19th June 1923

The Hon. The Colonial Surgeon,

I have the honour to inform you that, acting on your instructions. I left Starley at 5 a.m. on 14th inst., on the Cutter "Weddell" and proceeded to Port Louis South, arriving there at 1 n.m. on that day.

I examined the body of the late E. Robson, after having removed his clothing, and finding no arks of external violence had no hesitation in giving a certificate, in accordance with my findings, when I had seen the deceased at his Mothers house on the 8th inst., and the evidence I obtained at Port Lowis South as to the finding of the body.

The certificate as to the cause of death was as follows:-Primary. Heart Failure.

(Contributory)Secondary Emposure; Acute Alcoholism.

As soon as possible, the body was placed on board the cutter and we left for Port Stanley, but owing to lack of wind, we were unable to make the emit of Berkley Sound in daylight.

Owing to the inadequate accompodation of the Cutter, the Master decided to make "Johnsons Harbour" and anchor there for the night, so that Wrs J. Robson might sleep ashore.

We were becalmed there until 4 a.m. of the 16th, when we set sail for Port Stanley, arriving here about 10.30 a.m.
