

FISHING vessels licensed in the Falkland Islands all undergo safety inspections. Director of Natural Resources John Barton confirmed this week, when talking to Penguin News about standards applied to fishing vessels and the working conditions of the crew.

He also assured that if a fisherman reports mistreatment an investigation will follow.

With a successful 2014 squid fishery drawing to a close. licensed vessels reporting record eatches, and the Falkland Islands Government expecting to report an income of around £20 million this year, Penguin News asked Chief Inspector Len McGill of the Royal Falkland Islands Police and Mr Barton, about what has been described as the 'darker side' of the fishing industry.

Most years a number of crewmen try to 'jump ship'; leaping into the freezing waters of Stanley Harbour or outer harbours in order to escape the vessel on which they work. Some survive and have been returned to their ship or country of origin, depending on their preference. Others have perished as in February this year when three men were reported missing from a Taiwanese jugger. Their bodies were never located despite searches locally.

Chief Inspector McGill said since 1985 there have been 35 reports of 'man overboard' which in total resulted in 89 persons lost at sea. From the 35 reports, 10 bodies were recovered and 79 were recovered alive from the water. He also noted that the police have attended 122 deaths on board ships. "from murders and fires down to people having heart attacks and illnesses."

Of those who deliberately jumped ship and survived, some

simply claimed home-sick, others reported bad working conditions or mistreatment.

So are the vessels licensed by our Government subject to health and safety checks and if yes, what happens if the vessel is below standard?

Mr Barton told Penguin News: "All vessels arriving to collect licences undergo an inspection. This checks essential life saving appliances: sufficient life raft places, equipment in date etc."

A significant proportion of jiggers have extended inspections each year which verifies that a wider range of safety equipment is in place: "It also gives the opportunity for the inspecting Fishery Officers and also attending Customs and Immigration officers to see the erew and potentially detect any problems," he said

ISLANDER Dr Beccy Edwards has accepted the role of Chief Medical Officer (CMO) for the Faikland Islands Government.

She began work at the KEMH in September 2005 and has worked part-time there ever since, although also continued to work in Cornwall as an out of hours GP every year. Between 2010 and 2012 she

Between 2010 and 2012 she took a two year career break and spent more time in Cornwall working as a GP spending time on the labour ward doing extra obstetrics, and time in the Emergency Department she told Penguin News.

Governor's role to ensure security and law

THE purpose of the Governor today, "is to ensure the infrastructure and the context in which the elected representatives can make their decisions for the territory and in which the government of the Falkland Islands can implement those decisions," HE the Governor Colin Roberts told Penguin News in an interview on Wednesday.

The new Governor (who arrived in the Falklands on Monday April 28) expanded on the comment saying this ranged from security. "making sure these Islands are secure in defence terms, to making sure that the system of justice and the rule of law operates effectively and smoothly so that the things that they want to do can be achieved."

Mr Roberts took the oath of allegiance at a ceremony on Tuesday morning when he paid tribute to the state of the Falklands economy. Continued page 3

THE Court and Council Chamber had a busy week with our new Governor, Colin Roberts CVO signing up to the job before a full house of invited FIG officials and local dignitaries and the following day Senior Magistrate Carl Gumsley biding the Islands farewell.

Having missed but a few court cases in the past ten years and seen some four Senior Magistrates come and go, that there was standing room only in the court room on Wednesday morning caught me on the back foot. Initially I thought I had confused diary dates and it was a public meeting, but quickly clocked that a) there were far too many people b) wigs and gowns were present, and c) there were not any Assembly Members in the room. Could the latter I pondered, possibly be attributed to the previous long day of ceremonial and social events?

However the packed gallery were not to be disappointed with the speechifying from the Attorney General and of course top of the bill, Mr Gumsley who drew on the great wisdom of his hero Sir Winston Churchill to hammer his points home.

While those who have stood before him in the dock, or even defied his judgements will probably not appreciate the wit of the man who has been known to throw the odd ineffectual law book around in sheer frustration, those in attendance evidently did and it was pleasant to hear a room normally associated with weighty and often grave dealings ripple with laughter.

Mr Gumsley may have been compared to Marmite at times, but I hope that somewhere between the extremes of that analogy there is a large slice of respect for the lengths he has gone to, particularly with regard to the protection of children, to ensure that Falklands law should work for and be readily accessible to the very people it serves.

To sum up his work over the last two and a half years in the words of the great Sir Winston Churchill, "The truth is incontrovertible, malice may attack it, ignorance may deride it, but in the end; there it is."

Continued from front: In the event of a serious defect such as insufficient life rafts, the licence will be withheld until the defect is rectified: "There has been substantial investment in some sections of the jigger fleet with many vessels being modern, larger and with extensive safety equipment. There have been reports of some fishermen suffering frostbite however, which should be entirely avoidable," he added.

Atthe same time. the construction, level of equipment and operation of fishing vessels are largely a matter for the flag state; so South Korea for South Korean vessels and the Falklands for Falkland fishing vessels and so on The Fisheries Ordinance on the other hand, largely deals with conservation, regulation of fisheries, management of the ITQ system and not with the detailed operation or conditions on fishing vessels.

If a fisherman 'jumps ship' and claims mistreatment, is the ship's captain subject to an investigation, asked Penguin News.

"Yes," said Mr Barton, if this occurs, "the Captain, and others, will be subject to investigation. In fact any case where a fisherman jumps ship there will be an investigation to ascertain the circumstances, regardless of whether mistreatment is alleged."

The results of such investigations show that mistreatment is a relatively rare reason for jumping, he said: "In most cases the reasons are due to homesickness, dislike of the working conditions, or in some cases the opportunities in Stanley looked better.

In one case three crew jumped ship because they wished to phone their families. Once that had been done they were content to return to their vessel. This indicates the differing standards; access to communications should be readily available on Falklands and European fishing vessels but may be less readily available on some other vessels.

This year an increase in the number of crew using smart phones and tablets on jiggers was noticeable although the level of connectivity is uncertain he reported.

There has been one case where maltreatment has been proven with successful prosecution of the captain, and subsequent banning from the fishery.

All applications for licences have to be accompanied by a statement from the Captain indicating whether they have been convicted of maltreatment of crew in the last five years. It may be questioned whether they would confess to a previous conviction, however the provision of false information would be a serious matter, said Mr Barton.

If a fisherman jumps ship and refuses to go back to his ship who pays for repatriation?

The ensuing action would

depend on the circumstances said Mr Barton. He said in any case involving maltreatment the fisherman would obviously not be returned to the vessel. In some other cases the fishing company might pay for repatriation. He said it would be unusual for FIG to pay: "It will depend on circumstances. If crew left a vessel at FIPASS seeking better jobs in Stanley that would effectively be economic migration, and the first course would be to seek to persuade them to return to their vessel."

A worldwide problem

The standards applied on some fishing vessels, working and conditions, terms of employment are a worldwide issue. Merchant shipping often tends to be ahead of the fishing world in this regard. In 2007 the United Nation's International Labour Organisation agreed the Work in Fishing Convention 2007. This would provide a global standard for the basic protection on employment and working conditions for fishermen. The convention will come into force 12 months after there have been 10 ratifications. As at July 2013, there had been four ratifications including Argentina and South Africa. Ensuring that employment and working conditions on some fishing vessels are acceptable is a major issue. Mr Barton said. "At FIG's request, the FCO has been assisting in getting these messages across in both the flag states of the relevant vessels and also in the countries from where many of the crew are recruited through crewing agencies. This action was taken following the incident involving three crew reported missing from a jigging vessel back in February.

Mr Barton summed up saying: "Commercial fishing is often a hard and arduous career. Standards differ from flag state to flag state and most vessels operate to good standards. In many cases crew will return year after year. Unfortunately such standards are not uniform and in a minority of cases the nature of the job and the terms and conditions do not appear to be sufficiently clearly explained or set out."

FIG Fisheries Observers

The Fisheries Department deploys observers to a number of vessels. These scientists typically spend around three weeks living and working on each jigging vessel to which they are deployed.

of vessels number The observed in this way is only a small proportion of the fleet, but it is a sample: "If anything untoward was observed it would be reported. It is evident for crew on these ships that a lot of hard work is involved in some challenging conditions; sea state, work with frozen cargo, long hours and more so in a season like the current one where catch rates are high. However, if folk are going to be out there, they probably prefer high catches to low ones.

Senior Magistrate bids farewell Churchill style

WITH standing room only in the Court and Council Chamber on Wednesday morning Senior Magistrate Carl Gumsley in a farewell speech said he was unsure whether the majority were there out of affection or to ensure he really did get on the Airbridge.

Drawing on famous quotes from Sir Winston Churchill and challenging Court Assistant Laura Street to keep count of them, Mr Gumsley said he had arrived in the Islands two and a half years ago with nothing to offer but blood, toil, tears and sweat, but had not expected to offer so much so often.

There was so much to do, so little time and few resources, he said referring to the court which then operated with one assistant and had to close down on occasion due to staffing problems.

Mr Gumsley said people had told him the court was, "just another Government department," which dīd as it was told. "I may have dispelled that myth," he added. But changing beliefs and attitudes had not been easy and it was regretful that those who really needed to listen did not always open their ears, he said.

Talking of the achievements of the court he said he was pleased to have been able to make legal aid open to the public and he hoped a general lack of understanding of the working of the court would soon be remedied with the introduction of a good quality website. Along with the Prison Authority he said he had lobbied long and hard for an additional fence around the prison yard to prevent children from being able to see into it. Two and a half years on, he said he pleased to see work had finally started.

But, if he was proud of anything he had done it was his work towards the protection of children followed by the Attorney Generals Chambers' response to the Lucy Faithfull Foundation report, said Mr Gumsley.

There were however still many areas that needed work which had been in the pipeline since 2011 including; ambiguities in the law, appointment of a law commissioner and an authoritative set of laws if people are to know how to lead their lives, he said. He knew the Attorney General shared the view that it was fundamental to the bedroek of society and hoped it would progress under his stewardship, he added.

Mr Gumsley said he had tried to follow the laws and not work on gaining popularity, adding, "You have enemies. Good. That means you've stood up for something, sometime in your life." But he said there was no point in blaming the judges if you don't like the law – don't sit on social media making comments and moaning, appeal it or change the law was his advice.

Mr Gumsley thanked the many people he had worked with especially the women of the court. He praised the ability of the Head of Courts Aimee Meadows who was a capable lawyer in her own right and warned against crossing her, "she makes me look like a pussycat," he said.

Court Assistant Laura Street's achievements were a source of some pride for Mr Gumsley, who was pleased to announce that funding had been approved to advance her education and career within the courts - given her tenacity and forthright views she will go far, he said.

"I've never been a difficult employer, I'm easily satisfied with the very best and Misses Meadows and Street are," he said adding however that they would need help. "Give them the tools and they will finish the job," he said.

He praised the community and the direct engagement with regional and national communities with regard to diplomacy. trade, tourism, environmental science and sport.

Governor Roberts said he was very proud, "to have the chance to live and work with you and will do my utmost to promote your security, stability and prosperity."

Invited guests and the Governor's party proceeded to Victory Green where members of the Falkland Islands Defence Force, Royal Navy, Royal Air Force and Army along with youth organisations welcomed them and a Royal Salute was exchanged.

The large crowd gathered to welcome the new Governor were treated to an impeccably timed 17 volley salute by the FIDF and showed their appreciation with a spontaneous round of applause.

Invited guests retired to Government House for vin d'honneur and MLAs, FIG Directors and Heads of Service later attended a buffet lunch at Malvina House Hotel. Legislative Assembly Member Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into her working week

WE welcomed a new Governor this week, the seventh with whom I will have worked (not counting the recent Acting Governor). Most of them have been 'volunteers', that is individuals who have applied for this posting unlike one or two much earlier appointees who gave the impression they thought they had been banished to the British equivalent of Siberia. Several of those I've worked with have held previous Falklands related posts in London so arrived with at least working knowledge of what we are about and great goodwill

The Hon. Michael Poole and I had a useful visit to FIMCo last week. It is always striking, whether visiting the abattoir or the factory deck on some of the larger fishing trawlers. to see the industrial scale of their operations, something relatively new to the Islands. We saw various products being processed including a new cut of lamb being specially packaged for the Scandinavian market. The specialised packaging will be an attractive addition to marketing Falkland Islands meat. There has been a sizeable expansion of the operation since I last visited and I take my hat off to the staff and management who have achieved so much.

This week MLAs had a two hour visit to the Byron Marine oil support complex at the invitation of the directors, another very impressive achievement by a local company. The sheer scale of the warehousing and laydown areas represents significant investment and much hard work. It is worth looking at local companies to see which ones have genuinely invested in the Islands and will leave something behind when

they are long gone. We have another session on the Children Bill on Wednesday. a complex task but one which ultimately will give us legislation which is up to date and user friendly. Going through it clause by clause in Select Committee will ensure that it is appropriate for the Falklands. On Thursday we have a public meeting to discuss the Capital Programme. I've been contacted prior to that by a good number of people who have given it thought, most favouring a nursing home.

Preserving our Falklands past

STANLEY inhabitants may over the last few weeks have noticed the appearance of green oval plaques stating 'Historic Building, Falkland Islands'

This is an initiative by the Historic Building Committee (HBC) member Joost Pompert told Penguin News this week

There are quite a number of these properties within the town, "many of which are well known to the public, such as Gilbert House, Sulivan House, the socalled German Camp, quite a few houses on Pioneer Row such as Nutt Cartmell's cottage, as well as of course the Whalebone Arch, and two decorative fire hydrants, one on John street, another on Drury street," said Mr Pompert,

There are also properties listed in Camp such as the old mission building on Keppel Island, one of the oldest surviving shearing sheds in the Islands on West Point Island, and various stone corrals, the closest being just outside Stanley.

All of these structures carry with them a long history which is deemed to be significant enough to make sure they are protected against alterations or even removal

The committee itself was set up in the early 1990s by the late Jane Cameron, who found a receptive ear in the then councillor Norma Edwards.

For many years both were very active with a team of members, in locating important properties and persuading owners that listing their properties for this purpose was the right thing to do.

Within the government pool of properties, the list was quite extensive, and support for the scheme was overwhelming.

Mr Pompert explained that if repairs are needed to keep properties in a good and usable state of repair, an application can be made to help finance materials or labour, usually amounting to about 50 per cent of the total cost. Many owners have taken up this scheme, and FIG has generally kept their own listed properties very well maintained.

The plaque scheme was conceived some years ago in order to have something tasteful marking each listed property, so that both local inhabitants and tourists were able to easily identify these, and to give them some greater prominence.

Plans are afoot to eventually include locations on the tourist maps, and work has started on a 'Historical Trail' booklet, which will contain a map and some basic facts about the listed property and its historical significance.

The HBC also has a Portaka-



bin full of historic items, such as sash windows, decorative barge boards, meat safes, fireplaces and other items, all of which are free and available for those with an interest in reusing them in their property, preferably listed ones.

None of the items are new, but with some TLC can be easily restored to their former glory," said Mr Pompert.

"We hope that the plaque scheme will help generate renewed interest in our historically interesting buildings and structures and if members of the community wish to engage themselves more with HBC's activities, or are perhaps interested in listing one of their own properties, please feel free to contact them through the Environmental Planning Office," he asked

The committee is a sub-committee of the Planning and Building committee, and its remit is to help safeguard some of the historically interesting or important buildings or structures both in Stanley and in camp.

Chlamydia the silent infection

CHLAMYDIA is the most common bacterial sexually transmitted infection (STI), and the greatest risk is when you are under 25. It is known as the 'silent' infection due to its lack of noticeable symptoms. Symptoms include discharge, or in women irregular bleeding, but not always. It is passed from one person to another through unprotected sex thus the use of condoms greatly reduces the chances of contracting Chlamydia and other STIs.

If you are under 25, have a new sexual partner, or have had more than one partner in the last year and have not used condoms you should have a test.

The test is simple, vaginal swab for females and urine for males. A physical examination may not be required. If someone has Chlamydia it is important to let the sexual partner/partners (both current and any other recent) know. as they may have it too.

They should also be tested and treated. Do not have any sex until seven days after both partners complete their treatment.

In women the reason Chlamydia is nasty is that it can spread to all reproductive parts. This can lead to long-term pelvic pain, blocked fallopian tubes leading to infertility and ectopic pregnancy. In men, untreated Chlamydia may lead to a painful infection in the testicles and can sometimes re-

Falklands and Crimea the new cold war

THE Argentine President Cristina Kirchner praised the recent Crimean status referendum as, "one of the famous referendums of self-determination."

She also drew a parallel with the 2013 Falklands sovereignty referendum complaining that, for the West, "the referendum for self-determination in Crimea is bad, but the referendum for selfdetermination for the Kelpers is good." Indeed, there are some obvious differences between the two referendums. To begin with, the Crimean one had no legal validity under the then applicable law in that territory (Ukrainian Law), while the Falklands one was held in compliance with the law applicable on the Islands (Falklands Law). Furthermore, the former took place along with a Russian military operation that subdued the Ukrainian armed forces dislocated in Crimea. To can it all, the application of self-determination principle to Crimea is questionable, given that international law would grant that right to a people which the Crimean Russian community – unlike the Falkland Islanders - is not.

Nevertheless, let us assume that in both cases the referendum results reflected the prevailing attitudes respectively in Crimea and the Falklands. Then where the two referendums differ further is in their follow-ups. In the former case, Russia referred to the referendum results in order to unilaterally change the status quo and annex a territory that until then had been administered by Ukraine and recognized by Russia as a sovereign Ukrainian territory by treaty. Britain did nothing of the sort.

The essential parallel between the Falklands and Crimea lies in two aspects conveniently overlooked by President Kirchner. First, both Argentina and Russia stand no chance if their pretensions were submitted to the International Court of Justice. And second, while Russia had the ample military power to take over Crimea in disregard of international law, Argentina has no such capabilities as attested by the Falklands War. So President Kirchner has chosen to acclaim President Putin's action, hoping that Russia would return the favour and support the Argentine claim. However, Russia's Foreign Minister Lavrov has stated that Crimea means to Russia more than the Falklands do to Britain, effectively placing Russia in the position of Britain rather than that of Argentina. Indeed, when that mattered most back in 1982, Russia refrained from vetoing the UN Security Council Resolution 502 which demanded the removal of the Argentine troops from the Falklands.

The present Ukrainian crisis is widely perceived to be setting the stage for a replay of the Cold IN an article for Penguin News, distinguished political and scientific Bulgarian author Dr Lyubomir Ivanov discusses the Crimean conflict and its parallel with the Falklands.

Memorial Fellowship Program for Bulgaria of the German Marshall Fund – US (1997-2002). Participant in the National Round Table for Transition to Democracy (1990), member of the National Coordinating Council of the Union of Democratic Forces (1990-91). Principal sponsor of both the 1990 parliamentary decision for Bulgaria to join the European Union and the 1991 parliamentary decision for Bulgaria to participate in the Allied liberation of Kuwait.

Profesor Ivanov is the author of scientific and popular books and papers on foreign and security policy, Falklands and Kosovo self-determination, history, immigration policy, mathematics, linguistics and Antarctic science.

War, with possible hotter conflicts spilling out in the region. Looking at the possible outcome, there are those who foresee Russia gaining the upper hand this time. and emerging triumphant through the annexation of territories with significant Russian population in areas like eastern Ukraine or northern Kazakhstan. On the other hand, there are those who believe that a protracted standoff between the West and Russia is not such a bad thing after all, that it would end up with the West victorious once again, prompting a regime change in Moscow and possible disintegration of the Russian Federation fuelled by ethnic and religious division. However, in a world where both the West and Russia face a range of common challenges in the field of security, each of them has the leverage to turn the other party's victory sour, with the collateral effect of enhancing the stature of third powers such as China. As for the possible breakup of Ukraine or Russia, that runs the risk of getting out of control and slipping into a Yugoslav style imbroglio of gigantic proportions rather than following the 'civilized divorce' example of Czechoslovakia or the Soviet Union.

Could these worrisome scenarios be mitigated, given that the territorial aspect is essential to the present crisis? The key lies in the Crimean issue which is far from being settled. Indeed, it would be unrealistic to expect that in the foreseeable future Ukraine might be prepared to relinquish her rights over Crimea, unless some substantial territorial compensations were made available. The question therefore is, might it be possible to resolve that issue by a negotiated exchange of Ukrainian and Russian territories? And if Crimea were to be recognized as Russian in the process, then what might be the respective Russian territories suitable for a transfer to Ukraine?

Ceding to Ukraine some Russian districts adjacent to the common border won't do, for these are populated mostly by ethnic Russians. Fortunately, however, the Russian Federation enjoys the possession of a variety of uninhabited or virtually so territories that might qualify. For instance, one could consider the polar archipelagos of Novaya Zemlya, Severnaya Zemlya and New Siberian Islands, or rather appropriate parts of them comparable in size to Crimea. Taking into account the sensitivity of that particular region for Russia's strategic defense on the one hand, and Ukraine's possible EU and NATO membership on the other, the territory to be ceded to Ukraine could be demilitarized by treaty too. Finally, the value of the swapped entities could be balanced by an appropriate delimitation of Crimea's vast maritime exclusive economic zone rich in fish, gas and possibly oil. Once agreed, the overall package could be put on nationwide referendums in both Russia and Ukraine.

An agreed swap along these lines would be in perfect compliance with international law, arguably delivering a truly win-win solution benefiting all the parties involved, and curbing the Crimean conflict's potential to boost irredentist and separatist agendas in Ukraine, elsewhere in Europe and indeed worldwide. Such a solution may well seem unrealistic but then, just few months ago, so seemed the idea of Russia annexing a sizable chunk of Ukrainian territory.

If this avenue of opportunity is to be explored, then probably the diplomatic initiative ought to come from Russia as all the territories in question are presently controlled by that country. If not, then President Putin's pledge that "our relations with Ukraine, with the fraternal Ukrainian people have always been and will remain of foremost importance for us" would sound rather hollow. That recurrently repeated pledge, however, is indicative of the real vulnerability of Putin's regime. It's not the economic sanctions that would be but a convenient excuse for the pending troubles of Russia's structurally deficient economy anyway, and it's not the prospect of seeing Ukraine and Georgia in NATO. It's the fear that a success story of Ukraine's accession to the European Union like that of Poland for instance might appear attractive to the Russians as well.

YOUNG couples and those on single incomes can find it both difficult and daunting to become home owners. For many the idea of owning a house did not seem achievable until very recently when a large number of subsidised plots were made available by the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) and added to that the Falkland Islands Company (FIC) 'turnkey' mortgage scheme, and for many the dream has become a reality.

Islanders Michael Betts and Samantha Davies are two of a group of young professionals who are quite literally making their mark on the town.

Michael applied early and has a plot on Phase One, Rex Hunt Road, and has designed his ScotFrame two-bedroom bungalow to suit his budget and personal requirements. As a single occupant he does not need a large house, but has thought about how he would extend in the future.

Michael's plot is one of his preferred options and he is excited to get started and hopes it will be finished in summer this year. "I really can't wait until I move into the house...I love the idea of having my own space, with my own things and designed exactly how I want it," he said. With a great deal of

phase three of the development. Similar to Michael she is planning to build a modest two-bedroom house and has approached FIC for a quote: "I like the designs, and I have tweaked mine a bit to how I want

it. She said: "It has been really enjoyable to choose kitchen, bathroom, flooring and tiles. It's a lot to think about, but I have had an image in my mind for quite some time now, so it was fairly easy," she said.

"It is an easy option for me as a single person to go through the FIC, and most importantly I will not have to draw my mortgage until I'm handed the keys."

In order to save for her dream home she is house sharing and working overtime to ensure she has enough funds to kick-start the project and furnish her living space.

Both Michael and Samantha are excited by the opportunities encouraging them to build their own homes and it will benefit the Government housing list too.

When FIG houses become

available for the local pool they are usually larger family homes and not surprisingly priority is given to families and larger groups.

Michael admits he had been disheartened by inflating rent rates in the private sector: "I have been waiting for the opportunity to buy land and build a house for a long time," he said.

Samantha agreed that opening doors so those on single incomes could become property owners had been overlooked in the past, and is brimming with excitement that such an important life achievement is now a possibility. "I know that there are many young people building, and I think we are going to have a good community at Sapper Hill," she said.

The opportunity to build a home and tend a garden instead of spending half a lifetime renting has fuelled the ambitions of many other young people.

Sapper Hill is proving to be a wise development ensuring the future of the Falklands.

What's happening at Sapper Hill

The Falkland Islands Government has been busy preparing the site development plan and houses are already appearing at Stanley's newest district. Penguin News has been investigating what has been decided and what this means for potential residents...

Roads and access?

THE road names 'Diamond Jubilee Road'. 'Rex Hunt Road' and 'Sandy Woodward Road' for the current development were proposed at Lands Committee and were then approved by the Members of the Legislative Assembly and Executive Council.

At last week's meeting of the Legislative Assembly the roads were described by MLA Barry Elsby as, "fairly narrow" and it was also noted at the meeting that no traffic calming measures were being proposed.

Deputy Director of Public Works Colin Summers confirmed to Penguin News that the 5.5 metre road width for Rex Hunt Road and Sandy Woodward Road is half a metre narrower than other roads in Stanley. He believed that the planning restrictions that require all properties to have two off-street parking spaces will ensure that large vehicles servicing the development, like Bonners Haulage and the Stanley Services fuel truck will not have problems accessing the area.

The decision to have one side of pavement on the roads is in keeping with "standard design" and is a normal feature on a majority of roads within Stanley he said. Street lighting heads are all installed but require circuits and energising. They should be com-

energising. They should be completed by mid May, after priority works elsewhere.

There are shortcuts provided by pathways intersecting the two roads but no plans for specific cycling lanes in the first four phases. Cycling lanes are a, "possibility" for future phases, "with a link to Haskard Rise pencilled in as an option" said Mr Summers.

Recreation, landscaping and amenities?

THE access to an appropriate level of open space is a "priority"

and "important for the appearance and also for public health purposes" MLA Michael Poole, the portfolio holder for Lands told Legislative Assembly.

This is reflected in the draft development plan currently under consultation which says the area should be a, "safe attractive and convenient place to live, providing opportunities for a healthy lifestyle and a range of recreational activities," said MLA Poole.

The site will include a play park between phases two and three by summer 2015, with equipment to arrive between 2015 - 2016.

In addition Rex Hunt Road residents will also have direct access to a, "less formal" recreational space and future development on the site, from phase five onwards, will be decided in due course said MLA Poole.

Land spoil dumped to the north will be landscaped into another amenity area and a wind breaking bund is due to be landscaped next summer between phase four and future development phase five.

Outline planning permission has also been sought and approved for a commercial space within the development for private sector development that is hoped will provide services similar to those found in developments at the East and West ends of Stanley.

Government housing?

FALKLAND Islands Government is currently building 20 semi-detached houses in phase two. There are three three-bedroom units and seventeen two-bedroom units and are all for allocation to the contractor pool.

There are a further six properties being built in phase three to benefit local demand for FIG rented accommodation. The six houses are two-bedroom units and one has disabled access Mr Summers told Penguin News, adding that Government has ambitions for more housing on the site.

"There is funding and approval for a further 10 houses and the contract for these is likely to be awarded in May/June with works starting on site in August/September. These will be three, threebedroom units and seven twobedroom units and the allocation will be split between contractor and local pool.

"There is also a proposal currently under consideration for an additional 30 houses which includes a mix of one bed flats, two bed houses and three bed houses," said Mr Summers.

Plots for tender?

LANDS Secretary Roxanne Regalado confirmed that plots remaining in phase two will be released for tender in the very near future and will be advertised in Penguin News in the coming weeks.

The release dates for phases three and four are not yet confirmed said Mr Summers: "These works are progressing well and Morrison (Falklands) Ltd works should be completed by October and March respectively although there is, as yet no confirmed date for the completion of asphalting works."

First time buyers?

THE first time buyers list is still growing said Mrs Regalado; 65 people have applied and 44 remain on the list yet to be allocated a plot, this does not include first time buyers who have tendered for land.

In the first release of phase one, ten plots were allocated specifically for first time buyers and a further seven in phase two and another three were allocated in phase one in the second release of land. There are a further eight plots in phase one being reserved for first time buyers during the next release with no further plots reserved in phase two.

"Phase three and four will be reviewed as works progress," confirmed Mr Summers who highlighted that first time buyers are entitled to apply for all available plots, not just those reserved for first time buyers, "and the discounted rates still apply."

Government subsidy?

GOVERNMENT subsidy for first time buyer plots is 75 per cent to help make the option of building affordable and attractive. A land subsidy (Crown Grant) does come with conditions that were introduced after the East development of Stanley some years ago.

100 per cent of subsidy is payable if the property is sold, leased or the owner dies up to six years from date of Crown Grant being issued. After six years the amount payable decreases by 20 per cent each year.

Penguin News has been investigating whether the rule around leasing is too restrictive and conflicts with the Islands Plan to encourage education and cultural development, as the commitment to remain in the Islands for 10 years reduces freedom to study or travel within that time.

MLA Mike Summers was approached for his opinion in February and he agreed there should be room for some flexibility as part of a new, "strategic approach to housing." He said relaxing the policy on buyers made sense if it would benefit the Islands as a result of Islanders, "taking a year or two out to study at a university," for example. The current policy restricts the lease of a property but does not restrict the house owner from taking in a lodger.

A proposal to relax the policy will be on the table at the next Lands Committee on May 14, said MLA Poole. **T Barkman**


IN the last 25 years, the squid fishery has been one of the major contributors to the economy of the Falkland Islands. It is unique in the world as about 80 per cent of the total annual catch is squid. Both Illex and Loligo squid have annual life cycles, with a new generation recruiting into the fishery every year Recruitment abundance is a result of many ecological factors such as water temperatures, food availability and currents, with the abundance of parental stock having relatively minor effect. This is why planning and exploitation of squid stocks is a challenging task not only for fisheries managers but for the fishing companies as well

The Falklands largely missed summer for the second year in a row. Frequently overcast skies and uncommon south easterly winds decreased sun radiation in Deceniber 2013 - February 2014. Sea surface waters around the Islands were heated to a mere 8-9°C, approximately three degrees below the normal average for this time of the year. It was known that cold waters could deter Illex squid migrations to Falkland waters as seen in the poor year of 2002

But, good news about high abun-

dance of Illex squid was received in January-February from the high in January reordary from the high seas region; international waters located outside 200 nautical mile conservation zones. More than 150 juggers and trawlers fished there and had good catches attaining 15-20 tonnes of squid per fishing day. The question however remained the question notice internation tions of sauid would move south to Falkland waters. Fortunately, water cooling affected only near-surface layers, with deeper waters on the shelf having normal temperatures. The inflow of relatively warm shelf waters formed late this year, in the beginning of March. Squid of the South Patagonian Stock migrated from the high seas in that inflow. and concentrated along its eastem edge (see figure). By the end of the first week of March. some 90 juggers started to work within the boundaries of the inflow. Their daily catches improved to 18-20 tonnes per night, and during the second week almost the whole fleet (105 vessels) were fishing for Illex there. Catches gradually increased to 40-55 tonnes per vessel/night. with maximum catches reaching 165 tonnes per vessel night.


Until now, the whole fleet continues fishing for Illex in the boundaries of the inflow, with consistently high catches (average 46 tonnes per vessel/night) On April 22, the total daily catch of Illex by all yessels fishing inside FICZ FOCZ recorded the highest value since the beginning of the regulated fishery m 1987. A total of 6,701 tonnes of squid was taken, enough to fill up a whole reefer in just one day! Up to now 187.500 tonnes of Illex have been caught in Falkland waters. making it the second best Illex catch after the bumper year of 1999.

Some trawlers had high catches of Illex in the west of FICZ (20-30 tonnes per day). These catches are a reliable indication of good fishing conditions at least until the second half of May.


The other commercial squid fished around the Falkland Islands is Dorvteuthis gahi (aka Loligo) and now more commonly referred to as 'Falkland Calamari'. The abundance of this squid was estimated during a survey carried out onboard a commercial trawler in February before the start of the first season. It was calculated that at least 35,000




The Loligo fishing season started on February 24, and confirmed the survey results. Daily catches of all 16 licensed trawlers were high, averaging 24-30 tonnes per day. Vessels had exceptionally good catches in the northern part of the Loligo Box where migrations of

the fishing zone, representing the highest first season survey estimate

However, colder than usual water temperatures around the Falkland Islands delayed migrations of the bulk of Loligo stocks to their feeding grounds During the first three weeks of March, daily catches fluctuated between 10 and 15 tonnes per vessel/day, which is low.

A real breakthrough happened on March 21, when several vessels found dense concentrations of Loligo in the northern part of the Loligo Box. A combination of south-westerly winds and a strong Falklands Current contributed to aggregating Falkland calamari in that relatively small area. During the next five days, the fleet fished squid up to their freezing capacity with average daily catches of 66.5 tonnes per vessel (maximum 97.6 tonnes). On March 23, the total daily catch of the fleet hit the record since 1996 of 1,102 tonnes of squid per day

As expected, these aggregations were soon fished and dispersed to more 'normal' levels. By March 28-29 the vessels returned to still high daily catches of 35-45 tonnes. Another neak of abundance occurred during the second week of Anril in deeper waters of the northern area (50-65 tonnes ner vessel/day)

Despite the slow start, more than 28,000 tonnes of Loligo was taken by the end of the first season, making it the third highest Loligo catch after 2010 and 2012.

Regular monitoring of the total biomass of souid by the Fisheries Department ensured that conservation targets were met to keep the stocks of Falkland Calamari at a sustainable level.

Resources 'not discrimination 9 shape child immigration plans

A PLAN to put procedures in place to prevent children arriving in the Islands, particularly of secondary school age, without an adequate command of the English language, "is not about multiculturalism or discrimination," but "the resources we have to deliver the services we want to deliver, MLA Summers stated yesterday.

He responded to Penguin News questioning whether the proposed policy was discriminatory and overly restrictive.

MLA Summers said currently there were a number of children in school in the Islands who did not speak English well enough to properly access the curriculum. This has lead to requests for FIG funding from the Education Department, for additional teachers to assist the pupils.

MLA Summers said what is being discussed is the inter-relationship between immigration and education to ensure that anyone intending to enter the education system has been previously vetted by Customs and Immigration to make sure they can speak sufficient English to access the curriculum.

"We as a country do not have

the resources to teach in another language, there is no obligation, and I think no will, to teach in another language. Why would we? We are English speaking."

MLA Summers added "What we are saying is that there is an obligation on the parents and on the employer to ensure these children have a sufficient command of English to ensure they can access the curriculum."

He said the danger was that if this was not the case the children would disturb other pupils in the class: "You put some people in a class who need constant attention because they don't under-stand, and they will be holding back a whole bunch of other kids who would otherwise be getting better attention from the school teacher.

The issue has opened up questions about application procedures to go to school: "and the reality is there has to be an entry requirement. If you can't understand what you are being told in the school then you are not going to learn and you are not even going to be in a position to be able to accept the instructions and the norms that teachers require of

you," he said.

Similar entry requirements are the norm in other countries he claimed, and if a child did not speak the language they could attend a relevant private school, but he accepted this type of facility is not available in the Falklands

MLA Summers agreed the procedure would place restrictions on employers, but said it was, "just a practical reality.

"If you had an employer who wanted to employ a top quality Russian, for example, and they really wanted to bring their family here, it would be the employer's responsibility to ensure those children were somehow educated.

He asked: "What happens if someone wanted to employ a Japanese or Turkish technician, We can't afford to employ a Turkish translator or a Japanese translator [in school] it just won't work.]

Asked how Immigration would police the policy, MLA Summers said it was largely the employer's responsibility to satisfy themselves that the information on a work permit form was accurate. He said: "If somebody either gratuitously lies or stretches the truth because they are desperate for the job the employer is probably responsible for fronting up and saying 'well what are we going to do about it'

The procedure is currently being examined by a joint working group comprising the Emergency Services Directorate (which covers immigration) and the Education Directorate.

MLA Barry Elsby who also has portfolio responsibility for immi-gration commented: "The Falklands is an open society and we welcome people from all countries but being small we need to ensure that before a work permit is issued there are no medical or educational needs in the worker or the family that would be difficult to cope with here."

BY the time this column is published the public meeting on the Capital Plan Consultation (see page 6) which took place over a week ago, might be thought a little bit of a dusty subject, but considering the breadth of its implications perhaps I can get away with a few comments.

Because the meeting went on longer than expected there was little time for MLAs to insist on feedback to their final questions, which was a shame as it would have been interesting to hear for certain whether there was any real dissent when it came to the list of the Priory 1 projects. But in any case, based on exchanges during the meeting it certainly appeared there was general agreement with the list; hardly surprising comprising as it did a combination of urgent social and infrastructural requirements.

But what of the unasked questions? An important one was 'What have we missed?' Well if there was any neglect at all, according to some who have offered feedback to PN, it was a lack of emphasis on projects that actually generate income. And admittedly it did appear during the meeting that investment into a port port road services was rather quickly dismissed with the comment that the only way the figures would add up was if that project and the MPA road tarmacing was jettisoned.

In fairness though the presentation was only indicative, "and was not a capital plan," Michael Poole emphasised later. Also when 1 mentioned the rather dismissive attitude towards the port he said expenditure on port development will happen during this Government, "as it will have to."

And is it really fair to claim neglect of investment into economic development? The RDS and tourism are well funded, there is investment in roads, the FIDC loan budget has been fully spent this year, and more money will be made available if required. FIG assures.


Even when I attempted to wind up a couple of business people with enquiries about their opinion of the priorities, one expressed his relief that FIPASS was on the list (although qualified this saying it had been so neglected in past years that the proposed budget would be insufficient) and another said he was impressed with the "seriousness" with which everyone approached the subject.

He did add that MLAs should take care not to overburden the system with too ambitious a capital programme and suggested a measured approach.

It was also suggested that FIG could do things that did not involve huge expenditure but were critical to the economy, the example given that they should ensure that fuel supply agreement and telecommunications provider agreements were properly and transparently conducted and properly regulated.

So to summarise, I couldn't really dig up a great deal of criticism of the consultation – not very exciting for Penguin News but not a bad starting point for our elected representatives.

Your questions answered

WHAT is the cost of the Chief Executive's new venicle? What is the budget for the planned driveway at Sulivan House?

The heating (kerosene) for Sulivan House is paid by FIG, what is the annual heating budget for Sulivan House?

What happens if the heating bills exceed this budget, ie who pays?

What is the justification behind FIG paying for the CE's new vehicle, driveway and heating?

A The Government's Chief Executive, Keith Padgett provided the following response:

It is interesting to note that details of my employment contract with FIG appear to be known to members of the public. How this came to be is perhaps worthy of investigation but, notwithstanding this, details of my remuneration and all taxable benefits in kind are now included in the Govermment's Financial Statements, which are publicly available. The Statements also include the same details for all other Directors for reasons of openness.

The provision of an official vehicle has been a standard term for Chief Executives for a considerable number of years; certainly longer than 1 have been in the Islands. The new vehicle was purchased following extensive damage being caused to the previous vehicle by a third party. The decision was taken to replace it with another which would better meet needs, particularly to support official functions and of transporting official visitors. The vehicle which it replaced has since been repaired and put to use elsewhere within FIG.

Sulivan House is a listed building with a long history which is required to be used for official functions and entertaining.

The best way to maintain a house of historical importance is to ensure adequate maintenance over the years. This includes preventing damp by adequately heating the property. Again, the provision of heating is not something unique to myself as Chief Executive.

Finally, considerable time has elapsed since any significant works were done to the driveway at Sulivan and it is hoped that once the works are completed it will be some time before anything more will be needed.

The works to the driveway are intended to be undertaken by contractor so it is not appropriate at this stage to indicate estimated costs, although the results of the tender will be issued after award of contract.

The works are intended to address the failure of the existing surfaces and associated surface water drainage problems, which have over time caused both gradual deterioration to parts of the house but also flooding of the walled garden, with associated concerns that this could result in collapse of part of the wall which is part of the historic setting of the house.

THE Falkland Islands has earned eleventh place in a list of the 30 best islands in the world

The list was created by Lee Abbamonte who is the youngest American to visit every country in the world and is recognised as one of the world's most-travelled people. I AM afraid you are stuck with me for the next few weeks, so a bit of what I write may well be the world as viewed from a PWD perspective, but I will try to keep away from too many mentions of thistles – whilst roads, sewers and other groovy subjects will be fair game.

ALTHOUGH it is dangerous to be self-congratulatory, I was pleasantly surprised by the way the public consultation on the capital programme went. I think it was helped in part by having a healthier balance to spend on capital items than was first thought. I guess the budget and especially the capital budget is something like the gymnastics that most of us go through at the end of every month when its payday.

You have to put so much aside for food rent mortgage electric etc. (the operating budget) whilst what is left over (if you are lucky enough to have some left over) can either be banked or spent on something for the house/ vehicle wife, etc. (the capital budget). You probably have a list as long as your arm of essential! important or nice to have things but only a finite amount of dosh and if you blow it all on one expensive item then you won't be able to afford anything else (for a while, if you have to get a loan or HP) and that is exactly the same with the countries capital budget. From what I observed at the meeting we are almost all thinking the same way on most projects and there is an acceptance, albeit reluctant, that we just don't have the money to do everything at once, especially the very large projects and must take a measured approach until we can see extra money coming from somewhere or else you stand a real risk of bankrupting the country. I am not a believer in borrowing at this stage, we have no sovereign debt and that is just the way I wish to keep it.

THE next few weeks of the budgetary machinations are going to be interesting but I am not overly excited as we will arrive at a sensible conclusion without breaking the bank, we always do.

Museum honours board donated and historic tea set gift from Jim

I attended the dress rehearsal on Tuesday night and the first aspect of the production to receive a tick on my list was the striking set created by Dave and Pam Lewis, Matthew Freer and Mark Brook. Not only did the attention to detail make it behevably 1920s in appearance, it was entirely functional and even a few flouncy exits complete with slammed doors didn't leave me praying it would stay upright.

The very professional lighting added to the experience and sitting in the darkened auditorium, despite being the entire audience. I was soon laughing at the fast moving dialogue and stopped wondering what I was missing on telly.

While I lead with a tribute to the dedicated souls working behind the scenes, without whom these productions would not come together, don't be concerned that the acting didn't measure up.

Sergeant Plod (Neil Ward, FICS DT teacher) leads the audience through the David Tristram farce with Inspector Drake (FITVs Joshua Saunders) attempting to solve the murder of a man dressed in woman's clothes.

Sgt Plod completely epitomises the character with his bumbling ways while not too far behind but considering himself well above the boys in blue, the Sherlock Holmes-like Inspector Drake considers policemen to be of limited intelligence, "and just get in the way."

While Lady Devonshire (Andrea Stanworth) declares her only regret about the death of Mr Johnson was that she didn't murder him herself, the other residents and possible suspects are dropping like flies. Penguin News, May 9, 2014 Pour 6 **Capital priorities outlined to publ**

AT a presentation where it was explained how approximately £61.1 million £61.1 million in available government funds might be divided between capital projects over the next five years, Assembly Members were offered feedback from the public that changed some of their minds, MLA Poole told Penguin News.

Between 60-70 members of the public attended the presentation of a Capital plan Consultation (2014-18) last Thursday.

The meeting was held in order to generate a discussion "relative priorities," on said MLA Summers who gave the presentation, supported by his colleagues, adding that the initial outline groupings had been decided by MLAs and that a 20year National Infrastructure Plan was to be completed later in the vear.

MLA Summers emphasised that all figures were illustrative and no detailed costing work had been done.

When speaking of the list of priorities he also noted that the amounts did not come anywhere close to the amounts requested by the actual departments.

MLA Michael Poole told Penguin News the meeting was helpful: "and we were glad to see such a wide range of people attend. I think some may have been disappointed that we did

not present a final vision for capital development, but we are just not there yet. It was good to get a sense of what people see as the priorities and we encourage everyone to keep talking to us on the subject.

The National Infrastructure Plan (NIP) is due to be completed towards the end of this year: "However we cannot stand still in the meantime and are looking to make budget allocations for 2014/15 right now," he explained "so we need to decide where we want to go in some areas. The NIP is a 20-year plan; we are currently focused on this Government and what we want to achieve within the funds we have available."

He concluded: "We encourage and value people's views on this important issue. The feedback certainly changed my mind in a couple of areas, as I know it did others too.'

Priorities and sub-totals

The Priority I projects were FIPASS, the prison (extension only) an elderly care home. education requirements, the Fire Station and the Power Station (additional capacity) however it was explained that they were not in order of importance. The sub total of the Number 1 priorities was £21,500,000.

Another priority project was housing: housing infrastructure, Government housing. Stanley utilities and maintenance (sub total £12,650,000).

Roads projects comprised Camp roads, the MPA road (a 'low estimate' of £36,000,000) Stanley roads, and Ross Road with a sub total of £45.950.000.

Development projects were the EDS/RDS/TDS, air terminal redevelopment. industrial site development and waste management, with a sub total of

£9.725.000

Government Offices projects which included new offices and hospital maintenance came to £5,822.000 and Community Projects (sports and community facilities and a Vulnerable Persons Strategy) sub totalled £1,650,000.

The cost of the port projects including roads/services would total £15,000,000 and plant and vehicles projects (including plant for PWD, vehicles and hospital equipment) would sub total £5,565,000.

With £61,000,000 available to spend and priority projects totalling £117,862,000 MLAs suggested the only way this would come close to working out was by not including the MPA Road and the port.

MLAs emphasised that it was still anticipated that the private sector would fund the new port and it had never been the intention that the public sector would do so.

meeting generated The considerable discussion with particular attention paid to the Number 1 priorities although most other projects also drew questions.

MLA Elsby took the opportunity to promote the idea of a purpose built IJS/CE situated by the Training Centre behind the Power Station.


Notice from the Taxation Office – **Response Times**

The good, the bad and the ugly

DURING the past week, the British news media have forced us to contrast the good with the wicked people in our society, and then consider whether we agree with the verdicts that have been delivered on them by both the court of public opinion and the legal courts.

In the cases of the publicist Max Clifford and the formerly high-flying barrister Constance Briscoe, I have no doubt that both courts got it absolutely right. Both have been given painful jail terms, and they deserve them.

Clifford is - I am tempted to say was, but I wish I could be sure that he is history - the man who could make and break celebrities, politicians and even ordinary people if he believed there was money in their stories. We all knew about that, but what we did not know about was the string of sex offences he perpetrated on vulnerable and often very young women; offences that finally landed him in the chokey.

His was the classical offence of hubris. When I checked out the precise definition of that word, I found it could not have fitted him better: 'Actions that shamed and humiliated the victim for the pleasure or gratification of the abuser.' How appropriate is that?

Then there was the high-flying and well-known barrister and writer Constance Briscoe, who has been jailed for conspiring with one or other of the Huhne couple (I find it hard to tell them apart and dislike them both) to fabricate evidence about the traffic offence that one or other of them committed. She has also gone down and will not emerge again as a barrister.

Fortunately for us, though, a Briton of far greater quality emerged in the same week, reminding us of the greatness of a huge number of ordinary people who just do their jobs well and do not seek fame and fortune. This hero was the teacher Anne Macguire who was stabbed to death by one of her pupils.

Mrs Macguire was within months of retiring after a fourdecade-long career during which she educated generations of the same families. When she died it was not only her pupils who prayed, shed tears and laid flowers for her, but their parents too.

She was by all accounts an exemplary person, but she has suffered far in excess of Max Clifford and Constance Briscoe. What a waste and what a shame.

And what about The Ugly? That slot is filled comfortably by UKIP leader Nigel Farage. Not that he is physically any more unattractive than any one else - although he does bear a remarkable resemblance to Mr Toad - but because of the supremely ugly brand of xenophobia and racism that he is peddling.

As we approach the European Parliamentary Election campaign. Mr Farage is hardly ever off his soapbox. He and his party are a sideshow, of course, because they are patently absurd (prime example of absurdity: suggesting that comedian and actor Lenny Henry should return to the Caribbean, whence his ancestors came). But Farage's message is ugly and corrodes British society. I fear it will continue to do that for some time yet

I can imagine that the Governor himself looked fabulous in his traditional uniform and the uniformed organisations marched with enthusiasm.

The symbolism of such an event is powerful of course, as it is representative of a strong and vital relationship with Britain.

But, real power is now almost fully in the hands of Islanders, and modern governors have the limited, though still important, role of ensuring good and ethical governance in the Islands, keeping the Foreign Office's finger on the Falklands pulse, and - crucially, one might say, bearing in mind the continued threat - being the colourful personification of Britain in the South Atlantic.

I can remember a time when

Governors really governed. They presided over councils packed with men and women whom they selected and who could be expected to pretty much toe the colonial line, even though British Government parsimony and diplomacy were often working against Islanders' interests.

They also presided over an invidious class system that discriminated against ordinary Islanders.

Thank God it is different now. Governors are people whom Islanders can befriend and perhaps call by their first name.

They no longer govern, though, so it follows that the old colonial uniform and even the title of Governor might look and sound a little odd.

But traditions and symbolism can be hugely reassuring and they send strong messages. So even though there are 2,000-plus governors in the Falklands these days, there is no harm in leaving the institution of Governor superficially unchanged.

The changing role of the Falklands Governor

HE the Governor

Colin Roberts

THE role of the Governor has moved away from an executive position within the Falklands His Excellency the Governor Colin Roberts told Penguin News last week as he talked about what he saw as his role, and how the position itself has changed over the decades.

He said: "There is a direction of travel in this which is ensuring that the elected representatives are taking the decisions, making the strategic direction and essentially running the Falkland Islands."

Roberts acknowledged Mr that although this move follows constitutional review (when with each review the role of the Governor has altered) "in between these big revisions there is still a trend,' and that involves the Governor focusing more on the very specific roles which are awarded to him under the constitution, primarily comprising security and foreign relations.

As such there is a place for the Governor to have a high profile international on 15sues when speaking to the foreign press, he said when asked if he, like the last Governor, would be as willing as his predecessor to speak to visiting international media.

He added: "but it is

also important that the Governor doesn't take away the role of the elected members of the Legislative Assembly, it ought to be the people responding on most Falklands issues.

Asked if he saw himself as an advisor to MLAs, or even a, "refcree or Chair," he said: "part of the constitutional role is to Chair

Executive Council and in that sense that function comes out but I think it is best to look at it as not just trying to describe the function but ask what is the purpose of it?"

That purpose he said was to make certain there was an infrastructure and context in which MLAs made and implemented their decisions and

that included making certain the Falklands was secure in defence terms and also in terms of the rule of law.

Asked what he predicted would be the line on the Falklands issue taken by a new Argentine Govemment following the Argentine General Elections in October 2015 he said: "Obviously a lot of people including me are extremely interested to hear what will be the outcome of the elections in Argentina, I feel that in relation to the Falkland Islands it would be difficult to see the situation getting significantly worse. On the other hand I'm not sure that I see the evidence within Argentina at the moment that there is going to be any radical change of policy or public opinion."

He added however that the reality is that the next Argentine government, "has a lot of things to worry about in Argentina," and so, "they might find that they have less time to devote to making life difficult for Falkland Islanders.

Mr Roberts said it would be a mistake to be overly optimistic, but FIG and the British government will deal with whatever does come out of Argentina after the election.

DIDN'T we have a wonderful few days recently – let's have more of the same, but if not at least 1 managed to achieve three days work while the sun was out.

During that time Sue turned up and worked with a will. Our workforce rather reminds me of the nursery rhyme 1 loved as a child: you know, the one that goes 'Jack Sprati could eat no fat...' Well, our efforts should read something like this. 'Sue can kneel but not bend over. Ginge can bend over but cannot kneel, and so between them both you see. They weed the garden clean.'

Maybe not quite but we make a happy team Sue sing whilst 1 whistle (usually different tunes). But between us we couldn't possibly produce the tuneful sounds Bill makes from his perch on top of the garage roof, that is, between the not so tuneful mutters and curses. He has taken some aerial photographs from up there as well. They show the gardens in a reasonable light or, at least you can't see any weeds from that height.

The flower beds are taking a while to clean up again. The rain grass which is really plain meadow grass but which produces such a beautiful green, fine and velvety sward, would be all too easy to leave in there for too long when it will seed and die and be easy to pull out Unfortunately the damage has been done by that stage and masses of seeds await a bit of dampness to colonise the borders again. We are getting rid of most of it before that bit can happen but it does mean an awful lot of soil comes out with it. Composting is one answer, the other is what we are doing now, which is to take these clumps of tender young grass and site them over some of the holes made by dandelions or dock (or children) on the lawns.



They should establish over the winter months and the lawn areas will look rather better next spring.

Did I really say that the earwig population did not seem so large and bothersome this year? What a total mistake. They are back and they have obviously been madly multiplying during their absence They are everywhere in great numbers: the latest fatalities in the greenhouses are the beefsteak tomatoes. They are huge and so when I saw what looked like splits on them I lifted them to bring in to the house; what a shock! Earwigs had literally crawled just under their skin and when I dropped them in surprise masses of them fell out, yeuk, disgusting creatures. And, is it not a shame we don't have frogs and hedgehogs here? For following close behind earwigs in destructive habits and sheer 'yeuk factor' are the slugs. I think the thrushes try their hardest to find the odd pest as they burrow into the soil in plant pots but really they are fighting a losing battle. It's enough to put you off growing food, it certainly shows me that whatever they say about nature finding its own balance (as long as one gardens organically) it will not work for me, not here and not this year anyway. Now, where did I put my poison sprays and granules.

The pumpkins have now been harvested, diced, blanched and put in the freezer bagged in suitable amounts for meals. Predictably we also have the usual gluts of broccolis and other calabrese at the moment so they have also been cut and brought in and cleaned and blanched before putting in the freezer. These I prefer to freeze


tfat on trays and bag them atterwards. Our cauliflowers were ruined by earwigs but we were given two lovely ones by Hay Miller. One was eaten immediately the other lightly cooked and covered with the left over cheese sauce and put into the freezer to be enjoyed at a later date. The cabbages are also all appearing at the same time, but although there are many other types to yet mature so we shouldn't run out, I still cut a cross into each stem when I've cut the heart off, Most of the cabbages treated this way are already starting to produce four little hearts, even if they don't ever become very large it does ensure some greens at all times.

The deep freezers are groaning with garden produce and also produce caused by bad weather (1 believe it is known as a displacement activity). In this household that means I turn to the cooker rather than the duster and polish. All sorts of meals, pasties, pies, flans as well as breads, cakes and pastries are made 'for when I'm too busy doing something else'. The freezers suffer in consequence and I usually forget to take things out to thaw out anyway. Ah well, the intentions are good.

In the flower beds some of the roses are still bravely trying to flower but I will be cutting them down soon. The colchicums (autumn crocus) are flowering, their very large flowers both the pretty singles, and the beautiful doubles known as 'water lily' look wonderful.

I hope to start planting out all my new strawberry plants, taken as runners off the mature plants earlier on in the season. It is now time to cut down all the older plants anyway, as that helps to keep pests and diseases at bay. So it is also a good time to start a new bed for next year.





Defeated Stanley take heart from strong performance

Punta Arenas executives offer commercial solutions to Falklands' industries

A GROUP of managers representing Punta Arenas port facilities, logistic companies and shipping companies visited the Islands this week with an ultimate aim to offer solutions to the current and future commercial needs of the Falklands.

Speaking to Penguin News yesterday General Manager Asmar Magallanes, Marcelo Mahuzier and four other businessmen said the group visited with, "a commercial agenda," and the intention of understanding, "what is going on around the Islands. Things are evolving quickly so it is important to link with the people now and see what is available for us and for them in a future business relationship."

The businessmen, who say they have had a wonderful reception in the Islands, have met with members of the Falkland Islands Chamber of Commerce, the fishing industry, oil and gas company representatives and the Government.

Explaining what they might bring to the oil and gas industry in the Islands, Mr Mahuzier said: "I think we can offer a whole lot, Punta Arenas is so near it could well be a platform for logistic support ... we have an airport and planes that only take two hours to get here, we've got port facilities, and there are new developments in infrastructure that will increase our capability for cargo transfer and suchlike. There are plenty of opportunities and since decision makers are planning the way ahead we want to get involved in the early stages so that we can be an option.

Mr Buljan who is the Branch Manager of shipping agency Agunsa, added: "We have a lot

of homework to do on our return and we will focus on getting real results from our work.

"We have a clear picture of what is going on here and I think that we must transfer all of this information to our local government, and tell them that we need the link and the connection to be as soon as possible on a regular basis."

He said not only should this link be via shipping, but they might be able to help set up a second flight to the Falklands: "We have to do good step by step planning according to real needs and then proceed from there." Mr Mahuzier described the delegation as a group of, "friends involved in areas that are well linked together. Alvaro [Insua Holscher] is part of a big logistical company including shipping and construction, he can source anything, he is a miracle man," adding, "should difficulties arise because of more competitive prices or whatever, we are in a good position to re-analyse and present a better proposition. So that is why we built this committee."

IT'S a fact of life in any small town newspaper that annual events seem to come around far quicker than the actual 364 days that separate them. Finding a way to imbue life into a parade that doesn't begin! "The sun shone unexpectedly on the Queen's Birthday this year. " or seeking alternative words to describe the plethora of plants at the yearly horticultural show, has often left me glazed eyed at and wondering if anyone would notice if I just cut and pasted last year's text. (I promise we don't).

Happily though that's probably the only time we feel less than wholly enthused about the weekly work count required, and in fact I think most journalists would agree it's a privilege to have a job that validates nosiness, and the opportunity to pursue a broad knowledge - I'm not going to claim a deep one - of how a community functions and what people think

An additional advantage is (or disadvantage perhaps if we PN staff were gentler of nature) the freedom to embark on some pretty blistering in-office debates. Last week's lively exchanges centred on what ultimately became our front page story; whether preventing immigrants entering the Islands (if their children did not have an adequate command of English to access the school curriculum) was discriminatory and restrictive or just plain practical. On one side were arguments based on 'lack of funding' for resources to support these children in school, while on the other the potential for it to restrict employers bringing in human resources that would likely benefit the Islands in both the short and long-term. We were pleased then, following the publication of MLA Summers arguments last week, to receive a thoughtprovoking letter from a lady knowledgeable of the education system and of non-English speaking children emigrating to the Falklands. I don't wish to overly pre-empt Mrs Fowler's letter but rather direct you towards it (page 7). Suffice to say, her clarification of the type of post requested by the Education Department, is one of a number of valid comments worthy of your consideration, alongside those presented by MLA Summers.

This week's chirpy exchange of views between PN staff was based on journalist Teslyn's piece on the type of education requirements mooted by MLA Elsby and the Education Department, that is, a brand new Infant/Junior School. But why is a middle school alone so out of the question we ask? That alternative option would certainly be cheaper and could be extended to encompass infants in the future when we knew if oil money was available? Or is that a short-sighted argument? Perhaps; after all the Infant School too is guaranteed to grow in pupil numbers.

Personally I support the idea of a new Infant/Junior School, but based only on the proviso that unlike FICS, somebody will actually bother to manage the maintenance of the damn thing



New record for Illex squid catches at 268,223 tonnes

of Illex CATCHES yesterday squid surpassed the previous record annual catch by 2.022 tonnes.

The previous record was 266,201 tonnes in 1999 and Director of Natural Resources John Barton reported midmorning on Thursday that the 2014 catch had just has just overtaken that at 268.223 tonnes.

He said however that catches will now slow **John Barton** dramatically as licences for about 70 per cent of the fleet

expired yesterday (May 15). Mr Barton commented that it was good to have a strong squid season and it demonstrated the

resilience of Illex squid. He said however that the Illex is under a lot of pressure throughout the Southwest Atlantic and biomass and catches can fluctuate hugely from year to year.

He explained that the previous conservation arrangements implemented through the South Atlantic Fisheries Commission involving Argentina, Britain and the Falklands, from 1990

to 2005, had afforded greater protection and conservation to Illex squid, but that process had stopped in 2005 when Argentina suspended co-operation.

The fire was quickly contained, however the kitchen was a writeoff and some personal, irreplaceable possessions were lost, he said.



Third award for fishing company

PATAGONIA squid caught by Beauchene Fishing Company trawlers, scored a hat trick at the Brussels Seafood Exposition this year, winning a quality taste testing award for the third year running, through marketing company Marfrio.

A delegation representing the Falkland Islands Fishing Companies Association (FIFCA) joined by representatives from South American Atlantic Services Ltd (SAAS) attended the 20th Annual Seafood Exposition in Brussels last week.

Andy Pollard, Cheryl and Brad Roberts, Stuart Wallace, Janet Robertson, Alex Reid, Eugene Hurley and Jill Ford travelled from the Falklands for the event.

The exposition lasted three days, and the Falkland Island products stimulated a lot of interest, FIFCA Executive Secretary Andy Pollard told Penguin News.

He said this was the first exposition where the Falkland Islands could advertise its Patagonian Toothfish as being Marine Stewardship Council (MSc) accredited

The MSe is an independent non-profit organisation which sets a standard for sustainable fishing.

Fisheries are assessed by a team of experts who are independent of both the fishery and the MSc. Seafood products can display the blue MSc ecolabel only if that seafood can be traced back through the supply chain to a fishery that has been certified against the MSC standard

Mr Pollard said that after good fishing seasons for both Illex and Loligo squid, interest from visotors to the stand was strong and there was also significant interest in the Falklands finfish products, such as Kingelip, Hake, Hoki and Rock Cod, particularly from the Eastern European nations.

"Whilst this show is an excellent platform for meeting both those involved in the fishing industry directly and also the logistics partners of the fishing industry, it is also another opportunity to represent the Islands overseas and communicate with a wider International audience," said Mr Pollard.

The trade fair covered 1.2 million square feet of exhibits which included fishing companies, buyers and sellers, processors and manufacturers of equipment, to name but a few. **Excavator funded** ADDITIONAL capital funding of £88,220 was agreed at Standing Finance Committee on Wednesday for the purchase of a suitable excavator for use at the quarry with the new mobile crusher unit.

On the back of trials with both 25 and 35 tonne excavators it was proved that neither item of plant could sustain the achievable output of the crusher and a larger excavator was needed. Soldier fabricates drugs story to get kicked out of army

A PRIVATE with the Royal Logistics Corp who claimed he had been offered and taken cocaine at Mount Pleasant as a means to get out of the Army, has admitted wasting police time and awaits sentencing.

The Court heard on Monday that Karl Phillip Parish (20) had alleged that on April 13 he had been in the Gull and Penguin Club where he had played pool with two unnamed individuals who he had later left with, had taken cocaine with and ended up on a beach.

Crown Prosecutor Simon Rowe said Mr Parish had been detailed with his description of events, saying the cocaine had been in a sandwich bag, lines had been arranged on a paper plate and a rolled £20 used to ingest the class A drug. Mr Parish in a detailed eight page statement to the police said he had taken several lines an described how the drug had affected him.

An Army captain had heard on the grapevine that Mr Parish was not happy in the Army and challenged him that he was looking for a means to get out of the military, however Mr Parish maintained his account was true and the alleged incident was duly investigated over three days by the police.

Mr Rowe said that given the low incidence of drugs in the lslands there was strong concern there could be people willing to give drugs to strangers within

Mount Pleasant Complex.

However on April 18, when Mr Parish was drinking with a colleague he admitted his account was false, that he was not happy in the Army and wanted to be kicked out. This was related to a senior officer who confronted Mr Parish who then admitted he was lying.

Mr Rowe noted that the actions of the soldier had not been spur of the moment, but had been thought about over two weeks and had put other people at risk of being investigated and possibly imprisoned.

Appearing in court and opting not to seek legal representation Mr Parish apologised to the British Army for bringing them into disrepute, explaining that he had not been happy throughout his time in the Army and his actions had been out of desperation.

Locum Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds asked for a pre-sentence report to be prepared considering all possible sentencing options.

She said Mr Parish was clearly a young man who had found himself trapped in a career he did not want and did not know how to deal with it.

Mr Parish was due to finish his tour in the Falklands this week however a military spokesperson said he would not be going anywhere until this incident was sorted.

Mr Parish was released on bail to reappear in Court on June 2.

Head-butting in the pub costs builder £500

CONSTRUCTION worker Daniel Lawrence Adlem (26) has been fined £200 and ordered to pay £300 compensation to a 21 year old man he admitted head-butting while in Deanos Bar on April 5.

The court heard on Monday that there had been some sort of verbal exchange between the two men the previous week, which, said Crown Prosecutor Simon Rowe had, "sadly festered on," in Mr Adlem's view.

The victim's eye which was treated initially by bar staff and later at the hospital become swollen and completely closed, but no lasting damage was caused, said Mr Rowe.

Mr Adlem who was arrested soon after the incident, but released on bail to be interviewed some six days later said his memory of the incident was not good, however he accepted he must have head-butted the man with some force because of the injury to his own eye.

Mr Rowe reminded the court that head-butting was a serious assault and was akin within the sentencing guidelines to the use of a weapon.

Locum Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said Mr Adlem was fortunate there was no lasting damage, and noted he had, "made peace with his victim." However the aggravating factors were that incident had taken place in licensed premises at night when he was so drunk as to not be in a position to calculate what he was doing, she added.

Mrs Faulds said she had considered banning him from licensed premises but as it was a first offence was not going to on this occasion.

In addition to the fines Mr Adlem, who is due to leave the Islands in five weeks time, was ordered to pay £85 prosecution costs

Driving offence

IN court last week was Stanley man Robert John Crowie who was fined £500 after he pleaded guilty by post to driving without due care and attention on March 28.

The Court heard that when Mr Crowie was pulling out of the Stanley Services forecourt, a collision occurred with an oncoming vehicle causing minor damage.

Mr Crowie was cautioned at the scene. In addition to the fine he was also ordered to pay £85 prosecution costs.

Prosecutions for illegal fishing total zero in 2014

THERE were four successful prosecutions for fishery offences in 2013 but none this year confirmed Director of Natural Resources John Barton this week

However, regarding 2014 he clarified: "some warnings have been issued in relation to excessive by-catches of non-licensed species."

Asked what level of policing and patrolling had taken place he said the level of fishery protection had remained constant throughout with a combination of surface (FPV *Protegat*) and aerial surveillance (FIGAS).

(FIGAS). Some 35 per cent of the large jigger fleet has been inspected on the fishing grounds, "and a one in three inspection rate is a good result in view of some of the weather," he said

A significant number of trawlers have also been inspected although activity has concentrated on jiggers in the recent period.

No actual illegal activity has been encountered so far, however Mr Barton said: "A handful of reports of suspected illegal activity were made by licensed customers.

"These were investigated and either no evidence found, or the vessel giving rise to the report being found and identified as legal.

As indicated a significant proportion of the fleet has been inspected at sea, and the wider area has been monitored through aerial surveillance with FIGAS and additionally at times with information from other sources.

Protection from the air In 2013, 120.3 hours of airborne fishery patrol took place and in the last two months 81.3 hours.

Background The government anticipates around £20 million income from the Falklands fishery this year. Record catches were recorded of both Illex and Loligo squid

About 80 per cent of the Falklands fishery total annual catch is squid.

Court, custody and community the work of a Probation Officer

THE role of a probation officer can be both testing and very rewarding explained Beccy Roberts who arrived to take up the post in April.

Speaking to Penguin News this week she explained that in the UK the job. "would be very specialist," but here she gets to cover every aspect of the role, extending from representing the probation service in court, that is assessing the seriousness of harm that an offender represents, to helping rehabilitate people, as well as managing community service work.

Ms Roberts who has specialised in working with those with drug or alcohol problems, 'lifers' and prolific offenders for example in burglary and street robberies, and has worked as an offender manager (managing a caseload of people in the community) most recently worked in a sexual offenders unit in Northamptonshire.

Here in the Falklands she has a caseload of offenders, "in custody that I will be working with hope-fully in depth."

As yet none of them have resisted the idea of working on their problems, she explained, "often you are dealing with people who are aggressively resistant, who are in denial ...but I have not met any resistance so far."

So what exactly does this work involve.

In the first place, said Ms Roberts, the term sex offender is not used as it is, "a real label." This, she says, can create resistance to rehabilitation as the offender may feel with a label there is no point changing. Instead they are referred to as a, "man or woman who has been convicted of a sex offence."

Responsibility is also examined, in that, "you look at what someone is comfortable with sharing with you, because you are asking them to talk about the most shameful episode of their life." As such it is about, "setting a safe environment where they can talk about these issues freely,"

every person is different. "Research has shown that there are numerous risk factors that might apply, but how they apply to each person varies. So, you might have someone who has only one risk factor and that was the thing that triggered them to offend, or you might have somebody that has numerous risk factors and that can vary from certain deviant sexual interests to inappropriate emotional intimacy, thoughts and attitudes."

Ms Roberts job is first of all to assess what was going on at the time of the offending or previous offending and reach a point with the person where it is more clear what the risk areas are, and what they need to work on, "how we are going to do that; a collaborative approach."

Of course this does not always happen she said, and in the Falklands there is no 'period of licence' during which the person can continue to be assessed after he is released. The period of licence not only helps the person adjust back into the community, but it is a time when he would be managed by the probation officer. If he were to "slip up." reoffend or if there were concerns about his patterns of behaviour, or what he was verbalising to the probation officer in terms of how he was thinking that indicated his risk was increasing, then the officer, "would have recourse to say this man needs to go back to custody for a while."

Ms Roberts hopes that this 'period of licence' will be introduced in the Falklands.

With her, "rehabilitation," hat

on she said it is rewarding when. "you see someone moving on and saying yes, I take responsibility for what I did, this is the reason I did it, these are the warning signs, this is what my friends and family need to watch out for.... I want to be a useful member of the community again."

But, Ms Roberts also has her, "public protection," hat: "I see my role as a dual edged sword of justice because it's about taking my case's needs into account, but I also have to think about the potential victims and actual victims too. And you have to marry the two up, so some days it's testing and other days it's incredibly rewarding."

Ms Roberts, who has been invited onto the Falklands Safeguarding Children Board, says she is impressed by its work so far, and that there are so many people around the table contributing. This she views as a, "massive positive" of a small community: "You can just access the right, relevant people really quickly and get their ideas and input." rather than it being slowed down by bureaucracy.

Community service work

Ms Roberts is keen to hear ideas from the public regarding possible community service work: "I've been learning there are so many really interesting projects that are happening such as conservation and the museum moving, so that is something I want to get involved in."

Her message is that if you have projects or tasks that might benefit from assistance, an elderly relative needing help clearing a yard or painting and decorating for example, then contact her at the Social Services office where she will usually be based. She sees community service as representing, "our people, paying back, making best against the harm that they committed."

She is also keen to hear how people undertaking community service, but are based at MPA, can fulfil their service there. She asked: "Why should a community at the north of the Island not be benefited, why should it all be focused in Stanley?

Irritation at self congratulatory Senior Magistrate

IN his own inimitable style. Carl Gumsley could not resist one last oblique pop at the government and Falkland Island society.

I felt irritated by Mr Gumsley's farewell speech as reported in PN 2 May 2014 - rather self-congratulatory - giving me the impression he thought he deserved credit for introducing moral values into a backward parochial society in dire need of enlightenment.

The myth he thinks he may have dispelled, that the court was 'just another government department which did as it was told', is one I've not heard said since the early 1980s (pre-conflict), and by giving this old myth voice he puts the idea out there that maybe it was in recent times and somehow casts aspersions on previous Senior Magistrates abilities to administer the law and the governments respect for the law.

Did he change beliefs and attitudes? Maybe, but who did not always open their ears? The criminals (who I hope did) or did he mean the government or the rest of us? Certainly, some leadership management styles policies could do with a few tweaks! But is that the role of the court?

Alternatively, perhaps he was slightly peeved he was not perceived as the oracle, due to our general lack of understanding of how the court works. I think Falkland Islanders have great attitude and beliefs.

I seem to remember Legal Aid being around longer than the two and a half years Mr. Gumsley's been here and I can see the chat on Facebook reducing considerably once the court website is introduced.

He should (as should anyone) be rightly proud of his work towards the protection of our children, but I do have a slight niggle of cynicism on the purpose of one of his decisions. In August 2013 he published judgements, involving children, for no other reason that I could see, than to use it to highlight related issues, running the risk of consequences to those children - not for their benefit -which should have been paramount.

The changes Mr Gumsley wanted to see happen were already happening, as before Au-gust, in June 2013, The Lucy Faithful Report (excellent by the way) was commissioned and the government and relevant services were and are very aware of the problems and needs, and are. 1 believe, doing some very good work towards the protection of children, along with all the other work needed in a fast changing community. If a service is not doing its job properly sort it out in a better way, do not use the plight of children as a vehicle to do so





Ironically, most of the problems that he thought the public should be aware of were in varying degrees, common knowledge - the advantage or disadvantage of a small community depending on your perspective- and I don't think anything has been done differently because of the published judgements anyway. I wait to be corrected.

The independence of the court is vital but I find it sad that such an undoubtedly clever man took the confrontational stance he appeared to take with other authorities and agencies in the government – he had the opportunity to make progress in a better way.

I think most of us aspire to a fair and safe society, which will be better maintained by working

together with respect for everyone's role in it - a concept 1 thought Mr Gumsley's lacked.

As for enemies, I doubt anyone felt that strongly — more incredulity even disappointment at some of his comments on our society and his decisions.

The bedrock of our society is damn solid and from our bedrock of self-knowledge we can also (like Mr Gumsley who called a defendant a 'great lunatic' and 'moron' PN 30 Aug 2013) make comment and indulge in a bit of wit on whatever issue by social media or by any means available if we so wish.

Maybe he should have mused on one of Churchill's better known quotes: the fighting on beaches, streets, hills etc...and never surrendering one – a quote most apt for those who seek to change our traditions and life style, which in the main is mostly law-abiding and treating each other with decency, however we should all be reassured that once we have an 'authoritative set of laws' we shall all know how to lead our lives!

I will miss his colourful turns of phrase in court proceedings and give him credit for handing down some good sentences (a few exceptions no one is perfect) oh... and responsibility for the fence.

Truth to say: He came, he saw, he judged, yet he did not see. (Churchill did not say that!) Gail Steen

Another view on immigrants without English

THE minutes of a recent Exco meeting described the response of MLAs to an Education paper requesting the creation of a two-year teaching post for the teaching of English as a Second Language. MLAs Summers and Elsby also commented on this question in last week's PN. While such a paper deserves due diligence. I was surprised to note that the requested post would not be necessary 'as it is expected that procedures will be put in place to prevent children arriving in the Islands, particularly of secondary age, without an adequate command of the English language'

I wish to know if these 'expected procedures' were in train before or after the consideration of the Education Department paper? Are the procedures also to apply to adult immigrants without an adequate command of the English language?

I believe MLA Summers is ill-informed about the processes involved in the acquisition of a second language, and approaches to ESL (English Second Language) teaching and learning but, to be fair, we cannot expect our MLAs to be knowledgeable in all areas which come before them. For example, I do not believe for one moment that it was the intention of anyone in the Education Department to teach the FI curriculum to any student 'in another language' Rather, the post under discussion could facilitate speedier access to the new language and integration into the community. Indeed hundreds of ESL teachers who teach English around the world often do not speak the language of the country in which they teach although they do understand how to teach English as

a foreign language. Also, MLA Summers could not have chosen a worse analogy in his example of 'a top quality Russian' emigrating to the islands whose children could be an educational problem. We have Russians in this category presently living in our community, Russians who have been here for many years and who have contributed economically and socially to this society. Several Russian families have come and gone, but here I will only focus on two such families. Neither the wives, nor the children in these families, spoke English when they arrived here. One wife has since trained as a nurse in the UK and presently follows her profession in the Islands, and the other works as a biologist in the Fisheries Department. So what of their non-English speaking children?

• One is studying Project Management at a prestigious UK university

One is studying Medicine

• One is an IT expert working

in the Islands

• One has a law degree and is working in the islands

Not bad for adults and children who arrived in the islands without an adequate command of the English Language - success by any criteria and 1 believe excellent value for money.

As one who has as much, if not more, professional experience than anyone else in this community, of non-English-speaking students and adults who emigrate to these Islands, I think my opinions arise from an informed base, rather than uninformed speculation.

Obviously, the younger the child, the speedier the acquisition of a new language, but even with older pupils it does not take long, with sufficient support, to acquire sufficient rudiments of English to cope in their new environment. In any case, at secondary level, there are a variety of subjects which non-English-speaking students can quickly access at some level with a little basic help: Science, Maths, Art, Music, PE, DT, Home Economics, and, in the case of foreign-language speakers, they can also take GCSE exams in their home language, as many have done, and continue to do.

For many years, I have supported non-English-speaking students upon arrival at FICS and helped their parents acquire and improve upon their English skills at night class. Having already given examples of the families of Russian immigrants, there are other English-second-language students who have gone on to achieve academic and career success:

• One who is proposing to study law

• One working in local oil development and studying for a Masters degree in a related area

 Several working successfully in the service industries in the lslands

•Several who took other routes, for instance, becoming apprentices, qualifying in a variety of trades and presently working in the Islands

These are just a few students who come to mind - there are more. As for the adults, many of whom arrived in the Falklands with little or no English, there are many who now make an excellent contribution to this community. These adults can be found in many walks of life - in nursing, in the voluntary services, in the Fisheries Department, in electrical trades, in the service industries, and other areas where we need essential personnel. These are people who contribute significantly to the economy of these Islands and, had language restrictions been in place when they applied to enter the Falklands, this community would have been a poorer place had they been ex-cluded because they did not have an adequate command of the English language.

It is common in many areas of UK that schools have many students for whom English is not



their first language - recent research in this area highlighted one school, where 40 different languages were spoken, but the comments from the Headteacher of that school were interesting and enlightening. Contrary to MLA Summers' remark that second language students 'will be holding back a whole bunch of other kids', he might like to join a class in our schools from time to time to see that it will generally be disruptive English-speaking students who are holding other pupils back. And, as for MLA Elsby's short response to this debate when he asserted that we need to ensure that 'there are no medical or educational needs in the (immigrant) worker or the family that would be difficult to deal with here', medical problems may be with people for life - language acquisition is temporary and, correctly supported, should not 'be difficult to deal with here

Perhaps a little research might not go amiss over this question. Before making any decisions on these procedures, perhaps MLAs could, for example, meet with some of ex-students/adults who initially were not competent in English to discuss their experiences; or investigate data on the effects of having a variety of non-English speakers in Englishspeaking schools in UK or elsewhere in the world, for instance, in Australia and New Zealand.

Quite apart from my personal misgivings about these expected procedures, I wonder what kind of message we would be sending to the rest of the world should these procedures be put in place? That we may be slightly xenophobic. inward-looking, intolerant? Certainly such a proposal does not promote this community as the open, inclusive, democratic, and forward-thinking people we like to think we present to the rest of the world. These expected procedures are a slippery slope and, as such, should be very carefully considered from both a local and international perspective

Hands up, who wants a new

A NEW Junior School is considered in the current top five priority projects for capital funding alongside a new port, police station, fire station and a care home for the elderly.

The current school is full and temporary classrooms are spread over three sites as a result, however, only two or three priority projects can be feasibly included in this year's budget.

Atty Cofre, Sarah Clarke and Karen Lee share their views on what they would like to see as mothers of young children attending, or soon to attend, the school.

Atty is starting to think about the education her one-year old boy will receive if no action is taken to reduce overcrowding at the school. She is aware of the difficult decisions facing the current Legislative Assembly but believes it should be a, "top priority."

As manager of Rugrats nursery Atty is striving to adhere to new policies being introduced by the Falkland Islands Government that regulate nurseries in the interest of safeguarding children. With this in mind, she finds it slightly hypocritical to have a school with, "no space and bad parking."

She believes the school



is a good one but the lack of classrooms, "horrendous parking," and traffic congestion distracts from this.

Extra room would also provide opportunity to expand the special educational needs facility which she feels should be, "slightly more important."

Sarah Clarke is a mother of two young children, one who will be starting pre-school in September, and appreciates the project needs to be considered carefully against other community needs.

She voiced a common concern that even though the population was, and is, predicted to rise no provision has been made sooner. "I don't really understand why allowances weren't made in the past," she said.

With the school now overflowing the predicted significant boom in population could affect both her children's access to education if the overcrowding is not addressed.

The "nightmare" of parking in John Street and Pencil Lane around the school is also a daily grind to Sarah, "there is nowhere near enough parking spaces and it is infuriating," she said. Karen Lee's greatest concern is that Islands children be assured equal opportunity and access to a level of education the Falklands can be proud of as a country.

"The Island Plan commits to allowing our children the opportunity to get the best jobs," she said.

The likelihood of a steep rise in population is of concern to Karen. "We have to have a building that is fit for purpose and large enough to accommodate sufficient classes for all."

Research has shown that children achieve better grades in basic subjects like science, maths and English when the teacher to pupil ratio is low.

Karen also believes that class sizes have an impact on the achievement of the group and therefore being able to split up larger groups is essential.

As a member on the Education Board she recently acknowledged that the teachers at the temporary pre-school classrooms at Stanley House work hard to "mask" the difficulties of limited access to the main building facilities, like the playground and assembly hall.

A new build would potentially overcome this and in addition could incorporate a new and safer playing area she indicated.

Infant and Junior School?

The Training Centre site has been identified as the prime location for a new Infant/Junior School

Member of Legislative Assembly Barry Elsby has highlighted a new Infant and Junior School as one of the top three contenders for projects to be started as soon as possible.

He said it was also firmly believed that after a large financial injection to build a new school it could be maintained and staffed by the current Education Budget.

£3.5 million was flagged up at the recent Capital Plan Consultation to be spent on education requirements. This 'finger in the wind' figure would be spent over four years indicated Members of Legislative Assembly, and was part of the £60 million likely to be available to spend on vital capital projects.

£100,000 has been allocated to look at the actual design and costs of two or three of the five top priority capital projects. The decision regarding which project will be awarded that kick start will be decided during the budget sessions at the beginning of next month.

Penguin News journalist Teslyn Barkman asked those involved, why the urgency?

Why is it so important to start now?

Every single year group at the Infant and Junior School will be split from this September and population growth is at the lowest we can expect for the next twenty years.

It is currently Falkland Islands Government educational policy to split classes at 30 pupils to ensure a good student to teacher percentage is maintained so students receive the best educational instruction.

An increased awareness and enthusiasm from Government and the public to help all students achieve, also means more specialised classrooms and facilities are needed.

IJS&C/E is running over maximum capacity, overflowing on to Stanley House grounds and St Mary's church hall. Since the most recent extension in 2002 two Portakabin temporary classrooms have been built at Stanley House for early years children and this year two more classes are to be built. The total cost of Portakabin classrooms is £300,000 -£400,000, said MLA Elsby. A significant peak in immigration could seriously affect the quality of Falklands education because there is no room left at the current site.

Socio-economic research conducted by Regeneris predicted that if the SeaLion project goes ahead the population will bulge dramatically then plateau leaving the demand much higher than it is at the moment, and if it doesn't go ahead, 'no one can realistically predict the population shrinking," said MLA Elsby. It has been confirmed that the next five year groups are all predicted to be over 35 students.

Regarding potential oil development the figures will only further increase if oil is exploited around the Falklands.

Head Teacher of IJS&CE, Mrs Karen Steen says this constant distraction to overcome accommodation problems they suffer distracts funds and leadership efforts from the school's main aim, to provide the best educational service.

In addition to lacking basic room to teach, the current school does not have a suitable playground area, or sporting facilities, with very limited parking and access, inadequate security, and no ability to offer wrap around provision, for example, school lunches, breakfast clubs and after school clubs, Mrs Steen told Penguin News.

There is also an increased risk to pedestrians and school-children due to traffic congestion in the town centre.

An extension?

There has been discussion over the years of how to tackle the problem and a repeated suggestion has been expansion of IJS into the neighbouring Stanley House site. But the buildings at Stanley House are not suitable for conversion to classrooms and to demolish and rebuild would still cause parking congestion and safety issues that plague the current Junior School.

Expanding the site with an extension separate from the school would also make it difficult to address all children with special educational needs, as they would physically be distanced from accessing the BASE educational facility when they are in their mainstream classes. "It would leave a difficult decision as to whether the child spends a majority of their time included in mainstream education or most of their time at a special educational needs centre," said MLA Elsby.

Children would have to travel from one part of the school to another to access the assembly hall, IT facilities and play ground too. A middle school?

"If I was to support a middle

school now I think we would get the funding for that, but I won't because I don't think it is the right answer ...it's not in the country's best interest to waste money," said MLA Elsby.

He added: "A school should be a school not two or three different schools."

There was talk of a middle school in the last Assembly but the suggestion has been more carefully considered since then.

After discussion with the Director of Education Annie Tempest and the heads of government they are in agreement it would be the worst thing for Falklands' society: "It does not support quality continuous education for children. We want to continue with the system of education we have now; infant, junior and secondary," as they feel this provides the best educational system, "for our children," Ms Tempest told Penguin News.

Of the present mixture of students some would not be in mainstream education in the UK, but it is Falkland Islands Government policy to, "maintain those students, ideally, in a mixed ability class" said MLA Elsby, "because of the uniqueness of our small society we think differently to the UK approach."

Benefits of a new school?

Ms Tempest, Mrs Steen and MLA Elsby all hold one vision for the future, a purpose built new junior school to deal with the overcrowding issues that will also become a centre supporting gaps in education for the whole community.

After meetings with staff and PWD the ideal place for a new build was identified as across the road to Falkland Islands Community School by the Training Centre. It is a site with the possibility for future expansion and where educational facilities can be shared with both the Training

Centre and FICS

"At the moment the Training Centre is not achieving what we want and we're making some changes in how it is run," said MLA Elsby.

The results of the Training needs analysis out for tender this month is predicted to show a demand for training from the community that the current centre cannot handle he said. Although some of the land identified for this project belongs to FIC, MLA Elsby was certain it was the right location: "You've got to think in the long term because we want to develop the training centre too.

"A facility such as this would be designed to address a multitude of high-interest community issues alongside providing essential educational accommodation.

"This project is more than just a new school for this community," said Mrs Steen, who sees potential to combine a new school design with the Training Centre and promote the health of the nation by providing school meals, and facilities for sport and after school games and clubs.

"Imagine how first class sporting facilities could support the aims of a future National Sports Council; how a refectory could address the lunch time rush for parents and allow the school to address the current misalignment of the school day with working hours."

The vision is shared by MLA Elsby who agreed that the hour rush at lunch time is difficult for parents to balance, and that if there is a genuine demand, and following research, "we want to incorporate a kitchen to provide school meals for all children from IJS and FICS ...or even just a place to eat their sandwiches."

The added benefit of a relocation of the school is the, "prime site in the centre of town," that would be left vacant.

What is realistic?

It was explained at the Public Meeting on May 1, that what is ideal may not be practicably affordable yet, but Ms Tempest, MLA Elsby and Mrs Steen are hopeful they will receive enough funding to build a much needed school with adequate parking, play space and classrooms, and they hope that one day the ideal vision will become a reality.

Role of the Company Secretary

Under Falkland's law every company must have at least one Director and one Company Secretary who cannot be the same single Director. If there are two Directors then one of them can be the company secretary. As Company Secretary you are an officer of the company showing legal responsibility with the Directors. As a Company Secretary you are obliged by law to act in interest of the company not in your own interests. The company secretary is a Chief Administrative Officer of the company and as such has certain responsibilities. The Company Secretary has power to enter into certain contractson the companies behalf and will be responsible for making sure that the company complies with Company Legislation.

The Companies Act contains many requirements and over a hundred offences. Failure to comply with Companies Legislation can result in the Company Secretary being personally fined.

The main role of a Company Secretary is to file company documents including annual returns as well as filing with the Registrar of Companies anything which changes within the company, for example when directors change or shares change or there is a change of offices. The Company Secretary is also responsible for organising the Annual General Meeting (AGM) and for the up keep of company documents such as minute books.

As Company Secretary you are responsible for maintaining the company's registered office and you must make provision for insuring that you receive any post sent to the company. The company's name must be shown at the registered office and every other place of business. It is the responsibility of the Company Secretary to ensure that all company business stationary carries it registered name, registered number and

registered address these details must also appear on any what an company order forms.

Any new share certificates will have to be issued by the Company Secretary, who is also responsible for the security of the company'slegal documents such as Certificate of Incorporation, Memorandum and Articles of the Association, Director'sService Contracts etc.

As the Company Secretary is responsible for organising all meeting including AGMs and board meetings they are often expected to keep minutes of the meetings and to make sure that the minutes comply with Company law and the Articles of the company. Although for many small companies the role of Company Secretary need not be onerous in relation to the amount of work and the responsibilities and the consequences of things not done correctly remains the same even for the smallest of companies.

Often for this reason, companies appoint professionals to act as the Company Secretary, whereby the company can delegate responsibilities by passing all the official correspondence to their advisers informing their advisors in advance if they want to make any changes to the company or its administration and arranging for professional advisers to check documents before the Directors sign them and become liable for them. Also many companies prefer to instruct a professional to take responsibility of filing annual returns and other such documentation in order to make sure the forms are completed correctly and to avoid the worry of accidently forgetting.

There are no formal qualifications to be a Company Secretary but no one who is bankrupt or who has been banned from being a Director may be a CompanySecretary.

At Falklands Legal we have a number of packages to assist all business types including acting as a Company Secretary and providing the backup required by a business.

If you are asked to be a Company Secretary or even a Director make sure you are aware of the obligations you are taking on and the responsibilities of acting as a Company Secretary or Director.



A stroll down memory lane

20 years ago

"WOEFULLY inadequate" facilities at the Infant and Junior School will probably have to be endured for another two years, Councillors John Cheek and Richard Stevens tell parents and teachers at a PTA meeting. Both councillors said they were aware that there were major problems and an extension was needed, but it was all a matter of, "priorities and political reality." The extension would come, said Cllr Cheek, but not before the summer after next.

Meanwhile Fox Bay Village School closes down and Sammy Marsh is reported as being the last pupil to put up her chair, before riding off on her parents' quad bike along the new link-road to her home at Fox Bay West. Teacher Myra Pitt rules a line under the last entry in the register

and writes 'school closed'. Two Chilean fishermen are killed and two others injured in an explosion onboard the longliner *Friosur V* in South Georgia waters.

A gas heater caused the blast which left crew sheltering from the elements in life rafts on the deck while a fire gutted the vessel's bridge and crew accommodation.

The Colony Club closes down, but goes out with a bang of the auctioneer's gavel as the contents of the building are sold and the 'last supper' is enjoyed by more than 90 guests. Bar takings are estimated to be in the region of £600. In all, the

auction raises £7,500 which with other cash assets of the club is to be split between full members after outstanding bills have been paid.

At the Chamber of Commerce AGM. President David Hall is happy to report that membership has nearly doubled in the last year and now stands at 75. He warned that this was the final year of Development Corporation assistance and additional costs would have to be recovered by an increase in subscriptions.

It is recognised it may be too late for deterring poachers in the fishing zones for this season, however it is expected to play an important role with the ever increasing problem of illegal fishing next season.

However, within a few days FPV *Dorado* gives chase, fires and damages Taiwanese Jigger *Shan Fu* δ after it refuses to respond to all other internationally recognised signals. Some damage is seen to be caused, but the vessel fleas to the north and eventually *Dorado* returns to the

fishing zones where other poachers are known to be operating. (Poaching was so lucrative at this time the poachers were thought to be operating their own P&I club (Pirate and Indemity?) whereby each operator put money into a pot to bail out a fellow poacher who may be sacrificed so the others can carry on unhindered.)



The cold light of day brought with it the realisation that the real picture would more likely contain a bit of bitching about weed seeds blowing over from a neighbouring plot, closely guarded secrets of how to grow prize winning leeks and kids stin vehicles playing PS3 games, munching on crisps and wanting to go home.

Sull, I am not put off the idea and genuinely feel that it is worth pursuing vigorously, and not just for my own benefit I hasten to add as I'm fortunate enough to already have a small vegetable plot

Pescanova pressured because of Falklands fishing links

SPANISH media reported this week that the Argentine government could force Spanish seafood group Pescanova to dissociate from its squid fishing operation based in the Falklands, as it is reportedly breaching fishing legislation.

According to the Deloitte report on Pescanova, the Spanish company has two vessels which generate some 16 millon Euros in operation earnings in waters around the Falkland Islands, through a stake in Polar Ltd, in which Pescanova has a 69.68 per cent stake through asset holding firm Lafonia.


Other Spanish companies, like the oil corporation Repsol, and the Spanish fishing firm Eduardo

Vieira, have already suffered expropriation orders from the Argentine government.

Sooner or later, the new owners of Pescanova will have to deal with this conflict, considered by a number of directors as a real 'time bomb' and a potential issue that could derail the efforts to salvage the Spanish seafood company," it was reported in an article in Madrid news outlet La Confidencial.

In an apparent and partial uturn, the creditor banks which took control over Pescanova recently decided to renegotiate the foreign subsidiaries' debts, reported El Economista.

No official word has so far been said about the Argentine legal conflict.



£250 fine for owning non licensed pistol

STANLEY man Timothy Ian Minto (49) was fined £250 on Wednesday after he admitted owning a .22 calibre pistol without the relevant licence.

The court heard that the whereabouts of the pistol had been investigated when another one had been sold with incorrect registration documents. The pistol was traced to Mr Minto who immediately admitted he had been given it as a Christmas present by his son three years previously. Mr Minto had a licence for .22 rifle and shotgun and said he had intended to join a gun club which would have covered the licensing issue, however he had not got around to it.

Crown Prosecutor Simon Rowe said there was no suggestion that Mr Minto had intended to commit an offence, adding that it was obvious that on the whole people of the Falklands can be trusted with firearms which play an important part within the lifestyle.

Locum Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said Mr Minto had made a serious mistake with no nasty intention behind it. She noted he was a man of very good character, adding that although he had got himself, "into a mess," he had shown a responsible attitude and been completely open with the police. Mrs Faulds said the .22 pistol was to be forfeited and destroyed by the police and £85 court costs were also to be paid.

Private sector plans to build put on hold

AN outline planning application to build a block of eight terraced houses to the west of 17 Goss Road was deferred by the Planning and Building Committee so that other site options and revised plans could be discussed with the developer and to await the decision of the Lands Committee later that day.

There was some controversy surrounding the application by local builder Richard Short with eight letters of objection received citing the fact previous applications to build on the land had been refused in 2007 and 2010, alternative sites were now available, the area should be retained as greenspace, that the development was not in keeping with the area and there was insufficient parking and traffic related issues.

The area opposite Narrows View was designated as 'greenspace' in the 2004 Stanley Town Plan however it was later designated for housing when the document was updated in 2009.

Mr Short explained to the Committee that having heard MLA Barry Elsby saying there was plenty of land available in Stanley and urging the private sector to build houses, he said he had gone to PWD to see what land was on offer with the Goss Road site being suggested. He had followed that up with a positive meeting with the Planning Department and so had proceeded with plans.

He said the proposed build was of good quality Scott framed, one bedroom units with high end amenities and would provide a short term option other than Malvina House Hotel. Mr Short said he had had a further meeting with the Planning Department and offered to reduce the amount of units to six and also move the development to the east, however this information had not been passed on to the objectors.

Veronica Fowler represented the objectors saying the proposed development, "had no place in a family orientated area." She also said arguments had been based on the original plans circulated and had now been "knocked out from under us."

Head of Environmental Planning Steve Butler apologised to Mrs Fowler for the lack of information forwarded while the committee deferred the application until June so it could be updated with the amended plans for six units instead of eight.

The Lands Committee also deferred the application until the Attorney General's Chambers can produce a more detailed paper with the history of the site and clarify the power the Committee has to dispose of it for this purpose.

Eirik Raude not signed up yet

RESPONDING to comments in the media that the *Eirik Raude* semi submersible drilling rig had been sourced by Noble Energy and Premier oil for their respective drilling campaigns in Falklands waters in 2015, a spokesperson for Premier told Penguin News on Thursday that negotiations are ongoing with rig companies, joint venture partners and other operators to pave the way for the 2015 exploration campaign.

They added that a rig contract and an associated rig sharing agreement was expected to be signed shortly.

The campaign is planned to commence in the second quarter of 2015 and is expected to comprise four operated wells on Premier acreage; three on PL004 and one on PL032.

The *Eirik Raude* was supposed to conduct the last hunt for Noble, but was replaced at the last minute by brother rig Leiv Eriksson.

Fire fighters remembered

A MEMORIAL service for Gerard Johnson and Robert Finlayson who died while on duty as fire fighters on May 20, 1989 was held in Christ Church Cathedral on Tuesday evening.

The young men were fighting a fire on board a fishing vessel when they were overcome with smoke.

BY the time you read this the landing day remembrance service will have happened and we will be on the countdown to the 14th of lune when we can celebrate our liberation and remember those both civilian and military who did so much to return our Islands and freedom to us. We shall be forever thankful for all their sacrifices on our behalf and will never be able to fully repay the debt we owe them all. In all this we must also never forget the families of those who came South to liberate us, it must have been awful not knowing, dreading getting a phone call or seeing something on the television. For all of us both here in the Falklands and elsewhere the memories of those black and hopeless days are still as fresh as if they happened yesterday.

Someone whose memory isn't as fresh as it could be is that of the Argentine Ambassador in London. Ms Castro's witterings as to how we would be better off under Argentine colonial control make me wonder whether she ever lived in her own country or suffers from either delusions or raging amnesia. Whatever it is I have only one message for her: Been there, seen it done it and I have the t-shirt as well and believe me lady I shan't ever be voluntarily going back for another helping.

It has been almost six months since the introduction of the minimum wage legislation in the Falklands and I am appalled that at least one large employer of people still has not implemented it. I shall be endeavouring to make sure this situation is rectified forthwith.

I look forward to the revision and updating of the workers protection ordinance and its delivery to LegCo before the life of this Assembly is over. We are living in an altogether different world sow and at times it isn't the nicest or fairest of worlds either and employees need protection.

I chaired a meeting of the Transport Advisory Committee last week and it was a very useful session and I am hoping that with a bit more work we can really make a useful contribution to the future of transport within the Falklands. We do though have to advertise who is on the committee and what we are about in order for the public to lobby the representatives and will be working towards his before the next meeting.

Who's building what and where

A SOUTH Atlantic Marine Services application to extend the existing jetty to the north of the Boat House was refused as recommended by the head of Environmental Planning Steve Butler who did not feel comfortable approving it because the applicant, Dave Eynon objected to the inclusion of safeguard conditions.

MLA Michael Poole said the key issue was lack of information, but noted that the refusal did not prevent Mr Eynon from re-applying with more detailed plans.

The erection of VHF and HF antennas at 4C Hebe Street was approved for the FIC Ltd for a limited period to ascertain whether suggested interference to television and FM radio was as a result of the radio activity.

Steve Massam's application to build a garage at 2 Racecourse Road East was approved as was Colin Ford's request to attach a garden shed onto the existing garage at 15 Kent Road.

Michael Betts' application to build a single storey dwelling at 16 Rex Hunt Road, Sapper Hill was approved, while Eddie Grimmer was given permission to site a static mobile home at 7 Teaberry Way, Murray Heights and Erica Berntsen was given the go ahead to build a two bedroom bungalow in the north part of the garden at 10 Fitzroy Road.

Reuben Cofre was granted permission to build a four bedroom two storey house at 13 Rex Hunt Road, Sapper Hill with standard conditions.

FIG properties

Approval was given for the construction of eight semi-detached properties consisting of 16 dwellings on Sandy Woodward Road, Sapper Hill for the Falkland Islands Government (FIG) under one application and also for a further four one-bedroom apartments at numbers 30 to 36 on the same road.

An amendment to a previous application to increase it from a two bedroom semi to a three bedroom semi-detached at 33 Sandy Woodward Road was also approved.

An outline FIG application to construct a modular building and play area for FS2 children within the Stanley House grounds to the east of the FS1 school building was given temporary approval.

FIC Ltd was granted permission to site 10 temporary mobile homes and associated external works within Murray Heights and had a further outline application to build 15 houses at the Old Butchery, Moody Brook Road although the Committee noted there would be considerable conditions

Plans afoot for garden allotments

WORK is to be carried out on how an allotment scheme could be managed following suggestions and research put to Assembly Members by Sian Nightingale.

MLA Michael Poole said it was a concept that had been discussed previously and trialed on a very small scale with the education department

He noted that traditionally plots of land in Stanley had been large enough for people to maintain their own gardens, however this was becoming increasingly difficult with land pressures and there was a potential gap that the Government could possibly help to fill.

There were several ways this could be done, such as a private sector partner providing allotments on a commercial or semicommercial basis; direct provision of allotments on FIG-owned land or instead of allotments a community led growing of vegetables in areas previously used for floral displays/landscaping.

MLA Poole said that while the concept required further discussion, based on feedback to date if an allotment arrangement were used an average size would be 80 to 100 square metres. This would allow for production for domestic use, but not on a commercial scale.

MLA Jan Cheek said she supported the idea but did not underestimate the work involved to get new land workable and also noted that there should be a use it or lose it type clause should be incorporated, having seen some allotments in the UK fall into disrepair and become a mess.

Nina promotes medical links in Punta Arenas

RELATIONSHIPS between medical professionals in Southern Chile and the Falklands have been strengthened following a visit by the Islands' radiographer to Punta Arenas.

Nina Aldridge spent a week with the team at Scanner Sur in the Clinica Magallanes, on a visit supported by the British Embassy in Santiago and with assistance from Honourary Consul John Rees, who is also International Relations Manager at the Punta Arenas hospital.

Stanley's King Edward VII Memorial Hospital (KEMH) and the Clinica Magallanes have long-standing ties, with Islanders regularly referred to Punta Arenas for emergency or specialist treatment and Ms Aldridge welcomed the chance to meet the imaging team there and see the facilities on offer, a set up she described as, "fantastic"

She met the team which looks after Falklands patients and gained information about how they operate which she will pass onto patients prior to their referrals to Chile.

Likewise, the team there got to know Ms Aldridge, to understand limitations in the Islands and get

a better feel for patients' management pre and post-imaging in Punta Arenas.

'Particularly useful were the plain x-ray rooms, as we are currently looking at upgrading our system to digital radiography and it was excellent to get the op-portunity to see it at work," she added.

The visit came a week before the mammography screening specialists arrived in the Falklands and Ms Aldridge said it had been

interesting to see how the Clinica Magallanes managed their breast screening and their equipment to deliver the service.

The professionalism and imaging knowledge of the staff in Scanner Sur was exceptional and there was a high standard of English among them, "even those who claimed to speak no English," she said.

She added, "I would like to thank everyone who made this visit possible."

MANAGING Director of the Falkland Islands Tourist Board along with Manager of Tourism Operations Stephanie Middleton, will represent the Falkland Islands Tourist Board at IAATO in Rhode Island, USA, next week.



Since the beginning of the modern Antarctic tourism industry in 1969, the number of tourists in Antarctica has grown from a few hundred to more than 30,000 each year, said Mr Mason.

Recognising the potential environmental impact of the growing numbers, seven private tour operators conducting excursions in Antarctica joined together in 1991 to practice and promote the highest possible standards of travel in this remote, wild and delicate region.

Currently, more than 100 Antarctica-bound outfitters are voluntary members of the organisation, the International Association of Antarctica Tour Operators (IAATO).

"Together Mr Mason said: we have established extensive procedures and guidelines that ensure appropriate, safe and environmentally sound privatesector travel to the Antarctic: regulations and restrictions on numbers of people ashore: staffto-passenger ratios; site-specific and activity guidelines: wildlife watching; pre and post visit activity reporting: passenger. crew and staff briefings: previous Antarctic experience for tour staff; contingency and emergency medical evacuation plans; and more."

lAATO is an industry group that has resolved to set the highest possible tourism operating standards in its effort to protect Antarctica and the surrounding regions. This effort is unique, and the challenge to maintain environmentally responsible tourism exists to this extent in no other region of the world. The membership comprises ship operators, land-based operators, ship agents, travel agents, one government office and travel companies that charter ships and aircraft from existing operators. Mr Mason said: "It is our

Mr Mason said: "It is our responsibility to ensure tourism does not harm or disturb wildlife or damage the region as a whole. While the experience in the Falkland Islands is absolutely amazing, we must keep the larger picture in mind as we grow our industry.

The tourism sector in the Falkland Islands is on the move and growth is expected to exceed a seven per cent increase this season. This doesn't sound like a huge number but if you multiply the growth over ten years you can imagine the possible impact in the future."

When asked about the benefits

of the meetings, Mr Mason said while it was important to attend and hear what others have to say and review statistical information relevant to the Falkland Islands, the networking and establishment of new relationships was equally important. "Attending these events is not something that should be looked at lightly. The partnerships we forge today will see the Falkland Islands continue to flourish and prosper from sustainable and manageable tourism for many years to come."

Busy schedule

FITB has a busy schedule over the coming months and the Falkland Islands is once again a main sponsor of Birdfair in Rutland, UK. This event is the world's largest wildlife event and raised a record £270,000 last year to be used for conservation efforts.

Birdfair is held annually at Rutland Water for three days every August, and is jointly promoted by the RSPB and the Leicestershire and Rutland Wildlife Trust.

Mr Mason said: "Birdfair has an attendance of over 22,000 enthusiasts and is the perfect outlet for promoting the Falkland Islands. We are excited to once again be sponsors of this important event and look forward to working with Tim Appleton and his team for many years to come."

In November the Falkland Islands will again exhibit at the World Travel Market in London. Plans are already underway for the design of this year's stand and promotional efforts. World Travel Market is the leading global event for the travel industry. It is a business-to-business event presenting a diverse range of destinations and industry sectors to UK and International travel professionals.

DEFRIB Unit

The Tourist Board has purchased a DEFRIB unit which is to be installed in the Jetty Visitors Centre ahead of this year's season.

He said it was vitally important to have adequate first aid procedures in place in the event, "one of our visitors needs urgent care and assistance. Given the average age of our visitors it is just something we need to be prepared for."

Sudden cardiac arrest (SCA) is a leading cause of premature

death, but with immediate treatment many lives can be saved he explained. SCA occurs because the electrical rhythms that controls the heart are replaced by a chaotic disorganised electrical rhythm called ventricular fibrillation (VF). The quicker VF can be treated by defibrillation the greater the chance of successful resuscitation. Seconds count, and the ambulance service may be unlikely to arrive quickly enough to resuscitate most victims.

Many SCA victims can be saved if persons nearby recognise what has happened, summon the ambulance service with the minimum of delay, perform basic cardiopulmonary resuscitation (particularly chest compressions) and use an AED to provide a high energy electric shock to restore the heart's normal rhythm. Each of these stages is a link in a chain of events that provide the best chance of success, but the critical factor is the speed with which the shock is given.

AEDs are easy to use, compact, portable and very effective. They are designed to be used by anyone; the machines guide the operator through the process by verbal instructions and visual prompts. They are safe and will not allow a shock to be given unless the heart's rhythm requires it. They are designed to be stored for long periods without use and require very little routine maintenance.

Mr Mason said FITB is pleased to be in line with UK business and tourism operations, where AEDs have been installed in many busy public places, workplaces, or other areas where the public have access.

The intention is to use the machines to restart the heart as soon as possible. This strategy of placing AEDs in locations where they are used by lay persons near the arrest is known as public access defibrillation (PAD). Training to use an AED is an extension of the first aid skills possessed by first aid personnel and appointed persons. AEDs have been used successfully by untrained persons, and lack of training should not be a deterrent to their use.

Emergency First Aid Training

Mr Mason has arranged for three emergency first aid training sessions to be conducted at the Jetty Visitors Centre in partnership with Invenio. He and Tom Whistler, senior trainer and HSES consultant with the local company have developed a programme which will ensure the tourism industry is trained on emergency first aid.

Mr Mason said, "with the number of tourists we deal with each season we have been fortunate not to have had a situation which required such first aid treatment. However, this doesn't mean we shouldn't be prepared to save the life of another person either locally or one of our visitors to the Falkland Islands."

The Tourist Board has arranged three sessions which are open to everyone in the community, but especially geared towards tour operators, guides and drivers, basically anyone who has interaction with tourists.

'Emergency First Aid at Work' is a qualification that is valid for three years (with skills to be refreshed every 12 months) which enables a candidate to act as an appointed person to take charge of the first aid arrangements, including looking after the equipment and facilities and calling the Emergency Medical Services when required. Training covered within the six hours contact time includes

• How to provide first aid care to a casualty/ injured person for minor injuries including small cuts, grazes, bruises, minor burns, scalds and small splinters.

• How to effectively administer cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR).

• Administering first aid to a casualty who is unconscious, having a seizure, choking, wounded and bleeding or suffering from shock.

•Understanding the need for recording incidents and actions.

•Understanding the importance of preventing cross-infection.

•The use of available equipment.

•Assessing the situation and circumstances in order to act safely, promptly and effectively in an emergency.

All of the courses are taught in a safe learning environment with experienced instructors who tailor the training to our industry and will be held at the Jetty Visitors Centre.

The courses are scheduled for July I, 2 and 3, 2014. The course is a full day course and is a qualification certificate recognised in the UK.

FITB has arranged a special tourism rate of £70 per person for courses scheduled through the Board.

Provision for an all weather sports ground on the area in front of the Community school will also be examined by the Committee. This has an aspiration that the ground-works can be completed as a community project to contain the overall cost and create community ownership.

A proposal for the appointment of a waste management coordinator to enable the Public Works Department to make progress on waste management issues, was also referred by Executive Councillors to the Select Committee next week. Climate change and

THE risks posed by climate change on the land in the Falklands is the subject of an EU and FIG-funded project.

The Falkland Islands is the first UKOT to access this EU BEST* funding and Rebecca Upson, the project officer for this Kew Gardens, FIG, & Falklands Conservation and Falkland Islands Trust collaborative project, takes up the story.

We are now midway through a month-long visit to the Islands with the primary goal of holding several public events about climate change and the Falkland Islands and to run a prioritisation workshop that will let us know the best way to approach the next phase of the project.

Climate change is one of the major challenges facing the world, placing an additional stress on our natural resources at a time when many are already under stress from a range of including threats invasive species. If we want to be able to continue to benefit from the services provided by our natural resources we need to start looking at potential impacts of climate change as soon as possible, hence the timeliness of this project. When considering the impacts of climate change on the countryside, it makes sense to start with the soils and plants which form the basis of all habitats and the basis for livestock farming, the major land use across the Falkland Islands.

Climate predictions for the Falkland Islands

In order to make predictions

about the climate, scientists build computer models based on our current understanding of the earth's climate system. The Centre for Climate Change Research at the University of East Anglia, headed by Professor Phil Jones, has worked with regional models, calibrated with Falkland Islands weather data (Fig 1), to make the first predictions for how the climate of the Falkland Islands will change over the coming 100 years.

First they looked back over the last century of records that had been collated by Jim McAdam (UK Falkland Islands Trust) and surprisingly found that despite some apparent trends in these data, once the whole set was analysed it was clear that there have been no significant changes in temperature or rainfall (Fig 2). There has, however, been a significant increase in summer sunshine (Fig 3). These analyses were only possible because there is a reasonable overlap between recording in Stanley and the Mount Pleasant Complex. This is thanks to Manfred Keenleyside (PWD) continuing to take the Stanley measurements after the official weather recording was moved to Mount Pleasant. This allowed the team at UEA to treat the records as one complete series covering over 90 years.

The major climate modelling predictions for the Falkland Islands are an approximately 3°C increase in the average annual temperature, but no change in annual rainfall (Fig 4). The same trends are predicted for Patagonia. It had been thought that rainfall was decreasing so there is some good news, however modelling precipitation is extremely complex and it is not currently possible to investigate seasonality of rainfall. If funds are available, the team at UEA are next going to investigate possible changes in the level of storminess. This is important because under a warmer climate the probability and frequency


of extreme weather events is predicted to increase. It may be that even though the overall rainfall remains unchanged it could arrive in heavier bursts with drought periods between, perhaps backed up by the increase in summer sunshine. It is also worth remembering that annual rainfall varies across the Falkland Islands (Fig 5) and the predictions are based on a single weather station at Stanley/MPA. It would be valuable to establish more weather stations across the Falklands, particularly on higher ground.

Identifying areas of most concern


There are many potential impacts of climate change on our native and introduced plants and the key 'services' (such as farming systems, water quality, soil stability and carbon storage) provided by the grasslands and soils of the Falklands. Our primary reason for organising a workshop this month was therefore to find out from people in the Falklands what the local priorities are and where most concerns lie. We would like to express our thanks to all the participants for the useful and stimulating debate. Participants included representatives from the Departments of Environmental Planning, Agriculture, Public Works, Falklands Conservation, the farming community, local naturalists, Members of the FLH, Assembly, Legislative Falklands Wool, SAERI and members of the public.

We still have a few more responses to receive back from workshop participants but so far the areas that are being highlighted as of most concern in relation to climate change and biodiversity are the potential for: • Drier soils

- Increased soil erosion
- · Changes in invasive plants

These priorities take into account likely impacts on dominant as well as vulnerable species and habitats and also the level of perceived urgency.

The areas that were highlighted as of most concern in relation to climate change and agriculture are the potential for:

· Increased soil erosion

 Increased run-off/ erosion caused by high intensity rainfall events

 Increased water use by animals in dry periods

 Reduced water resources available for direct removal caused by changes to runoff and recharge

• The need to increase national food security

 Increased greenhouse gas emissions due to enhanced soil biological activity from warmer soils

These priorities take into account likely economic, environmental and social impacts as well as the level of perceived urgency. So there are, as expected, several crosscutting themes such as soil health that are of concern for both agriculture and the biodiversity on which it depends.

We also met to discuss the likely impacts on public works and services insofar as these are integrated into the use of natural resources and the wider countryside in the Falklands.

Carrying out targeted research

One of the climate change impacts we are currently investigating is the effect that

increased temperatures (with no change in rainfall) could have on soil moisture levels and carbon storage (with UKFIT). The magnitude/scale of this impact will be influenced by the health of soils across the Falkland Islands and so will vary according to local conditions. Plotting predicted rainfall against the amount of water lost through evaporation and through (evapotranspiration) plants under current and predicted temperatures shows that the would predicted increase severely lengthen the period across which water lost from soils through evapotranspiration exceeds the input of water into soils from rainfall. This could have major knock-on impacts, for example in terms of plant growth and vulnerability of soils to erosion.

The other major area we are currently investigating is the vulnerability of different plants of the Islands to climate change. This has been made possible through the use of plant distribution data (held at Falklands Conservation and RBG Kew) and the production of maps of climatic (by the team at UEA) as well as more local environmental conditions (at RBG Kew) across the Islands both under current conditions and as predicted up to 2100. Plants adapted to upland areas of the Falklands are shown to be particularly vulnerable to the predicted warmer conditions but in general the responses will be many and varied depending in part on the tolerances of different species as well as changes in the interactions between different species. We are also investigating potential impacts of climate change on the spread of invasive plants starting with a focus on Calafate.




Assessing the risk associated with each area of concern

The next major focus for the project is to carry out an assessment of the risk associated with each of the priority climate change impacts identified through the Stanley workshop in the short, medium and long term. We are effectively going to be looking at how likely it is that a given impact will occur combined with what the likely extent of that impact will be.

This will provide vital evidence for the Falkland Islands Government to consider what actions they wish to prioritise to address the key risks and opportunities posed by climate change. This in turn will encourage the best use of limited resources and the building in of resilience to climate change.






Above: First boy and second overall loan Roberts who completed the distance in 24 minutes a full minute ahead of Roddy Cordeiro







Major road works on budget and on time

THE major road works taking place on Ross Road are, "proceeding to time and budget so far," Director of Public Works Manfred Keenleyside told Penguin News this week.

The overall project is to complete the, "progressive rebuilding," of Ross Road from the Public Jetty to by the Reservoir Road junction with completion scheduled for financial year 2017/18.

The current phase is from where work has begun by the Cathedral to near the Villiers Street Junction which it was estimated would take until the end of November. "but the end date will be determined by when the first large cruise vessel is looking likely to be nearer the time," said Mr Keenleyside.

If it is not going to be possible to complete all the way to Villiers Street before the first large vessel, this will simply mean the next phase will be expanded slightly he said.

Part of the current project is the separation of surface and foul water drainage (to reduce the amount of sewage needing to be pumped) which means excavating trenches for, and laying the new pipes along and across Ross Road and Dean Street as well as forming new manholes. Matching the new work with old and incorporating these additional elements which have to be done in sequence have contributed to the projected time to do the works he said.

In order to try to minimise effects on businesses and traffic the work is being done in sections and also out of the main cruise ship season.

History

The road itself has an interesting history; probably completed in 1957 it was built by a group of people commonly referred to as the 'German gang' and took little over a year to complete.

The gang is understood to have mixed all of the concrete on site and moved it from the mixer to the laying surface in two wheeled hand barrows. **Continued page 3**

A LIGHT-HEARTED comment made on a Mercopress report on Len McGill's promotion (congratulations to Len by the way) gave me a jolt of nostalgia this week with its reference to the Police Force on Tristan da Cuhna. According to the writer the island's inspector is due to retire fairly soon and, "neither of the rest of the police force want the job.

A little unfortunate in itself, but the use of the word 'neither' made me chuckle, and also sigh at the thought of a community that apparently requires no more than a police force of three

Not of course that I remember a Falklands with such a small force, but with RFIP members the highest ever, a full jail and a child safety Bill being fast tracked (see page 4) perhaps 1 might be forgiven for hankering momentarily after a 'more innocent time

Hmm hold on, that's the problem with nostalgia, it's just so easy to blur out realities with time and sentiment. After all some of our current prison inmates are charged with historic crimes, so clearly that innocent time wasn't so innocent after all

And that being the case why are some of our MLAs being quite so precious about private fostering arrangement legislation?

Apparently they have concerns about interference into the Falklands way of life and unnecessary intrusiveness into family life

OK I get that there has to be a balance (and I respect their focus on achieving this) but let's not get too snippy at the thought of required checks into persons caring for other people's children. When working with children overseas I was required to have a police check - and guess what - my head didn't burst into flames and I wasn't made to feel like a criminal

And if a friend asked me to care for their child (for more than the 28 days required without checks) I wouldn't have the slightest objection to a visit from Social Services, although admittedly I might get around to doing some dusting and swipe the cat hair off the sofa

Of course those types of checks won't bring a decisive end to neglect or abuse of children, but if it means just one less victim then a little interference into people's lives is worth it isn't it

The Falklands way of life is a wonderful thing but there's no point pretending it doesn't require adjustment - the past wasn't perfect - let's not pretend otherwise

THE Falklands can look forward to tuition from a shearing instructor as well as musicians and some entertainment courtesy of the Quality of Life awards and the Shackleton Scholarship Fund this vear.

Secretary of the fund Sally Ellis said it seemed appropriate with the Falklands recent participation in the Golden Shears World Championships in Ireland that £3,000 was allocated to bring an instructor down from New Zealand The instructor will work with shearing gangs on East and West Falklands and provide the opportunity for farmers and novices to participate in workshops.

Appalling service from Alnmaritec

MLA Phyl Rendell expressed the Government's disappointment at the lack of progress and the delays caused by Alimaritec, manufacturers of the Concordia Baby sea truck, in carrying out modifications.

"The customer service is appalling considering there has been five months waiting time," she said. Workboat Services Manager Adam Cockwell reported at the May Transport Advisory Committee that there had been no progress on the modifications to the sea truck since the last meeting in March.

He said they were currently waiting for the Alnmaritee engineer to chase up prices for foam fenders but due to being on holiday had not done so until recently. Works to carry out the modifications to meet the specified payload of four tonnes would take between six to eight weeks for completion. he said, adding that it was envisaged the works would be carried out at the end of this season, when it can be taken out of action.

Mr Cockwell explained that the error was with Alnmaritec, and they were meeting all expenses.

that this year for the first time, a more generous allocation of funds was made following the growth in the Fund's capital reserves, "as a result of sound investment policies

The largest grant was made to Dr Blanca Figuerola Balana from the University of Barcelona in Spain who proposes to study the spatial patterns and biodiversity of bryzoan communities around the Falklands. (Bryozoa are small colonies of moss-like sea animals). The project will be supported by the Shallow Marine Surveys Group (SMSG) and the South Atlantic Environmental Research Institute (SAERI) in Stanley

A second scholar will also be working in a coastal environment in Antarctica on the South Orkney or South Shetland Islands. She is Dr Jade Berman the Living Seas Manager from Ulster Wildlife in Belfast who will be studying sponges from the 'shallow Antarctic' as part of an SMSG study in which Dr Claire Goodwin (a former Shackleton Scholar) will also be taking part. The survey will be based on the research vessel Hans Hansson but Dr Berman will spend time before and after the voyage in Stanley where she hopes to work with Falklands Conservation on educational activities for schoolchildren

Dr Anne Jungblut is a German scholar working at the Natural History Museum in London. She proposes to study microbial communities in the soils of East Falkland. This knowledge is needed to provide a baseline ecological framework and eventually will facilitate soil restoration and revegetation work in the Islands.

Finally, Katherine Moon a PhD student at the Australian National University who has studied penguin populations in Australia and New Zealand proposes to undertake research into parasites of the Falklands penguins, looking at the distribution of penguin ticks and their impact on penguin health. She expects to visit the islands early in 2015

Mr Keenleyside said as far as he was able to find out, "they were a Christian fundamentalist sect who intended to settle here, but ended up in Argentina. according to a researcher who visited the Falklands recently.

As well as building Ross Road in its current form, the gang also worked on the Town Hall

Mr Keenleyside said he discovered information in a file noting how one had fallen off the scaffold whilst working on the Town Hall and suffered concussion which lead to a group discussion, "as to whether it was ethically acceptable for them to accept help from FIG in the form of a trip to Montevideo for treatment with costs being met for the injured man and someone to accompany them.

Speed

Asked how was it that the original gang had been able to complete such good quality work so quickly he indicated that the amount of workers would have been much higher than today. Also today there are less, "practical working hours due to winter working, although the latter would presumably also have been the case for part of the original works if they were continuous.

He said he had, "long been impressed by how well the main section of Ross Road has lasted given that it was clearly not designed for the level of traffic or size of vehicles now using it, and which was constructed using fairly scant resources.

This longevity was clearly in no small part due to good workmanship, he said adding, "but also there has been time for what is just below the concrete surface panels to settle and compact as the traffic increased but what has been found is that once the panels are removed. there is need to replace much of what is immediately below."

He said there was a layer of generally very shallow compacted stone over relatively soft clay. In some areas peat has been left in situ and even peat ash is present as the sea wall by the section currently being worked on was built out from the original road line and the space between was filled with a mix of materials.

He said: "What was done has worked well, but the replacement works are more robust, with thicker concrete slabs and a greater depth of supporting aggregate unless testing shows that the existing material below will give sufficient continued

"Hopefully the new works will last at least as long as the old."

Legislative Assembly Member Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into her working week

MANY thanks to Gavin for freeing me to spend extra time with daughter and grandson who were here for a two week break from her master degree course.

Last week we spent another day in Budget Select Committee mainly concentrating on capital items and with a fair amount of pragmatism on all sides managed to shape something which may be workable if it can be refined and confirmed in the final budget meetings next week.

Following an interesting May meeting of the Planning and Building Committee it is worth reminding readers that this week is the last opportunity to fill out the consultation document on the development plan which closes at the end of the month. We are hoping for a record number of responses to help shape the developments for the future. If you are one of the many who don't want to see every bit of space in Stanley built on, now is the time to make your view count. There were copies available at the Planning office. Post Office and on line. With all development that may be ahead we want to get it right and keep the space and freedom that make our way of life special.

There was a presentation and discussion on the Children Bill at the public meeting this week. While there is an understandable reluctance to legislate for everything, child protection has to be the exception. We do not have laws against murder because we are all about to hit our neighbours over the head but because a few unsavoury people may do. Likewise powers are needed to follow up on worries about children's welfare and safety because of a handful of cases where parents are unable to protect and care for them adequately. Help and support can be put in place and can often prevent more drastic consequences. Most of the Bill simply formalises the good practice that is already being followed. A final select committee on the bill is scheduled for June 10. and it should go to the As-sembly where it may be debated further in June or July.

Bill balanced between child safety and family privacy

OTHER than some misgivings regarding private fostering arrangements and some details about the role of the Safeguarding Board, Members are, "relatively comfortable with the balance," of the way the Children Bill 2014 is written. Member of Legislative Assembly Mike Summers told Monday's public meeting prior to a presentation on the Bill.

He believes a balance has been struck between protecting children and, "the need for normal family life to proceed," and for government not to be overly intrusive.

MLA Summers added that while it might be tempting, "to think we have slammed the door after the horse has bolted after what has happened in the last two or three years here in terms of child abuse, I think that the fact that we've got people locked up for child abuse is due to the very good work of the Police, the Social Services Department, the AG's Chambers and the courts: and perhaps we managed to do it despite the quality of our existing legislation and not because of it."

At the meeting Principal Crown Counsel Ros Cheek gave a presentation summarising the Bill which updates the Children Ordinance 1994.

Director of Health and Social Services Hilary Rowland also gave background explaining the FIG commissioned Lucy Faithfull Report which made recommendations relating to child safety in the Falklands.

Ms Rowland emphasised that six months on, most of the recommendations had been acted upon; there was a campaign planned to promote child safety, there was a new probation officer and an extra social worker as well as "good work," done with the nurseries.

In her presentation Ms Cheek explained the existing provisions for child protection and the planned new provisions. The latter includes early help for children in need, such as the provision of services by FIG to avoid crises. It also includes parental rights for unmarried fathers through registration at birth or by agreement or order. Other new provisions will be parental rights for step-parents through agreement or order, the Safeguarding Board, private fostering checks, and education supervision orders to ensure parents allow children to be properly educated

Ms Cheek spoke of new laws to impose certain duties on FIG

and outlined an exact definition of what a child in need was defined as, that being, "Child unlikely to achieve or maintain reasonable health or development; health or development likely to be significantly impaired without provision, or child is disabled."

Private fostering arrangements may in the future mean social services checks on children living with someone not their parent, relative, or someone with parental responsibility, for more than 28 days.

Comments made by the public indicated concern that this might be intrusive; a concern also felt by some MLAs. At the March Select Committee for the Bill, Head of Social Services Nicky Murphy reassured checks are essential but would be "light touch."

Those presenting the Bill emphasised that many of the provisions in the Bill were already being undertaken and this was simply legislation, "catching up."

The Bill will now go before a meeting of Select Committee and depending on progress through that committee, will go back to Legislative Assembly either at the end of June or July 2014, confirmed the Attorney Generals Chambers this week.

Camber lay-up

A DECISION on an application from a local company for an additional lay-up area for fishing vessels at a site on the Camber, should be made by the end of June or July, MLA Michael Poole told Monday's public meeting.

Responding to a written question submitted to the meeting he said the application regarding placing warehousing on the Camber at the current dock site, went to the April Lands Committee. He said he hoped there would be a paper to ExCo on the subject in June, "possibly July but no later," and that the relevant officers had been liaising with the applicant over recent weeks to make sure they had all the details required so that ExCo could make an informed decision on the proposal.

He said the economic benefits did seem quite clear, "but we have already recognised as a Government that we need to review the existing Lands Disposal Policy particularly in terms of commercial disposal and that's due to be completed next month."

On call doctor

POLICY requires an on call doctor must be in attendance at the hospital within ten minutes. MLA Summers confirmed at the public meeting on Monday that there was a degree of discretion regarding how the doctors acted in response to a call depending on the urgency of the situation.

Pupils reading their way to calm and concentration

EXERCISING the brain, improving concentration, relaxing the body and calming the mind are all benefits of reading, revealed Tutor Group Shackleton 2 at a recent reading assembly.

The brainchild of English teacher Wendy Wilson, along with Zoe Gill, also an English teacher, the assembly promoted reading as an integral part of developing literacy skills across the school

Unusually, the students attended the assembly in two halves, boys at one and girls at another.

FIG Media and PR Manager Krysteen Ormond read excerpts from Nick Hornby's 31 Songs, to the girls

Headteacher Martin Winward said: "Krysteen is an excellent role model for not only the Islands but for our young students at FICS. 

Bureaucracy stalls jetty plans

IN last weeks Penguin News Steve Butler the new Head of Environmental Planning was quoted as saying that our company's application to extend our jetty was refused because I objected to the inclusion of safeguard conditions.

Some of the conditions such as providing 11 parking spaces, only allowing vessels based in the Falklands to use the jetty, no more than six vessels to use the jetty at any one time, no vessels to arrive or depart the jetty outside the hours of 8am to 5pm Monday to Saturday and so on, has the hallmarks of bureaucratic control with no allowance for the practicalities of having a working jetty.

I asked on numerous occasions verbally and written, if all these same conditions would be applied to other jetty owners, but I have never received a satisfactory answer to this question. I can only conclude that because I do not conform to their own Waterfront Master plan, then they will do the upmost to frustrate me. People must not forget that Stanley harbour is a working harbour and has been since 1842. I hope that this will continue into the future.

The principal reason for extending our jetty is to assist another local company who themselves have experienced similar bureaucracy that seems to pervade within some of our government departments.





time I wrote? Silly me - For it has become steadily cooler, which is understandable given the time of year, but the dark, early mornings I cannot get used to, not this early in the year anyway! Mind you, this dark, damp and dreary weather just shows how much our seasons have changed over the last decade or so. The first snow and frosts were usually reserved for the evening of the May Ball, when all dancers could slide around the roads on their leather dancing soles. Great memories indeed.

My broken kneecap continues to cause problems even though it appears to be mending quite well. Once again my 'wiring' has come to the surface and gives me some discomfort. Still, hopefully all that will come to an end in August. Meanwhile, well, let's just say, life gets very frustrating at times.

All is not lost though and most of the jobs continue to be done even if the pace is somewhat slower.

I have been digging out the potatoes little by little and when weather permits. So far they are little more than marbles but I dare say we will get a few good ones yet, especially from the early and second early ones. We will, no doubt, eat them as they are lifted so we don't have to worry about incu keeping quanties and win just save a few for seed. I'm more concerned about keeping enough seeds from the main crop potatoes, even if they are only little ones. As self sets tend to produce good crops from often very small seed, we can only hope planting them that size will work too.

Taking advantage of a reasonably sunny, if a rather cool windy day, I got into the greenhouses and pulled out all of the tomato plants having removed all healthy, untouched tomatoes first. Strangely the bugs do not seem to bother with the yellow ones. I might have to concentrate on those next year. All not-quite-mature ones are now scattered on dishes on window-sills. The green ones are in cardboard boxes in a warmish but not sunny place. A ripening banana's ethylene gasses would probably also hasten the process a bit, but as long as the tomatoes are healthy they should ripen anyway. I can't decide yet what to do with them as we still have chutney left from last year and we don't use much ketchup, but, I guess those that don't get used as soon as they ripen will end up in the freezer.

Last year I failed to cut down the cherry tree growing alone by the greenhouses and so was not able to cut down the clematis montana growing behind it either. They had both become hopelessly entangled and neither looked their

Dest last Season." They probably won't this spring either, for I'm a little early for the cherry which should be pruned in spring and late for the clematis which should have been trimmed as soon as it flowered in late spring. However, it is done now and it won't kill them; at the same time I pruned all the other cherries, crab apples and some of the overgrown apples and plums in the 'orchard' at the west end of the house. The new family apple tree did not need pruning this year but it produced many quite large apples all of which I took off as they are not likely to ripen any more and most were ready and starting to fall off anyway.

The apples were quite delicious, probably more so for being our own.

Those smaller, not-quite-ripe ones are going to make a jelly together with the mountain ash/ rowan berries picked and put into the freezer last month. This jelly is quite delicious with a nice roast (preferably shoulder) of mutton. The plums await the same treatment because if I don't remove them soon the birds are going to polish them off first. The currants and gooseberries have had a light 'short back and sides' too. Not much was needed this year, just a tidy up of any branches crossing over and removal of those growing too close to the ground

make life complicated when picking the fruit.

The raspberry canes just needed the old brown canes to be removed leaving space for the fresh new stuff to grow and fruit next year. We then put what we could fit of the prunings through the garden shredder, this makes a wonderful mulch once it matures a bit, or, it can go into the compost bin. I still haven't cut down the strawberry plants as I've not got amongst them yet. I got quite taken up removing weeds which had become clumps of grass amongst the currants instead. Lastly on the fruiting scene I must either buy more rhubarb plants or split the ones we have, though they really are a bit young, we so enjoyed the rhubarb this year that we must have more.

Bill has finished trimming the eucalyptus hedges; they grow surprisingly well and thickly and really take very little caring for throughout the year. Samantha got going with the secateurs and pruned some small willows and other shrubs that needed cutting back and we have lifted some overgrown hebes in the borders and so space is being made for more plants in the spring. Can't wait to get going!

Now it is time to ensure all taps outside are lagged and all hoses coiled and put under cover.

New fishery protection gun is 'ideal for role'

A NEW gun for Fisheries Protection Vessel FPV Protegat is "ideal for the role," confirmed Major Peter Biggs Officer Commanding Falkland Islands Defence Force (FIDF) this week.

Director of Fisheries John Barton explained that on Sunday, the opportunity was taken to commission the new gun.

He said: "The gun being replaced is an ex MoD Oerlikon 20mm that has been used twice in fishery protection incidents."

The Oerlikon is quite elderly and is no longer in use with UK Forces said Mr Barton, "and spare parts are becoming impossible to obtain."

It has been replaced by a .50° calibre Manroy heavy machine gun. This weapon system has the benefit of already being in service with the Falkland Islands Defence Force and spares and maintenance are easier to arrange, as is the procurement of ammunition.

A large team of FIDF personnel and Fishery Officers assembled on *Protegat* for the sea day on Sunday.

Mr Barton said: "The exercise gave the opportunity to rehearse all the procedures; running through the rules of engagement and giving FIDF personnel the opportunity to practise with the weapon onboard ship. Despite the rather blustery conditions some good accurate shooting followed."

Major Biggs said the gun proved to be ideal: "The new gun has a far superior sight and is easier to use. This weapon system should help in providing a credible deterrent against illegal fishing for years to come."

The original gun arrived in the Falklands at the beginning of May 1999 and was installed on FPV *Dorada*. At a high point during that particular season approximately 50 illegal vessels were detected operating well inside the Falklands' fishing zone. Poachers then were even n. Picture by A Miller

thought to operate their own club where each operator put money in a pot to bail out a fellow poacher who could be sacrificed so that the others could carry on unhindered.

By May 15, the gun had been used by the FIDF to fire directly on a Taiwanese poaching vessel *Shan Fu* 8 after it tried to flee following warning shots fired. The vessel escaped but it was considered that the direct action might serve as a deterrent.

It is hoped that the old gun will find a home in the new museum complex.





The 2014 budget proposals

THE following proposals were announced at Wednesday's meeting of Legislative Assembly. Final decisions will be given by Financial Secretary Nicola Granger in the meeting of Legislative Assembly today, June 6.

- Septic tank cleaning by 6.2 per cent.

- Banking licence fee to £6,000 per annum.

- Illex fees by 5 per cent.

Governor Roberts speaks to the nation

HIS Excellency the Governor Colin Roberts delivered his annual speech to the Falklands population from the Court and Council Chamber at the opening of Legislative Assembly on Wednesday morning.

He said the hydrocarbons industry continued to go from strength to strength, "despite Ar-

gentine efforts to disrupt activity and threaten legal action against participants."

These efforts had proved ineffective, and the unwavering support of the government of the United Kingdom would continue to ensure that legitimate economic activity in Falkland Islands waters continued

unhindered, he said.

"Planning is significantly advanced for a new multi-operator exploratory drilling programme which is expected to commence in the first half of 2015. This will bring a fresh surge in economic activity in the Falkland Islands and new opportunities for the local business community. A number of exciting new targets will be tested in both the North and South basins around the Falkland Islands," said Mr Roberts.

Meanwhile other licensees continued to seek new partners to carry out additional exploration and appraisal work elsewhere in licensed acreage, and success may lead to extended exploratory drilling taking place in the short term, he noted.

"The impact that hydrocarbons may have on the Islands is of paramount importance to all of us. The abundance of wildlife, the pristine nature of the Islands and the way of life of the Islanders are always in our minds," Mr Roberts said.

The Falklands Government had therefore developed a Hydrocarbon Development Policy Statement, which sets out a broad policy framework for the future development of the industry, he said, adding, "This must be, and will be, carefully planned."

Relevant legislation had been reviewed and new and amended legislation was in the pipeline; the legislative side of the Tax Review was almost complete and new, much needed, maritime legislation was being drafted; planning, in all areas was progressing well and industry specialists had been commissioned to guide and assist in that process, said Mr Roberts.

He said the Government had also been working with the private sector to define 'Local Content' policies that would encourage and maximise opportunities

for local businesses to work with the oil industry. "The prospect of oil provides a real opportunity to boost the economic prosperity of the Islands and this opportunity must be grasped if we are to play a full part in our long-term economic development."

In terms of existing key industries he said there re-

mained continued optimism in the farming community despite the challenging weather conditions of the last season while FIMCo had more than achieved its targets for meat production and sales.

Tourism remained an integral part of the economy with redevelopment of the public jetty to continue and the relocation of the Museum to be completed in time for the next tourist season in support of the strategic ambitions and in line with the Waterfront Master plan, Mr Roberts said, adding that the potential for additional air links and increase in accommodation capacity would also continue to be pursued.

"The Falkland Islands fiscal position continues to grow strongly and another significant Government surplus will be evident this year. This is partly due to additional revenues from the hydrocarbons industry and investment returns but it is also the result of another excellent year for the fishing industry. This historical surplus, together with the additional revenues anticipated from the oil exploration and development activities currently in progress, has allowed significant investments in infrastructure, facilities and services to be planned. These will be detailed in the next few days as the Government's budget for the next financial year and Medium Term Financial Plan are announced."

Premier signs rig contract

PREMIER has announced it has signed a contract for a semi-sub, harsh environment rig alongside a rig sharing agreement (with Noble Energy) for the Falklands Islands exploration and appraisal campaign to commence in the second quarter of 2015

Premier's initial drilling plans include at least four wells in the North Falkland Basin. The rig passes to Noble for two wells in the South Falklands Basin before returning to Premier to drill the Jayne East prospect and an appraisal well to confirm the gas cap at Sea Lion and test the deeper Chatham prospect. Preparations are already underway within the Islands to accommodate the logistical requirements for the forthcoming drilling said Director of Mineral Resources, Stephen Luxton said: "We are pleased to see confirmation of this exploration programme com-mencing in 2015 as forecast.

THE Royal Falkland Islands police are currently investigating alleged serious sexual offences which occurred on June 1

One person was arrested and later released on police bail following interview.

A police spokesperson said the investigation continues.

Crane incident

AN incident with the crane on the temporary dock facility (TDF) in Stanley Harbour occurred on Wednesday evening but, "thankfully there was no injury other than to the crane," confirmed Noble Energy representative in the Falklands Richard Winkleman. "We are beginning an investigation," he told Penguin News vesterday. He did not confirm if the incident would impact on the planned completion date (July I) of the TDF.

Plans to mark **1914 centenary**

COMMEMORATIVE events to mark the centenary of the Battles of Coronel and the Falklands were brought to the table by the 1914 committee last Friday

Chair of the committee MLA Phyl Rendell said the committee split into two working groups last year to organise the schedule of events and to progress the memorial wall plans. £50,000 has been allocated by FIG to fund events, "this is not a vast number of funds compared to June 14 events" said MLA Rendell, but a, "good core" to work with

She said the funds would be split between a memorial wall, social events and transporting the families of significant naval figures involved in the battle descendants of families to the Falklands from Germany and Britain. It was decided that events should be, "a commemoration, not a celebration ... to recognise the human losses," said MLA Rendell.

Military Liaison officer Gareth Westlake confirmed a band and a large number sailors would be made available to take part in the parade.

HMS Clyde, HMS Dragon and RFA Gold Rover are confirmed to be taking part and HMS Protector may also be in attendance. Small boat owners are encouraged to join in to sound their horns at significant commemorative times.

Research is being carried out to find the youngest descendants of the eight FIDF members who died in the Canache during this period so they can be invited to take part.

Other research by Tim Miller has also revealed that Admiral Sturdee had a direct link with the First Falklands Scout Group.

Letters were found documenting the Admiral's acceptance to the invitation of becoming the group's patron, alongside the request of renaming the group to include the prefix 'Admiral Sturdee's own.

"We don't know if the name was used at the time but in recognition of the request the Scout Group will adopt the name this year," said Mr Miller.

A wall is being constructed to bear a visual representation of the Battle of Coronel and the Battle of the Falklands and both German and British naval dignities involved. "This is an entirely new concept to commemorate instead of celebrating the victory, said committee member Richard Cockwell who hoped other countries would adopt the concept too. Planning permission has been approved for the wall to be constructed in the flower bed area by Sure. "The idea is to compliment the current memorial not overwhelm it," said Mr Cockwell.

A commemorative call-sign will open from the dates of the battles with a collectable QSL Card to be specially designed. Janet McLeod explained that the amateur (Ham) radio reaches people all over the world and the last time a call-sign was made available more than 4,500 contacts were made in four days. This callsign will be open for a month and available at the Post Office, and could reach thousands of people.

British Forces radio manager Antony Ballard attended the meeting and said the station would create promotions for the events and could create features that carried the story of the Falklands, and they would be made available for use by FIRS_Opportunities to broadcast on BFBS television and link in Falklands' events with BBC coverage of WWI remembrance are being investigated.

Not getting the minimum wage? Seek legal advice

EMPLOYEES who feel their rights are not being met under the Minimum Wage Ordinance can seek advice from the FIG tax office, the Citizens Advice Bureau

and MLAs are, "also happy to act as advocates for individuals if needed," said MLA Michael Poole in response to a question during Wednesday's during Legislative Assembly. MLA Gavin Short

asked if all employers operating within the Falkland Islands were now fully compliant with the Minimum Wages Ordinance

which came into effect on December 1, 2013

MLA Poole said that unfortunately he could not definitively answer the question.

He said the legislation made non-compliance a civil matter which enabled an employee to make a complaint to the Summary Court and placed the obligation on the employer to share information with the employee so that the employee can then check themselves whether they are being paid the minimum wage as defined within the Ordinance. The Government plays no official role

that there has been a very short period since it was enacted so this is far from definitive.

MLA Poole said that anecdotally, a number of Members had heard of instances of alleged noncompliance with the law "If this is the case then I am sure that my Honourable Colleagues will join me in condemning such actions," he said

MTO linked to obesity

MLA Mike Summers said it was not possible to discern whether any medical treatment overseas (MTO) over the last five years was attributable to lack of exercise and referrals also did not indicate if treatment was being received as a result of a sports injury, in response to a question from MLA Gavin Short at Wednesday's Legislative Assembly

He said however that there was a direct correlation between obesity and a wide range of diseases which in our circumstances do lead to the necessity for treatment overseas

Referring to information provided by the Chief Medical Office, MLA Summers explained that the National Institute for Clinical Excellence (NICE) in the UK was trying to start an initiative to promote lifestyle change to encourage more activity and productive life

He said much debate on the fact that a relatively small weight loss and as little as three per cent could cut the burden on health costs considerably, by reducing the numbers of new type 2 diabetes and hypertensive cases. "The key is keeping weight off and exercise plays a part in this," said MLA Summers.

"There is excellent evidence to show that waist size directly impacts on health. As rule of thumb waist measurement should be no more than half your height. Obese and overweight people should make this aim a starting point_

Disease directly linked to obesity and being overweight in general includes hypertension, cardiovascular disease and heart attack, stroke, type 2 diabetes. osteoarthritis, spine pain and certain cancers (bowel, breast, endimetrial).

All these diseases have led to and will continue to lead to medical treatment overseas from the Falklands," said MLA Summers.

Colorectal screening plans in progress

A COLORECTAL screening plan in line with the screening programme currently in place for the Southampton NHS Trust is being arranged for the Falklands All patients age 60-70 will be in the screening programme in line with the Southampton protocol and current patients in the previous screening will be reviewed. The Consultant Surgeon with assistance from the medical team will develop the criteria for the high-risk group of patients. A Government press release this week said it was hoped that the plan would provide the Islands with a, "sustainable robust screening programme."

D-Day's 70th Anniversary THE print and broadcast media are dominated this week by the 70th anniversary of what was, arguably, the most remarkable military operation in history: D-Day, the invasion of Nazi Europe.

I was fortunate enough to be in Normandy for the 60th Anniversary, reporting for the defence magazine I worked for. I found the experience profoundly moving, and while I won't be back in Normandy this week. I expect to revisit those emotions through the TV coverage.

Back in 2004 I was not so much moved by the presence on the invasion beaches of world leaders and by the many religious services, but by the presence of the veterans, often gathered together with other survivors of their units. The bond between these old-timers was obvious and touching.

I interviewed a number of these brave men, and found them to be modest, sometimes tearful in their recollections, but proud. But their pride was nothing compared to that of the children and grand children who often accompanied them.

1 interviewed one old chap who had been with the Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry, who landed in gliders at Pegasus Bridge. This gentleman - I'm afraid I don't recall his name - was wearing his regiment beret, an array of medals eight inches across, and a grin that gave a glimpse of the boy warrior from 1944. His grandson gripped him so tightly and beamed with such pride that he looked fit to bust.

The lad looked on as his hero told me that he had run from the wreckage of his glider as soon as it landed, engaging the Germans defending the bridge almost immediately with his Bren light machine gun. Then fought on through the hours and days with hardly a break to brew tea or have a fag.

I sincerely hope that this great old gent will be back in Normandy this week, again enjoying the respect and thanks that he and all of his comrades deserve.

Falklands echo in Iraq Inquiry

The Iraq war and our subsequent disastrous occupation of the country commenced over 11 years ago. Many people in this country would be happy if this sorry episode would now slip away into the dustier chapters of the history books. Were that to happen, no one would be happier than former Prime Minister, Tony Blair, who has never been able to clear himself of the allegations that he conspired with the security services and with the Americans to trump up fallacious reasons to take Britain to war.

It could be that his last chance to clear the air over this, and perhaps move on to a new role as President of Europe (yes, it appears he is a contender) without those ugly Iraq rumours hanging over him, may now have passed.

Bound Ungagged

It has been decided that communications covering the preamble to war between Mr Blair's Number 10 and George Bush's Whitehouse need not now be revealed in Lord Chiclet's report into the origins of the war, which may be published in late 2014 - a mere decade after it was commissioned.

Did the President call the Prime Minister and say, "Yo, Blair! Are you going to let some piss-ant problem about not having any proof that Saddam has WMD stop you from overthrowing the bastard?"And did the Prime Minister reply, "Don't worry George, we're cooking up the evidence"?

We don't know, and we won't know, because Tony Blair's office lobbied successfully to have accounts of these communications excluded from Lord Chilcot's report.

The argument in favour of keeping us all in the dark about those crucial conversations is that their release would set a "dangerous precedent." Future presidents and prime ministers will simply not conduct such candid conversations, or if they do they will not keep records, if they know that their indiscretions may be published a mere decade on. The counter argument to that is that almost 200 British servicemen and women died in Iraq, and knowing whether they did so on the basis of a lie must trump any concerns about the niceties of diplomatic confidentiality.

So the more serious news media in the UK has been dwelling on this victory by the Tony Blair camp, and many are already assuming that the report will be of little value. After many years and many millions spent, we are never likely to know the full truth behind the Iraq War.

This was not the first report into the genesis of a war, which failed to deliver answers. In July 1982 the government commissioned a committee of Privy Counsellors, led by Lord Franks, to, "review the way in which the responsibilities of Government in relation to the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies were discharged in the period leading up to the Argentine invasion of the Falkland Islands on 2 April 1982, taking account of all such factors in previous years as are relevant."

I remember the report being published, and the shock at its conclusions. I was editing Penguin News at the time, and relishing the thought of a good story. We in the Falklands were convinced that weak British diplomacy and neglect of the Islands throughout the 1970s and early 1980s had informed Argentina that Britain cared very little about its colony. We knew that the announcement of plans to withdraw HMS Endurance reinforced that signal, and we knew (because we could see and hear them) that the Argentines were becoming increasingly aggressive in their policy. We had no proof, because such things are secret, but we strongly suspected that the government was ignoring the signs.

Lord Franks did note most of these facts in his report, but the expected denouement, in which at least two governments would be blamed for mismanagement of the Falklands, and therefore at least easing the way to war, did not occur. Lord Franks concluded that British governments and officials were innocent of any blame. There was uproar in parliament and the press - one outraged cry of "whitewash!"

It is said that Lord Franks privately urged those who wanted to know the truth to read between the lines. But no one looks for such subtle meaning in official reports: most of us only read the conclusion.

The verdict of history is that the Franks Report served only to protect the establishment.

So as we gear up to see, at long last, the results of Lord Chilcot's inquiry, those of us with a long memory feel a sense of déjà vu. I strongly suspect that the lid has been lifted from a bucket of gleaming whitewash and it is being stirred ready for a generous application.

Falklands Tartan – a request

I hear on the grapevine of plans to design a Falklands tartan. That's a rather nice idea, because we do have cultural ties with Scotland, and Falklands topography and vegetation have much in common with those of Scotland's western and northern isles.

I assume the new tartan will be designed from colours found in nature and industry; black and white of seabirds, brown, red and green of diddle dee, and the slimy grey of squid. Perhaps not the latter.

Just one concern though. It is but a short step from introducing a local tartan to men wearing skirts. I don't know about Scotland, but that wicked old prevailing westerly could play havoc here.

So unless we are to alarm tourists with frequent flashes of ivory white male legs (and worse), perhaps we should introduce a local variation on kilt wearing: long johns must be worn at all times. You know it makes sense.

A public reception hosted by the Falkland Islands Government, will be held in the Town Hall from 1130 hrs to 1300 hrs. All residents and members of the Armed Services are cordially invited to attend.

Stories of the German gang

THE article on front page Penguin News May 30 'Major road works on budget and on time,' caught my attention, in particular the history section.

I have family links with Ross Road, as in 1843/4 Jacob Napoleon Goss and a chap called Culey cleared the stone and marked out Ross Road and Philomel Street for Governor Moody. I can add fact to the story about the head injury sustained by one of the German labour gang.

I worked with the gang in 1957 under the foreman Gustav Boehme, first in the Dockyard Garage under mechanic Vernon Rittershofter, mainly on Thames Traders trucks, allocated to the German labour force.

Sos Paulini, Rudy Clarke and Pete Startin maintained the Government vehicles. After four months I went to Moody Valley quarry crushing rock from the stone run. The late, Con Rowlands, Ernie Gleadell and Nibs Browning and some other locals worked there with the Germans.

At the same time part of the German Gang were down the valley, erecting the steel frames of the Filtration Plant. The heavy support joists to carry the high level tank (still in place with a bulged bottom from a Carl Gustav 1982).

The chap who fell was called Manfred (I don't recall his surname) he was a tall, quiet spoken man, fair hair, clean cut features.

He put a bolt into one end of the girder and a man on the other end did the same. Manfred stepped on the girder to cross over to help fit the other bolts, thinking the other bolt was in the diagonal apposed hole: unfortunately, the bolts were both on the same side and the beam tipped, Manfred fell 30 feet onto three inch planks laid over blue clay.

He was moved quickly to hospital in Norman Barnes' brown Ford van. Dr Slessor stabilised the patient and he was shipped out a few days later on RMS *Darwin* to Montevideo. After he returned I had difficulty looking at him as his forehead was pushed half way down over his eyes, his concentration was gone and speech impaired. He was not the man we used to know.

I do not believe the German Gang worked on the Town Hall or the new Infant School being built at that time.

I think the key to the longevity of the concrete road was the time spent by Willie Dihlmann with the heavy diesel three drum roller consolidating the base mattress. Salt water sand from the beach at Rookery Bay was used.

Once I was sent with Clive Allan to load sand by hand shovel, we came back after a couple of hours with only two wheel barrow loads. Much to the annoyance of the Foreman and DPW Norman Barnes, who went down to see for themselves that the South East storm had taken all the sand off the beach, exposing bare rock and pebbles.

Sand shortages occasionally caused delays to road work. A section of concrete road instigated by Sir Miles Clifford, from in front of the Town Hall to the front of the gymnasium/public baths was untouched.

Man numbers compensated for lack of hydraulic machinery and the winter time gave an extra hour, so work began at 7.30am, with no waiting for daylight.

Readers might be interested to learn Clive Allan driving a Ford Thames Trader and I, cut and hauled turf from Goose Green near Round Pond to lay on Arch Green.

In 1957 HRH Prince Phillip Duke of Edinburgh planted a tree on Arch Green in front of George Perry's house. It dried up and died!

Other jobs 1 worked on included roofing the Reservoir in Dairy Paddock and with Tommy Braxton as mason's mate building block work walls of the Filtration Plant.

We also repaired the cemetery wall at the north east corner. After the accident Manfred Keenleyside's father Ken was at the Filtration Plant, in charge of the Winget cement mixer pouring the floors.

On wet days we made cement blocks, curb stones and pit covers in the old Theatre, Army Camp where the new Stanley Arms now stands. The re-laying of the sewer on John Street from the Speedwell Store to Colonia Cottage was another job.

I have memories of cold hands and sticky wet clay. The most exhilarating job I had as a 16 year old, was driving an International TD6 tractor pressing down the spoil and Bert Hansen driving the Mann front end loader pushed into the trench to cover the six inch water main in the 60 Acre Paddock, from the Filtration Plant to Stanley.

We had a ring side seat watching the Agriculture Department's new black Galloway bull fighting the old Friesian bull sold to the late Richard Hills, that used to swim across from Fairy Cove.

More history of the gang

I READ with interest the article concerning the road works together with the information about the German gang that came here during the mid 1950s to work on FIG projects.

In fact they came to carry out two major tasks; to construct a new water filtration plant and to repair/rebuild roads in Stanley.

The principal road to be rebuilt was Ross Road from the Public Jetty to the West end driveway to Government House and this road had to be completed by the end of 1956 prior to the first visit to the Islands of the Duke of Edinburgh which was scheduled to take place during the first week of 1957.

This did in fact happen with the road being completed on time but this gang had no involvement in the building of the Town Hall which was completed and indeed opened in May 1950 with the first public event being the May Ball.

It was during the construction of the filtration plant at Moody Brook when one of the German gang was knocked off the ladder he was working from installing the roof girders.

Sadly, although this man received treatment in Montevideo and he returned to the Islands afterwards, he was never fit enough to work again.

Surprise party for golden wedding couple





WHILE seeking and obtaining permission to incorporate Antarctic tartan into uniforms for the Commonwealth Games, the Falkland Islands Overseas Games Association (FIOGA) has announced that the Director of Scottish Tartan Authority himself offered to create an official Falklands tartan.

Science and tourism combine in support of Wandering Albatross

A SUPERB development for science and tourism in South Georgia. Cheeseman's Ecology Safaris is offering the opportunity for 7-8 people to join a scientific trip on the Hans Hansson surveying South Georgia's wandering albatross.

Ted Cheeseman, who has been leading international wildlife tours for 14 years now, told Penguin News this week that Sally Poncet asked him to help create an expedition for this coming January to support a survey. He said "the government of

He said "the government of South Georgia, is supposed to do a complete survey of the wanderers every 10 years under their commitment to Agreement on the Conservation of Albatrosses and Petrels (ACAP) but the cost of vessel support is of course not small.

"We are delighted to be using tourism to enable good conservation science, in this case an extremely important survey. At the same time we're able to give the tour participants an incredibly

unique experience with access to sites usually inaccessible to travellers. This is one of two science/private partnership voyages we've created this coming season, the other being an expedition with Tom Hart of Oxford in October and November."

He added: "In a world where science funding is increasingly scarce, we are very pleased to be creating expeditions where the work of scientists is made possible very cost effectively, and at the same time creating very meaningful expeditions for a very few fortunate travellers who will benefit from being in the company of scientists."

Along with the survey the participants will watch, photograph, and learn about the Wandering Albatross and four scientists will also be present. The project has a special permit to visit islands usually off-limits to travellers, such as Albatross Island, the Willis Islands, and other remote regions along the spectacular southwest.

Mr Cheeseman said: "Our expedition sails during the peak breeding season for an exceptional 18 landing days where you can assist with surveys, learn from renowned scientists, and explore and photograph one of the most dramatically scenic and wildliferich island habitats on the planet."

Such a singular adventure of course doesn't come cheap. The price is \$18,450 to \$21,450 per person with shared occupancy, depending on cabin choice and the price does not include air fare.

It lasts 32 days total, including estimated travel time with 29 days onboard the *Hans Hansson*.

The Expedition Leader and a professional photographer is Scott Davis with Sally Poncet the lead scientist and captain of the vessel is Dion Poncet.



CRAFT and textile enthusiasts from Stanley, MPC and Camp joined for a crafty weekend organised by the Spinners and Weavers Guild at Darwin House from May 23 through until Sunday.

Organiser Heather Norman told Penguin News: "Zhana and Fiona ran a wet-felting workshop on Saturday where participants chose to make items from slipper boots, hot-pot scented trivets, handbag or landscape wall hanging." She said soap suds filled the dining room and amid the hard work lost of chat and laughter could be heard.

For Sunday's workshop, Andi Neate brought an array of greenware pottery pieces and a great range of coloured underglazes with which to paint designs. They were taken away to be fired, "so we await the results with anticipation," said Ms Norman.

She added: "As well as the organised workshops Bonny and Fiona showed the basics of needle-felting and with more ideas from craft books, the table was soon filled with 3D mice, giraffes, penguins, Russian dolls, Christmas decorations, a mermaid and a dragon.

"Sue shared her expertise with knitting pins so that a couple of people wore fingerless gloves home, one a cowl searf and the aforementioned mouse sported a tiny jumper. Clare demonstrated arm knitting and heather showed how to use hand held weavettes."

The gentle hum of spinning wheels was an almost constant undertone as yarn was prepared for future projects and experienced spinners were always available to patiently teach beginners.

Private boarding legislation agreed

PRIVATE fostering legislation will include a 'private boarding' branch that will specifically deal with students from Camp staying with families to attend school in Stanley, it was agreed at the Select Committee on the Child Bill this week.

Despite this classification comprising a lesser degree of 'intrusive' regulation than private fostering, two Members of Legislative Assembly objected, one fearing it imposed on the Falklands way of life.

Families sending children to Stanley to attend school will now be required to inform Social Welfare should their child not be boarding with a direct relative. They must also ensure the child's situation is known to the school and that they will not be at any disadvantage.

The involvement of Social Welfare in the case of private boarding would be, "relatively low key," said Head of Social Welfare Nicky Murphy and extend to a discussion of who was already in the home, space available to the child, finances of the family, police checks and consultation with the child to be sure they were happy with where they were placed.

At the meeting MLA Phyl Rendell objected saying it, "imposed," on the, "traditional Falklands way of life," an opinion she said was echoed in the number of phone calls she had received from the community, and said resources for child protection should be directed elsewhere.

MLA Roger Edwards agreed saying a perceived, "stigma" existed around social welfare that discouraged people from accepting the involvement of the department in the care for their children. **Continued on page 2**

Get your house in order builder tells Government

"WE have never seen such indecisiveness. Government (FIG) really need to get their rules and regulations in order." local builder Richard Short told Penguin News yesterday as his plans to provide much needed housing were again set back.

Having submitted revised plans reducing a block of eight terraced houses on Goss Road to four, and moving the development to the west of the plot to address objections raised at a previous meeting, local builder Richard Short had his application approved at Wednesday's Planning and Building Committee.

However at the Lands Committee later that day, Mr Short's application to buy the government land was refused with the decision taken that the land should be put out to public tender.

Mr Short explained that from the start he had applied through all the correct channels with a fairly good result which could have been finalised. Thad FIG been clearer from the beginning.

'We have never seen such in-

decisiveness. FIG really need to get their rules and regulations in order. What we already know and has been reiterated is that FIG will change their minds where appropriate, and no one can challenge that."

MLA Phyl Rendell voiced sympathy for Mr Short who had, "gone out in good faith," and looked for a building plot and proceeded to obtain planning permission. She said she recognised the need for more housing and for the private sector to get involved with development and that Mr Short had also addressed those issues. MLA Rendell said she supported his initiative and preferred the option to directly negotiate a price with the applicant.

The issue with it going to tender was that Mr Short had been encouraged to come forward with plans. "and then technically we take his idea and put it out for tender," said MLA Rendell.

The piece of land in question was described by interim chair of the Planning and Building Committee MLA Jan Cheek (who declared an interest because of a family member's formal objection) as having a, "chequered history." Previous applicants had been refused permission to build on it initially because it was a designated "green space" within the town and then later when it had been allocated as a building plot, because the application was "premature."

Also chairing the Lands Committee, but required to declare an interest. MLA Cheek said she valued green space for children to play on informally and if it were to be sold it should go out to tender, because of the people who had previously been refused permission to build there.

Mr Short said he was happy to have received planning permission but the end result was an indication of how FIG operates. "On one hand they are encouraging the private sector to step up and provide housing and on the other hand their complicated, unclear policies stand in the way of progress and makes the process very difficult and frustrating."

ON the 40th anniversary of the Falkland Islands Government Reception in London, Minister of State at the Foreign and Commonwealth Office Hugo Swire, gave the message, "the UK Government will help you to realise your ambitions."

He acknowledged the renewed sense of confidence and pride of the community in their identity as Falkland Islanders and condemned Argentine, bullying and coercion. The Minister remembered the fallen of the 1982 war on both sides and noted: "we want to see a mutually beneficial relationship with Argentina in the years ahead."

BECOMING a professional full-time politician, "is a development that presents challenges as well as opportunities," FCO Minister Hugo Swire said wryly of Falklands MLAs this week.

Too true - and I'm sure with their increased portfolio responsibilities, longer working hours, and following the launch of the 2014/15 budget and the enormous amounts of energy expended juggling figures in an attempt to be prudent yet please as many people as possible, they've probably never felt quite so - well - politiciany.

Truth be told I feel quite proud of them, it's not a bad budget; but right on the cusp of proving their worth as grown-up politicians what did they do but decisively present themselves as caricatures of what everyone believes a politician to be.

In order to achieve this remarkable representation our newly full time, much better paid (and please don't miss the emphasis on 'much better paid') elected representatives whipped pennies away from old folk; the cost of meals on wheels was increased by 73 per cent.

Not only that but when presenting the 'how this budget will affect me' section of the published highlights, the Financial Secretary somehow managed to avoid making reference to that particular group: presumably because it would have meant using the phrase 'worse off' in the total?

This was a budget of nine principles wasn't it?

Did we not listen on at least two occasions to the long-winded and rather sermonizing list of statutes on which it was based?

Was not one of them an intention to improve the quality of life? (And as an aside introducing MST and then almost taking it away isn't convincing proof of that principle, no matter how many times you read it out).

Look the thing is, those particular pensioners probably aren't going to starve to death, and it may not have a massive impact - but it will impact negatively on them to varving degrees.

MLAs can prevaricate guiltily all they like about the details of what the KEMH will do to ensure those people are OK and 1 trust that they will make the effort, but ultimately it is a fact that this budget has not improved their quality of life, it has worsened it.

So I see your nine bullet points of snotty doctrine and raise it as follows... If you're going to preach a principle, how about practising it too.

Continued from front page MLA Jan Cheek said she had received a very different reaction to the safeguarding legislation from the public and that on the whole it was not felt to be intrusive.

She said a member of the public had drawn attention to the situation that a prisoner was currently in jail having taken advantage of a private fostering arrangement, and that checks might help prevent child abuse.

MLA Barry Elsby said if he were charged with looking after someone else's child he would expect to be checked and, "wouldn't be offended I would believe it was the government looking after its community," and indicated that any stigma surrounding social welfare should be combated.

The amendment to the Bill, to include an additional reciprocity condition for children leaving Stanley to attend school at Camp or MPA, was supported. A second amendment for discussion clarified the role of the Falkland Islands Safeguarding Children Board in order to define it as a body to gather information and to highlight it did not have an investigative or accusatory role.

Principal Crown Counsel Ros Check said the Board would aim to, "create an environment to look at human errors and reduce likelihood of them happening again... and to promote the welfare of children... it is not a disciplinary committee," she said.

The Board can request information from people and will use the information only to improve practices in the future and learn from mistakes, but the only branches of the community required to provide information to the Board would be public officers and statutory bodies.

This was expected to be the last select committee gathering to discuss the Children Bill in preparation for June's meeting of Legislative Assembly.

News from planning and building

It was agreed a two-bedroom bungalow could be built at 27 Fitzroy Road, although MLA Cheek registered her disapproval at continued infill within the town. Gilberto Castro's retrospective application to extend a Portakabin dwelling to the rear of 94 Davis Street was also aproved.

Two applications for mobile

homes at 3 Teaberry Way (Kenneth and Josie McKay) and 1 Mountain Berry Way (Melvyn and Marika McKay) were approved with the committee agreeing that future applications unless varying from the standard conditions would not need to be reviewed in full by the committee.

Two applications by the Education Department to meet the needs of growing student numbers were approved in the form of permisston to continue siting three Portakabins within the grounds of Stanley House and the change of use from Church Hall to temporary classrooms at St Mary's Church.

Within the Dockyard development permission was granted to refurbish shed number 7 and change the use from site office to potential museum or concession space.

John Summer Jaffray's application to build at 5 Racecourse Road was the only one to be refused on the grounds that the plot would be overdeveloped with the house taking up more than the 25 per cent footprint allowed.

Nevin Middleton's application to build a house with garage and workshop to house a gun repair business at 15 Mink Park was deferred until the next meeting pending plans to include elevations.

Increase in hydatid cysts this season

AN increased number of hydatid cysts were detected at FIMCo this year. Senior Veterinary Of-ficer Steve Pointing said: "We've had four positive hydatids found in old sheep passing through the abattoir this year from four different properties around the Islands." They are the first positive samples found in sheep since 2011 and the department is currently awaiting dog faecal samples for testing. Mr Pointing said he could not explain why four hydatids had been found this season and none for the previous three seasons: "I suspect it was due to the diligence of the meat inspector on the line. We tend to have a different meat inspector each year." Dog dosing will continue to take place for the foreseeable future even if all the dog faeces results come back as negative

ARGENTINA'S football association is set to face a sanction over a banner held up by its players before a friendly with Slovenia on the eve of the World Cup. The banner said 'Las Malvinas son Argentinas'.

FIFA said on Monday that its lawyers were analysing the situation. However, insiders said the banner clearly broke the ruling body's rules on making political statements, reported the Guardian. FIFA, which does not allow political messages during matches, has confirmed to Sky Sports News it will review the incident which could lead to a punishment for Argentina.

Wool scheme

A DARK Fibre Risk Scheme will be discussed at the upcoming RBA Farmers Week and the DoA is to work to shape the scheme with the aim of having it operational for the 2014/15 wool season. The Falklands has a reputation for producing high yielding, very white wool hence the decision to create the scheme to build on this reputation.

The DFC risk status of wool could be used by wool marketers to increase returns to wool producers involved in the scheme. During 2013 approximately 1,700 tonnes of greasy wool was produced in the Falkland Islands.

Tartan choice 2

MLA Summers announced the winning design of what is to become the official tartan of the Falklands at the Commonwealth Games reception at Government House on Wednesday. Design two (see last week's PN) secured 44 per cent of the public vote and was revealed as the most popular choice. THE total Illex catch for the season has now exceeded 300,000 tonnes. The previous highest catch was 266,000 tonnes in 1999. Director of Natural Resources John Barton reported this week that because the season will end on June 15 catches will not go much higher.

BUDGET completed we can focus on the many tasks and projects that have been somewhat overshadowed by budget meetings. As always we did not achieve everyone's individual wish list and had to work in a spirit of compromise to manage funds in the most efficient way to fulfil as many of the most pressing requirements as possible. 1 hope our constituents recognise that we have to take a careful approach to the responsibility for ensuring that our economy remains stable and sustainable. Most of the people I speak to might take issue with one or two decisions but appear generally content that we have weighed the alternatives and arrived at reasonable conclusions.

One of the redeeming factors in the work as an MLA is the huge range of different things we may deal with in a given week. keeping us both challenged and interested. On Monday we met and discussed among other things some public diplomacy matters and then went across the road to look at the prison. Although an immense improvement on the old prison that I regularly saw when on the board of prison visitors. I accept that it is crowded at the moment and a temporary fix urgently needed.

On Tuesdays we have regular meetings with the Governor and with the Chief Executive and any officials who can brief us on a whole range of subjects. In the afternoon we will all attend the Select Committee on the Children Bill as work continues to bring it back to a future Assembly meeting. Everything you need to know about... The minimum wage

LAST week Penguin News reported on statements in Legislative Assembly made by MLA Poole on the subject of the minimum wage. Workers in the Falkland Islands are now entitled to receive a minimum wage for the work that they do.

This week Alison Inglis and Chris Armstrong of Pinsent Masons' explain more about the subject.

What is the minimum wage? The minimum wage is currently £5.05 per hour for adults (aged 18 and above) and £3.10 per hour for people aged 16 or 17.(Where a worker turns 18 during their employment, they are entitled to be paid the lower rate of minimum wage up until the day before their 18th birthday and the higher rate of minimum wage from the day of their birthday onwards.) Everybody is entitled to receive the minimum wage, regardless of their immigration status.

How is minimum wage calculated?

Workers are entitled to be paid the minimum wage in respect of any hours they spend working for their employer.

The definition of 'working' is very wide, so as well as including time spent undertaking work for an employer it also includes time spent undertaking training, where this training is contractually required.

Workers may also be entitled to be paid minimum wage for time spent travelling in the course of their employment, where such travel is a contractual requirement of the job. However, time spent travelling to and from work will not usually count towards the total number of hours worked unless this has expressly been agreed.

Employers are allowed to make deductions for amounts spent on providing accommodation and board to their workers, applied at the rate of 50% of the amount spent up to a total cap of £90.60 per week. Deductions can also be made for POAT and pensions contributions. All of these amounts can be taken into account when calculating whether an employer has been paying its workers the minimum wage they are entitled to.

What does the minimum wage mean for you as a worker?

If you are a worker in the Falkland Islands, you are entitled to be paid at least the minimum wage for the hours that you work.

If you are not receiving the minimum wage, you can bring a small claims action in the Summary Court against your employer for additional payment. In order to do this you will need to fill out a claim form, which can be obtained from the Court, in which you should state the amount of money you are claiming as additional pay and why. You will also need to pay a small Court Fee.

If you are not sure whether you are being paid the minimum wage, you have the right to request to see the records that your employer holds in relation to the hours you have worked and the pay you have received. This right is known as, "the right of rea-sonable access." When looking at these records you can be accompanied by somebody of your choice and you can also ask for photocopies. If your employer refuses to show you the records you can issue your employer with a "production notice", which is a formal request to see the records. Once you have done this, your employer can only continue to refuse you access to the records if it is reasonable for them to do so.

It is important to note that you also have a general right, 'not to suffer detriment' for any reason connected to the minimum wage. This means that you have a right not to be treated unfavourably either because you are entitled to the minimum wage or because you have chosen to take action relating to any of your rights under the Minimum Wage Ordinance.

If you have any concerns relating to the minimum wage we would recommend that you contact either the Citizens' Advice Bureau or a lawyer.

What does the minimum wage mean for you as an employer?

If you are an employer in the Falkland Islands, you must ensure

that all of your employees receive at least the minimum wages they are entitled to, in line with the current legislation. This means understanding how the minimum wage entitlement is calculated for each worker.

The Minimum Wage Ordinance requires you to keep adequate records in relation to each of your employees. These records must be capable of showing(in a single document) the hours worked and pay received by an employee in respect of each pay reference period. If you do not keep adequate records, you may be liable to pay additional damages and/or legal costs if it is shown that you have not paid the minimum wage to any of your employees.

You are also required to provide each of your employees with certain information relating to their rights to the minimum wage. This includes information about their entitlement to the minimum wage, their rights to access their employer's records (and how to access them) and their rights not to suffer any detriment because of the minimum wage legislation. You are also required to provide each of your employees with information about how they can enforce any of their rights relating to the minimum wage should they need to do so. If you are unsure as to how the minimum wage legislation applies to your business, or what you need to do to comply with it, we would recommend that you seek legal advice as soon as possible.


Bowel cancer screening

THE hospital will shortly be hosting a visit from Chile to begin to eatch up on the backlog of colonoscopies that are needed for those at moderate to high risk of bowel cancer, or who have developed symptoms that are suggestive of this possibility.

Dr Mandy Fry explained that the number of procedures that can be carried out at any one time is limited which means that some people who are overdue for screening will not be offered appointments on this occasion, as patients have been prioritised on the basis of clinical need. "However this is intended to be the first of several visits so we plan to get through everyone in due course," she said.

If you feel you should be on the recall list (if you have a slightly higher risk of bowel cancer than the general population due to factors such as a family history of the condition) and have not been offered an appointment then you are welcome to contact the hospital (Tel 28000) to check they have your details.

"However this will not result in an immediate appointment,"said Dr Fry.



Childhood South Georgia memories

REVIEW of In the Shadow of Shackleton's Cross An Antarctic Memoir by Beverley McLeod

A charming, well-written and informative book about the author's childhood experiences in South Georgia. Born in Stanley in 1951. Beverley McLeod lived on South Georgia between 1957 and 1961, where her father was a radio operator at King Edward Point for the Falkland Islands Dependencies Survey. For much of her time there she had no other children to play with: and she had no formal schooling at all during those four years.

Her book describes how she was taught by her very demanding father who, sadly, had become a victim of drink. This led to domestic violence and, finally, to economic hardship for the whole family. During those difficult times the family was sustained only by her mother's love, devotion, and hard work

The author describes the kind-

ness of the Norwegian sealers employed nearby at Grytviken, then the largest whaling station in the world. It describes some of the details of the whaling process - and the dangers of life in that isolated spot. The book also describes the

The book also describes the couple of years following her return to Stanley, with interesting insight into school life there. In 1963, this came to an end – although a most successful one – when she won a Falkland Islands Government scholarship to go to a boarding school in Britain

This book is not only the story of a quite unique childhood, but also a valuable record of the realities of life in South Georgia before the demise of the whaling industry there, and in the Falklands in the years before Argentine involvement, and finally war, changed life there for ever.

I strongly recommend it.

Good finishing season, bad FIMCO methods

THROUGH your letters page I would like to give a farmers point of view on the issue of finishing stock this past season.

Firstly, the only people that you hear saying that it has been a bad year for finishing stock is the Meat Company (FIMCO) and the Department of Agriculture.

For me it has been one of the better seasons that we have had for finishing stock, with good grass growth throughout; in fact I would say there was actually more feed on the ground than my animals could utilise, not a bad thing as there is a good backup of winter feed.

Having talked to many farmers this season, I have been given the impression that most agree their stock was in better condition this season than it has been for the last few seasons.

The reality of the situation is, that the fat scoring and grading system in the abattoir was changed this season, and the pricing structured in such a way that there were heavy losses of income to farms on point two of a millimetre of fat.

If you draw a pencil line on a piece of paper, it is equal to about a millimetre width, try and take point two or even point five off that and you will see where I am coming from. To cover this up the old excuse of it has been a bad year for finishing stock has come into play. Listening to MLA's speeches yesterday, it seems they have been led to believe it has been a bad season for finishing animals as well.

In my opinion, If we keep trying to produce a New Zealand, Australian, British lamb equivalent, our meat industry will never make progress, but if we strive to produce like most of us are, a good quality Falklands product, and have it marketed as such, we will all be so much better off.

Let's hear what the farmer is saying.

I know that some are scared to speak out, and others will say we can't do anything about it, but in every situation there are two sides to a story.

Names don't have to be mentioned, but farmers opinions need to be known. Actual men on the ground, managers and owners alike.

Just as an observation: I am constantly hearing from people new to the Islands, how good the quality of meat is with a flavour never experienced before, and so cheap it is unbelievable.

I would like it known that I am and always have been a supporter of the abattoir, but there are a few areas that need sorting out before it starts to push people away from producing for it.

Admit MST is employer tax

DEAR four Assembly Members who voted to keep Medical Service Tax (MST) including those who did total U-turns compared to what they said when campaigning for election,

By almost totally getting rid of it for employees but leaving it intact for employers you have indeed classed it 100 per cent as a tax on employment - have you now got the guts to admit that is what it is?

Oh yes - leave on all employers and employees earning over £60K - not surprisingly that means that it will hit hardest at the Offshore Industry when they return in 2015!

The same workers who have full 100 per cent Medical Health and Accident Insurance as they are here usually for less than six months - the people who have to spend the moment they step inside the hospital. Others as well. Please can you publicly explain to me how can it be just and moral for me as an employer to tax an employee or pay one penny of MST on any employee who arrives in summer season and rightly by law has to have full medical insurance cover before being allowed to enter the Islands?

I await you justification of charging these people or me with a tax that you claim is a contribution to the health service - the service they have already fully paid up for and which rightly presents them with a bill for any treatment.

Our employer MST annual payments would instead pay for the wages of another employee in summer-just when I need one - but cannot as I am already paying that wage to FIG. What is more, I am forced to pay that tax whether I am making a loss or a profit. When I went to school you paid tax on your earnings, or as a business your profit. All this set up does is add to the production costs - the cost of fresh food. In our business we naturally have a far higher labour input per unit of production than others

I certainly would not expect you to just wipe it out without consequences - logically you would replace it with adjustments to income tax and company tax - that is where tax belongs - not hidden under silly names. Tim Miller Stanley

Your questions answered

Q Does Standard Chartered Bank pay tax on interest they charge on loans? Deputy Taxatiion Officer Tracy Floyd supplied the following information

A Due to confidentiality reasons we can not provide details on a company's tax affairs. We can however provide a general response and advise that under section 8(1)(a) of the Taxes Ordinance 1997 'gains or profits from any business carried on by or exercised by that person' are subject to tax. Loaning money in return for interest would generally fall under that provision of the taxes legislation.

Qual pay tax if they loaned money and charged interest. If yes what would be the percentage tax?

A the same provision would apply to individuals as per the answer to question one. For a person (not being a company), in addition to this income being subject to Income Tax, any relevant profits would also be subject to Medical Services Tax (MST) in accordance with the MST Ordinance 2010. A personal allowance of £60,000 per annum would be applied prior to the MST coming into effect.

For Income Tax, the % tax a person would be subject to on this income depends on their overall tax position for the relevant tax year, as all other sources of taxable income would be added together and then have any allowable reliefs and personal allowance applied to arrive at the net chargeable income figure. Their net chargeable income figure would then have the tax rates applied of the first £12,000 at 21% and any remainder at 26%.

For MST, the rate for relevant profits is 1.5%. Any other relevant profits would be totalled together and first have their allowable amount of the MST annual personal allowance (£60,000) applied before calculating tax due.

The above answers are based on the tax rates and legislation for the tax year 2014.

Q If an employer has a team of casual workers, local and those on work permits all with the same experience and qualifications; when work becomes available should it go automatically to the local resident or does the employer have the option of giving it to the person on a work permit instead?

Immigration Officer Jenny Smith responded...

A It is difficult to answer this question in full without further details of any contractual terms that might apply to the "casual workers" in question. The status of individual workers and the rights and protections available to them in law will be determined by the nature of the working relationship that exists with the employer.

In general, Section 17 (7A) of the Immigration Ordinance states:

Unless otherwise directed by the Governor, the Principal Immigration Officer may require –

(a) any employment vacancy to be advertised in the Falkland Islands before considering any application for a work permit enabling a person who has not a right of residence in the Falkland Islands to be engaged to fill that vacancy; (b) the proposed employer to satisfy the Principal Immigration Officer that it is necessary to engage such a person rather than engage any person having a right of residence in the Falkland Islands who has applied as a result of that advertisement or otherwise to be engaged to fill that vacancy.

When a work perinit is requested by someone to undertake any employment it is therefore necessary for the prospective employer to satisfy the requirements set out in this section of the Immigration Ordinance. Any work permit issued will be for a limited period of time (normally not more than 2 years).

Once a work permit is issued there is no requirement under Falkland Islands Immigration law for the employer to give preference to residents over work permit holders in the allocation of work to team members, but if it is evident that there is insufficient work for all team members then the necessity to continue to employ a work permit holder may no longer exist and any permit is unlikely to be renewed when it expires.

The story of the German Gang

German contract labour in the Falkland Islands (1954-1959) by Karlheinz Olsinger

MAJOR works currently taking place on Ross Road have lead to an interest in the history of the road and its original builders, a German contract labour gang. Following mention of its history in Penguin News two weeks ago, two Islanders have written with their memories and this week we publish with the permission of the Falkland Islands Journal Editor Jim McAdam, a history researched and written by Karlheinz Olsinger for the Journal.

The credit for the recruitment in the 1950s of a small German labour force to be employed in the Falkland Islands must go to Willi A Cordier, founder and leader of a minor Christian sect. Born in Strasbourg/Alsace(then German) in 1913 he took a profound interest in the Scriptures at an early age and showed a remarkable talent for leadership. After graduating from grammar school, he trained as an export merchant and subsequently went into business. When the Nazis took over, he joined and actively supported the dissident branch of the Protestant church. During most of WWII he served in the army and towards the end was seriously wounded. After coming home in 1945, he held various unskilled jobs to support his family. For some time the YMCA in Pforzheim employed him as secretary. But, during the post-war years he was increasingly critical of the Christian churches in Germany

Consequently, he broke away from the Protestant church in 1948, and later on was dismissed from his post as secretary. In and around Pforzheim, he soon made his name as a lay preacher, whose aggressive rhetoric and religious radicalism had a tremendous impact on his predominantly young and middle-class audience. Eventually, he regularly gathered some 130 followers who became known as the 'Cordier Circle' or the 'Cordians'.

At some point in the early 1950s. Cordier made the deci-sion to leave Germany with his adherents and find a remote and isolated place where he could establish a rural community based on collective property and devoted to hard manual work, the strict observance of the Bible and the worship of God. To translate his vision of a Christian commune into reality, he started by contacting several foreign embassies to make enquiries about immigration and employment opportunities for about 80 Germans. But the response was anything but encouraging. At last an advertisement placed by Cordier in "The Times" caught the attention of a reader who sent a note saying." The Falkland Islands Co. have a shortage of farm labour. Contact the Head Office in London." Little is known about the negotiations that soon took place in Pfor-zheim between L.W.H. Young, the then Managing Director of the FIC, and Cordier. Most probably, there was no hard bargaining and before long a settlement was reached. The main articles of the five-year contract negotiated between the two parties covered the payment of wages (£ 223-235 p.a.), a flexible cost of living bonus and an extra £12 p.a. for sheep-shearing. Fringe benefits included free housing and 3 lbs of butcher's meat per day.

Soon afterwards on September 23 1953, Young sent a letter to the Colonial Manager in Stanley informing him of his intention to employ a small party of Germans as farm labourers. The attached list of names included W. Cordier, his wife and four school-age daughters, five single workmen and a domestic help, who should all be stationed on one farm. Thomas A. Gilruth, Camp Manager at the time, proposed Goose Green or Fitzroy provided suitable houses could be built before their arrival. "These Germans," he emphasized, "will have to be properly housed and treated, or the thing will be a failure "To oversee the signing of the "Agreements" (contracts), Young travelled to Pforzheim once again and on July 2 1954, the first party of twelve Germans left for the Falklands

They arrived at Goose Green on the morning of August 3, and were very pleased with their new home, a plantly furnished semi-detached house that became known as the "German House." (The part of the house occupied

by Cordier's family and the domestic servant is still in exist-ence.) Surprisingly, the group had no trouble settling down in a completely unfamiliar environment and getting used to their new jobs as navvies. The Camp Manager was favourably impressed calling them "very clean, tidy and willing people." After some hesitation, even the Labour Federation gave the green light, though reluctantly, stating that its members accepted the importation of the Germans as an "experiment." Gilruth admitted that there was still some anti-German feeling among the local workmen, but he was sure that they would gradually change their minds.



The greatest difficulty presented the language: most German labourers, as it turned out, could not speak English very well, and especially Cordier's imperfect command of the English language gave rise, more often than not, to some irritation or embarrassment. From the start Cordier tried hard to bring in more members of his sect. To that end, he had talks with Gilruth and sent letters to Young and the Governor.

Yet in November 1954 he saw a chance for the rest of his community to settle in the Falklands when he learned that Government was planning to repair or resurface "seven and a half miles of road in and around Stanley that were seriously damaged by the heavy military vehicles used by the garrison" during the war.

Continued from page 9: Furthermore, the construction of a new water filtration plant and pumping station to secure the supply of piped water was part of the project. Given the extreme shortage of labour in the Colony, it was evident that workers from abroad had to be hired. In a letter of December 23, the Colonial Secretary asked Gilruth to approach Cordier about the recruitment of 25 German workmen. They were to be employed for a term of three years on the same basis and rates as local hourly paid labourers. In addition. Government would pay the outbound and homeward passages and half salary based on a 45-hour week during the voyages. A week later. Gilruth passed the plan for the engagement of a road gang on to Cordier, who approved of almost all the proposed terms and gave his assurance that he could recruit the required work force at short notice.

It did not take much time for Young acting on behalf of Govemment and Heinz H., Cordier's spokesman in Pforzheim, to finalise the agreements. Only some minor modifications, such as the number of domestics, were necessary. In the presence of Young, the 24 members of the road gang including one foreman, six tradesmen/specialists and 17 navvies signed their contracts on May 1, 1955. An advance party of five single men and one married couple left Pforzheim on June 2. The departure of 18 workmen, three wives accompanying their husbands, two children and six female domestic servants was scheduled for June 29. The two parties arrived at Stanley in July and August respectively and subsequently did some preliminary jobs before they started work on the roads. On September 23, 1955 they moved into their new quarters, seven Nissen huts on the site of the former RA camp, which to this day is known as the 'German Camp'

From the very beginning until the end of their stay in the Falklands

both the road gang and the Goose Green group were highly appreciated throughout the Colony. Only eight weeks after their arrival a government official noted that the road gang, "are doing an excellent job of work." In a memorandum dated July 10, 1956 the Public Works Department approvingly stated: "Work on the roads is now well in hand and 3.480 feet of concrete along the principal Road in the Town, together with 1.400 feet of 5 ft wide sidewalks have now been laid."

When in early 1958 the Water Filtration Plant and the Pumping Station were officially opened, the Governor, in his speech, emphasized the importance of the German work force for the completion of the project. And even 50 years on there are Islanders who still remember the Germans as, "good, dedicated people who worked hard." or, as Velma Malcolm put it in an account of her life, "These Germans were well liked, they were splendid workers."

The efficiency of the German road gang was largely a result of their religious outlook. Hard manual work, the Bible had taught them, was crucial to peace of mind and salvation. Besides, they made a point of working to the complete satisfaction of Government in the hope that their community would be allowed to settle in the Falklands. Most of the gang who had signed up as navvies were actually qualified specialists or skilled tradesmen. Age, of course, also played an important role. Of the original road gang of 24 men. no less than 16 were in their twenties. The same applied to the Goose Green group. On their arrival, five of the six labourers were between 23 and 31 years of age.

Although Cordier had played a key role in the recruitment of contract labour from Germany -Young had once called him "the prime mover in the project"- his relations with the authorities and the Company deteriorated following disputes over religious freedom. The

had to attend school, against their parents' will, during the period immediately preceding Christmas, when classrooms were decorated and almost all lessons dealt with the most popular Christian holiday. The 'Cordians' in fact, denounced the traditional way of celebrating Christmas as harmful to their children's spiritual development. A dispute with the headmaster of the Darwin School escalated in December 1956 when Cordier threatened to keep his children at home and the

Superintendent of Education had

decided that the children of the Ger-

man workmen were to be excused

from Religious Instruction. But they

vised him to abide by the law or the Government would have to consider if his, "continued presence was still in the best interests of the Colony." At long last in September 1957 a compromise was reached to the effect that the German school children, seven in all, would be moved to separate classrooms and be given separate tuition without reference to Christmas or the Christmas story during the time in question.

Colonial Secretary on his part ad-

But Cordier was still preoccupied with obtaining permission for the whole sect to settle in the Falklands. In this matter, Government was not prepared to make any concessions. Replying to Cordier's enquiry about the entry of two war-blind men from Pforzheim, a senior official declared that Government did not accept foreigners as settlers, "unless they show reasonable signs that they do not intend to form themselves into a separate political entity, but are willing to be absorbed into the general community of the Colony. Government, apparently, doubted whether Cordier wanted his people to become Faiklanders, because, "the indications are that they will remain a closely knit body, even in so far as their children are concerned and they are not permitted to have any normal social intercourse or relations with other children."

But Cordier could not prevent all of his men from taking part in the social life of Stanley, since they were living and most of the time working in close proximity to the local population. And even his own daughters managed to make friends with children at Goose Green. Nevertheless, the majority of the German labour force toed the line and kept to themselves, but they used to be kind and friendly whenever they

came into contact with Islanders. Frustrated at Government's attitude, Cordier wrote a letter dated February 20, 1956 to the Colonial Office in London asking for land on, 'some Islands of the British Empire (Guayana?)" for about 80 persons. ointing out the religious origins of the group, he claimed that they were, "promised that the whole group can come to the Falklands by and by." However, there is no documentary evidence in the archives to support his allegation. On the contrary, in a letter of December 29, 1954 sent to Cordier about the recruiting of the road gang there is a passage that states. "It is important to stress that Government can give no guarantee of further employment or for permission to settle in the Colony at the end of the three years ... Therefore, the men must be prepared to return to Germany

Eventually, on November 5, 1957 Government granted permission for another 16 members of the sect to enter the Falklands. But Cordier was no longer interested in the entry of small, individual groups. Most probably, he had come to the conclusion that it was about time that he left the Colony to find a suitable place for all members of his community somewhere in South America. On November 21, the Goose Green group, except Leo W announced that they would cease working for the Company on June 1, 1958, one year before termination of their contracts, on the grounds that they had been obliged to carry out specialist jobs, such as, "engine-work, cowby-work, shepherding and seventh day (Sunday) work," that were contrary to their beliefs. Gilruth was upset and pointed out that each of them had approved of the clause in the contract, "to attend to the utmost of his ability ... to whatever duties during whatever hours shall be assigned to him.

He reminded Cordier that he himself had once volunteered to go out shepherding and that in 1954 he had recruited not only the navvies but also the required specialists, such as road roller and lorry drivers, without raising any objections. The crisis was brought to an abrupt end when on the morning of November 27, 1957 Hans W, who had been running the engine on the cutter Black Swan for almost 18 months, stopped work and the rest of the Germans at Goose Green including the domestic servants immediately followed suit. Early in December Cordier accompanied by his family and two of his men set out on the 51 mile walk from Goose Green into Stanley. Presumably, in January or February 1958 the Cordiers, Heinz H, a deputy leader, and two of the five men dismissed by the Company for breach of contract left Stanley for Argentina. Ernesto Rowe happened to meet Cordier in Buenos Aires on May 13, when he was just negotiating, on behalf of his community, the purchase of Paso Flores, a large

Government was rather concerned about the effects of the Goose Green walk-out on the road gang. For a moment the Colonial Secretary was even considering immediate deporta Cordier's tion under the 'Aliens Ordinance, but he gave up the idea bearing in mind that Government wanted the road gang to renew their contracts for at least another year. At first 19 workmen,"agreed to continue in Government's employment on a three-monthly basis after the completion of their present contracts.' Then on August 7, 1958 those men who intended to rejoin Cordier in Argentina declared that they were willing, "to stay on to complete a full year of their extended contracts," provided that Government would pay the group the amount it would have cost to repatriate them from Montevideo to Pforzheim. In addition, they were granted a cash advance of £3,200 which the majority of the road gang had applied for. Government was well aware that the Germans being in need of money following the purchase of

farm in Patagonia (Rio Negro) with sixteen thousand acres of land.

Paso Flores would welcome any financial help.

On August 28, 1959 the German road gang sailed for Montevideo on-board the RMS Darwin. Just 18 of the 24 men who had arrived four years previously were left. Two of them had to be repatriated before on medical grounds. Richard W.and Helmut K, separated from the group and returned to Germany in 1958 because they were possibly tired of the constant pressure to conform and the lack of privacy. Helmut Dihlmann and Werner Rittershofer were the first to drop out from the sect. Mechanics by trade, the two outgoing young men obviously had no trouble mixing with the locals. Rittershofer departed the Falklands for Pforzheim in April 1959 and fifteen years later rejoined the 'Cordians' at Paso Flores. Dihlmann stayed on to become a naturalised British subject.

He was immensely popular with Islanders and was twice chosen Prince Charming (in 1961 and 1966) at the annual May Ball. For some time, he had run the Water Filtration Plant in Stanley and worked on the RRS John Biscoe and the RMS Darwin before he was employed by the British Antarctic Survey (BAS). In the early 1970s he moved to Southampton where he became an employee with the P&O shipping company. Dihlmann is still remembered in the Falkland Islands and even the radio station in Stanley (FIBS) broadcast a brief obituary shortly after his death on June 12, 2005, in appreciation of his services to the community.

Leo W fell out with Cordier and was the first to separate from the Goose Green group. Most of the time he was out shepherding at the Trap (Walker Creek farm) and stayed in the employ of the FIC until he left for Greece. It is not known when 'Peter' (Guenter) Vogler broke up with the 'Cordians'. Islanders were very fond of the talented guitar player and amateur painter. He felt at home in the Falklands and worked with the Darwin Harbour/Walker Creek gang until his untimely death in 1968,

The editor of the 'Falkland Islands Monthly Review' of September 1959 expressed what most Islanders might have felt when the road gang departed: "We are sorry that this honest and hard working community has left us. The Filtration Plant and the new roads are proof of their industry and ability."

Over the garden fence with Ginge Kidd


BRRR this rather cool spell has led to an enforced rest from gardening outside, all digging and weeding is off the agenda at the moment. Call me a softie if you like but gardening is a pleasure and trying to find shelter and a drvish area to work in would not be that, at the moment.

It's a great time of year though. to get the used pots and seed pans washed up and ready for the coming season. It would be nice to think that all bugs and diseases would not survive the cold, but who are we kidding? All those nasties are survivors. And so, the sink in the peat shed is in use, but I'm not that tough in cold conditions and so a bucket full of hot water taken from the kitchen joins the cold water in the sink out there. The addition of Jeyes fluid or, when that runs out, some bleach is all that is required although some washing up liquid makes it rather pleasant to use too; the rest is down to elbow power. Mind you in this cool weather if Bill goes away for any length of time quite a few pots get sneaked in to the comfort of the kitchen sink as well.

The other job waiting to be done is the cleaning of the greenhouses, apart from some cuttings they are more or less empty, except from one of the longer ones which Bill is using to paint fence battens in, that is.

There really is no good reason to put off this bit of essential 'house' work but I will wait for a sunny day to do the job as it makes it rather warmer and more comfortable to work in. Again. a bucket of hot water with Jeyes fluid or bleach will do the trick. whilst a plant label will get in to those areas where the glass overlaps and any other inaccessible

A plant patrol on one of the better days led to removing some of the dead leaves on the hellebores. They were planted close to the paths for our enjoyment and so are easy to see and reach. All are flowering beautifully in shades of white for some plants and various pinks through to purple red on others; lovely. The same patrol revealed loads of bulbs already showing their noses and, in some cases, quite a lot more too. It's no where near spring but the signs are promising

Any reasonable days have me outside and digging another row of potatoes. So far the results are anything but great, but it's a job that must be done and each row dug now is one less to do in spring when everything is demanding attention, both inside and outside. The early and second early potatoes are still in the raised beds outside: the kiddies planted those.

It is a bit of a shame to have them in the beds as it means digging beds which should not need it, but with everything else being planted so late last year the raised beds would have gone to waste otherwise


I'm going to try growing some 'green' manure in them once they have been cleared. I think that with some fleece over them they should grow. Hopefully so, as I don't think collecting manure will be possible before the spring. I'm also going to plant some 'green' manure in a couple of the greenhouses. This should be a wonderful way to return something to the soil and perhaps stop them becoming covered in weeds

As sweet peas do reasonably well planted to grow over winter, I'm going to try planting some vegetable peas in the borders of one of the tunnels this year. Who knows, with our seasons behaving


rather strangely this might be the way to go. We could never hope to grow enough for our needs and to freeze as well but they should certainly provide enough pickings for our two legged mice. Meanwhile, both inside and outside we have plenty of greens to keep us all happy. I am particularly fond of a kale I grew for the first time this year. It's just known as Russian red kale; it's very productive, great in stir fries and even better raw. I like the fresh new growth, which keeps coming on in the heart of the plant as long as it is kept cut, very thinly sliced or shredded and in a salad, either a mixed one or on its own. A little dash of sugar either in the dressing or over the kale itself makes it a very pleasant and refreshing change. At this time of year it would be all too easy to just eat stodgy, but very, comforting food. And to end up looking like an animal just brought back in spring from a tussae island.

The new roses grown from cuttings barely became established this year so I don't expect they have much of a root system yet. They are making a lot of top growth though and this is rather whippy and weak so I will cut them down before frosts and winds lift them out of the ground or do other damage. The bits I cut off will serve as more cuttings; who knows where they might be needed?

Last year I had some success with the Embothrium (Chilean fire bush). I have started off some more with the hope of getting a few to root again, fingers crossed. As ever, there are cuttings of all sorts planted in any convenient container and any other odd corner under cover too.







Flexibility for cattle shifting

FEARS that an inflexible schedule for animal shifting from ports other than the ferry terminals with Concordia Bay was "holding back farming" are to be looked into following a discussion at the Agricultural Advisory Committee

MLA lan Hansen said he would like to see a certain amount of flexibility in the current Workboat Services schedule to allow shipment of stock "I believe this would be best addressed by setting aside certain dates well in advance, perhaps twice a year, so those wishing to ship livestock from farm to farm could plan accordingly," he added

Rural Business Association representative Louise Pole-Evans highlighted the issue, explaining that on occasion the Concordia Bay sailed directly past ports wishing to either send or receive cattle and instead the animals had to go through a long and stressful system of being dropped at the main terminals for onward overland movement.

Miss Pole-Evans from Saunders Island said she had experienced problems personally, but was also making the point on behalf of others who had raised the issue with her.

Workboat Services manager Adam Cockwell said the company always tried to be as flexible as possible with their customers, particularly when moving animals, "but there is a fine line between remaining flexible and having an unpredictable ad-hoc service which only benefits the minority." Top squid season despite lack of data sharing

A LACK of cooperation from Argentina to share data means that the total Illex fishery for the region is not known and affects the accuracy of seasonal predictions in the Falklands fishery, it was reported at the Fisheries Committee on Thursday.

Senior Fisheries Scientist Dr Sasha Arkhipkin presented the scientific programme for the Fisheries Department for 2015-2017 outlining research and studies to be undertaken in that period and said that because of Argentina's lack of cooperation to share data "we don't know how many fish are in the water" of the whole region. This affects accuracy of forecasts and stock predictions for the Illex fishery, "but there are other ways to predict data" he said.

The Falklands have enjoyed a very good season despite the lack of regional cooperation.

In the Lohgo fishery, more than 28,000 tonnes of Loligo was taken by the end of the first season, making it the third highest Loligo catch after 2010 and 2012. and an absolute record of 300,000 tonnes in the Illex fishery was hit by June 10.

Over 500 jiggers visited Berkeley Sound this season and 20 Korean juggers are still fishing in our zones.

It has been a big year for transhipping as a result of such successful squid catches, and a record number of fees have been collected, Director of Natural Resources John Barton told the committee

One of the most successful

areas elsewhere in the fishery has been the two year study on mesh size of nets to address by-catch. "our most serious problem" said Dr Arkhipkin.

Rock cod by-catch was a particular concern in the past and the fishery has recovered since. Fishery of rock cod is down this year, "but that in part is down to demand from the industry" said Mr Barton.

The by-catch of small skates is a serious problem as they are discarded by vessels, he told the committee, and further explained that though the fishery is steady the catch is not of consistent quality. "Creating a Marine Protected Area like we did for Toothfish and whiting may be worthwhile," said Dr Arkhipkin. Continued on page 2



If it's your dog, then it's your mess

Senior Veterinary Officer Steve Pointing sends out another plea to dog owners to please clean up their dog's mess in and around Stanley.

WHEN you take your dog out for a walk please go prepared with a poop scoop and a dog poo bag. If someone else is exercising your dog for you then please provide that person with the necessary items.

Why is it important to clean up after your dog?

Well the most obvious reason is that it is not a nice experience for someone else to have to walk in it and that alone should be sufficient reason but there are public health implications as well.

The two main public health issues in the Falkland Islands are hydatid disease and the spread of roundworm larvae. Most of you are aware of hydatid disease as it been present in the Falkland Islands for many years and several of you will know of someone personally who has had to suffer the very unpleasant consequences of contracting that disease. Fortunately it is at a very low level now in both the dog and sheep population in the Falkland Islands and, as a result, there have been no new human cases for a considerable period of time

The other disease that dogs can spread via their facees is a condition in humans known as visceral larval migrans. This occurs when a human being (often a young child) eats the eggs of the roundworm which they have picked up on their fingers while playing in the park or the garden. These eggs hatch inside the person and the emerging larvae then migrate to various parts of the body.

In many cases there will be no major consequences but in a small number of cases the larvae will migrate to important parts of the body such as the eye or the brain where they could cause blindness or neurological symptoms.

The easiest way to prevent this is to worm your dog (and cat) frequently, always get children to wash their hands after playing outside or when they have handled their pets and to pick up dog poo as quickly as possible so that the roundworm eggs don't have a chance to spread on to the ground

Horse poo too?

Some people have asked me why we make a fuss about dog poo, but don't make a similar fuss about horse poo which can also be seen in the town streets at certain times of the year. Well, as far as I am aware, horse poo isn't linked with a particular public health concern and so it is more of an environmental issue than a medical one.

As vets Zoe and I have to deal with animal poo in all its forms and we both agree that the poo of the carnivores and omnivores (cats, dogs, pigs and humans) is much less pleasant to deal with than that of the herbivores (cattle, sheep and horses). Perhaps there is something to be said about being a vegetarian after all!

Studies into the biology, trends, maturity and size of stock, not just the quantity, of different fisheries is scheduled to take place over the next few years.

Statistics showing the observer deployments to vessels in the Loligo fishery was also presented to the committee that showed an annual coverage of the fishery of more nine per cent. Chair of Falkland Islands Fishing Companies Association Cheryl Roberts said the report was very helpful, although personally she would like to see more observers on vessels.

It was agreed that this kind of report should be produced annually to assist the industry.

Mr Barton said he thought the number of observer boardings was "fair" given the difficulties in weather conditions and logistics but discussion evolved in the committee to address how the process could be made easier, including the possibility of requesting ships to dock at FIPASS to tranship observers. At the moment an observer is required by Customs to only land at a registered port said Mr Barton. With each observer costing around £35,000 annually "to move from six to seven observers to fifteen or so would potentially be a big problem for the budget he told the committee.

Borders' fresh data shows new potential

BORDERS and Southern Petroleum PLC on Tuesday said new data on the Darwin gas condensate discovery in the Falklands showed the potential for wider hydrocarbon distribution.

The Falkland Islands-focused oil and gas exploration company said that new data, from enhanced seismic data, has confirmed its previous interpretation of the potential distribution of hydrocarbons over Darwin East and West.

It said its new base case model estimates a wet gas in place of 2.6 trillion cubic feet and the recovered condensate of 263 million barrels, up from previous estimates, which it said was due to improved net pore volume and an improvement in fluid recovery. The company said that its new base case estimate of recoverable condensate of 263 million barrels is dependent on successful appraisal wells.

The company operates and has a 100 per cent interest in three production licences in the South Falkland Basin covering an area of nearly 10,000 square kilometres. It has acquired 2,862 kilometres of 2D seismic, 2,517 square kilometres of 3D seismic and drilled two exploration wells, making a gas condensate discovery with its first well.

Shares in the company were up 1.0 per cent at 12.50 pence on Tuesday morning, having touched an intraday high of 13.00p.

Chicks counted after arrival

ALL being well the Falklands population can look forward to being supplied with fresh eggs around October from the recently established Yolks4Folks business at Beckside Farm.

An Import Substitution funded initiative managed by Alan Steen, Yolks4Folks safely imported 1,200 day old chicks on the MoD Airbridge flight on May 22.

Interim General Manager Martin Slater said only three of the chicks had died and he was hopeful that the supply could be replenished when needed by the system set up with the Airbridge.

Admiral White

ADMIRAL Hugo Moresby White who was Captain of the Type 21 *Avenger* in 1982 died aged 74 on June 1.

Admiral White fought off several Exocet missile attacks in the Falklands and accepted the surrender of the Argentines at Fox Bay on June 15. He later became the Governor of Gibraltar.

Flexible cattle shifting

The Workboat Services contract with Government has two more years to run before it is reviewed in 2016, and MLA Phyl Rendell said there was a need to work out some guidelines with Central Services for flexibility over the next two years.

Mr Cockwell told Penguin News that ultimately it was up to the Government how the service runs and explained that the policy for the past six years had been that all deliveries were carried out to/ from New Haven. Stanley, Port Howard or Fox Bay

Bay. "Deliveries to other ports, unless the port in question has impassable roads, are not normally carried out and the Government position has been that diversions to extra ports should be charged at full cost recovery," he said.

MLA Hansen said he would look into the matter but users should recognise that there would be an associated cost involved, although not full cost recovery, explaining that the daily costs of operating the vessel are the same and extra fuel would be minimal when "popping into a port," if the ship was passing close by as part of an itinerary.

Mr Cockwell said, the movement of animals to a "convenient port" because the ship can "just pop in" might benefit the farmer who happens to be nearby, "but the majority of farmers will still need to come and collect their animals from New Haven or Stanley (or Fox Bay/Port Howard for the West) the way they have for the past six years with no apparent concerns over the welfare of the animals."

"WSL always, of course, welcome any discussion over scheduling and ways to improve the service to the islands as a whole. The key issue for us is to have a service which is as reliable and predictable as possible to allow customers to plan in advance," he concluded.

Court news

Fined for assault by beating

STANLEY man Shane Mitchell (22) was fined £140 and ordered to pay £100 compensation and £85 costs after he admitted assault by beating.

Crown Prosecutor Simon Rowe told the court that on April 5, Mr Mitchell had been out to the pubs from about 6pm and consumed some 30 to 40 drinks throughout the evening

In police interview Mr Mitchell said that as the night wore on he had become agitated at people barging past him in Deanos and when he was outside he had "lost it," and struck out at a random person.

The Probation Officer described how Mr Mitchell had been going through a low time in his life and had used alcohol as a way of dealing with it. She said he had resolved his issues, had not used alcohol for several weeks and had no ongoing issues with his victim.

JP Judy Summers said she was pleased he was now addressing his problems, but stressed he had been "out of order," to hit someone.

Taking into consideration his previous good character and early guilty plea she said he had avoided a higher fine, adding, "I hope we don't see you in here again."

Driving offences go to trial

MOUNT Pleasant contract worker Robert Bromley who was charged with drink driving, failure to stop and failure to report an accident and careless driving before he left the Falklands last Friday, has had a trial date set for July 30.

Crown Prosecutor Simon Rowe said as Mr Bromley did not appear in court it could be assumed he had pleaded not guilty and to set a trial date was the best way to progress the case.

He explained to the Justices of the Peace that Mr Bromley had made his position clear to Royal Falkland Islands Police when interviewed that his contract and accommodation provision had expired and he had to leave the Islands on June 13.

Mr Rowe said a pragmatic approach had to be taken with Mr Bromley given an opportunity to respond, however he said he should be reminded that if he failed to attend the court on July 30, the case would proceed in his absence.

Your Questions Answered ments and so on.

IS it a requirement in government departments that individuals only ever communicate in English in work time - with their first language only allowed to be used in breaktimes?

The Human Resources Department of Falkland Islands Government responded as follows.

ENGLISH is the established A working' language in Falkland Islands Governemnt (FIG). Using such a common language in the workplace ensures that all staff can clearly understand and pass on all relevant information given to them in the workplace correctly.

It also means that everyone should understand any instruc-tions given or received by them or their team members in relation to their duties in the workplace so everyone knows clearly what must be done, how and by when.

FIG considers this is particularly important when the duties need to be carried out in such a way as to provide appropriate protection of staff members welfare and ensure health and safety measures are met and maintained; i.e. where the duties involve lifting and handling heavy items or machinery, or working with items which can be at extremes of temperature or using sharp imple-

It is commendable for staff to try to help out or offer instructions to those who might have difficulty with English. However it should not be forgotten that one of the best ways to get to grips with any language is to take every opportunity to communicate in it and FIG encourages this practice wherever possible to facilitate such learning

It should also be noted that a core competency in FIG common to all grades is the ability to 'communicate effectively' in the workplace; i.e. FIG expects individuals to have a sufficient grasp of the working language of the organisation (English) to be able to do their job properly and safely.

Of course should a service end user require some support communicating in English when it is not their first language then FIG will try to assist with any translation if and when considered necessary; e.g. a crew member from a jigger who does not speak English presents themselves with an illness at the hospital and can't give their symptoms without some translation support

In such exceptional cases FIG will seek out those with any relevant language skills for that specific purpose, but it would not be anticipated as being part of anyone's day to day duties in the main

US Judge wary of Argentina

US JUDGE Tomas Griesa said on Wednesday that the televised speech delivered by President Cristina Kirchner on Monday after the US Supreme Court declined to hear an appeal by Argentina in its battle against the holdouts was "a problem" for negotiations and said he did not trust the Argentine leader.

"Now that really does not give me confidence in a good faith commitment to pay all the obligations of the Republic said Judge Griesa in reference to the Monday speech, which he described as "unfortunate"

Argentina has shown a more than clear will to pay, but there is a difference between negotiation and extortion" Cristina Kirchner said after the Supreme Court decision.

Responding to a request by NML Capital and other hedge funds that sued Argentina for payment. Griesa lifted a stay, or freeze, on his court order last year for the country to pay up. This refers to the pending payment of 1.3 billion dollars plus interests

The stay had been in place while the parties waited to see if the Supreme Court would accept Argentina's appeal for it to review the case. But the court turned the appeal back, and by lifting the stay on Wednesday, Griesa started the debt clock ticking.

Argentina is scheduled to make repayments by June 30, to both holders of the restructured debt and now the hedge funds. If it does not pay, a 30-day grace period gives it until the end of July before it will be seen as in default again. MP

Jackie Earnshaw of the Tabernacle explained that Taurai Lore come to the Islands to work with de-mining company Bactee during the 2009/2010 season and made many friends.

On his return to Harare he had a short holiday with his wife and children before going to Afghanistan to work with the de-miners there. It was during this time that he picked up a severe virus which affected his kidneys and he had to return home for medical treatment. There it was discovered that the condition was worse than first thought and he is now in renal failure and requires renal dialyses at least twice a week but preferably three times a week unless he can find a kidney donor.

Initially this treatment was paid for by the medical insurance that covered his work but that ceased at the end of 2013.

During this time his brother was found to be a good match and offered to be a kidney donor, they flew to South Africa for the transplant operation but sadly on arrival the medical staff discovered that his brother only had one normal kidney, the second one was likely to cause a problem in a few years time so the transplant could not go ahead.

Lore now has to fund his own treatment and each dialysis costs a minimum of \$60 his wife tries to buy and sell vegetables to make more money and it is Lore's hope to set up a small business which would make sufficient funds to pay for his treatments and help to support his young and growing family.

The Tabernacle has sent some funds from time to time but we would like to send more and therefore all donations from the Soupersaturday will be sent direct to Lore in Harare.

Miss Earnshaw said should anyone who wished to donate to this cause but is unable to join them for the soup, could send donations to the Tabernacle to be added to the fund. Starting at midday there will be a variety of hot soups and cakes on offer, said Miss Earnshaw.

Breast milk contains exactly the right amount of nutrients that a baby needs and it is delivered in a form that can be digested easily and so causes less chance of diarrhoea, vomiting and constipation. Also this perfect balance of nutrients means that breast fed babies are significantly less likely to develop obesity.

Breast milk also contains important antibodies (cells that fight disease) that can help protect the baby from infections during the first months of life meaning that they may well get fewer chest and ear infections

Breast milk rarely passes on an allergy so breast fed babies seem to have a reduced risk of developing an allergy later in life. This also means that breast fed babies are significantly less likely to develop eczema.

Any amount of breast feeding has a positive effect. The longer

the baby is the breast fed, the longer the protection lasts and the greater the benefits.

Breast feeding has benefits for the mothers too. It saves money, naturally uses up to 500 calories a day, lowers risk of getting breast and ovarian cancer, and exclusive breast feeding can also delay the return of periods.

Breast feeding is a relaxing and enjoyable time for the mother and her baby, creating and maintaining a close skin and eye contact and building a strong physical and emotional bond between them. It can give a great sense of achievement.

However, not all women are able to breast feed easily and can have difficulty. Fortunately, there are quite a number of aids for breast feeding available. Mothers should talk to a midwife or health visitor about it. There are also women who, for a variety of reasons, do not wish to breast feed. Talking the matter over with a midwife or health visitor may help to quell fears or objections, or provide possible alternatives.

Mothers have the right to choose whatever they think is best for them and their baby. But they are strongly encouraged to seek as much information as possible, so they will come to a decision based on the facts.

Notice from the Taxation Office Change to Medical Services Tax (MST) Allowance

As a result of the budget process it was agreed the MST allowance for individuals would increase from £15,000 to £60,000. The new allowance is for the tax year 2014 but will not be applied until 1 Jan 2015.

Employers are still required to apply MST deductions as per the current 2014 tax tables for the remainder of 2014 (Therefore no changes required to payroll systems for 2014 to avoid any problems e.g. electronic systems)

Employees will receive any MST refund due through their individual tax assessment for 2014 income, for which the £60,000 MST allowance will apply. (This avoids refunds being given early when the overall tax position of the individual is not known until their 2014 income assessment is issued as they may have MST due from other income sources e.g. relevant profits, or an Income Tax demand which any MST refund would be offset against.)

There has been no change to Employer MST, this remains 1.5% on employees' gross earnings and benefits in kind.

How does the change in MST allowance affect me?

I'm an employer, what should I do?

- Continue running payroll as last month Use the payroll tables and information issued previously for the 2014 tax year
- Before the start of the 2015 tax year, the Tax Office will issue new information and payroll tables for 2015
- MST rates remain at 1.5% Employer and 1% Employee

Im an employee (or self-employed), when will I get my refund?

- The increased personal allowance is being backdated to 1st January 2014
- You will receive any refund after you've submitted your normal tax return after the 2014 year end
- To prevent complications for employers running payrolls and extra administration, refunds will not be paid out until next year



Operation Tabarin Britain's secret WWII expedition



RECENTLY published, Operation Tabarin by Stephen Haddelsey and Alan Carroll tells a remarkable Antarctic story with Falklands connections.

In 1943, with the German Sixth Army annihilated at Stalingrad and Rommel's Afrika Korps in full retreat after defeat at El Alamein, Winston Churchill's War Cabinet met to discuss the opening of a new front. Its battles would be fought not on the beaches of Normandy or in the jungles of Burma but amid the blizzards and glaciers of the Antarctic. Originally conceived as a means by which to safeguard the Falkland Islands from Japanese invasion and to deny harbours in the sub-Antarctic territories to German surface raiders and U-boats.

The expedition also sought to re-assert British sovereignty in the face of incursions by neutral Argentina. As well as

setting in train 1 a sequence of events that would RATION eventually BARIN culminate in Falklands the War, the British bases secretly established in 1944 would go on to play a vital

part in the Cold War and lay the foundations for one of the most important and enduring government-sponsored programmes of scientific research in the polar regions: the British Antarctic Survey.

Based upon contemporary sources, including official reports and the diaries and letters of the participants, Operation Tabarin tells for the first time the story of this, the only Antarctic expedition to be launched by any of the combatant nations during the Second World War and one of the most curious episodes in what Ernest Shackleton called 'the white warfare of the south'. 

Fin's war: A brave and skilled captain who saved many lives

THE late Finlay Ferguson who sadly passed away in February this year was a hugely patriotic character who attended every Liberation Day in his quiet and respectful manner.

His absence was duly noted and a glass raised in his honour by his friends this year and it seemed appropriate to record some of Fin's less known activities as a seafarer in 1982 and his brave efforts to assist the British Forces.

Fin's war was an eventful one which began soon after the invasion when as captain of the Penelope he received an urgent message from the FIC manager Brook Hardcastle to sail to Egg Harbour in Falkland Sound to pick up the children of West Falkland who had been at the school hostel. Consequently they were driven overland from Stanley to Egg Harbour from where Fin transported them across to Port Howard for collection by their parents

Just a day or so later an Argentine crew took over Penelope and the local crew were instructed to remain working on the ship initially, but they were finally allowed to leave the vessel at Egg Harbour from where they walked back to Goose Green only to be locked up together with the other civilians in the Social Club where they stayed until the liberation of the settlement on May 29.

Following the battle for Goose Green and the release of the locals from the hall, Fin took up the role of skipper on the Monsunen. Unforlunately for him there was already a Royal Navy officer on the ship, a Lieutenant McLaren, who was there to control their movements and operations. In Lt McLaren's eyes, the Monsunen was his ship.

On June 7, Fin and the Monsunen moved a full load of about 200 Gurkhas and Paras from Goose Green to Fitzroy, as part of the effort to move the 5th Infantry Brigade forward as quickly as possible. Once unloaded, the Monsunen returned to Goose

Green for another load. The safe to go, arguing that the fine weather navigation of the Monsunen through the challenging waters of Choiseul Sound in the dark was entirely down to Fin. The trip was about four hours each way

By first light on June 8 1982 the Monsunen was again alongside the jetty at Goose Green. She was joined by the LCU (Landing Craft Utility) Foxtrot Four from HMS Fearless, with Royal Marine Colour Sergeant Brian Johnston in command, Both vessels were loaded with further elements of 5 Brigade for the big move to Fitzroy. Foxtrot Four was loaded with six Land Rovers, signals equipment, and some personnel of 5 Brigade's HQ and Signal Squadron. The Monsunen's derricks were used to load the vehicles on to Foxtrot Four. Monsunen meanwhile, was to transport another 180 soldiers that were predominantly Gurkhas.

Both vessels were to make a night passage to Fitzroy, but an Officer at Goose Green ordered them to sail in daylight as the rest of 5 Brigade required their loads at Fitzroy urgently. Colour Sergeant Johnston could see how important the signals equipment was and left immediately. Fin, on the other hand, refused

to Fin, he didn't reply. It wasn't exwould almost certainly mean that Argentine jets would be out and he didn't want to be caught in broad daylight with a ship full of soldiers. Very few had lifejackets and none had survival suits. Lt McLaren wanted to sail and ordered Fin to do so, but after a "heated exchange" Fin put him in his place and they staved put until dark.

The soldiers were loaded on to Monsumen in the late afternoon. By then the tragic news had been received that Argentine Skyhawks had caught Foxtrot Four in Choiseul Sound and attacked her. The bombs and cannon fire destroyed the wheelhouse and badly damaged the stern, killing six personnel including Colour Sergeant Johnston. The survivors shuffled the vehicles forward to raise the stern and keep Foxtrot Four afloat A Sea King helicopter then arrived and lifted the survivors off. With Foxtrot Four abandoned

and adrift near the entrance of Choiseul Sound, Fin received instructions via Lt McLaren that they were to locate the LCU, take her in tow and then proceed to Fitzroy. Fin told Lt. McLaren - "Thank Christ we didn't go with her!" According

They lowered a Gemini inflatable and two divers quickly cleared the propeller. Just as quickly as she arrived. HMS Yarmouth backed off and disappeared into the night.

By now most of the troops were very seasick and in a bad way in the stuffy hold. Fin got Monsunen under way and decided to anchor in the lee of the Sea Lion Islands in Choiseul Sound to give the soldiers a break. This was a familiar anchorage that he was able to find easily in the dark.

Foxtrot Four had drifted off into the darkness and was never seen again. She sank, taking her dead and precious cargo with her. Orders came through for the Monsumen to return to Goose Green where a Chinook airlift awaited the troops. Fin had her back alongside the jetty before sunrise.

Fm's refusal to sail in daylight probably averted a major disaster and saved countless lives. Had he sailed in company with Foxtrot Four then the Skyhawks would have had a choice of two targets. and with Monsunen being the largest it is reasonable to assume that they would have gone for her. His actions were nothing less than heroic and were never fully recognised.



FIG wants too much control says Chamber of Commerce

"THE Government wants development, while not wanting to pay for it, but yet it wants to control it," was one of the points made by the Chamber of Commerce in response to a Land Development Policy paper up for discussion at an Extraordinary Lands Committee meeting on Monday.

A document recommending a variety of options on land disposal policy changes for industry development, to effectively "unlock" policy for the business case for a port development, was presented to and supported by the Committee.

The document was designed to, "protect and strengthen FIG's interests on Crown land," and create, "a clear and consistent framework," for its disposal in the face of oil development, said FIG's Head of Policy Jamie Fotheringham.

Mr Fotheringham said he believed international interest would remain unchanged should the policy options be approved but local companies had shown dissatisfaction, particularly with the 99 year lease policy.

The Chamber of Commerce (CoC) viewed the policy changes as too weighted in Government's favour, granting them a level of control which would discourage private investors.

Back in 2010 it was calculated by the CoC that the average cost before constructing a commercial building (excavating, backfilling, etc) would cost the business around £200,000 per acre.

Including inflation on top this

figure it is believed a business would be expected to invest too much in land that the document recommends should only be leased to them.

In the letter to the Lands Committee, CoC's Executive Secretary Stacy Bragger said they believed FIG was developing policy too slowly to keep up with oil industry demands and as a result Falklands companies can not participate fully.

"We are disappointed that all the land will remain in the ownership of FIG. Private sector development cannot be funded or make the cash investment without the certainty of getting the return. The companies concerned are taking all of the risk and should get the rewards," said Mr Bragger, adding that FIG would still benefit from sale of the land, and taxation.

"FIG policy is unrealistic, FIG wants development, while not wanting to pay for it, but yet it wants to control it. The private sector best understands what it needs, not Government deciding what the private sector needs," concluded Mr Bragger.

Mr Fotheringham said the port development is "reliant" on land rentals and that the proposals put forward satisfy the business case for the port "at this stage."

It was noted as unusual that the policy options on development of Crown Land were being considered before the business case for the port development it was designed to support has been drafted and circulated.

Mr Fotheringham explained that it was being pushed in order to speed up development of the land for the oil industry, as the process had already been slowed considerably waiting for the business case to be presented. The document encompassed policy change options for a variety of proposals, he said.

He also anticipates all land earmarked for industrial development, not just that specifically direct to the port, will be included.

"The business case has slipped from May to July already," said Chair of the Lands Committee MLA Jan Cheek, who added that the options included were needed to, "unlock" policy for the port development.

Mr Fotheringham suggested that some of his 10 concluding recommendations outlined in the paper could be adopted immediately. MLA Cheek said she was reluctant to see it delayed longer. The task has stretched from months to over a year and is "holding up development," said MLA Cheek.

FIG Payroll audit response

LEGISLATIVE Assembly yesterday accepted the Government response to the Public Accounts Committee (PAC) findings following the Payroll Audit in 2013, although MLA Gavin Short who six months ago when the PAC noted the FIG Payroll Audit had referred to the system as "rotten from the bottom up," chose not to support the motion.

He said the response did not answer all the questions and "left him with doubts in his mind." adding that he would have preferred to see more detail at this stage, particularly regarding the wilful obstruction to the audit by a member of Human Resources (HR) staff.

MLA Poole said the matter of wilful obstruction was very much an internal matter for the Chief Executive to deal with, adding that it was not appropriate to discuss that particular item in Legislative Assembly.

Giving the background to the issue MLA Ian Hansen said that at the request of the PAC an internal audit of the FIG payroll was carried out in 2013 and the findings reported in August that year. The high level finding of the chief auditor was that the control mechanisms with regard to the payroll system was unsatisfactory.

PAC raised concerns about the report in a letter dated September 27, 2013 which included the possible wilful obstruction to the audit process and asked if it had been dealt with properly in line with the management code. **Continued on page 4**

WITH the Falklands and Argentina both having put their views to the United Nations C24 yesterday I was gratified that MLA Mike Summers chose to again this year take the hard line and point out that the committee as it currently operates, and by its own admission, is not doing its duty.

I would be tempted to go a step further and suggest it is as almost as corrupt as the country which undoubtedly puts pressure on those who consistently ignore the very basic rules with regard to the "Implementation of the Declaration on the Granting of Independence of Colonial Countries and Peoples."

As we went to print Hector Timerman was still trotting out the same hypocrisy as in previous years, we did't know if the level of support for the Falklands cause had increased, and I was left wondering what other avenues could be explored. Is it time to take the sovereignty and our right to self determination issues to an international court of law? Probably not. While I have the highest regard for the integrity of the law, putting our fate in the hands of an individual or small group who might base their decision on the fantasies cooked up by the other side and not even bother to visit the Islands, just as the C24 has opted to do to date, is a far too risky move.

Further research into the outcome of similar cases revealed that even when International Court judgment has been made, it does not necessarily follow that it is complied with and disputes rumble on. With our antagonist's track record in sticking to any agreement either with us or other countries you can appreciate that I slammed the door shut on that train of thought pretty darn quick.

So that still leaves us eyeing up the locked and well blockaded door of the C24, but at least our representatives are no longer timidly tapping and then going away when not invited in for smoko.

When the cold hard facts of history and the wishes of the people make no impact, there is no better battering ram than to question the integrity of the Committee leaders and members themselves and that is just what our MLAs are now doing. Thank you MLA Summers and Edwards.

Presumably if the invitation to visit the Falklands is again ignored, as it has been on seven previous occasions (the most notable being in 2011 when the chairman was invited here to balance his recent visit to Argentina) the credibility of the C24 will surely have to be investigated at a higher level?



C24 not doing its duty says MLA Summers

ADDRESSING the United Nations C24 on Thursday, MLA Mike Summers got straight to the point and reminded the Committee not only of its current duty, but also of its inability in the past to fulfil its obligations to the Non Self Governing Territories (NSGT) it should be assisting to reach a post-colonial status acceptable to the people who live there.

The C24 was specifically not charged with mediating in or determining any sovereignty disputes, said MLA Summers, adding: "Upholding the basic human rights of the people of the Non Self Governing Territories is your single and solemn duty."

He urged the Committee to listen to the wishes of the Falkland Islanders expressed so clearly and democratically in the March 2013 referendum; a referendum which, he reminded them, the Committee had signally failed to seek accreditation to observe, "despite having had every opportunity, and a clear mandate on behalf of the UN, to do so."

MLA Summers said the Committee had, by its own admission, "failed in its duty and its mission for the past two decades."

He encouraged the Committee to examine what had caused that failure and to then remedy it.

"Above all get out to the territories which are in your care, talk to the people, see how they live, test the extent of their self government, and ask them what they want for themselves. That is the way to discharge your duty, and to have real success going forward.

"We have formally invited the Committee of the C-24 to send a visiting mission to the Falkland Islands on many occasions before. We have not even had the courtesy of a response."


Addressing the Chairman Xavier Lasso Mendoza of Ecuador MLA Summers reminded him that his his predecessor had said: "Visiting missions were critical not only in terms of hearing the concerns of the people in Non-Self-Governing Territories, but also in terms of arriving at informed conclusions through the collection of data."

He said that statement was correct. "We have formally invited you again this year, and are assured that the UK, as administering power, will not object. And nor do we set conditions on the makeup of the delegation. If Argentina objects it can only be that it continues to be afraid of the truth, of openness and transparency, and of the power of basic human rights," said MLA Summers.

MLA Roger Edwards outlined the Islands history and highlighted that the Falklands had British sovereignty since 1765, a time when Argentina did not exist as a sovereign nation. He said that during a recent visit to the Island of Fiji he had invited the C24 Chairman to visit the Falklands.

MLA Edwards repeated the invitation saying he had formal letter of invitation which would be presented to the Chairman with a copy to the Secretary General.

Concluding his address he said he realised that some people would only hear what they wanted to hear, "others will only hear if they are prepared to listen, but I do hope that on this occasion members of this committee are prepared to listen and to take note."



'Know what's right' child safety awareness campaign launched

A HARD hitting 'Know what's right campaign' aimed at raising awareness of the issue of child sexual abuse was launched on Wednesday by the Falkland Islands Safeguarding Children Board.

Public Relations and Media Manager Krysteen Ormond who co-ordinated the campaign introduced it as, "a culmination of six months solid work." Pointing out that invited guests included youth groups, nurseries, publicans and business owners, and those who work with children, she emphasised, "at the end of the day keeping our children in the Islands' safe is everybody's job."

safe is everybody's job." Chair of the Safeguarding Board Hilary Rowland put the vital campaign in context noting that it was the very first recommendation of the Government commissioned Lucy Faithful Report, and describing it as a, "hugely important long awaited piece of work." She thanked the Foreign Office and the Falklands Government for funding it and Sure and the NSPCC for funding the helpline which has the telephone number 28888

She said she felt it was incumbent on her to outline the key messages of the campaign, those being:

- The Falkland Islands are a small community but it is not immune to child sexual abuse.

- The Falkland Islands takes a zero tolerance approach to child sexual abuse.

- Sexual activity with children is wrong.

- If you perpetrate sexual abuse

you will get caught.

- We can all help protect our children and keep them safe.

- If you have a worry or concern, talk about it. Schools, health, police, social services are geared up to help you with them

- The internet poses risks to children, but we can help minimise these.

- Children and young people, do not have to do anything they do not want to. They can say no and 'no means no'. If they have a concern they can talk to someone. They should look out for each other. Child safety awareness is a campaign that everyone can help out with. Apart from sharing the leaflets and promoting the key messages, businesses and organisations can use the campaign banner on their website and signpost people to the website www.falk-lands.gov.fk/more-information/FISCB. Just on a day to day basis people can also start conversations with people about the campaign, why it is needed and what it is trying to achieve.

The desired outcomes of the campaign are multifaceted and range from making it clear to adults not only that sexual contact with children under 16 is wrong, but that adults know who to talk to if they are concerned about a child's or another adult's behaviour.

It also aims to give positive messages to young people about staying safe and about appropriate, healthy relationships and help young people know who to talk to if they have a concern about themselves or a friend.

It emphasises to young people that they can say no to sexual activity and also make them more aware of the dangers online.

The campaign also aims to better inform clubs and organisations about sexual abuse and what they can do to help.

Campaign materials are available for distribution and include 'Smart Rules for Parents and Carers' and 'for Adults to Share with Children'. There is the 'In the Know - Tips for Keeping the Under 12s Safe' and 'In the Know - Tips for Keeping Young People Safe.''

If your concerns involve the internet there is 'The Internet and Children - What we all Need to Know' and for young people specifically there is the 'In the Know - tips for Safe Relationships'.

There are four posters available covering a range of issues relating to sexual abuse.

A special Falklands link for Midshipman Harrisson

AN HMS *CLYDE* Midshipman with strong Falklands connections is currently serving in the Falklands. Lucas Harrisson is the son of Islander Sandie Harrisson and Mark Harrisson.

Lucas' parents first met in the Falklands shortly after the 1982 War, Mark was a contracted helicopter pilot and Sandie in telecommunications. A few years after they married they decided to relocate to the UK, choosing to settle in Guernsey.

Lucas started working for a commercial boat company, but as he enjoyed life at sea so much, decided that joining the Royal Navy was a logical career move.

In 2013, after completing his A-levels at Elizabeth College School, he joined Britannia Royal Naval College, Dartmouth, as a Warfare Officer. Graduating the same year as a Midshipman, Lucas went on to complete his Initial Warfare Officer's course at HMS *Collingwood*. Portsmouth, where he studied basic navigation and



ship handling. In March 2014 he joined the Falkland Islands Patrol Ship, HMS *Chyde*, to undertake further navigation and warfare training before returning to the UK for his final assessments at the start of next year.

Since he joined, the ship has

had an extremely busy programme; one of the highlights the 1,500 mile round trip to the island of South Georgia.

There he was able to explore and view the incredible scenery, despite frequently being chased by the local wildlife - the fur seal pups. He said the trip was made especially memorable when members of the ship's company were hosted by government officials in South Georgia at a dinner, the meal consisting of roast local reindeer.

More recently HMS *Clyde* conducted visits to the islands and outlying settlements around the Falklands.

He said this had provided many opportunities to further explore his mother's homeland and to catch up with some family friends. Having a little local knowledge aboard the ship has proved invaluable, especially when it comes to getting hold of a hot drink and some home baking during visits ashore. Home baking provided by his Aunts Nancy and Myriam has been enjoyed by the ship's company on a number of occasions; allegedly the chocolate brownies are a particular favourite.

Settlement visits have been varied, he says, ranging from penguin spotting on Bleaker Island, to attending the memorial service at San Carlos.

With only a few weeks left on HMS *Clyde*, Lucas hopes to make the most of his remaining time by exploring the Islands further. He is due to join the helicopter carrier HMS *Ocean* in July, when he will also be promoted to Sub Lieutenant, to complete his navigation training. Once fully qualified as a Warfare Officer he hopes to specialise as a helicopter pilot in the Fleet Air Arm.

HMS *Clyde* is the Royal Navy's longest deployed warship, having been on patrol in the South Atlantic and the waters surrounding the Falkland Islands since August 2007.

AT an early extraordinary Lands Committee meeting on Monday we discussed a paper on Lands Disposal Policy for development land to be remitted to Exco in July. An interim policy put in place last year and confirmed by Excolearly this year, froze land transfers for oil related activity pending a decision on the new port for which we await the business case. People are understandably concerned that the interim policy not only had run for longer than anticipated but that it is also affecting progress on other developments. In common with much that we do, it entails a whole series of complex issues and further work is required on defining exactly what land is available for developers and whether developers can get finance on leasehold land

LEGISLATIVE Assembly this week includes the Children Bill, an important piece of legislation which represents many weeks of work. Some worries have been expressed that some of its provisions amount to interference in family life. I think those worries are misplaced; with all the recent concern about child safety issues there are times when intervention is both appropriate and necessary. In all such matters the welfare and safety of children must be the priority.

THE Hon. Gavin Short and I had a brief session with a group of students who have just finished their GCSEs. While encouraging them to seize all the training and education opportunities on offer I remembered that 1 was one of the lucky few to win scholarships and bursaries and gain access to further and higher education in the 1960s, returning to teach 45 years ago. I hope their generation do appreciate that the funding available to them places them in a much happier position than most UK students who are obliged to run up large loans in order to gain many qualifications. Likewise there are many apprenticeships on offer and with a useful trade there are many lucrative job opportunities. With dual temptations of Wimbledon and World Cup football, I've experienced my first smidgeon of regret at being full time and having to watch late night repeats and roundups.

FIG Payroll audit response

The PAC also noted that a large number of issues raised in the report had not been actioned and asked that the root cause of this failure to act be resolved as soon as possible.

The PAC also advised that one of the reasons given by HR for not resolving previous issues was that the payroll service was being outsourced. PAC said outsourcing should not be pursued while issues were still to be resolved.

MLA Hansen said the Chief Internal Auditor had given examples of how problems that exist in the payroll had been compounded by FIG departments and that there appeared to be serious management and training weaknesses in these departments which needed to be seriously addressed so that the administration of payroll in HR could function properly.

It was also noted that the software in place was not being utilised properly and a large amount of tasks were being carried out manually often leading to errors.

Seconding the motion MLA Michael Poole said they had taken the allowed six months to respond as a government because of changes to senior management in HR. The response was not particularly detailed but did cover a number of the key points, said MLA Poole

He said FIG had accepted there was significant room for improvement within the payroll system, did not dispute the major findings of the PAC report and recognised the obligation to ensure the proper management of public funds.

He said it had been decided not to progress with out-sourcing the pay roll and changes had been made in the Human Resources team with new software introduced and training provided to staff.

MLA Poole said directors were now directly responsible for signing off payrolls and were accountable for any errors. Further work was planned he said, but added that MLAs were not satisfied that all the recommendations had been carried out

In December last year Assembly Members asked that the result of the enquiry, "be made public," with MLA Roger Edwards saying a report from the Chief Executive to Executive Council within six months was an obligation.

"We'll be keen to see it and make it a public document," he said



Your Questions Answered

How much does the Government make on duty per packet of cigarettes?

The Customs and Immigration Department provided the answers for the this and the next question

A The duty is calculated by the tobacco weight per cigarette, this varies depending on the brand. Different brands contain different amounts of tobacco in their products. As an example, the duty on packet of 20 Embassy Number 1 cigarettes is currently £4.87.

What was the total revenue from duty on tobacco for the last financial year?

A The total revenue from all tobacco products was £568,195.

Q Does this go directly into the medical budget as was indicated it would several years ago, or into the central fund? Financial Secretary Nicola Granger responded

A In the 2008/09 budget a greater than previous increase was approved on tobacco duties, with the additional funds this raised being directed into the medical budget for the provision of free smoking cessation aids. This principle has continued and $\pm 20,000$ is included in this year's budget to fund these aids.

Everything you need to know about ... Selling a business



Alison Inglis of Pinsent Masons explains the process of selling vour business

SELLING a business is often the culmination of years of work. It can be an emotional and a timeconsuming task. There are many reasons to sell a business, but one thing that is common to all sellers is that they want the best possible sale price. What follows is a brief overview of some of the main considerations that apply in selling a business.

Why am I Selling?

You've decided to sell your business. Why? That's one of the first questions a potential buyer will ask. Owners commonly sell their businesses for any of the following reasons:

· Seller wishes to do other things

- Market conditions
- Opportunistic buyer appears
- Retirement
- Illness

Whilst the reasons people sell businesses are diverse, careful planning is essential. Some owners consider selling a business when it is not profitable, but this can make it harder to attract buyers. You should look at the business's ability to sell, its readiness and your timing Detailed tax advice should also be taken to ensure that the time and structure is right for you. It is therefore important to remember that preparation is key to success in selling.

How much is my business worth?

A business is worth precisely what someone is willing (and able) to pay for it - and what you would be prepared to sell it for, Standard valuation techniques include a multiple of earnings or a net asset valuation. Arguably the only true way to value your business is to put it on the open market and see what offers you receive.

There are many attributes that can make your business more attractive, including.

· Increasing profits trend

· Consistent historic income figures

Strong customer base

Scarcity of product or service

Preparation

To ease the sale process, it makes sense to gather together in advance all relevant documentation. Buyers will require details of contracts with key suppliers and

customers, service history (and service contracts) for assets included in the sale, any guarantees from suppliers or contractors, and relevant consultancy agreements. They will also want sight of planning permissions, building per-mits and completion certificates for recent building works.

Shares or Assets?

If you are contemplating selling your business, then there are various structures which can be used. If the business is run by a sole trader or a partnership then there will be no shares to sell. If the business is owned by a company there is a choice of selling the assets of the company, or selling the whole company itself by selling its shares. Many of the principles are very similar whether it is a share sale or asset sale. The general rule of thumb for a company sale is that a buyer will normally prefer to buy the assets of a business and the seller will prefer to sell the shares. The important point to remember is that in an asset sale, the company itself will be selling the assets, whereas in a share sale, the individual shareholders of the company will be the sellers

What is the process striking the deal?

The valuation of a business and the deal structure proposed for a sale are interrelated. The structure will often have important implications for tax planning and should be discussed at a very early stage with your accountants. Changing the structure of a deal at the end can be time consuming and costly. and may weaken your bargaining position

some time negotiating fairly detailed heads of agreement (that are then reflected in a legally binding "Sale and Purchase Agreement"), as this will reduce the scope for disagreements later on. The following is a list of typical matters (not exhaustive) which might be included:

· Purchase price

· Timing and the form of the payment

 Structure - sale of shares or assets

· Assets and liabilities included excluded from the sale

Premises – freehold or leased?

 Intellectual property rights · Future involvement of the seller in the business (if any) and

restrictions on competing Service contracts/consultancy agreements

- Warranties and indemnities
- Employees

Timetable

Confidentiality

It is often important to ensure that the proposed sale is kept confidential from third parties (e.g. customers and employees). If the purchaser has not already signed a confidentiality agreement some detailed provisions (stated to be binding on the buyer) should be included in the Heads of Agreement, including a commitment not to use the confidential information for any purpose other than the proposed purchase.

Conclusion

Every sale of a business is unique in its terms but many of the principles are the same. Factors that contribute to a smooth and successful sale are pre-sale preparation, an awareness of the sale process to follow, early consultation with key professionals and realistic expectations as to the price the business will generate.

Contrary to popular belief, Town Planning does not set out to make your life difficult. It aims to ensure that we, those who live and work here, develop our town and country in a careful, sustainable manner, without hindering the quality of life enjoyed by residents now and in the future and without losing the character of Stanley that many of its residents are fond of.

It may seem, considering the subject of this article, that we as planners are far too concerned about the minutiae of development. However, sometimes the minutiae are what gives us the quality of life we have and want

This week: fences

to protect.

We appreciate that privacy is important to people and that this is maintained by erecting fences around our properties. However, we do not live in isolation, but alongside other people, in a society that is governed by laws such as the Planning Ordinance 1991. Society places some responsibility on each and every one of us to abide by the regulations contained within those laws and to live alongside each other with due respect and concern.

There have been a number of incidences lately of tall fences being erected around properties in Stanley, with most owners doing so unaware of the legally required planning permission that must be in place beforehand. To nip this

For further information please contact David or Carol Eynon on 21144, 21145 or 51145 in the bud, below is the guide as to what is classed as 'permitted development' (ie. planning permission is NOT required) in regard to fences:

The basic rules are:

• On a roadside boundary (within 2m of the nearest edge of the footpath - or kerb in the cases where there is no footpath) you can erect a fence up to 1 metre in height* without the need for planning permission;

• On a boundary between neighbours, you can erect a fence up to 2 metres in height* without the need for planning permission (*as measured from ground level.)

When it comes to roadside boundaries, particularly those on a corner, care must be taken not reduce the visibility around that corner for drivers approaching it.

Generally, a fence of 1 metre will not affect this but in some cases for example, where the fence is solid panels or featherboarding and not separate rails pickets, a property owner may be asked to take the fence further back into their property just for the corner section. If you feel that this may be a concern for your fencing plans, please do not hesitate to contact the office to discuss.

Some may wonder why there is a limit placed on permitted fencing height. Whilst the Ordinance does not provide an explanation, the limitations ensure that plans for anything above these heights, which are likely to have a significant visual impact, is put out to the public for consultation.

Ultimately, this is your town and the planning process gives you the opportunity to have a say in what is acceptable or not. In the case of fences between neighbours, the height limit ensures that one neighbour does not block out the other neighbours access to light during the day, without the affected neighbour having a say in the matter. Your right to hight and to privacy are protected by the Planning Ordinance.

In conclusion, you need to apply for planning permission if.

- you want to build over a metre on a roadside boundary: or

- over 2 metres between you and your neighbour.

The process involves the completion of a simple form and submission of a site plan, plus a picture of the proposed fence design. You should receive a decision within an eight week period. Failure to obtain the relevant permissions for your fence can result in enforcement action being taken and the fence being taken down. Save yourself the wasted time and expense and come and discuss your plans with us and, if need be, submit an application. This is a free service.

Take Argentine flags from visitors

1, like many, am fed up with the total impunity with which visiting Argentines (mostly they are NOT veterans) arriving for a week every second Saturday, are permitted to wander around the Islands and in Stanley openly displaying Argentine Flags and wearing Argentine military uniforms.

Complain to the Royal Falkland Islands Police and you are told 'there is nothing we can do' if the guy is in an Argentine uniform apparently it would be discriminatory to ask him to change!

What started originally as a means of allowing groups of bereaved families and veterans to return for peace of mind some years ago, has not surprisinglybeen railroaded by Kirchner for political aims. So they annoy and aggravate us in the hope that one day someone will flip and retaliate and out will come the Argentine press cameras, and of course the local would no doubt be promptly arrested.

Genuine folk used to just mainly come in small groups in summer but for the last few years they come all year round and often in groups of twenty or thirty most with passports of identical date which of course are often, only as a last resort, passed to Immigration at MPA for stamping. And just as often an Argentine ID card is given to our Customs officers instead as if they were just "entering part of Argentina". Well done to our Customs staff for facing down the aggravation and forcing them to produce a passport; at least one of our uniformed services has some balls

Most likely the Argentine government pays them to come; how else could ordinary Argentines afford the US dollars?

I am told that the best policy is that of the Royal Falkland Islands Police who go and talk to the Argentines in their accommodation after arrival and explain what is sensitive such as flags and uniforms. What a farce. It really is totally ineffective. I imagine said Argentines roll around on the floor with laughter after the 'friendly chat'.

Instead every second week of the month, local people have to put up with the deep personal hurt of seeing that ugly flag flying around the Islands and everything evil that it represents and reminds us of; and distressing sight of Argentines in 1982 style military uniforms strutting about on our Islands in public.

For many of our senior citizens it is often too much; they lock their doors and stay inside and are often reduced to tears because of the memories it all brings

back.

But NO - there is nothing we can do apparently. It's not a breach of the peace. FIG could not give a damn about the PEACE of MIND of its citizens nor their wellbeing. And we must not "discriminate" instead we have to accept being discriminated against, in our own country.

These visitors tend to come with an agenda and are very different in attitude to the majority of those who pay their own way here on cruise ships

To those in charge of our laws, and perhaps more recent arrivals to the Islands, can I put it another way? How do you think your parents and grandparents would have felt about people in gestapo uniforms waving swastika flags being allowed to walk freely about England in 1946? Would it have been allowed?

WW2 ended in 1945 and the aggressors dropped all territorial claims. BUT on June 14, 1982 the only thing that ended here was live bullets and lead flying about. In every other format Argentina in 2014 is still waging economic and communications and political warfare against the Islands.

All it really needs is the decision by FIG to authorise Customs and Immigration to search visitors' luggage on arrival, remove any flags or uniforms, label them and return to the owner the following Saturday at departure.

Tabarin book review errors

I READ with interest your review in last week's Penguin News of the book recently published by Stephen Haddelsey and Alan Carroll on Operation Tabarin.

I write now to correct what 1 consider to be some significant errors in the description of what operation Tabarin was about.

The Operation never had a military purpose and was never conceived to do so. The personnet involved were employed directly by the Colonial Office and had no military weapons with them. The cabinet meeting on 28 January 1943 which decided upon the operation did not involve Churchill -- it was chaired by Attlee - as Churchill was returning from the Casablanca summit meeting at the time. In fact Churchill seems to have been unaware of the operation until he read the press release in the Times on 24 April 1944.

The operation had only one purpose which was to establish permanent occupation of the Falkland Islands Dependencies to bolster the British claim in the face of what were seen as Argentine incursions, following firm advice from the Foreign Office legal advisors that protest

notes were not sufficient. The story about searching for German raiders was deliberate propaganda (also decided upon at the January Cabinet meeting) aimed primarily at the USA because of worries that the US would take a dim view of British Empire building. Incidentally the record of that Cabinet meeting is still, officially at least, closed more than 70 years after the event.

Tabarin had its roots in the offer made by William Speirs Bruce in December 1903 of his observatory on Laurie Island in the South Orkneys to the Argentine Meteorological Service, an offer passed on to the Argentine Government by the Resident British Minister in Buenos Aires, and that they were quick to take up. British Government acquiescence in their occupation was quickly seen to have been a mistake and this was one factor behind the formal issue of "Letters Patent" creating the Falkland Islands Dependencies in 1908.

It is stretching a point to claim that Tabarin was in any way directly implicated in the subsequent Argentine invasion of 1982. What is undoubtedly true however is that in the eyes of the British Foreign Office the claim to the FID and the claim to the Falkland Islands have been very closely coupled as regards policy (or lack of it) ever since Argentina began its permanent occupation of Laurie Island.

All of this material was published by myself and my colleague Prof David Walton in a peer reviewed paper in Polar Record in 2011.

In writing this response 1 do not presume that the errors are necessarily contained within the book, as I know that Stephen Haddersley made significant use of the Polar Record paper in the drafting of his book.

Equally the proposal by Port Smyley Group who have looked into developing a deep water port in San Carlos Waters should be supported and discussed. An alternative to the proposed deep water port in Port William is needed and should not be discounted. In fact it has many distinct advantages as outlined on their web site.

While Stanley will someday need to replace or renew FIPASS we have with a future oil industry, the opportunity to open up an area in Falkland Sound which is more central. Port Stanley was never going to be the best place to build a new capital, but in 1843 circumstances dictated otherwise. Those reasons have long since gone and with the coming of the oil industry we have the ideal opportunity to open up an area close to Falkland Sound and make it the oil capital of the Faiklands whilst retaining the civic and historic capital that Stanley has become.

I would love to hear people's views on the concept of having another large urban area and port centred near the Falkland Sound. It is certainly not a pie in the sky vision of mine, but a real concept that will take the Falklands into the next exciting stage of its development as a small independent nation.

Page 8 Remembering Finlay Ferguson (1935 – 2014)

FINLAY James Ferguson was born in Stanley on March 7, 1935. He was the fourth child of John Ferguson, a Scottish immigrant from the Hebrides, and his wife Ethel from New Island. One of Fin's surviving sisters Teen is well-known here in the Islands: his other sister Effie lives in Scotland. His older brother Bob. another Falklands seafaring legend, and younger sister Mary have since passed away.

Such was the way with travel in those days that it was some months before Finlay could be taken by his mother for the first time to his remote Weddell Island home to meet the rest of his family. No sooner was he there than the family moved for work purposes to nearby New Island – where he remained until his early teens.

Those early formative years included occasional visits by such travelling teachers as Jim Lellman. Sam Henner and Doug Harries, and occasional gatherings on Weddell Island with the children from other farming families. But it was in Stanley in 1948 that Fin finished school and began working life as messenger and delivery boy with the Estate Louis Williams store on Philomel Street

Later that year he took what he would eventually look back on as a 'fascinating' job - perhaps because it first involved him going to sea, helping to transport

and construct the equipment and premises of the new Albemarle Sealing Company. As a 15 year old lad he joined some 36 other men and for \pounds 8 a month worked alongside his brother Bob. finally ending up as galley boy on one of the ships which undertook the difficult and dangerous work of hunting seals.

Thereafter various jobs ensued and each time it required Fin to watch and listen carefully and learn by doing: he worked as a sort of engineer on the old *Fitzroy*: he worked as a lorry driver on Weddell Island; he carted rubbish for the Town Council here in Stanley; he tried tractor driving out at Fox Bay; he worked on road construction on East Falkland; and he took part ownership in a haulage company based here in town.

Then in 1957 he was employed as engineer on a ketch known as *Gambler* and within 10 months he was appointed her skipper. Notwithstanding a change of ownership of the boat to the FIC, and a change of operating base to Goose Green, Finlay

continued to cart sheep, cattle, shingle and the like until, in 1965, Gambler was found to be unseaworthy, too expensive to repair, and so was condemned. Fin did his best for a while on the leaky and rather dangerous Black Swan but fortunately (as far as Fin was concerned) this boat too was condemned after a 10 minute inspection by a visitor from Lloyds of London. That year (1967) FIC acquired a new sturdy wooden vessel, already well-known around in the Islands and the company approached Finlay to be the new skipper of the auxiliary ketch Penelope, a post he would hold for the next 19 years

Of course he took this in his stride and learned too to watch over and manage his everchanging crews of between three and eight men - including for over five years the ever-loyal and trustworthy Brian Jaffray - and eventually to accept the post of Manager on behalf of FIC of their many island farms, including Speedwell Island. It was tough work and often involved seven days a week travelling, shearing, culling and fencing - lugging their own generator around with them almost everywhere they went. All this took its toll on family and personal life and his wife Kathy, who he'd married in that key year of 1967, and their daughter Marie didn't see too much of Fin at Goose Green during the spring, summer and early autumn each year.

Fin was at Speedwell Island when the Argentines invaded on April 2, 1982 and the story of how he subsequently ferried many children from Egg Harbour on East Falkland across the Sound to relative safety at Port Howard was well told by Alan White in last weeks Penguin News, as well as the dangerous days when under Argentine orders he was required to make trips in the Penelope during terrible weather conditions, and spend the worst night he'd ever endured in the Penelope during the whole of his 19 years as her skipper.

1984 saw Fin take his leave of the company and settle at Bleaker Island for some 13 years with his second wife Rose. From a financial point of view this episode in his life was especially difficult but he gave it his best shot. It wasn't all doom and gloom though as someone explained recently:

[•]Finlay loved the cruise ship visits to Bleaker, especially the more interesting characters on board. He had, at that time, a Citroen 2CV, and often used to fill it with crew members (particularly the prettier ones) and take them on little tours. The crews of the ships always looked forward to these visits and a stop at Bleaker was always eagerly anticipated, not just because of the wildlife but also because of Fin's warm and engaging personality'

In 1989 the FIC decided to sell the Penelope which was bought and operated out of Weddell again for the next five years by his brother Bob and nephew John, and in 1991 they sold Bleaker Island too. After those increasingly tough and lonely years out there Fin returned to Stanley and complemented his already varied working career by serving first as manager of FIC's Land Rover agency and then later as their watchouse manager. In 1997 he completed 30 years with FIC and left their employ - and as late as 2006 he could still be found working for the Co-op; but in that year he officially retired, spending much of the following years here in Stanley in the company of his third wife, Ellen.

'Not an easy life' Fin subsequently reflected, 'but I think I'd do it all over again. I enjoyed the work - hard work, it was. But it never killed me.'

There's so much more that could be said, as we all well know. In later years Fin made several trips to the UK and probably spent a good part of his time with friends at the Falkland Club – where he'd been a member since October 2, 1959. One of the members wrote:

'Fin was an important and long serving member at the Falkland Club. In recent years you could usually rely on him being there in the evening for a good yarn - about the garden, the weather or his favourite subject, which was boats. There is a strong core of members who love boats. and Fin was always good for a memory of old times: a piece of advice about reefs or channels, a story about moving sheep, or a bit of sealing. He was a font of knowledge about all things Falklands to do with the sea, and he will be very much missed.

If Fin wasn't at 'The Pot' he would most likely be in the company of his daughter Marie or one of his three granddaughters Isla. Kirsty and Verity-Anne, or of his great grand-daughter, Soraye.

years were closing Fin's somewhat clouded by increasing concern with his health. A diagnosis of cancer by the hospital in UK was terrible news but his personal courage kicked in and such wonderful Falklands friends as Nannette and Tooty, and former Foxtrot 4 man from 1982 days Keith 'Baz' Broom, were on hand to visit and encourage him day-by-day until he died peacefully on February 24, 2014.




In total 228 swimmers registered with 126 from Mount Pleasant and 102 from Stanley.





Page 13 Over the garden fence with Ginge Kidd

THE days are predictably dark and fairly miserable at this time of year and so it was a delightful surprise when Liberation Day dawned clear and sunny, wonderful to stand at the Monument in those conditions and see everything without wishing you had window wipers on your glasses or heated boots.

We are now approaching the shortest day: it does not mean (and usually doesn't) that anything will improve, but you do think you are starting to see a light at the end of the tunnel. For me it means starting to ensure 1 have enough of the correct seed and cutting compost and seeds to make a start one of these days, in the not so distant future now, on getting the propagators going. For the moment though 1 will have to make do with cress seeds in an ice cream tub on the kitchen windowsill and shrub, tree and various other seeds and berries sown in containers. outside, covered with netting to keep birds out and waiting to germinate once frosts and snow help them along. Meanwhile and as usual, my seed and 'wants' list grows ever longer. A trip to the Garden Centre will have to be made soon, you have been warned Jan

I don't believe gardens are unattractive in winter, though the colours certainly change or are a little muted perhaps. I was doing a little more cleaning in the vegetable garden on a reasonable day and found myself admiring the various blue, grey and green hues of our mixed eucalyptus hedge. It really is a lovely sight. Taking a break a little later 1 picked up my camera to see what I could see elsewhere and was truly delighted to find not just pansies in full flow and of course, many primulas too, but what really caught my eye were the various greens and browns and purples showing in the 'stumpery

The coloured Phormiums (New Zealand flax) are beautiful and the green ones are massive. The Cordyline australis (cabbage palm) looks much too tropical to cope with winter but manages to look great for all that. The Sedum (ice plant) is covered in dark red flowers; they are too late to interest the butterflies this year, but they look wonderful anyway. The Tolmeia (pick-aback plant) is equally attractive. It is normally grown as a house plant, but I have grown it here in the shade of the hedge; it loves the conditions and I have to trim it back every year before it strangles some other plant.

While I was out there I covered

(either with loads of cardboard or bubble wrap) all plants in pots outdoors which I cannot move into shelter or which might not be too hardy. Under cover we don't insulate much as it is not too practical (and who wants to help keep bugs warm anyway) but the odd plant I'm not sure about gets a plastic lid or bell cover just for safety.

It is very important to keep ventilating all under cover plants though as they very quickly succumb to botritys and the plant is unlikely to survive that. Any strawberries indoors are very susceptible even when it is warm so the damp, cool conditions are very likely to finish them off. It is also a good time to check for red spider mite and cock chafter beetle as they can create havoc under cover over winter.

It's as good an excuse as any to go out for a breath of fresh air and a plant patrol even if you can't do much else.

So far no newly planted shrubs or trees have been lifted by the, admittedly light, frosts we have experienced so far, but I check them anyway. A little care at this stage either with more compost on top or carefully pushing any roots on show, back in, will keep them safe. It is still possible on mild days if the ground is not too wet to shift plants in the wrong places, preferably with a board to stand on. I had made a list in the height of summer of plants I wanted to shift. Predictably I cannot find my list! But at least

on good days I can still trim back those shrubs and flowering plants which are trying to dominate the area. Many a cutting makes its way back into the ground at the same time. Deciduous trees such as willows, poplars and elders in particular are very quick to root at this time and will be ready to plant out in spring

In the vegetable garden we continue to harvest brussel sprouts, perennial kale and some red Russian kale (which I intend to plant in the flower beds next year as it's so pretty) and the savoy cabbages which are so good in salads.

The ordinary cabbages are good too, even if also enjoyed by birds or bugs. I intend to get out there and earth-up some of the young cabbage plants and other greens to give them some protection over the coming months.


As I empty the raised beds they are being fed with well rotted manure or home made compost; any chickweed that's not flowering is getting dug in also.

Once one of the compost bins is empty we will be able to turn over the contents of the other bin into it and that should then finish decomposing ready for the spring. All fallen leaves are going into that one this year also. Given time they make wonderful compost but left on the ground they can smother or kill good plants.


