#### Staff Changes

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For the first time for many years, the Medical Staff has been at full complement for the first half of 1978. Due to leave and gaps between appointments during the remainder of the 18 month period there were only two doctors in the Falkland Islands. Likewise since Matron Wilson left in July 1978 there has generally been one Nursing Sister below establishment. This situation leaves very little room for sickness, forward planning or for preventative medicine.

#### 4. Public Health

Vaccination and Immunisation procedures for children were carried out according to the schedule set out in the 1978 British Pharmaceutical Codex 1973. Smallpox vaccination was restricted to International Certification requirements.

Measles - towards the end of 1978 Measles vaccination was started for children from 3 to 10 years of age.

Hydatid - The Hydatid screening compaign was completed in the first half of 1978. A total os 6 patients were found to have this disease. All have been investigated and treated.

#### 5. Hygiene and Sanitation

a) Water supply - Filtered water continues to be supplied and is more than adequate for present needs. All Camp settlements have piped water.

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b) Housing - In general the standard of housing throughout the Colony is high and a survey to identify areas of overcrowding and under usage was carried out in 1978.

#### 6. School Health

Plans for reintroducing a routine school health examination are still being worked upon and it is also hoped to introduce hearing tests in the future.

#### 7. Port Health

ships were cleared during the 18 months.

#### 8. Maternity and Child Health

All confinements continue to be conducted in the Hospital.

Parentcraft classes are carried out periodocially according to demand and Child Welfare Clinics continue to be held. It is hoped to expand these to include a periodic assessment which would be more meaningful than the present procedures.

#### 9. Family Planning

Family planning is provided free and some financial assistance is gratefully received from the International Planned Parenthood Federation.

#### 10. Social Work

During the period of the report the Social Worker left and has not as yet been replaced. Social problems are dealt with by the Nursing and Medical Staff in the meantime.

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#### 11. King Edward Memorial Hospital

During 1978 the number of admissions were 297 patients and in the first six months of 1979, 146 patients were admitted. The average bed occupancy was 15. In future the old peoples part of the Hospital will not bo included in the reckoning of bed occupancy as this gives rise to a false figure.

Plans are afoot for the retiling of all Hospital floors, and for the re-organisation of the X-ray Department to take account of a new X-ray Machine which has been provided from the Ministry of Overseas Development through a soft loan scheme. It is also hoped to upgrade the Operating Theatre, the Kitchen and the Sluices.

During the last year, more carpet tiles have been donated from the Red Cross and the Royal Marines and have been laid in the main corridors and parts of the old peoples end. Further carpet tiles are to be laid in the near future. Also during the year **an** automatic slide projector was kindly donated by the Royal Marines for use both as a teaching aid and for pleasure.

Total visits to Camp settlements were 162 (120 + 42) when 1080 patients were seen (768 + 312). The morning R/T surgery continued.

The Camp Medicine Chests have now been supplied with inflatable splints and throughout the time of this report all Camp Chests were completely renewed. The system seems to be working satisfactory.

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#### 14. Medical Treatment Overseas

38 Patients were referred for Overseas Treatment in 1978; 16 to the Alvear Hospital in Comodoro Rivadavia, 21 to the British Hospital in Buenos Aires and 1 to the United Kingdom. In the first half of 1979, 17 patients were referred for Overseas Treatment; 6 to Comodoro Rivadavia, 9 to Buenos Aires and 2 to the United Kingdom.

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#### 2. Staff changes

For the first time for some while there have been three doctors during the year and this has enabled a considerable amount of preventative medicine being done as can be seen by the increased figures of vaccinations and repeat Hydatid screening.

Unfortunately, this is not the case with the Nursing Sisters, as we are invaribly short staffed by at least one sister which inevitably leads to a reduction in the training of local staff, school health and district visiting.

#### 4. Public Health

Hydatid screening. A repeat screening was carried out of the whole of the Falkland Islands from April 1980 and the Laboratory work will be carried out in the Panamerican Zoonosis Centre in Buenos Aires. They have received all the specimens.

An epidemiological survey was also started during the year and this will be analysed in the United Kingdom by computer, kindly donated by St. Georges Hospital. This will enable the incidence of disease in the Falkland Islands to be studied compared to that in the United Kingdom.

In the coming year, in October 1980, for the first time, the services of an Optician from Guildford has been obtained and he will screen all the school children against eye defects. During the last year Dr Figari the Ophthalmic Surgeon from Comodoro Rivadavia, who has operated on several patients from the Falklands, was able to make a visit for follow-up purposes and to see some new patients. This was a valuable visit, both for himself and for the Medical Department, and inspite of the Opticians visit it is hoped that Dr Figari may come again in the future. The amount of spectacles prescribed in

#### 5. School Health

Finance has been approved to obtain a machine to test hearing and in due course all school children will be screened.

6. Port Health Due to the increasing number of ships using Stanley Harbour, routine visits are not made, and the need to visit is left to the discretion of the Customs and Harbour Master. However, a large number of patients have been received throughout the year for Dental, Surgical and Casualty Consultations.

7. Maternity and Child Health All confinements continue to be conducted in the Hospital.

Parentcraft classes are carried out periodically according to demand and Child Welfare Clinics continue to be held on the first Friday in each month. It is hoped to expand these to include a periodic assessment which would be more meaningful than the present procedures.

### 8. Family Planning

Advice for family planning continues to be offered at the General clinics.

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### 9. Social Work

Social problems continue to be a major factor in the work load of the Nursing and Medical Staff. In particular the problem of excess alcohol intake which gives rise to many medical and social problems. The present medical and nursing staff deal with these the best they can. St admid tower

#### 10. King Edward Memorial Hospital

During the 12 months (1/7/79 to 30/6/80) a total of 296 patients were admitted. The average bed occupancy was 6.96 for the new part of the Hospital and 5.38 for the residential end.

At the time of this report, the Hospital floors are in the process of being retiled. New curtains have been installed around the beds in the three large words and the greater part of the Hospital is in the process of being repainted.

Finance is available in the coming year for the refurbishing of the kitchen together with renewal of two sluices. There are also plans for the alteration of the Theatre.

In May 1980, a new olympic x-ray table was installed at the cost of £40,000; the majority of which was provided as a soft loan by the British Government. This was a very considerable achievement from a logistic point of view and had taken five years between planning and completion. The machine is working well and it is hoped it will help the Medical staff in diagnosis and treatment.

We continue to receive financial support from the Red Cross for commodes for use in peoples homes together with some new chairs for use in the residential part of the Hospital. New carpet tiles have yet to be laid - also donated this year by the Red Cross.

### 11. Medical Services in Stanley

At the general out-patient clinics 2,627 patients were seen. Of these 886 were new and 1,741 were old.

Hydatid Screening Eight people were found to be positive - five of which were previously positive on the first screening, two of which, for some reason were not screened on the previous occasion, and one who was not in the Falkland Islands during the previous screening. Most of these have been to Buenos Aires for investigation.

#### 5. SCHOOL HEALTH

A plan to start a school health service with routine medical examinations for all school childron is bein developed in cooperation with the Education Department.

The audiometer is now operating and has been used to assess hearing in several children suspected of having hearing defects.

#### 6. PORT HEALTH

Ships entering Port Stanley are visited at the discretion of the Customs and Harbour Master. Medical Officers have visited several ships to examine sick and injured crew members and arrange for their transfer to hospital.

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#### 7. MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE

The antenatal clinic times have been changed from Monday afternoon to Friday mornings by appointment, hopefully providing a better service by not keeping the mothers waiting. A series of parentcraft talks, instead of one single talk, has also been introduced. These talks are enhanced by slides and more recently films, now that we have our own projector. Prior to receiving the projector we were indepted to the Senior School for the loan of theirs.

Due to the keenness and awareness of the mothers the Child Welfare clinic on the first Friday of each month, was full to capacity. It was then decided to divide the clinics to under and over six months. Under six months to be held on the first Friday and over six months on the third Friday each month. This has worked well and enables the staff to spend more time assessing the babies and helping the mothers with their problems.

#### 8. FAMILY PLANNING

Family Planning advice is available at all clinics, and is offered to all nothers delivered at the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital. Oral contraceptives are the most popular method. 13 intra-uterine contraceptive devices have been fitted during the year.

#### 9. SOCIAL WORK

Social problems continue to take up a considerable amount of medical and nursing time. This is occasioned mainly by the proportionately large number of elderly folk resident in Stanley, and also by problems resulting from high alcohol consumption.

#### 10. KING EDWARD VII MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

During the year (1/7/80 to 30/6/81) a total of 336 patients were admitted. The average daily bed occupancy was 7.7 for the acute wing of the hospital and 6.1 for the residential end of the hospital.

#### 10. KEMH continued.

Two new sluices have arrived which are to be installed shortly - one for the acute wing and one for the residential end of the hospital. Other additions to the hospital have been the purchase of a Resuscitare for the Maternity Department, sinks have been installed in some wards as well as the duty room. A new Matron Autoclave has arrived for sterilising theatre instruments. Three cooker hoods for the kitchen have arrived and are presently being installed. Most of the new instruments for the theatre have been purchased and have arrived.

#### 11. MEDICAL SERVICES IN STANLEY

At the general out-patient clinics, 3,499 consultations were made. District calls made in Stanley totaled 128.

The larger settlements are visited every four to six weeks, medium sized settlements every two months and small settlements every three months. # Medical and Sanitary Report

## for the period 1st July 1983 to 9th April 1984

#### MEDICAL AND SANITARY REPORT 1983 - 1984

Following the upheaval of the islands during 1982/83 it had been assumed that in 1984 the task of writing the annual medical report would be quite straightforward. Unfortunately, in April 1984, the medical services in the islands suffered a blow from which they are still recovering. The fire at the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital has placed a greater burden than normal on the community medical services, and, until the opening of the temporary Stanley Hospital, upon the Military medical services. This, together with the loss of some of the statistical returns in the fire, has meant that the statistics presented in this report can only cover the period July 1st 1983 to April 9th 1984.

#### STAFFING ,

It has proved consistently difficult to recruit sufficient staff for the efficient running of the hospital, and in almost every department we have had to work with less than the established numbers. Recruitment, both within the islands, and in the United Kingdom, seems to have met with little response, and local workers, finding that there are more lucrative and less socially demanding jobs, are easily seduced away from the medical services. The arrival in May 1984, of four nurses on secondment from the Westminster Hospital has eased the shortage of trained staff, and perhaps provides an avenue which could be investigated in the future.

#### BUILDINGS

From the end of the war in June 1982, until the fire in April 1984, both the military and civilian medical services were housed in the King Edward Memorial Hospital. After the fire the military moved to their own temporary accomodation at the Canache, whilst the civilians, after a short time in the Town Hall, moved to the hastily converted Brewster accomodation block. Although this now serves as a temporary hospital, it is already apparent that the civilian medical services have insufficient beds to meet the current average bed occupancy rates, and that there are many severe shortcomings in the hospital, both in the short term, and if it is to be used for a long period of time.

It is hoped that a start will have been made on new hospital premises within Stanley by the time the next report is published in 1985.

#### SERVICES.

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The medical department continues to provide a broad range of hospital based services. These include:-

- a) Maternity care
- b) Geriatric care
- c) Community Medical Services, ie Daily clinics District Nursing Camp Visiting District Visiting R/T Consultations
- d) Accident and Emergency
- e) Dispensing
- f) Acute Medical and Surgical care
- g) Environmental Health
- h) Social Services

At present the military medical team provide assistance, especially with acute medical and surgical cases. They do also provide the civilian health team with expert advice as and when required.

Drugs, dressings, rations and some equipment are still provided by the military authorities, and paid for by the Falkland Islands Government. This arrangement was arrived at under the terms of the Cost-Sharing agreement, 1983.

As no dental statistics are to hand, these will be included in the :984/85 report.
