,732 patients were seen.

VII. MEDICAL SERVICES IN THE CAMP

The Camp medical services are based in Stanley and the Senior Medical Officer and both Medical Officers conduct routine and emergency visits to Camp settlements. During 1975 the frequency of these visits was doubled to two visits per week, so that on average each settlement was visited every three months and the busier settlements every six weeks. Most medical visits were carried out utilising the two Government Beaver floatplanes but occasional use was also made of m.v. FORREST, at present on charter to the Royal Marines. All settlements are in contact with Stanley either by telephone or by radio/telephone, although both of these communications systems (particularly the R/T system) suffer from severe drawbacks and communications, especially during hours of darkness, may be tenuous in the extreme.

VIII.PRISONS AND ASYLUMS

The gaol in Stanley is the only one in the Colony. There is no mental hospital. Psychiatric cases requiring in-patient treatment are treated in the K.E.M. Hospital.

ANNUAL MEDICAL AND SANITARY REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 1976

I. ADMINISTRATION

- 1. During 1976 the Medical complement was complete with Dr. F. C. Cox as Senior Medical Officer and Dr. B. Lee and Dr. K. E. Dunnett as Medical Officers.
- 2. The nursing situation remained difficult throughout the year because of the shortage of one full-time sister. The full-time staff consisted of Miss D. M. Wilson, Matron, Miss B. Teague and Miss D. M. Forster. The Department has been fortunate in being able to draw on the assistence of several part-time nursing sisters namely Mrs. H. Felton, Mrs. M. Watkinson, Mrs. A. Smith and Mrs. P. Malby. Miss Forster left in November at the end of her contract and her place has been taken by Miss F. A. Stead.
- 3. Mr. R. M. Matson, Dental Surgeon, continued his work in Stanley and the Camp during the year assisted in Stanley by several part-time dental assistants. The other hospital staff comprised six nurse probationers, a clerk/storekeeper, laboratory assistant, two full-time caretakers and handymen, one part-time typist, one full-time and two part-time cooks, three maids, a laundress and part-time seamstress.
- 4. 1976 was an unsettled year for the Medical Department which had to work within an atmosphere of public criticism and worsening relationships with Government. This latter aspect culminated in September with the Senior Medical Officer and Dr. K. F. Dunnett withdrawing their services from the Department for all but emergency requirements.
- 5. Normal working was recommenced however, with the announcement of an official Government enquiry into the Medical Department, which was evertaken by a visit by Dr. Murray Baker of the Ministry of Overseas Development, whose discussions helped restore confidence within the Department and a better understanding of the problems on all sides.
- 6. As a result of the crash of the Government Air Service Beaver Alfa-Kilo at Mare Harbour on 14th October, in which Dr. Lee was travelling and in which Captain Ian Campbell lost his life, Dr. Lee had to travel to the United Kingdom for Medical treatment as a result of complications of severe exposure.

Medical Officer and the Medical Officers conduct routine and emergency visits to Camp settlements. One full time and two part time cooks, two handware gardners, three main, and roun part time dental surgery assistants were also employed in the Ming Edward Memorial Hospital.

B. Staff Changes

The year commenced with a difficult medical staff situation with only the Senior Medical Officer and Dr Dunnett in the Colony, Dr B Lee being in UK on sick leave. In addition both the SMO and Dr Dunnett were due overseas leave. Fortunately Mr Peter Summers was recruited under UK Technical Co-operation to act as leave tenons and he stayed until July, allowing firstly the SMO and then Dr Dunnett to take overseas leave. Dr Dunnett acted as SMO during the absence of Dr Cox.

Dr Alison Mackintosh arrived in September, thus bringing the medical staff up to full strength again for the first time since October 1976.

On the departure of Sister B Collins (nee Tengue) the nursing staff was brought up to full establishment by the arrival of Sister Ann Caswell and Sister Dinah Brown in February, however in July the nursing establishment was increased from 3 to 4 and no permanent appointment had been made for this additional post by the end of the year. Nevertheless, Sister Elizabeth Felton and Sister Ann Smith have filled the vacant post on a part time basis.

Dr. B Lee's contract was terminated on 13/7/77.

Wydatid disease - During the year a campaign to screen the entire population for the presence of hydatid disease was commenced. By the end of the year approximately half of the population had had blood samples taken for Latex Agglatination tests (carried out by the Pan-American Zoonosis Centre outside Buenes Aires). So far only one positive case has emerged and this patient, a 31 year old woman, has had surgery for a hydatid cyst of the liver carried out in the British Hospital in Buenes wires.

Photographia - Between 1st September and the end of the year seven cases of photographic were admitted to Hospital all with a very similar clinical appearance which included pleurisy or frank empyora. No organism could be identified as the cause of this illness and the results of serological studies are still awaited in an attempt to identify the causitive organism. Two of these patients died, one directly of the photographic and another as a result of an associated encephalitis. Case to case transmission could not be identified, but many people in the Colony at this time were suffering from a milder flu-like illness associated with upper respiratory infection.

IV HYGIENE AND SAMITATION

- 1) Sewage Disposal All but one regularly occupied house in the Colony have water closets, the sewage being water-bourne to the sea where possible.
- 2) <u>Mater Supply</u> In Stanley surface water is collected from the Moody Brook a few miles from the town. The raw water is de-colourised by precipitation to an average concentration of 1p.p.m. The water from the filtration plant is then piped to covered reservoirs sited just above Stanley. Almost all dwelling houses are connected to the mains.

In the Camp the water supplies are of a varied nature but in general are pumped by wind or electricity from wells into a reservoir from which all settlement houses are supplied with piped water.

- 3) <u>Dairies</u> There are two privately cumed dairies in Stanley. The milk is unposteurised.
- 4) <u>Slaughter Houses</u> There is only one slaughter house in Stanley. Each Camp settlement has a "Killing Shed" kept exclusively for this purpose.
- 5) Housing In general the standards of housing throught the Colony are high and overcrowding is thought to be relatively uncommon. A survey is at present under way to try to identify more closely any problems that do exist in Stanley.
- 6) Rats Rats continue to be present in Stanley. Early in the year there seemed to be an increase in their numbers, but this now seems to have reverted to a nare normal situation, but the fact that they are present at all is an undesirable state of affairs.

V SCHOOL HEALTH

No routine school health examination has been undertaken. There are plans for a re-introduction of a regular school health service next year, after a lapse of many years.

VI PORT HEALTH

47 ships entered Port during 1977. All vessels were given pratique, in stly following routine inspection by a Nedical Officer. In our location and with the present health situation prevailing in neighbouring countries, consideration is being given to withdrawing the requirements of granting free pratique.

VII MATERNITY AND CHILD VELICIBLE

All confinements are conducted in Stanley, in the Hospital, expectant nothers in Camp coming to Stanley at 36 weeks. During the year weekly parenteraft and relaxation classes were introduced prior to the anti-natal clinic at the Hospital, and the rajority of expectant mothers attended these classes.

As a result of an active policy to encourage breast feeding 26 (72.2%) of mothers chose to food their babies in this way.

Post-natal clinics are held once each month.

Child welfare clinics are held twice each month. There were 254 attendances at these clinics in 1977.

VIII FAMILY PLIMBING

Although officially there is a Femily Planning climic hold once each month these are very rarely attended. Most family planning advice is dealt with at general climics. As a result of this advice there were 8 insertions of intra-uterine contraceptive devices, 5 vasectomics and 4 tubal ligations carried out in 1977.

While it seems likely that the family planning advice is adequate for married couples there is obviously scope for improving the advice obtained by single girls. In 1977 there were 8 illegitimate births (22% of total births) and one birth conceived pre-maritally.

IX SOCIAL WORK

The Social Worker dealt with a case load of 58 cases during the year, of which 29 were new referrals. The cases covered a whole range of social problems, with a high incidence of housing problems. In view of this the Social Worker was computed on to Government's Housing Advisory Committee.

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During the year arrangements were made for the adoption of a baby in the Colony by a couple in the United Kingdon, which appears to be the first occasion that such an adoption has been arranged. Similar arrangements are at present under way for another baby to be adopted in the United Kingdon in 1978.

Four children were found foster homes in the Colony. Seven families received help from the "Charitable Relief" fund.

X KING EDWARD MINORIAL HOSPITAL

The King Edward Memorial Hospital is the only Hospital in the Colony. It has 27 beds in 14 wards for all medical, surgical, obstetric and gerintric cases. During the year 358 patients were admitted. The average bed occupancy was 23 (85.2%). A surmary of in-patient diagnoses is shown in Table I.

XI MEDIC L SERVICES IN SELFECT

At the general out-patients clinics 3024 patients were seen.

XII MEDICAL SERVICES IN CAMP

The Camp modical services are based on a flying dector service operated out of Stanley. Routine medical visits are made to Camp twice weekly when possible, utilising the two Government Beaver float planes. During a significant proportion of the year however, the air service has not been able to operate at full capacity and this has held up some of the Camp visiting.

In November 1977 the Senior Medical Officer undertook an overland trip on East and West Falklands.

All settlements are in contact with Stanley either by tolephene or radio-telephone although both of these systems (particularly the R/T system) suffer from severe drawbacks, and communications particularly during the hours of darkness, may be tenuous in the extreme.

Camp medical visits and routine N/T contacts are listed in Table II. These statistics do not include energency or week-end R/T contacts, nor do they include contacts rade over the telephone with certain settlements.

During the year Camp medicine chests were all brought up to date with a standardised range of drugs and dressings and responsibility for the maintenance of the medicine chests was transfered from the Camp managers to the Medical Department.

XIII MEDICAL TREATMENT OVERSEAS

40 patients were referred for treatment overseas, 21 to the British Hospital in Buenos Aires, 18 to the Alvear Hospital in Comedore Rivadavia and 1 to the Royal Infirmary in Glasgow.

The diagnoses of the cases sent overseas are given in Table III.

XIV PRISONS AND ASYLUMS

The gaol in Stanley is the only one in the Colony. All prisoners are nedically examined on corrittal and again on release and at any other appropriate times. Psychiatric cases requiring in-patient treatment are treated in the KEM Hospital.
