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

# Institute wins support from local researchers

A PROPOSED new environmental research institute in the Falklands could create significant opportunities in science, and boost both the economy and job prospects for budding researchers.

A number of interested parties in the Falklands have welcomed the proposal, from Andrew Fleming of the British Antarctic Survey (BAS), who recently spent five days on the Islands.

He said a lot of research already went on in the Islands within the fishery, conservation, agriculture and many other areas. However, there was a perception that it was not as coordinated as it might be, and there could be opportunities to attract a "larger and more vibrant research community" to the Islands.

"The key thing is that we don't propose to completely change or disrupt any of the existing research structures that are already working, unless there is a really good reason to do so," he said.

Independent researcher Sally Poncet said she thought it was an excellent idea.

"An institute could provide a central point of contact for the increasing number of researchers, both local and overseas, who are making use of the Islands' natural resources for their research activitics. It could also provide openings for young Islanders wishing to further careers in research.

"These activities include not only the science itself, but the social and commercial aspects that the science creates.

"It needs to be done in a coordinated and structured fashion though, founded on a solid business plan and with sufficient local private sector know-how and backing to avoid ending up with another 'white elephant'.

"Only then would an institute be in a position to be of benefit to both science and the community." Dr Paul Brickle, Fisheries Biologist/Marine Ecologist with the Fishery Department said the Falklands had many unique selling points for environmental research, so the potential for an institute was there.

"The Falkland Islands shelf and slope waters are an interesting environment and ecosystem on the doorstep of the southern ocean with easy logistics," he said. "Also, it is an area which is relatively unstudied, so there is significant potential for significant advances in regional science which may have wider applications.

"Economically it can only be beneficial with scientists paying for local services and also bringing in grant money which will be spent in the Islands."

Senior Agricultural Advisor Mac MacArthur said the proposal had a lot of merit, as it could attract funding for a wide range of agricultural, biodiversity, conservation and climate change issues. There were benefits, too, to be had from development of a research and development project to utilise fish and meat processing waste composted with calcified seaweed, kelp and utilising wind power to produce relatively inexpensive agricultural fertilizer.

Scientific work is currently being conducted at Saladero which involves using satellite technology to ascertain plant species and sustainable stocking rates for different camps in the Falklands.

Mr MacArthur said this important scientific work could benefit from more resources to provide improved sustainable grazing management knowledge and prevent regression of greens and whitegrass to less nutritive species such as diddle-dee and native fern.

"There is still so much to be researched in the Falklands," he said.

1 AM told the ongoing discussions over workplace legislation in the Falklands can be traced partly to debate over the reprehensible terms and conditions under which some overseas fishing crews are employed.

There have been numerous distressing examples of crewmen jumping ship while in Falklands waters, simply to escape those conditions and seek refuge or repatriation.

Some, shockingly, have died through their efforts, while others have endured beatings, torture and, to put it mildly, gross indignity – all in the name of scraping a living from the sea.

The subject raised its head again when a member of the public rang the Penguin News this week to thank us for publishing the report on government salaries. They then spoke of their disgust at the apparent hypocrisy of a society which promotes fair and equitable working conditions, yet turns a blind eye to the horrors dealt out by a minority in the fishing industry, upon whom this country earns the bulk of its national income.

And they are horrors. Locally employed squidders, who are often instructed to not reveal their wages to the fishing crews with whom they share meals have, over the years, told tales of appalling treatment dealt out to their erstwhile colleagues.

Fisheries department observers are tasked with monitoring their catches and ensuring licences are adhered to, but they are not empowered to enforce the law, and nor can they be assigned to every vessel. Islanders know they are faced with an awful dilemma. There have been too many examples of men overboard and too many stories of gruesome maltreatment for the issue to be imagined. But, realistically, what can be done?

Customs and Immigration is powerless when a foreign registered vessel is at sea, and it is simply unviable to appoint police officers – probably the only personnel who could deal with such incidents – to patrol every ship.

And all the while the country continues to reap the benefits of the minority who abuse the privilege of fishing in Falklands waters.

This country, of course, is not alone. Miscreant fishing vessel owners are the scourge of the industry worldwide. But is it not still morally repugnant that the industry finds itself helpless, despite the cries for help of those unfortunates who have occasionally been rescued – or, worse, their bodies washed up – from Stanley harbour? 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## **Couple's alcohol fuelled argument ends up in court**

STANLEY man Claudio Agustin Lautaro Briones Sepulveda (48) was arrested in the early hours of Sunday morning, after a taxi driver reported to police that he was in breach of bail conditions and had been dropped off with his wife at their home on Discovery Close.

Mr Briones had appeared in court last week charged with assault occasioning actual bodily harm to his wife on June 26. The case was adjourned so he could seek legal advice.

On Monday, represented by David Lang, Mr Briones admitted he had breached the bail conditions not to contact his wife or enter their home, saying he wanted to save his marriage because he loved his wife. Acting Crown Counsel Sam Burke said the taxi driver had been concerned because Mr Briones was verbally abusive to Mrs Briones and herself.

Mr Burke said when the police arrived at the Briones' home to arrest Mr Briones, Mrs Briones had been upset, but she was adamant nothing had happened. Mr Briones was also upset and blamed the police for ruining his marriage.

"Mr Briones had breached bail conditions and was likely to breach further conditions if they were imposed," said Mr Burke, who also recommended Mr Briones be remanded in custody until Wednesday.

Senior Magistrate John Trevaskis said he had taken into consideration that the police were not summoned by Mrs Briones, there was no suggestion he had been physically abusive to her and that being remanded in custody since the previous day was a "taster" of what would lie ahead if he was to appear before him again. Mr Lang indicated that his client intended to enter a guilty plea to the charge of causing actual bodily harm, and Mr Trevaskis decided to proceed with the case rather than wait until Wednesday.

The court heard how on June 26, after consuming approximately four litres of alcohol between them, an argument had broken out between the Briones, which had ended in Mr Briones hitting his wife around the head, pushing her to the floor, kicking her in the shins and cutting off an item of her clothing with a penknife.

When Mrs Briones managed to get away from him she called the police and later made a statement. Two days later Mrs Briones retracted her statement.

Mr Lang said the couple were intent on patching things up and his client was thoroughly ashamed of his actions, which had taken place at a time when Mr Briones and his wife were extremely stressed due to medical and financial difficulties.

Placing a one year conditional discharge on Mr Briones, Mr Trevaskis told him he had been given credit for his early guilty plea, but it was behaviour the court would not tolerate: "Sadly, once again, the court hears of the involvement of alcohol turning an incident violent," he said.

Explaining the conditions of the discharge, Mr Trevaskis told Mr Briones that in no sense was he being let off, and the court in no way condoned his behaviour. At the same time there was no wish to add to the difficulties Mr and Mrs Briones were experiencing, he said. Prosecution costs of £120 are to be paid by Mr Briones.

## Too few ticking off responses to survey

THE government's Retail Price Index Household Expenditure Survey has been postponed until October 1 – because too few households have agreed to take part.

The survey is designed to assist the government in setting the Retail Price Index, which is used to determine changes in the cost of living. Government workers are routinely given cost of living wage increases, and this in turn trickles down to pensioners and the private sector.

But not enough households have so far responded to allow FIG to work on a suitable sample size.

Letters to prospective participants were sent out in July, and the survey was by now to have been underway.

The Policy Unit and Synergy Information Systems, who have been contracted to conduct the survey, strongly urge any households who have not yet returned their forms to please do so as soon as possible, remembering to include their name and address in the spaces provided.

# School's Out club youngsters enjoy their day out at MPA Oil activities still remain encouraging

THE offshore oil drilling rig Ocean Guardian continues its work at Rockhopper Exploration's Sea Lion well, where hydrocarbons were encountered earlier this year. The well at that time was suspended for re-entry and testing.

Director of Mineral Resources Phyl Rendell said the current programme included re-en-

tering the well, drilling through cement cores, locating the hydrocarbon intervals and testing before the well would be permanently plugged and abandonded.

The activities are expected to last between 25 to 35 days.


Mrs Rendell said the actual flaring of carbons was likely to last less than 48 hours.

While she described recent activities as "encouraging steps" she said there was no guarantee that the well would produce commercial hydrocarbons until more appraisal wells were drilled and further analysis carried out over the following months and years, to establish the economic viability of the field.

After the drill stem test on the Sea Lion prospect, Ocean Guardian will be contracted by Desire Petroleum to drill at their Rachel structure, which is located south of Sea Lion in licence PL004.

Desire Petroleum director Ian Duncan and chairman Stephen Phipps plan to visit the Falklands at the beginning of October.

Argos Resources have meanwhile successfully listed their company on the London Stock

countered in 1998. Mrs Rendell said new data would equip the company in "de-risking

drillable prospects." Meanwhile in the northern hemisphere Encore Oil has enjoyed a surge in value after discovering a significant new oil field close to the Shetland Islands.

But would this be likely to detract from exploration activities in the Falklands?

Mrs Rendell said she did not think it would have any impact on the exploration programme in the Falklands because most operators did not have licences to explore elsewhere and had licence commitments that needed to be fulfilled.

"As it can take over a decade to develop an oil field, with no guarantees of production if the economics don't justify development, exploration can be expected to continue around the world, including the Falklands," she said.

"The Falklands is of course only one country out of many promoting oil exploration, and companies weigh up the odds when applying for licences.

"We are fortunate to have committed licensees who are investing a lot of money in exploration at present, which is benefiting the local economy. We hope it will continue," she said.

## Rape charges

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A STANLEY youth who has denied raping a child under 13 is to be tried in the Supreme Court on January 17. Senior Magistrate John Trevaskis said on Friday he was satisfied there was a case to answer. The 16-year-old male was released on bail. On Wednesday Stanley man Matthew John Newton, who faces two charges of rape and two of sexual activity with a child, also had his case committed to the Supreme Court. No trial date was set.

## Oil flight delay

THE first UK to Falklands passenger flight for the oil industry, an A310 Airbus with approximately 194 seats scheduled for Saturday, will not now take place. An AGR Group spokesperson last week said a fortnightly flight was scheduled to begin this weekend, but a military spokesperson this week said no contract had been signed and arrangements were "commercial in confidence."

### SA forum bid

ARGENTINA is working with Unasur (Union of South American Nations) so that in future the South American forum offers more than "a gesture of support" to its sovereignty claim over the Falklands, said Argentine ambassador Jorge Argüello in advance of next month's UN General Assembly.

### Fire appliance

LAST week we described the new fire appliance for Stanley Airport as CAT3 compliant. It is in fact a CAT2/H2 capable appliance. The error is regretted. A second vehicle commissioned for the Fire and Rescue Service is due to arrive in the Islands around November 21.

### Visas waived

VISA requirements for visitors from Taiwan have been waived. Cllr Dick Sawle said this meant fishing crews and others would find it simpler to enter the Falklands, but they would still be subject to exactly the same immigration laws as before.

## **EU** mission

FALKLANDS airbridge carrier Air Seychelles is in the process of meeting European Union emissions monitoring and reporting requirements, in order to allow it to continue meeting traffic regulations into the EU.

# MPA volunteers raise a fortune for local charity

A NEW initiative at MPA in the form of a Thrift Shop has taken off in a big way - and a local charity has been the first benefactor.

Next month they hope to raise a further £1,000 for the Royal Hospital Chelsea. Flight Lieutenant Mark Wareing, who is Officer in Command of the Thrift Shop property, said he was astounded by the success of the Thrift Shop.

## Police deny lights set to dazzle

DIRECTOR of Community Safety and Chief Police Officer Gary Finchett has denied that the lights on police vehicles are set to deliberately dazzle drivers.

Several members of the community, including local taxi drivers, had expressed concerns that the headlights on police patrol vehicles were set to shine directly in the eyes of oncoming traffic.

Mr Finchett said the patrol car headlights had not been altered to dazzle road users and this had been confirmed by an independent inspection.

He said, however, that police did need to carry heavy equipment in the rear of their vehicles which, when driving over uneven ground, might cause the front of the vehicle to rise, but there was no manual mechanism in the vehicles to adjust the alignment of the headlamps.

The Road Traffic Ordinance states that headlamps should be able to be deflected "downwards or both downwards and to the left at the will of the driver in such a manner as to render the lamp incapable of dazzling any road user," and this was the case with the police vehicles.

The suggestion that headlamps had been adjusted to better iden-

tify whether drivers were wearing seat belts at night was incorrect, said Mr Finchett.

He added that it was, however, timely to remind people that safety belts must be worn by drivers and passengers unless certain provisions applied. "This is for their own safety and that of others. The police will prosecute people who persistently flout the law," he said.

He said all road users, regardless of whether they were police officers or not, must comply with the regulations laid down by the Road Traffic Ordinance and the Road Traffic Regulations.

## Destroyer intercepts £4m drug smugglers

HMS Gloucester has intercepted a yacht carrying £4 million worth of cocaine.

The Type 42 destroyer, heading south from Portsmouth for its final deployment to the Falklands, was called in to assist a law enforcement team from Cape Verde in the mid-Atlantic in the early hours of Friday.

The suspect yacht, the Florida registered Tortuga, was then taken to Cape Verde, off the western coast of Africa, where cocaine with a street value of £4m was found hidden within the rudder HMS Gloucester's Commanding Officer. Commander David George, said the yacht had nowhere to run: "The last thing a drug smuggler wants to be seeing as the sun comes up is a Royal Navy warship bearing down on him, He can't run and he can't fight.

"HMS Gloucester provided the ideal launching pad for the Cape Verde law enforcement team to

intercept these drugs. It's fast, has long-range detection radar, and one of the fastest helicopters in the world, the Lynx Mk 8. There was no argument."

The operation was coordinated by the Maritime Analysis and Operations Centre (Narcotics), based in Lisbon, acting on French intelligence.

"Thanks to close cooperation between the Cape Verde authoritics, international counter-narcotics agencies and the Royal Navy, millions of pounds worth of cocaine has been stopped from reaching our streets," said Commander George

The operation is the first one of its kind between the UK and Cape Verde authorities, and comes after efforts by the Royal Navy and Serious Organised Crime Agency to increase counter narcotics missions in the area. UK Defence Secretary Dr Liam Fox said: "This is another example of the great work the men and women of the Royal Navy carry out around the world which helps protect us at home.

"The Royal Navy plays a crucial role in intercepting drugs that could be destined for Britain's streets. I am very proud of their efforts."

The Gloucester, carrying a company of 280 men and women, only left Portsmouth on August 20. It will spend the next seven months in the South Atlantic, and make official visits to Brazil and Chile.

### Visitor fees do work elsewhere

FALKLANDS Conservation views tourism and conservation as being inseparable, thus we are interested in the future of Gypsy Cove and encourage public discussion of issues and activities that affect tourism and conservation.

However, several points made by Mr Watts (Penguin News, August 20) need to be clarified.

While Mrs Jaffray's editorial on August 13 made a number of valid points, it is doubtful that FIG will redirect funds from healthcare. infrastructure or education to improve tourist facilities and management of Gypsy Cove.

Thus, some with an interest in Gypsy Cove are exploring how funds can be set aside for site management and improvement.

We noted Mr Watts' concern that a site fee might be illegal but, having consulted the Falkland Islands Constitution, it appears that subsection 4 allows for differential service/access fees for persons not belonging to the Falkland Islands.

To our knowledge, all discussions of site fees have indicated that persons belonging to the Falklands, current military and veterans would retain rights of free access.

As a comparison, tourists would pay £80 to see a doctor, but residents would receive the same service free of charge.

Is there a particular reason why foreign visitors, who pay no taxes in the Falklands, should receive the same rights of access as those who do?

Mr Watts suggests that a site visitor fee will harm tourism, yet visitor fees successfully support the development, operation and maintenance of facilities at popular tourist sites elsewhere.

Tourists at Seno Otway Penguin Reserve near Punta Arenas pay £2.50 per person: tourists at Boulders Beach penguin colony in Cape Town pay £4 each: and visitors at Phillip Island's Little Penguin colony in Australia pay £12 each. All three sites are immensely popular.

Mr Watts also proposes a solution for wardens at Gypsy Cove, including a series of comments about Falklands Conservation that require clarification.

As a registered charity, Falklands Conservation is accountable to its members, various funders, including the Falkland Islands Government, and the UK Charities Commission.

For the interest of readers, Falklands Conservation currently receives less than 20 per cent of its annual operating budget from an FIG subvention. We raise the remainder through grant applications and the generosity of countless individuals and companies, who make events such as the Charity Ball possible.

Most of our funds are restricted to particular projects in support of FIG's biodiversity strategy. Seabird monitoring, tussac restoration and environmental education are key components of our work; but we also produce a range of books and interpretive materials in support of tourism.

FIG is responsible for managing Gypsy Cove, but they cannot currently fund improvements to the on-site facilities or tourist experience.

If some among you believe that a Gypsy Cove visitor fee of a few dollars is going to cause tourists to cancel their \$2,000 to \$20,000 cruises, then we encourage you to express those views during the public consultation.

## You can't blame the contractors

DESPITE the online chirping Mr Goodwin prompts from the anonymous Johnny Rooks crowing in The Nest, he raises a very pertinent point in his letter (Penguin News, August 27).

Robin is inquisitive to know how much of the cash paid to contract employees is remitted off the Islands annually.

I think in general for those so engaged that, less the expenses incurred living here, it is the lot!

My understanding is that for an employment contract to be awarded the local pool of talent for a particular job will have first been exhausted and only then are folk from elsewhere recruited.

Presumably these individuals, who fill not only some key positions but also many in the general workforce, are required to keep the Islands buoyant.

Even if British, such workers do not enjoy the same rights as the established elite of these purported British Islands, and they can be easily discarded.

Australians long ago recognised they must "populate or perish" and seem well aware of the tyranny of distance and economies of scale.

Although they do enforce a rigorous immigration filter they encourage those who benefit the Australian economy to stay. Canada I believe does likewise.

The Economic Development Strategy meeting hinted at a population of 9,000 by 2034 for survival. In view of the decline in agriculture, erosion of Camp life, fish vanishing, empty oil wells and now that the UK Armed Forces are to be further pruned to field the firepower of the 3rd Aldershot Scout Troop. I think a population of 9.000 by next week would be far better for the longevity of these beautiful Islands.

I do realise this suggestion may ruffle our "old guard" and will get the diddle-dee wires humming, but a thriving contemporary community will be hard pressed to survive on animosity to newcomers and nostalgia alone.

At present contract employees are disenfranchised, but pay full tax in line with the local electorate.

Whilst accepting that there is no need yet for contract workers to dress up as Indians and throw all FIC's tea-bags in the harbour in protest, the concept of "no taxation without representation" rings a bell in the history of settlements founded by landed immigrants.

Sovereignty claimants trumpet that there was no indigenous population here so all Islanders must descend from migrants at some time.

Contract workers have to keep a bag packed, can only bring the basics with them, and cannot purchase property or invest in these Islands with ease.

I suggest this is short-sighted and a sad loss to the vibrancy of the community. Since contract employees are always waiting for the "boot," even the most skilled tend to shuffle about quietly resembling bag-ladies because they must plan to jettison as much as possible when finally frogmarched off to the airbridge.

In fairness it is not unreasonable therefore for them to wisely make provision for that fateful day by investing overseas. John Dobson




Again the fun and lively celebrations continued into the early hours of the morning ending the Hill Cove two nighter on a positive high.

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## Scientists survey krill fishery as part of huge marine study

TWO South Georgia based scientists are undertaking survey work at sea to investigate the spatial overlap between the winter krill fishery and the distribution of foraging predators and fish larvae in South Georgia waters, reports the SG newsletter.

This forms part of a larger programme of marine studies that will lead to the establishment of Marine Protected Areas (MPAs) in the South Georgia Maritime Zone.

In 2008 the Commission for the Conservation of Antarctic Marine Living Resources identified 11 priority regions where work to designate MPAs was urgent, and one of those was South Georgia.

MPAs are an important tool for conservation of marine biodiversity, and form a key component of ecosystem-based management.

According to the UK Overseas Territories Conservation Forum, the Sub-Antarctic is a natural laboratory that provides unique opportunities to study and understand one of the most intact large marine ecosystems remaining on earth.

However, human activities such as fishing, tourism and scientific research are increasing in the Southern Ocean, and have the potential to cause major impacts on biodiversity and eco-system function. Sub-Antarctic marine eco-systems are fragile and can be slow to recover from the impacts of human activities.

Their resilience may also be weakened by the effects of climate change.

Action must therefore be taken to maintain the integrity of Sub-Antarctic ecosystems and biodiversity, before irreversible changes are allowed to occur.

The current survey work is investigating the potential interactions between higher predators and the krill fishery at South Georgia.

The work is also being carried out to monitor the possible interactions the fishery may have with other fish stock through the by-catch of larval fish, and will be conducted over two years.

The scientists are conducting seabird and mammal counts and trawling for larval fish on set transects.

The transect areas have been set in the main target areas of the krill fleet, set using historic krill catch data, and in adjacent areas that are not normally fished.

The two scientists, based at the British Antarctic Survey at King Edward Point, are working opposite ends of the day.

During daylight hours Higher Predator Scientist Jon Ashburner monitors a 300-metre wide strip of sea on one side of the ship as it moves along the transect.

He records every higher predator seen, which may include penguins and other birds, seals and whales.

He also records the animals' behaviour, noting if they are feeding, their direction of travel, approximate age and moult states for some of the birds.

Analysis of the data should show what species are competing with the fishing industry to use the krill resource during winter.

Fishery Scientist Luke Kenny conducts his work at night.

A plankton trawl net is used to fish for half an hour at three stations along each transect.

He then analyses the collected samples to identify any larval fish. Four surveys are planned as

part of an Overseas Territories Environment Programme project. The results will build on carlier

work surveying seabirds at sea carried out in 2002 to 2004.

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
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


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

# **People power overturns FIG housing application**

MORE than 200 Stanley residents have successfully opposed a controversial plan to build five new government houses on Anderson Drive – despite a recommendation for their approval

The building plots were earmarked for vacant land between Short Street and Anderson Drive, one of the few untouched pieces of land in the east Stanley development area.

Originally designated in the town plan as green space, 0.2 hectares of the site was last year redesignated as suitable for residential development and, as a result, recommended for approval by the Environmental Planning Officer.

But fierce opposition from neighbours and local residents – including a petition with 205 signatures – helped persuade members of the Planning and Building Committee to lend their support to the objections. Eleven people also wrote letters of protest.

A majority of the written objections cited not only the loss of green space, but also the lack of provision for play parks in an area popular with young families.

Bernie and Gareth Goodwin said a previous petition was organised some years ago when residents felt the area was under threat of development (a similar government attempt to build houses was turned down in 2004).

"When we were first allocated our plot, the plans clearly showed that this area was to remain a green space, possibly a play park," they wrote, "There is already a limited amount of public green space in the ESD as it is. This development will reduce this to almost nil.

"East Stanley is full of young couples and families. Soon these young children will be older and needing space to play and explore safely, and at this rate they will end up doing this on the pavements. We think the in-fill policy needs to be stopped now before

the character of Stanley is lost forever." Sarah Rowland, Joste Joshua, Mark Spruce and Caroline Cotter also were among those bemoaning the loss of an area which could be turned over for children's and family use.

"This will surely cause more danger to the children and worry to the parents," wrote Ms Rowland. "Please reconsider and think of the young generation."

Mr Spruce said it was about time government moved its housing developments to the south side of Stanley Bypass, and Ms Cotter argued that green areas helped build the strength of a community because they offered opportunities for family recreation.

"The community spirit is something that is slowly dying off in these Islands, as a result of development and expansion, and no one seems to have foreseen the potential negative effects that this may bring," she said.

Assembly Member Emma Edwards also was among those objecting, saying she was upset at the proposal to build houses on what was "the last natural area of green land in the heart of the east Stanley development area."

She wrote: "The infilling of land I feel is very short sighted. FIG needs to progress the West Stanley development area and to stop finding small areas to fill up with houses."

Among those happiest at the outcome were Stephen and Suzi Lapham, who submitted the petition to FIG. They told the Environmental Planning Department they were concerned a large number of residents they had canvassed appeared unaware of the planning application.

They also said a number of "senior representatives of FIG and the Foreign and Commonwealth Office" had expressed support for their petition, but felt unable to publicly express their opinions.

Mr Lapham told the Penguin News this week he was delighted with the outcome: "Obviously we are very pleased," he said. "One of the things that struck me was that a lot of people seemed resigned to the fact that because it was a government proposal it was going to happen. But it's fair to say the decision was better than we had expected or even hoped."

Under the planning ordinance, the Planning and Building Committee is not empowered to refuse government applications, but it did recommend refusal to ExCo. However, within a few hours referral to ExCo was not necessary, after the Lands Committee late last Thursday instructed the Director of Public Works to withdraw the application.

While still not officially redesignated green space, a spokesperson at the Environmental Planning Office said the land would most likely revert to green space – after going to public consultation – when the town plan was next reviewed in a year or two.

"It is good to see that it does make a difference when people put their opinions forward," said Mr Lapham.

MEMBERS of the Legislative Assembly have been nothing if not community-minded while they have gone about their business.

They have sought feedback on the Economic Development Strategy and canvassed employers on the introduction of a minimum wage. They have declared that the issue of smoking in public places is to go to public consultation, householders have been asked to complete expenditure surveys to assist in compiling the next Retail Price Index, and they have again pleaded for more responses to their Housing Needs Survey

And this phenomenal flurry of public input has been sought in just the past two months. So why then are some people growing increasingly underwhelmed as Assembly members keep adding to their efforts at inclusiveness?

Could it be that they haven't actually "done" much since that heady night of the long knives last year, when they dismissed their predecessors in one fell swoop?

Don't get me wrong. Attending endless committee meetings, hosting frequent public meetings and dashing overseas to attend yet more meetings is no idle feat. And the wheels of democracy must keep turning. But when we consider what has actually "happened" as a direct result of this Assembly's policies, what can we point to?

The removal of means testing for family allowance payments and student grants were sensible moves - but the lowering of the tax threshold and the reintroduction of the Medical Services Levy are far from popular decisions.

In their defence, they do seem genuinely committed to a number of progressive policies. And they are good listeners. But these intentions alone don't cut it when you are an elected representative because, sooner or later, the electorate demands results.

The news this week that some in the community want to finance a nationwide survey on smoking because they feel Assembly Members are not taking sufficient notice of public opinion should, then, come as something of a wake-up call. It may even suggest a degree of impotence among those they asked to assume power

The current crop of MLAs certainly enjoyed an arousing honeymoon period when they were swept into office. But, more than nine months after the new Assembly was consummated, there is little evidence of the pitter-patter of concrete achievements among the corridors of Gilbert House. Which sort of begs another question: just how long is the gestation period of a Legislative Assembly?

## **Dairy manager** admits theft in Australia court

FORMER Stanley Dairy manager Kevin Reynolds appeared in court in Fremantle, Western Australia, on August 20, admitting theft from the dairy of items totalling \$AU20,000. He was remanded for sentencing on October 8. The charge against his wife and fellow dairy manager Leone was discontinued. The couple first appeared in court in April 2009 as a result of joint investigations by the Royal Falkland Islands Police and Australian police, after dairy owners FIDC reported items worth £38,000 may have been stolen from the dairy. Further investigations by Australian Customs and Excise are expected.

COLIN George Macdonald (60) appeared before the Senior Magistrates Court on Wednesday, charged with attempted unlawful sexual intercourse with a girl under the age of 13, between December 1967 and February 1968. Senior Magistrate John Trevaskis said the charge should be answered in conjunction with other matters pending, due to be heard in the Supreme Court on January 10. A plea has not been entered.

KYLE Joshua (21) has had his case adjourned after admitting assault. Acting Crown Counsel Sam Burke said the defendant had approached his victim after she called out to him, shortly after midnight on Sunday August 22. He allegedly grabbed her, threw her on the ground and kicked her repeatedly in the head. After the victim retaliated, Mr Joshua had run away. Defence lawyer David Lang, said Mr Joshua admitted throwing the victim to the ground, but did not

admit to kicking her. Mr Trevaskis said because kicking was an aggravating feature, and the defendant had not accepted all elements of the charge, the case would be adjourned for a Newton hearing.

MARK Anthony Courtney (18) was fined £250 after admitting careless driving. Mr Courtney was driving east along Davis Street on August 25 when he lost control of his vehicle at the Snake Hill junction, His Toyota Prado drove through the Hillside fence before coming to rest against an administration block. He also was ordered to pay prosecution costs of £85 and had his licence endorsed. \* \* \* \*

MARIE Clifton (36), who was charged with stealing £25,587.88 from Kelper Stores Limited between October 2009 and April 2010, has had her case adjourned until Wednesday October 13, in order to give her time to take legal advice. Mr Trevaskis said she would be expected to enter a plea at her next appearance.

A STANLEY youth (16) who is to be tried in the Supreme Court in January, has entered no plea to the charge of rape of a child under 13, as reported last week. Under Falklands law, alleged rape is one of five offences considered so serious that it can only be dealt with in the Supreme Court, and no plea is taken in the Senior Magistrates Court. \* \* \* \* \*

## Oil drilling to continue until at least February

THE Falklands exploratory drilling programme is to continue through to February 2011, despite opposition from Falklands Conservation.

At the recent Mineral Resources Committee meeting FC argued that hydrocarbon exploration activities should be restricted to the original activity window (February to July 2010) and not extended through wildlife breeding seasons.

The organisation recommended that given the inadequate quality and quantity of data upon which Desire Petroleum had based its conclusions, the international significance of the Falklands for marine birds and mammals, and adhering to the precautionary principle, the request by Desire for an extension to the drilling period should be declined.

Environmental Planning Officer Anthony Payne, however, said FC's comments failed to recognise the short term nature of the current round of exploration, and they would carry more weight if they were made in respect of production platforms which could be in situ for far longer.

Mr Payne said hydrocarbon exploration took place in many sensitive areas of the world and he was not aware of operations being suspended elsewhere due to seasonal wildlife concerns.

He surmised that FC's proposal to withhold consent to undertake drilling in the more sensitive period seemed a disproportionate response that was not supported by available evidence and that any impacts would be short term and localised in nature.

FC's suggestion that Desire had downplayed changes in species interest over the extended drilling period, and that the Environmental Risk Assessment failed to address those matters sufficiently, was countered by Desire who argued that the only possible risk was an accidental oil spill event which was very unlikely to occur given the control measures the company had in place and, as such, the risk to species was low.

FC representative Sarah Crofts told the committee that FC was not intending to be unduly critical but, given that neither FC or FIG could properly appraise the sensitivities and risks at this stage, the aim was to raise awareness.

She said FC wanted to draw attention to sensitive periods so the regulator could ensure that best practice was adhered to.

Declaring an interest as a trustee of FC, MLA Jan Cheek agreed the organisation would not be doing its job if it wasn't questioning, and agreed the data upon which the EIAs and subsequent addenda were based was "pretty thin."

The Mineral Resources committe members said they welcomed the dialogue with Falklands Conservation and agreed that FIG needed to consider what could be done to improve the data issues.

### Plum replaced

HMS Endurance, the Antarctic patrol vessel fondly referred to as the Red Plum, is to be replaced early next year by a vessel from Norway, reports the News from Portsmouth. Endurance almost sank in 2008 and was piggy-backed from the Falklands to the UK. The Navy maintains that a decision is yet to be taken on whether to repair or replace the ship.

### Retail up 24%

FALKLAND Islands Holdings announced at their AGM yesterday that year to year retail sales at the West Store are up 24 per cent on the comparable period last year. Chairman David Hudd said despite a quiet start to the year due to disappointing illex catches, oil exploration had boosted Islands activity, especially in the retail sector.

### New council

AT the Chamber of Commerce AGM on Wednesday, Roger Spink was re-elected as president and Hamish Wylie as Vice President. Treasurer by general consensus is to be Pam Budd and the two new members elected onto the council were Nikki Buxton and Drew Irvine.

### Smoking ban

A GROUP of individuals representing a broad section of the community, and including a doctor, parents, three smokers and an ex-smoker, is attempting to raise funds to undertake an independent survey of the electoral roll, to establish the community's view on a smoking ban in public places. See Page 6.

## Oil payouts

ROCKHOPPER has awarded almost £1m in early bonuses to four executives after finding oil in the Falklands, before key tests on the flow have been completed. The bonuses are Rockhopper's third pay-out to directors in the past 16 months, after its annual report revealed an "accelerated" incentive plan.

## Quality snaps

AWARD winning wildlife photographer David Slater is set to join Aqua-Firma in February on its Wildlife and Photography Expedition Voyage to South Georgia, Antarctic Peninsula and the Falklands. He will be on hand to assist passengers with their photography.

## Abandon rig

A CHILEAN operated oil rig off Argentine Patagonia in the South Atlantic caught fire early on Wednesday, forcing all eight workers to evacuate.

## Coming soon to a TV set near you

THE Falklands is about to welcome its own independent TV channel.

Existing private sector TV provider KTV has teamed up with Stanley Services Limited to launch Falkland Islands Television Limited (FITV), which will broadcast locally produced news programmes "two to three times a week." The new company is equally owned by both parties and plans to start broadcasting later this year using KTV's distribution platform. Mario and Sharon Bulic Zuvic, owners of KTV, said they were very excited to be creating a TV station producing "local news and other programmes by local people for the local community."

Tom Swales, Managing Director of Stanley Services Limited, said he was very pleased to be involved in the creation of a new company offering a new service to the Islands.

"It will be a new sector within local business, and will create a small but dynamic industry in the Falkland Islands," he said.

Station owners say FITV will be staffed by local people who will undergo the relevant training.

### Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

THE reporting on FIRS of the recent decision of Planning and Building and Lands committees to shelve the application for building in green space in East Stanley was incomplete. It omitted the important fact that the area in Anderson Drive was designated green space in the town plan until the middle of last year when the Executive Council of the day re-designated it as building space. I believe that the Mink Park development plus the Snake Hill plots to be released imminently, and other plots still undeveloped by those to whom they were allocated, will absorb all the building capacity for some time. Further plans for the West Stanley development are in hand

EXCESSIVE infill in the centre of Stanley is one of the many concerns frequently voiced by constituents, and it is not simply a matter of NIMBY (not in my back yard); more often people deplore a short-sighted change to the essential character of the town. While some very large plots can be divided sensibly, the development of smaller plots may lead to overcrowding and exacerbates parking problems, despite the requirement to provide parking spaces. One day I hope the Planning and Building Committee will have access to computer generated representations showing what impact any proposed new development will have. A number of former members of the committee have told me that they would never have agreed certain developments had they understood how large/ overpowering/inappropriate/ugly they would be. It is sometimes hard to visualise from paper plans whether a building will blend with its neighbours.

AT the end of next week I head north to help man the Falklands stand at the party conferences. It is always very important to have a presence, but even more so this year with so many new MPs. It is also a great opportunity to meet the people at the grassroots of the parties. Hundreds, if not thousands pass the stand each day, and many stop with questions about the situation in the Falklands today. Many quaint myths can be dispelled and it is an exceptionally good opportunity to publicise the 21st century Falkland Islands. Jan Cheek MLA

# **Outgoing Governor the economy... and**

#### Can you describe your background in a nutshell, and how you were appointed to your role here?

After a spell in the Home Civil Service, where I served twice in Northern Ireland, I joined the FCO in 1980.

There have been two strands to my career: arms control (both conventional and weapons of mass destruction) and European security after the break-up of the former Soviet Union and the former Republic of Yugoslavia; and the Overseas Territories.

1 have a bit of experience with the latter. 1 headed the Regional Secretariat in Barbados dealing with the five Caribbean Territories in 1996-8; was head of the Overseas Territories Department (OTD) in 2001-4; and Governor of Anguilla in the Caribbean in 2004-6. 1 was short-toured in Anguilla to come to the Falklands in particular to cover the 25th Anniversary of the 1982 conflict – perhaps the Office thought I was a safe pair of hands!

#### What were your initial impressions of the Falklands, and how have they changed since?

I had already visited the Falklands when I was head of OTD. So I had an inkling of what I was coming to; Helen did not.

The Islands get under your skin with their rugged beauty, constantly changing weather and wonderful wildlife – but it's people who make the community. We have been privileged to get to know so many lovely people here – and have met nothing but warmth, friendliness and generous hospitality.


#### You have been the UK Government's representative here for four years. What are the most significant issues in which you have been involved?

Three key issues – the 25th Anniversary of the 1982 conflict, Constitutional reform and the current oil exploration round.

On the first, Simon Weston (Welsh Guards) said to me that there were two best times to have been Governor of the Falkland Islands – in 1982 and on the 25th Anniversary. Absolutely true.

It was a privilege to host so many 1982 veterans returning that year, Sir Rex Hunt and Lady Mavis and, of course, HRH the Prince Edward (and earlier the Princess Royal).

Chris Keeble (2 Para) said that once he had conjured up enough courage to return to the Islands, it was the best thing he had ever



done. It was good that so many went away feeling better about their battle experiences and, above all, that having seen the advances that the Islanders have made since then, they left knowing that it had been worth the sacrifice.

On the second, the new Constitution represents a major step in the political development of the Falkland Islands. It places responsibility for domestic affairs much more firmly on elected representatives, which is where it should be. I think (and hope) that people recognise the advantages of this.

On the third, the possibility of developing an oil industry in the Falklands is an exciting prospect. But it has created problems in managing relations with Argentina, which were predictable and predicted. And, if successful, it may result in socio-economic changes, which will also require careful management if they are not to have a negative effect on the way of life enjoyed here.

But the advantages for the Falkland Islands' economy and the economic prosperity and stability that oil exploitation can provide to the people of the Falkland Islands is the real prize in prospect.

#### How would you describe relations with our various neighbours in South America, and how do you see them in the future?

Relations with Argentina are difficult and have become more so as the Argentine Government has sought to constrain the possible development of an oil industry in the Falklands. But it is in all our interests to maintain a stable relationship.

Yes, of course, the Argentine Government has pulled out of several co-operation agreements and not allowed others to work properly, and some of their actions are directly against our best interests. It is deeply frustrating that they do not accept the principle of self-determination as it applies to the people of the Falkland Islands. But this has to be managed by patient, long-term diplomacy.

We must continue to be resolute in maintaining our position on sovereignty but we should avoid matching rhetoric with rhetoric and action with reaction. This only serves to inflame passions, making problems more difficult to resolve. Quiet resilience is pragmatic, not weakness.

Relations with our other neighbours – Chile, Uruguay and Brazil – are excellent. But even then, we need to respect their views. They should not be taken for granted (and are not).

#### How much work goes on "behind the scenes" to protect the Falklands and to attempt dialogue with Argentina?

Lots I think people would be amazed at how much daily effort in London and overseas posts goes into managing the issues affecting the Falklands. Certainly, more of my time is looking outwards rather than inwards. And it is good that the new British Government has emphasised its determination to ensure the continued defence of the Islands even at a time of stringent economies.

#### What single domestic political event or issue has most stretched your patience?

The Governor has to help to resolve or at least ease problems that arise in various working relationships. This is not always easy

Above all, the Governor has to reflect honestly the views of elected representatives and public opinion to London. Sometimes, 1 suspect that they may have thought that I had gone too far in doing so – but that is probably because I shared Islander views.

#### On what occasion has your influence been most beneficial to domestic affairs?

In getting the balance right on Constitutional issues.

In other Overseas Territories, there is perhaps greater intervention on the part of the Governor. But this is a very British place where the machinery of government works well. So it is important to shift the role of the Governor more into oversight rather than direct involvement, whilst protecting UK Government liabilities and ensuring overall good governance.

## reflects on politics, Huckle's Corner

#### You have hosted many parties and receptions at Government House. What is it about them you enjoy most, and which has been your most memorable?

Government House is there to serve the community and for the community to enjoy. I was taken aback to be told that many Islanders had never visited Government House: so we tried to be as inclusive as possible and hosted several open houses so that all could come.

You wouldn't do this job if you didn't like meeting people. We've had some wonderful occasions – dances, opera evenings, garden parties, fundraiser events, snooker and darts evenings – all excellently catered by Anita Alazia (who has cooked for Government House for nearly 25 years) and served by efficient staff. They make the House what it should be – a warm, friendly and relaxing place.

The most memorable? Well, it has to be Anita's wedding to Gavin Browning on Saturday last – the first time, 1 believe, that a Governor has conducted a marriage service in Government House, at least in living memory.

#### If you were able to spend a day in the Falklands incognito, how would you spend it?

**how would you spend it?** Why incognito? We've always wanted people to know us for what we are. We'd probably head for the West, though, where noone's not known.

#### There's a spot near New Haven known locally as Huckle's Corner. What's that all about?

Not my best moment – rolling the Rover was not what I wanted to be remembered for! Thank goodness they didn't call it Governor's Bend – it would have soon morphed into "the Governor's round the bend"! But it togethe

But it taught me a salutary lesson about driving in the Falklands and the benefit of seatbelts – and nowhere else would people scoop you up, take you home and sort your car out so readily. I hope the sign will prevent future accidents on that corner, given the number of people who said that they nearly got caught out there too.

The Falklands is weathering the global recession, but there are serious question marks about opportunities for economic growth and a stagnating population. How would you fix the future for the Falklands?

Without oil, prospects are worrying. With declining fish revenues and deficit budgets, we are beginning to live beyond our means.

The options are to raise taxes, cut public expenditure and/or to increase the revenue base by economic diversification – and we probably need to do all three.

The economic and rural development strategies are a good start on diversification but they need to be progressed, not put on the shelf.

With oil, the outlook is considerably better. But Members are wise not to take it for granted in their economic planning forecasts.

And if we do find oil in commercially exploitable quantities, we should start planning how best to use the income that it will generate – we should learn from the countries that have managed their oil revenues the most successfully.

#### Your position precludes you from taking an active role in the running of the Falkland Islands Government. What would you do if you could?

It's worth noting that the Constitution provides quite extensive powers for the Governor to ensure good governance in the Territory and, through his chairmanship of Executive Council, the Governor is intrinsically involved in all aspects of government.

That said, without slavishly taking on all the overlybureaucratic procedures found in the UK (and EU). I would encourage adopting some sensible health and safety, fire prevention and risk management measures and, if oil exploitation and a port are in the offing, some stronger environmental protection measures.

If we had the money, we might also consider whether the 1982 battlefield sites should be preserved (and conserved) or continue to be left to decay naturally (and be prey to the pilferer).

#### You have an occasionally wicked sense of humour and you have shared numerous "off the record" jokes with the media. Have you had an "undiplomatic" moment which you would care to share with our readers?

Every Governor should expect to get bogged – indeed, you haven't experienced life in Camp until you have. But 1 never expected to be personally bogged.

I was invited to lunch on a frigate by a previous CBF when a senior military figure was visiting. So I dressed relatively smartly.

What I wasn't told was that, on the way, the helicopter would drop us at Onion Range to allow us to observe a live firing exercise.

CBF and CJO, in combats, yomped off in pouring rain as I sank to my knees in the bog – and had to suffer the indignity of being hauled out bodily by two burly sergeants who, thankfully, came to my rescue.

#### Your home is your office, and you share it with a number of staff and FCO officials. What do you like to do when they all finish for the day?

The problem about living next door to the office is that work can be all-consuming (although I wouldn't be so keen if I did not enjoy it).

But, when there's no evening function to attend, it's good to relax in front of the fire, perhaps snoozing gently with contented dogs and cats.

#### When you look back on your posting to the Falklands, what will make you smile, and what will make you cringe?

I cringe at the memory of all those I have mistaken for someone else – please forgive me.

But 1 have lots of fond memories that I'll be able to smile about – the seagull that was roundly cheered by the 1982 veterans when waiting for a delayed fly-past; the look on a former CBF's face when a FIGAS plane flew nonchalantly past a Battle Day ceremony when his Tornadoes had been grounded for bad weather; the pleasure on the faces of those told that they are being honoured... there are many more.

### What are the future plans for yourself and Mrs Huckle?

An active retirement, after a slow passage home via New Zealand, Australia and Singapore (though Helen has threatened to leave me in New Zealand if I continue to be rude about the Aussies and Australia).

I shall join the Falkland Islands Association and we shall both cheer on the Falkland Island competitors in the Island Games in the Isle of Wight next year – and, of course, we shall take out a subscription to the Penguin News to keep up with events here.

#### What would you offer as a farewell message to residents of the Falklands?

Thank you for your many kindnesses and for allowing us the opportunity to serve the Falklands for four happy years. You shall always be in our thoughts.

## Survey to reveal majority opinion

LIKE Jan Cheek, writing in last week's Penguin News (September 3), we are finding it increasingly difficult to understand the stance taken by some MLAs on the subject of smoking in public places

Everyone, including the tobacco companies, recognises that smoking is harmful to the smoker and the majority would agree that it is harmful to non-smokers who have to inhale the smoke.

This worldwide recognition of the harm to smokers and passive smokers has led many countries to enact or be working towards a total ban on smoking in public places, including restaurants and bars.

There are not many countries left in Europe where you can smoke in public places. Australia has a total ban, as does New Zealand, Canada and, closer to home. Uruguay.

China had hoped to have a total ban in place by 2011, but this has now been delayed to 2012.

Russia is in the process of enacting laws for a total ban on smoking in public places.

Many other counties, such as Brazil. Mexico. India, etc have banned smoking in public areas but do allow limited smoking in small areas of bars, etc so long as there are high quality extractor fans (these systems have not been shown to remove all harmful particulate matter from the air).

In America, over half of the states have enacted anti-smoking legislation.

None of these countries has banned smoking itself, but they rightly feel they have a duty to protect the health of their citizens and are acting accordingly.

Our MLAs have put this matter out for public consultation but we fear they will only hear from those with firm views at both extremes of the argument, and the views of the majority will go unrecorded.

MLAs will be aware that a few years ago the Medical Department undertook a survey and found a majority of both smokers and nonsmokers in favour of a ban on smoking in public places.

Had MLAs really wished to ascertain the views of the electorate on this important matter, they should have conducted another postal or telephone survey.

The signatories to this letter represent a broad section of the community, including a doctor, parents, three smokers and an exsmoker, who all feel a ban is essential.

The missing link photograph from the August 20 edition of the Penguin News (pictured), submitted by Ailsa Heathman, has been identified by Anna-Lisa Johnson. She said the man was her great grandfather Robert Reive (also Ailsa's great grandfather) with his oldest son Peter.

She said Peter died in November 1903 aged nine, so the photograph must have been taken around 1901. Robert had ten children; four by his first wife Alice Bonner and six by his second wife

Jessica Coutts. He came to the Islands from Scotland when he was three weeks old in 1866, with his parents Peter and Elizabeth Reive. They had a total of eight children, six of whom were born in the Falklands. Robert Reive died in

Stanley in 1936. Anna-Lisa grew up in London and lives now in Buckinghamshire. Her mother Elvira Hadassah Fuhlendorff (or Dass to those who knew her) was born in Stanley in 1915. Dass' mother was Elizabeth Alice Reive, the daughter of Robert Reive. Her father was Hjalmar Johannes Frederick Fuhlendorff, a Danish sailor who in 1908 decided living in the Falklands was better than being at sea. Dass went to England in 1937 to train as a nurse, and didn't return home until 1996 when

### Losses are gains in the long run

I HAVE been following the smoking debate with interest and I believe the landlords have little to fear. They may lose the odd customer but the majority will not stay away for long, as most of she and Anna-Lisa visited for a holiday; Dass' first visit in 58 vears.

Stanley's social life occurs in the pubs, be it darts, pool, quiz nights, live music and karaoke, bingo, etc.

If any customers are lost, 1 think they will be replaced by others who do not frequent the pubs now because of the smoky atmosphere.

Apparently the Trough is as popular now as it was before becoming a non-smoking venue, and other non-smoking events are usually well attended: the Winter, May and Conservation balls for instance.

The Narrows also appeared to be a favoured family pub in the past, certainly on a Friday evening.

I am not usually in favour of forced action but, in this case, with the backing of medical evidence and the associated costs, I think the ban should be implemented, especially when we hear young people asking for it. Some could argue that being overweight is posing another potential medical drain, but at least the overweight are only harming themselves and the taxpayer who has to pay for the treatment.

It was argued at a recent public meeting that addictions also affect other family members, and that is very true, but also of any illness generally.

I was not in favour of a seat belt law but I was frequently told that any serious accidents brought huge medevac costs and that appeared to be the overriding argument at the time, and it won the day.

Seat belts save lives and a smoking ban will too. As with the seat belt law, even if we choose to ignore the dangers ourselves, children deserve our protection as do those who have to work in these establishments for our entertainment.

I know a good number of smokers who already go outside their own homes to smoke so they can't relish the smoky atmosphere and its consequences.

I have seen people quit smoking that I never believed would be able to, and they have saved so much money and quite possibly lives, and I salute them.

If smokers can roll up and burn bank notes and inhale poisonous substances, then good luck to them. Perhaps they do not realise just what some of these poisons are, but no one else deserves to have them inflicted upon them.

## Our bank notes are worth a mint

THE Treasury announcement that we need a resupply of  $\pounds 10$  and  $\pounds 20$  pound notes begs the question, why not have a new design?

We have used the same design for the past 26 years, with small changes in wording and new signatures.

The extra costs in production of a complete new design would be recovered by increased sales in uncirculated notes to collectors and tourists looking for souvenirs.

The reason a country issues its own currency is to establish sovereignty, and the design of the banknote should reflect this.

Added to this is the extra revenue that can be accrued to the Treasury by sales of notes.

It is known in the collecting world that some countries issue too many notes.

Equally, countries like the Falklands fall into the category of not maximising returns on a safe commodity, by only reissuing old designs. We have many talented local artists that could be challenged to create the new look banknote. Why not get them involved with a design competition?

In that way more local interest is created and more people would collect, which in turn encourages more to buy notes.

The more notes that are sold to collectors, the more revenue to FIG and the lower the reserves required in the currency fund.

The same idea could be channelled into currency coinage. There has been no new design for any coin since their first issue.

The original idea of wildlife plus sheep for the 1974 issue had the 50p warrah added in 1980 and £1 coat of arms in 1987.

Collectors will collect whatever the design, but souvenir hunters want a token image of the Islands.

Therefore the penguin should be on the highest denomination coin!

Commemorative coins are issued to celebrate events or promote local heritage, while proclaiming sovereignty.

The Falklands will have only one commemorative coin issued in 2010. The Henry Dunnant gold coin is now available. The Queen's 85th birthday coin awaits royal approval before issue in 2012.

Unfortunately there is no policy for the minting of commemorative coins, resulting in wasted opportunities for raising revenue and promotion of local personalities, historical events, wildlife or heritage.

Collectors collect a series of coins either in gold, silver or cupronickel.

A balance needs to be struck between too many issues, and a drought of too few.

Royal coins will attract the thematic market. A gap of no coins will attract no sales.

To remain in the market the Islands need to adopt designs that reflect local interest. Designers need to be encouraged to create images that attract customers to buy and raise awareness of the Islands.

Revenue from sales could be channelled into particular fund raising schemes, like maritime preservation through a series of coins depicting the SS Great Britain in Stanley Harbour in 1854, or the Lady Elizabeth under sail.

I suggest that the Islands are wasting the opportunity of raising funds through lack of marketing of a scarce commodity.

## Oil victim waddles up to Surf Bay

A NEW breed of penguin visited the Falklands last week, but not under the best of circumstances.

An oiled Chinstrap Penguin was reported at Surf Bay, and a search by Falklands Conservation staff and volunteers found the bird sheltering around the corner of Hookers Point, looking rather the worse for wear.

The decision was made to catch the Chinstrap and take him to the Veterinary Department for rehabilitation. After weighing and washing, he was given fluids and put in the pen used to house the oiled King Penguins last year.

With no colonies of Chinstraps in the Falklands it is most likely the oiled visitor came from South Georgia. There have been no other reports of oiled birds, and Conservation staff are hoping this is a one-off case. If anyone spots distressed wildlife, please give Falklands Conservation a call on 22247. Also, any old towels and sheets that Conservation could use for cleaning and rehabilitating birds would be greatly appreciated.

## August blusters away

AUGUST was slightly milder, wetter, sunnier and more windy compared to others since MPA records began in 1986.

The mean maximum was 6.6 Celsius compared with the 5.7C average. The highest was 12.1C on the 4th and the lowest maximum was 0.5C on the 1st. The mean minimum was 1.2C, against the 0.5C average. The lowest minimum was -4C on the 1st and the highest minimum was 4.3C on the 11th.

Total rainfall was 54mm, compared to an average of 39.4mm. The wettest day was the 30th with 16.2mm. More than 0.1mm fell on 21 days and 1mm or more fell on 14 days.

LIFE in the pink palace of Argentina's ruling couple is no bed of roses, says the Sunday Times, reporting on journalist Sylvina Walger's new biography of the Argentine president.

The book portrays Cristina Kirchner as the "puppet" of an authoritarian husband who once punched her in the face for defying his will. She is said to be so obsessed with her appearance she changes outfits three times a day. Nestor Kirchner is described as "mean, petty, vengeful and envious," and is said to take all the important decisions for his wife, flying into a fury if she disobeys him. "All that's left of that marriage is the question of how to divide the spoils of power," writes Walger, who claims both have had affairs.

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The Falklands Health Promotion Group presents a series of columns aimed at making our lives longer, safer and healthier. This week's focus is on oral health...

ORAL health is important for us all. Firstly, I am sure most of us clean our teeth two or three times per day, but do we do it properly?

Do we use toothpaste with fluoride? Children only need a pea-sized amount of toothpaste and need not rinse after brushing for three minutes, but just spit out the excess. Parents are advised to supervise their children's brushing until such time as they can clean all tooth surfaces on their own.

Adults should do exactly the same but being careful not to scrub too hard. Use a gentle action to remove plaque from teeth and especially at the gum/ tooth join where plaque is harder to remove.

Other oral care aids are available such as floss, dental tape and inter-dental brushes are available for the difficult to reach areas.

Other common "irritants" can also affect our oral health. Remember the "S's": spirits, smoking and spices. Alcohol in excess can affect our general health, which is well known, but it can also lead to cancer in our mouth.

Drinking alcohol to excess is not good and many people are unaware of the damage that it can cause to our oral structures. Sometimes it is known as the "silent killer," so advice is to keep it at a reasonable limit.

This goes for smoking as well, but here, no safe limit applies! Smoking is bad for our teeth, gums, lips, throat and all the oral tissues, so stop it immediately by seeking smoking cessation guidance now.

Regular attendance at the dental clinic is not just to check the teeth but also to provide early screening for the above oral health concerns.

For these reasons even those with complete dentures should attend regularly for check-ups and denture care advice.

If attention is given to our teeth, gums and oral health then hopefully the day you need plastic teeth will be put off forever.

## **Eileen may be longest surviving Islander**

A 100-year-old woman living in the UK may be the longest surviving Falkland Islander. Her daughter, Veronica Wilson, submitted this article for the Penguin News...

EILEEN Pickford, nee Creece, was born in the Falklands on August 20 1910, and celebrated her centenary with a luncheon at the Carlyon Bay Hotel in Cornwall, two days later with her family and close friends. Now living with one of her daughters in Cornwall. Eileen often recalls much of her early days in the Falklands, albeit for just nine years of her life.

Eileen remains a member of the Falkland Islands Association and, we believe, she could well be the longest surviving Falkland Islander – but possibly readers will let us know if this is not the case!

Eileen's parents. Edwin and Agnes Creece, went to the Falkland Islands in 1908 - her father as storekeeper to the Falkland Island Company - taking with them their first son Martin, and first daughter Jean.

Doris was born in February 1909 and Eileen and Nora followed.

Younger brother Tony was born on a Norwegian whaling vessel the "Urm," en route for England in 1919, following the family's temporary departure to the United Kingdom after the First World War.

During that voyage Eileen experienced her first taste of life outside the Falklands, calling at several ports on the way to Liverpool, including putting into St Vincent in the West Indies to refuel with coal. Prior to that she recalls

sitting on the knee of Ernest Shackleton when he was billeted with her parents in 1916, and being evacuated to Fox Bay during the Battle of the Falklands.

The sight of the SS Great Britain also was a familiar one when the ship was used as a woolstore in those days.

Her school life was at the small local Catholic school being taught by Sisters Rose and Fortunata as well as by Father Mignone, who baptised her and also had given her father Edwin last rites when he was suffering from double pneumonia.

She recalls that straw was laid in the road outside the house to deaden any traffic sound – something we in the UK now find quite astounding. Fortunately her father recovered and survived for several more years.

Eileen married first in 1936 to Horace Charles Wilson from London, and they had four children.

Eileen's brother Martin returned to the Falklands as an adult and was posted to Darwin, employed as an accountant for the Falkland Islands Company. In later years he met his wife to be, Frances, who was nursing in the local hospital and, coincidentally, her mentor in London where she trained was Martin's aunt Gertrude Kelly – Agnes Creece's sister.

Martin was also a local JP and secretary of the Sheep Owners' Association. They both became well known figures in the community and possibly some of the older members of the community may still remember them.

Frances went to the UK to prepare for her wedding but on returning to the Falklands her ship was torpedoed and her trousseau still lies at the bottom of the Atlantic!

However, she eventually sent a telegram to Martin advising him of this but, due to the translation of the message and unfortunate loss of punctuation, the telegram read: "Arrival Baby by plane" instead of "arrival BA [Buenos Aires] by plane"!

However, Martin, with some alarm, travelled there and they married in Montevideo Cathedral.

They stayed in the Falklands until they both retired to Sussex in England in 1964. Their son Dermott, now in his early 60s, has a successful bookbinding business in the Midlands.

In 2008 Eileen's youngest son Philip visited the Falklands in his quest to produce a comprehensive family history. He met Jane Cameron in the Archives office and she gave him a tremendous amount of help and information, as well as having the opportunity to acquire some interesting photos of his mother's old haunts.



# Seal of approval for an island called... Bleaker

THE refrains of the late, great Johnny Cash song A Boy Named Sue was in my head as I strolled the coast of Bleaker Island on the weekend. I couldn't help but sing along: "And if I owned this island I'd call it Bill, George, charming, blissfully peaceful, a walker and birdwatcher's paradise, the perfect getaway... anything but Bleaker

The 5.155-acre island with a varied coastline of low cliffs with hidden caves, sloping bedrock and sandy beaches with sheltered bays, an abundance of wildlife and some fantastic walks is anything but bleak

Now owned by the Rendell family and managed by Robert and Elaine Short, it has been farmed for more than 100 years and to my mind is the most immaculately maintained farm I have ever seen on the Falklands. Our accommodation, the purpose-built self-catering house called Cobbs Cottage also lived up to these standards.

With a sniff of spring in the air, the antics of geese preparing to nest provided endless entertainment from the living room window. And for those Islanders who like to mark the season with a goose egg for breakfast. Bleaker is an absolute haven.

There is no shortage of wildlife with four types of penguin breeding on the island, King Cormorants, Black-necked Swans and Silver Teal among the 37 breeding birds recorded, not forgetting the seals that dot the Return FIGAS flight Stanley to Bleaker Island: £108

shoreline and bask in the thick coastal tussac grass. But you don't have to be an avid birdwatcher to appreciate all that is good about Bleaker. I am guilty, as are many who have grown up on the Falklands, of being a bit blase about the wildlife. I appreciate it, am always on the lookout for a good photograph, but I am more inclined to get excited about a particularly craggy piece of coast, a hidden cave or a blow hole carved in the rocks by the endless pound-

ing of the open sea. Personally I blame Enid Blyton and all those Famous Five books 1 devoured as a child: and yes; I do still keep an eye out for treasure a: passing smuggler might have. stowed away!

Walking around the coast of the National Nature Reserve on the northern part of the, island we discovered all of the above (well, okav, no treasure), had an escort from a' young elephant seal who kept a beady eye on us and gave the occasional roar from a safe distance in the sea, and saw the first few Jackasses returning. Bleaker lends itself well to walking, no matter what level of fitness, and even the most relaxed stroller will find themselves eating up the miles.

In the evening we had a magnificent barbecue in a recently renovated cowshed, complete with purpose-built cooking area, woodburning space heater, kitchen area and an untold luxury at a Falklands barbecue... a loo. While the forewarned storm gathered strength we feasted on succulent Hereford beef steaks? burgers, sausages, lamb chops and salad, all washed down with Chilean winc.

It was the perfect way to end a deliciously restful weekend and , I'm already planning a return visit with; a group of friends with guitars. The rafters in that barbecue barn are just crying out to be rat-tled with a good old Falklands sing-song. Brace yourself Bleaker, we ll be back. Sharon Jaffray

# Tourism support lacking

I HAVE heard many comments since being in the Falkland Islands. about tourism and it seems there is a real lack of understanding from many on the future potential of tourism in the Falkland Islands and how seriously tourism is accepted in the community. I amalso surprised about the lack of government investment into this industry compared with other industries on the Islands, which continue to be propped up year on year with little return.

Tourism is the largest and fastest-growing export sector in the world and the world's number one employer: one in 12 jobs today is in tourism. By the end of 2011 it will contribute more than SUS 9.3 trillion to world economic activity - more than 10% of total global spending - and a very healthy growth rate of 4%-5% is projected over the next ten years.

Overall, expenditure in 2010 by inbound overnight tourists. cruise passengers and domestic tourists to the Falkland Islands is expected to total over £5.4 million, number two in GDP.

Tourism affects all our communities. Directly or indirectly, it involves a huge range of businesses, from accountants and builders to hotels and supermarket workers, and I believe it will become one of the largest drivers for growth in the Falkland Islands in future years if it is taken seriously. Tourism is also providing sustainable growth in activity and profitable income streams to the Camp community.

1 fully understand that tourism does not have the 160 years of history in the Falklands as some industries, but what I don't understand is how an industry that actually contributes over £5 million to the economy has to fight to get its basic infrastructure to an international standard which is, in effect, our export product! Cable and Wireless became the hockey league's sponsor and teams recently contested the Russell Smith Memorial Trophy.



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



# FIG joins SAAS bid to save vital shipping link

ASSEMBLY Members this week confirmed government was financially assisting local shipping company South American Atlantic Services (SAAS) in its bid to maintain the Falklands' vital shipping link with South America.

At Tuesday's public meeting Assembly Member Sharon Halford denied the business was government subsidised in any way.

However, Cllr Glenn Ross said the decision had been made to support SAAS for a fixed period of two years for a "finite amount of money." He declined to reveal the amount saying only that the figure was in the government estimates.

The FIG approved estimates for 2010/11 show the sum of £1million listed under loans and investments, with no further appropriation in subsequent years, which is believed to be the sum made available to SAAS.

But councillors declined to confirm this was the case: "This has to be treated in the same manner we treat all commercial in confidence matters," said Cllr Halford.

Due to declared interests by Cllrs Jan Cheek, Roger Edwards and Bill Luxton, who are all shareholders, and absence from the Islands of other councillors, Cllr Ross said he and Cllr Gavin Short had dealt with most of the work involved with the decision to assist the shipping company. Cllr Ross said he thought the link could work, but it would "take time."

Development Corporation General Manager David Waugh said that with only one voyage per month being undertaken at present, the 20 days each month spent not steaming were spent either in the Falklands or in South America. He said the recent period spent anchored in and around Stanley Harbour was a saving while waiting to go alongside FIPASS for cargo. In the high fishing season Scout would likely be back to making two voyages per month.

SAAS began trading in July 2005 and is a 100 per cent subsidiary of Consolidated Fisheries Ltd (CFL) which, according to financial statements, intends up until 2012 to provide up to £1m to meet SAAS's liabilities. During the 2009 financial year CFL provided for a loss of almost £1.5m, but the bigger picture shows a total loss of almost £4.3m over the past five years. FIG and FIDC also have invested in a new 300-container park east of the FIPASS access road, at a total estimated development cost of £944,470. The park would, said Cllr Sawle, be a vast improvement to SAAS' ability to operate a container service and also provided a much needed piece of shore-side infrastructure to service FIPASS.

# **Gypsy Cove loos go down the pan**

THE lack of toilets at Gypsy Cove for the forthcoming tourist season came under fire at Tuesday's public meeting, accompanied by several predictable quips.

The suggestion that it cost £60,000 per annum to maintain the toilets, however, was quickly dispelled by Development Corporation General Manager David Waugh, who explained that the figure was estimated as the annual maintenance cost of high usage toilets in that area in a report several years ago.

The toilets were purchased, equipped and maintained by the Tourist Board but, having fallen into a costly state of disrepair, they have now been sold to FIG for PWD workmen on site, FITB General Manager Paul Trowell told the Penguin News. The annual maintenance, cleaning and supplies had actually cost £3,500.

The decision to remove the toilets had not been taken lightly, and the money from the sale and the maintenance budget would now be put towards an alternative solution. "We are currently looking at environmentally friendly composting systems," he said. However, said Mr Trowell, it

However, said Mr Trowell, it was his view that it was not the role of the Tourist Board to supply public toilets and bathrooms and, with budget cuts over the past two years, they could no longer afford to maintain the old Portaloos.

"At the end of the day I had to decide whether to market the Falklands as a destination or look after public amenities," he said.

# Housing needs survey open to all

ALL Falklands residents are being encouraged to take part in the government's Housing Needs Survey, as part of ongoing efforts to identify demand and assist those most in need.

Policy and Performance Officer Gina Smith, who is assisting the Environmental Planning Office with the project by collecting and collating the information, said she would like all residents in the Falklands to contribute, regardless of immigration status. "The housing market in the Falkland Islands has not yet been truly evaluated for both local and non-local status holders," she said. "We need to consider everyone's views

"We want to know if there are gaps in the housing market, firstly for Falkland Islanders and secondly for non-residents. Non-residents may want to invest in their future, but at the moment it appears to be very difficult. This questionnaire is being used to establish our baseline."

Copies of the survey have been distributed to some, and Mrs Smith said she hoped many others would contact her for copies. "The more responses received, the more information we will have available to enable the correct decisions to be made," she said.

The survey includes questions designed to establish the respondents' current situation, other details such as residential status and income, future accommodation requirements and a section for further comment.

When Bonnie heard their bid was successful, she was at work: "I was very excited and jumped around the office squealing a lot, and rang Ben straight away," she said, "He came home that lunchtime with a bottle of bubbly, and we had a checky glass in our lunch hour – only a cheap bottle though, because obviously we have to save for our house now."

The plots, situated just off the Moody Brook Road, offered achievable prices for first time buyers with a substantial government subsidy. Those submitting tenders had to wait only four days before being notified whether or not they were successful.

The couple have now acquired a builder for their future home, and are in the process of working through their plans before they can be given a final quote, and they

Bonnie said: "We've got a few catalogues from the builder. We're at the fun bit now, where we get to pick what we want, although I'm sure it will get stressful at some point. We're just enjoying the good bit at the moment!"

Bonnie said she and Ben had in the past already bid for privately owned plots – substantially more than they paid for the government one - but had never been accepted.

"After the last bid the land owner didn't even bother responding, it was obviously so far below what he was expecting," she said.

"People seem to expect a lot of money for plots these days. When I was a single person, I know there was absolutely no way I would have been able to buy a private plot. And as a couple we would have had to save for years."

### A star is gone

THE cruise ship Star Princess has cancelled her final voyage to the Falklands on March 16.

THE money received by college students, formerly known as "pocket money," will now be referred to as a "student allowance," the Education Board decided on Tuesday.

Assembly Member Jan Cheek said referring to the allowance as pocket money inferred it was "money with no commitments."

College students receive £120 per month to cover additional costs such as exeats and internal travel. Full board, lodging and most books are provided for college students. University students receive £6,900 per year referred to as a grant, paid in monthly instalments to cover food, rent, internal travel and books.

Payment by way of the internet had yet to be sorted out, said Acting Director of Education Richard Fogerty. The Treasury have experienced problems linked to banking in the UK, he said, but it was hoped the college student initiative would be in place by the end of the year. Students and families would be given a minimum of one month's notice of commencement.

# Delhi bound to fly the flag for the Falklands

CHAIRMAN of the Overseas Games Association Mike Summers said it was critically important to the Falkland Islands for competitors to attend the Commonwealth Games with all the other Commonwealth nations.

"Marching with flags, talking about what we do, who we are; it has always been the case the Falklands sports people have represented the Falklands very well when competing overseas," he said.

"The flag with the little union jack in the corner is, for us, very significant."

The bulk of the Falkland Islands competitors will arrive in Delhi on September 28.

The team is 15 strong, with two competing in lawn bowls, five in badminton, and eight in various shooting events. Virtually the whole team will be staying within the Commonwealth Games village.


Mr Summers will arrive in Delhi on September 22, earlier than the majority of competitors in order to iron out any issues before they arrive.

"When the competitors arrive their lives should be as stress free as possible to concentrate on training, not on anything else," he said.

The competitors will have six days to acclimatise and get used to the venues and facilities before the opening ceremony on October 4.

Competitors have put a lot of preparation and effort into their training, Mr Summers told the Penguin News. George Paice and Gerald Reive are regular players in the lawn bowls club circuit in Aukland, and have been playing and training regularly for some months (see page 15).

The badminton team have had their coach Rebecca Pantaney visit

the Islands to set out training schedules for the players, and have been training several times a week. Doug Clark and Michael Brownlee are already overseas playing in various tournaments in preparation for the games.

Recently, they spent a few hours at the National Badminton Centre, where they watched the England badminton squad, before playing Nathan Robertson, and men's singles winner of the USA open, Raj Ouseph, in doubles, losing a respectable 11-4.

Of the shooting teams, clay shooters Steve Dent and Bono McKay have recently travelled to the UK, competing in competitions in Northern Ireland, Scotland and England. The three Full Bore shooters have recently competed at Bisley, and the three pistol shooters will be travelling to a competition in the UK, before the start of the Commonwealth Games

Mr Summers said: "Expectations at the Commonwealth games are for everyone to shoot, bowl, or play badminton to their personal best ability. It is a major international competition and we have to be realistic about expectations, as to where they're going to come, but we do want them to do their personal best."

If there was one area where the Islands stood a chance it would be the full bore rifle shooting, he said.

"But again, that's a highly competitive sport, and we're looking at people out there who are virtually professional."

Mr Summers said he hoped everyone would also have time to get out and about and see a little bit of Delhi.

"It's an important part of travelling, I believe," he said.

# Strong desire to set up drilling

ARGOS Resources have identified seven prospects through data reinterpretation, with a combined potential of 747 million barrels of unrisked recoverable oil in the most likely case, and the prospect of the figure rising to 1.75 billion barrels in the upside case.

Another five leads were mapped using the updated information.

The company reported a noticeable improvement in quality on completion of 2D seismic data reprocessing, and are now following the example of Rockhopper Exploration, in using new seismic 3D techniques within their PL001 licence next to Rockhopper's Sea Lion prospect.

The company listed on AIM at the end of July, raising £22 million, and says it is fully-funded to complete a planned 3D seismic programme, which will be the basis for a drilling campaign to commence in late 2011/2012.

Separately, Argos Resources unveiled its interim results which showed the company's losses in the six months to June 30 more than tripled to US\$247,546 from US\$77,567 a year earlier.

Ocean Guardian continues its work at the Sea Lion prospect, which is expected to continue into October, when it will be contracted by Desire Petroleum to drill up to four wells starting in the Rachel prospect. In order to allow time for the Rachel results to be evaluated, it is said Desire are most likely to drill the Dawn/Jacinta prospect. Desire made a loss of \$6.4m (£4.1m) in the half year to June.

Meanwhile, the Argentine press has confirmed a semi-submersible rig has been contracted from the Swedish company Stensa, and a consortium of Argentine-based oil companies including YPF-Repsol, Pan American Energy and Petrobras will begin exploratory drilling, halfway between Tierra del Fuego and the Falklands, in December. US\$140 million is expected to be poured into the operation by the consortium.

The initiative was interpreted by industry analysts in the British press as Argentina's answer to the exploratory round in Falklands waters and a follow-up to Argentina's claims of sovereignty over the area.

# Sawle rebuts claims at Give us two conference in Kenya

Assembly memebr Dick Sawle this week rebutted historical claims made by Argentina over the Islands in a speech to the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association in Kenya, adding that the challenge Falkland Islanders faced was Argentina's "simple desire to steal what is ours

Cllr Sawle said that during the two-day small states conference. "thanks to much hard work and research by Peter Pepper and Graham Pascoe, the historical falsehoods stated and repeated many times in 1964 at the UN by Argentina had been proved to be exactly that. Any claim based as it was on false historical 'evidence' is meaningless

Around 30 to 40 small state members of the CPA attended the conference

Cllr Sawle said: "For the Falklands, this was an important chance to state our case clearly and, while the CPA itself is not a body that can pass resolutions, it is nevertheless the second largest body of political opinion after the United Nations. For the Falkland Islands, it is therefore a very important conduit in which we can express our views and hope to influence decision makers who represent over two billion people in the world.

### the key issues of sovereignty in general, and the challenges that many small states faced from threats to their sovereignty.

The speech aimed to define what sovereignty meant, with emphasis placed on the difference between the desire to own a small state which was achieved through subjugation and control by fear and force - inevitably leading to conflict - and sovereignty which was achieved through the desire for democracy propelled by selfdetermination.

There is an important point here," said Cllr Sawle, "which is that the authority invested in a sovereign power has to be desired. by those governed by it, in order for it to have the respect that thereby leads to the acceptance by the people of their duty to obey the sovereign system of governance

The speech noted the UN Charter, with its mention of "respect for the principle of equal rights and self-determination of peoples," and UN resolution 1514 which elaborates further on that principle

Clir Sawle said: "But a crucial point agreed by the UN 4th Com-mittee in 2008 was that any dispute over sovereignty should not affect self-determination, which is a fundamental human right.

He said the speech was well received and there was a lively debate afterwards. Gibraltar discussed its problems with Spain, and Malta called on large organisations such as the CPA to assist.

Bermuda called for negotiation over the Falklands/Argentina situation, but it was pointed out that self-determination and democracy were not principles that could be negotiated.


Some delegates agreed that it was more a case of Argentine national pride at stake than any valid claim. One delegate referred to mediation as "rot – it's just a con-spiracy." and said that "joint sovereignty is like claiming to be half pregnant - it simply doesn't exist.

Cllr Sawle said the challenge that Islanders faced from Argentina was "a simple desire to steal what is ours and to subjugate a fiercely independent people to an authority that we do not admire, respect, desire, envy or want.

Cllr Sawle concluded: "The pleawas made for delegates to understand more fully our case and take our views and our position with them when they attend conferences and to speak out on our behalf.

"It will never be a speedy process, but changing opinions and winning friends is something to which we must always dedicate time, effort and cost. To ignore these opportunities is to lose position and influence.

BAS are back in the Islands after the last council allowed them to leave as they were unprepared to update fire safety standards at Stanley Airport.

There is also movement towards a ruling on smoking in public places. This was a policy that the last council had rolled out four years previously, and yet nothing had happened.

At least this new council are doing something, even if they are dragging their feet a little.

I'm not sure if everything that I've mentioned is as a direct result of the new council, but is it not coincidental that they have all occurred since the election?

There have been other changes too, but more than anything, this new council has managed to replace the despondent and stagnant feelings that a lot of the public felt before the election, with a belief that things will actually happen. It may not always be the case, but it sure does make a change from this time last year.

# Beds sought for Glamorgan vets memorial visit

MORE beds are being sought in Stanley to accommodate the 50plus visitors travelling to the Falklands in February for the dedication of a memorial to HMS Glamorgan.

Surviving crew, family members and veterans of the South Atlantic Medal Association (SAMA 82) will be among those attending a dedication service and laying ceremony at Hooker's Point on February 15.

HMS Glamorgan, a Royal Navy County Class Destroyer, was was hit by an Argentine Exocet fired from Stanley by the occupying Argentine Forces on June 12 1982.

The missile passed over Hooker's Point before heading out to sea and striking the vessel.

SAMA 82 Falkland members Gary Clement and Jock Elliot said they were extremely grateful to the usual local stalwarts who assisted SAMA visitors on every pilgrimage and, although they had nearly reached their target, there still was a shortage of beds to be allocated.

"We know it is a bad time of the year," said Gary. "However, we are hoping there will still be some accommodation offers for those dates."

Three people who have been involved in planning the memorial and the visit – Alan Watt, Mike Croxford and Alan Bradley – will be coming to the Islands for an advance recee from October 2-9.

Mr Watt, Chief Executive of CECA Scotland, the sole trade body for Scotland's Civil Engineering Contractors, said they planned to meet with councillors, Director of Public Works Manfred Keenleyside, and as many local people as they could during their visit, when the exact siting of the memorial would also be decided.

The stone will have 14 names inscribed upon it, with the tribute: "In everlasting memory of those who lost their lives on HMS Glamorgan on or after 12th June 1982." Many were wounded in the attack, one of whom subsequently died.

The 14 sailors who gave their lives were Michael Adcock, Brian Easton, Mark Henderson, Brian Hinge, David Lee, Brain Malcolm, Kevin McCallum, David McCann, Terry Perkins, Mark Sambles, Tony Sillence, John Stroud, David Tinker and Colin Vickers.

# The rising rock star in Falklands waters

FALKLANDS rock cod is fast becoming one of the hottest fish on the Spanish market.

The capture of the fish by Galician freezer vessels is now four times those of hake, and numbers continue to rise.

According to Falklands Fisheries statistics, the rock cod catch has almost doubled in the past two years, from 30,000 tons in 2007 to 58,000 tons in 2009.

Previously unknown to the Spanish market, the rock cod (Gadiculus argenteus argenteus) earned its coloquial name because crews on the Galician fleet fishing the South Atlantic did not know what to call it.

A white fish of a similar taste to hake, the rock cod comes with several distinct advantages.

Spanish consumers can buy the fish for less than £1.70 per kilo, while Falklands authorities would welcome the continuing reduction in stocks due to the species eating squid eggs. The rock cod weighs approximately 150-200 grammes, but a few years ago was discarded by hake and squid fishermen as they were unable to sell it.

Javier Touza, president of the Cooperative of Vigo ship owners, said: "We thought it was a shame to discard it because it was a quality fish, with very tasty white mate similar to hake, a size that makes it very interesting for the market and a final price for consumers always below two euros per kilo, which makes it an interesting alternative to many traditional species."

He said in 2005 the cooperative sponsored a study to determine the biological conditions and the commercial possibilities of rock cod in European markets.

The fish has in the past been sent to Russia, Ukraine and the Baltic, reports the newspaper Faro de Vigo, and a new campaign has now been launched to promote the species in Spain. Talk of the town Penguin News Vox Pop What have councillors achieved since they were elected in November?

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# **Islander Teraaka makes 2nd Lieutenant on Falkland Day**

PROUD parents Stella and Phil Middleton recently celebrated Falkland Day in style as they witnessed their son Teraaka become commissioned into the British Army as a 2nd Lieutenant.

Teraaka's wife Phoebe and baby son Theo, along with his younger brother Lief, attended the Sovereign's Parade, which was also attended by Prime Minister David Cameron.

The day began with a church service in the Memorial Chapel, before guests made their way to the stands overlooking the Parade Square.

Around 600 cadets were on parade, all immaculately dressed and showing their marching and drill to an appreciative audience of several heads of state, visiting generals and British Forces senior officers. The parade was inspected by Mr Cameron and Major General P C Marriott, Commandant of Sandhurst.

As a Junior Under Officer Teraaka took charge of part of his company, shouting orders to left and right wheel during the slow and quick march section, culminating in the traditional March of the Square behind the Adjutant,who

Therefore on August 14, Falkland Day, 2nd Lt Teraaka Middleton was commissioned into the 3rd Battalion (Staffs) Mercian Regiment.

After leaving the Falklands. Teraaka passed A Levels at Loughborough College and gained his BSc 2:1 Honours degree in Medical Bio-Chemistry from the University of Birmingham. While at University he joined the Officer Training Corps and the Territorial Army.

After University Teraaka passed selection and entered Sandhurst for the 44-week regular army commissioning course and, by pure coincidence, was placed in Falklands Company.

Each company is named after a famous military battle.

Following two weeks leave Teraaka will attend the Platoon Commanders Battle Course at the Infantry Battle School, Brecon Beacons, and undergo four weeks of jungle training in Belize. Then it's off to Warrior Armoured Vehicle Training at Bovington in Devon, before deployment to Afghanistan in March 2011.

Phoebe and Theo will stay at home in Burton-on-Trent while Teraaka finishes his training, and will then move to the Bad Folingbostel in Germany, where the armoured infantry battalion is based.

"The next time we see him he might be in the Islands as part of the Roulement Infantary Company," said Phil.



# An historic wedding


ANITA Alazia and Gavin Browning became the first couple to be married at Government House when they were married by Governor Alan Huckle.



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# **Q** HOW many contract officers do FIG employ and how many FIG houses do they occupy?

This answer was provided by Hilary McFarland, from the Falkland Islands Government Human Resources Department.

**A** AS at 31 August 2010, there are 78 contract officers employed by FIG and 72 FIG properties occupied by this category of staff.

### Q HOW many domestic violence incidents have been reported then retracted in the past two years and why have none of them been prosecuted for wasting police time?

The answer to this question was provided by Chief Police Officer, and Director of Community Safety, Gary Finchett.

A RFIP dealt with 41 domestic incidents in 2008/9 and 16 in 2009/10. Whilst this downward trend is pleasing, it must be remembered that most domestic violence goes unreported.

Domestic violence is a serious crime and more people die at the hands of their partners than by strangers, which is why protecting vulnerable people from harm is a high priority for the police and other departments. In addition, the misuse of alcohol is a common fac-

tor in many cases of domestic violence. Victims of domestic violence sometimes feel compelled not to make a complaint or to withdraw it once made due to pressure from the perpetrator, or other factors such as finances or where they and their children will live. These issues can always be resolved and the safety of the victim and their children is paramount.

It is not helpful to provide figures relating to the number of complaints retracted, or the number of cases where the Attorney General's department have decided that a prosecution for wasting police time is warranted, as to do so would potentially identify individuals and also undermine the principal that anyone who is in an abusive relationship, or anyone who has concerns about a friend or relative. should come forward and report it so they can be given help and support. Suffice to say the vast majority of reports of domestic violence are absolutely genuine and very rarely do people deliberately. make false allegations, as they know the potential consequences for themselves and the alleged perpetrator.

Nobody has the right to abuse another person physically, sexually or emotionally and everyone in the Falkland Islands has the right to live their life free of violence, fear and abuse.


People who are in abusive relationships need to remember they are not alone, it is never their fault and there are people like the police and social work department who will help them stay safe, if they or people who know them seek the help and support that is available.

### WHEN it comes to encouraging our children not to smoke etc, why is it that we see uniformed police smoking on the street?

The answer to this question was provided by Chief Police Officer, and Director of Community Safety, Gary Finchett.

A THE police station is a FIG building and no smoking is permitted on the premises. There is a designated smoking area at the rear of the police station which is used not just by police officers but also visitors. It is not an offence to smoke in a public place.

As part of my commitment to increase the visible presence of police officers in public, some of my



It has been brought to my attention that one such officer did have a short smoke break whilst walking home after a night shift. The officer was off duty at the time and could have easily chosen to wear civilian clothing.

This is the only incident I am aware of. However, I have reinforced with my staff that the public rightly have high expectations of police officers and that smoking whilst in uniform in public places (other than designated smoking areas) is not permitted.

# **Q** HOW much did the new access road into the west side of the PWD water depot to access the new training centre cost in total?

Richard Fogerty, Acting Director of Education, provided the following response.

A £30.000 was transferred to the Public Works Department for the construction of a road to the Training Centre. This was to provide access for vehicles, and a footpath was proposed to provide a more direct approach for pedestrians and students from the Community School. The road was completed in good time and the Education Department is waiting to hear if there are sufficient funds remaining to fund the footpath.



## Stormy waters greet the return of the Gloucester

'WE can't take risks," Uruguayan President Jose Mujica reportedly said, after HMS Gloucester had permission to resupply in the port of Montevideo retracted, just hours before her planned arrival.

President Mujica said a concession was not being made to anyone, and that the decision was more to do with his country's relationship with Argentina.

The Gloucester had planned to call into Montevideo last week to

take on supplies and fuel as it made its way to the Falklands from Rio de Janeiro.

Argentine ports have been closed to British Royal Navy ships since the 1982 war.

A military spokesperson in the Falkland Islands confirmed diplomatic clearance had been withdrawn for a short, routine port visit between September 15-17.

"We are obviously disappointed with this last minute decision by Uruguay, but respect their right to make it.

"We have a longstanding close defence relationship with the Uruguayans; this incident will not affect those good links," said the spokesperson.

The decision to turn the Gloucester away is viewed as a solidarity gesture by Uruguay towards Argentina, because of several bilateral issues which need to be worked through.

Since President Mujica took office in March he has managed to solve the pulp mills dispute, dating back to 2006, but issues such as the dredging of the River Plate canals to Uruguayan ports, which has to be carried out jointly with Argentina, are yet to be settled.

President Mujica contacted British authorities saying it was a "priority" for his government to align with Argentina over the "very delicate" Falklands issue.

Between the tips of the southern continents and Antarctica there's nothing to stop the wind from whipping a swell around the whole circumference of the planet, building and building it as it goes, until you get these notorious 30 and 40-metre seas - and worse. That's why the southern ocean is so challenging for mariners.

Cmdre Thicknesse said the ship's arrival demonstrated the UK's continued commitment.

"This is a highly capable ship and, having done three Atlantic patrols in the past four years, she is an old hand in this part of the world also. It's good to see her back," he said.

PUBLIC meetings hosted by members of the Legislative Assembly often appear something of an anachronism, conducted in a manner which would not be out of place in a medieval village square.

At the top table sit the elders, and before them sit a couple of dozen serfs, delivering and dissecting anything from disarming weasel words to bizarre personal grievances

And, while equivalent gatherings in the developed world are conducted more often than not under strict parliamentary protocols, Falkland residents can still enjoy a public tete-a-tete with elected representatives who still refer to them by their first name.

It's all rather quaint, and I doubt either party would want it any other way: because it works. It brings democracy to grass roots level, and it is surely fitting for such a close-knit community-minded nation.

How courageous, then, that councillors have decided to trial the hosting of the next public meeting without the presence of those newfangled radio microphones.

It is a brave move because there is doubtless a small but dedicated number of radio listeners who will miss their monthly broadcast. And, because brickbats are always delivered with more gumption than bouquets, I expect a vocal few will voice their angst (although they have been strangely silent to date).

But the reasons behind the trial are interesting. Councillors say they hope it may attract more lively debate, particularly from those not keen on having their voices publicly broadcast across the country's wireless sets. And, if the discussions are sufficiently vigorous (the diddle-dee telegraph will soon determine whether or not they are), it is possible we may see a rise in attendance and - more importantly - participation.

But, if councillors want to give this experiment the best chance of blossoming into a fully frank and fearless exchange, let's hope those attending also have the courage to throw open for debate some seriously hot topics.

Councillors should be there in full force for the first time in months, so what better opportunity to stoke the fires of democracy and ensure it is a night to remember

## End of the road for London taxi

IT was one of the most poignant moments of the Falklands War when chauffeur Don Bonner drove Governor Rex Hunt and his wife Mavis from Government House to Stanley Airport, as occupying forces raised the Argentine flag and ousted the Queen's representative from the Falklands.

The red London taxi was a potent symbol of the Island's inextricable links with Britain, and Don ensured its safekeeping until Governor Hunt's return

The Austin had first come into service as Crown car for Governor Neville French in 1976, and continued to carry royalty and VIPs for another 34 years. But on Saturday, as Governor Alan Huckle packed his own bags for the last time, the taxi too was retired.

"It's a bit sad really," said Don, one of five current and former drivers to be reunited with the car before it was sent to its new home at the Museum. "They should have another one to replace it because it's one of our old traditions to have a London taxi.

Val Berntsen, who was the first chauffeur to drive the car, echoed Don's comments: "It's sad to lose another part of the Falkland Islands," he said. "It means a lot to me. Rudy Clarke was the first in the Islands to actually drive it. He was the head mechanic and he presented it to me. Every day he used to laugh at me and say who do you love. Cecilia or the taxi, because I was forever polishing it." The car went into storage in 1996 under Governor Richard Ralph (1996-99), because of its condition and because many of the replacement parts needed to keep it going were obsolete

It was restored in 2005 by Bruce Miller of Stanley Body Repairs, and given a new licence plate F1 MNT in time for Governor Howard Pearce's wedding at Christ Church Cathedral.

Among VIPs to be carried in the taxi were British politicians Michael Heseltine, John Nott and Douglas Hurd, and Lord Shackleton and Sherpa Tensing. But driving Margaret Thatcher remains one of Don's most vivid memories: "When I drove Maggie Thatcher into Stanley from the airport, everybody was out waving to her," he said.

"I'm quite pleased it's going up to the Museum and not being forgotten about because normally the old taxis, when they retired, went to the funerals as a hearse. I know a lot of tourists I've met have always asked about it.'

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## UK treaty with Brazil HE's final task IN one of his last acts in office to strengthen defence

BRITAIN and Brazil this week heralded a "new dawn" in defence relations, with the signing of a treaty which promises to greatly strengthen bonds between the two countries. But while the deal offers tantalising glimpses of future relations with the wealthiest pf Latinamerican countries, references to the UK's relationship with its neighbours were noticeable by their absence.

And while international trade between the Falklands and South America has been hampered by Argentina, Falkland Islands Government and the Foreign Office's top representative in the Islands refused to be drawn on the issue.

The Defence Cooperation Treaty is "much more than grand gestures," said Gerald Howarth, Minister for International Security Strategy, "It is designed to enhance long-term defence and security cooperation. The UK and Brazil are old and trusted friends and I believe that this treaty will mark a new dawn in defence relations between our two countries.

Mr Howarth travelled to Brazil accompanied by ten senior representatives from the top UK defence companies. He signed the treaty with the Commander of the Brazilian Navy, Admiral Moura Neto, on board HMS Ocean, the largest ship in the Royal Navy and the venue for the UK-Brazil seminar on future cooperation in the defence and security sectors. On his first visit to Brazil on taking

up his appointment in May, Mr Howarth said "We understand the importance of having an open exchange of ideas on defence issues. Only proper strategic engagement, industrial partnership and technology transfer will help us to reach agreement on solutions to our mutual challenges.

Addressing the seminar Mr Howarth said: "Britain means business, and the UK Government is proud to support British industry's contribution to Brazil's defence and security capabilities. Equally, we are keen to attract proposals from Brazilian companies who feel they can equip and support our own Armed Forces, or meet our security requirements.

Mr Howarth stressed the importance of Brazil as a rising economic force with a growing international voice and went said that Britain actively encouraged Brazilian investment in the UK

Mr Howarth also used the procurement of new ships as an example of a shared UK-Brazil chal-lenge. He said: "The design of the Type 26 ships, which will replace the UK's current generation of frig-ates, brings with it a tremendous opportunity for cooperation with Brazil through partnering, rather than simply through a customersupplier relationship."

Mr Howarth talked about the changing face of conflict and thanked Brazil for their continued support of British military assets in the region:

"The nature of conflict itself is changing," he said. "We need genuine long-term partners and we recognise that we need to strengthen bilateral relations with dynamic and increasingly self-confident countries like Brazil

"We do not take Brazil's support for granted. They are a strong ally and a stabilising influence in Latin America. When facing future challenges it makes sense to be smarter about when and how we deploy military power, whether diplomacy, training, deterrence, or use of force; which tasks we can do in alliance with others; and therefore what capabilities we will need as a result. That's why we wish to encourage full strategic defence partnerships with countries like Brazil."

Cllr Sharon Halford said it was not for Assembly Members to comment on the workings of the British Parliament. She added: "But we welcome any enhancement of relations between the UK and the region.

Acting Governor Ric Nye yesterday also declined to comment.

## Dilemma in Delhi for games team

ARRIVING in Delhi ahead of the Commonweath Games team, FIOGA chairman Mike Summers is less than happy with the accommodation allocated to the 15 strong team.

The majority of the team are due to arrive on September 28, but Mr Summers has warned they should not have high expectations for their accommodation.

He said the four flats with 32 beds allocated to the Falklands team were spacious, but poorly constructed and finished, with minimal furniture. They were dirty and had rudimentary electrics. He had given the organisers until late yesterday to show some genuine progress with cleaning and rectification works.

"My current judgement is that the flats will be liveable, but don't expect too much. I will ensure the electrics that I consider unacceptable are rectified," he said.

## Argentina blocks **FI licensed trawler**

A SPANISH flagged trawler that operates in Falkland Islands waters and was heading to Montevideo to unload 700 tons of fish was denied "innocent pass" through Argentine waters and had to steam an additional 17 hours at a cost of 7,000 litres of fuel before it finally unloaded its cargo in the Uruguayan port.

Čosta do Cabo is licensed by local company Bold Ventures, and owned by Elvio Cofre and Amanda Forster. Sulivan Shipping are the agents for the vessel.

Mr Cofre said it was inconvenient for the operators to take the longer route and it had caused increased cost.

But as people here in the Falklands were resourceful, the economic blockade the Argentines were attempting to put in place would not have a great effect, and would possibly have a positive outcome if the facilities were to become available for vessels to do all their business here in the Islands instead of in Uruguay," he said.

"I'd like to see all the fish caught in Falklands waters by FI registered vessels transhipped here in the Islands, and this latest incident might be an added incentive for this to happen," Mr Cofre told the Penguin News.

He said he was now awaiting an account from the skipper of Costa do Cabo to establish whether he had initiated contact with the Argentines, or if they had made the first contact with the vessel

"We have instructed our partners to avoid the Argentine EEZ at all costs and minimise any contact with them," he said

Innocent pass, according to the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea, refers to ships' rights to enter and pass through a coastal state's territorial waters so long as it is not prejudicial to the peace, good order or security of the coastal state.

## **Smooth operation for** Sea Lion boat workers

WITH the completion of work on a landing stage and pulley system, loading and unloading cargo at Sea Lion Island has never been so easy.


The island is a major tourist destination and relies on bulk deliveries of provisions for the lodge to be delivered by sea, via the Gulch, which is a natural cove carved into the rocky north western shore of the island surrounded by tussac grass.

The actual platform on which goods were landed was a slippery almost flat rock that is submerged at high tide, and the only access to the platform was by navigating a rocky path formed over the years by the inhabitants, around the outcrop of rocks onto the platform. Working the boat on Sea Lion Island was more like a clandestine smuggling operation and not without a little danger

After delivery of provisions by a sea truck to the Gulch they were then winched or hoisted up the 30foot cliff face on a wooden chute. using the power of a 4x4 vehicle in later years and, no doubt, a horse prior to the arrival of vehicles on the island.

Some three years ago engineers from PWD and Morrison Falklands Ltd designed a new facility to provide a much safer access, together with lifting and hoisting facilities that did not rely on ropes and horsepower, to drag the much needed provisions and supplies from sea level to the top of the cliff.

Morrison Falklands Regional Manager Mike Butler explained that the new works involved the construction of a GRP (glass reinforced plastic) loading platform supported on concrete strips and

Mr Butler said the works were indeed very dangerous and challenging and required logistical planning due to the limited excavation and mechanical lifting equipment on the island.

All materials and plant used were designed to be man-handleable

A welcome use of part of the lodge's mechanical equipment, an old tractor with a digging bucket assisted greatly, as the majority of the excavation works had to be carried out by hand," he said.

"The logistics of getting the necessary materials and small plant to the site presented a major challenge, due to the lack of any alternative place for the Concordia Bay to dock: materials and small plant were airlifted to the site using a British International helicopter, lifting from the deck of the Concordia while she was offshore

Morrison workers Neil Clifton, Campbell Kirkham, Mike Movce, Melvyn Clifton and Kevin Ross started the project at the end of February and had the main structure complete hy mid April, with works completed on the deck earlier this month.

Lodge manager Jenny Luxton thanked everyone involved in the project, adding that the efforts of the Morrison gang were really appreciated. "Working the boat has certainly been made a lot easier with this operation," she said.



He and Ms Cameron received briefings on the strategic defence review from a Liberal Democrat viewpoint and were able to meet with various members to put across their views about the situation concerning oil, fish and "the belligerence of the Argentines towards the Islands," Clir Edwards said.

Cllr Jan Cheek will attend the Labour and Conservative party conferences with Cllr Edwards later this month.

## **Rival greets oil find as** 'world class' discovery

**ROCKHOPPER** Exploration's announcement that its Sea Lion prospect is commercially viable has prompted rivals at Argos Resources to declare it a "world class oil find

Argos will be the last of the five existing oil companies to kick start its own prospects when it undertakes the first of its seismic surveys at the end of the year. But Managing Director John Hogan told investors this week he was perfectly happy to be the last in line for the current Falklands oil rush.

"The plan is to start the seismic acquisition later this year," he said. "Thanks to Rockhopper and Sea Lion we now know that we're in a proven working hydrocarbon province. There is potentially big oil here. Rockhopper reported a 240 million barrels discovery, and Sea Lion could be as big as 670 million. That's a world class oil field. We think, that by coming behind everybody else, Rockhopper and Desire are derisking the proposition for us."

Rockhopper on Friday announced Sea Lion 1 had flowed for 18 hours at sustained rates in excess of 2,000 barrels per day.

**Executive Chairman Pierre** Jungels said: "Rockhopper is the first company to successfully flow oil to surface in Falkland Islands waters.

"We believe Sea Lion is the largest fan sandstone body in the North Falkland Basin and, given this successful flow test, that the Sea Lion discovery will be commercially viable."

The Falkland Islands Government welcomed the announcement with its customary caution, as Assembly Member Emma Edwards said on Tuesday: "The results from the Sea Lion test represent another positive step in offshore hydrocarbons exploration.

However, a great deal of work is still required before it can be determined whether a production phase will result.

Argos, though, is almost rubbing its hands in glee. Five of the eight exploration wells being drilled by Rockhopper and Desire are in a semi-circle around the Argos licence, Mr Hogan said. And, by the time the company has shot and interpreted its 3D seismic data, Rockhopper and Desire's drilling campaign will have ended

"That puts us in a great position to high-grade our own prospects and decide where we want to drill first," said Mr Hogan.

He said the most exciting prospect on the Argos licence area could be Boreas, which he described as "mirror image of Sea Lion."

## Why the mystery over our money?

THANK you for your front page article on the expenditure of up to £1 million of public funds in financial assistance to SAAS.

Seven weeks ago I enquired at a public meeting why details in the Government Estimates of the proposed capital expenditure of more than £10m of public funds had been reduced from a dozen pages or so to a single page.

The response was that the figures were not being made available as tenderers for contracts were using the published estimates as a guide to the figure they should bid.

I don't support this assertion but, even if it is true, our elected members should remember that they have a duty of openness under Standards in Public Life.

We have been down this path before, as I pointed out at the public meeting.

A few days later, and in an endeavour to help members be more open. I supplied Gilbert House with some correspondence I had with other elected members on the same subject six years previously, showing how they could easily provide information to the public, and at the same time maintain their position.

After all, this £10m is our money not theirs.

And what response did I get to that letter? Nothing. Not even an acknowledgement. I wonder why I bothered.

Now, of course, I know why I didn't get a response.

As you have pointed out in your article there is a  $\pounds$ 1m figure in the capital estimates, some or all of which we now learn is for financial assistance to SAAS.

This figure is under loans and investments.

That is interesting. You get a loan back: certainly you lend money with the intention of getting it back. An investment is money expended with the intention of a profit.

We don't know what this £1m is for because our elected members refuse to tell us, hiding behind the "commercial in confidence" screen.

But what if it's not a loan or an investment, and is a subsidy? Then it should appear in the "transfer payments" section of the estimates.

Of course, if it appeared as a transfer it would be identifiable. Is it a subsidy disguised as an investment? Have any concessions of financial significance been made?

No doubt the true facts will be established in due course.

There is another and more serious area arising from Standards

in Public Life – declaring interests. The £1m in question was approved by elected members at the budget meeting of the Legislative Assembly held on May 26 & 28 following members' deliberations in the Select Committee on the Estimates.

Now we don't know what happened in the Select Committee as it is held behind closed doors.

However, it is the Legislative Assembly which approves the Appropriation Bill, not the Select Committee. It is therefore in the Legislative Assembly that interests should be declared.

The  $\pounds$ 1m for loans and investments is referred to in the record of the Budget Meeting of the Legislative Assembly on the Falkland Islands Government website.

Surely it was at that time that those elected members with shareholdings in Consolidated Fisheries Ltd, and close family relatives, should have declared their interest in this item?

As far as I can make out by searching the record of that Assembly meeting, they didn't. They can, of course, correct me if they did.

Coincidentally, it was at this meeting of the Legislative Assembly that the Complaints Commissioner Bill 2010 was approved.

The core function of the Commissioner is to investigate complaints of maladministration across the public service.

This function includes Members of the Assembly in so far as the complaint relates to their conduct when compared to the standing orders of the Assembly, or to matters of personal interest.

## Dave Gunnery assesses Mike Thomas, overhead gantry operation Plant operator scheme designed to help workers meet new laws

THE Falkland Islands Government (FIG) Training Centre is currently celebrating ten years of providing vocational qualifications in the Falkland Islands. One scheme that was introduced in 2006 to the Islands was the Plant Operator Certificate, or POC as it is known.

The POC scheme was set up with the help of local plant operators to ensure a national card system was in place to show competency on plant and machinery. Due to the Construction Skills CPCS card requesting operators to complete 300 hours on each machine, operators were finding it difficult to renew. FIG wanted to ensure that operators were still deemed competent to operate and drive plant and machinery, and put it to the Training Centre to establish a local card scheme - and so the POC card was born.


The POC card, checked and authorised by the Attorney General's Chambers, which has replaced the Licensing Bureau Plant Licence, is currently not a mandatory qualification for operators. If you hold the appropriate driving licence you will be legally covered to drive machinery on the public highways. However, by holding a POC card, an operator will be able to show employers that they have the knowledge and practical skills to operate plant and machinery listed on their card.

There are currently 120 plant operators registered with the POC scheme and numbers are steadily increasing as more employers realise its benefits.

Interserve Validator/Assessor Dave Gunnery said the POC scheme had been a great success for Interserve, as they were able to assess after operators had passed their Health and Safety test via the Training Centre. The successful operators will then obtain a card that is recognised by the Health and Safety Executive (HSE) without having to rely on sending people to Britain or having an assessor come to the Islands.

The importance of the scheme, is that it allows operators, new or experienced, to keep up with the ever changing laws and Health and Safety matters. It also keeps employers within the law in regard to allowing untrained operators to operate machinery within their company. If an accident was to happen after allowing an untrained operator to use their machines, then the repercussions would be a lot more severe than the amount of money it would take to have them trained and assessed within the area of the law.

We would strongly recommend that this scheme is used by other companies as it supplies all the



tual machine training which can be off-putting to some people. It's as hard as the trainee lets it be. If they study and learn the Health and Safety book when they pass they will feel a sense of achievement and, as for the machine training, if they have any experience then all they may need is some bad habits ironed out. But if they have no experience then the assessor/trainer will work with them until a standard of competency is reached. It's really up to the trainee to say if it's hard to obtain an operators card. I would say it is easier than having to go through the same course in Britain, where it is one trainer to four or five trainees.

The ultimate goal would be to have all plant operators ticketed and assessed as competent via the Plant Operator Certificate. All operators are encouraged to contact the Issuing Body for the POC cards, call the Training Centre on 27025, 27133 or send an email to mmorrison.training@sec.gov.fk.








## **Typhoons airborne**

THE MoD announced last week that "non-operational" Typhoon flights were to be temporarily suspended after a crewman died during a training flight.

The accident involving a Spanish Typhoon indicated "a potential issue" with the aircrew harness systems. Typhoon Quick Reaction Alert aircraft in the UK and the Falkland Islands were are not affected, said the MoD, as they had already been modified.

A military spokesperson confirmed on Saturday, however, that just over half of the 64 Typhoons which had been delivered to the Royal Air Force were affected "pending modification."



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#### **Q** WHAT are the costs of the redundancies, advertising and recruitment arising from the government restructure?

The old print shop will hold all of the AG's staff, including two currently in the Malvina Gardens building and the Regulatory element which are also currently elsewhere, allowing consolidation of AG's team and freeing up of other space.

#### **Q** WHAT will be happening to the premises known as Cable Cottage?

**A** THE property will be allocated to the Director of Health and Education in order to consolidate all the senior administrative staff from his directorate and to enable BAS to occupy the former Education Office at Stanley Cottage.

**Q** HOW much has the government's annual salary bill increased as a result of the government restructure including the new manager post in the Health and Medical Department?

**A** FOR 2010/11 the restructure has increased the salary bill by £113.000. However, within two years, savings of over £250.000 per annum are projected. The recently published estimates of government expenditure show that salaries and staffing costs will fall by almost £600.000 by  $\pm$  July 2011.

## **Q** IS the CE confident that this reduction in salaries and staffing costs will be met?

THE salaries and staffing reduction of £560,000 between 2010/ 11 and 2011/12 relates to a number of changes in establishment and staffing structures, including the cessation of a number of temporary posts and changes in staffing required for capital programmes. Fiona Wallace-Nanning of the Planning Dept provided the following response.

WITHOUT a definition of what the enquirer means by "green areas" I will answer this question in respect of greenspace designated in the Stanley Town Plan.

The Town Plan 2001–2016 (approved in 2004) designated a number of areas as public greenspace in Stanley. The Town Plan is periodically subject to review to (a) ensure that it remains relevant: and (b) to indicate when an alteration to the Plan is necessary. In April 2007 Executive Council agreed to review the Town Plan with a view to ensure that sufficient land was brought forward to provide for the housing needs of Stanley.

A study undertaken as part of the review concluded that some designated greenspace could be released for residential development whilst still retaining a significant amount of public open space across the town.

Following a process which involved public consultation, an Alteration to the Town Plan was approved in 2009 and included the re-designation of five greenspace areas to residential development.

These were near the Leading Lights, adjacent to Anderson Drive, adjacent to H Jones Road, between Kent Road and Snake Hill and off Davis Street East. Because these areas are near existing services they can be developed at relatively low cost and help address the current shortage of housing within Stanley.

The above changes reduced the overall amount of designated greenspace by 1.8ha (some 10% of the total), mainly in East Stanley Despite these changes the eastern part of the town still contains almost 60% of all greenspace designated in the Town Plan


In addition, the Alteration formerly designated land along the coastal strip fronting Ross Road West, the Racecourse and land adjacent to Watson's Way as new greenspace. These areas combined more than make up for the loss of former greenspace now proposed for housing.

DURING the UK election, the then Health Secretary Andy Burnham outlined Labour's policy on smoking.

proposed smoking ban.

New smokers should be the focus, he said, not "limiting the freedoms" of people who choose to smoke. Does he have a point?

So far, the biggest limit to freedom for smokers has been the ban on smoking in enclosed public spaces, introduced UKwide on July 1 2007.

UK Government data showed the ban had no significant effect on the number of people smoking, and a Cochrane review of 50 studies looking at smoking bans around the world found limited evidence of a decrease in smokers after bans were introduced.

However, the review found consistent evidence of a reduction in hospital admissions for cardiac events, and a clear reduction in passive smoking. This along supports how such

This alone suggests bans work. Then there's the question of whether smoking is a choice. According to the UK Government, two thirds of smokers want to give up, 75 per cent having tried previously.

Yet between April and September 2009, only around 330,000 – at a very rough count about four per cent of English smokers – tried to give up through smoking cessation services in England.

Of these, almost 157,000 succeeded, 24,500 through pharmacy NHS services in the UK.

Those good at maths can see just under 0.3 per cent of all smokers stopped because of a healthcare professional.

A tiny fraction? Yes. But this amount could, at a rough count, save the NHS about £15.6 million and prevent around 1,300 hospital admissions and 250 deaths a year in the UK.

And remember: this doesn't even scratch the surface when you think of the countless smokers who have quit through Nicotine Replacement Therapy.

Few would argue with Mr Burnham that stopping new smokers is a vital aspect of policy.

But with such a small slither of those wanting to quit getting the help they need, the importance of focusing on the increased availability of smoking cessation services cannot be ignored.

It's not about limiting freedoms, it's about saving lives.







## **Police Chief calls for public support**

VICTIMS of sexual offences in the Falklands are failing to report their attackers to police, warns Chief Police Officer Gary Finchett.

Although recorded crime has fallen in the past year, not all crimes are reported to the police for a variety of reasons, he told the Penguin News.

"Mainly they don't want to trouble the police," he said. But he urged victims of sexual offences in particular to come forward.

"We know that usually a female victim won't report the first offence, and the fact that their attacker is likely to be known or close to the victim makes it difficult to get away with the crime, but they may not want to get the perpetrator into trouble or suffer backlash in gossip.

"A victim of sexual attack goes through emotional trauma and invasive testing, so they need reassurance something will be done.

"One rape is one too many and we have to have a zero tolerance on them.

"And it is not uncommon for a paedophile to start on low levels

of offence and have them escalate, so the earlier it is reported the better."

But the dilemma facing the RFIP is the poor reputation they earn from the public.

"Approachability, in the past we've struggled with that," Supt Finchett admitted.

"Being the only law enforcement available to investigate crime in the Falklands means we need to make sure people's bad experiences don't stop them coming forward."

While in Britain 40 per cent of crime goes unreported, the proportion in the Falklands is unknown, but it does exist, and Supt Finchett says police here need more help from the public to do their job.

"It is important that people who know or suspect they have been the victim of crime report this to the police.

"This will then inform the targeted deployment of police resources, for example high visibility patrols or covert observations at certain times and locations. It can also assist us to identify the rightful owners of property we recover."

He said there also were some occasions when people were not sure whether they had been a victim of crime or not.

"If they are in any doubt they should report any concerns. The police will always thoroughly investigate matters reported to us."

He admitted popular opinion was that most serious crimes goes relatively unpunished, while small or petty crime is targeted, with the focus on youths.

One 16-year-old student told the Penguin News they felt they were followed around by local police "like they were waiting for us to slip up so they could get us."

Supt Finchett said overcoming the "no confidence" stigma of the police was the first step towards encouraging more calls to come in.

"Anyone with concerns related to criminal activity can contact the police direct, through a friend or via the safe email address (safe@police.gov.uk)," he said.

CHIEF Police Officer Gary Finchett admits he and his colleagues face something of a dilemma: how do they restore public confidence if the public won't help them enough to provide a better service?

It is a dilemma which is particularly potent in the Falklands, where a tight knit community presents itself as much as an obstacle to police work as a deterrent for crime.

However much people believe the community here can look after itself – and, generally, it does – crime still goes unreported. And that means the perpetrators are getting away with it.

But such is the public perception of lack of trust in the police, many crimes go unreported simply because the victims don't believe the culprits will be caught anyway

The failure of some victims to report more serious crime, particularly sexual offences, presents a different problem altogether because all too often the culprit is known. And police are only too well aware of the reasons they are not brought into play

But it is not right - and it should not be acceptable - that such crimes should go unpunished.

Supt Finchett acknowledges winning the trust of the public is not something that can happen overnight. It needs to be earned over time. And the issue of "approachability" is a two-pronged one: the

police must be seen to be more approachable, and the public needs the confidence to approach them.

Perhaps if the issue was tackled at a public meeting, then maybe the seeds of that trust could be sown. If the Chief of Police was to gather his officers together for a debate over policing issues, would you help him address them?

Crime prevention and awareness is a subject which has long been close to my heart, ever since I launched a newspaper campaign called Crime Line. It was simply a tape recorded message service, where members of the public were encouraged to offer tip-offs to police, anonymously if they wished.

Such was its success, five million newspaper readers backed the campaign as it spread across the UK in the 1980s, and I later exported it to Australia.

It clearly demonstrated to me that a vast majority of right-minded people do want to help the police do their job well.

We just have to work out how best to apply that cooperative spirit in the Falklands.



# **£1million for SAAS is a loan says Chief Exec**

THE Government Chief Executive, Tim Thorogood, has said that the reason FIG has financially supported SAAS is because it recognises that shipping links to South America are important to the commercial life of the Islands: "It has for this reason agreed with Consolidated Fisheries Ltd to provide some support to SAAS for a limited time period," he told the Penguin News this week.

Responding to Mike Forrest's letter in last week's edition, which questioned the method of allocating and recording the £1million loan to SAAS over a two year period, Mr Thorogood said the support had taken the shape of a loan to support the company's development in the short term, which was to be repaid in accordance with a loan agreement.

"The details of this are, of course, confidential as they are with any public sector support to businesses," he added.

Mr Thorogood said that in addition the Government had decided to build a more secure and efficient container handling facility near to FIPASS which was to be leased to SAAS, initially as the only current provider of containerised services from FIPASS but, under the terms of the lease, SAAS

would offer container transit and storage yard services to other companies as and when required.

"These actions are in keeping with support for economic development and for individual businesses such as has always been provided on a case by case basis.

"Given the commercially confidential nature of these arrangements FIG will not provide any further comment on this issue," said Mr Thorogood.

He also responded to Mr Forrest's assertion that Members of the Assembly had failed to declare a conflict of interest in relation to the support to SAAS.

"That is not the case," said Mr Thorogood, "All Members having an interest in CFL made the appropriate declaration in the Register of Members Interests.

"The potential for a conflict of interest being present was recognised at all times when the question of support was being considered, and no member who had an interest in CFL participated in relevant meetings of Executive Council or Standing Finance Committee," he said.

The Attorney General had also confirmed that no declaration of interest was required from any of the members at the meetings of the Legislative Assembly to which Mike Forrest referred, as neither the Appropriations Bill or the Finance Bill contained any provision authorising support for SAAS and, even if they had, an obligation to declare an interest was only required by the Standing Rules and Orders of the Assembly if either a vote or debate took place, neither of which occurred in relation to either Bill.

He concluded: "Mr Forrest also refers to the summary form of capital expenditure which now appears in the Estimates. I understand that this restricted format was first used some years ago, following advice from the then Director of Public Works that publishing greater detail gave too much information to tenderers bidding for particular projects. The Government believes on balance that this is the most effective approach."

## Fleet plea for innocent pass

JAVIER Touza, president of the Vigo Ship Owners cooperative has made an appeal in the name of the Galician fleet for Argentina to respect the principle of "innocent pass" of fishing vessels heading for the Falklands fisheries or to Montevideo, Uruguay, which had always been respected in the past.

"We have nothing to do with political or diplomatic disputes," Mr Vigo told a Vigo newspaper.

"We're only fishermen willing to work and if we are in the (Falkland) Islands it is because that is where the resources are. Given this situation, Galician vessel owners have been forced to order their ships not to cross Argentine waters, thus avoiding involving us in a conflict in spite of the negative consequences which this represents for us," said Mr Touza. Innnocent pass was not being respected for "political reasons," he concluded.

## Medical referral

THE number of patients referred overseas for further specialist care since the beginning of this financial year has increased. To date 77 patients have received appointments, compared to 59 patients for the first quarter of the last financial year. The expenditure to date is £239,500, said Director of Health David Jenkins, adding that it should be noted that medical emergencies were an unknown quantity.

### Lib presence

FALKLAND Islands Government London Representative Sukey Cameron has pointed out that Liberal Democrat party conferences have been attended by the Falklands in the past. The recent one was, however, the first time a Member of the Legislative Assembly had attended. The error was in supplied material.

### Gone fishing

THE sale of rod-caught brown trout and a potential review of legislation to remove the introduced species from protection has been discussed at the Environmental Committee. The item received several letters of objection from the public and is to be reviewed further, said Nick Rendell of the Environmental Planning Office.

out of the second phase of drilling in the souther 2002 licences with partner Falklands Oil and Gas (FOGL).

BHP Billiton, a global leader in the resources industry, does however remain committed to its northern licence joint venture with FOGL.

Shares plummeted by 56 per cent following the announcement, but FOGL Chief Executive Tim Bushell remained upbeat saying they would carry on with their programme: "We welcome the Falkland Islands Government's understanding in agreeing to extend the licence terms. We intend to continue actively exploring the southern licences and, with our joint venture partner, to secure a deepwater rig to resume drilling in the northern licences as soon as possible," he said.

Regarding its northern licence, FOGL has said that due to the tight rig market it was unlikely that the next phase of the drilling pro-



gramme would commence in 2010 as required by the current terms of the licences.

Following discussions, the Falkland Islands Government agreed to extend the first phase of the northern 2004 licences by one year, so that they will now expire on December 15 2011.

Last week Desire announced the placing of 16,294,600 new ordinary shares at 140 pence each to raise £22.8 million, and is reported to have raised \$36 million through pound sterling share placements to enable it to continue with scientific research and identify more lucrative oil deposits than those previously drilled. firmed that the Rachel exploration well in the North Falklands Basin had been spudded with drilling operations expected to take 35 days.

Desire and Rockhopper Exploration have both enjoyed relative success with the initial Liz joint venture well, and Rockhopper's world-class Sea Lion oil discovery. Rockhopper shares jumped from 333p to peak above 500p with the successful Sea Lion flow tests, and Desire shot up from 120p to over 180p on the result.

Borders and Southern shares dropped 13 per cent and traded at 71.25 pence yesterday morning. Plans to start drilling in the Darwin and Stebbing prospects in the South Falkland Basin had been pushed back because of competition for high-specification rigs, the company said. Borders and Southern shares are still up more than 40 per cent since the start of May.

The company yesterday reported a first-half loss of \$672,185 compared with a profit of \$1.4 million a year earlier and has \$205 million in cash. Page 3

## I ran for the Falklands at the Friendly Games

Simon Turnbull of The Independent recalls the day he ran for the Falklands, thanks to a chance meeting at an airport en route to the Commonwealth Games...

SOMEWHERE in the bottom of a drawer is my international vest. I've had it since January 29 1990, the day I ran 10,000m for the Falkland Islands in Auckland

I have never been to the Falkland Islands and have no Falklands blood. How I came to represent the South Atlantic archipelago on the other side of the planet perhaps sheds a little light on why the Commonwealth Games are known as the Friendly Games, and why so many of us hope they survive the critical trials and tribulations that have arisen ahead of the 2010 gathering in Delhi

It was during the XIV Commonwealth Games in New Zealand that I got to run for the Falklands - not in the actual Games but in a 10km road race taking place in Auckland while the Games were being held there

The Falklands had two official representatives at those Games: William Goss, a sheep shearer, and Peter Biggs, a tax inspector.

They were too exhausted from their efforts in the 10,000m on the track at Mount Smart Stadium to compete for the Falklands two days later in a 10km road race organised by the celebrated Oiwaraka Athletic Club, the Auckland running institution which produced Peter Snell, the great triple Olympic middle-distance champion.

A three-strong team was required and Sarah Dixon, the Falklands team coach at the Games, asked me to make up the numbers with herself and the team manager, Patrick Watts. The Falklands con-

nection? We just happened to meet on an escalator in Perth Airport en route to New Zealand and discovered that Sarah, a native Northumbrian, had a cousin who worked with me on the Journal, a daily newspaper in Newcastle.

As international debuts go, someone said at the time that it "bordered on the more modest side of inauspicious."

Sarah had been at a barbecue for Falklands expats the night before and was stricken with a stitch when we warmed up.

I decided to sacrifice international ambition at the altar of chivalry. We jogged round together in 49min 15sec, finishing joint 174th out of 198. Patrick was 192nd.

I recall feeling somewhat sheepish and not a little fraudulent when the crowds lining the route of the race, which started and finished at the Jack Lovelock Track, spotted the name on the back of my vest and shouted: "Good on yer, Falklands.

Still, I have my international vest and the fond memories that have sprung to mind this past week. When the 2010 Games be-

gin in the Jawaharlal Nehru Stadium a week today, they are unlikely to be anything like as intimate as those Auckland Games of two decades ago. Such was the state of security back then, a group of English journalists could walk out from the Opening Ceremony with a group of English athletes and strike up a bet to race one another to a taxi which appeared at the end of the road 100 yards away (two of the four athletes were beaten by a hack).

It was a similar story after the Closing Ceremony in 1990. The English journalists were last to emerge from the press room in the bowels of Mount Smart Stadium, to find that every steward, official and police officer had locked up and gone home.

Infused with the demob spirit, we held our own Games in the deserted arena, running around the track, leaping into the long-jump pit and, naturally, standing on top of the medal rostrum soaking up the silent applause.

It had been different when the official Falkland Islands Commonwealth Games team had taken part in the men's 10,000m.

The cheers in a packed stadium had been as loud for William Goss and Peter Biggs as they had for Eamonn Martin, the full-time athlete who won the race 13 minutes ahead of the two back-markers.

In training for the race of their life, the sheep shearer and the tax inspector had been obliged to dodge landmines left over from the 1982 war. Happily, there will be a 15-strong team from the Falklands this time: five badminton players, two lawn bowlers and eight shooters. As a former Falkland Islands ringer, I wish them - and the troubled XIX Commonwealth Games - all the very best.

## Keep your heads down Give us two and your hearts high...

FORMER radio broadcaster Peter King, the voice behind the show Calling The Falklands, has died aged 89. Brian Denney pays tribute to his friend and colleague...

PETER King died on September 13. after a long illness endured with stoicism and good humour.

I first met Peter in 1947 when. as a very junior programme engineer. I found myself in the various continuity studios of the Overseas Services at 200 Oxford Street.

Announcers in those days could be rather intimidating people, but Peter was very much the exception. You could not fail to like him, but behind the relaxed bonhomie lay a total professionalism

He was born in Margate, where his father ran a small business. He was educated locally and remembers attending a performance of Handel's Messiah in Canterbury Cathedral, an experience which awakened a lifelong love of classical music. On leaving school he had a variety of jobs, including at one stage as a barber's assistant

On the outbreak of war in 1939. Peter went to France with the British Expeditionary Force. After Dunkirk, he joined the 8th Army in Egypt and fought at Tobruk and El Alamein. Subsequently he took part in the invasions of Sicily and Normandy. During the 2nd Army's victorious advance through Germany, Peter was among the

first to enter the camp at Bergen-Belsen, an experience he never forgot. At the end of hostilities, he was posted to the newly created British Forces Broadcasting Service in Hamburg, where he learned the elements of his craft

Peter joined the BBC Overseas Services in 1946 as an announcer. As well as his usual duties of continuity and news reading, he quickly showed his aptitude for a wide range of activities, excelling in the presentation of popular music, working with the orchestras of Joe Loss, Geraldo and George Melachino. He was also a frequent presenter of the Proms to an overseas audience, always writing his own material. In 1948

he was asked to introduce the Olympic Games, which he did brilliantly, although admitting he knew little about athletics!

Peter always remained loyal to the Overseas Services, but made periodic forays into television in the 1950s, and to Radio 2 in 1965, where he presented the highly successful Late Night Live, which mixed studio interviews with outside broadcast contributions.

He was called back from retirement in 1982 to present Calling the Falklands, at the outbreak of the conflict, a programme he had last introduced 40 years earlier in very different circumstances

He always signed off with "keep your heads down and your hearts high," a phrase which became a morale booster among Islanders. At the end of the conflict, he was able to visit the Islands at the invitation of the Governor.

During retirement. Peter had joined Bowers and Wilkins, a firm which developed high quality loudspeakers, a life-long interest. He also became an excellent potter. During the Queen's Jubilee, he was awarded the Queen's Medal.

Peter King was one of the finest broadcasters of his generation. His old friend, John Arlott, would have called him a great all-rounder. He was also the nicest man you could wish to work with. We shall all miss him and sympathies go out to Glen and Toby.

## Volunteers unearth a mountain of rubbish at Bertha's Beach

THE milestone 25th Annual International Coastal Clean-up was celebrated in the Falkland Islands this year when it became the 109th country to participate.

In partnership with organisations and individuals across the globe, the Ocean Conservancy's International Coastal Clean-up engages people to remove rubbish and debris from the world's beaches and waterways, identify the sources of debris, and change the behaviours that cause marine debris in the first place.

Last year, nearly half-a-million volunteers from 108 countries and locations and 45 US states combed lakes, rivers and beaches and successfully removed 7.4 million pounds of rubbish.

This was the first task on Bertha's Beach undertaken by BFSAl Conservation Group as holders of the stewardship, in agreement with the land manager Alan Eagles, of the spectacular RAMSAR site.

BFSAI Conservation Group spotted the call to arms from the Ocean Conservancy website and the timing of the activity fitted as

"We wanted to aid the Ocean Conservancy in their efforts to gain evidence on types and distribution of waterborne rubbish, and as such assist in policy development to clean up the world's waterways," said Major Archie Douglas who controlled the cleanup

Appropriate considerations for the current lambing season were put in place which limited the vehicles that were used and the clean-up was limited to BFSAI Conservation Group members to control the numbers.

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

### **Smoke signals** are undeniable

NO matter where it is sparked up. the smoking debate generates a great deal of heat. Now it has hit the Falklands, and I see councillors are conducting a "consultation" on the issue.

Whenever this process begins, the same arguments against banning always emerge: the "nanny state" is interfering: it's a move which would hit pubs the hardest; it's an infringement on freedom. And so on. All of these points can

be debated but two counter-arguments are undeniable: (1) smoking is the greatest preventable killer we know, and (2) the first duty of any government is to protect the health and safety of its people.

Based on that which I have seen here in the UK, the furious argument in favour of the right to smoke oneself to death smoulders for only a little while Everyone soon gets used to it and grows

to like smoke-free atmospheres.

Pubs, cafes and restaurants in the UK are now vastly more pleasant and, of course, a lot safer for those who did not smoke but had to inhale the fumes generated by others. Most strikingly, those who did smoke and initially opposed a ban agree.

In countries where ignorance about health prevails and where tobacco companies have governments by the short and curlies, one can understand why this killer is tolerated. But the Falklands needs to keep in step with the rest of the informed world, and that world is marching into fresher air.

### Farewell then, Your Excelleny

LET'S be clear: I like former Governor Alan Huckle, and Elike his wife, Helen, even more. They're nice people who mixed well in the Falklands, and who did much to show that the old class divisions are a thing of the past.

I have good reason to talk warmly of them. A few years ago, when I was involved in the making of a semi-dramatised documentary about 1982's invasion and occupation, the Huckles opened the doors of Government House for us. The film crew, the am-dram group and members of the Defence Force in full battle-rattle trooped into the building, stomped around it and made it into a film set. Helen was a personification of hospitality. Good sports, the Huckles. I'm sorry to see them go.

However, as he was a representative of the British Government it did not surprise me much to see that the Governor's departure carried with it - unwittingly. perhaps - a few subtle messages.

Firstly, there was the manner of his leaving. Governors are always given a ceremonial send-off. but this time it was a rather grander event than in recent years; one that smacked of a 50s, 60s and 70s full-monty, pith helmeted, colonial farewell.

The parade was not limited to the Defence Force, but included civil servants whom I have never known to parade in uniform: Immigration and Customs and the Fire Brigade. It looked to me as though (as foreseen by many) the

restructured Civil Service, largely under "superheads" cruited from the UK. had led to a resurgence of colonial kow-towing.

It occurred to me some months ago that the Governor was probably being used by London when the very divisive question of the Chief Executive's reappointment was being considered. It was reported then that he 'reminded'' elected representatives that a

new Governor and Attorney General were about to be appointed. and it would not, therefore, be the best of times to begin recruiting a new CE. That looked like London speaking and bringing old colonialstyle pressure to bear on a supposedly independent administration. I doubt this was the Governor's intention, but the message was there, nevertheless. In any case, I wish the Huckles well.

### **Over to Tony** Pole-Evans

TONY Pole-Evans, who died recently, will be remembered for many reasons; among them. Thope, his daring work during 1982. When I revised my book about the Is-landers' war, I interviewed some key people whom I had been unable to reach when writing the first edition. One of these was Tony.

I spoke to him down the line from London, and he told me how he had maintained a short wave "ham" radio link with a friend in the UK throughout the Argentine occupation. Tony gathered news about Argentine dispositions from friends around the Islands, often using the forbidden two-metre radio network. The information was routinely passed to the Ministry of Defence and, that which was deemed useful, was almost certainly passed on to the task force.

I'm not sure whether he realised it but, as we spoke, he ended each of his answers with "over," Tony was that steeped in the arcane procedure of radio communications. And with that, I too am happy to say: "over."






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# **Dust sampling** on the far West

AN air sampling station has been set up on Carcass Island to monitor the supply of windblown dust to the South Atlantic and Southern Ocean, as part of an international scientific project

Dr Alex Baker and Dr Rosie Chance from the University of East Anglia in Norwich, UK, travelled to the Falklands in September to set up the atmospheric monitoring station on a short tower close to the airstrip.

The sampler itself is like a "glorified vacuum cleaner," which sucks air through specially cleaned filters to catch tiny particles

Carcass Island owner Rob McGill helped set up the station and will keep it running over the forthcoming year.

The scientists are looking for dust blown to the Islands from Patagonia, because nutrients in it can act as a fertiliser for microscopic marine plants, the growth of which might help suck carbon dioxide from the atmosphere

Samples of modern day dust will also shed some light on the patterns of ancient dust found preserved in Antarctic ice cores, which can tell us what the climate was like in the past

Head lice infestation is associated with limited morbidity but causes a high level of anxiety among parents of school-aged children. Head lice cannot fly, and

their short stumpy legs render them incapable of jumping, or even walking efficiently on flat surfaces

The reference standard for diagnosing head lice is finding a live louse on the head, although infestation can also be diagnosed by using a louse comb or by observation of eggs at the nape

of the neck or behind the cars, within 1cm of the scalp

Despite the impossibility of preventing all head lice infestations, children should be taught not to share personal items such as combs, brushes, and hats. Specific recommendations regarding current diagnosis, management, and treatment protocols for children with head lice in the school setting include the following:

\* Head lice should not be a reason for an otherwise healthy child to be excluded from or kept absent from school.

Dr Baker said: "We are really excited to have this opportunity to make measurements in the South Atlantic

"Until now there has been exceedingly little data available for this region, so the site is very important.

The scientists were also thrilled to be able to visit the Islands and sample the famous Falkland's hospitality

"It has been a great trip and we would like to thank everyone who has welcomed us and been so helpful," said Dr Chance.

\* Healthcare professionals should know how to manage and treat head lice infestations so that they can actively inform families, schools, and other community agencies.

Current products are not completely ovicidal (capable of killing the eggs), necessitating that they be applied at least twice at proper intervals. To prevent spread, manual removal of nits is not necessary immediately after

therapy. However, nit removal may be considered in the school setting to reduce diagnostic confusion.

\* Feasible alternatives to use of insecticides may include "wet-combing" or an occlusive method, such as Full Marks or Hedrin.

Repetition for at least two weekly cycles, using careful technique, is needed. Suitable indications for these therapeutic options include proven resistance to available over-the-counter products in the community, a patient too young to use an insecticide, or parental desire not to use an insecticide.

Because lice infestation is so benign, treatments must prove safe to ensure that the adverse effects of therapy are not worse than the infestation.

THE Stanley Cup is the final Dek Hockey competition of the 2010 season and is now in full flow.





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# Private sector reveals multi-million port bid

AN ambitious new multi-million pound port development – specifically for the burgeoning oil industry in the Islands – has been proposed for the western coast of East Falkland.

Plans have already been lodged with the Environmental Planning Office for the site, on 175 acres of privately owned land at Port San Carlos, opposite Camerons Point,

The proposed berthing is more than four times the size of the floating dock (FIPASS) currently used in Stanley harbour.

The private sector initiative comes from Port Smyley Ltd, a new company being incorporated by Cantray Ltd, the owners of Smylies Farm.

The naturally sheltered inlet with a small wooden jetty was previously used for ferry runs to nearby West Falkland before government provided the purpose built terminal at New Haven.

But if the plans go ahead, it could soon be providing berths and facilities for eight offshore supply vessels as well as a cargo and bunker berth.

Plans indicate that suitable material will be pushed out along the coast line to form the foundation of the structure, which would incorporate drilling mud storage, warehousing, container and pipe storage, water treatment plant, power station and sewage treatment.

A presentation was made to Assembly Members and senior Government Officers on Tuesday evening by directors of Port Smyley Ltd and its technical advisors.

The outline planning permission applied for relates to the land and the related Crown seabed (everything below the high tide mark).

Cantray Company director Lewis Clifton said he recognised that FIG would wish to take a little time to consider the issue further. He declined to offer any more details to the Penguin News.

Director of Mineral Resources Phyl Rendell welcomed the news of a possible new port: "It's a very bold initiative led by local business people which is a real credit to them," she told the Penguin News.

"It's exactly what the oil industry will need in the event they move to a production phase.

"It benefits the Falklands to have local companies involved at an early stage in any development phase.

Assembly Member Sharon Halford also welcomed the news: "I think that if this kind of development is going to happen, then Port San Carlos is the sort of place to have it, away from the main hub of the community."

Mrs Halford described the bid as a "fantastic private sector initiative" that could be a tremendous boost to the economy.

She added: "It's a move that could create new opportunities in the rural community."


Rural Development Strategy Coordinator Nuala McKay said that to date no oil related activity had been considered within the strategy, but that it was indeed very exciting news.

Miss McKay said she looked forward to learning more about the initiative and the possibility of harnessing opportunities for the rural community.

With the exploration oil round still to be completed and no guarantee that oil will ever be extracted in commercial quantities, it is an ambitious move to provide support for what is hoped will be the Islands' main industry.

The social and environmental impacts of the project on the area will of course have to be assessed, but it could be the start of repopulating the Camp in a way we never imagined possible.



# **One last time for** the Fighting G

HMS Gloucester returned to Stanley this week, almost a year since her last deployment to the South Atlantic

Commander David George and the ship's company hosted a party of guests and VIPs on Wednesday, which included a presentation outlining the ship's ability to assist civil authorities in dealing with major incidents.

Since arriving in the Falklands on September 19, Gloucester undertook her first patrol, visiting San Carlos Water and New Island.

At San Carlos the ship paid its respects to the fallen in the Falklands War, with a salute to the site of the sunken HMS Antelope, and a wreath laying at Blue Beach cemeterv

The ship's company was given the opportunity to meet local residents and watch a demonstration of sheep-shearing. Medical officer, Surg Lt Sonia Pillai said: "I have never seen anything like the shearing, which was actually incredible. Everyone seemed pleased to see us, and they were very hospita-ble. I was absolutely fascinated."

Launching from New Island, Gloucester's Lynx helicopter undertook some conservation work, assisting Georgina Strange survey albatross around the Jason Islands

Pilot Lt Bill Thompson said: "Usually I am trying to keep us safely away from birds. Flying near a colony of this magnitude was an unforgettable experience. Despite their curiosity, the birds displayed great airmanship and managed to avoid us!'

Gloucester will be the lead patrol vessel in the South Atlantic over summer, and Cdr George said he was keen to renew acquaintances with as many Islanders as possible.

Further visits will be scheduled to Stanley and around the Islands and, as the 28-year-old ship, affectionately known as the Fighting G, nears the end of her deployment, some of those will be tinged with more than a degree of poignancy - this is the Gloucester's final patrol, after which, on her return to the UK, she is due to be decommissioned.

# **CE seeking responses** to move FIDC ahead

CHIEF Executive Tim Thorogood, in his efforts to complete a review of the Development Corporation, asked board members for the fourth time on Tuesday for their responses to four questions raised in the terms of reference (ToR) approved by Executive Council at its March meeting.

The ToR were put before the Development Board on April 14. At the June 8 meeting, board members felt it was premature to comment before having sight of the draft Economic Development Strategy, which was later presented to the board on July 23.

The board was again invited to respond to the questions at the August 3 meeting.

Mr Thorogood said the anticipated completion of the EDS and RDS would provide that framework and also provide the background for the FIDC review and way forward.

The key questions which needed resolving, he said, were: What is the role of FIG in taking the EDS forward? How should that role be organised? If that involves in external body, what exactly should the role/objectives of that body be? And what should be the exact role of FIG?

Mr Thorogood has been tasked to consult with key stakeholders to prepare a report based on these questions and provide options for Executive Council and Legislative Assembly to consider.

Board member Drew Irvine said it was the view of the fishing industry that FIDC should be more independent from FIG on all fronts. Emphasis should be on assisting the growth of existing companies and particularly those in the fishing industry, he said.

Speaking on behalf of the Chamber of Commerce Council, Mike Forrest said there had been little feedback from the wider membership, which he felt illustrated a disenchantment and belief that nothing would change.

He said the Chamber supported the Fishing Industry Association view that private sector representatives on the Board of FIDC had been increasingly unhappy about their role, and the way in which FIDC was effectively managed by government.

"Any new organisation needs to operate on a different basis, and the relationship between it and government needs to be such that private sector participants can be confident that the board does in fact direct the organisation and its management reports to them alone," said Mr Forrest.

There was a view that FIG used the corporation when and as it saw fit, and that board recommendations were often ignored, he said, suggesting that the Chief Executive and members looked back at the history of FIDC when direction had been given but not actioned, citing Coastal Shipping, the Meat Company and Stanley Dairy as prime examples.

"The inclusion of private sector board members gives FIDC creditability, but in practice items are agreed between FIG, councillors and FIDC beforehand," said Mr Forrest.

Cllr Glenn Ross, however, took a different view. Funding for FIDC tended to come from FIG, so therefore FIDC had a responsibility to the government, he said.

"The private sector wants things done with government money, when a lot of the time government cannot even get any commitment from the private sector to use these facilities [proposed new port and container yards] once they are built," said Cllr Ross.

"How can there be less government involvement unless the private sector is willing to undertake at least half the financial risk?"

FIDC General Manager David Waugh said he thought the corporation was in "pretty good shape."

He said "leaner and fitter" had been the remit when he arrived and it was his view it was in a "good financial position to move forward with whatever the new remit is."

October 15 is the deadline for responses from stakeholders.

# Glamorgan vets agree site for memorial to fallen crew

ALAN Watt and Captain Michael Croxford, formerly of HMS Glamorgan, visited Hookers Point this week to discuss a site for the memorial that has been constructed to honour their fallen colleagues.

Accompanied by the Secretary for SAMA (Falkland Islands) Trust Jock Elliot, they met with Environmental Planning Officer Anthony Payne, Director of Public Works Manfred Keenlyside and Mike Butler of Morrison (Falklands) Ltd, thanking them for their help and for granting them planning permission.

The site will have a view of Two Sisters twin peaks where the county-class destroyer saved many lives. Glamorgan was supporting the 45 Commando Royal Marines when she was hit by an Argentine Exocet missile, causing the loss of 13 crew.

The three and a half ton Welsh granite monument will face in the direction of where the Glamorgan was hit. Mr Watt said the memorial was "a consequence of the 25th

anniversary when some of our guys came down and noted that ships that had been sunk had a memorial, but our ship was repaired at sea and came back, so we didn't have one.

"We were worried, not wanting to impose on the community, but we've been very taken with the warmth and the fact that they seem to want us to have one."

He recalled the moment of their deployment to the Islands: "We were in Gibraltar at a concert when we got the call. We got back to the ship and had to get the maps out and promptly turned left. We spent 105 days at sea, which then was a record. Our 500-strong crew were the first ship on the scene in '82, and we very likely fired the first shell in defence of the Islands. People scem to remember us because we made a lot of noise."

Capt Croxford went on to explain this was a brief visit to bring down the engineering drawings and stake a spot for the memorial.

"Thirty crew members hope to make the journey down for the unveiling in February, and we are very keen to have Falkland Islanders attend," he said.

The memorial is costing about  $\pounds 20,000$ , with virtually all the money being raised by the ship's company, although SAMA has assisted a lot in the organisation.

The Development Corporation (FIDC) has agreed with the Public Accounts Committee to supply documents relevant to the inquiry into Stanley Dairy by November 12. General Manager David Waugh said FIDC had advertised for a temporary researcher to assist. The terms of reference for the Dairy Inquiry are: given the policy to provide fresh milk to Stanley, determine whether value for money had been achieved by the time the project was closed. If value for money was not achieved, identify what factors led to poor value for money and how these could be prevented in future such projects.

### Oil rights issue

OIL explorer Rockhopper is planning a £95-125 million rights issue to fund more wells off the Falklands, according to the Sunday Times. The newspaper, which cited unnamed sources, said the company was close to hiring Bank of America Merrill Lynch as corporate broker to help lead its next phase of development, and a rights issue could be launched within six weeks. Rockhopper declined to comment.

### Speedy apology

MOUNT Pleasant man Peter James McFarlane was on Wednesday fined £315 for speeding on the Stanley to Darwin road. A police officer recorded Mr McFarlane driving on a tarmac section of the road at 66mph in a Land Rover 110 on September 10. Mr McFarlane, who was also ordered to pay £85 costs, apologised to the court for "wasting your time and for my negligence."

### Mighty penguin

THE fossil of a giant penguin almost twice the size of an Emperor, that lived 36 million years ago, has been discovered in Peru. The bird had a long, straight beak and its feathers were brown and grey. Scientists nicknamed the penguin "Pedro."

### Youth clocked

A STANLEY youth who admitted speeding on Davis Street was fined £150 plus £85 prosecution costs and had his licence endorsed. Police carrying out static speed checks recorded the 17-year-old travelling at 39mph at 8am on September 23.

# Case adjourned

CHRISTOPHER Martin Warren entered a guilty plea by post for a speeding offence on September 11. JP Phyl Rendell said as there was insufficient documentation to proceed, the case would be adjourned until October 13.

Gavin Short shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

IN the words of that famous singer of country songs, "I'm back again," thankfully though only for this week.

ALTHOUGH there are some rather mind blowingly big things that could be about to happen to our little country that could well change our lives and perhaps outlooks, it is still important to treat small things with equal enthusiasm as they too, just as much as the big plans, can affect how people feel. . . . . .

The company was invited to take a look and make some suggestions. I believe this is now done and we are just waiting for some figures to be worked up. I would imagine they may be a tad eyewatering, but it is a call that is going to have to be made.

# September the driest since 1986

SEPTEMBER weather made a decent effort at paving the way for summer. It was sunnier than normal - and the driest since 1986. Temperature

The mean maximum was 8.4 Celsius compared with an average of 7.7C. The highest temperature was 13.5C on the 2nd and the lowest maximum was 1.1C on the 6th. The mean minimum was LIC, compared with the IC average. The lowest minimum was -5C on the 6th and the highest minimum was 6.7C on the 3rd.

#### Rainfall

The total rainfall for the month was only 10.1mm, compared to an average of 31.9mm, the driest September since records began at MPA in 1986. The wettest day was the 5th with a total of 2mm. More than 0.1mm fell on 16 days and 1mm or more fell on five days. Sunshine

There were 168.1 hours of sunshine, compared with the average of 133.8 hours, which was only bettered in 1989. The highest daily total was 10.3 hours on the 24th. Snow/Hail/Thunder/Fog

Sleet or snow fell on six days, which is below average, and there were six days with hail, five days with fog and none with thunder. Wind/Ğales

The monthly mean wind speed was 14.4 knots, compared to an average of 15.2 knots. The highest hourly mean speed of 38 knots and the highest recorded gust of 59 knots were both on the 5th. Gales occurred on three days and there were 15 days with gusts in excess of 33 knots.

# **Proposal offers new** lease of life for land

A PROCESS to dispose of FIG commercial development land through freehold and leasehold means has been aproved by the Development Board.

The idea is to provide a draft policy paper to Executive Council with the purpose of establishing clear policy guidelines for the evaluation of private sector proposals to purchase FIG commercial land by freehold.

While there was some concern that the pricing structure was high, FIDC General Manager David Waugh said he thought it was a "pretty solid way forward."

If accepted, plots at Gordon Lines would be made available for freehold purchase and current leaseholders would be able to convert their agreement into a freehold purchase.

Tenants at Lookout Industrial Estate would be able to convert their lease agreements into a 999year lease and FIG land designated for commercial development at present and in the future could be obtained by freehold. Also, current tenants of other FIG commercial development land could convert their lease agreement into a freehold title.

The proposal put before the board was prepared by Michael Betts of FIDC and Hamish Wylie for the Chamber of Commerce, in consultation with Senior Crown Council Alison Inglis.

Cllr Gavin Short said: "We should thank Michael and Hamish who have probably cracked something people have been banging their heads against the wall about for quite some time."

# It's 'business as usual' as runway is renewed

NOW over one month into the runway resurfacing project at Mount Pleasant, known as Project Shackleton, significant progress has been made on the construction, says the MoD. And for the military base it is very much business as usual.

Contingency plans for the passenger airbridge have been tried, tested and have proved successful, and quick reaction alerts and medical evacuations have all been launched as normal as the works continue, said a military spokesperson.

Wing Commander John Shields. Commanding Officer of 905 Expeditionary Air Wing said the project had been planned for some considerable time and it was reassuring to see those efforts bearing fruit: "We are now five weeks into the runway resurfacing project and it is progressing well.

There is definitely a team approach to this unique project, not only among my military colleagues but, most importantly, with Colas. As a result, and despite significant infrastructure work on the airfield, BFSAI has, in parallel, maintained its operational and

training output across land, sea and air." From a movements perspective, the weekly airbridge window had been 100 per cent successful, with all the correct people and equipment arriving into and departing the Islands. "The programme is on schedule," he said.

Falkland Islander Marc Short has been seconded from Pony's Pass Quarry for the duration of the project and is gaining valuable experience in the role of Asphalt Production Supervisor. Other local residents are directly employed on the project, including Zoran

Zuvic Bulic who is gaining experience with the Colas surveying and engineering team.

The Colas Project Manager said: "We have made good early progress to date with no disruption to the airbridge caused by the construction activities.

We have a large project team including local Falkland Islands residents and suppliers whose local knowledge is invaluable and who have integrated really well with the UK members of the team."

# onservation only islands for sale

A NUMBER of small islands and islets, varying in size from 1.5 acres to a group totalling 47 acres. are currently available fo buy from the Falkland Islands Company.

In an analysis conducted in 1991, Ian Strange noted that all of the islands were isolated and not joined to the mainland by low tide sandbars or reefs, though a few have anchorages.

A more recent survey conducted by Ken Passfield and Sally Poncet identified penguin and seal populations present on many of the islands. Dominated by tussac

in most cases, they support a wealth of wildlife with areas of unique plant life and breeding bird populations. Also appraised was the amount of tussac grass cover. whether there were records of stock, domestic animals, sheep. horses or cattle, and whether the land had rodent infestation.

In order to protect the environmental integrity of these islands, purchase requires the inclusion of a clause forbidding building on the land and stating the islands are to be used for conservation purposes only.

FIC General Manager Roger Spink said: "There are 24 islands. ownership of most of which stretches back to when we [FIC] were formed in 1851. The islands and some others that have already been sold, were retained when we sold the last FIC farms in 1991."

Mr Spink said value varied by size, shape and content of the land, and sale prices would be based on negotiation, dependant on interest. Only serious offers would be considered. For more details contact Roger Spink on 27600 or email fic@horizon.co.fk

### FIG standards beg questions

I REFER to the Chief Executive's article regarding financial support for SAAS in your October 1 edition.

The main issue is Standards in Public Life and whether declarations of interest have been properly made.

The test is whether it could be thought by a reasonable member of the public that the interest could affect the way that an elected member has discharged their duties.

The number of elected members with shareholdings in and/or directorships of CFL, or with a close family interest, is significant as a proportion of the Assembly. The sums of money involved are substantial.

The sums of money involved are substantial. Judging by the phone calls and emails I have received following publication of my letter on 24 September it would not be unreasonable to think that an interest in CFL, and consequently SAAS, could have affected the way that a Member with an interest has acted.

Another issue is openness. Government has changed the way in which it makes public the amount of money allocated to capital expenditure. It would not be unreasonable to think that government has done so to hide this particular item. supported by the fact that it has only acknowledged financial support for SAAS under sustained questioning from the public and the press. A reasonable member of the public said to me the whole subject had been shrouded in secrecy and obfuscation.

Yet another issue is the way in which government has provided this financial support. The normal route for providing support for economic development and for individual businesses is through the Development Corporation. Government often passes non-development projects through FIDC. Now we see a development project not being passed through FIDC. It appears that government makes up the rules as it goes along.

I have problems with a number of comments that the Chief Executive has made, so perhaps he can answer the following questions:

1. He states that no member who had an interest in CFL participated in relevant meetings of ExCo or SFC. Can he therefore explain the public minutes of Au-

gust 19 2010 of SFC which approved ExCo's decision for the new container park, at which meeting two members declared an interest and another with a close family interest was present.

There is nothing in the minutes to say that these members did not participate, or remove themselves from the meeting. In his response can the CE advise the quorum for SFC?

2. The ExCo paper (186/10) for the container park was not public. It was, however, considered in the public section of SFC. My request for a copy of this paper has been refused. Can the CE explain how a paper can be considered in public and not made public?

3. The CE refers to Assembly Standing Orders. Can he confirm that in Select Committee, declarations of relevant pecuniary interests have been made, and minuted in all the committee's minutes of proceedings?

4. The principles relating to declaration of interests are not confined to meetings of ExCo, SFC and Select Committees. Can he confirm that declarations of relevant pecuniary interest have been made at all other meetings, either with officers or other members?

5. Can he advise the public why this financial support for an individual business was not routed through the Development Corporation?

6. SAAS is a wholly owned subsidiary of CFL. No elected member has made reference to SAAS in the Register of Interests. Does he agree that there is a difference between registration of interests and declaration of interests, and that pecuniary interests in SAAS should have been declared at all times?

7. The CE describes the financial assistance as a loan. Can he confirm that these public funds are not at risk in any way, and that there is no chance that the loan will not be repaid in full?

It is a concern that it is necessary for a member of the public to raise these issues, and it highlights a flaw in our political system.

This is the job of an opposition. More on that another time. Mike Forrest Stanley

### Positive outlook for policing

I REFER to your article and editorial in the Penguin News (October 1) "Police Chief Calls for public support." It is important that I correct several inaccuracies in your report.

Victims of sexual offences need to be aware that they do not always require medical examinations and they are performed only when absolutely necessary. Often corroboration of what has happened can be obtained from other sources. When medical examinations are required, they are not necessarily invasive and will only be undertaken with the express consent of the victim. They are always conducted sensitively by approved medical practitioners.

In respect of your comments regarding confidence in the Royal Falkland Islands Police, I consider we have moved on to a new era of policing and that it is time to look forward and not back.

Whilst there is always more we can do to enhance public confidence in policing, I do believe we have already made great strides in this respect, although there can be no room for complacency.

I am receiving very positive comments on what RFIP are doing from members of the public, MLAs and other key groups and individuals including the media. Crime is very low and our detection rate is very high.

Complaints have significantly reduced and the letters and telephone calls of appreciation 1 received far outnumber these. We received over 16,500 telephone calls and dealt with 1,000 incidents during 2009/10 and are punching above our weight in terms of the size of the force.

People tell me they want to see more uniformed officers walking on the beat and we are beginning to deliver on this by using police vehicles only when absolutely necessary, targeting locations where anti-social behaviour is taking place and ensuring we are highly visible on cruise days at public events. There will always be a very small minority of peo-

ple who do no want police officers upholding the law for their own reasons. That's fine, and criminals should fear us.

However, the vast majority of the public do understand that the police are necessary to uphold the law and bring offenders to justice, which is why as responsible citizens they often help and support us.

I passionately believe that RFIP has responded to wellfounded criticism with a willingness to change. I expect no less.

However, unfounded criticism of the police is neither helpful or constructive and can serve to undermine not only the confidence of the public but also those police officers, police staff and their family and friends who are proud of what they do often in difficult and challenging circumstances.

I do acknowledge that RFIP needs to engage better with the public, especially young people, and take a more proactive approach to telling people what we do and why we do it, as long as this does not compromise operational policing.

ExCo has recently approved the publication of the RFIP Annual Report 2009/10, copies of which will soon be available at the police station and public library.

This document reviews our previous performance and outlines our policing objectives for the forthcoming year which the Police Committee has approved.

RFIP is also planning an open day at the police station and prison and a "Have Your Say" Meeting to which the public will be invited to discuss policing issues.

In advance of this, the public are very welcome to attend the open session of the Police Committee which will take place at 2pm on Friday October 29 at Government House.

Likewise, people are welcome to contact me direct on 28100 regarding policing matters or other areas of concern we can help with.

Tell us when we get things wrong and I'll make sure we do something about it.

However, also acknowledge that we have a group of dedicated and professional police officers and police staff who, with the support of the public, are committed to delivering the very best service they can in order to make the Falkland Islands even safer.

# **Energy option impresses CPA**

COUNCILLOR Dick Sawle has returned from Kenya where he represented the Falklands at the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association meeting in Nairobi.

Thirty-two of the 54 countries in the Commonwealth are considered small overseas territories, and Cllr Sawle said it was a valuable opportunity to discuss common issues.

He was selected as a discussion leader in one section of the 30th Small Branches Conference, during which he gave a presentation on the Falklands sovereighty challenges, focusing on the flaws in Argentina's "historic claim" over the Islands and highlighting selfdetermination as a basic right.

This was received well by the group with other small territories across the world facing similar issues.

During the energy and environmental discussions Cllr Sawle said the Falklands had the potential to create up to 60 per cent of its power through renewable energy. "Our desire to develop this is

threefold," he said.

"The oil price is volatile and fuel imports are expensive. Renewable energy removes the risk of economic sanctions that could prevent imports, and it means we can pass the savings on to the consumer.

"The ability to be so self-sufficient in power sets our Islands apart, but the main problem is storage. Canada overcame this problem recently and representatives are in talks to share expertise."

At another session he discussed the setting up of the government's Public Accounts Committee: "It would be difficult to measure and I am unsure how much it would save.

"We are in infancy on the parliamentary scale but, for example, if they looked at defence contracts they could centre on taxpayers' money which they may believe could be used wiser in providing military hardware.

"But we'd need it to be a watchdog and not a bloodhound. Many are unsure how it works and we have a lot to learn about PACs, but the size of our country leaves little room for government to hide in accounts anyway."

Another discussion point was the fragility of boom economies. Small territories relying on fish, agriculture, tourism and reserve funds are affected disastrously by price hikes and natural disasters.

He said this was why the Falklands had an economic development strategy and needed to progress it.

The cost of the trip was absorbed by the £8,000 annual CPA membership.

The possibility of holding the 2013 regional CPA meeting in the Fałklands, with an offer of assistance from the Isle of Man, is also being considered.

# **Argentine policy has bolstered resistance**

THE "belligerent" policy of Argentina towards the Falklands has backfired, and served only to make young Islanders born after 1982 more resistant to their threats, Councillor Roger Edwards has said.

"Instead of trying to win our support, they've done exactly the opposite," said Cllr Edwards, interviewed in Manchester where he was attending the annual Labour Party Conference.

"The Argentine Government has tried to corner us socially, politically, environmentally and any other way they can think of."

Cllr Edwards warned that this attitude had created a "new strongminded generation of Falkland Islanders" who were antipathic to Argentina and any links with Argentina which, he said, was "negative and totally counter-productive."

"We would like to have a normal 'good neighbours' relation with Argentina. We could even be the best of trade partners and neighbours you can imagine.

"But as long as they continue with this nebulous claim over the Falklands, we simply can't be neighbours, which is regrettable."

Cllr Edwards attended both the Labour and Conservative Party Conferences, in Manchester and Birmingham, along with Cllr Jan Cheek and FIG London Representative Sukey Cameron. It was the 23rd consecutive

It was the 23rd consecutive year the Falklands had been represented at the conferences.

Mrs Cameron said interest was especially expressed in oil exploration and concerns over the Strategic Defence Review, and any implications it may have for the defence of the Islands.

The Conservative Conference in particular presented the opportunity for Cllrs Edwards and Cheek to meet a large number of new MPs, as well as speaking to Government Ministers and members of the Cabinet.

# Doug blazes the trail for the Falklands as Delhi takes off

Doug Clark, soon to begin university studies in the UK, this week had another milestone in mind when he kicked off the Falklands Commonwealth Games campaign in the badminton mixed doubles. Before doing so, he spoke with the Newcastle Journal...

THIS week was supposed to mark the first chapter in the next phase of a life which has already taken in international football and working as a bricklayer. But before Doug Clark studies to be a chartered surveyor, the 33-year-old has his third Commonwealth Games to negotiate.


When he belatedly attends his first Northumbria University lecture it will not be as a superstar, even if he achieves his goals in Delhi. Doug just hopes to become the first Falkland Islander to win a badminton match.

"That would be lovely," he said. "In Manchester I got a bye to the second round and played Mark Constable. He didn't let me have a point? In the doubles we got a point or two against Simon Archer and James Anderson. It ended up on the televised court. I remember somebody telling me there would be 17 milion people watching in Malaysia.

"I'm hoping to play in Glasgow in four years' time, although I'll be too old to play in the singles by then, it'll be doubles only."

There were plenty of stars present when the Commonwealth Games started on Sunday, but Doug's presence was a reminder it can also provide a platform for unheralded names.

Doug does not lack experience of multi-sport events, albeit much of it has come on the football field, as the centre-back played in three

Island Games, the biggest tournament for footballers in the Falklands because the country is not affiliated to FIFA.

He was captain in the second and carried the flag in the third ("the lad who was meant to do it was lost or late, so I got voted in"). But badminton is his main sporting focus now.

"I made my 'international debut' in a tournament in Chile in 1997," he says. "It was the first time we'd played outside the Islands.

"We only used to play combined regiments or visiting warships. We entered the Island Games on the Isle of Man in 2001, and played in Shetland (2005) and Åland (2009).

"It's very expensive, there's a lot of fund-raising. The last one was a £1,600 return flight, so sending a whole team over is very expensive. I found a fair bit of success at badminton when I was 16. I had some coaching at a camp run by John Edwards. From 1983 nobody on the Islands beat me consistently, which is a bit sad really.

"The Falklands has got 16 competitors and, with coaches and everyone else, it's an overall squad of about 25. There are five of us in the badminton team, plus our coach Rebecca Pantaney, a Commonwealth gold winner with England in 1998."

The size of the domestic team hampered Doug's preparations for partnering Michael Brownlee in the doubles – he also plays in the team event, mixed doubles and singles.

"We've played in the same club for a few years, but always on the other side of the net," he says. "Unfortunately we would be too strong a pairing to play together. He's a leftie (left-hander) as well, so it's not ideal. But we spent ten days at a training camp in Cheltenham to prepare."

Doug moved to the Falklands aged six. "I was born in Torquay," he explains. "My father was a Royal Marine, who ended up there between 1971 and 72, then came back for the war in 1982. We moved there when he retired in 1983.

"I was speaking to someone back home who's from Newcastle, called John Foster, a chartered surveyor who suggested I go for this course at Northumbria University. He'd done it as a mature student when he was 40.

"I was working as a bricklayer and there was no work back home. I was looking for a change so I thought I would go for it. It was purely an academic decision. The badminton side of it is just a bonus. I tended to work a 55-hour week back home, so once you'd fitted in 20 hours' training, it didn't leave much time for anything else.

"T've done some training at the university and with the county. It's a fantastic (badminton) facility here, top class. They had a few teething problems, things like the posts – when they're screwed in they're three-and-a-half centimetres too short."

Doug headed to India with trepidation. The Games have been dogged by controversy since before the Opening Ceremony, but he never considered pulling out.

"When somebody said there was a shooting at a bus, and when the bridge collapsed, it made you think. I saw the pictures on the BBC website.

"But just being around all the world-class athletes is great."

The Falklands badminton team are playing their games in the Siri Fort main badminton venue, which has a capacity of 3,700 seats and three practice courts.

Doug said he was very impressed with the venue, and the team played a few warm-up matches against Northern Ireland. They lost the friendlies, but put up a respectable showing against their more experienced opponents.

Doug partnered Anna Luxton in their opening mixed doubles match on Monday, losing 21-6, 21-7 to England's Chris Adcock and Gabby White.

"We couldn't have asked for a more difficult opener, but it gives us something to work on," he said afterwards. "When it comes to some of the other games in our pool we will be looking to nick games here and there. For us it's very difficult to get the competitive edge because back home we play the same opponents every week."

# **Carcass: exquisite food and exceptional hosting**

AMAZING scenery, spectacular wildlife and excellent hosts: for me Carcass Island lives up to its impressive reputation. I arrived on the first FIGAS flight of the day, a warm, early September morning.

The house, belonging to our hosts Rob and Lorraine McGill, is nestled appealingly between trees and gorse, ab oluiely bursting at the seams with birds. The impression of being komewhere distant from the Fail ands while still at home hit us (a feeling that would last) as we strolled along the sheltered beach in front of the house before lunch, complete with palm trees and abundant with wildlife.

In the afternoon Rob drove us to see the penguins that had already returned from their winter, antick and waited for us to finish taking pictures, eating our snacks and generally meandering along the roas. Now, I'm not particularly fond of penguins. Wildlife to me, on the most pan, is winething that exists to provide a few minutes entertainment and keep visitors to the Falklands happy. However Carcass must possess a bit of magic, as I found ruyself happily snapping away at the gentoo penguins, which were particularly considerate, coming right up and peering down my camera lens.

With no predators on Carcass - such as rats, mice or cats - if you sit down for longer than 30 seconds a feathery creature of some variety will hop. flutter or wobble past: the place resembles a wildlife sanctuary.

I don't know about anyone else but, whenever I'm separated too far from the West Store. I always take some rations in case of a food shortage '(you really never do know what you might be fed, and how often). On Carcass my starvation peanuts (high in protein and energy) remained unopened = the food was simply amazing.

Whatever your heart desires for breakfast, unlimited (ca-and biscuits, picnic bars (f d forgotten how good they are). top notch lunch and dinner, including salad, fruit and pudding, and a cheese board in the evening. You will not go hungry.


On our second day. Rob drove us down to have a gander at some elephant seals. We arrived at the beach to find most of the seals hadn't arrived (by now it should be literally coated in them), and enjoyed a packed lunch, a pleasant stroll and a lunatic scramble through the tussac. My travelling companion forged ahead, fuelled by the adventure, while I crept along less courageously, muttering under my breath the various "bitten by a seal" stories I've been brought up with. At one point we stumbled across three slumbering sea lions – at the click of the camera the male reared and roared, while we shrieked and scrambled towards a vague notion of safety, on top of a tussac bog (a certain amount of clinging on to each other was apparent) before he crashed away into the distance.

Shortly after our little adventure Rob found us, and happily repeated (with extra details) a few of my favourite "bitten by a seal" stories, while subtly steering us back to the beach.

Carcass Island is gorgeous. The accommodation has all the modcons, such as an ensuite shower, yet still retains an air of homeliness. Seldom have I felt so comfortable while not in my own home.

Rob was the most obliging host I have ever met-waiting hours for us to take photographs, and regailing us with tales, such as mountaineering penguins. The food was great and the wildlife simply overwhelmed me. Where else in the world would you pay so little for so much?



# MPA patrol dogs soldier on

TUCKED away in a quiet corner at the back of the runway at Mount Pleasant is the dog section where 13 patrol dogs and one police dog are housed. Every one is a force to be reckoned with, and each has a personality.

Top dog though is mascot Jake, a nine-and-a-half-year-old German Shepherd who strolls around the office block enjoying his retirement. funded by the Sergeants Mess. Jake is lucky; he's been successfully detrained and has such a gentle temperament even small children can walk up and stroke him, so he can now live out the rest of his life in luxury.

But the other dogs which are used to patrol the military base are far from pussycats.

Devoted to their handlets, they wouldn't bite the hand that feeds them, but I think they would pretty much devour anything else that happened into their cages by mistake.

Their aggression is trained, and to reach the heady heights of patrol dogs they have passed aptitude tests and months of intensive training. Seventy per cent of the dogs used are gift dogs from rescues or Battersea Dogs Home,

but their standard of living is second to none once they join the Royal Air Force.

Each handler is responsible for the welfare of their dog, and the standard of care they receive puts them up there in the pampered pooches ranks.

There is no such thing as a day off for the handlers who groom, feed and clean their dogs' living quarters every day and log any relevant information into the weighty file each dog has.

The large buildings housing the dogs are heated at night and the ultimate luxury - heated kennels - are arriving soon.

But there is nothing soft about these dogs.

Once they are on duty they are focused and ready to detect any intruders within the military base, or assist with search and rescue out in the hills. The dogs live out their working lives in the Islands with a succession of handlers with their final resting place a dignified cemetery near the pound.

The police dog Hart, however, is a bit of jet setter and only does a four-month tour.

He is an even more valuable asset and can track up to three hours cold from the scene of a crime, search for articles, move passively through crowds and switch to aggressive crowd control at command. The main role for Hart and and his handler. Cpl Chris Lall, however, is routine patrol of the labrynth of corridors at Mount Pleasant throughout the night, especially at bar closing time when they have assisted with arrests and the conrolling of large crowds.

Hart, along with his handler Chris, also is a reserve RFIP officer, available to carry out any necessary duties and could become a familiar sight in Stanley over the summer months.

There has been a dog section in the Islands since 1982, quietly working away in the background ensuring the base perimeter is secure at night and ready for action at all times.

Having seen them at work 1 wouldn't recommend doing anything to get their hackles up.

They might be as playful as puppies during downtime with their handlers but, when they go on duty, they are as dedicated as any other member of the British Forces... and equipped with a bark that is probably nowhere as bad as their bite.

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# **Conservationist spreads message**

FALKLANDS Conservation took its message to Canada when Sarah Croft represented the organisation at the first World Seabird Conference, held in Victoria.

Concerns over the survival of albatrosses, penguins and other marine birds brought together more than 800 seabird scientists from over 40 countries.

The theme of the conference -Linking the Global Oceans - was to put seabird management and conservation issues into a worldwide perspective.

"The Falkland Islands are home to internationally important populations of seabirds, and attending a world conference of this magnitude was a chance to highlight the conservation work and threats facing seabirds in the southwest Atlantic," said Sarah.

"In addition, it was an opportunity to learn about other seabird issues around the world, share ideas and bring back relevant information to strengthen our work in the Falklands.

"The end goal of the conference was to establish a legacy in which improved global communications would be set up and create opportunities to share global data;




**Black-browed albatross** 

a platform on which scientists, governments and industries can better ensure the worldwide conservation of seabirds in the coming decades."

Among the birds most at risk in the Falklands is the Blackbrowed albatross, which is classified globally as "endangered with extinction" due to unsustainable numbers killed as the result of bycatch in fisheries across the Southern Oceans.

Seabird conservation issues such as by-catch in fisheries, overfishing, marine pollution, invasive species and effects of climate change also were discussed at the five-day conference.



# Sad end for the ship which led the way to liberation in 1982

#### Twenty-eight years after being the first ship to claim British victory in the Falklands, RFA Sir Percivale is dismantled...

IN her finest hour she was at the forefront of British victory in the Falklands in a long service that saw her serving the country around the world. Now this once great servant of the Royal Navy sits tired and lifeless in a Merseyside dry dock and is destined to become a tin of beans in your kitchen.

As the first ship to sail into Stanley following the Argentine surrender on June 14 1982, RFA Sir Percivale gained affectionate notoriety among those who served on her.

But, over the past four months, she has been gradually stripped and ripped to pieces by a CAT digger, broken and up and sold for parts. Many servicemen who

fondly remember the 255 of their brothers in arms killed in the Falklands. conflict can see her today. in her final hours. But it will surely sadden them to think that

the once great machine will be recycled like any other piece of scrap metal

"Some of the metal might even go into new structures like highrise buildings. Non-ferrous metals like the wiring and copper piping are melted down and resold as things like ingots.

It could even be salvaged as jewellery if you find the right kinds of metal. So far we are finding copper, brass, titanium and cupro-nickel."

Colleague Stuart Halsey added: "We towed the ship up from Southampton in December last year.

"Firstly there is the removal of anything re-saleable such as anchor chains and generators

Then you are left with steal and non-ferrous metals which are cut up and sold to local metal merchants."

Entering service with the RFA in 1970, Sir Percivale played an important role in the major flashpoints involving British maritime forces from the Falklands to the first Gulf War.

In 1982 Sir Percivale was one of the first ships to sail for the South Atlantic, and was in the forefront of the amphibious assault on San Carlos.

Measuring 412 feet in length with a crew of 52, Sir Percivale could carry up to 500 troops plus their equipment: vehicles like tanks and aircraft like Chinook helicopters

Later she would become the first ship to enter Stanley, followed by RFA Sir Bedivere, after the Argentine surrender.

"It is a sad day for any ship to be scrapped, especially one with such a notable and illustrious history as RFA Sir Percivale," said Commander Gerry Northwood of the Royal Navy.

During the first Gulf War Sir Percivale was deployed on various duties, remaining in theatre for the duration of the conflict. In 1997 she became the last grey ship to leave Hong Kong before the handover of power.

RFA Sir Percivale was decommissioned in August 2004 and was laid up alongside at Marchwood Military Port. Southampton. She remained at the Sea Mounting Centre until December 2009 when she made her final vovage - towed to Liverpool to be demolished.

It is anticipated this will greatly assist the administration of future games, said FIOGA chairman Mike Summers.



# Cruise tourist numbers revised up by one third

TOURISM in the Falklands is looking up, with visitor projections far higher than anticipated just three months ago.

After a bout of nerves during winter, when cruise season forecasts appeared sluggish at best, partly due to the withdrawal this year of the super-cruiser Norwegian Sun, the latest figures are promising.

According to the 2010 second quarter forecast, the Falkland Islands Tourist Board says tourist arrivals to the Falkland Islands are expected to increase by almost 32 per cent

Cruise ship passenger arrivals are now expected to total approximately 49,000 during the 2010/11 season, a small increase of L3 per cent compared to the 2009/10 season.

But this is a massive leap against the June quarter figures, which predicted just 40,572 passengers, a drop of more than 16 per cent.

About 5,500 overnight tourists are expected to visit the Islands, spending over £2.5 million

Domestic tourism also is forecast to grow, albeit at a moderately low rate of 1.5 per cent, and is expected to generate more than 13,500 trips and £1.15 million in expenditure.

Overall, visitor arrivals in 2010 – including inbound overnight tourists, cruise passengers and domestic tourists – are expected to total 67,000, adding £5.3 million to the Falkland Islands economy.

"The team at the Falkland Islands Tourist Board has been working extremely hard with both communications and our online presence to attract new and current markets to the Islands," said Paul Trowell, General Manger of FITB.

"It seems these may be starting to pay off."

The announcement last year that the 2,000-capacity Norwegian Sun would no longer be visiting the Falklands was a blow to the tourist industry. The ship visited the Falklands eight times last season, although it cancelled two, one of which due to sickness on board.

Tour operators and government earn upwards of £100,000 each time a ship of similar size disembarks passengers.

Samantha Marsh, tourism coordinator for Sulivan Shipping Services, said cruise visitor numbers were expected to be up from the actual arrivals of last season, although the 2009-2010 season included 13 no-shows.

"Last year we had a lot of cancellations, reducing the numbers drastically," said Miss Marsh. "More than 17,000 passengers did not arrive in the Falkland Islands due to a combination of poor weather and the earthquake in Chile."

Chile." "We are expecting at least 68 cruise vessel calls into Stanley, and we are optimistic there will be fewer cancellations this season."

Mr Trowell said the FITB forecasts for inbound and domestic tourism demand were calculated using an iterative process by drawing on a series of data sources.

These included the United Nations World Tourism Organisation, the International Monetary Fund, the UK Office for National Statistics, Visit Britain, Falkland Customs and Immigration, and industry sources in the Falkland Islands. Tony Curran

LATE on Wednesday night, the Chilean community in the Falklands shared an epochal moment for their country.

As Luis Urzua emerged from the San Jose mine, the last of 33 to be rescued after 70 days underground, few who witnessed those scenes on live television could fail to be unmoved.

It would be remiss of us to not recognise the impact this astonishing rescue has had on our friendliest neighbour. After February's devastating earthquake, they now have something remarkable to celebrate.

"Chileans now feel they have been noticed," said a TV commentator, as a wave of unprecedented national pride spread out from the epicentre of this drama in the northern Atacama Desert.

President Pinera called it "the night no Chilean will forget," and claimed the success of the rescue signified the rebirth of his nation.

It is heartening that this week we can share their joy... rather than only dwell on the cantankerous antics of that belligerent pest across the water.

# Driver changes plea over crash

JANE Louise Crompton (46) of Mount Pleasant was fined £275 on Wednesday after she changed her plea to guilty to a charge of driving without due care and attention.

Mrs Crompton had crashed into an oncoming vehicle on the Mount Pleasant to Darwin road on the afternoon of August 13. She was carrying five passengers, four of whom were minors.

Acting Crown Counsel Eliza Sharron said Mrs Crompton was not driving fully on the correct side of the road and had swerved out of the way of an approaching vehicle driven by East Falkland farmer Terence McPhee. Mrs Crompton had then over-corrected, crossing into the path of the vehicle, causing the collision. Injuries to Mr McPhee were minor, though both vehicles were written-off, Ms Sharron told the court.

At her first court appearance on August 27, Mrs Crompton had denied the incident was her fault, citing pot-holes and ridges in the road as the cause. However, further investigation revealed the road condition was not bad and on Wednesday she entered a guilty plea and apologised to the court saying she could have "driven in a manner that would have been better."

She was found not to be speeding, although she failed to brake sufficiently on sighting the vehicle. The court ordered her to pay costs of £85, although her UK licence will not be endorsed.

# Midnight fishing trip ends in the ditch with a £850 fine

STANLEY man Ross William Poole (28) was fined £850 plus £100 prosecution costs and disqualified from driving for a year after he admitted drink driving, and driving without a licence or insurance on September 24.

The court heard he had left the Conservation Ball between 11.30 -11.45pm and, although intoxicated, had decided to go fishing.

He took his father's vehicle and lost control of it in the Bluff Cove region of the Mount Pleasant road. He had then reported the vehicle as missing the next day, but later admitted to police he had taken the vehicle.

Mr Poole said he had paid his father £5,000 for the vehicle after the incident, and he was no longer employed.

He<sup>2</sup> apologised for the trouble he had caused and assured the court he was already suffering financially and personally for his actions.

### Women drivers plead guilty by post

TWO speeding offences were dealt with in court on Wednesday.

Both offenders pleaded guilty by post to speeding on Ross Road on July 17. The speed limit within Stanley is 25 mph. 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# Twittering president launches new tirade

WHILE many would question whether social networking site Twitter is an appropriate forum for a president to air their views, Argentina's Cristina Kirchner had no such qualms when, earlier this week, she launched an attack about the Port Harriet Rapier missile training exercise - a routine drill carried out by British Forces in the Falklands for more than 25 years.

In her postings President Kirchner announced plans to summon the British Ambassador for a meeting over the test, which went ahead as normal

Argentina then proceeded to lodge a formal complaint with the United Nations in the form of a letter delivered to the UN Secretary General Ban Ki Moon by Jorge Arguello, Argentina's UN envoy.

It stated that the United Nations, through resolution 41/39, had asked the two parties to refrain from unilateral actions to occur within the territory of the disputed Islands until negotiation on sovereignty between the parties began. "The UK fails to comply," protested Argentina.

The Argentine Government also claimed that the missiles "could fall into the water or in Argentina," and the testing was an "unacceptable provocation." A military spokesperson said the

Resident Rapier Battery undertook their bi-annual training exercise at the Port Harriet ground based air defence range. It was a normal test, firing missiles no different to those that take place all over the world, including the UK. The firings take place out to sea where the range covers an area within Falkland Islands territorial waters and airspace, with all airmen and mariners forewarned of the area to avoid.

Yesterday it was announced that Donatus Keith Saint Aime, president of the Special Decolonisation Committee of the UN, accompanied by Jorge Arguello, was to visit Tierra del Fuego as a result of the protest lodged by Argentina.

Meanwhile, the Buenos Aires Herald reported that Foreign Minister Hector Timerman had received instructions from President Kirchner to file a formal complaint before the International Maritime Organisation in order to determine whether or not an international treaty had been violated for more than 20 years.

Argentina claims that the routine missile testing could be a violation of the SOLAS International Convention where a treaty was established in 1974 making it obligatory for British Forces to inform the Argentine Naval Hydrograph Service of operations in the Falklands.

But Argentina's latest bout of sabre-rattling is not only concentrating on the legitimate missile testing which concluded on Wednesday. Just days before, an Argentine navy vessel lurked on the northern edge of the outer conservation zone and accused the Falklands registered trawler Venturer, which was three miles inside the zone, of "fishing illegally." Director of Natural Resource John Barton was reported as saying such an incident had not occurred for about four "It is certainly a bit years unsettling to see an unfriendly vessel come into view, but if folks are sure of their legal position then that should provide them with some reassurance."

The Venturer then moved further into the zone as the ships were clearly visible to each other. Sharon Jaffray

# Falklands team walks with pride as Delhi Games end

THE Falklands team were packing up and preparing to leave Delhi and the Commonwealth Games before the champagne corks had finished popping at the closing ceremony and after-party.

Thursday marked the end of 11 days of events with a spectacular closing ceremony in Jawaharlal Nehru Stadium. The 60,000 guests present were shown a short film, Incredible India, before being treated to acts including the charming skills of Bollywood, modern dancers from Delhi schools and acrobats with a backdrop of stunning fireworks. The stages were a feast of colour, soundtracked with local talents in singing and Punjabi rap, fusing Indian culture with modern crowd pleasers.

Among banners waving in every direction the Falklands team entered the stadium with Gerald Rieve carrying the flag, accompanied by three young athletes and Mike Summers. Present at the event was Michael Fennel, President of the Commonwealth Games

Federation, Sonia Gandhi, Chairperson UPA, His Royal Highness Prince Edward, the Earl of Wessex, Dr Manmohan Singh, the Prime Minister of India and Shri M. Hamid Ansari, Vice President of India.

"Despite the initial bad press these games have been a success for India and we're glad to be a part of it," said Mr Summers.

He described the noise from the celebration as immense: "Many of the younger members of our team would like to stay and celebrate into the smallest of hours. Unfortunately we have to leave quite early because of our flight commitments."

Mr Summers talked to Stacy Bragger about our teams efforts this year: "It's been a good games. We brought a larger team than on previous years but our athletes performed very credibly, all the time talking to people and promoting the Islands. The quality of our players was commented on continuously, especially considering their circumstances.

"The press and other nations were very interested in what our country is all about. They did an excellent job at promoting the Islands.

"Our team and their pins were very popular in the village and everyone wanted a penguin. From a promotion perspective it was a success.

"We may have no medals to show for it, but it's a promotional success."

# Stolen goods

PASSENGERS on the Friday night airbridge flight to the UK were surprised to have their baggage searched on arrival at Brize Norton. A military spokesperson said she could confirm that the baggage search was related to a burglary investigation that is currently being conducted by the Joint Service Police and Security Unit at Mount Pleasant. A spokesperson for the FIC confirmed that goods were stolen from the Rightlines shop during the early hours of Friday morning. A passenger on the flight confirmed that at least two people were transferred to a police vehicle on arrival in the UK.

REPORTS of activity by a group of visitors from Argentina to the east of Black Eagle rock near FIGAS have been thoroughly investigated by both the RFIP and the MPA dog section this week. Inspector Len McGill said there was an old military position in the area which had disintegrated, but there was no sign of recent disturbance to the ground and no items had been removed by the police.

### Oil reserves slip

ROCKHOPPER Exploration is considering raising more cash on the stock markets to fund further tests in the Sea Lion well, after independent technical consultants said the reserves could be almost a third less than estimated. The oil company raised £48.5 million from its investors in June this year. However, the company insisted the discovery was still commercially viable, despite postponing publication of the consultants' report until more data has been gathered.

SUKEY Cameron, the Falkland Islands Government representative in London delivered a large bouquet of flowers to Lady Thatcher's home on Wednesday, her 85th birthday, with a message attached from Members of the Legislative Assembly on behalf of the people of the Falkland Islands. ### Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

THE Falklands were among a handful of exhibitors who heeded the Labour conference organisers' request to man the stands on the first afternoon when the result of the leadership contest was announced. That meant five days in total with the consequent test of feet and voices.

THE leadership contest caused great excitement but, of course, a good number were disgruntled because in a first past the post contest David Miliband would have won. Instead, as third, fourth and fifth choices were added in, his brother Ed won by a hairsbreadth. I suspect this will be noted as a warning against alternative voting systems with the forthcoming referendum in the UK.

ED Miliband's first speech as leader had a sincerity which was in strong contrast to the style of Tony Blair which, on the one occasion when I was in the audience, consisted of cleverly spun sound bites punctuated by orchestrated standing ovations. Miliband's account of how his parents had arrived in the UK as young refugees from Europe was very moving.

MOST of our time was spent answering questions from delegates, MPs, local councillors and party officials. We renewed acquaintance with many old friends of the Islands, including MPs Kevan Jones, Bob Blizzard, Jim Paice, Tony Lloyd (now chair of the parliamentary Labour party) and Derek Twigg. former Veterans Minister, now chair of the Falklands all party group. We also met Joe Bossano. leader of the Labour opposition in Gibraltar who retains happy memories of his visit to the Falklands and is always generous with help and advice. As usual, with equal generosity, we were included as guests at the Gibraltar reception and made very welcome by Peter Caruana. These receptions are another opportunity to meet interested people and satisfy their curiosity about the Falklands. Another opportunity was the international lunch where I was able to ensure that some European and Asian ambassadors were better informed.

# Museum website brings history back to the future

THE Falkland Islands Museum is bringing history right up to date with the launch today of its new website.

The site is packed with information about the Museum and National Trust, but also features a range of articles and photographs about many other aspects of Falklands history.

"We hope that these articles will make for interesting browsing as well as providing a useful online resource for Islanders and overseas visitors," said Museum Manager Leona Roberts.

"It has always been our intention to open up our collections and make our information and images more accessible, and this seems like a good way to start."

One major benefit of the new website is that the Museum staff are able to upload information themselves, meaning that they can add to and edit the site as necessary, rather than having to wait for a third party to do this for them.

The redesign has been in the pipeline for more than a year, but could not go ahead until staff had the time to undertake training and to write the content – a job that can only be tackled during the winter.

"It's not a flashy or gadgety site," said Leona. "We have concentrated on trying to make it userfriendly and easy to browse. But

Summers takes sideswipe at IOC

FALKLAND Islands Overseas Games Association chairman Mike Summers has reiterated his disappointment at the International Olympic Committee during an interview in Delhi.

The Falklands is one of 11 countries competing at the Commonwealth Games which are barred from participating in the Olympics.

"I don't know the exact date, but around 15 years ago the IOC rejected our plea saying they didn't want any more small nations included. I find that insulting," said Mr Summers. "Yet there are tiny countries like Bermuda and Cayman Islands who were accepted by the IOC when they applied." The IOC has 219 affiliate members countries.

The only way out, he said, was for the smaller nations to lobby together for inclusion in the IOC, but different national priorities had prevented them from doing so.

Gibraltar blames the tussle between Spain and the UK for its non-inclusion. Representatives of the other non-Olympic countries - Anguilla, Guernsey, Isle of Man, Jersey, Montserrat, Niue, Norfolk Islands, Tokelau, Turks & Caicos Islands - refused to speak out, saying they preferred to concentrate on the Commonwealth Games.

On a lighter note, there was a little confusion over the national anthem at the Games. With God Save The Queen reserved for England, Falklands competitors were grinning their way through The Isles of The Sea by Rock Berntsen, should they achieve a medal.

## Racing spirit lives on as Max beats the odds

IT is a year since Max Levene, then 17, suffered a freak rugby accident which left him paralysed from the chest down. Doctors said he might not live, and specialists told him he would never be able to use his hands to push his wheelchair. But the determined teenager has done more than survive and, against all odds, he is back at his school in Truro, Cornwall, studying for his A-levels, and hoping for a career coaching sport. Max and his brother Bill were familiar faces around the Falklands after parents Guy and Yvonne were posted to MPA in 2005 and, since the accident, they have kept many of their friends in the Falklands updated. We asked Yvonne to tell the story in her own words for the Penguin News...

MAX had his rugby injury on Saturday October 10 2009.

We immediately flew back from our posting in Ethiopia to be by his bedside at Derriford Hospital. Plymouth, arriving at 2pm the next day.

Monday was the longest day when the operation to remove the halo of pins holding and stretching Max's neck and replace it with metal plating back and front took place.

Early the following morning (Tuesday) we decided to email our friends in the Falkland Islands, (middle of the night FI time), so we could inform them directly, in case they heard indirectly, which we did not want to happen.

It seems that news travels fast. As people were waking in the Islands opening emails, staff in the FIGAS office were reading online from a local Plymouth newspaper about a Max Levene who had bro-

ken his neck, and wondering if it was "our" Max Levene. Guy and I had arrived in the Falklands in April 2005.

Guy was the ACOS J1/J4, a job which has many links with the local community and it was a wonderful opportunity to meet people. We were soon into the local way of life and really enjoyed joining in with dances in the Town Hall, nights in the Trough, life out in Camp and with farming, getting invited to lamb marking and "carroting."

Our boys Bill, then 15, and Max, 13, came over for their school holidays and loved the Islands as much as Guy and myself.

Max in particular became very involved with horse riding at Wineglass Station.

Starting with a casual ride one day in the October half-term holiday 2006, having never ridden before, he seemed a "natural."

Bobby Short reckoned that if Max had some training when he arrived for the Christmas holidays he would have him racing in the Boxing Day Races. I would deliver Max to the farm for an hour or so each day and could not bear to stay to watch, but Max would return each day thrilled with his progress. The day of the races came and again I could barely watch as Max came thundering down the course on Minihomer. He came a credible fourth, only a horse length behind the winner, and was just on such a high. It was an incredible performance, and one we did not realise would for us come to epitomise the spirit he was later to exhibit when his injury struck.

As Max lay on a ventilator on ICU in Plymouth with pneumonia that was to last three weeks, it was the photograph of Max racing on Minihomer that we placed on the wall next to him: we told staff that this was the boy who

was lying there with wires and tubes everywhere, and that this was the boy we wanted back...

We have had difficult times in the year since, helped by the constant support of friends in the Falklands who have had the courage to phone and email in our darkest hours. Max has fought through two remissions, and showed the same courage throughout his rehab that was exhibited on that horse in those races! The photograph still holds pride of place on our wall.

Max has no use of his fingers but can move his wrists and pick up thinks by hooking them on his hands. He uses a stick to type on his keyboard.

However, we have so many special memories of the Falklands, we had so many laughs and so much fun, it would be hard to name them all: the fantastic horse ride from Shallow Bay to Hill Cove, Guy being shipwrecked off Goose Green with our dog Ollie, New Year bogged in at The Wreck, offroading to Volunteer Point and penguins and smoko everywhere!

We would love to return to the Falkland Islands in the future, either with the military or for a holiday and, even though it will now prove difficult with Max's injury, expect to see us someday. Not a threat, but a promise!

## Minister reaffirms sovereignty issue

THE UK had a close and productive relationship with Argentina but would not discuss sovereignty of the Falklands with Argentina unless Islanders so wished. Minister of State for the Foreign and Commonwealth Office, Lord Howell of Guilford told the House of Lords on Monday.

"We regard Argentina as an important partner." he said. "We have a close and productive relationship on a range of bilateral and multilateral issues, but we will not discuss the sovereignty of the Falkland Islands with Argentina unless the Falkland Islanders so wish.

UK is not a member of the UN Special Committee on Decolonisation, but we regularly make clear within the UN our support for the right to self-determination of the Falkland Islanders." However, in replying to a question from Lord Brett (Labour), the Minister of State admitted it was difficult dealing with Argentina.

"I mentioned the difficulty of getting cooperation, which we certainly have on offer. over the two items (fisheries and

oil) that the noble Lord mentions." he said.

But on other things we are engaged. We are dealing with Argentina as an important country and potentially a country of great wealth and prosperity.

"We are dealing with it on science, mining, education and en-

tive cooperation. Lord Howell said the **UN** Decolonisation Committee was "rather outdated and full of language about colonies, British imperialism and so on.

We have moved far away from that because the Falkland Islands is a self-governing overseas territory under the British Crown and that is what it remains." When Baroness Falkner (Liberal Democrat) asked why 12 Commonwealth countries supported the Argentines in the UN committee. Lord Howell said they were entitled to their views, although the resolutions were not binding.

It is always a pity when there is not full agreement, particularly among our fellow Commonwealth members with whom we operate closely on many issues.

But they have their point of view, to which they are perfectly entitled.

"The debate goes on, but it is not a binding debate as no binding resolutions are involved.

"I expect that the debate will continue, particularly among not so much Commonwealth countries but other Latin American MP/PN countries.

## ExCo to decide disputed plan for new house

THIS month's meeting of the Planning and Building Committee, chaired by Councillor Sharon Halford, assembled in the Liberation Room in the Secretariat to review ten applications seeking planning permission.

In the absence of CIIr Jan Check, who was overseas attending the Conservative Party Conference in Birmingham, fellow CIIr Glenn Ross provided support. Just one of the five lay members was absent and there were two members of the public present to view proceedings in the "open" section of the meeting.

Conditional planning permission was granted for the following detailed submissions: demolition of a peat shed and erection of a fence at 92 Davis Street for Norma Thom: erection of dwelling with decking at 12 Mink Park for Hannah Humphries: erection of decking and a porch to the dwelling at 4B Ross Road West for Paul Loosley; siting of a container for use as a lock-up and the designation of the area north of the sail loft as a container park at the Maiden Haven Marina on Moody Brook Road for Carl and Dianne Freeman: and the construction of two warehouses at 11-13 Boxer Bridge Road for Byron Holdings 1.imited

There were two applications seeking planning permission in principle, one of which was refused as it would constitute overdevelopment of the site. This was submitted by Gilberto Castro and was for the erection of a dwelling on land to the rear of 92 Davis Street.

The other outline application was submitted by Bob and Lyn Hancox and was for the erection of a dwelling on land to the rear of 9 Ross Road West. This received conditional consent despite a letter of objection from a couple living in the area.

Attached to that letter was copy of a letter dated May 12 1997 to those persons from the then Building Adviser/Planning Officer (the writer) which advised on the refusal of an appeal to Executive Council and included the following concluding sentence: "Executive Council further agreed that as a general policy it does not favour development proposals which would fill in every green area and back garden in Stanley as it would cause urbanisation on a scale which would destroy the character of the town."

A proposal submitted by Arlene Bowers for a bakery and cafe with seating for up the 24 people located at Waverley House on John Street attracted a lot of discussion and was the subject of discussion and was the subject of mental Planning Officer (EPO), Antony Payne.

This was recommended for refusal on the grounds of insufficient parking spaces to meet the increased number of covers of the enlarged cafe, which would give rise to highway and pedestrian concerns. Members agreed with this view and it was refused consent.

An application for the siting of two containers on land opposite 13 Sulivan Street, for Rose Toolan, was withdrawn, and the proposal to incorporate a corner window in the north-east corner of the café at West Store on Ross Road for the Faikland Islands Company was deemed "permitted development," which meant it did not require planning consent.

The committee then took note of progress being made with applications for building permits, and heard in some detail from the Building Adviser Nick Stephens on two submissions for such work in Camp, with members in agreement with his proposals. Nick also acted as the Secretary during the meeting in the absence of Fiona Wallace-Nannig who was unable to attend.

Committee members also reviewed statements made by the appellant and the EPO on an appeal against the refusal of planning permission for the erection of a dwelling to the rear of 10 Barrack Street for Graham Bound. These will in due course be placed before Executive Council for a decision. The committee next meets on November 4.

within 30 minutes from the time of ordering depending on where in town you live. "It takes the best part of 20 minutes to get to the houses at Moody Brook, so that has to be taken into consideration." he told Penguin News earlier this week, as they prepared for their opening night.

## Mystery photo is a world record breaker

A SUPER-SIZED image from the Falklands is to appear in a world record breaking book to be unveiled in London today.

The archetypal beach scene, of penguins on a rocky shoreline beneath a heavy sky, has been reproduced into a massive 20ft by 14ft image. It is one of 400 selected from 30,000 entries worldwide to feature in a giant Photo Book project, organised by the PhotoBox company in the UK.

The competition set out to attract photos from every country in the world, and the best have been reproduced in giant format to go on display at the Truman Brewery Gallery.

Unfortunately the company was only able to supply the name of the photographer – Julie Woodward – who is understood to have lived in the Falklands some years ago. Her present whereabouts are unknown.

FALKLANDS Conservation is launching a Penguin Appeal fund to help finance the cost of the upcoming census, an ambitious project to monitor penguin breeding sites throughout the Islands.

The five-week census takes place during November and December, when three teams, including scientists, volunteers and local guides, will visit seabird colonies on East Falkland. West Falkland and the numerous smaller islands.

The Black-Browed albatross population will also be monitored, which is of global significance as the Falklands is home to 70 per cent of the species.

This work will be followed by the first survey undertaken in the Falklands of Magellanic penguins early in 2011.

Research on Rockhopper penguins will be undertaken through the summer fieldwork season.

The census will provide essential information on breeding colonies to determine action for the future protection of the seabirds.

But at a cost of £30,000, including boat charters to reach offshore islands, survey equipment and data analysis, Falklands Conservation is appealing for cash



support. Described as a race against time to protect the seabirds of the South Atlantic, the project also is considered vital work to address the protection of all penguins in the face of potential threats, particularly offshore oil development.

Among other work undertaken by Falklands Conservation are its elforts to rescue oiled penguins, reduce the killing of albatrosses by fisheries in the South Atlantic, and to study the unique and native species of the Islands and campaign for their protection.

The Penguin Appeal aims to raise funds to support protection of wildlife, in particular the five species of penguin that live and breed in and around the Islands.



## White Ship - Red Crosses: a tale of professional dedication in 1982

White Ship - Red Crosses, a book commemorating the work of medical teams during the Falklands War, was launched earlier this year on board HMS Warrior in Portsmouth. The event was combined with the third reunion of the hospital ship Uganda, attended by Royal Navy doctors, nurses, paramedics, P&O personnel and former patients. Robin Pitaluga has written the following review for the Penguin News...

**IFINISHED** reading White Ship Red Crosses by Nicci Pugh in the early hours of the morning, and what an amazing story it is

I like the way it is set out using that lovely poem by John Masefield. Sea Fever, as the basis for each chapter heading, and the compelling maritime theme running throughout the work

White Ship - Red Crosses is an astonishing tale, carefully constructed and beautifully written.

Black and white images of those involved appear throughout the 11 chapters and a full colour band of pictures includes several Falkland Islanders taken in recent years. ## Falklands new Governor hits the ground running

NEW Governor Nigel Haywood this week swept into the Falklands on a wave of goodwill and with an appointments diary bursting at the seams.

"Everyone has made us feel very welcome," he said. "It's been very busy, and I've done as much as I can to meet as many people as possible. There's an awful lot to learn, but it's great fun.

"Cleverly, people have filled up my diary with things that are very necessary, but the more I can get out and about, the better."

With less than a week in his role, and barely enough time to unpack his running shoes, he is already convinced of his number one goal! to make Government House less remote from day-to-day life in the Falklands.

In an exclusive interview with the Penguin News, he said the twoway process of ensuring a good information flow between his office and the Islands was his priority: "There will be lots of individual issues that we'll be coping with," he said.

"But the main thing is to make sure that we do our level best to minimise misunderstandings between my job, this house and everyone else in the Islands. What I really want to focus on is making sure that people understand where Government House fits in.

"I want it to be very much part of the life of the Islands."

And that, of course, includes the West: "I haven't got a time scheduled, but I am very much looking forward to going there."

Having set foot in his new territory at 9.30pm on Friday night, the 55-year-oid Governor and his wife Louise – who this week celebrated their 31st wedding anniversary – were guests at MPA before arriving in Stanley on board HMS Clyde, ahead of his official swearing-in ceremony.

Throughout a day of remarkably kind weather, during which

they must have been stared at by more than most of us would feel comfortable with, the couple were on sparkling form as they undertook the formalities.

Before a carefully choreographed entrance to the Court and Assembly Chambers got underway, 50 guests and media assembled, waited patiently, and wondered if it really would be possible to fit air-conditioning in the Town Hall for just one or two days each year.

Mrs Haywood, escorted to her seat by Clerk of the Assembly Claudette Anderson-Prior, wore a black fluffy hat which hid her face from most of those assembled, but it was an impressive item of headgear which will serve her well as the seasons move on.

And then, spot on 3pm, her husband made his entrance, borrowing the Senior Magistrate's seat, alongside Chief Executive Tim Thorogood. Introduced as "Mr Nigel Haywood CVO," it was a matter of only a few minutes of ceremonials – the reading of the Commission from the Queen, the National Anthem, the Oath of Allegiance, prayers and a sword handover – before the 34th Governor of the Falklands rose to introduce himself.

Straight away paying tribute to his predecessors, and in particular Alan Huckle, he promised to do his best to "meet their high standards."

Immediately reinforcing the UK's commitment to the Falklands in the face of "tendentious and misleading assertions" from "others in the region," he outlined the challenges and opportunities ahead, describing the next few years as "a particularly important period for the Islands."

He also touched on the environment, a personal passion having recently completed an MSc in Biodiversity Conservation at Bournemouth University: "The beauty of the Islands, and their incredible biodiversity, are famous throughout the world," he said.

"Beyond that, however, is your reputation for careful stewardship of your environment. You have a strong biodiversity action plan, and a real commitment to implement it. I believe this is something that other countries can learn from, and hope that the Islands can soon become a centre of excellence from which academics and practitioners throughout the region, and beyond, can benefit."

As the ceremony drew to a close, a Guard of Honour took up position on Ross Road opposite Victory Green, and a small but appreciative crowd saw their first glimpse of their new Governor as he strode along the waterfront towards the dais, accompanied by his wife and Aide-de-Camp Captain Derek Clarke.


The Governor received the Royal Salute and, with Capt Clarke and Commander British Forces Commodore Phillip Thicknesse, inspected the Guard. After a 17volley salute, and with the swans' feathers in his hat flapping wildly in the breeze, Mr Haywood mingled with youth groups and onlookers, while Mrs Haywood, who today celebrates her 57th birthday, watched with a group of cub scouts behind a roped-off area.

The couple, who have three sons – lawyer Christopher (26), merchant banker Tom (25) and Peter (19), who is studying estate management – later opened the doors of Government House, where visiting young children seemed as much at home as their honourable hosts.

It was a fitting finale to his first day on show. And the slimline Governor was rarely seen without a broad smile on his face.

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## Assembly poised to stub out smoking ban debate

TODAY'S Legislative Assembly promises to hold some lively discussion when the ban on smoking in public places bill hits the table, as well as the Statistics Bill, which is also stirring up debate among local businesses and interested parties.

At Tuesday's public meeting the Assembly still appeared divided on the smoking ban, and the recent independent telephone survey had done little to sway them from their earlier views, shaped in some cases by information gathered from constituents and, in others, by their own views.

In fact there was an air of resentment from councillors that they had not been considered capable of gathering adequate feedback and that a survey had been conducted.

The result of the survey, with 70 per cent in favour of a ban, was "no surprise," said Cllr Jan Cheek. "I had already come to that conclusion without going to the expense of a survey."

Cllr Glenn Ross went so far as to say that in his mind the survey

## G24 president forms opinion

THE president of the UN Special Committee on Decolonisation, Donatus Keith Saint Aimee, left Argentina on Sunday after a fourday visit, which coincided with routine military exercises in the Falklands.

"We must be careful about the consequences of such actions," said the St Lucia diplomat. "First of all I must collect all possible information to have a founded and well-informed opinion. I can read hundreds of documents and resolutions, but nothing equals contact with reality."

In July 2005 FIG wrote to the then secretary of the UN Decolonisation Committee inviting members to visit the Falklands. He did not reply. **PN/MP**  had been discredited by a letter in the Penguin News in favour of a ban, and its association with the Cancer Support and Awareness Trust, and he would not be using the results to form a decision.

"You have to be careful how pubic opinion is sought," he said.

"The majority are sick of the subject and just want a decision made either way."

The Statistics Bill 2010 is also causing some rumblings of discontent in the private sector, although it was not discussed at the public meeting.

The primary functions of the bill are to assist the Falkland Islands Government in determining its policies by producing an annual national account, social, economic and cultural statistics, and to provide these to the Governor and the Legislative Assembly.

Assembly Member Dick Sawle told the Penguin News he intended to address the issue at today's Legislative Assembly and, although he said he had to check out the procedures, he anticipated the bill undergoing further discussion , with possible amendments made, before going back to the November Legislative Assembly.

Local businesses had, he said, raised concerns about the questions that could be asked and the frequency of data collection which could become onerous, as well as how the data would be treated.

Security issues had also been discussed, and whether or not the data should be held on the government network, he said.

One local businessman said he objected to having to provide information about his finances, especially when it was his understanding that there would be a hefty fine in place if he refused to answer any of the questions. It was a breach of civil liberty, he said.

Another said it was disquieting that the head of policy could call for legislated data collection at any point: "This should be driven by the Assembly, not by the head of policy," she said. Listen out to see if the ban goes

## **Rockhopper joins forces with Argos**

ARGOS Resources and Rockhopper Exploration yesterday signed an identical contract with Polarcus Limited for the use of the seismic vessel MV Polarcus Asima to acquire seismic data in their adjacent licences and other areas.

Argos Chairman Ian Thomson said he was delighted to sign the cooperative contract. "This allows both companies to share mobilisation and demobilisation costs and to capture the technical and cost efficiencies resulting from a larger programme. As a result of these savings, I am pleased to note that Argos should be able to acquire more 3D coverage over the whole of PL001 and adjacent areas than originally envisaged at the time of listing."

Rockhopper's Chief Executive Sam Moody said they wanted to "define the aerial extent of the Sea Lion fan, following our oil discovery earlier this year, as well to examine other areas and play types within PL032, PL033 and adjacent areas, which will help us to identifyfuture prospects."

Earlier this week Rockhopper announced its intention to place 65 million shares at 315p on the market to raise a further £200 million to finance the next stages of their exploration programme in the North Falkland Basin.

## Wind damage

HIGH winds on Wednesday caused minor damage Island wide but left Fox Bay village without any electricity. Four poles carrying the power cables across the settlement were blown over, knocking the supply out for most of the day. Resourceful residents propped the poles up with machinery, weights and cargo straps and had a supply back to the houses before nightfall. The Power Station manager went West to assess the damage on Thursday.

## On the road

SEASONAL roadworks are under way on both East and West Falklands with work on the Onion Range Road by a government gang and capping in the Port Howard area by McLee Ltd to begin on November 1. Road camps have been set up at Fox Bay and Hill Cove and McLee Ltd have also been contracted to install the cattle grids, as identified in the 2010 cattle grid survey, said Roads Engineer Bob Hancox

### Water's rising

DATA collected by the National Oceanography Centre in conjunction with measurements made at Port Louis in 1842 reveal that the rise in sea level has accelerated over recent decades from 0.75mm per year, up until the early 1980s, to 2.5mm per year since 1992.

## Mink Park plots

SOME of the Mink Park housing plot applications have been handed back in, and are now being offered to people who were unsuccessful with their earlier bid. If the plots are not taken up by those people, they will again be offered out to tender, said Cllr Sharon Halford at Tuesday's public meeting.

## It's business as usual at MPA

THE UK Strategic Defence and Security Review (SDSR) has recently been published and, according to a statement from the office of Chief of Staff HQ BFSAI Group Captain Steven Russell, it heralds "a new strategic approach, based on rigorous risk management and conflict prevention."

While maintaining highly capable military forces, any emerging risks can be stopped and dealt with before they become a crisis, the statement read, adding that the formation of the National Security Council was an important new development that would bring together key Ministers and defence and intelligence chiefs to ensure that cross-government resources were employed to best effect.

"Whilst some priorities are familiar, such as counter-terrorism, new priorities, such as cybersecurity, have been identified that will attract increased investment. The SDSR process has been subject to rigorous prioritisation, based on clear understanding of the UK's priorities, but will be implemented in challenging financial circumstances," it said.

And it is very much business as usual for British Forces in the Falklands: "The Islands will continue to be defended by one of the world's most capable, balanced and integrated military forces. Additionally, Mount Pleasant remains configured to allow for rapid reinforcement should it become necessary to deal with any crisis, including as a result of external aggression."

## Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

AFTER one free day I travelled to Birmingham for the Tory conference. Having arrived late because of cancelled and delayed trains I passed several rowdy clubs and more pubs to collect my security pass. As I emerged two police cars and an ambulance roared up to the neighbouring pub. Overall security was much more obvious than in Manchester, any potential threats clearly being taken very seriously.

THIS was a busier conference with more delegates and many more commercial exhibitors who tend to follow those in power. It was shorter, but we managed to speak to more people. Most asked questions which mainly fell into three categories: "Why are you here?" "How do you get to the Falklands?" and "Is there any oil?" Many had visited the Islands, usually on cruise ships, others had the misfortune to sail by, and more planned visits this season or in the future. Many were watching the oil exploration news with interest, some owning shares in the various companies. We updated many more on other developments in the Islands. Daftest question, after we had described the two air routes: "And can you land there?"

WE met more of the new MPs including Richard Graham, also Patrick Conner who visited the Islands with Trant late last year. Several others used to be regulars at conferences years ago, then young hopefuls asking earnest questions, now elected members. I've always answered even the most naive questions with patience and courtesy; one never knows who will hold power in the future. I've only attended a few conferences before and am a novice compared with our Representative who has now attended every one in the 23 years the Falklands has had a stand at the two conferences. At both, organisers and party members expressed their appreciation that we continue to make this considerable investment in money and time. The great respect earned by Sukey Cameron was evident.

FAMILIAR stand visitors included William and Ffion Hague, Teresa May, Cheryl Gillam, Bernard Jenkin, Andrew Rosindell, Peter Luff and Gerald Howarth, the last two holding defence related responsibilities.

## Delighted to be here, and ready to pitch in

Welcome to the Falklands. What was your very first impression?

I was fortunate in arriving by sea on HMS Clyde. You can't possibly beat the first sight of Stanley from the sea. Lou and I were just so pleased finally to get here.

You have arrived at a time of intense diplomatic activity. What qualities will you bring to your role in this area – specifically in regard to Argentina – that may be different to your predecessors?

I'm lucky to have had some outstanding predecessors, whom I also count amongst my friends. We all have different skills and experiences.

This is a job which I believe draws on all the skills one acquires in a lengthy diplomatic career.

#### You told me a year ago you have a keen interest in tourism and conservation, in particular eco-tourism and wildlife. How would you like to see both progress, without damaging the accepted way of life here?

You have set out the challenge exactly. The beauty of properly managed tourism is that it doesn't damage the existing environment – after all, that's what people come to see.


You also said you were eager to immerse yourself in the community as quickly and as often as you can. Can we expect to see you occasionally walking the supermarket aisles, or popping into a pub for a swift half?

Are you buying?

Prince William has been reported as saying he would like to serve in the Falklands with his Search and Rescue squadron. What challenges would that present to you as his grandmother's representative?

A perfectly fair question, but I'm in no position to comment on military postings.

Given we have some of the finest military kit on our doorstep, and you will clearly build a good working relationship with CBFSAI, what boyhood dream would you hope to realise if you are offered the opportunity: jet fighter or warship?

If either of those was my boyhood dream, would I have gone to Sandhurst?

But you have hit on a serious point. CBFSA1 and I have already built up a good working relationship, which is, to me, a priority.

During your speech at Saturday's swearing in ceremony you referred to the UK Government's review of its relationship with overseas territories, which will consider, among other things: "better defining the framework for the management of issues such as risk and good governance." Can you expand on what this may mean to the Falklands?

As I said, it's at an early stage, and I'll keep people in the picture. The FCO is looking to work on this in direct consultation with the OTs, including the Falklands.

I'd observe that, from my first few days here, there may be a lot that the review can learn from what seem to me to be strong initiatives to take forward good governance here.

#### You also referred to the Islands seeking to identify new sectors beyond the key industries of agriculture, fisheries and tourism. Aside from hydrocarbons, what new sectors do you believe could show most promise?

Some of the potential is set out in the EDS papers under "new industries" – those need further exploration.

I believe there is potentially a strong future in a knowledge-based economy, and the creation of a research centre, which could lead to spin-offs, is particularly worth pursuing. Falklands sovereignty is nonnegotiable and selfdetermination is the right of every Islander. Can you come up with a better phrase?

With the small quibble that selfdetermination is in practice a collective, rather than individual, right, no. This is a fundamental position.

Many people in the Falklands have a passion for music and sport. You were a teenager in late 1960s Britain, when rock music came of age and footballers became celebrities. Can you tell us your favourite band and sporting team?

I've always supported Spurs, and have long been a shareholder – I reckon I probably own one of Gareth Bale's toe nails.

I'm not a rock fan, but the opening bars of Layla still send a shiver up my spine.

Are there any associations, organisations or charities in the Falklands in which your wife Louise and yourself hope to take a particular interest, beyond your duties as Governor?

Wherever we can be of help, we'll happily pitch in.

You have run dozens of marathons, and boast a personal best time of 3:13. Will you be entering the Stanley Marathon in March? If so, how will you train, and what will be your target time?

When you get to my age, you get wary about making predictions. And running in these winds has been a bit of an eye-opener. But yes, I plan to run. No targets other than survival.

#### Thank you very much for your time. Is there anything else you would like to add?

I'm very happy to have had this chance to answer some questions.

My aim is to continue to be as open as possible over my time here, and to address any question put to me.

I am conscious that the role of Government House is sometimes not fully understood, and I want to put that right.

Oh, and if any of your readers see a person in an orange Boston Marathon jacket out pounding the roads, I hope they'll give me a cheery wave.

## Sharkey Ward's Harrier jet pilot son challenges PM over defence

PRIME Minister David Cameron was confronted by a hero Harrier pilot's serving son on Tuesday over his plans to scrap the Ark Royal aircraft carrier and its jets.

Navy Lieutenant Commander Kris Ward, The F 37, whose father is Cdr Nigel "Sharkey" Ward, the Commander of 801 Naval Air Squadron from HMS Invincible in 1982, told the Prime Minister: "I am a Harrier pilot and I have flown 140-odd missions in Afghanistan, and I am now potentially facing unemployment.

"How am I supposed to feel about that, please sir?"

Mr Cameron thanked Lt Cdr Ward for everything he had done

for his country, adding: "We do have to make decisions for the future and there have been long discussions about this in the National Security Council.

"I have listened to all the military advice, and the military advice is pretty clear, that when we have to make difficult decisions, it is right to keep the Typhoon as our principal ground attack aircraft, working in Afghanistan at the moment, and it is right to retire the Harrier." Lt Cdr Ward challenged Mr Cameron during a question and answer session with staff at the Permanent Joint Headquarters (PJHQ) in north west London.

His father, author of Sea Harrier over the Falklands: A Maverick at War, was equally shocked.

He said: "I think this is an absolutely appalling decision which reflects one thing, and that is the intent of the Royal Air Force to take away the Royal Navy Fleet Air Arm and supplant it with their own land-based capability, which of course it cannot do. So Kris is absolutely right."

## Working group reveals minimum 'living' wage

THE group set up to consider setting a minimum wage for the Falklands has set the rate of £4.53 per hour as the "living wage" for workers over 18.

The figure has been reached after six months of meetings and a public questionnaire and, while remaining subject to further review, legislation is to come into force 12 months after it has been approved by the Legislative Assembly.

The government's Head of Policy, Sonny Jose, who has been tasked with reviewing the country's employment law, baised with a number of groups, including the Chamber of Commerce, Rural Business Association, General Employees Union, Falkland Islands Fishing Companies Association and the MoD.

He emphasised, however, that each group had only one representative in the discussions and, because of the relatively short time period, they had not had the opportunity to consult fully with their respective memberships.

The rate is calculated on an average accommodation charge of £11.70 per day (based on the weekly Lookout Lodge rate of £81.90) and £14.14 per day for general subsistence (based on £99 per week, as per the government welfare benefit).

The group agreed that the national minimum wage should be calculated on the basis of gross pay before deductions such as income tax and MSL, and assume a 40hour working week.

Senior Economist Michael Poole told the Penguin News: "There wasn't too much science behind this, I'm afraid. [Lookout Lodge] was the only place we could think of that offered a relatively basic living environment and that had a widely available cost to it.

"We did discuss trying to work out average rental levels, etc. but the information is not easy to find and the group felt that Lookout Lodge offered the kind of 'basic' living that a minimum wage should be focused on."

He said the arguments in favour of a minimum wage were "to ensure that everyone that works is able to earn a living wage that they can survive on, to ensure that employers do not exploit their workforce, and to ensure that it is more profitable to work than to claim benefits."

This was despite objections from the Chamber of Commerce and RBA who, he said, believed there was not a major low wage issue in the Falklands, and that "we would be writing expensive legislation that only impacts on a small number of businesses and individuals."

Mr Poole also said workers paid the suggested rate would not earn sufficient income to pay taxes and, assuming the personal allowance stayed around the same level, their only tax-related deduction would be MSL at 1% of gross earnings from next year.

MPA based employees, though, who are exempt from retirement pension contributions, income tax and MSL, would effectively receive a greater net pay. However, this issue is to be considered further by the Executive Council.

While the working group says the ultimate aim is for the labour

market to self-regulate the minimum wage legislation, it will be a criminal offence to break the law, and any employers doing so should be reported to the police.

An appropriate penalty will be discussed as the legislation is drafted.

The setting of a minimum wage is the first step in a major overhaul of the country's employment law, last set in 1989, and highlighted earlier this year when the Penguin News revealed many part-time workers in the retail and hospitality industry were among the least protected in the Falklands.

At the time, Assembly member and former union boss Gavin Short said: "It is sad that it has to come to legislation to try and obtain dignified wages and conditions for workers."

This week, interviewed by FIRS, he said the minimum wage was "what it says on the box; the minimum that is really survivable upon."

He said it was heartening that employers and employee representatives had reached a consensus, and the proposal had now gone back out to various bodies for further input before the group meets again in the coming weeks.

"I think the message is the train is going to come into the station," he said. "It is subject to change, of course. We are a working group and that has to go through both GPC and Exco and, of course, Exco rightly can throw it all out, change it and do as they wish.

"But that's the present thinking at the moment. So let's work together to make sure we get something that's fair and equitable for all sides."

## Points of Law

Staff from the Attorney General's Chambers present key aspects of existing Employment Protection Legislation. This week they look at the duty on employers to provide information to employees

UNDER section 4 of the Employment Protection Ordinance employers must provide their employees with a written statement, setting out the terms and conditions of employment applicable to them, within 13 weeks of the employee starting work. The statement of terms and conditions should include the identity of the employer and employee, the date employment commenced, the rate of pay, how often the employee is paid (ie weekly, monthly, etc), working hours, any holiday entitlement (including public holidays and holiday pay), any terms and conditions relating to incapacity for work due to sickness or injury (including any entitlement to sick pay), any pension provision and any disciplinary rules.

The employee should also be given information about what to do if they have a complaint regarding any disciplinary decision or other grievance relating to their employment.

Employees should know who to contact, what documented information is available, what kinds of problem they can report, and what further steps might follow making a complaint.

If the employment is to be for a fixed term only, the statement of terms and conditions must say when the contract of employment ends. Employers must notify employees in writing within four weeks if their terms of employment change.

Under section 10 of the Ordinance employees can also request an Itemised Pay Statement. This written statement must contain the gross amount of the wages paid to the employee. the amounts and purposes of any deductions made by the employer from the gross wages, and the net amount payable to the employee.

The employee must request an Itemised Pay Statement at or before the time at which he or she receives payment of their wages. If different parts of the wages are paid in different ways, the amount and method of each part-payment should be detailed in the statement. If an employee is worried that they have not received written information about their employment and wages, their first action should be to speak to the employer.

### Public supports smoking ban

SOME weeks ago MLAs called for public consultation on the proposal to ban smoking in public places, including restaurants and pubs.

A small group of people, both smokers and non-smokers, raised funds to enable an independent survey of the electorate to be undertaken by Synergy Ltd, so as to make MLAs aware of the views of the majority.

Most readers will already be aware of the results of this survey via reports on FIRS or on the internet. For those who have yet to hear I will summarise the main results:

\* Funds raised enabled Synergy to poll 600 members of the Electoral Roll, chosen in a stratified random manner. Of these, 481 people agreed to take part in the survey. This represents 30.7% of the Electoral Roll and participants were equally divided between men and women

\* Overall. 69.2% of those surveyed said they support a ban on smoking in public places

\* Of those who did not smoke, 77.1% supported a ban whereas 41% of smokers also supported the ban

\* Of all those supporting a ban. 87% said it should include restaurants and pubs

It has always been the intention of our group to fund an open, independent survey, and a com-

"trips" and £1.15 million for a population of approx 3,000? This would imply that on average every man woman and child in the Falklands takes almost five local tourism "trips" a year and spends around £400 a year on them.

I would be surprised if this is the case unless there is a very loose description of "tourism" and "trips."

The statement "overall, visitor arrivals in 2010 - including overnight tourists, cruise passengers and domestic tourists - are expected to total 67.000" seems to make no sense, and I suspect is made up of the 49,000 forecast cruise ship passengers, plus the 5.500 bed/nights (?) of overnight tourists, plus the 13,500 "trips" of domestic tourists - not by any sensible definition a number of "visitor arrivals."

Statistics can be very useful when used and defined with care, but can very quickly become meaningless if not well-defined.

## Governor's pledge for FI defence renewed commitment

#### The full text of Governor Nigel Haywood's speech during his swearing in ceremony at the Town Hall on Saturday...

MR Speaker. Honourable Members, ladies and gentlemen. It is an honour and a privilege to stand here as Governor.

I am conscious that I follow a long and distinguished line of predecessors, many of whom 1 count as friends. So it is more than simply convention to pay tribute to all they have done, and in many cases continue to do, for the Islands which they all have come to love

In particular 1 know that it will be difficult to follow Alan whose Huckle. wisdom knowledge and ability to make connections with everyone I have long admired.

But times change and people move on. All I can do is promise to do my best to meet their high standards. I

should say at the outset. however, that the one thing that has not changed is the United Kingdom Government's commitment to the Falkland Islands

Perhaps this should go without saying. Sukey Cameron, your outstanding representative in London, tells me that, at a recent party conference, a senior politician visiting the Falkland Islands' stand wondered why she still attended, year after year.

After all, he said, "surely there can be no doubt in anyone's mind of the Islanders' right to selfdetermination?"

In one sense he was right: in my recent calls on the Foreign Secretary and the Minister of State I was left in no doubt about the strength of the new Government's support for this right, expressed in your wish for continued United Kingdom sovereignty.

But some things bear repeating: when others in the region seek to raise the political temperature with tendentious and misleading assertions, it is as well, calmly, to remind everyone of the simple clarity of Article 1.2 of the United Nations Charter.

Yes, we want friendly relations with other nations. But these must be based on respect for the principle of self-determination of peoples. And it is a principle we remain committed to defend. While the United Kingdom's commitment to these Islands has not changed, the way in which the relationship is managed has changed, and will continue to do so. Your new constitution is wellsuited to a modern and vibrant democracy, giving a greater voice to the Islanders through the Legislative Assembly, and clarifying the way in which the various parts of machinery of Government work together.

While in one sense it could be seen as constraining, in that it clearly delineates powers and responsibilities, it can also be seen as very much enabling, as it ensures that all have to work

> together co-operatively and constructively to achieve results.

> The power of mutually reinforcing institutions 15 considerable, and I will do all I can to ensure that it can be harnessed here. In addition, you will know that shortly after the present United Kingdom Government took office, it decided, in the words of the Minister responsible for Overseas Territories, "to bring renewed focus to the UK's relationship with the Overseas Territories and the important strategic, historic and cultural links that we share."

This has resulted in the commissioning of a review of the way that relationship works, which will consider, amongst other things, better defining the framework for the management of issues such as risk and good governance. It is early days yet, but and I will, of course, keep you closely informed as thinking develops.

Processes and mechanisms are important. But only if they help achieve results. And the next few years - the lifetime of the present Legislative Assembly, and my term as Governor - are likely to be a particularly important period for the Islands, as you seek to agree and take forward the Economic Development Strategy. There are many challenges and opportunities ahead, which the consultation paper sets out clearly. You already

have good management structures in place in key sectors, such as agriculture, fisheries and tourism, although each of these, worldwide. is volatile. You are working to identify new sectors

But, of course, the sector that is likely to preoccupy thinking over the next few years is hydro-carbons. Even at the exploration stage, the effects of the hydrocarbon industry are being felt in the Islands. Should production start, those effects will increase considerably, with political, social and environmental challenges. The Economic Development Strategy

> consultation paper seeks to address these points. But it is an exciting prospect, and though 1 know you don't need this reassurance the United Kingdom fully supports you in taking exploration forward. It is your legitimate business. I am aware from my

discussions that, as important as sustainable economic development is to the Islands, what is even more important is the unique environment in which you live.

The beauty of the Islands, and their incredible biodiversity, are famous throughout the world. Beyond that, however, is your reputation for careful stewardship your environment

You have a strong biodiversity action plan, and a real commitment to implement it. I believe this is something that other countries can learn from, and hope that the Islands can soon become a centre of excellence from which academics and practitioners throughout the region, and beyond, can benefit.

1 am grateful to everyone for enabling this ceremony to take place so soon after my arrival. I am keen to meet as many people as possible, and visit as many places as possible, as quickly as possible. I was born with a dislike for sitting behind desks: I want to roll my sleeves up and get on with the job. Those of you here, looking at my uniform, will realise what a challenge that will be.

Finally, Louise and I have been touched by the warmth of your welcome. Thank you very much.

I am conscious that, throughout this short speech, I have referred to those on the Islands as "you." I hope that soon you will feel we have earned the right to say "we."

## remains strong says Fox

AS the United Kingdom reviews the strength of its armed forces amid severe Government economic cuts, the Secretary of State for Defence, Doctor Liam Fox, has declared that the defence of the Falkland Islands remains strong.

In a BBC television interview he dismissed suggestions that Britain could not now launch a 1982 type Falklands rescue attempt if Argentina ever attempted to invade again: "If anyone thinks that the Falklands Islands defence is weak, they should think again," he said.

Dr Fox said Britain was far stronger militarily than Argentina and that the Falklands were defended by some of the most modern weaponry, such as Typhoon strike aircraft deployed at Mount Pleasant.

He said the Islands were also defended by submarine patrols.

While some parts of the armed services face economic cuts, he said Britain would maintain its ability to project air power wherever in the world it was needed. He confirmed Britain was going ahead with the building of two huge aircraft carriers already under construction, ordered by the previous Labour Government.

But he rejected suggestions Britain would be vulnerable between deployment of the future joint European strike aircraft on the carriers and the phasing out of the present Harrier jump-jet force, which performed so effectively in the Falklands war. Harriers have been deployed along with helicopters on three smaller aircraft carriers with upswept decks - the Ark Royal. Invincible and Illustrious – to facilitate Harrier take-off.

Dr Fox has first-hand knowledge of Falklands defences which he inspected on a 25th Anniversary visit in 2007.

He also dismissed concerns about the viability of a future Falklands Task force expressed by defence experts such as Lord West, a former head of the Royal Navy and captain of HMS Ardent, sunk in the Falklands War with many of his crew killed or wounded.

Dr Fox said Britain's defence capability was designed to meet the commitments of the future not the past, a reference to the run-down of forces deployed in Europe left over from the Cold War threat from the Soviet Union and the Warsaw Pact. **Harold Briley**  Page 8



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## FI sends letter to President Piñera

ON behalf of the people of the Falkland Islands, Assembly Member Sharon Halford has sent a message to the President of Chile.

She said the message offered "heartfelt thanks and support for the fantastic work that you have carried out in Chile by the rescue of the 33 miners in the Atacama.

"The whole world, including ourselves with a large Falkland population of Chilean people, has been watching in hope and praying for the success of this mission."

Travelling with First Lady Cecilia Morel and ministers of Foreign Affairs and Economy, Alfredo Moreno and Juan Andres Fontaine, President Sebstian Piñera travelled to London on the weekend.

"England is a key ally in Europe and I hope we will be able to strengthen our ties," saidthe Chilean president.

When asked about Chile's position following Argentina's protests about military exercises in the Falklands Mr Pinera said: "Friendship between England and Chile is one with deep historic roots and with projections into the future: we have excellent relations with England from the time of our independence."

On Monday Mr Piñera met the British Prime Minister David Cameron as well as the Queen and presented her with a piece of rock from the mine.

During the visit he revealed that his government was revising all mining regulations and had tripled the budget for safety measures: "We are changing everything because we have learned our lesson," he said.

## **Rising air freight rates see egg prices soaring**

A VISIT to Brazil by the Senior Veterinary Officer Steve Pointing within the next few months could reduce the price of imported eggs in Stanley's shops.

Mr Pointing is currently working on processes to import eggs, dairy products and fruit and vegetables from Brazil.

The price of eggs has soared in the last few months since the established links with Chile and Uruguay have been interrupted. But while Brazil does have EU approved processing plants for red meat and poultry, it does not have any for eggs and dairy products. While Mr Pointing said the lack

While Mr Pointing said the lack of EU certification did not necessarily stop these products being imported, he said: "We want to be sure that we are not going to bring in any nasty animal diseases from Brazil, and that is what we are trying to sort out at the moment."

But his efforts to sort out the necessary certification by email has been a bit like sending an email off into a black hole: "You never get a reply back," he said. It looks like the only way forward is for someone from the veterinary department, most probably. Mr Pointing, to go to Brazil and meet with the relevant bodies face to

face. The visit would include meeting the exporters in Brazil and dairy and egg producing plants in the Rio Grande area, as well as tidy up a few loose ends with the importation of fruit and vegetables.

Local businesses have imported eggs, fruit and veg into the Islands from Brazil only to have them compounded on arrival.

Seafish Chandlery manager Neville Hayward recently imported fruit and veg which wasn't allowed to go on the shelves. He said it had not caused a great loss to the company as it was also recognised to be a mistake at the Brazil end, and he only had to pay for the fruit and veg he had been able to sell on to fishing vessels.

But until certification is sorted out we will have to continue bringing eggs in by airfreight, and it is expensive, he said.

It costs almost £30 air freight for a box of 15 dozen eggs, which makes the product expensive to buy in the Falklands.

In recent months customers have been paying up to £2.40 for six eggs in many retail outlets in Stanley.

## Assembly meeting this morning

Councillor Dick Sawle is to ask Cllr Sharon Halford whether she agrees that the ever increasing MCA (Maritime Coastal Agency) regulations are having a negative effect on the operation of the Concordia Bay to the outer islands. He will ask Cllr Halford to advise the House what arrangements are in place to get plant and machinery to the outer islands. and if there are plans to improve the accessibility for these items in both the short and longer term.

**RETIRED** Commu-School nītv art teacher Tim Simpson is the inspiration behind the latest Falklands stamp issue, to released on Wednesday.

She has designed the series based on her observations of flowering found in the Islands. Featured are the

shrubs Fuchsia (27p), Boxwood (70p), Gorse



(95p) and Honey- The latest Falklands stamp release suckle (£1.15).

The Fuchsia is a species of flowering plant in the family Onagraceae, and native to Southern Argentina and Chile.

It is widely cultivated as a garden plant and was thought to have been introduced to the Islands by early settlers.

The Boxwood or Hebe elliptica is a member of the Figwort family and grows extensively in the Falkland Islands.

It is one of the tallest native plants to be found in the Islands and is commonly used as a hedging plant around gardens.

Gorse is a member of the Pea family and was introduced to the Islands by early European settlers for use as hedges to contain cattle

In the wild it tends to be found on rocky areas around the coast of West Falkland where it is relatively protected from sheep and cattle.

The Honeysuckle, also known as the Common Honeysuckle or Woodbine, is from the family Caprifoliaceae.

Commonly grown as a garden plant, it is thought to have been introduced by early settlers from Europe.






With great performances from both goalies. Stu Duncun, captain and Buffalos goal tender, was on the receiving end of more accurate shots.


But as the Buffs showed, near misses don't win games, which is why for the second time this season the Blackhawks walked away with the silverware.


Final sore was 9-4 which gives a final result of a 2-0 win to the Blackhawks.

For widows and widowers a pension may be claimed upon reaching the age of 60 years. Claim to Pension forms can be obtained from the Pensions Office at the Treasury.

#### CONTRIBUTIONS TO RETIREMENT PENSION SCHEME

It is compulsory for all persons resident in the Falkland Islands between the ages of 17 to 64, and who have earnings in excess of the current limit of £180 per week, to contribute to the Fund. It is important for all contributors to have as full a pension record as possible. An incomplete pension record will result in only a partial pension at retirement.

#### APPLYING FOR CONTRIBUTION CREDITS

Any person who considers they are unable to afford making contributions is advised to contact the Pensions Office at the Treasury to see if they are eligible to apply to the Board of Management for assistance. Under certain circumstances the Government will pay contributions on behalf of contributors. To be eligible a person must be earning less than the current limit of £180 per week and fulfil any one of the following criteria: entitled to a family allowance, or

looking after a person who is entitled to an attendance allowance, or unable to work due to ill health, or

- following a prescribed course of education/training, or
- actively seeking employment.



# Stern rebukes greet '82 task force chief's claim

CLAIMS that British defence cuts could encourage Argentina to retake the Falklands have been met with stern rebukes from both MLAs and Government House.

As the impact of the Strategic Defence and Security Review (SDSR) continues to reverberate - most notably as a result of controversial cutbacks for the Royal Navy - one of the heads of the 1982 task force this week claimed the Islands could be taken with "barely a shot fired."

Admiral Sir John "Sandy" Woodward, who led the Carrier Battle Group, said the review was "staggeringly ill-informed.

In a report for the Phoenix defence think tank, Woodward and two other former senior officers suggest a scenario in which a wellplanned surprise attack would be "highly likely" to succeed. Under the SDSR, published

last Tuesday, Harrier jump jets will be scrapped next year, leaving at least nine years until new F35 Joint Strike Fighters are delivered to operate from one of two new carriers


HMS Ark Royal, the flagship carrier, will be decommissioned next year, and HMS Illustrious will become a helicopter platform and retire in 2014.

Without fully functioning carriers until at least 2020, the Falklands would be dangerously exposed, the report claims.

And, it says, delaying or cutting the new aircraft carriers would be "a clear sign to Argentina that the UK does not have the resolve to fight once again to maintain its sovereignty over the Falkland Islands.

Senior staff at Mount Pleasant were last week swift to reinforce their position, telling the Penguin News it was "business as usual" at MPA

"The Islands will continue to he defended by one of the world's

most capable, balanced and integrated military forces," read a statement from the office of Chief of Staff HQ BFSAL

'Additionally, Mount Pleasant remains configured to allow for rapid reinforcement should it become necessary to deal with any crisis, including as a result of external aggression.

This week, both Gilbert House and Government House, responding to requests for comment from the Penguin News, were equally adamant the Falklands remained not only secure defensively, but Britain's support also was unequivocal.

Councillor Gavin Short, speaking on behalf of Members of the Legislative Assembly, said he was comfortable the review would not lessen the defence of the Islands "one iota," and that members

"were receiving assurances along these lines before the defence review was announced."

He added: "There is and will continue to be a sufficient level of equipment and personnel here to act as a very efficient deterrent, and it would be very foolhardy for any nation to contemplate a foreign adventure in the Falklands.

"A lot of the newspaper articles seem to have mixed their eras, as it were, and seem to be basing their stories on the levels of defence that was found here in 1982.

"Today the story is very different: instead of a small contingent of lightly armed Royal Marines and FIDF there is a very effective and technologically advanced force here in the Islands, both at MPA and local.

'It would not be a case of having to retake an invaded Island, but

that of effective defence until reinforcements arrive (if required at all).

He reiterated the Falkland 1sland Government's gratitude to the British Government and people for their "unfailing support" for Islanders to live in freedom and under a government of their choosing, while also maintaining FIG's wish to have normal relations with all countries - including Argentina.

However, he added: "But that certainly isn't possible at the moment given the aggressive and bombastic stance of their government, and it is to be hoped that in the future there will be a more pragmatic government in Argentina who will be able to recognise our right to exist as a nation. The ball is very firmly in their court.

Government House said the SDSR was driven by a new na-tional strategy aimed at foreseeing potential conflict, which would be refreshed every two years: "The review will equip the UK with modern defences: armed forces and equipment fit for the 21st century; strong security and intelligence agencies; and diplomats and development assistance which can help us prevent threats before they become a reality.

"The UK remains fully committed to the defence and security of the Falkland Islands. The SDSR does not, in any way, change the UK's ability to maintain a deterrence posture in the Falkland Islands.

Earlier in the week Foreign Secretary William Hague also said the British military presence in the Falkland Islands would be maintained.

We are committed, and there are no doubts that we are totally equipped to defend the Falkland Islands.

"There won't be any reductions in that area," he said. **Tony Curran** 



# Penguin News

ON many occasions the elected representatives of the Falklands have maintained a stoic, dignified and diplomatic silence while Argentina has continued to ratchet up its aggressive rhetoric.

And, on many occasions, that has been exactly the right thing to do: "Don't wrestle with the pig," I was once advised. "Otherwise you'll both get dirty."

However, when the rhetoric comes from "one of our own," and it is splashed across the UK press, it is appropriate that those living in the Falklands receive more than the usual reassurances, notwithstanding the immense debt of gratitude owed to Britain by the Islands.

When Sandy Woodward, one of the heads of the 1982 task force, lambasted the UK's defence review and, by extension, implied a weakening of Britain's position over the Falklands, this is one occasion when our MLAs are entirely correct to respond.

Less than 12 months ago, as chairman of the General Employees' Union, Gavin Short's portfolio focused primarily on dwindling union members and disgruntled employees.

This week he spoke for a nation, in the face of a think tank report which itself could perhaps be described as a "well-planned surprise attack" on the UK's defence capabilities.

"I have been following the defence review and the speculation in the press, both UK and foreign," he told the Penguin News.

"I am sure that I can speak for all members in saying that we are comfortable that the review will not lessen our defence one iota here in the Islands: indeed we were receiving assurances along these lines before the defence review was announced."

Authors of the report are upset, to put it mildly, at the effect of

the review on the Royal Navy, and its carrier presence in particular. Many will agree. But is it really necessary to revert to factics that some would describe as scaremongering?

There can be no doubt publication of the report is considered by those in diplomatic and military quarters as grossly unhelpful.

But it is refreshing – and right – that an elected Islander should speak for the people at the centre of this latest media maelstrom.

I would hope that when readers of the Penguin News digest Gavin Short's words they will say "good for him."

And good for the Falklands, too. Tony Curran

# **Kirchner death raises multiple uncertainties**

THE death of former Argentine President Nestor Kirchner – who revived Argentina's claims on the Falklands – has thrown a huge question mark over the future direction of the country.

Long acknowledged as the true power broker behind his wife Cristina's current presidency, he was credited with stabilising the Argentine economy, clearing out the military high command and reforming the justice system.

Having ruled from 2003 to 2007, he was widely tipped to stand again in the 2011 elections.

Now, with just 13 months remaining of her presidency, and the likely end of the Kirchner family dynasty, it remains to be seen how his wife will play out her role without her greatest advisor by her side. Argentine historian and political commentator, Rosendo Fraga, said: "The disappearance of Nestor Kirchner generates multiple uncertainties."

His death also raises questions surrounding the country's future stance on the Falklands.

Legislative Assembly Member Gavin Short said: "We will be watching what happens in the future in Argentina with great interest, as Mr Kirchner's passing certainly seems as if it may stand the political situation in Argentina on its head. Obviously we hope that whatever happens in their elections may lead to that country deciding to behave in a more neighbourly way towards us." While Latinamerican leaders showered praise on their former colleague, Kirchner's death was met with optimism on the world stage, as financial markets rallied on the prospect of a more investment-friendly regime.

Nestor Kirchner was born in Santa Cruz in February 1950. His mother's family came from Croatia, but she was born in Chile

He met Cristina Fernandez at university, and they married in 1975. Their son and daughter are not known to have political aspirations.

He died of a sudden heart attack at 9.30am on Wednesday, while in hospital at the Patagonian town of El Calafate.

## LAN profits up

LAN Airlines reported this week that third quarter profits had doubled and it planned to invest \$US 7.72 billion through to 2018 to more than double its fleet. It also had acquired 98% of outstanding shares of Colombian airline AIRES, through the purchase of its parent entities.

## Pencil Lane

THE trial reversal of traffic on Pencil Lane (IJS access) has been made permanent by ExCo. It was agreed that, although the situation was not perfect, the change was an improvement.

### Status party

STATUS ceremonies are once againto be held at Government House rather than the Court and Council Chambers. Cllr Gavin Short said Government House better suited what was essentially a celebration.

## Freight rates, jobs for locals and MSL on the ExCo menu

GOOD news for Camp residents is that the freight consolidation service run by Workboat Services Ltd was agreed at Executive Council last week, along with the continuation of the livestock transportation subsidies.

If the new consolidation service is successful the annual cost to government is expected to be £35,000, which is already included within the 2010/11 operating budget and will be monitored throughout the year via the FIG quarterly Workboat Services Ltd contract management meetings.

The service comprises nine voyages to each island group per year, with cargo received at the Fortuna Warehouse and containers tilled by WSL. Haulage to the vessel at either New Haven or FIPASS will be done by hauliers but managed by WSL as part of its contractual obligations.

New rates agreed at the meeting are £85 per cubic metre for frozen goods and £350 per 20-foot container not exceeding 10 tonnes

## Plaudits for SG fishery

AFTER a 21-month independent assessment, the South Georgia icetish fishery has been certified as a sustainable and well-managed fishery under the Marine Stewardship Council (MSC) standard. The fishery, operated by Seaview Ltd, scored particularly highly on its maintenance of the ecosystem, with nets designed to avoid contact with the ocean floor and extensive measures in place to limit bycatch of seabirds. to all islands, and £39 per cubic metre for dry goods to Fox Bay.

The livestock transportation subsidy for abattoir bound sheep is to continue for the next three years, bringing down the level of subsidy each year by 25%.

EXECUTIVE Council took a majority vote to approve proposals made by the Chief Executive on the localisation of posts and succession planning.

A key recommendation of the Chief Executive's review of government is to ensure more posts in FIG, particularly at senior level, are filled by local people.

Mr Thorogood said a career management scheme should be adopted within FIG, with two streams: a general management stream designed to identify and manage the careers of individuals who are judged to have the potential to fill senior management posts in FIG, placing a premium on general management ability and experience; and a succession planning stream under which key FIG posts are identified which require specific job-related skills and experience, where individuals are identified for development to enable them to occupy those posts when the vacancy arises. The scheme is expected to cost £50,000 per year, contained within the additional £200,000 already in the operating budget for training.

CLLR Jan Cheek said there was much debate on the title of the bill to implement the proposed medical services levy, which featured in several Assembly Member's election manifestos and appeared to be well understood by the electorate: "Legal advice seems to be that it cannot be called a levy," said ClIr Cheek.

Two members argued strongly that it would be better understood as such by the public, because many would remember it as operating in the past as a levy on earned income, before other taxes and allowances were taken into account.

## Another oil-ercoaster

SHARES in Desire Petroleum more than doubled on Wednesday, following internet bulletin board speculation of a bid approach for the Falklands-focused explorer and an oil find, traders said.

An approach at £2 per share was being talked about, reported Reuters. However, Desire said it had noted the press speculation, but it had not received any approaches concerning a possible offer for the company.

Desire has been drilling a sidetrack well on its Rachel prospect and said on Wednesday it had reached the measured total depth of 3,418 metres, and the process of pulling out of the drill hole was underway. Once this was complete, logging operations would begin and a further announcement would be made once the logging results were known, said a spokesperson.

Desire rose 76 per cent to 117.5p, the biggest one-day gain since listing in April 1998. Rockhopper rose 6.1 per cent to 318.25p.

## Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

FIRST, apologies for confusing names last week: it was Conor Burns MP who visited the Falklands with Patrick Trant late last year. My only excuse is the fact that I wrote it on the airbridge, always a mindnumbing experience.

A QUIETER week than last, but with the addition of the committee looking yet again at the bill on smoking in enclosed public spaces. Finding a time when all members can make themselves available is proving well nighimpossible with two too busy elsewhere to attend

FOR those still puzzled by some of the somewhat chaotic proceedings on the bill last Friday, I can say that you are not alone. While I understand that some members are relatively new to the Legislative Assembly Standing Rules and Orders, we had just accepted the new version, updated to make it consistent with the new Constitution.

IT is not too early for individuals thinking of standing for election three years hence to start studying the Constitution, Standing Rules and Orders, and attending as many meetings as they can, to get an understanding of process and of some of the issues. If someone wants to be thought capable of representing the electorate they cannot expect to be spoon-fed this kind of information; it is up to individuals to show a little initiative.

ON Wednesday we spent the day with senior FIG officials looking at progress since the last "awayday" in April. Portfolio holders and directors outline the present position on each subject to ensure that all are aware of what others are doing. We then have a joint discussion of key issues where officers' input is valuable in putting different perspectives for Assembly Members' consideration when making decisions.

AN interesting meeting was held, including a few MLAs and a senior BAS representative, to review progress on rebuilding the relationship which ran into difficulties a few years ago. I'm pleased to report that everything is back on track and we are exploring new areas for cooperation.

Born in Erkelenz in western Germany, Holtby is still eligible to play for Fabio Capello's senior team, provided he does not play for Germany first. He has a German mother and his father Chris has spent most of his military career stationed in Munich

It is a situation unprecedented in recent footballing history. However, Germany boss Joachim Low has indicated that he plans to include Holtby in his senior squad before long.

## **Rare stamp seals** national collection

THE Falklands has achieved a philatelic milestone - the completion of the country's national stamp collection.

Following the donation of a Falkland Islands 1928 2d Provisional in September, Stanley Gibbons has completed the collection for the museum with a further donation of a Falkland Islands 1933 £1 Centenary

The Falkland Islands Philatelic Study Group (FIPSG) has, for some months, been trying to compile a basic mint collection of stamps, after it was found that the collection bought previously was incomplte

The 1933 £1 Centenary stamp is regarded as one of the most handsome and recognisable stamps of the British Empire, said Stanley Gibbons Director of Philately, Dr Philip Kinns

The central design is the finest portrait of King George V ever to appear on a postage stamp, according to Stanley Gibbons, and the colour of the frame and superb. quality of production enhance the noble effect

Only 2,711 were sold and, catalogued at £2,000 unused and £2,750 used, it is the most valu-

able "basic" stamp of the Falklands (when varieties, shades and errors are excluded).

The complete collection will be presented to Falkland Islands Government Representative Sukey Cameron, at a special ceremony at Falkland House on Thursday, before being flown to its permanent home at the Falkland Islands Museum later next month.

# Pub brawl spills onto street and into court

A SCUFFLE in Deano's Bar which spilled out into the street eventually led three people into court, where Senior Magistrate John Trevaskis on Wednesday described their actions as a "thoroughly shameful incident.

Carlin Reginald Crowie (43), Justin Clive Richard East (40) and Michelle Crowie (36) admitted disorderly behaviour charges while Ms Crowie also pleaded guilty to an assault charge

The court heard how the three had become involved in an argument which escalated into punches being thrown in Deano's Bar on May 1. Bar staff evicted them onto the street where further abusive language and behaviour took place.

Senior Crown Counsel Alison Inglis said one witness had described them as "grappling in the street.

All three were described by witnesses as being "wound up, angry and abusive" to the bar man-ager Chris Sim when he tried to intervene in the early stages, said Ms Inglis.

The matter had come to court after Ms Crowie had made a complaint at the Police Station about an injury she had received. Mr Trevaskis said he hoped they were

all ashamed of themselves, adding: "It's unnecessary in public and not the sort of thing that should be going on in the public streets of this town or any community

He said there was some mitigation in that injuries had been no more serious than "denting of personal pride."

Each of the three was given a conditional discharge for one year and ordered to pay £85 prosecution costs.

\* \* \* \* \*

ALSO in court this week. Stanley man Kyle Kieran Lee Joshua (21) appeared for a Newton Hearing relating to a charge of assault, which was adjourned until November 8 for defence lawyer David Lang to receive disclosure from Crown Counsel.

Mr Joshua had earlier admitted the offence against a woman. However, he had not agreed to the prosecution's claim that he had kicked the victim.

COLIN George MacDonald (70), who faces a re-trial in January, has been charged with two further sexual offences dating back to 1967/68.

The jury was discharged in the earlier trial which took place in June Mr MacDonald now faces three counts of rape, one of indecent assault and one of unlawful sexual intercourse.

**JAMES** William Hamilton Curtis (37) of Stanley had a charge of using threatening words and behaviour dismissed after Senior Crown Counsel Alison Inglis said the Crown offered no evidence and apologised for any inconvenience or stress caused.

MOUNT Pleasant resident Christopher Martin Warren (42), who admitted by post that he had been speeding on Ross Road on September 11, was fined £132 plus £85 prosecution costs.

Mr Warren said it was the first time he had driven into Stanley and he had not seen signs for a speed limit, which he had assumed was 30mph. He was recorded driving at a 36mph within the 25mph zone. \* \* \* \* \*

TWO cases were adjourned for lawyers to take instruction. lan Betts (31), who is charged with unlawful violence, will be back in court on October 3, and Sylvia Jean Francis (48) will enter a plea to a charge of harassment on October 10.

# Smoking legislation to drag on another month

THE bill to ban smoking in public places was approved in principle at Friday's Legislative Assembly, but members were unable to offer amendments to details of the legislation they did not agree with, much to the surprise of many listening to the live broadcast.

Final copies of the legislation, with the primary aim of protecting public health by banning smoking in most enclosed places, had been with Assembly Members since early August.

But listeners could be forgiven for thinking there had been no time to study it and prepare amendments in advance.

It was not a unanimous decision to ban smoking in public places. Smokers Gavin Short and Dick Sawle voted against, while Cllr Bill Luxton took a seat on the fence and abstained, saying it was a matter about which he "deeply did not care."

Cllrs Emma and Roger Edwards, Jan Cheek and Sharon Halford supported the bill, while Glenn Ross did not attend the meeting.

But the one thing all seven tended to agree on was that the proposed legislation was a "sledgehammer being used to crack a very small nut."

Cllr Sawle said that if it had been a bill to prohibit smoking completely it may have earned his support. However, it was his view that much had already been gained voluntarily.

"If we approve this law then we may wish to congratulate ourselves on following the examples of other countries," he said. "But would it not be a better example to other countries to show that we are capable of achieving the same end by voluntary means?

"I would maintain that with the exception of a few bars we have already achieved this, and believe that we can congratulate ourselves for doing so," he said.

The legislation as it stood would only stop smoking in very few establishments, and he reminded the Assembly of the many exemptions, which did not "leave much to legislate for."

Cllr Gavin Short maintained that "things in the Falklands have a way of finding their own level." He added: "It was loony that

He added: "It was loony that somebody could be criminalised for lighting up where they shouldn't."

Cllr Jan Cheek said she supported the ban on the basic principle of people's freedom to breathe clean air.

"I am not voting to ban smoking. Those who wish to poison themselves remain free to do so. But I believe the rest of us should be free to breathe unpolluted air, as should those who work in pubs, clubs and other public venues.

Cllr Cheek said she had listened to many members of the public and, with only a handful of exceptions, their views could be summarised as wanting the Assembly to "just get on with it." Cllrs Sharon Halford and Roger

Edwards added their support to

the bill, and it looked like "getting on with it" was the order of the day. However, Cllr Edwards' query on what he referred to as "the strange business" of not being allowed to smoke in an area of your home where a business was carried out, when a hotel could designate all its rooms or bedrooms as smoking places, caused proceedings to almost grind to a halt. Proposals that the

Proposals that the Assembly could go into Select k Committee to produce amendments to be brought back at a later date were not met

with support, as most felt the issue needed to be dealt with that day. The Attorney General,

however, warned that to produce amendments "on the hoof" could result in the legislation becoming more confusing.

Confusion did indeed reign, and one couldn't help but wonder if the Standing Orders adopted at the beginning of the meeting to "make the process of passing legislation through the Assembly clearer" had been read by anyone in the room.

Eventually it was decided that Select Committee would compile amendments for the November meeting of the Assembly.

Councillor Sawle said that while he would have preferred the bill to have been passed as written - or ditched - for him it had been a reasonably good debate.

The result, he said, simply proved his point that people had not read the detail of what was proposed and it was the detail that he was objecting to, as well as the principle of government legislating too strongly for people's behaviour. But, he told the Penguin News afterwards, he was delighted with the result and was looking forward to "dealing with the next job on the list."

## MLAs revise red tape protocols

COUNCILLOR Dick Sawle described the Revised Standing Rules and Orders adopted by the Assembly as "a lengthy document, but one that further strengthens accountability of Assembly Members."

The aim of the revisions had been to remove duplications and anomalies in the old standing orders and reflect current practice, and to make the new standing orders compliant with the new Constitution, "given that we now have a PAC and Complaints Commissioner."

It also made the process of passing legislation through the Assembly clearer, and included the definition of the roles of the speaker and deputy speaker as well as incorporating the Nolan Principal of Standards of Public Life, ensuring compliance with them through a code of conduct applicable to and positively accepted by all members of the Legislative Assembly.

The Revised Standing Orders also provided a procedure for alleged breaches of the code of conduct to be passed to the Principal Complaints Commissioner for investigation and report, he said.

The Statistics Bill was also adopted, after several amendments. Chief Executive Tim Thorogood said it had three overarching objectives: it formalised and kept in a single place a lot of the statistical and data gathering work that already occurred within FIG and the private sector, (ie census and annual production of national accounts).

It also articulated the scope and methods for collecting additional data from businesses and individuals for future policy formation, and for reporting to bodies such as the European Union, and offered legislative protection and recourse to private businesses and individuals who provided information to the service within the FIG if the stringent confidentiality conditions were ever breached.

## Our stats stand up to scrutiny

IN his letter (Penguin News, October 22). Anthony Tuson suggests that statistics are only useful if they are defined with care. I couldn't agree more.

That is why, in 2008, the FITB established a system of tourism statistics that rigidly follows the United Nations World Tourism Organization (UNWTO) concepts, classifications and definitions of tourism.

This allows us to consistently measure the sector in the Falklands, and to compare ourselves, like with like, with other countries that also follow the world standard

It was therefore with disappointment that I read his letter. which queried the statistics that FITB collect and publish on a regular basis

Tourism is defined as "The activities of persons travelling to and staying in places outside their usual environment for not more than one consecutive year for leisure, business and other purposes."

Note that tourism consists of persons travelling for business. visiting friends and relatives, religion, even transit, as well as leisure.

So when we talk about tourism, we are not just referring to holidays.

Remember, hotels and restaurants benefit from business visitors just as they do from leisure visitors (often more so).

Some countries in the world base their entire tourism sector on non-leisure tourism, such as Saudi Arabia (business and religious tourism). There are three further definitions that are important before we look at the statistics for the Falklands.

A "tourist" is a visitor who stays at least one night away from their place of usual residence on a trip (in the Falklands these are mainly our air arrivals).

A "day visitor" is a visitor who does not spend a night away from their place of usual residence on a trip (in the Falklands these are almost exclusively cruise arrivals).

A "visitor" is the term used for both Day Visitors and Tourists (the sum of the two).

With that cleared up, let's look at the statistics that Mr Tuson has challenged.

Yes, we do mean that over 5,500 overnight tourists are expected to visit the Islands during 2010.

The majority of these arrivals will travel by air, although around 750 will arrive by sea. Around 1,400 of these will be leisure visitors. We work closely with Customs and Immigration when com-

piling these figures. Out of interest, the average length of stay of overnight visitors in the Falklands is about 15 nights so, if we are talking about bed nights, we can expect over 80,000 in 2010

Remember that not all of these will be in hotels and guesthouses. Many will be in private accommodation

Yes, we do mean 13,500 domestic tourism trips and £1.15 million in spend in 2010.

A domestic tourism trip is very clearly defined (by UNWTO) as any trip made by a resident of the Falkland Islands to a place at least 40 miles from their place of residence, for at least one night, excluding places that are visited once a week or more

To measure domestic tourism we undertake a quarterly household survey, and ask respondents in Stanley, Camp and MPA about trips taken during the previous three months.

These show that the average length of a trip is around two nights and spend is around £100 per trip.

Whilst it varies from month to month, visiting friends and relatives (VFR) usually accounts for around one half of all trips

This of course means that the accommodation sector does not benefit.

Yes, there will be a total of around 67,000 internal visitor arrivals in 2010.

Internal visitor arrivals are a sum of tourist arrivals (overnight visitors, usually arriving by air). day visitors (mainly cruise), and domestic tourists.

We are very proud at FITB of our tourism statistics, and we undertake a regular tourist departure survey at MPA, a quarterly domestic tourism survey by telephone, and a cruise visitor survey for selected vessels.

In addition to that we compile monthly arrivals statistics based on data from Customs and Immigration.

We also have a database that all this data is stored on, and a sophisticated reporting system.

Finally, we publish Falklands Forecast on a quarterly basis that provides a summary of the current status of the tourism sector

All of this is based on a rigid set of definitions.

## A clean bill of healthy food

MAY I correct an error (Penguin News, October 22) where it states that importers have had fresh produce from Brazil arrive and be impounded by DOA

This has not happened to Stanley Growers, nor would we knowingly import produce likely to be impounded.

On the previous my Scout voyage we cancelled and refused acceptance for loading of a full container of fresh produce in Rio Grande because it had failed the Brazilian Agricultural Biosecurity Export Inspection, and would quite correctly have been impounded if it had arrived

We did order and receive a shipment of eggs as "in transit" cargo. a perfectly legal operation under DOA agreement for preplanned offshore sales, to reduce prices to those customers and relieve freight pressure on Lan.

There has been no problem with supplies from Uruguay. We receive a container each month loaded by our Montevideo suppliers and trans-shipped via RioGrande. Unfortunately Uruguayan Customs rules do not permit the export of eggs to any country

The Falklands does not require EEC regulations on dairy and egg suppliers from Chile and Uruguay and - with the exception of one dairy products producer in Uru-guay - no such EEC plants exist in either country, nor is there any need for them to.

We have accepted their own national standards as satisfactory and as good as EU - after all, which country wants to poison its own people by poor hygiene and disease standards?

Hopefully a similar system can quickly be agreed with Brazil otherwise, as summer arrives and passenger numbers on Lan increase. freight space decreases, and there will be no capacity to import eggs and they will disappear from the shelves

We have a 40ft reefer arriving from Montevideo on November 2, and those stocks should reduce the price of air freighted carrots, cabbage and onions, etc. and last for some time.

# **Black-browed albatross** defy downward trends

FLYERS of a different kind took to the air again in late September and the first days of October to carry out further surveys of Blackbrowed albatross colonies.

Hardly before work had been completed on analysing 2009 aerial photographic surveys, a team of five, all professionals in their own particular field. were flying with, but well above, the albatross again.

Following the same pattern, same timing and using the same methodology developed over a number of years, the objective was also the same.

Refining aerial photographic survey knowledge was one aim: a system which can now be used to count albatross precisely and even define if they are on new or old nests. Confirming whether or not this new breeding season in the Falkland Islands has brought back the increasing numbers of potential adult breeding pairs shown by our surveys in the past 25 years was another.

Following our all-Island survey in 2005, annual surveys have been made of approximately a third of the twelve Black-browed albatross colonies in the Islands

This most recent survey was successful in covering all colonies.

As shown with the earlier surveys, the results of the annual surveys made between 2005 and 2010 have been interesting

Although dips occur in the population at some sites in some years, the overall trend is for an increasing population.

The process of counting each individual bird on a nest, carried out from digital images on a high definition screen, is a very slow

process. At the time of writing this article nine of the 12 colonies in the Falklands have been counted and it will be some weeks before the other counts are complete

However, all those colonies counted show increases varying from 6.3% to 40%, and sample areas counted from the remaining colonies indicate the same trend.

With the high upward trend in the albatross population shown in our 1986 to 2005 surveys, our expectation had been for a levelling of the population. So far this is not the case.

What our aerial survey photographs do show is that the albatross at all 12 sites in the Falkland Islands are presently doing well

and not in decline. Hopefully this is a rewarding note to all those landowners and individuals who have supported this view from their own observations over the years. It has also been especially gratifying that our independent surveys and the methodology used are being recognised and given support, not just by many individuals, but by organisations such as FIFCA.

We can only hope that larger conservation lobbying organisations, who have a strong voice in the conservation world, will see the wisdom in presenting the reality of the Falkland population of Black-browed albatross in a better light.

Being included continually as part of the declining albatross population view does little to support the conservation efforts that are made in these Islands

Thanks to the other three professionals of British International Helicopters, the Captain and flight

of HMS Gloucester for their support; to landowners for their supporting information, the help given by the Falkland Island Fishing Companies Association and Monika Egli

At some time in the next weeks, assistance will be given to FIG's Environmental Planning Department, as part of FIG's commitment to ACAP (Agreement on the Conservation of Albatross and Petrels). Aerial survey photographs will be taken of some albatross colony sites in conjunction with ground counts

This cooperative effort it is hoped will go some way to understanding the different counting methodology. Ian and Georgina Strange

for outer island access No change

RESPONDING to a question from Cllr Dick Sawle at Friday's Legislative Assembly, Cllr Sharon Halford said that unless the Assembly agreed to purchase a seatruck with a heavier load capacity, the current situation for supplying outer islands was unlikely to change.

Cllr Sawle asked Cllr Halford if she agreed with him that the ever increasing MCA regulations were having a negative effect on the operation of the Concordia Bay to the outer islands, and asked what arrangements were currently in place to get plant and machinery to the outer islands, and if there were any plans to improve the accessibility for these items in both the short and longer term.

Cllr Halford did not give her view on MCA regulations, but said it was an area of great concern to the residents of the outer islands.

Efforts had been made to improve the ability to move plant and machinery as well as meet the operating needs of the islands. Several island owners had already built or were building ramps for Concordia Bay but, unfortunately, there were still some islands where access remained a problem.

Work was ongoing and would continue until a workable solution was found for all habitable islands. she said, and unless or until MLAs

wished to consider the possibility of purchasing a seatruck with a heavier loading capacity then options were unlikely to change.

Cllr Sawle said that things seemed to had gone backwards: The type of operation we are talking about was entirely possible not so long ago before MCA regulations made it too difficult.

He asked Cllr Halford if she believed allowing items to be offloaded from Concordia Bay onto private vessels would be a simple solution.

Clir Halford said she would take the matter up with the Attorney General, Workboat Services and FIG

## **Points of Law** Staff from the Attorney

General's Chambers present key aspects of existing Employment Protection Legislation. This week they look at employees' rights to time off work

TIME off work must be allowed by employers in the following circumstances:

#### 1. Trade Union Activities

Employees who are officials or members of an independent trade union must be granted time off to carry out union duties or activities under sections 31 and 32 of the Employment Protection Ordinance (EPO).

#### 2. Public duties

Under section 33 of the EPO members of Legislative Council, members of FIDC and Justices of the Peace may take time off to carry out their official duties.

#### 3. Attendance at court

Section 34 of the EPO covers all instances in which you may have to attend court, such as being a party to civil proceedings, appearing as a witness, being summoned as a defendant in criminal proceedings, jury service or accompanying a child under 18 to the criminal youth court

4. Medical or dental treatment Time off for medical or dental appointments is provided for under section 35 of the EPO. Employees may also take time off to accompany a child under the age of 16. Employers may require employees to postpone appoint-ments until later the same day, if this is reasonable for business purposes, having regard to the urgency of the matter and the availability of treatment.

#### 5. Ante-natal care

Time off for ante-natal care must be permitted by employers under section 37 of the EPO. However, from the second appointment onwards, employers may request a certificate from medical staff to prove an employee is pregnant. together with an appointment card or other proof of the appointment itself. The amount of time allowed off is always that which would be considered reasonable. For example, if you have a routine doctor's appointment, it is unlikely to take up a whole afternoon. Time off is usually unpaid, except under sections 31 (trade union officials) and 37 (ante-natal care) of the EPO.

An employee who is refused time off (paid or unpaid) can complain to the Summary Court. which can order the employer to pay compensation. The employer also commits a criminal offence if he breaches sections 34 or 35.





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# **Miraculous recovery inspires vet's action holiday charity**

A BATTERED red scrapbook stuffed with yellow newspaper clippings and a few old photographs are the only memorabilia Robert Lawrence has of his Falklands War.

"The dog ate it." he quips, slinging it down on the kitchen counter and pulling up a stool.

We are in the converted barn that Robert – whose memours, When The Fighting Is Over, inspired the controversial 1988 film Tumbledown starring Colin Firth – shares with his wife Marion, 50, and children Conrad, 22, Max. 16, and Matilda, 13.

In the battle for Tumbledown in June 1982, Robert lost 40 per cent of his brain when he took a bullet in the head.

The injury left him paralysed on his left side. Against all odds, he survived – but doctors told him he would never walk and would be incontinent.

He proved them wrong on both counts. And as we meet, the 50-year-old former Scots Guards captain is finalising preparations for a 1.000-mile. 11-day trip through the Himalayas during which he will be leading a team of about 35 - including a dozen veterans and as many civvies, some disabled, some not – on motorbikes and in jeeps.

But this is no ordinary action holiday. He hopes the trip will be the first of many and calls it "a kind of adventure therapy" for those, like him, with disabilities.

Having been on a number of similarly exotic expeditions over the past few years – to Africa (escorting Princes William and Harry), the Arctic and twice to India – he finds the experiences "cathartic."

"With these kind of things, you forget about the things you can't do because you're concentrating so bloody hard on just getting through it all in one piece," he says.

"It's tough, but you feel you've achieved something at the end.

"It isn't a boot camp or Outward Bound," he adds. "It's going to be fun.

"We stay in hotels. I don't have to prove to myself I can sleep in a tent – I've done enough of that in the Army."

In his scrapbook is a picture taken in December 1982. Robert is in uniform outside Buckingham Palace, flanked by his proud father John and mother Jean.

It was the day he received the Military Cross for bravery – which now hangs framed in his downstairs toilet.

Twenty-eight years on, the most visible legacy of Robert's injury is a slight limp and his

paralysed left arm: "There is nothing wrong with the arm, it's just my brain no longer has the ability to tell it to move." he explains.

"1 suffer from involuntary muscle contractions.

"I've had Botox injections to try to stop it, but that didn't work and now I have metal plates implanted to hold it in a normal position.

"The contractions are so strong that one of the screws has started to lever out."

Robert seems unfazed by his physical disabilities but says his mental wounds may never fully heal.

"I've often said that it isn't going to war that is hard, it's the coming home," he says.

"When you have been in situations when decisions mean the difference between life and death, it's easy to find paying bills rather pointless."

Over the past two decades Robert has worked in the film industry and in property, yet he speaks of "a sense of isolation, because you feel people can't understand what you've been through."

Now, though, he believes he has found part of the solution. Huddled around a large table are various expedition team members.

The group will travel with two doctors, a paramedic and five mechanics.

They will carry satellite communication equipment, making sure they are prepared for any eventuality. They have even modified motorbike sidecars for wheelchair users.

Once his project, Global Adventure Plus, is up and running Robert hopes to secure financial support from the government, which has earmarked around £30million for the rehabilitation of returning soldiers.

"About 19,000 men and women leave the Forces each year, many of them injured or with psychological problems," he says.

"Work needs to be done to make sure they can contribute when they come home."

In 1995 he was diagnosed with post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), a condition that affects around seven per cent of the population: "I don't know how much of the problem is due to the physical damage to my brain, and how much is because of the experiences I have had." says Robert.

Over the years he has had counselling, cognitive behavioural therapy and he takes the antidepressants peroxetine and sodium valproate.

Still there are "black" periods where he can't get out of bed.

"You just think, 'what's the point?" Some guys hit the bottle, or get into fights, and others end up on the streets because they can't work.

"Around a quarter of the homeless population are exservicemen.

"I've joked with people, saying form two queues; one goes to The Priory for counselling, the other is coming to India with me." he says.

Robert met Marion, an actress, at the Cannes Film Festival in 1994. They married a year later and live in a converted barn in Hampshire.

The Himalayas trip will be Marion's second such adventure: "I'm nervous." she says.

"But I've noticed a huge change in Robert since he started going on these trips. It's given him a focus."

I talk to Robert again weeks later after the expedition. "It was mind-blowing," he says.

"There was a soldier who served in Northern Ireland in the 1970s, another Falklands guy like me, one from Sierra Leone and another from Iraq, and two serving soldiers who had been hurt in Afghanistan.

"I've known the benefits of these trips for a long time, but everyone said they hadn't felt as good in ages.

"Now all that remains is to convince the powers that be that these things are worth supporting."

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# One quarter of rock cod catch dumped so far

MORE than 15,000 tonnes of rock cod has been discarded so far this year from the Falklands finfish fisheries.

Rock cod has taken over from Southern Blue Whiting as the key finfish species in local waters, but such high volumes of waste are a concern for industry regulators.

The total catch of rock cod so far in 2010 is 67,000 tonnes, of which it is reported that 23% has been discarded.

And, while not an illegal activity, officials are eager to explore ways of reducing the discard level.

'It is clearly in the interests of the fishery and the industry which relies on it to reduce discards," said Director of Mineral Resources John Barton

All vessels are obliged to report catches and discards accurately, as a failure to do this would constitute an offence. The discarded fish are included in the overall assessment, and therefore effectively count against the total allowable effort or catch. But the reasons for discarding vary, and some issues are easier to address than others, said Mr Barton.

"The majority of fish being discarded are too small to process. In some cases a total catch of 30 tonnes of rock cod may be caught by a trawler in a day, of which 1-3 tonnes might be discarded.

"In other cases small rock cod are caught as a bycatch of the loligo fishery and are discarded. In the first case it may be possible to reduce the catch of small fish by increasing mesh size, and we need to run some trials on that. In the case of the loligo fishery it is difficult to alter the mesh size significantly as the current mesh size is appropriate for that fishery."

There also is an element of discarding of rock cod of all sizes by some companies who see it as low value, or perhaps do not have the right processing equipment

This type of discarding should be deterred or stopped, said Mr. Barton, and the obvious solution would be for such vessels to change fishing area. While there might be some issues surrounding the accuracy of discards, vessels generally reported discards, he said, regardless of whether or not they had fishery observers on board.

'Rock cod have become widely distributed throughout the zone and some discarding of small fish is a common feature." said Mr Barton. "Area restrictions would have their limitations, as it might be difficult to maintain viable fishing opportunities while avoiding the smaller fish. Increasing the mesh size of the nets may be the solution, and that is to be investigated. The other issue which has been considered is whether discards could be retained and subsequently processed onshore. "The initial interest was in

whether this could provide a local source of fertiliser. There would be a number of technical issues to overcome in terms of storage and processing. While such a process would reduce wastage it is unlikely to be a low cost operation."





# Five-yearly census a massive undertaking

PREPARATIONS for a busy summer are well under way at Falklands Conservation. The fourth Island-wide census of penguins and albatross will take place from late October to late November.

Aside from obtaining total estimates of population numbers, the census allows us to determine how accurately changes in our annually monitored sites reflect total population changes of key seabird species. Initiated in 1995, this archipelago-wide census happens once every five years and involves three dedicated teams to census East Falklands, West Falklands and offshore islands.

This massive undertaking is only possible with the support, cooperation and assistance of countless landowners, numerous volunteers and the FIG, for which we extend our sincere thanks.

WE will also continue our albatross demographic study at Steeple Jason Island, and our annual seabird monitoring programme across East Falklands.

This year we will also begin new research on the foraging ecology of Imperial shags, rockhopper penguins and black-browed albatross.

Finally, our Southern Sea Lion Programme will commence in February - the first project on sea lion foraging ecology in 18 years. We look forward to providing updates on all these programmes as the season unfolds. Please contact our

THE Rockhopper Project, led by Sarah Crofts, continues on from last year where birds were tracked from Steeple Jason to record their foraging trips. Tracks made by male adult birds during the incubating period showed that after leaving the colony, they travelled some 300km to the Patagonian shelf to feed before returning to take over incubating the egg.

This summer we will track birds from two islands over the breeding season, and at the end of the summer satellite trackers will record their winter migration routes.

The data collected will help us to understand much more about this species, with roughly twothirds of the rockhopper population being studied. The Infant and

Junior School was involved last year in raising money towards a satellite tracker and we hope to show the children, with real time data, exactly where their tagged rockhopper is over the winter months.

FALKLAND Conservation's Watch Group plans for this summer include continuing a native plant area near Gilbert House, a Christmas barbecue, camping at Elephant Beach Farm, small-group weekend trips to conduct a conservation activity, and to experience special island locations.


## Twin tasks to monitor and restore

FALKLANDS Conservation Plants and Habitat Conservation Officer, Dr Rebecca Upson will be focusing on two new main projects. The first, in collaboration with FIG and DoA, is already underway and involves the setting up and monitoring of restoration trials on the two recently cleared minefields near Stanley.

FC hopes to determine how the sites recover after clearance, and whether seeding and planting with native species can hasten the recovery. Rebecca's second major task will be a joint project with the New Island Conservation Trust to provide baseline information on the plants of New Island.

FC will produce a broad-scale habitat map and gather population data for threatened species, and will also set up a long-term monitoring programme to evaluate changes in vegetation types across the island. In addition to these two larger projects, Rebecca-will also run a plant ID course in January, set up long-term monitoring of two globally threatened vascular plants, and continue her survey work on nationally threatened species. A partnership with Stanley Nurseries will also continue, making a range of native plants available for purchase soon.

The Native Plants Project will enable the Royal Botanical Gardens. Kew, to assist Stanley Nurseries in ways of growing some of the more unusual native plants of ornamental value. Lastly, the Native Plants project will carry out a range of invasive plant species control work at key sites for plant conservation.

COREY Bagley and Rhys Clifford represent just two of the success stories to have come out of the Falkland Islands Government Training Centre, which this year is enjoying a new lease of life since moving into its new premises overlooking the Power Station.

Sixteen-year-old Corey successfully completed his Young Apprenticeship programme in June, obtaining his IVQ Level 1 in Construction, and he is now working towards his IVQ Level 2 in Site Carpentry

An apprentice with C+S Construction, he was the first person to achieve this feat while still a student at FICS, and hopes one day to run his own business

Nineteen-year-old Rhys also is making impressive inroads into his chosen career, having wanted to become a chef since his school years

He has a NVQ Level 2 in Hospitality and Catering Professional Cookery, and is looking to work towards overseas training with Chichester College in September 2011

With a love and appreciation for fine foods he has been on the apprenticeship scheme for a year. as well as working as a kitchen assistant at King Edward Memo-

rial Hospital to develop his skills. Rhys saw the apprenticeship scheme as setting his career off to a flying start: "It's fun. They open up so many opportunities for peo-

"They combine theory and work placements to gain qualifications and experience at the same time

He visits the Training Centre twice a week to keep on top of the theory and says the support he receives from the team really helps. When asked of his future plans he says: "I would like to work in other kitchens around Stanley to get different experiences.

'I hope to be a pastry chef, it's the most difficult thing I do. but it's also the most fun. I want to expand my skills as much as I can

Officers at the Training Centre not only administer the courses, but also keep a keen eye on new opportunities, partly through its annual survey, designed to identify training gaps within the public and private sector.

Training Advice and Placement Officer Jock Elliot said: "We targeted managers and supervisors to see what they were looking for from their workforce, to try and find where companies and agencies are, and where they wish to be. This is an opportunity to source out what employees can do to boost their contribution to their company, and to make that annual review more impressive.

"We get inundated with calls requesting courses. People do want to improve themselves whether to upgrade their knowledge or chase promotions

Employers are asked to come up with a "wish list." he said, and courses in customer service were always a popular request

Coming out on top for the second consecutive year of the survey was the need for developing management and IT skills to a higher level. These courses are available and take around a year to complete.

Apprenticeship Scheme Coor-dinator Marcus Morrison explained: "We offer NVQs to adults over 25 so that they can obtain the qualification they desire, as long as the centre can offer it."

The apprenticeship scheme is also available for those between 15-25 years, and this year's survey exposed a need for bricklayers, electricians and other skilled professions

Apprenticeships are limited to that age range to ensure all youngsters are given a chance to obtain training and education upon leaving school.

'To open it further could mean youngsters are not given the chance to succeed," said Marcus.

"It's classed as positive discrimination.

## Training Centre offers growing opportunities

STAFF at the Training Centre worked with colleagues in the Public Works Department to transform a former plumbers' workshop into their new home earlier this year.

At the heart of the new building is a large workshop for carpentry, plumbing, electrical and decorating with work trades. bays representing rooms in a house.

There is a small commercial kitchen, a test area, classroom facilities and a computer suite plus staff offices. Apprentices in the construction trades can undertake practical training on-site, which is of particular benefit where their employer is unable to provide the opportunity to do work required as part of the NVQ syllabus.

Catering candidates are able to train and learn in the commercial kitchen. A wide range of NVQs are already available in the Falkland Islands, but the new centre also has strengthened links with the Department of Agriculture and related employers, and hopes to offer courses in horticulture and agriculture. New courses in leatherwork and furniture making are also being explored.

Other apprenticeships already sponsored by the Falkland Islands Government include mechanics and aircraft maintenance.

The Training Centre is part of the Department of Education. As well as managing the apprenticeship programme, it has provided Key Skills Training, the European Computer Driving Licence, Entry 2 Employment for school leavers who are not going straight into employment or further education, courses in bookkeeping and supervisory management, and much more besides.

Its vision is to enable young and old to obtain the qualifications that will benefit the Falkland Islands' continuing growth and development.



## **Near miss for HMS Dumbarton Castle**

A FORMER Royal Navy vessel. with 73 people on board, almost ran aground off the Tyneside coast after suffering engine failure during sea trials.

The former HMS Dumbarton Castle, now named Bijo, is one of two former patrol vessels which have been refitted for the Bangladeshi Navy

Dumbarton Castle spent many years as a Falklands protection vessel and and her name is inscribed in large rocks on the Camber opposite Stanley.

A lifeboat was launched to assist the 265ft (81m) vessel, which had begun to drift close to rocks at South Shields, A RNLI spokesman said the ship was about 80ft (24m) from hitting a pier. No-one was hurt. Two tugs managed to secure lines to the ship and are towing it back to the River Tyne.

The RNLI spokesman said: "It looks like she suffered engine failure while she was out on sea trials. It was a close call as she came about 80ft from going into a pier at South Shields in strong winds.

The Tynemouth lifeboat got to her and managed to stabilise her until she got her anchor down and the tugs arrived.

The Dumbarton Castle and its sister vessel the Leeds Castle have been refitted at A&P Type as part of a multimillion-pound deal with the Bangladeshi Navy

The Castle Class patrol vessels were built in Aberdeen and first entered service with the Royal Navy in 1982, protecting the fishing fleets and oil and gas fields in the North Sea

They also did long-term service guarding the Falkland Islands after the war, before being sold to the Bangladeshi Government. The project will include the overhaul of the vessels' engines and an upgrade of crew accommodation.


