I beg to ask the permission of His Excellency the Governor to take ten Rock-hopper Penguins alive from Kidney Isd, or elsewhere, for the Zoological Society of London; subject to leave being granted me and providing the birds have ^{not} already left for the ocean.

It has been my practice in past leaves to take living specimens to London with me. There is no cost to the Colony whatever, and no gain to myself; the tablets describing the exhibits advertise the Falklands as the place of origin. I may add that some of the birds transported nine years ago were still living **happily** a few months ~~ago~~ since.
