Oil found at last, but how much not known

and to all

ANY despair and disappointment that may have been felt when Desire Petroleum's first well did not immediately gush black gold all over the South Atlantic has been banished with the announcement by Rockhopper Exploration that it has made what it hopes is "the first oil discovery in the North Falkland Basin."

Managing director of Rockhopper Sam Moody, who said he was "very excited at the result," said the well had found oil along intervals across 53m, which was 25m deep at its thickest.

Now the company has to decide whether to plug the well, suspend it for future testing or drill an appraisal well.

The response from the Falkland Islands Government, who issued the licences for the current oil exploration campaign was upbeat.

Director of Mineral Resources Phyl Rendell said: "We are really very, very encouraged by the news.

"It is early days but good news for the Falkland Islands, and we hope it will result in continued activity in the area and increased confidence."

Equally buoyant was the response of the Member of the Falkland Islands Legislative Assembly with responsibility for Mineral Resources, Emma Edwards: "It's very exciting and the news is likely to boost confidence in the industry in the islands," she said. Miss Edwards offered her

Miss Edwards offered her congratulations to Rockhopper and wished equal success to the other companies exploring in the Falklands.

The discovery, she said, "bodes well for the long term future of the Falkland Islands hydrocarbons industry."

Although the company still has much data to study before

deciding on its next step, the announcement had an immediate confidence-boosting effect on the stock market, which extended to all the companies currently engaged in exploration around the Falkland Islands.

Rockhopper's shares soared by 150% to 91p.

Desire Petroleum, whose shares had lost over half their value when the results of their first drilling prospect were called "disappointing," saw their value bounce up 96% to 74p, with lesser, but significant rises in value being experienced by Falklands Oil & Gas and Borders and Southern.

The story of Rockhopper's discovery was immediately taken up by Britain's newspapers and the world's major press agencies, many of which referred back to the political tensions created between Britain and Argentina when the oil rig Ocean Guardian first arrived in Falklands waters in February.

Speculation as to the possible size of the discovery was also rife, with BFBS radio talking about a possible two million barrel find.

John Sparks of Channel 4 News, who reportedly visited the Falkland Islands in February, was more circumspect.


"It's not yet possible to tell how many millions of barrels Rockhopper has discovered, but it has made the first step along the road of a commercial find," he wrote.

"More testing is required before the size of the find becomes apparent. It was always known that the Falklands sits on a bed of the black stuff. What matters is how much of it is commercially viable to recover.

"The basic answer is that far more is commercially viable with an oil price at \$80 per barrel than it was in 1998 when Shell abandoned some small finds in the vicinity of today's Rockhopper find with the oil price barely above \$10.

"Eyebrow-raising estimates suggest as much as 60 billion barrels across the whole of the Falklands - basically another North Sea - a figure scoffed at by many of the big oil executives I have spoken to."

For his part, Mr Moody said: "We don't know how much oil there is, but we now know there is some."

THE Complaints Commissioner Bill was approved by Executive Council this week but already I fear that this will turn out to be another box to tick, which makes us look good, but serves no very useful purpose.

You may ask why we need a Complaints Commissioner. After all, apart from the Letters Page of the Penguin News, we have legal aid, and an independent judiciary with a small claims court. The Civil Service, which obstinately remains the Falkland Islands largest employer, has its own system of line management and complaints procedure. So isn't all well?

The answer, sadly, is that it is not. This is the case for a variety of reasons, among them the tendency of any organisation to close ranks when challenged in a way which puts its own credibility above that of any complainant.

Recently at Penguin News we heard of a case where someone had alleged minor corruption, or at least an over-zealous application of the rules, on the part of a civil servant. The claimant expected the matter to be soon cleared up, but instead claims that from the bottom to the very top, the administration closed ranks against him, including possibly turning a blind eye to the falsification of evidence.

The guilt or innocence of any of the parties in the above case is not the issue here, but the lack of an independent body to which a complainant can appeal is.

This is particularly true for the Civil Service, whose members are bound by a Mafia-style "omerta" or vow of silence, from disclosing publicly anything that may be going amiss in their departments.

They also do not much like the idea of having to make any complaints to their line manager, when it is he or she who holds sway over their prospects of promotion and possibly is the person against whom they most wish to complain.

Unfortunately for the hopes of any civil servant looking to the Complaints Commissioner for support, Paragraph 6.4, Section (ii) of the Bill reads: "A complaint can only be made if internal complaints procedures have been used first, and the complaint has been referred to a commissioner by a member of the Assembly or the Governor."

Fined for second case of assault

WHAT was described by Senior Magistrate John Trevaskis as "a momentary loss of self-control" led to financial penalties totalling £380 being imposed on Mr Jason Alazia in the Magistrates Court on Thursday.

Mr Alazia was fined £200 for a common assault on Mr Gary Thomas, to whom he was also ordered to pay £100 in compensation. Court costs of £80 were also awarded against Mr Alazia, who was given credit for having entered a plea of guilty, on the advice of his lawyer, Keith Watson.

In a previous hearing, Mr Alazia had entered a plea of not guilty, claiming he had been simply patting Mr Thomas as thanks for his intervention in a dispute. However, the court was told he had since accepted the view that striking Mr Thomas for whatever reason constituted an assault.

In sentencing, Mr Trevaskis said he rejected a suggestion by Mr Alazia's defence counsel that a conditional discharge would be appropriate.

He said bruising to Mr Thomas's chest resulting from the blow indicated an inappropriate use of excessive force. This also was the second time Mr Alazia had come before the court on an assault charge and, although the circumstances were different, he felt the appropriate punishment should be "further up the scale."

Man 'pushed' partner

DELROY Kevin Leo (20) pleaded guilty to two charges of common assault against his then partner Alena Dawn Scott, in the Magistrate's Court on Wednesday.

Crown Counsel Élliott Taylforth said the first offence, alleged to have taken place on April 9, involved Mr Leo becoming violent, grabbing, pushing, choking and attempting to smother the victim, and the second on April 18 included incidences of Mr Leo pushing Miss Scott, kicking her as she ran away, and in the ribs when she was on the floor. Mr Leo, who was not represented, admitted pushing the victim, but denied the other assertions.

Senior Magistrate John Trevaskis said: "I am satisfied the elements of the prosecution case you deny would substantially affect sentencing, therefore I cannot accept your plea of guilty."

Mr Taylforth said because Miss Scott had withdrawn her statement she may not agree to participate. The case was adjourned until May 20.

Drink driving review

COLIN Macdonald (69) pleaded not guilty last Friday to charges of rape and indecent assualt.

Three cases of rape and one of indecent assault were alleged to have taken place between November 1976 and November 1977 against two children, and a further charge of rape, between July 1991 and July 1992 was alleged against a third child. The trial, to be held in the Supreme Court, will begin on June 7, and is anticipated to last six to seven days.

ExCo rejects private sector on freight bids

NOT everyone seems to be as pleased as Councillor Roger Edwards by news from last week's Executive Council meeting that the consolidation of freight to West Falkland and its delivery to Fox Bay will be handed over to ferry operators Workboat Services Ltd.

Cllr Edwards, who lives at Fox Bay and was one of the ExCo members who took the decision, said he thought the move would be "well supported on the West."

But John Clifford of Saddle Direct, who has been attempting to set up a private freight service to the West, was furious.

Mr Clifford told the Penguin News: "Imagine the annoyance, having been trying for the past year to introduce a reliable freight service between Stanley and Fox Bay, to have the council undermine the effort with one fell swoop by awarding the contract to a subsidised company like Workboat Services. We at Saddle Direct, with no help or money from government or FIDC, have tried really hard to get this up and running.

"We have fought – with others – to bring rates on the Concordia Bay down to reasonable levels for freight carriers and, just when we think we are in a position to make it all work, and without any acknowledgement or even an invitation to be considered – kick, right in the nuts from council."

Cllr Edwards said the issue had been a "bone of contention for a long time."

Although delivery of freight to Fox Bay and the provision of a consolidated freight service had been part of Workboat Services' original proposal, the previous council had thought it should be opened up to the private sector.

But Cllr Edwards said efforts by the private sector to provide a consolidation service had not been a success and, because heavy traffic was having a deleterious effect on roads, ExCo felt the service should now be handed over to

"He should know better," said Mr Clifford. "After all, he drove our truck across for us twice."

Hamish Wylie of Seafish Chandlery, which also has in the past offered a consolidated freight service to the West, said he would be surprised if Workboat Services could provide a superior service at a competitive price.

"I guess if government wants to spend more money, it's up to them," he said.

Workboat Services manager Adam Cockwell said negotiations with government were still ongoing, but his company looked forward to being able to provide a level of service that its customers would appreciate.

Veteran's son dies in Helmand

CPL Harvey Alex Holmes, 22 whose father fought with 2 Para in 1982 was killed on Sunday by an improvised explosive device close to patrol base Waterloo, in Sangin, Helmand Province Afghanistan.

He was providing protection for his patrol as it investigated a compound when the explosion happened, the MoD said.

In his five years with the 1st Battalion The Mercian Regiment Cpl Holmes served in Northern Ireland, Belize, Iraq and the Falkland Islands.

Whilst serving in the Falkland Islands, Cpl Holmes was able to visit Mount Longdon where his late father had served with the Parachute Regiment during the 1982 conflict.

This was described by Major Mark Ellwood MBE, Officer Commanding A Company, 1st Battalion The Mercian Regiment (Cheshire) as " an emotional experience for him as his father was a huge inspiration to him."

Mixed bag as showers are slight

APRIL showers fell far below average, with sunshine and temperature both up on monthly averages, since MPA records began in 1986.

Temperature

The mean maximum temperature was 10.6 Celsius compared with an average of 9.9C. The highest temperature was 16.5C on the 9th and the lowest maximum was 3.5C on the 21st. The mean minimum temperature was 4.1C, compared with the 3.8C average. The lowest minimum was -1.4C on the 19th and the highest minimum was 8.7C recorded on the 9th.

Rainfall

The total rainfall for the month was 31.2mm, much less than the average of 57mm. The wettest day was the 18th with a total of 9mm. More than 0.1mm fell on 17 days and 1.0 mm or more fell on nine days.

Sunshine

There were 127.8 hours of sunshine, compared with the monthly average of 112 hours. The highest daily total was 9.7 hours on the 7th.

Snow/Hail/Thunder/Fog

There were four days when sleet or snow fell and six days with hail, just about average for both. There were five days with fog and none with thunder.

Wind/Gales

The monthly mean wind speed was 14.2 knots, against an average of 14.4 knots. The highest hourly mean speed of 37 knots and the highest recorded gust of 50 knots both occurred on the 6th. Gales occurred on three days and there were 14 days with gusts in excess of 33 knots.

Celebrity GP a sign of global doctor shortage

RECENTLY departed from the Falklands after three months as a locum at the King Edward Memorial Hospital, Dr Mary Fortune is something of a celebrity both in her native Scotland and Australia.

After replying to an advertisement in a magazine, Dr Fortune, 52, left her family and friends behind in Brora, Sutherland, to head for the West Australian desert. After spending six weeks in the gold mining town of Kalgoorlie, Mary's final medical placement was in Dalwallinu, a tiny town in Australia's wheatbelt region.

On her arrival, the town's only resident doctor disappeared, leaving Mary completely on her own. While running the busy GP surgery, the hospital and attending emergencies 24 hours a day, she finally realised a childhood dream of working with the Australian Royal Flying Doctor service.

As if this were not challenging enough, Dr Fortune became the star of a TV documentary called Desperately Seeking Doctors. Screened in 2008 in both Aus-

Screened in 2008 in both Australia and Scotland, the programme looked at the medical crisis facing Australia where, despite extensive domestic and international recruitment campaigns, doctors are leaving some rural communities faster than they can be replaced. According to Dr Fortune the series "went down a treat." The BBC then made another documentary in Scotland about her called Doctor Mary's Casebook. Intended to be a modem version of the 1962 classic TV series Dr Finlay's Casebook, Dr Mary's Casebook also earned good reviews.

Dr Fortune enjoyed her time in the Falklands where she had the chance to combine general practice with accident and emergency, and even occasional duty in the operating theatre. Before leaving she quipped: "Maybe one day I'll come back with the BBC and do something here in the Falklands. You never know."

Another programme with the title Desperately Seeking Doctors has proved very popular in Canada. What the interest by filmmakers in making such programmes seems to suggest is that like the whale or the warrah, the general practitioner is becoming an endangered species – not just in the Falklands, but throughout the more rural parts of the world like the Australian Outback or the plains of Canada.

While more and more doctors are specialising early on in their careers, fewer it seems are willing to take on the rigours that come with living in remote areas.

When Dr Fortune arrived in Kalgoorlie she was told: "If you

go on holidays, we don't have someone to fill that gap."

But it's not just Kalgoorlie struggling with staffing issues, as the Falklands knows only too well.

FIG's Senior Medical Officer Dr Roger Diggle told the Penguin News that in the Falklands he and three other doctors provided 24four hour, 365-day cover for everything that was not surgical or anaesthetic.

This, he said, was an extremely wide range of medical areas including accident and emergency, acute in-patient general medicine, and acute paediatric and obstetrics. And there are few areas in the world now where doctors are expected to provide such a wide range of services.

The policy had always been to try and recruit general practitioners with extended skills, said Dr Diggle, but this had always been problematic, with an average of one satisfactory applicant per advert.

Last October there were no satisfactory applicants for a one year or longer post, but there were five excellent applicants for shorter-terms, so four doctors were appointed to undertake approximately three months each.

These doctors, who included celebrity GP Dr Fortune, were appointed on standard FIG terms, not locum hourly rates.

Vet who led pilgrimage is new SAMA chairman

A 1982 veteran known to many in the Falkland Islands has become the new Chairman of the South Atlantic Medal Association (SAMA 82).

At the annual meeting of the Association held in Southport, Lancashire. Mike Bowles was elected as Chairman to take over from Tony Davies who is stepping down after three years in the post. Mike has been a member of SAMA since it was started by Rick Jolly in 1997 and became a Trustee in 2008.

In 1982 Mike commanded the Port Squadron from 17 Port Regt RCT which was sent on the operation. The Squadron was spread around the six Landing Ships Logistic (LSL) of the Royal Fleet Auxiliary and also various merchant ships. They operated the Mexeflote rafts as well as cargo handling gear, fork lift trucks, cranes and everything else needed to operate a port. After the surrender the Squadron set up a military port in Stanley and built and commissioned B Slip which was to be the centre of operations for many months afterwards.

The Squadron HQ was set up in Harry Milne's office (now Roger Spink's) in the FIC building and the port operators quickly adopted Harold Rowlands as their benefactor – a relationship that continued for well over 20 years until Harold's sad death in 2004.

With his family. Mike returned to the Islands in 1995 for 15 months as Chief Staff Officer (Personnel and Logistics) in HQ BIFFI where, among other responsibilities, he had the Civil Military Liaison officer working for him.

His son was a cub with Jan Miller's pack and his wife Ros's claim to fame was winning the Commander's Cup at the Boxing Day races in 1996 on a horse belonging to Ron Binnic – Miss Ellie. The family returned in 2000 for a holiday while Mike was serving as Defence Attaché in Brazil. Later he led the 2007 Pilgrimage for 250 veterans to mark the 25th anniversary of the conflict.

Mike is also a Trustee of Falklands Conservation and a member of the committee of the Falkland Islands Association.

On taking up his position as Chairman Mike said: "It is a great honour and I will strive to continue the excellent work done by my predecessors Rick Jolly, Martin Reed and Tony Davies.

"My family and I feel that we have strong and enduring links to the Islands which we treasure and will always maintain. It is my aim to continue to build on the links between SAMA 82, SAMA FI and all the Islanders for the benefit of veterans and of all our friends and supporters in the Islands."

Argentine sea threats realised

IT would appear that the threats against shipping travelling to and from the Falklands which were made by Argentine President, Cristina Kirchner in February have now become a reality.

The Argentine Naval Prefecture says requests for permission to travel by sea to the Islands from Argentina must be submitted seven days before departure.

It has warned shippers that the same rule applies to vessels bound for Argentina from the Falklands, South Georgia, or South Sandwich Islands in the Falklands archipelago.

The Argentine curbs include punitive action against vessels that are found to be involved with the Falklands oil exploration effort, but at the heart of the new restrictions are Argentine demands for shippers to adhere to its Decree 256/2010, which forces shippers who comply to tacitly recognise Argentine jurisdiction over the Islands. In one major incident in February, Argentine coastal officials halted a shipment of oil pipes apparently destined for the Falklands.

The seizure coincided with the start of exploratory drilling.

Neither the oil companies nor Argentine authorities watching over them have given up on the idea that the Falklands basin may hold huge oil and gas reserves.

As a result, some commentators claim, the Argentine moves to refurbish its long neglected military machine as part of the sovereignty drive.



On the float of a **Bleaker Beaver**

YOU may not be surprised to hear that a lot of people in this country

would like to get away from it all. By "all." I mean of course the nerve-jangling election campaign and the appalling financial situation

So what to do, said The Times today. Get out of it, that's what. Go to an island as far away as possible. It listed 20 "ultimate escapes," islands where electioneering and failing economies are rare, and peace is abundant.

You're ahead of me here, aren't you. Yes, we're talking the Falkland Islands but, one in particular. There, at number five in The Times list, was Bleaker Island (it was preceded, by the way, by Castilla de la Isla del Burguillo in Spain)

"There is not much between Bleaker and Antarctica," said the Thunderer, going on to describe the wildlife that resides on Bleaker's shores. Mike and Phyl Rendell's number and email address were listed, so I suspect Cobb's Cottage is now booked well into 2015

That's a shame for me, because when I'm back in the Falklands I like going out to Bleaker to spend a day or two in its utter tranquillity. Bleaker has special memories for me because, back in the 1970s, my father negotiated rights from the FIC to develop the island as a tourist location. He and I made plans for the island, and would travel to and from it by Beaver floatplane of FIGAS, or on the Lindblad Explorer or the World Discoverer (both now rusting beneath the sea, God bless their little hulls)

The FIC were even more parsimonious then than they are now, and refused to sell or lease the island as long as they could run it even slightly profitably as a sheep farm, without putting anything into it or paying any permanent staff. The war of 1982 was a watershed for Bleaker and us. Because the tourism industry died almost overnight, our hope to develop the island ended, and it was a decade or two before it again be-

gan to receive visitors and demonstrate its potential.

My most vivid memory of Bleaker has nothing to do with wildlife. Dad and I had hosted one of the ships and were being picked up by Beaver pilot Dave Emsley. Picking us up was a bit tricky, as there was no one left on shore to help fend the plane off from the jetty, and we were on a nasty leeshore

My father was first to climb up the float struts and into the boxy cabin. I scrambled after him, doing my best to keep the plane off the jetty as I went. Meanwhile. Dave gunned the huge Pratt and Whitney radial engine to edge us away from the structure.

The pilot could see over his right shoulder that, despite his efforts, the Beaver was drifting towards a bollard that stuck up to wing level. He shouted some probably choice words to my father. who leaned out of the aircraft's door and urged me to push us off the jetty. And, by the way, would I mind putting every ounce of my strength into it (I think he was a little less delicate)

It was all very well for him, but I was in the precarious position of having both my feet on the jetty, while my arms were wrapped around the struts of an aircraft which was trying to take off. This would have been per-

fectly normal activity for Bruce Willis and Sylvester Stallone, but there was no sign of them

Other than during a brief and unsuccessful career loading bags of cement onto trucks, I had never exerted more blood-vessel-busting energy. Amazingly, though, I did manage to get the better of the Beaver and the 20-knot wind. Briefly.

Dad leaned out of the door, and shouted, "For God's sake get on board!" But I had become a human fender.

At that moment, Dave gunned the engine furiously, and the plane began to pull ahead. I leapt for the door as my father leaned out to grab me. My feet were still sticking out into the slipstream, as I heard a terrible crunch. Huddled over the control column. Dave had not heard it

Supposedly under his control, we careered across the choppy bay, bouncing off increasingly large waves, but weaving an erratic track and certainly not leaving the water. The door was still open and I leaned out, looking for the source of the crunch

There it was. The right tailplane - one of the little wings at the back - was hanging almost vertically and flapping like a demented penguin. The bollard and the jetty had proved stronger than De Havilland of Canada.

After what seemed like minutes Dave got the message. We managed to mime the fact that the tail had largely been ripped off, and he might like to slow down. He did, and we drifted back up on that damned lee-shore.

We were cast away on Bleaker for only a few hours. Dave called FIGAS on the radio, and his fellow pilot, Jim Kerr, soon arrived in another Beaver, carrying a couple of engineers. We dragged the wounded Beaver up the beach as well as we could and all flew back to Stanley with Jim.

A few days later, the plane was embarked onto the deck of MV Monsunen. She flew again but ended her days at the hands of the Argentines

When I flew to Bleaker recently. I did so aboard an Islander aircraft, a less rustic little plane that is fitted with a delightful set of wheels

I caught a glimpse of the jetty as we flew in, and noticed that it had crumbled over the years, and there was much less to see of it now. Couldn't happen to a nicer jetty. 1 thought.

The island was. I found, as lovely as ever but, as I packed my thermos and sandwiches ready for a hike, it occured to me that the sense of adventure I had associated with Bleaker had gone. Not that I felt in the least sad about that

Falkland Islands' unique plants to be conserved at Kew Gardens

SOME of the Falklands' rarest plant species have been saved from possible extinction by an ongoing collaboration hetween botanists from the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew and Falklands Conservation.

Botanist Richard Lewis has been visiting the islands to work on plant conservation for 4.5 months. As part of his work he has been collecting seeds from native plant species for a unique conservation initiative, the Millennium Seed Bank Partnership These have included seeds from many of our rarest native plants and three of the 13 plants that are unique to the Falklands and found nowhere else on earth.

As part of their ongoing plant conservation programme, Falkland Conservation (FC) have been collaborating with the Millennium Seed Bank Partnership (MSBP) at the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew in a drive to collect and safeguard seeds from all native Falkland Island seed plants.

The MSBP is based in the UK and is a unique, global project that aims to safeguard as many wild plant species as possible. With 10% of the world's seed plants already in the bank, the MSBP is aiming for 25% by 2020, including 90% of all seed plants native to the UK Overseas Territories.

At the MSBP, the seeds are caefully dried and then stored at -20°C, allowing them to remain viable for decades or centuries. These seeds are then made available to researchers and for restoration projects as well as acting as a safeguard against extinction in the wild.

In the Falklands, seeds from the MSBP have been used in the Native Plants Nursery project, a collaboration between FC, RBG. Kew and Stanley Growers. Native plants are being grown from seed and cuttings, under the careful supervision of Cynthia Williams at

Stanley Growers. Next spring, some of these will be planted out in the FC front garden, others will be made available for purchase as garden plants, and some may be used in habitat restoration projects.

Some seeds from the MSBP have been grown on at RBG, Kew, where it is hoped they will form part of a future display highlighting RBG Kew's plant conservation in the UK overseas territories, including their collaboration with FC. This will include growing on some seeds collected from an as yet unnamed species (Calandrinia sp.) similar to Felton's Flower (Calandrinia menziesii. syn. C. feltonii). It is hoped this will eventually allow researchers to accurately identify this poorly understood species.

The Falklands have around 157 native plant species suitable for seed banking, plus a further 19 native species not suitable for seed banking, including ferns and clubmosses that produce spores rather than seeds. Previous seed collections undertaken in collaboration with FC have seen 77 of these species added to the MSBP. Over the 2009/2010 season, Richard Lewis has been working to add to these collections, resulting in 45 separate seed collections from 38 species, 35 of which were new to the MSBP.

This brings the running total to 112 species seed banked, over



70% of the native seed-producing flora and a fantastic achievement for plant conservation in the islands.

Highlights of this season's collections include three endemic species, including the two globally threatened species Antarctic Cudweed (Gamochaeta antarctica) and Hairy Daisy (Erigeron incertus), both of which are classified as globally threatened.

Twelve of the 13 Falkland endemic species are now safely seed banked, with only the elusive Silvery Buttercup (Hamadryas argentea) left.

This latter species has been particularly difficult to collect as

it bears separate male and female plants, with only the female plants bearing seeds. It also tends to grow in fairly remote locations, often on mountains, making collecting trips time consuming and sometimes logistically difficult.

At one location visited only male plants were found, whilst at another all the female flowers had all been nibbled off by some escaped goats.

At a third location the plants were heavily grazed and probably rarely, if ever, flower, whilst at the fourth the chilly November had delayed flowering, so a long climb to the top of the mountain resulted in lovely photos of flowering plants, but sadly no seeds!

The seed collections made over the 2009/2010 season have only been possible thanks to the assistance of 15 local and international volunteers, who have helped make seed collections in locations as diverse as Weddell, Keppel and Kidney Islands, Cape Pembroke, North Arm and Roy Cove. Our thanks go out to all who have contributed to this inspiring conservation project.







Friday, May 14, 2010 British family saved in Southern Ocean drama

A BRITISH family with good reason to be thankful for the Royal Navy's presence in the South Atlantic arrived back in the Falklands on Wednesday aboard HMS Clyde.

After a twenty-hour vigil of baling to keep down rising water levels, Carl Lomas and Tracey Worth, also known as Lord and Lady Hollinsclough, and daughters Caitland and Morgause were rescued from their sinking yacht Hollinsclough by the HMS Clyde, three-hundred miles north east of South Georgia.

They left South Georgia on an excellent weather forecast, Mr. Lomas said, expecting regular force eight gales which are typical for the southern oceans: "It was sensible southern ocean weather; what you expected."

Last Friday, when safely hoveto for the night, their Oyster yacht Hollinsclough was hit by a "growler" the name given to small chunks of floating ice rising only about one metre out of the water.

Their alarm signal was received by the international distress centre run by the Falmouth coastguard, who communicated with HMS Clyde, which was some two hundred miles away from the stricken yacht.

When HMS Clyde approached the family was huddled together on the rear deck of the stricken vessel

"It was by the grace of God that we found an English warship, sat within 300 miles of us. We could not believe the luck we had," Mr Lomas said. "The Royal Navy plucked us from the ocean and saved our lives, for which we're forever indebted.

Before communications finally broke down on the Hollinsclough the family received messages of support from all over the world. including from the Rev Dr Richard Hines of Christehureh Cathedral in Stanley, the FPV Pharos SG, the RRS Shackleton and HMS York

On the four days spent on HMS Clyde returning to the Falklands, the family "were treated to outstanding food, friendship and warmth," Mr Lomas said.

As is customary for naval ships on operation, there was a communication blackout from the ship, which the family described as difficult to deal with at times, as they had no way of communicating with their family back in the UK.

Mr Lomas said: "We're just happy to be here with the friendship and warmth of the Falkland Islands. There's no greater place than the Falklands Islands to have to come back to.

They are staying with friends they and their daughters made in their previous six weeks visit to the Islands, which was longer than expected: "The girls were very sad to leave the Islands and leave the school" Tracey said. "We'd stayed longer than expected because the girls had got involved in going to school and really loved it, and asked us to keep them here until the end of term." She added: "We recognise that there were lots of friends in the Falklands that were rooting for us, and we did appreciate that."

While happy to be in Stanley they do hope to return home soon: "It's time to take stock and head home to England" said Karl.

Rockhopper shares boom

SHARES in the Rockhopper Exploration company rose from 37p to 93p following last Friday's announcement of an oil discovery and surged upwards in value again on Monday to open at £1.90, reaching as high as £2.35 during the following week.

This optimism among investors followed an update from the AIM listed company on Monday, which stated that additional logging data had confirmed the quality of the reservoir encountered by their Sea Lion well.

Managing Director of Rockhopper, Samuel Moody,

commented: "These are further encouraging results; the logs clearly indicate that we have encountered a high quality reservoir interval with very good porosity and permeability. This increases the likelihood that we will return to this well later during the campaign to carry out a flow test.

Renewed confidence in the viability of the North Falkland Basin has been shown by the market. Shares in Desire Petroleum which had slumped in the wake of early disappointing results from their Liz well, rose from 37p on May 5, to 88.5p yesterday.

THERE is an old saying to the effect that while hard work, intelligence and perseverence are all admirable qualities, it is better to be lucky. However it goes, I am sure it is a sentiment with which the eight members of the Falkland Islands Legislative Assembly would all agree.

Since the announcement by Rockhopper Exploration last Thursday that they seemed to have found some oil, I am sure councillors have also been tempted to remember thankfully that other old cliche: "What a difference a day makes."

Six months or so since they were voted in, and probably time that we stopped thinking of them as "new," the eight councillors seem to have been enjoying an extended honeymoon period, even - rather disturbingly to some people - winning plaudits from one of our regular and most critical correspondents.

Whether this is because they have been wisely doing the right things, or rather, as someone unkindly suggested, because they have even more wisely been doing nothing at all, is not clear. However, I would bet an old penny to a rapidly devaluing pound that all eight were viewing the approach of the Assembly's budget session on May 26 with some trepidation.

Cuts in public spending are usually accompanied by increases in taxation and fees and though these might be necessary they are no more popular here than in Athens. Furthermore, no amount of feet shuffling, finger pointing or shoulder shrugging would serve to allow councillors to wriggle out of being held responsible, either individually or collectively.

The Falkland Islands do not seem to have suffered too severely from the global economic chaos, but, with the Illex squid still being coy, or perhaps being slaughtered in unsustainable numbers as it passes through Argentine waters, and bad weather plus a rising tide of cost and regulation reducing the arrivals of large cruise ships, any chance of balancing the budget without what BBC commentators used to call "swingeing cuts" is as likely as squadrons of flying penguins.

Now, suddenly, it doesn't seem to matter as much. The mere existence of the oil means that the Malvina House Hotel will continue to be full of oil men for much longer and, if we have to wait for some years before real revenues start to flow, in the meantime there are always our reserves to be squandered - sorry, I meant invested.

It's all good isn't it? So why aren't the champagne corks popping at Gilbert House and the streets raucous with celebrations of drunken councillors? Could it be that our representatives are having a "Hurrah....oh dear" moment as they realise that while they may have got lucky in the short term, in the longer term, if the black gold does flow they might be faced with challenges beyond any they have so far imagined.

FIG planning stronger stance

LEGISLATIVE Assembly member, Emma Edwards, is to attend a seminar entitled "An Assessment of the Decolonisation Process in Today's World" organised by the United Nations (UN) Committee.

Attendance at the seminar, to be held in the Pacific island of Noumea in New Caledonia, is seen as preparation for the annual meeting in June of the United Nations Special Committee of 24 in New York.

Miss Edwards stated: "This year, given the increasing prominence given to its territorial claims by Argentina, Members of Legislative Assembly felt that it was appropriate that the Falkland Islands Government's stance be aired in the international arena as much as possible.

"Attendance at the seminar will give the Falkland Islands a greater insight into what the aims of the Committee of 24 arc, enabling us to take a stronger and more productive stance at next month's meeting in New York.

"It will also allow us to network with other territories in a similar position to ourselves, as well as meeting member countries of the Special Committee. It is important for the Falkland Islands to raise their profile on the international scene."

All Stanley turns out for Henry's big charity bang

PEOPLE like to see explosions, at least from a safe distance.

That would seem to be a safe conclusion to draw from the fact that a host of folk in 94 vehicles (Jimmy Smith's count) turned up at Canopus Hill on Saturday afternoon to see the demolition of almost the last, of well over a thousand mines cleared from the Surf Bay minefield during recent months.

It would also seem safe to say that lots of people would like the chance to set off a big explosion, but maybe not as much as Nyree Heathman and Henry Browning.

With the cooperation of the Falkland Islands Radio Service, the mine-clearing contractors, BACTEC had arranged an auction, with the highest bidder getting to press the plunger on Saturday and send the mines and a great quantity of peat, smoke and sand into the air.

With half an hour to go to the lpm deadline the best bid stood at £250, but by the time the seconds had finally ticked away to the end of Liz Elliot's Lifestyle programme and the close of the auction. Henry Browning had narrowly outbid Nyree with an offer of £500.

This offer was immediately matched by BACTEC themselves, with the now magnificent sum of £1000 promised to be shared between the local Cancer Support and Awareness Trust and BLESMA, a charity which looks after servicemen who have lost limbs in the course of their duties.

On the day, the bang was even bigger than originally promised and Henry's smile reportedly almost as big as the bang he set off.

Thanks to the efforts of Bruce Humphreys, beavering away in his armoured digger, the last panel of mines have now been discovered some four metres below the sand and another three anti-tank mines have been found, carefully excavated to add to the 18 already destined to be blown up.

It is hoped that the final few mines in the last panel will be found and safely disposed of before the end of this week, which will allow BACTEC Project manager Roger Gagen to go home, following operations manager, Kev Bryant who left the Islands on Tuesday.

UNASUR backs Argentine claim

THE leaders of the 12-member Union of South American Nations (UNASUR), has declared support for Argentina in its dispute with Britain over sovereignty of the Falkland Islands, in anticipation of its forthcoming summit.

One positioning document states that UNASUR repudiates recent petroleum exploration activities by Britain in the area and calls on the two nations to comply with recommendations by the United Nations and seek a negotiated solution.

In another paper, UNASUR declares that one of the organisation's priorities is to integrate the continent's electricity grids and expand the development of energy sources as well as access to those sources throughout all of South America.

Nestor Kirchner, former president of Argentina and the husband of the present president was elected UNASUR Secretary General.

One problem with his election was a threat by Uruguay to veto Kirchner because of a dispute over alleged pollution from paper mills built in Uruguay across the River Plate from Argentina.

Finally, there is the matter of Paraguay where the president, Fernando Lugo, has placed the country under a "state of exception" so the Army can act freely (always a delicate issue in Latin America).

Lugo justifies the measure because of activities of a leftist militant movement known as the Army of the Paraguayan People (EPP) that has been kidnapping people since 2008. Paraguay also has a very serious problem with drug trafficking.

At the moment, further complicating the situation, Paraguay and Brazil face difficulties along the 1,365 kilometre border the two countries share where tens of thousands of so-called Brasiguayos have lived on both sides of the border more or less without any control for many years. These people, who are both, but neither, Brazilian or Paraguayan and often have no documents, are being expelled from Paraguay en masse by the EPP and drug barons.

Much of the credit for this is due to the hard work of our London representative Sukey Cameron. The high regard in which she is held is always evident when attending political party conferences or meeting politicians.

Big oil companies have done pretty much as they please in much larger countries than ours so we will need to be careful whose advice we seek and take in the event of a find proving commercial. I have yet to find any two individuals in full agreement about what we need to include in a new port, where it should go and how it may be paid for. I do know that I will feel duty bound to vote against any proposal that would significantly encroach on Stanley's recreational space.

Finally, any arguments we may have regarding the future of the minefields, for example remediation, must be had with the Foreign Office, not the deminers who have done a great job in frequently nasty weather and ground conditions.

Many thanks for the feedback from the first MLA diary which is much appreciated. All of us welcome comment on any issue.

Moves afoot to overhaul immigration

MOVES are finally afoot to overhaul the Falklands immigration process which has come in for much criticism from many different quarters during recent years.

The last meeting of Executive Council accepted the terms of reference for a Strategic Review of Immigration which will be carried out by a group known as the Immigration Review Group (IRG).

This group, which will initially meet fortnightly, will be chaired by Gavin Short MLA. Portfolio Holder for Customs and Immigration, and will include Dick Sawle MLA. Deputy Portfolio Holder for Customs and Immigration: Ros Cheek, Principal Crown Counsel; Robert King, Collector of Customs: Wendy Reeves, Immigration Officer; Sonny Jose, Head of Policy; and Principal Immigration Officer Gary Finchett, who will be responsible for the co-ordination of its activities.

The Falkland Islands Immigration Ordinance was introduced in 1999 and there has been no complete review since this date. It was intended that the basic framework for immigration procedures set out under the Ordinance would be supplemented by detailed polices and regulation, but very little of the work needed for that to occur has been done, except in relation to permanent residence permits.

In 2006 an Immigration Policy Working Group was formed comprising of three member of the Legislative Assembly, the Government Secretary/Principal Immigration Officer, Collector of Customs and the Immigration Officer.

One of the first tasks of the group was to consider a draft im-

migration policy statement which, it was said, was intended "to encourage on a gradual and controlled basis, such permanent immigration as is in the interests of the Falkland Islands, taking account of the need: to increase the human capital of knowledge, ability and skill in the Falkland Islands, to develop and increase enterprise and innovation in the Falkland Islands; and to safeguard social cohesion and promote integration in the Falkland Islands."

The group eventually produced an immigration points system which was approved by Executive Council in 2009 and has been the subject of fierce criticism ever since.

It is regarded by many as being designed to keep out immigrants rather than to encourage immigration.

Paragraph 4.8 of the paper accepted by ExCo acknowledges these shortcomings and states: "Against the concerns expressed by Members in connection with the points system, it is clear that there is a need to undertake a comprehensive review of immigration policy, beginning with a review of the fundamental policy statement to ensure that immigration policy meets the current and future needs of the Falkland Islands."

The paper suggests that criteria for Falkland Islands status or for an adjustment of the points system could be made at an early stage, as it was always anticipated that the points systems would be revised on a regular basis to reflect any changes in immigration reouirements.

Looking back as MPA turns twenty-five

WEDNESDAY saw the 25th anniversary of the official opening of the Mount Pleasant Airport by HRH Prince Andrew.

This ceremony, attended by the then Secretary of State for Defence, Michael Heseltine, and the author of the blueprints for the economic development of the Falkland Islands, Lord Shackleton, marked not only the culmination of an incredible feat of civil engineering, but the start of a new phase in the evolution of the Falkland Islands.


The Laing-Mowlem-Amey Roadstone Construction consortium (LMA) built the airfield within eighteen months of starting on a bare field site at the ends of the earth, with nothing available to them locally other than water and rock. The 8,500ft runway was completed on time, just three years after the end of fighting in the Falklands and at a cost of £215,000,000.

As there was no road between Stanley and the site chosen for the new airport, all materials had to be shipped to Mare Harbour, where the first job for LMA was to attach one of two specially acquired ships, the 13,000 ton Merchant Providence, to the shore to serve as a jetty head and accommodation block. Further materials and the work force, which at one time numbered 2000, were ferried from South Africa in the 8,000 ton, England, chartered from Cunard.

By the time the first runway was completed in 1985 it was estimated that 9,000 passengers had been carried and the England had travelled more than 150,000 miles. During the same period four other chartered cargo vessels had moved 513,000 tonnes of materials and there was a fleet of single-decker buses and over 850 major items of construction plant on site, worth some £25,000,000. This plant enabled the quarrying of 1,500,000 tonnes of stone from quarries which can still be seen today.

One of the strange features of this massive civil engineering project was how little it impinged on the life of the Falklands population, particularly those who lived in Stanley, who for the most part were blissfully unaware of the scale of the undertaking or the number of people involved. With no road between Stanley and Mount Pleasant and hazards in between like the feared Bluff Cove blue clay, the overland trip was not for the inexperienced or fainthearted. A Mount Pleasant workers' football team found this out when their trip to town to be beaten 11-0 by an army unit took five hours.





AN early and welcome sign of the new British Government's attitude towards the sovereignty of the Falkland Islands came yesterday with the delivery to the Argentine Charge d'Affaires in London of a note from the Foreign and Commonwealth Office challenging the legality of recent attempts by Cristina Kirchner's government to hamper the free flow of shipping between the Islands and the continent.

The note to the Charge d'Affaires (there being no Argentine Ambassador in post in London) challenges the legality of the Argentine President's Decree 256/ 2010 which requires all shipping passing to and from Argentina, the Falkland Islands, South Georgia and South Sandwich Islands to seek the permission of the Argentine Government.

The note points out that the imposition of such a restriction constitutes a contravention of international law, including the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea (UNCLOS) and points out that any attempt to restrict the passage of shipping through the Straits of Magellan is in direct contravention of its 1984 Treaty with Chile.

Article 10 of the Treaty states: "The Argentine Republic undertakes to maintain, at any time and in whatever circumstances, the right of ships of all flags to navigate expeditiously and without obstacles through its jurisdictional waters to and from the Straits of Magellan.

While the principal aim of these restrictions is to impede the oil exploration campaign being carried out in Falklands waters, if applied rigorously to all shipping it could have a serious effect on the Islands economy, increasing the isolation we already suffer from the limits imposed upon air access by Argentina and making difficult the routine visits of Falklands vessels to both Punta Arenas and Montevideo for dry docking and other purposes.

How strictly, if at all, the new regulations will be imposed by the Argentine authorities is not yet known, but there will clearly be an understandable reluctance to test the situation on the part of ship owners and charterers until the situation is clarified. In the meantime one vessel due into Stanley from

Punta Arenas has been delayed by three days, having chosen to leave the Magellan Straits by the western end and take the long route around Cape Horn for what are described as "operational reasons."

Asked whether any specific event had triggered the sending of the note to the Argentine Government at this time, Government House First Secretary Paul

The United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland considers that Presidential Decree 256/2010 and Disposition 14/2010 are not compliant with international law, including the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea.

The United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland would like to take this opportunity to remind the Government of the Republic of Argentina of its obligations under international law, and that the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea provides for ships of all States to enjoy the right of innocent passage through territorial seas, and freedom of navigation in the waters beyond the territorial sea. Furthermore, with respect to the Straits of Magellan, the rights of international shipping to navigate these waters expeditiously and without obstacle is affirmed in the 1984 Treaty of Peace and Friendship between Chile and Argentina with respect to the Straits of Magellan Article 10 of the Treaty of Magellan further provides "The Argentine Republic undertakes to maintain, at any time and in whatever circumstances, the right of ships of all flags to navigate expeditiously and without obstacles through its jurisdictional waters to and from the Strait of Magellan"

The United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland has no doubt about its sovereignty over the Falkland Islands, and South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands, its sovereignty over the adjacent territorial sea of these Islands, and its sovereign rights over the adjacent maritime areas.

The United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland also has no doubt that the surrounding maritime areas of the Falkland Islands, and South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands are not Argentine jurisdictional waters.

Martinez said that it was something that had been "in the pipeline" for some time, but had been delayed due to the change of government in Britain. Mr Martinez also said that he believed a similar note would shortly be on its way to the United Nations Secretary General

Former fishing company owner and now Member of the Falklands Legislative Assembly, Dick Sawle said that he and his colleagues in the Assembly were, "delighted by the strong and robust stance that the new British Government had taken" and added that any attempt to interfere with international shipping's "right of innocent passage" had to be opposed.

Whether or not the Argentine Government would change their stance as a result of the note, Councillor Sawle said that they could not dispute the legal situation, as described in it. The councillor also pointed out that as recently as this year at the Latin American and Caribbean Summit in Cancun, Mrs Kirchner had stated that it was not her government's intention to blockade the Islands.

Ironically, the Argentine President used the platform of the recent European Union-Latin American summit in Madrid to rebuke the UK for failing to respect international law, after her request for British-Argentine dialogue to be opened with regard to the Falkland Islands was rejected.

At the final news conference of the EU summit Kirchner commented: "Refusing dialogue does not point to someone that wants to be part of a society governed by international law."

It seems to me that the UK. which is a very important country in the concert of the UN and is very important in the EU, should, in my view, set an example and should itself also submit to UN resolutions, as we ask for others to do.

DESPITE apparently being invisible to the government of Argentina and some sections of the British media, the Falkland Islands Legislative Assembly continues to show the British Parliament the way forward. However, British politicians could take a lesson and be warmed by the enthusiasm expressed in these pages by veteran Falklands councillor Bill Luxton for his present colleagues and their ability to come to a consensus view, without abandoning their own principles or falling out over their differences.

Judging by this issue of Penguin News alone, in which three members have taken the time to pick up their pens or light up their laptops, this Legislative Assembly does seem to be largely living up to its pre-election promise to be more committed to communication with its electorate and the wider world than some of the Legislative Councils which preceded it. And they are using plain language and not the kind of alienating jargon so commonly heard from some of their predecessors.

The over-use of any kind of jargon serves to boost the feeling of belonging to an elite among those to whom it is meaningful, but to exclude those to whom it is meaningless. This is as true for the kind of "management-speak" that some former councillors used to use as it is for gangster rap. Apart from being intensely irritating, the unnecessary use of strange acronyms and weird and wonderful ways of saying the commonplace, uttered by some former councillors, only served to confirm the feelings of many that their representatives were no longer in touch with them and, indeed, may have been living on some other planet. While this was maybe a symptom rather than the whole disease, it may partially explain why no one was left standing from the old Council, once the smoke of electoral battle had cleared.

If the new Assembly has been successful in bridging the perceived gap between them and their electorate, and in the process boosted the morale of both parties, I would suggest that their next big challenge before even the oily ones discussed last week - should be to restore the morale of large portions of the civil service.

The response to my recent rather mild 'dig' at the jargon and boxticking rampant in the civil service seems to indicate that there are some very, very, unhappy people out there.

FIG Environmental Studies Budget 2010-2011

The Falkland Islands Government provides funding to help people in the Falkland Islands to conduct activities which benefit and enhance the environment. Anyone can apply for assistance from the Environmental Studies Budget, including owners and managers of land, non-government organisations and international scientists that conduct research and conservation activities in the Falkland Islands.

Projects eligible for ESB funding must assist in the management or enhancement of the biodiversity of the Falkland Islands. Priority will be given to initiatives addressing the key three themes of the 'Falkland Islands Biodiversity Strategy', which are: environmental research, on-ground action and education.

The ESB has a formal application and decision making process with the Environmental Committee responsible for the allocation of funds. This year all the available funds will be allocated in one round in July 2010.

The deadline for applications is Monday 21st June 2010. The application form can be obtained from the Environmental Planning Department. Applicants are encouraged to discuss proposed projects with the EPD Environmental Officer prior to submission and he can also help draft your application. Where possible, some level of co-funding or in-kind costs (e.g. labour, equipment) is desirable.

FICS welcomes Chilean students

LAST Saturday saw the arrival in the Falklands of eight students from Punta Arenas, who are to spend three weeks as pupils at the Falkland Islands Community School (FICS) in Stanley.

The eight, who are accompanied by teacher, Elena Barria Ampuero, come from eight different schools in the Punta Arenas public school system and so had not met each other until they boarded the plane.

Their visit to the Falkland Islands is sponsored by various bodies, including LAN and the municipality of Punta Arenas.

Seeing the group off at Punta Arenas airport, the Mayor urged them to be good ambassadors for the city and for their country, which so far they appear to be.

FICS headmaster, Alistair Baldwin speaking on Tuesday said that although it was early days, the visit seemed to be going well. All eight students had faced the ordeal of delivering a short speech in English and Spanish at the school's Monday assembly.

The students had been given the twin aims of learning about the geography and culture of the Falkland Islands and improving their English, but Mr Baldwin said that he had given them a third which was to help FICS students to improve their spoken Spanish.

At the end of the visit, the Chilean students would address the school again, showing, he hoped, an improvement in their English fluency. He also hoped that an equivalent number of FICS students would be able to give a brief speech in Spanish, showing how much they had gained from this exchange.

All of the students, with one exception, are lodged with families in Stanley and on Wednesday they and their hosts were entertained to tea at Government House.

Rockhopper to announce soon

FOLLOWING on from their announcement of a significant oil discovery at their well 14/10-2 on their Sea Lion prospect, Rockhopper Exploration reported on May 19 that it had been successfully suspended for future testing.

A release from the company stated that physical samples taken from the well were currently being transported to the United Kingdom by freight plane, and were due to arrive shortly.

A further update from the company giving initial estimates of the potential size of the discovery is expected within the next 8-13 days.

Rockhopper's Executive Chairman, Pierre Jungels, said:

"The outcome is great news in itself, but it also demonstrates that small operators, with the correct planning by the Company, combined with the right support from outside experts and quality contractors, can work to the highest industry standards in terms of health, safety and respect for the environment, whilst achieving excellent operational results."

We can never be complacent in this regard and will seek to maintain this standard with the drilling of our Ernest prospect in the coming months."

Training courses complete

PC Kim Bone and PC Paul McDade were commended for their achievements at a reception held at Government House on May 10. Both officers had recently completed training courses overseas.

Director of Community Safety and Chief Police Officer Gary Finchett said: "PC Kim Bone and PC Paul McDade have successfully completed two very challenging nationally accredited training courses in the UK and have passed with flying colours. I am proud of their determination to succeed and the specialist skills and abilities they have obtained will be used to good effect to make people who live, work and visit the Falklands Islands even safer."

PC Kim Bone attended the National Hostage and Crisis Negotiators Course in London for two weeks in March. At 18 hours per day, only provided at two locations worldwide and with only four spaces for international students, the course was intensive and students were put under extreme pressure to perform consistently.

PC Bone's qualification will enable him to work worldwide as a hostage and crisis negotiator. His services will potentially be offered to other South Atlantic Islands. He said the course was hard with people dropping out within the first week. "The final exercise was 48 hours" he said. "People got dropped that day; it was really shocking."

PC McDade attended an Initial Crime Scene Investigator course held between Jan 4 and March 10 at the National Police Improvement Agency at Harperley Hall in County Durham. The aim of the course was to teach basic skills required of a Crime Scene Investigator, and included photography, procedures surrounding forensic trace evidence, and the appropriate use of fingerprint powders and techniques.

Hello to the new and thanks to the old

RECENT dramatic changes in the composition of the British Government have brought about a flurry of letter writing from the Falkland Islands Legislative Assembly.

Letters of congratulation have been sent to British Prime Minister David Cameron, Foreign Secretary William Hague and Defence Secretary Liam Fox on their appointments and a letter of appreciation has been sent to the outgoing Prime Minister, Gordon Brown.

The letters to the in-coming ministers were signed on behalf of the Legislative Assembly by Legislative Council Member Emma Edwards, as she travelled through London on her way to New Caledonia to attend a seminar on decolonisation organised by the United Nations 'Special Committee of 24."

The new cabinet ministers were told that the people of the Falkland Islands had greatly appreciated the support that they had received from the Conservative Party over the years and appreciated their robust stance on our sovereignty and our right to self-determination. The letter to the cabinet ministers went on to express the delight of the Falkland Islands Government that Mr Hague and Mr Fox had already visited the Falklands, and anticipated working with them and their colleagues to the benefit of the British Government and the Falklands.

Miss Edwards has also sent a letter of appreciation on behalf of the Legislative Assembly to Gordon Brown, to thank him for the robust stance that he and his government took on the rights of Falkland Islanders to self determination, his refusal to entertain any discussion of sovereignty, and the strong messages that he gave in relation to oil exploration around the Falklands. Members sent Mr Brown and his family their very best wishes for the future.

The Falkland Islands Government has also sent a letter of congratulations to the new Minister of State at the Foreign and Commonwealth, Jeremy Browne MP, who has responsibility for South America and the Falkland Islands. The letter was signed by Legislative Assembly spokesperson Bill Luxton. It said that councillors looked forward to working with Mr Browne for the mutual benefit of the British Government and the Falkland Islands, and hoped that his schedule would allow him to visit soon.

The letter also thanked Mr Browne for his strong statement of support following to President Kirchner's call for Sovereignty negotiations at the opening session of the European-Latin American summit in Madrid yesterday.

In his statement, Mr Browne said: "We have no doubt about our Sovereignty over the Falkland Islands. The principle of self determination is set out in the UN charter applies. There cannot be negotiation on sovereignty unless and until the Falkland Islanders so wish. The Lisbon Treaty clearly reaffirms the European Union position that the Falkland Islands is an overseas territory of the United Kingdom."

Mr Luxton said that Legislative Assembly members are very pleased at Mr Browne's appointment, as he has demonstrated an interest in Falklands affairs for some time.

Mr Browne had met with Sukey Cameron, for a briefing on issues of concern to Islanders.

Legislative Assembly Diary

An occasional glimpse into the work of a member of Legislative Assembly provided by Jan Cheek

DESPITE similarities between the last diary and the editorial in the same PN, brought to my attention by readers. I can give an absolute assurance that there was no conferring!

Regarding the assertion in the editorial that this Assembly has had too long a honeymoon, could it be that we are getting something right? All those elected promised to heed the concerns of the electorate and I believe that we are listening. That said I did ignore one e-mail a few months ago, directed at all assembly members, that verged on abusive and threatening and did not therefore deserve a response.

How the electorate will react to the budget when finalised I cannot guess; however, I believe that concern about the economy and dwindling reserves was the biggest single issue in November.

My aim is to act responsibly and not undermine the resilience and independent self reliance of which Falkland Islanders are rightly proud. To factor in theoretical oil income at this stage would be irresponsible.

Returning to possible oil, the recent accident off Mexico has reminded everyone, industry and others, that it is impossible to remove every risk. The legislation and regulation of the exploration phase here in the Islands aims to mitigate risks as far as possible and the Mineral Resources Committee constantly reviews requirements in the light of the best advice available.

Our local capability was tested and found wanting in Berkeley Sound fairly recently, so it is important that the oil operators have their own contingency plans and insurance Our environment is our most valuable asset, let's keep it that way.

I was interviewed by the Cinema 7 group who were in the Islands last week filming the story of an Argentine veteran who was here aged just 18 in '82. I mentioned in answer to one of their questions that at least one branch of one of the families who arrived at Port Louis in 1842 can now trace nine generations in the Falklands. This elicited great interest from the Argentine film crew, some being only third generation immigrants in their country.

Biking the Americas

"SOME people say if you travel in a car it's like watching a movie, but if you travel on a motorcycle you're in the movie," Julieta Cerri told the Penguin News. This goes some way to explain the amazing distance she and her husband Julian have travelled over the past two years.

The couple arrived in the Falklands on Saturday and leave to return to Punta Arenas tomorrow.

Julian has travelled a total distance of 44,000 miles on his Suzuki V-Strom 1000: from Miami to Alaska, and head, dawn therewile

and back down through America, including 38 states and four in Canada. Julieta has joined Julian in his journeys through central America and South America, including Columbia, Equador, Peru, Bolivia, Chile and Argentina.

Speaking of the Falklands both commented: "We are so happy, from the first moment we arrived here in the Islands; we felt like we're at home" Julieta said. "The military people helped us, and all the people helped us a lot; they're all so friendly" Julian added. Originally due to arrive in the

Originally due to arrive in the Islands a week earlier, the couple were not allowed to travel with their motorcycle as luggage. Determined to make the trip they took off the two wells, the gas



tank, the seat, battery, mirrors, windshield and side bags, anything that was easily removable, and finally boarded the plane with the bike as one piece of luggage, and everything else as the other.

Although Julieta was born in California they both grew up in Argentina, moving to Miami in Florida some years ago, where they met, discovered a mutual interest in travelling and embarked upon their trip.

After reading of the regulations imposed by President Kirchner in a newspaper, Julian confessed they were worried they wouldn't be able to visit the Islands. "We came to the Islands to see the people, like we have done in all the other countries" Julieta said. "Obviously we grew up in Argentina so we know what happened in the past, but we are people, we are not Argentinians that came here thinking that this is our territory." Julian added "We didn't come to claim, we came to learn.

"One of the most important things on the trip is making friends" he said. Julieta added: "Most of the people we stayed with, the day we left I started crying, because you don't know when you're going to see the place or the people again. It's really special when you have these moments with people."

From Punta Arenas the couple plan to travel to Argentina, before riding across to Uruguay and up the East Coast of Brazil, taking an estimated further two years. They are planning to replace the clutch of their Suzuki when they get to Buenos Aires, but aren't anticipating any other mechanical problems.

Julian and Julieta invite everyone to visit their webpage, <u>www.juliancerri.com</u>, or to add them on Facebook. Julian said: "People dream to travel like us, but they are scared. They share their dreams with us. The future is now. Do it now, because you don't know what might happen to you in a couple of years. If we can do it, everyone can do it."

MR Stephen Stuart Whitley (31) of Hillside camp was found guilty of common assault in court on Monday. He was fined £200 and ordered to pay prosecution costs of £200. No compensation was orederd to be paid to the victim.

The incident occurred on March 19 in Deanos Bar. The victim Simon Guevara was dancing with Mr Kevin McLaren's wife. Mr McLaren took exception to Mr Guevara's conduct, and pushed him across the dance floor, which resulted in the defendant (Mr Whitley) being knocked to the ground. After standing up the defendant then hit the victim.

In his summing up Mr Trevaskis said: "I am sure on the facts that Mr Whitley deliberately stuck Mr Guevara because he admits he did, I am sure that when he did he did not honestly believe that he needed to defend himself.

"Self-defence has been disproved by the Crown. The defendant is therefore guilty."

Fallout in Falklands

I'M off politics again. There was that moment of exhilaration when I realised the election might be more than the traditional two horse race: "Coming up the half way stage, now, and it's neck and neck. Brown and Cameron, Cameron and Brown: but who's this coming up on the near side? It's Clegg – the nag they said could never do it, but by golly he's giving them a run for their money..."

One of Patrick Watts's Christmax commentaries would not have been out of place. It was good to see the result, but now the fake love-in that is the Cameron-Clegg coalition is just too saccharine sweet.

Clegg says that it is the shape of new British politics. And Cameron beams his agreement but with fingers firmly crossed behind his back. In fact neither main party had a real appetite for coalition. We, the great puble, forced them into it because we had decided to punish them by not voting as expected.

I am also intensely irritated by the presence at the top table of privileged public schoolboys. Both Cameron and his Chancellor are products of that most famous of "public" schools, Eton. If the party operated on a level playing field, such a coincidence would be so unlikely as to be impossible. It just confirms that the old establishment dominated class systems still rules.

But one cannot criticise them for getting to work quickly. New foreign Secretary William Hague has met Hillary Clinton in Washington, and there will be an emergency budget announcement next week; one which could save £8 billion.

I don't think there will be any impact on the Falklands. A decision not to replace HMS Endurance (always a possibility) would save only a few millions.

We must wait until the promised root-and-branch defence review kicks off next month before we see whether the cost of Falklands defence generally may be slashed. If that were to occur, it would have to be accompanied by a concession to the old foe – talks. But William Hague is pretty rightwing, a closet Thatcherite, and I believe he made clear his support for islanders many months ago. I don't think he would be in favour of concessions.

Breathe easy for a little while, I think. But these are strange times.

Where are the voices of dissent?

1 ENJOYED the editorial in the last issue of PN which reflected on the discovery of oil. John wondered whether councillors and officials may now be wondering whether, along with possible wealth, they have created a monster.

No one has articulated it in such a way, but I think of Robert Oppenheimer, who created the atomic bomb, and Dr Frankenstein who created, quite literally, a monster. Both were eloquently in awe of what they had achieved, but were equally terrified of it.

It was a very unfortunate time to find oil. At about the same time, a BP- off-shore oil rig pumping crude up from the bottom of Gulf of Mexico exploded with the loss of 11 lives, precipitating an apparently unstoppable belching of oil into the sea.

I am no expert, but it seems to me that the method of oil extraction being used off the southern USA is very similar to that which is proposed for the Falklands. It does not take a massive leap of the imagination to picture the same thing happening off the Falklands some time in the future.

Writing from London, I can only be an observer. But I have been struck by how little discussion there seems to be about the pros and cons of the industry, particular by those in the conservation movement, for whom preservation of the unique South Atlantic environment is critical. They do not appear to be saying much for or against oil.

We sometimes read in Penguin News about beach clean-ups and educating children about the need to look after our birds, beaches and grasslands. But little is heard about the big issues.

In the last issue of PN there was a letter from someone who cared enough about the environment to complain about condoms discarded around Stanley's coastal beauty spots. Not nice. I agree, but not a major threat. I do wonder why we see so few conservationists raising their heads above the parapet to question the wisdom of developing an oil industry. Any answers?

Four by fear

HERE in central London, more and more wealthy drivers are getting around in Mercedes G-Wagons, the same vehicles with which the Argentines patrolled our streets all those years ago. They are ugly, angular vehicles, and I hate them.

This got me thinking about 4x4s that I do like. I feel positively warm about Series 1 and 2 Land Rovers. My first "car" was a 1957 Rover. I bought it off Aub Summers for, I think, £350. A lick of gloss green and a new canvas top, and the Rover was my steed for fishing trips, burning up the tarmae at 40mph, and just hanging around trying to looking cool.

I felt so nostalgic about my old wagon that I bought a Land Rover magazine to see how much it might cost me to re-live the Series I dream. About £8,000; that's what it would cost! Apparently Series Is are in big demand.

CBF explains

IN the run up to Landing Day there seems to have been an amount of speculation, not all informed, on changes that were being considered by me and my staff. in consultation with members of the FIG and community. I thought, therefore, that I should write to you in order to explain to your readers why I have put in place some changes to the way that we have, until recently, done commemoration and remembrance. My reasons are threefold:

The first is that for us in the military, Remembrance Sunday and Armistice Day are the days when we remember our fallen from all wars. All of us here at MPC have friends and colleagues who have been killed or wounded in lraq or Afghanistan and I feel that it is right that we should conduct our military wreath laying and acts of remembrance on the same day as the rest of the Armed Forces.

The second is that I feel that commemoration of the battles of 1982 are properly community led events, to allow the communities to celebrate their liberation, commemorate the fallen and express their gratitude to the veterans of the Task Force. It is therefore my intention that the military adopts a lower profile - attending as invited guests, rather than organising and leading the events.

The third is that the vast majority of my personnel serving here at BFSAI were not even born in 1982. I need to educate them in the war so that they understand their own service and commitment to these islands. Events such as the Landing Day at San Carlos are, therefore, wonderful opportunities for the veterans - both service and civilian - to tell their stories and inform the next generation.

The effect of these changes is that the majority of the 1982 commemorations will be attended by the appropriate unit and they will liaise with the community in order to fit in with the style and tone of the community led commemoration. Our attendance at Liberation Day will be as it always has been.

Not fooled

I REFER to the letter in PN (May 14) from Juan Bautista of "Rugby sin Fronteras" in which he insinuates that the December visit to the Falklands by an Argentine rugby team: 'Was not used in any political way. 'He surely must not have picked up a copy of the Clarin newspaper of Buenos Aires of January 10, which had a massive photo on the front page, and a double page spread (pages 68 and 69) in the sport section.

Needless to say all the merits of having an Argentine rugby team visit the Falklands, were extolled. The title of the article: "El rugby (Rugby une" unifies) says it all. Suggestions by Clarin that the Argentines played the first ever rugby game seen in the Falklands are also incorrect. A thriving rugby club played for many years at Eliza Cove and the goal posts can still be seen behind the fences which were erected around the mines that the Argentines left behind in 1982. After hostilities ceased regular rugby games, between Stanley and the British Forces, were played on Stanley common, just off the by-pass road.

In the newspaper Bautista Segonds is quoted as saying: "We managed to leave the seeds of rugby and extend a promising bridge of union between both peoples." While the Argentines refuse to recognise the Islanders right to self-determination, then I consider this statement alone, to be of a political nature.

In the Clarin article much is made of the fact that 17 youngsters attended the first rugby clinic and this number later rose to 40. No mention was made of the fact that on the first day of training at four in the afternoon, the Argentines stood at the school gates and enticed many of these youngsters to the football field. with gifts of sweets, chocolates, soft drinks and t-shirts, while our police inexplicably did nothing. other than to later suggest a "comprimiso" whereby the Argentines should conduct their practice sessions at a later time.

I fully commend the newly elected Councillors for promptly withdrawing the Government's support for the tour within a few days of their election, but unfortunately the damage had already been done through approval given by the previous Legislature, many of whom said they were misled by the intentions of the tour. Furthermore a senior government official, operating out of the F.I.C.S. had already given the green light to the Argentines to go ahead with tour, so little could be done to halt the visit.

It was also ironic that just a day before the team's arrival in the Falklands, the Argentine Government had incorporated the "Malvinas" into the province of Tierra del Fuego, which was gazetted in the "Boletin Oficial." Seemingly President Cristina de Kirchner had signed the decree just days before. So much for "a promising bridge of union" as quoted by Mr Bautista!

Cautious and pragmatic approach

I READ your editorial (PN May 14) with interest and would like to make a few comments if I may take advantage of your pages.

Honeymoon period for the elected eight? It doesn't feel like it, but there again I have only had one honeymoon in my life before. That experience was great – a relaxing time at KC, with no e-mails, phone (fixed or mobile) and generally very pleasant indeed. One of my first impressions in this job has been that there is a huge amount to do if you wish to do it, and then comes the perhaps obvious detail that all of the work is so varied and different, which makes it all the more interesting. Not a honeymoon, but a steep learning curve. This is not a complaint – simply an observation. This job is busy, full and perhaps the most interesting I have ever done.

On the oil question – it would be a sad reflection on us all if we rolled drunk down the streets at this early stage.

Delighted? Of course, as is everyone. Slightly sad that 1 never bought any shares of course, but no doubt those who bought at the right time or sold at the right time have wider grins than I!

More seriously, there is little doubt that this is excellent news for the Falklands. However, whilst there will be interim income from the exploratory phases, it would be too soon to begin writing large cheques and "squandering" reserves – I would like to think that we were voted in because people considered we had the right type of approach, and I would hope therefore that everyone would appreciate our being slightly cautious and pragmatic.

The problems posed by oil exploitation (rather than exploration) have all been considered carefully – both in the past and now. I would hope that exploitation will not pose any great surprises. After all, we are not the first country to find ourselves in this situation and FIG has always taken heed of the good advice it has received.

It is far too early to throw caution to the winds when approaching the budget. However, whether there should be cuts in services or increases in revenue, I think it would be a person out of touch with reality who did not expect to have to tighten the belt in some measure.

The Falklands, as you rightly point out, has not suffered anything like as much as other countries from the economic recession. However, I believe that this year did see some hope on the horizon regarding illex stocks. The first Loligo season was by all accounts the best for many years. At the same time, the Falklands has to diversify and expand its economic base. We can't afford to be complacent and expect the oil companies or the fishing companies to fuel our cheque book without any effort on our part – those days have gone.

With this aim, the economic development strategy is now coming to an interesting point, where I would hope that soon things will begin to happen which will be to the benefit of everyone, but they will require entrepreneurial skills and "get up and go" to see it through to success.

Don't lose touch with the people

AT the end of last week's excellent editorial. John Fowler asked for thoughts on how the present Government might respond to the discovery of oil.

In the same edition, Jan Cheek rightly states that if oil is found in commercial quantities, it will be difficult to resist the power of the multinational oil companies.

I think we all knew that if oil was to be discovered in commercial quantities in our waters it would change the Islands forever, for good or ill, and that the job of the Government would be to try and steer a course such that there are more benefits than problems.

Councillors will be faced with taking some very difficult decisions and I hope they will not forget to ask their constituents, us, how we would like to see the Islands develop.

When exploration took place in the Islands in the '90s, a majority of the then Council, led by Mike Summers, were of the firm view that we needed as much on-shore oil development as possible.

It even suggested the building of a new town on the Camber to house all the workers and their families we would need to recruit from overseas to man the industry.

Whenever this view was challenged in Public meetings, we were told that "Councillors know the wishes of the public."

A group of us were so concerned by this arrogance that we paid for an independent survey of every person on the electoral roll to ascertain their true views as to how the Islands might develop.

The overwhelming majority of those polled favoured no, or minimal, on-shore development, even if that meant making less money from oil.

I hope the present councillors will realise that they will not have all the answers to the difficult questions they will face and that they cannot know the views of the electorate, unless they take the trouble to ask.

Referenda on crucial issues relating to how the Islands might develop if oil is found in commercial quantities would not show weakness on the part of Councillors, but highlight their commitment to open and inclusive government.

DNA from feathers can unlock the history of penguin movements

FINGER printing is often used to catch criminals and now it's being used to help inform conservation management of Falkland Island penguins.

Two visiting scientists are working in the Falklands throughout May to study the movements of gentoo penguins populations in the South Atlantic which will help to produce a species action plan for gentoos.

Hila Levy from Oxford University and Tom Hart from the Institute of Zoology (London Zoo) are investigating penguins' population structure and movement using their DNA. The process is very similar to forensic science, when police can obtain a DNA profile from microscopic tissue samples.

The two researchers aim to visit as many gentoo colonies as possible and use DNA fingerprinting (or in this case, featherprinting) to determine the gentoo penguin population structure around the islands.

Tom and colleagues from Sheffield University have spent the last two years adapting the technique for penguin research. They have just completed a population map of macaroni penguins around South Georgia and hope to apply the technique to penguin conservation worldwide.

Just as DNA can tell us how closely related you are to your parents, your cousins and your friends, a penguin's DNA can show which colony a penguin originally came from, and therefore how penguins mix between colonies.

Hila and Tom will be taking a direct feather sample from penguins only where they can do this without disturbing colonies, and comparing

HOME LIVING DNA from feathers can unlock the history of penguin movements

FINGER printing is often used to catch criminals and now it's being used to help inform conservation management of Falkland Island penguins.

Two visiting scientists are working in the Falklands throughout May to study the movements of gentoo penguins populations in the South Atlantic which will help to produce a species action plan for gentoos.

Hila Levy from Oxford Univer-sity and Tom Hart from the Insti-tute of Zoology (London Zoo) are investigating penguins' population structure and movement using their DNA. The process is very similar to forensic science, when police can obtain a DNA profile from microscopic tissue samples.

The two researchers aim to visit as many gentoo colonies as possible and use DNA fingerprinting (or in this case, featherprinting) to determine the gentoo penguin population structure around the islands.

Tom and colleagues from Sheffield University have spent the last two years adapting the technique for penguin research. They have just completed a population map of macaroni penguins around South Georgia and hope to apply the technique to penguin conservation worldwide.

Just as DNA can tell us how closely related you are to your parents, your cousins and your friends, a penguin's DNA can show which colony a penguin originally came from, and therefore how penguins mix between colonies.

Hila and Tom will be taking a direct feather sample from penguins only where they can do this without disturbing colonies, and comparing shed feathers.




work is important because we need to know which colonies contribute most to the overall population and how population structure changes with time.

So far, Tom and colleagues have sampled gentoo penguins from the bottom of the Antarctic Peninsula to South Georgia using the same tech-niques. They have looked at how population structure changes and might be influenced on the large scale y climate change. Both Tom and Hila hope that the techniques trialled in Antarctica will prove useful to the Falklands.





On the trail of the Falklands walrus

On April 1, the Penguin News "Missing Links" article featured a photo of an amphibious plane contributed by Ian Gleadell. Readers Ron Clarke and Peter Wakefield were able to give us some information, but the Falkland Islands Association's Ted Clapp has sent us more:

I BECAME interested in the old photograph in the Penguin News not just because of the two persons identified but because the amphibian on the beach seemed to me to be a "Walrus" and I had never heard of such a plane operating from the Falklands at that time.

I was interested also as I had served on a Light Fleet Aircraft Carrier in 1947 which held a small flight of Walrus Amphibians used for anti submarine searches and sea rescue (two of which, with their crews, were lost on search and rescue operations) in addition to our normal Sea Fury Fighters and Firefly ground/ship attackers armed with rockets and light bombs.

The plane in the photo showed no markings and I embarked upon a bit of research with the help of the RNAS Museum at Culdrose and the internet.

Staff at the Museum were particularly helpful and willingly provided details and the two photos. I think they were a little surprised that they held in the archives such specific records relating to my queries. But there are gaps!

The Walrus was probably W2738 of 710 squadron Y Flight and was carried onboard HMS

Albatross (formerly HMAS Albatross) which saw service in the South Atlantic, based at Freetown, during 1939 and until May 1942. Walrus W2738 (apparently named Audrey) was detached from HMS Albatross and placed onboard RFA Broomdale (a Dale Class Tanker), which headed towards the Falklands.

Records indicate the "unit" landed at Bluff Cove on the 28th January 1942 and presumably operated from there until the following signal was recorded in the 710 Squadron records.

"March 6th. Learnt by signal that Audrey has been written off."

This ties in very well with Ron Clarke's information that she crashed at Mullet Creek after "a couple of months" and a Museum report that she "crashed 1/3/1942." Photo: RNAS Museum Culdrose As I said – there are gaps...I haven't yet been able to trace any crew names or positively confirmed they were at "Bluff Cove." The 710 squadron records do

The 710 squadron records do not, it seems, cover the Falklands Detached Force so there is a big blank there. I suspect the flight was working in support of a cruiser squadron operating in the nearby South Atlantic area, possibly looking out for Blockade Runners, but I can't confirm it.

If anyone has information or "tales of old" I would love to hear from them.

I have spoken to Frank Burton (RN) who was stationed at the Head of Bay Wireless Station from 1939 until 1944 but he cannot recall anything about an RNAS air unit being around.

Temporary planning permission for pizzaria

THIS month's meeting of the Planning & Building Committee was chaired by Cllr Jan Cheek due to the absence overseas on government business of Cllr Sharon Halford.

Councillor Cheek was supported by fellow Legislative Assembly Member Gavin Short and also attending for the first three applications were two members of the Historic Buildings Committee: Dawn Hoy and Gerald Cheek.

The first of those three submissions was a proposal to change the windows of listed building 12 Drury Street submitted by Shirley Hirtle and this was approved conditionally.

Next was Ken Halliday's outline application for the erection of a dwelling on land at the rear of 5 Drury Street fronting Pioneer Row.

Members agreed with the recommendation that it be refused as "the proposal would have an unacceptable impact on the character of this historic part of Stanley as it would be on a conspicuous elevation between the Victorian cottages of Pioneer Row and Drury Street, the greatest concentration of historic houses in Stanley."

Two other reasons for the refusal were also part of the decision.

The third application, submitted by Jeannie McKay, was for the erection of a pair of one-anda-half storey semi-detached dwellings on "Speedwell Paddock" in Villiers Street.

A very similar proposal was submitted in 2008 which was refused permission and, on appeal, rejected by Executive Council (ExCo) who agreed it amounted to over-development. Committee members felt themselves to be of the same opinion as their forbears and agreed to refuse consent.

After the departure of members of the Historic Buildings Committee, the meeting moved on to review ten other applications.

The Committee resolved to grant conditional planning permission for the following:

I. Extension to her dwelling at I Watson Way for Karen Drysdale,

2. Siting of a Portakabin for storage at "The Stables,"Moody Brook for Graham Fiddes, 3. Erection of a single-storey dwelling at 17 Sulivan Street for Neil Gilbert.

4. Extension to the dwelling with internal alterations at 7 Allardyce Street for Nyree Heathman,

 Conservatory at 10 Brandon Road for Frank Leyland,

6. Attached garage at 1 Anderson Drive for Irwin Summers,

7. Extensive works including bund construction, road access, security fencing, lighting, floodlights. Also permission in principle for warehouse and office units, on land at 11/13 Boxer Bridge Road for Byron Holdings Limited.

Temporary permission for the siting of "coach tea rooms" at Gypsy Cove car park was granted to Paz Blyth on the condition it will only be sited between 1 October and 30 April each year until 30 April 2013.

The proposal submitted for Sue Goss to change the use from storage and music studio to food preparation area (such as pizzas for home delivery) and music studio at 98 Davis Street attracted a lot of discussion. It was finally decided to grant temporary permission for one year with a number of other conditions also to be imposed.

The Public Services Department proposed the erection of a 1.8 metre-high fence on the Ross Road East roadside boundary of Stanley Cemetery. This was in response to concerns expressed by families visiting graves who wished to have more privacy. Members felt unhappy with the scheme but were unable to refuse consent and therefore it would have to be forwarded to ExCo for decision. It was said at the meeting that the proposal might now be withdrawn.

Before concluding the open part of the meeting, members were updated with the current position on seventeen applications for building permits, two of which were shown to be "rejected" but had now been amended to provide the correct information and had been approved.

The next meeting of this committee is scheduled to take place on Thursday 3 June commencing at 8.30am in the Liberation Room. Graham France

The Buffalos best Blackhawks





Price £1.20 Friday, May 28, 2010 War of words is only simmering

AS might have been expected during a week when Argentina has been celebrating the bicentenary of its independence from Spain, the new British Government's "Note Verbale." reasserting sovereignty over the Falkland Islands and declaring illegal recent Argentine attempts to impede the free passage of shipping to and from the Islands, brought forth a prompt response.

British Ambassador in Buenos Aires Shan Morgan was summoned to the Foreign Ministry, Palacio San Martin, on Monday afternoon to receive a note from the Argentine government in response to the British one.

The Argentine note was delivered to the Ambassador by Cabinet Chief Alberto D'Alotto.

Britain had complained that Argentine Presidential Decree 256/2010 and Disposition 14/2010 which state all vessels sailing to and from Argentina, the Falklands, South Georgia and South Sandwich Islands, must request a previous authorisation from the Argentine government, "are not compliant with International Law including the UN Convention on the Law of the Sea," and other international treaties signed by the Argentine government.

The Argentine response reiterated that country's territorial claims in the South Atlantic and argued in consequence that the restrictions they seek to impose on shipping do not break international laws, because voyages to and from the Falklands (and other islands that Argentina claims) are really voyages to Argentine territory and so are an internal matter for Argentina.

This exchange of notes has been described by the Argentine press as indicating an escalation of tension between Britain and Argentina, but many seasoned observers take the view that it is predictable rather than critical.

Outside the simmering of these fomal diplomatic exchanges, however, Argentina's Deputy Foreign Affairs minister Victorio Tacetti has been attempting to raise the temperature with statements, which are both historically inaccurate and clearly meant to be inflammatory, such as his declaration that: "Those living in Malvinas were not colonised; they were sent by the UK, thus displacing the original inhabitants by the use of force."

Rather strangely, given the historical evidence to the contrary, Mr Tacetti also complained that for the past 200 years "Argentines have not been allowed to live in Malvinas," claiming: "At some point only teachers and labourers were allowed to lead some activities." Several Members of the Falkland Islands Legislative Assembly took the opportunity offered by Wednesday's Budget Session to praise the robust stance of the new British Government vis-a-vis what is seen in the Islands as a stepping up of Argentina's sovereignty campaign, since the current period of oil exploration began in the waters around the Falklands.

Councillor Jan Cheek, whose grandchildren are eighth generation Falkland Islanders, said that the Argentine claim was based on "shaky history," and the wrong assumption that Falkland Islanders were an implanted population. Her earliest Falkland Islands ancestor had arrived with the first British Governor, but he was a volunteer.

Veteran Councillor Bill Luxton decribed recent actions by the Argentine Government as: "thuggish, bullying tactics."

FOR a budget that was promised to be belt-tightening, the one outlined on Wednesday by the Director of Financial Services, did not seem at first to be too frightening, except maybe for those on the verge of extinction from over-indulgence in alcohol and tobacco. However, eleverly offering as it does a mixture of small benefits, small subtractions and lumps of status quo, it will take me, like most people I expect, some time to digest its complexities and to work out where it leaves me.

This was not the case with one Penguin News reader who was on the phone within minutes of Keith Padgett sitting down, to tell me how much the new arrangements, if adopted, would cost the average family. She later was kind enough to email with a range of calculations for families of various sizes and incomes, which we may well publish next week once we have checked them out.

At first glance they seem to suggest that a family earning a gross income of £31,000, consisting of two parents with two children, will be £74 better off if one stays home so they don't have to pay for child care, but £472 worse off, if both work. Even more worrying, a similar family earning £61,000 per year, even paying for child care for their children end up £282 better off.

If these calculations are correct - and the background of the person doing them suggests that she should know how to use a calculator then it would appear that what we have is a Reverse Robin Hood budget, with the poorer being robbed to pay for the better off.

To be honest though, important though they may be, these kind of calculations just hurt my head. What really impressed me about what we all heard on Wednesday, both from the Director of Corporate Resources, or Financial Secretary as I still prefer to call him, and the Governor was the sheer size of the task that this Assembly seems to be setting for itself. To carry out the recommendations of the budget alone will, we were told, require changes to 23 different laws and that's before housing, education and a new port get sorted out, or the nine other bills are passed which are required to help implement the Rural Development Strategy or overhaul the laws relating to telecommunications or employment or smoking in public places or immigration or......the list goes on and on.

This Assembly's plans as presented seem to strike a fair balance between many conflicting demands, but it would have been good to see some provision made to make its Members full-time and reasonably well-paid. Surely the volume and nature of the work involved demands this if they are to succeed without being brought to their knees by the sheer size of their own lofty ambitions.

Highs & lows from budget



Cruise ship tourism escapes any threat from increases in passenger levies, embarkation fees, harbour dues, and customs fees

THOSE fearing that they would have to take in many notches in their belts may heave a sigh of relief if all the Financial Secretary's budget recommendations are accepted by councillors; it is not as draconian as might have been expected.

Surprisingly, perhaps, there are no changes proposed to either income tax rates or corporation tax rates, though personal and lower tax bands are decreased to £12,000.

Businesses which profit from the cruise ship side of tourism will no doubt be gratified to find that there are no changes proposed to the passenger levy or to embarkation fees, harbour dues, or customs entrance & clearance fees.

All these costs for visiting ships have been cited in the past as high, and likely to discourage visits, when Stanley is compared with other destinations in the Southern Cone.

Things are not so rosy for the prospects of land-based tourism, which suffers already from the high cost of getting here and the lack of easy access.

All these difficulties will be added to from July 1 2011, by a 10% increase in FIGAS tourist rates. Outer island resident's flight costs remain capped at £50, though FIGAS freight rates are set to increase by 20%.

Those whose salaries or wages are tied to the cost of living will enjoy a 1% increase, as will beneficiaries of the Old Scheme public service & FLH pensions. Standard retirement pensions, ex-gratia pensions & Christmas bonuses also increase by 1%.

Allowances for the rent rebate and service charge rebate schemes go up by 5% and 1% respectively.

Welfare allowances, including attendance and fostering allowances, also see a 1% rise. The threshold for rent rebate, service charge rebate and winter fuel allowance increases by 0.7%

Further good news, no doubt occasioned by the increased use of the wind, is that the cost of a **unit of electricity** will reduce from 17.5p to 16.53p.

Retirement pension contributions (RPCs) go up from January 1, 2011, to £13.50 for residents, employees and employers, while the voluntary overseas retirement pension contribution goes up to £33.10. There is to be no change in the OAP winter fuel allowance.

Rents for FIG accommodation rise by 5%

Customs import duties on cigarettes and tobacco products will go up up by 10% and 3% will be added to the cost of alcohol, which with a 1% Medical Services Levy may help cover the cost to us all of those killing themselves with cigarettes and booze.

The dead, too, or at least their surviving relatives, come in for a bit of a hammering with **funeral charges** in Stanley going up by 18% to £1,168 and in Camp by 29.5% to £1,368.

Clearly the push for the repopulation of Camp applies only to the living.

There's also no change to the reservation charges for plots in Stanley cemetery, so the Stanley bias continues, tempered slightly by the news that service charges for domestic properties will go up 6.5% to £396.

The cost of waste collection from non-domestic properties goes up 10% to £134 for a wheelie bin & £407 for a large bin. Metered water charges for commercial users rise by 3%.

Local postage charges remain the same, but if you want to complain about the budget to overseas relatives complaining about the budget, it will cost you more.

Governor's final state New Civil Military I of the nation address

THE Budget Session of the Legislative Assembly was held on Wednesday morning. It began as always with the annual State of the Nation Address by His Excellency the Governor. At one time, as the Honourable Dick Sawle mentioned in his vote of thanks, this used to be a somewhat tedious affair, rather akin to a typical headmaster's speech at prize giving, with every one of the government's departments getting a favourable mention

For the last two years however, as the Governor himself pointed out, there has been a different format. Instead of being written for the Governor by the heads of the Civil Service, the Address is compiled with contributions from the Members of the Legislative Assembly themselves and is, in effect, an outline of the policies and plans they have for the coming year. In this respect it now very much resembles the speech made by the Queen at the state opening of the Westminster parliament, which this year, by coincidence, happened a couple of days earlier

Beginning with government's finances, the speech made reference to the effects of the global economic downturn, which coupled with reduced fisheries income, reduced returns on investments and reduced tourist numbers made our budgetary position "fragile" and called for "financial prudence" and "budgetary restraint.

The effect on the government's finances of any future oil exploitation was acknowledged, but because of its uncertainty and the time scale involved, was dismissed as a base for economic forecasting. Mention was made, however, of the short-term boost to the economy provided by the current oil exploration effort, and the local private sector were praised for the considerable investments and efforts they had made to support this

The nearness to completion of the Economic Development Strat-

egy (EDS) was hailed as providing "the potential to provide increased economic growth including in Camp," though significant private sector investment would be needed, particularly from the fishing industry, should it be decided to go ahead with the construction of a new port

A medium term financial plan has been agreed by the Legislative Assembly, which aims to strike a balance between meeting investment and public service needs on the one hand and affordability on the other. While the Assembly will work towards a balanced budget in the future, for next year the target of an operating budget deficit of £1m has been retained.

The Governor went on to say that councillors no longer considered that there was a need to build up reserves, but in their speeches of thanks after his address, Councillor Cheek and Councillor Halford both took issue with this statement

The Government's policy priorities were listed in the speech as Housing, Education, Rural Development, Tourism, Internal Transport and Telecommunications.

These ambitions were echoed by several members during subsequent speeches, with Cllrs Glenn Ross and Gavin Short being particularly forceful on the need to make house-ownership more accessible than at present.

Government will be producing a housing plan to detail the types of accommodation required in both the short and long term. It will also look at financial options for making housing affordable, which might include shared ownership and government mortgages.

Cllr Cheek, as principal proposer of the vote of thanks to the Governor, said that she felt there had been a "falling off" in the priority given to education in the past few years, and that in her opinion it was vital to have more local people in senior positions in government: "If we are to be convincing as a people in our own right," she said. This attitude is clearly shared by Cllr Short who declared a totally local civil service as something he hoped to see before heading to his final rest in East Stanley. Plans currently being drawn up by the Education and Training Departments include a review of the apprenticeship scheme and the consideration of provision for support for mature students and for those undertaking Masters degrees.

Knowing that when the Assembly resumes on Friday, they will have the opportunity to speak at length, some of the Members limited their remarks to taking the opportunity of his last Budget Session, to thank the Governor for his support and to wish him and wife, Helen, a happy retirement.

It was no surprise however that Cllr Sawle should have taken the opportunity to speak about telecommunications. He assured those present, and the wider radio audience, that there had been "no dimunition of resolution or will' or change in the "robust stance" that he and his colleagues were taking with regard to the Cable and Wireless Service, and urged that company to cooperate with Government rather than shy away from admitting the existence of problems.

The Governor's speech outlined consultancy work on the quality of the service, which, when concluded in August, will "enable the Assembly to consider whether the exclusive licence granted to Cable and Wireless continues to be in the best interests of the Falkland Islands people."

In the final section of his address, the Governor forcibly reiterated the British position on the illegality of Argentine attempts to interfere with international shipping. He also criticised the Argentine Government for ignoring the existence of the Falkland's democratically elected government. It was surprising, he said, that a country composed largely of relatively recent immigrants should deny the right of self-determination to a country where some families had lived for up to nine generations.

Clara McKay however has also identified the woman, but as Teena Ashley, a maid who worked there at the same time as Bertha. She said Teena married Dick Anderson, and had two children.

She identified the picture as being taken outside the manager's house, and said she had known both women well; Clara was 12 at the time. Clara said that Bertha used to walk to San Carlos Point on her half days, would light a fire so a dinghy would come across to fetch her, and would have supper with Clara's mother. She said she remembered her as a lovely, pretty and a lively person. She thought Bertha's husband Jack was the gardener at the time, not the shepherd, and believes the couple left, possibly to return to England, as at that time house keepers were not allowed children.

Gaviscon, oh, Gaviscon

ON April 21 I was sent ashore from the good ship RFA Wave Ruler, feeling unwell, and put under the care of the medical centre at MPA.

At MPA I received no relevant medical treatment at all (unless you include Gaviscon) but, on my third day there, they had the sense to send me to your wonderful hospital in Stanley. In Stanley my condition was immediately identified (heart attack) and the duty team rolled into action like well oiled clockwork – and saved my life.

It wouldn't be fair to name names as I might miss somebody - except Angela, the doctor, whose name clearly comes from the word angel. There was a man, a nurse, who made me tea that tasted just as if my wife had made it. A better looking nurse held my hand earlier in the day, another one took over until early evening and then yet another through the night! Other doctors visited, someone brought me food. I was allowed to phone my wife and drugs were pumped into my arms. At one point I had a bit of a relapse but the third nurse on the above list was calm and professional and knew what to do.

The Anglican Rector of the Falkland Islands. Richard Hines, turned up and was a pillar of strength – and he also phoned my wife.

However, the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital is unable to provide more than initial front line treatment for heart attack victims and, as intensive care is next to the main desk(!), I could hear arrangements being made throughout the night. They located my luggage and, most importantly, my passport - and arranged for me to be transferred to the Clinica Alemana in Santiago. As a result, at 11:00 the next morning I was put aboard a Chilean Gulfstream 150 jet plane and whisked far away across the still trembling Andes.

That afternoon a Chilean doctor told me I would have to wait approximately 48 hours, while they pumped the necessary drugs into me, before they could carry out the next medical step. And then he returned half an hour later and said they would operate tomorrow. Apparently the Stanley hospital team had pre-empted everything and the relevant drugs were already in me! (Thanks Angela.)

The last time I saw Angela I said: "Thank you for saving my life." She told me to think nothing of it (yeah – really!). And I don't think I got the chance to thank anyone else in that wonderful hospital – so this is it: THANK YOU – EVERYONE. King Edward VII Memorial Hospital is the best hospital in the world – and it is because of the professional, nice, able, caring, conscientious, thinking, beautiful, good tea making, kind, knowledgeable, bestest nurses, doctors, ambulance drivers and everyone else who work within it. Without them a hospital is just walls and a few unmade beds.

As for me. I was very lucky to be sent to the Clinica Alemana and it is a seat of medical excellence. A stent was fitted to one of my main coronary arteries (which was 90% occluded). Another artery, the primary diagonal, is still 80% occluded but due to the small size of this artery further decisions must be made before any further action is taken. And I have a number of dead heart muscles as well! However, the output from my heart is good and, apparently, it should adapt.

I returned to the UK on April 11th and attended my GP the next day. The local hospital (in Reading) will see me on 6th June (I've told them that if I am still alive I'll look forward to it) and, if I want to see a dietician, the next available appointment is in the last week of September!!!

So, thank you to all at Stanley hospital and to Richard Hines. Don't worry if you have to go to the Clinica Alemana because you will be in the best hands. However, if you should return to the UK, don't count on the speedy service you have surely become accustomed to on the FI and... I doubt you would print my comments concerning the medical centre at MPA (but just keep an eye on Gaviscon shares).

Nice try but not allowed

EVERYTHING about the Falklands in Argentina is political. Sr Bautista's recent rugby visit was no exception. It is wrong for him to say (PN 14 May) that it "was not used in any political way."

I was in Buenos Aires when it took place and saw the media coverage. Clarin, had most, on January 10th. There was a colour picture of a match on the front page. In the caption it said the first try was scored by the son of an Argentine killed in the 1982 war.

There were two more pages in the sports section. The main title was "El Rugby Une" (rugby unifies, or unites). Here Sr Bautista said that through rugby they believed they could form a "vinculo indisoluble" (unbreakable link) with the Falklands. Is this normal, if politics were not involved?

Three Argentine veterans of the war accompanied the team. Clarin reported: "After an emotional minute's silence." one kicked the first match off! Isn't that political?

A sub-title was "Fue para los Chicos" (It was for the Youngsters), and the concentration on coaching young Islanders was glaring. This is a time-honoured Argentine tactic, as they know that youngsters are not politically mature enough to realize that they are being used. Sr Bautista stressed that they had promoted "rugby values." Whatever those values are, can't they best be obtained from Britain where the game originated? British rugby players could teach the game for its own sake, without a hidden agenda.

Lastly, 1 thought the title "Rugby Sin Fronteras" particularly inappropriate. At the time of the visit, Argentina had just finalised its provincial "fronteras" putting the Falklands into the Province of Tierra del Fuego, the most chaotic province in Argentina, and one of the most corrupt.

Keeping local is more fruitful

WHILST it certainly is a good time to have some discussion on how we would wish to see the economy and community develop in the event of a successful hydrocarons industry, let us not start from a position of strangely distorted reports of historical perspective and fact (Elsby 21/5/10).

The last drilling round was in 1998: the Council that supervised it was elected in 1997, and included ClIrs Luxton. Halford and Cheek as well as myself and others not now in Government. There were many discussions about "what if's" but there was never to my knowledge any philosophy that "we needed as much on-shore development as possible."

From the very early days of exploration it was always accepted that the best route for the Falklands, if there were hydrocarbons; was that they should be produced, loaded and exported offshore without any need to bring them ashore. This avoids the need for large scale construction projects and the very large numbers of temporary imported construction workers that have had such detrimental effect on other small communities elsewhere. Our view was, and I hope and expect it still is, a minimal onshore impact route.

Where Mr Elsby is perhaps confused, is in the provision of support services in which I and others support maximum local involvement.

It took us 160 years to get back our farming industry from external ownership at very considerable cost. It took 20 years to get control of the majority of our fishing quotas into local ownership, though some of it is still controlled from outside. We would not want the oil industry to go the same way, with large numbers of outside owned and non-Falklands registered companies providing the support services and reaping the benefits, with Islanders left as employees and observers in our own country.

Maximisation of local involvement, and substantial growth in the private sector, is essential to the provision of a long term and stable economy.

The alternative in which we all become the workers whilst others are the owners, and the Government gets bigger and bigger through resource rents and taxation, is unthinkable.

Sharon Halford at Isle of Man conference

LEGISLATIVE Assembly Member, the Honourable Sharon Halford, attended the annual conference of the British Islands and Mediterranean Region of the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association, which was held on the Isle of Man from May 10 to 14.

Mrs Halford described the event as: "An opportunity to renew old acquaintances with friends of the Falkland Islands, to share common experiences, to gain fresh perspectives, and to bring back new ideas to discuss with my colleagues in Government."

The theme of this conference was "Possibilities," the possibilities for democracy created by new technologies including, in particular, recent developments in information technology.

The first day involved a broad overview of governments and technology. Topics covered include the pros and cons of allowing staff to use networking sites in the workplace. IT management and obtaining value for money in IT procurement. Also considered was keeping costs down by updating programs rather than replacing hardware.

Delegates were reminded that whilst technology is the method it is not the message. Mrs Halford said she was particularly interested by a comment from the speaker that attracting financial institutions to work in your territory is guaranteed to improve your IT connections since without fast IT connections the finance industry is unable to work efficiently.

The technology already exists to permit on-line voting, and the use of laptops is now allowed in some legislatures.

On the second day delegates had a demonstration of how the electronic voting system works in the Tynwald, the Isle of Man's legislature. Delegates were also shown the Hansard voice recognition system in use in Council Chambers. As a parliamentarian speaks, their words appear on a big screen.

During the conference Mrs Halford chaired a session on "The challenges presented by information technologies in terms of protecting important rights and freedoms such as the right to privacy." The keynote speaker was Christopher Graham, the UK's Information Commissioner.

It was pointed out that whilst data protection is necessary, it is not always easy to marry this up with freedom of information. On

line communication is instant and this is not always comfortable. One difficult issue is how long data should be kept by government agencies.

The regional AGM was held towards the end of the conference, which gave delegates the opportunity to update everyone on parliamentary developments in their territories. Mrs Halford commented: "When future meetings were discussed there was a huge emphasis on cost cutting, as everyone has to cut back on what they can spend as the recession is still biting."

The final event was a formal dinner, at which the Falklands delegation were seated at the top table beside the Gibraltar delegation. Mrs Halford concluded: "Out-

Stanley gets a yacht club at long last

AFTER what Chairman Tony Blake described as: "Three years of trying and being bogged down over property rights and other issues," the newly formed Falkland Islands Yacht Club held its first Annual General Meeting on May 20 in the Geography room at the Community School.

Twenty-one people were present at the meeting and all signed up for membership, at a cost of $\pounds 10$.

The following were elected as officers of the Club: Tony Blake as Chair. Alison Thorogood as Vice Chair. Janet McLeod as Secretary and Dianne Freeman as Treasurer.

In addition, as required by the Constitution of the Club, the following were elected as Committee Members: Richard Short, Ken Passfield, Carl Freeman and Neil Rowlands

Mr Blake told Penguin News that he was very pleased by the composition of the Club's Committee. They and the officers of the Club represented a good cross-section of Falkland Islands society, and also covered the three principal locations where yachts were currently to be found in Stanley.

It was hoped, said Mr Blake that the existence of the club would attract contacts from overseas and would help promote the development of the Falklands as a yachting destination, an aspect of the club's existence in which the Tourist Board had already shown interest.

New Camp TV up and running

SINCE the BFBS1 analogue service was recovered on April 7, the service is running satisfactorily with very few reception issues having been raised. This will continue for the foreseeable future and anyone experiencing difficulties should contact SSVC to let them know.

Having successfully completed the bulk of new installations on West Falkland, installation of the digital satellite dishes on East Falkland is due to commence on May 31.

As on West Falkland, two twoman installation crews will be working across the Island.

One crew will be in Sussex on the May 31 to start installations in Sussex. Head of the Bay, Kingsford Valley, Blue Beach, Wreck Point, Green Field and Cape Dolphin.

These installations should be complete during the first week of June after which the following places will be covered: Hope Cottage, Elephant Beach, Dunvegan Cabin, Moss Side, Race Point, Smylies, Newhouse, Lorenzo and Home Farm. Around the 14th June this crew will go on to complete installations on George Island. Speedwell and Bleaker.

The second crew will be starting at Port Louis on May 31 and covering installations at Johnsons Harbour, Rincon Grande and Horseshoe Bay.

These installations should be completed during the first week in June after which the following places will be covered in the first week of June, Brookfield, Long Island, Estancia, Riverview and Teal Inlet.

Around June 14 this crew will go on to complete installations at North Arm. Walker Creek. Saladero and Goose Green, followed by Darwin, Hillhead, Camilla Creek, Swan Inlet, Wineglass Station and Fitzroy during the third week of June.

Apart from a few sites which may require a revisit, overall installation of the digital TV service should be completed by end of June 2010.

All residents due to receive an installation are kindly reminded to ensure that the concrete bases are

complete and have been laid down in accordance with FIG guidelines. Anyone with any concerns should please contact Lynn Brownlee at the Secretariat.

Work on the installation of the new infrastructure and digital transmitter on Sapper Hill is progressing to plan. Test transmissions will be taking place over the next few weeks with the SSVC digital specialist arriving on around June 14.

The final sign-off of the new service is scheduled for the end of June after which all residents in Stanley with a digital TV will be able to commence viewing the enhanced digital service and view the new stations.

I am personally very pleased with all of the hard work and effort being made by the installers G&S Electrical, the service providers SSVC and the numerous other people and government departments that are playing a part in bringing the new digital services to the Falkland Islands. It has been very satisfying to see everyone working together effectively to make this happen. There is still much work to be done, but hopefully with the continued focus everyone has been giving onto this project we should see everything completed and the new TV services available to everyone around the end of June.

FIG has had a number of residents in Camp say to us what a stirling job the installation teams on the West have done; this feedback is very satisfying to the project team and much appreciated. I have also had feedback saying that they are very pleased with the service, picture quality and so on.

After TV, the next big challenge for the project team is to tackle the expansion of the FM radio network. The digital broadcasting of FIRS will this month provide a much improved strength of signal and area coverage.

Beyond this, island-wide improvements to the FM infrastructure should see FIRS and three other channels being distributed islands-wide by or before the end of the year.

At its succesful conclusion, the unit being inspected is issued by the Sea Cadet's Association with a Licence to Train.

Inspecting Officer Giles was aided in this task by another 1982 veteran, Royal Marine Major Steve Crawley

Commander Giles said that this visit to the Falklands was probably the only one he would be able to make during his three-year appointment to the Sea Cadets. He had found the Stanley Royal Marine Cadet and Sea Cadets - the most southerly of the 70 units in his division - to be: "a thriving unit. with lots of positives and offering lots of good things for the youngsters of Stanley to enjoy. Being in the Sea Cadets gives young people confidence and the valuable experience of working together."







Keeping track of vegetation by satellite images

IF the work of two Shackleton Fund scholars who returned to Chile on Saturday is successful, the vastness of the typical Falklands farm could one day be reduced to the size of a computer screen and its capacity for sheep carrying available at the click of a mouse.

Dr Sergio Radie and Dr Sergio Opazo were in the Falklands as part of the links between Queen's University Belfast, the University of Magallanes (UMAG) in Punta Arenas, Chile and the Falkland Islands Agricultural Department, which were established some years back by Professor Jim MacAdam. Jim, who is a frequent visitor to the Falklands and the editor of the Falkland Islands Journal worked as an agronomist for what is now the Agricultural Department in the late 'seventies.

Sergio Radic, an agronomist, who gained his PhD at Queen's Belfast under the supervision of Professor MacAdam, has vīsited the Falklands previously. With Dr Opazo, who is an expert in Geographical Information Systems (GIS) Dr Radic has been attempting to map the vegetation of the Agricultural Department's farm at Saladero using images obtained from satellites.

Using Saladero as a test case to enable the identification and value as pasture of different vegetation types encountered in the Falklands by remote methods, and coupling that information with a procedure widely tested and used in the Magallanes region of Chilean Patagonia, the two scientists believe it should eventually be possible to estimate the potential productivity and sheep-carrying capacity of any Falklands camp, without the need to put on the wellies and go outside. Andrew Pollard of the Agricul-

Andrew Pollard of the Agricultural Department, is enthusiastic about the project. He believes that given the vast spaces involved in the Falklands, detailed information about the vegetation types in any given area obtained from satellite images could be of use and interest, not only to the farming com-


munity but also to conservationists.

CIS expert Dr Opazo told Penguin News that much of the information to be gathered from satellite comes free and that in the project in Patagonia the results are updated every 15 days, giving a smooth flow of information on seasonal as well as longer-term changes in vegetation. In the Falklands, a frequency of between three and five years might be sufficient to keep the information on vegetation distribution adequately up-dated.

Shackleton awards announced

In addition to the Shackleton Scholarship awarded to Dr Radie and Dr Opazo, three other academic awards have been granted for the year 2010. Projects funded range from the archaeological excavation of nineteenth century farm settlements to the study of mosses and seaweed flora.

Two Danish scholars who were awarded scholarships in 2009 will be making their voyage south this year. They are Dr Jakob Tougaard and Dr Line Kyhn, who will be monitoring Peale's and Commerson's dolphins. See Page 17 for full details.

Academic awards Cross dressing fun announced

THE academic awards of the Shackleton Scholarship Fund have been announced.

As mentioned earlier in this paper (p15) one award has gone to Chilean scientists Dr Sergio Radic and Dr Sergio Opazo, who are using satellite photography to assess grassland.

Three other awards go to an archaeologist, two other scientists and a botanist.

The archaeologist is Dr Rob Philpott of the National Museums Liverpool, who has already worked on Port Louis and other sites in the Islands including Darwin. This is not his first Shackleton Award and he has shown great enthusiasm for explaining his research to the Falklands public. He will be excavating farms established by the Falkland Islands Company in the nineteenth century.

The scientists Dr Aldo Anensi

and Professor Bruno de Reviers

of the National Museum of Natural History in Paris are world authorities in the study of brown algae with experience in Kerguelen and Tierra del Fuego. Dr Anensi will visit the Islands in December to work with an expedition of the Scottish Association for Marine Science. The ultimate objective will be an inventory of the Falklands' brown seaweed flora - of scientific importance and potential economic value. Sam Bosanquet from the Coun-

tryside Commission for Wales will form part of a four-person expedition which will investigate the "lower plants" of the Islands mosses, liverworts, lichens and fungi in co-operation with Falklands Conservation. Their three weeks fieldwork will start in December 2010.




Miss Stanley Arms was won by Danielle Harris and Master Stanley Arms went to Connor Betts



Anniversary exhibition of the SS Great Britain

FEATURING film footage and original items as well as a wide range of photographs, an exhibition marking the 40th anniversary of the salvage of the SS "Great Britain" is now open at the Museum.

Launched in 1843, the "Great Britain" was condemned in the Falklands in 1886 and purchased by the FIC for use as a storage hulk.

After 50 years of service in Stanley Harbour, the hulk was deemed unfit for further use, towed out to Sparrow Cove, beached and holed, there to see out the rest of her days – or so it was believed.

However, in the mid-1960s interest in the old ship was renewed and a plan to return her to Britain for restoration began to gather momentum – finally possible with the backing of the Bahamas-based philanthropist, Jack Hayward.

The massive operation to return the ship to her home port began in January 1970 with the arrival in the Islands of Leslie "Spike" O'Neil – a salvage expert. He judged there to be an 80 per cent chance of success and the plan went ahead.

The salvage operation that followed in April of the same year achieved what few thought was possible – the hulk was patched up, pumped out and refloated, then towed on to the submersible pontoon that would carry her 8.000 miles home to Bristol.

A number of Islanders were involved in the famous operation – either providing carpentry skills (Willie Bowles and his apprentices), working on the small boats and launches that helped to tow the hulk into position (Rohin Goodwin and Peter McGill), or as part of the dive team (Lyle Craigle-Halkett).

Now restored to her original glory, the "Great Britain" is Bristol's main visitor attraction, but the ship retains an unbreakable link to the Falklands.

The salvage is central to the Museum's exhibition, and illustrated with a series of photographs by Marion and Tony Morrison of South American Pictures, along with some excellent images taken by Islanders.

For the first time, the Museum is able to enhance an exhibition with video - a 10 minute video clip shows some of the salvage work and adds great interest to the display.

The design, working life and restoration of Brunel's most celebrated ship is also briefly explained.

The Museum & National Trust is extremely grateful to the Falkland Islands Co. Ltd. and Sulivan Shipping Services for their sponsorship of the exhibition and to all the individuals who loaned photographs or shared their memories of the ship.

A visit to the Museum is always an interesting way to pass some time but for the next month the SS "Great Britain" exhibition will certainly add to your enjoyment of Britannia House.

Stampeding dek hockey Buffalos







Friday, June 4, 2010 Mum is lucky to be alive after hit-and-run drama

WHEN Sandra Short eventually went to bed late on Saturday night, she was nursing a swollen head and a badly bruised arm. But she was happy to be alive, and safely home with her husband and children.

The 37-year-old mother-ofthree was the victim of a hit-andrun motorist who left her dazed and shocked, lying on the side of Stanley Bypass just before midnight. As she lay there alone in the dark, a friend ran in tears for help, not knowing the extent of her injuries. Finally, a taxi driver

came to her aid and ferried her to hospital.

It was a distressing night for her family, and Sandra is week still this recovering from her a injuries. But even more worrying is the knowledge that somewhere out there is a motorist who could have killed her.

Sandra had been invited to a party at the FIDF Hall and, after finishing her waitressing shift at the Malvina House Hotel, she picked up her friend Alba Bastias and left her car at home after collecting a bottle of wine. Sandra and Alba were approaching Stanley Services when she was hit.

"It was very busy that night but it was easy to see the cars coming because you could see the lights," Sandra told the Penguin News. "Then I felt a very big bang.

"It hit me on the right side, on my arm. I can't remember very well but I think it pushed Alba by the side as well, and then I fell down in the road.

"It came from behind and carried on. It was just so quick. After that I was on the floor. I couldn't get up. There was pain in my arm and my head. I felt really dizzy. Alba was shaking. She didn't know what to do.

"The only thing I remember is that Alba said to me 'are you ok,

I'll go for help', and she was crying.

When she reached the hospital a nurse attended to her and rang the on-call doctor.

They went inside and called the doctor and the doctor didn't want to come to see me," said Sandra. "They gave me some ibuprofen and paracetamol, and told me to go home. The police were very helpful, but even they were surprised the doctor wouldn't come out."

Husband Derek, 41, said he

was appalled the doctor did not see his wife: "It was a road accident. And a head injury. I wouldn't be exaggerating if I said the lump on her head was the size of a hen egg. It was unreal. And it could have been worse.

"At least if the doctor had been there.

and seen her, then fine. But to make that judgment over the phone I find appalling.

Derek later lodged a complaint with Assembly Member Sharon Halford, who has passed on his concerns to Director of Health and Education David Jenkins.

Mr Jenkins said: "Mrs Short's condition was assessed following the normal head injury protocol. The on-call doctor confirmed

the course of action that he felt was appropriate. Although she had a large bruise there were no other serious injuries and she was in a satisfactory condition to be allowed to go home.

'lt was entirely reasonable that Mrs Short's condition was assessed by the senior staff nurse on duty and that appropriate clinical decisions were made.'

Cllr Halford said she was horrified that a hit-and-run could happen in the Falklands: "It is shocking to think we have had that sort of incident in the first place."

Despite Sandra and Derek's traumatic experience, they made an emotional plea to the driver of the vehicle which struck her.

"I would say to the driver to have a little more conscience, think about what he's done," said Sandra. "I had a bottle of wine in a bag

and the bottle knocked against the car when it knocked me over, so he must have heard the noise.

We all make mistakes, and if that night he was drunk or he was scared about what he'd done, he should realise. What happened could be worse, and he could do it to somebody else."

Derek said: "If anybody knows something please come forward with any information you may have, and don't withhold it.'

Detective Sergeant Dave Street said: "We would urge the driver of the vehicle to come forward and make themselves known. If your readers can assist that would be very helpful.

ONE of the really good things about teaching in a small community like the Falklands is that you get to see the end product in adulthood. I am very proud of most of the human "products" of Darwin Boarding School and am sure that Jan Cheek feels the same, sitting as she now does at the same council table as two of her former pupils: the Honourable Emma Edwards and the equally Honourable Glenn Ross.

There was a touch of teacherly pride in Cllr Cheek's commendation of the work done by Cllr Edwards at the UN's New Caledonia decolonisation seminar. I was in agreement, up to the point where Cllr Edwards' remarks about independence had me shouting at the radio.

New Caledonia enjoys a unique status: it has an increasingly autonomous local government called the Territoral Congress, which will be entitled to hold a referendum on full independence, anytime it chooses after 2014. Until then, New Caledonia remains part of the French Republic; its inhabitants are French citizens, carry French passports and take part in French elections. In the eighties, I once landed in the capital Noumea to find the airport crawling with French marines and helicopters. They were there to put down a revolt calling for independence.

At the time, I was on my way to the Republic of Kiribati (formerly the Gilbert Islands) which, though economically a basket case swarming with more aid agencies than a dog has fleas, gained independence from the UK in 1979, is now a full member of the Commonwealth of Nations, the IMF and the World Bank and, since 1999, has had its own seat at the United Nations.

My point is that self-determination takes different forms and can be difficult to understand. However, the natural aspiration of any separate people, which is what we have to convince the Argentines that we are according to Jan Cheek recently, must surely be independence, however far off or difficult to achieve it may seem.

In the case of the Falklands, it seems to me and to many others but obviously not to Cllr Edwards speaking on our behalf - that the mere utterance of independence as the ultimate goal for the Falklands, could go a long way to achieve the magic of allowing the British Government, the Argentines and ourselves to be extricated from the trap of history without losing face.

Promoting a healthy view of democracy

COUNCILLOR Emma Edwards returned to the Falklands last Thursday after promoting the Islands' "healthy democracy" to a UN seminar in New Caledonia attended by delegates from around the world.

A key objective of the seminar was to help the Special Committee on Decolonisation – the "Committee of 24" – to assess progress towards decolonisation.

Although little progress on decolonisation had been made in the past ten years, with only the host territory expressing a wish to become a new nation, the occasion offered an opportunity for Cllr Edwards to re-emphasise the wishes of Falklands residents to an international audience.

She said Islanders had repeatedly expressed their firm view that they were content with their current status, and noted that for a variety of reasons the alternative options of full independence, free association or integration with an independent state were "not suitable" for the Islands.

Cllr Edwards told delegates: "We are happy with the status quo, and do not like being told by others what to do. The Falkland Islands are currently not ready for independence, but we do express our right of self-determination with almost all of the people of the Falkland Islands wishing to remain and enjoy our British Overseas Territory status."

Cllr Edwards also outlined key aspects of the Islands' "healthy democracy." She said these included the November election, the new Constitution of January 2009, and "enhanced local democracy, establishing a greater degree of internal self-government and providing mechanisms for transparency and accountability."

She said while the Falklands had, like elsewhere, been affected by the global financial crisis, its economy remained strong.

The seminar was held from May 18-20. On her journey home via London Cllr Edwards attended the State Opening of Parliament, together with Falkland Islands Government Representative Sukey Cameron, and a reception hosted by the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association.

Child rape charge to be heard by Supreme Court

MATTHEW John Newton (23) on Wednesday appeared before court to face charges including rape, rape of a child under 13 and sexual activity with children. The offences were alleged to have taken place between May 2005 and September 2008. Senior Magistrate John Trevaskis said the matter would be referred to the Supreme Court, and adjourned the case until July 28. Mr Newton was released on conditional bail.

Two offences of common assault, committed against his former partner, cost Delroy Kevin Leo (20) a total of £980 in the Senior Magistrate's Court on Wednesday. Mr Leo was fined £300 for the first assault and £500 for the second, both occuring during April. Mr Trevaskis warned Mr Leo he had narrowly avoided a custodial sentence. He ordered him to pay £100 compensation to the victim and £80 prosecution costs.

Adrian Minnell, who had previously denied drink driving, said during a pre-trial review on Tuesday he might be forced to represent himself, as he had been unable to obtain legal representation. Mr Trevaskis adjourned the matter until today.

Deminers prepare to farewell the Islands

MORE than six months since the sight of groups of Zimbabwean deminers strolling the streets of Stanley or shopping in the West Store had become commonplace, the first demining project in the Falklands since 1982 is now over.

Operations manager Roger Gagen of BACTEC (Battle Area Clearance, Training, Equipment and Consultancy) says all the Lebanese deminers returned home to warmer climes in April, as did the majority of the Zimbabweans.

Four Zimbabwean deminers and Roger himself remained to complete the location and clearance of the final panel of 16 antitank mines at Surf Bay.

This work was carried out using a combination of an armoured excavator, operated by Bruce Humphreys, and manual clearance techniques using mine detectors operated by the Zimbabwean deminers.

The last mine was finally located and successfully cleared last Thursday.

Also remaining in the Islands but due to leave on June 11 has been Robin Swanson, Director of the Falkland Islands Demining Programme Office (DPO).

The DPO has been responsible for overseeing BACTEC's work and testing to ensure it conformed with rigorous international mine action standards.

As Robin explained to the Penguin News, the separation of the company doing the clearance from the company ensuring compliance and quality was normal procedure in commercial demining. As BACTEC has finished the clearance of each of the four task sites, they have been handed over to DPO for quality assurance check-

ing before being handed back to the Falkland Islands Government, guaranteed mine and ordnance free.

Robin said the environmental aspects of the demining programme had been a major concern of his office, which had worked closely with the Environmental Planning Department to devise a remediation plan for the Sapper Hill and Surf Bay sites.

Three separate approaches were tried, with the aim of finding the best method of returning the disturbed ground to a condition where nature would do the rest.

On the Surf Bay minefield, they had been keen not to break the dunes if possible and, although the final panel had been close to the fence, they managed to avoid breaking through into the beach area.

A total of 190 recorded mines were located and disposed of at Sapper Hill, as well as two British cluster "bomblets." At Goose Green and Fox bay no mines were found but the clearance operation had proved the sites to be ordnance free.

At Surf Bay which, with more than 1,000 anti-tank and anti-personnel mines, was one of the most heavily mined areas resulting from the Argentine occupation, some of the mines were found buried up to 4m deep in the sand. Should there be future demining operations, it is reassuring that the records made by the Argentine forces who laid the mines have been accurate.

Speaking as a former Royal Engineer, who has both cleared mines and laid them in the past, Mr Swanson said any military force laying mines did so expecting they would themselves have to lift them at some stage.

He discounted as highly improbable the rumours that mines were scattered out of aircraft. Apart from any other considerations, he said, there would be no guarantee that they would land the right way up to be effective.

Roger Gagen described the project as an overall success, with a number of challenges, including the weather, overcome with the help of FIG, colleagues on the Islands and especially the community, who he praised for their hospitality towards the Zimbabwean and Lebanese deminers.

The deminers, he said, adapted well to the Falklands environment and worked assiduously to complete the project.

A final public confidence demonstration will be staged at Surf Bay at 12.15pm today.

All customers will be given a 10 per cent refund on their monthly package charge for the coming month.

FLH wool sales

ALL the FLH wool has now been cored and test results are awaited for bales which have been interlotted with other farms. Apart from a lot of 23 bales of hogget wool, the remaining wools are all low value oddments. Total gross value of all unsold wools is estimated at £20,000 and wool sales to date have grossed £984,000.

Appeal fund

CHILE Earthquake Appeal funds totalling more than £26,600 are to be directed towards building 800 houses in the stricken town of Lolol in Colchagua Province. Fund organiser Celia Short thanked Islanders for their "fantastic" support and said she would report back on how the funds were being spent.

Rockhopper holds fire on results of latest exploration

INVESTORS waiting breathlessly for an evaluation of the size and quality of the oil discovery made in Falkland Islands waters by exploration company Rockhopper may have to wait a little longer.

On May 19 the company announced its Sea Lion well had been successfully suspended for future testing and announced that results would be available within 10-15 days.

Wednesday's trading saw Rockhoppers's share price take a switchback ride before levelling 10% down. The company said it was aware of significant share price movement, but knew of no reason for it. They blamed "air transport logistics difficulties for a delay in the analysis of oil quality."

However, the directors said, they had no reason at present to believe the outcome of the analysis would not meet their expectations with regard to potential resources.

The report added that a sample of oil from the shallowest oil sand in the well was subjected to a preliminary test in Stanley, which indicated a medium grade crude, broadly in line with the directors' expectations.

Meanwhile, the Ocean Guardian rig has passed into the hands of BHP Billiton and has been towed to the East Falklands Basin. The new well, Toroa, is described as having the potential to be a big discovery, which could yield up to 1.7 billion barrels of oil.

BHP Billiton's partner in this well, and the original owner of Licence PL15, in which it now has a 49% interest, is Falkland Oil and Gas Ltd (FOGL), who announced that the Toroa F61/5-1 exploration well was spudded on Monday.

The well is being drilled to an estimated target depth of 2,700m. Drilling is expected to take about 35 days and the company says a further announcement will be made once it is completed.

How budget hits families

LAST week we offered some verv immediate calculations on the effect budget proposals would have on families, which were kindly sent in by a reader.

As might be expected due to the extreme haste with which they were prepared, a more leisurely examination has shown some errors and some miscalculation, but the general premise remains the same, namely that the fiscal elements of this budget favour most the higherearning sectors of this community.

While there will be a delay before some of the elements of the new budget will come into play, the assumptions on which our revised calculations are based deal only with those elements which have to do with income tax, where the threshold has been dropped from £14,000 to £12,000, but rates remain the same, the re-imposed Medical Services Levy at 1% of gross income, Family Allowances at £60 per month, but not meantested and now taxable, and contributions towards retirement pensions (RPC), which have gone up from £12.50 per week to £13.50 per week. We have ignored the increased service charge as this is more or less universal, except for pensioners who only pay half.

On this basis, we find that a couple, who both work, earning £45,000 gross, will be £1,041 or 2.3% worse off, while a similar couple earning £61,000 between them will lose only £428 or 0.7% of their present earnings.

Worst off of all, in percentage terms, if we survey only families of four, are the couple earning £31,000 with one parent staying home to look after the children. They will end up £946 or 3.1% worse off. If both parents work, earning £31,000 between them, their reduction on present net earnings is £848 or 2.7%.

It would seem also that taking away the means test for Family Allowances, but making it taxable, may be a bit of a two-edged sword.

By our calculations, a working couple with no children eligible for child allowance, who earn £31,000 between them, end up only £14 better off per year than a couple with the same earnings receiving Family Allowance of £702 per year for their two children.

Our budget guide to where the money goes

GOVERNMENT plans to spend about £42.5 million on our behalf this year. If you wonder where it all goes, read on...

ON Friday afternoon members of the Legislative Assembly returned to the Town Hall's Court and Council Chamber for the final reading of the Appropriation Bill.

When asked to report on the Bill by the Speaker of the House, Director of Corporate Resources Keith Padgett began by saying that the proposals he had put before the House on Monday had been accepted, except for some small adjustments.

The total appropriation by government for the next year would therefore remain at $\pounds 42,414,800$, which it was expected would result in a budget deficit of $\pounds 1million$.

Complete details of government's planned expenditure for the year will be available to the public, when the government's Budget Book is published shortly.

In the meantime, the following gives the main items listed by the Director of Public Resources in his speech to the House:

ELSEWHERE we have looked at the impact on families and individuals caused by the change to the income tax threshold and the reintroduction of the Family Allowance. With all the budget proposals accepted and announced, we look at other items affecting the pounds in our pockets:

£ An extra 34 pence on a packet of 20 cigarettes, 72 pence on 50 grammes of tobacco and 32 pence on a litre of spirits.

£ Licence for a Land Rover or Shogun up from £109.50 to £110.25.

£ Vehicle registration, drivers licence, driving test and firearms licence also increased by 0.7 percent.

£ General rent increase of 5% for government houses. Rent rebates also increased by 5%. No

increase in cost of communal heating, where applicable.

£ Water charges up by 3%

£ Domestic property service charge is increased to £396. 50% reduction for pensioners.

Electricity price is reduced by 1p per unit to 16.5 pence per unit from 1 July 2010.

£ Standard airmail letter up to 70p. No change for local postage rates or overseas surface mail but Christmas cards special rate stopped.

£ 1% cost of living award to all government officers from July 1.

£ Retirement Pension contributions. Employer and employee rates up to £13.50 per week, self-employed rate to £27.00.

£ Pension payments, including retirement, public service pensions and Falkland Landholdings pensions are increased by 1%.

£ Christmas Bonus still to be paid to pensioners in receipt of a retirement or ex-gratia pension residing in the Falkland Islands.

£ Winter fuel allowance for pensioners continues with 1% income threshold increase.

£ All welfare allowances, attendance allowances and fostering allowances are up by 1%.

£ Family allowance stays at £60 per month for each child, with no means testing from July 1, but taxable from the start of the new tax year in January 2011.

 \pounds A weekly allowance of £30 to all Further Education students with no means testing.

Taxing time for every one of us

I NOTE you made no mention of the 1.5 per cent proposed Employment Tax on Employers in your budget proposals review (Penguin News, May 28).

Call it what one likes - a tax on wages paid by employers is a tax on employment and nothing less, whatever it may be for.

Of course we as people need to contribute towards health care - user pays. Therefore I hope by the end of the budget debate it will be altered so that we as individuals do all the contributing - be it in a percentage of our incomes and/ or some direct charges like prescriptions, etc. (with relevant groups exempted).

Ideally every adult, whether in work or not, could pay an initial sum of say £5 per week and then an earnings percentage afterwards.

UK has deliberately shied away from a proposed employment tax increase plan, as they realise you need to create jobs to move the economy forward. Tax jobs and employers look to employ fewer people - not more.

Employment taxes hit the primary producers hard. They have less impact on say retailers and wholesalers. It hits hotels and restaurants who have a large wage cost as part of the product you buy. They need lots of staff to produce the beds or meals, etc.

It hits the primary production industry very hard, as they also need lots of labour input to grow/ produce the product, and here they are limited: fisheries are mostly offshore so out of the tax reach: Camp agriculture and FIMCo are already struggling financially at best; market gardening - ditto above – and the biggest cost of producing crops is in labour.

POSSIBLY the only surprise about the budget is that it came as a surprise to anyone.

For those employers complaining about the reintroduction of a medical services levy, I can give an assurance that it was the least grim of all the options that we considered.

No-one took the decision without careful thought after weighing up the advice received.

There are no miracle fixes for the economic problems that we share with most of the world.

While the continuing search for a commercial oil find is encouraging, even if it happens, we are years from any significant boost to the economy. Those who can will have to pass that increase in costs onto the local public - so we get inflation and back to square one.

Missing Links

Those who cannot pass on the costs will have to consider reducing staff and downsizing to just a basic core business.

I am all for contributing to our health care, but let's have it done by the users - us as individuals. **Tim Miller**



Writer claims '82 ships sunk with aid of Russians

strategic information for

A RUSSIAN author claims the sinking by Argentina of HMS Sheffield, HMS Coventry and the Atlantic Conveyor during the 1982 war was achieved with assistance from Soviet satellites in orbit over the South Atlantic.

Journalist and researcher Sergey Briley says Russia launched a Kosmos 1365 satellite on May 15 1982, positioning it over the South Atlantic to provide strategic information to the Argentines about the British Task Force

Brilev cites top Soviet military officers from the eighties - General Nikolai Leonov, who was then head of KGB analytical services. and General Valentin Varennikov, first deputy chief of Soviet forces in Moscow - as confirming the provision of regular intelligence aid to the Argentines.

He argues Moscow assisted the Argentines and their most 'anti-communist'' leader General Leopoldo Galtieri, in spite of the risks of a world conflict because of Soviet support in a war involving a NATO member. The detection of the Sheffield by

Neptune aircraft, and its subsequent sinking by Mirages and Exocet missiles, claims Briley, was "too patriotic" an explanation by the Argentines, given the Neptune was already old and had serious maintenance problems.

spent most of his youth in Latinamerica, Cuba, Ecuador and Uruguay.

Currently deputy director of Rossiya Television, RTR, he says it was intriguing that the launch of the Kosmos satellite occurred at the height of the war and a month and a half after Argentina landed in the Falklands.

And he says Soviet support was not limited to satellite intelligence. Brilev states that the Soviets used TU-95 intelligence gathering aircraft to follow the British Task Force as it sailed south in an area from the Gulf of Biscay

to the Equator. He says Soviet Colonel Georguiy Bulbenkov confirmed his participation as a pilot in these operations, sometimes flying as

low as 40 metres above the Royal Navy vessels.

In an effort to pinpoint the powerbrokers behind the

Russian spying missions, Briley pursued Mikhail Gorbachov, who in the eighties was a member of the Communist Party Political Bureau which made all major strategic decisions.

Sergey Brilev

Gorbachov, however, denied the claim, saying: "There was never a decision from the Central Committee to collaborate with the Argentine military Junta.

But Briley concludes that in the

early eighties the Soviet Union power structure was already under strain, and the strategic aid was a decision of the generals at military command level as a logical support

for "the enemy of my enemy." He recalls that only two countries did not join the 1979 USsponsored international embargo on the Soviet Union. They were Argentina and Uruguay and, says Brilev: "The military were very thankful for that."

He says also the Falklands conflict will be remembered as "the first armed incident of a major dispute in Antarctica."

After visits to the Argentine. Chilean, British and Russian Antarctic institutes, Brilev suggests: "In a couple of decades we'll be facing a situation where the traditional sources of minerals and energy will be exhausted - and the last great important reserves are in the Antarctic continent.

"That is why the Falklands, as I see it, will be considered a first major conflict over Antarctica.

The Falklands, after all, are the natural and privileged gate to Antarctica

FALKLANDS Conservation, in association with retail outlets around Stanley, is continuing the campaign trail to try to reduce the number of plastic bags used in the Islands.

In recent months stores have had a variety of schemes to encourage us to use canvas, cotton and jute shopping bags rather than "grab the plastic" and there have been great improvements. But as a final push to get shoppers into the Bag for Life habit once and for all Falklands Conservation is

It's a simple scheme. • Think before you grab a bag. Do you really need a bag to carry your sandwich and drink the 15 metres from the shop to your car?




Did you know?

13 BILLION plastic bags are given away in shops each year in the UK. That's 216 for every person in the country. If the statistics were similar in the Falklands our total would be 648,000. However if you go to three different outlets each day to do your shopping and take a plastic bag from each shop you would use 1,095 bags a year, taking our Islands total to 3,285,000!

In India plastic bag pollution is such a problem that people can be jailed for up to seven years for using a plastic carrier bag. For every square mile of ocean there are 46,000 plastic bags floating on the surface.

In South Africa there are so many plastic bags littering the countryside they have become known as the National Flower. A Minke whale was washed up on a beach in France and

was found to have over 2lbs of plastic bags in its stomach.








Police chief praised for softly softly approach

RECENTLY appointed Police Chief Gary Finchett has earned glowing praise from the councillor appointed to oversee the Community Safety portfolio.

Earlier this year Mr Finchett took overall responsibility for Police, Customs and Immigration, Fire and Rescue and the FIDF, as the government's new Director of Community Safety.

And he believes both police presence on the streets and work behind the scenes are reaping dividends.

In a report to mark his first five months in the job, he said: "Already, Heads of Service have found substantial efficiency savings without reducing the level of service provided to the public, and this work needs to continue to ensure we are as effective as we can be, bearing in mind public finances are extremely tight."

Mr Finchett said his priorities included increasing public confidence in the police, responding effectively to people when they were in need, preventing and investigating crime and disorder, protecting vulnerable people and effectively managing serious incidents.

Police officers, he said, were focusing on reducing the number of serious and fatal road traffic eollisions, reducing crime and repeat incidents of anti-social behaviour and increasing the volume of crimes detected.

He also urged the public to help police and other emergency services make the Islands even safer by reporting crime and suspicious incidents, and by taking personal responsibility for their own safety and that of others.

This included driving at slower speeds and wearing a seatbelt at all times, enjoying alcohol responsibly, letting someone know when travelling in remote areas, and carrying some means of communication where practicable.

"People here feel safe and have every right to do so," said Mr Finchett.

"Serious crime is very rare and, with the support of the community, we identify and deal with offenders quickly. However, there can be no room for complacency regarding community safety."

Much of his efforts have focused also on restoring confidence among police officers and staff who, he admitted, have "had some knocks" in recent times.

He told the Penguin News yesterday: "It has been mainly about engaging the staff in the things we are doing. They know how to do the job better than 1.

"I think it's been about providing strong leadership and setting strong expectations of them. It's about vocation of service. They want to serve and protect the community.

"It's about restoring their pride and enhancing their confidence. It's about trust, and we have to earn that." He also emphasised the need for the public to assist the police, not only through reporting crime, but also by getting to know his officers and staff, and discussing general issues of concern.

"People will always ring the police when they are in need," he said. "But I want them to ring us when they don't need to. We want to foster that trust. It seems at the minute to be working well."

Cllr Gavin Short said: "In his own very quiet way Gary has transformed the Royal Falkland Islands Police into a happy and fully-functioning unit which is visible and approachable.

"I am also very impressed at how quickly Gary has got a handle on the functioning of the other three departments for which he has responsibility, although I am pleased to say that in each case he has been fortunate to take on well run departments headed by dedicated staff."

Prior to joining the Falkland Islands Government, Mr Finchett served for 31 years as a police officer in the Cheshire Constabulary in the UK, rising to the rank of Chief Superintendent as Area Commander for Warrington, Widnes and Runcorn.

Now living in East Stanley with his partner Alison, a nurse, he said: "You can see why so many people choose to live, visit and work in these wonderful Islands.

"There is, literally, nowhere else like it on earth. People are extremely resilient, self sufficient and look out for each other here."

He said he would continue his visits to isolated settlements and would be interested to hear everyone's views on "what we can do together to make the Falkland Islands even safer."

THE so-called diddle-dee telegraph isn't always as informative as it pretends to be. Nor are some of its proponents as informed as they assume.

Baseless rumours predictably flew as soon as news broke of a hitand-run on Stanley Bypass late last Saturday night. Some leapt to the conclusion that the culprit must have been an outsider because, in their opinion, no "local" would be so heartless as to drive away.

When we interviewed the victim and she spoke of her distress at not being attended to by the on-call doctor, the diddle-dee perpetrators were at it again. This time they claimed the on-call doctor could not have been an Islander because only a "local" doctor would care sufficiently to attend to a patient out of hours.

Such comments are both ridiculous and callous. And they serve only to drive deeper the nasty wedge which some narrow-minded Islanders seem determined to perpetuate.

At the centre of this incident was a couple who were extremely distraught (not that they contributed to any of these remarks). Nevertheless, as the Director of Health and Education assured us, all relevant and appropriate hospital procedures were followed.

Some people may not agree with those procedures, but none of them was ignored. And, of course, everyone in the Falklands would dearly like to see more doctors employed. But that is a different issue altogether.

What this particular incident serves to highlight is not merely the shock of a hit-and-run, nor the inevitable anxiety of the victim or her family. It is sadly the knee-jerk reaction of those who assume they know best, yet rely on nothing more than their own flawed suppositions.

As I see it, those who jump to ill-informed conclusions, those who cast judgment on events upon which they have no direct knowledge, and those who spread malice with no consideration to those whose ears their rumours will inevitably reach, perform a gross disservice to these Islands.

The diddle-dee telegraph is a potent tool. It is usually reasonably accurate, and it can also be remarkably helpful. But when it serves merely as a portal for thoughtless and misinformed comment, directed at individuals or non-Islander groups all too often used as colloquial punchbags, it really should carry a warning: ignorant gossip can damage the good health of this community.

OAS hears bid on sovereignty

THE Argentine sovereignty claim over the Falkland Islands was once again raised at the 40th General Assembly of the Organisation of American States (OAS), which was held over two days in Peru and finished on Tuesday.

The OAS is made up of representatives of all the states of the Americas, with the exception of Honduras. The General Assembly, which was attended by the foreign ministers of the 35 or so participating states, including Hillary Clinton for the USA, adopted a lengthy declaration, designed to commit the member states to peace, security and cooperation.

At the fourth and last plenary session, Argentina's Foreign Minister Jorge Taiana said: "The Organisation of American States has considered this question to be a subject of permanent hemispheric interest," adding that the OAS had "reaffirmed the need of the gov-

All are then welcome to attend a civic reception at the Town Hall from 11.30am to 12.30pm. emments of the Argentine Republic and the United Kingdom to renew as soon as possible the negotiations on the dispute of sovereignty." He concluded: "Never has Argentina ceased to express the will to negotiate to find a peaceful solution."

Curiously, from the point of view of the Falkland Islands, and in the light of recent Argentine attempts to curtail our economic activity, Article 19 of the OAS Charter, which was reaffirmed in Lima, "establishes that no state or group of states has the right to intervene, directly or indirectly, for any reason whatever, in the internal or external affairs of any other state. The foregoing principle prohibits not only armed force but also any other form of interference or attempted threat against the personality of the state or against its political, economic, and cultural elements.

Typhoons in 'emergency'

TWO Typhoon Eurofighter jets and their Vickers VC10 refuelling tanker had to land in Punta Arenas last Wednesday when rapidly deteriorating weather prevented their safe return to to MPA.

An MoD spokesperson said the aircraft were on routine training activities before they were directed to Punta Arenas, a diversionary airport for MPA: "We are very grateful to both the Argentine Authorities and the Chilean Authorities for their cooperation and rapid response which ensured that this emergency was resolved swiftly and with no loss of life."

RAF officer awarded £16k

A FALKLANDS based RAF officer who claimed she was discriminated against when she was pregnant has been awarded more than £16,000 by an Employment Tribunal.

The UK tribunal found she suffered discrimination, and the force had unintentionally created "an intimidating, degrading, hostile or offensive environment for her." When the officer told her superiors she was 12 weeks pregnant, her request to stay in her desk-based job was rejected, despite her RAF officer husband also being based on the Islands.

She was ordered to return to the UK immediately, and forced to take leave to return to the Falklands so she could visit her husband during her pregnancy.

Poor yield

THE manager of Fitzroy reports mixed results from the potato crop and a very poor yield overall in comparison to previous years. He estimates the total crop this year will be about 15-20 tonnes (4.1-5.5t/ha), compared to 60 tonnes (16.5t/ ha) the previous year.

Peter Millam

A FORMER Falklands Senior Anglican Chaplain died in the UK on Tuesday. The Reverend Peter J Millam, the son of a Falkland Islands mother, served in the Islands from 1966-1970.

THE positive outcome of the preliminary testing of Rockhopper Exploration's Sea Lion well appears to have prompted a flurry of activity in the financial markets and the boardrooms of oil companies involved, as well as in the South Atlantic itself.

Estimates of the size of its Sea Lion prospect increased last week by 72 million barrels to a potential 242 million barrels recoverable, prompting media speculation that this could be the biggest discovery of its kind since the North Sea.

With shares in their company soaring over 52% on Friday and having risen over 500% in the past three months, Rockhopper went back to the stock market to finance its further drilling and testing programme, announcing on Tuesday that it had raised a further £48.5m through the issue of 17.3 million new shares at 280p each, just 10p below the closing price on Monday. This fundraising plan appeared to find favour with the market, which pushed the Rockhopper share price up to 293p

According to market analysts Stockopedia, the new funds will

provide Rockhopper with enough cash to complete its current drilling programme: £21m has reportedly been earmarked to flow test the Sea Lion well while £11m will be used to prove to the Falkland Islands Government that the company has the financial capacity to carry out work on the Sea Lion and forthcoming Ernest wells.

A further £16.5m is said to have been allocated for operational contingency, technical and engineering studies and working capital.

Desire Petroleum, the pioneer oil exploration company, which is also focused on the North Falkland Basin and shares some prospects with Rockhopper as its junior partner, has taken heart from the Sea Lion discovery. This renewed confidence is evidently shared by the stock market as Desire shares also have risen to almost their former height, before somewhat disappointing results from their own first drilling at the start of the present campaign caused them to dip sharply.

This week, shareholders at the Desire's annual meeting this week were told: "The Sea Lion discovery is very exciting, discovering oil in a good quality sandstone reservoir. This has significantly derisked oil exploration, particularly on the eastern flank of the basin where Desire has a strong acreage position.

"Desire has identified a number of potential sandstone fans of the same type as Sea Lion, including the Rachel, Ninky and Anna prospects. It is now Desire's intention to drill the Rachel prospect as its next well, subject to all the necessary approvals, when the rig returns to Desire later in the year."

Though operating in a different basin to the south of the Falklands, global oil and minerals exploration giant BHP Billiton and partner Falkland Oil & Gas Ltd. (FOGL) have used the Ocean Guardian semi-submersible rig to spud their first exploration well, Toroa, on May 31.

It is estimated it will take some 35 days to reach the well's target depth around 2,700m. The companies are targeting what they estimate to be a 1.7 billion barrel prospect with operator BHP Billiton having a 51% stake and FOGL the remainder.

Chilean flight fears allayed

APPEALS to veterans of the Falklands War not to arrive in the Islands this weekend, which have been made by the ultra nationalistic Argentine website El Malvinense, appear to have led to growing, but baseless fears in the Islands about alteration or even interruption to the weekly LAN flight between Mount Pleasant and Punta Arenas.

This Saturday, as on every second Saturday of every month since the 1999 Joint Declaration between the Argentine and British governments, the incoming LAN flight will make a stop at Rio Gallegos, and next week a similar stop will be made by the outgoing flight; the original purpose of this rather strange scheduling being to allow Argentine next-of-kin visitors to come to the Islands without the necessity of travelling via Santiago. On many weeks this stop and the return stop on the following week sees no passengers embarking or disembarking.

But the writer of an article posted on the bellicose El Malvinense website says: "According to unofficial sources, Argentine war veterans will be on this flight, who have decided to travel on this date because they have received information from LAN employees that this will be the last flight to the Islands to stop in Rio Gallegos."

The prime purpose of the website article was to warn Argentine veterans that by arriving this weekend, before the celebration on Monday of the anniversary of liberation of the Islands from Argentine occupation, they might unwittingly find themselves being used as tools of British propaganda. But the "unofficial sources" quoted, together with the tense climate created by the Argentine Government's recent attempts to isolate the Falklands, appear to have had a secondary effect.

Intentionally or not, their comments have cast doubts about the continuation of the Rio Gallegos stop and, by extension, the whole LAN service.

The Penguin News has received a number of calls recently, principally from members of the Islands' Chilean community, worried that their only direct link with home and family might be under threat. Jennie Forrest, proprietor of the local LAN agency, International Tours and Travel, said her office had taken a number of calls, but she assured the Penguin News that the Rio Gallegos stops and the LAN service itself would continue.

Midwinter madness beckoning

WITH just over a week to go, there isn't much time to get ready for the Midwinter Swim, which kicks off at Surf Bay on June 19.

If you are brave enough to take part, be at the beach to register before 11am and to qualify for your certificate of lunacy signed by the Governor. There is no entry fee, but as this is a fundraising event for the Lighthouse Seamen's Centre and Stanley Sea Cadets, everyone is encouraged to raise some sponsorship or make a donation when registering.

Argentines deported

TEN suspected football hooligans from Argentina have been deported by South African police, who say they were planning to disrupt the World Cup. The men, identified as members of the notorious "Barrabravas" gang, were arrested at Johannesburg airport and found to be on an entry blacklist.

"Intelligence indicated these persons would commit acts of public disorder, engage in acts of violence and provoke conflict with certain fans of opponent teams and other groups from Argentina during the World Cup," a police spokesman said. THIS weekend we remember those who restored our freedom and whose courage and sacrifice allow us to live at peace.

Everyone has a different way of remembering, be it formal ceremonial, celebration or quiet reflection. I would not want disagreement over the conduct of memorials to sour these poignant and solemn occasions.

I was privileged, a few years ago, to host the mothers of two very young members of 3 Para who were killed in the last days of the war. It had taken 25 years for them to come and see where their sons died.

The courage and humour with which they joined some of their sons' old comrades on a visit to Mount Longdon reemphasised how important these visits are.

I'm happy that plans are already underway for a different set of visits to mark the thirtieth anniversary of our liberation. Seeing the recent

commemorations of the evacuation of Dunkirk reinforced my belief that we do well to remember those involved in such extraordinary events, not least because of what we can learn from them.

However, most years at least one or two will recognise our right to self determination and if we did not attend, the large Argentine contingent would simply present their distorted version of history in pursuit of their attempt to colonise our country. Public at last reclaims the dunes of Surf Bay

WITH no hesitation, the 30 or so men, women and children who had put off their lunch to be present, followed the Governor into the former minefield, at the conclusion of the final demining public confidence demonstration, which was held at Surf Bay on Friday.

Described by Robin Swanson of the Demining Programme Office as having been by far the most complex and difficult task of the recent campaign, where people now walked and children scampered, had once been one of the most densely mined areas in the Falklands, with more than 1,000 landmines and three different types of terrain, from peat through to shallow sand and deep sand dunes. In the shallow sand area, some of the mines were buried up to 40cm deep because

of the accumulation of sand over the years. In the dunes the situation was worse, with mines at the 1982 level now up to 4m beneath the surface and requiring the use of an armoured mechanical excavator to locate them. Mr Swanson says although this pilot phase has only reduced the number of mines buried in the Islands by five per cent, and much less in terms of area, the UK Government will now have a much better understanding of the challenges presented by the remaining 113 or so mined areas.

Badminton players to serve up a celebration

SATURDAY'S Liberation Dance at the Town Hall will revive many cherished memories for past and present members of Stanley Badminton Club, as the fundraiser is celebrating the club's 60th anniversary.

The club (SBC) was founded, with the approval of Stanley Town Council, on June 28 1950 under the chairmanship of Bert Livermore, and players met in the old gymnasium on Ross Road.

SBC became an associate member of the International Badminton Federation (IBF) in September 1956 at a cost of ten shillings per year membership fee, and has continued as a member ever since.

The IBF is now known as the Badminton World Federation and membership has risen to US\$200 per year.

BWF has evidence in their archives that badminton was played in the Islands as early as 1907, and the forerunner to SBC, the Falkland Islands Defence Force Badminton Club, was founded in 1929.

This club was still running when the SBC was formed in 1950 and friendly matches between the two clubs were often held.

In 1959 Nick Hadden established a badminton club at Goose Green to which Stanley Badminton Club donated a net and shuttlecocks.

The SBC has continued to run apart from a break in 1982 during the Argentine occupation, when the town was put under curfew and the occupying forces took over the gymnasium.

From first forming, the SBC hosted an annual midwinter fancy dress ball, which was a very popular event in Stanley's social calendar until the 1990s.

Rosemarie King is the longest serving member, having joined the club in 1972. However, Rene

Rowlands, who sadly passed away on June 28 2008, 58 years to the day from the club first being formed, had been one of the founding members and was actively involved in the club, having been elected life president in the 1990s, until she took ill shortly before her death.

Rene received a meritorious award from the IBF in 1986 and was invited to attend the IBF AGM in Guatemala in 1993. She then went on to the Isle of Wight that same year to support the Falklands team in their first competition in the Island Games, at which her son Neil was competing.

SBC has competed at every Island Games since the Falklands team first attended in 1993, apart from Gibraltar in 1995 and in 2007 when Rhodes did not hold a badminton event. However, a badminton competition was hosted by Greenland that year where SBC was represented.

A young team went to the Commonwealth Youth Games in Pune, India, in 2008 and a team will be going to the Commonwealth Games in Delhi, India in October this year. As well as representing the club in Delhi in October, and at numerous Island Games, Doug Clark has represented the club at the Commonwealth Games in Kuala Lumpur in 1998 with Bill Chater (although Bill was injured and didn't get to play) and also in Manchester in 2002 with Chris Eynon.

The club is fortunate to be able to bring a professional coach to the Islands this week. Rebecca Pantaney, a Commonwealth Games gold medal winner, will be here on her fourth visit to work with both the team and other younger members of the club to help develop the sport within the younger generation.

SBC would like to thank Commonwealth Games Federation, Falklands Holdings and Caribbean Alliance Insurance Company for their sponsorship, without which Rebecca's visits would not be possible.

Worse paid will be worse off

IN last week's article "How budget hits families" it was interesting to see examples of how the tax changes would affect the higher paid. Earnings of £31,000 to £61,000 were illustrated showing how those sample taxpayers would be worse off by percentages ranging from 0.7% to 3.1%.

However, the lower paid are more adversely affected in percentage terms and obviously in money terms since they have lower earnings to begin with.

For example, an employed person with annual earnings of £14,000 and in receipt of, say, one child allowance of £720 pays no tax now other than retirement pension contributions (RPC) of £650.

With no other income, disposable income is therefore £14,070.

Next year, following the combination of a reduction in the personal tax allowance, bringing the child allowance into the tax net, the reintroduction of MSL and the increase in RPC, disposable income in that example will reduce by a further £614 to £13,456 or 4.4% worse off. I'm sure Members of the Legislative Assembly were aware of all of the effects of the tax changes before making the decisions.

However, it does appear to be a severe hit for lower paid individuals with children, in particular at a time when the cost of tax free holiday credits for earners of all levels is still being met from the public purse and where £450,000 has been allocated in 2010/11 for that purpose (about £130,000 more than the total annual cost of family allowances)!

FIG Environmental Studies Budget 2010/11

The Falkland Islands Government provides funding to help people in the Falkland Islands to conduct activities which benefit and enhance the environment. Anyone can apply for assistance from the Environmental Studies Budget, including owners and managers of land, non-government organisations and international scientists that conduct research and conservation activities in the Falkland Islands.

Projects eligible for ESB funding must assist in the management or enhancement of the biodiversity of the Falkland Islands. Priority will be given to initiatives addressing the key three themes of the 'Falkland Islands Biodiversity Strategy', which are: environmental research, on-ground action and education.

The ESB has a formal application and decision making process with the Environmental Committee responsible for the allocation of funds. This year all the available funds will be allocated in one round in July 2010.

The deadline for applications is **Monday 21st June 2010**. The application form can be obtained from the Environmental Planning Department. Applicants are encouraged to discuss proposed projects with the EPD Environmental Officer prior to submission and he can also help draft your application. Where possible, some level of co-funding or inkind costs (e.g. labour, equipment) is desirable.

A little less conversation

A FEW issues ago. I wrote about the big Falklands debate, or rather the lack of it.

I was not taking a personal position one way or the other about oil exploration in the South Atlantic, but – somewhat provocatively, I suppose – I did mention the strangely coincidental massive oil disaster in the Gulf of Mexico (which continues as I write) and the discovery of oil in Falklands waters.

It seemed strange to me then, and seems strange still, that that there was and is so little debate about whether oil is a good or bad thing for the Falklands.

This is despite the fact that the tourism, meat and fish industries rely heavily on the Falklands "brand" of unsullied freshness.

This is an image that is strong now but would be immediately and perhaps fatally devalued on first sight of an oil slick.

If there is a debate, it is a curiously sterile one. Perhaps it takes place behind closed doors, although I can see no reason for secrecy: both loving the seductive promises of oil and hating its duplicity are perfectly understandable sentiments.

In most parts of the world, opinions about such issues are openly polarised. On one side of an environmental/industrial

argument, a minority will loudly argue the case against a development that may have potential environmental impact, while on the other side a group will argue that risks, if there are any, are worth taking because of the wealth they may bring to a community.

Newspapers take sides. So do politicians. International bodies like Greenpeace and the WWF add their weight. People lobby their governmental representatives and even take to the streets if they have to. But, as I say, the Falklands debate, if there is one, is curiously sterile. In response to my original piece, a representative of Falkland Conservation put pen to paper, and explained to me and other Penguin News readers that the group does engage with the government on issues of risk to the environment, but they do it quietly and rationally.

That approach, they believe, works better than megaphone protests and blanket opposition. I am sure these dialogues occur,

and they may work.

But it does seem that "Conservation" (as the group is known in the Falklands) has accepted that oil development should not be broadly opposed.

Perhaps they are choosing to fight only the battles they can win, a position in which there is some wisdom, but. I regret to say, little glory.

I commend the writer of the letter for his non-inflammatory response which, I'm afraid. I may fail to match. But, again, the letter brings to mind that word: sterile.

There seemed to be no passion of the type that one sees in other parts of the world when conservation butts up against business.

Correct me. please, if I am wrong, but I believe that some of the research work conducted by the main conservation body in the Falklands is funded by the Falkland Islands Government.

That being so, it would be understandable if Conservation avoided open conflict with FIG. Conservation may be right, and environmental protestors the

world over may be wrong. Perhaps it is best to pursue environmental goals through behind-the-scenes influence. But it is a peculiarly quiet, even secretive, way of working.

Despite the letter writer's suggestion that anyone can join Conservation and influence its policies, the organisation still seems somewhat elitist.

Perhaps that is a public relations issue that they should work on.

I was a member of Falkland Conservation for some years, but left it because I felt that I had few opportunities for real involvement.

I did not seem to be wanted for any reason other than the motheaten contents of my wallet. I had joined when it was a populist, crusading movement, but it had evolved into a studious body in which there was no place for foot soldiers.

Perhaps the time is ripe for the creation of a lobby group which will provoke really exciting, loud, interesting and healthy argument.

Conservation could continue to get the science right, incrementally improving protection of species and habitats, while the new body takes a far more vocal position on the big issues, talking loudly and simply from the heart and the soul. **Graham.bound@btinternet.com** Also on Facebook

Gusty May reveals the sunny side of the stats

MAY was a dry, sunny but windy month with temperatures just above average, and much more sunshine than average. There were more gales and more days with gusts greater than 33 knots since MPA records began in 1986. **Temperature**

The mean maximum was 8.4 Celsius compared with an average for May of 7C. The highest temperature recorded was 12.3C on the 9th and the lowest maximum was 4.5C on the 30th. The mean minimum temperature was 3C, compared with the 2.2C average. The lowest minimum was -1C on the 26th and the highest minimum was 7.5C recorded on the 18th.

Rainfall

The total rainfall for the month was 19.9mm, much less than the 49.5mm average and significantly less than last year's total 105.4mm. The wettest day was the 18th with a total of 9mm. More than 0.1mm fell on 16 days and 1mm or more on eight days. Sunshine

There were 104.8 hours of sunshine, compared with the average of 83.4 hours. The highest daily total was 7.8 hours on the 9th.

Snow/Hail/Thunder/Fog There were six days when sleet or

snow fell and four days with hail, less than average for both. There were no days with fog and none with thunder.

Wind/Gales

The mean wind speed was 14.7 knots, against an average of 13.4. The highest hourly mean speed of 38 knots was on the 27th and the highest recorded gust of 54 knots also on the 27th. Gales occurred on six days and there were 21 days with gusts in excess of 33 knots.

According to the California Wine Institute, the Falklands boasts the ninth highest per capita wine consumption, with each resident gulping up to 60 litres per year over the five year period (2004-2008) of the survey. Top of the plops is the Vatican, with the Norfolk Islands, France, Luxembourg and Andorra making up the top five.

There was a quiet hush of concentration in the room as the women were so intent on their works of art, each producing at least one silk painting to take home with them.



Governor's right hand man bids a fond farewell to the Falklands

EAST Saturday's LAN flight saw the final departure from the Falklands of Government House First Secretary Paul Martinez and his wife Anne, after a week of farewells, both official and unofficial.

It is only just short of three years since Mr and Mrs Martinez arrived in July 2007, but it is probably fair to say that in that time they have made many friends here and their absence will be keenly felt.

Mr Martinez told the Penguin News he had very much enjoyed his time in the Falklands, listing among the professional highlights the visit of the Princess Royal when, in the absence of the Governor, he had to take on the role of Acting Governor and host.

Refusing to admit to any downsides to his stay here. Mr Martinez said among the best memories he would carry away with him was that of the "magical atmosphere" surrounding the 25th Anniversary of Liberation.

He had missed the early celebrations, but said the way in which the whole community had turned out to show their appreciation of the British veterans in November, in so many practical

ways, left a deep and lasting impression on him.

"It was an incredibly unifying experience," he said.

As a fluent Spanish speaker with previous Latin American experience, Mr Martinez played a crucial role in the Argentine nextof-kin visits. This involved much complex negotiation between three governments, the local military and the Families Commission. That it all went well, particularly the second visit, remains for Mr Martinez a matter of considerable satisfaction:

"To get that LAN flight off, five minutes early at the end of the second visit, was a fantastic achievement by everybody concerned," he said.

Another satisfying aspect of the event was that as a Spanish speaker Mr Martinez became something of a focal point for the Argentine media who accompanied the next-of-kin visits. This gave him the opportunity to put across the message that the Falklands was a separate democratic country and that there were areas like fisheries conservation where it would be to our mutual benefit to talk and cooperate, to journalists who maybe started out with a very different view.

Mr Martinez's replacement as First Secretary is recently-arrived Rik Nye, who for the past four years has been Deputy Head of Mission in the British High Commission in Wellington, New Zealand.

Mr Nye is no stranger to the Falklands, having visited in 1994, when on the Falklands Desk at the Foreign Office in London.

Accompanied by his wife Alison and their ten-year-old son Ciaran, Mr Nye said he hoped one day to return to New Zealand, which he only left because the job in the Falklands came up, which he very much wanted to take.

Describing himself as "passionate about the outdoors," Mr Nye is a keen road cyclist and rock climber, both activities he hopes to be able to pursue during his time here.







CAN government please explain what principles, reasoning and logic guide the user pay policy in its application to the various services subject to that policy?

A THE user pays policy has been in place for several years and is being expanded incrementally.

Some services (such as electricity) have been calculated on this basis for many years and others (such as education) will probably never be calculated in this way. There are also services that will probably require ongoing subsidies for social or economic purposes.

The intention is to gradually move more services on to the user pays basis, where it is appropriate to do so. The principle on fees and charges is that where the particular service benefits an individual or group, they should be responsible for the costs of providing that service.

However, it is recognised that FIG is not a commercial enterprise and charges sometimes need to reflect social needs as well as the costs of direct service provision.

Q THE housing section of government makes an annual surplus of around £200,000 after taking full account of all costs including depreciation on housing assets that actually appreciate in value! However, budget approval was given to a

further increase on the basis of catch up with the limited private sector housing market.

It is understood that the main purpose of the government housing stock is for accommodating public officers recruited from overseas and for social housing: ie, for qualifying residents who are unable to afford to rent from the private sector or become a home owner. Therefore government housing does not compete with private sector housing.

The increase will reduce the take home pay for overseas officers and must reduce FIG's competitiveness in what is understood to be a very competitive market for the recruitment of professional staff.


For FIG to remain competitive this will no doubt lead to an increase in their remuneration package and, as a result, to salary inflation generally.

In light of the foregoing does government intend to continue its policy of catch up and to what extent, having regard to the widening of the gap due to the higher demand for housing caused by the current increase in economic activity? If the answer is yes does this mean that government will adjust its house rents downwards in the event there is an economic downturn and private sector rents reduce to reflect a possible lower demand for housing?

A IT has been clearly stated for several years that government policy is to reduce the gap between private sector and public sector rents.

The assertion that the government does not compete with the private sector is clearly unjustified. The reason for this is that private sector rents are unaffordable for many, who therefore seek social housing. It is also apparent from the last budget that the government has not increased salaries for contract officers proportionately to the recently announced rent increase.

The widening gap caused by the current increase in economic activity has not been a factor so far. This would only be a factor if FIG rents were close to the private sector, which is not currently the case. Finally, future rent increases or reductions will be assessed when considering future budgets.



A NO separate charge is currently made to commercial properties for those services.

WHAT independent body is charged with the examination of the audit report on the expenditure of public funds on the operation of the Public Accounts Committee (PAC) and on assessing the public benefit of that expenditure with respect to value for money: ie, economy, efficiency and effectiveness?

A The PAC is an independent body established by Section 81 of the Constitution that reports to the Legislative Assembly and the Governor.

The PAC is required to submit its intended programme of work to the Legislative Assembly, including how it intends to apply its funds in carrying out the programme.

This, combined with the annual report to Legislative Assembly, will allow members (and the public) to determine the benefit and effectiveness of the committee.

Falklands cricket team visits Mexico

THE Falkland Islands cricket team leaves tomorrow bound for Mexico City to play in Division 4 of the International Cricket Council Americas League, against Mexico and Costa Rica.

This is an exciting development for cricket in the Falklands: it will be the first time a team has played in an ICC international tournament. In theory we could keep on being promoted and ultimately end up at the World Cup. Clearly that is not likely to happen in the near future but always remains a distant possibility. Arranging a mutually convenient date for all the teams has been difficult and sadly Cuba is not participating, we believe due to visa issues.

The team has been practising hard for the month, mainly indoors. Mexico City is at 7,500 feet altitude and will be hot and humid, so we may find the conditions difficult to acclimatise to.

It will be a busy week with 50over matches on Tuesday and Wednesday and two T20 matches on Thursday with the team flying back on Friday.

None of the teams has played each other in the past, so no-one is sure how each country's standard compares with the others. It will be interesting to see how the Falklands fare in the competition.

The 13 man squad is: Elliott Taylforth (Captain), Craig Palee, Daniel Biggs, Ian Betts, Kevin Clapp, Martin Collins, Mike Barton, Mike Summers, Richard Marlor, Wayne Thompson, Roger Diggle, David Pickup and David Hewitt. On return from Mexico the team will travel to Scotland in July to play in a triangular tournament of the three Falkland teams: Falkland (Fife), Falkland (Newhury, Berks) and the Falkland Islands, to celebrate the 150th anniversary of Falkland Fife CC.

Next year the ICC is hoping to hold an under 17s competition in St Kitts in the West Indies. The Falklands are hoping to send a team, which will be hugely exciting for the younger cricketers.

Later this year the Cricket Association is intending to appoint a Development Officer. It is an ICC requirement of membership that from 2010 all members must have a full-time employee. The ICC provides a substantial contribution towards the cost of this post, Stanley Services have been extremely generous with their support, and Cable & Wireless has offered a free telecommunications package. Chamber survey says C&W must try harder

THE business community appears less than impressed with the quality of the internet and telephone services they receive, according to the results of a recent survey of members - but a study commissioned by FIG seems to indicate recent improvements have had a positive impact.

In the wake of significant increases in bandwidth implemented by Cable and Wireless (C&W) in December 2009 and April 2010, the Chamber of Commerce ran a survey among its members, the results of which have just been published.

This survey runs parallel to the Quality Observation project carried out by monitoring company Actual Experience (AE), which was sponsored by the government.

Of the 87 members of the business community polled, 55 (63.2%) replied to some, if not all of the five questions posed. More than one in four respondents (82%) were Stanley based and the rest in Camp.

Only 7% of respondents felt the speed of the internet service had improved after the December upgrade, all of whom were based in Stanley. A large majority (69%) had experienced no change and 24% felt it had deteriorated.

Fewer still (4%) considered the reliability of the internet service had improved, while 44% felt it had deteriorated. One respondent said: "Reliable high speed internet is critical for the economic and social growth of the Falklands."

More than a quarter of respondents felt the accuracy of billed internet usage had deteriorated since the December upgrade, with 62% believing there had been no change and only 4% seeing any improvement.

Similarly negative responses were obtained in regard to the telephone service. Asked if reception quality had improved since the

December upgrade, 73% reported having found no difference, with 25% claiming it had deteriorated. Only 2% had observed an improvement.

No respondents had perceived any improvement in telephone service reliability since December, with 31% claiming it had deteriorated. A large majority (75%) felt accuracy of call billing had remained the same, with 16% claiming deterioration and only 7% seeing an improvement.

The biggest perception of deterioration in the service provided by C&W came from the question about directory inquiries, with 49% of all respondents claiming the service had deteriorated and 12% of all comments received ascribing this deterioration to the relocation of the service in Saint Helena.

One correspondent wrote: "Since relocating the Directory Enquiries service it has proved costly and uninformative... names not recognised and you are kept waiting, and being charged, often to be told they can not find the name. This was much better as a local service."

C&W emerges best from those sections of the survey dealing with the interface between customers and local C&W staff: fault reporting, customer services and account queries.

Two out of three (66%) respondents found the fault reporting service either excellent, good or average, dropping to 64% in their appreciation of customer service and to 59% for the response to account queries. Fault reporting and customer service was rated as excellent by 13% and 15% respectively.

The recently released report by Chris Gare of AE on the Perceptiom of Quality Observation run by his company in the Falklands, with the help of volunteers and the cooperation of C&W, suggested an overall improvement of 10.8% as the result of the C&W upgrade of their satellite link which took place on the night of April 28. Legislative Assembly Member Dick Sawle told the Penguin News he did not feel there was a conflict between the findings of the Chamber of Commerce Survey, which was subjective, and the AE Observation, which was scientific and analytical.

Justin McPhee, C&W Chief Executive Officer in the Falklands, said he was pleased by the positive comments in the AE report, even though the company had encountered severe technical problems during the month of the observation.

Referring to the Chamber of Commerce survey, Mr McPhee said C&W would continue to work to provide the best service possible for its customers and welcomed comments from any source which helped achieve that aim.

Cllr Sawle admitted there was still a long way to go to improve telecommunications quality, particularly in Camp. but said one of the encouraging aspects of the AE Observation was that software installed in the computer of one volunteer, whose Perception Quality Score (PQS) was significantly lower than the rest, was able to identify a problem, which C&W was then able to fix.

That there might be a finite limit to possible improvements in Falklands telecommunications is suggested by the caveat which introduces the AE report.

This states that even at times when reception should be optimum, the performance of the internet service in the Islands would not be as good as that experienced in the UK due to the use of a geo-stationary satellite.

A UK-based website Perception Quality Score, when observed from the UK, would usually be classified as excellent, but when the same site was observed from the Falklands it would be classified as fair, at best.

I caught the end of "The Islanders' War," perhaps the most poignant and dramatic documentary of all on the 1982 invasion and its legacy. There then followed striking battle footage from the BBC, an account of how MPA was built, and another feature on the war.

It appeared KTV had dedicated one of its "spare" channels to the TV event, and I am sure many who stumbled upon this programming wish it had been promoted in advance. Nevertheless, it was a fitting end to a momentous date in the country's calendar.

Households to be surveyed for new RPI

BUYING habits from 150 representative households in Stanley, selected at random, are to help determine future cost of living wage and charge increases.

The householders will be contacted during July, and asked to record their daily household expenditure for four months in the year (and larger purchases over the complete year).

Information gathered from the survey will be used to compile an up-to-date Retail Price Index for Stanley, due to be reviewed from September 1 through to the end of August 2011.

The review is being carried out because the current index, which is based on a review undertaken in 1996-97, no longer accurately reflects what the average Stanley resident buys on a day-to-day basis.

At the last revision, services such as broadband and mobile phones were not available. In addition, the range of goods available, the buying patterns and the structure of the population also have altered since then.

Ensuring the index is as accu-

rate as possible is important, particularly as it is used as a basis for cost of living wage and charge increases.

Householders will be offered an incentive payment to take part, and they will be provided with specially prepared forms or computer data entry spreadsheets for those households with computers, to simplify the process.

Synergy Information Systems Limited, which undertook the previous survey and regularly monitors the current index, has been commissioned to carry out the review on behalf of the Government.

They say participation of a wide range of people is important to ensure the success of the project so that the new index accurately reflects the cost of items purchased by typical Stanley residents.

Identity of the volunteers and the information on their expenditure will be confidential.

Sukey reinforces FIG Police report POLICE had a quiet weeke with only one incident, a re role to deny claims

ARGENTINA was urged to ac-cept the Falkland Islands' "expressed, democratic wish to remain British" when the government's UK representative, Ms Sukey Cameron, spoke at the Falkland Islands Annual Reception

Over 250 guests attended Wednesday's reception, at the Great Hall in Lincoln's Inn. including several government ministers and the Governor Designate, Mr Nigel Haywood.

Individuals and representatives from numerous organisations associated with the Islands attend each year, including the Falkland Islands Association Chairman David Tatham, who read out a message of thanks from Her Majesty the Oueen, and Baroness Thatcher who received a very warm welcome upon her arrival.

In her speech to those assembled Ms Cameron mentioned the return of an oil rig to the Islands, which she described as "the most visible and potentially transformational change to the economy of the Islands.

She said: "Argentina has used the new round of oil exploration in the most unprincipled fashion, to reignite its spurious claim to sovereignty." She detailed the various actions taken by Argentina. including going back on the 1999 agreement to conserve fishing stocks, the ban on charter flights, and the attempt through a Presidential Decree to control the maritime access to the Falklands.

Describing the new UK coalition Government's stance as "immensely reassuring" and detailing the efforts made by the Falkland

Islands Government and new Legislative Assembly to get our message out, Ms Cameron said: "The Falkland Islands Government is determined to play its part in resisting the colonial aspirations of Argentina.

The message is simple and unequivocal. We are a distinct community with our own identity and separate government.

We have the right to self determination, the right to decide our own future, unhindered by any interference from any other government; and our expressed, demoeratic wish is to remain British. It is time the Argentine Government accented that.

Ms Cameron went on to say: "Our gratitude to those who fought for our freedom is unbounded and undiminished.

Twenty eight years after the war, it is appropriate that we should re-emphasise our wish to seek peaceful cooperation with our neighbours as full participating members of the South Atlantic community, to ensure that neveragain will the tragedy of 1982 be repeated.

During her speech Ms Cameron also made mention of the UK election, thanking Sir Nicholas Winterton and others for their sunport over the years. She observed the Falklands[†] budgetary position remained "uncertain" and said although the fisihing, farming and tourism industries have long been the mainstays of the economy, they required further development.

Ms Cameron's response to a letter printed in the Guardian on June 9 by Simon Jenkins, was printed on June 14. She informed him of the actual cost of Falklands defence, and described his use of the term colonies as "both anachronistic and inaccurate." She said we are proud of the strides made in developing our economy and if oil were discovered, we should be able to make an even bigger contribution to the cost of defence.

Employment law review a high priority

A COMPREHENSIVE review of employment legislation in the Falklands is to be undertaken by the Government's Policy Department.

The current Employment Protection Ordinance, which covers all the key employment law elements, was drafted in 1989 and based on UK legislation from even earlier in the eightics.

A review of the existing law to bring it in line with best practice elsewhere in the world was a high priority of the present Legislative Assembly, said FIG's Senior Economist Michael Poole, who stressed that the intention was not to implement irrelevant EU or UK legislation, but to strike the correct balance between having as little legislation as possible and ensuring there was no exploitation of labour. The first focus of the review will be on the need for a minimum wage and any cost implications, while the second will be the terms and conditions for casual and temporary workers

These, said Mr Poole, were the priorities put forward by Members of Legislative Assembly, but a questionnaire has been widely distributed to help the Policy Unit decide whether these are the correct priority areas and what should be be looked at next, after those two areas have been addressed.

Employment law can cover areas from health and safety, leave, including sick, maternity and paternity leave, discrimination, dismissal and arbitration.

Comments from the general public are welcomed by the Policy Unit, which has assembled a consultative forum with representatives from the Chamber of Commerce, the Rural Business Association, the General Employees Union, FIG, the Attorney General's Chambers and MOD.

The first stage of the Review will result in a paper to Executive Council in August of this year giving recommendations on the first two priorities listed previously.

Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

THERE was great turn out at the '82 memorial on a damp grey day; a day as always of mixed emotions, sorrow and thankfulness uppermost. When 1 was a teenager in the mid sixties WW2, which ended 20 years before had seemed like ancient history, yet 28 years on, the events of the war here in '82 are still vividly etched in people's memories.

HOUSING is still high on the agenda with the tranche of plots at Mink Park now out for bids. FIG must house contract officers and also provide some social housing. Rent rebates are available for those in real need. It is the unanimous wish of this Assembly to encourage more people to house themselves by ensuring the availability of land and accessible mortgages. In the long term individuals are far better off paying a mortgage on their own property than paying rent for years with no asset at the end. A quick calculation shows that a rent of £500 per month is the equivalent of £90,000 over 15 years. I hope that provision of plots in various sizes will prevent some of the unsightly and anti-social infill

that we have seen in recent years. We have ample space and a little lateral thinking on plot shapes will keep servicing costs as low as possible.

* * * * *

I HAVE often wondered why we do not stay on summer time all year round, for extra minutes of daylight after working hours. Perhaps someone can explain the reason to me.

LAST week was total immersion in oil affairs, with a briefing and workshop for all MLAs and a meeting of the Mineral Resources Committee. Those who pontificate from afar might do well to take a close look at the effort and expertise being dedicated to ensuring the safe and efficient conduct of the current exploration round.

A winter walk for wildlife

MEMBERS of the Watch Group will be doing their Winter Walk for Wildlife tomorrow. We invite you to join us to raise funds for the new oiled penguin facility that Falklands Conservation are hoping to build next summer.

At the moment when oiled penguins turn up around the islands we have very limited facilities for cleaning and housing them, a simple shed with no running water or electricity. It isn't ideal, although we have had high success rates for rehabilitation of oiled penguins.

Members of the military based at MPA are going to assist in the build and are doing their own fundraising as well but anything we can do will help to make this dream a reality.

We're also hoping to buy some satellite tracking devices to attach to penguins that are cleaned and released. At the moment the last thing that staff and volunteers at Falklands Conservation and the Department of Agriculture see of the penguins is their tails as they head out to sea after release.

We want to track them to see where they go. Do they go straight out to sea to feed or do they head back to their breeding colony? How long does it take them to get back to their colony?

A satellite device will give us all of this information and more importantly give us an idea of the survival rates after they are released.

The Winter Walk for Wildlife will begin at 9.15am at the Jetty Centre car park and will finish at Surf Bay in time to watch or take part in the mid winter swim.

Our route will take us along Ross Road East towards the Narrows Bar where we will then take the coastal path down past the Seaman's Mission then along the coastline to Boxer Bridge. We will then cross the bridge and walk along the track to Surf Bay.

This year, rather than badgering friends and family for sponsor money all we ask is a £5 entry/ walking fee from each walker.

Walkers will receive a certificate and sticker to mark their achievement.

The walk is open to all members of the community but please bear in mind you will need to be collected from Surf Bay at around 11.15am, just after the madness of the midwinter swim.

The tracks along the coast are quite wet and muddy so please wear sensible footwear.

Welsh Guards first return to salute their fallen comrades

FOR the first time since 1982, when they lost 36 of their men in the aerial attack on the RFA Sir Galahad, the Welsh Guards are back in the Falklands.

Taking over from the King's Royal Hussars as the Roulement Infantry Company at MPC. 3 Company Welsh Guards' arrival in the Islands coincided with the Fitzroy commemoration service held on Tuesday 8th June.

In 1982, the Welsh Guards commanded by Lieutenant-Colonel John Rickett formed part of the 5th Infantry Brigade. The Guards were on board the ill-fated Sir Galahad, accompanied by Sir Tristam, waiting to be landed at Bluff Cove, when they suffered an air attack culminating in a dreadfully high number of fatalities and burn casualties.

Major Nicky Bott, Quartermaster, is the last Falklands War Veteran serving in the Welsh Guards. It is his first return since 1982.

Major Bott. 47, was on the Sir Galabad along with his brother Billy, and pointed out the sheds in Fitzroy where they had the spent the night, when they had reached land after the brutal bombings

"The Service was very moving for me: it was really nice for the young lads to meet the Falkland Island people and understand the history behind the cap badge."

Billy is now the Garrison Sergeant Major of London District. His younger brother Johnny also joined and was the Regimental Sergeant Major. They followed the footsteps of both of their parents who served with the Royal Army Medical Corps and the Women's Royal Auxiliary Corps. Nicky hopes to return with Billy in the not too distant future.

Major Daniel Gallimore, Officer Commanding 3 Company. Welsh Guards, expressed his delight with the Fitzroy service and with the chance to meet Fitzroy residents later at the social club:

"It was fantastic for our young lads to have the legacy of the regiment so explicit and touchable.

"The hospitality of the residents of Fitzroy really was second to none and was overwhelming for some of the guardsmen. I think some of them were quite shocked! We were really wonderfully well looked after."

Major Gallimore commented on how the land of the Falkland Islands is very similar to that in North Wales.

He added: "This deployment as the Roulement Infantry Company has been a fantastic opportunity, very poignant for us and it has been good to get out on the ground after a particularly heavy tour in Helmand last summer."

After the service the 3 Company returned and Sgt Peters laid a wreath on the sea. His stepfather and step-uncles were on Sir Galahad; one of them lost his life.

The Welsh Guards have been exceedingly busy over the last few years, including doing ceremonial duty in London, exercises in Belize Canada and Germany, the Queen's Birthday Parade and deployments in Bosnia and Afghanistan.



Community is praised for a magnificent charity effort

REFERENCE to the close links which exist between the Falkland Islands and Chile was made by Legislative Assembly Member Dick Sawle on Thursday night, at a reception held in Government House for those who had helped with the recent fundraising response to the catastrophic earthquake which hit Chile on February 27. Cllr Sawle paid tribute

Cllr Sawle paid tribute to the generosity of the Falkland Islands community and the hard work of those who contributed to the fundraising effort, but particularly to Mrs Celia Short, who was the principal organiser of the relief fund.

"On Saturday Febru-

ary 27 this year. Chile was devastated by an earthquake of magnitude 8.8 in the early hours of the morning at about 3.30pm when most people were asleep." he said.

"Over 500 people were killed and many others were left homeless and without power, in some cases for many days. It is hard for us to imagine the experience of movement, noise, dust and panic that this must have caused.

"It was only a few days later that Celia decided to set up an appeal fund to raise funds in the Falkland Islands – funds that would not just be a message of sympathy and support but also funds that would make a real difference and be remembered.

"But fundraising was not enough for Celia. She was keen to see that the funds would be targeted and used somewhere where it would be remembered and would make a very real difference."

A giant cheque for £26,600.19, the total in the fund when it closed

on June 1, was presented to Mrs Short by Teresa McGill of Standard Chartered Bank.

The money raised is going to go specifically to the town of Lolol, which is in Colchagua province in Chile's Sixth Region.

With a population of about 6,000 people, and described as a small rural town with strong links to its colonial past, Lolol, which was situated close to the earthquake's epicentre, lost something in the region of 800 homes when the earthquake struck.

The intention of the appeal's organisers was to identify an area where there was much devastation and an extreme need for assistance.

It was also the hope that by supporting a single community the benefit of the funds raised in the Falklands could be seen and, perhaps, a permanent link established between the two communities.

Mrs Short said the decision to devote the funds to Lolol was the result of much research.



She had written to a number of communities in Chile, but Lolol was the first to respond positively.

At this moment, most of Lolol's population are living in tents which is causing them much physical and mental stress. The need to act quickly and provide housing is paramount because the winter is coming.

Cllr Sawle said: "But there is more to it than just raising funds. Chile has always been a very close neighbour of ours – not just geographically but also in spirit. "The Fałkland Is-

"The Fałkland Islands, with a population of half that of Lolol, has embraced and welcomed many Chileans into its community, and it is that sense of friendship and brotherhood that has led to such a huge support from the community here in the Falklands.

"I would like to thank His Excellency the Governor and Mrs Huckle for

hosting this important occasion and would finish by asking all of you to show your support and thanks to Celia, and also to yourselves, for this magnificent achievement."







Elliott inspires historic victory

THE Falkland Islands blew away Costa Rica in the International Cricket Council (ICC) Americas Championship Division 4 game played at the Reforma Athletic ground in Mexico on Tuesday

A devastating spell of medium pace bowling from Elliott Taylforth caused all the damage in the 50-over match. He took six wickets for 14 runs including a hat trick and completed the overs by taking another wicket for a four wicket maiden

The Falklands Cricket team left the Islands on Saturday to fly to Mexico, for the first match they have played internationally since 2007 against Chile.

The Falklands team's innings had folded with 11.3 overs remaining for 131 runs, the game looking all but lost at that stage. However, they never gave up hope. Spirits were lifted when Taylforth had Costa Rican Tim Baker caught by Collins without a run on the board. Ben Smith then threatened to take the game away from the Falklands, but went caught at midoff to leave the Costa Ricans on 44 for 2

After the break for lunch the game went backwards and forwards until the 29th over. Costa Rica was poised at 92 for 6, in need of 39 runs for victory, when the later named man of the match Elliott Taylforth stepped up. Described by a spectator as the most exhilarating finish to a cricket match, the ICC website reported. Taylforth came back into the attack from the northern end of the ground and, with his first ball of the over, had Richard Illingworth caught at gully by Ian Betts.

This success encouraged the Falkland's to go on an all out attack with two slips, two gullies and all fielders inside the circle. The second ball of the over brought Garth Tweedale forward only to see the ball being snapped up by Richard Marlor at one of the two gullies.

With Taylforth on a hat-trick. the perfect delivery saw next man Sheriff groping forward and again Marlor in the gully did the honours

The Falkland Islanders were jumping and screaming with delight for captain Taylforth but also at the sight of a well deserved victory. The Costa Rica innings ended with the score of 92 to give the Falkland's victory by 39 runs.

The Falklands have now played four matches in their first ICC-sanctioned international tournament. They played Mexico in a 50 over match on Wednesday, and yesterday played both teams in 20 over matches.





New contract secured for CE on second vote

ALTHOUGH word had been on the street for some time that the contract for Chief Executive Tim Thorogood was likely to be extended, the official announcement on Friday was still met with some astonishment by the public.

In the lead up to the November election, seven of the eight successful candidates made public their displeasure with the government review and, in some cases, Mr Thorogood himself.

When it came to the deciding moment, which was on a second vote and after the Governor had reminded members that both he and the Attorney General would be leaving the Islands later this year, only three Assembly Members voted against the contract being renewed.

In the first vote, five had been against and three in favour, but the Governor's reminder had been enough to sway Mr Thorogood's two most vocal critics.

In the lead up to the election Cllr Sharon Halford likened FIG to a tree with branches spreading everywhere, some of which were getting well overgrown. She said: "This tree needs a thorough and good pruning, without which it is likely to topple over through sheer weight of management." She made no bones about her careful choice of words.

Cllr Bill Luxton said the previous council had been completely supine in the face of an "aggressive Chief Executive building up his own empire," adding that he was "an extraordinarily unpopular figure with both the civil service and the public."

Almost eight months after being elected, both Cllrs Halford and Luxton are now of the opinion that Mr Thorogood had and continues to act only on the direction of the Assembly in power.

Cllr Luxton told the Penguin News: "Since being inside the tent as it were, it is apparent that in fact the CE never made a move that was not driven by the previous council. That is the way he works and every single decision and action was at the instigation or with the approval of the previous council.

"Perhaps the electorate saw this and that is why they were all voted out." In the past eight months everything the CE had done had been with the approval of the majority of present Assembly Members, he said.

Cllr Luxton said he was persuaded it was not in the best interest to have three senior posts change in such a short time, but added he had approved a one year extension only, that the final decision was by a majority of MLAs, with views covering all the possibilities.

"It's a critical time for the Islands with Argentine pressure and oil development potential," said Cllr Luxton, and to be advertising the postion at this time would have attracted a "swathe of carpet baggers with lots of personal ambition."

He concluded: "I think it is now in the Islands' best interest for all MLAs to pull together and go forward from here in what is a very difficult time for the Islands." Cllr Halford declined to answer any direct questions from the Penguin News, saying she had already explained the full process of Mr Thorogood's contract renewal to the members of her electorate and others in her weekly round-up.

In the final vote Cllrs Roger and Emma Edwards along with Cllr Glenn Ross maintained their opposition to the proposal.

Clir Ross said the debate had been "full and frank." He agreed the CE had had Executive Council approval for his earlier actions, and had worked closely with the new Assembly in forming new policies. He had accepted and moved on when a proposal sponsored by him had been turned down, he said.

However, Cllr Ross did not agree that the departure of the Governor and Attorney General were contributory factors to renewing the contract: "In each role the individual can bring a style or personality, but ultimately, in the case of the Governor, you are in the room with the FCO, and the Attorney General will advise on the law of the land," he said.

Cllr Ross said he voted in the way those who had elected him would wish. He said he accepted the majority decision and looked forward to working with the CE Picture: Phil Reed

in the same vein as the first months of the new Assembly.

Cllr Roger Edwards said he had not been in support of the renewal as, by January 2011, Mr Thorogood would have completed three years. He said he felt there was a need to move away from a government background to a business one, especially with oil on the horizon.

rizon. "We are as a body looking more and more at posts being given to Islanders," he said. The changeover of Governor and AG did not impact on his decision, he said, but as a democracy, the majority view must prevail.

Cllr Emma Edwards consulted her constituents and acted on the majority response which was not in favour of contract renewal.

She said she stood by what she had said prior to the election, that super heads were not right for the Islands: "When they come up for renewal, I will stand by what I have said and not agree to the post being continued," she said.

Mr Thorogood is currently on holiday overseas and was not available for comment.

MEMBERS of the Legislative Assembly were elected on a surge of support from an electorate seeking change, transparency and a return to simplified governance. Voters argued the previous Assembly ignored their concerns and conducted too much business behind closed doors. They also were dismayed with the Chief Executive's sweeping review of the civil service, and the installation of "superheads."

The new councillors promised to recognise the groundswell of opinion, and most shared the community's dislike of Tim Thorogood's changes.

So why did they extend his contract by two years – which will be seen as effectively endorsing those changes – and how can they hold their collective heads high when so many of them were so vocal in their opposition to his top-heavy reforms?

Six members were openly critical of the Chief Executive's review during the hustings and a seventh. Glenn Ross, indicated this week he did not want Mr Thorogood to stay on.

Bill Luxton was perhaps his fiercest critic: "The last council seem to have been completely supine in the face of an aggressive Chief Executive building up his own empire " he wrote in his manifesto


Jan Cheek was more circumspect than her colleagues, and said nothing in print about the issue. But she did emphasise: "People must know that their views are being given due respect and attention."

Man jailed for underage sex

MOUNT Pleasant man Rico Jaye Anthony (19) was sentenced to 12 months' detention in a young offenders Institution in the Senior Magistrate's Court on Wednesday, having pleaded guilty to a charge of sexual activity with a child.

The offence took place early this year.

Senior Magistrate John Trevaskis said: "I have regard to the facts that the defendant has shown no genuine remorse and committed the offence deliberately and in full knowledge of the age of the victim, and I find that the risk of re-offending is therefore significant." He reminded the court that the purpose of section 9 of the Sexual Offences Act was the protection of children from sexual exploitation as well as punishing those who exploited them, and that sentencing could act as a deterrent. He said the offence was such that a non-custodial sentence could not be justified, and that there were no mitigating factors.

Due to Mr Anthony's early guilty plea Mr Trevaskis reduced the sentence, which would have stood at 21 months, by one third, and allowed a reduction of a further two months to reflect the age and previous good character of the defendant.

TRINA Berntsen (40) of Stanley was ordered to pay a fine of $\pounds 200$ and prosecution costs of $\pounds 80$ on Wednesday, when she pleaded guilty to a charge of driving without due care and attention.

Members defend the decision to back CE

ASSEMBLY Members Jan Cheek, Dick Sawle and Gavin Short joined Bill Luxton and Sharon Halford in supporting the extension of the contract of Chief Executive Tim Thorogood at a second vote.

Prior to the election CIIr Cheek made it clear that any criticism she had was of some of the policies of the previous Assembly and not of any of the individuals paid to implement them.

She said she continued to give due respect and attention to the views of people who approached her on any subject and would continue to do so.

When asked for the reasoning behind her vote and how the decision was made, she told the Penguin News: "Many issues are deeided on a majority vote and it is not for me to go into details of any such vote."

Cllr Short, who is currently in New York attending the C24 conference, said the contract renewal provided continuity: "A case maybe of the devil you know," he quipped in his inimitable way.

Before the election Cllr Short was adamant a new Assembly would have to initiate a review of the whole government, including "each and every contract post from the Chief Executive down." He said posts that could be done without should be eliminated and those deemed necessary scrutinised to see just how quickly a local person could be in place. He anticipated a degree of resistance but, he said, "not from the general public."

He said he was still of the view that super heads were not necessary, but didn't think he had been "braying for the CE's head" then, and had taken a pragmatic approach since.

"Since the election, I cannot fault the CE in any way as he has always kept us in the picture and carried out our instructions to the letter," he said. "We are entering an extremely delicate time in my humble opinion and one that requires continuity."

As to the civil service, Cllr Short said: "The CE will do as we ask him and, if that includes us desuper heading the establishment, then so be it."

Cllr Sawle also was critical of the government review in the lead up to the election, saying local knowledge had been lost in yet another review process that had achieved "little other than add more complication and additional layers to the system." A new Assembly, he said, needed to "listen more and take account of what people are saving."

Asked how he could justify those comments in the light of the

latest decision, he said he had listened and had made enquiries more recently.

"The result of the review is with us, whether or not we like it, and I am happy that the CE's review was properly undertaken and broke no rules," he said.

"The review has caused much upset - there is no doubt about that - but it was done and we must move on. The review of government, which was quite rightly questioned, has been explained to me and I am happy that it was approved at all stages by the Assembly members at the time, and that no 'rules' were broken in carrying it out."

Cllr Sawle had stated publicly he was in favour of offering a new contract from the offset, and he was in favour of continuity at a time when there were to be changes in three senior positions.

"The risks in making changes at this time outweighed any desire for change," he said. Asked by the Penguin News if

Asked by the Penguin News if this move would achieve the desired boost to morale in the civil service he had mooted pre-election, he said: "I believe morale has improved with the new Assembly and the change of leadership this has brought about. I believe that our change of style has also been reflected by the Chief Executive."



Jorge Taiana (60) has resigned, and will be succeeded by Argentina's ambassador to the US, Hector Timmerman. Mr Taiana was a political prisoner for seven years, and was released in 1982, a year before the end of Argentina's last military regime. He recently testified in a human rights abuse trial against leaders of the dictatorship.

IAP membership

THE Falkland Islands Government's legal department has been granted organisational membership of the International Association of Prosecutors. As the only worldwide association of prosecutors, with more than 130 members, it aims to develop cooperation to enable offenders to be more effectively brought to justice while promoting universal standards for the rule of law.

Child allowance

EXCO yesterday confirmed Family Allowance would no longer be paid for children who have reached their 16th birthday. Subject to a Bill to amend the ordinance, the change is due to come into effect on July 1, at the same time as other changes to Family Allowance, and will include 16-year-olds who are still in compulsory education.

Raleigh's blocks

HMS Raleigh's four new accommodation blocks at the Royal Navy training base at Torpoint in the UK have been named Antelope, Ardent, Sir Galahad and Conqueror, paying tribute to the units sent to liberate the Islands in 1982.

A busy weekend with fire and ice

ON Saturday the police and fire service were called to attend a fire in a portakabin in 1an Campbell Drive.

The police station received the 999 call shortly before 11am. When the services arrived at the address, it was apparent an acetalyne bottle was on fire.

The portakabin also contained other dangerous items, Chief Supt Gary Finchett said, such as other oxygen and propane cylinders.

"We quickly decided we needed to evacuate a number of houses." he said. "About 20 houses were evacuated and about ten families were displaced to the Stanley Arms whilst the fire and rescue service fought the fire, and the police managed the cordons to make sure nobody got into that dangerous area."

The situation took over 24 hours to resolve, with families from three houses unable to return to their homes overnight. Later, Chief Supt Finchett said, they could see the cylinders were cooling well, but precautionary measures had to be taken. He thanked the Stanley Arms for looking after people during the incident, and the public for their cooperation.

There were also several minor road traffic "near misses" reported to the police during the bad weather. On Saturday afternoon two vehicles left the MPA road, one by the wind turbines and one by Boot Hill, and on Sunday a Land Rover ended up on its side in a dich on the Mount Kent road near to Johnsons Harbour.

Chief Supt Finchett advised drivers to "slow down, wear your seat belt, use headlights and just use caution" during poor weather.

THE timing of the resignation of Argentine Foreign Minister Taiana is interesting with the Committee of 24 meeting this week. His replacement is the son of Jacobo Timerman, a newspaper editor locked up during the dirty war. Timerman senior was fortunate to be released to the US rather than disappear like so many of his compatriots. His book "Prisoner Without a Name, Cell Without a Number," along with the writing of Anglo-Argentine journalist Andrew Graham-Yooll, alerted us to the murderous excesses of the Junta. It is good to see that at least some in that country recognise the fact that the military defeat in the Falklands was a first step back to democracy. I guess it is too much to hope that Timerman junior, with his strong association with human rights organisations, might recognise our right to self-determination.

Edwards and Short to address UN committee

EMMA Edwards and Gavin Short were yesterday preparing to defend the rights of Falkland Islanders before a United Nations committee, as Argentina also prepared to flex its muscles on the sovereignty issue.

The two Assembly members are in New York to address the UN Decolonisation Committee, or C24.

Media agency UPI quoted diplomats saying the meeting was "an annual ritual, notorious for a lot of talk and little action."

But it anticipated Argentina to up the ante on the back of its argument over oil exploration in Falklands waters. Argentina also recently won support for its cause from the Union of South American Nations, a grouping of nations that want to see US influence - and by implicit extension the UK - removed from South America and South Atlantic region.

And, UPI claimed, military defences on the Islands were being bolstered because of Argentine pronouncements.


However, the new British coalition headed by PM David Cameron and Deputy PM Nick Clegg has again reinforced its support of the Falklands right to selfdetermination and to develop its own hydrocarbons industry. Last Friday Mr Clegg said: "We will not compromise the rights, preferences and sovereignty of the Falklands.

"We clearly want the Falklands to remain as part of the United Kingdom."

Ms Edwards and Mr Short were expected to present vigorous arguments to the committee to counter the latest series of Argentine claims.

Assembly members have long argued that if Argentina cooperated on the issue of hydrocarbons then the whole region could benefit. But, given their track record on breaking promises, this was unlikely.

Business as usual as MPA gets a makeover



Mount Pleasant Airport awaiting resurfacing later this year

TWO 767-300s have been confirmed as the aircraft to be used for the South Atlantic Airbridge while the Mount Pleasant runway is being resurfaced later this year.

Engineering company SOLAS has been contracted to carry out the work between September and the spring of 2011.

The 25-year-old runway and some taxiways are to be resurfaced. However, an operating window for large aircraft will open each weekend throughout the project.

Work will cease on the runway each weekend to allow the airbridge and LAN flights to operate and the full South Atlantic Airbridge will continue to operate on a restructured schedule for both passenger and freight flights.

A military spokesperson said everyone in the Falklands should be reassured that throughout the project's life the Quick Reaction Alert aircraft and Search and Rescue helicopters would continue to be in position to launch at any and all times.

He said: "In short, British Forces South Atlantic Islands will be able to operate its full military capability including air defence."

Preservation of the Lady Liz

RECENTLY there has been some conversation and exchange of emails on the "Falkland Reunion / Chay's stop for Smoko" Facebook site, started and managed by Rock Berntsen, which as of today has over 470 members, in regard to the preservation of the wonderful heritage of old ships that exists in the Falklands.


Dee Jennings, a Falkland Islander and well known artist presently living in Ireland and who has done quite a lot of fact gathering on the subject, has suggested that the Lady Elizabeth would be a good subject for consideration for some preservation activity, before final disintegration takes place and any effort at recovery becomes impossible.

We have seen in recent years, to all intents and purposes, the demise of the Charles Cooper, the disintegration of the fore part of the Jelhum, with the after part no doubt soon to follow. In earlier years the Fennia was also rather disgracefully lost to the Islands and the world by a series of bad decision making.

It is easy, no doubt, to overlook maritime heritage when other more pressing matters are at hand; equally it is also just as easy in my mind, given the rapidly deteriorating condition of the now meagre remains of old ships in Stanley Harbour, to envisage a harbour which will have no maritime heritage left other than a few wooden knee joints and some rusty ribs to remind us vaguely of a proud past.

In about 1970 a survey apparently showed that the Lady Liz could at that time have been repaired and re-floated and put into reasonable working condition. sadly it would seem that with the passage of time that option is probably no longer open to us as her deterioration has advanced so much. It seems that apart from the broken jib boom some plates are rusted through, wooden decking is turning to powder and if her substantial cross tree is not soon lowered to deck level it may fall of its own accord and literally destroy the ship amidships for once and for all.

What to do? There has been a suggestion on 'Chay's Smoko' that money should be raised to at least take some minimum precautions to prevent any further deterioration of the condition of the Lady Liz. Such as lowering the cross tree as a matter of urgency and building a breakwater or coffer dam connected to the shore, to protect what is left of the hull from



Caribbeans and Kelpers forge an alliance in the oil business

THE world of work is becoming everyday more international, but it was with some surprise that the Penguin News learned of the presence in Stanley of a Trinidad based company helping the current oil exploration.

In an office close to the laydown area for drilling pipes and mud silos, we finally tracked down John Campbell from Trinidad who, with his Scottish colleague Graham Hird, forms half of the four-man team from ASCO Trinidad.

They have been sub-contracted by local firm Byron McKay Port Services to manage the logistics, safety and quality control of the services required by the oil exploration teams.

The other half of the team. Scot Bob Rankin and Trinidadian Hugo Brown, rotate with Campbell and Hird on a 28-day basis.

In a report in the Trinidad and Tobago Guardian. Mr Brown is reported as saying that the company had been very impressed by the work ethic of the Falkland Islands' workers.

"We encountered crews across there that have no problem with working long hours, in the rain and so on," he explained.

"Across there, they're working in rain and the limited daylight you get. They also multi-task.

"You would see someone driving a forklift one minute, next minute he is operating a crane, next minute he is driving a truck. That is a big plus, especially at the stage of the operation we are at now."

This versatility of the workforce and the "fantastic teamwork" of the Falklands is something that has also impressed John Campbell.

He said that particular aspect would be one of the things that his company would be hoping to introduce back home where, he said, "a truck driver is only a truck driver, a crane driver only a crane driver and a fork lift operator only a fork lift operator." ASCO Trinidad is one section of a global oil and gas logistics company which has its home base in Aberdeen but has been operating in Trinidad since January 2001.

Although the company has previously worked in Suriname this is the first time its operation has been managed from out of Trinidad, where the global economic turndown has caused an equal turndown in oil-related activities.

"The Falklands was something we were looking for and when we got it, it was a big morale booster," said Mr Brown, adding that it has been challenging.

"When we first arrived there, there was nothing. We were starting from scratch.

"There were no offices, no warehouses, nothing. They were actually in the middle of constructing offices, etc.

"The biggest challenge for me was not having a proper office and communication tools, like the internet. I was actually operating out of my vehicle."

Shore-based operations entail managing the supply of equipment and materials delivered to the drilling rig.

Everything, from pipes to food, has to pass through the shore base on its way to the drilling rig, and because drilling is very costly, materials have to be shipped on time to ensure that there is no downtime offshore.

This unique Caribbean and Kelper alliance is getting the job done.



THE risk of falling increases as we get older and represents over half of hospital admissions for accidental injury among older people in the UK. The most significant in-

jury this leads to is a fracture of the hip. Even non-injurious falls can lead to people being afraid of falling, which can reduce their mobility and independence. There are known risk factors that increase your risk of falling. By being aware of these and proactive in making simple changes

in your daily life you can considerably lessen your risk of falling and hurting yourself.

What can I do to lessen my risk of falling?

- have your eyesight checked regularly

manage your medications — let your doctor know if you feel faint or unsteady after taking your pills.
Wear suitable footwear — high sided footwear with low heels and thin soles with a good grip will give you extra stability. Try to avoid slippers which are loose and worn-out or which don't have backs.



Avoid walking on slippery surfaces in socks or tights.
Assessments are available for

pendant alarms which are a good way of attracting help if you do have a fall

 check your home environment – good lighting is very important, particularly if you have stairs. If you need to get up during the night switch on a light to make sure you

can see where you are going.

- Have handrails fitted to your steps and stairs if you find them difficult to climb.

- Keep the floor clear of trailing leads, rucked up or fraying carpets or anything else you may

trip over or slip on. - Make sure your walkways in the house are

free of clutter, especially the stairs

- A non-slip mat in the bath can help you keep your balance when getting in and out.

- Take your time to get up out of chairs or out of bed as sometimes getting up too quickly can cause you to feel faint or light headed.

- Use a step ladder when changing light bulbs or curtains etc. or ask someone to help.

- Watch out for uneven paths and slippery surfaces in the garden.

- If you have a pet think about giving it a coloured collar or collar with a bell so that you will notice it more easily

PRINCIPAL COMPLAINTS COMMISSIONER

Chapter IX of the new Constitution provided for the appointment of Complaints Commissioners from time to time to investigate complaints of maladministration in government and any other matters prescribed by Ordinance. The Complaints Commissioners Ordinance 2010 prescribed the functions, powers and jurisdiction of Complaints Commissioners and also provided for the appointment of a Principal Complaints Commissioner.

The appointment of a Principal Complaints Commissioner will be a major step in ensuring the good governance of the Falkland Islands. It will provide a further avenue of complaint once existing avenues have been exhausted, will allow an independent check to ensure that complaints have been handled properly and fairly, and will provide for a greater degree of transparency in the complaints process, where appropriate.

Complaints Commissioners will be entitled to a daily attendance allowance when engaged on their functions. No-one can be appointed as a Complaints Commissioner if they are a member of the public service or the Legislative Assembly.

Those wishing to apply for the post of Principal Complaints Commissioner should write to the Governor at Government House **by Friday 23 July** with their name, address and contact details, the nature of their current employment, and a brief explanation of their reasons for applying and the skills that they would bring to the post.

claims.

Q IN a recent letter to parents, the Head of FICS outlined the arrangements being put in place to cover MLA Edwards' teaching responsibilities while she attends an overseas conference.

What is the total cost of bringing in the Geography Specialist mentioned in the letter?

The answer to this, and the following three questions were provided by Director of Corporate Resources Keith Padgett.

A £4,350 including flights. Q WHO is covering this cost? A THIS has been funded from savings at Gilbert House as a result of reduced Members' Allowances

Q DO the Assembly not feel that this money, in such tight economical times, could have been better spent with a different MLA attending the conferences?

A AS is always the case. Members considered carefully who should attend that conference. In this instance, bearing in mind the political situation with our neighbours, it was considered important that one of the two people who would later be attending the UN Committee of 24 should attend for consistency. The other Member who will be attending that committee was unable to attend both.

WHAT specific plans are in place for the arrangements being made following the start of the 2010/11 academic year when MLA Edwards becomes a part time teacher, specifically what plans are in place for KS3 students?

A THE arrangements have not yet been formalised but the intention is to amend the timetables to ensure that students are not disadvantaged and allow Ms Edwards to fulfil her role as a teacher as well as her Legislative Assembly commitments.

VIF a contractor is employed by FIG, and extends their contract, at what point will they have to transfer on to local conditions?

Personnel Officer Jennifer Smith provided the answers to this and the following question.

A AT Executive Council on 23rd May 2006 it was agreed that the maximum period over which overseas contract officers may be employed on full overseas terms is seven years, subject to the approval of Executive Council in each case: to the post being advertised locally during the period of six months prior to the fifth anniversary of the commencement of employment: and to there being no



suitably qualified and experienced local applicant.

IS it possible, for example, for them to remain indefinitely on overseas conditions (with the additional pay, flight and gratuity benefits that implies), although they have lived in the Falklands for a considerable length of time?

A NO. There may be circumstances where an individual's contract of employment continues beyond the seven year period, due to them having had extended breaks between contracts, or for other reasons associated with leave entitlements, but those conditions end when that contract does and any new employment would be offered on local terms and conditions.

WITH the disaster of Louisiana continuing to unfold, it begs the questions:

What are FIG's contingency plans for such an event occurring here?

An FIG spokesperson has provided a response to this, and the following six questions.

A IF an event such as a blowout, like that recently experienced in the Gulf of Mexico, were to occur in the Falklands Offshore Area then the initial response would be provided by the offshore operator concerned, as detailed in their Oil Spill Contingency Plan (OSCP).

Each operator produces an OSCP, which FIG must approve before permission to drill is granted. Operators' oil spill contingency plans complement the Government's National Oil Spill Contingency Plan, which was revised last year.

The Contingency Plans detail three different categories of response arrangements (tier 1,2 and 3). The response that would be adopted is determined by the characteristics of a particular spill (size, location etc.). An incident like that experienced on the Deepwater Horizon rig in the Gulf of Mexico would be a tier 3 spill (the most significant and important).

As a tier 3 incident the Oil Operator would activate the arrangements they have in place, as a condition of operating here, to call in their tier 3 response. This involves using a specialist oil spill response company which has the capability to respond to a tier 3 spill. This would involve mobilising equipment and people from elsewhere.

FIG's oil spill plan is geared to dealing with relatively minor oil pollution events, but events which are quite likely. These include accidents involving vessel types commonly operating around the Falklands where any single pollution event is unlikely to exceed 200 tonnes. FIG's limited resources can be deployed to assist in combating any larger pollution event.

Q DO we have sufficient resources already in place to deal with such an occurrence? (Presumably miles of oil booms and sufficient shipping assets to deploy them)

A NO, but there is some oil spill response material available in the Islands, to deal with at least an initial response. The Government holds a limited amount of dispersants and booms in order to deal with a small scale spill, and the oil operators have response material available in order to be able to respond to a minor spill, or to provide initial response to a major spill.

Sea conditions around the Falklands are such that the use of booms is only likely to be effective in sheltered areas.

In the event of a major spill, the oil companies have agreements with dedicated international oil spill response agencies and other organisations which ensure that further supplies can be directed to the Falkland Islands at very short notice if necessary.

There are normally at least three vessels supporting rig operations, which could be used to deploy booms and dispersant in the event of a spill. In the event of a large scale spill. In the event of a large scale spill, the oil spill response organisations would deploy additional assets to deal with the spill, such as aircraft capable of spreading dispersant from the air.

Q WHO foots the bill for the above materials?

A IF the oil spill were caused by oil industry activity, then under Falkland Islands legislation the oil industry is liable for the costs of any clean up, and to pay compensation as calculated.

WHAT would be the procedure to assess the damage to the environment and wildlife?

A IT is probable that wildlife at sea would be most affected by a spill, as the oil is very unlikely to reach the shore. The degree of impact would depend on the time of year and the species affected.

In the highly unlikely event of such an incident FIG will take the lead on assessing damage to the environment and wildlife. Local resources will be mobilised and these could be supplemented with addi-



tional resources if necessary. This should include both the immediate response and longer term monitoring. Costs will be recovered where possible.

Q DO we have the capability and assets to decontaminate vast quantities of wildlife?

A NO. The National Oil Spill Contingency Plan anticipates a capability to treat small numbers of oiled birds; 30 or less. In a crisis larger numbers could be treated, but the logistics of collecting, transporting and maintaining significant numbers should not be underestimated.

External resources can be mobilised which may assist where there is an ongoing spill. Such resources are unlikely to be available in time to respond to initial wildlife casualties.



A THE polluter pays - the company responsible for the pollution would foot the bill.

Q HOW would FIG assess the financial damage to tourism?

A IN the event that there is a major oil pollution event, apart from the immediate damage to the environment and wildlife, a number of industries may be impacted; fishing and tourism being the most obvious candidates.

FIG will work closely with these sectors to assess the damage arising from any such pollution events.

Note: In the unlikely event of a major oil spill, the Falkland Islands sea conditions, being generally rough, would mean that any spilled oil would be dispersed naturally relatively quickly.

Furthermore, in their Environmental Impact Statements, the oil companies detail the results of modelling they have undertaken to calculate the worst case scenarios in the event of the loss of diesel or crude oil.

This modelling shows that, even in a worst case scenario with sustained periods of abnormal wind directions, the probability that an oil spill would impact on land environments is very low.

This is primarily because the prevailing wind and currents will tend to push any spill to the north east and away from land. Wildlife at sea may be affected, depending on the time of year, wildlife and specific locations.

The answers given refer to response in the event of a spill, but the Falkland Islands regulatory framework and significant resources are directed at prevention of such incidents. FIG works with the UK Health and Safety Executive and the UK Department of Energy and Climate Change to assess Operators' proposals to drill.

Permissions to drill are not granted unless FIG is satisfied with the drilling plans.

A cricketers future for the Falklands

WE know what we've got to do to be better" Chairman of the Falkland Islands Cricket Association Roger Diggle said to the Penguin News, after the team's return from Mexico.

They played in the Americas Championship Division 4, where they won against Costa Rica in a 50 over match, with a score of 131 ahead by 39 runs, and lost against Mexico by 211 runs

In the 20 over matches against the two division four teams Roger said they performed well: "We did think Mexico were beatable," he said. "We know what we've got to do to improve, we didn't disgrace ourselves, we came away performing better than we thought we might." They lost by 29 runs to Mexico, and 65 to Costa Rica.






