## EU asked to examine UK Argentine trade conflict

THE European Union is to undertake diplomatic proceedings between Britain and Argentina in an attempt to solve a trade conflict that has arisen between the countries over the Falkland Islands.

This week Argentine Minister of Industry Debora Giorgis urged Argentine companies not to buy British goods, following which the British Foreign Office met with Argentine chargé in London Osvaldo Marsico and requested urgent clarification of the Minister's words.

After an appeal to the EU by the UK on the issue, EU Trade spokesman John Clancy announced: "The European Union will begin the appropriate diplomatic proceedings with the aim of clarifying the legitimate trade concerns.

"We have raised our concerns with the Argentine Charge in London this afternoon, who will report back to Buenos Aires for urgent clarification."

Mercopress reported that a

British government official had earlier described the trade ban as, "counter-productive," adding: "It is not in Argentina's economic interest to put up barriers.

"We are also a major investor in Argentina and we import goods from Argentina. The right approach here is one of cooperation not confrontation."

Meanwhile, the Argentine Foreign Affairs Ministry released a statement suggesting the EU mediate the Falklands 'Conflict'.

In the same week Conservative European MP Nerj Deva called for an end to UK (via EU) monetary aid to Argentina until threats to the Falkland Islands ceased. He said "Why are we giving

He said "Why are we giving money to the Argentines that they may use to attack the Falkland Islands? It is potty, dotty and mad."

At the beginning of the week the Argentine port of Ushuaia banned Carnival cruise ships Star Princess and Adonia from entrance, based on a law that prohibits British or Falklands flagged vessels, or vessels with flags of convenience that have worked in Falklands waters, from entering Tierra del Fuego ports.

The act was not universally supported in Argentina, however, and the President of Ushuaia Chamber of Tourism Marcelo Lietti reacted angrily saying, "I would like to know who is going to be responsible for all the losses generated."

Around 5,000 tourists and crew members were unable to come ashore and he said, "hundreds of Ushuaia families," were left without an opportunity to make some money.

Former Pink Floyd bass player Roger Waters, who shortly begins a major concert tour of South America was reported this week as saying in a Chilean television interview that the Falklands belong to Argentina.

"I am as ashamed as I possibly could be of our colonial past," Waters is reported to have said to journalist Amaro Gomez-Pablos. Friday, March 2, 2012

### Attenborough welcomes SG protected marine area

RESPECTED naturalist and broadcaster Sir David Attenborough has welcomed an announcement from the Government of South Georgia and South Sandwich Islands of the establishment of a large sustainable use Marine Protected Area covering over one million km<sup>2</sup> of the South Georgia and South Sandwich Islands Maritime Zone.

Nigel Haywood, Commissioner for South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands, who formally signed the legislation on Monday, stated that the waters were among the most productive in the Southern Ocean, with very high biodiversity: "We remain committed to the highest standards of environmental management in this unique and globally important UK Overseas Territory."

Sir David Attenborough said: "I am delighted to hear of the decision by the Government to create one of the world's largest marine reserves, which will help protect the unique and precious wildlife of South Georgia and Antarctica. This is extremely timely given the dramatic change that the polar regions are currently undergoing."

### Lost x-rays

ALL archived x-rays from 2007 onwards have been lost Director of Health and Education Services David Jenkins announced at the Health and Medical Services Committee yesterday. He said the situation had only become known, "within the last hour."

AGFA, the company that logs the images, are currently working remotely to try and retrieve electronic copies, but the events leading to the loss are unknown.

Only patients who have recently undergone x-rays might be affected: "All x-rays are reported and entered into patient notes so there will be no negative impact on patients," said Mr Jenkins

X-rays relating to military cases and serious cases sent for referral overseas, will not be affected as back-up x-ray copies are maintained on disc.

DUE to Deputy Editor John Fowler being a bit of a geek when it comes to all things governmental, his enthusiasm for the necessary, but entertainingly entitled. Review of the Review of Government, meant I was able to shuffle off the responsibility of covering that particular topic; a decision I now regret having read his interview with Ms Lucas and appreciated her common sense approach (see page 9) to our unique government establishment.

After all, who cannot be aware that the Falkland Islands government is something of an odd fish; in one day for example, a government representative might be required to make a decision that wouldn't seem out of place at No 10 Downing Street, while in the next moment be faced with a conundrum more appropriate to the Vicar of Dibley's Parish Council.

This oddity translates to what Ms Lucas describes as the wide range of 'services to the community' offered by a handful of civil service heads and their departments; and means that the second hand models and solutions forced on the Falklands establishment by a series of MBA-waving professionals, has, not surprisingly, been a recipe for frustration and discontent.

Having recognised that problem, however, it seems all is not lost; her practical recommendations with regard to the unhappy health and education alliance, plus the need to 'root out' what so many Islanders consider the insane degree of bureaucracy in the system, not to mention pushing decision-making down the structure rather than up. I suspect will result in shuddering sighs of relief from countless civil servants.

Also, one can only hope that the comment from the respected Whitehall consultant, that we should 'harness all that talent' in the civil service, will be enough of a kick up the backside to those interview panel members still disinclined to believe that our very capable home-grown talent can stand shoulder to shoulder with those from more distant shores.

For while in recent months we have happily taken advantage of being thrust in front of overseas media microphones and cameras, and promoted our developing identity, healthy economy and increasing self confidence, there still sadly exists a few in our community less willing to give up the old school mentality that somehow 'local' equates to 'lesser'.

## Secrets of the silent listener revealed

FALKLANDS War veteran Major (Rtrd.) David Thorp, the man who prepared a report on the sinking of the Belgrano for Margaret Thatcher, presented a copy of his book The Silent Listener to MLA Jan Cheek on Wednesday.

Major Thorp was visiting the Islands along with his wife Margaret, on board the cruise ship *Balmoral*, and he has not been back to the Falklands since 1982.

The book details his time spent as a Captain in the Special Task Detachment, a shrouded group that intercepted Argentine electronic and radio signals and allowed Britain to know of enemy plans long before execution.

Among the book's contents are copies of communications findings, and records of the movements of the intelligence core, whose existence was cloaked from many commanders and bound by the Official Secrets Act.

Thirty years had to pass before the book could be published, because of the nature of the content and what British security instructions allowed, but from its first publication last year it sold out within three months.

Major Thorp was deployed from Britain on April 26, 1982.

He docked at San Carlos and was the first to spot the Argentine ground force using Manybranch house as a lookout position to report on the ships landing nearby.

Major Thorp believes it was very important to publish the book, "in there you'll find a lot of the truth. For example most people do not know of the Argentinean's counter plan," he said.

When the ceasefire was called on June 14, notes were intercepted, decoded and translated to reveal a plan to recapture the Falklands.

At the request of then Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, he prepared the report on the controversial sinking of ARA *General Belgrano*. His investigation is included and reveals the *Belgrano* turned away from the Falklands under orders to retreat to a predetermined rendezvous point that was within the exclusion zone, supporting the belief that warfare rules of engagement were not breached.

The book also details the development of electronic warfare during the Cold War period.

A SURPRISE phone call about a year ago has led to a track by the band Whistleblower, which contains two Falkland Islands musicians; Marcus Porter and Sam Elliot, being used in an action movie due to be on general release on March 9.

The film, which is called Clean Skin stars Sean Bean as an antiterrorist agent and also includes Charlotte Rampling and Michelle Ryan in its cast.

Marcus Porter told Penguin News, "We had recorded the song, called 'This Town', in early 2009 as part of the annual Brighton Institute of Modern Music (BIMM) album called 'What's Inside Your Head? (Vol. 2)', so to get a phone call two years later was a bit of a surprise."

The film sound track contains some 90 seconds of the song, but Marcus reports, "They didn't give us a big pile of cash or anything like that: in fact neither Sam or me actually got paid as we didn't write the song." However, Marcus believes that he and Sam may be due some performance royalties because they played on the actual recording.

Apart from these financial considerations, Marcus is just very happy at the exposure from having their band's song included in a major film, "as our music will be listened to by thousands of people we couldn't have reached otherwise."

Marcus reports that the band Whistleblower has now broken up, but he and Sam are both very busy with other projects all the time and are looking to start up a new band over the next few months.

He said, "We've also been setting up a function band for weddings and parties and are steadily getting more and more gigs. Hopefully by the middle of the year we'll have enough bookings to be able to live solely from playing music.

"I'm also currently recording an album with my 3-piece folk band called Amara. We're aiming to have it all finished by June and we're hoping to get some festival slots in the UK and also in mainland Europe."

## **BACTEC** to clear additional land

### Legislative Assembly Diary

MLA Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

FOLLOWING a few weeks where, thanks to Argentina's seemingly bungling intransigence, we have received some rather good press. I believe we have journalists from at least five countries here over the next couple of weeks. Interesting that the saga of ineptitude across the water continues with the turning away of two cruise liners simply, it appears, because they happened to have been here first.

History was made last week when we invited the visiting US Congressman Jim Sensenbrenner to address the Legislative Assembly in its regular session. I hope his visit will pave the way for more visits by politicians of other countries. There can be no better way of demonstrating what we are about than inviting people to see our country for themselves, thus enabling them to draw their own conclusions.

We were briefed by Irene Lucas on the report on the review of government which we had received in draft form a few days earlier. As has been said by others it is a well researched and comprehensive report that will be a useful tool for the future, in particular in cutting through some of the cumulative bureaucracy which frequently hinders real efficiency. It is easy to understand the frustration of officers whose job it is to try to make unwieldy structures work.

This week we undertake the next stage of the recruitment of a new Chief Executive who will also have to get to grips with following up some of the recommendations of the review. The post is a complex and demanding one which is, as always, not easy to fill.

\*\*\* Late March will see the completion of the land release programme undertaken this summer. We understand that progress has been good thanks in part to the prolonged period of fine weather in the early weeks. It will be great to see the land enjoyed by so many of us before the war again open for recreational activities. A picnic at the stone corral was something we could enjoy independently from a quite early age and Mullet Creek was a popular expedition for those a little older. LAND Clearance and de mining company BACTEC has made excellent progress due to a combination of good weather and sheer hard work, said DPO Programme Manager Robin Swanson this week.

All minefields have now been fenced and all the remaining areas agreed within the contract to search have also been completed three weeks ahead of schedule.

Mr Swanson said: "However, BACTEC has agreed to clear additional land to the south of the contract area towards the shoreline which, weather permitting, will release land around Mile Pond, Round Pond and an east facing beach."

Members of Legislative Assembly and the Suspect Hazardous Area Land Release Committee (SHALARC) have been briefed and have accepted the proposed changes to the work which should add an additional square kilometre of land released by the end of the project bringing the total to 3.5 Km2.

When compared to the overall area of land currently restricted from social and other use by minefield fences, this will represent a reduction of some 15% by the end of the project.

Andy Frizzell, Project Manager of BACTEC, said: "We are absolutely delighted with our progress to date and just hope that the weather stays on our side so that

we can clear that very interesting area around the ponds and down towards the sea."

The project has not been without its challenges. BACTEC encountered nine fortified former Argentine positions which required slow and deliberate clearance of trenches, some of which were full of water and had to be emptied.

À large number of un-fired ordnance was located in this area including M67 90 mm High Explosive Anti-Tank (HEAT) ammunition, Air to Surface Rockets, Hand and Rifle Grenades and small arms ammunition (see photograph). These will be destroyed by the JS EOD team from MPC in a number of controlled explosions, probably on 7th or 8th March. The DPO continues to validate the cleared land by sampling areas released in accordance with International Standards.

Mr Swanson said: "To date, the quality of land cleared has been excellent and BACTEC can be proud of their record. We are planning an opening ceremony of the released area on Monday 26 March at 1700 hours, in the final days of the project to celebrate this success. The ceremony will be centred on the Corral and 1 hope it will be well attended by the community."

### Investigation is normal practice

SPEAKING of the decision that Director of Health and Education David Jenkins would conduct an investigation into the deaths of babies at the KEMH, the Interim Chief Executive told Penguin News that this was normal practice when, "incidents of such a serious nature occur."

He said in such situations the head of a service or departmental director would undertake a review into the work practices in their departments in line with prescribed procedures.

He added, "Such reviews are carried out to establish all the facts of a case and assess whether any further action is necessary as a result of the findings."


# Plant of the fortnight

ALL thirteen of the Falklands' endemic plant species are now being preserved at the Millennium Seed Bank at Kew Gardens. These species are a unique part of the heritage of the Falklands as they are found only on the Falkland Islands and nowhere else on earth.

Botanist Richard Lewis recently collected seeds from the Silvery Buttercup. 13th and final endemic species on Weddell Island, where low levels of grazing in some parts of the island have allowed this scarce plant to thrive. These seeds will be carefully dried and sent to Kew gardens, where they will join seeds previously collected from the other 12 endemic species, preserved at low temperatures so they will stay alive and viable for decades or centuries.

"I was thrilled to find large stands of this plant in a few remote valleys on Weddell Island," Richard commented: "The low levels of grazing in some parts of the island have allowed this scarce plant to thrive along with many other rare plants. I had tried to collect seeds of this species several times before in other parts of the Falklands but always been defeated; once a cold Spring had made the plant flower late, another time the plants only had male flowers, so no seeds were set, and a third time some goats had escaped from a nearby farm and eaten all the female flowers they must be tastier than the male flowers.

The 13 endemic plant species found only in the Falklands include some beautiful and unusual species, such as Lady's Slipper and Snake Plant. Unfortunately it also includes five species which are considered at risk of extinction. For example two species, Moore's Plantain and False Plantain are restricted to the southern coasts of West Falkland, where they are being affected by an invasive plant, Mouse-ear Hawkweed, which can grow over and smother them. Keeping seeds carefully preserved at the Millennium Seed Bank ensures that should these plants become extinct in the wild.

they can still be grown from seed so future generations will still be able to learn about and appreciate the unique natural heritage of the Falklands.

The Millennium Seed Bank (MSB) at Kew Gardens has an ambitious objective to preserve the seeds of wild plants from around the world. In 2010 it met its first objective to save seeds from 10 per cent of all known species of seed-bearing plants, working with partners all around the world, including several of the UK Overseas Territories. Now it has set the goal to preserve 25 per cent of known species by 2020. The MSB has been work-

ing with Falklands Conservation and the Falkland Islands Government since 2004, with the aim of eventually preserving seeds from all native flowering plants. Not only are these seeds saved in case of extinction, but they are also made available for research and other use. For example, several species are now grown in the rock garden and alpine house at Kew, where they will eventually form part of a display educating visitors about the Falklands. Some seeds have also been sent back to Stanley to be grown by the native plant nursery, which grows plants for habitat restoration projects and for sale to gardeners. Seeds of some of the rarest species, such as Moore's Plantain, are being used by researchers at Kew to better understand issues affecting conservation, such as possible hybridisation with Thrift Plantain.

The seeds of the 13 endemic species join seeds of a further 117 native species, which have been collected in the Falklands since 2004 by local volunteers and botanists from Kew and Falklands Conservation. Over 80 per cent of the native Falklands flowering plants are now in the MSB, with just 25 species left to collect.

## Court news: Drink drivers disqualified

IN the Magistrates Court on Friday February 24, Graham Hemming was sentenced after pleading guilty to a charge of drink driving.

On December 3, 2011, Mr Hemming was found to have 134 micrograms of alcohol per 100 ml of breath and admitted driving to a store to purchase more alcohol.

Senior Magistrate Carl Gumsley said such a high reading of alcohol would almost always lead to immediate imprisonment, but he felt that a custodial sentence would not be helpful in the long term in this case.

Mr Hemming was disqualified from driving for three years and also received an 18 month probation order.

Also in court on Friday, Carlin Crowie pleaded guilty to a charge of common assault and a charge of drink driving.

The common assault charge occurred at Millers Bar in the early hours of January 1.

Following this, on February 18 Mr Crowie was found to be driving with a recorded breath sample of 67 micrograms of alcohol per 100 ml of breath.

The Senior Magistrate pointed out that both of these incidents involved alcohol and a high degree of aggression.

Mr Crowie received a fine of  $\pounds500$  for the assault offence and a fine of  $\pounds400$  for the drink driving offence.

He also received a driving disqualification for 18 months and was ordered to pay £85 prosecution costs. (F1RS).

## ExCo briefs

### Temporary Classrooms

A SCHEME to provide temporary additional classroom space for the Infant and Junior School was agreed to by Executive Council last week, but only on the understanding that this should be a temporary fix and that the need for a permanent solution should addressed as soon as possible.

The proposal, which was ap-proved by the Education Committee at their meeting on January 12, calls for an estimated expenditure of £39,780 to locate in the grounds of Stanley House and equip as classrooms, three portakabins already belonging to PWD. The extra classroom space thus created will, ExCo was told. accommodate a long-predicted increase in the number of preschool children and also free up space in the Infant and Junior School for a primary/secondary Special Needs Unit, which will in turn remove the need for the expense of providing additional ac-commodation and staffing at the Community School.

### **Museum Move**

EXECUTIVE Council this month agreed to proceed with the relocation of the Museum to the Government Dockyard and that a sum of £1.5m should be set aside for this with the proviso that the relocation project would be managed by the Falkland Islands Museum and National Trust (FIMNT) in close liaison with a Projects Director and an oversight board.

FIMNT Manager, Leona Roberts, told Penguin News that she was delighted by this decision. Well developed plans for the move were already in existence, and will now be put into action independently of the need to wait for decisions to be taken on the Development Corporations Master Plan for the Stanley waterfront.


## MLAs pay

A REVIEW of MLAs' remuneration has been added to the government's task list and will be kickstarted when members have an away day in March to discuss all areas and possibilities surrounding this.

### New car park

THE joint development of a car park off St Mary's Walk was agreed. This is a joint development between Stanley Services Ltd and FIG and should help with parking needs in the area.

## Getting ready for oil

SEVERAL papers relating to the possible development of an oil and gas industry in the Falklands were considered by ExCo, which gave approval to a number of proposals designed to facilitate private sector involvement. Also approved were guidelines for offshore exploration licences for distribution among operators looking to submit field development plans as part of their licence requirements.

It was decided that an Internal FIG Working Group should be set up to ensure that all appropriate infrastructure and policies were in place to respond to the onshore needs of a development phase and to capitalise on opportunities that will arise for local people and businesses. The ExCo paper lists a number of factors to be reviewed including the following:

a) The robustness of the current planning regime and the level of resources that may be required to respond to multiple planning applications for onshore activity that may arise once a development phase is confirmed

b) FIG's readiness to respond to any need for improved port and airport facilities that a development phase may require

c) The suitability of water supplies to meet additional demands from the oil industry, and identification of what investment may be needed and how to resource this

e) The suitability of current fuel supply arrangements and the possible need for additional fuel storage facilities onshore

 The capacity of the quarry to deal with demands for large volumes of materials for development, and consideration of how additional demand can be met locally.

g) The appropriateness and flexibility of the current immigration system in terms of responding to oil industry needs, and the rotational working patterns that are commonplace in the industry. It is proposed that this group will include an MLA and also the Mineral Resources Director. FIG's Head of Policy, the Attorney General, the Taxation Office and Government House. Research and co-ordination will be supplied by the Economist and Principal Policy Officer.

Additional individuals will be approached to input on specific issues, for example the Director of Public Works on utilities infrastructure.

An Oil Development Reserve of £100,000 will be set aside to allow the procurement of specialist external assistance in order to ensure that the fiscal and legislative regime is sufficiently clear and robust to deal with possible oil and gas production in the future.

### Compromise reached on jury eligibility

IN December last year, the progress through Legislative Assembly of the Jury (Amendment) Bill 2011, which seeks to expand the pool of people eligible for jury service in the Falkland Islands, stalled unexpectedly, despite being presented for the third time. It was halted after an objection from MLA Mike Summers, who argued that the inclusion of work permit holders in the pool of potential jurors ran contrary to the feelings of the community as expressed during a process of public consultation.

Following a suggestion by the Speaker of the House the issue came before a Select Committeee which met last Friday in the Court and Council Chamber.

A lively debate chaired by Attorney General Mark Lewis eventually arrived at a compromise requiring work permit holders to have been resident for three years.



APPROVAL was given for the setting up of a Working Group to analyse the conclusion of the consultancy on the Resource Rent Review.

The consultancy had looked at the main findings of the review process and the final report from both the Falkland Islands Government and the Falkland Island Fishing Company Association. The working group would be expected to report back to Executive Council with clear proposals no later than the December 2012 meeting with Members.

## Civilianisation

WITH the proposed civilianisation of some areas at Mount Pleasant in prospect, ExCo approved the revised Programme Initiation Document for signature and publication. One of the first things to be taken forward under this proposal, at Government to Government level, is the future operation of the Air Terminal Members endorsed the proposal of the Localisation Steering Group in this regard.

## Rural Strategy

THE Rural Development Strategy was adopted by ExCo, who asked the Rural Development Strategy Steering Group to prepare a detailed and achievable action plan for the implementation of the strategy for subsequent consideration by Executive Council.

## Privatisation

CONFIRMATION was given by ExCo of the Public Services Development Framework as the approach to determining the future of public services in the Falklands. This will look into what areas can be privatised either wholly, partially or in some cases not at all. The protection of staff transferrals in the event of a service being outsourced will also be addressed.

## New toilets

THE cost for the provision of Public Toilets at the Visitor Centre and Dockyard sites was approved with the hope that this work will be put out to tender in the near future.

## Appointment

DAVID Roberts was appointed to the Transport Advisory Committee as a East Falkland Mainland representative and Owen Betts as a Town representative.

## Not so friendly Falklands?

IT is with a heavy heart that I leave the Falklands, not because I am sad to go, but because – at times in the past few months – I've wished I'd never come.

As some of you read this I shall be sat at MPA awaiting the Airbridge return flight to the UK; as others read this I shall be on the flight back and for others I will be back in the UK. I return to the UK to 'no fixed abode' (the house I'd been trying to sell for 6 months finally sold during my flight out here) and no job, but even that is preferable to spending another week in the Falklands.

When I spotted the advert for the contract I have just completed, I actually told my mum, "I think 1'll give that one a miss," thinking the Falklands was a cold barren place, but then when I was directly approached about the role 1 did some research. It seemed that the Falklands would be enjoying summer during my 4-6 month stay and I'd be escaping the UK winter (always a good idea for someone who suffers from SAD); the standard of living was on par with the UK, the economy was thriving and the people warm and welcoming; the wildlife was amazing. "Why not," I decided and asked the recruitment consultant to put me forward. Just over a month later 1 was excited at the prospect of my forthcoming 'adventure'. Bags packed, personal belongings and car in storage, clued up on the country I was going to for 4-6 months, I felt ready for anything.

Lots of people complain about the flight here, the refuel stop in Ascension and MPA - me? 1 didn't see an issue with any of that. The 'squaddies' on the plane were lovely (not so sure about some of the non-military personnel), but all in all I thought the flight - which is by far the longest I'd done in over four years - was fine. I was collected from MPA on a cold early October afternoon, a flurry of snow and newborn lambs on the road to Stanley. I was raring to go. My adventure had begun.

I'd read and been told about how friendly people here were, how many invites I'd get, how many opportunities there were to socialise and meet people. Keen to 'fit in', I made a point of chatting to everyone I met, making an effort to socialise with people from the local, contract, interim communities and tourists. My role was to some degree pressured, but I was determined to make the most of time out of the office. But it seemed that no matter how hard I tried I failed. The

contractors 1 met soon found other contractors to socialise with (if they weren't already part of a clique), the locals seemed to shun me and other interim individuals seemed indifferent to the idea of socialising. I actually experienced some open hostility to contractors. After what appeared to be a promising start it became all too apparent that I was failing to find the social life and friends that I expected and hoped for.

I've never been the sort of person to be able to go into bars on my own, yet I tried a few times. I tried going to cafés alone. I tried going for walks. But nothing I tried had the effect I so wanted and needed. Some people told me I was making too much effort, so I made less and ended up spending more and more time alone. Eventually after 2 ½ months of making lots of effort I resigned myself to spending the rest of my contract pretty much alone.

Don't get me wrong, I've met lots of lovely people during my five months here. I spent an amazing few days on Sealion Island over Christmas and was made to feel very welcome by the lodge managers and other guests. But the reality is, no matter what I had been told about the 'friendly Falkland Islanders' - outside of the office - no-one made any effort to make me feel at home and no-one seemed to consider how alone I might be feeling...

It's not all bad news, I've grown and healed a lot whilst I've been here and this experience has truly changed the person I am. The contract has been exciting and rewarding and will certainly help me in any future job search. But if offered this opportunity again - 1 would almost certainly say no. Coming alone to somewhere as remote as the Falklands, with it frustratingly limited internet (which meant even communicating with the outside world difficult and limited) is not for me. Perhaps if I'd been a man I'd have had a different experience. who knows?

## Jimmy burns Penn

JOURNALIST and author Jimmy Burns, who has a wide knowledge of Latin America and Argentina, has sent an open letter to Sean Penn in his online blog on the subject of Penn's recent utterings on the Falkland Islands and Argentina.

In the letter Mr Burns comments, "I am told that Cristina as her supporters like to call her is delighted to have met one of her favourite actors - a true world celebrity and campaigner to boot - who seems to have provoked more column inches in the British media than the rather limp and ill-conceived presentation the other day of foreign minister Hector Timerman. Cristina's sister in law, Alicia who as you know is a good friend of a brave and hard working priest in Haiti, must also be thankful that you came there not only waving the Malvinas flag, but also in your capacity as ambassador at large not just for one island, but several, and one country.

He adds that unlike Mr Penn he does not have, "personal access to Cristina - she does not give interviews to investigative journalists and avoids press conferences like the plague - but I have spent rather more days than you have in Buenos Aires, a city (and a country) I happen to know pretty well having been posted there as a correspondent both in the lead-up to and during the Falklands War. I have revisited the country on several occasions since."

Taking issue with Mr Penn's points he said: "Contrary to what you suggest, the current diplomatic deadlock was provoked not by a pre-emptive intimidation by the UK but by the decision taken in 2007 by President Kirchner -Cristina's late husband - to unilaterally ditch a cooperation agreement on oil exploration around the Malvinas/Falklands.

"The agreement formed part of a broader compromise reached by Argentina and the UK during the Menem and Blair governments in the late 1990's to put the issue of sovereignty 'under an umbrella'i.e. set it to one side in order to make progress on bringing about a better engagement between the islands and the mainland, while also improving diplomatic relations between the UK and Argentina."

He adds that Cristina Fernandez "has upped the ante by getting Falkland flagged transport and fishing boats banned from Argentine and neighbouring countries" ports while threatening to cut off flight communications, carrying food and other products from the mainland to the islands in a move that would amount to a virtual trade embargo. "This, 1 would submit is in-

"This, I would submit is intimidation, not the alleged military escalation that the Fernandez government has denounced and which ignores or rather distorts the fact that the dispatch to the islands of a vessel by the Royal Navy has been a regular and routine practice since the end of war, and that Prince William's role on the islands is not commander in chief of an Imperial Task Force but as a member of a Search and Rescue team which is there to save lives, regardless of their nationality."

He said while Mr Penn suggested those who rule Argentina today are not tainted by their involvement in the brutal repression of fellow citizens carried out in the 1970's and early 1980's by their military: "Granted they have put several military officers in jail but it was President Alfonsin back in 1985 that had the guts to put the juntas on trial. Closer scrutiny of the current president and her late husband's political background would show that your assertion that the very people who suffered and fought most enduring against the military junta are the ones who now lead the country gives a slightly misleading impression that they led the resistance after the1976 coup and that Argentina today is a fully functioning democracy when it is not.

He notes that neither Christina Fernandez nor her husband Nestor played a prominent role in the resistance to the military after coup. Nor did they take a public stand against the invasion of the Faklands like Alfonsin did. Today the President, whose ideological ally is Chavez, is surrounded by a small clique of unquestioning ministers and officials supported by sectors of the media the government controls, and a praetorian guard of young nationalistic neo-Marxist Peronist activists called La Campora who have taken key positions in government departments and state companies.

"A new anti-terrorism law has been drafted to curb opposition which is increasing as the economy deteriorates and the social compact with favoured business leaders and trade unionists is no longer solid.

"While you were in BA, government media censored details of the brutal repression by riot police and hired thugs of those protesting on ecological grounds the ravages to earth and water threatened by private gold mining companies in the northern province of Catamarca."

He concludes that because of Penn's track record in standing up for decent causes he should empathise with the wish of the Islanders not to be Argentine, not, "because their colonial masters are gagging them," but because they believe in, and Argentina rejects the right to self-determination.

## **Improving the Falklands' internet services**

OVER the last 24 months, FIG and C&W have put great effort into trying to improve the quality of broadband internet services in the Falkland Islands, as residents greatly rely on the Internet, especially for social networking, for contact with the outside world.

Poor Internet performance could lead to isolation and economic loss. Consumers would be challenged to interact with friends and family worldwide through social media apps such as Facebook and effective communication for businesses with suppliers and customers could be compromised. A decade ago the Internet was just for 'fun', these days it is not unreasonable to say that is it a critical utility alongside telephones and electricity.

Yet readers of this article are burdened with an internet user experience that is probably worse than most other developed countries. This is because the entire Islands' Internet users are forced to share a satellite link with less bandwidth than many UK homes! Internet traffic also suffers from a delay of over half a second as it needs to travel 22.000 miles up to and down from the satellite.

Back in 2009 there were many anecdotal comments concerning how well – or not - the Islands' Internet services met the needs of consumers and businesses. Discussions about service quality were solely based on anecdotal comment which often led to a lot of 'heat' but little progress in changing the status quo. If a clearer understanding of how 'good' or 'bad' Internet services really are, independent objective performance data was required.

In 2010 FIG contracted Actual Experience Ltd (AE) to provide that objective data but AE undertook that task in a fundamentally different way. Many of the more technically oriented residents have been monitoring their own download speeds for many years. however, looking at download speed alone does not provide an accurate view of how well an Internet connection is working as it fails to accurately reflect true user experience. But why should this be?


A suitable analogy is to think of the Internet as a water pipe. The Islands' satellite Internet connection is just a small pipe that can only support a limited water flow. If demand is greater than the pipe can supply, water that cannot find a path through the pipe back-up into lakes at either end. With the Internet, data, like water, is discarded or queued when demand is more than the pipe can supply. When this happens in times of high congestion. users experience poor performance and probably much frustration. C&W, like all Internet Service Providers (ISPs), manage this by implementing 'traffic shaping' in periods of high demand to ensure fair access for all. If they didn't, the Islands' Internet service would grind to a halt for all.

C&W do technically measure how much data traffic goes through their pipes but simple technical data cannot be translated into an objective score reflecting your experience Internet use. AE does things rather differently by measuring true user experience using software 'Agents' located on users' PCs external to C&W's network. It then publishes this in the form of Performance Quality (PQ) scores. If you asked a group of users using the same Internet connection to grade their experience as excellent, good, fair, poor or bad, the PQ Score is a reliable proxy for the averaged views of the entire group.

A number of residents and businesses have installed AE Agent' software that work in the background on their PCs on an anonymous 'secret-shopper' basis. Volunteers then automatically contribute data to AE that reflects the performance of their own Internet service (no personal data is captured). AE has been monitoring the performance of bronze, silver and gold residential and business Internet services in Stanley and radio-connected Camp users. Over the last 24 months, C&W have extensively upgraded their network and doubled the satellite bandwidth from 12 to 25Mbpslink, so it would be hoped that user experience would have improved. But has it? Let's take a look.

Over the last 12 months, PQ scores have been generally consistent on a month by month basis across all residential and business services which show, in our view, that performance has improved. 80% of the time was spent in our 'Fair' category, 17% spent in 'Poor' and 2.5% in 'Bad' leading to a PQ score of around 40 (out of a maximum of 100). It must be noted that, due to the constraint of the satellite link, the best possible PQ score for the Islands could never be greater than 'Fair' representing a PQ in the low 40s. However, this should not be taken as a poor reflection on C&W who, we believe, have done a good job in fitting a 'quart into a pint pot'. By way of comparison, UK ISPs such as BT or Virgin would receive a PO score of around 80.

In 2012, the morning and early afternoon Work Period PQ scores are similar to the late afternoon and early evening Play Period PQ scores showing that the user experience for consumers and businesses are, in general, quite similar. It was not always so. In the graph above, it can be scen that the Gold service Play Period PQ scores have significantly improved since 2009.



It is good to see that Camp Internet users who are connected back to Stanley using Wi-Max radio links seem to have a similar browsing experience to ADSLconnected Stanley-based users as would be as expected from a technical point of view.

The night time free usage 'experiment' was started by C&W in August 2011. The early hours is the usual period when large file peer-to-peer down-loading and software updating takes place. so potentially user experience could have collapsed leading to much frustration. The average PO score for all agents over the last three months for the free period is around 38 showing a user experience that is marginally less than would be experience during daytime usage. This could only be achieved by C&W implementing appropriate traffic shaping i.e. limiting download rates to ensure fair usage for all.

AE also identifies where bottlenecks in the Internet occur and place these in separate categories e. g. Home (Wi-Fi), DSL connection, C&W network, C&W's provider, Cable & Wireless Worldwide (CWW) (who connect C&W to the Internet) and the rest of the Internet. In the last twelve months C&W's network does not look to be a major contributor to impairments which could be a reflection of the network and service upgrades undertaken combined with effective traffic management and self-restraint by residents due to package restrictions.

One of the other benefits of placing agents on users' PCs is that AE is able to detect problems with a user's Internet service that could not be detected by C&W. An example of this was that the PQ scores for one company's Business Silver package were suspiciously low compared to the Island PQ score average. After asking C&W to investigate, they found that the company's upload and download speeds were incorrectly set as a bronze service. This was immediately corrected by C&W and the company's PQ numbers returned to the expected level.

Justin McPhee CEO of C&W says: "C&W is pleased to see the work being carried out by AE on behalf of FIG to independently measure broadband performance over the last few years which have shown that the huge effort by the team at C&W in upgrading and developing the network has been well worthwhile.

"The results generated have reflected the investment we have made to the network including the upgrading of the core network, installation of new equipment in camp, several major bandwidth upgrades as well as new equipment in the earth station. In addition to this we have improved the usage monitoring for customers and provided emailed usage alerts.

"We are also pleased to see that excluding the limitations imposed by satellite connectivity the Falklands broadband service, our network performance is comparable to other service providers and we will continue to make every effort to ensure this continues."

Andrew Newman, FIG says: "From a Regulatory point of view, FIG are happy to have a company record and measureInternet user experience. The trial and development of the Performance Quality (PQ) programme allows us to measure a wide range of services offered by the exclusive licence holder to ensure that the customer is receiving the service as advertised. The data collected through the agents installed on volunteers" PCs is distributed in report form which we, the exclusive licence holder and other interested parties receive monthly. This data can be used to identify anomalies in performance quality; to date these have been quickly investigated and rectified. We are very satisfied with the progress that has been made over the last 2 years and would like to thank Chris, Nikki and all the volunteers for their contribution to this important programme."

It is good to see the improvements in the Island's internet services but we should not get complacent, so I shall end by saying that there is still much that could be done, for example increased satellite bandwidth.

## Review says there's a lot of talent to be harnessed

#### Irene Lucas takes a critical, but positive look at the Civil Service

ANYBODY expecting, or even hoping, that the recently-delivered Report on the Review of Government would constitute a hatchet job on the civil service will probably be disappointed.

The author, independent consultant, Irene Lucas, who had many years as a successful local government chief executive, before being translated to national government in Whitehall, does criticise certain aspects of the restructuring of the Falkland Islands Government Civil Service which took place from 2009 and other facets of its existence, some of which were evidently endemic long before that date.

On the whole, however, from the various presentations made last week by Ms Lucas to civil servants, MLAs and the Chamber of Commerce, together with the interviews she has given to Penguin News and FIRS, it would appear that this lengthy report, which it is hoped will shortly be available to the public, exudes the same enthusiasm, positivity and good sense its writer does herself, in person.

Prior to arriving in the Falklands in December 2011. Ms Lucas had begun to immerse herself in Falklands matters with the help of material sent her by the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly, Keith Biles, who with HE the Governor constituted the Review Board set up by MLAs.

Ms Lucas admits that during this process, which included reading six months worth of Penguin News, she began to be aware of the unique nature of the Falkland Islands, an appreciation which being in the Islands and conducting a series of some 104 interviews served only to intensify.

#### Imported models

As Ms Lucas explained to Penguin News, "The Falkland Islands is absolutely unique in terms of the combination of an absolute geo-political importance in the world and the fact that it has to deliver day-to-day services to its citizens. I have looked at models elsewhere in the world, but the dynamics of the environmental and the economic situation and the impact on society of such a close-knit community means that models imported from elsewhere don't necessarily work.

"Overall the Review was a good thing; there hadn't been any significant change for some time and many of the things that were implemented, were implemented for the right reasons. However, many of the recommendations that were implemented were not implemented well and models which had been imported from elsewhere had not been tailored to suit the very unique nature of the Falklands."

Among the features that make the Falkland Islands unique is our small size, especially when this is set against our very large pretensions.

As Ms Lucas put it, "The Falkland Islands and its Government and the functions it is required to deliver to local government are precisely the same as that of Whitehall and a major metropolitan unitary authority.

"This means that the Falkland Islands delivers about 140 different services to the community, which is the average in a unitary authority.

"The difference is that a unitary authority generally has between seven and a half and ten thousand people delivering them. You have got breadth, but no depth, therefore the quality of leadership and attention time given to specific issues, some of which are incredibly sensitive is important."

Should this mismatch between size and function appear too daunting. Ms Lucas is reassuring. "There is some exceptional best practice happening in the Falkland Islands; there are some great people delivering some great services here. It took me some time to find out with some humility that this is a special place."

Grouping the nine questions posed by MLAs as constituting the terms of reference for her enquiries into four domains: the machinery of government, organisational changes, the financial savings, and the work force, Ms Lucas said the over-arching question was whether the Review was working for the Falkland Islands and, if not, what might be done to put things right.

#### No synergies or added values

While the regrouping of government departments as a consequence of the Review of Government had been designed to free the Chief Executive to concentrate more on focussing on strategic direction, Ms Lucas said that she could not agree with it "in totality."

She could find, "no compelling evidence," for Health and Education to be put together. There were no synergies and no added values. One consequence of this combination was that two of the most significant and

important services provided by FIG had a director who was parttime. Without wishing to criticise the current post holder, who was working, "impossibly long hours and passionately contmitted to his task," Ms Lucas said, "the health people believe that he spends 60 per cent of his time in education and the education people believe he spends 80 per cent of his time on health."

Changing this situation would require, "careful, considered handling," but was, said Ms Lucas, "probably the biggest and strongest recommendation in the Report."

In the case of the Police, Emergency Services and Fałkland Islands Defence Force, about which equal concerns had been voiced, Ms Lucas said that she felt there were some compelling reasons for their grouping together. This worked well in some other overseas territories, where there was strength, if they worked in unison.

#### What is holding people back?

Another area for focus in Ms Lucas's report is governmental bureaucracy, though she says its effects were in evidence before the review: "What would freeup the energy and time of civil servants more than anything else would be if thoses areas causing bureaucracy were managed effectively.

"There is a very onerous performance management regime in place. It was appropriate to introduce one to have some means of holding the civil service to account, but it's particularly onerous and actually results in managers receiving a 72 page performance report which is an incredible mix of everything from whether or not the fire alarms are working in the Leisure Centre to whether or not

the planes land on time."

Acknowledging the unreliability of statistical goals in such a small place. Mrs Lucas added."It is soul destroying for people to be spending so much of their time when the set targets are meaningless."

A disproportionate amount of bureaucracy is observed in Human Resources, where its growth has out-stripped its original purpose.

She says the same about the performance appraisal system, which she equates to the wry description of the camel as "a horse designed by a committee, "adding, "it's been added to and pulled about. It doesn't achieve the goal of making people feel great because they've delivered a great service, or, in fact, hold people to account if they are not."

In Irene Lucas's view this kind of bureaucracy is holding people back. This is particularly unfortunate when taken together with her assessment of the work force in the Falkland Islands, not just in the Civil Service, "there is some stunning talent within the Falkland Islands existing work force.

"There's also some stunning talent in the Chamber of Commerce and purely in terms of the Member contribution, you've got some very well-experienced, energetic, enthusiastic members."

#### So what now?

About bureaucracy, Ms Lucas proposes the creation of "a crosscutting team" to root it out, "with an MLA to give that absolute leadership and credibility but you don't necessarily choose the most senior person to remedy this. You might choose from two to three or four levels down. There are some people lower down the structure who are equally if not more capable."

#### A fractured relationship

With regard to what is generally believed to have been a fall in Civil Service morale since the Review, Mrs Lucas states, "What has happened is that there's been a fracture between the political and managerial leadership.

"The civil servants knew that the Chief Executive had one view and knew that the current members were not necessarily on board. That's the worst possible thing for the morale of the work force, if there is a lack of clarity of direction.

"You've got to harness all that talent ....and there's a lot."

The audience was particularly delighted to hear her stunning rendition of 'Spring in Bloom' written by Falklands' farmer and local musician Neil Goodwin,


and put to music by Andi. Talented guitarist and fiddle player Andi also gave a further launch gig at the Narrows Bar last Saturday night.

# Dashing Dancer still unbeaten

DESPITE her increasing years Dashing Dancer remains as good as ever and chalked up her 5th success in the Governor's Cup at what is thought to be the 134th meeting of the Darwin Harbour Sports Association. These 5 Cups will stand proudly on the sideboard of owner Maurice Davis, alongside the 5 Governor's Cup which the mare has won at the Stanley meeting. For jockey Arthur Turner it was his 6th victory in this event having won on two occasions on Capizana (P.R. Short family) and 4 times on Dash-

This latest victory means that Dashing Dancer equals Sheba's record of 5 victories but leaves her one behind Eic Goss's Lucinda which won the Governor's Cup 6 times although one of these was at the unofficial 'mini-meeting' at North Arm on 28 December 1982.

In a spirited race which attracted 6 entries, Dashing Dancer was required to show her amazing turn of foot as firstly Monster Muncher (Lisa Watson) and Zafonic ((Hayley Bonner challenged, but the Pollerita/Thyer mare was equal to the task and was going away comfortably as she reached the winning post. Zafonic took the runners-up position just ahead of surprise packet Monster Muncher which had taken the Maiden Plate on this same course one year earlier. The Rincon Grande bred horse seems to run hot and cold as he ran incredibly well to take the Stanley Services Stakes and the F.I.B. 400 and then finished 5th and last in another race!

Not surprisingly Dashing Dancer remained unbeaten throughout the meeting and recorded wins in the F.I.C. Cup, Lafonia Plate and the Cantera Open Challenge Cup (Champion race) beating Zalonic for the second time.

It was strange to see two unheralded horses entered in the Maiden

been accustomed to talking about off-spring of thoroughbreds lining up in the traditional opener. On this occasion father beat son as Nicky Davis riding Beauty, which according to Tyrone Whitney is a granddaughter of the famous Governor's Cup winning Beauty (Keith Whitney), beat his son Macauley who was riding a good old-fashioned shepherding horse named Athena.

In an unprecedented move, Nicky then entered his Maiden Plate winner in the Maiden Trotting event and easily won that as well.

Tim and Hayley Bonner took a string of good horses from Stanley to Darwin for the meeting and with 8 first places and 7 seconds, Tim comfortably won the Champion Jockey title with a commanding 39 points. Arthur Turner was runnerup with 23 and young Duane Evans achieved an excellent 21 points for 3rd place.

Zafonic provided Tim with 4 victories - Cable & Wireless FIB, Owners Up, Fitzroy Cup and The Nick Taylor Memorial Challenge Trophy. Zafonic's only defeats came at the hands of Dashing Dancer which says much for the ability of this twice Governor's Cup winner at the Darwin Harbour Meeting.

Zafonic with 16 points from 6 rides won the award of Champion Horse with Dashing Dancer, 12 points from 4 races, being the runner-up. Destiny had 11 points.

Another previous Maiden Plate winner Rock of Gibraltar gave Tim Bonner a victory in the Standard Chartered Chase, and he recorded further victories on Thylinda in The Silver Cup, Spirit in the Java Battery, beating strong favourite Southern Dancer (Ron Binnie), and Balanchine in the Ronnie Morrison Champion Cup FIB.

Sometimes an excellent racer appears from the most unlikely source and this is surely the case of Destiny

Plate as in recent years we have which is owned and run by Duane been accustomed to talking about Evans and bred from the mare Sukey (owned by Ben Berntsen) which reportedly never won a race. However it must be said that Destiny was sired from the Bonner's excellent stallion Dancing Brave which is also the father of their champion Zafonic

At this meeting Destiny brought a happy smile to the faces of the only three people who backed him to win the Argos FIB, beating the favourite Balanchine (Tim Bonner) and then later pulling off the North Arm Plate, just ahead of Venus (Tim Bonner) with the favourite Monster Muncher (Arthur Turner) back in 3rd place.

Perhaps the most exciting and closest finish of all was witnessed in the Triangle Y Chase when Penguin News editor Lisa Watson steered Serendipity to a 'short head' victory over Tim Bonner's Rock of Gibraltar. It was literally a last stride result and had the sparse crowd cheering madly

Another race which almost called for a photo finish was the North Arm Plate when Duane Evans riding Destiny edged out Tim Bonner on Venus, but Tim had his revenge on Duane in the Champion Cup when he brought Balanchine in with just a head to spare over Destiny.

It was pleasing to see Ron Binme 'up' for a few races and he was rightly applauded for his victory on Southern Dancer in the Port San Carlos Prize for the young and old jockeys (under 25 and over 50). Ron had his first mounts at the Stanley races back in the early 1960's, almost 50 years ago.

Hayley Bonner brought Eric Goss's Thylinda into first place in the Ladies Gallop with the wellbred but disappointing Royal Charger (Capizana/Thyer) ridden by Lisa Watson having to settle for 2nd place.

provided breath-taking finishes in the Ladies and Open Trots. Dude With An Attitude, ridden by Elaine and Arthur Turner respectively sneaked it on both occasions with Apache ridden by Sharon Jaffray in the Ladies event and Bob Short in the Open, losing by a stride.

Arthur Turner won most of the Gymkhana events such as Thread the Needle, Musical Chairs, Bending race and Potato race, while youngster Cieran Nye took the One Mile, 880 yards and 440 yards foot events beating his close rival Jack Alazia on each occasion. Jack upheld the reputation of Goose Green though by winning the 100 and 220 yards races.



THIS is the time of year when sensible hens start to moult, giving them plenty of time to grow their new feathers before the cold weather hits in earnest.

Some birds moult gradually, others are dramatic, resembling something you prepared carlier for the oven. Nutrition is really important as a lot of energy goes into growing the new feathers. This is when Apple Cider Vinegar and a clove of garlic in their water can make a difference. Also, a few drops of cod liver oil mixed in their daily feed helps. You can buy poultry tonic and spice from Falkland Farmers too I think. Not all of your hens will moult now. Some leave it a bit late and get caught out with the cold, so be observant and provide plenty of shelter for the late moulters. You will have noticed your egg numbers dropping as the moult happens

Give them warmth and good food and they will get over the moult easier and give you eggs again if there is enough daylight.

You can provide extra light in their hen house to encourage winter laying, but be careful and do it gradually by increasing the day length in the mornings using a timer. Don't extend at night time. Let them go to roost naturally as the light fades. Imagine what happens if you extend light hours in the evening - click - the lights have gone out - it's pitch black the hens aren't roosting yet. They are hopeless in the dark and will stay wherever they are when the light goes out, making them vulnerable to cold drafts and predators. Don't extend the light too much as they need about 10 hours of night-time. They also spend more time eating for the sake of it because they are indoors and bored. Likewise with bullying and feather pecking.



### Liverpool Uni polls Argentine youth opinion on Falklands

RESEARCHERS at the University of Liverpool have found that that the opinions of young people in Argentina towards the Falklands Islands are varied and influenced by a number of factors including geographical location, family history and their views on domestic polities.

A pilot study involving 20-18 -26 year olds from throughout Argentina, found that despite being well-informed about the sovereignty dispute, young people did not always conform to the views of either the Argentine Government or the media. Many of the young people considered domestic political issues to be more important, while others supported the Islands' independence. Despite this there was recognition of the importance of natural resources to the Argentine state and some expressed concerns with having a 'colonial' presence in the Latin American region.

The research undertaken from December 2009 to June 2010 sought to explore the significance of the Islands in everyday life amongst young citizens of Argentina. Opinion polls from 2010 showed that 45 per cent of the Argentine population have little or no interest in the Islands and the age group 18 - 29 year olds have the least interest of all. However, 52 per cent - mainly male and over-50, were found to regularly follow the news on the Falklands. More recent opinion polls -- since tensions between Argentina and the UK have increased - suggest more interest from all age groups.

Many of the young people did not put the issue of who owned the Islands as high on their list of concerns as international trade, higher education or the issues of drugs and insecurity.

If interviewees had a family member, or knew of someone who had taken part in the 1982 conflict, then the issue was more important to them, although that didn't necessarily mean they supported the government's actions. Also, the views of young people who lived nearer to the South Atlantic territories were far stronger than those who lived in Buenos Aires, or the northern regions.

#### **Comment by Deputy Editor John Fowler**

REFERRING to her part in the appointment of a new Chief Executive for the Falkland Islands Government, Legislative Assembly Member Jan Cheek writes this week about relying on "instinct and intuition which would not pass the scrutiny of 'modern' recruitment processes."

While Penguin News did not have the opportunity of meeting the two UK candidates, we are delighted at the outcome. Besides congratulating Keith Padgett on his well-earned appointment, it seems we must also cheer Mrs Cheek for demonstrating the return to common sense which was called for in the recent Review of the Review of Government by Mrs Irene Lucas.

Recruiting someone to the most influential position in the government service is always a bit of a gamble, even more so now where we find ourselves simultaneously at the epicentre of a diplomatic storm between Argentina and Britain and possibly poised for a period of meteoric economic growth in the next few years. In these circumstances, the last person we need as Chief Executive is someone whose mam effort is devoted to the short-term enhancement of his CV, even if this is at the expense of our long-term requirements.

The word from the Secretariat is that Mr Padgett is renowned for efficiency and getting things done to time. Some people have described him as dour, uncommunicative and altogether too 'Northern.' Coming from Yorkshire myself. I find the last attribute admirable, as is the first, if what is meant is that Mr Padgett does not waste his words. Our common experience of him, as evidenced at the meetings of the Legislative Assembly in his old role as Financial Secretary, is that Mr Padgett communicates very effectively, with a blessed absence of the kind of elitist business school jargon, which many of us find so annoving.

On top of his 'day job,' whoever became Chief Executive at this time was going to be faced with the added responsibility for putting flesh on whichever of the recommendations of the Review of the Review that Executive Council agree should be pursued. This task is no walk-over, but it will be infinitely easier for Mr Padgett, coming from within the administration of what the Review's author called, "this unique place," than it would have been for any newcomer.

If not Falklands-born. Keith Padgett and his wife Val have demonstrated a long-term commitment to the Islands and therefore he could rightly be considered a, 'local' candidate. Apart from any other benefits to derive from his appointment, its inspirational effect on the, "sparkling talent," that Mrs Lucas discovered in the lower branches of the government's tree should not be discounted.

### Court news - technical bail awarded

SIMON Reid, who is currently remanded in custody after pleading guilty to three charges of sexual activity with a child and one of meeting a child following sexual grooming, appeared in court on Tuesday.

Senior Magistrate, Carl Gumsley, told the court that under Falkland Islands law the maximum period for which a person, who has been found guilty, but not yet sentenced, can be remanded in custody is three weeks. Because Mr Reid still faces charges to which he has pleaded not guilty, the maximum he could be on remand for on those charges is eight days.

It was proposed by Mr Gumsley that if Mr Reid were to apply

for technical bail for the charges to which he has pleaded not guilty, he would be remanded on the charges he has admitted to.

As a consequence of this he would be expected to appear before the court to be remanded again into custody only every three weeks instead of every week.

Mr Gumsley also noted that the time for which Mr Reid is remanded would count as part of his sentence.

Defence Counsel Mr Deans said Mr Reid was appreciative that his time on remand would be included in his sentence and that it was in the interest of assisting the court that he was applying for technical bail.

## "Special coming back to a place that appreciates what you did"

DEALING with his injuries is somehow "easier in the Falklands," 1982 war veteran Robert Lawrence told Penguin News during his visit last week.

An officer in the Scots Guards in 1982 Robert was severely injured on Mt Tumbledown. After the war he wrote (co-written by his father) the book: When the Fighting Is Over, A Personal Story of the Battle for Tumbledown Mountain and Its Aftermath. His story was also portrayed in the television play Tumbledown, in which he was played by Colin Firth.

Robert told Penguin News: "It's lovely coming back again to see the Islanders because that's the best bit—it's very special coming back to a place that appreciates what you did. It's almost easier living with the injury here than back in the UK, where people don't know what you've done or what you're doing. Here it's a lift.

"You almost feel like you're one of the Islanders as though you have a special card that says you can come back and enjoy life." He said: "I'd like to bring my

He said "I'd like to bring my kids one day if they're not too bored of Dad's story."

Speaking of his most recent vis-

it to Tumbledown he said, "You think you've got your emotional responses under control, but it's very hard when you get up there and see the items left by people who lost members of their family, or even from those injured" (including a number of his own soldiers).

"It's distressing to see things left by soldiers who have been injured and have been living with this every day since, for 30 years."

Robert initially hoped to put the Falklands War behind him, but has since resigned himself to his ever present memories. Speaking of current conflicts said: "In WWI and WWII everyone took part, so everyone knew how it felt. "Now it's a very small hidden group that go and do these things, and that means that when they come back it's harder for them to live on their own with it, without people who really know or understand, and that's why it's so nice being here because it is understood and appreciated, which it isn't necessarily down in your own village."

Robert runs the charity Global Adventure Plus which helps Britain's ex-servicemen get back on their feet through the challenges of adventure, team-work and camaraderie after serving their country in the forces

Robert lost 43% of his brain and was paralysed down one side of his body as a result of a 7.62x51 mm round passing through the rear of his skull and emerging at his hairline above his right eye.

He lay in the snow on Tumbledown for six hours before being airlifted to, and left outside, a makeshift operating theatre without painkillers. He assumed he was the last to be operated on because he was the least likely to survive.

The final stage was an interview with all MLAs who were on the Islands at the time, and the decision was one that they all supported."

### More courses at Chichester?

THE Education Board is considering allowing students to study for certain Level 2 courses at Chichester College. It was agreed that some courses offered at Level 2 could be beneficial to the Islands, such as the Legal Secretaries L2 Certificate Course, or construction courses like plumbing (Technical Certificate in Basic Plumbing). However, the courses are considered by the Board to be part-time compared to the currently required Level 3 courses and it was decided that it should be assessed whether they could be combined with other courses.

### Call for clarity from Argentina

THE European Union has called on Argentina to respect international trade commitments, following an announcement by the Argentine Minister of Industry that imports originating in the UK should be boycotted. "We would like Argentina to explain and clarify what is happening and gives guarantees that it is going to completely respect its interna-tional commitments," said John Clancy, Trade spokesperson for the European Commission. The EC announcement followed a Foreign Office request to the EU for a reaction after the Argentine Minister of Industry reportedly had called 20 senior executives asking them to replace the goods they import from the UK with products from other countries (Mercopress)

### Legislative Assembly Diary

MLA Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

LAST week I had the unusual privilege of meeting the author David Thorp whose book The Silent Listener tells the fascinating story of the role of some of the electronic surveillance in 1982. I rate it among the best ten books to come out of the war. Too many simply regurgitated fairly inaccurate press reports and second or third hand reporting which just reinforced some of the mythology which only first hand stories and real research into original sources can dispel.

#### \*\*\*

Interviewing candidates for the post of Chief Executive was a revealing experience. I found marking candidates particularly difficult as I have pretty much got through life relying on instinct and intuition which would not pass the scrutiny of 'modern' recruitment processes.

This week press visitors include some from Uruguay, Chile and two important French publications Le Monde and Figaro. There is also a representative from Associated Press whose reports may have very wide coverage. A piece I did for AP fairly early in the life of this Assembly was picked up by news media in many counties ranging from Canada to Taiwan. I know we are in danger of becoming weary of the demands of so many journalists wanting our time but it is an opportunity that may not be repeated for some time.

With the greatest respect to the distinguished retired senior task force commanders from 82 who are regularly coming forward with messages of gloom and despair. I wonder if they have given much thought to the effect their statements may have on the nervous and impressionable among our population. Perhaps they should visit as a group to be briefed on the present day deterrent defence of the Islands; they could then generate confidence instead of warnings. I cannot believe that the questions they raise have not already been considered and dealt with I imagine that those same questions will also be asked by the Defence Committee members visiting this week. If previous visits are a fair indicator, the members are committed and knowledgeable people who have taken a keen interest in defence matters for many years.

# Port public consultation process: lots of questions, but not so many answers

AS part of the consultative process demanded by Executive Council (ExCo) a public meeting on the location of a new port on Tuesday evening was followed on Wednesday night by a radio phone in.

Opening the public meeting, MLA Sawle said that after many years of discussion and a series of five consultants reports. Executive Council had recommended three possible port sites out of the six originally considered.

The chosen sites were: Stanley's inner harbour, Navy Point in Port William and the shared use of the military port at East Cove, Mare Harbour. Rejected were Port Harriet, Ordnance Point in Port William and Berkeley Sound.

An uncertain life expectancy for the current floating dock FI-PASS, and the likelihood of a rapidly increasing demand for port services, lent urgency to the need for a decision, said MLA Sawle. Apart from whether ExCo had been right in their selection, the important question was whether to concentrate all the services in one place or to duplicate them. It was necessary, he said, to learn the details of what was required from all sectors: the fishing industry, the oil industry, tourism and containerisation.

Following on from MLA Sawle's introduction, FIG's Projects Director, Stephen Dent, gave an illustrated presentation covering both the rejected options and those recommended by ExCo, none of which appeared to be without both advantages and some constraints.

Stanley Harbour with its shelter from offshore waves, prox-imity to Stanley and established infrastructure was the first option proposed, but attention was drawn to a potential lack of vessel manoeuvring space, the need for dredging and the already existing complaints about noise and light pollution. While it was admitted that some large vessel captains would never agree to navigate through the Narrows, Mr Dent said that this might be more of a problem of perception, in that, at 120m, the effective safe distance through the passage was not much less than the distance between breakwaters in Montevideo

It was likely, said Mr Dent, that there would always be a require-



ment for some berthing facilities at FIPASS, due among other factors to its proximity to the fuel farm and a temporary 'fix' while other plans were being developed might be worth consideration.

Outside Stanley and therefore requiring an access road 13 miles long, the Navy Point option offered an open approach and a degree of protection from the normally prevailing winds, though either a long causeway or continual dredging would be necessary to obtain the required minimum depth of 10m. The sloping nature of the land immediately behind the port could be a constraint on the development of the new infrastructure that would be required if this option were chosen.

The shared use of the existing East Cove Military Port at Mare Harbour was attractive, though its distance from Stanley and a concomitant need to improve the MPA road acted against it, as did the need to build separate docking facilities alongside the existing military arrangements. Fears had been expressed by the industry that their access to the port might suffer constraints if this clashed with military requirements.

When the meeting was thrown open for comment and questions, ex-Councillor Eric Goss, made a lengthy case for the re-inclusion of Ordnance Point in Port William.

This site had been ruled out by ExCo in December 2011 because of fears of a possible negative impact on the Cape Pembroke area and the much-visited penguin colony at Gypsy Cove.

Local conservationist, Brian Summers re-stated this view, supported by Lidda Luxton.

The Magellanic penguin colony at Gypsy Cove already co-existed with vessels bunkering immediately off-shore, said Mr Goss who gave examples of Jackass penguins living among housing developments in South Africa. He argued that the proximity of Ordnance Point to Stanley would allow existing facilities at FIPASS to continue to be used and the prior existence of a road to Stanley airport which already had electricity and water would bring much lower project costs

The meeting broke up at six o'clock without a consensus view being reached.

There was further support for the Ordnance Point site voiced during the radio phone-in, but the main degree of consensus among the panel of Steve Dent, MLA Dick Sawle, Cheryl Roberts on behalf of the fishing industry and Roger Spink for the Chamber of Commerce, seemed to be for an immediate improvement of FIPASS and an incremental approach to the development of any of the other sites.

## Hello Guernsey this is Stanley

GONE, it seems, are the days when teachers badgered pupils into writing laborious letters to their opposite numbers in schools far away.

On Tuesday, as a demonstration, perhaps, of how technology has made the world smaller and the Falkland Islands less isolated, the youngest members of the Infant and Junior School in Stanley (Mrs Stanworth and Mrs Nightingale's classes) were able to talk directly to the children of the reception class in a school in far-off Guernsey, one of the British Channel Islands.

This encounter, which occurred courtesy of Skype and the services of the school's computer



technician, Zane Hirtle, was the brainchild of US teacher Susan Nightinglale, who before coming to the Falklands taught for five years at St Andrews Primary School in Guernsey. The contact, with the Reception Class of St Sampson's Infant School in the Channel Island, was made through her friend and their class teacher, Di Thorogood.

Leading up to this opportunity for the children to exchange information about such important topics as their new t-shirt, penguins, what exactly is meant by "bogging" and "shearing." both classes had been busy learning about each others' lives, Mrs Nightingale told Penguin News. In fact, although separated by over seven thousand miles of ocean, there are differences and similarities between our two communities, not least that both islands have suffered occupation by foreign armed forces: the Falklands by Argentina for 74 days in 1982 and Guernsey by Germany for five years during the Second World War.

### Top ram weights

SHEARLING rams to be sold this year at Saladero Farm will be the heaviest on record, according to the Department of Agriculture (DOA).

The 2012 Ram Sale takes place on Friday, March 16 where buyers will be able to choose from 90 high quality 17-month old Polwarth breeding rams, plus Angus bulls and mature breeding female eattle.

The average sale weight has topped 50kg for the first time with some animals predicted to be between 65-70kg on sale day.

The DOA team has carefully selected each ram based on a number of wool quality and physical factors that have gradually been whittled down to the very best animals.

National Stud Flock Manager Helen Thoday said, "The high body weights have been achieved through careful grazing management and by utilising an oat crop that was drilled earlier in the Spring to compensate for the lower overall amount of forage caused by the very dry summer." She added: "Body weight and

She added: "Body weight and body condition are key to many things including survival and fertility levels, but over a joining season a ram loses 15 per cent of its body weight and then will go straight into winter, so it is important to have this body reserve prior to joining. The correct body weight at shearling age will put the ram on track for a productive life on farm."

## no bananas

FOR the Falklands to be short of bananas as a result of Argentina's bully-boy blockade and trade restrictions is understandable. For Argentina to run out of bananas you'd think would be impossible in a sub-continent which grows millions of them. But a few weeks ago, they had no bananas in Buenos Aires shops. Only the incompetent Argentines could achieve the impossible. It's not just bananas they are slipping up on.

Lots of other commodities are in short supply because of Christina Fernandez de Kirchner's imposition of import restrictions to prop up the economy. In Buenos Aires I heard people complaining of shortages of every day goods such as electrical equipment. One woman told me she was taking the ferry to Uruguay to buy a re-

placement iron, and others to get urgently needed medicinal drugs no longer available in Argentina. It reminds me of chronic shortages over thirty years ago when Argentines would take the LADE flight to the Falklands to buy Cadburys chocolate, toilet paper, and even carpets.

Argentina's import restrictions have caused great annoyance among Argentina's neighbours including Uruguay, Chile and Brazil, the very countries Argentina has persuaded to support its Falklands policy. And the ban on cruise ships calling at Ushuaia has angered people there involved in the tourist industry which is so important to them as 1 found when I called in last month.

There is much discontent in Argentina. Despite democratic elections and impressive economic growth, the country is beset with unrest and demonstrations, widespread crime, corruption and cronyism, high inflation, poverty and child starvation in a land of plentiful food. While I was there a French photographer was murdered in broad daylight at the Malvinas war memorial in a busy part of Buenos Aires. It was one of many robberies plaguing the place. Not long previously two other French tourists had been murdered in Salta. Among the many demonstrations was one by Malvinas veterans campaigning for pensions for those who served only on the mainland, to bring them in line with those sent to take part in the invasion. The demonstrations were ruthlessly dispersed by riot police with batons, tear gas and water cannon. Not much change there then!

President Fernandez de Kirchner is at odds with substantial parts of the media and with the YPF oil company now part of a Spanish corporation. She has criticised it for lack of effort in exploring for more oil as Argentina's supplies become depleted.

Last year the country spent nine billion dollars on oil imports, expected to rise to 13 billion this year. No wonder it easts covetous eves on what may lie in Falklands waters. Serves it right for reneging on agreements which could have encouraged co-operation on oil and preservation of fish stocks. Islanders are right to be sceptical about her offer to revisit the 1999 agreement and try to switch LAN flights from Chile to Buenos Aires flights by Aerolineas Argentinas which, apart from the political pitfalls, is not a reliable airline commercially. Decades of monitoring Argentina have convinced me of one enduring characteristic - it just cannot be trusted, whether under military or civilian rule, and whether pursuing aggressive

or deceptively moderate policies.

I heard a lot of criticism of the president's ranting about the Malvinas. The recent declaration by 17 leading Argentine intellectuals challenging the President's demands for sovereignty of the Falkland Islands is a view shared by other people in Argentina at all levels of society.

A young well-educated Argentine business woman I met on a Buenos Aires bus was forthright in her view: "You (the British) won the war. You keep the is-lands!" Her attitude was echoed by a middle-aged entrepreneur in the tourist industry in Ushuaia, where I saw lots of notices absurdly claiming it to be the capital of the Falkland Islands. The businessman told me that many young Argentines are just not interested in the sovereignty dispute. He went on to predict that the Malvinas dispute will no longer be an issue for newer generations within thirty or forty years.

I am not convinced of that refreshing scenario but my experience canvassing the views of Argentines over the past 30 years is that younger people are far more concerned with getting a good education and a job, how to enjoy their next free evening and what mobile telephone to buy next. I think there is a growing glimmer of realism and scepticism espe-cially about the historical falsehoods and misinformation deployed in support of Argentina's claim. Its exaggerated rhetoric, not least its accusation of UK "militarisation" of the South Atlantic, is proving counter-productive. Its submissions to the United Nations have been met by the UK's robust rebuttal and a detailed, factual account of events going back centuries validating British sovereignty. The Foreign and Commonwealth Office seem to be embarked on an active campaign to correct misconceptions, in welcome contrast to its shameful pre-1982 policy of surrender of British sovereignty.

I am sure the robust commonsense declarations by councillors and other Islanders are making impact in the media and more widely. In contrast to Agentina, my brief visit to Stanley was a heartening experience as ever, finding you all in good heart in a much healthier economic and democratic environment than the mainland and British to the core, demonstrating by your conduct and your hospitality and support for Task Force veterans, and your abiding gratitude.

I was delighted to meet and chat with so many friends in the Globe. I thank you for your welcome and Patrick Watts for organising it and showing me around Stanley to see how much it has developed.



# It shouldn't happen to a chef

## When Penguin News Winter Deputy Editor, Sharon Jaffray gave up her duties as sea cook on the Hans Hansson, her place at the stove was taken by Ben Cockwell, who found himself cooking for celebrity chef, Hugh Fearnley-Whittingstall.

KING George Island next stop, all change please. The Japanese film crew was ashore to catch the charter flight at the Chilean base and it was a crazy scramble to get the ship ready for the next batch of passen-

We were ready just in time and welcomed aboard the Channel 4 film crew and celebrity chef Hugh Fearney-Whittingstall, onboard for a three week charter filming an episode of the new series of the popular TV show Hugh's Fish Fight.

We hauled anchor and away; the new cook hard at work already (me of course). Nervous as hell to be cooking for a celebrity chef, my nerves were not helped by finding out that there were only nineteen onions in the store cupboard, not much when cooking for eleven people for three weeks.

As we had already lost a day due to the delayed charter flight we headed straight off for the Ant-

dropped the hook off the Argentine Esperanza Base in Hope Bay; a large collection of red buildings on the foreshore dominated by an enormous Adelie penguin colony. It was an interesting job landing the film crew, on-shore wind and loads of rocks and ice (exciting stuff) but we managed it without drowning anyone. Hugh's son Oscar. who'd stayed aboard with us, promptly set up his fishing rod and caught several Antarctic cod. In the evening Hugh gave us the first demonstration of his skill by making a sublime dish of ceviche with these rather unprepossessing looking fish. Our stay at Hope Bay was curtailed when a large berg floated in, scraping by us and giving the hull a couple of shrewd knocks then rebounding off the shore straight back towards our vulnerable stern, needless to say we departed, sharpish.

As we headed further down the

the South Shetlands with us as we lone humpback who was incredibly obliging. Hugh was sitting on the stern doing his thing for the camera and the whale was virtually putting its chin on the rail, peaking its tail and so on. Hugh was delivering the line, 'Hugh's fish fight just got a whole lot bigger' - so appropriate. The whale played with us for nearly an hour before the display culminated with a modest belly flop breach right beside the boat and with yet another gust of fishy breath it was gone, last seen disappearing around one of the huge tabular bergs that litter the sound.

It was getting late and the wind was blowing up a so we headed to the lee of Johannsen Island to find an anchorage. In the straits between the island and the mainland we had to beat against a four knot tide, for a mile or so at the narrowest point it was a maelstrom of mad, conflicting waves breaking any old how plus lots of bergy bits and growlers to

strong currents.

The subject of the programme being filmed was principally about krill, not just the wee little shrimps themselves and what eats them, but the growing commercial exploitation of the species. One of their big filming goals was to rendezvous with and get aboard the big krill trawler Saga Sea - somewhere between the Peninsula and South Georgia. We had had word that the Saga Sea would be transhipping at Signy Island in the South Orkneys so this would be our chance to catch up with her. We had just one more day to get as much done in the Sound as we could. To this end we left Hugh on an iceberg and sailed away; this wasn't some Antarctic version of the fate of Ben Gunn but merely so we could film him as we circled the berg bringing him back into frame. Having bagged the shot and successfully retrieved Hugh from his berg we dashed across to have one last go filming ashore with the Adelie penguins, this time on

Paulet Island.

Paulet Island is another of the Peninsula's active volcanoes, a black, ash streaked cone and shelving lower slopes with basalt cliffs. Unlike her snow and glacier clad neighbours, geothermal heat keeps Paulet Island ice-free making it the ideal home for hundreds of thousands of Adelie penguins. The area is also infested with giant petrels. among their drab cousins are several of the more debonair white morphs, a bird of a more genteel appearance than the common Stinkers.

Among the huge penguin colony are the ruins of a stone hut built by a Swedish expedition in 1902 as a supply depot. There is an ironic tale about this. Ernest Shackleton's ill-fated Imperial Trans-Antarctic Expedition, on losing their ship the Endurance in the pack ice, were unable to reach this haven, instead having to make do with the remote and barren Elephant Island. It must have been calling for Shackleton knowing exactly what was cached on Paulet Island as he was the man who had actually purchased the supplies for them in England


Anyway I digress; Aidan and the film crew loaded up the zodiac and disappeared off into the crowded bergy bits and grounded icebergs, eaten away and rotted on their seaward side by the incessant swell that litters the approach to the island. On their return Dion plotted a course for Signy Island, South Orkneys.


So ended our time in the Peninsula; we headed for the South Orkneys, a remote island group two days steaming away. It was a sad time as we headed eastward to pass by the rather dramatically named Danger Islands, the blackened peak of Paulet Island disappearing into the haze. This was the last we'd see of the Peninsula on this trip.

The Sound had been different from the balmy fjords of the Gerlache Strait, rougher seas, inclement







# Punta Arenas river flood leaves trail of destruction

"I WAS left in the open, without house or workshop. I lost it all." This was the anguished cry of one of the citizens of Punta Arenas after the flash flood which happened on Sunday night leaving a trail of destruction in its wake.

According to the local newspaper, Prensa Austral, the plight of this complainant reflected that of many residents of the populous Playa Norte sector, when what was estimated to be between one quarter and one third of the annual rainfall, fell on the city over a day and a half. The sudden unexpected surge of water descending from the heights above the port city caused the river Las Minas to burst its banks, and the resulting flood to effectively cut the city centre in half.

Among those people wellknown in Stanley to be affected was former FIC shipping agent, Bob Peart, whose shop in the city centre was flooded causing damage to recently arrived new stock.

According to Nancy Jennings, her cousin Susan Stewart, a former long-time teacher at the British School in Punta Arenas found her garden on Mejicana Street under three metres of water on Monday morning and her exit to the outside world cut off, until the water was pumped out through the house. Nancy is not

sure whether Susan's house itself was flooded because of the height of her basement, but knows that the nearby house of Susan's son, Gonzalo had suffered from the effects of the rising water.

Many people locally will have been concerned for the well-being of family and friends in this city with which we have enjoyed so many links in the past. Nancy says that for her the events of the weekend have had a particularly strong impact: "The Magallanes Region has already been struggling and now the people will have to dig deep to get over this," she told Penguin News.

Such was the quantity of water that flowed over the banks of the river Las Minas to form lakes in much of the city centre that it became necessary for the authorities to break down the flood barriers at some points after the river had subsided, to allow water to flow back into it. Guests at the Diego de Almagro hotel which overlooks the Straits of Magellan found themselves stranded, in some case for more than two days, and having to survive on bar snacks as the kitchens were out of action.

Also moved by the plight of the people of Punta Arenas is Liz Elliot, Programme Controller of the Falkland Islands Radio Service.

On Wednesday Liz launched a radio appeal and an accompanying Facebook page for suggestions as to how the Falklands community might aid what the Prensa Austral calculates to be 880 families in 860 dwellings affected by the floods. While she has no relatives there, Liz is keen to show support as a means of thanking the people of Punta Arenas for kindnesses shown to her and Jock during his medical treatment there.

As of Wednesday, while it was still reportedly drizzling in Punta Arenas, the floods had subsided, leaving affected residents contemplating the ruin of their properties and the local authorities with the task of shifting mountains of mud, trees and other detritus from the centre of their city.

### Cost of Falklands



### **Comment by Editor Lisa Watson**

FOLLOWING up unconfirmed rumours of creme eggs available in shops earlier this week. I happened to glance, mid search, to my right at three conservatively dressed, slightly anxious looking middle-aged men lined up at the checkout. Concluding from their language and accents they were likely part of the group of visiting Argentine war veterans, I found it hard to equate these avuncular looking chaps with some angrily worded social network descriptions of marauding hoards of hell-bent-on-trouble-making Argentines invading our shores courtesy of the LAN flight.

Understandably some Islanders do feel discomforted by the thought of large groups of visitors from that nation. A friend of mine describes it as a visceral, or instinctive, response; a distressing revival of a highly traumatic episode - in this case the 1982 War. As someone who, also as a result of that time, can still be emotionally discomforted by the unexpected sound of an unfamiliar aircraft 1 don't doubt his analysis for one moment.

Personally (and I count myself lucky in this) the presence of Argentines as visitors causes me no great unease in itself, and I cannot think of a good reason why their presence, as visitors, should be negative in a political sense. On the other hand I also feel no pressing responsibility for what they might encounter while they are here. If they decide to visit a territory that their own government seeks to misappropriate (and in failing to do so, treats shoddily) then they can hardly expect a welcome of smiles. At the same time, for them to be treated with ugly aggression serves no good purpose; and in fact would do little more than make Islanders appear in the eyes of the world as exactly that ugly and aggressive.

What is truly distressing, however, is recent evidence that the upsurge of agitation, perhaps partly fuelled by more press attention as well as the aforementioned emotional reaction to increased Argentine visits, is leading the more naturally intolerant in the community to turn upon their own. To put it bluntly, these "I'm more patriotic than you, so you're a traitor" displays and jibes aimed at those wishing to carry on quietly and normally is nothing more than a pissing competition - crude and utterly pointless.

Pull together guys; we have great support for our cause both in the UK and in other parts of the world - let's show them we deserve it.

Specialist mechanical equipment was used for the project, including an Armtrak-75 armoured remote control tractor fitted with a flail.

# 64 runners determined to go the marathon distance

132 runners have signed up for the AIMS accredited Standard Chartered Stanley Marathon on Sunday, with another 37 entries for the 3k fun run.

A spokesperson for Standard Chartered Bank confirmed yesterday that 64 individuals will be running the full marathon and 17 teams of four running the relay. He said there were eight different countries represented in the race but was unable to confirm what nationalities they comprised.

Stanley SCB Chief Executive Officer, Binoy Karia, did confirm that Frank Jaffray was the only Falklands-born runner entered to complete the 26.2 mile course.

Stanley resident Yukimo Fletcher told Penguin News that she was proud to say six runners from Japan would be taking part this year: "Two of the runners recently took part in the South Pole marathon," and are taking the opportunity to run the Stanley

With a course claimed to be one of the toughest, due to near constant\_gradients and high winds, happily the Japanese entrants are experienced in running in extreme heat and cold: "The group leader Shinichi Takahashi has run all over Africa, the Caribbean, Sri Lanka, Alaska and the middle East," said Mrs Fletcher. One of the group ran from Los Angeles to New York in 70 days.

Standard Chartered Bank sponsors nine races in four continents, and believes their marathons characterise, "the values and attitude we believe in and live by every day - a 'can-do' attitude, a priority on strength of trust, willpower, stamina, and a determination to go the distance, no matter what."

### Benefits to road materials

THERE were clear benefits to using material recently tested in road seal trials confirmed Road Engineer Simon Catton last week. However, there were still three things that needed to be tested. These included length of time before maintenance is required, performance during the winter months, and how to maintain the road when required. On this basis it was, he said, too early to decide on the success or failure of the product.

A first trial layer of Otta Seal was completed on the January 26 and the second layer was planned for March 22 and 23. Mr Catton reported that to date the bitumen had started to show on the first layer which was a good sign, but added, "time will tell."

### Sensenbrenner defends Islands

ARGENTINA wants to dictate when self-determination should apply, regardless of the expressed opinion of the affected population, US Congressman F. James Sensenbrenner, told the Telegraph this week. He noted that Argentina had in the past defended the principle of self-determination, in the case of Puerto Rico in 2010.

He criticised President Obama's policy on the Islands that calls for sovereignty discussions.

Mr Sensenbrenner said before he visited the Falklands he believed it to be, "a colonial backwater," but having spent time there learning he saw that Islanders had a democratic system of government, an effective Chamber of Commerce, produce annual budget surpluses and maintain excellent primary and secondary schools.

## Legislative Assembly Diary

MLA Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

ON Tuesday we have our first stab at the larger subventions for the budget. This involves studying the accounts and applications from the bodies like FIDC. FIRS and the Museum which receive annual sums to assist them in fulfilling their roles and then presentations by representative of the various organizations when they justify their requests. Between now and May we will look in detail at departmental budgets which have in some cases already been considered by the relevant committees.

#### \*\*\*\*

Later this week we have regular meeting with directors of various portfolio departments as well as regular weekly meetings with the governor and Chief Executive at which a whole range of current issues may be discussed. On occasions the Chief Executive may bring other officers to make presentations or clarify situations where problems may have arisen. Although press interest remains high this is looking like the quietest week for three to four months. Having said that I hope I'm not tempting fate to unleash anything startling in the days between writing and publication.

Next week we are having our March public meeting early in order that it does not clash with the celebration of completion of the latest phase of land release. Later in the week MLAs are having a session concentrated on looking at a whole range of matters relating to candidates for elections and potential changes to the list of FIG post holders barred from standing. The current list is out of date and also there is no clear policy on backfilling posts when an individual is elected, leading to real problems, both for individuals and their departments. With the next general election little over 18 months away we need to ensure that there are many good candidates for voters to choose. Some suggest that the increasing workload and responsibilities demand higher allowances and that would have to be referred to an independent group as it was a few years ago so that new rates could commence with the next Assembly.

#### \*\*\*

It appears that our neighbours are not alone in rewriting and distorting history to suit their own views.

## FIGAS and ferry to work more closely together

MEASURES to integrate the existing passenger services to West Falklands more closely were discussed at the meeting of the Transport Advisory Committee (TAC) on March 7.

FIG's Director of Central Services, Simon Fletcher introduced a paper outlining the results of talks which had been requested between the Managing Director of Workboat Services Ltd (WSL), Adam Cockwell, and the General Manager of FIGAS, Morgan Gioss.

TAC had asked FIGAS and WSL to undertake a review to determine whether the two services might offer an element of integration that might improve services to customers, both in terms of rates charged for freight and continuity of service at times when one or the other operator were not available.

It was agreed that the only real area for closer integration would be the ferry operation and flying between West and East Falkland. The ship's service to islands remains cargo only and it was difficult to see how it could be further integrated with FIGAS passenger services.

Both FIGAS and WSL recognised that they could quite easily work closer when scheduling the ferry and the FIGAS no fly days. This would involve little cost to either but would have quite considerable potential benefit to the customer. It was thought that more could be done to provide a 'backup' service in the event that a weather delay was experienced by only one of the operators. For example, if FIGAS was unable to fly, passengers could make last minute bookings on the ferry. Likewise, if the ferry was delayed perhaps FIGAS could put on a 'ferry replacement' flight to, for example, Port Howard.

Subject to reasonable levels of demand, it was also considered that FIGAS might be able to offer seven day operations for the duration of Concordia Bay's scheduled annual dry docking. For this to happen, however, it was agreed there would have to be a policy change to allow data for passenger/hour load factors and overall deficit during this period to be removed from the annual data collection.

The Director of Central Services suggested a reassessment of the shipping freight rates which had not been increased since the 1990s. It was agreed that the shipping freight rates needed to be reviewed but that there should not be a sudden large increase to compensate for the lack of rate increase in the past. Mr Fletcher agreed that any increase would need to be applied incrementally.

Workboat Services Ltd and FI-GAS will continue to work on the development of these ideas with the Director of Central Services.

## TAC road work update

AN extensive update on the road work done this year was provided for the Transport Advisory Committee by Road Engineer Simon Catton, at the March 7 meeting.

On the East Falklands grading has been done on all North East roads, the North Camp track from Estancia to the Pedro, the MPA roads and the Darwin road. The programme through to the end of the year includes the MPA road and Johnson's Harbour roads again, the New Haven road, the Ring road and town roads.

Capping has been completed on the road to the rubbish tip (2,445 tonnes material used), the Gypsy Cove road (5,020 tonnes) and the New Haven road (8,596 tonnes). The Goose Green road has been patched with 3,064 tonnes of material, making a total of 19,125 tonnes of material produced and laid.

Significant drainage improvements have been completed from Wall Mountain to Mount Kent turnoff including new pipes.

On the West Falklands, all grading has been finished and the equipment returned to the East. Having finished their contracted length of capping, McLee are now to undertake a further 8km.

Following the award of a four

year contract Justin Knight has been progressing well with the annual works on cattle grids. To date three grids have been completed and opened up and the remaining three are being worked on.

The Windbound Valley realignment and the Fox Bay cross strip are both complete, but planned work at Carew Harbour and Wall Mountain has been cancelled due to lack of funds.

The town road gang remit has been expanded to include maintenance (excluding grading and capping) of the MPA road. Since July over 100 projects of varying size and scope have been undertaken.

Despite the late cancellation of an expected asphalt trainer the decision was taken to proceed with asphalt on a much changed programme. To date laying has been slower than expected but the quality has been improving along with the gang's confidence.

The opportunity arose to utilise a specialist white lining gang from England, which was hired to reline 75 junctions in town. This work was completed in two days and some training was given to the town gang to help simplify and speed up the process in future.

### Time to change?

THE recent survey undertaken by the Policy Unit on the Falklands time has closed and a report produced and a decision made. However, I still feel somewhat disturbed at the whole process and in particular the way in which the survey was carried out. We have been told the proposed telephone survey was not carried out because of time and cost constraints but surely the quickest, cheapest and easiest way of getting a consensus was to place a simple questionnaire in everyone's mail box and they could then choose whether or not to put the reply in a box in the post office.

I have to admit that I did hear the Policy Unit survey advertised on FIRS but usually in the evenings, so despite my best intentions to phone the department 1 did not do so. Many people have told me they were unaware that the survey was even taking place and there did seem to be relatively little public consultation and a very short time frame for such. 1 would have rung the Policy Unit rather than conducting an on line survey because although I am on line. I would not really consider myself computer literate and I think many others in the community would feel likewise. There are also a number of older people in the community, who probably were as much affected by not changing the time last winter as anyone, but who are probably not on line at all

Having said I did not contact the Policy Unit, I did, however, sign the petition in the Post Office and I believe there were papers in other locations too. I did so in good faith fully expecting that this petition would at least be given consideration and I am sure that goes for the other signatories. I took the time and trouble a couple of weeks ago to find out who was responsible for this petition and learnt that it was Mrs. Marlene Short. She told me she had sent the petition to the Secretariat with a covering letter and it was never acknowledged. I then undertook to contact the Policy Unit to see if this petition had been taken into consideration. 1 was told by Mr Fotheringham that he had been given the petition but that he had not seen any covering letter. Unfortunately Mrs Short is out of the country so I have been unable to get further comment from her. I asked if the signatures on the petition had been taken into account and was told by Mr Fotherigham that whilst they had been taken into consideration they had NOT been included in his report to MLAs. 1 find this very unfortunate as I believe most people would have signed in good faith and expected it to have had some consideration. I then asked the Policy Unit for details of the numbers involved in the petition and I have attached a number of emails between myself and Mr

Fotheringham on the matter.

I have also obtained a copy of the report and see that it verifies the figures quoted in Eric Goss' letter to Penguin News of February 24, 2012. It states that 209 responses were received but the petition that was not included appears to have contained approximately 240 signatures against remaining on summer time all year.

The report further states that three businesses in construction were included but 1 know that most of the private businesses working outside were dead against the proposal and that a paper was circulated (not sure by whom or where it went to but 1 do know who was involved) indicating that 18 private sector companies, representing 88 individuals were not in favour.

The same people are more than willing to approach such companies again to get more signa-tures should it be necessary. A good number of the businesses included in the survey report were people whose business did not involve working outside. In the introduction and background of the report, paragraph 1.10 states that more people should have been surveyed to get a reasonable representative sample of the community, even suggesting a figure of another 142 persons. It also states that given the nature of the responses received this may not have made any difference to the survey results but if the 240 people who had signed the petition and at least another 88 of those working outside had been taken into consideration, the results could have been quite dif-



ferent. Of course I may be totally wrong about this but I would like to think a democratic decision had been reached and I am not at all sure this was the case and would like to see the exercise run again to prove the case once and for all.

The idea of remaining on summer time all year is fine for those ensconced indoors with electric lights and central heating. It is a nonsense for anyone who has to work outside and many people do.

Why was this decision rushed through in such a hurry with so little consultation and why was consideration not given to trialling a winter of remaining on Winter Time too? People would then have had a much more informed opinion to base their decision on. It has been suggested that Camp can do what they like and use whatever time they choose and some do. I for one was loath to give up Camp/winter time several years ago but the argument that we can do what we like is not as real as it used to be. The advent of roads and the fact that many of us are fairly heavily involved with tourism, FIMCo, FIGAS, WBS and other businesses in Stanley just leaves too much room for error and it is no longer practical. I have to agree with those that commented that two time zones is not in keeping with today's Falklands. I had written

Three time suggestions seem to have been put forward by the Policy Unit but they all overlooked the fact that some people who still wanted a time change, actually wanted the winter time to be shortened. It was always a bone of contention that we changed the clocks so early in the spring. Those poor souls working outside were just starting to get a bit of daylight in the mornings again when they would be plunged back into darkness for another hour at the beginning of September.

It was also interesting that FIG did not even contact all their own Departments when this survey was undertaken as 1 am sure FI-GAS would not have supported it for one.

I am sorry to labour this point as it is supposedly closed but I do feel most strongly that many of us were wronged in the survey process and I urge MLAs to address the matter and if necessary, to rectify it.



# Wildlife haven 30 minutes from town

ON the advice of conservationist Farrah Peck, I joined a small group gathered at the Public Jetty for a 30 minute launch ride to Kidney Island, a National Nature Reserve owned by FIG.

An island I'd probably never have thought to visit I learnt from the distributed leaflet it was densely covered in tussac, and supported an abundance of wildlife including threatened

and vulnerable species of birds. Most importantly it was also the correct time of year to see a flock of sooty shearwaters as dusk fell. The only flock 1'd seen behaving similarly was the swallows that loiter around Brighton Pier, and thankfully on this occasion, all of my expectations were surpassed.

It threatened to rain on frequent occasions as we trekked through ten foot tussac to see the rockhoppers and cormorants nesting on the North Cliffs, ever watchful for the sea lions roaring through the grass. Many photographs later our group headed back to the beach and were greated by a dramatic sunset to accompany our sandwiches, as we watched the birds slowly gather just offshore.

Around 100,000 mating pairs of shearwaters breed on Kidney Island every year, and swarm in the air in a cacophony of calls as they take off at dawn and land at dusk each day.

The sight of thousands of birds thickening the sky as dusk

falls is considered by many as one of the most spectacular in the Falklands. We stood mesmorised by the group, so graceful until they land and flop awkwardly into their burrows after a long day's fishing. Standing around in the dark completely enchanted does have its drawbacks; the bird that flew into my head was unharmed.

All agreed it was a fantastic way to spend an evening amongst half-heartedly aggressive sea lions, rockhoppers, one lonely macaroni, tussac birds, cobbs wren, king cormorants and some whale spotting thrown in too - so we went again a few weeks later.

Evening trips can be arranged through local shipping agencies.



### The Wool Market Report - March 9, 2012 by Agricultural Advisor Helen Thoday

The AWEX ended this week at AUS1,216 up 3 cents making it 816/kg clean in Stirling, actually down 5 pence. Two very different sales were seen at either end of the week, with the first half showing poor demand and lower prices which were rectified at the end of the week with more positive sales creating the overall stable effect.

effect. The strange pattern in price drops and gains is based on the US Dollar affecting the Australian Dollar and then the conversion to Stirling. An impact of how the US dollar and the Australian dollar interact compared with other wool currency such as the NZ Dollar and the South African Rand which are not typically sensitive. The forecast over the next few weeks is sales will be 6% lower than this time last year potentially restricting supply and maintaining prices.

The catastrophic floods that have affected large parts of central and eastern Australia during the past couple of weeks are expected to disrupt autumn shearing schedules and the delivery of wool to market. DAMN it's hard work cooking in a kitchen that tips this much; the *Hans Hansson's* rolling about 30 degrees as we approach the South Orkneys. I'm attempting to prepare supper without ending up with the greater part of it spread over the range, floor and walls of the galley.

As we run into the lee of Signy Island, chased by the freshening gale two huge shapes appear in the murk; it's our objective, the krill trawler Saga Sea and the reefer La Manche.

Fair play to Hugh and the film crew, they were straight out there on the foredeck and filming the trawler and reefer as they made the rendezvous. They came back in half frozen and moderately soaked but pleased with the footage they'd got and very pleased with Dion's deft handling of the ship that allowed them to get the shots they wanted. There was no chance of transterring Hugh and company aboard the *Saga Sea* until the weather moderated, so we ducked into a reasonably sheltered anchorage off Borge Bay on Signy that is home to a small BAS base.

I took advantage of the calm to knock out pizzas and quiches to stow in the freezer for the next leg to South Georgia. Best laid plans and all but in the end we ate most of the pizza straight out of the oven.

In the afternoon the weather moderated and we headed out into the sound to catch up with some fin whales that had been reported out there. We managed to sneak up on one that was having a snooze after being pursued by a cruise ship all morning. We were very lucky to get so close to one of these shy giants.

In the evening we headed back out to the Saga Sea and with the help of their rescue boat we transferred Hugh, plus cameraman, sound man and director, all dry suited and life-jacketed like orange Michelin men across to her.

So that was that; the remainder of us sailed back to our cove on Signy and they headed out to trawl for krill.

A restful two days followed as we waited to rendezvous with her again. We also had a pleasant shore visit to Signy Base, stepping carefully round the score or so of moulting elephant seals that have taken up residence on the convenient walkways that surround the buildings.

One of the staff here has the unenviable job of going out every morning with broom and hosepipe to serub off the ordure that these blubbery neighbours perpetually spread over the walkways and up the walls.

Back aboard we mariners spent

the rest of the evening practicing our wit on our remaining companions as to how long it would take us to get Hugh off the trawler if the weather didn't moderate; 'Oooh dear, could be here for weeks and weeks chay' 'they'll have to be aboard until the next crew change' and so on.

Having retrieved Hugh and companions from the Saga Sea, we had a short but exciting (for Aidan who was driving the Zodiac at least) excursion to North Point, a big gentoo colony with a pretty interesting landing: fots of swell and rocks, no beach to speak of.

I have to add that Hugh is a champion scrounger. Having taken notice of my moaning about a shortage of onions he succeeded in piltering a whole sack of these precious objects from the galley on the Saga Sea. What a star!

# Page 13 Over the garden fence with Ginge Kidd

IT looks as though following a hot -but rather short- summer, winter has descended. What a shock to the system and not so good for the plants either.

It has been a busy couple of weeks for all that. Having picked up a nasty bout of the cold or whatever it is we have 'going around' this time. I thought some indoor work was called for instead, and having filled our deep freezers with fresh produce (and borrowed another for more) it seemed a good time to start the annual round of jams and chutnevs

Bill is very partial to a curried green tomato chutney and has been having a quiet moan about the lack of it since we finished the last jar a couple of months ago. I was able to make some more of that earlier than normal from some tomato plants which as the 'runts of the litter,' should have been thrown out, but I'm not good at doing that and so they ended up planted amongst the rows of lettuce, carrots and early beetroots in the tunnel. Against all expectations they thrived and were full of tomatoes! The problem is, I need the space they are occupying and so decided to remove the green tomatoes from them and pull the plants out; we do have more after all. Bill has now got his chutney now, loads of it, and others as well

Talking of tomatoes, 1 did wonder if the rest were going to get a chance to ripen this year, the weather having changed so rapidly. I do believe it will improve again but, if it doesn't, a warm window sill will help to ripen

them or, even better, a ripe banana placed in a paper bag or cardboard box with them helps them to ripen quite quickly.

The window sills in the porch are wide enough to hold my collection of wash jugs and china chamber-potties\_ Ďidn\*t they make some pretty but functional things in olden days? The potties now contain some regal pelarginiums (sometimes called geraniums, though those are actually hardy, and very pretty plants, out-

side) and 1 have some fuchsias to replace any that suffer as the days grow cooler. I'm not allowed to turn the porch into a garden have so to content myself just filling the availa-

days

bage - I chose 'flower of spring'and will grow them on and the winter lettuce for a little while, before planting some under cover and some outside. Surely those caterpillars and earwigs will depart soon?

We had a visiting dove for a little while, which loved the areas where the grass seed was available and found plenty here. Looking up the books it seems we had

a vagrant bird. I have not seen it for a few days, but haven't seen any feathers either so just hope the cats haven't found it.

I am not too enamoured with the idea of winter been so close but have to say it either is or, the plants are also confused, for the Autumn crocuses (colchicum) are starting to flower already and the hardy cyclamen are also putting on a show with their very delicate flowers. Some of the Liatris ( known as gay feathers because they flower from

the top down) a r e starting to flower also, as are this vear's n e w bulbs. Some h a v e been flowering for a while. b u t

quite disconcerting to see snowdrops in the middle of summer. I do have some already but you can never have too much of a good thing. Any red-hot-pokers (Kniphofias) left are pretty tattered and torn as the little finches swing off the flowers, for all the world looking like a (somewhat large) humming bird.

I will hopefully start digging out the polatoes next week. The few lifted so far are wonderful both in size and amounts. Hopefully, if the rest follow suit, we shall have a bumper crop this year


Some of the rose cuttings put in last month are already showing some roots; that should allow stacks of time for growth before the really bad weather comes. Meanwhile I shall continue putting more cuttings in. Ready to plant into the borders now are the various pinks and carnations grown from seed earlier. At the same time I will take some cuttings or 'pippins' off the existing ones in the borders which have flowered their little socks off. The primula seedlings and the delphinium 'cuttings' which are large enough to stop the inevitable slug attack will also be planted at this time. The very old leptospermum (tea tree) seeds which I'd tried before without any success have geminated well this time. As these are supposed to be pink and red flowered ones I'm hoping they will make it through the winter. They are considerably more tender than the white flowered ones we grow so succesfully here.

Bill has been trimming the eucalyptus hedges, which are lovely and thick now. Within the vegetable garden they have quite a drying effect which for us is good but I would not advise using them in a small vegetable garden. They are fine anywhere else though.

Our photograph this week shows Ginge's granddaughter Samantha at the Horticultural Show, with two prize-winning heads made from swedes that she grew herself in Ginge's garden. Proof, if it were needed, that vegetables you grow yourself can give pleasure even hefore they reach the table.





### Timerman lists 'illegal' companies

ARGENTINE Foreign Minister. Hector Timerman, has issued a list of companies that his government plans to prosecute as part of its action plan against what it describes as, "illicit exploration and exploitation activities for hydrocarbons in the South Atlantic."

All of the companies which currently hold Falkland Islands Government licences were mentioned along with some that have merely expressed interest.

Next in line come the suppliers of the two oil rigs so far used, the shipping companies supplying support vessels and oil-related cargo and finally the suppliers of financial and legal services to the oil effort.

The list includes some very big names like RBS, Merrill Lynch, Goldman Sachs, Credit Suisse and Standard Chartered Bank and some smaller names like local lawyers Kilmartin and Marlor.

Director of Mineral Resources, Stephen Luxton told Penguin News that FIG had no doubts about its legal right to develop their own resources. They were, "not particularly concerned," by Mr Timerman's threats as they did not see how Argentina could enforce its domestic legislation in a place to which it did not apply.

## Farmers recruited in coastal security

COAST watch, a mechanism by which information and intelligence can be shared in a formal manner between relevant Falklands' authorities is to be launched in the Islands.

Inspector Len McGill told Penguin News yesterday: "Historically there has existed, in the Falkland Islands, an expectation that land owners and occupiers of outlying islands and farms, on both East and West Falklands, would report sightings of vessels, people or suspicious activity."

Reports would then be made to the police, or if a vessel, then to Customs and Immigration. Since the 1982 War and the creation of the Fisheries Department, reports are sometimes made direct to the Fisheries Department often using modern communications like the internet.

Inspector McGill noted that local land owners and occupiers of outlying islands and farms are very familiar with their land and coast lines and are very observant: "They tend to see anything unusual or suspicious as well as the more obvious movement of small vessels such as yachts. They are without a doubt the best resource available to detect and report any suspicious activity or threat to the waters, coast line and outlying areas of the Falkland Islands. The introduction of Coast Watch is the means by which this resource can be fully utilised and every person in the Falkland Islands becomes involved in the safety and security of our homeland."

The National Intelligence Model (NIM) provides a mechanism by which information and intelligence can be shared in a formal manner between the Royal Falkland Islands Police, Customs and Immigration and other agencies and authorities.

Inspector McGill said, "The primary function of NIM is to collect, collate and share information and intelligence to enable the identification of criminal or unlawful activity and enable the targeting of resources.

"Information and intelligence received by the Royal Falkland Islands Police through Coast Watch, improving the intelligence picture to all."

To encourage the reporting of suspicious activity and to standardise reporting, Coast Watch has been developed. It consists of a double sided A4 sheet which is capable of being completed online and submitted electronically. Farms and islands will be supplied with the form in hard copy and electronic form. ### **Drilling resumed**

DIRECTOR of Mineral Resources, Stephen Euxton reported to the Mineral Resources Committee meeting on Wednesday that drilling had resumed on the Lerv Eriksson after a delay of some weeks caused by technical problems. The rig spudded Darwin East-1, first well of its four-well campaign for Borders & Southern Petroleum plc on January 31. 2012 and was originally expected to complete in around 45 days On completion of the Darwin East-1 well, the rig will move to drill the Stebbing prospect for Borders and Southern before drilling two wells for Falkland Oil & Gas Ltd in their acreage

### **Review for April**

THE Chief Executive Keith Padgett's report on the Review of the Review of Government will be placed before Executive Council in April he confirmed at the public meeting on Monday. Mr Padgett said he had consid-

### Comment by Deputy Editor John Fowler

"TO BE bothered OR NOT TO BE bothered? That is the question. Whether t'is nobler in the mind to suffer the slings and arrows of outrageous politicians, journalists and aged celebrities on the make, or to take arms against a sea of politically-inspired nonsense and, by opposing, maybe help to end it."

With apologies to the Bard of Stratford-on-Avon for messing about with his most famous soliloquy, but maybe the strain of the last couple of weeks is beginning to show. As our editor, Lisa, commented recently, sometimes it has seemed that every time the phone rings or the door opens, there's another journalist from some other country asking us to react to another piece of idiocy from across the water or elsewhere.

We should not whinge. While it would be easy enough for us to be permanently, "in a meeting," and thus unavailable for comment, as it is easy for others to say that they have, "nothing to say," whenever a microphone is thrust under their nose, the current explosion of media attention is turning out to be the greatest opportunity we in the Falkland Islands have ever had to present our case to the world and, as such, should be exploited and not wasted.

While a poll conducted for the Guardian Newspaper across all social classes and regions in Britain by opinion researchers ICM, shows 61 per cent of the population believing that Britain should protect the Falkland Islands regardless of cost. 49 percent of voters aged from 18 to 24 say they support the possibility of a handover, while only 39 per cent take the contrary view.

So what do we do about this? Waving flags is one thing, (though personally I worry that too much waving of the Union Flag rather than the Falkland Islands flag can be misinterpreted), speeches by our elected representatives and British politicians are also important, but there is no substitute for ordinary people talking straightforwardly and honestly about how they see things.

For this reason I would like to congratulate all those who represented the Falkland Islands so well in the BBC's World Have Your Say live discussions this week. Occasionally breaks in the discussion for news and historical background preventing an immediate response to some of the comments made by the participants in Argentina may have made it a frustrating experience, but in public relations terms, it was beyond price.

While handing out bouquets, one is also due to the Standard Chartered Bank for their sponsorship and organisation of the Stanley Marathon. Personally I can't understand why anyone would want to run so far along a road when taxis here are so cheap, but marathons everywhere attract athletes and media attention, bringing in their wake good news for hotels, restaurants and other tourism-related businesses. While Stanley may never challenge London as a venue, as the group of Japanese competitors illustrated, the world's most southerly marathon is already attracting international interest which will surely grow.



THE road between Mount Pleasant Complex and the training area on Onion Range has been completed by the Public Works Department.

A spokesperson for the British Forces in the Falklands said: "A much-needed new road has been built linking the Mount Pleasant Complex, home to British Forces South Atlantic Islands and Onion Range Camp ensuring that vital kit and equipment can be moved between the two locations with ease. Previous to the road's completion, supplies had to be taken in by helicopter or by tracked vehicle."

The construction process was complicated with the route having to be cleared for any unexploded ordnance or debris. The final hurdle was the river that runs along the edge of Onion Range Camp; crossed by a complex culvert and river diversion before the road could be completed.

The new road is 18 kilometres in length and the project took four years from start to finish. The 40 individuals involved with the project worked long and hard over the spring and summer months for the last four years, with most of the workers living in a makeshift camp.

Simon Catton, the road engineer said: "The camp is now being removed, with parts to be used to continue to support road works, but the kitchen and a second unit will be moving to Stanley House to provide a much needed temporary facility for the Infant and Junior School

The forces spokesperson added: "A special mention needs to go to Nunker Summers, the foreman of the project, who has been with the project the whole way from start to finish, through all the trials and tribulations that the project has had to offer.

"Onion Range road will allow for essential maintenance to be carried out in the camp at the range. British Forces South Atlantic Islands are delighted to take over the new road.

"The project demonstrates the enduring co-operation and partnership between British Forces South Atlantic Islands and the Falkland Islands Government

"The new road will allow for essential maintenance on the aging generator that powers the camp at Onion Range. If the maintenance was not completed the generator would eventually stop working resulting in the camp being without any form of electricity. This would mean anyone on the camp would be without fresh water and sanitary facilities, rendering the camp unliveable."

Wing Commander Colin Winwood, the officer in charge of Theatre training for British Forces South Atlantic Islands said: "We are extremely pleased to see this road completed as it means that we can continue to use the Onion Range facility to its full potential."

He added "without this road we would be unable to carry out essential maintenance to the site."

# Falklands to Trinidad for Cowrie crew

FORMER King Edward Memorial Hospital Doctor, Richard Davies, is embarking on a sailing adventure of a life time.

Richard who spent nearly fourteen years in the Islands and also served as a Member of Legislative Assembly left in 2010, but has returned to sail his 21 year old yacht *Cowrie* to Trinidad in the Caribbean.

Richard will sail via St Helena with a crew consisting of his brother Alan, his sister-in-law Dorothy, and environmentalist Helen Otley who also worked in the Falkland Islands for several years.

The crew is hopeful that the weather will be kind to them, however, he told Penguin News work experience journalist Tessa Berntsen this week he anticipated the first week would be slightly rough.

The trip should take around 60 days using sails for most of the journey and only using the small Yanmar engine for getting in and out of docks.

In order to keep to schedule and

sail the 3,500 miles the crew will said around 110 miles per day.

The *Cowrie* gang is reasonably confident things will run smoothly. Alan having spent a great deal of time maintaining the engine and, just as importantly, the cooker. The *Cowrie* has the additional help of small strong storm sails and a drogue or small sea anchor.

This isn't Richard's first sea journey. In 1996 he and his wife at the time Sarah, sailed the yacht from UK to the Falklands, prior to Richard taking up his role as doctor. Richard said: "There shouldn't be any major problems because everyone knows their way around the deck."

The vessel also has a well stocked first aid kit and with a doctor on board what could go wrong?

The crew feels the biggest challenge will be the lack of space; in such limited confines everyone will have to, "get on very well."

Richard is the happy owner of a fresh water maker; thus if they should run out, salt water can be pumped into the device, and fresh water the result.

When arriving in Trinidad Richard and his crew will fly back to their homes until some time next year when Richard hopes to be able to sail the yacht through the Panama Canal and return to New Zealand.

Richard asked that his thanks be passed to everyone who had helped in the preparation for the trip and in particular to Carl and Diane, Gordon, Ian, Bobby, Neil and Joost and Janet.

No matter how difficult it is to make time in busy lives that involvement can make a tremendous difference to your children's application and achievement in a competitive world. Working with them and their teachers gives them the best possible chance of a happy fulfilling future.

# Defra funding for raptors project

THE Conservation of Falkland Islands Raptors Project aimed at reducing conflicts with sheep farming, a Darwin-funded project, was co-ordinated in 2010 with Islander Sam Cockwell employed as the project officer.

The aim of this was to test the feasibility of a longer-term project, looking in depth at the populations of the main raptors on the Falklands (turkey vultures, southern caracaras, striated caracaras), their interactions with livestock, and people's attitudes to the birds.

The Department for Environment Food and Rural Affairs (Defra) recently announced that this new Darwin project has been successful in gaining funding and will run for three years. The results of the scientific data gained will be combined with the information on people's attitudes to produce a 'Plan of Action for Managing Conflicts Between Raptors and Rural Livelihoods'. It will also result in a 'Species Action Plan for the Striated Caracara (Johnny rook), one of the rarest birds of prey in the world. Collectively, these outputs will enable policy

makers to determine the best management strategies for looking after these species and reducing conflicts.

The project will be a partnership of many organisations, namely Falklands Conservation, FIG Environmental Planning Department, Department of Agriculture, Rural Business Association, Royal Zoological Society of Scotland, Royal Society for the Protection of Birds, Hawk Mountain Sanctuary, Wildlife Conservation Society, Boise State University, and EDM International Ltd.

During a celebration this month held at London Zoo to mark the 20th anniversary of the Darwin Initiative, Environment Secretary Caroline Spelman said: "We have seen the Darwin Initiative deliver many success stories, and I believe it will help us achieve our ambition of being the first generation to leave the environment in a better condition than we found it."

The Darwin Raptor Project will start in April 2012 and Falklands Conservation is currently advertising for the post of project officer.

### Climate change?

THE United Kingdom Falklands Trust (UKFIT) is undertaking a project to investigate climate change in the Falkland Islands.

The project started in late 2010 and involves four key parts. The first two include the acquisition and collation of relevant weather records for the region and the submission of the data for analysis. Another aspect comprises climate modelling to provide further detailed predictions of possible future climates and a sectoral review to analyse how climate change might impact on governance and planning in the Falklands

### Gentoos double

THE number of gentoo penguin breeding pairs in the Falklands has doubled according to the most recent census, it was noted at the Environmental Committee meeting this week. This is compared with the number counted during the last census in 2005.

The Falkland Islands gentoo population is now estimated to be 132,321 breeding pairs, the largest number reported since the first estimate was generated in 1933. The Falkland Islands is likely to be the largest component of the global population.

### **Unplanned** flight

A GULF Stream 500 aircraft made an unscheduled visit to Mount Pleasant on Sunday. The aircraft, which flew from Miami. USA, transported four divers to the Falklands in order for them to undertake work on the krill vessel Saga Sea which had experienced a damaged propellor. The aircraft left again on Wednesday.

Land and corral returned to the Islands' community


BACTEC's land release project is in its final stages and is due to be completed on March 24. At the outset of the project the contract target was to process and release some 2,370,000 sq m of Stanley Common for public access and use. The rate of clearance has been greater than anticipated due to favourable weather and low level of ordnance contamination, as a direct result of which an area of just over 3,700,000 sq m will be released. The opening ceremony will take place on Monday March 26.

The area which will be released does, however, contain four minefields. These four minefields have been re-fenced and new mine signs attached. Prior to the construction of the new fences the perimeter of each minefield was flailed with a mechanical flail and subjected to battle area clearance procedures. The new fences have been constructed just outside the old fences on the area which had been flailed. This has been done as an additional safety measure. The old minefield fences have been left in situ to facilitate the future clearance of the minefields.

As an integral part of the project a series of new fences have been constructed to restrict access to part of the area which remains a hazardous area and contains mines. The new fences have been sited to allow access to both Mile and Round Ponds from the East. It unfortunately will not be possible to access Mile and Round Ponds from the West.

The corral lies within the area which will be released for public access.

The 17 Zimbabwean deminers under the control of the BACTEC Operations Manager, Phillimon Gonamombe have achieved excellent progress, assisted by favourable weather. During BAC-TEC's mine clearance project in 2009/10 we lost over 20% of



working time due to bad weather resulting in unsafe working conditions for mine clearance.

Andy Frizzell, who set up and ran the project initially, had to return to Mozambique early in March and his role as Project Manager was taken over by myself, Guy Lucas.

Throughout the project we have worked very closely with the Demining Project Office (DPO) whose main role has been to ensure all aspects of our work have been carried out to the required standards and in accordance with the FCO contract.

Robin Swanson MBE, DPO Programme Manager said this week, "BACTEC has applied all the right quality measures during this contract so the community should have absolute confidence in their work. They have worked very hard and achieved almost double the minimum they were contracted to do. This phase alone will release about 17% of the area currently prohibited by minefield fences and unavailable for social use across the Islands."

As the Falklands autumn draws near the BACTEC team are completing the remaining tasks ready for the opening ceremony on March 26, I would like to express my most sincere thanks to the community on behalf of BAC-TEC and our Zimbabwean deminers, for the support and hospitality shown to us from the day we arrived at MPA on January 1. We have all felt very much part of the community and hope to be able to return in the near future to carry out further mine clearance and land release projects.

From a personal perspective I was here in 1982 as the EOD Squadron Commander and established the post conflict Tri-Service EOD detachment. Since then as CEO of BACTEC I have been responsible for both the BACTEC 2009/10 and current contracts. I have enjoyed being part of the process of removing the mines and ordnance blight since 1982 and am now experiencing the satisfaction of seeing formerly blighted land being returned to the community.

A route to the corral and car parking will be clearly marked. Please make your way to the car park, some 700m to the west of the water tanks, at the top of the track leading to Mullet creek and the old pump house. You will be directed from there to a signed and marked route leading to the corral and adjacent parking.

# A summer of work for Conservation

TWENTY two years into the seabird monitoring programme those involved in this summer's project have announced. "another successful year in terms of breeding pairs and chicks produced."

It is likely that the warm and dry start to the season helped not only the birds, but assisted the field workers and volunteers too.

Sarah Crofis takes up the story: Rockhopper penguins were tracked at Steeple Jason during the breeding season and sea lions tracked from the north camp coast using satellite and GPS devices. Maps and more information on these projects can be found on our website.

Jonathon Handley from Nelson Mandela University. South Africa spent the summer studying the ecology of gentoo penguins, with help from the John Cheek Trust. Their underwater world was revealed by using small lightweight video cameras attached to the penguin's back, a first for the Falklands.

A three year UK DEFRA funded invasive plants project brought Richard Lewis from Kew Gardens to survey and control invasive plants and to increase local capacity by training a local assistant. Brian Summers tackled the mouse-cared hawkweed around Port Stephens and was recently

funded by FIG Environmental Study Budget to clear thistles around Stanley.

Rebecca Upson has been working from Kew Gardens in the UK writing up the four year plants project she recently completed in the Islands. Rebecca is updating the plant Red List and producing ID guides for all nationally threatened species - shortly to be uploaded on the FC website. Rebecca has almost completed Species Action Plans for all 31 nationally threatened plants.

Clare Cockwell working on the Protected Areas Project, funded by the Overseas Territories Environmental Programme, is currently hosting a series of public meetings to stimulate feedback on protected areas in the Islands. In addition Clare has been working with IJS and Camp Education with a focus on art and Falkland landscapes.

landscapes. The Watch Group with 50 members and sponsored by Standard Chartered Bank has explored: Sea Lion Is., Pt. Stephens, Darwin, Pt. Edgar, Pebble Is., Weddell Is., EBF and Fitzroy with Bleaker Is. and Shallow Bay visits still to come. Over the next few weeks they will be out whale watching.

Coming up this winter: Initiation of a raptor project which aims to provide a sound basis for government policy regarding management of conflicts between raptors with rural livelihoods in the Falklands, particularly sheep farming. Einked to this, the wellknown naturalist Robin Woods is set to visit Steeple Jason studying the behaviour of striated caracara on an island without sheep.

A second team, led by the RSPB working with the Wildlife Conservation Society, will be investigating the feasibility of eradicating mice from Steeple Jason, the island's only introduced mammalian predator.

### **Census** Sunday 15th April 2012

### What and When?

The Falkland Islands Census will take place on Sunday 15th April 2012. The registration process for the Census is being conducted during March.

### What do I need to do?

Please make sure that your household has registered to complete the census, either online at www.census.gov.fk, or by contacting the FIG Policy Unit to request a paper census form.

All known households in Stanley, Camp, and civilian occupied households at MPC should now have received a census registration letter and Census User Guide with instructions for registering your household to complete the census. Households were asked to register for the census by Friday 23rd March 2012. Please contact the FIG Policy Unit if your household has not yet received a Census Registration Letter and User Guide or has been unable to register to complete the census.

If you have already registered to complete the census you will receive further instructions on completing the census closer to Census Night (Sunday 15th April). Many thanks for registering.

### What if I live in shared accommodation?

If you are a resident in shared accommodation (for example Lookout Lodge, the YMCA or contractors' accommodation at MPC), you should not have received a household census registration letter and do not need to do anything at this stage. The Policy Unit will contact the Managers' Landlords of this accommodation to organise census registration.

EGG numbers from the older girls are decreasing, but the pullets are sneaking a few out now so hopefully I will be OK for eggs over the winter. Most of the older girls are in various stages of moult so I have started giving them warm feeds.

I'll start giving them corn too in the evening as the nights get longer. I don't bother in the summer months as they get plenty of forage food and are out and about until nearly dark, and up again at the erack of dawn, so they get lots of good nutrition.

In the winter when they go to roost early, a crop full of corn to go to bed on sees them through the long cold nights. The corn in the crop heats up with their own body heat and acts as a personal radiator. Corn is also slow to digest, so keeps the night hunger at bay. We have had a few frosts here and there has been a thin layer of ice on the water buckets. At this thickness the hens can break it themselves, but you will need to break the ice on their water as the winter draws in.

I often get around with a bucket of hot water in the morning to top up their drinkers. The birds (including robins) all seem to appreciate the warm drink.

A couple of months ago someone wanted to buy some fertile eggs to set under a broody hen. They asked if 1 sexed the eggs before selecting for incubation. As far as 1 was aware this couldn't be done so my answer was no. So 1 was intrigued to see the gold ring on a thread being held over each egg to determine its sex.

All boys were rejected and the female eggs taken and set. Apparently they had a good hatch (9 out of 12) but as yet we don't know the sex.

Anyway, I thought I would have a go with a breed that I know the boys from the girls at hatching by their down colour. So, after trying out my new skill by suspending a ring over the dog, daughter (and her baby bump), son in law, husband and various livestock to check that the ring was doing the right thing (swing or circle), 1 put 18 'girls' in the incubator ..... and waited ..... I guess I haven't got the gift as they were a mixed bag at hatching (predominantly boys).


### Time change historic view

LOCAL historian Joan Spruce recently came upon the written thoughts of Arthur F. Cobb (penned while living on Bleaker Island, somewhere between the two World Wars) on the subject of summer time and time changes.

Mrs Spruce said, "It may not solve the argument, but gives a good flavour of life in Camp at the time."

Mr Cobb writes: Roughly speaking, time in the Falklands is 4 hours behind that in England, if one wishes to think of what friends may be doing at certain hours. That was in the good old days, but now with Summer Time' at home we are five hours behind in our winter, and with our summer-time during the English winter, we catch up to only three hours behind Greenwich time. It was only during the war (1914-18) that an hour's extra daylight was introduced from mornings to evenings in Stanley, presumably to save parathin and candles. But outside Stanley in the camps the clocks have from time immemorial been manipulated to suit the individual whim of each farmer or manager, according to the season and the requirements of the work.

If it is the custom at one settlement to go to bed in summer at 8.30 prompt, there is no need to advance the clocks, or the sunlight would interfere with those who were unable to fall asleep 'anywhere', as the expression is in Sussex. On the other hand, at some neighbouring place gardening up to 10.00 p.m. may be fashionable, well and good, by monkeying the clocks on a couple of hours, this profitable pastime can be indulged for several months.



A captain of a local vessel arriving during the night never knows whether going ashore he will find the people of the place just off to breakfast or after a two hour spell of work, or perhaps still in bed sleeping off their horticultural exertions of the night before. Riding from one place to another, some fast travellers have been known to arrive before they started, and this discrepancy of the clocks possibly accounts for not a few of the record trips of which one hears.

Even a whole day has sometimes been lost and never satisfactorily found.

Once, two boys who had been left alone on this island, on our return in the cutter, were firmly convinced that it was Monday, while we happened to know that it was Tuesday. One of them in fact refused to believe he was wrong till some weeks later he crossed to the Mainland (in this case Lafonia and not the South American Mainland) and ran ahead of the others to ask the shepherd what day it was.

On one occasion a schooner came in for wool on a Sunday. The captain of all people thinking it was Monday, sent his men ashore. The shore people thought he was in a hurry, but wishing as usual to humour the captain in view of probable future favours, rolled down the wool without further comment. The crew, who had said nothing beforehand, claimed overtime wages on getting back to the ship, for working on a Sunday, much to the captain's annoyance. Another time on the Mainland

a shepherd rode into the settlement to get his week's stores and news, only to find the store shut, most people asleep, and that it was Sunday. He was quite sure it was Saturday because he "had left the old woman scrubbing out at home", and was very wroth because he had missed his chance of getting a bottle of whiskey on this last Saturday of the month.

But now in these days of telephones on many of the farms, and wireless messages between East and West Falklands, in order to lessen the confusion somewhat, Stanley time is not adhered to generally, that is, on the Mainland. On the Islands or where there are no telephones, it is different and we can divide up our 24 hours as we please.

In some Camp houses there are marks cut in the window sash at which the sun casts a shadow from a nail at noon, this is not so bad if the watches and clocks choose a sunny day to go on strike, otherwise one has to guess. Arthur F Cobb

### Billie recalls war and Wales at Eisteddfod

BILLIE Davies (14), great niece of Falklands pilot, the late lan Campbell, won first prize at Eisteddfod to celebrate St David's Day in Wales, with an article on Falklands War veteran Simon Weston, her Great Aunt Nadine Campbell told Penguin News.

One of the topics of the Eisteddfod was 'A significant event for the Welsh people in the past century'.

Billie who has visited the Falklands described how, "British servicemen lost their lives on board the Sir Galahad.

She wrote: "The Sir *Galahad* and *Sir Tristram* were anchored off Fitzroy in Port Pleasant when they were bombed in a surprise attack by five Argentine Skyhawks. The ship had almost finished its mission to move support troops when the attack took place.

"The *Sir Galahad* went up in flames and smoke almost immediately and it was clear that some wouldn't survive the attack."

She added: "This was a dark day for Wales, as in amongst the British servicemen were many Welsh soldiers.

"Simon Weston was one of the Welsh survivors of the attack. He was badly injured and had many serious burns. He endured years of reconstructive surgery, including over 70 major operations and surgical procedures. Skin from all over his body had to be taken to reconstruct his face. Yet he still lives on today and is one of Wales most respected men."

Billie wrote, "I chose to write about the Sir *Galahad* as I have been to see the memorial and while visiting in 2008 I saw Simon Weston himself. Also on my visit I found out a lot of my family history. My great uncle lan Campbell is one of a few people in the Islands to have a street named after him.

"He was a pilot and in 1976 an accident occurred and unfortunately my great uncle did not survive, so I think it is very appropriate to write about the tragedies of the 1982 Sir *Galahad* bombing." Live history for students on Longdon

AS part of 'Falklands 30', both year 9 classes, along with members of staff from the Falkland Islands Community School took a walk and climb up Mount Longdon last week in order to learn about historic events surrounding the area in relation to the 1982 conflict.

Student Tamsin McLeod reported, "a wreath was carefully carried along as both groups walked two different paths dotted around with untold events of the battles."

Events were explained as the group proceeded up the mountain.

"Stopping before a lunch break one group retraced the steps of two photos taken from 1982. After a detailed search looking at rocks and trying to picture if the photo was taken there or somewhere else, eventually the location was identified and the group took time for a few moments of deep reflection about what had happened: the

lives lost, bravery won."

Tamsin said one of the students commented, "Our footsteps are crossing over the footsteps of the people that fought here. We are literally crossing paths with our own history."

Tamsin added, "The wreath was placed at the summit to sit alongside names and photos of those fallen below the cross as the wind blew in our faces. We remembered the twenty-three that were killed there, and the others that fought and survived this battle on both sides.

"Many thanks to FICS members of staff and FIDF (Thanks Pete Biggs) who came out with us and braved the wind for a historic lesson which we will always remember; many thanks and much appreciation from us all "

### Sue's 400k Kenyan adventure for charity

FALKLANDS-born Sue Elmes (nee McKay) survived bumps, bruises and temperatures of almost 40 degrees C to raise an amazing £3,800 for charity with a 400k cycle ride through Kenya.

Penguin News reported some time ago Sue's intention to join a group of other ladies in the feat, the overall result being  $\pounds 1,300,000$  divided between three different charities: Breast Cancer Care, Jo's Trust and Fighting cervical Cancer and Ovarian Cancer Action

Sue, who has only one lung as a result of contracting Hydatid cyst in the Falklands as a child, as well as a permanently damaged hand, joined a group of 70 other women of all ages. They were the second group to undertake the challenge in November 2011, which passed through the Aberdare and Kerio Valley National Parks crossing the Equator on the way, as well as climbing the Elgeyo escarpment (26km's of constant climb-

## Falklands first 'international' archery competition

AN INTERNATIONAL Competition, the first for the Falklands Archery Association was held on Sunday March 18 in the Stanley Leisure Centre. Fourteen members took up the challenge of a virtual shoot against the Nonsuch Bowmen of Ewell, Surry, England. Nonsuch Bowmen opted for a handicapped indoor Portsmouth shoot of 60 arrows plus six sighters per archer on 60cm faces.







# Uruguay flight ready to roll

DESPITE what he described as "complications" caused by indirect pressure from Argentina, the Vice President of the Uruguay-British Chamber of Commerce, Guillermo Wild assured Penguin News yesterday that a cargo plane was ready with all permissions granted to fly to the Falklands on April 13

The offer of such a flight by a Uruguayan company had been reported in the British newspaper. The Sun, though the paper had got it wrong that a trade mission from Uruguay was also due to arrive in the Islands shortly.

### Invitation to laureates

MEMBER of the Falkland Islands Legislative Assembly (MLA) Sharon Halford has expressed disappointment at this week's news that six Nobel Peace Prize winners urged the UK Government to open negotiations with Argentina over sovereignty of the Falkland Islands.

MLA Halford said, "As Falkland Islanders, we have no doubt as to our right to selfdetermination, and our sovereignty is not a matter that is up for discussion.

"As people who have won the Peace Prize for their work championing human rights, we would hope that they would consider the rights of the Falkland Islanders as paramount in this issue. We will be writing to each of the authors of the letter, explaining some of the issues that may have been overlooked or misunderstood, and encouraging them, as with all others, to come and visit us before reaching any conclusions."

The letter, posted on the website of Argentine laureate Ado-Ho Perez Esquivel, calls on the UK to, "review the British government's position of refusing to dialogue on this matter.

The other laureates to sign the letter are Rigoberta Menchu of Guatemala, Mairead Maguire of Ireland, South African Desmond Tutu, US national Jody Williams, and Iran's Shirin Ebadi. Mr Wild confirmed that a considerable number of Uruguayan businesses were interested in establishing commercial links with the Islands.

The difficulty they had experienced was, in his words, "getting hold of the right people," and putting together a sufficient amount of cargo in both directions to make the flight viable.

Similar concerns were expressed by the Chairman of the Falkland Islands Chamber of Commerce, Roger Spink, who said the Chamber welcomed the Uruguayan interest, but wondered whether there would be sufficient volumes of cargo available to sustain a regular air freight service.

In fact, according to Guillermo Wild, a regular scheduled flight would in all probability not be possible as permission would have to be sought from Argentina, but there was no prohibition in existence for Uruguayan Civil Aviation to organise flights on a charter basis.

In Argentina, said Mr Wild, there seemed to be the belief that an embargo on trade with the Falklands and even with Great Britain was in place, but this was

## **Black Pig is latest unlikely war hero**

WHILE the nearness to April 1 suggests caution, Mercopress yesterday reported that a vessel which once graced, or maybe disgraced, Stanley Harbour is about to join former LADE airline clerk Alec Betts on the list of unlikely Argentine war heroes.

According to the report, an Argentine extremist group based in Uruguay is planning to 'capture' a vessel which was involved in the Falklands conflict.

The group called Quebracho is described by Mercopress as an extremist political and social alliance born in Argentina in 1996, fusing left-wing Peronists, Marxist, Trotskyite and Leninist groups.

The vessel is Audax II which operates in Montevideo as an auxiliary support vessel. In the Falklands as the Yehuin it was one of four local vessels used by the Argentine Navy during the 1982 War and as such is now considered a war hero. The stated mission of the Quebrachos is to return the true identity and flag to the vessel but they seem to be unaware of the range of choice this gives them.

Although Yehuin came to the Falklands in peace time under the Argentine flag, she was built in Germany in 1967 and as Millerntorn served first as a North Sea oil supply vessel. After the Argentine defeat, she served under the white ensign for a while as HMS Falkland Sound, when she was captained by a British naval officer who later, as Commodore Philip Thicknesse was to become Commander British Forces South Atlantic Islands.

Her naval days over, the vessel, known locally as *The Black Pig*, was acquired by the FIC as a fuel barge, before being bought by Steve Beldon, who imported two young Dutchmen, Joost Pompert and Rob Yssel to get her back into working order before selling her in Uruguay in 1993. not the case.

He assured Penguin News that there was no legal impediment for the trade between Uruguay and the disputed territory.

Acting General Manager of the Falkland Islands Development Corporation (FIDC), Nick Tennant, said he was unaware of any direct communication between the Corporation and the Uruguay-British Chamber of Commerce, but was sure that the F1DC would welcome such contact, particularly from Uruguayan companies wishing to invest in the Falkland Islands.

### No worries

UK's Defence Secretary Philip Hammond said that the Islands, "do not face a current credible military threat from Argentina," and remembered that, "Argentine Mirage air-combat fighters do not represent a real menace to the Islands, which are well defended by the way too powerful RAF Typhoon jets."

Mr Hammond stated this week there was no need to increase the British military deployment to the Islands: "People must remember that Argentina hasn't bought a single combat jet since 1982, hence they still have the old Mirage jets used during the armed conflict. On the contrary, we have air superiority as we have Typhoon jets, which are the most advanced combat aircraft in the world, with the air base located on the very same Islands."

### SAR out of service

MINISTER of State for the Armed Forces Nick Harvey confirmed that RAF Sea King helicopters will go out of service no later than March 31, 2016.

Responding to a question from Madeleine Moon MP, Mr Harvey said, "The Ministry of Defence is currently examining alternative means of supplying a search and rescue helicopter capability in the Falkland Islands from 2016 onwards.

"This project will consider all options to determine which would best deliver this capability, and no decisions have yet been made."

a solution to their political difficulties. Our favourite this week concluded: 'Your population is too small and this is partly why Argentina is still pursing their sovereignty claim. It is possible to ignore or re-home 3000 people, but it's not possible to ignore or re-home 30.000 people. The solution 1 think is a baby boom, I'm not sure on the best advice on how to start one?

We assumed his uncertainty was with regard to how a baby boom might be encouraged, as opposed to the precise process that leads to ferilisation, but that apart, his point was a reasonable one: not necessarily directly with regard to the sovereignty dispute, but in terms of the progress and development of the Falklands as a whole

As it happens the government probably doesn't need to be haranguing our young female population to start flushing away their various contraceptive paraphernalia - in fact if the (excuse the pun) bulging Infant and Junior School is anything to go by, they're already doing an excellent job in providing the Islands with future generations. However, if we truly are serious about a future that boasts new industries, economic growth and of course a re-populated rural sector, then the only way to do that is with more people.

Of course there's the much debated question - do we continue tortoise-like with a trickle of immigration, a busy stork and seasonal or lower paid foreign workers, a few of whom might decide to become citizens of the Falklands? Or do we get down to the nitty-gritty of a plan that whole heartedly and pro-actively encourages people to the Falklands who will make a positive and long term contribution?

Yes, the concept of a deliberately planned population increase must be examined in conjunction with other Islands' strategies, and in particular with sectors such as housing, health and education; but why do I get the feeling we are being so ponderously 'strategic' in our planning that the weight of caution might ultimately prevent even a shuffle forward, let alone a few tentative steps.

Or perhaps we should just stick with being an excluisve little club tell me what you think.

### Nuclear missiles 'baseless' claim

THE Deputy Prime Minister Nick Clegg has denied claims by Argentina that Trident nuclear missiles were being carried on board a Royal Navy submarine deployed to the region

Mr Clegg dismissed the, "baseless insinuations," made by Hec-Timerman, the Argentine tor Foreign Minister, at the international Nuclear Security Summit in Seoul, South Korea

Mr Timerman claimed last month that the UK had despatched a Trafalgar class submarine to the region.

The MoD refused to confirm or deny the deployment at the time. but Mr Timerman told the United Nations that Britain had in fact sent a nuclear-armed Vanguard class submarine in violation of the Treaty of Tlatelolco, which guarantees Latin America as a nuclear weapons-free zone

Timerman produced maps and photographs to back up his claims. stating that the nuclear submarine posed a threat to regional security.

Despite British denials, officials said Mr Timerman had repeated the allegation at Tuesday's meeting in Seoul.

But Mr Clegg, who lead the

British delegation at the summit, strongly rejected the claim.

He said that while Britain did not make public the movements of its submarine fleet, it respected the obligations of the protocols to the Treaty in 1969, which guarantees a nuclear weapons-free zone covering Latin America and the Caribbean

### Fire at Megabid

I will therefore now be the Chair until the end of April 2012."

### Dog attack

THE Magistrate's Court heard on Wednesday a civil complaint brought by the RFIP against Dianne Freeman under the provisions of the Dogs Ordinance 1944. On February 17, a jogger. Lauren Grant, who had been running past the Freeman's property. had been attacked by a dog. Jim. Ms Grant had sustained an injury to her leg which it was felt would leave a permanent sear. As a result the police had made a complaint to the court claiming that the dog was, "dangerous and not kept under proper control." and requested the court make an order that the dog be destroyed or alternatively that it be kept under proper control. The Senior Magistrate said that the court did find that the unprovoked nature and severity of the attack was such so as to leave little doubt that Jim was dangerous but that the evidence before the court was that Jim was now under proper control and so the court had no power to make any order at all

### Licence lost

TOM Elsby was disqualified from driving for 18 months and fined a total of £535 for driving under the influence of alcohol on the Stanley to Darwin Road on March 17. Mr Elsby was found to have 71 me of alcohol to 100 ml of breath. The court took into account that Mr Elsby had pulled over and parked in order to sleep, however, the Senior Magistrate described him as, "a blithering idiot," adding that he could have killed other people. Mr Elsby appeared in court on Thursday.

### Licence returned

JUNE Wade in court on Wednesday applied to have her driving licence restored. Mrs Wade was convicted of drink driving in 2007 and April 2010. In 2010 she received a driving disqualification for three years. She asked for her licence to be returned to her due to her medical and social needs. Senior Magistrate Carl Gumsley approved the application. (FIRS)

MLA Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

THE journalists continue to arrive from around the world and no matter how much we are boring ourselves with repetition, to many of them it is a great opportunity to learn something about a country many know nothing about. It is very encouraging that so many international journalists are willing to commit so much time to make the journey and to be so open-minded when they arrive, unlike the occasional British tabloid writers, who just look for quotes to support a pre-written sensationalist story

This week and next we have over fifty Executive Council papers to consider, more than half of them budget related. I have tried to reduce them to digestible heaps, first skimming through to see which are straightforward and which are more complex and in need of more detailed study and research. There is no doubt that MLAs' workload is still increasing and with the need to send representatives overseas more frequently some of us wonder whether in future we will need one or two more members to spread the workload and ensure that a good number are left 'minding the shop' when several overseas conferences clash. We also need time to work on policy and plans, difficult when we are so preoccupied with so many day to day issues.

Select Committee is due to meet to discuss the capital programme. as always we have to agree what are our priorities. In other budget areas there will be difficult decisions to make; as we try to maintain and improve standards in Health and Education and create space for our growing population there is almost invariably a price to be paid. In some departments years of restricted spending have created a backlog of equipment and structures needing replacement or refurbishment. We are often asking more in terms of delivery of services without providing more resources so must be aware that some departments are at full stretch. We have been careful not to build any calculation of potential oil revenues into our planning process but I fear that some have become a little overexcited by the hype.

### Antarctic alien species invasion

SEEDS attached to Antarctic visitors' clothing and bags may introduce invasive alien plant species that could threaten the continent's ecosystems, according to research published in the journal Proceedings of the National Academy of Science (PNAS).

An international team of scientists, sampled, identified and mapped the sources and destinations of more than 2,600 plant propagules; structures like seeds or plant fragments that allowed plant to establish, hitching a ride to Antarctica on scientists and tourists during 2007-2008.

The researchers assessed the likelihood that these alien species would survive and establish in Antarctica, both now and by the year 2100.

Lead author Prof. Steven Chown said: "We wanted to assess the risks for Antarctica as a whole, by finding out which seeds are being brought in, where they originate from and where they are most likely to establish."

Although the authors found that the average visitor carries less than 10 seeds to the Antarctic, several alien species have already become established on the Western Antarctic Peninsula, in a region where future climate-related changes along the coast are likely to aid the plants' survival.

ENVIRONMENTAL Committee Members supported a Trout Research Licence Application, at their meeting last week

Members considered the application to research movements of brown trout, zebra trout and Falklands minnows and their reaction to and habitation of streams and rivers with culverts. It was also felt there was a need to look into 'barriers' to protect the zebra trout and the Chair noted a concern that the size of the chip to be used was large considering the size of fish it was proposed to deploy them on.

Youth Games on the Isle of Man, as well as designing and preparing quotes for a potential new sports facility.

In addition, Natalie, who is a Canadian provincial level football coach and recreational swimming coach has worked with a variety of sports clubs.

# Planning to build in Camp? Let Ken explain the rules

FROM time to time the Environmental Planning Department is asked if development in Camp requires planning permission or a building permit.

As there is some confusion on these matters, newly arrived Building Adviser Ken Snape, in the first of a series of articles tells Penguin News the position for residential developments.

Ken explained that in Camp you do not require planning permission to erect, enlarge, improve or alter a dwelling, providing the building is sited more than ten kilometres from Stanley's Christ Church Cathedral or more than 500 metres from the Stanley to Darwin road or the Stanley to North Camp road as far as the Estancia turn-off.

However, planning permission would be required if the development affects a building listed for its architectural or historic interest. Planning consent is also needed for new or newly converted buildings to be rented out for holiday accommodation.

Ken said all new dwellings in the Islands need a building permit.

A permit may also be required to enlarge, alter or improve an existing dwelling, depending on the details. If you are unsure whether a building permit is required Ken recommends contacting him before commencing work as it could otherwise, regrettably, lead to abortive or costly remedial works.

The Building Regulations exist to ensure that buildings are built

correctly and safely, using appropriate construction methods and materials. If an application is required Ken will explain the legislation and help you through the fairly straight forward paperwork required to complete the form. He will then consult the Chief Fire Officer for his views on the design of the building, materials to be used and means of escape. When Ken has the information necessary he will prepare a short report for the Planning and Building Committee, with a recommendation as to whether he considers a building permit should be issued. Key considerations are the safety of you and your family in the event of a fire and securing energy efficiencies through (for instance), the level of insulation.

The Committee (comprising two MLA's and five lay members) ultimately take the decision and their meetings are open to the public so the process is fair, transparent and accountable for all to see.

Ken is keen to point out that there are no fees for applying for a building permit and that his advice is free. He is also happy to discuss your plans and especially recommends talking to him before parting with your money and committing to buy anything. ### Re-writing RAF history?

THIRTY years on and it's time to re-write the history of the Falklands War.

lands War. Well, that seems to be the case in the light of the Channel 4 'documentary' Falklands Most Daring Raid: one learns that the one hit from the Vulcan bomber raids on the airfield at Stanley 'changed the outcome of the war'. The Vulcan raids were not a great success, though they were worth a try, and they were certainly a feat of aerial organisation. They were not especially daring, either, as three gallantry awards out of the 150 awarded for that war seems to testify.

Interesting as the programme was. I was left rather shocked at the unprofessionalism of the RAF in 1982, something I was blissfully ignorant about at sea in a small naval vessel. The aircrew spoke of getting drunk the night before in Ascension Island and having hang overs on the morning of the first raid. They did not have the appropriate maps in the Vulcan bomber; despite three weeks of preparation, and the re-fuelling plan, involving numerous Victor tankers, was clearly seriously flawed. These are embarrassing

revelations, some worthy of courtmartial in war. It was incomprehensible that a Flight Lieutenant should state that he. "didn't like the idea of doing it [the raid]" yet was clearly happy to take the Queen's shilling in peace time; war seemed almost inconvenient in career terms. When the mission itself was not going so well, with concerns about fuel for the return to Ascension Island, leadership failed and the captain of the aircraft asked the crew whether they wanted to carry on to complete the operation

Frankly, I was left amazed that, with this veritable comedy of errors, even one bomb hit the target; it was more like Dad's Army. In the event, it mattered not and the Argentine use of the airfield was hardly interrupted.

The Royal Navy did not get everything right in 1982 but it manifestly did learn the lessons from its mistakes and successes and 1 know that naval training



## History returned as stone corral opened to public

COURTESY of the men of mine clearing company BACTEC the historic stone corral near Stanley was re-opened to the public on Monday evening.

Although the surrounding land area still contains four newly fenced minefields, the company has cleared an incredible 3.7 million square metres of land: 30 per cent more than their original aim.

Following a briefing about the area by BACTEC CEO Guy Lucas and Demining Project Officer Robin Swanson, the corral was opened by H E the Governor Nigel Haywood. The Governor paid tribute to the Operations Manager Phillimon Gonanmombe and his 17 Zimbabwean deminers, before explaining a little of the history of the corral, built by Jacob Goss. (at the order of Governor Moody)between 1842 and 1848.

Standing in the 30-year-deep white grass, a large group of Falklands residents listened to students from the FI Community School give a moving rendition of 'Tumbledown' before the crowd joined in with 'The Song of the Falklands.'

Those attending then joined in with a picnic and drinks.

SO it was off to South Georgia we headed, three days more of rocking and rolling

We made landfall at the western most tip of the Island group, the Willis Islands. Dion again showed his prowess by weaving the Hans Hansson through some narrow and, for us at least, pretty scary gaps between the towering rocks. Once there the number of seabirds had increased dramatically, Black Browed, Grey Headed, Light Mantled Sooty and Wandering albatross swooped all around us along with countless petrels and the slopes of the precipitous islands were covered with Macaroni Penguins.

We passed through those islands and headed east toward Cumberland Bay. It was getting on in the day by this stage so we headed in to the Bay of Isles to anchor off Salisbury Plain. There we were treated to a sunset chorus from the thousands of King penguins and fur seals that inhabit the enormous beach here. Such a relief to be anchored in a calm spot again that we had a few whiskies and a sing-song in the saloon that evening, Andy the sound man proved to be a bit of a demon guitar player and singer, Hugh's singing though, alas, did not match his culinary skills.

A fine day's motoring took us to the green waters of Cumberland Bay East and we moored up at the jetty of the capital of South Georgia, King Edward Point. A warm welcome awaited us though it was strange indeed to see a customs of-ficial with the attendant paperwork again after so long away from such civilised mores.

At King Edward Point we were to take on two passengers for the Falk-lands, the head of South Georgia Fisheries Martin Collins and (another) celebrity chef Gerard Baker. On an offhand enquiry from Hugh about doing a spot of angling in the bay Martin leapt into action, mobilising crews for both the Harbour Patrol jet boats to take them out for this excursion

Dion, Aidan and I looked on bemused at the sudden hive of activ-



ity: boat drivers, line handlers, all in full rig, flotation suits, lifejackets, the works. Alas after spending the rest of the day out fishing, the boats returned with the grand total of zero fish. Never mind though; we were invited ashore for a few drinks at the bar to make up for it. I believe I got back to the boat at about half past midnight and was one of the earliest to do so, Dion recounted that he found me asleep in the crew's mess when he staggered back a couple of hours later, but somehow I ended up back in my cabin.

After our debauchery we had a quiet morning. Once everyone was feeling a bit more human in the evening we, and all the base staff. were treated by Hugh and Gerard to tasty krill snacks: krill & sesame toasts and potted krill, followed by hot icefish tartare buns and reindeer bolognaise.

So ended our time in Cumberland Bay, as we headed out for Bird Island getting one last view of the abandoned whaling station of Grytviken across the bay: a melancholy huddle of tanks and exposed, rusting machinery where the old buildings have been demolished.

Having quitted the civilisation of King Edward Point we shaped our course for the more rustic Bird Island. Our two days there were blessed with what is by all accounts extraordinary weather: reasonably

calm with bright sunshine.

We anchored overnight in the sheltered bay of Elsehul, peaceful but for the continuous whooping and shrieking of the thousands of fur seals that call this place home. With the filming completed this just left the longest leg of our entire trip, beating back 750 miles against the prevailing weather to the Falklands.

150 miles out we had a rather fine spell of weather as we approached the Shag Rocks and were treated to the sight of dozens of fin whales, when in the distance we spotted a couple of massive blows, far larger than the spouts of the nearby finners. Eventually we were able to catch up with these giants. Amidst a cloud of shearwaters and albatross a pair of Blue whales made their stately appearance. We had been lucky with whale encounters during the trip, but that was the crowning glory.

We suffered another three days of rough sailing and dwindling supplies as we headed west. On watch on a blustery morning in the small hours a faint orange glow appeared in the sky to the west. It was the lights of Stanley reflected in the low cloud like a false dawn. As the true sun rose behind us a low headland appeared with a lighthouse upon it, no towering mountains and no icebergs. The beaches were white sand rather than black gravel and ice; we were home

We had constructed a PeeWee track on one of the hard sections of the camp, slippery and very muddy (this probably added to the fun factor knowing the kids).



THE eucalyptus hedges we grow have produced a lot of seeds this year, it's rather exciting to see them germinating (outside) in their pots. As we have about six different types growing within the hedge there is also the chance that some cross pollination may have occurred and so it will be interesting to see what the seedlings might be like.

This 'bug' has not let up yet and I have not really felt up to doing much, but fortunately the weather hasn't been that pleasant and so I have not been made to feel too lazy. I have continued though, with the freezing and preserving and so have now got many tubs of pumpkin mash, which is so good for stews and soups.

The tomatoes are a different story but just as satisfying to process. I use two colanders and a pot full of boiling water large enough to accommodate them. Having filled one colander with ripe tomatoes I plunge them in the pot for one minute, remove and replace with other one and so on. The skins come off very easily so that all I then need to do is remove the core before putting them in a liquidiser, and bag or pot up for freezing. They are perfect for any cooking and there is no waste!

The peppers are being treated differently though: grilled to remove the skins, marinated in lemon juice for a day then put into sterilised bottles and covered with oil. Heated with the marinade, they are lovely to cook with, or in sandwiches.

I have lifted some of the main crop potatoes and have noticed a lot of them are carrying large amounts of 'green tomatoes', which are very dangerous to young children. If any should be left behind and grow away next year, they will be both a pain and a great disappointment, for these are the small 'fruit' that modern day hybrids have been bred from and nothing at all like the spuds we have grown used to. helps to keep them healthy and growing well rather than loads of growth around the outside of the plant and a 'bald' middle. It's quite simply a matter of making a hole, adding home-made compost, old manure or bone meal

Hopefully over the next week I will be digging the rest of the potatoes; they really look good so far. Predictably the weather has become wet which makes drying them before putting away a bit of a chore, but it is worth while washing them first. Not only do they dry faster, but it is easier to see if there are any diseased or damaged ones.

It is all too easy at this stage to forget to cover potatoes in a bid to get them dry but it really pays to use old sheets or blankets, or sacks, if these are still available, to keep all light away from the tubers.

This is also a good time to pick out the 'seed' potatoes for next season. Each one of us has different ideas on this subject. I like mine egg sized. I just leave them in the shed on trays or plant pots until ready to deal with them.

If time and weather permit, I hope to get some of the hardier (shasta daisies etc.) perennials dug up and broken into smaller to feed the roots and popping the bits of plants back in where required. Those plants that I think of as borderline will be left till spring when they will grow away faster and be in less danger from the cold.

It is also a good time to cut down the roses to half their height; this will keep wind rock, to a minimum at a time when frost might lift them a bit.

It is a good time too, to pop the cuttings into a pot if you are planning to grow more. Come to that, it is a very good time to put any cuttings in the soil or pots of any shrubs or trees. If you are new to the game then it is worthwhile remembering to cut neatly just below a leaf node. Remove any soft growth on top and most of the leaves, leaving only a couple at the top, put into a trench somewhere sheltered outside or into pots out there or inside, water and keep your fingers crossed. You might also like to try popping the stems in water and dipping them into hormone rooting powder. This is not good for pelargoniums or succulents though! One last word on this subject for now: don't waste your time trying to root eucalyptus cuttings, it is most unlikely that they will root, but they are very easy from seed.

The earwig population continues to grow. I can't pretend to like them but, within reason, am prepared to live and let live. However, for that they must stay in their own country: the garden. Now, I see they are once again trying to invade mine: the house, so war has been declared! I have no intention of sharing my footwear, or anything else for that matter, with them so it is time to start spraying and putting poisons down.

The annuals put in to fill bare areas in the flower garden have not really had a chance to shine and are looking very bedraggled now. Still, they may yet have a chance to do their best should the weather ever improve. In contrast, the girls 'window boxes' outside the playhouse are looking superb, very colourful and still in full flow.



# Tough conditions but Glenn triumphs in SCB Open Golf

## Dauntless sets sail south

FAMILIES, friends and wellwishers gathered at Old Portsmouth to wave goodbye to HMS *Datontless* (right) yesterday, as she embarked for the South Atlantic on her maiden operational deployment.

A spokesperson for the Royal Navy stated that the destroyer will maintain a continuous presence protecting British interests in the region and also carry out maritime security operations off West Africa and the wider South Atlantic.

Officially *Dauntless* will first call on a number of West African countries before steaming to the west coast of South America where she will dock in Brazil or Chile.

With a suite of 48 Sea Viper missiles and a Sampson radar, it is arguably the most sophisticated air defence warship in the world.

## Aberdeen visit for Chamber

THE Falkland Islands Chamber of Commerce (FICC) plans a trade visit to Aberdeen and the Shellands from May 7 to the 13.

The purpose of the trade visit is for businesses from the Falklands to evaluate business opportunities associated with the potential offshore development.

The companies and representatives from the Falklands will meet with local business, association and organizations, in order to better understand how the offshore oil development of the North Sea created business opportunities, as well as understanding barriers that might exist.

## FIDC for young entrepreneurs

THE Falkland Islands Development Corporation proposes to engage key individuals and association/agencies to participate in the development of a youth business programme. This will focus on entrepreneurship as a possible avenue for youth to develop the businesses of the future, based on the Falklands' realities. General Manager FIDC Marc Boucher will give a report to the committee on the subject next week at a meeting of the Board.

## **C&W v FIG in** data service row

AN ongoing row between Cable & Wireless (C&W) and the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) has stalled the launch of a mobile data service. The company announced last year that the service, which among other things allows internet browsing via mobile handsets, would be available by the end of 2011 but as yet it is still unavailable to the general public.

Chief Executive Officer, Falkland Islands Justin McPhee told Penguin News, C&W had invested in the mobile data capability as part of their ongoing improvement to the Falklands mobile services available to customers. The network upgrade was installed before Christmas, has been tested and is ready to support data traffic, "for those customers who have data enabled mobile phones."

He said it had not been launched due to a disagreement on the regulation of the service.

Several regulatory conditions were proposed by the Falkland Islands Government, but, "these were, to our knowledge, without precedent in the wider telecoms industry and were inconsistent with the principles that we had previously agreed with the FIG for the regulation of new services," said Mr McPhee

Head of Regulatory Services Andrew Newman responded that at the time the service was enabled. C&W only gave FIG three days notice to approve pricing and understand the modifications and capability of the network.

He said: "Correspondence was exchanged and a meeting held to discuss the proposed packages. At that meeting FIG advised C&W that in the light of the company's reported financial performance up to March 2011, the capital investment required for the new services and the potential return on investment, that the packages appeared expensive, restrictive in allowances and limited in choice."

Mr Newman said C&W were advised on November 10, 2011 and again on December 23, 2011 that the service could be made available but that the Regulator would reserve the right to implement measures to apply price controls to regulate the rate of return and ensure customers were protected against monopoly excess.

FIG continues to hold discussion with C&W on a range of measures. Thursday, April 5, 2012

# 42 ways to "improve"

FORTY two recommendations for areas that can be, "improved upon or developed," at the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital (KEMH) have been made to Executive Council by Director of Health and Education (DHE) David Jenkins.

He stated this week that this was, "part of our continuous efforts to provide the highest standard of care to patients.

"These recommendations range from relatively minor to those that would encompass significant change. We should not underestimate the task of addressing all of these but I am sure that with the relevant support, we have the team to do so."

Earlier in the year Mr Jenkins committed to undertake a, "thorough and formal review of care provided to patients within KEMH, with a particular focus on that provided to expectant mothers and babies."

The review in part focused on the recommendations of HM Coroner coming out of the inquest into the death of Baby Nivek McLaren, but the review also looked at aspects of care not commented on by Mr Gumsley. Mr Jenkins said: "This piece

Mr Jenkins said: "This piece of work has dominated my time over the past eight weeks and Executive Council has today seen a thorough and detailed report into my findings, with a series of recommendations being made for their approval.

"I am pleased to say that they have supported all my recommendations, though a number of the items require further work and thought over coming weeks and months.

"I have committed to update Executive Council on progress against these recommendations in October of this year."

At the same time the DHE offered his reassurance to the community, "that the standard of patient care provided within KEMH is generally of a high standard and that where areas for development exist these have been identified and there is a real appetite to address them within the entire KEMH team."

## FIH reports strong year

TRADING at Falkland Islands Holdings (FKL) was ahead of market expectations in the last financial year, it was reported on Wednesday.

The AIM-listed group which owns essential services businesses focused on retail, transport and logistics and which has a 4.4% shareholding in Falkland Oil and Gas (FOGL), reported that the year to the end of March 2012 was strong.

It expects pre-tax profits to come in around £300,000 higher than the previous year at £3 million and said the total dividend payment will be not less than the 10p per share, up from 9.5p in 2011

Chairman David Hudd said the group's businesses are performing well with the recovery in profits at art company Momart being particularly encouraging.

"In the Falklands attention has now shifted to the Southern Basin where any drilling success will further underwrite the prospects for the Islands economy. FOGL is expected to commence drilling in June with any success promising a substantial increase in the value of FHF's shareholding," he added.

"Looking further ahead we are working to ensure that FIC fully participates in the further growth of the Falkland Islands economy."

The group's preliminary results for the year to the end of 31 March are expected to be released on June 11.

Shares in the company have risen 55% in the last six months as it maintains progress alongside sector peers in positive territory.

She said, "We are disappointed that our invitation was not accepted. It is our firm belief that the only way for anyone truly to know the Islands - and to know the facts behind our lives and our situation - is to visit our home We offered to host the regional seminar and at the same time we repeated our invitation for any current or future Chair to visit the Islands. We also said we would welcome the Committee sending a fact-finding mission to the Islands. We hope that one or more of these things will one day take place - these offers remain on the table and we hope that some sort of visit in the future will then be used as a basis for the Committee's discussions.

MLA Roger Edwards made the invitation to the C24 Committee Chair on March 23, 2012. In his original letter he noted, "the people of the Falkland Islands consider it unusual that despite issuing annual resolutions on the Falkland Islands, neither the Special Committee nor its Secretariat have ever visited the Islands in any official capacity."

## News from the Arboretum

A PLAQUE commemorating the soldiers of 22 SAS and supporting Special Forces personnel who lost their lives in the Falklands War will be unveiled in the sun room of the Allied Special Forces Grove situated in the National Memorial Arboretum, Alrewas, Staffordshire on Saturday May 19. The plaque was donated to the Grove by the Newport Parachute Regiment Association. It will be fixed inside the sun room facing down 'Goose Green' to the Falklands Fighting Islanders Orchard and trees, which will eventually be dedicated to the courage and tenacity of Terry Peck, Trudy McPhee and all those who led the first British Resistance Force since the Second World War.

The Orchard to the Fighting Islanders was donated by John Worle of Herefordshire and will include three perry cider trees which will eventually be dedicated to Doreen Bonner, Mary Goodwin and Susan Whitley, who died in Stanley towards the end of the fighting.

## Imported highs

THE Health and Medical Services Committee (HMSC) heard todaythat the Customs & Immigration Department had noted a relatively large quantity of 'legal high' substances being imported from the UK.

While no serious impact from this importation had yet been felt by the Health Department, the Committee was told that evidence from the UK suggested that these substances could sometimes be detrimental to people's health. A campaign to raise awareness of this potentially damaging situation was being developed by the Acting Chief Medical Officer, but meanwhile caution in the consumption of these substances was recommended and people with concerns were urged to contact their GP.

## New provider

A NEW provider of surgical and anaesthetist services is due to commence on the July 1, 2012 the HMSC was told on Thursday by Director of Health and Education, Mr David Jenkins. It was originally intended that a contract confirming this would have been signed in February 2012. This had unfortunately slipped into April 2012, but excluding the contract, all elements of the due diligence phase were now completed.

## X-Ray Update

HMSC Members were assured today that the problem that was raised last month regarding loss of digital x-rays had now been fixed and over 99% of the digital x-rays had been recovered and restored to the storage system. The very small number that had not been recovered do still have reports of the images stored manually within patient records, so this loss would not lead to a reduction of the clinical care in any way.

## New SMO?

THE preferred candidate for the post of Senior Medical Officer is due to visit the Falklands from April 16 to 20 the Health and Medical Services Committee was told today. If all goes to plan it is hoped he will then sign a three year contract and commence work in May or June.

## Legislative Assembly Diary

MLA Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

SUNDAY'S ceremony in tribute to those FIDF members who turned out on the night of 1st April 1982 was an important occasion to acknowledge their courage and sense of duty. It was a dignified event where the public at large were able to show their appreciation. The present day members also looked smart and have more modern equipment and weapons than their predecessors enabling them to have an important role in the defence of the Islands.

I was very fortunate to be able to find time last week to attend the final few hours of the Environmental Mainstreaming Workshop attended by experts from many fields of science, professionals and FIG and Foreign Office officials as well as representatives from the fishing, farming, building, oil and tourism industries. Unfortunately only one member of the CMT was able to attend for a part session and apart from the Honourable Barry Elsby who was there for the opening session and I for the latter part, no other Assembly Members. The lively and informative workshops looked at practical ways of ensuring that environmental issues are properly integrated into decision making. Some still have a tendency to regard environmental considerations as being a cost to business or government, whereas it can be a benefit, as anyone involved in most of our industries knows. Those industries depend on the responsible use of the resources provided by our environment and good governance demands that the implications of this be incorporated in all our business planning.

Budget consideration dominates this week and we have the incredibly difficult task of balancing the needs of the community with the constant demands for better services and benefits. We want to be able to implement the various development strategies but those parts of them that fall to Government carry large price tickets so many difficult choices will have to be made. Ever growing expectations in Health and Education have staffing implications and salaries represent a large percentage of FIG operating expenditure. Whatever we do should be sustainable for the long term and not represent a knee jerk response to any current problems.

# *Star Princess*: a lesson learned

FOLLOWING an outbreak of norovirus on board, an intended visīt by the cruise vessel *Star Princess* on January 14, 2012, was cancelled by the Chief Medical Officer on public health grounds.

Following this event, a Post Incident Review to be conducted by the FIG Director of Natural Resources was requested by the Chief Executive.

The entire post-incident review is to be published shortly but today (Thursday) the Health and Medical Services Committee received a summary of the key points from the Health Service perspective presented by Acting Chief Medical Officer, Dr Beccy Edwards.

Prior to its arrival in Stanley, the ship had reported an outbreak of Norovirus with 68 (2.48%) of passengers showing symptoms.

On the advice of the Chief Medical Officer, none of the vessel's passengers were permitted to disembark into Stanley, on the grounds that an outbreak of the virus in Stanley, "would put enormous pressure on our limited medical resources, and jeopardise other scheduled cruise visits."

Norovirus, often called the

'winter vomiting bug' is easily spread by contact with an infected person and also through contaminated food or drink or by touching contaminated surfaces.

The report includes several recommendations designed to manage and mitigate future occurrences. These cover both the cruise industry, FIG harbour control and the health service. Those of relevance to the health service include the development of a more formal risk assessment tool so that ships with contagious outbreaks can be more formally assessed and recorded against this. This has now been completed.

A revision of the current protocol to ensure it balances risks and rewards appropriately has been undertaken by the KEMH in conjunction with the consultant microbiology advisor. This was recently submitted to the KEMH Policy Procedure, Protocol & Guidelines (PPPG) Committee for approval. Minor changes have been made but the principles remain as they were.

A recommendation that the protocol should be rehearsed each October is being considered and is likely to be implemented.



## Propaganda exceeds in volume and bitterness that of the 1982 Junta

WHEN your editor, Lisa, asked me for my latest 800 words or so, deliverable on April 2, 1 thought 1 might write something light to take readers' minds off the grim gravitas of the 30th anniversary of the invasion. She thought that might be a good idea, because aggressive rhetoric and action from Buenos Aires had hijacked the anniversary, taking it from simple remembrance to the miserable front line of politics.

So I thought about telling you more about the pup, Booboo, which now owns me, and the new friends that he and I have made at what I call the Holland Park Puppy Club. Or perhaps I would cover some UK domestic issues, such as No 10's bizarre "pie-gate" affair. But those ideas just don't work. I am sitting at my kitchen table in London on the morning of April 2, 2012, staring at my tea and a laptop while struggling to keep that stuff of 30 years ago at bay. I can-not do so. It is all over morning TV. Facebook and twitter friends are blogging about it. And I have just been contacted by BBC TV News 24, who would like me talk about the current Falklands situation. In mind and spirit, I am back there in the Stanley of April 1982, and that. I'm afraid, is all I can write about.

There have been 29 other April 2nds since the day war began, but none has had this degree of attention, and none has been so contaminated by one leader's desire to revive the hatred and animosity. The government of Cristina Kirchner has chosen exploit the 30th by articulating her bitter and aggressive "Malvinas" policy.

The propaganda actually exceeds in volume and bitterness that of the 1982 Junta in the lead-up to invasion. Argentina's murderous leaders had no virtues that I am aware of, but their rhetoric was relatively restrained.

I have to say, unfortunately, that this has led me to conclude that if the military deterrent in the Falklands did not exist, and if Argentina's military capability had not suffered at the hands of her rather wiser late husband, Mrs Kirchner would be talking about round two of the armed conflict. Fortunately, the Argentines do not now have the capability to at-

tack, but they still have the basis of a viable military machine, and they are thinking seriously about modernising it.

That talk of the Armada Republica Argentina procuring a nuclear submarine may be bravado, but there is no guarantee of that.

The danger is that fewer and fewer people can see the tangible connection between the past reality and future threat. To the vast majority of people in Argentina and Britain, 1982 is history.

Thirty years from the end of the Second World War brought us to 1975, and I know that war seemed like very dusty history to me then. If we look at photos of 1982, they are mostly in black and white, and some are fading to brown. If we listen to archived repeats of BBC World Service programmes, like Calling the Falklands and Radio Newsreel. we hear the crackle and whistle of short wave transmissions, not the clinical clarity of the internet. And of course, so many of those people who experienced war with us are no longer alive.

It is unsafe to consign the Falklands to history, but I rather envy those who can. I would rather live only in the present, but such is the gravity of this anniversary that I am today re-living a period which, frankly, terrified me. I am not the only one. I received a touching email from a friend of our family, John Roberts.

John had been a military doctor running a field hospital in 1982, and he and his staff treated the dozens of horribly, in some cases mortally, injured men who survived the Argentine air attack on the landing ships Sir *Galahad* and Sir *Tristram*.

After the Argentine surrender, he lived with our family in Stanley for a while, and we kept in touch. John wrote in his email to many friends from 1982: "I'm thinking of you all on this, the 30th anniversary of an event which ultimately affected every one of us. I hope that, for each of you, the good memories are gradually prevailing over the bad ones. God bless."

I have reflected on his words several time already this morning, and I wish to endorse them and share them with you.

Is there a lighter side of all of this upon which I can end? I think there is.

I was enjoying the lovely spring sunshine in the company of a group of people in the Holland Park Puppy Club yesterday when one lady mentioned the Falklands. She did not know of my connection. "You know," she said, "One place 1 would love to go is the Falkland Islands." 1 pricked my ears up. "I saw a documentary on TV with that Welsh chap. Simon Weston. He'd just been back there, and what a lovely place it looks: sunny, lovely beaches, gorgeous penguins, nice people. I really would like to go there."

She and the others in the group were amazed when I said that I was an Islander. I even upstaged the puppies. "What's it like there? Can we go?" I was asked. "Yes", I said. "You can. And you should."

So, as the spotlight has returned to illuminate the troubles of the Falklands, it has also inspired people with modern images which are as beautiful as those of 1982 are ugly. That has to be a good thing.

On that note, I leave you and promise not to write about the war again – at least until the next anniversary.

## Hypocritical point of view

AN open letter to Bishop Desmond Tutu from Roy Davis

As a person who has admired you for many years for your balanced views I was extremely distressed by remarks over the sovereignty of these Islands. Quite frankly I cannot understand why you and those eminent winners of the Nobel Prize for Peace, claim you are against colonialism but expect us to be colonised by Argentina? That, I would suggest is the most hypocritical thing I have ever heard.

These Islands are not an old fashioned colony of Great Britain: we are an Overseas Territory; we have self-determination, we decide our own laws and the freedom to choose our way of life. And yet you want us to be dominated by people of extreme rightwing views.

The population of Argentina are almost all immigrant stock: The Fuegan natives, or I would prefer to call them First Nation, were nearly all wiped out by that European stock. I don't know if you are aware. Sir, that when the Remington repeating rifle brought out in 1863 by the Union Army was supplied to Argentina, that 'brave' army wiped out 60,000 people, probably more. ## Weather for March 2012

TEMPERATURES in March 2012 were only slightly below average since records began at MPA with a mean maximum temperature of 12.9 Celsius. Both the mean maximum and minimum temperatures were slightly below the long-term averages, being 97% and 95% respectively.

March 2012 was the second driest March since records began at MPA with only 31.7mm of rainfall, which is only 58% of the long-term average.

Temperature

The mean maximum temperature was 12.9 Celsius compared with the long-term average for March of 13.3 Celsius. The highest temperature recorded was 22.2 Celsius on the 3rd. The lowest maximum was 7.6 Celsius recorded on the 25th.

The mean minimum temperature was 5.5 Celsius, which is only slightly cooler than the 5.8 Celsius average for February.

The lowest minimum was 1.5 Celsius on the 14th, which is the 5th highest for March since records began. The highest minimum was 11.1 Celsius recorded on the 4th.

fray, who founded the Stephen Jaffray Fund in November 1992 in accordance with the wishes of her son. (and Gerard's brother) Stephen Jaffray. Stephen passed away earlier the same year after a prolonged period of hospitalisation in Montevideo.

Having recovered from her initial surprise, Eileen went on to offer her very grateful thanks to Ben on behalf of the Jaffray family and the Fund's trustees: Nanette Morrison, Morgan Goss, Georgina Smith and Dennis Middleton.

Eileen told Penguin News that the Stephen Jaffray Fund paid out around £28,000 last year and helped some 23 different people.

The Fund, which is a registered charity, was set up to help towards passages and accommodation for family members of people sent overseas for medical treatment.

Eileen pointed out 2011 was the year in which the government's holiday assistance scheme finally ran out, so the help offered to families by the Fund had been even more important than ever.

## Rainfall

The total rainfall for the month was 31.7 mm, which is the second driest March since records began at MPC. The long-term average for March is 54.2mm. The wettest day was on the 9th with a total of 7.8 mm. More than 0.1mm fell on 16 days, and 1.0 mm or more fell on 9 days.

### Sunshine

There were 129.1 hours of sunshine, compared with the monthly average of 158.3 hours. The highest daily total was 10.7 hours on the 8th March.

## Snow/Hail/Thunder/Fog

There were three days of hail, 1 day of thunder with three days of snow or sleet. No fog days were recorded.

## Wind/Gales

The monthly mean wind speed was 15.1 knots, which is exactly the same as the March average. The highest hourly mean speed of 33 knots occurred on the 4th and 15th the highest gust of 54 knots was also recorded on the 21st March. Gales occurred on just 4 days, and there were 18 days with gusts in excess of 33 knots.

"WE meet today to commemorate the mobilisation of the Falkland Islands Defence Force on the night of April 1st, 1982. We honour the courage and determination of the men who went out to defend the Falkland Islands from invasion and we remember the sacrifice made by the families who waited in apprehension and uncertainty for their return."

These words were spoken by the Rev Richard Hines at the ceremony of commemoration held on Sunday at the Liberation Monument. The programme notes written for this act by Major Peter Biggs, the Officer Commanding, Falkland Islands Defence Force (FIDF) began even more simply, "On April 1, 1982, the FIDF was mobilised along with Royal Marine Naval Party 8901 to defend the Falkland Islands from a full scale Argentine invasion,"

Whether in the end they had the chance to fire a shot from their largely obsolete weapons or not is irrelevant; what does matter is that they obeyed their country's call to arms without knowing what fate had in store for them. Until now the courage they displayed has perhaps not been properly recognised, over-shadowed as it has been by the more obvious feats of arms that were to follow.

What needs to be remembered is that in 1982 the Falkland Islands Defence Force was not the welltrained and well-armed fighting force it is today: in fact someone once unkindly referred to it as "a drinking club with guns." While this might have been unfair, when the call to action came most of its members were well past the first flush of youth and, in contrast, those still on the active list were little more than boys.

To add to their difficulties, the

few heavy weapons they had in their armoury had been taken by the Royal Marines who had left on HMS *Endurance* to find out what was happening at South Georgia.

For all these reasons it was good to see a large crowd gathered on Sunday at the 1982 Monument to demonstrate by their presence their pride in these truly homegrown heroes and to pay tribute to them. Good also to publicly acknowledge the sacrifice of the families who waited anxiously not knowing whether their sons, fathers or brothers would return.

## Dogs, decay and old sheds are all grist to Griz's mill

DESPITE the counter-attraction of a FIODA production in the Town Hall, Friday evening saw a large gathering of invited guests in the Jetty Visitor Centre to view the opening of an exhibition by local artist Grizeldea Cockwell.

The exhibition of 68 paintings, pastels and drawings encompassed a wide and eclectic variety of subjects including landscapes, portraits of children, musicians and horsemen, dogs, still lifes and what can only be described as dead things in the process of decay

If the subjects for Grizelda's work were various so were the techniques displayed in what amounted to an exhibition of a life time of evolution as an artist in various parts of the world. including France and Greece as well as the Falklands.

With prices ranging from £650 for the larger oils to around £100 for the smaller drawings, all in-cluding mounting and framing. there was plenty to tempt local collectors.

Attracting particular attention, aside from Griz's characterful portraits in pastels of the various moods of her grandsons, were vibrant oils of old sheds and Nissen huts. These not only showed a marvelous command of the medium, but in presenting everyday objects to the observer in a way which makes us more aware of their visual qualities, served what is perhaps one of the prime purposes of all good figurative art or photography

Grizelda also auctioned a pastel image of a small flock of sheep in order to raise funds for SAMA (82). It eventually sold for £160.







## Enriching dust matters says Dr Large

WATCHING the 1982 conflict unfold, I remember vividly the images of troops trudging across these peat covered Islands. Just like the familiar bogs and peat hags of the Scottish Mountains, or so I thought.

Well, I was going to find out. A week bog hopping on East Falkland with a team of scientists from the UK, Baruch Spiro from the Natural History Museum. Dong Shuofei from Imperial College London and myself from the University of Nottingham. Another member of our team Dominik Weiss, had visited in January to identify sites and sort out the logistics. Two months later, our purpose was to collect 3-4 cores of peat that we would use to measure the quantity and composition of the windblown mineral dust trapped in the peat.

Why? Well dust matters and some of the best dust records come from peat. Westerly winds over the Falklands carry fine particles of silt and clay from South America into the Atlantic and Southern Ocean. In turn this dust enriches the oceans in essential mineral nutrients. Plankton flourishes in the nutrient rich water

taking carbon dioxide from the atmosphere to the sea floor.

There are few landmasses in the southern hemisphere so dust is in short supply and vulnerable to changes in patterns of wind and rain.

Fertility of the camp, so central

to the livelihood of Falkland Islanders, will also depend on this dust as the white sandstones of the Islands are virtually devoid of mineral nutrients. First stop was the thick peat in Moody Brook, high banks with a tough surface covered in unfamiliar plants, very different to the soft wet pool covered blanket bogs of home. Next Kings Ridge and this time the peat was full of thin dark bands, possibly charcoal left by brief fires on the peat surface.

Finally Nick Pitaluga took us to Cape Bougainville to sample tussac grass peat. The tussac peat is very different, hard, dense with a strong smell of rotten eggs throughout and it takes all four of us to drive the corer each centimetre of the way to the base at three meters.

Sampling is the easy bit, finding value and sense in what we find will be much harder. To do this we also need to learn from the people who know the land. Nick's guided tour of the interplay between, soil, slope, plants and sheep farming at Salvador and Michael Butcher's knowledge of the peat cuts around Stanley are invaluable additions to our knowledge.

It had been a great week in a wild and beautiful land and we all hope to return not least to tell you what we find and add to your knowledge of these Islands. Thank you to all.





# 'That' flag flies home

"IT was raised on a flag pole at the cemetery when HE the Governor, Jim Parker, took the salute and conducted the Armistice Parade on Remembrance Day Sunday November 12, 1978. After the parade and once H E had left 1 lowered it and was supposed to have taken it back to GH but forgot."

At a massive and glittering Falklands Anniversary Command Dinner held at Pangbourne College last week, the flag to which Lieutenant Colonel Ewen Southby-Tailyour referred, and was also that which was raised at Government House after the Argentine surrender, was once again returned into Falkland Islands hands.

Representative in London Sukey Cameron received the flag and it has since been carried home by Member of Legislative Assembly Roger Edwards, who also attended the dinner.

In 1978 Lieutenant Colonel Southby-Tailyour was Officer Commanding the Royal Marines in the Falklands (Naval Party 8901).

He explained that after arriving back in the UK in spring 1979 he used the 'borrowed' flag as a back drop to many lectures he gave on the subject of the Falkland Islands.

In April 1982 a few days after the Argentine invasion, Falklands Governor Rex Hunt flew into RAF Brize Norton where Southby-Tailyour offered the flag to him as a memento, " but his words were. No thank you. Your job is to put it back where it bloody well belongs."

And so the flag once more travelled south: "On the way I again used it as backdrop to most

of the 69 lectures 1 gave and we hung it on the bulkhead of Mark Gosling's cabin in HMS *Fearless* the night before the landings and toasted it and the future of the Islands with the last of the port. The next day we landed

"As we moved closer to Stanley I sent the flag to Julian's HQ so that it could be the first (and the proper) flag to be hoisted at GH and it was by the men of Mike Norman's Juliet Company, most of whom had been in his NP 8901 detachment)."

When Southby-Tailyour eventually arrived in Stanley, about ten days after the Argentine surrender it was still flying at Government House.

He said: "The next time I saw it to my surprise, it was on the wall of the RM Museum at Eastney for the Falkland Islands exhibition that lasted some months. I was sad as it was not where Rex wanted it but 1 hoped that once the exhibition had run its course it would be returned."

When the exhibition ended he asked what had happened to it and was told it was, "in store." He asked for it back but the request was refused.

Finally in the 30th anniversary year he asked Major General David Pennefather (Chairman of the Museum's trustees and a Falklands veteran) if it might be, "released from custody on the 30th anniversary and sent back to its rightful place."

He said, "I was all for Julian handing it back, as it was his men who, by and large, had made the conditions for it to be hoisted at GH, but after some discussion (to which I was not privy) it was decided that the person 'wot nicked it in the first place' should give it back."

The dinner itself, the idea of Lieutenant Gary Rimay-Muranyi Royal Navy, brought together the commanding officers of all service units, the Merchant Fleet, members of Mrs Thatcher's Cabinet and a few other selected guests.

The Commandant General Royal Marines provided a 48-piece Marching Band and seven-man fanfare team of Her Majesty's Royal Marines Portsmouth (The Royal Band).

The college drive was lined by Sea and Royal Marines Cadets from five different units and guests were greeted by two Welsh Guards in their distinctive red tunics and bearskins and two Royal Marines Colour Sergeants, before being ushered into the pre-dinner reception.

The lengthy guest list included Admiral Sir Jonathon Band, Admiral Sir Sandy Woodward, Major General Julian Thompson, Commodore Michael Clapp, Rear Admiral The Lord Sterling and Captain W J Dooris of the United States Navy.

Speaking to Penguin News this week Professor Julian Lindley-French who, gave a speech at the dinner, said he wished to reiterate his message to the people of the Falklands: "The British people will always stand with you and alongside you all in the Falklands Islands.

"Your defence is the defence of freedom and without that we are nothing. My best regards to you all and my thanks to Penguin News."

## Cargo flight postponed until May

THE cargo flight from Uruguay which was initially scheduled for April 13 has been postponed until late May as yet with no fixed date, according to information received this week from Mr Guillermo Wild of the Uruguayan-British Chamber of Commerce.

So far, according to Mr

Wild, between 9-16 tonnes of cargo have been confirmed for the plane's southbound leg with another two tonnes to be confirmed. The airline also has an as yet unconfirmed reservation for 10 tonnes of cargo from the Falklands to Montevideo.

The Uruguayan ministries of Foreign Aflairs and Defence have

already approved the flight, but approval to fly over Argentine air space is still awaited from the Argentine authorities.

Argentine approval is not expected to be a problem as the Uruguayan Ministry of Foreign Affairs has already had talks about the flight with its counterpart in Buenos Aires.

## C&W profit

CABLE & Wireless South Atlantic Ltd report a turnover of £10.8 million and an operating profit of £4 million in their Report and Financial Statements for the period ended March 31, 2011. However, the company complains that, "continued encroachment by voice over IP applications," (like Skype) continue to erode the revenue base on all three islands.

HAVING always prided ourselves on a zero tolerance policy towards drugs which has kept the Islands free of some of the problems faced in other communities, it comes as something of a shock to discover that investigations made by the Customs and Immigration Service have revealed that there may be drug pushers in our midst.

In our particular case, the problem is that unlike shady characters attempting to sell marihuana, cocaine or other illegal substances, if these pushers do exist, what they are selling are called 'legal highs' and therefore, they are maybe entitled to feel that what they are doing is as legal and unexceptional as selling sweets. Sadly while their activities may be narrowly defined as legal, they are likely to cause harm.

On page nine of this paper an article explains about 'legal highs' which can be just as dangerous as the better known 'hard' drugs. There are also details of what measures the Medical Department and Customs and Immigration are taking to inform people about the risks those who take them are running.

If we were talking about a few maybe misguided individuals seeking to divert themselves with an alternative to drinking a few beers the situation might not be regarded as serious, but the findings of the Customs and Immigration Department lead us to believe that what is happening is not about low-cost personal consumption, but the sort of high-priced trafficking in the wake of which dependency, addiction and theft usually follow.

The statistics available from random examinations of mail at Stanley Post Office are quite revealing. In mid February 2012 a package containing 'legal highs' was intercepted and between that time and April 9, a total number of 16 consignments were intercepted by the Customs & Immigration Service.


During that period nine importers were responsible for importing 256 'legal highs' at an estimated cost of  $\pounds 6.076$ . One of these importers imported 97 'legal highs' in a one month period, at an estimated cost of  $\pounds 2,285$ .

March 2012 has seen the largest amount of imports: 13 packages containing 209 'legal highs' at an estimated cost to the importer of £4,870.

Given that these are merely random searches revealing probably only the tip of a larger iceberg, it is obvious from the amounts of money involved that this is no teenagers' pocket money enterprise. No doubt, however, that teenagers will be the target and, unless action is taken, possibly the victims of this new and worrying development.

## Museum looking for a whole community effort

MUSEUM manager. Leona Roberts, told the Historic Buildings Committee on Wednesday that when the time comes for the museum to move from its present site on Holdfast Road to the Historic Dockyard in the heart of Stanley, she hopes the whole community will get involved. There will be lots to do, Mrs Roberts said, and plenty of scope for people to get involved, either on a paid basis or as volunteers.

While it was originally hoped that there would be at least one building ready for the 30th anniversary of liberation, the target date for the move is now November 2013.

The focus of the project in terms of the existing buildings on the site has now been reduced to the Central Store, the Old Smithy and the original gaol. The large shed to the immediate west of the Central Store which was part of the original plan published in the Penguin News in March is now to be demolished and replaced with a new purpose-built structure.

Not to be included are three small buildings, including Tommy Braxton's shed, originally designated as craft workshops and a very large shed to the west of them, which was originally ear-marked for the Reclus hut and other Antarctic-related exhibits.

Despite this reduction in available area. Mrs Roberts remains confident that there will be enough space for all but the museum's latgest exhibits to be housed.

The project is now in the hands of the Museum and National Trust (MNT)and separate from the FIG Waterfront Master Plan.

The MNT's consultant architects for the project, are Purcell, Miller and Triton. It is hoped that they will be in the Falklands in the next few months, as soon as a project manager has been appointed and is in place.

# Sunday night census

SENIOR Economist and Principal Policy Officer Pippa Christie spoke to Penguin News this week about the Sunday night Falkland Islands census. Don't forget completion of the Census is a legal requirement.

## When is the Census going to be held?

Census night is this Sunday 15th April 2012. Households should now have received a paper Census form or an email detailing their sign-in details to access the Census online. Anyone who is resident in the Islands on the night of the Census, Sunday 15th April, should respond to it. The exception to this is members of the UK Armed Forces serving in the Falkland Islands and their dependents. Completion of a Census is required by law, and people who refuse to complete a census or knowingly give false infor-mation could be liable to a fine or civil penalty. If you haven't received anything in connection with the Census from the FIG Policy Unit, please contact them as soon as possible.

## Why does the Government need the information collected in a Census?

The Data obtained in a Census enables the Government to monitor the size, growth, age and gender profile of the population. The Census also asks a lot of other questions that enable us to find

## BP no plans

BRITISH Petroleum will not be involved in exploration or production activities in the Falkland Islands, according to the Argentine Foreign Affairs ministry which just a few days ago sent threatening letters to oil industry and financial corporations which could be working or assessing in the 'disputed' South Atlantic waters.

According to the Foreign Affairs ministry BP sent a letter to the Argentine government stating that, "it does not participate in hydrocarbons exploration activities in the region referred to in your (19 March 2012) notification, nor has it plans to do so in the future." BP controls 60% of Panamerican Energy, one of the main oil corporations with activities in Argentina.

## Earwig explorers

HEADING down South? Be vigilant about what you might unknowingly be carrying with you. Two live earwigs were found in fresh fruit and vegetables arriving in South Georgia from the Falkland Islands recently. The insects were discovered during the biosecurity checks that all imported fresh goods undergo on arrival in the specially designed Biosecurity Building. out where people were born, what nationalities are present in the population, how many people are working or unemployed and the areas in which they are working or what they are doing if they are unemployed, people's educational attainment, religious beliefs, and their general state of health. The information obtained helps when planning public services, including health, and education

The Census also seeks to assess the standard of living in our community through asking about people's housing conditions, the amount they pay for utilities, and the number of household appliances they own or have access to, access to telephones and the internet, and their annual income.

Some of these questions may seem intrusive, but without responses to these it is not possible for the Government to gain an indication of any increases or decreases in living standards since the last Census, whether people are facing financial hardship, the affordability of housing and other social indicators.

How is confidentiality of information being assured?

Everybody's responses will remain confidential and are protected by law from being disclosed. No data relating to individuals or individual households will be released. Policy Unit staff and any other FIG staff who help with gathering the Census data must swear or affirm an oath of secrecy, promising not to divulge information obtained in the course of carrying out the census with anyone.

Following data analysis, individual information, will be stored on a confidential basis in the Government Archive for a period of 100 years, after which time it may be released for inspection by the public.

### How will the responses provided be used?

Responses provided will enable the Policy Unit to prepare summary statistical data on all the questions asked in the Census.

As well as informing a public report on the Census, the data will be used to inform policy development in areas such as housing and immigration, and certain information provided will be shared in its summary format with other departments to help them determine how they design policies and direct resources to assist those who most need them.

What if people need help completing their Census forms?

Help will be available on Census night (15th April) from 1800-2100 and throughout the following week by calling the telephone numbers 28422 or 28429. There will also be a Census help centre operating in the West Store Café from the 16th – 18th April from 1500-1900.

CHIU Yiu Nam, a seaman whose selfless actions during the Falklands War saved ten lives on the stricken *Sir Galahad* died on February 14 and is remembered in a Times obituary. Yiu Nam who was wearing an asbestos suit as the ship burned, lead men through smoke and flames out to the upper deck one after the other until there was no one left alive and he could do no more.

## Legislative Assembly Diary

MLA Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

MEDIA coverage is not reducing as fast as I thought it might because it seems everyone wants to have their say. I think the most extraordinary so far is the travel writer Hilary Bradt writing in Wanderlust and seemingly caught in a time warp - but then it was a Bradt guide published not so many years ago that placed the Falklands 300 miles West of South America. I've only been significantly misquoted once in recent weeks which is unusual; past experience was that if the press get things even half right they are doing well. I assume the interest will build again as the anniversary of Liberation is nearer.

This week we've regular education, health and minerals portfolio briefings from directors and an update on PR. We have a meeting with the Governor and later in the week the monthly meeting of the Education Board. Some of us visited the areas immediately west of the small wooded area behind Government House reserved for expansion of education facilities. The combined areas should provide more than enough space for all foreseeable requirements. Discussion now has to identify which are the priorities for the first part of a phased development that can be built on as future need emerges.

Everyone's memories of 30 years ago will come from a different perspective. I'm determined that those who worked selflessly day and night in London are not forgotten. The small FI Association office became an extraordinary hub of information and activity, volunteers staved overnight to ensure that no urgent call went unanswered. People who could provide important information to assist the MOD were identified and traced so that they could be linked with those who could use the mine of information they represented. An informal network of friends and relatives shared the fragmentary information that was getting through, all desperate for news of friends and loved ones. As the late Velma Malcolm said, if we ever put up a statue in Stanley it should be of Bill Hunter Christie, whose foresight, intellect and interest created the platform for much of the very effective lobbying to happen.

## Farms can be remortgaged

THE Falkland Islands Development Board agreed on Tuesday that farms suffering from high interest repayments on their mortgages should be approached by FIDC and offered the chance of remortgaging at current rates of interest.

This decision followed the Board's rejection of a proposal that existing farm mortgages should remain as they are, because of a potential £30,000 loss of income to FIDC if changes to existing farm mortgages were to be allowed.

MLA Mike Summers said that having an equitable system was more important than FIDC being worse off. This view found general support including from former farmer Tony Blake who said that he believed high interest rates on farm mortgages could put the brakes on the development of those farms due to the lack of spare cash.

FIDC General Manager Mare Boucher said that he was aware that some farms were struggling with mortgage interest rates of seven per cent or higher and were prevented from going to the bank by issues surrounding security. He thought, therefore, that FIDC should be prepared to look at appheations for further funding on an individual basis and saw no legal barrier to prevent farmers taking out fresh loans at current rates to pay off existing punitive mortgages.

A loss of  $\notin 30,000$  was not a massive issue when year on year three was considerable underspend of the FIDC's loans budget.

## SG shipping and tourism

THE tourist season in South Georgia has wound down, with just four cruise vessels calling in March, and one in April. One of the cruise vessels, *Polar Pioneer* was supporting a group of five expeditioners and two guides who made a successful crossing of the Island on the Shackleton route from King Haakon Bay to Stromness.

Alterwards the guides said conditions had been good and the group had experienced no particular difficulties en route.

The South Georgia toothfish season began in March with the arrival of two longliners on March 28 and 29 which called in at Cumberland Bay for inspection and licensing before heading down to fish in the South Sandwich Island area.

## **FIDC** funding for C of C trip

Mr Boucher said that what he had in mind was something similar to the UK's long-established Young Enterprise Scheme, but tailored to the Falkland Islands

## **New ordinance for FIDC**

THE members of the Falkland Islands Development Board were on Tuesday given a presentation by the Falkland Islands Government's legal drafter Ronnie MacLennan Baird who is in the process of drafting a new ordinance for the Development Corporation. The last one having been drafted in 1983, it is now considered to be 'not fit for purpose' despite having been amended no less than eight times.

The requirement for a new ordnance was highlighted in the then Chief Executive's review of FIDC in 2010/11 and Mr Baird said the proposed timetable for the presentation of the new ordinance would see a paper being presented to ExcO in May, when the initial drafting haD been completed. This would be followed by a period for public consultation in June and July resulting in another ExCo paper in August. Should this be accepted, the Bill allowing the establishment of the new ordinance would be gazetted at the end of August 2012 and presented to the Legislative Assembly for final approval and passage into implementation in October.

The Board's new statement of purpose would contain two key proposals: to advise FIG and to help implement its economic strategy and to encourage the successful further development of the Islands' business sector.

According to the draft of the new ordinance, FIDC's relationship with FIG would be more closely prescribed to be, "stra-tegic and enabling," but to fa-cilitate response to changing circumstances much of its rules and regulations would be contained in subsidiary regulation rather than in the ordinance. FIDC would be expected to produce for ExCo approval a medium term business plan for three or four years, along with annual budget and subvention requests, though again to reduce delay and facilitate response to changing circumstances, there would be scope for a percentage of variation from the original estimates - ten per cent was suggested - without the need to appeal to ExCo for authorisation.

Changes to the constitution of the Board were also envisaged in the ordinance as currently being drafted: the Chairman, Vice-Chairman and one other would be appointed by a panel made up of the Governor, the Chief Executive and the Head of Human Resources. In addition there would be one MLA member, the Chief Executive representing FIG in an ex-oficio capacity and four other co-opted members. All key sectors would represented.

# **Containerisation - use it or lose it**

THE fishing industry must. "use it or lose it," Director/Owner Beauchene Fishing Cheryl Roberts told Penguin News referring to the Falklands containerisation link with the rest of the world.

Beauchene Fishing Co Ltd recently utilised the system carrying out the transhipment of loligo catch from their vessel *Baffin Bay* into containers last Tuesday April 3.

The previous week and on Monday this week they also carried out transhipments with their vessel *lgueldo*.

This is not the first time a transhipment has been containerised as the company had previously used the same method during first loligo season of 2010. However, Mrs Roberts explained, "now as containerisation becomes more widely used world wide it is apparent to users that this method can be beneficial in that the product can be delivered to the end user in small packages of one container lots."

She said the alternative method of transhipping is to use large reefer vessels: "These vessels are capable of carrying thousands of tons and whilst this method is widely used by the fishing industry it can have disadvantages, one of those being that the reefer

will only set sail once the cargo is complete and the time frame involved will depend on the catches. Containers are shipped into a container hub and their destination worldwide is limitless."

She noted that for the fishing industry it is important to have both methods of shipping available to ensure best price and choice for the user and ultimately the buyers. "Containerisation, however, is not solely beneficial to the fishing industry but to the entire Falklands' population giving choice and availability to the worldwide market for imports as well as export.

"To ensure growth and profitability for containerisation the link must be utilised to its fullest potential. Use or lose it, the latter being to the detriment of all," she stated.

He did no such thing

Even bigger alarm bells should have rung when I heard the words: The Scottish Sun, over the phone! So, it was with some trepidation that I opened an article in that paper today to which I had contributed. I knew it was going to be bad after reading the first word, 'Terrified', followed shortly by 'lives in fear.'

The background to the interview was this. We were on the eve of departure from Spain, preparing for a visit to Cuba, when a journalist from the Scottish Sun rang to talk to me. I explained that I was very busy and was pleased that the phone line was playing up that day, making any conversation difficult. But, not to be outdone. the phone continued to ring and eventually we had some kind of 'interview' about the conflict. and the situation today with our near neighbours. I so wish I had resisted and remembered those famous last words about journalistic licence

To put the record straight for anyone vaguely interested in the truth, and especially PN readers in Argentina, I am neither terrified nor living in fear. I am fed up with the constant posturing and sabrerattling from a country which cannot even feed its own children, a country which, through years of corruption, has devastated its economy to the detriment of the people of Argentina, while the people of the Falklands continue to thrive.

With the plethora of recent journalists in the islands, I would be surprised if more journalistic drivel and half truths are not being printed at this very moment.

I was born in the city of Buenos Aires in 1980. I don't have any memories of the war, nor do I have any family members who participated in it, but I have been passionate about this subject all my life.

During recent months there has been an energetic plan to put the 'Malvinas Issue' at the front of the stage in Argentina. Every day there is news and pictures on TV, for the most part repetitive and

loaded with bias and the same thing has been the case in the national newspapers.

For the first time I have put my hand to the task of investigating the British position on this problem. I have often asked for it, but we never hear the Islanders view in our media and neither is an alternative version of their history known in Argentina. The use of the Internet makes this task easier, making me aware of the veil over verifiable historical facts which exists among the South American peoples.

Argentina is not a country with a democratic tradition; we don't have much history of that, while at the same time our society is loaded with authoritarian and dogmatic characteristics. As a people we are characteristed by egotism, overcrowding and extreme fervour, without questioning the rationality of what it is that we are supporting. (Of course we also have positive characteristics, but I believe that you have encountered the worst of us as a people.).

Not having come across any repercussion to the open letter 1 read in Penguin News does not surprise me; 1 did not find it in the Argentine newspapers; this is not by accident and it is not necessary for you to explain the obvious, however, 1 have to tell you that Argentines in general are ignorant about what happened in 1833 and even more so about the earlier history.

In Argentina the average citizen docs not ask himself what happened to the indigenous people who inhabited the lands of the continent, or question what was done to our neighbour Paraguay in the War of the Triple Alliance (Brazil, Argentina, Uruguay). Unfortunately ours is a country without the least conscience about the fact that our history is plagued with lies and atrocities.

If you like you can check what is shown in detail on the back of our 100 peso notes in a photo of the so-called 'Conquest of the Desert' in which conquest indigenous Americans were exterminated.

This ex-Argentine president succeeded in putting an end to an entire culture and we have

it on our largest denomination notes without any problems. This is how we are educated in our schools; the history which we know is what we are shown and not everyone has a sufficiently open mind to hear other versions.

By now you will have gathered that I am very critical of the society in which I live. In the year 2000 I travelled to Europe which gave me the opportunity to visit British museums. From the respectful manner in which they dealt with this subject it is clear that in many ways Britain is a mature society.

Argentina, on the other hand, is a young country and behaves like an adolescent in everything that has to do with democratic issues and with respect to our neighbours. We are learning little by little and we only need to mature socially and 1 estimate that our future generations will be able to enjoy an enduring and solid peace with the Islanders and above all about things which are real and sincere.

I think that this objective will take years of work and for this the Argentines must know all the options and views, "putting their cards on the table," as we say here. Many will feel pain at discovering the bestialities which they supported. Sadly we committed other errors similar to those of 1982.

Be aware of a historical paradox: the war in the eighties allowed my country to have democracy. Many more than 1000 have died for this. Do we really believe that possessing the Islands would change the lives of Argentines? We have thousands of square kilometres which are unpopulated and un-used. Why do we believe that they are so important for our people, when clearly for you they are your home?

The important thing here lies in the minds of Argentines of whom a majority believe that you have robbed them of a part of their territory (although both sides may know that this is not so).

To achieve peace we need to work in this idiosynerasy and way of seeing life. I personally hated the British, but everything changed when I got to know them. It was simply that getting to know and talk to citizens of London was enough to change my irrational hatred into profound admiration and respect. My wish is that this could be repeated with other people.

You will no doubt continue to wonder why I am writing to you; it is simply because I have thought a lot about it and just as once when I was very young I supported the invasion in 1982, I must now, for my part, ask your forgiveness. It is very painful reading your accounts.

I am sorry for everything that happened in 1982.


# Legal high importation spurs health campaign

FOLLOWING on from last week's meeting of the Health and Medical Services Committee (HMSC) a campaign has been started under the leadership of Acting Senior Medical Officer Dr Becey Edwards to educate the public to the dangers of taking what are referred to as "Legal Highs."

Medical Department by Customs and Excise regarding a recent increase in the importation of these substances led to the decision of HMSC to endorse the current campaign which will target school children, parents and those believed to be importing them.

Legal highs are substances that replicate the effects of illegal drugs such as LSD, eestasy, cocaine, amphetamines or marijuana and, according to Dr Edwards, are only legal, "because the law hasn't caught up with them yet."

As these drugs haven't been tested for human consumption and because their formulas are frequently changed to avoid legislation against them, users become human 'guinea pigs' and put themselves at risk.

Information regarding legal highs is to be made available in leaflet form to all school children. An information leaflet offering advice to parents has also been produced for distribution.

The leaflet for parents states that most legal highs are illegal to sell on for human consumption so manufacturers get around this by advertising these substances as, "bath crystals," "plant food," or, "incense," They claim their product is not intended for human consumption.

Legal highs are sold under a variety of names, such as Black Mamba. Atomic Bomb. Luna Waves. Spicy XXX. Tribal Warrior and Radioactive to name but a few. They rarely have their ingredients listed on the packet, which makes it extremely hard to know what they contain.

There is currently no legislation in place in the Falklands to make importation or using of these substances illegal.

Explaining why legal highs are dangerous, the leaflet tells us that the term "Legal High" is misleading, because it implies to the user that the product they are about to use is in some way safe. They are not. Legal highs are just as strong as illegal drugs and often stronger than the drug they mimic. Testing has suggested that synthetic highs are purer and more potent, which can lead to cases of accidental overdose.

In a recent article by Medical News today it is also warned that many drugs sold as 'legal highs' on the internet instead contain controlled substances and are illegal to sell over the internet.

Very little is known about the long term effects of these substances we are told, but the leaflet claims that the short term effects are better known. These include, anxiety, palpitations, reduced inhibitions, hallucinations, nose bleeds, vomiting, drowsiness, raised blood pressure, seizures, breathing difficulties, fitting, coma, limbs turning blue and paranoia.

There have been rare cases of coma and death following legal high use.

The long term effects are just starting to be observed and these seem to be mainly linked to psychiatric problems including, addiction, depression, suicide attempts and bipolar affective disorder.


The early suggestion is that there is a very strong link between legal high abuse and long term depression. The most serious psychiatric effects seem to be in those who use legal highs and already have a history of depression or other psychiatric illness.

Finally we are warned that legal highs become most dangerous when taken with other substances such as regular medications, other types of legal highs or alcohol.

Similar advice to that given in the information leaflets for children and parents will be given by Customs to anyone thought to be importing these substances.

Anyone seeking medical information after taking a legal high is urged to take a sample of the substance and the packet with them to the hospital.

FITV hope to be in a position to cover the Island Games in Bermuda in 2013 and the company are actively seeking sponsors to make that possible.

Also being sought is a fourth member of the production team. FITV plans to increase the programme's frequency to two a week by the end of June and to have its own web site up and running by the year's end, Mr Fowmes announced.







The outlook after Easter is unclear, the Australian Wool Board has seen an 18% reduction in wool testing from this time last year. This could indicate a short supply of wool or it could be an impact of the floods. New Zealand, South Africa and UK have all seen reductions in prices prior to the Easter recess

Derek and Trudi would like to thank everyone who helped make it a great fun day.





I have been tidying up the lily and gladioli bulbs taken from the tunnel borders, ready to plant them in the outside flower borders once I've completed the weeding and popped the annuals, as they finish flowering, into the compost bin. The biennial seeds planted earlier, ie. wallflowers, sweet williams, foxgloves and suchlike need planting out now, and of course, the many perennials and shrubs need to come out of their pots and into the borders. I like to keep a basin or bucket of water beside me when doing this little job and keep the pots in it until well soaked through; this gives plants a good chance to establish. especially with a teaspoonful of bone meal in the ground with them.

Speaking of compost bins, I've been given a fair amount of manure lately, but a garden this size just swallows any amount you care to feed it so all contributions are gratefully received. Most of it has gone straight into the compost bin where, with the rest of the garden waste of cabbage leaves, cut grass, shredded paper, it can become a good mulch for the flower beds and fruit bushes in the spring. I've also set some aside to trench into the plot when the cabbages come out and, if there is enough, to put on the top of the potato plot, once all the potatoes have been lifted. This will have cabbages and other brassicas in next year.

It is a good time while the

weather is like this, and too cold and unpleasant to lift the potatoes, to do some work on the indoor plants. It is still not too late to repot the cyclamens and set them growing again. If the tubers are large enough and have more than one growing point, they can be cut and replanted at this stage whilst they are growing strongly.

The young thrushes are causing havoc with any small plants in pots outside. I would be a bit miffed anyway if they just ate them: that I could at least understand but, oh no, these uncarthed plants just sit on the ground with their roots uncovered, but otherwise untouched! The area outside the tunnels, where most of the young plants are, is now either under mesh, old freezer baskets or anything else that will keep the varmints at bay.

What the clock says has no effect whatsoever on plants, and although there were still small immature fruit on the blackberry, they had little chance of growing to maturity, let alone ripening, due to the light levels. And so it seemed like a good time to take off any edible fruit left and then do a spot of pruning.

Any cases that have fruited are finished and so it's another easy one to do. There seemed to be masses of cases to remove by cutting off at ground level, but just as many young, thick new ones were waiting to replace them, many of them trying to root on the ground they were touching. I went on to treat the raspberries, outdoors, in exactly the same way as the cases that fruited this year, that is, the darker, drier ones, which will not fruit again.

The strawberry plants are in at last: the indoor ones have been moved to another bed inside and the outdoor ones are now in a well fed, raised bed where, hopefully, it will be easier to cover them and keep the birds off. Why oh why can they not just eat the pests surrounding the plants? I've dug out the rhubarb plants as well; they are destined for a richer and sunnier spot in the vegetable garden have now got early and later types so they should keep us going for some time.

The last pumpkin to come off the assembly line was considerably larger than the other


three were; this one had been grown by one of the babies in the family and myself. Naturally, the little one was delighted and, with the other girls shouting,"it is not fair she had help." she waited to be photographed, alone, with it beside her. Shooting stopped half way through for refreshments, and members would like to thank Stephanie for the excellent cakes and John and Cherie for the tea and coffee.







# **Re-living** and righting old wrongs

**BACK** in the Falkland Islands for the first time in thirty years, former Argentine conscript Rubén who now works on behalf of former comrades at the Argentine Senate, indicates where in 1982 he spent ten hours staked out on the cold wet ground as a punishment. His crime was going to look for food after two and a half days without any.

As we reported in 2007, Ruben is involved with other ex-soldiers in bringing an important test case against the officers and NCOs who committed such crimes against humanity, which is still proceeding slowly through the Argentine juducial system.

# Oil price hike

AS FOREIGN Secretary William Hague condemned Argentina's dramatic nationalisation of its main oil company YPF, in the process upsetting its Spanish majority owner, Repsol. British oil exploration companies operating around the Falkland Islands enjoyed a splendid day

In contrast to Repsol's plummeting share price. UK oil firm Borders & Southern Petroleum soared by an astonishing 55 per cent on Wednesday, shrugging off Argentina's claim to sovereignty over the Falklands and its threat to sue any company operating in the vicinity.

Drilling on the Darwin prospect, believed to contain around 760 million barrels of oil, started at the end of January but was held up for a while due to technical problems. It is the first in a series of exploration wells that will test potentially large reservoir targets in deeper water off the Falklands.

Shares in other Falklands-focused companies including Rockhopper Exploration Falklands Oil and Gas and Desire Petroleum benefitted from the halo effect

FOGL shares finished the day at 77p an increase of 12 per cent.

# **Bumper season says Director of Fisheries**

FALKLANDS fishing companies had tonnes of reasons to be cheerful as the first loligo squid season of 2012 drew to a close last weekend

Director of Fisheries John Barton described the season as, "bumper," explaining that 34,900 tonnes had been caught by the mainly Falklands vessels involved; that is more than the entire catch of 2011 when a total of 34,600 tonnes was caught.

Fourteen Falklands flagged vessels make up the loligo fleet along with one British and one Spanish

Commenting on the success of the season, Beauchene Fishing Company Ltd owner Cheryl Roberts confirmed, "it has been an absolutely brilliant season; one of our vessels transhipped three times and another twice

Other companies to enjoy the

season were Argos Ltd, Fortuna Ltd. RBC Ltd. Southern Cross Ltd. Seaview Ltd and Seafish Ltd. Mr Barton added, "the illex season is still going along but with fairly modest catch levels.

Although total illex squid catch is up to 64,000 tonnes, which is reasonable, there are around 90 jiggers involved compared to the 16 in the illex fishery, thus catch per vessel is relatively low

Asked if it seemed likely the season would shut early Mr Barton said. "we will keep an eye on it." but hastened to emphasise that there was no immediate danger. As he explained, "there have been a lot of years when we haven't caught anywhere near that.

With regard to finfish, Fisheries Department scientists are currently involved in a conservation research project on board Castelo, said Mr Barton.

The project involves, "looking at doing a bit more work on mesh size trials to see if there is scope to introduce different minimum mesh sizes.

If mesh sizes are larger, smaller fish such as rock cod will be able to escape before being brought on board the vessels rather than being discarded after being caught.

Training for crew

A number of crew of Falklands owned fishing vessels are currently undertaking Maritime and Coastguard Agency (MCA) safety awareness and risk assessment courses, Mrs Roberts also confirmed when speaking to Penguin News yesterday.

Beauchene Fishing Company Ltd, "have brought an inspector down to carry the training for crews of our two vessels along with some of the crew for CFL Gambler, Consolidated Fisheries long-liner," she explained.

The training takes place over six days and is being conducted at the Chamber of Commerce.

Mrs Roberts described this training as a positive move showing, "more is being done within the Islands with local companies and with our joint venture companies in relation to the Falklands fishing industry

### European show

Mrs Roberts who is also Chair of the Falkland Islands Fishing Companies Association (FIFCA) noted that FIFCA will be attending and manning a stand at the annual European Sealood Exposition in Brussels running from April 24-26. She commented, "we will be interested to see how the loligo prices are standing up

Because the fact is, there is no proof that anyone is peddling these substances and, in a letter sent to me this week, an individual who purchases the legal highs noted that for simplicity of payment to the online shop, he and his friends buy a relatively large amount for personal use as a group and not for onward sale.

Now whether that is accepted by you, or l, as fact or not, I still feel distinctly uncomfortable that a member of our government should encourage a course of action of hysterical rumour-mongering and finger pointing. Yes MLA Cheek noted that her suggestion was not politically correct, but acknowledging that fact doesn't make it any less of a licence to witch-hunt.

Take action of course but may we ask that you do it thoughtfully and intelligently so that it might have a far reaching positive effect, as opposed to wasting time with sensationalist comments that might gamer political support in the short term, but do little more than create paranoia, and divisiveness between generations.



# Exhibition looks at war's effects on man and land

ON March 30, New York based Argentine photographer Adriana Groisman, launched the first of three major exhibitions of work from a project which has been in development for nearly eight years and has involved her making three extended visits to the Falklands as well as visits to Britain and Argentina.

Called 'Voices of the South Atlantic' Adriana's first exhibition at the Photofusion gallery in Brixton. South London on March 30 will run till May 25. This will be followed by a larger exhibition in Wales beginning on May 18, then both exhibitions will be merged with additional material for showing in Plymouth from July 13.

Rooted in the 1982 Falklands War, 'Voices of the South Atlantic' examines the consequences of war, both on the landscape in which it happens and on the people affected. As well as colour photographs of landscapes of the Falkland Islands, and blackand-white seascapes of the South Atlantic the exhibition includes portraits of people who fought on both sides, as well as civilians who were directly affected by it and sound recordings of their testimonies. The premise of the exhibition is that fear and loss are universal, and that pain and trauma affect both the losers and the winners.

Adriana explains her method

as follows: "I started a portrait series with the people I had been working with, mostly by pairing former adversaries who had some kind of connection before, during or after the war-I asked them to hand write a personal message for the specific person or persons they would be paired with, regardless of any political or national context."

By juxtaposing photographs of bloodied and scarred landscapes with testimonies from British and Argentine veterans and Falkland Islanders, a connection is established between the time needed for the terrain to heal over and the period the men themselves need to recover.

As part of her desire to absorb the atmosphere of the landscapes scarred by warfare, and to be in position to capture the first light of dawn, during her second visit to the Falklands, Adriana spent nights camped out on her own at some of the battlefield sites, an experience she admits was scary, but worth it in terms of the results.

When not engaged on this project, Adriana, who has lived in New York for twenty-five years, works as the resident photo journalist there for the Argentine newspaper Clarin. In this capacity, over the years she claims to have met and photographed many Falkland Islands councillors attending the UN Committee of 24.

# Pre trial review

A PRE TRIAL review took place on Wednesday in the case against Simon Reid, currently remanded in custody after previously pleading guilty to several sexual offence charges. The Falkland Islanders have been there a long time. We uphold their right to self-determination."

# Scene of war crime is revisited by veteran

IN this 30th anniversary year of the armed conflict between British and Argentine forces it is not surprising that we have seen, and will continue to see, increased numbers of veterans from both sides arriving in the Islands. What does surprise many civilians, particularly those who were not here to witness warfare first hand, is the discovery that often those who fought find it easier to relate to their former enemies than to those who have never had to bear arms.

That this can be so is because it is the job of a soldier, in battle, to try to kill or at the very least, capture, the enemy. He has to obey orders; it's what he is paid for and war is what he has trained for. He doesn't necessarily have to enjoy what he is doing, or feel any particular animosity towards those he is trying to kill, even when they are trying equally hard to kill him.

If it is not unusual for excombatants to bear little ill-will against their enemies, ill-will between units on the same side or between the ordinary soldiery and their officers would seem to be much more common.

This is particularly so in the case of many of the conscripted soldiers who fought in the Falklands on the Argentine side in 1982. For many of them the battle against the twin enemies of cold and hunger began long before the arrival on the Islands of the British forces and their hardships were added to by the ill-treatment they received at the hands of some of their officers and non-commissioned officers.

On May 27 1982 Ruben Gleriano, who was just a few days short of his nineteenth birthday was caught attempting to filch food from a military canteen. He was hungry because since Argentina's national day, May 25, when all the troops were given a bar of chocolate by General Menendez, he and his companions, who lived in a trench just at the side of where Sulivan Shipping's office now is on Davis Street, had received nothing else to eat. For this crime he spent ten hours from four in the afternoon staked out on the cold wet ground:

In the Falklands for the first time since 1982, on Wednesday Ruben showed Penguin News the spot where he had suffered this punishment. Thanks to a slight slope in the ground he had been able to see Lookout Rocks until he lost consciousness and although many houses have been built in the area since then, the rocks helped him to locate the spot.

At 2am, when he was nearly dead from hypothermia, his companions were able to free him and carry him back to their trench. As he still did not regain consciousness, the next day they took him to a first aid post where he remained, unaware of his surroundings for a further two days. When finally he returned to Argentina at the end of hostilities he needed surgery on his feet which had been frozen.

In 2007 Penguin News named Ruběn, who comes from Mar del Plata, as one of a number of former soldiers who were bringing law suits against officers and NCOs for crimes against humanity, including the torture and even murder of their own troops.

Some of the testimonies by former members of the 12th Infantry Regiment from the northern province of Corrientes concerned two soldiers allegedly shot to death, four others who died of starvation and at least 13 who, like Rubén Gleriano were staked out on the ground.

At the end of hostilities, all returning Argentine soldiers were made to sign an agreement not to recount their experiences, even to their own families. It has only been in the last few years, in the wake of books and subsequently films like lluminados por el Fuego (Made Crazy by Fire) which gave graphic accounts of the treatment dished out to conscripts, that what started simply as rumours have had a more public presence.

Like many other former conscripts, since being released from military service, Rubén has dedicated himself to setting right the wrongs that were done to them and now works for the Argentine Senate in Buenos Aires where he and another ex-conscript head a department concerned with the rights and welfare of their former companions in arms.

As Ruben says, no lawyer or legislator will help the veterans of the Falklands war, unless they themselves work for changes in the law.

Despite the willingness of the present Argentine government to disassociate itself from the actions of the military dictatorship, it is a measure of the difficulties facing ex-combatants in their search for justice that the case brought by Ruben and his colleagues from Corrientes which we reported as going before the provincial court in Tierra del Fuego in 2007 is still waiting to be heard in the Argentine Supreme Court, possibly in March 2013. It is a slow business, but Ruben clings to the belief that in the end justice will prevail.

# Legislative Assembly Diary

MLA Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

AS discussed at the public meeting this week it is clear that urgent work is required to protect our more gullible citizens from substance abuse before someone is harmed by some of the very dubious products being imported in significant quantities. I suggested that in the meantime known importers should be named so that responsible organizations and parents can ensure that these individuals have no contact with vulnerable youngsters. If, as is believed, potentially harmful chemical substances are being sold, then the sellers are no better then drug dealers, one of the lowest forms of human life. The term 'legal' in relation to these products is misleading if people infer that legal means safe. Nothing could be further from the truth. Many products may be imported legally but will not have been tested for human use/ingestion/consumption.

This week is the quietest for some months with just a few routine meetings. The Honourable Dick Sawle is about to depart for a whole series of meetings and events in the UK and the Honourable Barry Elsby will be overseas privately for some time so we will probably not be at full strength until July as in the meantime people will also be attending the UN Committee of 24. It makes good sense for Dick to represent us at a number of thirtieth anniversary events to which we have been invited between pre-planned meetings such as the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association Regional, rather than fly different members over for each.

The neighbours continue to assist us by upsetting all and sundry with their latest threat to YPF/ Repsol, which according to reports today. Monday, only appears to have won the support of poor Mr Chavez. I wonder how many years we must wait for them to accept the inevitable conclusion that this is our country and we will choose our own government and with which other countries we wish to be associated. We must continue to ensure that the outside world knows and understands our right of self determination and our wish to do nothing more than cooperate as good neighbours with South American countries.

# Memorials, fuel and legal highs

MEMBERS of the Legislative Assembly assured public meeting attendees on Monday that the matter of the upkeep of 1982 memorials and monuments would be discussed with the British Forces in the Falkland Islands.

Currently an informal arrangement exists for the purpose involving sections of the forces having responsibility for certain memorials. Cleaning materials are also usually left at the site so that any visitor can clean and tidy the area. A member of the public commented that she visited the sites regularly and was concerned about the poor upkeep of the memorials. She emphasised, "no dis-respect," to the forces who were not always able to get to the sites but suggested that the Falkland Islands Government employ an individual to care for them.

Commander of British Forces Falkland Islands Brigadier Bill Aldridge who attended the meeting also noted that the military did their best to care for the sites and asked that if it was noticed that cleaning materials were not available that people should inform the Military Liasion Officer.

Another member of the public suggested the individual who cared for war graves in the Stanley cemetery under the auspices of the War Graves Commission might be approached and asked to bring all of the memorials within his remit.

## Domestic fuel pricing

Referring to the, "greater volumes of oil being sold to support oil exploration and the greater percentage of Stanley Services Ltd (SSL) business involved in hotels, offices, warehousing and other activities," a member of the public asked the question at the Public Meeting: "Has there been a reduction in the overheads allocated to the domestic fuel pricing formula?"

Chair of the month Member of Legislative Assembly (MLA) "The Sharon Halford replied: increase in the supply of bunker fuel is a matter for Stanley Bunkering Ltd (SBL) and is outside of the Domestic Fuel Formula (DFF). The amount of overheads allocated to the DFF is in accordance with that formula, SSL credit the DFF to reflect any additional effort spent in support of non DFF business. This has also been carried out in accordance with the DFF and its supporting documents. If the DFF had not been calculated as it has been the price of fuels at the pump would be approximately 0.1ppl more expensive.

### Legal highs

Concerns regarding the import of legal highs into the Falklands were raised at the meeting. MLA



Jan Cheek commented that the Falkland Islands Government was looking at, "what other countries are doing," and how they might instigate some kind of ban. They noted, however, that there were difficulties involving the banning of certain chemicals as this might cause problems to retailers who provided goods, plant food or cleaning products for example, that contained the same chemicals. MLA Dick Sawle commented that there was, "a general will to stop but it was acknowledged by īL. MLA Mike Summers that any attempts to do so must be, "within the law," when MLA Jan Cheek commented that although it was, "not very politically correct," she would be inclined to, "name and shame," individuals so parents could keep their children away from them

**Cost of quashing conviction** PROSECUTION costs totalled £9,877.55 for the quashing of conviction and sentences imposed on Colin MacDonald last year it was confirmed at the meeting.

Defence costs were £9,1 $\check{6}9.67$ and the Chief Justice's fees were £4,565, adding up to a total of £23,612.22.

These costs include all the costs that have been paid by FIG including where relevant flights, accommodation, transport and suchlike that related to the case.

T-shirts will be available on the day, on a first come first served basis.

She added: "Cancer has, and will, touch in some way most, if not all of us in our lifetimes, so a back plate will be offered to participants so that you can choose to run for someone if you wish.

"Entry is £10 per person and sponsorship forms are available from the MPA gym and the Stanley Leisure Centre. The target is £4000 this year and will only be achieved with support from all of the communities in the Islands."

THE Senior Magistrate Carl Gumsley has announced the introduction of a new Legal Aid Scheme for the Falkland Islands.

He told Penguin News this week the scheme will increase the number of people who might be eligible to receive help with legal costs.

It covers help with legal costs for advice and assistance and representation in both criminal and civil cases.

Whether a person is eligible for legal aid will depend upon a number of factors including the type of case, how serious it is, a person's financial circumstances and whether there are reasonable prospects of success. Changes in this new scheme from the one previously in operation in the Falklands include the format of the Scheme which is designed to make it more accessible and understandable to the public, the taking into account housing costs and family size when assessing eligibility, a removal or reduction in contributions from those who are eligible, and a discretion for

# Busy schedule for MLA Sawle

A FOUR day conference at Canterbury University discussing the Falkland Islands '30 years on', will begin Member of Legislative Assembly Dick Sawle's visit to the UK.

He will deliver a speech on the Falkland's growth since 1982 and its future 'rosy' prospects.

Sir John Nott who was the Secretary of Defence in 1982 and dispatched the task force, will open the proceedings and Major General Julian Thompson and Commodore Michael Clapp will speak on the amphibious phase of the conflict, while Mr Peter Hennessy will assess what British intelligence knew about the Argentine intentions on the eve of the invasion. A panel of Islanders including Patrick Watts, former head of Falklands Radio, will describe their experiences of the war.

MLA Sawle commented this week: "I have prepared a presentation on what the Falklands has done in the 30 years since the war, political, social and economic developments and I think the story we have to tell there is a good one."

He added that he believes, "the Falklands has grown and matured amazingly well."

He will also attend a SAMA meeting, a service in Liverpool in memory of those who died on the *Atlantic Conveyor* in the 1982 War, the Queen's Jubilee celebrations, the CPA meeting in Scotland and a number of other meetings on behalf of the Falkland Islands Government. legal aid to be granted in cases of fundamental public importance.

Applications for legal aid under the Scheme are determined by the Senior Magistrate, and administered by the Courts Administrator, Mrs Val Padgett.

The Law Courts of the Falkland Islands are independent of the government, and Mr Gumsley has been looking at other ways to promote a greater understanding of what role the Courts have in society and to promote greater access to the justice system.

These include producing a directory of overseas lawyers who are willing and committed to assisting the people of the Falkland Islands should local lawyers not be able to help.

The Senior Magistrate said: "1 am wholly committed to the idea and principles of justice being open to everyone. It was once said that the Courts are 'open to everyone, just like the doors of the Ritz Hotel' and I fear that a lot of people may still feel this is the case. I hope that the initiatives that the Courts are trying to introduce will begin to change that perception.

"Of course it is usually much better to try and sort out your problems without recourse to law where that is at all possible but when that can't be done it is essential that people feel able and confident to turn to the Courts for justice"\_

People will be able to view a copy of the Scheme, which it is planned will come into force on May 1, 2012 at the Courts, the Library, Gilbert House, the Attorney General's Chambers, Social Services and at the offices of the legal practitioners on the Islands.

Mr Gumsely explained that unfortunately the Court itself will be unable to advise as to the merits of any specific case and anyone who feels that they may have a case which is or might be eligible for legal aid should (in the first instance) seek out the help of one of the Island's legal practices, McGrigors or Falkland Island Legal Services who will be able to advise as to whether they may qualify.

He says he is hoping to try new things while he is here for the next two years and most of all enjoy himself, as, "life is too short not to."



THE weather has been a bit changeable with some glorious days for the time of year. Don't be fooled though because the wintery stuff is lurking in the wings. Now is the time to check out your hen houses for leaks and try to stop them, not always an easy task with the horizontal rain we often have. Keeping the hen house and nest boxes clean and dry will stop them getting so cold. I've lined a couple of my home made wooden crate conversions with some old cork tiles left over from a building project. This adds an extra layer of insulation. The only problem with lining like this is that you can create lovely crevices for the old red mite to thrive, so keep an eye out for them. A red mite infestation is just as bad for the birds as being cold! Also, make sure that your hen house has good ventilation as the birds will spend longer indoors when it's cold, dark and wet outside. I have a small field shelter in some of my runs and the birds spend most of the day in there where they can still find a dry dustbath and feeder. This keeps the hen house much cleaner as they only go in to lay or sleep.

Check out your hen run too and try and provide a dry area. Hen runs can become extremely muddy and unpleasant places. A pallet or two with some mesh fixed on top to stop legs being trapped can offer a nice island for the birds to soak up some sun, even in the wettest and muddlest run.

If your polytunnel is past its best now (or a neighbour's or friends), you can put your birds to good use and give them a cosier place for the winter.

They will scratch up and clean out weeds and potential self-set spuds, eat insect pupae and other nasties (earwigs included), and fertilise the ground at the same time. Provide them with some temporary roost bars though as you don't want them to develop the habit of sleeping on the ground, because they will then sleep in nest boxes when you move them back to the proper hen house.

Place a couple of boxes around with bedding in for those that are still laying. You can erect a simple tent like structure over their roost area for more warmth too. Doing all this gives you a chance to rest your hen run and deep clean your hen house ready for when they move back in.

## WELL that's Sports Week gone and hammered to a standstill in every way! Also gone is another shearing season resulting

in 12,535 shorn by yours truly. I worked with the usual mix of good young shearers and girls and didn't our team do ever so well at the Golden Shears, but I would also like to mention two I worked with, not in the spot light, Rachel Marsh who has quickly developed into an excellent wool handler and Diane Betts who is very efficient at all jobs in and around the shed.

Back at Port Edgar post sports we pilled our weaned lambs with cobalt and moved them to their autumn camp to join the two hundred that the Watch Group had helped us weigh and inject with vitamin B12 as part of an experiment. We also injected 32 small piner lambs that we keep close to the settlement over winter and along with our ram hogs (fed and sheltered in the shearing shed each snowy night.) They soon get used to this and would wait outside the shed door on any rough night. If the small ones survive the winter we then pill them. But while injecting these little fellows I found out you should really put the cap over the needle when not using, especially while opening a gate! A scratch on the hand probably did not result in any B12 entering my blood stream, but reminded me of a certain farmer in north West Falklands who while injecting rams for an A.l. programme with the sheep equivalent of testosterone, somehow injected himself.

He swore it was for no personal gain but I think he was just seeing if he could save himself NHS prescription charges.

Back on the farm with Tex Alazia

After helping to gather, shear, and sort the sheep at Rum Station we headed across the pond to the Ram Sale for a look but mostly as a stepping stone to Keith's milestone birthday party at Goose Green. All the usual suspects were there and it was a very eniovable night with a large crowd and plenty of banter, food and dancing. A choppy sea and ferry crossing was not the best cure for a hangover the next day so I spent most of the trip on deck looking out for whales; speaking of which there has been a lot around everywhere I believe. Certainly while flail-mowing our airstrip and watching them from my tractor just off shore made one reflect on how lucky we were, and given the month and year, reflection is what a lot of folk have been doing

I enjoyed the FIRS interviews with some of the FIDF members called out on that night thirty years ago. For me, living in the UK and not long out of the RAF1 felt very frustrated that I was not heading towards Ascension via Brize or Portsmouth, so I drove down to London to the old Falklands office and helped out there, mostly by camping out in the office at night so Sukey and co. were free to go home leaving the office and phones manned.

THE runners were almost poised to begin Britain's greatest horse race a week or so ago when a friend asked me if I had a tip for the horses. "Yes," I said. "Tell them not to do it. My tip for them is that they should dig in their hooves and refuse to gallop. Because if they do run, they stand a good chance of breaking a leg and be killed on the spot. And even if they win their only reward will be buckets of oats and water.

The Grand National is a raw and dangerous deal for the geegees, rather more dangerous than the race I have been running recently. Nevertheless, 1 sometimes think I should have taken the same advice that 1 offered those fourlegged heroes when I accepted a commission to write a book about the Falklands early in November last year. Unlike the horses, I volunteered for my race, but while 1 finally staggered across the line a couple of weeks ago, I'm still recovering and I do not even know if I've won.

That is something you may tell me in a few weeks.

The words of my publishers were still rattling around in my head when I left for Stanley early last November, to spend the best part of a month talking to people, listening and learning. "Don't forget, Graham," said the commissioner. "We want 85,000 words by the end of January, and we want the book polished up, indexed and corrected by early April. Because that's when the Falklands will be back in the news, and that's when we want you book to be in the shops. You've got five months. Cheerio."

The 30th anniversary of the invasion of the Falklands and the despatch of the task force, was just five months away, and if 1 missed that deadline, 1 might as well fall at the literary equivalent of Beechers' Brook, to be put down on the spot.

The book's pre-agreed name: Fortress Falklands – Life Under Siege in Britain's Last Outpost', reflects the profoundly serious challenges facing the Islands in 2012. There is a strong military presence manning the ramparts. And civilians within the fortress are well aware that the blockading Argentine government is doing all it can to choke the life out

The original brief was to concentrate on defence, looking at the Islands' men and women under arms, and the formidable hardware to establish whether the deterrent was credible.

Then I was to consider Argentine capability before looking at the regional politics and the state of diplomacy. Soon after arriving in the Falklands, however, I found that I needed to approach the book in a different way. British Forces Falklands were not in a mood to talk to me or show me their wares. They appeared to be under orders from London not to risk upsetting the delicate diplomatic situation by appearing to brag about their capability.

It was a shame, but in November 2011, no cross-departmental Whitehall strategy for handling the 30th anniversary had been agreed, and the holding plan was to do and say nothing. The Argentines were, as is obvious if you look back to early last summer, having it all their own way. Number 10 Downing St, the MOD and the Foreign Office, did eventually get their strategy together, and London has recently been quite successful at countering the Argentine offensive, which now ap-pears disjointed. But back then, journalists and writers were not to be encouraged.

So, I changed tack, and decided to look at the many other fascinating aspects of the Falklands today. And I am glad that I did. # Court: 'Genuine cause to suspect'

MICHAEL Barry Hirtle was remanded in custody on Friday by Senior Magistrate Carl Gumsley after being found guilty of failing to produce a sample of breath when requested by a police officer.

Earlier the court had heard that on the morning of Sunday March 25, at around 10.30 Leading Police Constable Andrea Barlow had been dispatched to Mr Hirtle's address after a call from a member of the public claiming that Mr Hirtle, currently serving a driving ban, was sitting at the wheel of his father's car with the engine running.

On arrival at the scene. LPC Barlow had discovered Mr Hirtle sitting in the driver's seat of the vehicle smoking, but with the engine turned off and no sign of the ignition key.

According to LPC Barlow's account, Mr Hirtle appeared drunk and became very abusive.

When asked to give a sample of breath Mr Hirtle refused, both at the vehicle and later at the police station to which Mr Hirtle had accompanied LPC Barlow without protest.

Senior Magistrate Carl Gumsley, heard evidence from defence counsel, Mark Neeves, that at the time of the incident the only keys to the vehicle were locked inside a safe, the key to which was in Mr Hirtle's father's wallet at North Arm.

However, he said that what mattered was not whether Mr Hirtle was in charge of the vehicle or whether he had consumed alcohol but whether LPC Barlow had reasonable cause for suspicion that he had been and was therefore justified in demanding that he give a breath sample.

Mr Gumsley concluded that though the court was not fully satisfied that Mr Hirtle had in fact been in charge of the vehicle, on the circumstances of the case, plus the information received from a credible witness, LPC Barlow had had, "genuine cause to suspect." He therefore found Mr Hirtle guilty of the offence for which he was charged and remanded him in custody pending a report from the Social Welfare Department.



# School sensory garden thanks to Standard Chartered bank

AN initiative which it is hoped will turn a currently abandoned area of the Infant and Junior School (IJS) into a space to stimulate the senses will now be possible thanks to the generosity of the Standard Chartered Bank.

On Wednesday afternoon, members of the US School Council received a cheque for eight thousand, one hundred and ninety-five pounds from bank manager Binoy Karia, which is the estimated cost of creating a sensory garden, where today there is just some scruffy grass.

Favourite was the idea of a "sensory garden," essentially a quiet area filled with plants and other equipment, like wind chimes, designed to appeal to the senses and stimulate imagination.

This, according to head teacher Tom Hill will turn what is now a waste area into a resource which will be of special benefit to young children and those with special needs.

As part of Standard Chartered Bank's diversity and inclusion programme it has had an ongoing involvement with the IJS and Camp Education, and so was

# Oil exploration brings another budget surplus

INCOME tax from oil workers, and corporation tax from oil companies, has added up to an unexpected addition of £9.2M to the Falkland Islands Government budget in the first nine months of the financial year 2011/12.

Added to this, £5.6million from illex licence revenue (£4million above budget) and favourable performances by a number of government directorates, FIG now boasts a budget surplus of £14.513M it was reported at Wednesday's Standing Finance Committee Meeting.

This is all compared to a revised budget surplus of £3.615M giving a positive performance of £10.898M confirmed government Management Accountant Daniel Heath.

Regarding the illex revenue Director of Fisheries was reported to have assured that the department anticipates no more than a 40% refund to fishing companies. A 50% refund, which is still a possibility given the current level of catch, would reduce this additional revenue to £3M. A particularly successful season, with no refunds, could see illex revenues as high as £9,4M.

Revenues within the Natural Resources Department have also been boosted by oil exploration companies paying out for berthing fees (£169K), purchase of water (£58K) and rent received (£109K). These increased revenues are expected to continue for the period of exploration.

Health and Education has also shown a favourable £348K surplus, partly as a result of the Medical Services Tax (MST) which is currently £413K over estimate. Current projections indicate total revenues for the year coming in at £546K over estimate.

A number of directorates have budgets showing a spend lower than expected at this point in the year including Central Services which shows a favourable £192K while Health and Education also shows a favourable £10K. The Health & Social Services section is £210K overspent. The Acting Financial Secretary Nicola Granger noted she had concerns that the department had committed expenditure without the budget available, particularly in the area of locums. However, the Education department is stand-ing £200K favourable in relation to the year to date estimate. and therefore the Directorate as a whole has managed the over spend, though retrospectively, reported Mr Heath.

There is currently a £36K underspend in fees for post-16 education due to a smaller than expected number of students requiring this year, which is expected to increase further before June.

Also in terms of expenditure the Public Works Department achieved a £52K under spend and Natural Resources a £161K under spend and Mineral Resources were £121K favourable. The latter is driven by a £115K saving in hydrocarbon consultancies.

Speaking of Capital Expenditure Mr Heath said capital schemes were currently behind schedule by £454K. Examples of progress to note included the Asphalt plant which is £92K under estimate due to a slower start on the project resulting from an assessment of road building priorities being undertaken.

He said: "This project has now begun although it is unclear whether it is likely to be completed by the year end."

Stanley Landscaping is £25K under estimate because of a delay to work on Snake Hill due to materials not arriving on time. The work has been re-scheduled for later in the year.

The Department of Natural Resources is  $\pounds71K$  year to date over budget with a total increase in project costs of  $\pounds370K$ . Additional funding has been approved by SFC.

Some highways project are currently running behind schedule with a year to date under spend of £268K, reported Mr Heath. Friday, April 27, 2012

## New man in medical

THE Director of Health and Education David Jenkins announced yesterday that Dr Robert (Rob) Queenborough has accepted an initial three year contract as the Chief Medical Officer.

Mr Jenkins commented: "Rob had a very brief and enjoyable visit to the Falkland Islands last week and met a variety of people from both Camp and Stanley and a number of clinical staff in the hospital."

Dr Queenborough trained as a doctor in 1979 in the Medical School, University of Birmingham and undertook his Diploma of the Royal College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists in 1983. His wide-ranging professional experience includes clinical governance and commissioning, clinical pathway development, medicines management and the national development of Nurse Prescribing explained Mr Jenkins.

Dr Queenborough will arrive in the Falklands, with his wife, on the June 3. He and his wife are keen walkers and are described as keen to explore further the beauty of the Falkland Islands.

Mr Jenkins said: "I am particularly pleased that Rob and I share the vision for the future of the health service and that I am in no doubt that, by working together, we will create further positive changes to the health service that will stand it in good stead for years to come."

#### Argentina warns

THE Argentine government has warned oil companies considered by that government to be, "illegally operating," in the Falklands Islands that it will press charges against them unless they justify their actions before next Wednesday, May 2.

The companies notified were Argos Resources, Rockhopper Exploration, Borders and Southern PLC, Falkland Oil & Gas Ltd and Desire Petroleum PLC.

The warning adds: "In case of failure to offer a response and once the legal deadline expires, we will issue the corresponding sanctions to every company according to a resolution by the Argentine Energy Secretariat."

#### Comment by Editor Lisa Watson

READING the FIG Management Accountant's financial report this week, it was difficult to decide whether to fizz with delight at another unexpectedly positive performance, in this case for the last nine months; or be mildly dismayed that our administration had been yet again 'surprised' by a healthy budget surplus.

In fact with regard to the latter I had, mid week, probably irritatingly, distracted the rest of Penguin News staff, by spouting figures from the above mentioned report (I like to share) and having announced the happy surplus and rhetorically enquired: "Well I wonder what that means," a visitor in the outer office called out: "it means their accountants are pretty rubbish."

Of course he jested: no doubt the Acting Financial Secretary errs deeply on the side of caution, and presumably it's difficult to foresec precisely how many squid will obligingly cling to jigging lures over a season, let alone have the faintest idea what the oil companies are planning.

At the same time it would be interesting to know to what extent such a cagey approach delays investment planning, capital planning, or any other type of planning within government. Even if 'best case' worst case' assumptions are made along the way, a generally gloomy approach to the budget has to have some kind of limiting effect, if not on progress, then on the speed of progress.

Then again, perhaps caution should be a concept the PN editor might embrace more often? After all if this one had followed her journalist's suggestion and placed a swimming gala photo ("kids sell papers Lisa") on the front page last week instead of Rubén the Argentine veteran, it's likely we wouldn't have had to deal with two grumpy letters and one irate phone-call.

But is it the job of the only local paper to provide content that avoids discomforting the reader? Should newspapers hide from obvious view those stories that provoke or unsettle? After all we're not a PR company or even a propaganda publication, and if we were to act as either, would that not be a disservice to our readers?

There's probably no right or wrong answer, and as such 1 respect all of the varying reactions 1 have received. At the same time if this particular editor is ever called upon in the future to make a quick decision between the every-day and the controversial, 1 still believe my inclination would be to opt for the latter.

# Historic flag is brought back to its old home

Colonel, Ewen Southby-Tailyour and raised again by the Royal Marines at Government House after the Argentine surrender in 1982 was presented to the Museum and National Trust on Wednesday night after being de-commissioned from the Royal Marines Museum at Southsea, Hampshire.

## Clearing up a rocky issue

WITH rock of all sorts being an essential requirement for almost any kind of construction, whether housing, lay-down yards or road building, how FIG as the main supplier prices the various products of its Pony Pass quarry is a subject which has frequently been raised at public meetings and elsewhere.

At the meeting of the Standing Finance Committee on Wednesday, Director of Public Works, Manfred Keenleyside presented an information paper entitled 'Report on Quarry Pricing and Costs versus Revenues,' designed to provide members with detail on how the quarry's products are priced.

Mr Keenleyside explained that prices of external and internal sales had been the same over the period 2007 to 2008, but that a review was undertaken in 2008/09 with the aim of reaching full cost recovery for visible costs, which were rising.

At that stage internal transfer costs were not applied and internal sale prices were not increased. Price increases for external sales were approved at the rate of 20% in year one, and 10% for the following four years, but costs for consumables and wear parts such as crusher jaws, had risen over the intervening period to a point where a 20% increase was applied instead in the third year

Over this period internal price rates were left at the 2007/08 rate

Following complaints about the price disparity between internal and external sales, a further review was undertaken with reference again made to costs for plant which were significant.

It was proposed that these costs should be applied, and a price review again undertaken to ascertain prices if these were both to be equalised for internal and external sales and plant hire charges applied.

The Director of Public Works said that it was apparent that prices would need to increase further if breakeven was to be achieved and it was proposed that FIG rates be equalised with those for external sales in 2012/13 and that a single pricing structure be used from that point. The need for increases will be reviewed each year, but it is anticipated that increases greater than inflation will eventually be required to achieve break even at projected production levels and costs.

### Up and down for FI oilers LAST WEEK, the share price

of Borders & Southern rose by 88 per cent following rumours thought to have been started by the Sunday Times about the drilling results from the company's Darwin exploration well. The hope was that Darwin, the first deepwater target in the southern basin to be drilled could contain as much as 760m barrels of oil. In the event, Borders' initial drilling turned up a 177 metre interval of gas condensate - with no details given as to the volume of the discovery, nor the proportion of gas to liquids.

Following these preliminary findings, shares in the Aim-listed company fell 32 per cent, to 89.5p. Gas condensate - a lighter, petrol-like substance - could be more challenging to extract commercially, analysts said, and data on the scale of the discovery are, at this stage, vague.

## Scavengers

SIX teams set out on a Scavenger Hunt organised by members of Christ Church Cathedral on Sunday; the challenge to track down local artists and writers, ransack lofts and outhouses. pick teaberries in the bitter cold, and photograph a variety of the more unusual flags on display on Stanley's flag-poles.

Alison Inglis said: "Highlights from the hunt included the 19th c. Howatt family bible, polished stones from the Ellis household and a mudguard from a Government House land rover. One team gained bonus points for a photograph of their favourite Stanley landmark (the 'husband creche').

Upon returning to the Parish Hall, each team was challenged to use some of the items collected to make a picture on the 'Falklands 30' theme.'

The best entry was a map of the Falklands made of shredded flower petals by Tim Stenning and 'The Noisy Crew'.

# **Argentine flights** offer presented by London embassy

ON TUESDAY, Argentina's Ambassador to the UK Alicia Castro raised Argentina's proposal to establish Aerolineas Argentinas airline regular flights to the Falkland Islands, during a meeting with UK's Minister of State Jeremy Browne

in London. According to an official communique, the Argentine proposal to resume direct flights between Argentina's main land and the Falklands, "marks an opportunity to enhance the islanders' quality MLA Summers

of life and their com munications capabilities."

The idea of such a service, which would replace the weekly LAN flight from Santiago was first mooted by Cristina Fernandez de Kirchner in a speech to the Argentine Government, on March . In the speech the Argentine President spoke of plans to, "reopen," the Buenos Aires to Falkland Islands flight route.

At the time, the Buenos Aires Herald reported the President's intention to instruct Foreign Minister Hector Timerman to renegotiate the flight path to the Islands. underlining that Buenos Aires be used instead of the route via Chile

Then as now, no direct approach has been made to the Falkland Islands Government although the consent of the Civil Aviation Department would be required for any such flights as proposed.

In the wake of Mrs Kirchner's March 1 speech, MLA Roger Edwards said, "it is difficult not to be sceptical of any proposal that would in effect give Argentina control over access to our home."

A similarly robust rejection was made by MLA Sharon Halford on Wednesday. Speaking on the Argentine Radio Mitre station, Mrs Halford said that the flights offered were unnecessary and that

she found the offer itself rather strange while Argentina continued to ban charter flights to the Falkland Islands.

This point was also made on Falklands radio by MLA Mike Summers, who said that although the offer had been

spoken about by Ambassador Alicia Castro in conversation with the British minister, no formal approach had yet been made. Mr Summers emphasised that the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) would be unlikely to view any such approach with favour while the charter flight ban remained.

While rejecting the Argentine offer of flights to the Islands, MLA Summers said that FIG would take, "a positive attitude" towards the suggestion from the Ambassador that her government considered the preservation of fish stocks an important issue and was prepared to consider the reopening of discussions about the terms and conditions of the South Atlantic Fishing Commission

The Argentine communique concluded,"the Argentine government reiterates its determination to solve the existent sovereignty dispute by peaceful and diplomatic means, while also expects the British government to listen to and obey the numerous United Nations' resolutions issued on this matter



SEBASTIAN Socodo (32) admitted to a charge of common assault in court on Wednesday

On the evening of March 8, Mr Socodo and the complainant, Mr Rodriguez, became involved in an alcohol fuelled play-fight at Mr Socodo's home. Mr Socodo became more aggressive and knocked Mr Rodriguez to the floor with a strong punch before repeatedly beating him until his mouth filled with blood. Mr Socodo called the police who found Mr Rodriguez nearby with a contusion on his forehead and severe bruising to his eye which left him unable to see and consequently to work that following week. The bruising and swelling to his face also made sleeping difficult.

On seeing photographs of the victim after the attack Senior Magistrate Carl Gumsley found it, "beyond belief" that Mr Socodo was being charged with common assault and expressed the view that a charge of actual bodily harm would have been more appropriate, as would the severity of punishment that could be imposed.

Crown Prosecutor Alison Inglis said that while she agreed the photographs were, "horrific" it was the fact there were no broken bones on the victim that directed the decision of the Attorney Generals department to charge Mr Socodo with common assault

The Senior Magistrate delayed sentencing until the afternoon to enable a probation officer's report to be produced to assist in sentencing. Robert Gardener of the Social Welfare department agreed with Mr Gumsley's assessment of the seriousness of the offence which he described as. "appalling.

It was also remarked by Mr Gumsley that the fact Mr Socodo's wife and two children slept upstairs whilst the attack took place aggravated the case.

Mr Gumsley told Mr Socodo "you deserve prison," but "as a reflection of the AG's decision 1 am restricted." explaining that the maximum custodial sentence he could impose would be too short and subsequently ineffective.

Mr Socodo was sentenced to 220 hrs. community service and to pay £1,085 damages to Mr Rodriguez, "as a token of the distress suffered." Mr Gumsley added that he felt the £85 prosecution costs normally awarded would be better given to Mr Rodriguez and regretted that he could not impose a probation order on Mr Socodo. In his final remarks the Senior Magistrate told Mr Socodo, "You have been extremely fortunate. For this you have to thank your counsel. Mr Neeves, and the Attorney General's Chambers for taking one of the most extraordinary decisions of my legal career.'

# Successful Falklands stamp sale

IN a Falkland auction arranged by Stefan Heijtz, stamps, covers, books and other collectables for more than £65,000 were sold. This is a record for these auctions which have been arranged since 1992 and included almost 700 different auction lots and the prices ranged from a few pounds up to thousands. The most expensive item sold in the auction was an 1891 envelope to the United States, with a unique combination of stamps, which sold for £3,600. The most expensive single stamp was a 1968 printing error, a 2d. stamp with the yellow colour missing, which sold



for £1,320. An unused postcard from 1912 showing a picture of the whaling station at Leith Harbour, South Georgia, sold for £125, and the 1773 book about Bougainville's journey to the

Falklands (mentioned in Penguin News in March) sold for £1,440. Mail from the 1982 conflict period was extremely popular and every item offered in this section was sold. Another section which was very popular was the 'cork cancellations' on stamps. These were cancellations cut to various shapes using rum bottle corks and a sharp knife, and they were in use between 1878 and 1895. The most expensive examples were a single stamp sold for £385 and a postcard sold for £1,000.

## Legislative Assembly Diary

IN addition to the normal end of month round of General Purposes Committee, Executive Council and Standing Finance Committee next week we have another session of Budget Select Committee, with more difficult decisions to be made. The different priorities espoused by members require careful thought, and reaching a reasonable consensus will not be straightforward. Everyone has views on how any 'windfall' funds may be allocated, whether to roads, pension funds, targeted help for the least well off, or investment in development to increase income in the future. I'm guessing that what we finally do will be a mix. I hope a balanced one

Urgent decisions will be made this week regarding ways to combat the increasing quantities of so called 'legal highs' being imported and offered to children as young as 13 or 14. Another MLA and I have been contacted by a member of the public who alleges that young people have been hospitalised with substance abuse related problems and that some mental health issues are already emerging as a conse-quence. Parents have reported anecdotal evidence from their older children who are worried that some of their contemporaries are mixing drinking alcohol and these substances which could have even more dire and unpredictable consequences. As MLAs we have a heavy responsibility to ensure that vulnerable individuals are protected from those who would exploit them or profit from their naivety. If, as seems likely, urgent new legislation will be required then we will ensure that it takes priority.

A more cheerful experience last week was the Rocky Monster Show displaying the talents of many students of all ages. The Junior School choir linked the scenes which was a real pleasure as such young performers are not always so tuneful. It is good to see staff and students working together and seemingly having fun at the same time. Our system had much that is good, and the more l hear about the failings of the UK system and relative illiteracy of many of their school leavers, the more I think we need to be very selective in which parts we adopt.

## Extra funds for busy MLAs?

FIFTY thousand pounds to be divided equally between allowances for Members of the Legislative Assembly (MLA) and the Liberation Anniversary costs, may be added to the Legislature budget for this financial year.

A paper considered at the Standing Finance Committee meeting on Wednesday noted that the workload of MLAs had been increasing for some time, however, during the current financial year there had been a concentrated push in public diplomacy effort. This had resulted in a heavier workload for MLAs which had included additional trips abroad.

The paper presented by the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly added that work on the ground

had also increased with many requests for hosting and for press interviews either remotely or face to face.

The post of Public Relations Manager, awarded to Darren Christie, was also created and the initial set up costs for equipment and training course expenses were taken from the Legislature PR budget. The corresponding bid to the FCO to offset some of those costs was rejected.

In terms of the additional £25,000 for the 30th Anniversary year, the original budget had been set for a low key event; however the guest list for June is now longer than originally planned and includes spouses or partners.

The originally approved budg-

et for Members Allowances for the current financial year was £130,000 but this will shortly be exceeded.

£50,000 was originally budgeted to cover costs for the June 2012 anniversary.

The invited guest list has expanded to 12 people (to include spouses/partners) and lapel pins, plaques, wreaths have been purchased and donations made to the National Arboretum memorial and the FIDF Veterans 30th Anniversary function.

The majority of the remaining funds will be taken up with flight costs.

On island costs for accommodation, transport, events and incidentals are estimated to be £25K.

## Fuel price adds to inflation

THE increase in cost of heating fuel is one of the major contributors to the 1.7% increase in the retail price index reported for the quarter ending March 31, 2012.

Heating fuel, kerosene has increased by 0.78 % with 'miscellaneous' noted to have contributed 0.59%. The report shows that specific goods chosen for the analysis including cereal, cat food, butter, chicken breasts and sausages had each increased by between 0.07% and 0.09%.



In the last quarter of 2011 the increase was reported as 1.5% and the quarter prior to that, 0.6%.



STANDING Finance Committee gave approval on Wednesday for transfers to Special Funds to improve the stability of the Capital Equalisation Fund and Pensions (Old Scheme) Fund.

An additional transfer of  $\pounds 5M$ will be made to the Capital Equalisation Fund in 2011/12 along with a one off transfer of  $\pounds 3M$  to the Pensions (Old Scheme) Fund in 2011/12.

£8M will be taken from the Consolidated Fund in order to cover the transfers.

The funding was required as the current projection for the three year capital programme for 2011/12 - 2013/14 is £28.6M while the Capital Equalisation Fund at June 30, 2011 stood at £21.5M. Also the Pension (Old Scheme) Fund is currently underfunded by £3.2M. This was discussed in ExCo 238/11 and an annual contribution of £300K was approved.

## Queen's badge

NOMINATIONS are being sought for the 2012 Queen's Certificate and Badge of Honour.

The award is one that recognises people with connections to the Falklands who have provided. "services of exceptional benefit to the people of the Falkland Islands," according to a press release from Government House, and is awarded by the Governor, acting on the advice of Executive Council on or around Falkland Day (14 August).

The number of recipients is normally to restricted to three a year but anybody can nominate a person and nomination forms are available on request from Gilbert House. Nominations should be submitted before Friday June 15 for the Executive Council at Gilbert House email celifford@sec. gov.fk

The award carries with it the right to wear a badge to be worn on the chest on official occasions.

# **Integrating environmental management of Falklands**

AT the end of March, a two day workshop was held in Stanley to consider and discuss what key actions need to be taken to ensure that the environment is taken into account in planning the economic future of the Falkland Islands.

The workshop was well attended by government and private sector representatives from all the key sectors, including the environment, fisheries, agriculture, minerals/oil, public works, development and tourism. Organisations represented at the workshop included the Falkland Islands Fishing Companies Association, the Rural Business Association and the Chamber of Commerce.

Representatives from the Foreign and Commonwealth (FCO) office in London, who have funded the project, and the Environment Department at Ascension Island, also participated in the workshop.

The main aims of the workshop were to determine ways in which environmental issues can be better integrated into the business planning and decision-making processes of existing institutions in the Falkland Islands in order to secure a better future for the Islands.

It was highlighted in this discussion that there were already examples of good practice in the Falklands. The Falkland Islands Offshore Hydrocarbon Environmental Forum and the Seabird Bycatch Advisory Committee were two such mechanisms, which facilitate a collaborative and proactive approach to considering and responding to the environmental implications of the hydrocarbons and fisheries sectors, respectively.

Other areas of discussion included the value of the Falkland Islands ratifying the Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD), the need for a more strategic and cross-sectoral approach to a range of environmental issues, including waste management and biosecurity, and the importance of education and increasing public awareness about the value of the Falklands environment to the economy and social well-being of the Islands' inhabitants.

The importance of collecting baseline information and continuing to monitor a range of environmental attributes was highlighted, as was the need for an integrated data management system.

It was agreed that there was a requirement for new and improved procedures to ensure that the objectives specified in the Falkland Islands Environmental Charter and Biodiversity Strategy are achieved.

Most importantly, the meeting discussed the need for a specific forum or body to facilitate better cross-sectoral communication and collaboration on environmental issues. This led to a clear consensus that a more formal mechanism for integrated environmental management should be developed by forming a cross-sectoral Biodiversity and Environmental Mainstreaming Group.

Such a group could drive forward environmental actions that had been previously identified as priorities in the biodiversity strategy and the recommendations from this workshop previously mentioned.

A report will be presented to FIG and the UK government providing recommendations on future streamlining of environmental activities in the Falkland Islands.

## **Clippings from FLH Board Meeting**

GENERAL Manager of FLH. Owen Summers reported at the Board's meeting on April 26 that wool sales had slowed up somewhat since the last report.

230368 kg clean had been sold to date at prices averaging 107p/ kg higher than last year. The majority of the wool remaining unsold (approximately 90132 kg clean) is made up of oddments and other lesser quality wools which will lower the season end average.

To date the overall clean clip for FLH is expected to be approximately 5000 kg or 1.5% less than last year whilst the overall value is likely to be higher. In recent weeks the trend has generally been downward, the biggest decline has been in the finer wools with 18 micron wools reaching a seasonal low (since November 2010) whilst the coarser wools have seen the least declines.

The wind turbines for the North Arm 24-hour power system have now arrived and works have commenced in preparing the steel reinforcement and other works for getting the bases poured in the next few weeks. The container with the generator, inverters and batteries is scheduled to leave the UK next week on the April 27 and the General Manager hopes that everything will be complete and operational around the end of May/early June.

To date Fi.H has supplied 21.241 sheep and new and old season lamb to the abattoir for both the local market and export season, which is 600 more than originally projected in the five year plans. This is not the final figure but the remaining numbers are not high. On average lamb has been 0.3 kg lighter than last year, old season lamb 0.25 kg lighter and sheep 0.24 kg lighter due to-the very dry season and very few crops available for finishing.

FLH has surpassed its budget by approximately £18K. Page 6

# The stone corral - a history confirmed

#### By E. M. Goss

IT was good to see so many turned up to the ceremony at the Stone Corral in March in order to show their appreciation to BACTEC and the sterling work undertaken by the Zimbabwean gang in terms of the land release, and recognition of the MLAs who directed land release to the benefit of the general public.

On my way down to the corral from the road that evening, I gave a lift to Robin Swanson the Demining Programme Manager. He told me he had a few words to say about the history of the corral provided by Joan Spruce and that I was a direct descendent of the builder. As my family history has no record of Jacob Napoleon Goss being the builder I was a little sceptical and commented that I felt obliged to obtain written proof. Joan had published a booklet in 1992 'Corrals and Gauchos' and at that time noted, "no date or builder has come to light'

The following morning I called Joan who told me the late Jane Cameron had been researching early history and came across the contract signed by J N Goss to build a corral out of stone near Sappers Hill. She was excited about her discovery and had called Joan to tell her about this important record in one of Governor Moody's letter or dispatch books.

I called Tansy Bishop at the National Archives but she knew nothing about the letter or the origin of the corral. On Wednesday morning Joan telephoned me to ask if I had checked my e-mails. My call inspired Tansy Bishop (who had pondered on my enquiry), to take a look, and discovered the contract dated February 2, 1846, that confirmed Goss was the builder.

Although some of my relatives believed my Great Grandfather was involved in building the corral. I had no reason to connect him with the construction. Now I have proof and all credit is due to the three dedicated ladies who have established the origin of this marvellous piece of dry stone wall construction. 1 wonder though why it wasn't, called Goss's, Moody's or Government Corral? Is there a date carved anywhere?

The contract, it seems, had a time limit, incorporating penalty clauses (an example we might incorporate in Government contracts today). I was interested that the document noted, "near Sappers Hill," which supported my argument about modern authorities taking the 's'. We all know Governor Moody imported a number of Sappers to build the town, not just one Sapper.

My admiration for Jacob Napoleon Goss expanded with each new record of his achievements. Born in New Inn Yard, Shoreditch, London 17 June, 1825, he arrived at Port Louis on 10 April 1842 and moved to Stanley in July 1843 with Governor Moody. Along with Mr Culey (a Lincolnshire farmer) who had travelled with him from Devonport, in the 220 Brig Alarm, caring for 200 sheep for G W Witington (100 died on passage), these two men cleared the waterfront of large rocks to make what is now Ross Road and Philomel Street; the latter to access the peat on Tumbledown Ridge (Murray Heights). He was paid £100 for the work. They also designed the town in a grid system, in which houses were built with living rooms facing north for best light and heat from the sun.

He purchased land and used the rock from the road clearance to build the Eagle Hotel or Marmont Row with the Eagle Inn bar in the centre. He was the gaoler for a period and paid 6d. a day for every prisoner in his care. He also owned a 2.5 ton whater employing five men to hunt seal skins, and the schooner Louise. He was described as a road builder, foreman, publican, auctioneer, merchant and storekeeper. He died on 11 September 1868 and his father died three days later under suspicious circumstances.

At 41 years and a father of 9 children he must have possessed amazing energy and drive to do so much in such a short time. A true Pioneer and a real go getter. Along with the layout of Stanley, building, Marmont Row and now confirmed, the Stone Corral, are all monuments to Jacob Napoleon Goss. I am proud to be a descendent of this industrious pioneer, as will all of Jacob's family living today.

#### My early memories of the stone corral

The annual roundup of all cattle grazing on the Stanley common was undertaken by the Common Rangers of the Agricultural Department based at the stable complex south of the Race Course red Nissan hut. The stone structure of the headquarters remains in situ. The day attracted all cow owners and a large proportion of the town population as an audience. It was a great sight to see the men on horseback bringing all the cattle together and with much whip cracking and shouting to get them into the corral. Horses were manared, cinches slackened, then a short rest was taken. Whisky flasks were passed around and a few sandwiches came from the maletas. Meanwhile the cow owners were going through the herd checking all of their ani-mals were present. Then the fun started; the Rangers would lasso calves for branding; a fire was laid on a bare clay patch in NW sector, where owners placed personal irons until cherry red. Fires were not permitted to be lit on the common as dry peat was everywhere in rickles or stacks. The noise was tremendous, cows mooing, calves bellowing flighty heifers goring each other, women screeching, men laughing, all adding to the din. Imagine the scene, the smells, of sweaty horses, singeing hair, cow skitters on the fences, walls and other animals; folk slipping in dung; the different colours of the many breeds. What an atmosphere for a boy to experience.

Some of the fiery cow owners, hardened characters like Sadie, Katie or Babs could be heard in loud dispute about ownership of a calf. All the inquisitive boys present would move in closer to listen to the quarrel. Shouts of, "it's my calf." "then why is it sucking my cow?" "Another word from you and you'll feel my stock whip."

This would end when the senior Ranger would mediate and after cooling the iron until it stopped flaming on a piece of wood he would make the brand with a squealing sizzle sound. Many families regarded the roundup as the best fun day of the year. Meantime in Stanley Dominic O'Sullivan would be checking the cow sheds and back yards to make sure no dry cows were in off the common to avoid the tally for the grazing charge. Steers were not allowed to graze on the common, ox calves were sold as yeal and the young steers sold to the farms. Bruce Bonner fattened a great many on East Island to supply Stanley with beef.

Cows belonging to Government House and owners in west of Stanley grazed their dry or in-calf cows on West End Common, the Felton Stream area. Government House dry or breeders, along with the Lighthouse cows, grazed in Cape Pembroke

Later in life when I owned a pony I would ride with the Common Rangers and Dairymen on the roundups. A race was added to the east west centre fence to make a chute where testing for bovine tuberculosis was carried out.

#### The future

Now is the time to put in place ground rules to protect this historic structure and the surrounding heath. Thirty years of matted dead vegetation, if ignited would destroy the whole common. Open the corral to all for picnics but with no fires at all so barbecues are a definite no go. There should be no repeat of the damage done to the beautiful Kelp Creek Corral from barbecue fires against the walls, or rocks removed. Litter would be another blemish. Take it home with you - let's avoid bins being placed in the area. Finally let's have the history remembered in a sign.


hall at the end of the parade, the wind picked up and the departing crowd got a taste of what they had escaped as the temperature dropped and the snow swirled.



### The Wool Market Report - 19th April, 2012

The AWEX ended this week at AU\$1,165 down by 47 cents making it 752/kg clean in Stirling, down 21 pence. One of the reasons was the large offering of wool 55,594 bales which has come shortly after the large offerings of wool prior to Easter.

A much smaller auction is predicted for next week of 41,616 bales this may help slow the decline in prices. The biggest falls have been seen in the finer wools. Mid micron has dipped slightly and the coarser wool has seen the least of the price fluctuations.

As a sign of Merino's increased attention and importance, both the Outdoor Retailer Show in the U.S. and the ISPO show in Europe arranged seminars around the return of the Merino fibre into per-formance apparel. Both events are amongst the most significant global trade shows for the outdoor and sports apparel sector.
