The Council met pursuant to summons

Present H. G. Governor Kerr President
Hon. G. P. Brooks & G. M. Dean Esq^r Members

The minutes of the previous council held on
the 25th January 1883 were read & confirmed.

Mr G P Brooks took the oath and his
seat at the Council

H. G informed the Council that pursuant
to instructions which he had received from the Rt Hon
the Secretary of State for the Colonies relative to the Estimates,
The Rent of Crown lands in certain cases, and the compulsory
purchases of Crown lands, he had to lay before them three
Ordinances relating to these subjects; as well as the financial
Estimates of Revenue & Expenditure for 1884. He also
laid on the table the Annual Account of the Revenue
and Expenditure of the Colony for the year 1882.)

H. G. then moved that the standing rules
"and orders be suspended and introduced." An Ordinance
"to provide for the service of the Falkland Islands
"for the year 1884" along with the amended Estimates
for the same year.

The Hon G P Brooks moved that the Bill
be read a first time and being seconded by the Hon
G. M. Dean the Bill was read a first time.

H. G. moved the second reading of the Bill
which was seconded by the Hon G. M. Dean & the
Bill was read a second time

FALKLAND ISLANDS,

BY HIS EXCELLENCY THOMAS KERR, GOVERNOR.

No 2 of 1884.

An Ordinance to regulate the amount of Rent to be paid by Lessees of Crown Lands in certain cases.

Preamble.

WHEREAS no provision has been made in the Land Ordinances for the reduction of rents in cases where Lessees of the Crown Lands exercise the right of purchasing, during the continuance of their leases, any further quantity of land comprised in their stations, over and beyond the blocks of one hundred and sixty acres in each section which they are compelled to purchase in the terms of their leases; and whereas it is expedient to regulate the amount of rent to be paid for the leasehold land remaining after such purchases of further quantities of land: Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

Rent of unsold land remaining after purchases during continuance of leases, to be in proportion to rent of the whole.

Proviso.

1. In every case where any person holding a lease of Crown lands for pastoral purposes, shall exercise the right of purchasing, during the continuance of his lease, any further quantity of land comprised in his station, over and beyond the block of one hundred and sixty acres in each section, which he is compelled to purchase in the terms of his lease; the rent of the remainder of the station after any such purchase, shall bear such proportion to the original rent, as the unsold lands bear to the original station; the whole of the land comprised in a lease being treated for this purpose as of equal value:—Provided always that there shall be no reduction of rent on account of the blocks of land which the lessees are compelled to purchase in the terms of their leases.



FALKLAND ISLANDS.

No 3 of 1884

An Ordinance to regulate the compulsory purchase of blocks of land under the provisions of the "Land Ordinance 1872."

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Preamble.

WHEREAS it is provided by Section 3 of the Land Ordinance 1872 that every lessee of Crown Lands shall within ten years from the date of his lease purchase a block of One hundred and sixty acres for every section contained in his lease, and whereas it is expedient to exempt the holders of renewed leases from such obligation. Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

Lessees not compelled to purchase land on renewed leases.

1. No Lessee of Crown Lands shall be liable to the obligation of purchasing land upon any Station included in a renewed lease, in any case wherein a compulsory purchase has already been made during the Original Lease in the terms of section 3 of the Ordinance No. 1. of 1872 and of section 2 of the Ordinance No 1. of 1879.

introduce two Bills, the first being No 4 of 1884
"An Ordinance to regulate the compulsory purchase
of blocks of Land under the provisions of the Land
Ordinance 1872," and the other No 5 of 1884
"a Naturalization Ordinance"

H. G stated that the first of these Bills was
intended to be in place of Ordinance No 3 of 1884
which had not received Her Majesty's confirmation
and allowance and with respect to which he had
received instructions from the Right Honble the Secretary
of State to repeal and to substitute an ordinance
in the terms and form in which it would now be
introduced.

H. G then moved the suspension of the
standing rules and orders and the first reading of a
Bill to regulate the compulsory purchase and of
freeholds under the provisions of the Land Ordinance 1872

CIRCULAR.

Downing Street,

Sir,

I have the honour to call your attention to the 43rd Section of the Explosive Substances Act, 1875 (38 & 39 Vic., Cap. 17), a copy of which is enclosed herewith, empowering Her Majesty, by Order in Council, to prohibit, or restrict, the manufacture, keeping, or importation of dangerous Explosives, and to suggest that a Law should be enacted in the Colony under your Government giving similar powers to the Governor in Council, if your legal advisers consider that existing Legislation does not make sufficient provision in the matter.

CIRCULAR (1)

Downing Street,

20th June, 1884.

Sir,

My attention has been drawn to the want of uniformity which prevails in the wording of the clauses inserted in the laws of different Colonies for the purpose of suspending their operation until the signification in the Colony of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon.

It appears to me to be desirable that the same form of clause should be used for this purpose in all Colonies, and I have therefore to request that the following form may in future be adopted in the Colony under your Government:—

“This (Law, Act, Ordinance) shall not come into operation unless and until the Officer Administering the Government notifies by proclamation that it is Her Majesty's pleasure not to disallow the same, and thereafter it shall come into operation upon such day as the Officer Administering the Government shall notify by the same or any other proclamation.”
