The Council met pursuant to summons.

The Minutes of the last Council held on
27th September 1875 were read and confirmed -

The Governor then said -

"I have placed before you
a short Ordinance naturalizing two
foreigners who are both well known to
you - I presume there can be no
objection to this measure."

The Clerk of the Council then read the draft
Ordinance No 1 of 1876 entitled "An ordinance
to an Ordinance for the naturalization of Edward Wilson
and Frank Bender -"

The Governor proposed and Mr. Dean seconded
the motion that the standing rules be suspended
and this reading taken as the first, second and
third readings.

The Council met pursuant to summons
The Minutes of the last meeting were read and
confirmed -

The Lieutenant Governor called upon the Clerk of the
Council to read the Secretary of State's Despatch
of 13 of 6th May last enclosing a draft
Ordinance to make further provision for the
administration of justice in the Falkland Islands
and moved that the standing orders should
be suspended and the Bill should pass
through all its stages on one reading.

The Hon. Mr. Dean ^{seconded} the motion but drew
attention to Clause 19 and suggested that when
Assessors are summoned in accordance with
its provisions by the Police Magistrate they
should be entitled to sit and take part in
the decision in the manner provided by section
No 21

§ 21 of the principal Ordinance. Mr. Dean
said he would not require a protest to be
recorded to that effect but would be satisfied
of the Lieutenant Governor doing so he promised
viz^r drawing the attention of the Secretary of
State to the suggestion in his covering Despatch.

The Governor then moved that the standing
rules should be suspended and that a Bill
entitled "An Ordinance for making certain
verbal alterations in the Summary Jurisdiction
Supplement Ordinances and other Ordinances
do, at this sitting, pass through all its stages.

The Hon. Mr. Smith ^{seconded} the motion
and the Ordinance was then passed.

Thursday, 14th December 1876.

The Council met pursuant to summons.

The Oath of Office as a Member of the Legislative Council was administered to Mr. Travis.

The Minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

The Governor called upon the Clerk of the Council to read the Secretary of State's Despatch No 27 of the 12th September 1876 in reply to the Governor's Despatch No 34 of the 30th June 1876 on the subject of the position of Assessors when summoned by the Police Magistrate under the new Ordinance No 2 of 1876, entitled "An Ordinance to make further provision for the Administration of Justice in the Falkland Islands."

The Members were of opinion that it was not desirable to make the contemplated alteration in the Ordinance in question.

His Excellency the Governor then moved that the standing Orders should be suspended and that a Bill entitled "The Penal Servitude Ordinance" do at this sitting pass through all its stages.

Mr. Dean seconded the motion and the Ordinance was then passed.

His Excellency the Governor then moved that the Standing Orders should be suspended again and that a Bill entitled "An Ordinance to extend to these settlements certain Acts of Parliament in force in England relating to the Criminal Law", do at this sitting pass through all its stages.

Mr. Dean seconded this motion and the Ordinance was then passed.

"An Ordinance to provide for the continuance of Ordinance No of 1875 entitled 'An Ordinance to give a preferable lien on Wool from season to season and to make mortgages on Sheep, Cattle, and Horses valid without delivery to the mortgagee,' do at this sitting pass through all its stages.

Mr. Travis seconded this motion and the Ordinance was then passed.
