ON THE DIMINUTION OF THE GENTOO PENGUIN.

The Gentoo Penguin is resident in the FalklandIslands and breeds in rookeries of varying size. These rookeries are generally situated at a considerable distance from the sea in ground covered withe Diddle-dee plants.

The effect of the penguins breeding on the ground and moving about in the neighbourhood is to extirpate all plant life except grass. The places where the birds actually nest are however completely bare while in use. The bare ground, which has been heavily manured, also becomes covered with grass eventual ly since the birds frequently change the position of the nesting site without apparent cause.

It appears therefore that the Gentoo is a natural agent for the improvement of ground from the point of view of the farmer.

Within the last few months I have frequently been told that the Gentoo reskeries are diminishing in size.

The eggs of this species are regarded as delicacies in the islands and it has been the practice to permit them to be taken up to the 31st.of December. Since the Gentoo begins to lay about the middle of October and will go on laying until it is allowed to incubate the necessity of producing several extra clutches of eggs annually constitutes a serious drain on the bird's sexual resources and must shorten its breeding life.

The Gentoo incubates for about six weeks and would naturally bring out its young about the beginning of December, whereas if the eggs are taken several times the chicks will hatch late the may well not be sufficiently strong to with tone the columns.

The diminution may, in my opinion, os reasonally attributed

to too long and close robbing of the rookeries.

I would submit for consideration therefore, a proposal that Gentoo Penguin eggs may be taken in future for a very limited period, namely up to the 31st. of October annually.

I may add that Mr.A.G. Bennett is in agreement with this suggestion.

In pursuance of the powers vested in him by section 4 of the Penguins Preservation Ordinance, 1914, and otherwise, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, is pleased hereby to make the following Regulations:—

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Penguins (Amendment) Regulations, 1931, and shall be read and construed as one with the Penguin Regulations, 1914.

Short Title.

2. Section 1 of the Penguin Regulations, 1914, is hereby repealed and replaced by the following:-

Repeal and Replacement of section 1 of the Penguin Regulations, 1914.

- 1. The period for which Licences to take Penguins' eggs may be issued shall be
 - (i) in the case of Gentoo Penguins from the 1st day of October to the 31st day of October in every year;
 - (ii) in the case of other Penguins from the 1st day of October to the 31st day of December in every year.
